Suspect arrested, two sought in AP shooting

AVON PARK — One suspect allegedly involved in the Avon Park shooting on Sunday has been arrested, but deputies are still searching for two other suspects.

Torin Lamell Swain-Daniels, 18, was arrested by Highlands County Sheriff's Office deputies Monday. Swain-Daniels was charged with two counts of attempted murder and robbery with a firearm.



GALARZA

Two other suspects, who are both from Avon Park, have arrest warrants for attempted murder.

Daniel Luis Galarza, 18, is the person who detectives believed pulled the trigger. He has a warrant for two counts of attempted homicide and one count of robbery.



MARTINEZ

Sebastian Martinez, 16, also has a warrant for two counts of attempted homicide and one count of robbery. In addition, Martinez is also being charged with violation of probation.

Neither of the victims had life-threatening injuries. According to Scott Dressel, public information officer for the Sheriff's Office, the 21-year-old

Roundabout OKed for 90-degree turn

County approves proposal to design, permit roundabout

SEBRING — County Engineer Clinton Howerton got the go-ahead Tuesday to design and permit a roundabout for Sebring Parkway at the 90-degree turn.

County commissioners voted unanimously in favor of the new design with the consensus that they want him to come back later with final designs and an estimate of how much it would cost to do it in concrete, not asphalt.

Right now, he has an estimate of \$606,000, which includes ripping out the intersection as it exists and putting in roundabout pavement, curbing and signs.

It also includes cost sharing with the City of Sebring and the Florida Department of Transportation.

Howerton said, as he was getting ready to order mast arms and traffic signals for the standard intersection, City of Sebring officials asked why a roundabout was not considered. Howerton assumed it was because it might not fit.

When he researched the matter, he found roundabouts were not being considered as intersections when

Phase 1 was constructed in 2000, but it would fit, without having to buy any more land for right of way.

Adding the roundabout would save almost \$200,000 Howerton would spend now to order mast arms and signals, in order for them to arrive by this spring. Instead, that money can go to the roundabout with the city and county splitting the rest.

County Administrator Randy Vosburg said FDOT officials like the

city/county partnership and has given verbal commitment to \$200,000 in additional funds, which would lower the split cost even further.

Commissioner Arlene Tuck had concerns about the cost, and wanted to set a limit at a cost increase.

"I think we've spent enough on that Parkway," Tuck said.

Commissioner Ron Handley had concerns about the amount of space needed for a roundabout, given that the county already needs a retaining wall on the northwest corner of the

NATIONAL DAY OF MOURNING

What's open and what's closed

SEBRING — The country will observe a National Day of Mourning today, honoring the 41st president, George H.W. Bush. He died Friday night, Nov. 30 at age 94.

Days of mourning usually recognize former commanders-in-chief and involve memorial and remembrance events. So how can it affect you?

The U.S. Postal Service will not deliver regular mail. All post office locations will be closed, too. Limited package delivery will continue to avoid setbacks during the busy holiday season, however.

The New York Stock Exchange and Nasdaq will be closed.

All federal offices will be closed. Federal employees will be excused from work, except for reasons of national security or essential public businesses.

Some banks and courts will be closed. Federal Reserve Bank payment systems will work as normal. Closures will vary by area.

Highlands News-Sun reached out to local banks in Highlands County and confirmed that branches of CenterState Bank,

Heartland National Bank, Seacoast Bank, SunTrust Bank, TD Bank, Wauchula State Bank and Wells Fargo will be open. Confirmation could not be obtained from Bank of America or MidFlorida Credit Union as of press time.

The municipal governments of Avon Park, Lake Placid and Sebring will be open and all city/town services will be available. The district offices of Sun 'n Lake of Sebring and Spring Lake will also be open.

Highlands County government offices will be open.

Flowers applies for AP city manager position

AVON PARK — David Flowers, a familiar face in the community, has applied for the Avon Park city manager position bringing the total number of applicants thus far to five.

Flowers, a lifelong resident of Avon Park, informed Highlands News-Sun that Monday evening he applied for the position online. Currently he is the facilities manager for Central Florida Healthcare.

"We have some work to do to try and get the city back on track and I have a lifelong interest and commitment to this area," he said. "I want to

be part of the leadership that plans and develops for the future here."

What are the most pressing needs for the city at this time?

"Obviously there are going to be some positions that need to be filled; I am going to have to be looking at that," Flowers said if hired. "I am going to be looking at some enhanced code enforcement ideas and try to clean up some areas."

"I am sure the City Council is going to have a wish list of a lot of things for me to try to accomplish if they choose me for this position."

Flowers served on the Avon Park City Council from 1994 to 1996 and on the Highlands County Commission from 1996 to 2004.

The other applicants for the city manager are:

- Samantha Mootosammy, of Avon Park, U.S. Postal Service mail carrier.

- Ryan Danzey, of Sebring, volunteer manager for Highlands County Habitat for Humanity.

- Timothy Day, of Cape Coral, until September 2018, was the association manager of Seven Lakes Golf and Tennis, an adult condominium community, in Fort Myers.

- Bill Lawrence, town manager of Warren, Maine.

The advertised annual salary for the position is "\$90,000 plus excellent benefit package."

The deadline for a completed application and resume is 5 p.m. Wednesday, Dec. 12.

A candidate will be selected at a special City Council meeting at 6 p.m. Thursday, Dec. 20.

School bus breakdown prompts emergency call

Bus 103 was transporting 23 students from Lake Placid Middle and High schools on Huntley Drive when the problem developed.

School Board of Highlands County Transportation Director David Solomon said there wasn't anything defective with the alternator, it was just that the belt broke and its fast rotations caused the smoke.

The fire department responded and the students were transferred to another bus without incident, he said.

intersection to accommodate a sidewalk.

Howerton said he feels confident the roundabout can fit in that space.

Handley brought up the idea of concrete. It would be more difficult to repair when it starts to fail, Howerton warned, but would take nearly 30 years to do so and would be more expensive up front, but he said he would look at it.

Sebring City Administrator Scott Noethlich said the Sebring City Council voted "5-zip" in favor of the roundabout.

"I think they'd be favorable to the concrete option," Noethlich said.

Tuck also asked about how close the sidewalk would be to the pavement, and Howerton said he would work with the design to give enough room.

Handley also asked if a roundabout could handle heavy trucks. Howerton said the Parkway is not a truck route, and heavy traffic would be minimal. He also said roundabouts have to be designed right, but when they are, they can handle trucks.

Commissioner Don Elwell said there would be trucks using the roundabout, especially

if the county ever builds "Phase 4," a connection to Arbuckle Creek Road.

"Blue and white trucks would go out there," Elwell said, referring to fully-loaded garbage trucks heading to the landfill. "The blue and white trucks are bad for our roads."

Elwell also worried about orientation for drivers, especially elderly visitors from out of state who have not experienced roundabouts.

"We will educate with signage on how to drive this, so when you get there, it's clear," Howerton said.

Beth Degnan of Highlands Park Estates, warned that Charlotte

County had problems with roundabouts being too small for long ladder-truck fire engines.

Commission Chair Jim Brooks said roundabouts are not new to the county: Sebring has had one downtown since 1912 and Sun 'n Lake for 30 years. Brooks said he recently drove one on State Road 33 at Deen Still Road, near Lakeland, and it worked well.

"You don't have the damage to asphalt you have where trucks put on their brakes and slide," Brooks said, referring to traditional traffic-signal intersections.

Other advantages to a roundabout, Howerton

said, include:

- 90 percent fewer fatalities
 - 75 percent fewer injuries
 - 10-40 percent fewer bicycle crashes
 - Ease of use for elderly and beginning drivers
 - Safely tying together multiple roads
 - A 30-50 percent increase in traffic capacity
 - Fewer delays waiting for signals
 - No need for turning lanes
 - Less noise and pollution from traffic, not standing
 - Less cost to operate
 - Continues to operate in power outages
- When Howerton was at

the Florida Association of Counties conference last week, he said county engineers from all over Florida told him the roundabouts work well.

Howerton said he's also driven the one at Hunt Brothers Road on State Road 17 between Frostproof and Lake Wales.

"It works well," Howerton said.

After the meeting, Howerton said he plans to amend his initial plans to make inbound lanes curve into the roundabout, to slow traffic further, and make sure all roads have two lanes in and two lanes out.

male victim was basically grazed by a bullet while the 17-year-old male victim was shot in the collarbone area.

Authorities say they were told that the adult was not admitted to the hospital, and the juvenile has been released from Tampa General Hospital after being treated for his gunshot wound.

Swain-Daniels was arrested Monday. According to the arrest report, he attempted to buy marijuana from one of the victims, the 17-year-old male, who was on his way to a friend's house. The victim told deputies he did not sell Swain-Daniels any marijuana.

After talking with Swain-Daniels, the victim went to his friend's residence. The

two males, who would later become victims, saw Swain-Daniels and two other males, who were wearing hoodies, outside of the house.

The two victims reportedly went outside to see what was going on. They reportedly saw three males gathered outside. One of the victims reported seeing an Hispanic male with black, curly hair pull a revolver from his waistband.

The 17-year-old victim told deputies he was shot in the collarbone, and then he ran back to his friend's residence and banged on the door to be let back inside.

The victim who was shot in the collarbone told authorities he believes Swain-Daniels masterminded the plot, because he was the "one who asked to buy marijuana."

The 17-year-old victim and Swain-Daniels

both attend Avon Park High School, and the victim told deputies they are both members of College Bound Males.

The College Bound Males program at Avon Park High School aims to help boost graduation and success rates for males, particularly males of color.

The 21-year-old victim told deputies he noticed someone hanging around "all sketchy," and he went with his friend to investigate. He reported that Swain-Daniels told him he would "run up in" his house, a term that refers to a burglary. Almost immediately after Swain-Daniels made this statement, one of the three individuals (not Swain-Daniels) "pulled a gun and started shooting," the arrest report states.

Only Martinez, one of the suspects in this case, has had encounters with

law enforcement in the past. He was charged with shooting a BB or pellet gun into a window and damaging property on April 8, 2017, according to an arrest report.

On May 3, 2018, Martinez was charged with carrying a concealed firearm, a black semiautomatic Glock handgun, according to authorities. At this time, he was only 15 years old and he was not legally allowed to possess a handgun until the minimum age of 21.

The Sunday encounter started after one of the suspects attempted to purchase illegal drugs and Highlands County Sheriff officials report that shootings and drugs are often related. "A lot of people get shot over marijuana," Dressel said, adding people think marijuana is a harmless drug, but it is not.

with the intent to sell, and possessing drug equipment.

Victoria Lynn Yates, 27, of Sebring, was also arrested the same day. Yates was charged with keeping a public nuisance structure for drug activity, producing marijuana, possessing marijuana with the intent to sell, and possessing drug

equipment.

Over 20 grams of marijuana was reportedly found at the residence. In addition, law enforcement officials found the following items:

- four smoking pipes
- two grinders
- one digital scale (commonly used for narcotics sales)
- AR-15 .223 Bushmaster rifle with a bump stock
- .40 Springfield XD semiautomatic pistol
- .38 Smith and Wesson

revolver handgun

- three loaded .223 magazines
- two loaded .40 magazines
- a box of .223 ammunition

One bedroom at 1428 Orange Blossom Ave. had been converted into a grow room, according to authorities. The room was allegedly divided into half with part of the room used for drying cannabis and the other half used for growing

cannabis.

Law enforcement officials found 11 live marijuana plants that field tested positive for cannabis.

Yates reportedly told law enforcement officials that she did not know about the marijuana that was being grown in the bedroom as "she had no reason to go in there." Yates told law officials that she does not use illegal narcotics.

Habitat continues Irma recovery

State Farm gives \$20K disaster grant

SEBRING — Habitat for Humanity International and State Farm Insurance have teamed up to donate another \$20,000 disaster services grant to Habitat for Humanity of Highlands County.

The grant will be used to build and repair homes as part of Hurricane Irma recovery efforts. Today, in addition to presenting the check, State Farm employees will work on a local Habitat home alongside an AmeriCorps' National Civilian Community Corps volunteer team currently on a tour of service.

The college-age volunteers have just come from doing relief efforts in South Carolina for victims of Hurricane Florence, said Blair Pakowski, director of programs for Habitat for Humanity of Highlands County.

They arrived in Sebring Nov. 26 and will

work on local Habitat homes through Dec. 12, Pakowski said. They will work on one of five Habitat houses currently under construction in Mason's Ridge.

"Our community was greatly affected by Hurricane Irma," said Sarah Creekmore, Habitat for Humanity of Highlands County executive director. "We would like to thank Habitat for Humanity International and State Farm for the grant and their help as our community continues to recover."

Following Irma, Highlands County Habitat began working to assess the community's needs and launched a disaster recovery home repair program alongside the traditional home ownership program. Highlands County Habitat has formed partnerships with more than 30 families affected by Irma to rebuild or build their own new safe and secure homes.

"State Farm is pleased

to support recovery efforts through this disaster services grant," said Ed Woods, State Farm director of Human Resources. "As our mission is to help people manage the risks of everyday life, recover from the unexpected, and realize their dreams, we hope this grant goes a long way in helping your community recover from this disaster."

State Farm and Habitat for Humanity are providing up to \$100,000 in grants for disaster recovery projects that engage youth. State Farm has been a supporter of Habitat for Humanity International's youth initiatives since 2007.

AmeriCorps had another team working at Mason's Ridge in September while the team was in Florida as part of a "Project Round" two-month tour of duty to help on projects in disaster response, energy conservation, environmental stewardship or urban renewal/development.

Green Dragon Drive traffic to remain unchanged for now

LAKE PLACID — Green Dragon Drive traffic patterns will remain status quo for the time being. Some changes will be coming however; the goal is to have a new system of parent pickup/drop-off in place by the time students return on Jan. 8 from Christmas break.

Last week Lake Placid Police Chief James Fansler sent an alert to parents and students stating motorists could not park along Green Dragon Drive to drop off and pick up students. The alert advised that Lake Placid police would be issuing citations to enforce the laws already on the books, pursuant to Florida Statue 316.1945.

The parking situation has been an issue for years, Fasnlr said last week. It has caused extreme congestion and safety issues for

both motorists and pedestrians.

Members of The School Board of Highlands County, LPPD and administrators from Lake Placid Elementary School held an informal meeting Monday in order to brainstorm possible solutions. Fansler sent a social media update to alert parents afterward.

Deputy Superintendent Andrew Lethbridge attended the Monday meeting but was unavailable for comment as of press time Tuesday.

"Traffic will remain status quo for the time being," he said. "A couple of options are being strongly considered. However, they will require a bit of time to iron out all the details."

Fansler said Tuesday he didn't want to go into specifics about the potential solutions because it could cause more confusion and cloud the issue.

"We will work closely with the School Board and staff to make the change work as effectively and efficiently as possible," Fansler said. "The changes will be advertised by LPPD and the School Board and implemented upon return to school after the Christmas break."

Some parents have been parking in the Town Hall and public library parking lots and waiting for their children. Fansler said those locations are inappropriate alternatives to parking and waiting on Green Dragon Drive.

Fansler's social media alert urges all parents to arrive at the schools "closer to the drop-off and pickup times."

"Parents showing up 30-plus minutes prior to the release are a major factor in this problem we are faced with solving," he said. "Once children are released from school, the line moves along smooth and quickly."

Take a spin (on a roundabout)

Don't get thrown for a (traffic) loop

SEBRING — How do you get around a roundabout?

If you are a motorist who drives through downtown Sebring, Sun 'n Lake Special Improvement District or to and from Lake June Park, you've already used them, several times.

Residents on Summit Drive in Sebring also have one. Like all the others, it's a single-lane version. Traffic entering the circle yields to traffic already on the circle, and traffic on the circle can turn off the circle using right turns.

Strictly speaking, The Circle in downtown Sebring and DeVane Circle in Lake Placid differ from most roundabouts because true roundabouts are smaller and don't let pedestrians cross into the center.

Still, those two circular traffic devices are one-way, single-lane routes that handle one lane of traffic at a time.

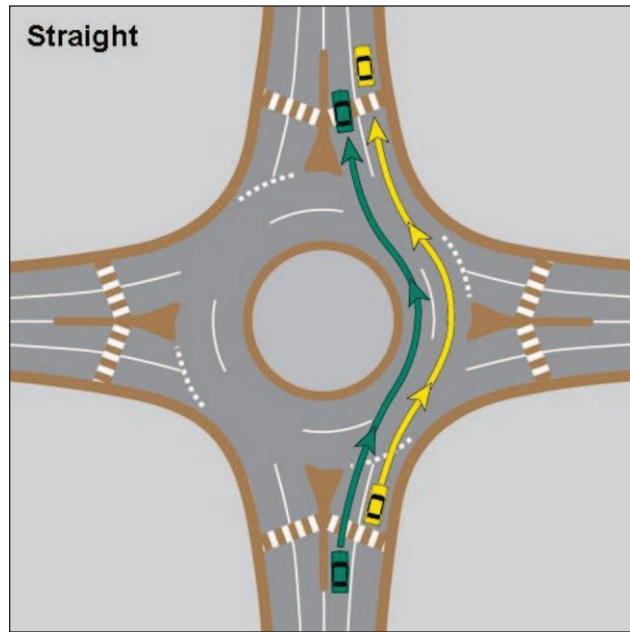
A proposed new roundabout at the current 90-degree turn on Sebring Parkway would handle two lanes at once, and would require motorists to use a bit more caution.

The basic rules of yielding to the traffic on the circle apply, as well as some other rules listed below, as outlined by the Florida Department of Transportation at fdot.gov/agencyresources/roundabouts.

FDOT states that roundabouts typically operate at relatively low speeds — 25 mph — while traffic circles allow higher speeds. To drive in a single-lane roundabout, a motorist needs to reduce speed to 10-15 mph and be prepared to stop for pedestrians and cyclists.

Since traffic moves counter-clockwise around the circle, motorists must look left for traffic, yield to vehicles already on the roundabout and wait for a gap to enter.

Do not stop on the roundabout, do not pass other vehicles and even though all exits are to the right, use your turn signal

to indicate when you are exiting so cars both on and off the circle know what you are about to do. How do I drive a multi-lane roundabout?

Obey all the rules for a single-lane roundabout, especially use of turn signals for exiting. Follow signs and pavement markings to determine what lane(s) will serve your destination. In diagrams of two-lane roundabouts, FDOT recommends using the outside lane for what would otherwise be a right turn or straight path, and the inside lane for left turns or U-turns. As always, keep moving and give every other driver as much room as possible.

How do I yield to emergency vehicles?

If you have not entered a roundabout, pull over to the right and let the emergency vehicle pass. If you have already entered the roundabout, continue to the closest exit and pull over once you are beyond the "splitter island" to let the emergency vehicle pass. Never stop in a roundabout. Should I let someone in?

You may slow down so the safe gap becomes more obvious to a driver wanting to enter the

roundabout, but do not stop once you are actually on the circle.

How about pedestrians?

Pedestrians must use marked crosswalks. True roundabouts have splitter islands to separate approach and exit lanes. The islands also serve as pedestrian refuge so pedestrians need only cross a single direction of traffic at a time.

And visually-impaired pedestrians?

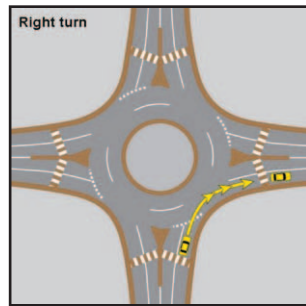
Roundabouts may have an advantage to the visually-impaired because they only have to address traffic from one direction at a time and can more easily distinguish between the vehicle noises. Slower vehicle speeds also help make it safer.

What about bicyclists?

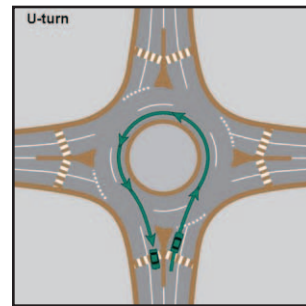
Bicyclists may either share the travel way with vehicles in a roundabout or dismount and use the sidewalk/crosswalk system to navigate through the roundabout.

What about large trucks?

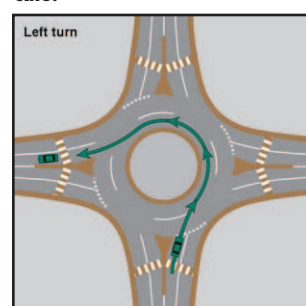
Roundabouts are designed to accommodate all turning movements of a semi-trailer. The one at Lake June Park, for example, has a truck apron on the inner circle to accommodate the sweep of the trailer wheels as the truck



If you plan to take the street to you immediate right at a roundabout, it's best to choose the outside lane, and to both enter and turn from the roundabout when it's clear to do so.



If you plan a U-turn on a two-lane roundabout, Washington State Department of Transportation recommends using the inside lane. As always, signal your exits and don't enter too close to other cars.



If you plan to take the left-hand spoke from a two-lane roundabout, basically three-quarters of the way around, Washington State Department of Transportation suggests using the inside lane. As always, signal your exits and don't enter too close to other traffic.

Authority belongs elsewhere

... Republicans rule the roost in the House, Senate, Governor's Mansion and, very soon, the State Supreme Court.

We're not likely to see any meaningful gun control — and we're not implying that we should. But it's clear we can do a better job of the protections in place, including concealed carry licensing. It currently resides under the state Agricultural Commissioner.

Outgoing Commissioner Adam Putnam was embroiled in a controversy in which his office was accused of allowing hundreds of criminals to get carry permits. At least 300 permits were subsequently revoked. Pundits disagree as to how that affected his losing campaign for governor, but it's a good bet Ron DeSantis' lockstep with President Trump was the major factor in Putnam's political swan song.

Let's agree on one thing: Licensing concealed weapons permits does not belong under the purview of the Agriculture Department.

So now Tallahassee is in a red-hot hurry to yank the permitting authority from the Ag Department. The reason is Nikki Fried's election to that seat Nov. 6. She is a Democrat who campaigned on tougher gun control laws.

That won't do in Tallahassee, though it was, for some reason, fine when a Republican held the office. The interesting twist is Fried, herself, wants the authority moved out of her office — to her credit.

Now the certain battle will reside elsewhere. It's not a matter of moving the authority elsewhere — it is where.

The legislature will push hard to put state CFO Jimmy Patronis' office in charge of permits. It's as dumb an idea as hanging them on the Ag Commissioner. But Patronis is a Republican. And the National Rifle Association is pushing just as hard to make that happen. It could have something to do with NRA campaign contributions' and lawmakers' gun control points of view ...

NRA lobbyist Marion Hammer says a bad place to put the responsibility for concealed carry licensing is the Florida Department of Law Enforcement because "you don't want this in an agency where the people are beholden to somebody who is a political appointee."

She concluded, "Law enforcement agencies are the worst place for a program like this."

Seriously, ma'am?

Let's forget for the moment that Patronis got his job as the state CFO as a political appointee of Gov. Rick Scott last year.

Currently, the FDLE does all the background checks for the concealed carry permits and enforces the gun laws. Who better to take over the permitting process?

It's a no-brainer. But politics trumps brains with astonishing consistency during legislative session.

If we were betting people, we'd bet you'll see Jimmy Patronis in charge of to whom and how concealed carry permits are issued in Florida.

Turn it around, it makes as much sense as putting the FDLE in charge of state finances.

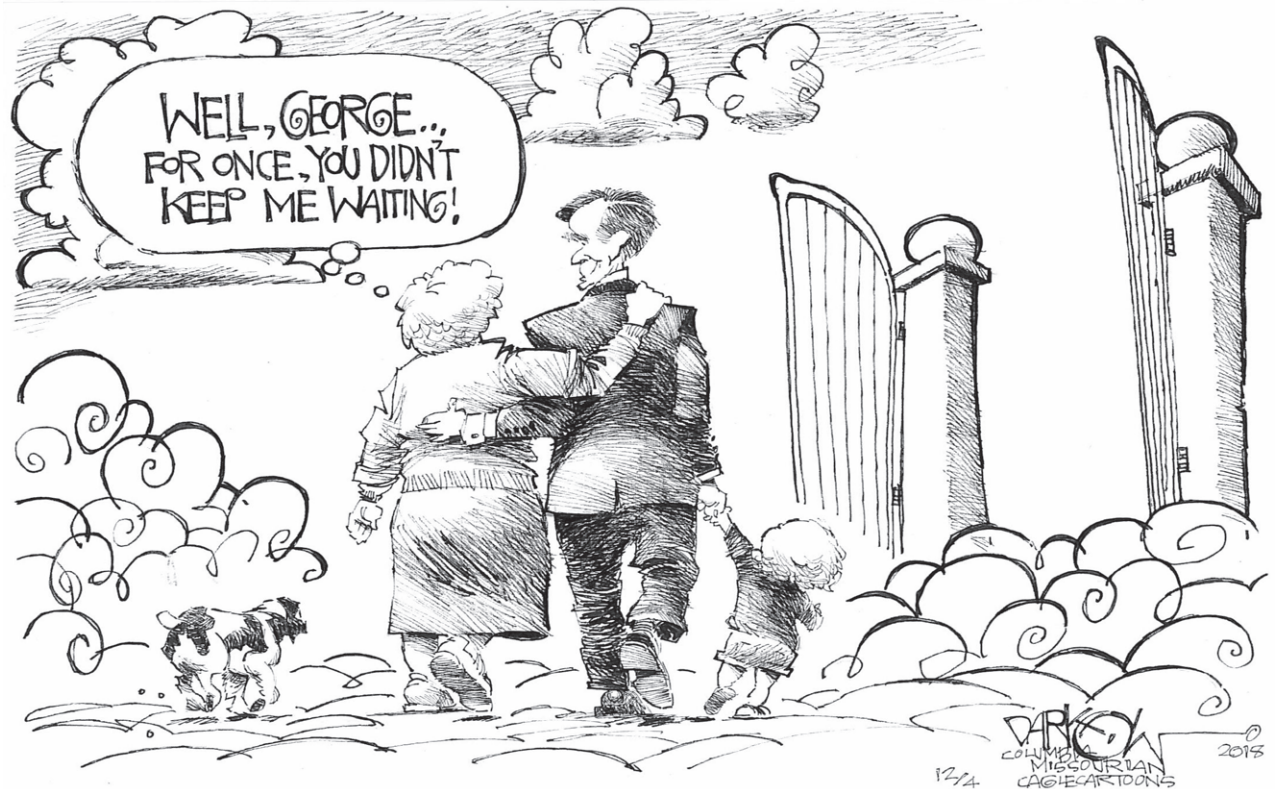

This can be said of John F. Kennedy, the commanding officer of PT-109. And Lt. Cmdr. Richard Nixon, who ran the South Pacific Combat Air Transport Command. And Navy aviator George H.W. Bush. Serving in the Pacific theater of World War II, these young men had few traits of temperament or character in common. But the war shaped their conception of America's global role, and their view of the necessity and capability of government in general.

People who fought in World War II were marinated in the ideas that evil is real and that American power is an essential, irreplaceable force for good. They intuitively understood the moral narrative of Munich, Buchenwald, D-Day, Hiroshima, NATO and the twilight struggle. And they generally shared the notion that America could do anything that power, wealth, will and courage could accomplish.

This presented the temptation of overreach, as in Vietnam. JFK's inaugural pledge to "pay any price, bear any burden" should be taken seriously, but not literally. But the children of World War II really did believe that a torch was passing from Dwight Eisenhower's

generation — the generation of their commanding officers — to a group of Americans who had rescued the world and fully intended to lead it. Given the other paths America might have taken, they did an extraordinary job. They twice saved humanity from well-armed, aggressive, totalitarian ideologies — first as soldiers, sailors and airmen, then as statesmen. America and the world owe them a great deal.

Being one of the youngest Navy pilots in World War II, and blessed with longevity, George H.W. Bush was among the last of his cohort to leave us. As intelligence chief, diplomat and president, he brought to his calling a set of values that might be called patrician. He was less New Frontier and more old school. He rose up in government on the impulse of service. He

lived by high standards of decency, fair play, humility, love of family and love of country. He was relentlessly moderate in temperament and political instinct.

This type of "establishment" code is easier to lampoon than replace. So much that a graceless age dismisses as repression is actually politeness, compassion and dignity.

And Bush's moral sensibilities turned out to be exactly what was needed at a decisive historical moment. As the Soviet Union collapsed under the weight of its economic and moral failure, what was needed from America was patience, wisdom, steady purpose and the generosity of true power. In presiding over the breaking of nations, an excess of vision or ambition might have been

Child in need of rare blood

OneBlood looking for donors

ORLANDO — OneBlood, the local not-for-profit blood center serving Florida and other parts of the southeast, is leading a worldwide search to find some of the rarest blood in the world. It's needed to help save 2-year-old Zainab, a South Florida girl who is battling neuroblastoma, a very aggressive form of cancer.

Zainab's blood is extremely rare because she is missing a common antigen that most people carry on their red blood cells. The antigen is called "Indian B" (Inb). For a person to be a possible match for Zainab, they must also be missing the Indian B antigen, or the little girl's body will reject the blood. Locating people who are missing the Indian B antigen comes down to genetics.

Statistically, the only people who are likely to be a match for Zainab are people of Pakistani, Indian or Iranian descent.

Of these populations, less than 4 percent of the people are actually missing the Indian B antigen.

To be a match for Zainab a donor must meet the following criteria:

- Must be exclusively Pakistani, Indian or Iranian descent — meaning the donor's birth parents are both 100 percent Pakistani, Indian or Iranian
- Must be blood type "O" or "A"

All donations for Zainab must be coordinated with OneBlood in advance to ensure the additional compatibility testing is performed.

OneBlood is working closely with other blood centers and the American Rare Donor Program (ARDP), an organization that searches the world for rare blood donors. So far, three matching donors have been located, including a donor that ARDP located in the United Kingdom, near London. It's the first time OneBlood has ever

received an international donor for a local patient. The other two matching donors are from the United States.

While it's promising the three donors have been located, additional donors are needed. Zainab will need blood transfusions for the foreseeable future. To support her long-term blood needs, the search is on to find at least seven to 10 compatible donors. OneBlood is sharing Zainab's story in the hopes more people who meet the specific donor criteria will come forward to donate for the little girl.

OneBlood is conducting all compatibility testing of potential donors. So far, more than 1,000 local donations, as well as donations from other parts of the country have been tested and no additional matches have been identified.

Rebuild Florida in Highlands

Service center taking applications in Avon Park

AVON PARK — If you still have damage from Hurricane Irma and need help rebuilding, you may want to get to the Avon Park CVS this week.

Through Saturday, a mobile Rebuild Florida center, equipped with intake specialists who can help families through registration, will be at the CVS Pharmacy at 1105 W. Main St. in Avon Park.

Rebuild Florida, a partnership with the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity (DEO), was created to help Florida recover from the impacts of Hurricane Irma.

The first phase is the Housing Repair Program, which will assist families

to rebuild homes damaged or destroyed by Irma, after it made landfall in Florida on Sept. 10, 2017.

As of July this year, Highlands County was one of 12 Florida counties that hadn't recovered fully from the Great Recession, and wasn't helped at all by Irma.

Since then, Hurricane Michael has devastated counties throughout the Florida Panhandle.

The DEO states on its website that the state of Florida is committed to helping homeowners affected by the storm by rebuilding or replacing damaged homes.

HUD has approved funding to local communities for Florida's long-term recovery efforts after the 2017 hurricane season. Funds will help eligible homeowners impacted

by Hurricane Irma and individuals and families from Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands who were displaced by Hurricane Maria.

The Rebuild Florida program will repair and rebuild damaged homes across the hardest-hit communities of Florida, with priority funding for low-income vulnerable residents, including the elderly, disabled and parents of children ages five and younger.

Other phases of Rebuild Florida, expected to launch soon, include business assistance and partnerships with local governments.

The mobile Rebuild Florida center will be at Avon Park CVS through the end of Saturday. Those unable to reach the center may also register online at florida-jobs.org/rebuildflorida.

dangerously disruptive. Crowing would have led to bitterness and unpredictable anger. And Bush was incapable of crowing.

On closer exposure to Bush, there was something more at work than a moral code. I generally saw the elder Bush through the eyes of his son, George W. Bush, for whom I worked. And he could hardly mention his father's name without welling up in tears of affection. During George W.'s first Republican National Convention speech, we had to cut short the section praising

his father, because the son could not get through the words without breaking down. There was a sweetness to their relationship that is a tribute to both men. George H.W. Bush loved deeply, and was deeply loved. He was sentimental without being fragile. And those who saw weakness in his manner know nothing about true strength — the victory over ego, over impulse, over hatred.

Dying can be cruel and unfair. But there was a profound and encouraging sense of rightness, of fittingness, at Bush's death. He left few things unaccomplished, and none that mattered. He was only briefly parted

from the love of his life. His strength failed before his spirit. Bush died as well as a man could manage — full of years, full of honors, surrounded by affection, confident in his faith, knowing that his work on earth was done.

Bush's life provides assurance that sometimes things go gloriously right. Sometimes Americans vote for a decent and honest leader. Sometimes a president finds his calling and his moment. Sometimes a good man meets a good end.

And still. It is a sad and solemn task to dig the graves of giants.

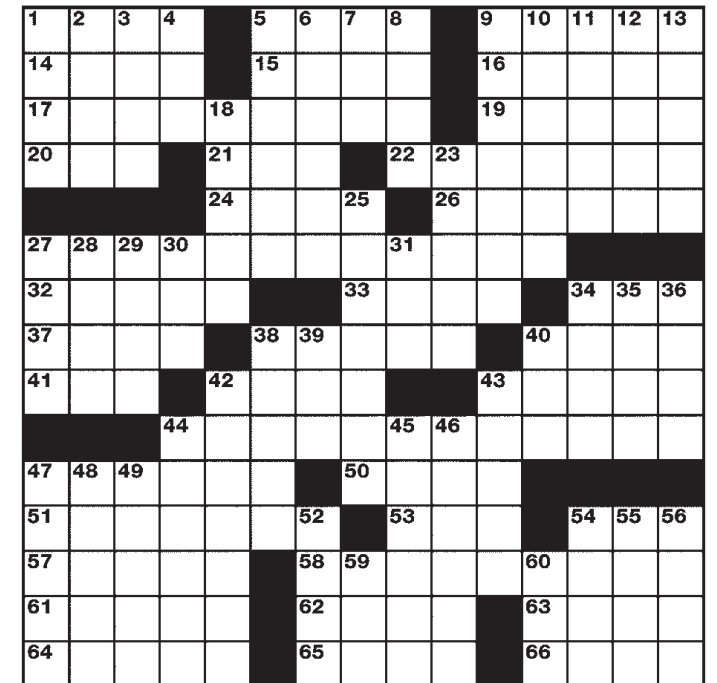

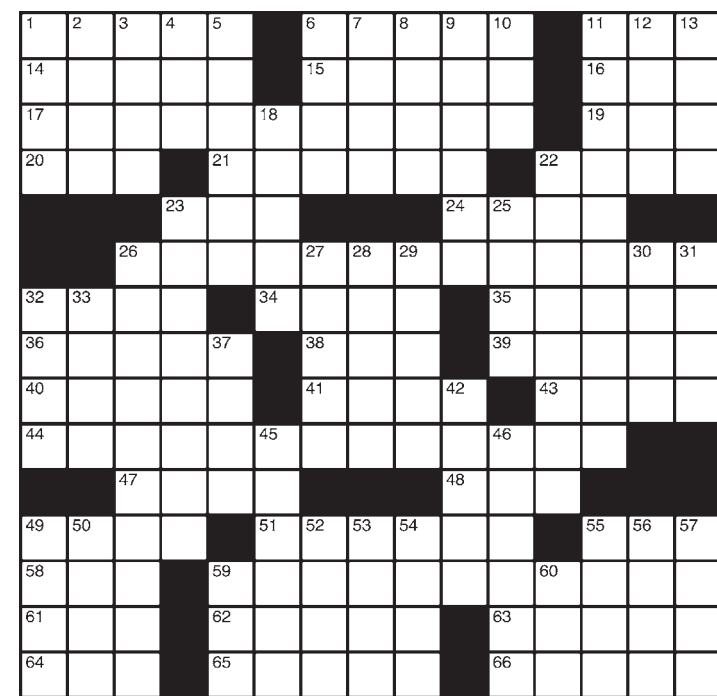

Great fishing this weekend

The Freshwater Fishing Forecast for the second half of the first week of December gives anglers the new moon phase which occurs on Friday and the arrival of another slow-moving major cold front which is currently still arriving but started yesterday.

All fishing factors considered; anglers will have slow fishing due to the cold front both today and Thursday. Fish will adjust fairly quickly since they are already "normalized"

in this seasonal weather pattern of water temperatures dramatically dropping and climbing every three to four days--from the bottom of the ideal

temperature range to the middle of the range, 70-82 degrees.

Best Fishing Days: Normally today and Thursday would be considered as producing the 'new moon phase accelerated feeding activity' however, due to the cold front not bottoming-out in temperature until tonight and Thursday morning I know this will not occur--the pre-front feeding frenzy occurred Tuesday morning.

So Friday will be...

perhaps the first day of better-than-average fishing since the new moon effect will cause some fish to feed even at the colder temperatures--fish having become normalized since this front is the third one to occur consistently timing-wise.

So...the best days of the next five days will be Saturday and Sunday, which will have the new moon effect and ideal water temperatures for fish to feed well above average feed rates.

Major Fishing Period: Today the moon is overhead at 11:01 a.m. and solar noon at 12:16 p.m. which will produce a feed intensity rating of 1-2 when normally a 3-4 rating would occur with the new moon effect 'without' the cold front. If fish do feed today it will be from 10:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.

By Friday and the weekend, there will be two periods daily with great 'new moon action'— 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. and 5-7 p.m. both with a rating of 4-6.

Minor Fishing Period: Today and through the next four days the moon-rise period along with the sunrise will produce poorly due to the cold temps. The moon-rise today occurs at 5:18 a.m. and daily it occurs later by an hour.

Friday the moon-rise and sunrise occur at the same time and will be fairly good rating wise at 2-3. By Sunday morning a better 4-rating could occur from 7-9:30 a.m.

Juncos Racing ready for debut

Since the announcement in August that Juncos Racing would be fielding a Cadillac DPi-V.R in the 2019 IMSA WeatherTech SportsCar Championship, the team has been systematically working to assemble all the pieces it needs.

The process isn't unique for the team, which has fielded successful Road to Indy programs and an IndyCar program over the past several years. At the same time, it also was helpful that the Cadillac DPi package the team

is using is already well established.

"It's very simple, actually," explains Juncos Racing President Ricardo Juncos. "It's been quite good. From when we got the car in pieces brand new, it took nine days to fire up. Everything was smooth, no issue whatsoever in any of the electronics, engines or gearbox. No surprises."

months on the new DPi program. However, his interest in participating in IMSA dates much further back than that.

"Since seven years ago, to be honest, I was trying to find a way to jump into IMSA somehow," he said. "In '19, the original intention was to maybe be a team on the LMP3 side, because at that moment, we didn't know what was going to happen with Pro Mazda. We won the championship in Pro Mazda, so we will continue with the Pro Mazda program, but we had an opportunity with Cadillac through General Motors because we have this relationship with Chevrolet on the IndyCar side that we could become one of the DPi teams in IMSA."

"Instead of starting with LMP3, we decided to get the big challenge. It's obviously very big for us, but we feel OK to do something like this based on our IndyCar experience. We started getting good opportunities with drivers so that's why we chose to do this DPi program, knowing that for the next three years, it's going to be

the same homologation. I think it was proper timing."

Juncos also has been pleased with the level of support his team has received since making the decision to go sports car racing.

"Everything is going smooth," he said. "We've got great support from IMSA, from Cadillac, from Dallara, from ECR, which are the engine guys. I mean, it's been great so far. It's a really, really nice group of people to work with."

The group figures to get larger in the coming days. On the heels of the Owen announcement, Juncos expects additional drivers to be introduced over the next two weeks.

As far as the race team is concerned, Juncos and his colleagues have been building a dedicated staff for the WeatherTech Championship program, just as it has done for other racing programs over the years.

"Each team has a team leader, like a team manager, then you have a crew chief and then you have your mechanics," he explained. "We have four separate teams now all together with the same shop and sharing some of the same people, like me, the

accounting department, the lawyers, the technical director and bodywork guy and fabricators. That's common to all the teams here in the shop, but each team has its own leaders and they work individually."

And what are Juncos' expectations heading into the team's maiden WeatherTech Championship voyage in 2019?

"Our expectation is, like I always say, to learn as much as possible, at least for me and a few other guys who have zero experience in IMSA or any endurance races," he said. "For me, it's a big learning curve, but I have people in the team that have already won 24-hour races before, so some of the guys I have, they have massive experience. Some of them don't, so we will take it easy and try to learn as much as possible, try to finish the races and try to make no mistakes."

"Obviously, it's one of the biggest series in the U.S. that we're going to be doing, so it requires a lot of effort and timing and patience to learn. It's like I always said, it takes time to be something really solid, and it's OK, because we're talking about something really big here."

CHAMPION'S TALE

Logano flew under the radar for 2018 Cup title

Joey Logano had one of the greatest seasons as a NASCAR Cup Series driver and, for the most part, flew under the radar until late in the game.

While the "Big 3" of Kevin Harvick, Kyle Busch and Martin Truex Jr. combined for 20 victories and most of the media limelight, Logano quietly was putting together a solid season.

Those three drivers gave Logano a standing ovation when the 28-year-old driver was officially crowned 2018 Cup Series champion last Thursday in Las Vegas at the NASCAR Awards Ceremony.

"This is what we've worked for our whole life," Logano said before the ceremony. "Not just 10 years that we've been trying at the Cup level, but it started in '95 when I first got behind the wheel of a go-kart. That's when this goal started."

If it seems like Logano has been around stock-car racing forever, you are right. He got a Cup Series ride at the tender age of 18 from Joe Gibbs Racing, when Tony Stewart left to join ranks with Gene Haas.

Logano was on the leading edge of NASCAR's current youth movement, which placed four millennial drivers among the top 10 in season-ending points.

But unlike his young counterparts Chase Elliott (23), Ryan Blaney (24) and Kyle Larson (26), he went

into the 2018 campaign with nine full seasons of Cup competition and 18 victories under his belt.

Logano scored a toss-of-the-dice victory at Talladega Superspeedway in the spring, then went winless for 22 races ... but was compiling top-five and top-10 finishes nearly every weekend.

The 'Dega win was important because it guaranteed Logano a playoff berth.

A look back at the stat sheet shows Logano led in Cup points after Race 2 and Race 3, before he drifted down to sixth place after crashing out at Watkins Glen International on Aug. 5.

His No. 22 Team Penske Ford started to get hot right as the playoffs began; not win-a-bunch-of-races hot, but score-enough-points-to-advance hot.

He made it to the Round of 12 and Round of 8 on points.

His signature moment was at Martinsville Speedway when he pulled the last-lap bump-and-run on Truex to win the First Data 500 and earn a ticket to the Championship Round.

That win gave him an immediate advantage, allowing crew chief Todd Gordon and his team more time to concentrate on massaging the car he would run at Homestead-Miami Speedway.

"This win allowed everyone at Team Penske to focus on Homestead for three weeks," Gordon said. "It was awesome to see all 550 Mooresville employees pulling in the same direction, getting us as prepared as we'd ever been for the championship race."

On the final restart in the Ford

EcoBoost 400, Logano simply motored away from the "Big 3" and everybody else. He had the right car at the right time, and when he crossed the finish line, the Cup Series championship was won.

"It's just how it kind of unfolds, but there's typically one (caution) somewhere late in the race," Gordon said. "And when it came up, there it was, our opportunity, and Joey's, and you give him that opportunity of 'here it is, it's right in front of you,' he steps up to another level."

After wrestling the lead from Truex, Logano would not be denied at Homestead. He led the last 12 laps for the win and title.

"There was never a second thing that I was going to try to do," Logano said. "This was it — NASCAR champion."

Logano becomes the seventh different champion over the past eight years. The only driver to nab two titles since 2011 was Jimmie Johnson (2013, 2016).

Logano's championship is a childhood dream fulfilled by the lanky driver from Middletown, Connecticut.

"You're a kid, and it's a dream," Logano said. "Maybe a goal is a little different. It's a dream at that point. A lot of kids want to be NASCAR champion, and I'm here to say it can happen, as long as you keep working hard and taking advantage of the opportunities in front of you."

"When I went to elementary school, and they said, 'What do you want to be when you grow up?' it was always race car driver."

Compelling questions ... and maybe a few actual answers

Have we overlooked the Captain's great 2018 season?

Over five-plus decades, Roger Penske has become so synonymous with success, it can be easy to overlook the recent trophies he's stashed into the bulging display case. Even at 81, he's hardly just a figurehead owner, but very much a part of team strategies and logistics. This past year, the Captain was clicking on all cylinders. Consider the spoils: The Indy 500 win with Will Power, Australia's V8 Supercar championship with Scott McLaughlin, and NASCAR's Cup championship with Joey Logano.

What, there's a down side?

Well, yes, in a way, though it's not Penske's fault. Many bemoan the lack of new blood in NASCAR's ownership ranks, but old warhorses like Penske are making it tough on interlopers. He's 81, Joe Gibbs is 78, and Rick Hendrick turns 70 next year. As stated so many times here, NASCAR needs an influx of younger ownership, but the current business model makes it tough for anyone without serious Wall Street connections.

Are you buying Jimmie's optimism?

Let's punt and say "renting." Jimmie Johnson went to Bahrain early last week and enjoyed a well-publicized test stint in the Formula One McLaren of two-time F1 champ Fernando Alonso. Jimmie was impressed ... with himself. The seven-time NASCAR champ is usually quite humble, but these aren't usual times. After a winless 2018, he's in need of a pick-me-up, even if he has to supply the lifting. "I climbed into an unfamiliar car and environment and did really well," he told media later last week in Las Vegas. "So my natural instincts, my ability to drive, my ability to scare myself and challenge myself hasn't gone anywhere."

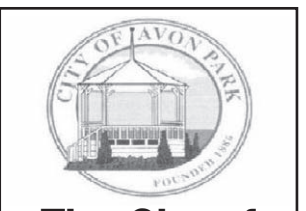

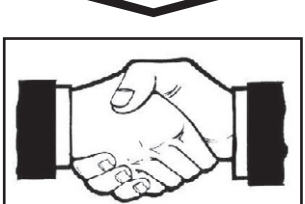

Ceramics by Bert Bogdany at MOFAC

Special to Highlands News-Sun

AVON PARK The Museum of Florida Art and Culture (MOFAC) at South Florida State College (SFSC) presents "Organic Geometry, Ceramics by Bert Bogdany." This exhibition runs today, Wednesday, Dec. 5 – Wednesday, Feb. 6, at MOFAC's gallery located in the east wing of the Alan Jay Wildstein Center for the Performing Arts on the SFSC Highlands Campus in Avon Park.

Bogdany's work exemplifies and challenges the malleable nature of clay. According to the artist, many of the forms in this collection are a combination of

wheel-thrown and hand-built constructions. Using a potter's wheel, these structures are formed by altering, shaping, and compressing the clay's surface area. In rotation, the clay is methodically worked until the surface is no longer recognizable compared to its original state.

"The forms are meticulously shaped to include an organic geometry that has occurred thematically within my work for over two decades," Bogdany said. "It is my hope that these works express the same feeling of balance and unity to the viewer, as I receive when creating them."

The horizontal and wall structures are a

combination of hand building and relief carving. "Working in the medium of clay for many years, I have discovered the inherent beauty within the unaltered, raw state of the material," Bogdany said. "Realizing the dichotomy of attempting to perfect a surface with a potter's wheel that already holds an inherent flawlessness has caused me to expand upon my research. This awareness has influenced my desire to create a sculptural series that holds a truth in materials. The horizontal structures are meant to convey a harmonious balance between the material and the physical process of its alteration."

An opening reception for the exhibition will be held on Thursday, Jan. 17, 2019 at 1 p.m., MOFAC.

MOFAC is located in the Wildstein Center at SFSC, 600 W. College Dr., Avon Park. The museum is open to the public on Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, 12:30 – 4:30 p.m., or by appointment for group tours. Patrons of the Wildstein Center may visit the museum one hour prior to matinee and evening performances.

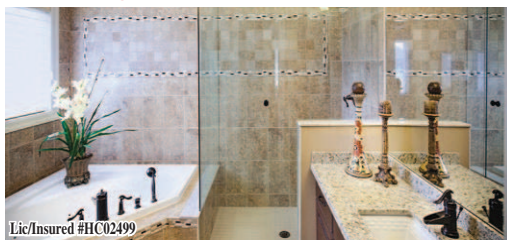

Crowds honor Bush for long service, from war to White House

Bush is celebrated for rights for the disabled and military service but mainly as a 'sincere' guy

WASHINGTON — Soldiers, citizens in wheelchairs and long lines of others on foot wound through the hushed Capitol Rotunda on Tuesday to view George H.W. Bush's casket and remember a president whose legacy included World War military service and a landmark law affirming the rights of the disabled. Bob Dole, a compatriot in war, peace and political struggle, steadied himself out of his wheelchair and saluted his old friend and one-time rival.

As at notable moments in his life, Bush brought together Republicans and Democrats in his death, and not only the VIPs.

Members of the public who never voted for the man waited in the same long lines as the rest, attesting that Bush possessed the dignity and grace that deserved to be remembered by their presence on a cold overcast day in the capital.

"I'm just here to pay my respects," said Jane Hernandez, a retired physician in the heavily Democratic city and suburbs. "I wasn't the biggest fan of his presidency, but all in all he was a good sincere guy doing a really hard job as best he could."

Bush's service dog, Sully, was brought to the viewing, too — his main service these last months since Barbara Bush's death in April being to rest his head on her husband's lap. Service dogs are trained to do that.

The CIA also honored Bush, the only spy chief to become president, as three agency directors past and present joined the public in the viewing.

In the midst of the period of mourning, first lady Melania Trump gave Laura Bush, one of her predecessors, a tour of holiday decorations at the White House, a

"sweet visit during this somber week," as Mrs. Bush's Instagram account put it. And the Trumps visited members of the Bush family at the Blair House presidential guesthouse, where they are staying. Former President George W. Bush and his wife greeted the Trumps outside before everyone went in for the private,

20-minute visit.

The Bushes later made a surprise visit to the Capitol Rotunda, shaking hands with visitors and tourists lined up to honor the family patriarch.

George W. and Laura Bush entered first, and the former president put his hand on the

FBI is investigating breach

WASHINGTON — Thousands of emails were stolen from aides to the National Republican Congressional Committee

during the 2018 midterm campaign, a major breach exposing vulnerabilities that have kept cybersecurity experts on edge since the 2016 presidential race.

The email accounts were compromised during a

series of intrusions that had been spread over several months and discovered in April, a person familiar with the matter told The Associated Press. At least four different party aides had their emails surveilled by hackers, said the person, who was not authorized to discuss the

details publicly and spoke on condition of anonymity.

The committee said an "unknown entity" was behind the hack but provided few other details. A cybersecurity firm and the FBI have been investigating the matter, the committee said. The FBI declined to comment.

Politically motivated cyberespionage is commonplace across the world, but Americans have become particularly alert to the possibility of digital interference since Russia's meddling in the 2016 election. The theft

5.M more pounds of beef recalled

Salmonella diagnosed in 246 people in 25 states

The USDA is recalling another 5.1 million pounds of raw beef products, expanding a previous recall to more than 12 million pounds.

The recalled beef, produced and packaged by JBS Tolleson Inc. between July 26 and Sept. 7, has been linked to an outbreak of salmonella that has been diagnosed in 246 people in 25 states as of Nov. 15.

Fifty-nine people have been hospitalized as a result but no deaths have been reported.

The Food Safety and Inspection Service "is continuing to investigate illnesses associated with this widespread outbreak, and additional product from other companies may also be recalled," the USDA said.

According to the Center for Disease Control, children younger than 5, adults older than 65 and people with weakened immune systems are more likely to suffer severe consequences.

Symptoms include diarrhea, fever and stomach cramps between 12 and 72 hours after consuming the contaminated beef.

The USDA warned any consumers to throw out the recalled beef or return it to the store.

Cuba to begin full internet access for phones

1st baby born using uterus transplanted from deceased donor

LONDON — Brazilian doctors are reporting the world's first baby born to a woman with a uterus transplanted from a deceased donor.

Eleven previous births have used a transplanted womb but from a living donor, usually a relative or friend.

Experts said using uteruses from women who have died could make more transplants possible. Ten previous attempts using deceased donors in the Czech Republic, Turkey and the U.S. have failed.

The baby girl was delivered last December by a woman born without a uterus because of a rare syndrome. The woman — a 32-year-old psychologist — was initially apprehensive about the transplant, said Dr. Dani Ejzenberg, the transplant team's lead doctor at the University of Sao Paulo School of Medicine.

"This was the most important thing in her life," he said. "Now she comes in to show us the baby and she is so happy."

The woman became pregnant through in vitro fertilization seven months after the transplant. The donor was a 45-year-old woman who had three children and died of a stroke.

The recipient, who was not identified, gave birth by cesarean section. Doctors also removed the womb, partly so the woman would no longer have to take anti-rejection medicines. Nearly a year later, mother and baby are both healthy.

Two more transplants are planned as part of the Brazilian study. Details of the first case were published Tuesday in the medical journal *Lancet*.

Uterus transplantation was pioneered by Swedish doctor Mats Brannstrom, who has delivered eight children from women who got wombs from family members or friends. Two babies have been born at Baylor University Medical

Center in Texas and one in Serbia, also from transplants from living donors.

In 2016, doctors at the Cleveland Clinic transplanted a uterus from a deceased donor, but it failed after an infection developed.

"The Brazilian group has proven that using deceased donors is a viable option," said the clinic's Dr. Tommaso Falcone, who was involved in the Ohio case. "It may give us a bigger supply of organs than we thought were possible."

The Cleveland program is continuing to use deceased donors. Falcone said the fact that the transplant was successful after the uterus was preserved in ice for nearly eight hours demonstrated how resilient the uterus is. Doctors try to keep the time an organ is without blood flow to a minimum.

Other experts said the knowledge gained from such procedures might also solve some lingering mysteries about pregnancies.

"There are still lots of things we don't understand about pregnancies, like how embryos implant," said Dr. Cesar Diaz, who co-authored an accompanying commentary in the journal. "These transplants will help us understand implantation and every stage of pregnancy."

US sets deadline for Russia, warns it may quit nuclear pact

BRUSSELS — The United States warned Russia Tuesday it has 60 days to start complying with a landmark missile treaty or Washington could abandon the pact, creating doubts about nuclear security in Europe.

At NATO talks in Brussels, Secretary of State Mike Pompeo accused Russia of "cheating at its arms control obligations" under the Intermediate-Range Nuclear Forces Treaty. Pompeo warned that if Russia did not

comply with the treaty's terms within 60 days, Washington could activate a six-month notice period for leaving the 1987 pact.

"Russia must return to full and verifiable compliance; Russia's failure to do so will result in the demise of the INF Treaty," Pompeo told reporters.

The U.S. has shared intelligence evidence with its NATO allies that Russia's new SSC-8 ground-fired cruise missile could give Moscow the ability to launch a nuclear strike in Europe with little or no notice.

The bilateral treaty between Washington and

Moscow banned all land-based cruise and ballistic missiles with a range between 310-3,410 miles. Russia says the range of the new system does not exceed 500 kilometers.

Pompeo said Washington "would welcome a Russian change of heart" but that he has seen no indication that Moscow is likely to comply.

U.S. allies in NATO said Tuesday they "strongly support the finding of the United States that Russia is in material breach of its obligations." They called on Russia "to return urgently to full and verifiable compliance."

US re-establishes 'permanent diplomatic presence' in Somalia

JOHANNESBURG (AP) — The United States says it has re-established a "permanent diplomatic presence" in Somalia for the first time in 27 years.

The State Department on Tuesday says "this historic event reflects Somalia's progress in recent years and is another step forward in formalizing U.S. diplomatic engagement in Mogadishu."

The U.S. closed its Somalia embassy in January 1991 as the country collapsed into civil war, with the military airlifting out the ambassador and others.

The U.S. formally recognized Somalia's new federal government in 2013 but has based its diplomatic mission in the capital of neighboring Kenya.

Former Secretary of State John Kerry during a surprise 2015 visit to Somalia said the U.S. would begin the process of re-establishing a diplomatic presence.

New Ambassador Donald Yamamoto arrived at the U.S. mission last month.

Anthrax responsible for 22 hippo deaths in Malawi, officials say

BLANTYRE, Malawi — Twenty-two hippopotamuses have died from anthrax disease at Liwonde National Park in Malawi over the past two months, a wildlife official said on Tuesday.

Laboratory tests conducted by the Health Ministry showed that the animals had been infected with the highly infectious, spore-forming bacterial disease, Brighton Kumchedwa, director of the Department of National Parks and Wildlife, told dpa.

A few weeks ago, wildlife officials had assumed that the deaths were caused by climate change after they found the hippos floating in the Shire River in September and October.

The river had unusually low water levels.

Liwonde National Park is one of the impoverished Southern African country's top tourism destinations. There are an estimated 3,000 hippos in Malawi.

Rich sex offender Epstein settles 1 suit, but more to come

WEST PALM BEACH — A decade ago, Florida financier Jeffrey Epstein pleaded guilty

to sex crimes involving underage girls and got 13 months behind bars. What the public and his accusers didn't know at the time was that he had

secretly struck a deal with federal prosecutors that spared him from charges that could have put him away for the rest of his life.

When the deal finally came to light years later, it immediately raised suspicions that Epstein — a man who counted Bill Clinton and Donald Trump among his friends and had some of the finest legal talent in America as his lawyers — had used his wealth and political connections to win special treatment.

Those allegations flared anew in recent weeks as news organizations, led by The Miami Herald, published interviews with the alleged victims and

took a closer look at Alexander Acosta, who as the U.S. attorney in Miami in 2008 approved the secret deal. Acosta is now Trump's secretary of labor.

On Tuesday, a lawsuit that many had hoped would expose some of the lurid allegations against Epstein by putting some of his accusers on the stand ended abruptly in a settlement just as jury selection was about to begin.

But the attempt to get to the bottom of the Epstein case and how he managed to get such a light sentence is not over: Some of his accusers are pursuing a separate legal effort to nullify the plea agreement and, they hope, expose him to federal prosecution again.

"That injustice needs to be addressed and will be addressed," said Jack Scarola, one of the attorneys lined up against Epstein. "There is no justification for the broad scope of immunity that was granted."

Epstein, 65, reached the non-prosecution deal with Acosta's office while under investigation on suspicion of sexually abusing at least 40 teenage girls. Under the deal, he pleaded guilty to two state charges, did his time in jail,

paid settlements to many of the alleged victims and registered as a sex offender.

He could have faced a far more severe penalty if federal prosecutors had pursued a draft 53-page indictment that was never filed and included sex trafficking charges.

Some of Epstein's accusers are now arguing that their rights were trampled under a federal law that says crime victims must be informed about plea bargains.

One of Epstein's lawyers, Roy Black, has said there was no conspiracy to violate victims' rights, and the plea agreement was "no sweetheart deal by any stretch of the imagination."

Even if the plea bargain is nullified, the final decision on bringing charges would rest solely with the Justice Department.

On Tuesday, Epstein settled a defamation lawsuit brought against him by a lawyer for some of the accusers, Bradley Edwards, who said Epstein tried to derail his representation of the women and ruin his career. In settling, Epstein apologized and agreed to pay an undisclosed amount.

Edwards said some of the

accusers — some of whom say they were 13 or 14 when they were molested — were prepared to testify in the lawsuit and may yet get their day in federal court.

"They're willing to talk. They want to share their stories," Edwards said.

Congressional Democrats are calling for an internal Justice Department investigation.

Rep. Lois Frankel, who represents the Palm Beach area, said Tuesday that Epstein "allegedly had dozens and dozens of young, vulnerable women, young women taken to his house where they were sexually exploited."

"I think what has been equally shocking is what I call an extreme minimal punishment for this man without really any public explanation as to why this happened," Frankel added.

Acosta has not commented about the case during the recent media coverage. He was asked briefly about the non-prosecution agreement at his Senate confirmation hearing.

"At the end of the day, based on the evidence, professionals within a prosecutor's office decided that a plea that guarantees someone goes to jail,

that guarantees he register generally and guarantees other outcomes, is a good thing," he said.

According to court papers, Epstein had a Palm Beach mansion where girls were brought for what they were sometimes told were massage sessions. He allegedly had female fixers who would look for suitable girls, some of them recruited from Eastern Europe and other parts of the world.

Before the scandal broke, Epstein was friends with Trump and had visited the real estate developer's Mar-a-Lago resort. Trump told interviewers that Epstein was "a great guy." Records also show Clinton flew on Epstein's jet more than two dozen times.

One young woman alleged in court documents that Epstein shared her with his friends, including Britain's Prince Andrew, a charge denied by Buckingham Palace.

Epstein's legal team at various times included such big names as Whitewater prosecutor Kenneth Starr and Harvard professor Alan Dershowitz.

Neither Trump nor Clinton has been accused of any wrongdoing related to Epstein.

Gov. Scott meets with Cabinet for final time

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Florida Gov. Rick Scott and two of the state's three independently elected Cabinet members met for the last time before leaving office.

Tuesday's meeting was filled with tributes to veterans, entrepreneurs, teachers, police officers and those who helped the Panhandle recover from Hurricane Michael.

Scott, Agriculture Commissioner Adam Putnam and Attorney General Pam Bondi also paid tribute to each other as the Republicans ended eight years of working together. Resolutions were approved to recognize

their service.

Each is leaving office due to term limits. Scott was elected to the U.S. Senate last month and Putnam lost a bid to replace him.

Chief Financial Officer Jimmy Patronis is the other Cabinet member. He was appointed by Scott to fill an unexpired term and elected last month to continue in his job.

Major layoffs at hospital damaged by Hurricane Michael

PANAMA CITY (AP) — A large number of layoffs are in the works at a Florida Panhandle hospital that was badly damaged by Hurricane Michael.

In a letter sent to employees Monday, CEO Scott Campbell said Panama City's Bay Medical Sacred Heart will re-open at about one quarter of its previous size and adjust staffing "accordingly."

The News Herald reports the hospital plans to open early next year with eight operating rooms, five cardiac catheterization labs and 75 in-patient beds. It had 323 beds before the Oct. 10 storm.

Ardent Health Services, which operates Bay Medical, said in a statement that laid-off employees will be paid through Feb. 4. Ardent and Ascension Sacred Heart say they're committed to hiring as many affected employees as

possible at other hospitals. They're planning a hiring event soon.

Court files: Dad told doctors voices urged him to kill girl

ST. PETERSBURG (AP) — A man accused of dropping his 5-year-old daughter off a Tampa Bay bridge told doctors that voices urged him to kill the child.

Twenty-nine-year-old John Jonchuck is being treated at a state mental hospital as he awaits a March trial on first-degree murder charges in the death of Phoebe Jonchuck. Prosecutors say Jonchuck dropped the little girl into the water in January 2015.

The Tampa Bay Times reports new court files reveal Jonchuck told doctors the voices told him "everybody was going to go to hell" if he and Phoebe didn't die.

Jonchuck told psychiatrist Emily Lazarou these details during evaluations to determine his mental state. Another doctor, hired to assess Lazarou's methods, quoted them in a deposition that became public when it was filed in court.

Police officer fired for using excessive force

DELAND (AP) — A police officer in Florida has been fired for using excessive force and unlawfully arresting a man.

The Florida Department of Law Enforcement said Deland Police Officer Joey Mulero's conduct was inappropriate when he threw a DeLand resident to the ground and handcuffed him during an encounter last year. The encounter was captured on video.

The Daytona Beach News-Journal reports that DeLand Police Chief Jason Umberger and his command staff determined the officer did not have probable cause to arrest the man.

Mulero was fired Monday. The FDLE investigation concluded Mulero didn't commit a crime and the State Attorney's Office declined to file criminal charges.

Nevada suing US in bid to block plan for plutonium shipments

LAS VEGAS — Nevada is suing the federal government in a bid to stop plans to ship plutonium cross-country next year from South Carolina to the nation's former nuclear proving ground north of Las Vegas.

In a statement Tuesday, outgoing Gov. Brian Sandoval and Attorney General Adam Laxalt repeated a vow that the state will fight "at every level" the U.S. Department of Energy plan to store radioactive bomb-making material at the Nevada Nuclear Security Site.

Sandoval, a Republican, said Nevada won't stand for the threat that shipping and storing highly toxic and cancer-causing material could pose to public health and safety.

State officials worry that an accident could permanently harm a Las Vegas area home to 2.2 million permanent residents and host to more than 40 million tourists a year.

The lawsuit, filed Friday in U.S. District Court in

Reno, accuses the Energy Department of failing to properly study environmental threats posed by moving about 2,200 pounds (1 metric ton) of weapons-grade plutonium from the federal Savannah River nuclear weapons refining complex in South Carolina to Nevada by New Year's Day 2020.

The plutonium has been designated for national security use and is not waste, National Nuclear Security Administration and Energy Department spokesman Gregory Wolf said in a statement that noted the government is responding to a deadline set by a federal judge in South Carolina.

The material will be "temporarily staged" at the Nevada National Security Site and the government's Pantex Plant in Texas, two facilities that already handle and process plutonium, before eventually being sent to the Los Alamos National Laboratory in New Mexico "or another facility," the statement said.

"Because this is now a

matter in litigation, NNSA will be unable to respond to questions or provide further information," it said.

In a final letter to Sandoval on Nov. 20, the Energy Department said it expects to move the material from Nevada to New Mexico "by the 2026-2027 timeframe," according to the lawsuit. The court filing accused federal officials of providing "none of the assurances Nevada requested."

Robert Halstead, head of the Nevada Agency for Nuclear Projects and the top state official fighting the proposal, expressed concern the material would end up permanently stored less than 100 miles from Las Vegas, and said he wasn't sure shipment hadn't already begun.

The Energy Department is on the hook to move 34 metric tons (nearly 75,000 pounds) of material, Halstead said. He expressed concern that after the first truckloads make the nearly 3,200-mile (5,150-kilometers) trip to Nevada, hundreds more would follow.

4 charged in Panama Papers investigation

NEW YORK — Federal authorities announced a raft of conspiracy and tax fraud charges Tuesday against four men in the first U.S. prosecution related to the so-called Panama Papers.

The 11-count indictment unsealed in Manhattan stems from what prosecutors described as an "intercontinental money laundering scheme" involving a global law firm based in Panama.

Two Germans, one American and a Panamanian attorney were charged with conspiracy and other counts.

The Panama Papers include a collection of 11 million secret financial documents that illustrated how some of the world's richest people hide their money. The records were first leaked to the *Suddeutsche Zeitung*, a major German newspaper, and were shared with the International Consortium of Investigative Journalists, which began publishing collaborative reports with news organizations in 2016.

The repercussions of the leaks were far-ranging, prompting the resignation of the prime minister of Iceland and bringing scrutiny to the leaders of Argentina and Ukraine,

Chinese politicians and Russian President Vladimir Putin, among others.

Federal prosecutors say the law firm Mossack Fonseca conspired to circumvent U.S. laws to maintain the wealth of its clients and conceal tax dollars owed to the IRS. They say the scheme dates to 2000 and involved sham foundations and shell companies in Panama, Hong Kong and the British Virgin Islands.

U.S. Attorney Geoffrey Berman said the defendants "shuffled millions of dollars through offshore accounts" and had "a playbook to repatriate un-taxed money into the U.S. banking system."

Teen who killed parents sentenced to 40 years

AUGUSTA, Maine (AP) — A teenager who told authorities she "snapped" and killed her parents while struggling with gender identity and acceptance was sentenced Tuesday to 40 years in prison.

Andrea Balcer, who was 17 at the time of the fatal stabbings, asked for forgiveness from her remaining family members, many of whom had called for the maximum penalty. Her attorney argued that

the teenager was dealing with her transition from male to female in isolation and without family support at the time of the killings. She had no criminal record before the violence early on Oct. 31, 2016, in the family's Winthrop home.

Family and friends disputed the notion that the parents, Alice and Antonio Balcer, were anything less than loving and supportive to Andrea and Christopher. Balcer, now 20, looked

down, wiped away tears and took notes while friends and family testified about the pain caused by the deaths. They said the couple, who were both 47 when they died, was widely regarded as caring people.

Carl Pierce, Alice's brother, said the suggestion that gender identity, abuse or lack of family support played a role was an "insult to our family, an insult to our society and an insult to the LGBTQ community."

Minnesota grain elevator manager charged with mail fraud, stealing nearly \$5 million

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — The former manager of a western Minnesota grain elevator who disappeared after allegedly stealing nearly \$5 million is charged in federal court with mail fraud.

Jerry Hennessey, 56, of Dalton surrendered and made his initial court appearance Tuesday, according to the U.S. Attorney's office.

The criminal complaint and a law enforcement affidavit said

Hennessey defrauded the Ashby Farmers' Co-Operative Elevator Co. in Ashby, Minnesota, for 15 years, from 2003 through at least September 2018. He allegedly spent the money on exotic hunting safaris, taxidermy, outdoor gear and credit card debt, the *Star Tribune* reported.

Hennessey managed the elevator for nearly 30 years. He already faces a lawsuit in state court accusing him of stealing

more than \$4.9 million from the business.

In September, the co-op contacted authorities about payments Hennessey made to himself or for his personal expenses. When the co-op asked to meet with Hennessey, he didn't show up and instead met a friend who drove him to Des Moines, Iowa.

Hennessey's friends told investigators he told them he had

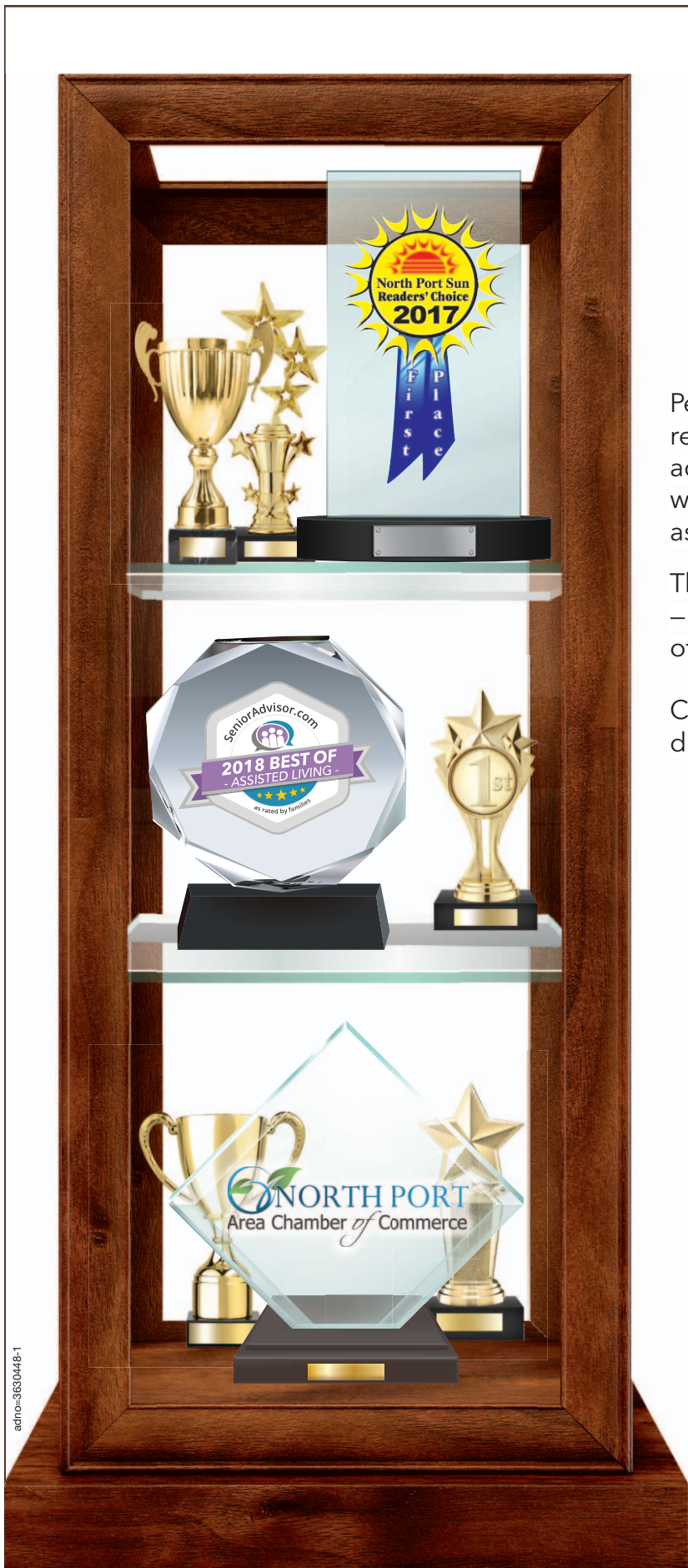
taken money from his employer and was in trouble.

According to the affidavit, the co-op discovered multiple checks written by Hennessey to himself for over \$40,000, including a check for \$135,000. Hennessey coded his allegedly fraudulent checks as purchases of corn, soybeans and wheat for the co-op, according to court documents.

Among the payments in question included over \$1 million to

Hennessey's personal credit card and hundreds of thousands of dollars for hunting trips, including international big game hunting safaris, and taxidermy services, the affidavit said.

In January 2017, Hennessey mailed a check for more than \$34,000 from the co-op's account for a partial payment toward the purchase of hunting property in Minnesota's Kanabec County, according to the court filing.

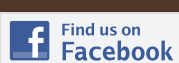

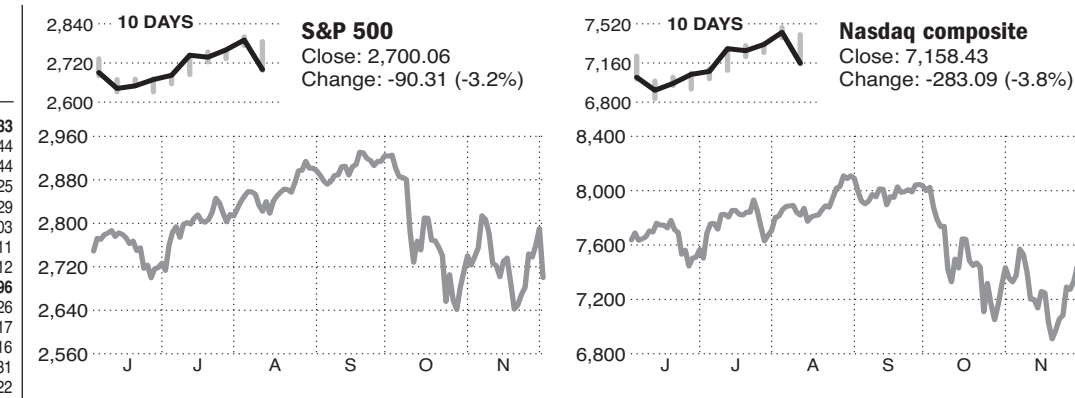

In a time when artificial gadgetry seems to dominate most expert auctions, it's a pleasure to see an auction based purely on bridge logic. North in today's deal was the late Sydney Lazard, a Hall of Famer, playing with his regular partner, Bart Bramley.

Many non-expert players would open the North hand with a bid of two clubs. It's a way to "start the party" and inform partner that good times are about to roll. Experts will not open distributional hands with a two-club bid unless the high-card strength is overwhelming. Describing a distributional hand is even more difficult when you start with an artificial bid at the two level.

Lazard might have bid four hearts at his second turn, but he thought he was too strong for that bid after Bramley's two-level response. Slam chances were significant. The delicate four-diamond bid brought a somewhat timid preference from Bramley, but Bramley couldn't know that his side had an eight-card fit, much less nine. The four-heart bid gave Lazard confidence that his heart suit was solid, and he tried a four-spade cue bid. Bramley wanted to accept the slam try, but he didn't know which suit to play in. He jumped to six clubs to emphasize his club strength. Lazard recognized that his king of clubs was golden, so he jumped to the grand slam in hearts. Bramley was certain that his partner held long, solid hearts, plus a minor suit king, so he converted to seven no trump and the top spot was reached. A well-bid hand!

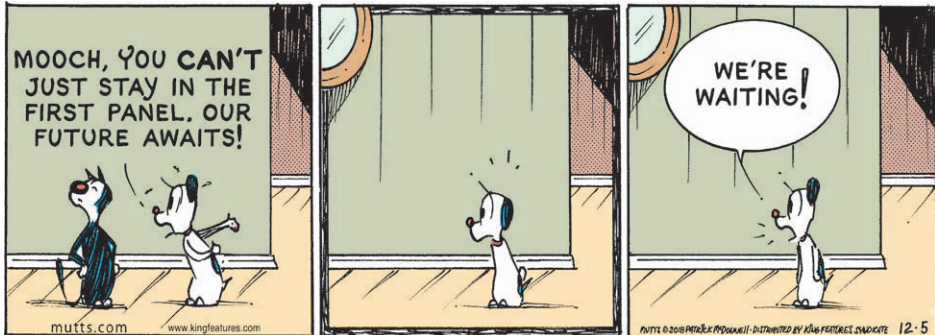

flag-draped casket holding the remains of his father. Their twin daughters, Jenna and Barbara, followed. Jeb Bush and his wife joined along with about a dozen other members of the Bush family. They mingled for about 10 minutes, at one point George W. Bush held up a baby.

Although President Donald Trump will attend Bush's national funeral service Wednesday, he is not among the eulogists announced by the Bush family, a list that includes George W. Bush. The others are Alan Simpson, the former senator and acerbic wit from Wyoming; Brian Mulrone, the former Canadian prime minister who also gave a eulogy for Ronald Reagan; and presidential historian Jon Meacham.

People lined up before dawn to pay respects to the 41st president, a son and father of privilege now celebrated by everyday citizens for his common courtesies and depth of experience.

Inside the Capitol, Sully, the 2-year-old Labrador retriever assigned to Bush, sat by the casket in the company of people who came to commemorate Bush's signing of the Americans with Disabilities Act, the 1990 law that, among its many provisions, required businesses that prohibit pets to give access to service dogs.

"After Mrs. Bush's death, general companionship was a big part of Sully's job," John Miller, president and CEO of

America's VetDogs, said in a phone interview. "One of the things that I think was important to the president was the rest command, where Sully would rest his head on the president's lap."

The law was just one point of intersection for Bush and Dole, now 95, who was one of its leading advocates in the Senate.

They were fellow World War II veterans, Republican Party leaders, fierce rivals for the 1988 Republican presidential nomination won by Bush

("Stop lying about my record," Dole snapped at Bush) and skilled negotiators. Dole, an Army veteran hit by German machine gunfire in Italy, has gone through life with a disabled right arm. Bush, a Navy pilot, survived a bail-out from his stricken aircraft over the Pacific and an earlier crash landing.

On Tuesday Dole was helped out of his wheelchair by an aide, slowly steadied himself and saluted Bush with his left hand, his chin quivering.

Dignitaries had come forward on Monday, too, to honor the Texan whose service to his country extended three quarters of a century, from World War II through his final years as an advocate for volunteerism and relief for people displaced by natural disaster. Bush, 94, died Friday.

In an invocation opening Monday evening's ceremony, the U.S. House chaplain, the Rev. Patrick J. Conroy, praised Bush's commitment to public service, from Navy pilot to congressman, U.N.

ambassador, envoy to China and then CIA director before being elected vice president and then president.

"Here lies a great man," said Rep. Paul Ryan, the House speaker, and "a gentle soul. ... His legacy is grace perfected."

After services in Washington, Bush's remains will be returned to Houston to lie in repose at St. Martin's Episcopal Church before burial Thursday at his family plot on the presidential library grounds at Texas A&M University in College Station. His final resting place will be alongside Barbara Bush, his wife of 73 years who died in April, and Robin Bush, the daughter they lost to leukemia in 1953 at age 3.

Trump has ordered the federal government closed Wednesday for a national day of mourning. Flags on public buildings are flying at half-staff for 30 days.

Bush's death reduces membership in the ex-presidents' club to four: Jimmy Carter, Bill Clinton, George W. Bush and Barack Obama.

of Democrats' emails is still fresh in the minds of many political operatives and lawmakers, who have stepped up defensive measures but still struggle to protect themselves.

Foreign spies routinely try to hack into politicians' emails to gain insight, ferret out weaknesses and win a diplomatic edge. But hackers often launch sweeping spear-phishing campaigns to gain access to a variety of accounts — with

no political motivation. With no immediate suspects and few technical details, it's unclear what the significance of this latest incursion is.

In August, the Democratic National Committee thought it had thwarted an attempt to break into its massive voter database — but the effort turned out to be unauthorized test that mimicked what an attack would look like.

CrowdStrike, a California-based cybersecurity company, said Tuesday the NRCC asked the company

in April to "perform an investigation related to unauthorized access" to the committee's emails. Before that, the company had been helping the committee protect its internal corporate network, which wasn't compromised.

"The cybersecurity of the committee's data is paramount, and upon learning of the intrusion, the NRCC immediately launched an internal investigation and notified the FBI, which is now investigating the matter," the committee said in a statement. The hack was first reported by Politico.

had access only to state-run email accounts on their phones.

The Cuban government has been building a 3G network in cities across the island and some tourists, Cuban government officials and foreign businesspeople have had access to it for several years.

The communist-governed island has one of the world's lowest rates of internet use but that has

been expanding rapidly since Presidents Barack Obama and Raul Castro declared detente in 2014. Expansion has not slowed with President Donald Trump's partial rollback of relations.

Cuba authorized home internet in 2017 and hundreds of public Wi-Fi connection points have opened in parks and plazas around the country.

The new service will cost about 10 cents per megabyte, with packages ranging from 600 megabytes for about \$7 to four gigabytes for about \$30.

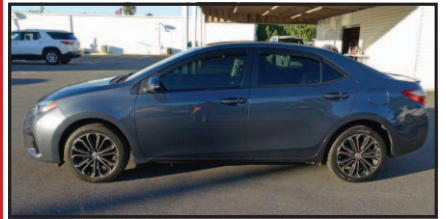

Ohio State coach Urban Meyer to retire after Rose Bowl

COLUMBUS, Ohio — Ohio State coach Urban Meyer abruptly announced his retirement Tuesday, citing health concerns and a difficult year that included a three-game suspension over his handling of domestic violence allegations against a now-fired assistant coach. He will step down after the Rose Bowl on Jan. 1.

Meyer is leaving at the top of his profession after

three national championships in a career spanning three decades, the last seven years at Ohio State, where he has an 82-9 record. The 54-year-old Meyer has an arachnoid cyst in his brain that causes severe headaches, and he had shown obvious effects of being in pain on the sideline this season.

At a packed news conference, Meyer explained that the headaches became severe last season during Ohio State's game at Penn State and have become a

persistent problem this season. But he didn't blame only his health for stepping away. Meyer said he believed he could no longer coach the way he has from the early days at Bowling Green to Utah, Florida and, finally, with the Buckeyes.

"The style of coaching I've done for 33 years is very intense, very demanding. I tried to delegate more and CEO more and the product started to feel ...," he said, not finishing his thought. "I didn't feel I was doing right by our players

and by Gene (Smith, the athletic director)."

Meyer said leaving would have been more difficult if the program wasn't healthy. The Buckeyes are 12-1 after winning the Big Ten championship and Meyer said he felt good about his replacement: Assistant coach Ryan Day will take over as the 25th coach of the storied program where Meyer won a national title in 2014 after two at Florida (2006, 2008).

As the rain got harder, Venice only seemed to get better. Krause scored twice in a two-minute stretch to make it 7-1, Megan Blevins scored moments later, and Dalton finally ended the game on a penalty kick past Charlotte goalkeeper Eva Le.

"We were disappointed to have that goal scored on us. We had five straight shutouts. But we finished, and we had some girls get in for some playing time," said Venice coach Gary Bolyard. "We're very young, but the coaching staff has faith in every player on the team. We'll put anybody in at any time, and our coaches get our girls ready to play."

Saints can score, but their defense has been surprisingly stout

TAMPA — The strength of the Saints' offense is well known — its 34.9 points per game are tied for second most in the NFL — but going into the division rematch with the Bucs, New Orleans' defense has been surprisingly stout.

The Bucs handed the Saints a 48-40 loss in Week 1. New Orleans then won 10 straight before losing to Dallas last week, and while its reputation is still one of a dangerous offense

anchored by quarterback Drew Brees, Bucs coach Dirk Koetter said he's been impressed with the the Saints on the defensive side of the ball.

Koetter noted that New Orleans owns the top rush defense in the league, allowing just 75.4 ground yards per game.

"I haven't been following them that much, I guess; I probably wouldn't have guessed that," he said. "You don't win 10 straight in this league if you're not pretty good."

And while the Bucs' defensive resurgence

has been anchored by a defensive line that has produced 15 sacks over the past four games, tied for second most in the league, Koetter noted that the only team that has more in that span is New Orleans with 20.

Saints defensive end Cameron Jordan has five sacks over his past four games, one of three New Orleans defensive linemen to record at least three sacks over the past four games. Defensive tackle Sheldon Rankins and David Onyemata each have three sacks.

And the Saints have

not allowed a 100-yard rusher all season. They've allowed 100 total rushing yards just three times this season.

But interesting enough, the Bucs' 112 rushing yards against the Saints in Week 1 are the most New Orleans has allowed in a game this season. In that game, running back Peyton Barber ran for 69 yards on 19 carries and quarterback Ryan Fitzpatrick netted 36 yards on 12 carries.

Why it was special for Rahm to beat his hero, Tiger

NASSAU, Bahamas — Three victories in three countries against fields large and small, strong and weak, couldn't make Jon Rahm's year any better. Nothing could top one win that offered no money, no world ranking points or even a trophy to call his own.

He beat Tiger Woods in the Ryder Cup.

"I don't think there's anything I can do in the game anytime soon that's going to mean more than that," Rahm said.

When he spoke late Sunday afternoon after a four-shot victory in the Bahamas, the Masters was still 130 days away. That's the next major, and majors are the greatest achievement for any player. Rahm is no exception.

But yes, that Ryder Cup was special.

If his tears that Sunday at Le Golf National didn't show that, Rahm spoke for just over 4 minutes and used 638 words to explain.

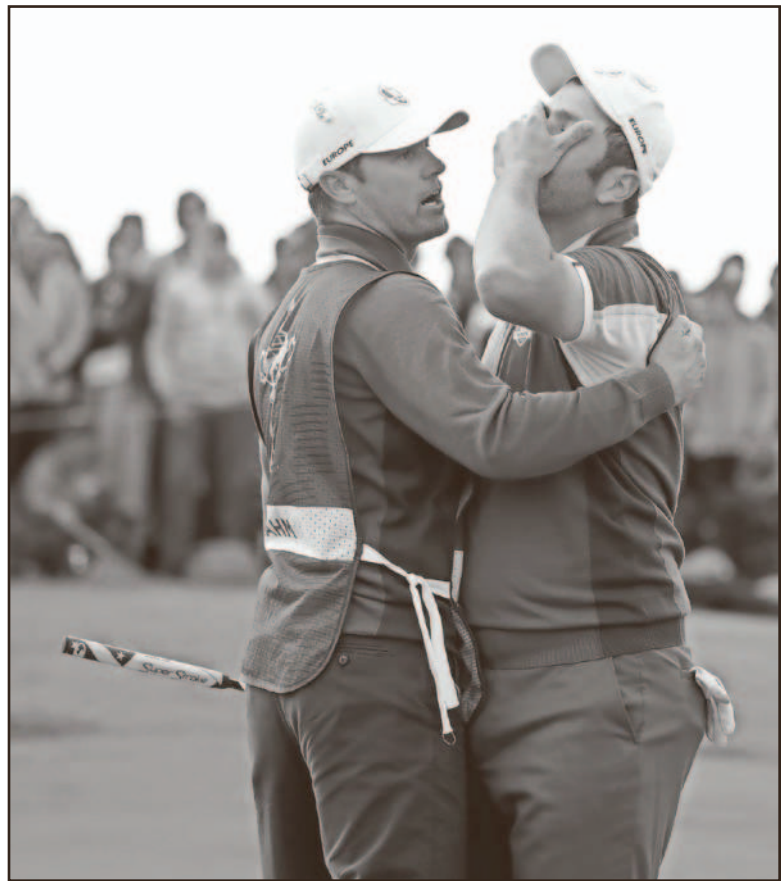
His year ended with Woods presenting him the trophy from the Hero World Challenge, but really that was the start of his story. As they looked at the trophy, where Woods' name first shows up in 2001, Rahm said Woods asked, "How old were you?"

Rahm was 7.

"I saw him win a great deal of events, grew up with a dream of someday beating him, and to do it on the Sunday or a Ryder Cup ... it was extremely special," he said.

Seve Ballesteros inspired him, and still does. Woods motivated the 24-year-old Spaniard, as he did for so many other young players from Rahm's generation. He studied Woods, including a recent documentary for the British Open that helped on Sunday at Albany.

"He said once he got in the lead, his goal was to

never go back to the field, to have the field catch him," Rahm said.

That wasn't the only film Rahm had watched.

He says he probably has seen every video on Woods and Ballesteros that can be found on the internet. And that's probably how his fiancée learned the game.

"She had no idea about golf, and I would just get the laptop and make her watch all the highlights of Tiger," Rahm said. "I've seen Tiger's final round at Pebble in 2000 about 150 times."

And that brings him to Saturday night outside Paris.

Europe had a 10-6 lead with Rahm contributing a point in his first Ryder Cup. "Kind of felt like I was letting the team down," he said. Rahm knew he would be in the No. 4 spot for Europe, and then the U.S. lineup was revealed. He was expecting to see Woods toward the back because that's where he had been the last two times he played, at No. 8 in Wales and No. 12 at Medinah.

This time, Woods was at No. 4 against Rahm.

"I'm like, 'Great.' To me, the greatest golfer of all time that I've been able to see, he just won at East Lake, he's 0-3, I was 0-2. I'm like, 'He really wants to win this, for sure, and I'm not playing my best.' So that was my first train of thought," Rahm said.

He spent time that night and the next morning talking to his mental coach, European captain Thomas Bjorn and Tommy Fleetwood, who

had experience playing Woods, including all three of Woods' losses that week. He thought about a strategy, which turned out to be the easy part. Woods doesn't make a lot of mistakes, so the Ryder Cup rookie better be close to flawless.

The gallery was the largest on the course, and not because Rahm was playing.

Turns out it was Woods who made the mistakes, with bogeys on the 13th and 14th holes to fall 2 down. Rahm missed a short putt on the 16th hole, giving him a 1-up lead with two to play. He responded with a shot into 5 feet on the 17th and a chance to close out his golfing idol.

Rahm never lacks for emotions, and by now they were raging.

His grandfather died on the Sunday of the PGA Championship and was on his mind. As he settled over the putt, he heard a Spanish voice in

the gallery yell, "Do it for Seve!" Rahm could picture both of them watching and thought to himself, "There's no way them two are going to allow me to miss the putt."

He dropped his putter and lost his mind when the putt went in.

"It's all that feeling, right?" Rahm said. "I tried to stay as balanced as possible, I never got mad, even after missing the putt on 16. Making the putt to beat Tiger Woods, my all-time hero ... man, it was hard."

He was screaming and hugging and forgot for a moment that Woods had walked across the green to congratulate him.

"He came to me with a smile," Rahm said. "He said, 'Man, don't even worry, you played great.' And I started crying in front of Tiger. It was such an emotional moment."

That's how much it meant to him, because that's how much Woods means to him.

Venice fends off Charlotte for narrow win

The Venice boys soccer team escaped with a 1-0 win over Charlotte on Tuesday night, but the deficit could have been much larger between the Indians and Tarpons.

The Indians made it difficult for the Tarpons to shoot, let alone score, as Venice used a first-half goal by Caleb Davis in the 10th minute to hold on for the win.

NHL: Seattle expansion

Fans abuzz after NHL awards its 32nd franchise to Seattle

SEATTLE — John Barr understood it was likely a foregone conclusion and yet as NHL Commissioner Gary Bettman spoke nearly 3,000 miles away, he found himself getting emotional watching the televisions in the packed bar.

Barr was among fans watching Tuesday morning as Seattle was awarded an NHL expansion franchise following a unanimous vote by the Board of Governors in Sea Island, Georgia, ending a lengthy dance between the league and the city that will finally see professional hockey return to the city. Seattle was the first U.S. city to win the Stanley Cup back in 1917. More than 100

years later, they'll have that chance again.

"I was always optimistic but I didn't think it was ever a guarantee. Might have got a little watery eyed there," said Barr, who has headed up the NHLtoSeattle.com website and been a voice for hockey fans in Seattle. "It's been a long haul and there's been some ups and downs but I think the wait is worth it."

The Seattle ownership group organized the watch party as a central gathering spot to celebrate the announcement and hand out swag a short distance from the Seattle Center, where the yet-to-be named team will begin play in a reconstructed Seattle Center Arena in 2021.

"Is there a better hockey morning than

this morning in Seattle?" said Mayor Jenny Durkan, who took a little of the suspense out of Bettman's announcement by revealing the outcome of the vote about 10 minutes early. "This is just a great thing for Seattle and I'm so honored to be part of it."

Dave Tippett, an adviser for the ownership group who had a front row seat for all the behind the scenes work that went into the pitch to the NHL, joined the fans in Seattle while his bosses were in Georgia.

"It's been coming a long time. The turning point for me, and this was before I was involved, was watching the season tickets go on sale and in 10 minutes sold 12,000 tickets," Tippett said. "We knew there was an

unbelievable following here so it's been fun to get to know people here and get to experience some of the excitement of bringing a team here."

For now, the NHL will serve to satisfy Seattle's winter sports itch that's existed since the SuperSonics left for Oklahoma City in 2008. There's also hope that the rebuilt arena and the foundation being laid by the NHL's 32nd franchise will help bring the NBA back.

If there was a tinge of disappointment, it came with the decision that the team won't start until the 2021-22 season.

The initial was hope for a 2020 start, but arena renovations may not be done in time. As it stands, team President Tod Leiweke said the hope is

the building will open in the first quarter of 2021. The first team to call the facility home will likely be the WNBA's Seattle Storm, before the NHL team begins in the fall.

"I've been at this eight

years so it's going to be another two years for 2020, another one for 2021, I can do it," Barr said. "They have all the information. I think it's the right call. We want to launch this right."

"Maybe I'll have the team send an icepack," Wade said. "I actually know him, I'm a fan of his and we've met before, but I didn't know I hit him."

It's not the first time Wade has dived into the stands after a ball. He's

done it several times over the years, and his leap on Sunday was a product of not being able to stop as quickly as he once could, he said. Barkov saw him coming and got his hands up to cover his face just in time.

"I tried my best to clear people," Wade said. "That's the worst to have someone flying at you, some (size) 14½s and everything slinging at your face. But he took it. I'm sure

he's been hit worse."

Barkov said he would like to see Wade at a Panthers game this season. The Panthers play about a 45-minute drive north of the arena where the Heat play.

Barkov predicted Wade would get a standing ovation from Panthers' fans and said he wouldn't let boards stop him from trying to see Wade during that game.

"I'll try my best to fly over him," Barkov said.

From Greg Hardy to Mychal Kendricks to Reuben Foster, the NFL has taken different approaches on a case-by-case basis when players misbehave. That has drawn a backlash from critics who see such action as erratic and, at times, pandering to public perception.

Hunt, the former Kansas City running back, was placed on the commissioner's exempt list Friday after TMZ released a video showing him pushing and kicking a

woman during a February scuffle at a Cleveland hotel. The video's jolt across the sports world accelerated a case that had been, in effect, put on the backburner for both the club and the league, with Hunt losing his job the same day — a steep fall for an elite playmaker for one of the most explosive offenses in football.

The Chiefs said Hunt had lied to them about the scuffle, an assertion Hunt acknowledged in an interview with ESPN on Sunday. But authorities never charged Hunt with a crime and the league's internal investigation — under guidance implemented after the lengthy legal saga involving the former Ravens running back Rice — stalled when NFL officials couldn't get in touch with the woman.

Hunt said he never saw the video until it was released publicly. And he said the league never asked to speak with him directly.

NFL officials say they tried several times to get video of the confrontation but couldn't because the hotel said its corporate policy only allowed footage to be given to law enforcement. And Cleveland police say they didn't pursue the video because it wasn't a felony case.

Now, the NFL says it will make "further attempts to speak to the complainants involved in the incident," and have "further conversations with all parties involved."

Just as it did during the Rice case in 2014, the NFL is changing its reaction amid jarring video, prompting new public outcry.

But the league also must conform to the collective bargaining agreement, which gives players certain protections through their union. Still, the agreement grants Commissioner Roger Goodell ultimate authority to issue

punishment. That has been a major point of contention for the NFL Players Association and is shaping up to be a major sticking point once the broader agreement expires in 2021.

NFL and NFLPA officials did not respond to messages seeking comment from The Associated Press.

Hunt cleared waivers on Monday and could sign with another team. He can't play while he's on the exempt list, but it's up to Goodell and league officials to decide when to take him off when — or if — they see fit.

Foster was claimed off waivers by the Washington Redskins last week after the San Francisco 49ers released the linebacker following a domestic violence arrest. Washington faced immediate criticism as the latest example of an organization looking past off-field troubles

toward potential on-field production.

Hardy was convicted in July 2014 of assaulting and threatening a woman who contended the 6-foot-4, 275-pound player threw her in a bathtub and onto a sofa covered with guns before threatening to kill her.

He appealed the ruling and was allowed to play the first game of the season before the

Carolina Panthers placed him on the exempt list.

Hardy didn't play the rest of the season but signed an incentive-laden, \$13.1 million deal with the Cowboys and played 12 games in 2015 after serving a four-game suspension.

He's been out of the league the last three years, focusing on a mixed martial arts career with the UFC.

Oklahoma QB Murray's 2-sport persistence pays off

NORMAN, Okla. — Oklahoma's Kyler Murray pulled off an impressive triple play during a brutal 30-hour stretch in April.

On a Friday night, he played center field for the Sooners' baseball team. The next day, he played quarterback in the football team's spring game. After that, he played another baseball game Saturday night.

It was a mental and physical grind for Murray, but his dedication to both sports has paid off. Two months later, the Oakland A's selected him in the first round of the Major League Baseball draft. He chose to continue playing football, and after posting one of the most impressive statistical seasons in FBS history, he was named a Heisman Trophy finalist on Monday.

Murray easily could have quit football after being drafted, but his reason for returning offers a window into his mentality. After a disappointing freshman season at Texas A&M in 2015, he transferred to Oklahoma. He sat out a year because of transfer rules, then waited last season behind Heisman winner Baker Mayfield. Murray's sudden rise in baseball left him facing the possibility that his last significant football memories would come from the rough year at Texas A&M.

He wasn't having it. "I've been playing this game my whole life," he said. "To leave this game with a bad taste in my mouth after my freshman year at A&M is just not who I am. I've worked my whole life for this, and we're here. So for me, leaving after getting drafted was never an option. And they (the A's) knew that. They gave me the opportunity to do what

I'm doing. I'm thankful.

"For the people that say I'm crazy for doing it (coming back), it's (quitting) just not who I am. I've played this game since I was 4 years old. I love this game, and I couldn't go out like that."

Instead, he goes out with a 205.7 passer efficiency rating, which would be an FBS record. He has rushed for 892 yards to lead the fourth-ranked Sooners to a Big 12 title and a College Football Playoff meeting with Alabama.

Murray's decision to return and play football gave Oklahoma a rare athlete who excels in football and another sport. Kirk Gibson was a star receiver at Michigan State and a first-round draft pick in baseball who famously helped the Los Angeles Dodgers win the 1988 World Series. Florida State cornerback Deion Sanders is a Pro Football Hall of Famer who also played in the

majors. Florida State quarterback Charlie Ward won the Heisman in 1993 before enjoying an 11-year NBA career.

But the comparison most often made is to Bo Jackson, the Auburn running back who won the Heisman in 1985 and eventually played in the NFL and was an MLB All-Star. Murray and Oklahoma even revisited the famed Jackson photo with the baseball bat and shoulder pads and did a "Kyler Knows" video that included famous Oklahomans, similar to the "Bo Knows" Nike campaign.

Oklahoma baseball coach Skip Johnson said it took a lot of cooperation between the football and baseball staffs to help Murray elevate his game to elite levels in both sports.

"It's pretty rare what he's done in football and baseball, especially in our world today of select baseball — you're either going to play select baseball or football, and

in football, they won't let you do baseball," Johnson said. "You have to make the choice."

Murray is a junior who would be eligible to play football next year, but he has said multiple times that he plans to focus strictly on baseball after this season. He didn't want to think about the end of his

football career.

"I'm not really focused on that," he said. "If I was, I think that would take away from some of the great things that are happening, and I don't think I'd be all in it right now if I was thinking about that stuff. It's something I obviously have to think about. It's coming up pretty quick."

No. 2 Clemson dominates AP All-ACC team again with 11 Tigers

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — No. 2 Clemson once again dominated the Associated Press All-Atlantic Coast Conference teams and individual awards released Tuesday.

The four-time defending league champions placed 11 players on the two teams as selected by a panel of 14 sports writers who cover the conference.

Five Tigers made the first team, and four were unanimous picks. Offensive tackle Mitch Hyatt was a unanimous pick for the second straight year.

Clemson nearly swept the individual awards. Running back Travis Etienne was picked as the offensive player of the year, defensive end Clelin Ferrell was the defensive player of the year, quarterback Trevor Lawrence was voted the newcomer of the year and coach Dabo Swinney shared the coach of the year award with Syracuse's Dino Babers.

Etienne and Ferrell also were unanimous selections to the first team along with Tigers defensive tackle Christian Wilkins.

Clemson earned its

fourth straight berth in the College Football Playoff a day after beating Pittsburgh in the ACC title game.

Etienne led the ACC with 1,463 yards rushing and 21 touchdowns while Ferrell had a league-best 10.5 sacks.

Babers led Syracuse, the preseason last-place pick in the Atlantic Division, to a 9-3 record, a second-place finish in the division and a berth in the Camping World Bowl.

WASHINGTON — Washington Redskins coach Jay Gruden says the team "talked about and discussed" bringing in quarterback Colin Kaepernick for a tryout "but we will probably go in a different direction." "I think we got to get a lot better, defensively," said Massolio. "With length and athleticism we can force some bad shots but we got to get a lot better there."

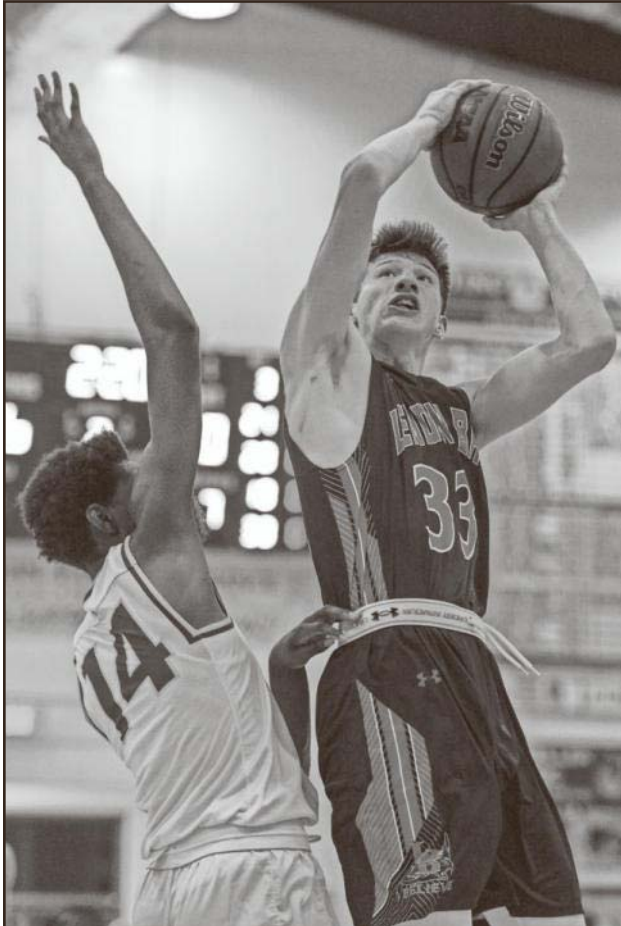

to someone who could make it stronger," Meyer said.

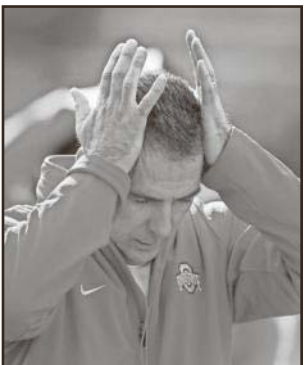
It was Day who led the Buckeyes when Meyer was suspended before the season opener over his role in the handling of assistant coach Zach Smith, who was accused by his ex-wife of domestic abuse.

Meyer said he knew about the allegations against Smith — grandson of former Ohio State coach Earle Bruce — but wasn't sure they were true and kept Smith on staff because no criminal charges were filed. The university cited that lapse in suspending Meyer after an investigation.

A report issued by an investigative committee left a lasting stain, detailing behavior by Meyer that could have taken down a coach of lesser stature. The investigation showed he tolerated bad behavior for years from Smith, including domestic-violence accusations, drug addiction, lies and other acts that directly clash with the values Meyer touts publicly.

Meyer acknowledged the investigation was among the reasons for stepping down — "the decision was the result of cumulative events" — and he was asked if the suspension will affect his legacy.

"I'm sure it will," he said.

"I can lie to you and say it is not important to me."

The announcement came as the Buckeyes begin preparations for the bowl game against Washington and less than three weeks before schools can sign a fresh batch of recruits. Meyer said his decision had to come before the early signing period opens Dec. 19.

Former players were full of praise for Meyer.

"Besides my parents, you were one of the most influential people to touch my life and I'm appreciative of that," former Buckeyes linebacker Joshua Perry wrote on Twitter.

The Buckeyes' strong finish this season belied on-the-field problems that made for a stressful season for Meyer and his staff. He lost star defensive end Nick Bosa to an early season-ending injury, and the defense never fully recovered.

The team alternated expected blowout wins with puzzling play that included a pair of one-point wins (Penn State, Maryland) and a closer-than-expected win over a struggling Nebraska team. A startling blowout loss at unranked Purdue on Oct. 20 pushed Ohio State to the fringe of the national championship chase and prompted questions about Meyer's future and he was forced to address speculation that he would step down at the end of the season.

"I plan on coaching," he said on Oct. 29. Asked if he would definitely return to Ohio State next year, he answered, "Yes."

Ohio State followed that with five straight wins, including a rout of archrival Michigan that gave the Buckeyes another division title and then pulled away for an easy win over Northwestern in the Big Ten Championship.

Ohio State will now turn to Day, a second-year Ohio State assistant who had never before been a head coach before he stepped in during Meyers' suspension.

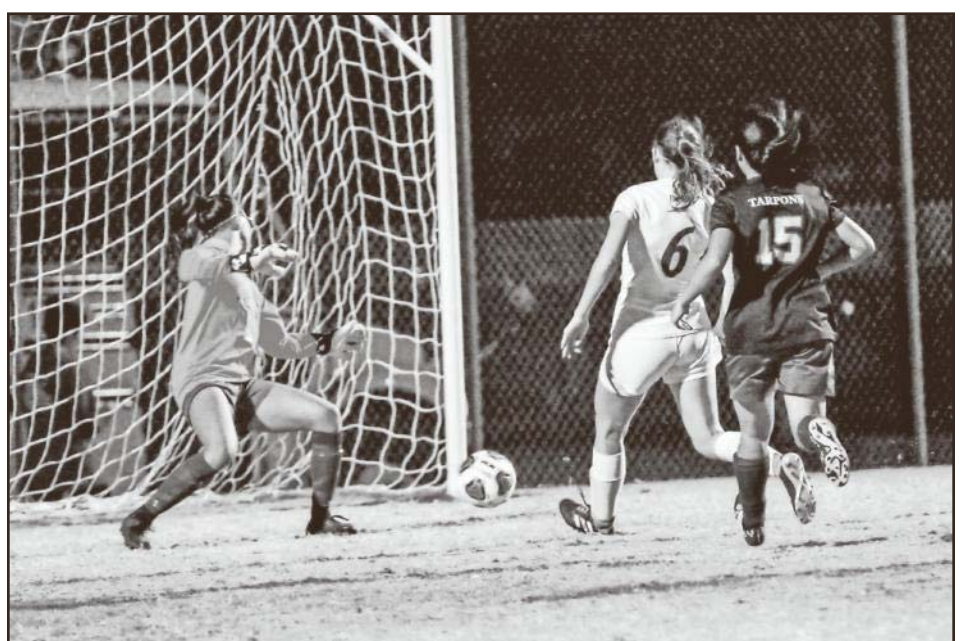
