

Bowling alley demolition underway

AVON PARK — In a March 28 meeting with Avon Park Special Magistrate Jeffrey Dawson, complaints were heard of the unsafe conditions at Heartland Lanes, 6800 U.S. 27.

Besides being an unsafe building, it has been sitting unsecured by fencing or any other barriers since it burned down the night of Sept. 10, 2017, when Hurricane Irma blew through Highlands County. Within the next month and a half, that will all change.

Avon Park Public Safety Director Jason Lister informed the Highlands News-Sun that during the meeting, several citizens gave voice to their concerns, saying that kids playing at the Go-Kart track, which is located in the same entertainment complex, were walking into and playing

in the "structure that was falling down on itself."

The co-owners of both the bowling alley and the Sebring Go-Karts are Linda, Jonathan and Christopher Davis with Kegel Company Inc.

Florida's Second District Court of Appeal denied Alethia's efforts to have her conviction overturned in 2006. That decision also shut the door on an appeal before the Florida Supreme Court.

Her legal team filed a motion to correct an illegal sentence in 2009. That, too, was rejected.

Alethia petitioned the state in 2011 to appoint legal counsel, so she could apply for post-conviction relief — an attempt to reduce her prison stay. But the Second District Court of Appeal ruled against her, concluding "the matter is neither complex nor is there need for substantial research." She obtained legal assistance from another inmate and applied

anyway. It didn't work.

The court denied a motion to vacate her life sentence in 2015. Another appeal based on poor legal representation at trial went nowhere.

An attorney who volunteers with Organize Florida has since picked up Alethia's case after hearing about it from her sister, Diane.

The attorney, John "Jack" Jordan,

AP expecting about \$1 million from storm claims

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Sebring Man charged with burglary, theft of gun

AVON PARK — Highlands County Sheriff's deputies have arrested and charged a Sebring man with beating another man while another robbed the man of his wallet, phone and gun.

Deputies have arrested Theodore "Teddy" Gibbs, 24, of Sebring on charges of robbery, burglary of a car and grand theft, in connection with a man being beaten and robbed as he tried to get in his car early Saturday morning.

Gibbs was still in jail

Monday in lieu of \$229,000 bond. No information was available in arrest reports about the identity of an accomplice.

Reports state the victim had just returned to his black Suzuki sport utility vehicle early Saturday morning after leaving it locked in the area of Hal McRae Boulevard and Delaney Avenue in Avon Park.

He, a male friend and two women were hanging out in the area late at

night when they decided to leave the area. The victim, a 22-year-old Sebring man, locked up his car, with his Taurus 9mm handgun secured under the driver's seat.

The group was gone 25 minutes, but then came back and dropped off the victim and left, leaving the victim alone.

Just as he was preparing to unlock his car, he got hit near his right eye with a closed fist. He fell to the ground and said his attacker hit him repeatedly.

The victim later identified his attacker as Gibbs.

While this was happening, arrest reports state,

another man searched his car.

At some point, reports said, one of them asked, "Where's the gun?"

The victim reportedly told them it was under the driver's seat.

After beating him for several minutes, reports said, his assailants fled, taking his wallet, iPhone 7 and handgun.

Deputies reported they saw bruises and swelling on the victim's face, large bruises on his back and scratches on his arms and knees.

The victim told deputies he and Gibbs associate with the same crowds and frequent the

same areas. In the past, the victim said, he's even provided transportation to Gibbs.

On Sunday, deputies found Gibbs in the area of U.S. 27 and Vision Street in the Highway Park neighborhood of Lake Placid. Reports state deputies found marijuana on him at the time, sealed in a zip-top plastic bag, and cigar paper.

After being given Miranda warnings, Gibbs reportedly said he had

gotten a ride with the victim that night from Sebring to Avon Park.

Gibbs told deputies that as he got out of the car, two men attacked the driver.

Gibbs said he fled to a spot some 30 yards away.

After the two men finished beating the victim, Gibbs statement reads, he went back over to the victim to help him find his keys. He then had to flee the two attackers, Gibbs told deputies.

School Board to consider Dewberry's termination

SEBRING — Kevin Dewberry did not respond to a termination letter from the School Board of Highlands County, which means the School Board will vote April 10 on his termination.

In a March 6 letter to Dewberry, who was a teacher at Avon Park Middle School, Superintendent Brenda Longshore stated, "Upon receipt of additional charges by the Highlands County Sheriff's Office on Feb. 28, review of the Statement of Probable Cause, I am recommending your termination at the April 10 School Board meeting."

The letter stated that in accordance with School Board policy, Dewberry had the right to request a hearing on the merits of the case by requesting a hearing within 15 days.

He did not respond within 15 days, Human Resources Manager Jodi Lee said Monday.

Dewberry, of Avon Park, was charged in February with four counts of lewd/lascivious behavior with a victim between the ages of 12 and 16 and was subsequently charged with 55 counts of possession of child pornography.

The student victim

in the lewd/lascivious behavior case told authorities that she and Dewberry began a relationship in 2017.

An arrest warrant was issued Feb. 27 for Dewberry, who turned himself in to the Highlands County Jail on the same day.

The Highlands County Sheriff's Office seized Dewberry's cellphone, which had many nude and sexually inappropriate videos of the student, according to an arrest report.

Dewberry pleaded not guilty on all charges, according to paperwork filed at his arraignment March 26 at the Highlands County Courthouse.

He remains in the Highlands County Jail with bail set at \$400,000 on the charges of four counts of lewd/lascivious behavior with a victim between the ages of 12 and 16, and bail set at \$550,000 on the charges of 55 counts of possession of child pornography.

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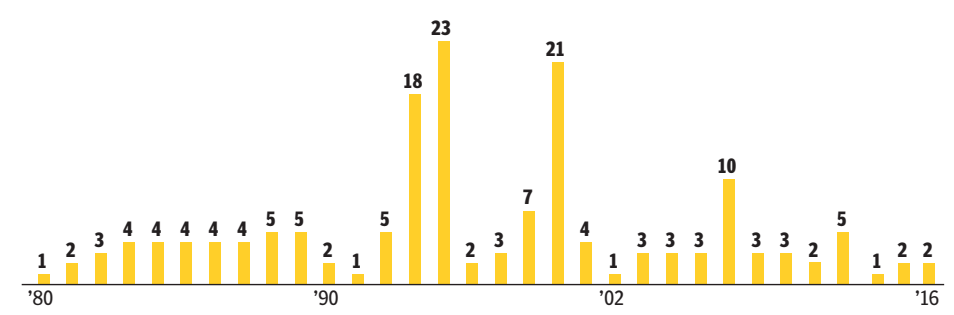


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Note: Years in which there were no commuted sentences are not included in this chart.

specializes in family law, foreclosure defense and other minor disputes. He does not have a background in major criminal cases.

“The systemic problems are there,” said Jordan, who was born blind. “But technically, this is a lawful sentence, and ultimately that’s how the appellate courts came down.”

Jordan believes the only option for Alethia is to petition the state for a pardon or a commutation of sentence — a form of clemency that could reduce her penalty.

Alethia has served the minimum amount of time that she would need to apply, which equates to 12 and a half years for a life sentence, according to the Florida Commission on Offender Review. But Jordan does not hold much hope until a new governor takes office in 2019.

Since Gov. Rick Scott took office in 2011, he has approved a commutation of sentence for only five prisoners, according to state records.

The state has commuted sentences for 160 inmates since 1980, including 26 on drug-related charges, like Alethia.

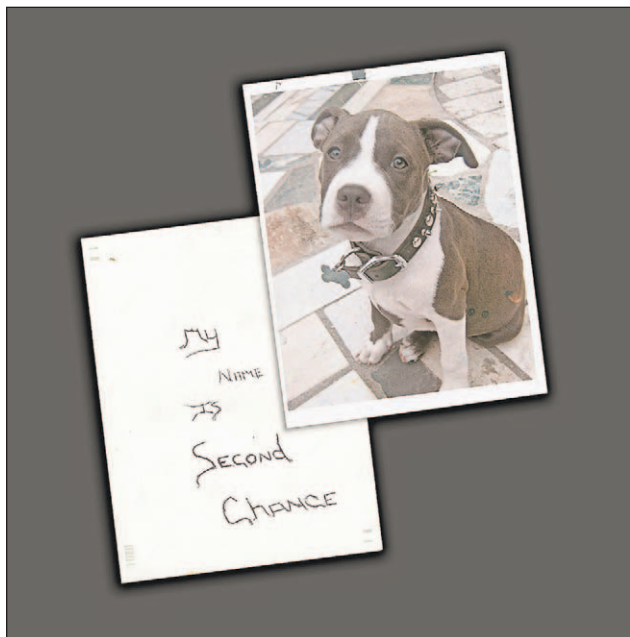
“There’s nothing left they could do to her that would benefit society,” Jordan said. “She sees the party is over. All she wants to do is see family and make up time with her children. It’s a waste of a person.”

“Drugs ruined my whole life”

Alethia’s daughter now has two children of her own. They are one of the few things that can bring her to smile.

Alethia still longs for a day on the outside. She thinks about the simple things — family life, a job, a car and a modest place to call home. She talks about a fresh start somewhere away from her demons in Sebring.

A lifetime of waiting ahead, Alethia keeps to herself in a dorm with women of similar age. She exercises to keep strength in her left leg, using a wheelchair as needed. She plays cards

and crosswords, and scrubs the bathroom over and over.

She wants to take classes toward a high school diploma or GED, but she says the officials at the facility will not let her because she’s never getting out.

Alethia points to the turnaround of her own sister, confident she can follow.

In 2008, Diane moved to Orlando to escape Sebring. She struggled to find work after prison and became involved in Organize Florida, a nonprofit that advocates for low-income communities.

Diane credits her recovery to a faith-based rehab program in Fort Lauderdale. She wishes her sister had been offered a similar opportunity.

“People change,” Alethia said. “Drugs

ruined my whole life. But I want to do right.”

Alethia’s case files are crammed into an old cardboard box with hundreds of pages of trial transcripts, dozens of court orders and motions, mixed together with various other legal documents. A glossy 8x10 photograph of a pit bull puppy sits atop the stack.

Nobody from Alethia’s family knows the dog or how the picture got there. But a note on the back gives them hope.

“My name is Second Chance.”

had to clarify for the insurance company on a number of issues because they kept reading in the newspaper that the roof was shot and they were assuming all of the damage inside the building was a result of the roof being shot, but it wasn’t,” he said. There were no apparent leaks prior to the storm.

Deleon said he located interior photos of the building from 2014 when the city was getting appraisals on the structure.

The photos were provided to the insurance company.

Also, more recent documentation was provided to show that though the roof was not brand new, it was also not leaking to the point to cause the amount of water damage to the drywall and ceiling that was evident following the hurricane, he said.

“I think we can establish that conclusively and we should be able to get a reasonable amount for rebuilding the Brickell Building or whatever, after the council meets on that,” Deleon said. It

is important, because the city spent a lot of money on emergency repairs.

Mayor Garrett Anderson asked Deleon if he had any actual dollar amounts the city will receive.

Not including the Brickell Building, the city could be getting almost \$1 million in reimbursements among the The Station, the Council Chambers and all the other buildings, he said. So the insurance company is being reasonable about it and if it is reasonable about the Brickell Building, the city will be fine.

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No more garbage in AP recycle bins

AVON PARK — The City of Avon Park has asked residents in the city limits to stop using the blue and yellow recycle bins as refuse cans. The city will no longer be picking up garbage in the recycling bins. Only the gray cans containing garbage will be picked up during the twice-weekly garbage schedule.

"Now that most of the storm debris has been picked up, we will no

longer be picking up garbage in the recycling cans," City Manager June Fisher said. "If you have garbage, just put it in the (gray) garbage can."

Residents should keep the yellow and blue cans while the city determines whether or not to resume the curbside recycling program. That decision might be presented to the City Council as early as the April 23 meeting.

After Hurricane Irma blew through Highlands County on Sept. 10, 2017, the city opted to suspend

the weekly recycling program through March 2018 so that residents could use the yellow and blue bins for debris removal.

"The City Council has not made a decision on how to move forward with recycling," Fisher said. "We are, as staff we are doing some research and we are going to bring it back to the council for them to make a decision. No decision has been made on that yet."

Fisher said that even if they went with a

different company, they should be able to use the same can as it is "standard" and it would be the most economical. She is not sure what the city will do with the cans if it decides to terminate the program altogether.

"We would have to re-group at that point," Fisher said. "There's about 4,000 cans out there. It would be a huge ordeal. We would have to back up and decide how the council will handle that if they decide to not do a recycling program."

The cans could continue to be used as a garbage can but Fisher says the concern with that is a two-can twice-weekly garbage pick up would be more pricey than a one can, twice-a-week pick up. The previous option would be more expensive although the price difference was not readily available for comparison.

Avon Park had a different recycling company than Lake Placid and Sebring. The city picked up the residents' cans

once a week and took the material to Republic Recycling Center in Lakeland.

According to a March 11 Highlands News-Sun article, Republic collects a fee from entities that process their recycling at its facility. After the materials are processed and sold on the market, those cities will receive any overage of the processing fee. However, because of the low prices on recycling, there is not much if anything left after the processing fee.

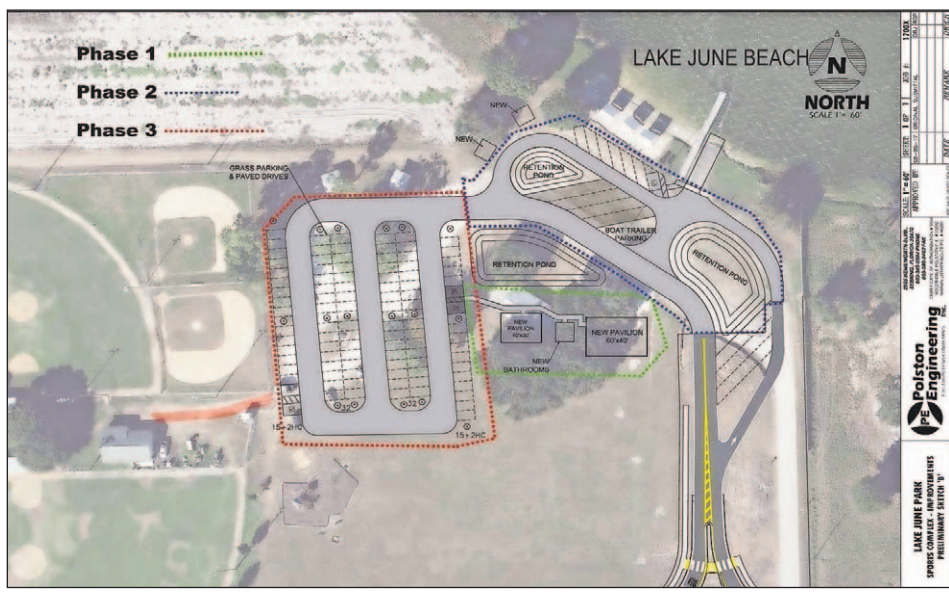

County OKs \$365K in recreation Lake June Park project moving forward

SEBRING — County commissioners approved a total of \$365,516 in improvements for three parks and recreation projects on Tuesday.

The biggest portion, \$277,950, will go toward the renovation and improvement of parking, pavilions and restrooms at Lake June Park in Lake Placid, which sits adjacent to the only baseball fields in the south end of the county.

The other allocations are \$48,066 toward playground equipment at Lake Tulane Park in Avon Park and \$39,500 for restrooms at Pine Breeze Park at Spring Lake.

Community Programs Director Chris Benson presented the budget amendment for all three projects, which were originally recommended by the Recreation and Parks Advisory Committee (RPAC) and

approved by the Board of County Commission in March. Benson told commissioners the three projects would not affect the overall budget or the infrastructure surtax fund, because it would realign funds already in the Recreation Department fund.

Commissioner Don Elwell told Benson he would rather have had more background on the three projects, such as the RPAC minutes or how committee members voted on it. The agenda package only contained a single page listing the items by project number and cost, but not telling the scope of the projects.

Elwell said his objection on the level of background for more than \$350,000 in spending "is that it's a little light."

Commissioner Ron Handley asked if the first phase of Lake June Park would be followed by future funding requests for more improvements.

Right now, with \$277,950 from the county and \$16,500 from the town of Lake Placid, the project will replace the current pavilion and restrooms and realign the parking area.

The town has already gotten \$8,721 from the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission to replace the boat dock at the park — a separate project.

Ray Royce, Lake Placid town councilman, told Handley the town hasn't made plans for a second or third phase.

"This is the biggest concern (now)," Royce said.

It's possible, in the future, town leaders may want to look at paved parking. The parking area is currently grass and shell and will remain so after improvements.

"It's right by the ball fields (which are) the main recreation facility for the southern half of the county," Royce said.

complaints from people as well as the building official," Lister said. "Which prompted us writing it [a notice of violation] for an unsafe structure and unsecured; anyone can just walk right in there."

"It became a real concern when they opened the Go-Kart place back up its full capacity of people on weekends and nights," Lister said. "You've got people walking around that environment. Two people from the Bluffs that attended said there were small children playing in there. I haven't seen that myself."

The Davis' did not appear at the hearing,

despite multiple notifications. Lister said they were given a 30-day notice to comply with the notice of violation and multiple certified letters.

"I posted a notice on the entrance to the property," Lister said. "It is now on the ground like someone kicked the stake over. They will get a copy of the order in the mail and they'll have 30 days to appeal it. It has to be appealed in front of county court."

"The magistrate found that the violations existed and ordered the site to be fenced within five days or a daily fine of \$25 would be imposed," he said. "It was further ordered that the site be demolished within 45 days."

Lister pointed out that the demolition permit had been pulled by

Bowman Steel, who is working on the building. He indicated it was not clear whether or not the permit was obtained before the March 28 magistrate hearing.

The five-day fencing deadline and the 45-day demolition deadline was imposed on March 28. There is no fence around the building as of press time on Tuesday, April 3.

Lt. Stacy McIntyre with the State Fire Marshal's office confirmed that its investigation is still ongoing. "The fire is undetermined and not suspicious," McIntyre said. "However, we are still following up on information coming to us through the community."

Jonathan Davis was unable to be reached for comment as of press time.

lives of children.

Highlands County has 20,000 children, said Carissa Marine, CEO of the Champion for Children Foundation. She said they have three big needs, the first of which is community.

"A community who believes we are all created equal, no matter what continent you were born on, no matter who your parents are, no matter how much money is or isn't in your bank account, no matter what you look like, no matter where you lay your head at night," Marine said. "A community who believes every child, every life has a unique purpose."

She also said they need family, whether blood, legal or spiritual — or all three.

"Devoted, stand-by-side-you, no-matter-what family," Marine said.

Family must teach, guide and challenge, Marine said. Fathers must show examples of leadership, stability, dedication and integrity, while mothers must show understanding, emotional strength and encouragement.

Grandparents, she said, show the importance of heritage, while siblings should teach "peace, playfulness and brotherhood."

Most of all, Marine said, children need love — not based on merit or actions, but unconditional, pure love.

She said children need a love that comforts, gives, respects, leads by example, acts and changes lives.

"Love is not what we feel," Marine said. "Love is what we do."

Kathie Southern, chair of the 10th Judicial Circuit's Child Abuse Prevention Task Force, said well over 90 percent of parents want what's best for their children

and approximately the same number want to be a positive influence in their children's lives.

She said central Florida, she's found, has a strong parenting basis. Parents who have less stress can be there for their children. Two of the biggest stressors and needs, she said, are housing and food, which many households struggle to provide.

She said she and her colleagues always ask how they can help.

Susan Ripley, director of Foster Home Licensing for Heartland for Children, said one thing people can do is open their homes as foster homes. The 10th Circuit has 184 homes available in Highlands, Hardee and Polk counties.

Of those, there are only eight in Highlands County.

The three-county area needs at least 250, Ripley said.

A request: Leave food before you go

The cars and travel trailers are northbound again. Easter has past, the Major League baseball season has begun and, in Ohio, Michigan, New York and Massachusetts, the weather is breaking for the better. If nothing else, the snow isn't sticking quite as much.

Snowbird season is ending here in Southwest Florida. It's time we wave farewell to annual visitors and wish them safe travels. Also, on a practical note, we ask they leave a little something behind before they pack the van and hit the road.

We're not being moochy. Just sensitive to the needs of neighbors and hopeful that those who are leaving our sunny patch of paradise won't simply toss items they don't need in the trash before driving off.

We're talking about food. Food that might perish in a week, canned goods too heavy to load and lug a thousand miles north, or boxed goods that take up too much trunk space.

Our food pantries are in need. They are always in need, frankly, but this time of year they stock up with food that snowbirds are thoughtful enough to leave for someone else who can use it.

The campaign is catchy: "Leave It Before You Leave."

And the idea is simple: When you're cleaning out your pantry, put the excess food you can't use or don't want to cart home into a box or bags. Bring it to a community food pantry. Call a church. Many will know where to drop it off. (See below for a few suggestions.)

This is an important time of year for food pantries. Typically, they stock up reasonably well during the Christmas season and the winter months that follow.

Then, the place clears out and shelves begin to go bare.

In addition, the school year will end in a couple of months and the kids who rely on school breakfast and lunch programs will find themselves in a bit of a hunger hole.

That's where the food pantries and the extraordinary services play a large roll.

For those who are leaving, we ask you consider the food drop-off. The list of pantries is long. Here are a few:

More sunshine, less swamp

The old maxim goes, "imitation is the sincerest form of flattery." Florida's wetland creatures must be beaming with blandishment as Washington, DC elites have collectively opted to bedeck the Nation's Capital to resemble Florida's historic swampy everglades. Arguably there may be more blood-sucking insects and snakes in DC than slithering through the tall sawgrass marshes and hardwood hammocks found just south of Florida's heartland.

Washington DC should instead strive to mimic Florida's transparent approach at legislating and cease its contemptible and furtive attempts to push forth grotesque omnibus spending bills that fail to deliver on any of the major promises made during the 2016 election cycle.

In addition to a Constitutional mandate to pass a balanced budget, Florida legislators are also constitutionally bound to limit their legislative bills to a single topic; it's called the single subject-rule. This is a mechanism designed to advance integrity and increase accountability. Limiting a bill to a single subject helps

prevent superfluous riders and earmarks from being attached to bills that have nothing to do with the legislation's stated purpose. 41 out of 50 states have a single subject rule; federal legislation should be no different.

Federal legislators will resist enacting rules that force them to exercise responsible self-restraint, but that begs the question, why? The answer is that a single subject rule for federal legislation would make it difficult to pass bad legislation, and by bad legislation, 9 times out of 10 that means fiscally irresponsible (the other 10 percent being morally reprehensible).

That further begs yet another question, why would a member of Congress want to pass bad legislation? Again, the answer is like a bad Chinese dinner, tough to swallow and unsatisfying. Bad legislation, chock full of pork barrel projects, function as a tangible bribe for a member's constituent base. In exchange the representative can expect the bribed special interest group to vote for him or

her in the next election.

The constitutionally mandated separation of powers provides Congress the power of the purse. Instead of lumping major spending budgets together, wouldn't it make more sense to breakdown the budget into sections and vote on each individually? What if the budget was divided into major categories such as defense spending, social welfare, regulatory, etc... and then each section was put to a vote to determine whether the federal government would fund those programs?

Under that scheme a spending bill would be drafted, say for defense spending, it would go through the various committees and then members of Congress and the Senate would vote. If it passed it would go to the president where it would be signed into law or vetoed. All these bills could be voted on within the same time frame, say at the beginning of the fiscal year in October. This would enable the federal government to have a budget for the upcoming year.

Adopting this approach would enable all citizens across the U.S. to know

exactly how their representatives voted on each segment of the budget, and it would help prevent waste, fraud, and abuse. Special budget items, like a border wall could be funded similarly.

It sounds like a sensible idea, right? That's because that is how the system is set up to operate right now. Partisan elites (on both sides) are side-stepping the process to lord their pathetic political rank over junior members in both chambers. These so-called party "leaders" use the omnibus budgets as both a carrot and stick, to entice or punish their members to do their bidding. This is yet another danger with having career politicians in DC, maybe a better system would be for representatives to lose rank the longer they remain in office.

Whenever you read or hear about a "continuing resolution" (CR), or omnibus bill, that means the party leaders have co-opted the prescribed budgeting process and are attempting to force their will on the rest of the legislature and the American people.

We must demand that our representatives stand up to their party leaders and end this long train of fiscal abuses that we have suffered for far too long.

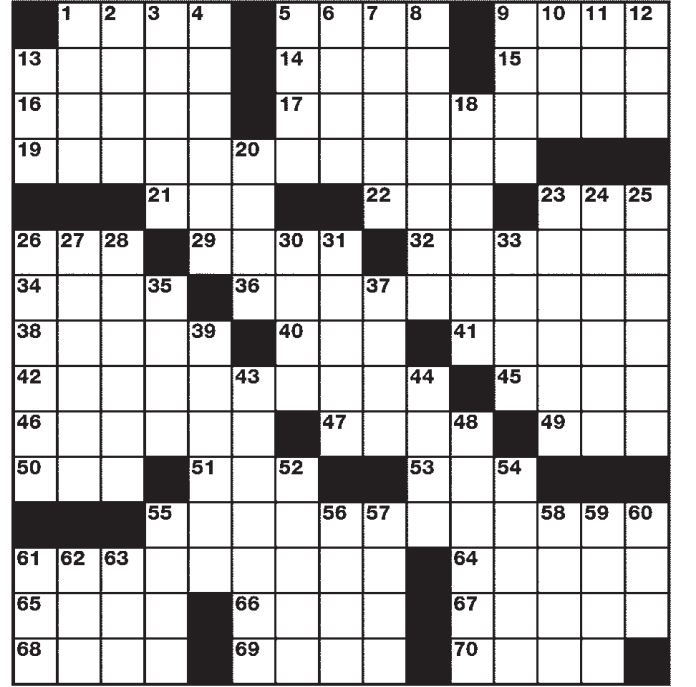

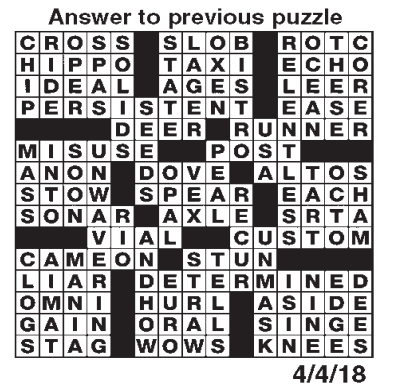

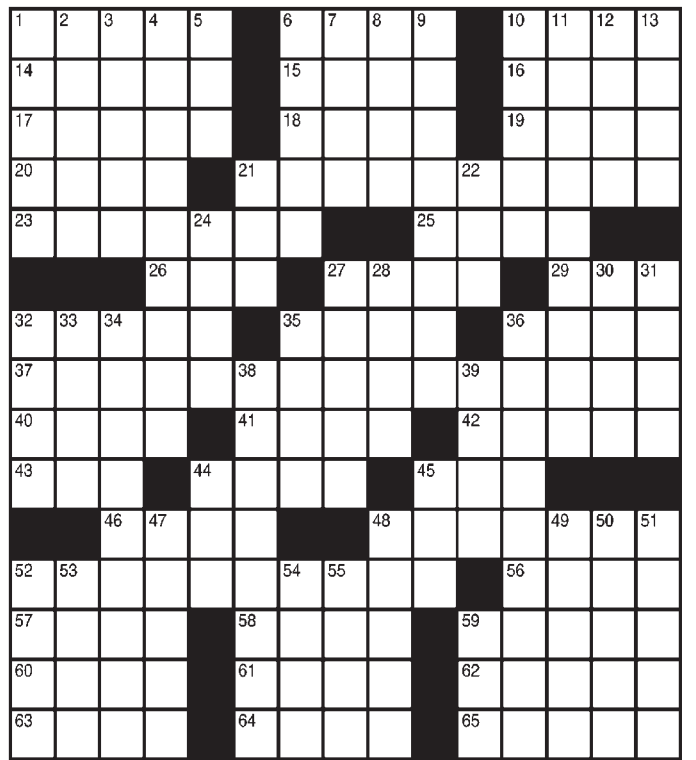

Eagle Ridge Mall for sale in upcoming auction

LAKE WALES — You could be the new owner of The Eagle Ridge Mall if you have \$2.7 million lying around.

An online auction for the indoor mall in Lake Wales will be April 9-11. The opening bid: \$2.7 million.

The auction includes 467,000 square feet of the overall 660,000 square feet of space at the mall. The space occupied by Dillard's, one of the anchor stores at Eagle Ridge, is not up for auction.

In addition to Dillard's, Regal Cinemas and JCPenney are located at the mall, which opened in 1996.

Thomas Dobrowski, the executive managing director at Newmark Knight Frank, is selling the mall for the owner, the Tabani Group of Dallas.

Dobrowski, who oversees mall sales nationally for the New York-based company, wasn't as pessimistic about the future of malls as some analysts and banks, which have predicted 20 percent to 25 percent of U.S. malls will close in the next five years.

The biggest factor in the loss of business in malls has been online shopping. During that

same period, online sales are predicted to grow from 17 percent to more than 35 percent.

To stay relevant, Dobrowski said malls must offer an entertainment element, such as a movie theater, or possibly a fitness center.

"For them to continue to exist and be viable, malls need to offer more than apparel and soft goods," Dobrowski said.

He predicted the new owner will continue to operate Eagle Ridge as a mall because it has a theater that draws people.

Some mall owners have seen success by leasing space to the medical field, grocery stores or colleges.

"Other non-retail uses are definitely becoming options for mall owners," Dobrowski said.

Eagle Ridge has faced

tough times. In 2017, one of its anchors, Sears, closed. Property values have declined. The mall is 71 percent occupied, according to the auctioneer, Ten-X Commercial. According to a report by REIS, a real estate analytics company, the national mall occupancy rate was about 92 percent in 2017.

The mall's appraised value in 2017 was \$2.6

million, down from \$4.1 million in 2013.

County Commissioner Todd Dantzler said during an agenda study on Friday that the low starting price for the mall in the auction piqued his interest.

He said Polk County Tax Collector Joe Tedder could use a portion of the property for offices he needs. Additional space could be used for driver's license testing,

Dantzler said.

"It may be a way to save Eagle Ridge Mall," Dantzler said. "Even if you get it for \$5 million, it's a heck of a real estate deal."

Commissioners listened to Dantzler's idea.

County Commissioner George Lindsey asked how the county would participate in the upcoming auction if bids must be made public in advance.

"I don't know if there is a way to move fast enough since the auction is coming up," Lindsey said.

Commissioners decided to monitor the auction. If it fails to sell, Dantzler mentioned that county officials could negotiate a price for the mall.

After the meeting, County Commissioner Bill Braswell said the price may be good but the location isn't ideal for the county to build offices.

Projected growth is north of the mall, he said.

"If Posner Park goes out of business, now we're talking," Braswell said. "The last thing we need to do is consider cheap real estate in the wrong place."

2 killed in Florida mall parking lot; no suspects in custody

LAUDERHILL — Police say a shooting in a crowded mall parking lot in Florida has left two people dead.

The Sun Sentinel reports 32-year-old Lawrence Hall and 33-year-old Omarie Stephens died.

Lauderhill police Lt. Michael Santiago says a police officer was working security Sunday night at a restaurant when he heard gunshots.

The officer found Stephens in front of the mall and paramedics found Hall on the east end of the mall. Another victim drove himself to a hospital and is expected to recover.

Police say multiple shell casings were found and that more than one type of gun was fired.

Investigators are trying to ascertain whether the assailant used more than one type of gun, or if multiple people were shooting outside the mall.

No suspects have been taken into custody.

Cities sue state officials over gun regulations law

TALLAHASSEE — Elected officials from 10 Florida cities are suing state officials over a law that prohibits local governments from enacting their own gun regulations.

The lawsuit filed Monday in Leon County Circuit Court against Gov. Rick Scott, Attorney General Pam Bondi and others says the law is invalid and unconstitutional.

A state law to pre-empt local gun regulations was passed in 1987, but

changes made in 2011 threatened local officials with removal from office and fines of up to \$5,000.

The participating cities are Weston, Miramar, Pompano Beach, Lauderhill, Miami Gardens, South Miami, Pinecrest, Cutler Bay, Miami Beach and Coral Gables. It comes after a South Florida school shooting in February that killed 17 people.

A Scott spokesman says they're reviewing the lawsuit. A Bondi spokesman says they haven't received it yet.

Florida makes it easier to track convicted sex offenders

TALLAHASSEE — Florida is upgrading the website that allows people to find out the location of sexual offenders and sexual predators.

The Florida

Department of Law Enforcement on Monday released links to a revamped website that is easier for people to use. It has also made the webpage available on mobile devices.

FDLE is authorized to post information collected from local law enforcement agencies, which usually includes name, address and other information.

Sexual offenders include people who have been convicted of crimes including sexual misconduct, lewd and lascivious behavior, rape and other crimes. Someone is designated a sexual predator if they have been convicted of a sexually violent crime and have a written court order that declares them a sexual predator.

The website allows people to search for offenders by name, by neighborhoods and on college campuses.

Confederate names removed from Florida city's street signs

HOLLYWOOD — The names of Confederate generals are being removed from street signs in one Florida city.

The Hollywood city commission voted in August to remove the names of Robert E. Lee, Nathan Bedford Forrest and John Bell Hood from residential streets.

In a Sun Sentinel report, officials said about half the signs have been replaced so far. The rest should be replaced by the end of April.

The streets were renamed Freedom, Hope and Liberty.

Mayor Josh Levy said

the new signs display a message that is "a lot better than the message the prior names were sending."

Laurie Schecter was one of the residents who

petitioned for the sign changes in 2017. She said the new names "better represent the character of our city and the people who live here."

WeatherTech earns naming rights to Laguna Seca Agreement reached with Monterey County for iconic track

The County of Monterey and WeatherTech have come to terms on a multiyear naming rights agreement at the iconic motorsports and entertainment facility located at the County-owned Laguna Seca Recreation Area. Beginning April 2018, the famed 11-turn, 2.238-mile road course will be

known as WeatherTech Raceway Laguna Seca. The track was built in 1957 by the Sports Car Racing Association of the Monterey Peninsula (SCRAMP) on land leased by Fort Ord in order to fill the void left by the Pebble Beach Road Races held between 1950 and 1956 before being deemed unsafe. The track, originally known as Laguna Seca Raceway, had held a naming

rights agreement with automaker Mazda for the past 17 years that ends on March 31. SCRAMP manages Laguna Seca Recreation Area on behalf of the County. The swiftness of an agreement is testament to the iconic facility's stature in the world of motorsports. Already as word of the pending agreement surfaced, accolades from within the industry has been

favorable. SCRAMP was able to capitalize on not only the facility's heritage, but on the future plans in place to enhance the facility for generations to come. Laguna Seca has long been an economic engine for the Central Coast and it continues to operate without the benefit of public funds.

Difficult fishing until the weekend

The Florida fresh-water fishing forecast for the second half of the first week of April gives anglers an ideal 'fishing weather' forecast and the beginning of the last quarter moon phase. All fishing factors considered, other than the fact that post full moon monthly periods are usually the least productive fishing days of the twenty-eight day cycle, every other fishing factor will be perfect for catching fish.

Now, the lunar and solar combined effect will be at the weakest levels of lunar month

of twenty-eight days--- which is due to the least lunar interference with the sun's energy levels, meaning less pressure change and a constant

steady solar energy rate.

When there is less 'fishing factor change' there is less 'adjusting fish' which means less energy used and thus less appetite for feeding. So it will take more time generally speaking, to locate concentrations of fishing needing to feed.

It should be noted and remembered however that we are in the 'Bass Capital of The World' where huge largemouth bass opportunistically feed even when they are not really very hungry. If it looks like it's a natural food source, and is moving slow and emitting a

heavy vibration due to a full stomach, she's going to inhale it.

Selecting a short, fat, heavy action bait which produces aggressive vibrations at slow retrieve speeds, will be the most productive strategy until the solar-lunar effect levels increase, which is when the last quarter moon phase arrives this weekend.

Best Fishing Days: Friday through Sunday during the early morning and evening periods.

Major Fishing Period: A weak

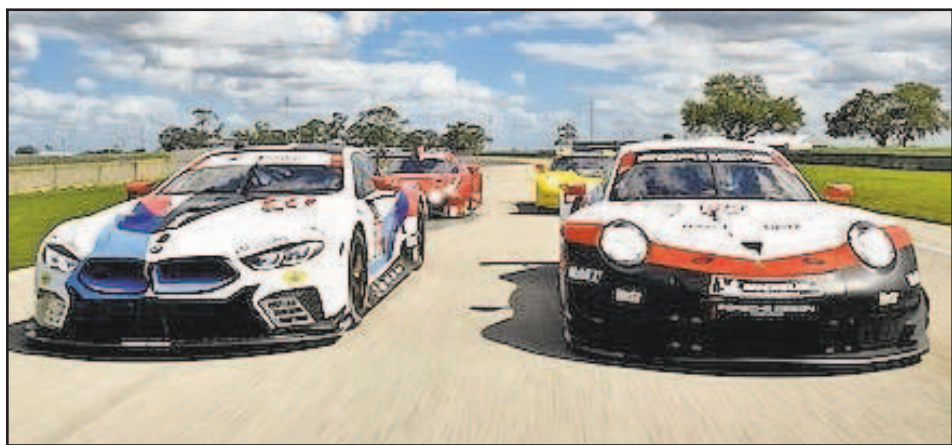
moonset occurs today at 10:09 a.m. There probably will be a slight bump up in atmospheric pressure at about the same time, give or take an hour, maybe. Therefore a rating of 2-3 will occur from 8-11 a.m. This period will not move later daily and will move backwards more so each day as the moon overhead period becomes closer to the sunrise period—Friday through the weekend 6-9 a.m. with a 5-6 rating.

Minor Fishing Period: The moon is underfoot today at 5 p.m.

and the sunset at 7:45 p.m. This period really is not a minor period but instead should equal the morning period producing a 2-3 rating from 5-8 p.m. Fact is, whichever fishing period has the greater atmospheric pressure change, will be the 'major fishing period'. Probably will come down to pure luck over the next two to three days.

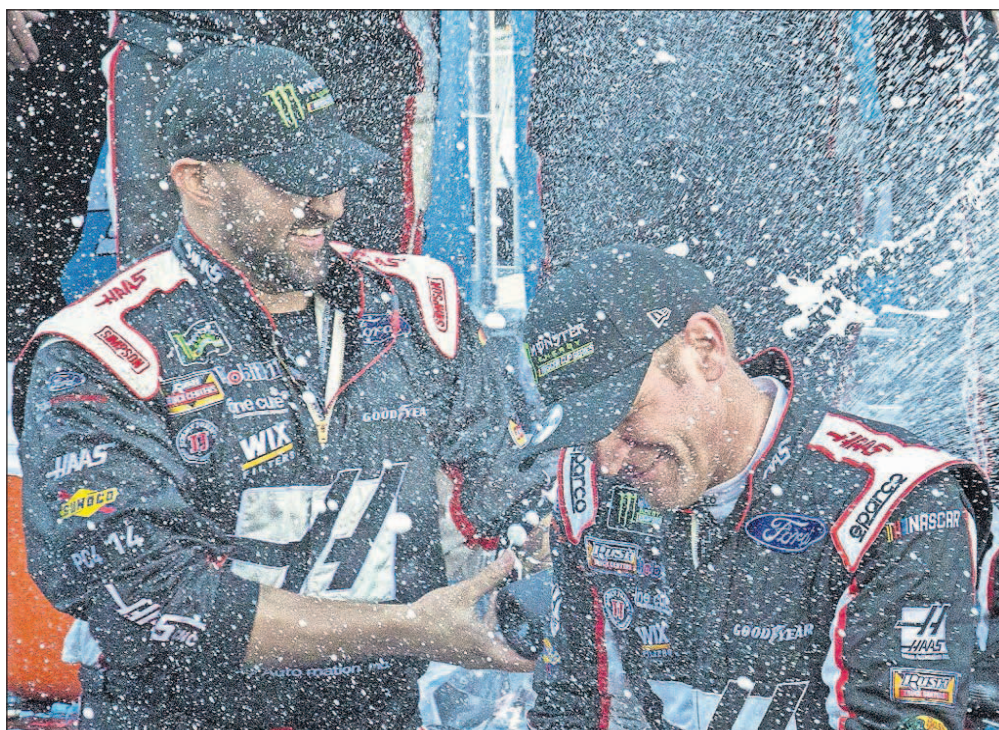
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EASTER BREAK THREE THINGS WE LEARNED

2. Playing nice

The Martinsville race was a bit boring. Three drivers dominated three different stages, and for a short-track race, it was pretty tame. Of the four caution periods, only one was for any

contact on the racetrack. That's ho-hum compared with the 2017 fall race's 11 cautions.

3. Losing control

Ron Devine lost control of the Cup Series team he created, BK Racing, which fields a car for Gray Gaulding. The court appointed a trustee to manage BK Racing's finances. "I don't know if I will stay involved in it or go in another direction," Devine told ESPN.com.

LAKE PLACID — Citizens of Highlands County hit the dance floor at the American Legion to raise money for a local non-profit, Wrede's Wildlife Center on March 31. Wrede's provides life-time care for injured wildlife who are unable to be released into the wild. In order to provide the special diets and habitats the animals require, the center relies on private donations.

Although Wrede's is

licensed by the FWC, USDA and USFW, it does not receive state or federal funding. The costs are substantial to provide care for a variety of animals, including eagles, bobcats, foxes and deer. The center provides exceptional care for the animals, and it uses specialized techniques to heal broken wings of large birds of prey.

Gina Guirola, an animal lover and dance teacher, realized the need for a local shelter when she found orphaned owls. By law,

she was unable to raise the owls herself and searched for a place to keep them. At this point, she recognized that local shelters, such as Wrede's, needed more funding to increase their ability to care for injured wildlife in our area.

Guirola organized her first fundraiser to help Wrede's continue their mission of providing care for wildlife. Modeling her competition after Dancing with the Stars, Guirola organized the

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A review of "The Quest of the Cubs"

A long time ago, at the Ice Cap, a clock that counts down to the next "great melting" was built to warn the polar bears. For a polar bear, no ice means no food. But, the Ice Clock's purpose has been corrupted. What was meant as a warning has now become something brainwashed bears worship. They think it can stop the next melting.

"First" and "Second" don't have names because in the Northern Kingdoms, bear cubs don't get named until their second year. First loves hearing stories about the hero bears of old; he wants to be one of those bears but he's anxious and scared of many things. Second is protective and brave, but she is also impulsive. Despite their differences, these cubs have special abilities: First can hear and feel other's thoughts and Second senses the molecular structures of different types of ice.

One day their mother, Svenna, is approached by two "Roguer" bears, worshippers of the clock, who come to take her cubs as sacrifices for the Ice Clock. She offers herself to save them and because she can read and write, they accept her trade. Svenna knows bears worshipping a clock just isn't natural and every day she formulates a plan to escape and get back to her cubs. While she is trapped at the Ice Cap, the cubs find out their dad, Svern, was the leader of a rebellion against the Timekeepers. Can they find their dad, save their mom, and destroy the Ice Clock?

I really enjoyed The Quest of the Cubs. It's very well written, with bits of a made-up language incorporated. Author Kathryn Lasky did this with her other series as well, so it's no surprise we see it here. Lasky's art of keeping the action going is appreciated, but I found it was hard to track when she switched back and forth

between the characters' inner dialogues. I found many positive messages in this book like believing in yourself, sticking up for other people, and doing what is right, even if it isn't easy.

While there is no profanity nor sexual content, this book has many instances of death and bloodshed. There's

also an abusive parenting scenario (Svenna has to leave the cubs with her distant cousin who doesn't give them food or affection), talk of cub sacrifices (we never read about a specific instance), ghosts of cubs who were sacrificed (we meet one while Svenna is in a cell), and drinking alcohol (an adult snow leopard drinks schnapps with his cocoa, one of the cubs tastes it and doesn't like it). The publisher, Scholastic Inc., recommends this book for ages 8-12.



I am sure I am staying tuned for book number two in the Bears of the Ice series by Kathryn Lasky, which is due to be published in October. Come visit the Heartland Library Cooperative to see what you will discover.

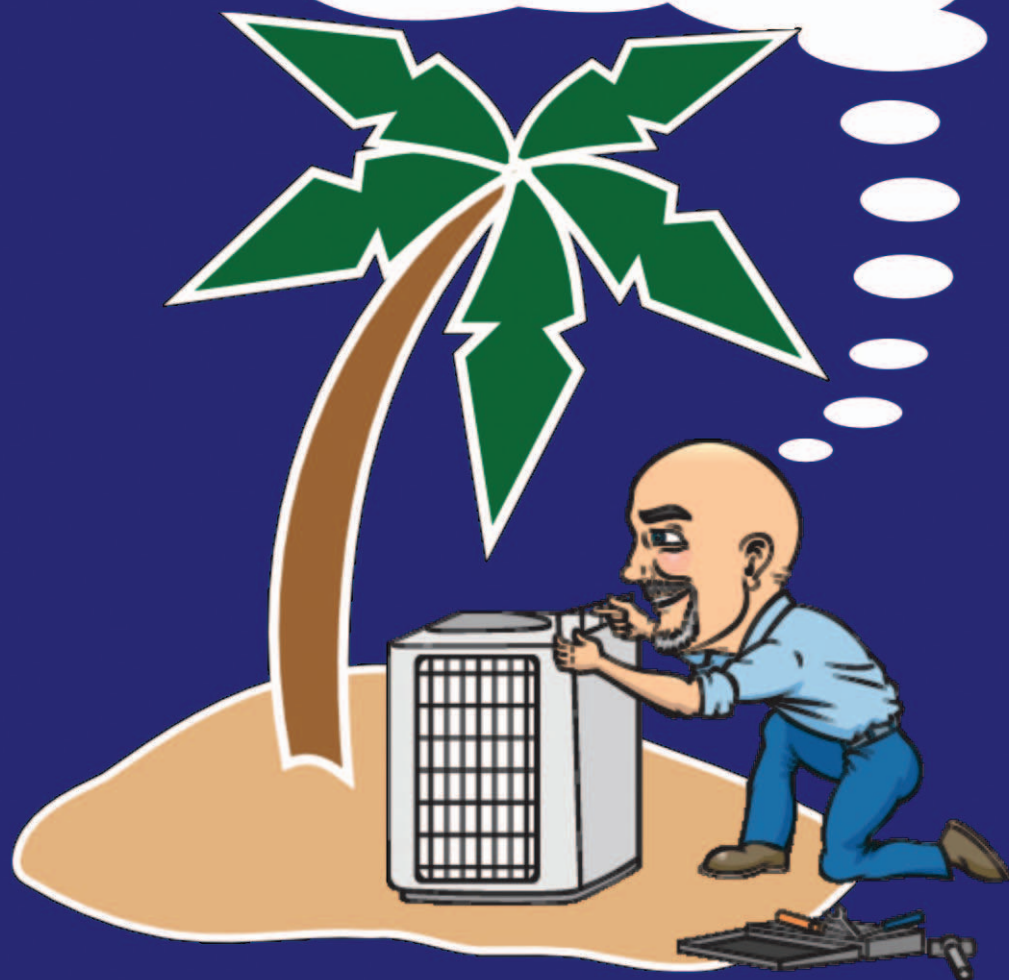


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Inside the mysterious Bok Tower

For many who have visited Bok Tower, what lies beyond the shiny brass door is a mystery. Few get a look inside the actual tower. It is an 'invitation only' event for selected members. You will now get a special peek inside that fabulous work of art.

The morning began with refreshments in the Magnolia Room at Bok Tower Gardens. Marilyn Knowlton welcomed those attending and offered assorted breads and spreads as well as coffee and fresh orange juice, courtesy of Florida Naturals.

Our guides Fred and Shelba Powell reverently opened the iron gates and led the group onto the hallowed grounds. "The ground breaking was in 1927. The Tower was dedicated two years later in 1929," explained Fred.

"Mr. Bok was very ill and knew he was not going to live much longer when he last came here on Jan. 6, 1930, with his wife and nurse. He passed away on Jan. 9 and is buried in the grassy area in front of the brass door."

The mystical brass door is a reverse cut wood that was covered in brass and hammered out using a 'chasing' technique. The 30 brass panels are from the book of Genesis and start with the creation and end with Adam and Eve being led out of the Garden of Eden.

Inside the Founder's Room is a wealth of art and history. "There was a reception here with President Calvin Coolidge and many world dignitaries to dedicate the tower and sanctuary on Feb. 1, 1929."

The windows were intricately carved on an easel and then were carefully installed on both sides of the tower.

"The Bok Tower is an architectural marvel, a work of art, a musical instrument and an office building," said Fred. The musical

instrument is the carillon which is housed in the top of the tower. It's an area open only to the carillonneur, Geert d'Hollander and those at the highest membership level by invitation only. D'Hollander was

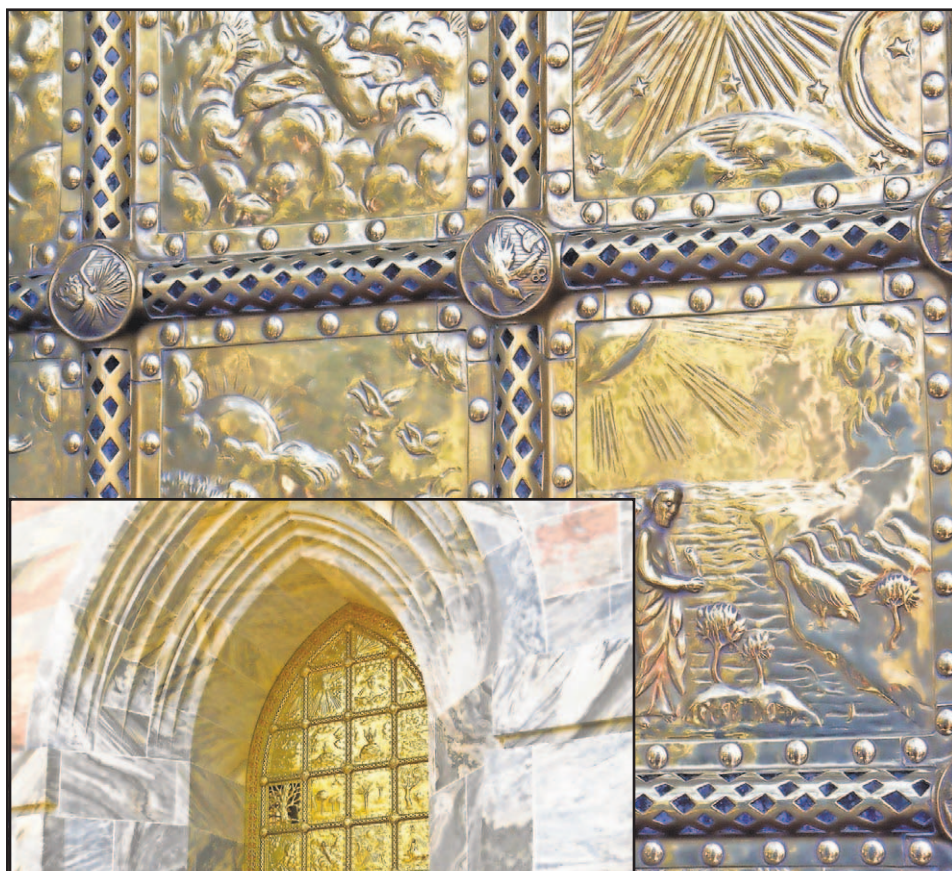
named Bok Tower's fourth full-time carillonneur in 2012. He is an internationally famous musician from Belgium. The carillon has 60 bronze bells ranging from 16 pounds to 11 tons, with a total weight



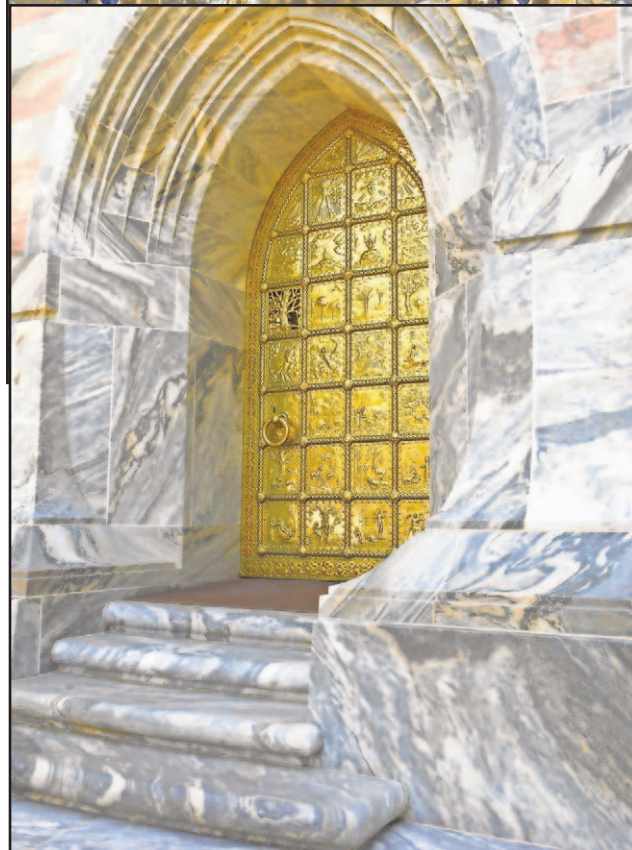
Resting place of Edward Bok inside the gate in front of the gold door.

on over 63 tons. The first concert was held in the tower back in 1929 by the first carillonneur, Anton Brees. D'Hollander performs live concerts depending on the season. (Please check online to verify dates and times). You can watch him perform on a TV screen in the gardens.

"The tiles in the floor start at the center which represents the tree of creation and the lotus blossom. There are six points depicting the six days of creation. There are branches with Florida creations and water. Some of the Florida symbols include lobsters, flamingos, fish, turtles and birds," explained Fred.

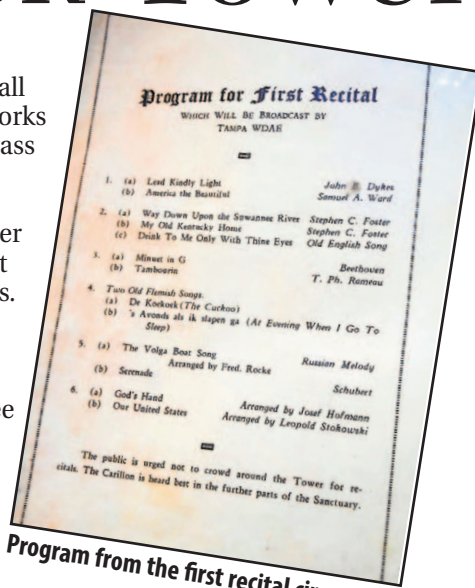
Samuel Yellin was the

creator of all the iron works and the brass door. The iron gates are a master work or art themselves. On the outside of the tower, you will see the huge sundial. That opening was how the bells were delivered into the tower.

The Founder's Room is a sacred place in the gardens. It was created to house the beautiful carillon, to serve as a centerpiece for the gardens and for the private

use and enjoyment of the Bok family.

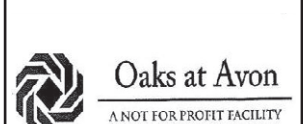

Green means go; this is where the actors get ready. The lights mimic the lighting on stage so they also do their make-up here. The flowers you see on the counter were received on opening night for our current show, 'All Shook Up.'

Behind the stage is a huge workshop, prop storage area and the 'fly system.'

"The height of the stage is 40 feet. We are able to store things in the rafters, like backdrops. The fly system is

how things are moved around."

The fly system is a series of counter balance weights, ropes and pulleys. There are no hydraulics used. It's pitch black during a show, so those working learn to operate in the dark.

The dark curtains on stage are either 'legs' (long curtains) or 'teasers' (short curtains). "Their sole purpose is to block your view as to what's going on behind them."

The backstage is very busy during a performance. Several monitors are wall-mounted so people can see what's going on stage. Dressers

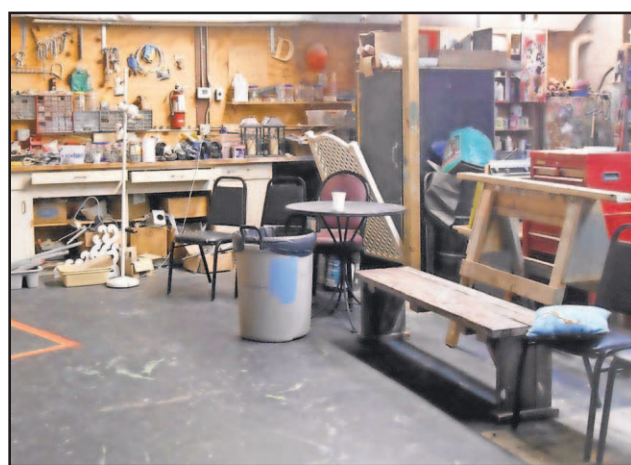

Trump wants military to secure border with Mexico

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump said Tuesday he wants to use the military to secure the U.S.-Mexico border until his promised border wall is built.

Speaking during a visit with Baltic leaders, Trump said he's been discussing the idea with his Defense Secretary, Jim Mattis.

"We're going to be doing things militarily. Until we can have a wall and proper security, we're going to be guarding our border with the military," he said, calling the measure a "big step" that had rarely been done before.

Federal law prohibits the use of active duty service members for law enforcement inside the U.S., unless specifically authorized by Congress. But over the past 12 years, presidents have twice sent National Guard troops to the border to bolster security and assist with surveillance and other support.

The White House counsel's office has been working on the idea for several weeks.

Trump has been deeply frustrated about the lack of progress building what was the signature promise of his campaign: a "big, beautiful wall" along the Mexican border. He's previously suggested using the Pentagon's budget to pay for building the wall, arguing it is a national security priority, despite strict rules that prohibit spending that's not authorized by Congress.

The Department of Homeland Security and White House did not immediately respond to requests for comment. At the Pentagon, officials were struggling to answer questions about the plan, including rudimentary details on whether it would involve National Guard members, as similar programs in the past have done.

But officials appeared to be considering a model similar to a 2006 operation in which former President Bush deployed National Guard troops to the southern border in an effort to increase security and surveillance.

Rekindling of King's 'Poor People's Campaign' takes shape

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — When he was killed 50 years ago, the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. was working on a campaign to unite poor people of diverse backgrounds to demand better homes, jobs and education.

Now, civil rights leaders are reviving the Poor People's Campaign with 40 days of marches, sit-ins and other peaceful protests. Organizers of the rekindled campaign discussed their plans Tuesday in Memphis on the eve of the anniversary of King's death.

"This first 40 days is not the end; it's the launch," said the Rev. William Barber

of North Carolina, one of the co-chairs of the revived campaign. "You will see simultaneous moral direct action. You will see simultaneous training of people to prepare for a season of massive voter mobilization."

Starting May 14, clergy, union members and other activists will take part in the events in about 30 states, targeting Congress and state legislatures. Then, on June 23, organizers plan a large rally in Washington — similar to what King had envisioned. The original Poor People's Campaign was carried out in 1968 after King's death by other civil rights leaders.

Barber and the Rev. Liz Theoharis of New York, who

started planning the new campaign in December, discussed the details at the National Civil Rights Museum in Memphis, one of several locations holding events commemorating the 50th anniversary of King's death.

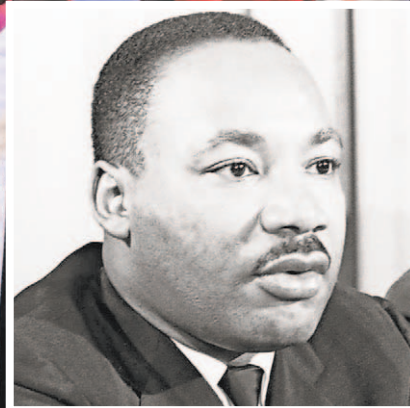
Aside from mobilizing voters, Barber said the revived campaign will call attention to poverty, racism and environmental issues. Organizers plan to release a study later this month on poverty in America over the past five decades.

King had envisioned the Poor People's Campaign in Washington as a way to speak out against economic injustice, as he shifted his focus from civil rights to

human rights. But before he could finish those plans, he came to Memphis in 1968 to support a strike by black sanitation workers who were tired of dealing with low pay and dangerous working conditions.

King led a march in Memphis that turned violent on March 28, and he went back home to Atlanta. Seeking to prove that non-violent protests still worked, King vowed to lead a peaceful march and returned to Memphis days later.

The civil rights leader was standing on the balcony of the old Lorraine Motel when he was shot on April 4, 1968. He died at a hospital at age 39.

APNewsBreak: US suspects cellphone spying devices in DC

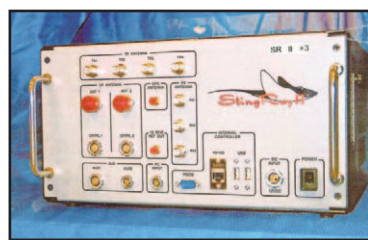
For the first time, the U.S. government has publicly acknowledged the existence in Washington of what appear to be rogue devices that foreign spies and criminals could be using to track individual cellphones and intercept calls and messages.

The use of what are known as cellphone-site simulators by foreign powers has long been a concern, but American intelligence and law enforcement agencies — which use such eavesdropping equipment themselves — have been silent on the issue until now.

In a March 26 letter to

Oregon Sen. Ron Wyden, the Department of Homeland Security acknowledged that last year it identified suspected unauthorized cell-site simulators in the nation's capital. The agency said it had not determined the type of devices in use or who might have been operating them. Nor did it say how many it detected or where.

The agency's response, obtained by The Associated Press from Wyden's office, suggests little has been done about such equipment, known popularly as Stingrays after a brand common among U.S. police departments. The Federal Communications Commission, which regulates the nation's airwaves, formed

a task force on the subject four years ago, but it never produced a report and no longer meets regularly.

The devices work by tricking

mobile devices into locking onto them instead of legitimate cell towers, revealing the exact location of a particular cellphone. More sophisticated versions can eavesdrop on calls by forcing phones to step down to older, unencrypted 2G wireless technology. Some attempt to plant malware.

They can cost anywhere from \$1,000 to about \$200,000. They are commonly the size of a briefcase; some are as small as a cellphone. They can be placed in a car next to a government building. The most powerful can be deployed in low-flying aircraft.

Thousands of members of the military, the NSA, the CIA, the

FBI and the rest of the national-security apparatus live and work in the Washington area. The surveillance-savvy among them encrypt their phone and data communications and employ electronic countermeasures. But unsuspecting citizens could fall prey.

Wyden, a Democrat, wrote DHS in November requesting information about unauthorized use of the cell-site simulators.

The reply from DHS official Christopher Krebs noted that DHS had observed "anomalous activity" consistent with Stingrays in the Washington area. A DHS official who spoke

CDC: Drug-resistant 'nightmare bacteria' pose growing threat

"Nightmare bacteria" with unusual resistance to antibiotics of last resort were found more than 200 times in the United States last year in a first-of-a-kind hunt to see how much of a threat these rare cases are becoming, health officials said Tuesday.

That's more than they had expected to find, and the true number is probably higher because the effort involved only certain labs in each state, officials say.

The problem mostly strikes people in hospitals and nursing homes who

need IVs and other tubes that can get infected. In many cases, others in close contact with these patients also harbored the superbugs even though they weren't sick — a risk for further spread.

Some of the sick patients had traveled for surgery or other health care to another country where drug-resistant germs are more common, and the superbug infections were discovered after they returned to the U.S.

"Essentially, we found nightmare bacteria in your backyard," said Dr. Anne Schuchat, principal deputy director of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and

Prevention.

"These verge on untreatable infections" where the only option may be supportive care — fluids and sometimes machines to maintain life to give the patient a chance to recover, Schuchat said.

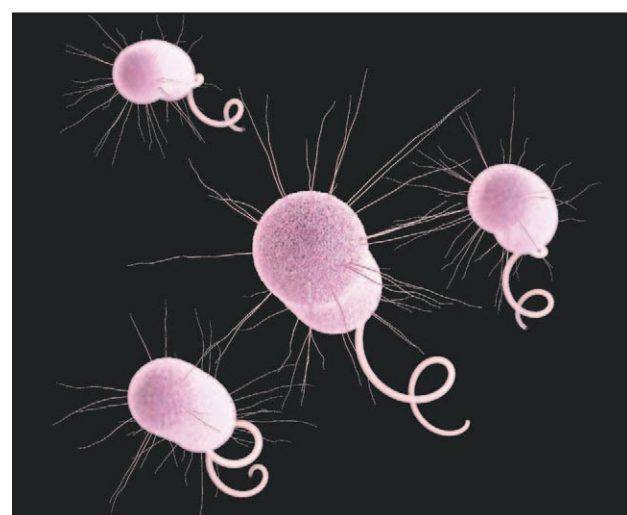
The situation was described in a CDC report.

Bugs and drugs are in a constant battle, as germs evolve to resist new and old antibiotics. About 2 million Americans get infections from antibiotic-resistant bacteria each year and 23,000 die, Schuchat said.

Concern has been growing about a rise in bacteria resistant to all

or most antibiotics. Last year, public health labs around the country were asked to watch for and quickly respond to cases of advanced antibiotic resistance, especially to some last-resort antibiotics called carbapenems.

In the first nine months of the year, more than 5,770 samples were tested for these "nightmare bacteria," as CDC calls them, and one quarter were found to have genes that make them hard to treat and easy to share their resistance tricks with other types of bacteria. Of these, 221 had unusual genes

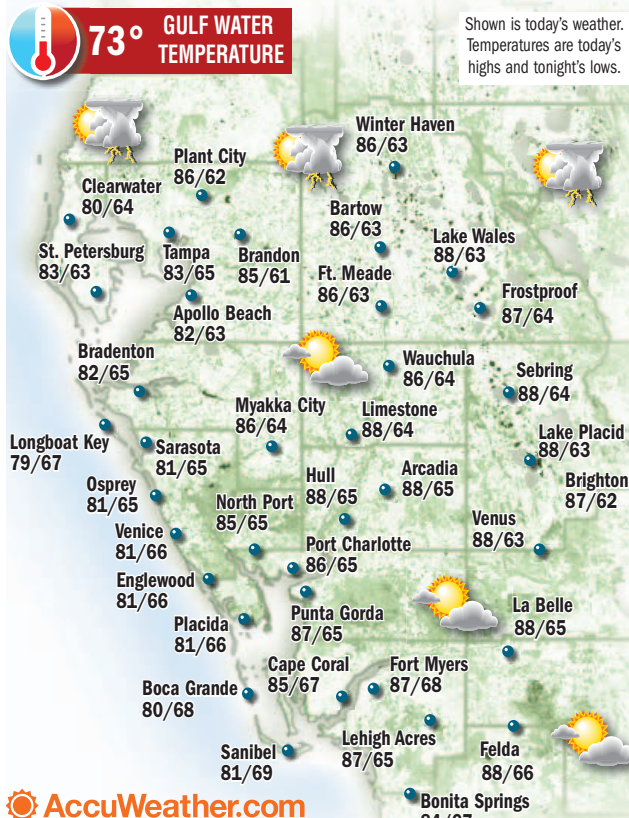

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Turkey's Erdogan says missile deal with Russia is final

ANKARA, Turkey — Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan said Tuesday that his country's plan to purchase Russia's long-range missile defense system is a "done deal," brushing aside concerns from some NATO allies.

Erdogan appeared at a joint news conference with Russian President Vladimir Putin, who was in Ankara for his first foreign visit since his March 18 re-election. Both the defense system agreement and Putin's visit underscore the intensifying ties between Turkey and Russia.

In December, they finalized a deal for Turkey to purchase Russia's long-range S-400 missile defense system, raising eyebrows among some of Turkey's fellow NATO members.

"We have made an agreement regarding the S-400s. That subject is closed. It's a done deal," Erdogan said.

The warming relations between the two countries stand in contrast to the souring relations between Russia and the West over the poisoning in Britain of a Russian ex-spy. Turkey's relations with its Western

allies also have deteriorated over human rights issues and its military operations against Kurdish militia in Syria.

The Turkish leader spoke of "attempts to poison Turkish-Russian cooperation" and added: "Thank God our relations navigated these difficult tests with success. With every failed provocation, our relationship strengthened, just like steel after iron is quenched with water."

Putin said Russia will manufacture the S-400 missiles at a quicker pace

than initially planned to deliver them more quickly per Ankara's request.

"We have decided to speed up the delivery of those highly efficient systems," he added.

Earlier, the two leaders symbolically launched the start of the construction of Turkey's first nuclear power plant, which will be built by Russia near the Mediterranean coast at Akkuyu.

Putin hailed the project as a symbol of growing cooperation between Russia and Turkey.

that conferred resistance. The cases were scattered throughout 27 states.

"Even in remote areas" this threat is real, because patients often transfer to and from other places for care, said Dr. Jay Butler, chief medical officer

for the state of Alaska and past president of the Association of State and Territorial Health Officials.

Others in close contact with the infected patient then were tested, and 11 percent were found to be carrying the same superbugs even though they were not sick. This gives the bugs more of a chance to spread.

What to do? CDC suggests:

- Tell your doctors if you recently had health care in another country.
- Talk with them about preventing infections, taking care of chronic conditions to help avoid them, and getting vaccines to prevent them.
- Wash your hands regularly and keep cuts clean until healed.

Woman shoots and wounds 4 at YouTube before killing herself

SAN BRUNO, Calif. (AP) — A woman opened fire at YouTube headquarters Tuesday, setting off a panic among employees and wounding at least four people before fatally shooting herself, police and witnesses said.

Officers and federal agents swarmed the company's complex in the Bay Area city of San Bruno after receiving multiple 911 calls reporting gunfire.

Television news footage showed people leaving the building in a

line, holding their arms in the air. Officers patted them down to make sure none had weapons.

The shooting left "four victims who have all been transported for gunshot related injuries and we have one subject who is deceased inside the building who we believe to be the shooter," said San Bruno Police Chief Ed Barberini.

YouTube employee Vadim Lavrusik posted on Twitter that he heard gunshots and saw people running. He said he was barricaded in a room with co-workers before being safely evacuated.

Will Hudson said a friend who works for

YouTube texted him about the shooter.

"I think there might be a shooter in my building," read one text. "The fire alarm went off so we started to evacuate and then people (started) running saying there was a shooter."

San Francisco General Hospital received three patients: a 36-year-old man in critical condition, a 32-year-old woman in serious condition and a 27-year-old woman in fair condition, a spokesman said.

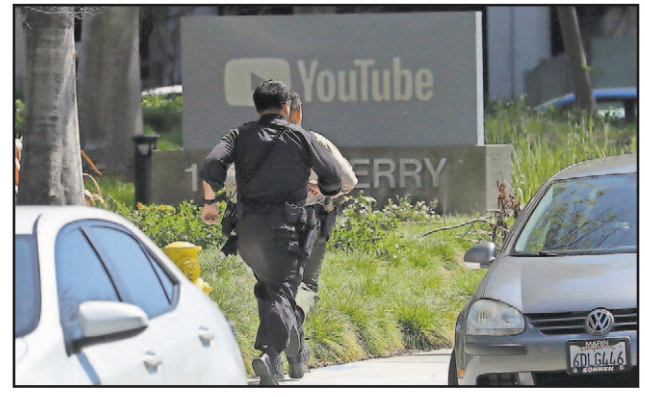
The hospital said later that it did not expect to receive more patients. It was not immediately clear where the fourth

gunshot victim had been sent for treatment.

Google, which owns the world's biggest online video website, posted on Twitter that the company was coordinating with authorities. The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives said it also responded.

The White House said President Donald Trump was briefed on a shooting and that officials were monitoring developments.

Hudson said his friend made it safely back to San Francisco and was in contact with his family. Hudson said he's become used to hearing about gun violence but has

never been so close to it.

"It just feels strange. It feels like it could really be anyone. That's really the strangeness of it," he

said.

Calls and emails to YouTube representatives were not immediately returned.

on condition of anonymity because the letter has not been publicly released added that the devices were detected in a 90-day trial that began in January 2017 with equipment from a Las Vegas-based DHS contractor, ESD America.

Krebs, the top official in the department's National Protection and Programs Directorate, noted in the letter that DHS lacks the equipment and funding to detect Stingrays even though their use by foreign governments "may threaten U.S. national and economic security." The department did report its findings to "federal partners" Krebs did not name. That presumably includes the FBI.

The CEO of ESD America, Les Goldsmith,

said his company has a relationship with DHS but would not comment further.

Legislators have been raising alarms about the use of Stingrays in the capital since at least 2014, when Goldsmith and other security-company researchers conducted public sweeps that located suspected unauthorized devices near the White House, the Supreme Court, the Commerce Department and the Pentagon, among other locations.

The executive branch, however, has shied away from even discussing the subject.

Aaron Turner, president of the mobile security consultancy Integricell, was among the experts who conducted the 2014 sweeps, in part to try to drum up business. Little has changed since, he said.

Like other major world capitals, he said,

Washington is awash in unauthorized interception devices. Foreign embassies have free rein because they are on sovereign soil.

Every embassy "worth their salt" has a cell tower simulator installed, Turner said. They use them "to track interesting people that come toward their embassies." The Russians' equipment is so powerful it can track targets a mile away, he said.

Shutting down rogue Stingrays is an expensive proposition that would require wireless network upgrades the industry has been loath to pay for, security experts say. It could also lead to conflict with U.S. intelligence and law enforcement.

In addition to federal agencies, police departments use them in at least 25 states and the District of Columbia, according to the American Civil Liberties Union.

Under Operation Jump Start, 6,000 National Guard troops were sent to assist border patrol with non-law enforcement duties while additional border agents were hired and trained. Over the two years, about 29,000 National Guard forces participated in the missions, as forces rotated in and out.

Active duty U.S. troops weren't used for the operation because legal prohibitions.

In addition, President Barack Obama sent about 1,200 National Guard troops to the U.S.-Mexico border in 2010 to beef up efforts to battle drug smuggling and illegal immigration.

Texas has also deployed military forces to its

800-mile border with Mexico. Former Texas Gov. Rick Perry, now serving as Trump's energy secretary, ordered the deployment of 1,000 Texas National Guardsmen to the Rio Grande Valley in summer 2014 in response to a sharp rise in the numbers of Central American children crossing the border alone.

White House officials were scheduled to meet later Tuesday with DHS border security personnel and attorneys to discuss further details, according to a White House official speaking on condition of anonymity. The White House counsel's office has been working on the issue for some time, the person said.

The Posse Comitatus Act, passed after the Civil War, is the main federal law prohibiting the use of American service members in law enforcement,

unless specifically authorized by Congress.

Trump's comments came a day after administration officials announced they were crafting a new legislative package aimed at closing immigration "loopholes" and Trump called on Republican lawmakers to immediately pass a border bill using the "Nuclear Option if necessary" to muscle it through, as part of a flurry of tweets on the subject over the last several days.

The president has also been declaring protections for so-called Dreamer immigrants "dead," accusing Democrats of allowing "open borders, drugs and crime" and warning Mexico to halt the passage of "caravans" of immigrants or risk U.S. abandonment of the North American Free Trade Agreement.

Good Advice From a Different Guy

Dear Mr. Berko: My 84-year-old dad is not well and was a very avid reader of your column until he got sick. He would send your columns to me every week with comments. Two years ago, he had a stroke. According to his brokerage statement, he owns two stocks: 400 shares of Citigroup and 3,000 shares of MGIC Investment Corp. In January 2009, he bought 4,000 shares of Citigroup as a gamble at \$1.20 per share. It's now selling for \$73 a share. But for some reason, Dad's 4,000-share investment is now 400 shares. A new stockbroker at his brokerage told me that he has no record of Dad's selling Citigroup and mumbled something about a "revised split" that was unintelligible. Dad's notes say you told him that big banks — such as the Bank of New York Mellon, Bank of America, Citigroup and JPMorgan Chase — were too big to go bankrupt and that the Federal Reserve would step in to do anything necessary to save all the major banks.

In the fall of 2012, on your recommendation, Dad bought 3,000 shares of MGIC Investment Corp. at 90 cents a share. His notes say you said that MGIC was on its way to a recovery and that the stock would sell at \$15 a share in the future. Well, MGIC did recover, and it's now trading at \$12.20. I've never seen this rate of profit before, so please tell me what to do. I know nothing about stocks. — AD, Detroit

Dear AD: Unfortunately, you have me confused with

MGIC Investment Corp. (MTG-\$12.20) is among the largest providers of private mortgage insurance (primarily for residential first mortgages), which protects lenders against default on loans with low or no down payments. MGIC also provides various related services, including claims administration and contract underwriting. After losing over \$8 billion between 2007 and 2014 — and as the housing market improved — MGIC began putting its house in order, and profits started rolling in. This year, management expects to earn \$1.75 a share on \$1.1 billion in revenues, and Wall Street is looking for sustainable forward growth, as buyer incomes, home sales and values still appear strong. MGIC's business seems to be on an upward trajectory, supported by a favorable economic background and low interest rates. Though MTG doesn't pay a dividend and won't for a while, the Street expects the stock price to double in three to four years. But I completely disagree with the Street! Your dad has a gain of \$11.30 per share on 3,000 shares, or \$33,900, and that's a dandy profit. Sell the stock.

Those are two excellent trades that I would never have recommended. Kudos to the old broker for his excellent perspicacity and swell advice.

Lawsuit blames pork giant for noxious farm smells

RALEIGH, N.C. — A low-cost, high-volume livestock method pioneered in North Carolina by the world's largest pork corporation came under fire Tuesday as jurors began hearing a lawsuit from neighbors who say it is endangering their health and making their lives miserable.

The legal action is the first in a string of federal lawsuits against the hog-production division of Virginia-based Smithfield Foods. Its outcome could alter production methods and profits for the company, which controls everything from the feed the animals eat to when they are trucked to slaughter and how the meat lands on consumers' plates. Smithfield was bought in 2013 by a division of China-based WH Group, the world's largest pork producer.

In dozens of lawsuits, more than 500 neighbors say that for decades they have suffered headaches, sinus problems and intense, putrid smells that can't be removed from clothing or household fabrics.

"Smithfield has never done anything to change," Michael Kaeske, a Dallas, Texas-based lawyer, told jurors. "They're not going to do anything to change unless you make them."

The suit heard Tuesday is the first of several test cases against the company. It pits Smithfield against 10 neighbors of a farm raising 15,000 livestock hogs under contract with the pork giant. Kinlaw Farm and its owners are not defendants.

Instead, the suit targets Smithfield, which determines the farm's operating standards.

"Smithfield controls what the growers do and they don't have the money to do anything different," Kaeske said.

Since pork producers began dramatically consolidating in the 1980s, sprawling operations holding thousands of hogs generating a small city's worth of urine and feces each day have become standard in North Carolina. The excrement is flushed into pits where it is broken down and then sprayed through a type of agricultural water cannon as fertilizer onto nearby fields.

DNA tests found a type of bacteria originating in swine digestive systems coating exterior surfaces at the homes of all 10 Bladen County plaintiffs, Kaeske told jurors.

Though less-malodorous technologies have been developed and applied at Smithfield operations elsewhere, North Carolina operations haven't changed, Kaeske said. For example, a lawsuit by Missouri's attorney general resulted in

a 1999 settlement forcing a company that Smithfield later took over to cut in half the nitrogen applied to fields, at a cost of tens of millions of dollars.

The Missouri solution included covering open-air waste pits, Kaeske said, yet Smithfield's "lagoons in North Carolina remain uncovered."

"They continue to spray feces and urine near their neighbors," Smithfield attorney Mark Anderson said. Anderson said agreements elsewhere, where temperatures and lagoon construction are different, shouldn't enter into this lawsuit. Jurors should consider only whether the 10 named plaintiffs have suffered so great a nuisance that they can't enjoy the use of their own property, he said. The farm never faced complaints from neighbors or state regulators until out-of-state lawyers showed up to press their agenda, Anderson said.

"This case is about this land, these neighbors, this farm," said Anderson, who practices in Raleigh and New York City. "Jurors know how to separate an agenda and an attack from the law."

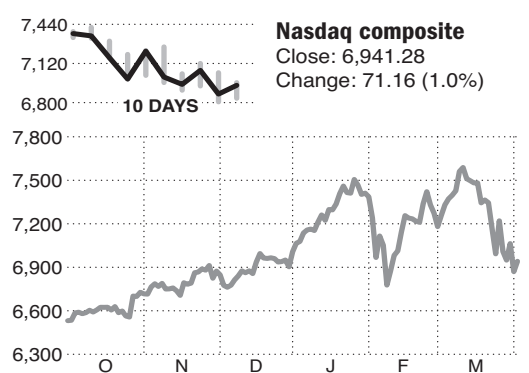
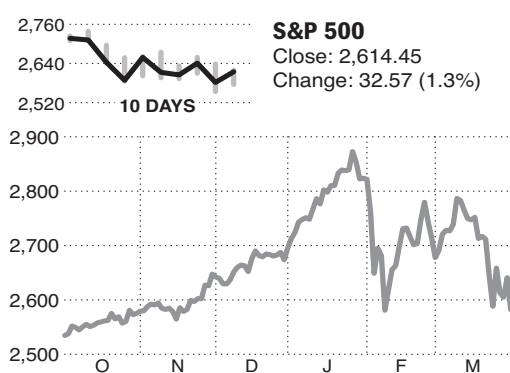

Drugs like pygeum and saw palmetto nix blood donation

DEAR DR. ROACH: Is there anything that I could take for an enlarged prostate that would allow me to donate blood? I have been trying saw palmetto and pygeum. Thank you. — M.J.C.

ANSWER: One class of medicines used to treat an enlarged prostate is called the 5-alpha reductase inhibitors. These work by blocking a type of testosterone called dihydrotestosterone, a substance that promotes both enlargement of the prostate and hair loss. These medicines, finasteride (Proscar) and dutasteride (Avodart), are used to treat male pattern baldness and benign (not cancerous) enlargement of the prostate. Saw palmetto works the same way, although it is not nearly as potent as the prescription medications. Pygeum is thought to work primarily as an anti-inflammatory, but it also may block dihydrotestosterone.

Because dihydrotestosterone is necessary for normal development of boys while in the uterus, these medications are likely to cause

birth defects in boys, even at very low doses, so blood banks don't want to take the chance that your blood might be given to a pregnant woman. I'm specifically referring to the prescription medications.

Men treating their prostate problems with alpha blockers, such as tamsulosin (Flomax), can safely donate blood.

There are several other drugs that cannot be taken by people giving blood. A list, courtesy of the Mayo Clinic, with the reasons for why they cannot be used by blood donors and the length of time

they need to be stopped prior to donation, can be found at <https://tinyurl.com/blood-drug>.

DEAR DR. ROACH: Let's say I get 10 blood samples taken at the same time for cholesterol, or one sample split into 10. I am curious how much variability in results would come from the test procedure itself, since the cholesterol level in my blood samples is (theoretically) identical. — P.P.

ANSWER: "Reliability" is the engineering term for the ability of a test to give the same result for the same sample. The reliability of a modern commercial laboratory

analyzer is very, very good, on the order of 1 percent. So, the 10 blood samples all should be close.

However, in a given person, the results can vary much more than 1 percent, even over a short period of time. I found studies showing that the (fasting) blood cholesterol results could change by 8 percent over one week, and 20 percent over four weeks. When laboratory results vary from one test to another, the vast majority of the difference is likely to be due to changes in the person, not the laboratory, at least for common blood tests.

A 1 percent error from test to test is good for cholesterol, but there are tests where a 1 percent error can mean a big difference in a person's treatment. In the case of bone density scanning, the test reliability error is high enough that sometimes, we have to evaluate a trend using several points of measurement, since 1 percent is an enormous difference in bones.

Because of variation of laboratory results, it is wise to recheck results before acting upon them.

DEAR COVERT: I hope you two will work out your disconnect with licensed professional help, because it will make the process faster. As to whether she should unfriend her old boyfriend on Facebook, the answer is "yes."

DEAR ABBY: I tutor a 16-year-old boy. His family moved to our city five months ago. They live in a crowded apartment with

other relatives. One day, he told me a 20-year-old girl was obsessed with him, and he didn't like her that much. I told him it was unusual and said it was a good thing he had moved.

A month later she showed up, uninvited, to visit him. I think she came here to get pregnant, which she did. Her family now expects him to move back to Oklahoma, quit school and work to support the family. His father is dead, the mother is clueless. How can I advise him?

DEAR TUTOR: The young man should not move ANYwhere without first insisting that a paternity test be taken to be certain he is the father of the child she's expecting — if she is, indeed, pregnant. Because of the difference in their ages, she may be guilty of statutory rape, and he may be a victim.

Keys to the ideal pie crust

Dear Heloise: There are only three ingredients in a GOOD PIE CRUST: flour, fat and water. Sometimes salt or sugar is added, but neither one is essential to a good crust. First, cut in butter or lard and mix with the flour until it resembles coarse meal. Next, add just enough ice water so that you can form a ball when you squeeze it. Allow it to rest for about 45 minutes in the refrigerator. After resting, it's ready to be rolled out. Handle the dough as little as possible, and be sure to stick your rolling pin in the refrigerator while the dough is resting. — Jane B., Missoula, Mont.

Oklahoma teachers demand more money in 2nd day of strike

OKLAHOMA CITY — Hundreds of teachers walked out of classrooms and crammed into the Oklahoma Capitol for a second day on Tuesday, shouting “Where’s our money?” to demand more aid for public schools, amid a rebellion of educators in Republican-led states across the country.

Rowdy teachers booted lawmakers when the Oklahoma House adjourned. House officials initially called on state troopers to clear the gallery of protesting teachers but later backed off. Education advocates filled the Capitol to capacity, and troopers limited access to the building.

Leaders of the state largest teachers’ union, the Oklahoma Education Association, said the strike would continue a third day on Wednesday. School districts in Oklahoma City, Tulsa, Edmond, Norman and other communities across the state announced they would

remain closed to honor the walkout.

“We’re going to pack the Capitol,” union President Alicia Priest said.

Oklahoma Gov. Mary Fallin signed legislation last week granting 15 to 18 percent higher salaries to teachers. But some educators — who haven’t seen a pay increase in 10 years — say that isn’t good enough and walked out.

Fallin warned Monday that the state budget is tight and there are other critical needs besides education.

“We must be responsible not to neglect other areas of need in the state, such as corrections and health and human services, as we continue to consider additional education funding measures,” the Republican said.

But Priest said teachers reject the argument that there isn’t enough money to provide additional funds for classrooms. They urged lawmakers to pass legislation that would repeal the capital gains tax exemption, a measure that would yield up to \$100 million.

“There’s revenue out there,” Priest said.

Democratic lawmaker Collin Walke said teachers should keep up the pressure.

“I think the Republican strategy is to wait the teachers out,” Walke said.

Oklahoma ranks 47th among states and the District of Columbia in public school revenue per student while its average teacher salary of \$45,276 ranked 49th before the latest raises, according to the most recent statistics from the National Education Association.

The demonstrations were inspired by West Virginia, where teachers walked out for nine days earlier this year and won a 5 percent increase in pay. Teachers in Arizona are now considering a strike over their demands for a 20 percent salary increase.

In Frankfort, Kentucky, the Legislature was not in session after teachers and other school employees held a massive rally at the Capitol Monday, chanting “Stop the war on public education.”

The Kentucky

teachers are mad because Republican lawmakers passed a pension overhaul last week that cuts benefits for new teachers. Opponents objected that the pension changes were inserted into an unrelated bill without a chance for public input, and worry that the changes

will discourage young people from joining the profession.

Republican Gov. Matt Bevin has not yet signed the bill, but last week tweeted his support, saying public workers owe “a deep debt of gratitude” to lawmakers who voted to pass it.

Trump’s campaign said it was better at Facebook; Facebook agrees

SAN FRANCISCO — Donald Trump’s presidential campaign has boasted often that it made better use of Facebook Inc.’s advertising tools than Hillary Clinton’s campaign did. An internal Facebook white paper, published days after the election, shows the company’s data scientists agree.

“Both campaigns spent heavily on Facebook between June and November of 2016,” the author of the internal paper writes, citing revenue of \$44 million for Trump and \$28 million for Clinton in that period. “But Trump’s FB campaigns were more complex than Clinton’s and better leveraged Facebook’s ability to

optimize for outcomes.”

The paper, obtained by Bloomberg and discussed here for the first time, describes in granular detail the difference between Trump’s campaign, which was focused on finding new donors, and Clinton’s campaign, which concentrated on ensuring Clinton had broad appeal. The data scientist says 84 percent of Trump’s budget asked people on Facebook to take an action, like donating, compared with 56 percent of Clinton’s.

Facebook didn’t immediately respond to a request for comment.

Trump ran 5.9 million different versions of ads during the presidential campaign and rapidly tested them to spread those that generated the most Facebook

engagement, according to the paper. Clinton ran 66,000 different kinds of ads in the same period.

As is typical at Facebook, employees had access to the white paper, according to a person familiar with the matter. Employees routinely publish papers so colleagues can dig into issues facing the company and learn how certain products work.

A former Facebook employee cited the information from the white paper in a memo to Rep. Adam Schiff’s office in early March, saying it could help Congress ask the right questions about whether the campaign coordinated with Russia. For example, according to the paper, more than a quarter of Trump’s ad spending

was tied to third-party data files on voters, and leveraged a Facebook tool that helped the campaign show ads to people who looked similar to the names on file. Clinton’s ads aimed for broader audiences, with only 4 percent of her Facebook spend on the lookalike tool.

“Did Russian operatives give the Trump campaign a list of names to include or exclude from advertising that was running on Facebook?” the former employee asked in the memo.

Republicans shut down the House of Representatives’ investigation into Russia and Trump days later, “leaving questions unanswered, leads unexplored, countless witnesses uncalled, subpoenas unissued,” Schiff,

a California Democrat, wrote on Twitter. A Schiff spokesman declined to comment for this story.

But Congress is still focusing on the use of third-party information on Facebook for another reason: the company’s ensuing crisis over data on 50 million users obtained by Cambridge Analytica, a political advertising company that helped Trump’s campaign. Facebook Chief Executive Officer Mark Zuckerberg is set to make his first congressional testimony on the issue in a matter of days.

One key question Zuckerberg is likely to face, raised in the former employee’s memo to Schiff: What lists of Facebook users did Trump’s campaign upload for advertising purposes?

Hawaii considers bill to help Hawaiians keep ancestral land

HONOLULU — A Hawaii Senate committee was scheduled Tuesday to hear a bill that would force landowners into mediation before they are allowed to file lawsuits to acquire small parcels awarded to Hawaiian commoners during mid-19th century land reforms.

The bill was introduced after Facebook CEO Mark Zuckerberg in late 2016 filed lawsuits to identify owners of 14 parcels interspersed within a 700-acre oceanfront estate he owns on Kauai Island. His lawsuits aimed to help him find the parcel owners so he could buy them out.

Critics say these so-called quiet title lawsuits are dispossessing individual Native Hawaiians of

the little land still in their control.

The bill would require mediation as a first step, as a way to reduce legal costs for small landowners and to level the playing field for those facing legal fights with wealthy property owners.

Zuckerberg withdrew his lawsuits last year after a public uproar.

The state House passed the legislation last year but senators haven’t considered it until now.

The 14 parcels within Zuckerberg’s estate fall in a category called kuleana lands.

These lands emerged during land reforms that the Kingdom of Hawaii pursued in the 1800s called “the Great Mahele.” Until then, no individuals owned land because it was collectively cared for and used.

The reforms allowed commoners to claim title to land they lived on and farmed, usually about a half-acre.

But commoners wound up receiving only a small share of the land that was distributed, about 28,000 acres. Millions of acres went to Hawaii’s royal family and the government. In subsequent decades, sugar and pineapple plantations acquired large expanses of property.

King Kamehameha IV sold the 3,000-acre ahupuaa, or traditional Hawaiian land division, where Zuckerberg’s property lies to an American businessman, Charles Titcomb, for \$2,600 in 1863, according to the Kilauea Neighborhood Association website.

In 1877, Titcomb sold some of it to English Capt.

John Ross and Edward Adams, who established Kilauea Sugar Co., The Garden Island newspaper reported. The sugar plantation, which previously owned Zuckerberg’s land, operated until 1971.

The social media billionaire bought his estate

in 2014 for \$100 million, Forbes reported.

Many original owners of kuleana lands died without wills. In many cases, ownership today is split among hundreds of descendants, many of whom are unaware of their shares.

Three former US Army soldiers go on trial in contract killing

NEW YORK (AP) — A former U.S. Army sniper and two other ex-soldiers have gone on trial in New York on charges they became contract killers for an international crime boss.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Patrick Egan said in opening statements Tuesday that Joseph

Hunter recruited the others for a cold-blooded hit on a real estate agent in the Philippines in 2012.

Defense attorneys said in their openings that evidence against them was too weak to convict them. All three have pleaded not guilty to murder conspiracy.

The case is expected to offer a window into the clandestine world of private mercenaries willing to kill for money. The

trafficker has pleaded guilty and agreed to testify for the government.

Hunter already is serving 20 years over a plot to kill a federal agent.

Zoo offering visitors buckets of ‘Detroit Zoo Poo’

ROYAL OAK, Mich. (AP) — Some visitors to the Detroit Zoo will soon be able to add animal droppings to their

souvenir list.

Five buckets of 5 pounds of animal manure, dubbed Detroit Zoo Poo, will be handed out on April 14 as part of the zoo’s GreenFest celebration. The event precedes Earth Day and will showcase how the zoo recycles waste.

Buckets will be available to the first 1,000 visitors to the zoo’s anaerobic digester educational display.

The digester converts

500 tons of animal manure and other organic waste each year into methane-rich gas to help power the zoo’s animal hospital. Nutrient-rich fertilizer is a byproduct. The zoo notes the compost “is great for putting in your garden.”

GreenFest is part of the Detroit Zoological Society’s effort to improve green practices and facilities at the zoo in Royal Oak, north of Detroit.

Gregorius powers Yankees past Rays

NEW YORK — A big bopper powered the New York Yankees to victory in their most anticipated home opener in years — Didi Gregorius, not Giancarlo Stanton or Aaron Judge.

When the Yankees agreed to acquire Stanton from Miami on Dec. 9, Gregorius playfully tweeted: "Hey Skip am i still batting 4th???"

He sure is. Gregorius hit a pair of

three-run homers and had a career-high eight RBIs, helping New York overcome five strikeouts by Stanton in his first game in pinstripes. In Aaron Boone's chilly first home opener as manager, the Yankees broke a seventh-inning tie and romped over the Tampa Bay Rays 11-4 on Tuesday.

"That's what a cleanup hitter does: You clean up the garbage in front of you," Stanton said.

Starting his fourth season as Derek Jeter's

successor, Gregorius had four hits and walked. He set a major league record for RBIs by a player in a home opener and a Yankees record for RBIs by a shortstop.

Gregorius established career bests last year with .287 average, 25 homers and 87 RBIs.

"I think everyone around the game understands what a good player he is and what a big-time money player he's become," Boone said.

Stanton starred in

last Thursday's opening win at Toronto, homering twice. But he struck out three times against Chris Archer and once each when facing Austin Pruitt (1-1) and Sergio Romo. Stanton was booed in the eighth inning after the first five-strikeout game of his 11-season professional career.

"I was awful today," he said. "You put up a performance like that, you should get some boos."

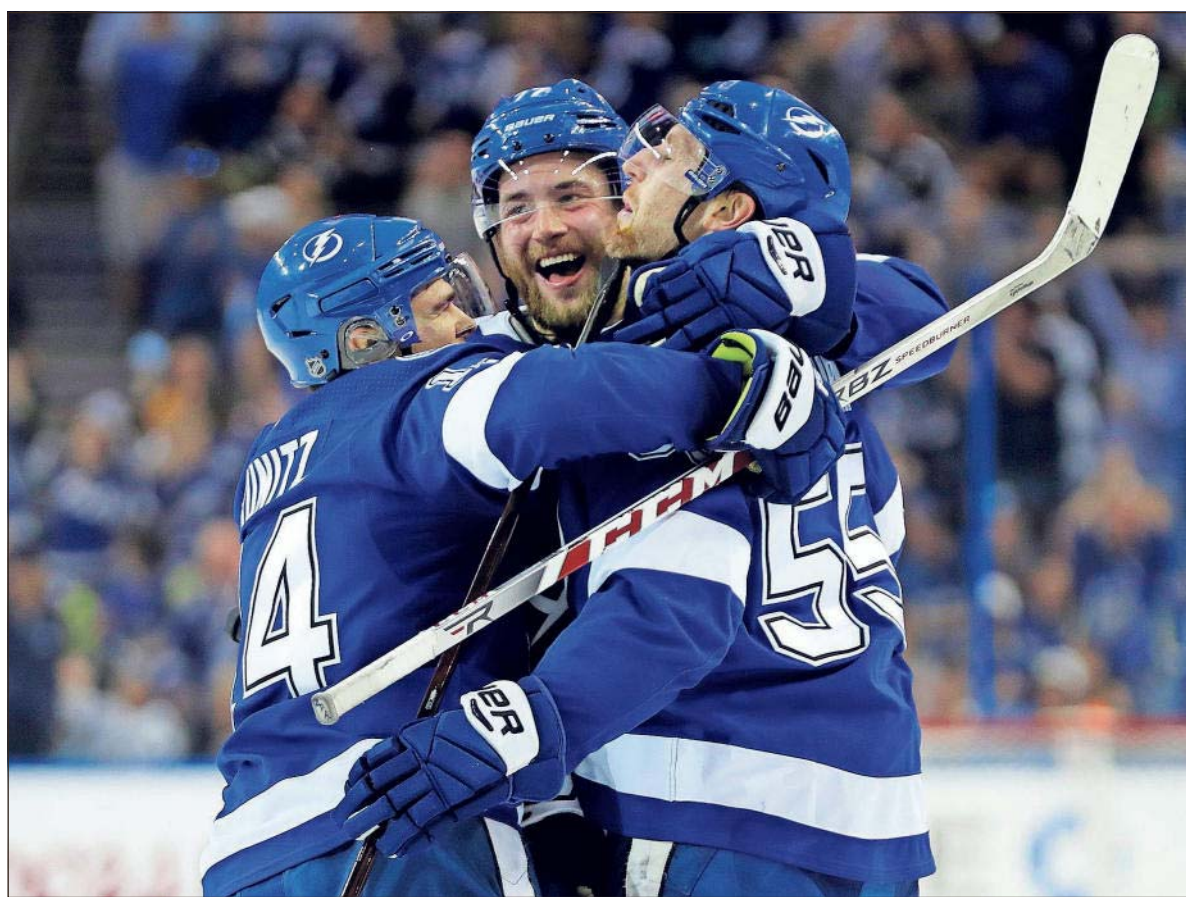

Heat clinch playoff spot, top Hawks

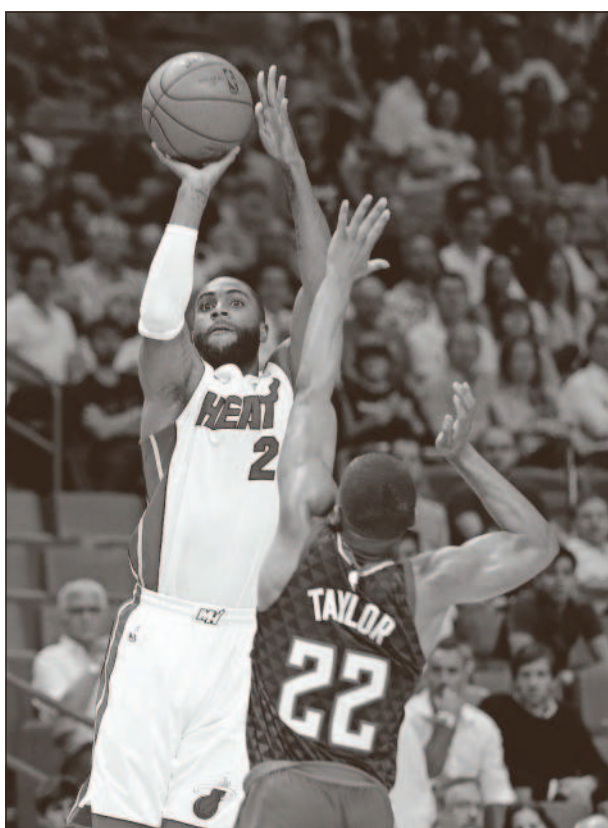

The Heat trailed 98-90 with less than 3 minutes left, then finished the game on an 11-0 run.

Tyler Johnson's 3-pointer got Miami within one, and Whiteside tipped in Josh Richardson's miss on the next possession. Atlanta had a chance to take the lead when Damion Lee got into the lane and tried a 10-footer with about 5 seconds left, but Richardson blocked it and the Heat controlled the rebound.

Richardson made a pair of free throws with 0.6 seconds left. The Hawks' last-ditch 3-point try by John Collins was well short, wrapping up the post-season spot for the Heat. Miami will open the

"The reason why they boo you, because they want you to do good. It's not because they hate you," Gregorius said. "It's a bad day today, but tomorrow if he gets five home runs, everybody's going to forget about it."

Gregorius doubled and scored in the second, and his first homer put the Yankees ahead 4-1 in the third.

"We prepare for him just as much as we prepare for the other boppers in their lineup," Archer said.

After New York's bullpen wasted a three-run lead for the second straight game, Gregorius drove an 0-2 pitch from Pritt into the second deck in right in a four-run seventh. He blooped

A day after New York's home opener was postponed because of 5½ inches of snow, the game started slightly late at 4:19 p.m. in a light, steady rain and

with a 40-degree temperature. The stands were half-full despite an announced crowd of 46,776, and the Yankees called off the pregame introductions that Boone had been looking forward to.

Tommy Kahnle (1-0) won despite allowing a tying, two-run double to pinch-hitter Denard Span on an 0-2 pitch with two outs in a three-run sixth. The Yankees regained the lead just before Gregorius' homer when Tyler Austin scored from second as Brett Gardner sacrificed and third baseman Matt Duffy threw wildly past first, where second baseman Brad Miller tried to make a backhand pickup.

Wolverines showed Beilein can win in different ways

ANN ARBOR, Mich. — It was a team unlike any John Beilein had coached at Michigan.

The Wolverines spent most of the NCAA Tournament out of sync offensively, misfiring from 3-point range and relying on a tenacious defense to keep their season going. That formula — so much different from the way Beilein's teams had won in the past — took Michigan all the way to the national title game before Monday night's loss to Villanova.

"They kept growing and growing, and that's all that coaches can ask for," Beilein said.

Michigan's Final Four run this season capped a two-year transformation in Beilein's program. The veteran coach made a conscious effort to improve his team's defensive deficiencies, and the result was the Wolverines' second appearance in the title game in six years — and a sense that Michigan will remain a threat in the Big Ten as long as Beilein is there.

That wasn't a sure thing, even after the Wolverines reached the Final Four in 2013 and won a conference title the following year. Michigan missed the NCAA Tournament in 2015 and barely made it in 2016. Then Beilein hired Billy Donlon as an assistant, turning over defensive responsibilities to him. The Wolverines made the Sweet 16 last season, then Donlon left to take a job at Northwestern, and Luke Yaklich was brought in to replace him.

This season, Michigan lacked the stellar outside shooting that had been the foundation of so much of Beilein's success. The Wolverines

never totally clicked offensively, but their defense was solid for most of the season and kept getting better.

In the NCAA Tournament, Michigan shot 29 percent from 3-point range, with only a blow-out win over Texas A&M in the Sweet 16 standing out as an impressive offensive showing. The Wolverines scrapped their way through, however, until Villanova was simply too much at the end.

"We'll always remember this run, this team," guard Muhammad-Ali Abdur-Rahkman said. "We're 33-8 and nobody expected us to be here. And we're just always going to remember each other and being part of this team."

Before Michigan's NCAA Tournament run, the Wolverines won the Big Ten Tournament for the second year in a row. Big man Moe Wagner was a focal point, and seniors Abdur-Rahkman and Duncan Robinson made significant contributions. Michigan had lost star point guard Derrick Walton from the previous season. Xavier Simpson replaced him and led the team in a completely different way, setting the tone on defense.

"We were losing to North Florida in the second half of the first

game of the year," Beilein said. "I'm proud of the way they grew, and they allowed our coaches to coach"

Michigan loses Abdur-Rahkman and Robinson, but the Wolverines could return four of their starters from the title game. All eyes will be on Wagner and Charles Matthews, either of whom could leave early for the pros.

Isaiah Livers was in that starting lineup, and fellow freshman Jordan Poole made the winning shot in a memorable NCAA Tournament game against Houston that put Michigan in the Sweet 16. Their progress could be crucial in helping the Wolverines replace whoever they end up losing.

Michigan could easily be a top-10 team to start next season, but before the Wolverines deal with expectations like that, they can look back with pride on what they accomplished in 2017-18.

"I think they loved each other, they were connected, and they proved they're a team that is growing in talent could win a lot of games by teamwork, by playing together, having great unity, great appreciation for the game, and really playing with great passion, too," Beilein said. "They love the game, and they love each other."

There's plenty of time to talk about Villanova's place in history after the partying is done this week. The Wildcats were to return home to a raucous celebration at their suburban campus on Tuesday and

a parade was planned for Thursday in downtown Philadelphia just hours before the Phillies' home opener.

Parades have suddenly become a thing in Philly. See: the Eagles.

Jalen Brunson, Mikal Bridges and breakout star Donte DiVincenzo helped the Wildcats win all six tournament games by double digits, joining Michigan State in 2000, Duke in 2001 and North

Carolina in 2009. Villanova also joined the 1968 UCLA team as the only ones to win both their Final Four games by 16 or more points.

"I knew we were good, but you don't think we can win this," Wright said.

He should know they can: The Wildcats set a program best in wins (36-4) and won an NCAA-record 136 games over a four-year span.

REFORMS

This issue has the potential to overshadow everything: the federal investigation into corruption in college basketball. And because of it, the sport could look very different come fall.

The probe seized headlines in September with the arrests of 10 agents, coaches and businessmen with basketball ties in a case tied to hundreds of thousands of dollars in alleged bribes and kickbacks designed to influence recruits on choosing a school or an agent.

Speaking at the Final Four, NCAA President Mark Emmert said that the commission on college basketball — led by former Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice — examining reforms to the sport will present its report to the Division I Board of Directors and Board of Governors on April 25.

THE CHAMPS

The Wildcats were brilliant in winning their third championship, becoming the first team since North Carolina in 2009 to win all six games by double figures in the NCAA Tournament. Now the Wildcats will try to become only the third repeat champion since UCLA's run of seven straight ended in 1973, the other two being Duke in 1991-92 and Florida in 2006-07.

"We really feel humbled and blessed to be in this position," coach Jay Wright said after the Michigan win.

It's unclear how the Wildcats will look next year. Associated Press national player of the year Jalen Brunson and NBA prospect Mikal Bridges could decide to leave a year early to pursue a professional career after winning two national championships.

ANOTHER SHOT?

Michigan lost in the national championship

game for the second time under John Beilein. Can the Wolverines get back there?

Much will depend on whether juniors Moe Wagner (14.6 points, 7.1 rebounds) and Charles Matthews (13.0 points) decide to return for their final season.

The Wolverines can at least look to some recent history for inspiration; North Carolina lost to Villanova in the 2016 final then made it all the way back to win the title last year.

Loyola-Chicago was the story of the NCAA Tournament by reaching the Final Four for the first time since winning the 1963 title.

The Ramblers lose key seniors but return Missouri Valley Conference player of the year Clayton Custer. Loyola could also see a recruiting boost, especially if coach Porter Moser stays in place instead of moving on to another job.

Duke is No. 1 in way-too-early AP rankings for 2018-19 season

SAN ANTONIO — Villanova was clearly college basketball's best team in 2017-18, romping through the NCAA Tournament and capping it with a rout of Michigan in the title game.

Now depression sets in for fans. It's seven long months until the next game.

We've got something to tide you over: A way-too-early Top 25 rankings for next season:

1. Duke. Marvin Bagley III and Grayson Allen are gone, Wendell Carter Jr. and Trevon Duval could join them. Even so, there's enough coming back and Coach K has another stellar recruiting class coming in, headed by dunking dynamo Zion Williamson.
2. Kansas. The Jayhawks reached the Final Four in a season they weren't even supposed to win the Big 12 title. Even with Devonte' Graham gone, there's plenty coming back especially if Malik Newman remains in Lawrence and more five-star help on the way.
3. Villanova. A lot will depend on whether Jalen Brunson, Mikal Bridges and Omari Spellman leave for the NBA. Either way, the Wildcats will be reigning champions and have breakout star Donte DiVincenzo.
4. Kentucky. As is always the case, lots of decisions await at Lexington. If a few players return, coach John Calipari's Wildcats will no longer be the youngest team around.
5. North Carolina. The losses of Joel Berry II and Theo Pinson will be tough. The addition of five-star freshman Nassir Little as part of UNC's best recruiting class in years with Luke Maye, Cameron Johnson and

Kenny Williams will keep the Tar Heels among the elite. 6. Gonzaga. The Zags have a strong core coming back in Zach Norvell, Rui Hashimuru and Killian Tillie. The addition of San Jose State transfer Brandon Clarke gives them a defensive presence.

7. Auburn. The Tigers won the Southeastern Conference regular-season title and have nearly everyone coming back. A deep March run could be on the horizon.

8. Virginia. The loss to No. 16 seed UMBC stings, and the Cavaliers surely will use it as motivation. There's also a nice core of players returning, even with the departures of Devon Hall and Isaiah Wilkins.

9. Tennessee. The Vols were one of the nation's biggest surprises in 2017-18 and have nearly everyone back, including SEC player of the year Grant Williams.

10. Nevada. The Wolf Pack took a big step in coach Eric Musselman's third season. Another such step could follow, with twins Caleb and Cody Martin back and more transfers on the way.

11. Michigan State. The loss of Miles Bridges and potentially Jaren Jackson Jr. is tough, but Cassius Winston could emerge as a Big Ten player of year candidate.

12. Louisville. Former Xavier coach Chris Mack inherits a lot of talent and he's been hitting the recruiting trail hard. Expect a bounce back from the Cardinals.

13. Oregon. The Ducks could be looking at a return to the NCAA Tournament with a top-five recruiting class, headed by big man Bol Bol — son of ex-NBA star Manute Bol — joining Payton Pritchard and Troy Brown.

14. Michigan. The national runner-up may lose Moe Wagner and Charles Matthews to the NBA draft. If those two return, No. 14

could be a bit low. 15. Kansas State. The Wildcats are expected to retain everyone from a team that reached the Elite Eight.

16. Virginia Tech. Losing Justin Bibbs is not easy, but Buzz Williams has the kind of roster that could make some ACC noise.

17. West Virginia. Jevon Carter's graduation may be the biggest blow any team takes heading into next season. But the Mountaineers always play tough and Bob Huggins always wrings out the best in everyone.

18. LSU. Will Wade signed the sort of recruiting class that can be an immediate course changer.

19. Maryland. Some key losses, but also some key returnees to team with a strong recruiting class to potentially keep the Terps in the Big Ten race.

20. Mississippi State. The Bulldogs won 25 games last season and have talent across the board for 2018-19.

21. Florida. The Gators lose a lot, particularly point guard Chris Chiozza, but Mike White has a super recruiting class coming in and Jalen Hudson coming back.

22. UCLA. Another stellar recruiting class by Steve Alford may help offset the loss of do-everything guard Aaron Holiday.

23. Arizona State. The Sun Devils' guard trio of Tra Holder, Kodi Justice and Shannon Evans II are gone. Transfers Zylan Cheatham and Rob Edwards will be around, joined by a strong recruiting class.

24. Florida State. The Seminoles made a deep NCAA run ahead of schedule this season and can turn to high-scoring Terance Mann.

25. Loyola-Chicago. The Ramblers were counted out throughout the NCAA Tournament. That shouldn't happen again after a Final Four run.

Rory McIlroy ready to seize history with a Masters title

AUGUSTA, Ga. — Rory McIlroy paused under a towering Georgia pine just off the 14th green, mimicking a swing and going over some of the finer points of Augusta National with practice partner Ian Woosnam.

Good thinking.

Woosnam, after all, has one of those coveted green jackets.

McIlroy needs one to join a very exclusive club.

“You have to embrace and relish the opportunity that is put in front of you,” he said, “and go out and grab it.”

Funny thing, it looked like the Masters would be the first major championship of McIlroy’s career. In 2011, riding the hype as the game’s brightest new star, he led after each of the first three rounds and was still out front making the turn Sunday.

Then, in one of the greatest collapses in major championship history, he played the final nine holes at 7 over to shoot 80.

At the time, it felt like his world had collapsed.

Looking back, he considers it a turning point in his career.

“I feel like it made me a better player, I feel like it made me a better person,” said McIlroy, who is among many

favorites in the loaded Masters field after his victory a couple of weeks ago at Bay Hill. “It took me a while to get over it, but I knew if I looked at the big picture it would serve me well in the long run. And I don’t think I would have had the career I’ve had so far if it wasn’t for that day.”

A few months later, he won the U.S. Open in a runaway. The next year, he added a PGA Championship to his resume. In 2014, he captured two more majors at the British Open and the PGA.

Only the Masters is preventing him from joining Jack Nicklaus, Tiger Woods, Gary Player, Ben Hogan and

Gene Sarazen with a career Grand Slam.

“I know a win here and what that would mean and where that would put me in history alongside some of the greatest that have ever played this game,” McIlroy said. “But have I to try and clear my head of that come Thursday morning and go out and play good golf, hit good golf shots, have good course management, hole putts. If you do that enough times, hopefully that score on Sunday evening’s the lowest out of all 87 or 88 competitors that are here and you walk away with something that you’ll have for the rest of your life.”

McIlroy was clearly in a relaxed mood as played the back nine late Tuesday afternoon with Woosnam, the 1991 Masters champion, and Branden Grace — long after many patrons had already headed home for the day.

Before teeing off at the 14th, McIlroy posed for a picture with a boy clad in burnt orange from head to toe, whose father insisted “he’s your biggest fan.” Someone murmured from afar, “He said the same thing when Rickie Fowler came through,” and certainly the young man was dressed in attire more appropriate to Fowler’s fashion sense.

Firefighter in elite company at Augusta

AUGUSTA, Ga. — When Matt Parziale steps outside of this moment he’s living, a firefighter-turned-Masters golfer, he can understand why everyone finds it so compelling.

This is the sort of over-the-top script they usually come up with in Hollywood. “It’s incredible,” Parziale said with a chuckle Monday, having just finished a practice round at Augusta National. “But,” he quickly added, turning serious, “I don’t see it that way. Because I’ve obviously lived it.”

Yep, the 30-year-old from Station 1 in Brockton, Massachusetts is taking a break from his regular job, the one where he might put his life on the line most any day against some fearsome inferno, to tee off at the Masters.

Amen Corner can’t seem all that intimidating to someone whose real life involves wading through thick smoke, unable to see what’s right in front of their face, unsure if their next breath might be their last.

Not even Hollywood can do it justice.

“We’re pulling walls, ceilings, cutting holes in roofs,” Parziale said, talking about firefighting instead of his short game. “Because you’re trying to find the fire. It gets in the walls and the attic. You have stuff flying everywhere, people swinging tools everywhere. A lot of things can happen. You can’t see a thing, so might as well close your eyes. Yeah, it’s pitch black. It’s not like the movies.”

About five years ago, Parziale gave up on his dream of being a professional golfer, having failed to make his mark

on various mini-tours. He reclaimed his amateur status and became a firefighter in his hard-scrabble hometown, which has certainly produced its share of top sports figures, from Rocky Marciano to Marvin Hagler to Al Davis.

It was a logical step. Parziale’s dad, Vic, spent more than three decades as a Brockton firefighter. Matt had been around the station pretty much his entire life. He liked the life, knew what he was getting himself into.

“You don’t make a lot of money,” said Vic Parziale, who retired last November. “But it’s steady.”

During his down time, Matt continued to play golf, though those long, cold New England winters meant putting away his clubs for months at a time. For three years running, he entered the Mid-Amateur Championship, the top tournament for post-college golfers who aren’t professionals, but he failed to win even a single match.

Then, last fall at a club outside of Atlanta, Parziale’s fortunes suddenly turned.

After making it through two days of stroke play as one of the top 64 players, Parziale won a match for the first time. Then another. And another. And another. And another.

Finally, in a 36-hole final that didn’t go nearly that far, Parziale won going away, beating Josh Nichols 8 and 6.

The firefighter was headed to the Masters.

“I’ll bet no other firefighter had played the Masters, have they?” his proud father asked a small group of reporters.

He didn’t even wait for the answer.

“Yeah, I’ll take that bet,” Vic Parziale said.

NEW YORK — Dallas Mavericks center Nerlens Noel and Utah Jazz forward Thabo Sefolosha have been suspended five games for violating the NBA’s anti-drug program.

The league announced the suspensions Tuesday.

Noel’s ban will cover the final five games of the season for the lottery-bound Mavericks, starting Tuesday night against Portland.

Sefolosha had surgery on the MCL in his right knee in January and hasn’t returned. His suspension will begin in the next

regular-season or playoff game when he is eligible and physically able to play.

Noel’s suspension ends a lost season for a player trying to earn a long-term contract after failed negotiations last offseason resulted in him signing the team’s qualifying offer of just \$4.1 million for one

year.

Noel played just 30 games, with most of the missed time coming after surgery for a torn ligament in his left thumb in December. He averaged 4.4 points and 5.6 rebounds in 16 minutes a game in his fourth season in the league.

BOXING: Heavyweight Unification Bout

Wilder says he’s ready to fight Joshua next

MONTGOMERY, Ala. — Deontay Wilder says he’s ready to fight Anthony Joshua in a heavyweight unification bout, and is willing to travel overseas to make it happen.

Wilder called off a scheduled media conference call Tuesday, instead issuing a statement saying he’s open to fighting Joshua next in the United Kingdom.

“Anthony, I am so glad we finally heard from you on Saturday and that you want to fight me as your

next opponent and you want the fight to happen in the UK,” Wilder said. “I accept that challenge and I am ready to come to the UK for my next fight. There is nothing on Team Wilder’s side to prevent me from fighting you next.”

The Alabama native said co-managers Shelly Finkel and Al Haymon are available to begin talks to set up the fight immediately, and “the sooner the better.”

Joshua (21-0, 20 knockouts) is a huge draw in the UK. He won a unanimous decision over Joseph Parker on Saturday before 78,000 fans in Cardiff,

Wales. He now holds four title belts, while Wilder (40-0, 39 KOs) is the WBC champion.

Wilder has defended his WBC belt six times, all with stoppages. He’s coming off a 10th-round knockout of previously unbeaten Luis Ortiz on March 3.

The Joshua-Wilder winner would be the first undisputed heavyweight champion since Lennox Lewis in 2000.

“I will get all five of the belts,” Joshua said after the Parker fight. “It’s not an issue.”

Joshua promoter Eddie Hearn said afterward the

fight needs to happen this year, but called Wilder’s representatives “erratic and unpredictable.”

One potential bone of contention: Joshua doesn’t think the purse should be a 50-50 split because he holds four belts.

But Wilder’s statement struck a polite tone a few days after shouting into his phone on a video posted on Twitter: “Joshua? Joshua? Stop playing, and pick up the phone!”

His message Tuesday: “Thanks Anthony, I can’t wait to meet you in the ring.”

This was only a snapshot, and it received far more attention because of the stage at Augusta National and the two leading characters. Woods and Mickelson have been longtime rivals, rarely friends and hardly ever partners.

But it’s not just with Mickelson.

Woods has become a mentor to Justin Thomas, Jason Day and

Rickie Fowler among other youngsters. Long respected by his peers as the greatest player of his generation, he now has formed relationships with them. Padraig Harrington hardly recognized Woods at Torrey Pines earlier this year when he saw him walk onto the range, exchange a few high-fives and stop to chat.

Woods turned 42 at the end of last year. He has been away from golf for much of the last few years because of his four back surgeries. The Masters

will be the first major he plays since the PGA Championship in August 2015.

Perhaps, as Harrington suggested, he simply has mellowed.

“I think they just missed my sharp needle,” Woods said. “This is just like a fraternity. When somebody gets hurt and someone gets sick, we bond. We come and try to support them as best we possibly can. Because we all know what it takes to be at this elite level.”

Regardless, he has

come a long way in a short amount of time.

Only last year, Woods said he had trouble just sitting through the dinner at the Masters Club of past champions because of pain from his lower back shooting down his legs. That hurt about as much as being at Augusta National without his clubs for the second straight year, not knowing when or even if he would return.

The low point came last summer when he was arrested on a DUI charge

in Florida after police found him asleep behind the wheel, his car parked awkwardly on the side of the road with the engine still running. Woods was found to have a mix of prescription pills to help with pain and sleep. He sought treatment, and then perhaps the best therapy was being among players as an assistant captain at the Presidents Cup.

“I don’t know the reasoning, but I think your assertion that he has a lot of great relationship

with a lot of players, I think that’s accurate,” Mickelson said. “His relationships with the guys on the team are extremely close.”

That includes Mickelson, of course.

The last practice round they played together, as best as Mickelson can recall, was 20 years ago at the Nissin Open when it was played at the TPC Valencia. Mickelson tricked him into hitting the wrong club late in their match and took \$500 off him.

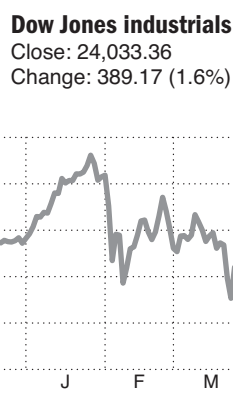
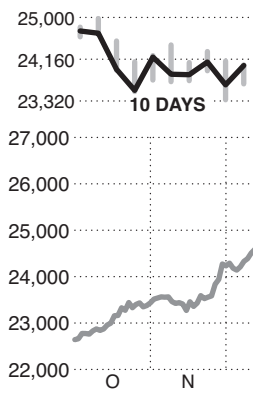
