Lopez's dedication to work was shown by her winning the Teller of the Year award for SunTrust several years ago. She made an impression on customers who appreciated her willingness to serve them and help them with their banking needs.

Lopez, 55, was married to Victor Lopez-Diaz since 1992, according to Victor's Facebook post. The couple had two children, Kiara and Victor Lopez, and list Lake Placid as their hometown.

Theresa Rhodes taught Kiara and Victor Lopez

## Remembering Ana Pinon-Williams

SEBRING — Ana Pinon-Williams was a 38-year-old mother to seven children, a wife, a daughter, and a sister. She was cut down in the prime of her life. Williams was one of five women that were senselessly murdered Wednesday at the South Sebring SunTrust.

Williams was originally from Mexico and moved to Okeechobee where she met her husband. She was married for six years and had three biological children ages 19, 17 and 11. She also had four step-children ages 29, 24, 21 and 13.

Her brother-in-law, Tim Williams, spoke to the press Thursday afternoon. The family wanted to do things on their terms and waited to announce that she was a victim.

"Her life was truly a light in this world, she



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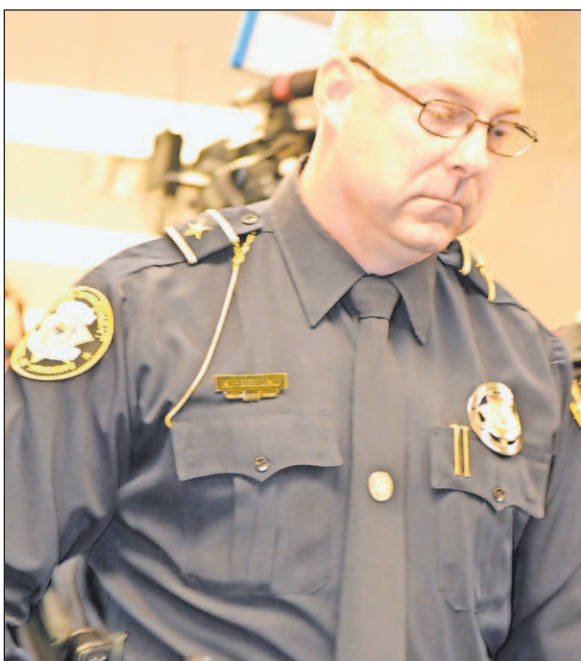

## Victims identified; officials pledge justice

### Hoglund: 'No apparent motive' in shooting

SEBRING — Officials on Thursday morning released the names of three of the five women shot and killed Wednesday at SunTrust Bank in Sebring's first mass shooting.

Cynthia Lee Watson, 65, was the only customer in the bank at that time. Marisol Lopez, 55, was one of the employees.

A second employee, Ana Pinon-Williams, age 38, was named at a press conference Thursday afternoon.

Families of the other

victims have requested that Sebring Police Chief Karl Hoglund not release their loved ones' names, in accordance with Marsy's Law.

"I'm going to honor their request," Hoglund said Thursday morning. "We've had additional requests that the victims be identified, from other families. I'm going to honor those requests, as well, to honor their loved ones' memories, to honor our citizens and to honor the people who call Sebring home."

Marsy's Law, passed as Amendment 6 last November, creates

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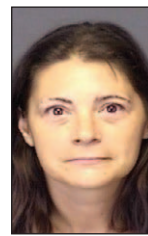
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# HCSO and SPD unite for reverse drug sting

SEBRING — On Friday, Jan. 18, at the corner of Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard and Lemon Avenue, a sheriff's deputy posed as a street-level drug dealer and allegedly sold faux narcotics to 10 people.

The Highlands County Sheriff's Special Operations Division and the Sebring Police Department joined forces to conduct a reverse sting operation.

“One of Sheriff [Paul] Blackman's top priorities is to try to eliminate the street-level drug trade, and this kind of operation is one way to do that,” Highlands County Sheriff's Office's Public

Information Officer Scott Dressel said. “The operation used cut up Alka-Seltzer tablets to resemble crack cocaine and oregano as fake marijuana.”

The following people were arrested and charged in the reverse drug sting:

- Karye Coleman, 57, of Sebring, solicitation to purchase cocaine and cannabis;
- Marcus Culverhouse, 31, of Sebring, solicitation to purchase cocaine and cannabis;
- Matias Mancebo, 25, of Sebring, solicitation to purchase cannabis, possession of cannabis under 20 grams, and possession of drug paraphernalia;
- Stanley Green, 53,

of Avon Park, solicitation to purchase cannabis;

- Stephanie Thompson, 21, of Sebring, possession of cannabis under 20 grams, and possession of drug paraphernalia;
- Alfredo Gonzalez, 52, of Sebring, solicitation to purchase cannabis, and tampering with physical evidence;
- Elizabeth Wortman, 38, of Sebring, solicitation to purchase cannabis;
- Gary Wortman, 57, of Sebring, solicitation to purchase cannabis;
- Javier Mota, 41, of Avon Park, solicitation to purchase cocaine;
- Sharry Smith, 27, of Sebring, possession of cannabis under 20 grams.

# Ray arrested for fraud and larceny

SEBRING — Stefanie Marie Ray, 29, of Lake Placid, was arrested on

multiple felony charges on Jan. 16 by deputies of the Highlands County Sheriff's Office. She will be facing defrauding of a financial institution, grand larceny of less than \$5,000, fraud by impersonating someone over 60 years old, larceny of a credit card, and passing a false bank check.

While the victim of the fraud and theft was in jail, deputies say that Ray was on the outside spending her money. After the victim was released from jail, she reported the theft.

Arrest records show



that on Aug. 28, 2018, Ray cashed a check at Amcscot for \$179.60. She allegedly transferred money from the victim's PayPal account for Walmart online for \$216.68; Hotels.com for \$215.20; \$9.99 for “DRVRSUPPORT;” Spotify was paid \$14.99 and Wish, \$382.

The victim showed fraudulent charges on at least two different credit cards. Bank of America reported \$400 in fraudulent charges. The arrest report showed numerous charges or attempted charges for gas, inmate

services, food, Google YouTube Premiums, gas and more from the end of Aug. 24 to mid-September 2018. By the end of August, the attempted charges began being declined.

Deputies got the victim's credit card number from her bank. They were able to see the charges from Walmart.com and Hotels.com.

According to the arrest report, Ray stayed a couple of days at the LaQuinta in Sebring. Hotel staff told deputies the person who stayed in

the room was smoking in it. The credit card the suspect gave to the hotel for incidentals was declined when the hotel staff tried to charge a \$250 fee on it. They tried to charge it for \$150 and it was still declined.

Hotel video showed a woman who was traveling with a U-Haul. The report said deputies could not

be 100 percent sure of the identity but it was consistent with the suspect.

ABC Liquor store cooperated with deputies by providing a surveillance video and a receipt for \$36.53 worth of Kahlua and tequila. The video showed the suspect, but she was signing the victim's name to the credit card slip.

Walmart was the target of the alleged fraud again for over \$70; this time there was a video and it caught the suspect on tape and using Walmart Pay.

Amcscot was taken for \$179.60 when Ray endorsed a check for that amount. The forged check said “dog walking” in the memo section.

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# Prayer vigils and counseling offer hope and healing

SEBRING — When a tragedy strikes a community like Wednesday's SunTrust bank shootings, healing has to start somewhere. For some, healing starts with solitude and reflection while others seek the comfort of friends and family, prayers and vigils.

In the wake of Wednesday's trauma, several churches and organizations have stepped up to offer support to the families, co-workers, and friends of the victims, as well as first responders and anyone who needs help in dealing with the senseless murders.

A public candlelight vigil will be held from

6-8 p.m. Sunday at Firemen's Field. Drug Free Highlands at 223 Pomegranate Ave. in Sebring has educational materials for first responders coping with stress, talking to youth who have been traumatized and helping communities cope with stress. The director said anyone can stop by the office for aromatherapy and food, or bring a lunch and chat, and some company on Friday.

Crossroads Recovery Center is available for any of those in need. They can be reached at 863-368-0482 for counseling with Andrea West or Corinne Adams.

Know someone who is in need of bereavement services stemming from the

senseless act at SunTrust bank? Call Cornerstone Hospice at 866-742-6655. Rachel Lovett, community liaison for Compassionate Care Hospice, has offered the assistance of her company. The office is at 2153 U.S. 27 South in Sebring and the phone number is 863-314-0166.

Sarah Harrisman, MA, is a Sebring native who has since moved, offered her counseling services at no charge by phone or video. She can be reached at 720-489-8555, ext. 113.

"I was born and raised in Sebring and am distraught over the tragedy that has recently befallen my beloved hometown. I am a Licensed Marriage and Family Therapy (licensed in Florida and

Colorado) and am certified in trauma focused therapy," Harrisman said. "I am currently residing in Colorado, however, I am able to provide teletherapy or video-therapy services to those in crisis (as is allowable according to Colorado statutes). This would still entail the completion of a few disclosure forms but I would like to offer these services at no cost to those affected by this recent traumatic event."

Florida Blue, in partnership with New Directions Behavioral Health, is offering a free grief counseling hotline to anyone in need of emotional support following the tragedy in Sebring this week. The hotline is open 24

hours a day to the entire community at no cost and will connect callers with a trained, caring professional who can provide assistance.

The 24-hour, toll-free help line is available by calling 1-833-848-1762,

and offers caring professionals trained to listen and offer support specific to what residents are going through. It's free regardless of whether callers have insurance and will be available as long as needed.

## Counseling after trauma is recommended

SEBRING — "I guess we're all just one phone call from our knees," Matt Kearney sings in his song, "Closer to Love." We go along through life expecting the status quo — wake, work, dinner, have some fun with the kids and do it again. We never think a phone call with bad news will interrupt our peaceful lives.

The families of five women got phone calls on Wednesday that brought them to their knees in grief. They were told they would never see their loved ones again. The grieving immediately begins but what about the healing?

According to Susan Gatzner-Snyder, counselor with the American Red Cross, help to support a grieving person can come from many different sources. Those include a friend's shoulder to cry on, a pastor, or a counselor.

"As long as there is trust, safety and compassion," Renee Janvier-Couto, also with the Red Cross, said. "Everyone needs to be kind to each other. This is such a tight-knit community, it's good to treat everyone kindly."

Gatzner-Snyder said that everyone's grieving process is different and there is no specific time assigned to the process.

"It is normal to be tearful and angry after an event such as this one," Gatzner-Snyder said. "Each individual is quite different in the amount of time it takes to heal.

When it gets to the point where somebody is feeling their sadness, their anger and inability to sleep, eat or function in a daily way that they did prior to the incident, that's the time when someone needs to reach out and get help."

Dr. David J. Romano of the American Red Cross said there is a good resource at APA.org called "Managing Your Stress in the Aftermath of a Shooting."

Romano says to talk to kids from the point of view that the children are "coming from."

"Your 5-year-old may end up looking like a 3-year-old. With children and adolescents, there tends to be a little regression," he said.

Red Cross counselor Catherine DeLeon said the regression may include bed wetting, sleeplessness and sucking their thumbs.

"The older kids can regress with other issues," she said. "Trouble sleeping, overeating, undereating, and a short temper. Sometimes difficulty getting up for school or not wanting to go to school."

The counselors recommend the school counselors and teachers be told of the child's trauma so they can be on the look out for any changes in behavior.

Romano said if children or adults are behaving differently, someone they trust should approach them.

The counselors said the biggest question they have been hearing is "why?" and the associated feelings of shock.

"The foundation of the community has been knocked off kilter," Romano said. "This is something that we normally don't have happen here. Regardless, it means people have to look at things a new way."

When people don't feel safe in their own community, they should use that to turn it into a positive, he said.

"People should ask themselves, 'What can I do to help the community reach its new [normal]?'"

## Marsy's Law offers rights to victims/families

SEBRING — Only three of the five bank shooting victims have been identified because a recently passed amendment to the Florida Constitution affords the right to prevent the disclosure of information related to victims and their families.

Voters approved Florida Amendment 6 in the November general election by a narrow margin as a supermajority vote of 60 percent is required to pass a constitutional amendment.

Florida Amendment 6 — the Marsy's Law Crime Victims Rights, Judicial Retirement Age and Judicial Interpretation of Laws and Rules Amendment — passed with 61.61 percent "yes" votes to 38.39 percent "no" votes.

The Amendment states: "The right to prevent the disclosure of information or records that could be used to locate or harass the victim or the victim's family or which could disclose confidential or privileged information of the victim."

It also specifies the right of the victim and victim's family to be informed of the court status of the accused.

Highlands County Tax Collector Eric Zwyer was among the state and local officials who endorsed the amendment.

"Victims rights and the families of victims and their right to be notified of the accused was important," Zwyer said Thursday.

"Obviously in the heinous and evil act like something that happened here in our county, especially with the number of lives lost and the families affected impacted by such tragedy, I think it is a great thing for them to be properly notified and the right to due process and treated the way they should be treated when it comes to the accused and their post conviction processes and everything leading up to the conviction."

There are many points to Marsy's Law, Zwyer said. "To me it seemed like the right thing to endorse and support, especially when it comes to the families of those victims."

The key is giving victim's families the right to privacy, he said.

"It is such a tragic event and our prayers go out to their families and it is

something that is going to take a long time for them to grieve," Zwyer said. "I think them being properly notified and being treated with the fairness, respect and dignity they deserve is important."

Marsy's Law is named after a California victim, Marsalee "Marsy" Nicholas, who was stalked and killed in 1983 by her ex-boyfriend.

Only a week after Marsy was murdered, her mother was confronted by Marsy's accused killer in the grocery store. She didn't know he had been released on bail.

Marsy's Law, the

California Victims' Bill of Rights Act of 2008, was approved by California voters as Proposition 33 in the November 2008 general election.

Other states have followed with similar amendments aimed at extending the rights of victims and their families.

The Florida Amendment also included the following: the right to due process and to be treated with fairness and respect for the victim's dignity; the right to be free from intimidation, harassment and abuse; and the right, within the judicial process, to be

reasonably protected from the accused and any person acting on behalf of the accused.

Marsy's Law for All is a public affairs organization that works to pass constitutional amendments that will provide equal rights for crime victims.

The organization's website that supported the passage of Amendment 6 noted many state and local officials endorsed Marsy's Law including then-Gov. Rick Scott, then-State Sen. Denise Grimsley, then-State Rep. Ben Albritton and Highlands County Sheriff Paul Blackman.

or a victim's family.

The other two victims were 54 and 31 years old. Hoglund said all those killed were women. Only one was a customer.

What happened

Hoglund said at 12:30 p.m. Wednesday when 21-year-old Zephen Allen Xaver entered the bank at 1901 U.S. 27 South, on the corner of Tubbs Road, he immediately contacted employees and the customer, and overtook the bank by force.

"He then shot everyone in the bank," Hoglund said.

Then, at 12:36 p.m., Xaver called 911, Hoglund said, allegedly telling dispatchers he killed five people in the bank.

Hoglund had to contain emotion as he said Xaver "knowingly and intentionally took the lives of five of our fellow community members."

"Our sisters, our mothers, our daughters and our coworkers," Hoglund said, his voice breaking at "daughters," before continuing.

"Perhaps most unfortunate, we now refer to them as victims," Hoglund said, "of a senseless crime."

When asked at the press conference, Hoglund said detectives have not found where Xaver had an apparent motive or connection to the bank.

Scott Dressel, public information officer for the Highlands County Sheriff's Office, reported after the press conference that there was another bank employee in a back break room when the incident began.

Upon hearing the shots, the employee ran out a back door and contacted law enforcement.

Dressel said law enforcement would not release any other information about this employee.

When asked after the press conference about obtaining tapes of Xaver's 911 call, Dressel said it would be exempt from public records requests under Florida Statute 119 as a potential confession.

Responders

Dispatchers maintained contact with Xaver, Hoglund said, until police officers and Highlands County sheriff's deputies arrived on the scene.

Xaver allegedly had told dispatchers he was inside the bank armed with a 9mm handgun and wearing a bulletproof vest.

Law enforcement maintained tactical positions and observation until support units could arrive, including the Crisis Negotiation Team, which established contact with Xaver.

At 12:44 p.m., the Sheriff's Office called for members of the Special Weapons And Tactics (SWAT) Team, Hoglund said.

During negotiations, Hoglund said, it appeared Xaver would not give police or deputies access to the victims. At that point, 1:54 p.m., Hoglund requested the SWAT Team enter the bank.

SWAT Team members took Xaver into custody at 2:28 p.m., Hoglund said.

Arrest affidavits state deputies found a bulletproof vest and 9mm handgun in the rear office where they found Xaver.

Law enforcement then began assessing victims' conditions, Hoglund said.

"Unfortunately, all victims had succumbed to their injuries inside the bank," said Hoglund, his voice breaking again. Xaver has since been

formally charged with five counts of first degree murder.

The Highlands News-Sun has chosen not to report the details of the deaths of the victims.

"We now begin the healing process," Hoglund said. "We attempt to make sense of a senseless act. We attempt to mourn the loss of our peers, our neighbors, our mothers and daughters. It's a time for us to come together. It's a time for us to heal. And it's an opportunity for us to look back, reflect and build strength based upon this senseless act."

Help

Both Hoglund and Highlands County Sheriff Paul Blackman, while introducing those at the press conference, said officials with SunTrust Bank were in town cooperating fully with the investigation. However, they were not at the press conference because they were helping and mourning with families of the employees that were lost.

With Hoglund and Blackman were Florida Attorney General Ashley Moody, District 10 State Attorney Brian Haas, Sebring Mayor John Shoop, Florida Department of Law Enforcement Fort Myers Special Agent in Charge Shane Pollard, Highlands County Public Safety Director Marc Bashoor, Sebring Fire Capt. Austin Maddox, and James "Jim" Brooks, chair of the Highlands County Board of County Commission.

Moody said she commended actions of the Sebring Police Department, Highlands County Sheriff's Office and FDLE.

"The law enforcement agencies have worked together in a cooperative manner to ensure that they can move forward successfully in the legal system," Moody said.

"We stand ready to assist them; we stand ready to assist the victims and we have been meeting with SunTrust representatives, dozens are here from around the nation so that they can help their corporate family heal."

She said this will not be a "quick process," by any means.

"I can tell you as a former prosecutor and judge, successfully moving forward to ensuring that someone responsible for such a heinous act takes cooperation from law enforcement, skilled prosecutors and patience by a community that wants justice," Moody said. "We are with you. We will be with you throughout this process and assist law enforcement."

"It is my responsibility to prosecute this case and that we will do," Haas

said.

He said his two priorities would be to build a case that would ensure conviction and the maximum penalty under the law, and to be there for the families of the victims.

"They are hurting today in an unbelievable way and we want to be there for them to make sure the terrible thing that they have been through, that this next step, the criminal justice process, goes as smoothly as possible," Haas said.

Haas plans to convene a grand jury in the next couple of weeks, seeking indictments for first-degree murder, and will meet with the families of the victims to go over all these steps with them in detail.

"This community is hurting unbelievably," Haas said. "Any community that would have a case like this happen with five murders would be so difficult, but for a community the size of Sebring it is just unbelievable. But if there is a place that can make it through this, it's Sebring and it's Highlands County, and we will."

Healing

"We have a wonderful community here," Sebring Mayor John Shoop said, "and this kind of senseless, cowardice act is something that's not even in our vocabulary."

He said the community has been fortunate that thousands of people throughout the world, through the internet, had reached out to offer their condolences.

First responders, Shoop said, have taken the crisis to heart, some of them related to the victims, yet have performed without hesitation.

Shoop, a banker, had a connection to the building. While he worked for SunTrust Bank, the company built that building in 1989.

"We have not changed here but our world has. We need to continue leading our lives as freely as we have in the past, with the love and effort that our community (has)," Shoop said. "Our community is a very caring and giving community. It gives back as much as we give to it. We'll walk through this together. The event will pass, unfortunately, but will not be forgotten. It is now part of our history, and we need

to remember for years to come.

"None of us are untouched by what has happened," Shoop said. "We will all grieve in our own way. We need you, everyone out there, to hug your family, your friends, coworkers, anywhere you go, just to give them peace of mind."

He then asked people to pray for the victims, their families and each other, so that "we will all walk through this in a peaceful manner."

Held without bond

At first appearance Thursday morning, Circuit Court Judge Anthony Ritenour found probable cause to hold Xaver without bond on

five counts of premeditated murder in the first degree.

Public Defender Robert Gray said neither he nor any of his agents were able to make contact with Xaver Wednesday afternoon or night at the Highlands County Jail.

"We tried to but were denied access," Gray told the Highlands News-Sun Thursday morning.

He requested that the court order that he and his staff be allowed to have contact with Xaver, which Ritenour did do.

Ritenour asked if Assistant State Attorney Steve Houchin had any comment, and Houchin said that could be addressed at the

appropriate time.

When asked about that situation, Dressel said that Xaver, on Wednesday, had not requested an attorney.

Gray told Ritenour on Thursday morning that Xaver would be exercising his due process rights, including the right not to speak to law enforcement.

Gray told the Highlands News-Sun that an investigator would be traveling from the Bartow Public Defender's Office to conduct an initial interview with Xaver.

a wonderful person who touched so many lives."

Kimberly Carter Dudley posted fond memories of Lopez on Facebook. She stated, "I met Marisol Rosado-Carmona in 2003 when I became the branch manager at the SunTrust office in Lake Placid. She was a great worker. The customers loved her and she loved helping others. We worked together through good days and times when it was just the two of us 'holding down the fort.' We have talked together, cried together, prayed together and supported each other through some most difficult days.

Co-workers planned a surprise baby shower for Dudley. "I was off that day and I remember Marisol making up some excuse to get me to come to the office," Dudley said. "When I arrived, I remember her saying that she needed me to come to the conference room, where the other managers and the team was waiting with food and gifts for my baby shower.

"Marisol's light and life shined brightly," Dudley said. "She loved people, her family, friends and church especially, and that love was apparent to everyone who met and knew her.

"My heart and prayers are with her husband, Victor, her children, Victor and Kiara, her family, church family, work family and friends," Dudley said. "Our lives are forever blessed for having shared time and space with her. May the God of all peace give us comfort and her memory be a blessing."

Shelley Lopez echoed Dudley's statements on Facebook. "In July 1998 I was a 22-year-old branch manager at SunTrust Bank in Lake Placid," Shelley Lopez said. "In walks Marisol Rosado-Carmona ready to interview for my open full-time teller position. It only took about five minutes for me to know that she had the job!

Maldonado, Lopez's pastor posted these remarks on Facebook for her congregation. Maldonado stated, "Dear friends and brothers, it is with great sadness that I let you know that Marisol Rosado-Carmona, Marisol Lopez, member of our church Nuevo Pacto was one of the victims of the bank SunTrust in Sebring. We ask for your prayers for your husband, children, family and all who have been touched by this tragedy."

"I was praying it wasn't someone I knew personally but in this small town, I knew those chances were slim to none," Griselda Morrison said on a Facebook post. "I will always remember meeting Victor and Kiara Lopez [Lopez's children] first in middle school. They were the nicest kids in orchestra class with me.

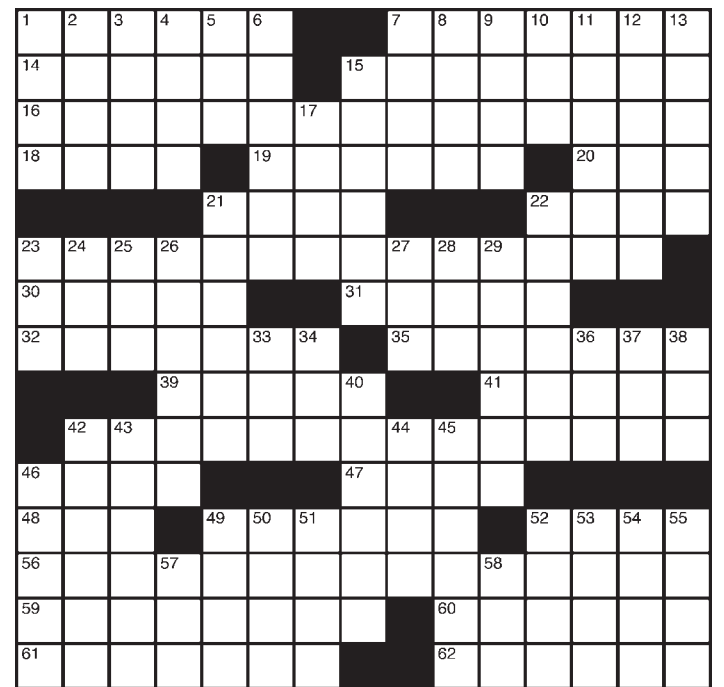

and executives have been with us every step of the way. We appreciate their ongoing care and support.”

Ana Williams’ children are in shock from all of this and the family is shielding them the best they can, he said. The family said it will take time to process and requested privacy as they begin the healing process.

“We do not know what was going on in the mind of the individual who committed this atrocious act but we do know he was influenced by the darkness of this world,” Williams said. “We will not try to understand the darkness but with God’s help we will overcome it. There is no law that can change the human heart but there is a God who can.”

Another brother-in-law works as a detective for the Sebring Police Department. He was sent to the scene but was pulled off the case when Ana Williams was determined to be a suspected victim.

“Ana found her life when she surrendered it to Jesus Christ,” said Tim Williams. “We know that she did not die in that bank, we know that she is alive today with her savior. We are determined to let Ana’s memory be marked by the life she lived, the people she loved and the difference she made.”

“She accepted others where they were in life,” he said. “Loving came easy for her. Loving her was easy.”

Living without her will be hard. Our family will not only survive but we will thrive as a living testament to the power of

prayer and faith. We will never forget Ana. She will forever live in our hearts and minds.”

Ana Williams began working at SunTrust Jan. 4 before this heinous incident occurred. This is the first loss in the family from gun violence.

“There are those who say that prayer is a useless act when tragedies such as this strikes. These same people argue that we need to pass new laws and assert more control over people,” Tim Williams said. “Our family rejects this ideology because we have experienced personally changed hearts as a result of prayer and faith. Darkness can only be defeated by light and we believe that Jesus Christ is that light. Lastly our thanks to Sen. [Marco] Rubio’s staff, Attorney General [Ashley] Moody and her staff.”

Loving tributes to Ana Williams are popping up all over social media. One is from Debra Ganas.

“She’d prayed for this job,” said Ganas on Facebook. “She was excited she’d no longer have to commute to work and was looking forward to being able to sign her children up for extra curricular activities and get to be there to

watch them. She and her husband just bought their new home and were well underway with remodeling. She’d snap her morning coffee pics overlooking the lake they live on.

“We’d just been planning to go to the local festivals and talked about a trip to Mexico,” she said. “So many plans.”

“So much life to be lived but today for reasons we are yet aware of, a shooter entered the bank she worked at. The job she’d prayed for, and he took her precious life, along with others,” Ganas said. “Her daughters, son and husband did not have their Mother or Wife come home. We cannot even begin to grasp or put into words the sheer shock and devastation the family and friends are experiencing from this senseless tragedy that has taken place.”

“I believe in my heart that as she was there (heaven), before the shooter even pulled the trigger that God showed mercy on her and removed all fear and took her before the pain could be felt,” she said.

“Take care of each other, love each other, be the best friend anyone can know,” the family added.

## A time for sorrow

This not the article I intended to write for this Friday. When folks read this in Friday's paper, the tragedy at the SunTrust Bank will be even more real and hurtful.

When I drove home Wednesday night there were still many emergency vehicles on the scene and the ever-present news trucks. You could see the bright red and blue lights for a long way as I drove up US 27. There was no mystery of what was going on. My heart hurt.

While Becky and I were discussing the day and the shooting not far from we live, we could not make any sense of it. She commented of the strong winds of the day at Expo and how at lunch time the Med-flight helicopter was running and holding position on the ground at the temporary LZ developed during the Expo and not taking off.

The lunch tent for the Expo volunteers was just across from the temporary LZ for Med-flight. She said the rotor wash and jet fuel fumes were quite noticeable. I said remember what time it was.

The helicopter was probably holding position until the bank scene was secure but had to go when called.

When they did take off later, I remember seeing it head toward Sebring from my position at the far end of the Expo grounds. At that time, I did not know what was happening in Sebring.

Being at the airport as often as I am, I have seen Med-flight take off many times. I was in emergency services earlier in my career and responsible for securing landing zones for Med-flight helicopters at accident scenes. I always said a little prayer every time I saw the helicopter leave.

This time there was no one to transport.

All of us were hurt by this senseless act and it will require our community to support each other to ease the pain.

## The original EBAY

### By Archbold Biological Station

Although eBay is a household name in e-commerce and extraordinarily successful, their name was an afterthought. Founded in 1995, the company was originally known as Auction Web, owned by a parent company named Echo Bay. When they tried to establish a domain name for their web-site, they discovered that echobay.com was already taken so they shortened it to their second choice...and thus eBay was formed.

But unbeknownst to the founders of eBay, EBAY had long been the name of a territory of Florida Scrub-Jays at Archbold Biological Station. Dr. Reed Bowman, director of the Avian Ecology Program at Archbold, who also directs Archbold's long-term study of jays that began in 1969 and continues today, said "We assign four-letter codes to all jay territories, usually based on some nearby landscape feature. This association with the habitat helps us remember where each territory is and which birds live there, facilitating monitoring. In 1983, a new jay territory formed that included a bayhead. A bayhead is a swampy, less flammable habitat where bay laurel trees predominate. This bayhead was the eastern-most of two, thus we referred to the territory as East Bayhead, which in our coded convention shortened to

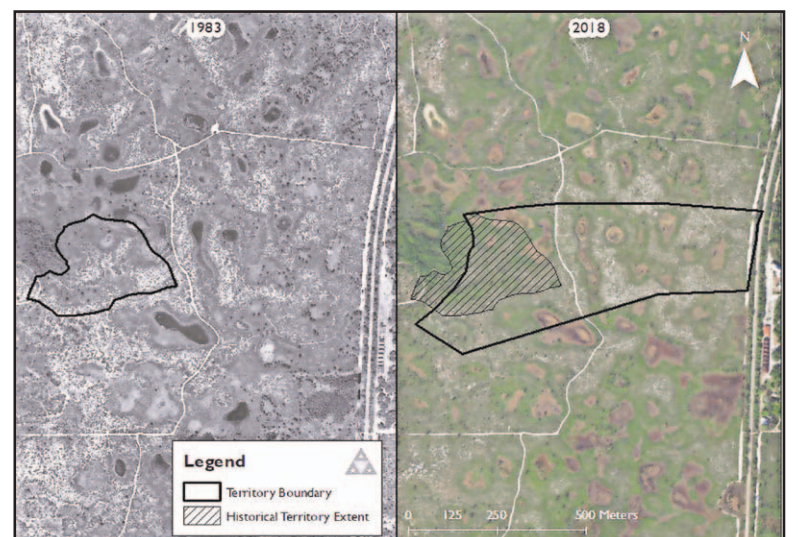

The EBAY territory still persists at Archbold, 37 years since its formation compared to eBay's 24-year existence.

Like companies, where we can track financial performance, long-term data on birds can reveal differences in individual performance in biology, usually measured as the number of offspring each breeder produces over its lifetime. In the Archbold jay study, each bird is uniquely banded so we can tell one from another.

Scrub-jays pair for life and over the past 37 years we have had seven different pairs of

### Go out and collect seashells

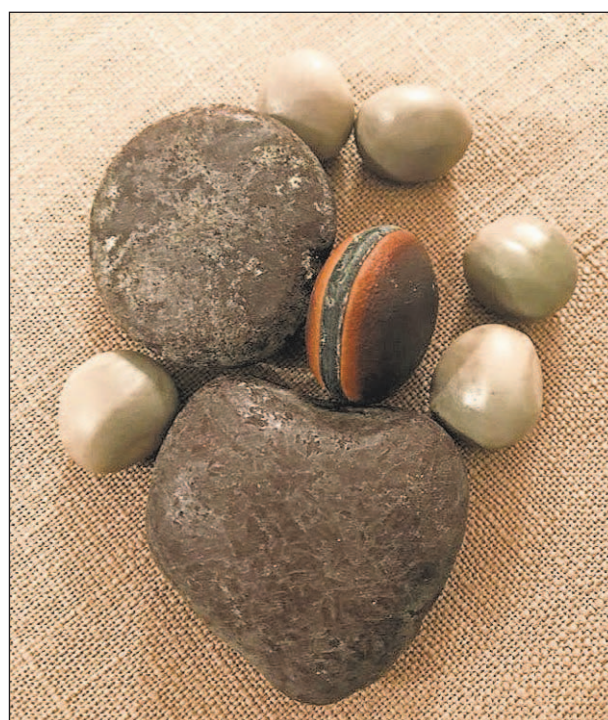

When most people think of Florida's sandy beaches, they think warm, sunny summer. But what the locals already know is that winter at the beach has tons to offer.

The sand and water may be cold, but it's a perfect time for looking for seashells.

Maybe it's because less people are on the beach, or maybe it's the cold weather and winter storms washing them ashore, but the beach always seems full of seashells and other great finds during the winter months.

As a former island dweller, seashells have become an integral part of my home decorating scheme. They make great containers for Q-tips, candles and jewelry.

Some act as decoration atop a cabinet, while

others have been turned into craft projects such as

a necklace or windchime. Little jars of sharks' teeth collected throughout the years are tucked away. I even have a shell from my daughter's first trip to the beach, labeled with the date. A little reminder of paradise.

While collecting is fun, leaving behind seashells and other marine organisms can also benefit our beaches, which is why I always limit what I take. Shells provide protection for creatures such as hermit crabs and can be hiding places for small fish. They also help stabilize beaches and anchor seagrass.

But if you do want to take home a few souvenirs, it's important to know there are some rules when it comes to recreational seashell collection on Florida's beaches.

The major thing to keep in mind when you are collecting is, if it's dead, it most likely is OK to keep.

Do not keep anything that is federally protected (i.e. sea turtles, sawfish or parts thereof).

If a seashell has a living organism inside it or is a living organism (think sand dollars and starfish), you must have a Florida saltwater fishing license (unless exempt) and you must adhere to state and local limits for that species.

It's also good to know that there are a few species prohibited from harvest, such as the Bahama starfish and live queen conch. You may collect queen conch shells when the shells do not contain any living

## Bassmaster Elite Series season opener on St. Johns River

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. — It's T-minus 17 days and counting to the launch of one of the most momentous seasons in the history of professional bass fishing. With the biggest bass on the biggest stage in the sport, the 2019 Bassmaster Elite Series is making dreams reality.

"I'm really excited," said Elite angler Bill Lowen of Brookville, Ind. "I've been in the Elite Series for 12 years, and today I feel just like I did right before my very first season. I can only imagine how exciting this has to be for the new guys over what I feel is fixing to take place."

What is "fixing" to take place is a 10-event series of tournaments on some of the best big-bass lakes in the nation. Elite No. 1 gets underway Thursday, Feb. 7, on the St. Johns River at Palatka, Fla. — a storied fishery where, three years ago, four-time Bassmaster Classic champion Rick Clunn won his 15th B.A.S.S. competition at age 69. Clunn's tournament heroics included a five-bass limit weighing 31 pounds, 7 ounces. The St. Johns River is also where Florida-native Cliff Prince landed the largest bass in Elite Series competition since 2016, weighing 10 pounds, 8 ounces.

Monstrous catches like that are part of the reason B.A.S.S. and the Elite anglers have adopted the

mantra, "Big Bass. Big Stage. Big Dreams." to describe the Elite Series in 2019.

**Big Bass**  
"We're visiting some of the hottest fisheries at the best times this year to catch the biggest bass," said B.A.S.S. CEO Bruce Akin. "If you want to talk 'Big Bass', this is the tried-and-true tournament format that rewards anglers who have the skill to catch the heaviest five-bass limits each day. We can't wait to see what our anglers bring to the scales from the waters of places like the St. Johns River, Lake Gunterville, Lake Fork and the St. Lawrence River."

**Big Stage**  
With more than 130,000 fans attending Elite events on average the past five years and the unparalleled media exposure for the Bassmaster Elite Series, B.A.S.S. continues, by far, to be the "Big Stage" in professional fishing. Bass

fishing's digital flagship, Bassmaster.com, averages 1.8 million page views on competition days, while Bassmaster LIVE in Elite events (excluding the Classic) reach more than 2.2 million fans. I looked around Lake Lanier and the St. Johns River a couple of days before the cutoff, and the folks I ran into in both areas are really looking forward to us coming to their areas."

A two-time tournament champion and four-time Classic qualifier, Zaldain is impressed with the newcomers' fishing skills, as well.

"I'm waiting for that one tournament finish where someone says, 'Oh, the competition is diluted,'" he said. "It's not diluted. It's just as fierce as it has been. Maybe we've never heard of some of these guys, but a quarter of the way through this season, the fishing community is going to know who these guys are. They're no slouches, and there won't be any 'gimmies.'"

Adding to the thrill of the approaching season is the knowledge that 40 of the 75 Elite anglers will qualify for the 2020 Bassmaster Classic, the 50th edition of what is inarguably the Super Bowl of Bass Fishing.

Lowen, a nine-time Classic qualifier, said he is motivated to return to the world championship.

"As a kid growing up, all I wanted was to fish the Classic," he said. "That's where you want to be. It's the biggest stage there is."

## BoatUS Foundation promotes safety

### Make on-water boat training affordable

ANNAPOLIS, Md.— Learning how to drive a boat takes practice. That's not always an easy or affordable thing to do, according to the BoatUS Foundation for Boating Safety and Clean Water — especially if you've never owned a boat or have a professional instructor to show you the ropes.

After completing a successful pilot program in 2018, the nonprofit Foundation and a host of key partners are giving new boaters, as well as current boat owners, the confidence, skills and much-needed practice behind the wheel with the official launch of the BoatUS Foundation On-Water Training Program. It offers a range of up to five, specially designed

courses at 40 locations across the country in 2019, held in conjunction with local boat shows or as stand-alone weekend events at clubs, marinas and professional on-water training facilities.

"We asked ourselves, How do you get more people to enjoy recreational boating and improve their on-water safety and confidence?" said BoatUS Foundation President Chris Edmonston.

"Traditional on-water boat training and skills development often isn't accessible. In many locations there simply are no course providers, and it's expensive and difficult to charter a boat and hire a captain on your own. We bring professional instruction to you in a format that doesn't chew

up the whole day or your wallet, and provides a high-caliber, practical learning experience."

"Course One: Introduction to Powerboating" and "Women Making Waves," each three hours long and taught aboard 20- to 26-foot single-engine powerboats, are offered at \$149 and may include boat-show admission. While both introductory and women's courses offer the same curriculum, the ladies-only course is the perfect opportunity to spend half a day learning boat-handling techniques in a supportive environment. To continue the curriculum, there's also Course Two: Precision Docking and Boat Handling, Course Three: Open-Water Boat

Handling, and Course Four: Open-Water Advanced Maneuvering.

All five courses offer the opportunity to learn centering the wheel, shifting, steering and throttle control, stopping, station holding, understanding the "weathervane" effect and how to use "the boater's eye" technique to safely navigate. Class sizes are limited to four students per vessel, ensuring each student gets sufficient time at the helm under the watchful eye of a U.S. Coast Guard-licensed captain.

The first locations to announce hosting the training program in 2019 include the Miami International Boat Show, Feb. 14-18, Miami, Florida; Wharf Boat & Yacht Show, Mar. 29-31, Orange Beach,

Alabama; In-Command Seamanship Training, Apr. 6-7, Wickford, Rhode Island; Bay Bridge Boat Show, Apr. 12-14, Stevensville, Maryland; Holiday Harbor Marina, Apr. 13-14, Acworth, Georgia; and Fleet Boat Club, June 8, Rochester, New York. The remaining slate of courses will be rolled out throughout the year.

Edmonston notes that nearly 100 percent of pilot-program course takers reported they are likely to recommend a course to a friend, and about 90 percent plan on taking another hands-on boating course. "We've clearly hit a sweet spot and are fulfilling an important need for affordable and accessible on-water instruction," said Edmonston.

Curriculum was created by the National Safe Boating Council and approved by the National Association of Boating

Law Administrators (NASBLA), the gold standards in boating safety education training.

Key partners, who generously provide training vessels and instructor training include Freedom Boat Club, National Marine Manufacturers Association, Annapolis Boat Shows, Annapolis School of Seamanship, In-Command Seamanship Training, Fleet Boat Club, Holiday Harbor Marina and Resort, Coastal Marine Management, and West Marine.

Freedom Boat Club President and CEO John R. Giglio said, "Freedom Boat Club supported the pilot project and we are excited for the official launch this program. Our goal is to ensure that all participants have a high level of confidence behind the helm and provide the basic tools to ensure their time on the water is safer and more enjoyable."

breeding birds at EBAY, but only five different males and five different females. Some pairs persisted many years only two different pairs of breeders lived at EBAY from 1983 to 2004, one pair persisting for 10 years, another for 11. But some pairs lasted only 1-2 years, and birds sometimes had multiple mates, re-pairing if their mate died.

Over the years, these birds in the EBAY territory have produced 56 fledglings, but life for these young jays is tough.

Dr. Angela Tringali, a post-doctoral research fellow in the Avian Ecology Program said, "just a bit more than half of all fledglings survive the first 90 days, but because our study follows birds throughout their lifespans, we can measure how many eventually become breeders and produce young of their own the very best measure of an individual birds' success."

To date, eight of the 56 fledglings from EBAY have become breeders. Although this seems like a paltry number, it is enough to replace their parents that have died, keeping the population

stable. Birds might not breed until they are 2-3 years or older thus some of the recent fledglings may still yet become breeders, producing enough individuals to grow the population, or at least outcompete some of the neighboring families and replace breeders from those territories with descendants of EBAY.

Dr. Bowman added "We track these same life history changes on the 75-80 different jay territories in our study, and we can assess how different environments or periodic events such as storms or fires, can influence survival and

reproduction, and from this we begin to see the big picture and a better understanding of what influences the success of Florida Scrub-Jays. These insights can and have led to truly successful conservation actions, such how management can meet jay's need for high-quality scrub that is burned every 10-20 years."

# Learn the facts about wildfires

 Deadly wildfires ravaged thousands upon thousands of acres of land across California in the summer of 2018. Officials at the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection said these combined fires comprised the largest wildlands fire in state history. Frightening images of blazes consuming landscapes dominated newscasts as thousands of people were forced to evacuate.

Wildfires torch everything in their paths, devastating communities, businesses and natural resources. Outbreaks seem to come out of nowhere, and meteorologists are not yet able to forecast when wildfires

may occur. It is important to note that wildfires are often started by humans. The National Park Service says as many as 90 percent of wildland fires in the United States are caused by negligence, whether it's discarded cigarette butts or campfires left unattended.

Some are intentional acts of arson. Nature also may be responsible, with lightning strikes causing torching of parched plants and trees. When combined with the perfect conditions, which can include dry weather, drought and strong winds, a mere spark can develop into a months-long blaze.

The NPS has wildland fire managers who

constantly assess the threat of human-caused

fires and the threat of wildland fires to humans. Assessments are made as to whether the wildfire should be left to run its course (in rural areas) or it should be contained and extinguished in a human-dominated landscape. National Geographic states that, historically, wildfires are actually supposed to be beneficial to certain natural landscapes, clearing underbrush in forests and triggering the release of seeds in some plant species, such as the Jack pine. However, when they encroach on people, their danger intensifies.

According to Cal Fire, Santa Ana Winds and Diablo Winds are stronger-than-normal wind conditions that occur in

Southern and Northern California, respectively. These winds can push a fire the length of a football field in a minute. Embers also pushed in front of fires become small spot fires. Powerful winds can disrupt efforts to extinguish fires, dissipating fire retardants dropped by aircraft.

Wildfires can wreak havoc on the environment and impact personal health. Worldwide, wildfire smoke kills 339,000 people per year according to estimates from Environmental Health Perspectives. Inhaling smoke can exacerbate asthma, and carbon monoxide can damage the respiratory system.

Considering how

difficult it can be to contain fires, prevention remains key. Remember Smokey Bear's tips, which remain relevant for kids and adults today:

- Never play with matches or lighters in the forest.
- Always watch your campfire.
- Always be careful with fire.
- Make sure a campfire is completely extinguished before leaving it.
- Observe posted fire-risk warnings.

Wildfires remain a constant threat wherever the conditions are right for fires to ignite. People need to be diligent in their prevention of these potentially far-reaching hazards.

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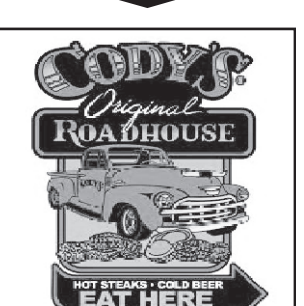
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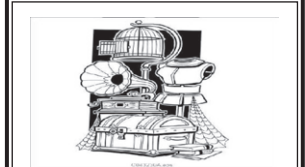

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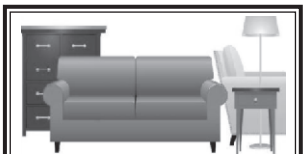

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# Several Florida species no longer warrant listing

**SPECIAL TO HIGHLANDS NEWS-SUN**

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) completed the final step in reevaluating five Species of Special Concern, one of six key objectives outlined in Florida's Imperiled Species Management Plan. As a result, several fish and wildlife species no longer warrant listing.

Based on thorough scientific review, the FWC determined the harlequin darter, Homosassa shrew, southern fox squirrel and the Monroe County osprey population no longer warrant listing as Species of Special Concern.

Through the process, FWC biologists and partners agreed that Florida has three distinct species of alligator snapping turtles. Two of these species do not warrant listing.

However, the Suwannee alligator snapping turtle will now be listed as State Threatened.

The new listing status for these species took effect Dec. 23, 2018.

These changes, along with current protections for the reclassified species, are reflected

in Florida's Imperiled Species Management Plan. Species no longer classified as Species of Special Concern remain protected from take and possession under Florida's General Prohibitions and Requirements. More information on

protections for these species can be found in the Species Action Plan Summaries of Florida's Imperiled Species Management Plan.

Voluntary conservation measures and activities that may require the need for a permit are outlined in Species Conservation Measures and Permitting Guidelines for species included in the Imperiled Species Management Plan, including those recently reclassified.

"The FWC is committed to ensuring the long-term stability of Florida's native wildlife," said Dr. Brad Gruver, head of the FWC's Species Conservation Planning Section. "Ongoing conservation efforts for species recently removed from Florida's Endangered and Threatened Species List will ensure populations remain healthy."

The Species Guidelines are designed to be a tool for landowners, consultants, conservation partners and other interested parties to promote species-specific conservation.

The Guidelines offer options for avoidance, minimization and mitigation of take for listed species. For species removed from the list, Guidelines outline recommended conservation practices that will maintain the status of the species. They provide species-specific information on key issues relevant to real-world conservation, including: Essential behavioral patterns. Survey methods. Recommended conservation practices. Exemptions or authorizations for take. Coordination with other regulatory programs. Permitting options.

# The origins of popular winter sports

Many people spend winter huddled indoors. For winter sports enthusiasts, however, the arrival of snow and chilly temperatures means the start of a season of outdoor fun. Those who see winter as a time to embrace their love of sport may appreciate learning more about some of the sports that are most popular during the colder months of the year.

**Ice hockey**  
Hockey is one of the most popular winter sports. In 1994, Parliament passed the Canada's National Sport Act, which declared hockey the

official national winter sport of Canada. The origins of ice hockey are somewhat uncertain, though some historians claim the first set of rules to govern the sport were written by students at Montreal's McGill University in the 1870s.

Downhill (Alpine) skiing SnowSports Industries America indicates that, in the 2014-2015 season, more than nine million American Alpine skiers took to the slopes, and the sport continues to attract new devotees each year.

Historians state that skiing evolved as a method to cross the landscape in the

winter when marshlands froze over. Cave drawings suggest that man used skis during the last Ice Age in the Palaeolithic period.

Yet the birth of modern downhill skiing is often traced to the 1850s when Norwegian legend Sondre Norheim popularized skis with curved sides and made skiing a sport instead of just a mode of transport. Skiing ultimately became quite popular in Russia, Finland, Sweden, and Norway. Today there are various types of downhill skiing, including mountain skiing, extreme cat skiing and heli skiing.

**Curling**

Curling may now be seen as a largely Canadian sport, but it is widely believed to be one of the world's oldest team sports, tracing its origins to Great Britain. The World Curling Federation states paintings by the 16th Century Flemish artist Pieter Bruegel portrayed an activity similar to curling being played on Scotland's frozen ponds. The earliest known curling stones came from the Scottish regions of Stirling and Perth, dating all the way back to 1511.

Ice skating  
Speed skating and figure

skating are derivatives of early ice skating, which is believed to have started in Finland more than 3,000 years ago. Skates were sharpened, flattened bone strapped to the bottom of a shoe and glided on top of the ice. The Dutch added edges to steel blades around the 13th or 14th centuries. Eventually, skating was brought to England from the Netherlands.

Winter sports draw millions of participants each year, giving people a reason to leave the house even when temperatures dip below freezing.

trailers and Class C motorhomes continue as the strongest segments.

queen conch at the time of collection.

Special rules also apply if you are collecting in Lee or Manatee counties.

My top favorite beach finds:

**Sea Beans:** I love that these rare finds often illicit a "whoa, what is that" from fellow beachgoers. Sea beans or drift seeds are common names for a variety of seeds that frequently wash up on the

beach. Our ocean currents are amazing, and sea beans are proof of that. Many of these seeds come from faraway places, such as the Amazon River.

**Cockle shells:** These beach show-stoppers are often the size of your hand and strong enough to remain in one piece, which makes them great for collecting. It's also always "warmed the cockles of my heart" that the two shells of this bivalve form a heart shape when whole.

**Lightning whelk vs. knobbed whelk:** I love a good whelk. They are big, beautiful, strong enough to not easily break and look great on a shelf. My favorite beach party whelk trick is showing people the difference between a lightning whelk and a knobbed whelk.

Lightning whelks open to the left, whereas the two other commonly found whelks, the channeled and knobbed, open to the right.

**Egg casings:** Another favorite "whoa, what is that" beach moment often comes from finding the egg casings of whelks and moon snails.

While these finds aren't great for decoration (moon snail casings are very fragile, whelk casings and skate egg casings—sometimes called mermaid purses—that have already hatched can be smelly and need to dry out), they are definitely fun to look at and talk about.

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
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# LP Arts and Crafts Country Fair next weekend

## Senate rejections of rival Dem, GOP plans trigger bipartisan activity

WASHINGTON — A splintered Senate swatted down competing Democratic and Republican plans for ending the 34-day partial government shutdown on Thursday, leaving President Donald Trump and Congress with no obvious formula for halting the longest-ever closure of federal agencies and the mounting damage it is inflicting around the country. The twin setbacks triggered a swirl of bipartisan activity, unseen for weeks, aimed at resolving the vitriolic stalemate, if only

temporarily. A day before 800,000 federal workers faced a second payday with no paychecks, senators seemed to have had enough of the standoff and had decided it was time to seek a way out. A parade of senators from both parties took to the Senate floor to advocate re-opening agencies for three weeks while bargainers seek a solution. Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer, D-N.Y., dashed to the office of Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., to explore potential next steps. "We're talking," Schumer told reporters, one of

## Out of touch administration?

### Trump aides struggle with shutdown empathy

NEW YORK — One White House aide mused that the shutdown was like a paid vacation for some furloughed workers. President Donald Trump's daughter-in-law said employees' "little bit of pain" was worth it for the good of the country. Commerce Secretary Wilbur Ross questioned why cash-poor workers were using food banks instead of taking out loans. The president himself says workers simply need to "make adjustments."

With hundreds of thousands of federal workers going without pay during the monthlong partial government shutdown, Trump and his team, which includes the wealthiest Cabinet ever assembled, have struggled to deliver a full dose of empathy for those who are scraping to get by.

Ross set off howls when he was asked on CNBC on Thursday about reports that some of the 800,000 workers currently not receiving paychecks were going to homeless shelters to get food.

"Well, I know they are, and I don't really quite understand why," he said. "The obligations that they would undertake, say borrowing from a bank or a credit union, are, in effect, federally guaranteed. So the 30 days of pay that some people will be out ... there's no real reason why they shouldn't be able to get a loan against it."

In a subsequent interview with Bloomberg, Ross said he was "painfully aware" that workers were suffering hardships. He added that in his earlier remarks, he'd been trying to let workers know that credit union loans were available for those "experiencing liquidity crises" — hardly the language of those living paycheck to paycheck.

It all contributed to perceptions that the Trump administration was out of touch with workers bearing the brunt of the shutdown impact.

## Trump makes rare cave on State of the Union speech

WASHINGTON — The counter-puncher caved. President Donald Trump's decision to postpone his State of the Union address under pressure from House Speaker Nancy Pelosi surprised allies, contradicted top aides who had been working on an alternative speech plan and left all of Washington trying to determine whether it signaled new willingness by Trump to make a deal to reopen the government. "Well, it's really her choice," Trump said Thursday, acknowledging Pelosi had the upper

hand when it came to scheduling the traditional presidential address to Congress. The speaker had made clear Trump could not deliver his speech from the House unless he waited until the government reopens.

So Trump, who is typically loath to show any sign of weakness, made a highly uncharacteristic about-face and one that highlighted the importance the president attaches to the type of symbolism and pageantry associated with a speech from the rostrum of the House.

The president concluded that there was no viable alternative that could match the gravitas of the traditional State of the

Union address, in which all three branches of government come together under one roof, drawing the president's largest television audience of the year. An alternative speech or rally also would have been a hard sell for television networks, which took heat earlier this month for airing the president's prime-time Oval Office address in which he largely rehashed his case for a southern border wall.

"I would have done it in a different location but I think that would be very disrespectful to the State of the Union," Trump said Thursday. "I could have gone to a big auditorium and gotten 25,000 people in

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# Florida elections chief resigns when blackface photos emerge

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Florida's top elections official abruptly resigned Thursday after a newspaper obtained pictures of him in blackface posing as a Hurricane Katrina victim.

Secretary of State Michael Ertel, who had been on the job less than three weeks, resigned just hours after he testified about election lawsuits before a state legislative committee.

The Tallahassee Democrat obtained pictures taken at a Halloween party 14 years ago that show Ertel dressed in blackface while wearing earrings,

a New Orleans Saints bandanna and fake breasts under a purple T-shirt with "Katrina Victim" written on it. The photos were taken two months after the deadly storm ravaged the Gulf Coast region.

Ertel had been the Seminole County supervisor of elections and was picked last month by new Gov. Ron DeSantis to take over the department that oversees elections.

DeSantis said Ertel regretted dressing up in blackface, but he said that he was right to step down after the pictures emerged.

"I want people to be

able to lead and not have any of these things swirling around," said DeSantis, who was in Marianna to discuss hurricane relief efforts for areas hit hard by Hurricane Michael in October.

During his campaign for governor, DeSantis came under fire from Democrats who said he made racially divisive comments about Tallahassee Mayor Andrew Gillum.

Ertel was appointed Seminole County supervisor of elections in 2005 by then-Gov. Jeb Bush and won four elections to keep the office.

DeSantis last year defeated Tallahassee Mayor Andrew Gillum, who was seeking to become Florida's first black governor. Gillum questioned DeSantis' association with people seen as racially divisive. DeSantis also came under fire for a comment he made in late August where he said that Florida voters shouldn't "monkey this up" by supporting Gillum.

### Judge ends legal battle over Broward election head

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — A federal judge is officially ending the legal skirmish between former Gov. Rick Scott and a former Florida elections official.

U.S. District Judge Mark Walker on Wednesday dismissed the lawsuit that former Broward Supervisor of Elections Brenda Snipes had filed against the Republican governor who is now a U.S. Senator.

Walker agreed with attorneys the lawsuit was no longer needed. Last week new Gov. Ron DeSantis said he would accept Snipes' resignation.

The long-time elections official came under fire during the mandatory recount that followed the November elections. Snipes announced she planned to resign Jan. 4,

but then Scott suspended her immediately.

Walker ruled earlier this month that Scott violated Snipes' constitutional rights when he suspended her and "vilified" her without first allowing her to make her own case.

### Police: Man takes purse, hits, injures 2 women with car

BOYNTON BEACH (AP) — Police in Florida say a man snatched an 81-year-old woman's purse in a Walmart parking lot before clipping her and another woman with his car as he fled.

The Palm Beach Post cites a Boynton Beach police report and court records as saying 25-year-old Bradley Richard Loveridge remained jailed Wednesday in Palm Beach County. Police say the car's license plate number had been traced to Loveridge.

Both women were injured. The woman whose purse was taken last week told police a man opened her car door and grabbed it while she was loading groceries. Police say the other woman saw what happened and was chasing the man when he backed into her.

Loveridge is charged with burglary, battery and other related offenses. It's unclear if he has lawyer who could comment.

### Construction worker killed in accident at country club

BONITA SPRINGS (AP) — Officials say a construction worker has been killed at a Florida country club.

The Naples Daily News reports that the accident happened Tuesday morning at Bonita National Golf and Country Club.

Bonita Springs Fire Control and Rescue

District says the accident involved a dump truck, but few other details were released.

The Lee County Sheriff's Office and the Occupational Safety and Health Administration are investigating the death.

### Commissioner reprimanded for post on Muslim congresswoman

HALLANDALE BEACH (AP) — Commissioners in a South Florida city are reprimanding a fellow councilmember over remarks on a Facebook post about the first Palestinian-American woman elected to the U.S. Congress.

Hallandale Beach commissioners voted Wednesday to condemn Commissioner Anabelle Lima-Taub for writing that U.S. Rep. Rashida Tlaib, a Democrat from Detroit, might become "a martyr

and blow up Capitol Hill." Tlaib is one of two Muslim women elected to Congress in November.

Lima-Taub remains unapologetic, telling commissioners her life is in danger. The Miami Herald reports Lima-Taub told the board that if she's found dead she holds Commissioner Michelle Lazarow, who sponsored the resolution, responsible.

Lazarow said the controversy has "brought out hate like I have never seen before."

The resolution reprimands Lima-Taub for "bigotry" and creating an unsafe environment for the Muslim community.

### Police honor officer who arrested school shooting suspect

COCONUT CREEK (AP) — The police officer who arrested the suspect in last year's Florida

school massacre has been honored for bravery.

The Coconut Creek Police Department awarded Officer Michael Leonard with its Medal of Valor this week for arresting Nicholas Cruz, who's charged with killing 17 people at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School on Feb. 14.

Leonard had responded to the school, but after learning the suspect had fled, began patrolling nearby neighborhoods. He spotted Cruz walking about a mile from the school wearing a burgundy shirt and black pants, which the shooter had worn. Leonard pulled up, drew his handgun and ordered Cruz to the ground.

The now 20-year-old suspect has pleaded not guilty, but his attorneys say he would plead guilty for a life sentence. Prosecutors are seeking the death penalty.

# Maduro orders Venezuelan diplomats out of US as crisis grows

CARACAS, Venezuela — President Nicolas Maduro on Thursday ordered all of Venezuela's diplomats home from the United States and defiantly closed the country's embassy as relations between the two nations rapidly collapsed.

Maduro warned that if U.S. officials "have any sense" they will pull out their own diplomats from the U.S. Embassy in Caracas, rather than defying his order for them to leave.

"They believe they have a colonial hold in Venezuela, where they decide what they want to do," Maduro said in an address broadcast live on state TV. "You must fulfill my order from the government of Venezuela."

Tensions have soared between the two nations after the Trump

administration recognized opposition leader Juan Guaido, who claimed Wednesday to hold the presidency and vowed to remove Maduro, calling him a "dictator."

Maduro retaliated by severing relations with the U.S. and giving American diplomats 72 hours to leave Venezuela. However, Washington said it would ignore the order after Guaido issued his own statement urging foreign embassies to disavow Maduro's orders and keep their diplomats in the country.

All eyes have been on the military, a traditional arbiter of political disputes in Venezuela, as a critical indicator of whether the opposition will succeed in establishing a new government.

Venezuela's top military brass pledged their unwavering support to Maduro, delivering vows of loyalty earlier Thursday

before rows of green-uniformed officers on state television.

A half-dozen generals belonging largely to district commands and with direct control over thousands of troops joined Maduro in accusing the United States of meddling in Venezuela's affairs and said they would uphold the socialist leader's rule.

Defense Minister Vladimir Padrino Lopez, a key Maduro ally, later delivered his own proclamation, dismissing efforts to install a "de-facto parallel government" as tantamount to a coup.

"It's not a war between Venezuelans that will solve our problems," he said. "It's dialogue."

Life in the capital appeared to be returning to normal Thursday after mass anti-government demonstrations a day earlier that left at least a dozen dead in the escalating conflict with Maduro,

who has been increasingly accused of undemocratic behavior by the United States and many other nations in the region.

Guaido, 35, turned up

the heat by declaring himself interim president on Wednesday before a mass of demonstrators in Caracas. He said it was the only way to end the

Maduro "dictatorship" in Venezuela, which has seen millions flee in recent years to escape sky-high inflation and food shortages.

## Report: US-backed Syrian fighters clash with IS, many killed

BEIRUT (AP) — Members of the Islamic State group failed Thursday to break a siege imposed by U.S.-backed fighters in the last area they control in Syria, leading to fierce fighting that inflicted casualties on both sides, Syrian opposition activists said.

The Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights and the DeirEzzor 24, an activist collective, said the fighting concentrated west of the eastern village of Baghouz near the Iraqi border that the extremists lost earlier this week.

U.S.-backed Kurdish-led fighters of the Syrian

Democratic Forces have captured most of the area that was once controlled by IS on the east banks of the Euphrates River and the extremists now only control two villages. More than 20,000 civilians have fled the IS-held area and hundreds of militants surrendered since SDF began its offensive on Sept. 10.

The extremists are likely to lose the areas they control in Deir el-Zour in the coming few weeks as SDF fighters press their offensive under the cover of airstrikes by the U.S.-led coalition.

Rami Abdurrahman, the Observatory's chief, said

Thursday's fighting left 34 militants and 16 SDF fighters dead. He added that 21 IS gunmen were taken prisoners.

DeirEzzor 24 confirmed fighters from both sides were killed without giving a number.

Earlier on Thursday, a bomb exploded in the capital Damascus causing property damage but no casualties, Syrian state media reported.

Syrian TV said the explosive was placed inside a car in the Adawi neighborhood. The Russian Embassy is located several hundred yards away.

There was no immediate claim of responsibility.

## Ukrainian court convicts ex-president Yanukovich of treason

MINSK, Belarus (AP) — A Ukrainian court on Thursday sentenced former President Viktor Yanukovich in absentia to 13 years in prison after finding him guilty of treason and helping Russian aggression.

There was no immediate reaction from Yanukovich to the decision by a court in Kiev, the Ukrainian capital.

Yanukovich fled to Russia after being forced from power by massive protests in February 2014. The demonstrations were sparked by Yanukovich's decision to abruptly spike an association agreement with the European Union

in favor of close ties with Russia.

Shortly after he fled, Moscow annexed Ukraine's Crimean Peninsula, using a request by Yanukovich as one of the legal arguments to justify the occupation.

Russia also has backed a separatist insurgency in eastern Ukraine, where fighting has killed more than 10,000 people since April 2014.

Yanukovich, who has lived in Russia since fleeing Ukraine, has acknowledged he sent a letter to Putin asking for military assistance, but claimed it not an official

invitation for boots on the ground.

Russian President Vladimir Putin has denounced the protests that removed Yanukovich from office as a Western-backed coup and scathingly criticized Yanukovich for lacking the guts to crush them.

Yanukovich's lawyers said that the verdict was delivered under government pressure and noted that the court failed to question many witnesses on the defense side. They said they would appeal.

Prosecutors had asked the court to sentence Yanukovich to 15 years in prison.



# Ex-Trump lawyer Cohen to comply with Senate subpoena

WASHINGTON — A Senate committee has subpoenaed President Donald Trump's former personal lawyer Michael Cohen, his attorney said Thursday, and Cohen intends to comply with the interview demand related to the Russia investigation. The development comes one day after Cohen postponed his public testimony to a House committee.

Lanny Davis, a lawyer for Cohen, disclosed the subpoena from the Senate Intelligence Committee in a one-sentence statement, and later told The Associated Press in a text message that "we will comply and hope to agree upon reasonable terms, ground rules and a date."

Cohen is set to begin a three-year prison sentence in March.

The Senate committee did not immediately confirm the subpoena, but any interview with Cohen

would almost certainly take place in private, in keeping with how the committee generally has conducts Russia-related hearings.

Cohen earlier this week delayed his Feb. 7 appearance before the House Committee on Oversight and Reform on the advice of his legal team, citing ongoing cooperation in special counsel Robert Mueller's Russia investigation and threats against his family. Trump, along with his attorney,

Rudy Giuliani, has publicly urged the Justice Department to investigate Cohen's father-in-law, insinuating that Cohen's relative was part of some unspecified criminal activity.

"If he wants to criticize Cohen, he can," Davis said. "Obviously, picking on his family publicly is a way of silencing him or intimidating him. And certainly he has engendered great fear in his extended family, which is why we postponed it."

In an interview Thursday, Davis said the House should take an immediate vote on censuring Trump "as a step before an impeachment investigation," and he pushed for a criminal investigation of Giuliani involving allegations of obstruction, witness intimidation and witness tampering.

The decision to postpone the House interview pushed back the chance of a public airing on additional details of Cohen's relationship with Trump,

including hush money payments that Cohen has admitted arranging for two women who say they had sex with the president. Trump has denied the allegation.

Democrats have suggested they may subpoena Cohen to compel his testimony and the committee's chairman, Rep. Elijah Cummings, said Cohen could be brought from prison to appear before Congress.

"We will get his testimony," Cummings said.

## Agency: Deadly California fire caused by homeowner equipment

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — Investigators said Thursday that a 2017 wildfire that killed 22 people in Northern California wine country was caused by a private electrical system, not equipment belonging to embattled Pacific Gas & Electric Corp.

The state firefighting agency concluded that the blaze started next to a residence. It did not find any violations of state law.

"I eliminated all other causes for the Tubbs Fire, with the exception of an electrical caused fire originating from an unknown event affecting privately owned conductor or equipment," CalFire Battalion Chief John Martinez wrote.

Some details about the property, including its owner and address, were blacked out of the report. It said the Napa County property about 3 miles north of Calistoga was built in 1946 on about 10.5 acres with a wine cellar, pool and several outbuildings.

The fire was one of more than 170 that torched the state in October 2017. It destroyed more than 5,600 structures over more than 57 square miles in Sonoma and Napa counties.

PG&E previously said it plans to file for bankruptcy protection next week, citing billions of dollars in potential damages from lawsuits linking its equipment to other deadly blazes for which it has been determined to be at fault.

The company said in a statement that despite Thursday's finding, PG&E "still faces extensive litigation, significant potential liabilities and a deteriorating financial situation."

A state senator said that just because a private electric line caused the wine country fire does not let the utility off the hook for the role of its equipment in other devastating fires in the state.

State Sen. Bill Dodd, a Napa Democrat, said the finding doesn't negate system-wide issues plaguing California's largest utility.

Lawmakers are under pressure to find a solution that addresses utility reform and compensates wildfire victims.

"This underscores the idea that we all have a role to play in wildfire prevention," said Dodd a frequent critic of PG&E, who noted that the company has already been found at fault for more than a dozen other Northern California wildfires.

PG&E said in a Jan. 2 court filing that it believed a handyman performing unlicensed electrical work started the wine country fire.

In the report released Thursday by the state, one witness reported seeing a transformer explode. Another reported seeing the fire approach a PG&E power pole.

One witness, Charlie Brown Jr. of Calistoga, said the electrical wiring leading from the property where investigators concluded the fire started had not been used in years.

## Belt buckles and beer: Federal shutdown hits businesses hard

WASHINGTON — From power restaurants in Washington and a belt-buckle maker in Colorado to a brewery in California, businesses that count heavily on federal employees as customers are feeling the punishing effects of the government shutdown.

In many cases, it's forcing them to cut workers' hours and buy less from suppliers — measures that could ripple through the larger U.S. economy.

"It's a fog with no end in sight," Michael Northern, vice president of a company that owns three restaurants in the Huntsville, Alabama, area near a huge Army base that houses some 70 federal agencies, including NASA. He said business is down 35 percent. "People are just going home and nesting, trying to conserve resources."

Western Heritage Co. in Loveland, Colorado, which makes buckles for uniformed employees of the National Forest Service and other outdoor agencies, has seen sales plummet 85 percent this month and laid off 12 of its 13 workers.

In the nation's capital, Clyde's Restaurant Group, which owns the Old Ebbitt Grill restaurant down the street from the White House and 10 other dining spots, reported a 20 percent drop in sales and is cutting hours for waiters and kitchen staff.

So far, the broader economic impact of the shutdown is not clear — because, well, many

agencies that compile such data are closed.

The Labor Department, which is open, said Thursday that the number of people seeking unemployment benefits fell last week to the lowest level since 1969, a sign the job market is still strong.

But most economists are forecasting slower growth in the first three months of this year. Analysts estimate gross domestic product shrinks 0.13 percentage points for each week the shutdown lasts.

Those estimates reflect the loss of government spending and lost paychecks for federal employees. What is not known is how much the shutdown will reverberate through the rest of the economy. When waiters at restaurants that serve federal employees lose income, for example, will they also cut back spending? And

will that then harm other companies?

Among the hardest hit are the owners of restaurants, hotels and gift shops near federal agencies and national parks around the country.

In Mariposa, California, just outside Yellowstone National Park, tourism has dropped sharply and most of the 6,000 county residents who work in the park have not been paid for a month.

"For my business personally it's been absolutely devastating," said Hanna Wackerman, owner of the 1850 Restaurant and Brewing Company. "Usually January is a pretty busy month for us. With the new snow being in Yosemite, that tends to bring new tourists to the park." Instead, business is down 80 percent, she said.

Mike Lynch, owner of Western Heritage, saw

online orders collapse almost immediately after the government shut down Dec. 22. The company sells buckles, keychains, commemorative coins and badges to employees of the Fish and Wildlife Service, the Forest Service, the Bureau of Land Management and other agencies. It also sells patches and some clothing.

On Jan. 7, Lynch laid off nearly everyone, leaving one person to answer the phone "in case someone wants to buy something." They were the first job cuts in the company's 43-year history.

Larger companies are also affected, though it is typically easier for them to weather the impact. Airlines like Delta and Southwest, for example, are losing tens of millions of dollars in business, but that's out of billions in revenue.

#### Deep freeze, wind chills of minus 50 coming to Upper Midwest

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — The Upper Midwest is about to plunge into a deep freeze.

The National Weather Service says the wind chill factor could dip to 40 to 50 degrees below zero in parts of Wisconsin and Minnesota and to 30 to 35 below in the Dakotas starting Thursday night.

Such wind chills, which describe the combined effect of wind and cold temperatures on exposed skin, could cause frostbite within minutes.

The wind chill advisory covers "pretty much the entire Upper Midwest," stretching from the Dakotas into Kansas and east to Ohio, including northern Missouri, central Illinois and central Indiana, said meteorologist Bill Borghoff of the National Weather Service in Chanhassen, Minnesota.

#### BuzzFeed cutting 15 percent of jobs

NEW YORK (AP) — Digital media company BuzzFeed is cutting

15 percent of its jobs, or about 200 people, to trim expenses and become profitable.

BuzzFeed CEO Jonah Peretti wrote employees Wednesday that the layoffs will help BuzzFeed avoid having to raise money from investors again.

The privately held company has not been profitable for several years. It has raised hundreds of millions from such investors as Comcast's NBCUniversal.

Based in New York, BuzzFeed is best known for its viral posts and quizzes and has a well-regarded news division.

#### CNN's Acosta writing book on Trump White House

NEW YORK (AP) — Jim Acosta has some follow-up comments on the Trump administration.

The CNN Chief White House Correspondent, who has frequently clashed with President Donald Trump and members of his administration, has a book coming out June 11. He's calling it "The Enemy of the People," Trump's inflammatory insult for the cable network and others whose

reporting displeases him.

"Simply put, I am writing this book to share what I've experienced covering President Trump during his first two years in office," Acosta said in a statement Thursday through HarperCollins Publishers.

"This sobering, bewildering and sometimes frightening experience has made it absolutely clear that this is a dangerous time to tell the truth in America. The president and his team, not to mention some of his supporters, have attempted to silence the press in ways we have never seen before."

"As just about everybody has seen, I have witnessed this firsthand."

Financial terms for the book weren't disclosed.

#### California GOP lawmaker switches parties, criticizes Trump

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — A moderate California Republican state lawmaker switched parties Thursday while criticizing the policies and leadership of President Donald Trump, whom he said has led the party "to the extreme."

Assemblyman Brian Maienschein said he and the Republican Party have moved in different directions since he was first elected in 2012.

He represents the border city of San Diego and said he differs with the Republican Party on immigration as well as health care, gun control, abortion and gay rights.

Maienschein said he has been a Republican all his adult life, but is changing in part because "Donald Trump has led the Republican Party to the extreme on issues that divide our country."

"As the Republican Party has drifted further right, I and my votes have shifted to the left," he added. "Over the years I've often been at odds with the Republican Party, and even when the GOP disrespected and ignored me, I crossed the aisle to vote for my values."

He has voted with Democrats particularly on environmental and human services legislation.

His defection gives Democrats 61 votes in the 80-member Assembly, well over the supermajority they need to increase taxes, overturn vetoes and take other actions without Republican votes.

## Stocks waver again as chipmakers jump and drug companies dip

NEW YORK — Stocks finished mostly higher Thursday as another day of mixed trading showed the market's recent rally losing some strength. Chipmakers rose, while drugmakers fell.

Chipmakers Xilinx and Lam Research soared and many of their peers also climbed as investors, many of whom have been pessimistic about demand for computer chips recently, saw signs of life in the business. The Philadelphia Semiconductor Index rose to its highest level since early December. Airlines also rose after several strong quarterly reports.

About two-thirds of the stocks on the New York Stock Exchange closed with gains, but major stock indexes didn't

move much. Drugmakers including Merck and Pfizer took sharp losses, and spice maker McCormick had its biggest drop in 13 years. Other household products companies also sank.

The S&P 500 index rose 3.63 points, or 0.1 percent, to 2,642.33. The benchmark U.S. index is up 12.4 percent over the last month, but it's slipped 1.1 percent this week after big gains in each of the past four weeks. The Dow Jones Industrial Average dipped 22.38 points, or 0.1 percent, to 24,553.24.

Thanks to the big gains for technology companies, the Nasdaq composite added 47.69 points, or 0.7 percent, to 7,073.46. The Russell 2000 of small-company stocks gained 10.15 points, or 0.7 percent, to 1,464.41.

# Estimates of blood loss are not always accurate readings

**DEAR DR. ROACH:** Here's something I've wondered about for a long time: Years ago, I was told that I lost 5 pints of blood in childbirth. How did they come up with that number? Obviously, they weren't scooping up blood off the floor to measure it! — L.K.

**ANSWER:** During surgery, there is always some blood loss, but 5 pints of blood is a great deal of blood loss, being about half the amount of total blood volume of an adult.

Way back when I was a third-year student, anesthesiologists and surgeons both estimated blood loss during surgery, based on the amount of blood removed from the body by suctioning (which is measured) as well as on the sponges used in surgery (hopefully the blood doesn't actually get on the floor during most surgeries, but it can certainly happen during childbirth). Unfortunately, the estimates are not accurate. Surgeons in particular tend to underestimate blood loss. Blood levels can be measured before and after surgery,

and so in hindsight the blood loss can be estimated reasonably well. During surgery with high amounts of blood loss, blood tests are taken frequently (and often tested in the operating room) to determine whether, and how much, blood needs to be transfused.

In your case, you may have required blood transfusions to keep your level near normal, or they may have noticed the drop in your blood hemoglobin level.

**DEAR DR. ROACH:** My wife has to have a CAT scan. She dreads having to drink the two

bottles of fluid before the scan. Can I doctor up the fluid (syrup, ice cream, etc.)? — J.N.

**ANSWER:** There are several types of oral contrast given for CT scans, and the type of scan determines the best choice of contrast, which will then be ordered by the radiologist. Barium-based contrast (Readi-Cat) is viscous and chalky. Diatrizoate (gastrografin) tastes bitter. Iohexol (Omnipaque) has a less unpleasant taste than the others and is generally preferred by those who must drink them. All of these agents can have flavorings added.

Traditional ways of adding flavor include unsweetened Kool-Aid mix, Crystal Light and water flavoring drops (such as MiO and Dasani). I don't recommend ice cream. I do recommend drinking the fluid cold.

There are some companies now marketing oral CT contrast solutions that are much easier to get down than the traditional agents.

**DEAR DR. ROACH:** Who decides what surgery is an elective? I have been on a waiting list

since August and am scheduled for February. I need a hip replacement, and after five years of injections that are no longer effective, my doctor agreed to surgery. I'm using pain pills and lidocaine patches, but still feel a lot of pain. — M.G.

**ANSWER:** The term "elective" is used to describe any surgery that is scheduled and not performed immediately due to a medical emergency. The term "semi-elective" sometimes is used to describe a necessary procedure to save life or limb but that does not need to be done emergently.

The surgeon is generally the person who decides if a surgery is appropriate, and it seems that this is the real issue in your case. Deciding when to perform a joint-replacement surgery is a mutual decision between patient and physician.

A six-month wait for surgery, when patient and surgeon have decided it is appropriate, is outside my experience, and I am frankly unable to guess why you have had to wait so long.

I'm worried it makes me unapproachable or appear to be unpleasant.

I have overcome addiction, attend daily support meetings and have almost a year of sobriety. I avoid bar/club scenes where a lot of people my age socialize. I'm beginning to feel very alone and empty. I asked out a temp at my job, but she had a boyfriend and offered to set me up with a friend of hers. I declined because I was embarrassed.

My friends tell me it's a game of numbers, but it hurts being rejected all the time. I see beautiful, nice women with men who treat them badly, and I obsess over what's wrong with me. My experience with women is limited. I'm not looking for a commitment, just some friends to share good times and laughter with.

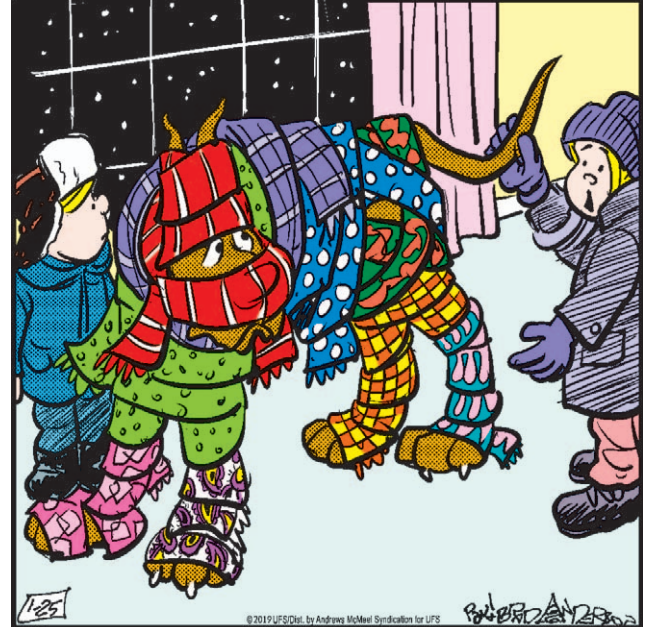

South's decision to bid two no trump rather than raise his partner's diamond suit was questionable, and that question was sure to be asked if South failed to come up with nine tricks in his no trump contract. South needed to presume a 4-4 spade split, but that wasn't enough. There were

nine tricks, but the two singleton aces made them hard to take. There was no apparent entry back to the king of hearts, but South found a way to enlist his opponent's help. South won the opening spade lead with his ace, cashed the ace of clubs, and crossed to dummy with a heart to the ace. He cashed all of dummy's clubs, discarding three hearts and a diamond. The king of diamonds was led from dummy, which East chose to duck, although that didn't matter. Had declarer continued with another diamond, the contract would have failed. He led a spade, instead, and gave the opponents their three spade tricks. It didn't matter which opponent won the last spade, he would have to give dummy the queen of diamonds or lead a heart to declarer's king — nine tricks either way. Problem solved, and the poor split in diamonds meant that a diamond slam would have failed. South could hold his head high about the auction.

# Hawaii's Gabbard formally launches campaign for president

HONOLULU — U.S. Rep. Tulsi Gabbard, a Hawaii Democrat known for bucking the party establishment and for criticizing U.S. foreign policy in the Middle East, formally launched her campaign for president with a video posted online Thursday.

Gabbard joins a growing field of Democrats seeking their party's nomination. U.S. Housing Secretary Julian Castro recently announced a bid, and Sen. Elizabeth Warren of Massachusetts, Sen. Sen. Kirsten Gillibrand of New York and Sen. Kamala Harris of California say they are running.

"We have people in positions of power who are not thinking about the well-being of the people and our planet," Gabbard said in the video. "Where is that conversation about the needs of our people?"

Gabbard, 37, has represented Honolulu's suburbs and rural Hawaii in the U.S. House since 2013. She is a combat veteran who served in Iraq and Kuwait with the Hawaii National Guard.

She was an early, vocal supporter of Vermont Sen. Bernie Sanders during the last presidential campaign, which has made her popular with progressive Democrats.

Gabbard indicated in an interview with CNN earlier this month that she would be a candidate. She said she would follow it up with a formal launch, which occurred Thursday.

Critics have focused on her past advocacy against same-sex marriage.

In one example, she spoke at a news conference in 2004 when she was a state representative about federal judges "tearing apart our U.S. Constitution in order to force same-sex marriage down the throats of the people of Hawaii

and America."

She appeared on behalf of Alliance for Traditional Marriage and Values, an organization founded by her father to lobby against same-sex marriage.

Lee Cataluna, a columnist for the Honolulu Star-Advertiser, wrote last week, "the unedited truth is that she didn't just slip and say a bad word, she actively, passionately worked against the legalization of same-sex marriage. She belonged to a group of rabid advocates of 'traditional' marriage."

To address such criticisms, Gabbard released a nearly four-minute-long video statement on YouTube last week explaining how she grew up in a socially conservative household but has since formed her own opinions shaped by her life experiences. She apologized for her past statements and the harm they caused.

"I look forward to being

able to share more of my story and experiences growing up — not as an excuse, but in the hopes that it may inspire others to truly live aloha; to love and care for others," she said.

Gabbard has said she's motivated by U.S. foreign policy that has led the country into military conflict in Iraq, Libya and Syria.

She said the actions in the Middle East have

destabilized the region, made the U.S. less safe and cost thousands of American lives. At the same time, terrorist groups like Al Qaeda and the Islamic State group are stronger than before the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks, she said.

In her new video Thursday, she said all Americans have paid the price for what she called "interventionist, regime-change wars."

For now, partisan potshots flowed freely.

As the Senate debated the two dueling proposals, McConnell said the Democratic plan would let that party's lawmakers "make political points and nothing else" because Trump wouldn't sign it. He called Pelosi's stance "unreasonable" and said, "Senate Democrats are not obligated to go down with her ship."

Schumer criticized the GOP plan for endorsing Trump's proposal to keep the government closed until he got what he wants.

"A vote for the president's plan is an endorsement of government by extortion," Schumer said. "If we let him do it today, he'll do it tomorrow, and tomorrow."

The White House closely monitored the Senate votes and Trump spoke with lawmakers throughout the day. He was waiting to see if many Democrats crossed over to back his plan, but West Virginia Sen. Joe Manchin proved to be the only one.

In one indication the lawmakers were ready to act, Vice President Mike Pence attended a pre-vote lunch with GOP senators and heard eagerness for the standoff to end, participants said. Sen. Roy Blunt, R-Mo., said their message to Pence was "Find a way forward."

did not mention the furloughed workers during his Oval Office address to the nation earlier this month and has said that government employees "will make adjustments" to get by.

Asked Thursday what his message to furloughed workers was, Trump said: "I love them. I respect them. I really appreciate the great job they're doing." He continued to insist that "many of those people that are not getting paid are totally in favor of what we're doing because they know the future of this country is dependent on having a strong border."

the most encouraging statements either side has made since the shutdown began Dec. 22.

At the White House, Trump told reporters he'd support a "reasonable" compromise but suggested he'd want it to include a "pro-rated down payment for the wall," which he did not describe. He said he has "other alternatives" for getting wall funding, an apparent reference to his disputed claim that he could declare a national emergency and fund its construction using other programs in the federal budget.

It was initially unclear whether the flurry of activity would produce results. House Speaker Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif., whose relationship with Trump seems to have soured by the day, told reporters a "big" down payment would not be "a reasonable agreement." Asked if she knew how much money Trump meant, Pelosi said, "I don't know if he knows what he's talking about."

In an embarrassment to Trump that could weaken his position whenever negotiations get serious, the Democratic proposal got two more votes than the GOP plan. There were six Republican defectors,

including freshman Sen. Mitt Romney, R-Utah, who's clashed periodically with the president.

For most of Thursday, both parties in conflicting ways to showed their sympathy for unpaid federal workers while yielding no ground in their fight over Trump's demand to build a border wall with Mexico.

The Senate first rejected a Republican plan reopening government through September and giving Trump the \$5.7 billion he's demanded for building segments of that wall, a project that he'd long promised Mexico would finance. The 50-47 vote

for the measure fell 10 shy of the 60 votes needed to succeed.

Minutes later, senators voted 52-44 for a Democratic alternative that sought to open padlocked agencies through Feb. 8 with no wall money. That was eight votes short. It was aimed at giving bargainers time to seek an accord while getting paychecks to government workers who are either working without pay or being forced to stay home.

Flustered lawmakers said Thursday's votes could be a reality check that would prod the start of talks. Throughout, the

two sides have issued mutually exclusive demands that have blocked negotiations from even starting: Trump has refused to reopen government until Congress gives him the wall money, and congressional Democrats have rejected bargaining until he reopens government.

Thursday's votes could "teach us that the leaders are going to have to get together and figure out how to resolve this," said Sen. John Thune of South Dakota, the No. 2 Senate GOP leader. He added, "One way or another we've got to get out of this. This is no win for anybody."

"Is this the 'Let them eat cake' kind of attitude?" said House Speaker Nancy Pelosi. "Or call your father for money?" With that, the speaker evoked Marie Antoinette and took an indirect jab at Trump for inheriting family money to launch his business career.

Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer, D-N.Y., said Ross' comments "reveal the administration's callous indifference toward the federal workers it is treating as pawns."

He added: "Secretary Ross, they just can't call their stock broker and ask them to sell some of their shares."

Deeming air traffic controllers who are calling in sick "disappointing," Ross said that workers will eventually get their pay and that there is no reason why a loan would not be a reasonable option for workers who have been staring at zeros on their pay statements.

"Now, true, the people might have to pay a little bit of interest, but the idea that it's paycheck or zero is not a really valid idea," said Ross, whose financial disclosure forms

reveal \$700 million in assets.

The president said he hadn't seen Ross's comments but added: "I do understand perhaps he should have said it differently."

Trump said the commerce secretary's point was that grocery stores, banks and other local entities were "working along" with federal employees to ease the shutdown's impact. He added that Ross has "done a great job."

Other Trump officials have been more effective in conveying their sympathies for those affected by the shutdown.

one day and you've been there many times. But I think that would be very disrespectful to the State of the Union."

Trump went so far as to praise Pelosi's move as "actually reasonable" — although he had blasted her position just a day earlier.

The reversal surprised those who have known Trump for years.

Throughout his presidency, Trump has revealed

in his take-no-prisoners negotiating style — from talking tough against North Korea to slapping tariffs on allies. And he has dug in his heels time and time again, refusing to admit errors and insisting that he won't accept a budget deal that doesn't include money for his promised border wall.

"Nobody's ever seen him make such a concession in public," said former campaign aide Sam Nunberg. "The only thing I can think of is that he wasn't going to like the optics of not giving it in

the House chamber."

As late as Wednesday afternoon, officials had been busy discussing contingency locations, including a rally-style event, an Oval Office address, a speech in the Senate chamber and even a visit to a border state.

"We always like to have a plan B," White House press secretary Sarah Huckabee Sanders had said Wednesday.

But White House officials were caught off guard when Pelosi announced that she would block Trump from speaking

## Healthy Stamkos regains his groove

SAN JOSE, Calif. — Steven Stamkos in a give-and-go is a scary thing, no matter who joins him on the rush.

Even more than most players, the Lightning center can do major damage whether he takes the shot or dishes it out.

And he has an uncanny sense on making that choice.

"Probably back in the day, guys liked playing with him because he's going to finish it," Lightning assistant coach Derek Lalonde said. "Now, guys like playing with him because you have give-and-goes, you're going to get it back."

It doesn't always have to be a give-and-go. Sometimes it's just in the course of the play. When the Lightning beat Dallas 2-1 on Jan. 15, Stamkos demonstrated just why a goalie can't assume.

He entered the zone with speed and with

Ondrej Palat on his wing, a couple of steps behind. Stamkos skated through three Stars and pulled the puck around his body, giving himself both a shooting lane and a passing lane. Goaltender Anton Khudobin shifted toward Stamkos, but he backhanded the puck over to Palat instead.

Palat scored before Khudobin could get back in position.

That play is just one of the 57 reasons why 28-year-old Stamkos will play in his sixth NHL All-Star Game this weekend at San Jose's SAP Center.

His 57 points put Stamkos on pace for a 95-point season, which would be his highest since that 60-goal season at age 22.

Stamkos started out as a known goal scorer, but he's made a conscious effort to become more of a playmaker in the last year or two.

It helped that last season he played with winger Nikita Kucherov,

who started the year on a tear as a scorer. Kucherov suggested that took some attention away from Stamkos' own scoring. Now, on separate lines but the same power play, Stamkos has found a balance. His scoring is almost evenly split between goals and assists.

When the season started, some wondered if Stamkos had peaked and would even reach 25 goals on the year. He has 26, one short of his total all of last year.

Even more impressive, he's produced most of his scoring in the latter half of the team's games. On Dec. 1, Stamkos had eight goals. He was 57th in the league with 22 points. Now, Stamkos is 14th in the NHL, having scored a career-high 14 goals in December and four more in January. He's also in the midst of a six-game streak of at least one assist.

"You play this game long enough, you go through streaks like this," Stamkos said.

## Less bucks for Bucs

### Ticket prices drop after attendance falls

TAMPA — Hang on to your seats, Bucs fans.

This is good news for you. The crowds may have thinned a bit, but your wallet will be fatter after purchasing tickets.

After experiencing their worst attendance since 2010 and a drop in fans at Raymond James Stadium for the third straight year, the Bucs are reducing the cost for season pass holders to attend a game next season.

The lowest entry level price to watch the Bucs play at home will be only \$30, plus a Tampa Sports Authority fee and sales tax.

The Bucs sent out renewals to season pass members today that showed a decrease of anywhere from an eight to 32 percent on seats in the 300 level. Eleven percent of members with lower level seats will receive decreases with the rest remaining flat.

Nearly all club members will see a price decrease from six to 17 percent.

In fact, the average

price for a general ticket to a Bucs game will be \$76.28, which would rank 24th in the NFL based on last year's figures.

Bucs chief operating officer Brian Ford said. "For the second year in a row, there will be no price increase for our season pass members ensuring that we remain one of the most affordably priced tickets in the NFL. We

# Charlotte uses athleticism, survives in North Port

Neither team led by more than 9 in Tarpons' 68-64 win

Johnson wreaked havoc underneath for Charlotte. He used his length and touch down low to score 17 second-half points to finish with a game-high 31.

"They don't really have that low-post presence defensively," Massolio said. "(Ahmad) can just elevate and score over guys and did a nice job of getting to the basket and scoring. We switched defenses and made some stops and then converted on those stops."

Tre Carroll also played a big role in the Tarpons' second half success. Carroll finished with 17 points and pulled down some key offensive rebounds that led to second chance buckets.

"He rebounds and plays with a good motor," said Massolio. "He's improving each and every game. Offensively, we were more patient and ran a lot more sets in the second half and were able to get the ball to where we wanted. It made a difference and will help us down the stretch."

While the Tarpons continue to roll through their regular season schedule and will surely be a major factor come playoff time, the Bobcats are beginning to show they are capable of playing with anyone. North Port will have to beat top seeds Gulf Coast and Riverdale on the road in order to claim a district title. The Bobcats took the Sharks

to overtime twice, and lost to Riverdale by just two points at home.

"Our guys believe we can beat both of those teams," Power said. "We're going to continue to play tough competition down the stretch. We're going to use those games to get better and gain confidence."

Both teams played a full 32 minutes of high-energy basketball, leaving little doubt that Thursday's tight, physical matchup will benefit both teams come playoff time.

# No. 6 Michigan State blows past No. 19 Iowa, 82-67

## Cassius Winston scored 23 points as MSU extends its winning streak to 13 games

IOWA CITY, Iowa (AP) — Iowa had the crowd rocking and plenty of momentum on its side.

But sixth-ranked Michigan State had the necessary toughness, blowing past the upstart Hawkeyes in a vintage Tom Izzo performance on the road.

Cassius Winston scored 23 points, Nick Ward had 21 points with 10 rebounds and the Spartans beat No. 19 Iowa 82-67 on Thursday night, extending their winning streak to 13 games.

Matt McQuaid added three second-half 3-pointers for the

Spartans (18-2, 9-0 Big Ten), who used a 24-2 run just after halftime to secure a school-record 21st consecutive league victory.

"What I've been most impressed with with my team is ... they're responding to things. They don't take things personal," said Izzo, the longtime Michigan State coach. "I was pleased with how we finished the game."

Tyler Cook scored 11 points in the first four minutes of the second half to give Iowa a 50-42 lead. But he was soon matched by the unflappable Winston, who hit three 3s in a row to help the Spartans retake the

lead, 53-50.

Ward's three-point play pushed the run to 14-0 and put Michigan State ahead 56-50 — mere moments after it appeared Iowa might pull away.

McQuaid's 3 and three more points from Winston, this time at the foul line, gave the Spartans a 66-52 edge. "That kid is a special player," Iowa coach Fran McCaffery said of Winston. "He makes big shots in very important situations. He's really consistent at doing that. ... That's why they are where they are."

Luka Garza scored 20 points and Tyler Cook had 17 for Iowa (16-4,

5-4), which won its previous five games. The Hawkeyes entered leading the nation in free throw attempts and makes, but hit just eight. Michigan State went 20 of 21 from the line, and Ward hit all seven of his tries.

"The two things that we needed to do was to defend without fouling ... and Nick Ward, who's come so far with his free throw shooting, for us to go 20 of 21, I think those two things along with some pretty good defense" were crucial, Izzo said.

### BIG PICTURE

Michigan State: This

is how teams win conference titles in tough leagues. The Spartans were on the road in a very hostile gym playing a team they embarrassed 90-68 in East Lansing on Dec. 3, and they still found a way to pull it out. It was quite the unintentional foreshadowing that Iowa was playing Ariana Grande's "Thank U, Next" when Michigan State came out for layup drills, because that's exactly how it went down in the second half. "A lot of constructive criticism went on," Ward joked about the halftime scene in the Michigan State locker room. "Yeah, I'll call it that."

Iowa: The Hawkeyes

blew a golden opportunity to knock off one of the best teams in America. But Michigan State is one of the best teams in America in part because of its resilience, and the Spartans showed plenty of that with their second-half rally. The Hawkeyes now know exactly how they would match up with a Final Four contender, and they didn't get the answer they were hoping for. "We have to work on, once we're getting consecutive baskets instead of trading baskets, being able to turn a six- or eight-point lead into an 11- or 14-point lead," Iowa's Nicholas Baer said.

# Young, Ogunbowale power Irish by Volunteers

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Jackie Young had a triple-double and Arike Ogunbowale scored 28 points as No. 1 Notre Dame rallied in the second half to beat Tennessee 77-62 on Thursday night and continue the Lady Vols' longest losing streak in nearly half a century.

Young had 16 points, 12 rebounds, 10 assists and only two turnovers for the seventh triple-double in Notre Dame history. The school's last player to post a triple-double was Lindsay Allen against Chattanooga on Dec. 27, 2016.

Ogunbowale scored 24 of her 28 points in the second half to help Notre Dame (18-1) earn its 12th consecutive victory.

Tennessee (12-7) lost for the sixth consecutive time. The Lady Vols also lost six straight in 1970.

Notre Dame trailed 38-32 early in the third quarter before Ogunbowale scored seven points in an 11-0 run. Tennessee rallied to tie it at 44, but Ogunbowale scored 11 more points in a 19-2 spurt by Notre Dame that extended its lead to 63-46 with 6½ minutes remaining.

The Irish scored 13 straight points during that 19-2 stretch.

Tennessee's Zaay Green scored a career-high 19 points to go along with eight rebounds and five assists. Evina Westbrook scored 16.

Jessica Shepard and Brianna Turner each scored 13 points

### No. 4 Louisville 68, No. 22 Florida State 49

Asia Durr bounced back from her worst game of the season with 29 points, and No. 4 Louisville jumped out to an

early lead in a 68-49 win over No. 22 Florida State.

Durr shot 10 of 16 from the floor with seven rebounds to lead the Cardinals (18-1, 6-1 Atlantic Coast Conference) to their fourth straight victory. Kiah Gillespie had 13 points and six rebounds for Florida State (16-3, 4-2). Nicki Ekhomu added 11 points.

Kylee Shook grabbed nine rebounds for Louisville, which had a 37-25 edge on the boards. The 6-foot-4 Shook also had eight points and five blocks.

Sam Fuehring scored 11 points for the Cardinals.

### No. 7 Mississippi St 90, Florida 42

Sophomore guard Bre'amber Scott added 15 points off the bench for the Bulldogs (18-1, 6-0 SEC), who won their eighth straight game. Senior guard Jordan Danberry had 12 points and four assists, while freshman guard Xaria Wiggins added 11 points.

Mississippi State dominated in all phases of the game, outscoring the Gators 37-6 in points off turnovers and 48-12 in points in the paint.

Senior guard Funda Nakkasoglu led the Gators (5-14, 1-5 SEC) with 14 points. Florida turned the ball over 27 times and was dealt its most lopsided loss of the season.

Howard scored 17 points in the first quarter, including a

5-foot floater in the lane off an in-bounds play at the buzzer that gave the Bulldogs a 27-9 lead.

# All-Star Game selections in hands of captains

## James and Antetokounmpo will draft the remainder of their rosters Feb. 7

LeBron James of the Los Angeles Lakers and Giannis Antetokounmpo of the Milwaukee Bucks are the captains for this year's NBA All-Star Game.

James and Antetokounmpo were the leading vote-getters from each conference, making them the players who will choose who plays on which team for the Feb. 17 matchup at Charlotte.

They will draft their teams on Feb. 7. As the leading overall vote-getter, James will have the first pick — just as he did last year, when the captain's-choice format was used for the All-Star rosters for the first time.

James extended his NBA record by being chosen as a starter for the 15th straight time. Antetokounmpo is now a three-time All-Star.

The starting guards from the East are Boston's Kyrie Irving and Charlotte's Kemba Walker — who'll get to start on his home floor. The East frontcourt picks were Antetokounmpo, Toronto's Kawhi Leonard and Philadelphia's Joel Embiid.

From the West, Stephen Curry and reigning NBA MVP James Harden were the picks at guard, with James, Golden State's Kevin Durant and Oklahoma City's Paul George getting the frontcourt spots.

George won a tiebreaker over New Orleans' Anthony Davis for the final West frontcourt starting spot.

Walker was pleased to see that he'll have the chance to start on his home floor.

"It's kind of surreal. It's kind of surreal," Walker told TNT. "I had a lot of doubt coming into my early career about just even being an elite point guard in this league. So for me to become an All-Star for two straight years and then now to become an All-Star starter most definitely proves the doubters wrong. So this is an unbelievable moment in my career."

Reserves will be announced Jan. 31. From there, James and Antetokounmpo will choose the rest of their 12-man rosters, with conference affiliations irrelevant.

All-Star starters are chosen by a combination of voting from fans, media and NBA players. Among the notable snubs

based on fan voting: Dallas rookie Luka Doncic, who was second in the West frontcourt voting; Minnesota's Derrick Rose, who outpolled Harden for the No. 2 spot in the West guard voting; and Miami guard Dwyane Wade, who fans voted second among East guards in his 16th and final NBA season.

# Who has the championship edge?

## Taking a closer look at the key matchups ahead of Super Bowl LIII

The previous time the Rams played in a Super Bowl, the opponent was New England. It didn't work out so well for the then-St. Louis team.

The Patriots, of course, have made a habit of being in the NFL championship game — this is their eighth since that 2002 victory over the Greatest Show On Turf.

Here's how they'll match up in Atlanta:

### WHEN NEW ENGLAND HAS THE BALL

Thanks to a dominating line led by LT Trent Brown, C David Andrews and RG Shaq Mason, Tom Brady barely was touched and never was sacked by Kansas City in the AFC title game. And the Chiefs led the league in sacks.

If that group can be just as stout against All-Pro DT Aaron Donald, the only unanimous choice for the squad, Ndamukong Suh and Michael Brockers, Brady could have another one of his MVP performances. However, the secondary he'll face this time is far superior to what the Chiefs put on the field, particularly with cornerbacks Aqib Talib and Marcus Peters — and backup Nickell Robey-Coleman, he of the now-infamous helmet-hit pass interference non-call against the Saints.

Those two must be aggressive at the line of scrimmage against WRs Julian Edelman and Chris Hogan, who were so open on some routes against Kansas City it looked like a passing drill.

The other intriguing matchup here is TE Rob Gronkowski against safeties Lamaricus

Joyner and John Johnson III, who are physical enough to deal with Gronk, but it's a wearying and thankless task.

And there's this for LA to deal with: Rookie Sony Michel has become a ground force with his power and instincts. Fellow RB James White is one of the best receivers out of the backfield in the league, and third-stringer Rex Burkhead scored twice, including the winning TD for the AFC crown.

Rams defensive coordinator Wade Phillips will challenge Brady with his schemes, but LA must disrupt the QB's timing and comfort zone. Brady's O-line has to prevent that.

### WHEN LOS ANGELES HAS THE BALL

Michel's former teammate at Georgia, All-Pro RB Todd Gurley, has been battling knee issues. While late-season pickup C.J. Anderson has been masterful, the Rams need a healthy and productive Gurley for the Super Bowl. At least he's had extra time to heal.

Gurley led the NFL with 21 TDs and ranked fourth with 1,831 yards from scrimmage. He'd be a handful as a receiver for Patriots LBs Dont'a Hightower and Kyle Van Noy, who comes off a superb outing in Kansas City. So one of the DBs, perhaps safeties Devin McCourty or Patrick Chung, could get some assignments.

The Rams want to have balance on offense, and they certainly have the options in the passing game with Jared Goff throwing to WRs Robert Woods, Brandin Cooks and rapidly developing Josh Reynolds. Cooks will be eager for a big game after the Patriots dealt him to LA last offseason. He'll likely see plenty of All-Pro CB

Stephon Gilmore, who struggled a bit in KC.

New England managed four sacks of Patrick Mahomes and the Rams can't be that generous if they expect to carry off the Lombardi Trophy. Steady linemen LT Andrew Whitworth, LG Rodger Saffold and RT Rob Havenstein must hold their own against DE Trey Flowers, Van Noy and the guys on the interior for New England.

### SPECIAL TEAMS

What more can Greg The Leg do? Well, LA placekicker Greg Zuerlein (could follow his clutch work in the Big Easy with a Super Bowl-winning boot.

Rams punter Johnny Hekker converted a fake punt for a first down at New Orleans and has one of the most powerful legs in the league.

The Patriots are more likely to break something in the return game with Cordarrelle Patterson on kickoffs. New England features the usually reliable Edelman on punts, although he did — or didn't — fumble one against the Chiefs.

Stephen Gostkowski has made more pressure attempts than nearly any current NFL placekicker and Ryan Allen does a solid job punting.

### COACHING

Seeing how the Patriots dominated the Chiefs early on both sides of the ball, OC Josh McDaniels and unofficial DC Brian Flores had a superb game plan. But KC began moving the ball almost at will in the second half, and the Rams are capable of the same. That makes for a key question: Can LA slow down the precision passing and powerful/slashing running of Michel?

# Senior Bowl edge rushers out to be next Davenport

MOBILE, Ala. — Jaylon Ferguson and Oshane Ximines would love to be the next Marcus Davenport.

They're already following in Davenport's steps, going from prolific Conference USA pass rushers to the Senior Bowl. Davenport last year parlayed that success into the first round of the NFL draft, getting picked 14th overall by the New Orleans Saints.

This week, Louisiana Tech's Ferguson — the NCAA career sacks leader — and Old Dominion's Ximines are among the edge rushers trying to improve their own draft stock at the Senior Bowl, including Mississippi State's highly rated Montez Sweat.

"Marcus Davenport opened the door for players like me and

Oshane," Ferguson said. "Conference USA, we have a lot of great pass rushers. Marcus Davenport came down here last year and he really kicked the door down for a lot of us to come down here and shine."

The three practices before representatives of NFL teams leading up to Saturday's game give them a chance to go against elite offensive line prospects like Washington State tackle Andre Dillard.

And maybe take advantage of the opportunity like Davenport did.

"I watched Marcus Davenport before you guys even knew about him," Ximines said. "We played against him at UTSA (Texas-San Antonio). We were both young. I was a freshman. He was a sophomore. We kind of eyed each other

... It's just awesome to see where he ended up. He's a hell of a player."

Ferguson feels he has plenty to prove even after breaking Terrell Suggs' NCAA career sacks record with 2.5 sacks in the Hawaii Bowl against Hawaii.

"You know, I've got 45 career sacks, all-time NCAA career leader, but I'm here to show I can do it against better competition," Ferguson said. Here's a look at a few of the top edge rushers at the Senior Bowl:

— Mississippi State's Sweat might be the most highly rated player at the all-star game and is projected as a potential Top 10 pick. He's drawn plenty of attention with big plays in Senior Bowl practices. The two-time All-SEC performer had 22 sacks over the past two seasons and was a second-team AP All-American.

— Charles Omenihu, DE, Texas: Finished his career with a big senior season, earning first-team All-Big 12 honors. He had 9.5 sacks and 18 tackles for loss.

— Ximines, DE, Old Dominion: Was a defensive playmaker throughout his career, finishing fifth in FBS with 12 sacks as a senior. He also forced 11 fumbles and collected 33 sacks in his four-year career. He ranked tied for first in forced fumbles among active players and trailed only Ferguson in career sacks. He and teammate, wide receiver Travis Fulgham, are the first Old Dominion players at the Senior Bowl.

— Zach Allen, DE, Boston College: Had 18.5 sacks over the past three seasons with 40 tackles for loss. Could have been an early-round pick last season but returned as a senior.

# Pollock signs with Dodgers

LOS ANGELES — The Dodgers have reached a five-year deal with free-agent center fielder A.J. Pollock.

The potential total value of the contract is \$60 million, but the pact includes a potential opt-out after the third year and a \$10 million player option with a \$5 million buyout for the fifth year.

Pollock, 31, spent his first seven seasons in the majors with the Arizona Diamondbacks after the club selected him with the 17th overall pick in the 2009 draft. He enjoyed a career season in 2015, when he batted .315 with an .865 on-base-plus-slugging percentage, 20 home runs, six triples and 39 stolen bases.

But elbow, groin, hand and thumb injuries plagued him the last three seasons and he hasn't been the same

offensive threat. Last season, he batted .257 with 21 home runs and an .800 OPS in 113 games. His defense remained elite in center field.

The offseason had left the Dodgers, platoon loyalists, in need of a right-handed batter. They traded away Yasiel Puig and Matt Kemp — to the Cincinnati Reds last month. Yasmani Grandal, a switch-hitting catcher, signed with the Milwaukee Brewers.

Justin Turner, Enrique Hernandez, Chris Taylor and the catching duo of Austin Barnes and Russell Martin are the only right-handed hitters projected to play regularly next season. Only Hernandez and Taylor will see time in the outfield.

Their other four outfielders on the roster — Cody Bellinger, Joc Pederson, Alex Verdugo and Andrew Toles — are left-handed batters.

# Quarterback transfers shaking up Power Five

Virginia Tech became the latest school to see one of its quarterbacks affected by the NCAA's transfer portal this week when 2017 starter Josh Jackson announced his intention to finish his career elsewhere.

As a grad transfer, Jackson will be eligible immediately at another program.

His decision came not long after Jalen Hurts left Alabama for Oklahoma, and after Miami landed Tate Martell from Ohio State.

Of the 65 Power Five programs, at least 27 have added or lost a transfer

quarterback (or both) since the start of last season. The list includes Miami (which added Martell), Florida State (which got Jordan Travis from Louisville) and Notre Dame (which lost Brandon Wimshush to UCF). I'm also including quarterbacks who put their names in the portal but have not yet announced

where they're going, even though they could return to their current school.

I feel pretty good about that 27 number because Power Five programs are covered so extensively by my media colleagues. ESPN and 247Sports even have special pages for the transfer portal. Add in Group of Five

schools, and I count at least 33 programs that have been affected by quarterbacks entering the portal.

The number might be higher because it's easier for players at smaller schools to get overlooked. Chris Oladokun left USF for Samford but isn't on either list, for example.

# Nadal reaches fifth Australian Open final

MELBOURNE, Australia (AP) — Rafael Nadal is certainly not treating tennis' next generation well at the Australian Open.

Add 20-year-old Stefanos Tsitsipas to the list of youngsters Nadal has bullied on his way to his fifth final at Melbourne Park and 25th at all Grand Slam tournaments.

Nadal needed all of 11 minutes Thursday to show Tsitsipas — and everyone else — that the kid's upset of Roger Federer was not going to be replicated on this night. Not even close. Breaking Tsitsipas in the match's third game and then another five times Thursday, while never facing a single break point himself until the very last game, Nadal won 6-2, 6-4, 6-0. He has won all 18 sets he has played thus far.

"It felt like a different dimension of tennis completely," said the 14th-seeded Tsitsipas, a blank expression on his face. "He gives you no rhythm. He plays just a different game style than the rest of the players. He has this, I don't know, talent that no other player has."

It was the same straight-set, no-contest treatment Nadal gave to 19-year-old Alex de Minaur in the third round and 21-year-old Frances Tiafoe in the quarterfinals.

Asked if he was trying to make a statement with the way he soundly defeated these up-and-coming talents, Nadal said:

"They don't need any message, no. They are good. They're improving every month."

Tsitsipas' run to the first major semifinal of his nascent career was most notable for the way he beat 20-time major champion Federer in the fourth round, saving 12 of 12 break points across four sets and 3 hours, 45 minutes.

But the left-handed Nadal was a much more difficult puzzle to solve.

On Sunday, the 32-year-old Spaniard will try to earn his second Australian Open title — he won the hard-court event in 2009 — and his 18th Slam trophy.

That final will come against either top-seeded Novak Djokovic or Lucas Pouille, who meet Friday.

A title would make Nadal only the third man in the sport's history to win each Grand Slam title at least twice, joining retired Australian greats Rod Laver — a front-row spectator Thursday night in an arena named for him — and Roy Emerson.

After a series of health issues, Nadal is once again the relentless forehand-whipping force that can dominate anyone.

He quit during his quarterfinal match at Melbourne Park a year ago because of a right leg problem, then stopped again during his semifinal at the U.S. Open in September because of a painful right knee. That was followed by offseason surgery on his right ankle.

## Former umpire, Florida resident Jim McKean dead

Jim McKean, who umpired 10 no-hitters and three World Series during a big league career from 1973-01, has died. He was 73.

Jamie McKean, one of his sons, said McKean died in his sleep early Thursday at Bayfront Medical Center in St. Petersburg, Florida, near his home.

Jim McKean had kidney issues and while at St. Anthony's Hospital in St. Petersburg around Thanksgiving developed a MRSA infection. He had appeared to have

recovered from the infection but remained weakened.

"I think his heart just gave out," his son said.

A Montreal native, Jim McKean played baseball, football and basketball at Monklands High School, then played professionally in the Canadian Football League. He was a punter and backup quarterback for the Montreal Alouettes in 1964-65, then was traded to Saskatchewan and was a punter for the Roughriders as they won the Grey Cup in 1966.

Following a back injury, he returned to college at Concordia. He hoped to

become an NHL referee but did not skate well.

McKean's career path changed after he attended an Expos game at Montreal's Jarry Park with a friend.

"His friend was a little drunk and yelled down at one of the umpires on the field, Billy Williams, 'Hey, my friend wants to be an umpire,'" Jamie McKean recalled. "And so, he said, 'OK, well, if he's serious, come down the locker room after the game.' And so my dad went home and changed like it was an interview and came back and he said he gave me information for the umpire school in

Gulfport, Florida, down here in St. Pete, and the rest is history."

McKean umpired in the minor leagues from 1970-73, joined the American League staff in 1973 and made his big league debut that September. His 10 no-hitters tied the record shared by Silk O'Loughlin and Paul Pryor, a mark broken when Bruce Froemming worked his 11th with the St. Louis Cardinals' Bud Smith on the mound in September 2001.

All of McKean's no-hitters were as a base umpire. He was behind the plate when Toronto's Roy Halladay was hitless

through 8 <sup>2</sup>/<sub>3</sub> innings against Detroit on Sept. 27, 1998, then allowed Bobby Higginson's home run. That was the second big league appearance for Halladay, who was elected to baseball's Hall of Fame this week.

McKean umpired All-Star Games in 1980, 1982 and 1993, and the World Series in 1979, 1985 and 1995.

"To be honest with you, umpires have to get up for big games, too," McKean said in 2008. "My premise is, if the umpiring is not good, the games are not good. You can have the two best teams in the world, and if that

umpire behind the plate or that umpire on the bases is not good, then it's not going to be a good game."

McKean worked his last game in 2001. He was on staff for the first half of 2002 and began an umpire supervisor at the All-Star break. He was let go after the 2010 season and became an umpire analyst for ESPN in 2011.

McKean was inducted into the Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame in 2004.

In addition to Jamie, he is survived by another son, Brett. McKean's wife, the former Ann Carey, died in 2007.

## Rays win battle for Drake

Twice this winter, the Rays have shown they wanted RH reliever Oliver Drake — to a degree.

The Rays acquired Drake twice, first on waivers from the Twins in November then in a small trade from the Blue Jays earlier this month, but ended up designating him for assignment both times as they needed a space on the 40-man roster.

But they have now won the battle for Drake, as he went unclaimed through waivers and accepted an outright

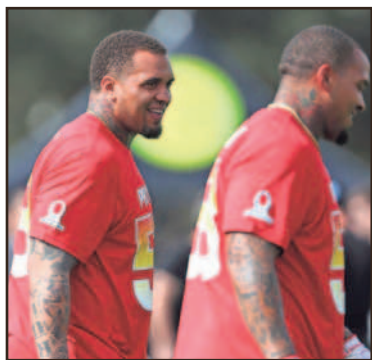
The Bucs are banking on the hiring of head coach Bruce Arians to give them a boost in season pass members after back-to-back 5-11 seasons.

"Maybe I'll be a Charger for a play," Maurkice Pouncey said.



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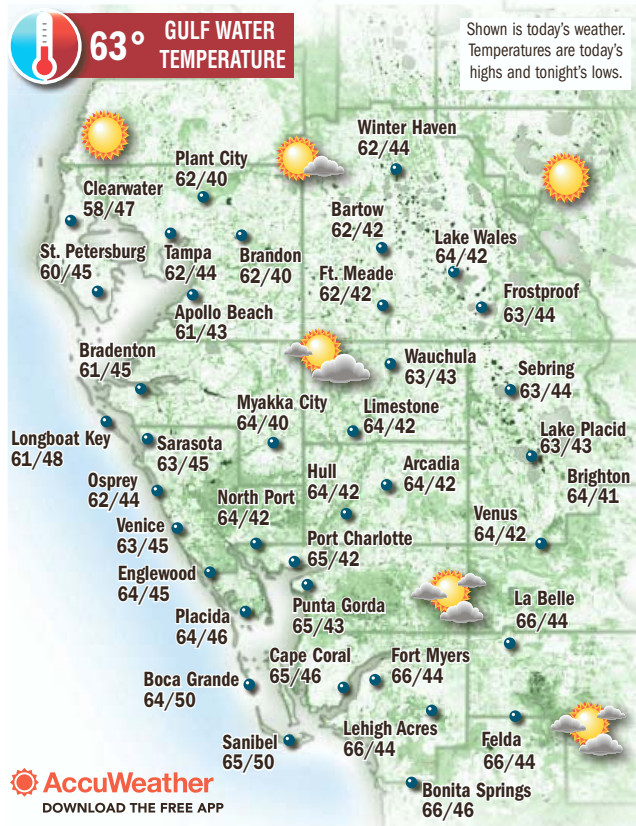

# Rahm opens with eagle, one-shot lead over Rose

SAN DIEGO (AP) — All the attention was on Tiger Woods and his 2019 debut. Just like the last two occasions, Jon Rahm delivered the best performance.

In ideal conditions even by San Diego standards, Rahm opened with an eagle and kept going lower until he had a 10-under 62 on the North course at Torrey Pines, giving him a one-shot lead over Justin Rose after the opening round Thursday at the Farmers Insurance Open.

"You play the South on the first day, you're trying to survive," Rahm said. "On the North, you've got to start under par to keep up. I kept the pedal down."

Woods was on the tougher South course, where he won his last major, the 2008 U.S. Open. He made three birdies on the back nine for a 70, which he thought could have been lower but found acceptable given that it was his first competition in nearly two months.

"I probably could have shot something around 68 or 67 today pretty easily," Woods said. "I hit a lot of good putts that were around the hole that just didn't quite fall in. Overall, shooting a couple under par on the South course is not so bad, but now I'm forced to have to shoot a low one tomorrow just like most of the field did over there today."

Rahm's highlight last year was beating Woods on Sunday in the Ryder Cup during a European victory in France. He ended the year by closing with a 65 to win Woods' holiday tournament in the Bahamas.

They were on opposite ends of Torrey Pines, and the Spaniard made the most of being on the North course, which is 440 yards shorter and

played just over two shots easier on average. He made two eagles on the back nine to go out in 29, and his only regret was missing a 7-foot birdie putt on his final hole that would have tied the North course record set 12 years ago by Brandt Snedeker, who was in his group.

"I don't think you ever tee up on any course at Torrey Pines expecting to shoot 10-under par," said Rahm, who won at Torrey two years ago for his first PGA Tour title.

Rose played in the group behind him, also opened with an eagle and did his best to keep up. He played bogey-free for a 63 and finished with a birdie. He played in the same group as Jordan Spieth (65) and Billy Horschel (66), a group that combined for 21 birdies and two eagles, a better-ball score of 59.

"They told us our combined group was the lowest," Spieth said. "I'm glad, because if there were lower than that, it means everybody went low."

Charles Howell III and Brandon Nagy had the lowest scores on the South at 66, and Nagy did that with three bogeys on his card.

"You don't see many days when you don't have any wind," Howell said. "The scores were a lot lower than I thought they would be."

Ninety-seven players in the 156-man field broke par. Even more unusual was that no one shot worse than 77.

Most of that was the ideal weather, and while the North is a little tougher than it used to be, the new greens from the Tom Weiskopf redo have settled in and were much easier to hold. Add to that a collection of shorter par 4s, and there was no shortage of

birdies.

Rahm led the way in what he calls his special place.

This is where he won for the first time on the PGA Tour, when he holed a 60-foot eagle putt on the 18th hole. He loves Torrey Pines so much that this was the only tournament where he tried Monday qualifying while at Arizona State (he missed). And this is where he proposed to his girlfriend, Kelley Cahill, on the hiking trails around Torrey.

"So there's a lot of reasons for me to be happy every time I come here, no matter how I play," Rahm said.

He had plenty of reason to smile after a 62, matching his low round in his short career.

Rahm made his only bogey on the tough par-3 third, and he was in trouble in the rough on the next hole until escaping with par. He responded with four straight birdies, and was just short of the green on the par-5 ninth when his pitch ran out 7 feet past the hole and his birdie putt to tie the course record caught the left lip.

"It's nice to get the North out of the way, shoot a good score, just what you have to do," Rose said.

Woods and Rory McIlroy, who opened with a 71, move over to the North.

"It seems like everybody over on the North course shot low numbers, and obviously it's playing a little bit easier than we've had the last couple of years over there," Woods said. "After the changes, those greens have been usually extremely firm and difficult to get the ball close. If that many guys shot that many under par, it might be a different story."



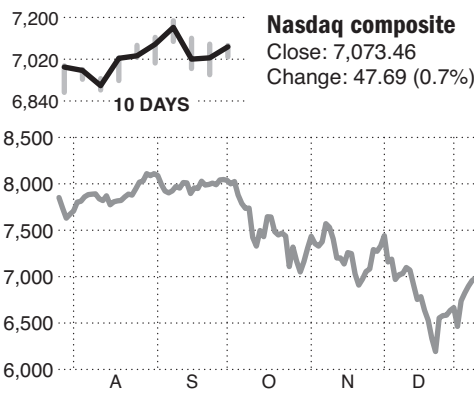
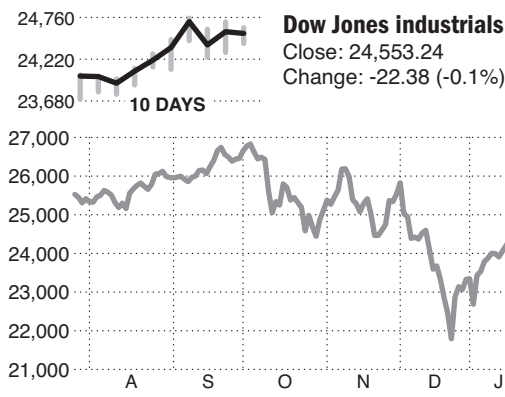
