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LP residents voice opinion for WaWa

LAKE PLACID — The debate on whether to let a WaWa convenience store into the old SunTrust bank building was brought up again by residents at the Town Council meeting Monday night. WaWa convenience store officials expressed a desire last summer to open a facility in Lake Placid at the corner of Interlake Boulevard and U.S. 27.

Lake Placid resident Dana Revel of Sylvan Shores spoke to Council during the public portion of the meeting. Revel pointed out that the Council does want WaWa and the revenue and jobs it will produce in the town as was discussed in the December meeting.

"I understand that, yes, you guys do want WaWa to come to Lake Placid," Revel said.

She went on to express her concerns and asked that the Council either change their minds on the ordinance or to change her mind with a solid argument.

"We no longer have a free market if you're going to specifically single out a certain type of business and say that particular

business cannot be on the same block, because nothing else in your ordinances is restricted in such a manner," she said. "Not only does the code of ordinances state that it can't be on the same block, but you cannot put another business on that same street front within 1,000 linear feet.

"That basically gives Gate a monopoly over that section of the town of Lake Placid," Revel said.

Lake June Park up for funds

SEBRING — Lake Placid officials plan to make a \$60,000 funding request today to the Tourist Development Council, to improve Lake June Park.

Total estimated cost of the project is \$294,200. The town has already gotten approval of up to \$277,700 in Highlands County funding from the county's Recreation and Parks Advisory Committee, as long as the town pays for the first \$16,500 of the project.

Today, Town Administrator Phil Williams — or his designee — will ask for \$60,000 from TDC to help offset some of those RPAC funds. The TDC meets at 8:15 a.m. at the Highlands County Board of County Commission meeting room, 600 S. Commerce Ave. in Sebring.

The Lake Placid Town Council wants to build new restrooms and picnic pavilions at Lake June Park, and has considered replacing the current combined pavilion and restroom structure for a long time.



The town now has plans and estimates for the project, which were submitted to TDC. Once fully funded, the project would take place in phases. Once completed, the town would provide all maintenance, water and amenities for the facility.

Based on plans, the town would tear down the exiting pavilion/restroom building for a retention pond. It would then build a large pavilion (60 feet by 40 feet), small pavilion (40 feet by 30 feet) and restrooms just south of the current site.

The proposed restrooms would be similar in size and design to those at Stuart Park in downtown Lake Placid: a metal roof building with a projected cost of \$53,700. Brantley Construction built the restrooms at Stuart Park, and the town submitted those same specifications for the TDC application.

Bill Brantley, owner of

Doing the right thing or possibly ending up in jail

SEBRING — When it comes to losing her wallet, Avon Park resident Connie Burke takes some responsibility.

She accidentally left her wallet on her vehicle last month and believes it fell off while she was driving.

"I was hoping an honest person would find it and return it," Burke said.

If someone had returned it, Burke would have beaten the odds, according to a CNN article.

A British privacy protection firm said only 1 in 5 people would hand the wallet in to a business or government office or try to track down the owner, according to the CNN article.

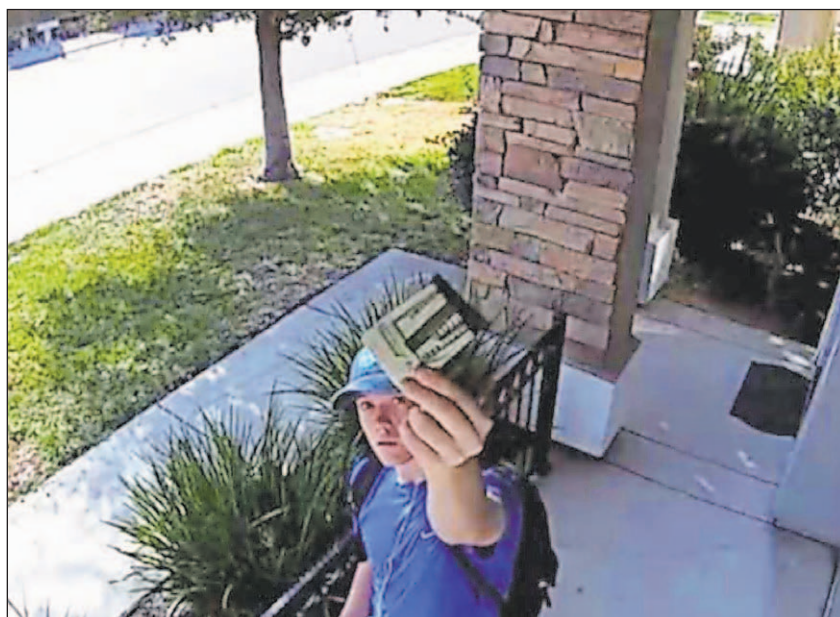
The article said researchers dropped 20 wallets and purses in each of five cities in Great Britain and only 20 percent of the wallets and purses were returned. Of those, only 55 percent contained the original sum of money in the wallet or purse when it was lost, the article said.

Burke said she knew she wasn't going to be the 1 in 5 when soon after the wallet disappeared someone used her credit cards.

It wasn't the money in the wallet that concerned her the most, Burke said. She was worried about the other stuff.

But, not everyone who declines to be a good Samaritan ends up benefiting from that choice.

Video surveillance seemingly is making it easier to catch the person who fails to return the wallet. And it's not just surveillance from where someone uses

a stolen credit card.

In January 2017, a woman reported that she left her wallet at a customer service desk. Video showed a man picking up the wallet and then later buying gas using a credit card from the wallet.

Sebring Police arrested the man, Pete Bloch, and charged him with grand theft and credit card fraud. Later that year, Bloch was placed on probation for a year and ordered to make about \$500 restitution after pleading no contest to the charges.

In a more recent case in December, Melinda Jean Chilson of Lake Placid was arrested after video showed her picking up a wallet that a man had dropped at a

convenience store in Avon Park.

Lake Wales Police have circulated photos from a video of a woman observed taking a wallet that a victim left at a blood pressure machine at Walmart. The video showed the woman looking through the wallet as she walked towards the garden center exit. The theft occurred on Dec. 12, 2017.

In another case, which was handled by the Polk County Sheriff's Office, a woman reported leaving her wallet on a corner at the Mulberry Dollar General Store. Video showed another woman picking up the wallet and paying for merchandise with it.

School Board salary study sparks discussion

SEBRING — Bus drivers and general cafeteria workers were among the positions that are underpaid the most in The School Board of Highlands County, according to a salary study the School Board reviewed at a workshop on Tuesday.

Evergreen Solutions consultant David Bollenback presented his findings on the salary study of 30 positions, which showed that overall, for the midpoint average of each position, Highlands salaries were 8.8 percent below the market.

Highlands salaries were compared to 13 other districts from the Heartland area and similar sized districts in the panhandle and the online Florida Virtual School.

Florida Education Association (teachers union) area representative Jim Demchak questioned the salary study's comparisons of teacher salaries due to the teacher workday hours used for Highlands.

The contract says that a Highlands County teacher workday is 7.5 hours, he said. "How do you come up with 7?"

Bollenback said the data he received stated a

Attorneys honored for pro bono work

SEBRING — Stephen R. Senn won The Florida Bar President's Pro Bono Service Award in 2006 and 2011, and will get it again this year for the 10th Judicial District, which covers Highlands, Hardee and Polk counties.

It might be because he reported more than 430 hours of pro bono service in 2017, and because he has, in the past, taken on victimization, family dispute, foreclosures, business losses and business disputes over the years.

His service-for-free cases have included such situations as when a repair shop sold a migrant farmworker's truck, a woman whose identity was stolen, a child who did not want to be returned to her father after her mother's death, a Turkish family who lost its half-interest in a restaurant and a dispute in Winter Haven between Friends of the Ritz and the leadership of the historic Ritz Theater.

Senn received his J.D. from Florida State University in 1989, is Board Certified in Appellate Practice, has been with Peterson & Myers P.A. in Lakeland since 1991 and has been a shareholder in the firm since 1999.

He joins attorneys from 19 other judicial districts and an attorney from outside Florida, all of whom have given help to Floridians who otherwise could not afford it.

Established in 1981, the Pro Bono Service Awards exist to encourage lawyers to volunteer free legal services to the poor. It does so by recognizing those who provide that help and raising public awareness of the volunteer services Florida lawyers provide to those who cannot afford legal fees. The awards recognize pro bono service in each of Florida's 20 judicial circuits as well as service by one Florida Bar member practicing outside the state of Florida.

In the most recent 12 months, Florida lawyers have reportedly provided more than 1.5 million hours of pro bono services and more than \$5.5 million worth of assistance through legal aid organizations.

The 2018 Florida Bar President's Pro Bono Service Awards will take place 3:30 p.m. Jan. 25 at the

Supreme Court of Florida in Tallahassee. Florida Bar President Michael J. Higer will present awards. It will broadcast live at wfsu.org/gavel2gavel.

Awards are given in conjunction with the Tobias Simon Pro Bono Service Award, which is given by the chief justice of the Florida Supreme Court.

Other awards will recognize pro bono work in categories of Distinguished Judicial Service, Distinguished Federal Judicial Service, Law Firm Commendation, Voluntary Bar Association and Young Lawyers Division.

Pray for the troops

The request is simple: “Pray for us.” It is something that all of us should do as more than 120 Florida National Guard troops from the 3rd Battalion, 116th Field Artillery Regiment begin a yearlong deployment in the Middle East.

A ceremony filled with well wishes, hugs, tears, flags and comments from Gov. Rick Scott on Sunday sent the men and women for what is the first combat mission for the Florida Guard artillery unit since World War II. For the past year, those same men and women have been training, mostly here in Avon Park. Some of the soldiers are our loved ones who work and live right here in Highlands County.

The exact destination of where the Regiment is headed remains confidential. What we do know is they will be supporting Operation Spartan Shield. The soldiers are expected to be somewhere in the Middle East for nine months to a year, joining a National Guard unit in Asia.

Operation Spartan Shield, ongoing since 2011, is U.S. Central Command’s means to “deter regional aggression and stabilize countries within the region. From Egypt to Pakistan, Kazakhstan to Yemen, the U.S. Central Command’s area of responsibility is strategically important as well as volatile,” according to the U.S. Army’s website. It further described the task force as “a unique, multi-component organization, made up of active Army and National Guard units, rounded out by U.S. Army Reserve support units.”

It’s easy to drive by the Armory in Avon Park and occasionally see the parking lot full, knowing that the men and women are doing training. The parking lot has been full a lot more frequently in the past year and now we know why.

What’s not so easy for the majority of us to remember is that we, as a nation, are still at war.

Regardless of where our local unit winds up, there is no question that they will be at risk. They are, after all, headed to the Middle East.

This is much different than helping with cleanup after a hurricane, or helping rescue victims of a flood. It’s much different than spending one weekend a month, or two weeks a year, away from family to train.

These soldiers will be in a foreign land. Every day they will wake and go to work, doing their part to fight terrorism, and defend American freedom and ideals. Every day, they will face a fear that, thanks to them, most of us will never realize.

To the soldier who asked, yes, we will pray for you and your fellow soldiers. We will pray for your safe return to your family and friends, and we will pray for comfort for your families.

Thank you to each and every one of you for your service and your sacrifice to this community and this nation.



Eventually, the other woman, Verlin Sue Wilson, surrendered herself. This was the second time she had been charged with theft, the Polk County Sheriff's Office said.

An article in the Huffington Post recommends that people who lose their wallets immediately file a police report, call credit card

companies and banks, and report cards missing.

They should report a stolen driver's license, notify their insurance company about a lost insurance card and place a fraud alert on credit files.

The article also recommends people should not carry their Social Security card, avoid carrying large sums of cash and sign up for identity theft protection.

A Wise Bread site article says that studies have shown that wallets

with baby pictures get returned more often than wallets without baby pictures. The writer speculates the baby photos evoke compassion.

But those in charge of evidence divisions at the Sebring Police Department and the Highlands County Sheriff's Office know honest people do exist in Highlands County.

"We do receive them all the time," Sebring Police Officer Raymond Rossy said. Oftentimes, someone turns in a

wallet to a store, he said.

The store often keeps it for awhile in case the person who lost the wallet returns, Rossy said.

The problem is that sometimes the wallets stay in safes for months before the store gives them to the Police Department.

Lt. Brian Kramer said the Sheriff's Office often gets wallets. Whether they contain all the original contents is unknown, he said. "We don't know how many hands it's been through," he said.

seven-hour workday.

Demchak replied he works with Highlands, DeSoto, Glades, Hardee and Hendry counties and they all have similar contracts with a 7.5-hour duty day with a half-hour duty-free lunch. They are salaried employees; they are paid for lunch even though there are no duties.

To compare Highlands to the others based on seven hours is not correct, he said. So the hourly rates are off by a 1/2 hour per day on all of these employees.

Demchak noted that a teacher with 10 years experience in Highlands

County can go to Glades County and earn \$9,000 more per year.

"It's a sad situation in this county and it is not the doing of the School Board; it is the doing of the finances," Demchak said. "I am not putting the blame on the School Board or the superintendent."

Discussion also focused on benefits.

During the overview of the study, Bollenback noted that The School Board of Highlands County provides an average of \$10,672 in benefits per employee while the comparison districts provide an average of \$7,615 in benefits.

School Board member Bill Brantley believed the benefits should have been included in the

salary comparisons for each position.

If the district would cut its insurance contribution, the employee says it is money coming out of their pocket, but when the district shows how much it is paying for insurance, the employee says it is not money in their pocket, he said.

Bollenback said his firm was not hired to do a full-scale benefits study.

The study showed there were nine surveyed positions that Highlands is paying more than 15 percent below market:

- Transportation area supervisor - 29.5 percent below market.
- Bus operator - 28.6 percent below market.
- Assistant superintendent - 24.1 percent below market.

The proposed location sits one block away from the town's Gate gas station, on the same block and street frontage: U.S. 27.

Revel also argued that the term "service station" is an antiquated term and needs to be revisited.

Council member Arlene Tuck said she has received much backlash from the public and even her own family members over the Council's previous decisions and might be willing to reconsider.

"Of my four years of being on the Council, this is the one that people have attacked me more with," Tuck said. "Why would you not put a WaWa in; do you know how great the WaWas

are?"

Tuck thanked the young woman for bringing the topic back to the forefront.

"People will die," Council member Debra Worley said frankly. "I don't mind the WaWa."

Worley stated that she would be willing to help WaWa come into the town. If they chose a different location, Worley said, it would be easier to get them lights, turn lanes and other items the company may need.

"We have economic development grants and if they employ 19 people and want to partner with the town, we can ask our grant people to explore getting \$650,000 to help them locate into a better site; help them with infrastructure and whatever else they need," Worley said. "It's not that we don't want that store."

Worley went on to cite that the traffic patterns would be a big problem at that intersection. She said that WaWa would want to use the same access from U.S. 27 as the Dollar General, which would cut back on that store's already limited parking. Worley also said she lives in town, close to that intersection but travels around the block just to avoid it because she deems it dangerous.

"We would very much

like to welcome that type of business into the community," Council member Ray Royce said.

Several conversations would be needed and two hearings, and the process could take several months, he said.

"There is no doubt in my mind that there will eventually be a change in that ordinance in some manner, at least in the definition and how it's handled. It's not a dead issue," he said.

Brantley Construction, also sits on the TDC Board and is a Lake Placid Town Council member.

Originally, the Lake Placid Town Council looked to spend approximately \$100,000

on a new pavilion and restrooms. That was before Highlands County repaved and realigned Tangerine Drive with a roundabout by the Lake June Park ballfields.

Now, Williams said, the overall scope of the park improvement project has expanded to include paved parking, to bring it up to the standard set by

the new road. That makes for a total final cost of approximately \$500,000, after all phases are done.

In a related but separate project, Lake Placid also went to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission in the fall and received an \$8,721 Florida Boating and Improvement Program

Grant for the park's floating boat dock. The grant was based on an estimate of \$9,691 from Costello Brothers Marine Construction of Sebring to install new components: two 28-foot-by-18-inch pontoons, two 4-foot-by-18-inch pontoons, pressure treated wood decking and boat bumpers.

3. Blackberries are similar to raspberries except that they have larger seeds and when picked the torus (stem) remains attached to the blackberry, whereas when a raspberry is picked the stem stays on the plant.

4. In the United Kingdom folklore stipulates that picking blackberries after Oct.

11 (Old Michaelmas Day) should be avoided because the devil has made them rotten or poisonous by spitting or doing other damage to the berries.

5. Blackberries contain copper which is essential for bone metabolism. It is also essential to the production of white and red blood cells in the body.

skiing are available in many snowy destinations and can be easier for beginners than downhill skiing. Or try one of the more offbeat snow sports. In some places, you can go snow biking. Others, like Ouray Ice Park in Colorado, offer ice climbing. There's also skijoring — skiing while pulled by dogs or a horse — and snow-kiting, which is like kite-surfing on skis, with the wind pulling the skier across the ice.

Dogsledding is popular in many wintry places, including Ely, Minnesota. For a truly remote experience, consider a sled dog safari with Tinja Myllykangas in Finland's Lapland wilderness.

How about Nordic skating? Also called tour skating, it's ice skating on a frozen trail rather than around a small rink, and it requires a different type of skate — typically a long blade attached to ski boots. It's popular in Sweden, Finland and elsewhere in Northern Europe, but you can also do it in North America on the Rideau Canal in Ottawa, Canada, and the Lake Morey Ice Skating Trail in Fairlee, Vermont.

Roller coaster fans can also now enjoy winter thrills with mountain coasters — which are gravity-driven roller coasters with dips, waves and loops — at three Colorado resorts: Aspen Snowmass, Steamboat and Copper Mountain. Colorado's Purgatory Resort also plans to open a mountain coaster this year.

Yellowstone and more

Travelers who have experienced Yellowstone National Park in winter say it's utterly magical: wildlife watching in the snow, geysers steaming in the cold air, cross-country skiing, snowshoeing, snow coaches, snowmobiles and more. Rick Hoeninghausen, director of sales and marketing for Yellowstone National

Park Lodges in Wyoming, says the weeks after Christmas are typically slow, though February is busier than January, with Presidents Day weekend often selling out. Except for that Feb. 19 holiday weekend, he says "most folks should be able to find lodging in the park" this winter at either Old Faithful Snow Lodge or Mammoth Hot Springs Hotel. Winter vacation packages like Winter Wolf Discovery or Winter in Wonderland combine lodging, meals and activities.

Or look into vacation rentals and resorts nearby. Big Sky Resort in Montana is 50 miles from Yellowstone's West Entrance, and Montana Backcountry Adventures offers an excursion to a yurt for an evening of dinner, music, sledding and stargazing.

But you don't have to go to a major national park to enjoy winter fun. Many smaller, local parks around the U.S. host special winter activities as well. Toboggan Run in Pokagon State Park near Angola, Indiana, is a 30-second thrill ride that can hit 40 mph with a 90-foot drop over a quarter-mile. Starved Rock State Park in Illinois, 90 minutes from Chicago, has gorgeous frozen waterfalls, various trails and even an overnight lodge.

Festivals

The Quebec Winter Carnival in Quebec City, Canada, runs Jan. 26-Feb. 11, with snow slides, snow sculptures, night parades, an ice palace and snow baths, where brave (foolish?) visitors play in the snow wearing

swimsuits. The Harbin International Ice and Snow Festival in China is known for massive, elaborate and colorfully lit ice sculptures along with art exhibitions and sporting events. The Harbin festival runs through late February, with heavy crowds expected the week of Chinese New Year celebrations, Feb. 15-23. Japan's Sapporo Snow Festival, Feb. 5-12, is also known for ice and snow sculptures. In Minnesota, a celebration called The Great Northern encompasses the Saint Paul Winter Carnival, Jan. 25-Feb. 10, with ice carvings and parades; the U.S. Pond Hockey Championships, Jan. 25-28, on Lake

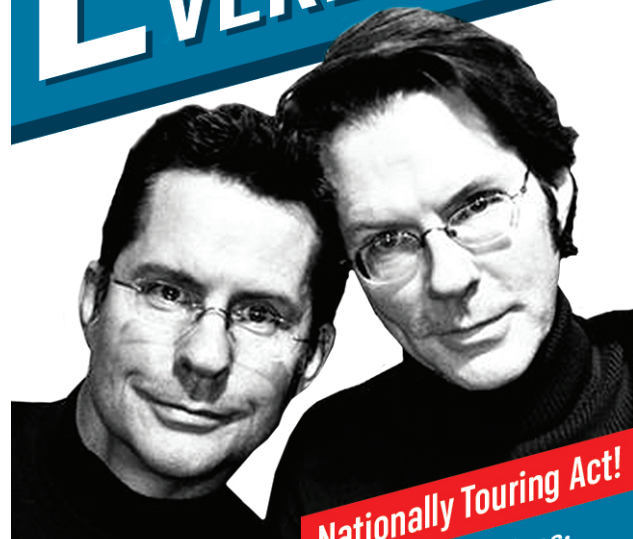

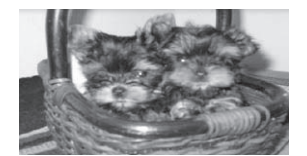

Catastrophe in California

Death toll hits 15 in California mudslides; 24 missing

MONTECITO, Calif. — Anxious family members awaited word on loved ones Wednesday as rescue crews searched for two dozen people missing after mudslides in Southern California destroyed an estimated 100 houses, swept away cars and left at least 15 victims dead. “It’s just waiting and not knowing, and the more I haven’t heard from them — we have to find them,” said Kelly Weimer, whose elderly parents’ home was wrecked by the torrent of mud, trees and boulders that flowed down a fire-scarred mountain and slammed into this coastal town in Santa Barbara County early Tuesday. The drenching storm that triggered the disaster had cleared out, giving way to sunny skies, as searchers worked carefully in a landscape strewn with hazards. “We’ve gotten multiple reports of rescuers falling through manholes that were covered with mud, swimming

pools that were covered up with mud,” said Anthony Buzzerio, a Los Angeles County fire battalion chief. “The mud is acting like a candy shell on ice cream. It’s crusty on top but soft underneath, so we’re having to be very careful.” Fifteen people were confirmed dead and two dozen people remained missing, said Amber Anderson, a Santa Barbara County spokeswoman. “We have no idea where they’re at. We think somewhere in the debris field,” she said. Buzzerio led a team of 14 firefighters and six dogs in the debris field, which was spread over 30 square miles. They used long-handled tools to search the muck. By lunchtime, they hadn’t found anybody, dead or alive. Twenty people remained hospitalized, four in critical condition. The deluge destroyed 100 houses and damaged 300 others, Santa Barbara County authorities said. Eight commercial properties were destroyed and 20 damaged. Weimer’s parents, Jim and Alice Mitchell, didn’t heed a voluntary

evacuation warning and had decided to stay home Monday to celebrate her father’s 89th birthday. She hoped to find them in a shelter or hospital. “They’re an adorable couple, and they were in love with their house. That’s their forever home,” Weimer said. People in Montecito, a wealthy enclave of about 9,000 people northwest of Los Angeles that is home to such celebrities as Oprah Winfrey, Rob Lowe and Ellen DeGeneres, had counted itself lucky last month after the biggest wildfire in California history spared the town. But it was the fire that led to the mudslide, by burning away vegetation. “We totally thought we were out of the woods,” said Jennifer Markham, whose home escaped damage in both disasters. “I was frozen yesterday morning thinking, ‘This is a million times worse than that fire ever was.’” Another storm-related death was reported in Northern California, where a man was killed when his car was apparently struck by falling rocks in a landslide Tuesday evening in Napa County.

Immigration agents descend on 7-Eleven stores in 17 states

LOS ANGELES — Seven immigration agents filed into a 7-Eleven store before dawn Wednesday, waited for people to go through the checkout line and told arriving customers and a driver delivering beer to wait outside. A federal inspection was underway, they said. Within 20 minutes, they verified that the cashier had a valid green card and served notice on the owner to produce hiring records in three days that deal with employees’ immigration status. The well-rehearsed scene, executed with quiet efficiency in Los Angeles’ Koreatown, played out at about 100 7-Eleven stores in 17 states and the District of Columbia, a rolling operation that officials called the largest immigration action against an employer under Donald Trump’s presidency. The employment audits and interviews with store workers could lead to criminal charges or fines. And they appeared to open a new front in Trump’s expansion of immigration enforcement, which has already brought a 40 percent increase in deportation arrests and pledges to spend billions of dollars on a border wall with Mexico. A top official at U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement said the audits were

Trump says it ‘seems unlikely’ he’ll give Mueller interview

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump said Wednesday that it “seems unlikely” that he’d give an interview in special counsel Robert Mueller’s investigation into potential coordination between Russia and the Trump campaign. Trump said “we’ll see what happens” when asked if he’d

provide an interview to Mueller’s team. “When they have no collusion and nobody’s found any collusion at any level, it seems unlikely that you’d even have an interview,” Trump said during a joint news conference with the prime minister of Norway. The special counsel’s team of investigators has expressed interest in speaking with Trump, but no details have been worked

out. Trump’s lawyers have previously stated their determination to cooperate with requests in the probe, which has already resulted in charges against four of Trump’s campaign advisers. Trump called the investigation a “phony cloud” over his administration. “It has hurt our government,” he said. “It was a Democrat hoax.” Trump’s words differed from

what he said at a news conference in June, shortly after fired FBI Director James Comey had told Congress that Trump asked him for a pledge of loyalty. Trump denied that, and said he’d be “100 percent” willing to tell his version of events under oath. He said he’d be “glad to” speak to Mueller about it. The comments come after Trump had already lashed out at the investigations on Twitter

Wednesday morning, urging Republicans to take control of the inquiries and repeating his claim that they are on a “witch hunt.” “There was no collusion, everybody including the Dems knows there was no collusion, & yet on and on it goes,” he tweeted. “Russia & the world is laughing at the stupidity they are

Mysterious series of fast radio bursts may have been twisted by extreme environment

Astronomers watching a fast-radio burst flashing from more than 3 billion light-years away say that its source lies in an extreme environment with a powerful magnetic field — perhaps a supermassive black hole, or the remains of a supernova. The findings about the phenomenon known as FRB 121102, described in the journal *Nature* and at the American Astronomical Society meeting outside Washington, hint that this mysterious source of powerful radio waves whose origin has puzzled scientists for years may finally be revealing its secrets. Since their discovery in 2007 from older archived data, fast-radio bursts have confounded astronomers. These bursts last only milliseconds, shorter than the blink of an eye, but in that tiny moment they are incredibly bright, a sign that whatever caused them was very powerful. “It’s some sort of extreme

physics that causes this emission and so the goal is to understand that,” study coauthor Betsey Adams of ASTRON, the Netherlands Institute for Radio Astronomy, said at a briefing Wednesday. The problem is that these bursts each only happen once — leading scientists to suspect that these were cataclysmic, death-throe explosions. So even if a telescope is lucky enough to catch one in the act of going off, there no way to go back to the same source for more detailed measurements. FRB 121102, sitting about 3 billion light-years away in a dwarf galaxy, was different. Since its discovery in 2012 it has repeatedly sent out flashes of radio waves, allowing researchers to train their telescopes on it to learn more about its origins. “We know of thirty sources of fast radio bursts, and this is the only one we’ve ever seen that repeats,” senior author Jason Hessels, an astrophysicist at the University of Amsterdam and ASTRON, said in an interview. Having now observed more

than 100 flashes from this single source over the last few years, researchers haven’t picked up a pattern to the bursts yet — aside from the fact that they often seemed to be clustered in time, instead of evenly spaced apart. Because of the extremely short, repeated bursts, the source was thought to be a kind of neutron star: either a pulsar (which spins very fast) or a magnetar (which spins but also has an extra strong magnetic field). Because it seems to sit in a star-forming region of its host galaxy, the scientists think FRB 121102 is linked to stellar birth or death. For this paper, the scientists wanted to figure out more about the environment around this source. Using data from the Arecibo Observatory in Puerto Rico and the Green Bank Telescope in West Virginia, the scientists looked at the polarization of the light: how much it’s been distorted in specific ways. They found that radio waves have been twisted by a magnetic field — an extremely powerful one, judging from the degree of

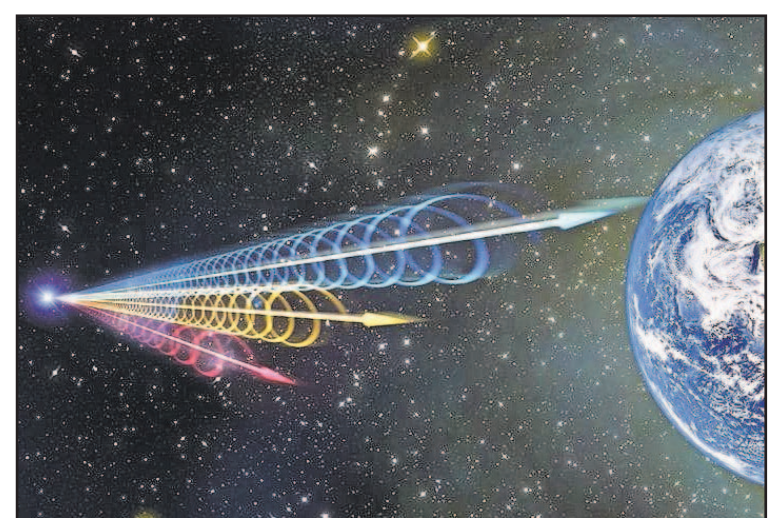

contortion. “We’ve seen this effect in other fast radio burst sources before, but in this case the effect is 500 times larger than what we’ve seen at other sources,” Hessels said. “That was quite surprising.” These kinds of polarization effects, he added, can be seen around powerful phenomena such as the supermassive black holes at the center of galaxies.

That makes some sense for FRB 121102, since the ionized gas, or plasma, around the black hole could be responsible for the magnetic field that’s twisting the neutron star’s signal. The researchers think these repeated fast radio bursts are coming from a pulsar that happens to be sitting near a growing

Vermont poised to enact legal pot through Legislature

MONTPELIER, Vt. — The Vermont Senate on Wednesday gave final approval to a bill that would allow the recreational use of marijuana, putting the state on course to become the first in the country to legalize pot by an act of the Legislature rather than through a referendum by voters.

By voice vote, the Senate agreed to the proposal that would make it legal for adults to possess and grow small amounts of marijuana but does not set up a system to tax and regulate the production and sale of the drug. The House approved the bill last week, and Gov. Phil Scott has indicated he will sign it.

"Today the Vermont Senate moved Vermont one step closer to a rational approach to marijuana," Senate President Pro Tem Tim

Ashe, a Democrat and Progressive, said in a statement. "Tens of thousands of Vermonters will no longer feel like they're committing a crime for their private, responsible use of marijuana."

Senators who voted against the bill didn't ask for a roll call. It takes effect July 1.

"I think this is a very exciting criminal justice reform for Vermont. There have been terrible harms that have happened in the name of marijuana prohibition that have disproportionately affected poor people and people of color for far too long," said Laura Subin, director of the Vermont Coalition to Regulate Marijuana.

Once the bill takes effect, Vermont will become the ninth state in the country, along with the District of Columbia, to approve the recreational use of marijuana and the only area where the law wasn't

created by the vote of residents. Vermont does not allow referendum votes.

Justin Strekal, political director for the National Organization for the Reform of Marijuana Laws, said Vermont and the District of Columbia are the only jurisdictions without a tax and regulation structure as part of their

marijuana legalization laws.

The legalization laws in Maine and Massachusetts call for tax and regulation structures, but they have not yet been set up, although personal marijuana use and possession are legal in those states.

The Vermont bill would allow adults 21 and older

to possess of up to 1 ounce of marijuana and have two mature marijuana plants or four immature plants.

Last spring, the Legislature passed a similar bill, but Scott vetoed it because the Republican thought it didn't do enough to protect children from marijuana and enhance highway safety. Lawmakers changed the proposal to address the governor's concerns, but there was not enough time left to pass it.

Democratic state Sen. Richard Sears, who has been working for marijuana legalization for years, said the bill passed Wednesday was an important first step.

"A lot of work has taken place, but we're still not there yet," Sears said. "I don't think we're there until we see a tax and regulated system."

He said it would be OK if Vermont went for a year or so without a tax system.

A commission formed by Scott last summer to study the issue is scheduled to release a report in December with suggestions on how the system could be set up.

Not everyone was happy with the bill's passage. Aubrey Adams traveled to Vermont from Pueblo, Colorado, to tell lawmakers she believes legalization in her state has had unintended consequences. She works with the group Moms Strong, whose mission is to educate the public about the harms of marijuana, according to its website.

"I'm here as a living witness ... to let you know the legalization of marijuana means promotion, it's not a solution to prohibition," she said. "Vermont has already decriminalized so it's a false narrative that the lobbyists and the marijuana promoters are giving Vermont and the Legislature."

Woman testifies about couple's Michigan body parts business

DETROIT (AP) — The ex-wife of a Michigan man who is charged with selling infected body parts for research says the couple lied about the diseased parts because they didn't want to lose business.

Elizabeth Rathburn testified Wednesday on the third day of trial for Arthur Rathburn. He's charged with covering up the fact that the body parts had tested positive for hepatitis B and HIV. They were used for medical training.

There were no reports of illness. Elizabeth Rathburn, who pleaded guilty to fraud, told jurors

that Arthur Rathburn assured her that he could make viruses inactive through embalming.

Stephen Gore, owner of Arizona-based Biological Resource Center, says Arthur Rathburn ordered cheaper infected body parts from him so he could make more money.

Arthur Rathburn's lawyer says the case should have been treated as a contract dispute, not a crime.

The Rathburns split up after they were charged.

Police: Michigan man lived a month with girlfriend's corpse

MONROE, Mich. (AP) — Authorities say a Michigan man lived with

his girlfriend's corpse for about a month before officers found it while performing a welfare check.

The Monroe News reported Wednesday that 49-year-old David M. Hall, of Monroe, was arraigned last week on a charge of concealing the death of an individual.

Authorities say 56-year-old Kandace Simmons appears to have died in early December. Officers found her body in an apartment bedroom after the landlord asked police to check on the couple.

Monroe police Lt. J.D. Wall told the newspaper that Hall didn't give a clear explanation as to why he didn't report the death.

Autopsy results are pending, but Wall says

there were no obvious signs of trauma to Simmons' body.

Hall's attorney declined to comment Wednesday.

Some turkeys survived the holidays, but not their road trip

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. (AP) — A tractor-trailer hauling hundreds of live turkeys overturned and caught fire Wednesday after troopers say the trucker fell asleep at the wheel.

The North Carolina Highway Patrol told local media outlets that the tractor-trailer went off the road before dawn in Guilford County.

The patrol said 39-year-old Devin Edward Long,

who was treated for minor injuries at a Greensboro hospital, was charged with careless and reckless driving.

According to the patrol, some of the turkeys were killed. Others survived and were herded by a group of workers into another truck.

USA Volleyball coach Rick Butler banned for life for abuse

CHICAGO (AP) — The governing body of USA Volleyball has banned coach Rick Butler for life.

The decision announced Wednesday follows reports by the Chicago Sun-Times which laid out sexual abuse allegations against Butler. The Aurora,

Illinois-based club he built, Sports Performance Volleyball, boasts four Olympic medalists and nearly 100 national championships.

In announcing Butler's ban, Colorado-based USA Volleyball referred to "allegations of misconduct and abuse against Mr. Butler from a number of individuals, including several former players."

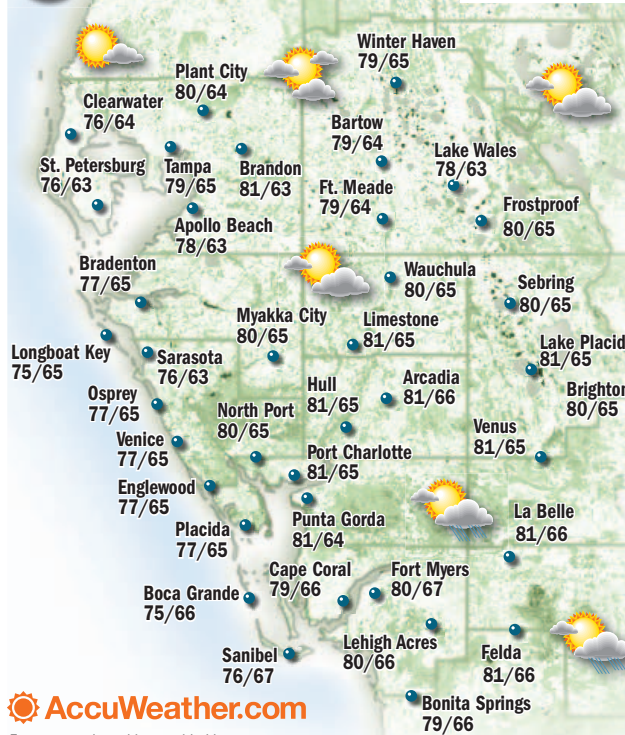
USA Volleyball board chairman Lori Okimura said the organization is committed to ridding the sport of coaches and others who "engage in hurtful actions against athletes and young people."

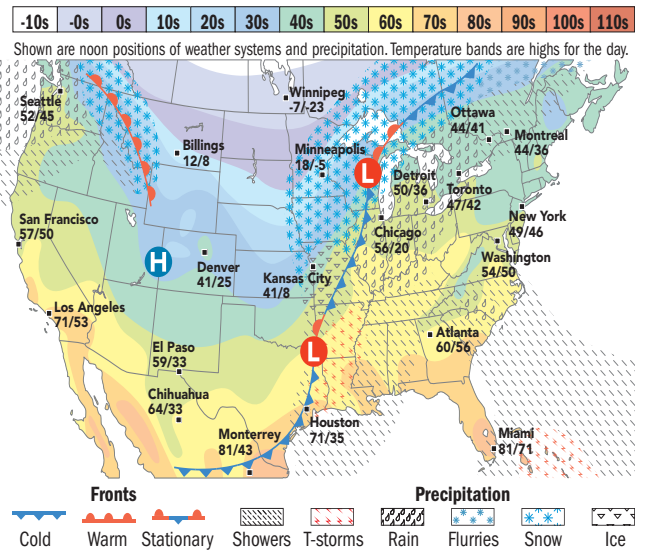

Iran suspends death penalty for some drug crimes, potentially sparing thousands on death row

TEHRAN, Iran — Iran has lifted the death penalty for certain nonviolent drug offenses, relaxing some of the world's harshest laws on drug crimes and potentially sparing the lives of thousands of death row inmates.

An amended narcotics law directs judges to suspend executions for 5,000 people convicted of drug-related offenses and review their cases, Mizan news agency, the mouthpiece of Iran's judiciary, reported Wednesday.

Most of the 5,000 convicts would have their punishments "converted to life sentences," Mohammad Ali Efsanani, assistant judge of the Iranian Supreme Court, told state media.

A spokesman for the

judiciary committee of Iran's Parliament, Hasan Nourouzi, told the Jam-e-Jam daily newspaper that violent drug offenders — including those who had committed murder in the course of drug crimes — would still be subject to the death penalty if convicted.

But the moratorium on executions for those found guilty of nonviolent crimes — such as drug smuggling — is a victory for reformists and human rights advocates who fought for years to change Iran's draconian drug laws. Proponents of the changes say that 90 percent of those imprisoned on drug convictions are first-time offenders younger than 30 years old.

The amended law had been in the works for more than two years, ever since a majority of Iran's

290 lawmakers said they endorsed a moratorium. After parliament approved the bill, it won approval from Iran's all-powerful Guardian Council, a conservative body made up of Islamic jurists and theologians.

Hard-liners had long opposed the changes, but the influence of moderates and reformists in parliament, and a rising backlash against executions, has contributed to a softening stance.

Lawmakers have raised the limits on the amounts of drugs one can possess before it becomes a capital offense. An earlier law provided for the death penalty if someone was caught with an ounce of cocaine; the new limit is 4.4 pounds.

Iran is in the grip of a terrible drug abuse problem, mainly driven by easy access to cheap

and plentiful narcotics, especially opium, coming over the border from Afghanistan. Health officials say there are more than 2 million drug addicts in a country of 80 million, but doctors say the actual figure is higher. Iran puts more

convicts to death per capita than any country in the world, most for drug crimes. Amnesty International says that since 1988, Iran has executed, usually by hanging, approximately 10,000 people for drug-related offenses.

5 Mexican states get US 'do not travel' warning

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Five states in Mexico have gotten the sternest "do not travel" advisories under a revamped U.S. State Department system unveiled Wednesday.

The five include the northern border state of Tamaulipas and the Pacific coast states of Sinaloa, Colima, Michoacan and

Guerrero.

The State Department had previously discouraged travel to all or part of the five states' territories but the new warnings are sterner, placing the drug- and crime-plagued states on the same level warning level as Somalia, Yemen, Syria or Afghanistan.

Mexico as a whole has a level-two rating, "exercise increased caution" in the new four-level alert system,

because of concerns about crime.

But an additional 11 Mexican states got a level-three warning, "reconsider travel." Mexico has 31 states, half of which are under level 3 or 4 warnings.

Honduras next in line for US decision on protected migrants

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras (AP) — This

week's news that the Trump administration is ending temporary protected status for 200,000 migrants from El Salvador is also rattling nerves in neighboring Honduras.

A decision on the fate of more than 50,000 Hondurans living in the United States under TPS is expected in July. And it could have severe social, economic and political consequences for the Central American nation.

Experts say the

return of tens of thousands of people threatens to exacerbate grave problems like high rates of murders and other crime, political instability, widespread poverty and inequality.

Perhaps most immediately, there would be a hit to remittances, which typically account for about 20 percent of the country's economy — though most of that is sent by Hondurans who would not be affected by cancellation of TPS.

News from across the USA

ALABAMA Decatur: Construction of two schools is on track for completion by this fall, WAAY-TV reports. Both new high schools will have storm shelters.

ALASKA Juneau: The state will levy a \$3 per-ride fee on ride-sharing programs such as Uber and Lyft that use the Anchorage and Fairbanks airports, *The Juneau Empire* reports.

ARIZONA Phoenix: A grand jury indicted a Tempe man for allegedly operating a large-scale cannabis extraction lab in a condominium.

ARKANSAS Little Rock: The University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences says it will lay off 258 workers and leave another 350 positions unfilled as it addresses a \$30 million hole in its budget.

CALIFORNIA Anaheim: Officials notified hundreds of homeless people camped out along a dusty Orange County riverbed that they must move starting in two weeks.

COLORADO Denver: A village of tiny homes in Denver's RiNo Arts district has moved, KMGH-TV reports. The Beloved Community Village's move affected at least 15 people.

CONNECTICUT Enfield: State prison officials say an inmate who escaped from a medium security prison has a tattoo on his neck that reads, "Time Waits For No One." Jerry Mercado, 25, was serving three years for burglary.

DELAWARE Dover: State lawmakers are back at work on issues ranging from the budget to capital punishment and recreational marijuana.



DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA: Customs officers at Dulles Airport in suburban Washington seized 400 pairs of counterfeit Air Jordan shoes last month that arrived from China.

HAWAII Honolulu: Hawaii State Hospital has earned a three-year reaccreditation, two months after a high-profile patient who escaped was able to fly to California, where he was arrested. Randall Saito said the facility made him want to escape.

IDAHO Coeur d'Alene: A family is seeking the return of a blanket made by the Texas grandmother of a 7-year-old girl. The blanket was in a package stolen from the family's porch, *Coeur d'Alene Press* reports.

ILLINOIS Aurora: Libraries in Chicago's suburbs are making efforts to welcome people who are homeless, the *Chicago Tribune* reports. Staffs in Aurora and Naperville are getting training from a shelter official on how to work with homeless patrons.

INDIANA Bloomington: City officials say sharpshooters killed 62 deer during a hunt to reduce the herd at Griffy Lake nature preserve, *The (Bloomington) Herald-Times* reports.

IOWA Des Moines: The Iowa Board of Regents isn't expected to decide tuition increases at the state's three public universities until June, *The Des Moines Register* reports.

Democrat concedes tied delegate race settled by lot

A Virginia Democrat who lost a contentious and crucial delegate race settled by lot after the vote ended in a tie conceded to the Republican incumbent Wednesday.

The announcement from Shelly Simonds means the GOP will remain in the majority, albeit by the razor-thin margin of 51-49. Democrats flipped more than a dozen seats in the November election, claiming the results as a renunciation of President Trump.

The concession cleared the way for David Yancey to be formally seated later Wednesday, the first day of the legislative session. Simonds said she was bowing out "with great disappointment."

"I have conceded because I do not see any legal pathways forward and I want representation for the 94th district today," Simonds tweeted. "I just tried to make a personal phone call to him and would like to ask him to vote for Medicaid expansion."

Ralph Northam, a Democrat who won the governor's race, campaigned on a pledge to expand Medicaid for hundreds of thousands of low-income state residents. Carl Tobias, a professor at the University of Richmond School of Law,

called Simonds' decision "pragmatic."

"Another recount could have left constituents without representation and would have taken time and resources," Tobias told USA TODAY. "She will ... try to persuade (Yancey) to favor Medicaid expansion. And she pledged to run again in 2019."

The race had flipped back and forth, with Yancey appearing to win by several votes on election night. A recount in the ensuing days put Simonds ahead by a single vote of more than 22,000 cast.

But Republicans challenged the decision made on one ballot, on which the circles next to both names were filled in. A line was drawn through Simonds' circle. The vote, initially not counted, was flipped to Yancey and then upheld by the courts.

That sent the decision to a tie-break. The state elections board placed both names in a ceramic bowl, and drew one. Yancey's name emerged, and Simonds decided not to seek another recount.

Yancey declared victory after Thursday's drawing.

"For those of you who voted for me, thank you, for those of you who did not, please know that I will continue to do my best to represent all of us in Richmond," he said.

MISSOURI Jefferson City: A state audit shows that Missouri is paying out income tax refunds later and later because of a cash shortage. The state paid roughly \$423,000 in interest on late refunds to nearly 155,000 taxpayers last fiscal year.

MONTANA Polson: Lake County Sheriff Don Bell has started posting on Facebook the names of people who are cited for crimes rather than jailed. He says that's because his



46-inmate jail is full.

NEBRASKA Lincoln: State lawmakers are reviving up another debate this year on whether to repeal the law requiring motorcyclists to wear helmets.

NEVADA Las Vegas: Police are seeking an armed suspect who robbed a Subway restaurant of \$69 and two macadamia nut cookies, KSNV-TV says.

NEW HAMPSHIRE Bedford: State environmental officials will meet with Bedford residents Thursday to give an update on the investigation into PFOA chemicals.

NEW JERSEY Hoboken: A suspect jumped into a New Jersey Transit SUV and drove it into the doors of the waiting room at the Hoboken rail terminal. No one was hurt.

NEW MEXICO Santa Fe: City officials are considering installing a public toilet in a downtown area that lacks public restrooms, *The Santa Fe New Mexican* reports.

NEW YORK New York: Authorities say a man arrested 30 times for stealing buses and trains is taking a plea deal that will send him to a mental institution. Darius McCollum, 52, has a disorder that includes difficulty with impulse control.

NORTH CAROLINA Morehead City: State officials are rethinking commercial fishing licenses because only about 3,000 fishermen who have one sell their catch to dealers, while another 4,000 don't, the *Virginian-Pilot* reports.

NORTH DAKOTA Fargo: The two-day National Sunflower Association

forum is in Fargo this week. Researchers present findings on sunflower studies dealing with disease, insects, irrigation and blackbirds.

OHIO Rocky River: Postal carriers say a cluster of aggressive wild turkeys makes it unsafe to deliver mail to homes in this Cleveland suburb. Officials say some carriers have been pecked but none have been injured.

OKLAHOMA Oklahoma City: Five limestone panels attached to a building being renovated in downtown Oklahoma City came loose and fell 22 floors to the street below. No one was injured, but three vehicles were damaged, *The Oklahoman* reports.

OREGON Bend: A \$10.7 million project designed to help fish move around better is coming to the Crooked River, *The Bend Bulletin* reports. It's called a fish ladder, and it allows chinook salmon and steelhead in the Deschutes Basin to travel up the river more effectively.

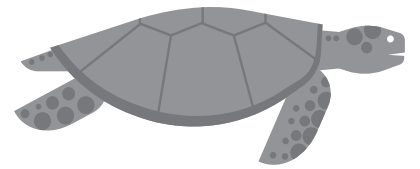

VIRGINIA Richmond: State colleges awarded the highest number of bachelor's degrees in Virginia history last year, *The Times-Dispatch* reports.

WASHINGTON Spokane: The \$40 million Spokane Tribe Casino opened this week, the third casino serving the regional gambling market, *The Spokesman-Review* reports. The casino was first proposed in 2006.

WEST VIRGINIA Charleston: The state Department of Environmental Protection has awarded nearly two dozen recycling grants worth \$1.3 million to groups in 20 counties.

WISCONSIN Madison: The state reached a \$1 million settlement in a lawsuit filed by the estate of a prisoner who died after a guard ignored a warning from his cellmate that he was having a seizure, *The Milwaukee Journal Sentinel* reports.

WYOMING Casper: The University of Wyoming will host its first diversity workshops next month since hiring a chief diversity officer last May, *The Casper Star-Tribune* reports. The university has a five-year plan to boost enrollment of "underrepresented students."

“the first of many” and “a harbinger of what’s to come” for employers.

“This is what we’re gearing up for this year and what you’re going to see more and more of is these large-scale compliance inspections, just for starters,” said Derek Benner, acting head of ICE’s Homeland Security Investigations, which oversees cases against employers.

“It’s not going to be limited to large companies or any particular industry — big, medium and small,” he said.

After the inspections, officials plan to look at whether the cases warrant administrative action or criminal investigations, Benner told The Associated Press.

7-Eleven Stores Inc., based in Irving, Texas, said in a statement that the owners of its franchises are responsible for hiring and verifying work eligibility. The chain with more than 8,600 convenience stores in the U.S. said it has previously ended franchise agreements for owners convicted of breaking employment laws.

Unlike other enforcement efforts that have marked Trump’s first year in office, Wednesday’s

actions were aimed squarely at store owners and managers, though 21 workers across the country were arrested on suspicion of being in the country illegally.

Illegal hiring is rarely prosecuted, partly because investigations are time-consuming and convictions are difficult to achieve because employers can claim they were duped by fraudulent documents or intermediaries. Administrative fines are discounted by some as a business cost.

Amy Peck, an Omaha, Nebraska, immigration attorney who represents businesses, said an employer crackdown will never work because the

government has limited resources and there are many jobs that people who are in the country legally do not want.

“When these audits occur, the employees scatter in the wind and go down the street and work for somebody else,” Peck said. “You’re playing whack-a-mole.”

President George W. Bush’s administration pursued high-profile criminal investigations against employers in its final years with dramatic pre-dawn shows of force and large numbers of worker arrests. In 2008, agents arrived by helicopter at the Agriprocessors meat-packing plant in Postville, Iowa, and detained nearly

400 workers. Last month, Trump commuted the 27-year prison sentence of Sholom Rubashkin, former chief executive of what was the nation’s largest kosher meatpacking operation.

Barack Obama’s administration more than doubled employer audits to more than 3,100 a year in 2013, shunning Bush’s flashier approach. John Sandweg, an acting ICE director under Obama, said significant fines instilled fear in employers and avoided draining resources from other enforcement priorities, which include child exploitation, human trafficking and money laundering.

Wednesday’s audits arose from a 2013 investigation that resulted in charges against nine 7-Eleven franchisees and managers in New York and Virginia. Eight have pleaded guilty and were ordered to pay more than \$2.6 million in back wages, and the ninth was arrested in November.

The managers used more than 25 stolen identities to employ at least 115 people in the country illegally, knowing they could pay below minimum wage, according to court documents.

Neither 7-Eleven nor was its parent company, Seven & I Holding Co. based in Tokyo, was charged in the case.

A day earlier, Feinstein, who faces a primary challenge in her re-election this year, released the transcript of the Senate Judiciary Committee’s closed-door August interview with an official from the political opposition research firm Fusion GPS, which commissioned the dossier. She released the transcript of Glenn Simpson’s interview over the objections of the committee’s Republican chairman, Iowa Sen. Chuck Grassley. She is the top Democrat on the

panel. “The fact that Sneaky Dianne Feinstein, who has on numerous occasions stated that collusion between Trump/Russia has not been found, would release testimony in such an underhanded and possibly illegal way, totally without authorization, is a disgrace,” Trump tweeted. “Must have tough Primary!”

The material wasn’t classified, and Feinstein said Wednesday that she didn’t do anything illegal. And as the top Democrat on the committee, she didn’t need authorization from Grassley to release it. Her staff helped conduct the interview with Simpson, who had also asked for the interview to be released.

Still, the release was a blow to the lawmakers’ earlier attempts at bipartisanship on the committee’s Russia investigation. Feinstein told reporters that she didn’t tell Grassley beforehand, and “I owe him an apology and I will give him an apology as soon as

I see him.”

Grassley said in an angry news release on Tuesday that he was “confounded” by the release and argued that it could undermine attempts to get additional witnesses. By Wednesday he appeared to have softened, saying he was continuing to negotiate witnesses with Feinstein in the Russia probe.

“Listen, I screw up regularly and she doesn’t owe me an apology,” Grassley said.

Trump has derided the dossier as a politically motivated hit job. Following his lead, several GOP-led committees are now investigating whether the dossier formed the basis for the FBI’s initial investigations. That has angered Democrats, who say those probes are distractions from the Russia investigations.

Feinstein said that she was trying to set the record straight after speculation about Simpson’s interview. “The innuendo and misinformation circulating about the transcript are

part of a deeply troubling effort to undermine the investigation into potential collusion and obstruction of justice,” she said. “The only way to set the record straight is to make the transcript public.”

Feinstein also sits on the Senate intelligence committee, which is conducting its own investigation into the Russian interference and whether Trump’s campaign was in any way involved.

Trump has often invoked Feinstein on the collusion issue. She said on CBS’s “Face the Nation” on Oct. 8 that there’s “no proof” yet that there was any collusion between Russia and Trump’s campaign, adding: “I think that proof will likely come with Mr. Mueller’s investigation.”

Feinstein faces a primary from California state Senate leader Kevin de Leon. Asked about Trump’s tweet, she brushed off the idea that the release had anything to do with her election.

“Oh come on,” she said. “Of course not.”

supermassive black hole that’s surrounded by gas and dust. But there are other possibilities: Perhaps a pulsar is interacting with the nebula from a dead star to create the strange repeat signal.

There are problems with both of those ideas, Hessel pointed out. If the neutron star’s radio signal is being twisted by the plasma around a nearby supermassive black hole, why would there be a massive black hole exist in such a small dwarf galaxy? And if it’s being affected by a surrounding nebula, how did it get to be so bright?

Even the idea that the source itself is some kind of pulsar doesn’t explain why the bursts are so clumped. Spinning neutron stars have highly regular periods.

It could also be that plasma is acting as a sort of lens, focusing the radio light and allowing

us to see it clearly. (In the black-hole scenario, the plasma could be both polarizing and lensing the radio waves, Hessel said.) That could mean that the other fast radio bursts are also repeats, and we just haven’t had a proper space lens that would allow us to see more than one.

Whatever its source, whatever its environment, and whether or not it is similar to the other one-shot fast radio bursts, understanding FRB 121102 will help astronomers to better understand the universe we live in, Hessels said.

After all, even though only a few dozen individual sources in total have been found, researchers estimate that perhaps 10,000 fast radio bursts flash across the night sky every single day. And just as a flashlight on a dark night can illuminate all the dust and fog particles in its beam, each of these radio bursts can reveal a little more of the contents of the space between the source and us.

DEAR WORRIED NANA: Do not just sit back. By all means, visit your granddaughter! She needs to know you love her and will be supportive if things don't work out with her boyfriend.

Because she's 18 and now considered an adult, you can't force her to reunite with her father, whose heavy-handed parenting may or may not be the reason she left home. But you can, however, point out that if she needs something, there are better ways to go about acquiring it than shoplifting. You should also encourage her to find a job. If she does, it will increase her independence, not only from her father, but also her boyfriend, if it becomes necessary.

Here's the breakdown

Dear Readers: We've become better at recycling, reusing and repurposing items, and keeping them out of the landfill, but we can always do more.

Here are some eye-opening stats on the time it takes trash to decompose in the environment, according to the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services website (www.des.nh.gov):

- Paper towel — two to four weeks
- Plastic bag — 10-20 years
- Aluminum can — 80-200 years
- Disposable diaper — 450 years
- Plastic bottle — 450 years
- Glass bottle — 1 million years

Plastic never fully breaks down; it just gets smaller and smaller, and it can always pose a threat to wildlife. This is especially true with the plastic six-ring holders for soft drinks and other items. Please, cut the rings before putting them in the recycle bin or trash. — Heloise

Water saver

Dear Heloise: During the winter months, I turn on my hot water first thing to brush my teeth. By the time I finish brushing, the water is warm enough to

wash my face. This way, I don't waste water or have to use ice-cold water to wash my face. — Vicky C., Fargo, N.D.

Swallowing pills

Dear Heloise: I have a hard time swallowing pills. I've found that the use of a straw helps greatly. I put the pill in my mouth, suck up enough liquid to swallow, then do it! This makes it easier for me. — E.L.Y., Villa Park, Calif.

South's jump to game was aggressive, but passing would have been too timid and North would have accepted any invitation. They were always getting to four hearts.

The contract seemed to depend on the trump suit. It is very close, with this trump combination, as to whether you should play the ace and another or double finesse. Ace first wins against a singleton honor in the

East hand and all 2-2 splits. Double finessing wins against a small singleton in the East hand and loses to king-queen doubleton with East. The problem on this deal is that declarer has to ruff a diamond in dummy. This makes playing the ace of hearts first a much stronger line of play. That would seemingly lead to defeat on this deal, but declarer found a slim extra chance.

South won the opening spade lead in hand with the ace and led his low club at trick two, ducking in dummy when West played the 10. The spade continuation was won in dummy with the king and declarer ruffed a club, East playing the king. South led a trump to dummy's ace and ruffed another club. The fall of the ace made the trump position irrelevant. South cashed the ace and king of diamonds, ruffed a diamond in dummy, and discarded his remaining spade on the queen of clubs.

Declarer lost two hearts and a club, but never lost a spade trick. Well done!

Four Bolts named to All-Star Game

TAMPA — Lightning defenseman Victor Hedman hoped he'd get named Wednesday to his second NHL All-Star Game, especially because it's in Tampa on Jan. 27.

But with an unfavorable roster format, and three Lightning teammates already locks for the 10-member Atlantic Division team, Hedman knew he was on the bubble.

"I wasn't really having high expectations," Hedman said. "There's a lot of guys that are really deserving on our team."

That's why Hedman was so excited that he'll join his three teammates — Steven Stamkos, Nikita Kucherov and Andrei Vasilevskiy — at the NHL All-Star weekend Jan. 27-28 at Amalie Arena. The skills competition is Jan. 27, with all four divisions competing in a 3-on-3 tournament Sunday.

This is the most all stars the Lightning has ever sent; the previous best was three in 2002-03 (Nikolai Khabibulin, Vincent Lecavalier and Martin St. Louis — in 2002-03).

It's not surprising that the Lightning (31-9-3), which boasts the league's best record, has the league's most all-stars (the Kings were the next highest with three). Plus coach Jon Cooper behind the bench for the Atlantic.

Stamkos was the fan vote for captain of the Atlantic All-Star team, and will make his fifth appearance. Cooper clinched the gig as Atlantic coach last week with Tampa Bay boasting the best points-percentage through 41 games. Kucherov, tied for the league-lead with 27 goals, was long expected to make his second all-star appearance (also last season).

Simms told The Dan Le Batard Show with Stugotz on Tuesday that Bortles is 70th in his NFL quarterback rankings, below backups Chad Henne (Jacksonville), T.J. Yates (Houston) and Nathan Peterman (Buffalo).

But for Vasilevskiy, who leads the league in all major goalie statistics, it is his first one. Vasilevskiy has said that making an all-star team is "one of my hockey dreams."

Vasilevskiy joins former league MVP Carey Price (Montreal) as the two Atlantic Division goaltenders. Hedman said he doesn't know where the Lightning would be in the standings without Vasilevskiy bailing them out.

"He's been arguably the top goaltender in the league this year," Hedman said. "There was no surprise in my eyes he got picked for his first one. Without a doubt, it won't be his last one."

Hedman's case was tricky, however. There's only three defensemen chosen for each division. But Hedman, a Norris Trophy finalist last season, has played some of his best hockey in the last month. He has 33 points (six goals) and is a plus-24 while averaging a career-high 25 minutes 57 seconds.

Hedman joins good friend and fellow Swede Erik Karlsson and Red Wings' Mike Green on the Atlantic Division team.

Hedman said last year's all-star appearance, his first, was unforgettable. The NHL did a ceremony celebrating its top 100 players, so Hedman got to hang out with idols like Nicklas Lidstrom and Peter Forsberg.

"You're like a kid again," Hedman said.

What will make this

NHL All-Star Game more special to Hedman is that it's in Tampa. "It's going to be spectacular," he said.

Hedman planned to be part of the weekend festivities anyway, taking in a staycation if he didn't make the team.

But now that Hedman is, it could make for a dream scenario where Cooper puts his four all-stars on the ice at the same time during 3-on-3. Think about it: Stamkos, Kucherov and Hedman, with Vasilevskiy in net.

"I hope so," Hedman said. "It'd be pretty cool. It could be a good lineup, and very special for us to have that opportunity."

Browns add Packers execs to front office

CLEVELAND — The Cleveland Browns' roster still needs major work. Their front office is starting to shape up.

New general manager John Dorsey tapped into his NFL connections to improve the winless Browns, adding former Green Bay executives Eliot Wolf and Alonzo Highsmith on Wednesday in the club's first major moves in a significant offseason.

Dorsey played linebacker for the Packers and spent time working in the club's front office with Wolf and Highsmith, two highly regarded talent evaluators with solid reputations.

The 35-year-old Wolf, who is considered a rising star in the league, will serve as Dorsey's assistant while Highsmith, a former NFL running back, is the Browns' vice president of player personnel.

"We're lucky to add Alonzo and Eliot to our personnel staff," said Dorsey, who was hired last month by owner Jimmy Haslam.

"Alonzo's 25 years of experience in the National Football League as a player, scout and personnel executive give him a unique perspective when it comes to evaluating talent and building a team.

"Alonzo and I share the same passion for this great game of football. We are going to set out to find talented football players that possess that same passion for the game.

"Eliot has been a fine executive in this league for some time now. It's been great to watch him grow up around this league when I was with him in Green Bay and from afar for the last five-plus years. He's been a big reason for the consistent success the Packers have experienced over the last decade."

Wolf spent 14 seasons with the Packers, working as the club's director of football operations for the past two. He recently interviewed for the Green Bay GM job that went to Brian Gutekunst and Wolf was reportedly offered a spot to work in Oakland with Raiders' GM Reggie McKenzie. Dorsey, McKenzie and Wolf all worked together in Green Bay.

But the son of Hall of Fame executive Ron Wolf is instead joining the Browns, still crawling from the wreckage of a 0-16 season while preparing for a draft in which they'll have the No. 1 overall pick and four in the top 35.

"I really like the direction of where leadership is headed," Wolf said. "We're going to build this team the right way and to be a part of that from the ground up is going to be special."

Highsmith spent 19 years in Green Bay's scouting department.

Business plan: Bell ready to carry heavy load for Steelers

PITTSBURGH — This was always part of Le'Veon Bell's business plan, the one that the Pittsburgh Steelers running back put together over the summer when he decided to skip training camp while waiting to sign his franchise tag tender.

Bell's eyes weren't focused on August but January. No camp meant less wear and tear on the legs that are pivotal to his team's Super Bowl hopes.

Even after a season in which his 406 touches were 60 more than any other player in the league, Bell insists he's "100" as the kids say heading into Sunday's divisional round game against Jacksonville.

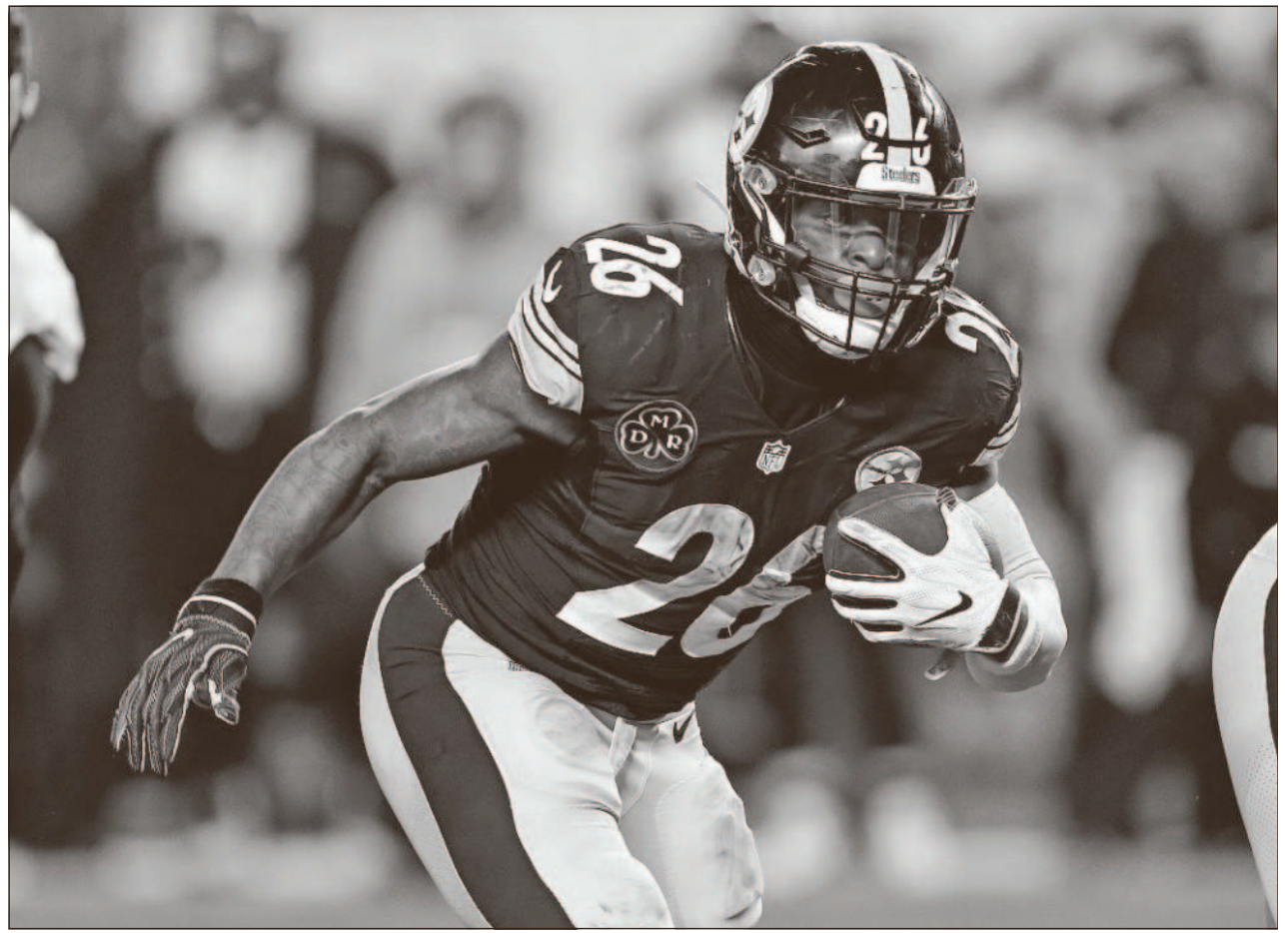
"I feel great, especially not playing these last two weeks, not going to camp earlier in the year," Bell said Wednesday. "I can't complain. I like where I am. This is the freshest I've ever been going into the playoffs so we'll see how it goes."

Bell missed the 2014 and 2015 playoffs with knee injuries and after practically carrying the Pittsburgh offense through the second half of the season in 2016, the groin problem he spent weeks trying to ignore flared up early in the AFC championship game.

He managed just 20 yards on six carries before leaving in the second quarter of a 36-17 loss to New England and spent the rest of the game watching from the sideline, helpless amid the blowing snow.

A year later, the memory lingers. Bell knows Pittsburgh's best chance to finally unseat the Patriots is with his No. 26 featured prominently.

It's one of the main reasons why he waited until Sept. 4 to sign the franchise tender that made him the highest-paid running back in

the league, a decision that briefly alienated the fan base, but one his teammates understood completely.

The running back and part-time rapper considers himself unlike any other player in the league. It's not a coincidence that he mentioned "\$17 million" during one freestyle session over the summer.

If anything, the \$12 million he's earned this season looks like a bargain. Bell earned first-team All-Pro honors at the "flex" position, a testament to his unique skillset.

He finished third in the league in yards rushing (1,291) and 10th in receptions (85) despite sitting out the regular-season finale with a first-round bye already clinched.

"He wanted to get paid \$17 million, but that's because of what he does," guard Ramon Foster said.

"He catches and runs the ball, he blocks. He does everything. That's

right up his alley. To be honest, I'm happy for him because he made himself into that. You can't just be a running back anymore and he's proven that."

Yet Bell is at the point in his career where what happens from September through December is no longer the point.

On a team loaded with talent, he's well aware the one thing he's missing on his resume is the one thing that a massive payday and all the regular-season touches in the world can't buy.

"I honestly don't care about records or things like that," Bell said. "I just want to win a championship. I think everything else kind of comes with it."

And Bell isn't afraid to speak his mind to make sure Pittsburgh's season ends in Minneapolis next month. He didn't hesitate to question his relatively light workload during a 30-9 loss to Jacksonville on Oct. 8. He carried just 15 times

for 47 yards against a team that came into the game ranked last in the NFL against the rush.

"We didn't necessarily stick to our game plan, we had to start playing catch-up a little bit so we couldn't really run the ball as much as we wanted to," Bell said. "We'll see how the game goes. We want to be balanced."

For the Steelers that often means making sure Bell is a vital part of the process. Pittsburgh is 6-0 this season when Bell has 30 touches or more.

It sounds like a lot because it is a lot.

Yet Bell also hasn't crossed it since a win over Green Bay the weekend after Thanksgiving.

Compare that to a year ago, when he needed a painkiller shot before the AFC title game just to play, a patchwork solution that failed spectacularly.

The first time the Patriots hit Bell, the

throbbing in his groin returned. There will be no shot necessary on Sunday.

"I don't go into a game feeling achy or sore," Bell said. "I'm going there and literally feeling like it's new, like I haven't played in a minute, I want to get back out there."

The proof can be heard on the practice field, where Foster says Bell keeps yelling "Tempo! Tempo!" in an effort to get his teammates to pick up the pace, not always an easy task more than five months into the season.

"His sense of urgency is higher than I ever seen it," Foster said. "He's eager about it. When you've got a guy like him that's eager to do it ... you've got to believe in those guys."

Former Jaguars left tackle Tony Boselli called into the show to defend Bortles, saying it's "the most ignorant, asinine statement I've ever heard."

None of it seemed to bother Bortles, who has been sullied all season.

Titans defensive end Jurrell Casey told a Nashville radio station last week that "as long as Bortles is back there, if the ballgame is in his hands, he's going to choke."

Bortles also has been publicly ripped by

Houston defensive end Jadeveon Clowney, Seattle safety Earl Thomas and Cincinnati linebacker Vontaze Burfict in the past two months.

"Players or peers talking about you is a little new," Bortles said last week.

Bortles' performance against the Bills was far from his best.

He completed 12 of 23 passes for 87 yards and a touchdown. He never settled into a rhythm, and with the game tied in the second half, he stopped throwing and starting scrambling. He finished with 88 yards on the ground, becoming the

first quarterback since Atlanta's Michael Vick in 2004 to win a playoff game with more rushing yards than passing.

"There's two different ways to look at it," Bortles said. "You kind of look at the numbers and look at the game and say, 'You played terrible.' Or you look at it and say, 'Things weren't going right here and you found a way to win and be efficient and move the ball and do different things.' I think that's how I feel about it. We didn't have our A-game. I missed a couple throws. Things weren't going well."

"But you know

scrambling around and doing some different things, and guys making some plays, we found a way to score one more time than they did. That's all you've got to do."

The Jaguars (11-6) won the wild-card game 10-3, with the lone touchdown coming on Bortles' 1-yard pass on a fourth-and-goal play, and advanced to play at second-seeded Pittsburgh (13-3) on Sunday.

Jacksonville beat the Steelers 30-9 in Pittsburgh earlier this season. Bortles threw just one pass in the second half as the Jags dominated thanks to five

interceptions, including two returned for touchdowns, and a season-high 231 yards rushing.

Bortles completed 8 of 14 passes for 95 yards, with an interception.

"Hopefully we can throw less," Bortles said. "That would be awesome. Leonard goes off again and those guys up front play as well they did last time and we can run the ball up there and not have to throw at all. That was something that happened last time, but you never know. ... It could be another one of those games or it could be you go up there and throw it 50 times."

Bowden likes Fisher's chances of making Aggies an SEC factor

OMAHA, Neb. — Former Florida State coach Bobby Bowden is 88 and still keeps a busy schedule of speaking engagements. On Wednesday he was in Omaha — his fourth city in a week — to receive the Tom Osborne Legacy Award for his contributions to college football and leadership in the community.

He spoke at a Rotary Club luncheon and appeared at the Outland Trophy Banquet. In between, Bowden sat down with The Associated Press to discuss the program at Florida State, where he won more than 300 games and two national championships from 1976-2009, in addition to Alabama's latest title and his memories of beating Osborne's Nebraska team for the 1993 title.

AP: What did you think of your successor, Jimbo Fisher, leaving Florida State to take the Texas A&M job?

Bowden: I did not think he would go. I know he wanted a football building, training table, a place to take care of injuries. He saw that he can get everything he wants at Texas A&M — everything. Money? He didn't have to worry about that. He didn't have (a new building) at Florida State, but they were going to get it for him. It was going to take a while.

AP: How is he going to like the SEC West?

Bowden: Ooh wee. Now he's going to have

to play Alabama, Auburn, LSU, Mississippi State. It's going to be a tough road to plow. You know what my feeling is? He is capable. It's not like me looking at him and saying, 'Jimbo, you can't do it.' In three or four years he might be right there among them.

AP: Are you pleased with FSU's hiring of Willie Taggart?

Bowden: Florida State is where he always wanted to be. He was raised in Florida. He always wanted to coach at Florida State. Only being at Oregon for one year, that ain't good. It's like he said, this is the only job I would have come for.

AP: I understand he called you right when he got the job.

Bowden: He sure did. ... If I can help him in any way, I'll sure do it. He's a kid who is raised in Florida and he watched the 'Bobby Bowden Show' every Sunday.

AP: What's your take on Nick Saban and Alabama winning five national titles since 2009 and Saban winning his sixth?

Bowden: He's making himself the best ever. Is he right now? It's not for me to say. But, dadgum, when he finishes his career, there might not be anyone even close. He just tied my favorite coach, Bear Bryant.

AP: How well did you know Bryant?

Bowden: I knew him more than he knew me. I coached at Samford, which is 50 miles from Tuscaloosa. Bear went to Tuscaloosa in 1958. I went to Samford in 1959.

He was winning national championships and I was learning. I would go and talk to Gene Stallings. Those coaches really taught me a lot of football. I feel I learned most of my football going to Tuscaloosa.

AP: That's a mouthful, saying Saban is in position to be the best ever.

Bowden: You got a lot of Alabama people who think he's the best ever now. I hate to give up the other guy (Bryant), but every time he wins one, it makes me see it more and more.

AP: You've said you like the College Football Playoff's four-team format and that you don't think it should go to eight. That said, does unbeaten Central Florida have a legitimate gripe about not having the opportunity to be in the playoff?

Bowden: Yeah, I think they do, although the system doesn't allow it. But if I were them I'd be yelling just like them, celebrating an undefeated season and a national championship — though it won't be recognized by the NCAA.

AP: What do you think of Scott Frost going from UCF to Nebraska?

Bowden: I thought that was a great move. Oooh, I was so impressed with what he did. Golly. Here is Auburn, they beat the No. 1 team in the nation (Georgia and Alabama), then Frost beats them. That ain't supposed to happen, but it happened. I was so glad when he decided to come here.

AP: You're receiving an award named after Tom Osborne. What does that mean to you?

Bowden: I wouldn't have come if it weren't him. I think so highly of him. He and I thought a whole lot alike — off the field. I've always admired him.

AP: You won national titles in 1993 and 1999. What do you remember about that 18-16 Orange Bowl win over Osborne with Tom. Before I get to your first one? (The game ended with officials putting one second back on the clock, allowing Nebraska to attempt a field goal that it missed.)

Bowden: I'll never forget it. No. 1, the game is over and we finally won a national championship. So all our people start going out on the field. I went to shake hands with Tom. Before I get to him, the official comes up and says, 'Coach Bowden, sorry, we have to add another second.' I said where is the ball? He told me. I'm thinking their kicker can't kick it that far. So just a few minutes later, the official comes up and says, 'Coach Bowden, I'm sorry, we have to move it up 5 yards.' Now we're in his range. Oh, God, they ain't going to let us win it. And he missed it.

AP: Did you know that loss is credited with being the impetus for Nebraska's run of three national titles over the next four years?

Bowden: I hope it was. Great job. Just a fantastic job. And that hadn't been done until right now. All of the talk is Alabama and what Saban has done. You realize 20-30 years ago Tom Osborne did the same thing, won three out of four. Unheard of.

Davis, Athletics agree to \$10.5M, 1-year contract

OAKLAND, Calif. — Slugger Khris Davis and the Oakland Athletics agreed to a \$10.5 million, one-year contract, more than doubling his salary after he beat the team in arbitration last winter.

Davis won a \$5 million salary during a hearing in February, when the club offered \$4.65 million. The agreement announced Wednesday avoided another hearing next month.

Davis is Oakland's

slugging centerpiece. He hit a career-best 43 home runs, connecting on the season's final day to surpass the season high he set the previous year for Oakland. The 30-year-old is the only A's player aside from Jimmie Foxx (1932-34) with consecutive 40-homer seasons. Davis' 85 homers the past two seasons are second in the majors to Giancarlo Stanton's 86.

Davis batted .247 with a career-high 110 RBIs in 153 games last season.

Texas guard Andrew Jones diagnosed with leukemia

AUSTIN, Texas — Texas sophomore guard Andrew Jones has leukemia and started treatment, the school announced Wednesday.

Jones led the team in scoring with a 15-point average before breaking his wrist in December. He played sparingly in his return in late December after complaining of low energy and was sent for tests.

“Speaking for our entire team and staff, we love Andrew and will do everything we can to support his family and help him get back to health,” Texas coach Shaka Smart said in the university statement.

No further details on the diagnosis or Jones’ condition were immediately released.

“We hope everyone will keep him in your thoughts and prayers,” the Jones family said in the statement. “This is obviously a difficult situation for our family, and we hope everyone will respect our privacy at this time.”

Although Texas had said little about Jones’ condition, it had become clear that he was facing a serious situation when team officials stopped providing updates out of respect for the family. He didn’t travel for Saturday’s loss at Baylor. Smart appeared shaken in brief remarks to the media on Tuesday and declined to answer

when asked if Jones was hospitalized.

“We know Andrew’s a fighter with a strong family and our thoughts, prayers and support are fully behind them. At the University of Texas, will do everything in our power to provide all of the resources we can to assist Andrew and his family,” athletic director Chris Del Conte said.

Texas hosts No. 16 TCU on Wednesday night.

Jones returned to the court Dec. 29 and played nine minutes at home in the loss to Kansas. He also played nine minutes

in the win at Iowa State on Jan. 1.

Jones averaged nearly 12 points as a freshman and considered leaving for the NBA draft after but returned to Texas after attending the scouting combine. His sister, Alexis, was a standout at Baylor and plays for the WNBA champion Minnesota Lynx.

Jones’ family has dealt with challenges in the past. Andrew was 7 in 2007 when his father was paralyzed in a car accident on an icy road. Jones was ejected from the car but escaped with only some bruising.

Villanova routs Xavier

Phil Booth hit five 3s and scored 21 points and Jalen Brunson had 17 to lead No. 1 Villanova to an 89-65 win over Xavier on Wednesday night.

The Wildcats (15-1, 3-1 Big East) returned to the top spot of the poll and dominated like a team that won’t lose its grip on that rank anytime soon.

Booth and Brunson opened the game with 3s and the Wildcats played every bit as worthy as their ranking as they raced to a 22-9 lead. Booth hit three 3s in the first half and Brunson was solid both from long range and in attacking the basket to make it 40-28 at the break.

The Wildcats took a 13-point lead in the half on the play of the game: Donte DiVincenzo stole the ball and fed to Eric Paschal just before halfcourt. Paschal passed to Booth who put some extra arc on a lob and the 6-foot-9 Paschal slammed it home to rock the rim and bring the crowd to its feet.

The Wildcats’ annual defeat at Butler had no impact on a program that has been humming along,

Villanova needed just a week to reclaim its lost No. 1 ranking in the AP Top 25. The Wildcats returned to the top after an upset-filled week that rattled the poll.

With the shakeup at the top of the AP Top 25 in the wake of losses by No. 1 Michigan State and No. 2 Duke, Xavier (15-3, 3-2) might have been able to make this game a 1-2 matchup had it defeated Providence.

The Musketeers instead had their 10-game winning streak snapped in an 81-72 loss to the Friars and slid to 10th.

They couldn’t bounce back in Philly.

Trevon Bluiett (19.4 points) and J.P. Macura (13.1 points) were awful in the first half and could not stop Nova from dominating. The duo went 3-for-11 from the floor, hit just one 3 and Xavier was generally overwhelmed, like so many Big East teams here before them. Kerem Kanter led Xavier with 16 points.

Mikal Bridges hit Villanova’s ninth 3 midway through the second half to make it 66-48 and squash the Musketeers for good.

STORRS, Conn. — UConn showed one of the nation’s best defensive teams that the Huskies can also guard the basket.

Christian Vital scored 18 points to lead UConn to a 62-53 win over UCF on Wednesday night.

Terry Larrier and Jalen Adams each added 13 points for Connecticut (9-7, 2-2 American), which won its second straight after a four-game losing streak.

“I think we’re honestly starting to figure this thing out,” said Vital.

Cesar DeJesus led UCF (12-5, 3-2) with 13 points. Terrell Allen had 12 and Tacko Fall finished with 11 points.

The Knights came in allowing just 54.7 points per game and were coming off a 60-39 win over Temple.

But UConn never trailed and held UCF to under 37 percent shooting.

“I thought our defensive effort was our best this whole season,” said UConn coach Kevin Ollie.

The Huskies used an 8-0 run to lead by nine at halftime, capped by a 3-pointer from Larrier at the first half buzzer. It was 35-21 at after Vital opened the second half with a steal and layup followed by a 3-pointer.

UCF responded with a 15-2 run, cutting the lead to 37-36 on Allen’s 3-point shot from the top of the key.

But the Knights could not get over the hump.

“We were right there a few times,” said UCF coach Johnny Dawkins. “But every time we were right there, someone stepped up and made a big play. That’s what really talented players do and they have really good guards. I think Jalen Adams stepped up a few times in those

situations and made big plays.”

Adams found Isaiah Whaley on the baseline for a dunk that made it 50-44 and then hit a fall-away jumper to stretch the lead back to 10 at 54-44. That shot put Adams over the 1,000-points for his career, becoming the 50th Husky to reach that plateau.

Neither team shot well. UConn made 43 percent of their attempts from the floor. But the Huskies went 20 of 21 from the free throw line.

“Maybe a couple of games ago we might have given the lead away,” said Adams. “But I think it just shows how mature the team is growing.”

BIG PICTURE

UCF: Guard B.J. Taylor missed his 16th straight game. The Knights leading scorer a year ago (17.4 points per game) fractured a bone in his left foot in the season-opener. He has returned to practice and Dawkins said he’s just waiting to get the all-clear from the medical staff.

“He’s day-to-day right now, but he’s definitely getting better. He’s moving better.”

UConn: The Huskies have won 11 of 12 meetings with the Knights,

and are 8-0 against UCF as members of the American Athletic Conference.

A BIT CHIPPY

There was some pushing between the teams in warmups before the game, a flagrant foul by Dayon Griffin on Vital that led to a confrontation during the game, and some more pushing between those two in the handshake line after the game.

Vital called it “fake energy” from UCF, trying to get UConn out of its game.

Dawkins said he expects his team to be a “class program” and avoid a lot of talking on the court.

“We just want to play basketball,” he said. “I made that very clear from the perspective of their coach what I tolerate and don’t tolerate.”

STARTERS

After using 12 different starting lineups this season, Kevin Ollie went with the same starting five (Adams, Vital, Larrier, Whaley and Josh Carlton) for a third consecutive game.

Duke bounces back with win

PITTSBURGH — Mike Krzyzewski knows he doesn’t have a lot of time to pack in a full college career’s worth of lessons on his supremely talented freshmen-laden roster. The Duke coach knows he’s got six months. Tops.

So after watching the seventh-ranked Blue Devils look disjointed and disinterested defensively in an upset loss at North Carolina State last weekend, Krzyzewski basically locked his team in the gym and forced them to get serious at both ends of the court, not just the fun half.

The early results were promising, even against an overmatched opponent. Marvin Bagley III scored 16 points and grabbed 15 rebounds and Duke held Pittsburgh to 33 percent shooting in an 87-52 victory on Wednesday night. Trevon Duval and Gary Trent Jr. added 14 points each for the Blue Devils, who had six players finish in double figures.

“We’ve been practicing like crazy trying to

get better,” Krzyzewski said. “We were better tonight. We have to just keep working at it. They’re young kids and we’re not deep. They’re real young and they have talent but they’re real young and have to keep learning these new habits. Today was a step forward.”

Bagley also blocked a shot while recording his

13th double-double of the season, one shy of the Duke freshman record shared by Jabari Parker and Gene Banks. The 6-foot-11 Bagley, one of the best NBA prospects in the country, did it despite shooting 7 of 16 from the field and just 2 of 8 from the free throw line. Not that it mattered against the undersized Panthers.

Mississippi State guard Xavian Stapleton did not make the trip after turning himself into police Monday to satisfy an arrest warrant for allegedly disturbing the peace.

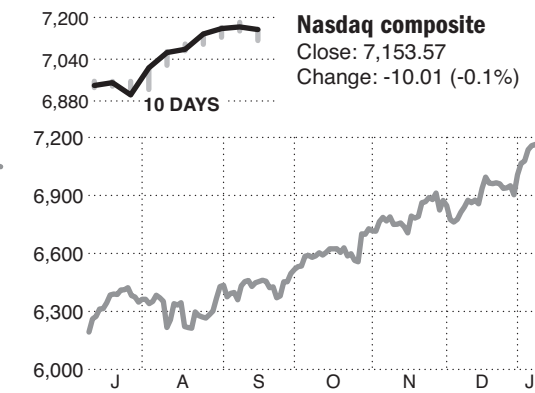
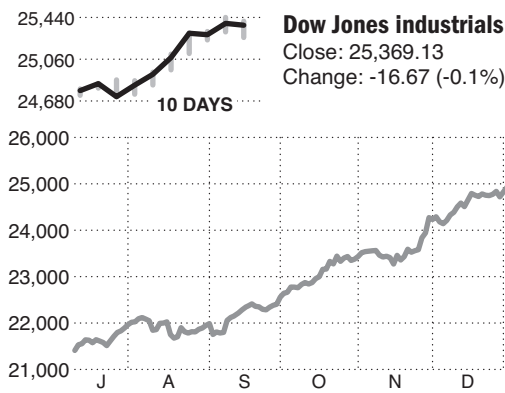
