Sunday morning beer and wine sales may be approved Aug 7

POLK COUNTY – Soon beer and wine may be available for purchase Sunday mornings in unincorporated portions of the county.

The first of two required public hearings was on July 24. A vote will take place Aug. 7 after

the second public hearing.

“(County) Staff found that extending the time in which sale of packaged beer and wine on Sundays will contribute to greater consistency and lessen the potential economic disadvantages between sales establishments in the unincorporated areas and those opposite jurisdictional borders,” according to a Polk County Development

Review Committee Staff Report dated June 14.

The county planning commission voted 7-0 to approve the report July 11.

Commissioner Bill Braswell proposed allowing beer, wine and liquor package sales in the unincorporated parts of the county during a workshop meeting June 15.

Health Dept fees increased without a public hearing

POLK COUNTY – In September 2016, Freeman made a recommendation to the county commission to raise several Polk County Health Department fees but neglected to attach the appropriate documents to an agenda packet. In layman terms, Freeman did not show the commissioners the rate changes and there was never a public hearing to debate them.

County Commissioner John Hall subsequently signed resolution 16-102 increasing the fees without ever publicly discussing them with his fellow commissioners. All of the fees were implemented except the increase to the fee to inspect septic tanks.

Staff with the Polk County Health Department, responsible for inspecting septic tanks, noticed that the fee increase was never implemented. In June, health department and other county staff met with members of the Polk County Builder's Association to announce the change.

Not understanding what happened, several of the contractors reached out to county commissioners. A few days later, the county commissioners met in a workshop and instructed Freeman to look into the matter.

During a June 15 budget workshop meeting, Freeman admitted that in the rush to present a budget that year, he made multiple mistakes.

"Through this discussion we found other examples where we were trying, with two board meetings per month, to push things to an agenda, to conduct business, but that is unacceptable," Freeman said. "The most basic approach to this agenda should be that actions taken by the board, the contracts, resolutions, ordinances be attached and be available for your in-

spection and the public's inspection."

Following this June 15 statement, County Attorney Michael Craig said the mistake put the county at risk of being sued and recommended that all of the fees implemented in 2016 be ratified and confirmed with the exception of the septic tank fee which was never implemented.

During the county commission meeting July 24, County Attorney Michael Craig recommended the fees that have already been implemented be ratified and confirmed excluding the septic fees.

Very few members of the public attend commission workshops so when Chairman Todd Dantzer opened this up for public discussion July 24, those who stepped to the podium were not aware of Freeman's mistake. Neither Freeman, Craig or any of the commissioners made a statement July 24 as to the error.

Liberty Septic owner Jerry Prescott does business in multiple counties in Central Florida and objected to the septic fee increase saying before the rate increase, fees in Polk were lower than most other counties in the area but if the rate increase pass as is, they will be higher than most other counties.

Commissioners told Prescott that the septic tank fee increase was not being implemented and that there would be a public hearing about it in September. Contacted later, Prescott said when county staff told the PCBA members about the sudden fee increase, it confused many contractors.

"We'd have fought this two years ago if I had known that," Prescott said after being told what happened in 2016.

Rather than explaining this local mistake to the public during a regular commission meeting, County Com-

missioners Melony Bell and George Lindsey blamed state legislators for not setting the septic inspection rate high enough and expressed disagreement that Polk County residents had to pay extra fees to make up the difference, using the term "unfunded mandates" a number of times.

The amount that the county fees were increased without public input are: \$15 annual permit for small pools and \$30 for large pools, \$150 more for an initial pool inspection; \$100 extra for a mobile home review; \$100 more for a tanning or body piercing facility plan review; \$20 more for food service training and \$100 for a food service plan review; \$40 more for group care facility inspections; and various extra fees to test water and water infrastructure projects.

Septic tank inspection fees were scheduled to go up by \$100 for new residential and commercial inspec-

tions and around another \$200 in various other septic tank related fees.

Prescott said fees to inspect a new septic system in Polk County are around \$350 right now and around \$500 if the fee is passed as presented in 2016. Prescott said the same service in Hillsborough County costs around \$400. Prescott said he and other PCBA contractors are planning to be voice input on the subject next month.

Polk County Health Department Public Information Officer Nicole Riley said she is not aware of another county that does not supplement state fees and that county fees supplementing the local health department have been in existence since the 1990s.

"If for some reason these fees were not approved, we would continue to provide the services but the timeliness would likely be affected," Riley said.

Lake Wales Ridge State Forest staff say c'mon down

POLK COUNTY – Staff with Lake Wales Ridge State Forest want to remind county residents who enjoy the great outdoors that there are plenty of recreational opportunities in the state forest near Frostproof.

With a day use fee of \$2.00 and just a short drive away, people can see this beautiful state forest and experience some of Florida's natural ecosystems.

"The state forest is home to many threatened and endangered species of plants and animals, such as the Florida scrub jay, gopher tortoise, sand skink, cutthroat grass ecosystem and the Florida ziziphus."

The state forest is separated into four tracts. Florida Trail Association volunteers and state forest staff maintain 22 miles of hiking trails in the Arbuckle Tract and there are 12 miles of horseback trails in the Walk In Water Tract.

There are lots of primitive and hunting campsites that can be reserved including one along Livingston Creek,

one on the shore of Lake Arbuckle, one near Isabel Creek and one in a xeric hammock / wet flatwoods site, among many other sites.

Does the idea of kayaking in a lake surrounded by nature sound refreshing? Lake Godwin is in the middle of the state forest.

"Arbuckle Creek is pretty, all Cypress," said OPS Agricultural Technician Jennifer Heller. "Some of the biggest Cypress trees on our property are along that creek."

Lake Weohyakapka (Walk-in-the-Water) borders the northeast corner of the property and by state standards the water is pristine, staff said.

"Whether you are a visitor from the other side of the country wanting to see something different or a local wishing to know more about Florida's natural ecosystems, Lake Wales Ridge State Forest has something for you," said OPS Park Services Specialist Jessica Clark. "Make sure to bring plenty of water and enjoy the great outdoors."

Beware when picking saw palmetto

I wanted to point out a new law that went into effect this year, and at first glance to some, might sound like a strange law, but it was passed for good reason.

In Florida, if you take the berries or fruits from someone's saw palmettos without permission, you could be facing a misdemeanor. If you plan to harvest your own saw palmetto berries, you must get a permit (no charge) fourteen days in advance. Again, might sound odd, but it's for good reason, and a lot of research went into this new law.

The Endangered Plant Advisory Council received input from public and private landowners and conservation interests, then unanimously recom-

mended adding saw palmetto to the Department's commercially exploited plant list.

Saw palmetto is believed to have health benefits, so there is a market for it. Because of that, we have people going around collecting the berries, often illegally, and selling them. One particular case a few years back comes to mind. Nine people were arrested as they were stealing the berries from a property in Lake Wales. In all, they harvested 497 pounds of berries, worth more than \$820.

It should go without saying, you must have permission from the owner of the property before you can start picking their berries. In fact, you must have written permission from the landowner or the legal representative prior to harvest. You must also possess a Native Plant Harvesting Permit from the Department prior to harvest.

Critical need for school bus drivers

POLK COUNTY – The Polk County School Board sent out a press release July 24 requesting the media inform the public that there are immediate openings for school bus drivers for the upcoming school year.

“The school district has a critical need to fill approximately 40 bus driver positions,” said Polk County School Board spokesperson Kyle Kennedy. “Bus attendants are needed as well.”

The job starts at \$10 per hour and includes health insurance and retirement benefits. You don’t need a special license, but you will need to

provide the school board with your lifetime driving record and pass a level II background check.

Drivers cannot be insulin dependent diabetic or have blood pressure exceeding 139/89. Driver’s must have vision in both eyes and all of their limbs.

Attendants earn \$8.25 per hour and must have completed the ninth grade.

Driver training is around three or four weeks, less if you possess a specialized license. Attendant training lasts around 20 hours.

Chairman Todd Dantzler proposed a compromise of only beer and wine sales. The only expressed dissent from Chairman Dantzler's proposal was from Commissioner John Hall.

Winter Haven and Lakeland allow for beer, wine and liquor sales on Sunday starting at 7 a.m. Lake Wales allows for purchase of the three starting at 6 a.m. Bartow allows beer and wine package sales starting at noon on Sundays with no liquor purchases

allowed. According to the June 14 report, the majority of alcohol sales establishments in the unincorporated areas are on the periphery of Lakeland and Winter Haven.

Two local residents expressed opinions during the first public hearing.

"The decision before us will ultimately be decided on where we place our values, the sacredness of life or a beer," one said.

Update: Ritz Theatre vs Pam Bondi

WINTER HAVEN – Caught up in legal action by Florida Attorney General Pam Bondi on allegations of "an extensive history of improprieties and irregularities," the iconic Ritz Theatre in downtown Winter Haven real estate contract was signed on Thursday according to court documents, for \$1.65M.

Judge Catherine Combee heard arguments from both sets of lawyers Tuesday, July 31 after press time. Results of the hearing will be published Aug. 8.

On July 30, lawyers representing Heath and the Ritz filed a motion stating now that the Ritz Board of Directors have approved the dissolution and sale of all assets, there is no need for further legal action. The motion further stated that the Ritz board now owes Heath \$318K because Heath did not receive any salary over the last two years. As of December 2015, there is a \$444K outstanding mortgage on the property. Court documents also state any profits from the sale would be distributed to other charitable organizations by a Ritz dissolution counsel.

The Ritz board of directors and the theater manager, Stella Heath, have been under legal scrutiny for the past year-and-a-half ever since the board filed a \$250K lien, payable to Heath, in the event that Heath is terminated, if

the mortgage on the theater was refinanced or satisfied, if the theater was sold or if the board dissolved.

Court documents reveal both legal positions.

According to lawyers representing the Ritz board, the theater sometimes did not make enough profit to pay the mortgage, utilities and salary for Heath. Ritz lawyers allege Heath periodically went without pay and used her own personal money to pay the theater mortgage and other theater bills for a total of \$250K.

Lawyers representing Attorney General Bondi allege there are two copies of minutes dated Aug. 27, 2014. Both copies document Heath is owed money but one copy documented debt to Heath \$200K more than the other copy.

There was not enough criminal evidence to make any arrests according to State Attorney Brian Haas, who investigated the allegations last year. Haas referred the case to Bondi to determine if any civil laws were broken by the Ritz board.

In March, Attorney General Bondi determined civil laws may have been broken and filed a petition to appoint third parties to replace Heath and the theater accountant, Lee Alex Wheeler of Lake Wales, while the matter is worked out in court.

Wheeler was scheduled for deposition last week as was Heath, who request-

ed more time, citing a family emergency.

Heath was reached for comment but pending litigation, she did not want to say why the Ritz board chose to sell the theater. Heath did say the Ritz board chose Winter Haven realtor Ozzie Carrerou Enterprises to be the broker. Carrerou was asked who listed the building but chose not to comment.

Billie Kayworth identified herself as Board President on the real estate paperwork.

For much of the past year and a half, Lakeland lawyer Dan Pilka was representing the theater pro bono. Pilka said he has since stopped volunteering his time. Pilka was recently replaced by Tampa attorney Scott Jackman and Orlando attorney David Henry. Jackman said a Ritz Theatre insurance policy is funding the legal defense. Henry and Jackman both declined to comment on how the legal proceeding was progressing.

Since Attorney General Bondi filed legal action against the theater in March, there have been more than a dozen motions filed totaling 812 pages. Government lawyers have demanded documentation in 50 categories for discovery and depositions. According

to a motion filed by the state July 20, defense lawyers have not turned over a single document.

"The Ritz's stonewalling necessitates judicial action," part of the motion read.

Three days later Ritz lawyers responded.

"The OAG (Office of the Attorney General) continues under the false premise that it has unlimited authority and can sue for anything," part of the motion read.

Thomas Oldt, a spokesman for a group called Friends of the Ritz, a group of area residents who believe the Ritz has not been managed well over recent years, said it was "ludicrous" that a Ritz representative asked the Winter Haven City Commission for \$10K in support July 26. A day later the theater was put up for sale.

"It reeks of impropriety and dishonesty, and grossly violates the trust of citizens and government entities that provided funds to restore the Ritz with the intention of making it a community resource, not the personal plaything of a hired consultant and an illegitimate board that has managed to run it to ground while swatting away offers of help," Oldt said.

Dantzler returns to public service

On July 24, 2018 Dantzler committed to serve his country in another capacity.

Everywhere on the planet where citrus is grown, citrus greening or HLB is a problem. HLB is a bacterial disease spread by bugs that infect the trees, reducing the size and capacity of the

fruit. The global citrus industry has been devastated.

Dantzler’s new job as executive director of the Citrus Research and Development Foundation will be doing his best to keep federal money flowing to fund a cure. The foundation is a non-profit organized by state law to oversee the fight for a cure through the University of Florida.

Dantzler will be moving out of his downtown Victor Smith Law Group office in the coming days and moving into his new rural office at the Citrus Research and Education Center in Lake Alfred, where 200+ others are also working toward a cure. His first day is August 15.

“My primary office will be in Lake Alfred but I’m sure there will be numerous trips to Washington, D.C. to explain the research we’ve done and why we can’t take the foot off the gas pedal,” Dantzler said.

The Winter Haven lawyer said leading the FSA in Florida gave him a chance to better understand area growers. He said he used that understanding to help people in Washington understand enough to vote for federal funding to replace millions of infected citrus trees.

Dantzler said his lack of experience in farming or science labs won’t stop him.

“The intricacies of the science we’ve been conducting is something I’ll have

to spend a great deal of time with,” Dantzler said. “Needless to say, I’m getting a new pair of reading glasses. The citrus industry gives Florida much of its identity. We simply must find a way for it to stay commercially viable, and we will.”

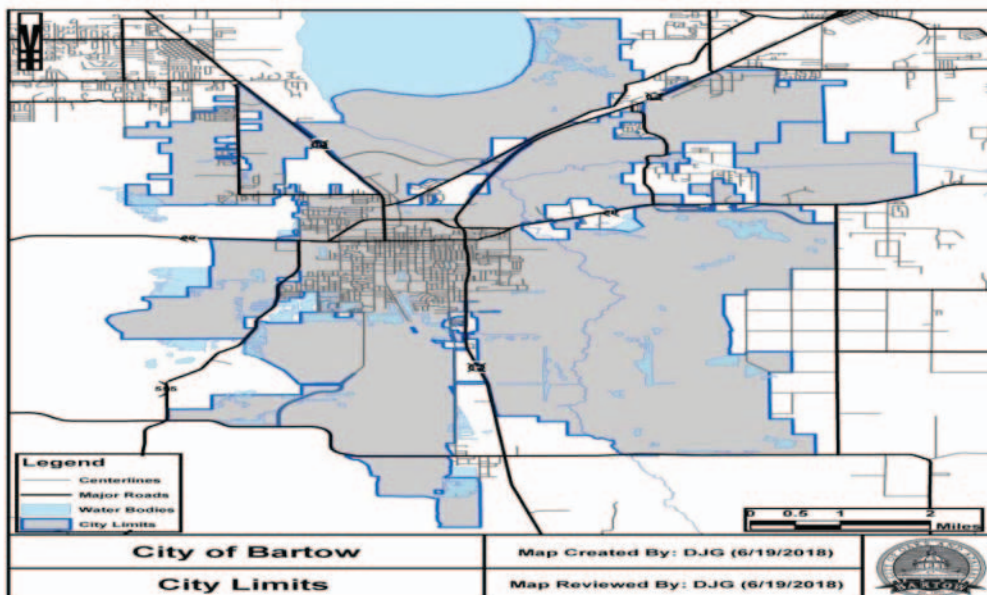

Non-profits get piece of city pie

Every year that it is able, the City of Winter Haven extends a funding hand to Winter Haven's non-profits, and those who want a piece of the pie get their five minutes to pitch their cause and hope for the best.

Last Thursday night, 16 non-profits were on the city commission "special meeting" docket for consideration. Public comment and commissioner discussion was also stirred into the mix, as this year's non-profit (2018-19) budget pie is \$430,655.

Three of the largest recipients were the Winter Haven Economic Development Council (\$150,000), the Greater Winter Haven Area Chamber of Commerce (\$100,000), and Main Street Winter Haven (\$60,000).

Commissioners discussed at length the EDC's request, with Pete Chichetto noting he was not against their proposal, but felt the city needed to have a plan in place to gradually decrease the amount given the EDC.

Since its creation in 2011, the EDC welcomed Bruce Lyon as its director in 2013. Having started with 11 members, it has increased to 30.

Lyon told Chichetto he could not "speak to" whether there is a plan for the city to decrease its funding for the EDC.

Commissioner Willie Twyford likewise, as well as Mayor Brad Dantzler, said they would like to see a plan, as Chichetto notes, "weaning off every

year," by an amount, as an example, say \$25,000 or 10 percent.

Dantzler said he did feel that the city has been well served by the EDC, and City Manager Mike Herr suggested that after commissioners set the amount they are going to award the EDC this year, the city would come back in November with a "win-win" plan, a goal to reduce that number.

The EDC is responsible for much in the way of marketing, drawing business and commerce, which brings jobs and overall, contributes to the economy.

Their request for the year was approved.

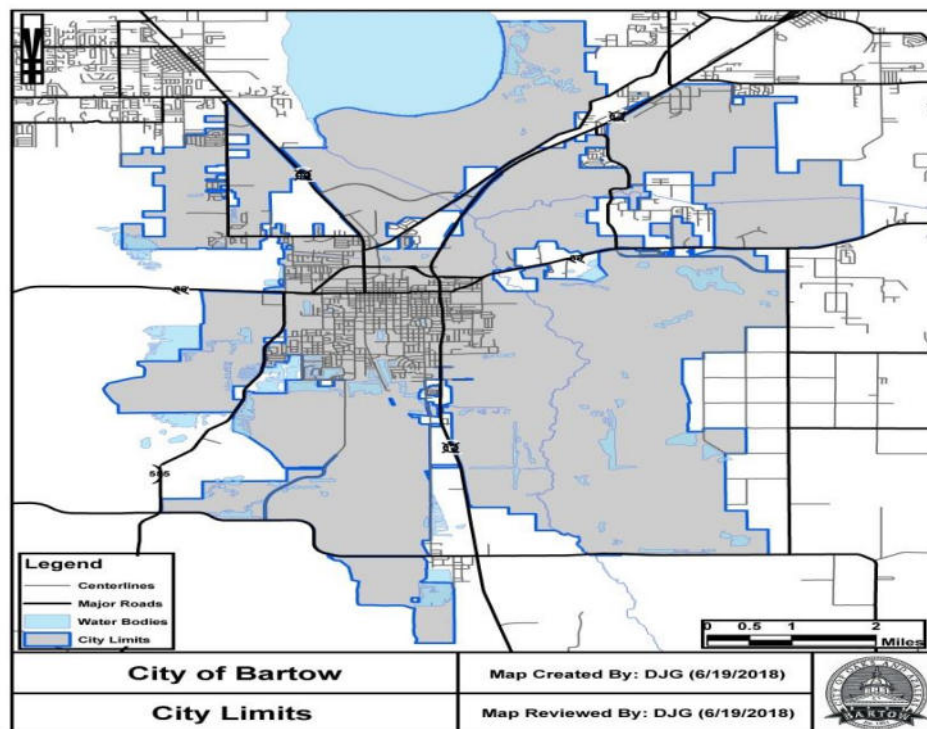

The Winter Haven Chamber was granted its request of \$100,000, increased from the \$15,000 awarded last year. The reason being is the Chamber is getting ready to renovate its building, a \$1 million project. Designs are about 63 percent finished, and the Chamber is beginning to take bids. President Katie Worthington said she did not believe that it was necessary to wait until all the funds were raised to begin the project. Commissioners approved her request, and that money will go to the first floor of the cause. The Chamber rents out its conference room frequently.

Main Street's request for \$60,000 was also a matter of discussion, with commissioners weighing how much to draw from the CRA fund, and how much from the city's general fund. The Downtown CRA advisory board recommended only \$45,000 be drawn from the CRA, which could have been overturned by commissioners. Nat Birdsong noted they usually do not "micromanage" decisions suggested by the board. The other choice was to fund the \$60,000 entirely out of the general fund.

Commissioners voted to review the \$45,000 at their next CRA meeting, and only approve \$15,000 from the general fund for Main Street.

All other non-profit requests were granted, except for the Language & Literacy Academy for Learning (previously the Our Children's Academy located in Winter Haven), and funding for The Ritz Theatre 100. Those two items, for the moment, are "tabled."

The Language & Learning Academy was going to use the \$25,000 it requested to build a playground for its special challenges students. The school is a Charter school, and also a public school now, and as such, should get some funding from the public school system. However, commissioners said they run the risk of the school reverting to a "private" school, as it was previously. Twyford noted "it is not that it is not needed," but added he did not feel comfortable in giving money to a Charter school, in that it might set a precedent for other Charters to follow suit.

He asked if the school had looked into federal grants for the project, and Assistant Principal Sheena Adams said they had not.

As for The Ritz, Twyford also questioned Steve Gold, board member, regarding the Ritz's litigation it is undergoing regarding its bylaws and debt payment. Gold replied "Things aren't as they seem," and noted the litigation

should be wrapped up soon. City Attorney John Murphy advised commissioners it "would not be prudent" to move forward "with this financial undertaking" at this time. Commissioners said they would table The Ritz'

request until litigation was final. The money was to spearhead a "Return of the Movies" at the Ritz, for local families. "I think it would be a benefit to all of us," Gold said.

BENEATH THE CHINABERRY TREE

A look at Winter Haven's Library History

The earliest evidence of a library in Winter Haven is thought to have been in 1909 - a few books on the shelf of Dr. Samuel Harrison Woods pharmacy that was located on Fifth Street, NW. It is noted that his wife oversaw the lending and the returns.

In 1914 it was announced that a new library would be situated on the second floor of the Englesen-Linger building on Fourth Street, NW at Central Avenue (where Wauchula State Bank is located today). The Women's Civic League had become involved and they were recruiting at least 300 members to make the library viable. (The History of Winter Haven by Josephine Burr.)

The Women's Christian Temperance Union had operated the library briefly but long term stability came to the operation when the Women's Civic League (today's Woman's Club) took control. The organization operated the library from 1915 until 1952. For most of those years the library was located in the former W.W. Mann home, a two-story structure that was located on Third Street, SE. The Woman's Club bought the building and it was moved to city land near what would become the Central Avenue library site. It is noted that Florence Inman (name-sake of Florence Villa) and her sister Mary Jewett, MD, both loaned money at low interest rates and bequeathed funds to the library upon their death. The current city library features a conference room named in Dr. Jewett's honor.

For many years the city contributed monies to the library operation. By the early 1950s a growing community needed a more substantial public li-

brary. The city assumed control of the library from the Woman's Club and through the use of tax millage monies built a modern brick structure located on west Central Avenue. In 1956 the two-story frame structure that had served as the library was moved to Seventh Street, SW where it was repurposed as the Boys's Club.

The Central Avenue location was some 6,702 square feet and cost \$90,000. Upon opening it housed 6,000 volumes. In 1976 Friends of the Winter Haven Public Library, Inc. was organized by the late Carl Strang, chairman of the library board, Kathryn Smith, head librarian and June Kuntz, an interested patron. The "Friends" have raised thousands of dollars for library operations. By 1986 the library had added another 2,500 square feet of space and housed 48,000 volumes.

In 2002 the city received a \$500,000 grant for new library construction from the State of Florida. The Fourth Street site was selected for the new 31,000 sq. ft. facility and on July 6, 2004 Winter Haven dedicated its current library facilities at a cost of \$5.2 million. Today's library features more than 75,000 books as well as access to the world wide web.

The information for this segment was taken from a library history overview compiled by the late Phyllis Reese Gilbert, a dedicated patron of the library and past president of the Woman's Club.. She noted City Commissioner Scott Girouard as being instrumental in making the new library a high priority on the city agenda.

Raising taxes could be a good thing

Last Monday's Winter Haven City Commission meeting covered a lot of ground, but premier in the discussion of the evening was a tax increase for the first time in 10 years.

City Manager Mike Herr said that the city would be able to address more capital projects — without going into debt — if they increase the millage rate a full mill (or \$1 per thousand).

Katie Worthington, president of the Greater Winter Haven Chamber of Commerce, said she and the Chamber were in support of such a move.

"That will allow you the flexibility to consider all proposals before you," she noted.

The city's infrastructure has needed improvement, Herr has long noted, to keep up with growth (which is expected to grow another 20,000 or so in the next several years).

David Dershimer, another local business man, noted he was likewise in support of the move. "I think it is the right thing to do for the citizens of Winter Haven," he said.

The public is invited to a formal public hearing on Sept. 11 at City Hall at 6:30, so there is time for the community to write commissioners, or meet with them, regarding any concerns they have.

But not everyone at the table was "for" the move.

Commissioner Pete Chichetto, long the voice of conservative spending

with low risk planning, noted "I am not in favor of the whole mill," noting, "Rome wasn't built in a day, and you've got a whole lot of projects here."

With various park and street improvements, Mayor Brad Dantzer said he did not think the city needed any more debt" either.

Under new business, the commission approved a one time loan (internal borrowing from the city budget) of \$1,220,000, to make building system upgrades at the Chain of Lakes Complex. Lighting and air conditioning are in dire need of replacement. Since the city was already redoing the ceilings (which left the upper ceiling exposed), the move was approved to replace all the HVAC system with multiple geothermal units, new ductwork, new LED lights and other cost saving systems. Assistant City Manager T. Mi-

chael Stavres said it was a good idea to do it now, rather than wait until all the new renovation is finished, then have to tear it all up again to replace the ancient AC.

Additionally, this loan includes a new heat pump for the pool, which can also cool the pool. The payment for the loan would be made from the water and sewer proprietary fund, at \$147,000 a year.

Chichetto said, "this was obviously something that was not in the budget."

Earlier this year, commissioners approved a \$25 million loan for the renovation of the Chain of Lakes Field House, something that Stavres says will pay for itself as it brings people to Winter Haven for large sporting events.

City hoping for best with new mall owners

LAKE WALES – City officials say so far so good with the new owners of Eagle Ridge Mall.

Stockbridge Enterprises, a privately held company based in Kalamazoo, Michigan, purchased the property this spring for \$7.8 million. The property was sold in an online auction which had an opening bid of \$2.7 million.

“They’re just trying to get going out there,” said Kevin Kieft, President and CEO for the Lake Wales Chamber of Commerce and executive director of the Lake Wales Economic Development Council.

He said in the early stages of their takeover, he has been speaking with Stockbridge President Mahmoud Al-Hadidi to get a better gauge on what the firm’s plans might be.

“In the past month, they’ve been focusing on the 60 tenants they have,” Kieft said. “Their main priority at this point is dealing with all the different maintenance out there. For the last three or four years there’s been very little maintenance, so they’re working on that.”

He said that list or work needed is lengthy.

“Landscaping, the roof has been leaking in many different areas, the bathrooms had gone to shambles, paint, signage,” he indicated.

Kieft said he has already tried to work with four or five different mall managers since he arrived in Lake Wales in 2014.

“It’s hard to develop a rapport and figure out what they’re going for,”

he added. “In the next two or three months they’ll work on new tenants. I don’t know of any larger, broader plans beyond that. We hope this new ownership takes a more active role than the last.”

The mall, now more than two decades old, has had multiple owners and management teams, something that Mayor Eugene Fultz said has hindered development there.

“The last one (mall manager) she came in all gung ho. She was there a couple of months and then she fled,” Fultz added.

City officials said the sales price will mean there shouldn’t be much impact on their coffers. The purchase included about 470,000 square feet, but excluded the space occupied by Dillard’s.

“The sale price was at about the appraised level. The fear was it would sell for less, but it did not, so there shouldn’t be any significant impact on our tax base,” Fields said.

Area’s around the mall have been a major growth center in the past 12 months for the city. Aldi’s Supermarket is constructing a store at the intersection of U.S. 27 and Thompson Nursery Road, while Wawa is building a gas station and convenience store at the intersection of U.S. 27 and Chalet Suzanne Road.

In addition, an 82-unit Best Western Plus is slated to be built near the Bob Evans restaurant, and IHOP recently opened a new eatery on U.S. 27 just north of the mall. Also, construction is slated to begin soon on a 335-unit Serenity apartment complex on Chalet Suzanne road in the area behind the Shoppes on the Ridge plaza.

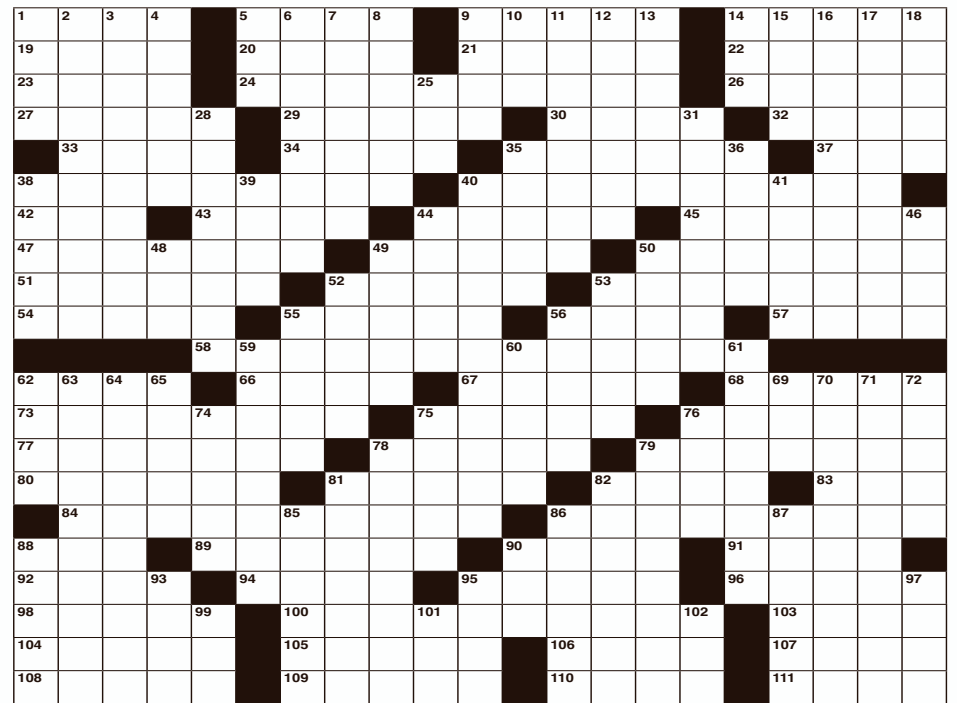

LW hopes stormwater fee frees up city funds

LAKE WALES – City officials are hopeful that a possible new monthly stormwater surcharge will not only lead to improvement in handling excess water, but will allow them to make improvements in other areas as well.

Although it has not been finalized, City Manager Ken Fields has suggested to commissioners that they consider a monthly surcharge, which would average about \$5 a month for most homeowners, as they finalize a 2018-19 spending plan.

Fields said Lake Wales is one of the last cities in the area to consider the fee. A more detailed plan for such a fee is expected to be discussed at a commission budget workshop scheduled for

Aug. 14, including a presentation from a consultant that has been working on the idea.

“Many items that are in the general fund, the transportation fund and, in fact, the utility fund could be supported by a stormwater assessment,” Fields said. “Lake Wales is one of the only cities in Polk County that doesn’t have such as assessment. It is something that, as we look forward to improved water quality in our lakes, to make improvements in our roads, to eliminate flooding in various areas of the city, it would be great to have a dedicating funding source to this purpose.”

The fee would be tacked on to the city’s monthly utility bill, and not collected through the county tax bill, he added.

“It’s a better way of collecting it and

targeting it, and it also makes it simpler to implement it,” he added.

The city already has hired a consultant to study the issue. Fields said a \$5 monthly residential fee would raise about \$600,000. No one from the public has come forward at any of the previous budget workshops to support or criticize the idea.

“There’s a lot of subtleties involved when I say five dollars,” Fields said. “In fact, certain neighborhoods would probably get a discount from that if they have on-site stormwater facilities. Everybody would pay something, but some neighborhoods would pay less.”

Fields estimated the city has about \$700,000 in stormwater projects waiting to be addressed.

“If we had a dedicated source of fund-

ing, over the next five to 10 years, we could start going after some of those large stormwater projects, and, at the same time, be able to free up money from those other funds to address other needs such as recreation and street resurfacing.”

The budget presented to commissioner on July 10 did not include the stormwater fee revenue, but it is likely to be part of the plan at the Aug. 14 meeting since commissioners did not direct Fields to stop the process at this point. No final vote will be taken at that meeting on whether or not to impose the fee since it is only a workshop.

“If you don’t put it on the tax bill, you can do it anytime. If you do it through the utility bills, you have a lot more flexibility,” Fields said, noting that it was already too late to put the assess-

New ‘old’ telescope will greet Bok Academy students

LAKE WALES – When students return to Edward W. Bok Academy this month, they’ll have a new “old” tool waiting for them.

A radio telescope which will allow the Lake Wales Charter middle school students to “see” things far off in the galaxy is back online with the help of Tampa’s Museum of Science and Industry and its Astronomical Resource Society. Specifically, the instrument is designed to detect radio emissions from both celestial objects or artificial satellites.

The telescope was damaged in last fall’s hurricane – which did extensive damage on much of the campus – only a few months after it had been up and running. Even then, it wasn’t fully functional.

“It really wasn’t up long enough for us to even wire everything,” Bok STEM teacher David Lockett said. “We rebuilt it using inexpensive parts, a recycled antenna dish, gold plated wire, and a personal computer.”

The telescope is a key part of the astronomy lessons at the school. Up-

wards of 100 of Bok’s students will get a chance to use the equipment which for the first time will be at full capacity.

“The significance of this project is so students can get a better understanding of astronomy, aerospace, and they can understand a little bit more about why events happen,” Lockett noted. “They can tell whether or not there’s a storm on a particular planet, they can tell if sun flares are higher than normal.”

The data also lends itself to other curriculum areas besides science, Lockett added.

“They can look at it from a math angle, they can look at parabolas, coordinates on a plane, and understand why math is an important part of a radio telescope too,” he added.

While in space terms it’s fairly close, one of the earth’s closest galaxies offers some of the best hunting grounds.

“The Milky Way is best,” Lockett added. “It produces a lot of intelligent radio transmissions and a lot the students can understand and better decipher.”

Lockett himself is this week in sub-Saharan Africa, one of more than 50 people from across the United States

picked to participate as part of the Mandela Washington Fellowship for Young African Americans. The group is collaborating with 2017 Mandela Washington Fellowship alumni on projects that address critical challenges.

The Reciprocal Exchange Award provides grant funding for American professionals to travel to sub-Saharan African countries in order to build upon strategic partnerships and professional connections developed during the

Mandela Washington Fellowship in the United States.

Accomplished in their careers and dedicated to service to their communities, The Mandela Washington Fellowship is the flagship program of the Young African Leaders Initiative (YALI). The in-country projects, devised and proposed by the Fellows, address thematic issues including arts, civic engagement, and STEM education. It is a program of the U.S. Department of State.

Robey-Coleman past proving, but still underdog

The start of another football season used to mean just one thing to Frostproof's Nickell Robey-Coleman. Time to prove himself all over again.

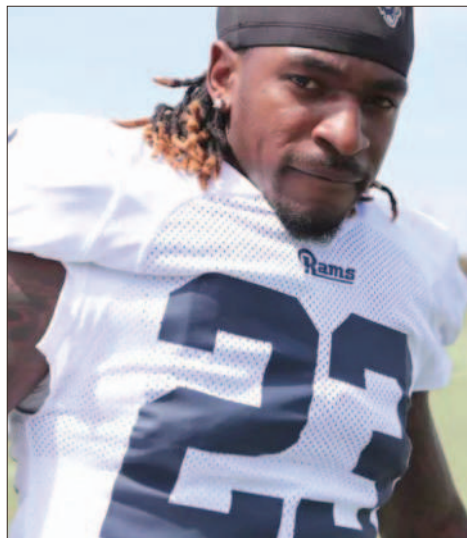

Frostproof's Nickell Robey signed a three-year contract extension this past offseason with the Los Angeles Rams, guaranteeing him \$8 million, and worth as much as \$15.75 million.

And while that's been true for most of his football life, all the way back to his days in Frostproof, it's not so much that way anymore.

Yes, when you're 5-7 (or 5-8 as the Los Angeles Rams list him on their team website), there's always a level of proving needed every year, but in case you missed it, the former Bulldog signed

a nifty three-year extension with the Rams, worth almost \$16 million, and guaranteed for at least \$8 million, far and beyond his salary in previous years when he earned an NFL spot with the Buffalo Bills as an undrafted free agent.

Pro Football Focus, a highly respected football analytic website, lists Robey-Coleman as one of the eight best slot cornerbacks in the National Football League now, terming him "criminally undervalued" in the free-agent market after last season. Ironically, maybe appropriately, it's also called the "nickel" back on defense.

Signing with the Rams last season, a one-year deal, was a bit of homecoming since he played his college ball at USC, and, proving doubters wrong there too, was the first defensive back to start for the Trojans as a true freshman since World War II.

The move proved prescient. Robey liked the Rams, and more importantly perhaps, the Rams really liked him.

"During the free agent market, they had stayed in close contact with me and my agent," he said. "They just expressed the love of my play on the field. And, again, they were loyal to me throughout the whole process. I really appreciated that and I valued that. That was the biggest part of my decision making with the Rams, was the part that they really still believed in me. And they believed in me ever since they put me out there on that football field."

It doesn't hurt, either, that Robey-Coleman gets to play under one of the most respected defensive coordinators the game has ever known in Wade Phillips.

"He's got great quickness. You need a guy in there [like that] because the slot receivers can run inside or outside — there's a lot of room either way — from them," Phillips told the Rams official website. "So, it takes a special player to play an inside, slot position and play those guys well and he's outstanding."

Les Snead, the team's general manager, is an admirer too.

SECOND IN STATE II – Nothing to be disappointed about from All Saint's freshman golfer Joshua Pritchett, who finished in the runner up spot in the recently completed Florida State Golf Association Junior Amateur Match Play event at Forest Country Club in Fort Myers. Both finalists weren't necessarily expected to be there. Pritchett was an 11 seed, and fell to the No. 9 seed, Andrew McLaughlin of Neptune Beach. Pritchett dismissed the final 16's No. 2 seed and No. 3 seed along the way to making the finals.

Mr. Fourth of July passes away Frank Rouse ran Bartow's Fourth of July party for 38 years

BARTOW – Mr. Fourth of July declared years ago that Broadway Avenue in Bartow be lined with American flags by his birthday – June 14 – leading to Mosaic Park where the annual Fourth of July party was held of which he was the chairman of the committee for 38 years.

Last week, just 20 days after the annual event where Frank James Rouse made a brief appearance, he died at 78 years old.

"He wanted the flags up on Broadway by his birthday and it is every year," said Barbara Newell a long-time friend who served on the Fourth of July committee with him for 27 years. "Every year I decorated the lake at Square Lake where I lived and had that up ... it always makes me think of him ... he is always on my mind."

In summing up his life, Pam Renew, who has been on the committee for the last 23 years, said, "He was the most patriotic person I've ever met in my life."

And that is quite something to say about a man who moved to America

from Sicily in 1950 when he was 10 years old not knowing any English. His name was Salvatore Aliotta. From the time he exited the boat in New York he had become an American. As a high school student at Summerlin Institute, he won an American history award for the American history class. He became a naturalized citizen in 1954, was a captain and a Judge Advocate General in the U.S. Army in 1967-1968 and he worked for the state attorney's office for seven years before starting his own law practice with an office on Main Street in Bartow for nearly 50 years. In 1982 the Bartow City Commission named him Mr. Fourth of July.

"The fire department did the fireworks of some sort off Highway 60 going toward Lake Wales. We were sitting around this particular night at the fire station and we said we needed to do something to celebrate the Fourth of July. As we discussed, and there were four or five of us there, I said well I know just the right guy," remembers Bartow Vice Mayor Billy Simpson.

He said Rouse was the right person to make it consistently good. Rouse agreed with the idea as long as Simpson, who was friends with Rouse since elementary school, serve as co-chairman. The next year the party started. Rouse served as chairman of the committee until this year.

Change in the celebration

This year's Fourth of July celebration was almost the first one Rouse didn't make. In the last year, he spent about three months in the hospital fighting health problems and he delegated much responsibility to his committee members. With doubts he would make an appearance at the event he hosted every year, he did show up during the afternoon and stayed a little while.

"He wanted to be involved," Renew said. "He and I stayed in touch for months by email and text and I'd talk to him on the phone when he was strong enough. He would remember the little details most people would never think of. He'd say, 'make sure this is being taken care of.' When it came to the July 4 time, we put on an event he and community could be proud of."

Picking up more responsibility this year, Renew was only too glad to help and said just following the lead Rouse had been doing every year it was not that hard.

"Between Eli (Mosley) and me who handled the music, there was not a big problem," she said. "We looked at last year and as soon as it was done, we started lining up people with Eli and people he knew in music."

This year's music was almost completely delegated and Mosley, a Bartow native and an accomplished country music star, who put together a concert of other stars he knew from Nashville.

But, Renew said, Rouse would not give up on what he loved doing.

"It was something how he persevered," she said. "He didn't let pain or sickness interfere so much. Years ago when he got a kidney transplant, he was out there. He always knew the key to get the job done."

In 2002, Rouse needed a kidney transplant and his daughter Stephanie showed to be a match and two months before the Fourth of July party they went into surgery in Tampa.

Growth of the show

It was not overnight that the party in Bartow has been a success. Now drawing crowds of up to 10,000 people, it started as an afternoon without vendors, music from the Bartow High School band and a few activities on the site. With some work with the city, a stage was put at Mosaic Park for what was becoming a yearly event. There was also a period of years where a parade was held but due to a lack of attendance, it was canceled. Soon the Bartow Adult Concert Band preceded the party with a one-hour Fourth of July show at the Bartow Civic Center.

But Rouse's earnestness was steadfast and it grew every year.

"One thing that strikes me about Frank is he is from an immigrant family from Sicily, but when he talked about it, he had so much love for this country," Renew said. "He came to be an American. He loved this country so much and he wanted to serve it and his community and that was in his heart." Simpson recalled, "I think by 1986 we were seeing them coming, about 8,000 plus people. All the people

would show up, then we'd get some major rain and lightning and then the people came back out."

In fact, the almost yearly rainstorm that hit the festival showed Rouse's sense of humor as he always insisted that people should get out in the park one day and celebrate their country.

"I am aggravated with the Congress of 1776," Rouse said in a story in The Polk County Democrat in 2012. "They picked July 4 for Independence Day and they could have picked March or February when we never have bad weather. So I'm going to blame them."

That sense of humor is something Newell said she will never forget about Rouse.

"We had a lot of powerpacks in Bartow. All you had to do is call him and he'd carry a lot of weight. (Frank) will be sorely missed."

Rouse is survived by his three daughters; Kim Blackwelder, Stephanie Ewalt (husband Dan) and Francesca Rouse, mother; Teresa Rouse, companion; Glenda Prough, sister; Nancy Carey, three granddaughters; Lindsay, Jenna and Cassandra Blackwelder, one niece and nephew.

Imagine yourself in a new community, driving down the street, when you start experiencing chest pains.

You spot a medical clinic, rush in, and see a person in a white coat.

"I think I'm having a heart attack!" you say. "Are you a doctor?"

"No, but maybe I can heal you. I don't think much of doctors, and I never attended medical school, but if you'll place your trust in me, I'll try to keep you alive."

Change the narrative to lawyers, engineers, or any other licensed profession.

Would you trust your health, legal affairs, or construction project to someone who boasts that he or she is not a

professional, and considers that to be an asset, not a liability?

Probably not.

How about a politician who insists that he or she is not a politician, proudly distancing himself or herself from the vocation for which they solicit your vote?

Few things are a sure bet in an election year, but you can take these two

(2) They will stridently declare that they are not politicians, while accusing their opponents of being just that.

Twelve years in political office for one, eight for the other, and they haven't yet mastered their vocation well enough to take ownership of it?

I doubt that either of them (both are casual friends of mine) refused to accept a paycheck for the offices they held, or that they will do so if they win election to the office they seek.

It might be persuasively argued that a candidate who has run several times and lost every election really cannot claim the title "politician." And I have

great respect for those who keep coming back, election after election, to make the effort.

But as one of the millions of employers (we are called voters) who hires, pays, and occasionally fires politicians, I find it a discouraging commentary on the political process that the victors are embarrassed to accept the title of their craft.

Imagine meeting a candidate for public office who introduced himself thus: "My name is George. I'm a politician

and a very good one. It is my goal to be so good that I will be remembered as the Father of Our Country. And I'd like your vote for president."

He'd probably get my vote, especially if he didn't use Twitter to send out the same message every morning, and to attack the press for exposing his shortcomings.

Facebook finds 'sophisticated' efforts to disrupt elections

NEW YORK — Facebook set off a firestorm Tuesday, announcing that it had uncovered “sophisticated” efforts, possibly linked to Russia, to manipulate U.S. politics and by extension the upcoming midterm elections.

The company was careful to hedge its announcement; it didn't connect the effort directly to Russia or to the midterms, now less than a hundred days away. And its findings were limited to 32 apparently fake accounts on Facebook and Instagram, which the company removed because they were involved in “coordinated” and “inauthentic” political behavior.

But official Washington went ballistic anyway, not least because the reported activity so closely mirrored Russian influence efforts during the 2016 presidential election. Nearly 300,000 people followed at least one of the newly banned accounts and thousands expressed interest in events they promoted.

“This is an absolute attack on our democracy,” said Virginia Sen. Mark Warner, the top Democrat on the Senate intelligence committee and one of several lawmakers Facebook had briefed in advance. He expressed “pretty high confidence” that Russia was behind the assault.

A spokesman for Senate Judiciary Chairman Chuck Grassley said Facebook had informed his office that “that a limited group of Russian actors has attempted to spread disinformation using its platform and that the affected groups are affiliated with the political left.”

The identified accounts sought to “promote divisions and set Americans against one another,” wrote Ben Nimmo and Graham Brookie of the Atlantic Council's Digital Forensic Research Lab in a blog post Tuesday. The nonprofit is working with Facebook to find and analyze abuse on its service.

The perpetrators, Facebook noted, have been “more careful to cover their tracks” than in 2016, in part because of steps Facebook has taken to prevent abuse over the past year. For example, they used virtual private networks and internet phone services to mask their locations, and paid third parties to run ads on their behalf.

Judge blocks release of blueprints for 3D-printed guns

SEATTLE — A federal judge on Tuesday stopped the release of blueprints to make untraceable and undetectable 3D-printed plastic guns as President Donald Trump questioned whether his administration should have agreed to allow the plans to be posted online.

The company behind the plans, Austin, Texas-based Defense Distributed, had reached a settlement with the federal government in June allowing it to make the plans for the guns available for download on Wednesday.

The restraining order from U.S. District Judge Robert Lasnik in Seattle puts that plan on hold for now. “There is a possibility of irreparable harm because of the way these

guns can be made,” he said.

Washington state Attorney General Bob Ferguson called the ruling “a complete, total victory.”

“We were asking for a nationwide temporary restraining order putting a halt to this outrageous decision by the federal government to allow these 3D downloadable guns to be available around our country and around the world. He granted that relief,” Ferguson said at a news conference after the hearing. “That is significant.”

Eight Democratic attorneys general had filed a lawsuit Monday seeking to block the settlement. They also sought the restraining order, arguing the 3D guns would be a safety risk.

Congressional Democrats have urged President Donald Trump to reverse the decision to publish the

plans. Trump said Tuesday that he's “looking into” the idea, saying making 3D plastic guns available to the public “doesn't seem to make much sense!”

Trump tweeted that he has already spoken with the National Rifle Association about the downloadable directions a Texas company wants to provide for people to make 3D-printed guns. The guns are made of a hard plastic and are simple to assemble, easy to conceal and difficult to trace.

“We don't agree with President Trump very much,” Washington state Assistant Attorney General Jeff Rupert told Lasnik, “but when he tweeted ‘this doesn't make much sense,’ that's something we agree with.”

Mexican passenger plane crashes after takeoff; no deaths reported

MEXICO CITY — An Aeromexico passenger plane with 101 people on board crashed immediately after it took off in northern Mexico on Tuesday, but the regional governor said there were no deaths in the accident.

US says no need for better gas mileage, heavy vehicles safer

WASHINGTON — The Trump administration says people would drive more and be exposed to increased risk if their cars get better gas mileage, an argument intended to justify freezing Obama-era toughening of fuel standards.

Transportation experts dispute the arguments, contained in a draft of the administration's proposals prepared this summer, excerpts of which were obtained by The Associated Press.

The excerpts also show the administration plans to challenge California's long-standing authority to enact its own, tougher pollution and fuel standards.

Revisions to the mileage requirements for 2021 through 2026 are still being worked on, the administration says, and changes could be made before the proposal is released as soon as this week.

The Trump administration gave notice earlier this year that it would roll back tough new fuel standards put into place in the waning days of the Obama administration. Anticipating the new regulation, California and 16 other states sued the Trump administration in May.

Overall, “improvements over time have better longer-term effects simply by not alienating consumers, as compared to great leaps forward” in fuel efficiency and other technology, the administration argues. It

contends that freezing the mileage requirements at 2020 levels would save up to 1,000 lives per year.

New vehicles would be cheaper — and heavier — if they don't have to meet more stringent fuel requirements and more people would buy them, the draft says, and that would put more drivers in safer, newer vehicles that pollute less.

At the same time, the draft says that people will drive less if their vehicles get fewer miles per gallon, lowering the risk of crashes.

David Zuby, chief research officer at the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety, said he's doubtful about the administration's estimate

Iran wary of Trump offer for talks, but not ruling them out

TEHRAN, Iran — Iran reacted skeptically Tuesday to President Donald Trump saying that he's willing to negotiate with his Iranian counterpart "anytime," but top officials did not reject a sit-down out of hand. Ali Akbar Nategh Nouri, a senior cleric and member of the influential Expediency Council, said Trump's suggestion

Monday that he would be willing to meet with Iranian President Hassan Rouhani should not be categorically rejected. "It should be discussed in the Supreme National Security Council," said Nategh Nouri, who is also a former aide to Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei. Nategh Nouri said "we have to contemplate" the gesture, but also cautioned "we should not rejoice over this offer and not get excited."

"Trump may take advantage of this over-excitement," he said, the state-run IRNA news agency reported. "It could be a test for us." Trump pulled the U.S. out of a deal with several major powers and Iran earlier this year that was meant to prevent Tehran from developing nuclear weapons. He's also said, however, that as renewed sanctions kick in, he expected Iran would call and offer to return to the

negotiating table, and that "we're ready to make a real deal." On Monday he said he could meet with the Iranians with "no pre-conditions," adding that "if they want to meet, I'll meet anytime they want." In his first public comments after the remarks, Rouhani himself avoided mentioning Trump's comments, instead stressing the need for the other nations involved in the nuclear deal to forge

ahead with their pledges of trying to salvage it. "Today we are at a very critical point in history regarding the nuclear deal, and Europe's transparent measures to compensate for the United States' unlawful withdrawal from it are very important for the Iranian nation," Rouhani said after talks with new British Ambassador Rob Macaire. Britain, along with China, Germany, France, Russia and the European

Union, are negotiating with Iran on preserving the deal. Iranian Foreign Minister Mohammad Javad Zarif noted on Twitter that Iran and the U.S. had two years of talks leading to the nuclear accord. "US can only blame itself for pulling out & leaving the table. Threats, sanctions & PR stunts won't work. Try respect: for Iranians & for int'l commitments," he tweeted.

France's Macron survives no-confidence votes amid scandal

PARIS — French President Emmanuel Macron's government survived two votes of no confidence Tuesday in the wake of a political and public uproar triggered by a video of his chief bodyguard beating a protester.

handling of the violence, including the two-week suspension Benalla received in May, have turned the affair into the biggest crisis of Macron's nearly 15-month-old presidency. Criticism also has focused on why officials in the president's office did not immediately disclose what happened, terminate Benalla and refer the matter for investigation. After Le Monde made the beating public and investigation was opened, Benalla, 26, was handed preliminary charges that included

committing violence in a group, interfering in the exercise of a public function and the unauthorized public display of official insignia. The leader of the Republicans in the National Assembly, Christian Jacob, told lawmakers the scandal stemming from the ex-aide was not "an affair for the left or the right." "This is a question of transparency, honor, integrity," Jacob said before Tuesday's votes. "That is why, in the name of the Republicans, I am asking you to sanction this government."

Bodies of 76 killed in deadly Greek wildfires identified

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — The bodies of 76 people killed by Greece's deadliest wildfire in decades have been identified, authorities said Tuesday, as forensic experts kept working to identify more remains recovered from the charred resort area.

Separately, the coast guard said Tuesday it had recovered the body of a woman from the sea in the Saronic Gulf south of Athens, many miles away from the site of the July 23 blaze. The body had not been identified and it was unclear whether it was related to the deadly wildfire that devastated the seaside resort of Mati northeast of Athens.

Coast guard special operations divers recovered another body Monday from waters off the coast of the fire area, believed to be someone who drowned in their effort to escape the flames. Identification of that body was pending. During the blaze, hundreds of people fled to beaches, and many were forced to swim out to sea to escape the flames and choking

smoke. A massive search operation involving ships and divers looking for more fire victims in the water is continuing near the fire zone.

At least 91 people are believed to have died in the blaze, but confusion surrounds the exact death toll.

Vietnam floods kill 3, threaten to submerge parts of Hanoi

HANOI, Vietnam (AP) — Seasonal floods have killed three people and threaten to submerge parts of Vietnam's capital, officials said Tuesday.

Two children and a man drowned Monday in Chuong My district, a suburb of Hanoi, where water has overflowed one bank of the Bui River and engulfed several villages, the officials said.

On the other side of the river, sandbags have been piled for 6 miles to prevent water in a dike from spilling into the inner city of the capital, Hanoi, which has a population of 7.5 million. "It is extremely important to keep the dike safe to protect (central) Hanoi," Mayor Nguyen Duc Chung said on national VTV.

IS claims Tajikistan attack that killed 4 foreign cyclists

MOSCOW (AP) — The Islamic State group on Tuesday claimed responsibility for a car-and-knife attack on Western tourists cycling in Tajikistan that killed two Americans and two Europeans.

Officials in the ex-Soviet Central Asian nation didn't publicly address the IS claim and instead blamed the Sunday attack on a banned local Islamist group. The young men featured in an IS-linked video resembled the individuals that Tajik authorities identified as attack suspects who were later killed by police. The Islamic State group said in a statement late Monday that several of its soldiers attacked the "citizens of the Crusader coalition."

The four tourists were killed when a car rammed into a group of foreigners on bicycles south of the capital of Dushanbe, Tajik officials have said. The driver and the passengers then got out and attacked the cyclists with knives. Two of the victims were American, one was Swiss and the fourth was from the Netherlands, foreign and Tajik officials said. The three people injured included a woman from Switzerland.

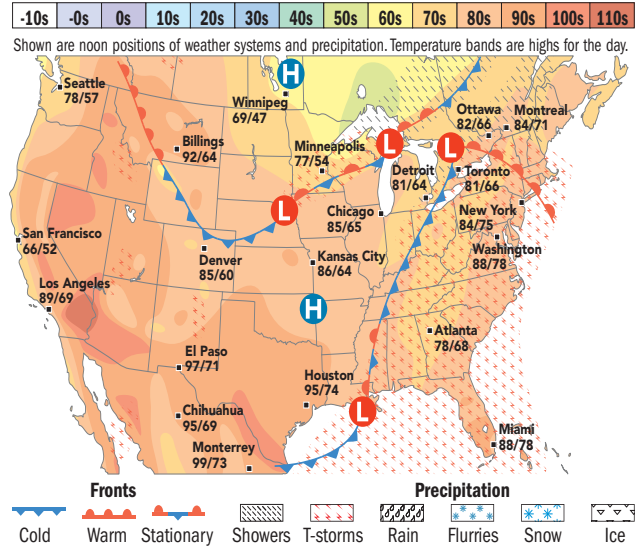

Official says agency warned family separation bad for kids

WASHINGTON — A Department of Health and Human Services official told senators Tuesday that his agency had warned the Trump administration that separating families would be dangerous for children. But some of the government's top immigration officials used a Senate hearing to largely defend how the policy has been implemented, with one comparing family detention centers to "a summer camp."

One official told the Senate Judiciary Committee that while the

Trump administration was developing its immigration policies, Health and Human Services officials said they were worried "about any policy which would result in family separation due to concerns we had about the best interests of the child." Commander Jonathan D. White of the U.S. Public Health Service Commissioned Corps, a branch of HHS, said they were uncertain their department had enough resources to handle large numbers of detained immigrants.

"There's no question that separation of children from parents entails

significant potential for traumatic psychological injury to the child," White said.

Asked by Sen. Richard Blumenthal, D-Conn., what response HHS officials got from administration policymakers, White said, "The answer was there was no policy which would result in separation of children from family units." White is a career official at HHS who has served in three administrations.

White's remarks came as the Judiciary committee questioned officials about what has become an election-year liability for the Republicans and the

White House — President Donald Trump's separation of migrant children from detained families. Trump dropped the policy more than a month ago under fire from Democrats and Republicans alike. But of more than 2,500 children who were initially separated from parents and guardians, hundreds remain in federal custody including more than 400 whose parents left the U.S. without them.

Lawmakers and journalists who have visited some detention facilities around the country and migrants themselves have reported poor conditions. The top members of the Judiciary

committee — Chairman Charles Grassley, R-Iowa, and Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif. — have asked inspectors general of two federal agencies to investigate reports by news organizations that immigrants at some centers have suffered alleged sexual and other forms of abuse.

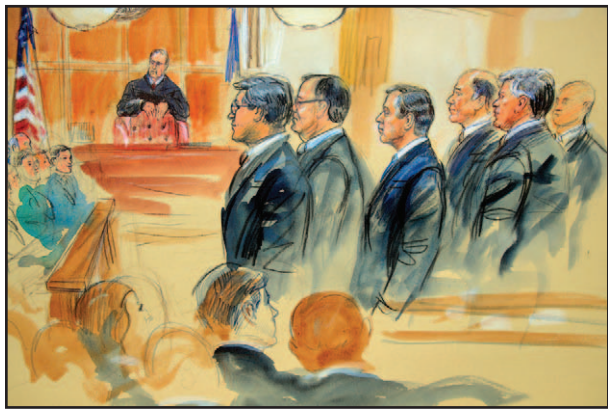
Matthew Albence, an executive associate director at U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement, told the lawmakers that "the best way to describe" conditions at family detention centers was "like a summer camp." He said the facilities undergo rigorous inspections and

offer basketball and other forms of recreation, food and water around the clock and medical and dental care.

"We do not leave our humanity behind when we report for duty," Carla L. Provost, acting chief of the U.S. border patrol told members of the committee.

At one point, Sen. Mazie Hirono, D-Hawaii, asked whether they would want their children to stay in one of the government's family detention centers.

"I think we're missing the point," answered Albence. "These individuals are there because they have broken a law."

Prosecutors: Paul Manafort believed he was above the law

ALEXANDRIA, Va. — Paul Manafort orchestrated a multimillion-dollar conspiracy to evade U.S. tax and banking laws, leaving behind a trail of lies as he lived a lavish lifestyle, prosecutors said Tuesday as they laid out their case against the former Trump campaign chairman.

During his opening statement, Assistant U.S. Attorney Uzo Asonye told the jury that Manafort considered himself above the law as he funneled tens of millions of dollars through offshore accounts. That "secret income" was used to pay for personal expenses such as a \$21,000 watch, a \$15,000 jacket made of ostrich and more than \$6 million worth of real estate paid for in cash, Asonye said.

"A man in this courtroom believed the law did not apply to him — not tax law, not banking law," Asonye said as he sketched out the evidence gathered by special counsel Robert Mueller's team in Manafort's bank fraud and tax evasion trial.

It's the first trial arising from Mueller's investigation into potential ties between the Trump presidential campaign and Russia. Mueller was not present in the courtroom.

Defense attorney Thomas Zehnle contended in his opening statement that Manafort trusted others to keep track of the millions of dollars he was earning from his Ukrainian political work.

He made clear that undermining the credibility of Rick Gates, his former business associate and the government's star witness, is central to the defense strategy. Zehnle said Manafort, earning millions as a political consultant helping officials in other parts of the world, relied on Gates and others — including a professional accounting firm — to keep watch over the money.

"Money's coming in fast. It's a lot, and Paul Manafort trusted that Rick Gates was keeping track of it," his attorney Thomas Zehnle said. "That's what Rick Gates was being paid to do."

Health care and industrial stocks lead US indexes higher

NEW YORK — U.S. stocks rose Tuesday following strong results from industrial and health care companies as well as a report that the U.S. and China are trying to restart trade talks. Small companies rallied.

Bloomberg News reported that representatives of the U.S. and China are looking for ways to open new talks to end their trade war. The report

cited two people familiar with those efforts and said there was no agreement about a time frame for talks or what issues would be discussed. Earlier this month both nations placed import taxes on \$34 billion worth of goods, and they've been threatening more severe measures.

The trade dispute could affect sales for many industrial companies and new tariffs on aluminum and steel imports are also sending costs for those companies higher.

Companies including Deere and Caterpillar jumped while engine maker Cummins rose after its second-quarter report.

Vincent Reinhart, chief economist at Standish Mellon, a unit of BNY Mellon Asset Management, said investors have mostly stayed calm during the trade dispute because they think most of the tensions will get worked out by November. Rising corporate profits, which have been helped by the recent

tax cuts, are also helping.

"Everybody thinks a deal will be cut before the midterms," he said. "That allows you to shake off the bad news and embrace the good."

The S&P 500 index rose 13.69 points, or 0.5 percent, to 2,816.29, making up most of the losses it took on Monday. The Dow Jones Industrial Average gained 108.36 points, or 0.4 percent, to 25,415.19. The Nasdaq composite added 41.78 points, or 0.5 percent, to 7,671.79.

Trump administration considering capital gains tax break

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Trump administration is studying the idea of implementing a big tax break for wealthy Americans by reducing the taxes levied on capital gains, but no decision has been made yet on whether to proceed.

Administration officials said Tuesday that Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin prefers deferring to Congress. But he does have his department studying the economic impact of such a change and the legality of proceeding without congressional approval.

The change would involve taxing capital gains — profits on investments such as stocks or real estate — after taking into account inflation, which would lower the tax bite. Capital gains taxes are currently determined by subtracting the original price of an asset from the price at which it was sold and taxing the difference without adjusting for inflation.

For example, a stock purchased in 1990 for \$100,000 and sold today for \$300,000 would produce a \$200,000 capital

gain. That amount, taxed at the top capital gains rate of 23.8 percent, would result in a tax bill of \$47,600. However, if the \$200,000 gain was trimmed to just \$103,000 by adjusting for inflation over the past 28 years, the tax bill would be \$24,514.

'M*A*S*H' star Alan Alda reveals he has Parkinson's disease

NEW YORK (AP) — Actor Alan Alda says he has Parkinson's disease.

Appearing Tuesday on "CBS This Morning," the former "M*A*S*H" star said he was diagnosed with the neurodegenerative disorder three and a half years ago. Alda says he expects a tabloid will soon publish a story about his diagnosis.

The 82-year-old says he's not angry and considers it a challenge. Alda says he has acted and given talks since then. He says he could see his thumb twitch in a recent podcast and thought someone would soon do a sad story.

Alda says revealing his diagnosis might be helpful to others with Parkinson's that there are things they can do.

Alda played a senator

who ran for president on "The West Wing" and he also hosted "Scientific American Frontiers" on PBS.

White House chief of staff to stick around for now

WASHINGTON (AP) — White House Chief of Staff John Kelly has for now quieted reports that he will exit the administration, staying on as an increasingly diminished sidekick after his early days as a strong right hand to President Donald Trump.

Kelly told senior aides this week he has agreed to stick around through 2020 at Trump's request, five White House officials said Tuesday. Following months of speculation that the chief of staff was on his way out, the message appeared to be not just about stabilizing Kelly, but also tamping down speculation about staff turnover and projecting calm as the president gears up for his re-election campaign.

On Monday, the president tweeted congratulations to Kelly on reaching the one-year mark.

"Congratulations to General John Kelly. Today we celebrate his first full year as @WhiteHouse

Chief of Staff!" Trump wrote.

Town's entire police force quits, citing equipment, safety

BLANDFORD, Mass. (AP) — The entire four-member police department of a small western Massachusetts town has resigned, citing poor equipment and unsafe working conditions.

Interim Police Chief Roberta Sarnacki and three officers submitted their resignations in a letter to Blandford officials on Monday, effective immediately.

The officers said the town's police cruisers are in such bad shape they often have to answer calls in their personal vehicles. They said their police radios don't work in some parts of the town and their poorly fitting bulletproof vests are beyond expiration dates.

State police said Tuesday all 911 calls from Blandford for police assistance are being routed to troopers in Russell.

The officers on the force said they regret leaving the town without coverage, but have no other choice because their own safety has been put at risk.

Tapering is best policy when stopping heartburn meds

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am a 61-year-old woman in fairly good health except that I have been taking prescription omeprazole once a day for heartburn for at least 10 years, if not more. I've read articles that say this isn't good to take long term, like I've been doing. When I've tried to stop by using famotidine instead, I still suffer from heartburn throughout the day. I've raised my bed and tried sleeping in an upright position. Your thoughts, please. — O.D.S.

ANSWER: It certainly is a good idea to periodically review with your doctor all the medications you take, to decide whether they are still necessary. It is very often the case that people are taking medications for unclear reasons, and the person who is prescribing it has been doing so without really thinking about whether the benefits still outweigh the risks, especially as people get older and may have acquired new conditions or had medication changes. Proton pump inhibitors like omeprazole frequently are pre-

scribed for short-term use but end up being continued for years. Except in people who absolutely need it (such as people with Barrett's esophagus), I agree with a trial of stopping and using H2 blockers like famotidine on an as-needed basis. I recommend a taper, not a sudden stop. Proton pump inhibitors are likely to increase the risk of infection, such as pneumonia (without acid in the stomach, bacteria are not killed as efficiently) and intestinal infections; may possibly increase

the risk of osteoporosis; and probably reduce vitamin B-12 and iron absorption. Although there have been reports of increased risk of kidney disease and dementia, I doubt the actual clinical risk is significant. Still, there are enough possible adverse effects that it is worth balancing the risks against the benefits of reducing symptoms. I am glad you tried some nondrug therapies, as we doctors often do not emphasize how important they are. In addition to raising the head of the bed (bricks under the feet is traditional, but a foam wedge under the mattress is also effective), losing weight for those who would benefit, avoiding tobacco and alcohol, and not eating three hours before bedtime make drugs unnecessary for many. Some people benefit from eliminating certain foods, especially caffeine, chocolate and fatty or spicy foods.

DEAR DR. ROACH: My father, 90, has neuropathy in his feet and legs, and it is very painful. He recently talked to a clinic that

is offering stem cell treatment to relieve the pain. The clinic says it helps 85 percent of those who get the treatment; however, because of HIPAA laws, they don't provide any referrals. The treatments are very expensive (\$16,000), and results are seen in six weeks to six months. Are you familiar with this treatment, and is it effective for 85 percent of the people? Is this something you can recommend? — D.B.

ANSWER: I also have seen advertisements for stem cell treatments for many conditions. For neuropathy in particular, there are no good studies that give an estimate of effectiveness. It may be the case that 85 percent of people treated at the clinic report improvement. But the risk of a placebo effect is very high with this kind of procedure, and I could not recommend stem cell treatments for neuropathy without better information about the risks, the benefits and how long those benefits might last.

DEAR ABBY: My brother-in-law raped and molested his two daughters and two granddaughters. It tore our family apart.

Although my sister said she intended to divorce him, she never did. She also didn't report it. Since then, my sister has disowned her daughters, my mother and me. She still interacts with her son and his family.

I know I shouldn't miss my sister, but I do. Abby, how can we get past this? — Anguished In Arkansas

DEAR ANGUISHED: It seems there was a conspiracy of silence in the family. Your sister dealt with her husband's crime by choosing to ignore that he is a sexual predator. That your sister has blamed his victims is beyond the pale. Your nieces and grand-nieces should talk with a licensed mental health professional about this.

DEAR ABBY: My boyfriend and I are in our 50s. We have lived together for two years. He's retired. I work full time.

We have a woman friend he sees almost daily during the summer at the swimming pool. Every day he says to her, "What time will you be here? I'll be here around 10. See ya then." She brings him food occasionally while they're there.

Sometimes he can be in a foul mood, and all he wants is to go to the pool to relax. When we go, his eyes search for her and if/when he sees her, they light up and he gets a big smile on his face. When I pointed it out to him, he gave me the silent treatment for a couple of hours. Then he accused me of being jealous.

We are in a committed relationship, but I find this threatening. Was I wrong to say what I did? — Georgia Girl

DEAR GEORGIA GIRL: No, but after he accused you of being jealous, what you should have told him was he was right, and that you wish his eyes would light up that way when he sees you. It appears your guy has developed a crush. If you handle it with humor, it will pass. However, if you don't, you will continue to make him feel defensive — which is counterproductive — so use a light touch.

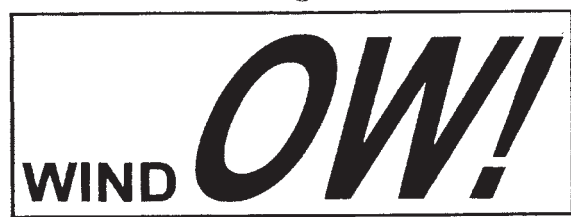

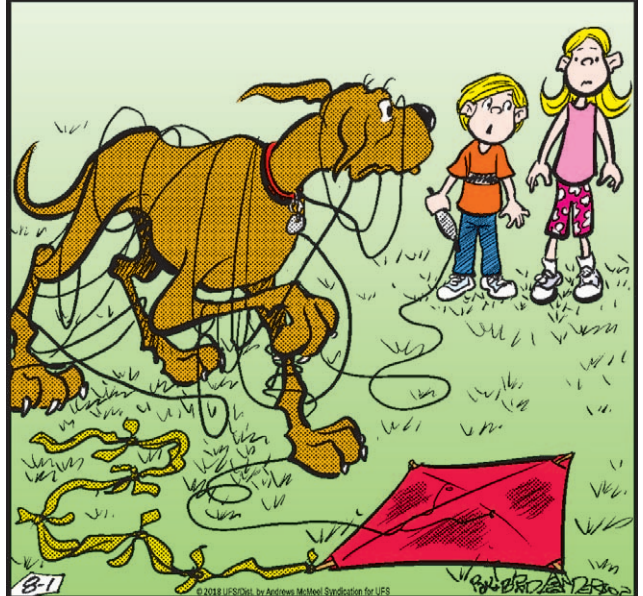

North's five no trump bid was a grand slam try, promising that his side held all of the aces, plus the king and queen of trumps. West knew that the lead of his singleton was

pointless, and might even point declarer to a winning line, so he chose the neutral six of spades as his lead.

Success was dependent on setting up dummy's diamond suit. South's first move was to cash the ace of hearts to make sure that the trumps were not splitting 5-0. Should that have been the case, declarer would have had to stake everything on the diamond finesse. When both opponents followed to the first trump, South continued by cashing the ace of diamonds and leading another diamond.

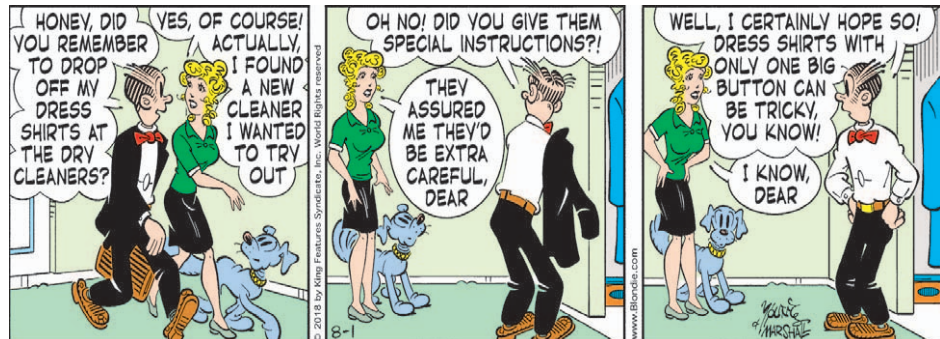
East won with his jack and led a high spade, forcing dummy to ruff. No other defense would have been better. Declarer ruffed in dummy and cashed dummy's 10 of hearts. A diamond was ruffed high, establishing the suit, and South drew the outstanding trumps. Dummy was high and the defense surrendered.

Note how important it was to play the diamonds properly. Had South crossed to his hand with the ace of clubs and taken the diamond finesse, instead, East could have defeated the contract by simply winning his king and leading a club to dummy's king. There would have been no late entry to enjoy the diamonds. Nicely played!

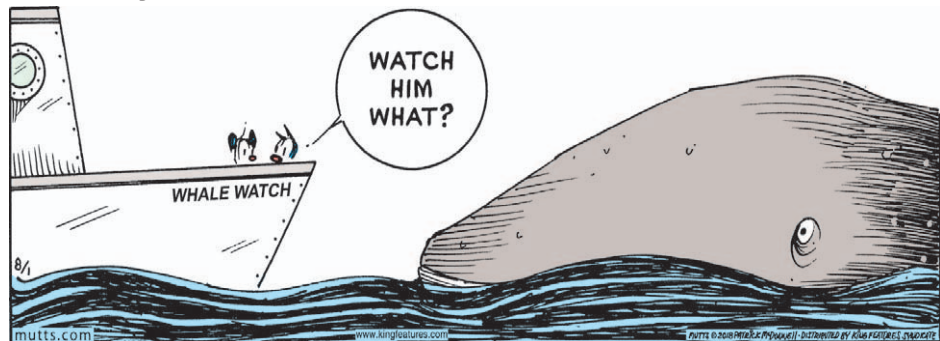

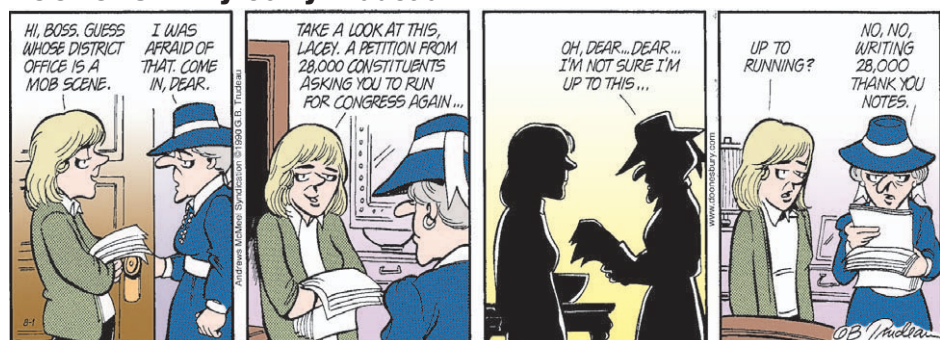

near the end of the runway, caught fire and was "seriously" damaged. Some passengers reported a "strange movement" when the plane took off, Aispuro added. He said the fire had been brought under control. Television images showed a column of black smoke rising from the site,

which had been cordoned off by police. Milenio showed images of rescuers attending to passengers, some of whom left the plane without help, according to the report. "I hope that the crew and all passengers are well," President Enrique Pena Nieto tweeted. He said he had instructed the army, civil protection and transport authorities to cooperate in handling the accident.

of lives saved because other factors could affect traffic deaths, such as automakers agreeing to make automatic emergency braking standard on all models before 2022. "They're making assumptions about stuff that may or may not be the same," he said. Experts say the logic that heavier vehicles are safer

doesn't hold up because lighter, newer vehicles perform as well or better than older, heavier versions in crash tests, and because the weight difference between the Obama and Trump requirements would be minimal. "Allow me to be skeptical," said Giorgio Rizzoni, an engineering professor and director of the Center for Automotive Research at Ohio State University. "To say that safety is a direct result of somehow freezing

the fuel economy mandate for a few years, I think that's a stretch." Experts say that a heavier, bigger vehicle would incur less damage in a crash with a smaller, lighter one and that fatality rates also are higher for smaller vehicles. But they also say that lighter vehicles with metals such as aluminum, magnesium, titanium and lighter, high-strength steel alloys perform as well or better than their predecessors in crash tests.

After a yearslong court battle, the State Department in late June settled the case against Defense Distributed. The settlement, which took gun-control advocates by surprise, allowed the company to resume posting blueprints for the hard-plastic guns at the end of July. Those plans were put on hold by the Seattle judge's decision. During the hearing in Seattle, Eric Soskin, a lawyer for the U.S. Justice Department, said they reached the settlement

to allow the company to post the material online because the regulations were designed to restrict weapons that could be used in war, and the online guns were no different from the weapons that could be bought in a store. Since the weapons "did not create a military advantage," he told the judge, "how could the government justify regulating the data?" But Rupert said a restraining order would keep the plans away from people who have learned about the technology and want to use it to get around gun laws. Hours before the restraining order was

issued, Democrats sounded the alarm, warning about "ghost guns" that can avoid detection and pose a deadly hazard. The company's website had said downloads would begin Wednesday, but blueprints for at least one gun — a plastic pistol called the Liberator — have been posted on the site since Friday. A lawyer for the company said he didn't know how many blueprints had been downloaded since then. Outrage over the administration decision is putting gun control back into the election-year political debate, but with a high-tech twist. The president seemed to

express surprise. He said on Twitter he was looking into the idea of a company providing plans to the public for printing guns, and he said it "doesn't seem to make much sense!" Democrats agreed and said Trump had the power to stop it. Some Republicans also expressed concern. "Even as a strong supporter of the Second Amendment — this is not right," Alaska Sen. Lisa Murkowski tweeted, linking to a news story on the guns. The NRA said in a statement that "anti-gun politicians" and some members of the news media wrongly claim that 3D-printing

technology "will allow for the production and widespread proliferation of undetectable plastic firearms." In truth, "undetectable plastic guns have been illegal for 30 years," said Chris W. Cox, executive director of the NRA's political arm. A federal law passed in 1988 — crafted with NRA support — bars the manufacture, sale or possession of an undetectable firearm. Trump spokesman Hogan Gidley made much the same point, saying the administration supports the law against wholly plastic guns, including those made with a 3D printer.

After it became clear that Russia-linked actors used social media to try to influence the 2016 U.S. election, Facebook has escalated countermeasures intended to prevent a repeat. It has cracked down on fake accounts and tried to slow the spread of fake news and misinformation through outside fact-checkers. The company has also

announced new guidelines around political advertisements, requiring disclosure of who paid for them and keeping a database. Facebook has ramped up spending on these and other measures, so much so that it finally spooked investors with a forecast of lower profitability last Wednesday. Facebook's shares promptly dropped almost 20 percent and haven't recovered. While the company would not say who is behind the efforts, Facebook said it uncovered

links between the accounts it just deleted and those created by Russia's Internet Research Agency in the 2016 influence effort. For example, the Atlantic Council's researchers noted "language patterns that indicate non-native English and consistent mistranslation, as well as an overwhelming focus on polarizing issues." The accounts seemed focused on building up an online audience and moving it to offline events, such as protests.

The earliest page was created in March 2017. Facebook says more than 290,000 accounts followed at least one of the fake pages. The most followed Facebook pages had names such as "Aztlan Warriors," "Black Elevation," "Mindful Being," and "Resisters." Facebook didn't provide detailed descriptions of those pages. But their names parallel those of 2016 groups established by Russian agents to manipulate Americans with particular ethnic, cultural or political identities. That

effort targeted people with both liberal and conservative leanings. This time, though, the pages Facebook found focused "exclusively at engaging and influencing the left end of the American political spectrum," according to the Atlantic Council researchers. Facebook says the pages ran about 150 ads for \$11,000 on Facebook and Instagram, paid for in U.S. and Canadian dollars. The first ad was created in April 2017; the last was created in June 2018.

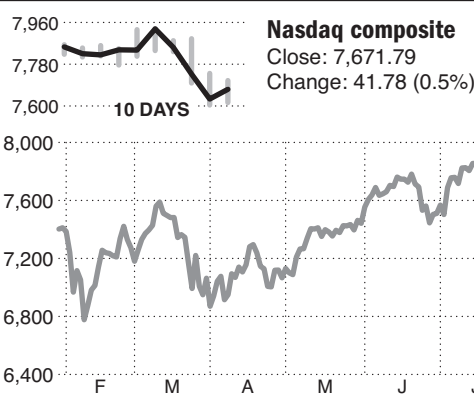
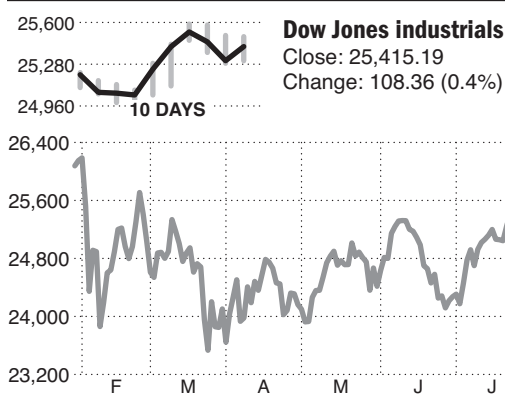
