CityWorks X(po) Florida back to continue sharing 'big ideas for better places'

WINTER HAVEN — It's been several years since Anita Strang first attended the CityWorks(X)po Annual Conference in Roanoke, Va., but the executive director of Main Street Winter Haven still gets excited when talking about the event her organization first brought to Polk County in 2016.

"There's an energy about being in a room full of people who all care about where they live and want to do something to make it better," Strang said, taking a break recently from final preparations for CityWorks (X)po Florida 2019. "It just sort of feeds your soul."

Indeed, if ideas are food, then the conference for Florida — with more than 20 presentations spanning its two-day program April 3-4 — is a buffet of sorts. The event will begin with a reception at 6 p.m. April 2 and the majority of the program will take place at the Ritz Theatre on Central Avenue in Winter Haven.

Bill Beasley selected as county manager

POLK COUNTY – On March 19, Polk County Commissioners unanimously selected Deputy County Manager Bill Beasley to replace Jim Freeman as County Manager.

Freeman had announced his retirement in February after working for the county for nearly 40 years.

Beasley has been the Deputy County Manager in Polk since 2006, overseeing county infrastructure. He will take over for Freeman in August. Freeman said between now and then he will help Beasley put together a county budget. Each fiscal year ends in September.

“I agree with the board,” Freeman said after the vote to appoint Beasley. “The candidates you had are solid contributors, good people and I know it was a difficult decision. I know the team will pull together for Mr. Beasley like they did for me.”

The county commissioners each wrote a name on a paper ballot and handed it to County Attorney Michael Craig, who announced Beasley as county manager.

Commissioner Martha Santiago was the first to speak after the vote. She said she was impressed with all of the candidates and was glad that the replacement candidates were all current county employees. Santiago gave kudos to Freeman for having a good succession plan.

Commissioner John Hall said it was a hard decision to make and added that he hoped that Beasley would work toward changing county government organization back to what it was like before the 2008 real estate crisis. The crisis plummeted property values and the associated tax income — so much that all of the department director positions were eliminated.

Beasley was in attendance when the announcement was made.

“Mr. Chair and members of the board, I’m honored and humbled at your decision,” Beasley said. “It continues to be a passion of mine to serve the citizens of Polk County and I have to say that it has been a personal and a professional privilege to serve along side the fine men and women who work in Polk County government.

“We are blessed that we have a cadre of well qualified and caring staff who every day serve the citizens of the county,” he went on. “It’s an honor and a privilege and I look forward to it.”

The county commissioners will be scheduling a time to start contract negotiations with Beasley in the coming weeks.

Public hearing on county junk ordinance amendment scheduled

POLK COUNTY – On March 19, county commissioners scheduled a public hearing for April 16 to amend the 2008 Polk County Property Maintenance Ordinance.

The ordinance from 2008 prohibits using private land as open storage of junk, debris, abandoned vehicles and overgrown lots. It allows for code enforcement officers to warn landowners to correct the problem within 10 days or face penalties.

Recently the county entered into a contract with a vendor to remove items in violation of this ordinance but said contract provides for payment of a “mobility fee” that was not part of the 2008 ordinance. Commissioners want to amend the ordinance to include this mobility fee.

For example, if a property owner does not correct a violation within 10 days, the code enforcement officer initiates the process of having a vendor come out to pick up the mess, the abandoned car, or mow an overgrown lawn. If the property owner corrects the problem after 10 days but before the vendor arrives, the property owner would still be responsible for paying the vendor to drive out to the property in question.

County staff would be legally able to place a lien on the private property to recover any fees not paid by the property owner 90 days after the fact.

Winter Haven Economic Development Council and Visit Central Florida, have been hard at work to facilitate another robust exchange of ideas.

Those ideas, and those speakers, will reflect what — for Strang — has become a bit of a mission.

“I just felt this need to make sure that Florida communities — like Winter Haven — were going to be prepared to grow responsibly and maintain their identity,” Strang said. “Each town has its own unique footprint and identity. We all just want to be the very best city we can be.”

The executive director for Main Street Winter Haven since 2012, Strang recalls going to the Roanoke-based event around that time and being blown away. In the following years, she brought a growing contingent from Winter Haven back to Virginia — something that impressed organizers for that event and led to a breakfast meeting with Ed Walker, CityWorks’ creator.

Recognizing an opportunity, Strang lobbied Walker to sign off on an event with the CityWorks branding in Winter Haven, but with a more specific focus on issues and ideas for communities throughout Florida. One thing organizers of CityWorks

(X)po Florida are adamant about is that the event, which is being held for the fourth time, is not a Winter Haven event. Leaders from surrounding communities, including Bartow and Lake Wales, regularly attend.

The program for the two-day event lays out a robust schedule geared toward keeping attendees fresh and engaged. A break in the action insofar as speakers are concerned might include chair yoga, for instance.

Speakers this year will touch on a variety of subjects from geographic information systems, incremental development, urban design, trails, sustainability, architectural tourism and plenty more.

Most of the speakers are new to the conference, but are returning and, in some cases, providing updates from projects in their respective communities. Some will present as individuals and others, such as a group from Realize Bradenton, are panel discussions.

Then, the end of each daily session — around roughly 4 p.m. each day — will be followed by after hours events each day. These social events, as Strang sees it, are one of the more important features of the

CityWorks experience.

“The premise is everybody is in there during the day, listening to these talks, and then we immediately put them into a social environment,” Strang said. “I want people to be able to have time to talk.”

For a fairly young event, CityWorks (X)po Florida already has some success stories. Victor Dover, a founding principal and urban planner for Dover, Kohl & Partners out of Coral Gables, presented in 2018. Recently, Dover and his firm partnered with organizations Lake Wales on the community’s efforts to revitalize its downtown corridor.

It is the type of connection, and camaraderie, event organizers are hoping for more of.

And, whoever you are, organizers feel the program will offer something to engage with and be mentally stimulated by.

“There’s something for everyone at this event — it doesn’t matter what you do,” Strang said. “It’ll make you want to get in there and be a part of (your community).”

But back to Runways — the newest iteration of an eatery at the airport certainly isn’t like its predecessors.

It’s no seat-of-the-pants operation, oh no. This time, it’s got almost 100 years of management expertise behind it, from owners Art Welhoelter and Darren Denington’s years as restaurant and management entrepreneurs, coupled with General Manager John Rushing’s tavern experience and — maybe most importantly — Executive Chef Sean Champe’s Cordon Bleu certifications.

All together, the team has developed a Southern Hospitality attitude, fueled with avgas.

“We have a great staff here,” says Rushing. “Most of them are experienced in either the kitchen or the front of the house and, since they are local and know Polk County, it’s been helpful in creating a comfortable atmosphere for our customers.”

On one particular day, the kitchen was hopping, the servers were scurrying and even Rushing was busy seeing that some 45 members of the ladies society of the Oakview Lakes retirement community in Fort Meade were getting their luncheon plates served with a smile.

The society spokeswoman, Marcia Day, explained that the large group often “goes out to new places” for their lunchtime gatherings.

“This is so nice, they can handle a crowd like us and we get a great lunch and get to sit and watch the planes come and go,” Day said. “This is just a great experience and I’m sure we’ll be back.”

Runways can technically handle more than 100 patrons, but on a Thursday, about noon, the restaurant had about 60 customers, most inside with a few

enjoying the spring weather at the covered patio tables.

Denington, et al, spent weeks revamping the restaurant’s interior, giving it an aero-rustic look. There are paintings of aircraft on the walls over reclaimed wood cupboards, where the Sunday brunch buffet is served, and a feature wall studded with black-and-white historic aircraft and flyers’ photos.

They serve to remind patrons that the airport was once farmland, then a World War II flight training base and is now a state-of-the-art airport, capable of welcoming large private planes, as well as home to an Army National Guard unit and numerous small industries and operations.

New booths also have that reclaimed-wood look, and provide ample space for a cozy meal for two or four.

The menu, says Rushing, is like the airport — always on the move.

“Our chef (Champe) changes the daily specials as he sees fit,” Rushing said. “His cooking, while southern in its roots, has the Cordon Bleu touch, too, which gives it a little bit more.”

Open for breakfast Monday through Saturday from 7:30 a.m.-11 a.m., the kitchen crew of cooks and sub-chefs switch to lunch mode from 11 p.m. to 2:30 p.m.

Since Runways has a full-bar license, it also stays open until 9 p.m. on Friday nights so one can enjoy a nice dinner after Happy Hour.

Sunday brunch is also available with a quasi-buffet, which, Rushing explains, is that the entree is usually selected by Champe and the buffet holds all the accouterments to round out the meal.

While feeding the customers is what Runways is all

about, Rushing also explains that “doing it reasonably” has also been a priority for the team.

“There are 800 people who work around here and we try to keep our food affordable,” he says.

The menu shows breakfasts average “about \$8 and lunches are about \$10,” Rushing adds.

Reservations aren’t required, but for larger groups, they are suggested. Denington says he hopes Runways becomes much more than just an airport eatery.

“I think this has all it needs to be a great event venue,” he explains.

Denington says receptions can be staged in the airport lobby, on the covered porches that overlook the runways and meals served in the restaurant proper.

“We could even hold weddings here,” he adds. “Wouldn’t that be fun!”

While pursuing that avenue, Denington is also starting to spread the word about Runways catering services. He’s working a deal with the National Guard unit to provide meals for their soldiers when they are on-site for training.

If anyone wants to fly-in or drive-in, the Runways at Bartow is at 5995 Airport Boulevard, Bartow, FL 33831, just south of U.S. Highway 17 between Bartow and Eagle Lake.

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Local Scouts BSA troops embrace changes, welcome girl members

POLK COUNTY — Local troops are excited about the changes recently made to Boy Scouts of America.

In February, the Boy Scouts program became Scouts BSA to reflect the decision to include girls and young women ages 11-17, or fifth grade through high school.

A girl unit has been set up in Haines City, Winter Haven and Davenport. Scouts Troop 528 in Davenport has 30 members: 25 boys and 5 girls have already started to participate in all the program has to offer.

The other two units do not have any girls yet, but leaders encourage them to join.

Lanette Edwards, Committee Chair Troop 528 and Vice Chair of Programs Lake Region District Greater Tampa Bay Area Council (GTBAC), and Jean Nardi, Scoutmaster Troop 528 and Activities Chair Lake Region District GTBAC, said that there are advantages to both programs — the newly rebranded Scouts BSA and Girls Scouts.

In fact, Nardi's daughter is a Girl Scout and was also the first girl to crossover from the Cub Scouts to Scouts BSA. Genevieve Nardi, 12, said she plans to remain in both programs.

"I love to do crafts and stuff like that in Girl Scouts," explained Genevieve Nardi. "Now, in Scouts BSA, I get to go outside and go on adventures."

To move up in rank, the Scouts BSA participants must earn merit badges, and, for the most part, focus on outdoor and survival skills. Girl Scouts choose from a long list of badges, and members are grouped by age, not rank, and it's possible to move through the program without earning a lot of outdoor badges.

Even though girls are now allowed in the Scouts BSA, boys and girls are not allowed to mix during activities.

"At the beginning and end of the meetings, all of the scouts are there but after the opening, they split and go into boy and girl groups," Jean Nardi said.

The requirements in Scouts BSA are identical for the boys and girls and haven't changed since girls were wel-

comed into the program. The books are even the same for boys and girls except the photos in the books are of their own gender.

The Cub Scouts program for younger children was the first to open to girls. More than 66,000 girls nationwide have already joined the Cub Scouts since it began accepting younger girls earlier this year, according to the Boy Scouts of America website.

"There were girls who came to us before February 1 who wanted to join the new Scouts BSA," Edwards said.

Other Boy Scouts programs for older youth — such as an outdoor adventure program called Venturing — were already open to girls. But those programs didn't offer girls the chance to attain the highest rank of Eagle Scout.

"There's so many fun activities planned. We are going camping at least once a month," Edwards said. "There's archery, rifle and shotgun shooting plus lots more."

Report praises value of taxpayer money spent on Florida College System

The president and CEO of Florida TaxWatch, the nonpartisan taxpayer research institute and government watchdog, wants Floridians to know they're getting their bang for their buck when it comes to the Florida College System.

Dominic Calabro and his team at Florida TaxWatch released an assessment that studied a decade's worth of data regarding the system, which encompasses Florida's 28 locally-governed public colleges, including Polk State College.

"It's low cost, high-quality — it's a great return on investment," Calabro said. "By every basic measure, Florida's College System is absolutely one of the best bargains in the country."

More commonly referred to as community colleges, the study explained that such institutions — generally offering two-year degrees, in addition to certificates and some four-year degrees — are the access-point for more than 800,000 Floridians to higher education each year.

And while Florida's universities enjoy a more prominent profile, Calabro said the Florida College System has proven itself crucial in regards to keep the state's workforce competitive.

"You've got to kind of look at the Florida College System as the workhorse of Florida's postsecondary institutions," Calabro said.

Some of the numbers cited in the report reinforce Calabro's enthusiastic assessment. For instance, students experience increased expected work-life earnings — from \$491,777 to \$838,023 — and a repayment of total cost time of between just 2.5 to 3.8 years.

Per the study, the higher work-life salaries earned by degree holders compared to high school completers, compared with the public investment in the system, translates to a return of \$10.80 to \$15.42 in increased Florida Gross Domestic Product for every \$1 invested and generates nearly 10,000 new jobs.

The prominent vote of confidence from TaxWatch was welcomed by school officials around the state, including Polk State President Dr. Angela Garcia Falconetti.

After all, Polk State boasts the second highest job-place and continuing-education rate in the Florida College System at 96.9 percent.

"At Polk State College, 80 percent of students graduate with zero student-loan debt and, on average, earn wages that are 2.3 times higher than the average entry-level wage for Polk County," Falconetti said. "The ability of our students to achieve quality higher education, earn successful careers, and do so without burdensome debt allows them to become the key drivers of economic growth for our communities and the State of Florida."

Expanding upon the findings his staff encountered, Calabro — whose own post-secondary education began at a Florida College System school (Broward College) — said that with less bureaucracy, the 28 schools are able to quickly adapt to the needs of the workforce in Florida.

"They are very responsive, not only to the issues and demands of the workforce, but also the speed and flexibility with which they achieve it," Calabro said.

Calabro said that he is optimistic that the Legislature, which is in session, and the new administration under Governor Ron DeSantis, will be receptive to the implications of the report and act accordingly. Most, if not all, of Florida's colleges are seeking increased funding.

Polk State, for example, is looking to increase funding for academic advisers — something school officials see as crucial to student success.

Based on the report, at

least, any such increased spending would likely be well-spent.

"I think, for the last few years, the (Florida) College System has been a little bit of a stepchild," Calabro said. "We hope this report will give it the kind of proper at-

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Raises for Polk County Public Schools teachers in doubt this year

POLK COUNTY – Through their union, teachers in Polk County have been lobbying the county school board for pay raises since 2017, when there was a long negotiation involving expensive lawyers and multiple late night mediation hearings.

At the time, the school board said a lack of state funding was the reason it could not authorize teacher pay raises.

Last September, the Polk Education Association — the local teacher's union — tried to negotiate for raises again. This time, the school board cited the rising cost of health insurance as a reason for not authorizing a substantial raise.

The two sides agreed to school staff getting \$300 per year cost of living allowance raises (COLA), but for many the COLA raise did not offset the higher insurance costs. Married teachers were asked to pay an additional \$171 per month for spousal health insurance costs, for example. Teachers with kids on their plan had to pay \$10 per month for each child.

During a March 19 Polk County School Board work session, Polk County Schools Associate Superintendent and Chief Financial Officer Michael Perrone said that this fiscal year, health insurance costs will be going up again.

Perrone said that, over the past two years, the amount of health insurance claim payouts have skyrocketed, taking the insurance fund reserve from more than \$11 million in the black to \$10,281,607 in the red.

Polk County School Board Member Kay Fields asked if this deficit would limit the ability to authorize a teacher pay raise again this year. School Board Chairman Lynn Wilson said it would.

“We will have to do the same thing this year,” Wilson said.

Polk County School Board Member Billy Townsend expressed frustration with the response.

“This is a failure at the management level,” Townsend said. “It’s not the union’s fault, not the em-

ployees’ fault, but they will suffer. It’s going to suck, it’s going to hurt — it needs to be known that there were people not taking care of business here.”

Townsend went on to apologize to school staff and blamed past school boards for not solving this problem when he brought it up last year. School Board Member Lori Cunningham and Fields both said Townsend’s words were offensive.

“Maybe we need historical training,” Fields said.

Fields, Cunningham and Wilson countered that past school boards could not have predicted that insurance claims would skyrocket over the past two years.

In 2018, teacher and school board contributions toward staff health care totaled \$107,952,401, but expenses were \$120,225,994. The school board had the same problem in 2017, when expenses exceeded income by around \$9 million.

Some of the members expressed support for requesting the public to vote to approve an expansion of the half cent sales tax as a solution.

Soon-to-be centenarian met Orville Wright, reflects on memories

WINTER HAVEN — How many people can say that they got to see one of the Wright Brothers fly a plane and also be around for the invention of the latest iPhone within their lifetime?

Lois Thomas can.

Thomas — described by family and friends as quick-witted and giant-hearted — will be celebrating her 100th birthday March 30.

The Winter Haven resident of seven years has lived to see some really incredible happenings in the last century.

GROWING UP SIMPLE

Lois was born in small-town Pennsylvania back in 1919, when life was seemingly simpler and hard work was the only work. She went to grade school for a few years growing up, but at age 12 her father had her out working on the family farm.

“We had 45 cows usually,” Thomas recalled. “As I grew up, I worked out there because the boys went to school. I was home and I worked with my dad with fences and farms and cows. I did farm work.”

Lois says she woke up early because the cows don’t wait. She would go out to the farm at the crack of dawn to milk three stables full of animals with her father. She would then transfer the milk to rest in a shed they built for cooling purposes.

After that, she would rinse the buckets with water from a springhouse and repeat the process again when

evening came. The next morning, a truck would pull up and the milkman would pick up their milk and transport it to the cream factory.

“That’s the way my daddy made his money,” said Lois with a smile.

Life got a bit easier when her uncle, Chris, started selling some of the first efficient, automatic milkers. The invention, like most, took something that was easy-to-do, yet extremely time consuming, and sped up the process. Her father wanted to support Chris and added the new technology to help out at the farm.

“We bought one from him and people came to see how it worked,” said Lois.

WRIGHT TIME AND PLACE

One day, they got a special visitor. He was flying his plane from Ohio to Lancaster and had to make a pitstop when unforeseen weather put his safety at risk.

That special someone was Orville Wright — one of the famous Wright Brothers.

When the storm passed, he asked Lois’ father to hop in the plane to see the county from above as payment for their hospitality. Her father was reluctant, since the planes were still pretty new and quickly turned down the offer.

After many years on the farm, Lois decided to go back to school. Education, at the time, was a privilege that was given to boys more often than girls. Since her father wanted her home, it wasn’t until she was old enough to make the decision on her own that she got to head back into the classroom.

“After she got married she eventually got her GED and then went to Bible school and got a degree,” explained her son, J.R. Thomas. “So, she did it the hard way with determination. She had a full-time job and was raising kids while she did that.”

Lois spent 33 years working for William Carter’s company, Carter’s Inc., which is a children’s apparel brand that is still a major name in retail today.

“Someone was talking about what I did and they said ‘she does everything!’ She presses and she folds and she puts them in the

pack and she folds the pack. I sewed, too,” Lois Thomas said.

FOUNDATION OF FAITH

Besides being a seamstress for baby clothes and raising children of her own, Lois found joy in combining her appreciation for the Bible and teaching kids at the church. After she received her degree from Bible school, she began teaching at a Sunday School. She continued impacting young lives with Christian education for 60 years.

The Bible is her favorite book, one she has read from start to finish, and one that she reads even to this day. Flipping to Isaiah 30:21 out of the blue one day when debating the big move was what sealed the deal about packing her bags to Florida.

“I read something in Isaiah that said ‘don’t look right or left, just go.’ It’s in the Bible and I thought, ‘oh that’s for me!’” she explained.

Faith was even a big part of the advice she said she would give her younger self.

“Be faithful, interested in learning new ways and learn to know the Lord better and better. Follow his way,” said Lois.

After all of the many countries Lois has seen, history that has been made and memories she has collected, her excitement for life and willingness to keep learning and growing is what she says keeps her feeling young.

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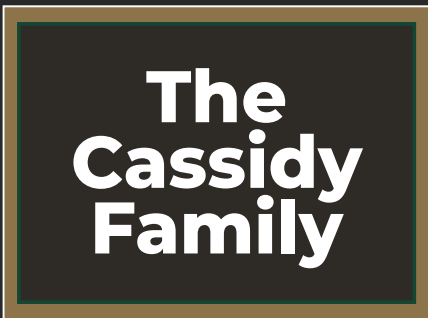

Q-and-A with Bartow City Commission District 3 candidates

The Bartow City Commission election is Tuesday, April 2. The race for the District 3 seat includes incumbent Vice Mayor W.H. "Billy" Simpson, as well as challengers Tanya Tucker and Gerald Cochran. We asked Simpson and Tucker, the two leading candidates in the race, to answer questions related to issues in which commissioners will make decisions. Responses have been edited for space.

The city has owned the Thompson & Company Cigar Factory since 2011, with the intention of making it an attraction. So far, the city has spent more than \$200,000 to maintain it. Should the city continue or discontinue this effort?

SIMPSON: If there is a cost effective way to move forward with restoration and historic preservation, I would be in favor of it. The county and the city have both invested funds to keep the building from degrading further. Unfortunately, to date, no solid plan has been presented and no firm commitment from a private investor has been offered. The good news is that we do have a private investor expressing interest, but marketing surveys are underway ... to determine the feasibility of a potential future use/project. Should a solid plan be brought to the commission, I will certainly consider it. However, my first responsibility is to the taxpayer, and I would only support a plan that makes good fiscal sense and does not negatively impact ... our ability to provide other necessary services for the community.

TUCKER: I am a strong supporter of historical preservation, but not at the taxpayers' expense. With that said, I feel the city should make a strong effort to eliminate roadblocks for potential private investors. ... Private investment funds can be leveraged with grants if needed to restore this historical gem and not cost the taxpayers anymore. (It) has the potential to bring some great things to Bartow and jump-start future development within the historical district. I hope my background in grants can bring knowledge ... to help Bartow in their preservation efforts and get projects like this back in a progressive mode.

In the latest FDLE report, Bartow showed a 14.8 percent crime-rate increase. Is there anything commissioners should address or do in regard to this situation?

SIMPSON: First, in order to put our residents' minds at ease, it's important to put the recent crime report in perspective, because — since the year 2000 (with the exception of 2003 and 2018) — the crime rate has steadily gone down every year. In fact, in 2017, we enjoyed the lowest crime rate in recorded history. That being said, ANY increase in crime rate is certainly something that should, and does, get the attention of commissioners and city leaders. So, this will be a priority discussion over the next few months as we work with our police chief to identify issues and find solutions.

TUCKER: Bartow's crime rate is actually in a downward trend, but

we have to maintain that. Employing community policing is a good start. We should also consider what our police department needs to make the crime rate lower, more resources, more staffing and support that is needed. Transparent communications with the citizens of Bartow is also important. We see stories like this in the paper but we don't always see our city's response and that lack of knowledge can lead to unsubstantiated fears among our citizens, visitors, and potential businesses.

How can cities maintain home rule in spite of recent trends by the Florida Legislature?

SIMPSON: There can be little doubt that the government closest to the people is best suited to make policy decisions that impact their communities — the places they live, work and raise families. But, increasingly, the Legislature is chipping away at what we often refer to as "Home Rule." To be fair, some of the discussions in Tallahassee are the result of a handful of bad players. ... However, for the most part, cities are highly attuned and responsive to the needs of their communities. ... We live local! And, that's where the decision-making should take place. The tougher thing is to determine the most effective way to stop the trend in the Legislature. We start by consistently doing what Bartow has always done — demonstrating integrity and transparency and we hold the bad players accountable. Next, educate both legislators and citizens about the importance of "home rule" and what it means to them. Finally, work together, in unity, to turn the ship and change the discussion from one that seeks to erode "home rule" to one that seeks to work cooperatively with local governments.

TUCKER: Educate the citizens and make sure they VOTE for elected officials that will support cities addressing unique local needs with local solutions. We do not want any more of the state's unfunded mandates or policies that remove our local input. Government at all levels are strapped for funding, but passing along any responsibility without resources is not what this country, this state nor our city is built upon. I believe decisions for local government needs to be made at a local level.

How can the city most effectively deal with population and business growth?

SIMPSON: Planning! Doing the legwork to understand growth trends and future demands on municipal services is the key to ensuring that Bartow is not only ready for growth, but is poised to capitalize on it for the benefit of its citizens. The city has a strategic plan

that provides a blueprint for decision-making and that's a starting point but, we also need a master plan — something that is already under consideration. Apart from the city's own planning efforts, our engagement with the Polk Regional Water Cooperative and my service as Bartow's representative on that Board of Directors ensures we're paying close attention to water supply needs. The city also participates on the Polk Transportation Planning Organization to ensure continued mobility for our workforce, students, tourists and more. We partner with the Central Florida Regional Planning Council and countless other organizations that are all highly engaged in planning for growth. These are all regional efforts.

On a more local level, one of Bartow's most recent achievements to meet growth demands was the completion of Phase I of a five to a seven-year plan to upgrade roads, curbs and sidewalks. This is a systematic approach to improving driving, walking and biking conditions throughout the city. Of note is the fact that the city's investment is approximately \$1 million annually — all of which is "pay as we go" — no loans (bond issues) and no interest to pay! It's a fiscally responsible way to address current problems and prevent others.

TUCKER: Strategic planning is key and growth is inevitable. Our community must plan, prepare and embrace growth. Population growth will hopefully bring business growth, something our city needs. Without growth we will die. We should be planning for things like infrastructure, land uses, and public safety services now to get a jump start on the anticipated growth. As for business growth, the Bartow City Commission should have an identified list of projects and industries Bartow needs and wants and those should be actively sought after by the Bartow Economic Development Council and the Commissioners. We have to be proactive in seeking the development we want for our community or we will get stuck with what other communities didn't want.

Commissioners direct staff to remove elected officials from social media ordinance

LAKE WALES – City commissioner Curtis Gibson is a big fan of social media.

Not so much, though, of an ordinance that would have given city officials the right to review what he wanted to post. And his fellow commission members agreed.

Last week, the group decided to table the second reading of a proposed ordinance covering acceptable social media use, directing city officials to remove elected officials from the guidelines — which will now cover just city staff — before it comes back for a final vote.

“Frankly, as the youngest member of the commission, and the one who uses social media the most, I feel targeted,”

Curtis Gibson said. “I resent any attempt by the city manager to limit my right to free speech. That sounds a lot like prior restraint. We don’t report to you.”

Curtis Gibson said he reached his position after talking to other elected officials at a recent National League of Cities meeting, and after looking at other policies from several Polk County cities.

“Nowhere did I find a policy that included elected officials — only employees,” he noted. “I am perfectly capable of regulating my own comments and making sure I comply with Florida Sunshine and public records laws.”

Curtis Gibson maintains two facebook pages: a personal one and second which specifically identifies him as a Lake Wales City Commissioner.

City Manager Ken Field said it was that second page that

was of concern and that there were two issues.

“One, it doesn’t become a platform for electioneering materials and two, if you’re going to post as an official representative of the city, there has to be some way for the city to know what’s being put out there so there isn’t a violation,” Fields said.

Fields said one way to solve the problem would be to add to the policy that the city would not share any content from Facebook pages commissioners had set up for themselves as elected officials, adding also that the policy was never intended to reach all the way to each of their personal pages.

Commissioner Robin Gibson said he, too, favored taking elected officials out of the policy, as did Mayor Eugene Fultz, who noted perceived problems could be dealt with by the state Board of Ethics.

Lake Wales Connected next step in redesign process

LAKE WALES – Lake Wales Main Street will undertake its biggest project – Lake Wales Connected – riding the momentum of a very positive 2018.

The group is spearheading a week-long initiative, starting next Monday, where consultants will be made available to the public to give input to help redesign the downtown area, as well as the Lincoln Avenue area in the northwest part of the city.

Consultants will be available weekdays, April 1 to 5, at 218 Park Avenue. There will also be a Friday night

public event to reveal tentative ideas, and nightly public workshops will be held starting at 6 p.m. at the Austin Center on MLK Boulevard.

“We want everyone there,” said Karen Thompson, executive director of Lake Wales Main Street.

As a group, Lake Wales Main Street is entering the initiative on a high note, thanks in part to a revitalized farmers market.

“We probably grew by 20 to 30 vendors this year alone,” Thompson said of the market. “We’re up to at least 50 vendors.”

Other initiatives have included quarterly merchant

meetings, a new award to recognize business that help beautify the city landscape and events such as Make It Magical; Small Business Saturday; Hops, Shop and Stroll; and the creation of a benefactor program which businesses agree to a yearly sponsorship of \$2,500.

So far, Thompson said 10 local businesses had stepped forward.

She termed the group’s annual meeting a “wild suc-

cess”. The January outdoor gala was a kickoff to the Lake Wales Connected initiative with representatives of Dover Kohl, the firm hired to reimagine the downtown, speaking about that effort.

Additionally, the organization launched a magazine, “Lake Wales Local.” There is both a print version and online edition.

“It is really, really, really getting good feedback,” she said.

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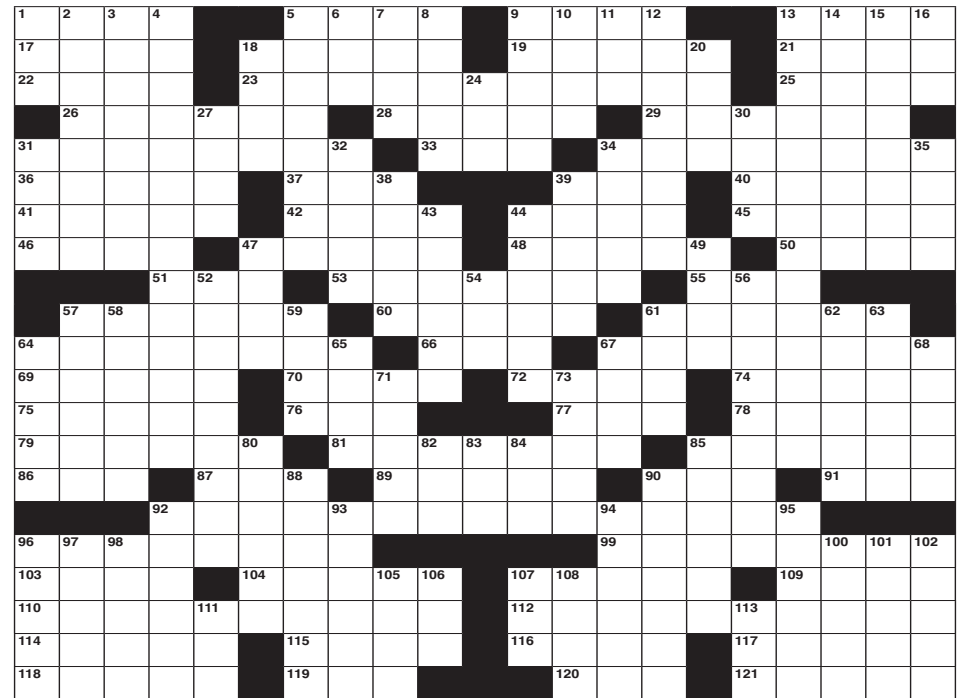

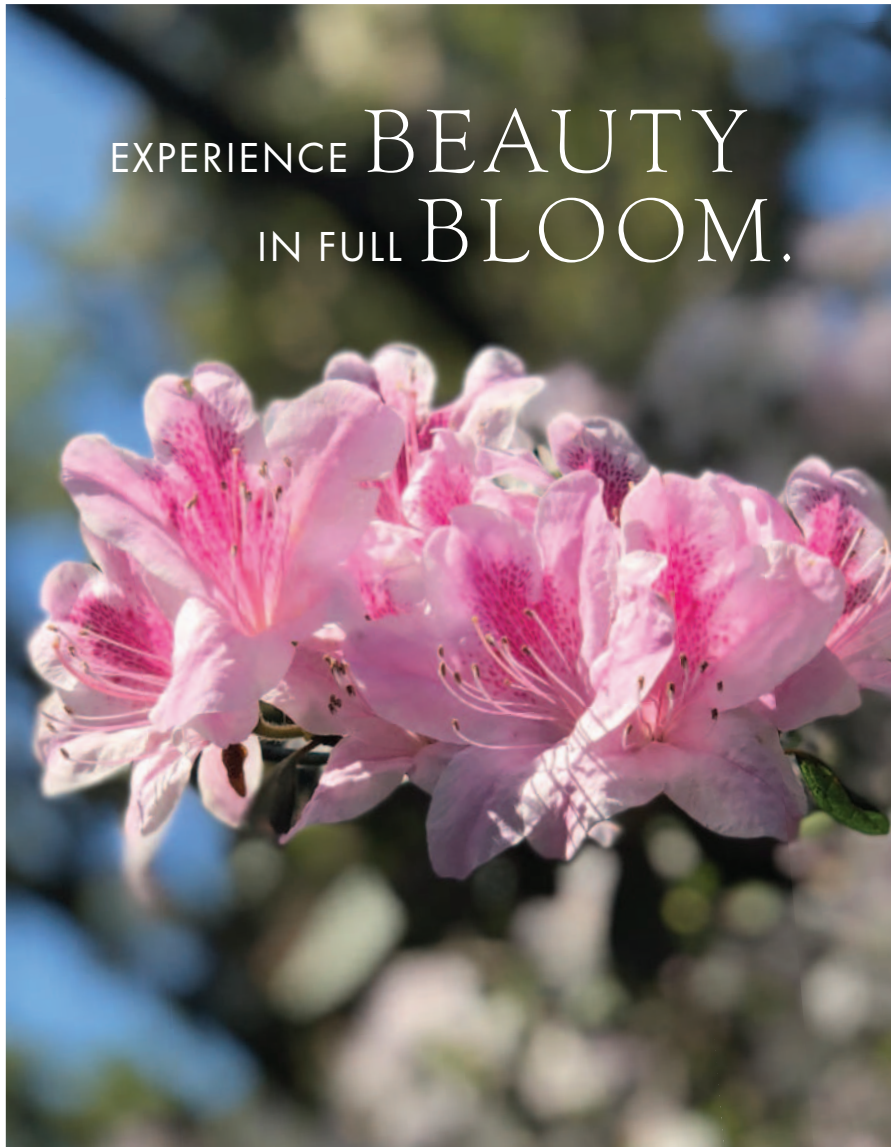

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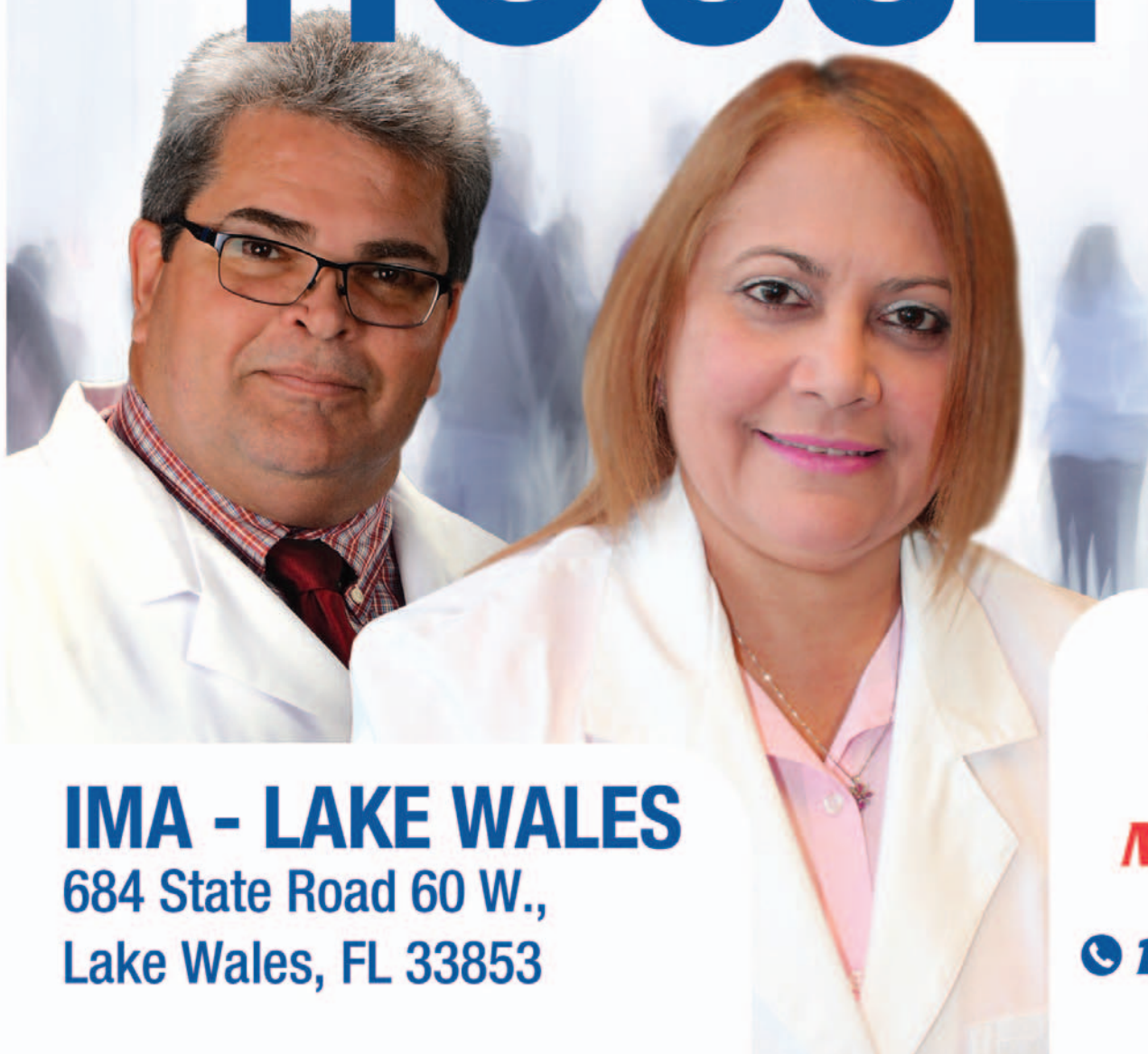
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**Beneath the Chinaberry Tree

E. D. "Dan" Dantzler came to Winter Haven in 1923.

He had been a cotton farmer in South Carolina when the price of cotton fell from 44 cents to five cents a pound. Married only nine months, he came south settling in Winter Haven.

He and wife Olive had four children: Ray the oldest went on to fame on what was then WTVT Channel 13 in Tampa, Helen, Katherine (Rose) and Richard (Dick) the youngest later to serve as mayor of Winter Haven. All are now deceased but back in 2001, Katherine Dantzler Jaberg penned her memories of growing up on Avenue I, NW — about three blocks north of the First Presbyterian Church — in the 1930s.

The Dantzler family lived in a large two-story house known as the Marks house (possibly the former home of the own-

er of Winter Haven Wagon Works and an inventor of grove heaters). It was owned by a widow, Mrs. Marks, who lived across a side street. Evidently, Mrs. Marks depended on Dan Dantzler to assist her with emergencies. Katherine remembers one such event involved a skunk which gave Dan a dose of "fragrance," and when he returned home he was not allowed in the house until he disrobed and was doused with tomato juice.

Katherine outlined 22 children along Avenue I, using the term "kid population." In addition to the Dantzlers she recalled many names familiar to our more "seasoned" residents:

The Smiths: Carol, Carroll, Jr, Lumby and three more. Carroll Smith operated a downtown hardware store where the Sun office is located today.

Jack Miller, an only child, lived next door.

Bob Bundy lived behind the Millers on Avenue H (but she counted him anyway).

The Gilbert family included Emily (Tootie), Sonny and Shirley. Their father was the beloved Dr. R. E. Gilbert (namesake

of Gilbert Field at WH airport). Sonny married Phyllis Reese (longtime teacher at Denison Middle School) and Shirley married Bob Turner. Helen Gilbert Dantzler was named after Dr. Gilbert.

The Mooty family included Frazier, Tom, Mark, Ross and daughter Mary (a longtime Florida State University art instructor and benefactor of Heritage Park at the Winter Haven Museum).

That totals 22 in her recollection, though she thinks there were probably more.

She also remembers that the Smith family across the street had a large bag swing up in a tree. The kids would lift her up to the top of the garage and let her "go on the swing" — until, that is, her mother learned of the practice and thought (age) 4 might have been a tad too young for such activity.

Katherine also noted, "I don't recall any accidents and I marvel that somebody didn't get killed."

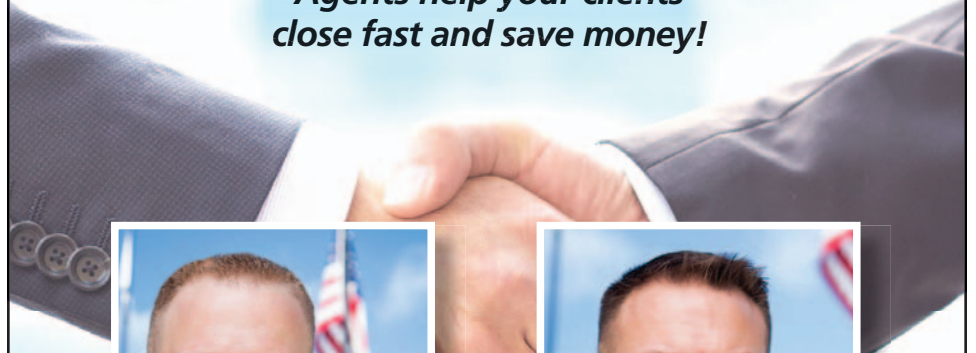

Standout players dot local varsity baseball rosters

The cool thing about playing high school baseball, especially in Florida, is you're never quite sure who's watching you.

But for some of the top players in eastern Polk, you can bet scouts from Major League Baseball are among those keeping an eye on their development, in an area that has produced big league stars such as Wade Davis (Lake Wales) and Andrew McCutchen (Fort Meade).

Auburndale games are certain to draw some buzz, thanks to a standout like catcher Jakob Runnels, who has sizzled as the Bloodhounds are off to an 8-8 start. His athletic build (he's already 6-foot) isn't the only thing that attracted the

University of Central Florida, where he is a commit.

Whether he makes it to the Orlando campus is matter of debate. He hit .556 through the team's first six games, and stole four bases — eye-opening numbers for any scout.

Winter Haven has a UCF commit, as well, in Juan Gonzalez. At 6-foot-3, he'll have to grow into his frame, which is not unusual for a talented high schooler. He drove in 21 runs as a junior, while hitting .391 last spring.

Sean Riley is another Blue Devil worth a look. He picked Montreat College in December, and is looking to follow up on a .350 junior campaign at the plate.

The trip to Highlander Hill in Lake Wales is worth it just for Ben Gilbert, a

senior outfielder who can play defense, hit, steal a base and pitch. He's gone 12-for-24 in eight games for Lake Wales to start this season, with three stolen bases. On the bump, he's thrown nine innings to an ERA of 0.78. Ole Miss will get his services at the collegiate level, if a major league team can't tempt him before the Bulldogs get their mitts on him.

Bartow has talent worth the trek too. Catcher Kasey Cribbs can play a lot of positions and carries a big stick, while Tucker Wiltrout is a junior, both carrying the Yellow Jackets to a 9-3 start.

And for the lucky few, the date of June 3 looms large — that will be opening night of the 2019 Major League Baseball League draft, after all.

Agree to disagree (and be nice about it)

My favorite professor of government — my major field of study at Florida State University — was Dr. Paul Piccard.

I addressed him (or at least referred to him) as Doc, the title of respect that students of my day used for those professors they held in highest regard.

Doc and I were polar opposites on the political spectrum — Doc

a liberal, me a conservative.

So why was he my favorite? Because you can learn a lot more from people who have a different viewpoint than from people who agree with you.

This carries an important caveat: If you're nice about it.

Doc never tried to make you feel that you were stupid, or uncaring, or uncompassionate, or any other insulting label, because you disagreed with him.

Although I can't paraphrase his words that closely nearly 60 years later, he taught that there are two political camps:

- Liberals — who generally advocate that government, with its nearly unlimited powers (and money), should do everything possible to make life better for its citizens. Implicit in this approach is that citizens must give up some individual prerogatives and pay significantly higher taxes.

- Conservatives — who generally advocate that government should provide only the essentials for its citizens

that they cannot provide for themselves (the classic example at the federal level is national security) and exercise minimum control over the lifestyles of its citizens. Implicit in this philosophy is that government, exercising fewer controls, needs less of your money for taxes.

I am sure Doc is long retired from the classroom, but I read with great interest an article from what is now the College of Social Sciences and Public Policy at FSU about a program it calls "Agree to Disagree."

Students holding opposite views are paired with each other — one-on-one — for (in the college's words) "facing each other (to) engage in active listening and conversation on the foundations of their political beliefs."

Lecturers emphasize "the idea of rational exchange" and "guide students toward respectful, thoughtful dialogue."

Back in "our day," Doc and I understood that as passionately as we each supported our divergent political viewpoints, both ends of the political spectrum have merit, as do the people who embrace them.

Imagine what our nation would be like today if its political leadership — starting at the White House — had the maturity to engage in mutually respectful discourse.

Erasing Capitalism? Consider the Pencil First

Socialism is back in vogue in some quarters.

According to the website of dictionary maker Merriam-Webster, socialism is a political theory that advocates "governmental ownership and administration of the means of production and distribution of goods."

The concept is that government central planners can make really smart decisions to distribute our collective wealth in a manner that benefits all. But socialism never works, because nobody is smart enough to make such incredibly complex decisions.

Leonard Read explained this clearly in a 1958 essay, "I, Pencil."

You see, the standard

pencil begins when a cedar is cut down and crews using ropes and gear tug it onto a truck or rail car.

Numberless people and skills are involved in mining ore to produce steel and refine it into saws, axes and motors, wrote Read.

The logs are shipped to a mill and cut into slats. The slats are kiln-dried, tinted, waxed, then kiln-dried again.

Read wondered how many skills were needed to produce the tint and the kilns. What about the electric power? And the mill's belts, motors and other parts?

The slats are shipped to a pencil factory. A complex machine cuts grooves into each slat. Then another machine lays graphite into every other slat. Glue is applied. Two slats — one

with graphite, one without — are sealed together, then cut to pencil length. Each pencil receives six coats of lacquer.

Complex processes employ thousands who create the graphite and lacquer.

Each pencil eraser's brass holder is a marvel. First, miners extract zinc and copper from the Earth. Experts transform those materials into sheet brass, which is cut, stamped and affixed to the pencil.

The eraser, wrote Read, is made from "factice," a rubber-like material produced when rapeseed oil from the Dutch East Indies (now Indonesia) reacts with sulfur chloride.

To be sure, an awe-inspiring amount of work goes into producing a pencil. Millions collabo-

rate to produce it, plying unique trades and skills, yet have no idea they are collaborating.

Even more amazing is this: No one person could possibly manage the millions of decisions made by the millions of people who produce pencils' ingredients.

Despite the absence of a mastermind — or government central planners — billions of pencils are produced every year with such humdrum efficiency that we take pencils for granted.

The pencil, explained Read, is a triumph of human freedom — of creative energies spontaneously responding to necessity and desire.

Without even one centrally planned government program, the need for pencils arose. With-

Read concluded his "I, Pencil" essay with this advice: The best thing our government can do is leave our creative energies uninhibited — by removing obstacles that keep creativity and innovation

from flowing freely.

His recommendation is the polar opposite of socialist central-planning policies. Let's hope our younger generation comes to its senses before it votes people espousing failed ideas into the highest levels of our government.

Trump border emergency survives

Democratic-controlled House has fallen short in its effort to override President Donald Trump's first veto

WASHINGTON — The Democratic-led House failed Tuesday to override President Donald Trump's first veto, salvaging his effort to steer billions of extra dollars to erecting border barriers and delivering a victory to the White House in a constitutional and political clash that's raged for months.

Lawmakers voted 248-181 to overturn Trump's veto, but that fell 38 votes shy of the required two-thirds margin. Just days after Attorney General William Barr announced that special counsel Robert Mueller had found Trump didn't scheme with Russia to help his 2016 election, Tuesday's vote bolstered Trump's drive to build a wall along the boundary with Mexico, a hallmark of his 2016

presidential campaign and a priority of his presidency.

"Thank you to the House Republicans for sticking together and the BIG WIN today on the Border," Trump tweeted. "Today's vote simply reaffirms Congressional Democrats are the party of Open Borders, Drugs and Crime!"

While clearly a defeat for Democrats, the vote afforded them a chance to reemphasize policy differences with Trump and change the subject from collusion allegations that have lost political clout. Underscoring that, House Speaker Nancy Pelosi placed her name atop a House Democratic fundraising email referencing the failed veto override, writing, "I know grassroots Democrats won't let Trump's enablers get away with this."

Prosecutors drop criminal case against Smollett

Authorities said they still believe 'Empire' actor lied about being the target of a racist, anti-gay attack

CHICAGO — Prosecutors on Tuesday dropped all charges against Jussie Smollett, an astonishing reversal that the "Empire" actor called vindication, but that the Chicago mayor angrily dismissed as a "whitewash" of allegations that Smollett lied about being the target of a racist, anti-gay attack.

Authorities said they still believe Smollett concocted the attack, and they offered little explanation for the decision to abandon the case barely five weeks after charges were filed. In return for the dismissal, Smollett agreed to do community service and to forfeit the \$10,000 he paid to get out of jail.

The mayor and police chief blasted the move and stood by the investigation that concluded Smollett staged a hoax. Mayor Rahm Emanuel lashed out at Smollett, saying he had dragged the city's reputation "through the mud" in a quest to advance his career. At one point he asked, "Is there no decency in this man?"

Smollett's attorneys said his record was "wiped clean" of the 16

Pence calls for landing astronauts on moon in 5 years

Currently, earliest possible landing on the moon by NASA isn't until 2028

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Vice President Mike Pence on Tuesday called for landing astronauts on the moon within five years, an accelerated pace that would aim to put Americans on the lunar south pole.

Pence said NASA needs to achieve that goal "by any means necessary." Speaking at a meeting of the National Space Council in Huntsville, Alabama, he said NASA rockets and lunar landers will be replaced by private craft, if required.

"It's time to redouble our effort," he said. "It can happen, but it will not happen unless we increase the pace."

Now, the earliest possible landing on the moon by NASA isn't until 2028, Pence said. He acknowledged talent — and money — will be

Professional dominatrix tells lawmakers: Don't hurt consensual sex work

State Legislature considers bills addressing human trafficking

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — A professional dominatrix urged Florida lawmakers Tuesday not to hurt consensual sex workers as the Legislature considers bills addressing human trafficking.

"I am your neighbor, I am your co-worker, I am the person in the grocery store. I am also a consensual sex worker," said Grace Taylor of Pinellas County, who said she began

work as a dominatrix about 20 years ago so she could afford to send her sons to Philmont Boy Scout Ranch. "And as such, I am your first line of defense in helping you find those who have been trafficked."

She and fellow sex-worker Kristen Cain told the House Criminal Justice Committee there's a difference between people who choose to work in the sex industry and those forced into the trade. They testified before the committee approved two bills aimed at

addressing the problem of human trafficking — an issue that's gained more attention after New England Patriots owner Robert Kraft was charged with paying for sex as part of a Florida investigation into massage parlor prostitution.

"Sex work does not equate to human trafficking. Conflating the two is dangerous for both victims of human trafficking and sex workers," Cain said. "Listen to sex workers. We are here to help you."

A bill sponsored by

Republican Rep. Heather Fitzhagen would create a statewide council to focus on human trafficking and require massage parlor employees and hotel front desk and housekeeping staff be trained to recognize signs of human trafficking. A second bill sponsored by Republican Rep. Toby Overdorf would create a mandatory 10-day jail sentence for anyone convicted of soliciting a prostitute and an additional 30-day sentence if the person solicited is a human trafficking victim.

Both bills were approved.

Overdorf mentioned the investigation that snared Kraft and about 300 other men in arguing for his bill. He said he hopes his bill will reduce demand for paid sex.

"Mr. Kraft's unfortunate choices certainly have raised the awareness of what human trafficking is in the state of Florida and how prevalent it is throughout our entire society," Overdorf said after the meeting. "It's a scourge that's really affecting the state of Florida."

But Christine Hanavan of the

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Spain: FBI offered data stolen in North Korean Embassy raid

MADRID — Spain has issued at least two international arrest warrants for members of a self-proclaimed human rights group who allegedly led a mysterious raid at the North Korean Embassy in Madrid last month and offered the FBI stolen data from the break-in.

A National Court judge who lifted a secrecy order in the case Tuesday said an investigation of the Feb. 22 attack uncovered evidence that “a criminal organization” shackled and gagged embassy staff members before escaping with computers, hard drives and documents.

The intruders also urged North Korea’s only accredited diplomat in Spain, business envoy So Yun Sok, to defect, Judge Jose de la Mata said in a written report on the Spanish investigation. So refused to do so and was gagged, according to the report.

The assailants identified themselves as “members of an association or movement of human rights for the liberation of North Korea.”

That group is the Cheollima Civil Defense, according to a U.S. official who spoke on condition of anonymity to discuss details of the incident. The shadowy activists have the self-declared mission of helping defectors from North Korea.

De la Mata identified citizens of Mexico, the United States and South Korea as the main suspects being investigated on charges that include causing injuries, making threats and burglary. He named Adrian Hong Chang, a Mexican citizen living in the United States, as the break-in’s leader.

Hong Chang flew to the U.S. on Feb. 23, got in touch with the FBI and offered to share material and videos with federal investigators, according to the court report. The document did not say what type of information the items contained or whether the FBI accepted the offer.

The FBI said in a statement that its standard practice is to neither confirm nor deny the existence of investigations. The agency added that “the FBI enjoys a strong working relationship with our Spanish law enforcement partners.”

An official with Spain’s National Police who wasn’t authorized to be named in media reports confirmed to The Associated Press that arrest warrants were issued for Hong Chang and one other suspect. No one had been charged as of Tuesday.

The assailants purchased knives and handgun mock-ups when they visited Madrid in early February and used them during the attack, according to the investigation document.

While in Madrid, Hong Chang also applied for a new passport at the Mexican Embassy, the investigation found, and used the name “Oswaldo Trump” to register in the Uber ride-hailing app.

The North Korean Embassy hasn’t pressed charges in Spain, and officials in Pyongyang haven’t officially commented on the attack.

Spanish police learned about the break-in after the wife of an embassy employee escaped by jumping from a window. When officers went to check on the situation, Hong Chang allegedly greeted them at the door and pretended to be a diplomatic official, the investigation found.

He sent the officers away with assurances everything was fine, paving the way for the invading group to make a getaway in the embassy’s cars.

A police investigator with knowledge of the case told the AP that “this attack, whatever it is, would have gone unnoticed if it wasn’t for the woman who escaped.”

The timing of the incident, which happened less than a week before a high-stakes U.S.-North Korea summit on denuclearization derailed in Hanoi on Feb. 28, led to speculation the incursion was carried out to obtain data related to North Korea’s former ambassador to Spain.

Kim Hyok Chol, who was expelled from Spain in September 2017 following Pyongyang’s sixth nuclear test and its missile launches over neighboring Japan, has become North Korea’s top nuclear negotiator with the U.S.

Asked if Washington had any connection to the embassy break-in, U.S. State Department spokesman Robert Palladino answered, “The United States government had nothing to do with this.”

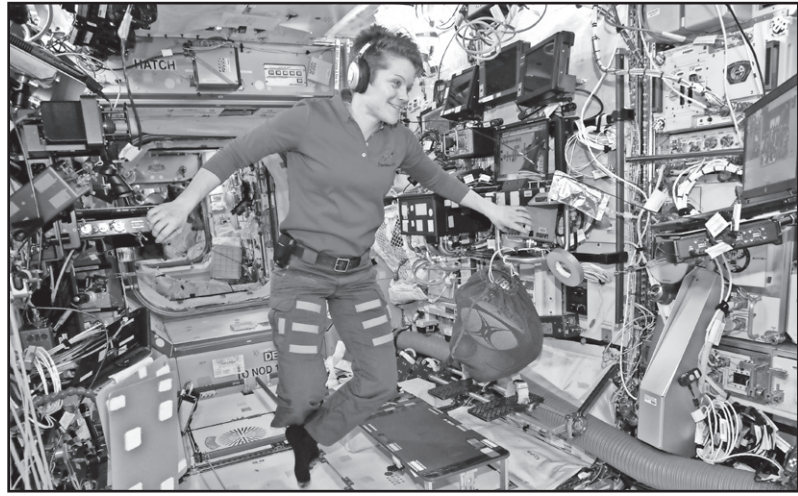
Palladino said that “regarding the specifics of what’s going on, the Spanish authorities are investigating. The investigation is still underway. For any details on their investigation, I would have to refer you to Spanish authorities.”

The South Korean Embassy in Madrid said it had no knowledge of the events and couldn’t offer further comment.

Others identified as part of the assailants’ group were Sam Ryu, from the U.S., and Woo Ran Lee, a South Korean citizen. Their whereabouts and their hometowns weren’t immediately known. None of the suspects were thought to be still in Spain, the judge wrote.

Spanish authorities tried to keep information about the attack from becoming public until Spain’s El Confidencial news site revealed some details on Feb. 27.

No medium sized suits caused problem

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — NASA has nixed the first all-female spacewalk over a spacesuit sizing issue.

Astronaut Anne McClain was supposed to float out of the International Space Station this Friday with newly arrived Christina Koch, to replace old batteries. But McClain pulled herself from the lineup because there’s not enough time to get two medium suits ready for them. Koch will go out with a male crewmate, Nick Hague.

NASA spokeswoman Brandi Dean said Tuesday that McClain trained before flight in both medium and large spacesuits. She wore a medium when

she went out on her first spacewalk last Friday and was supposed to switch to a large this week. But after last week’s spacewalk, she decided that a large would be too big.

It would have taken 12 hours to get another medium spacesuit ready and potentially compromised safety, according to Dean. These spacewalks are months late, and with cargo deliveries coming up, NASA wants to keep everything on track.

In 54 years of spacewalking, women have only gone outside with men. That’s because men have always outnumbered women in space.

McClain, Koch and Hague are part of NASA’s Astronaut Class of 2013, the only time there have

been the same number of women accepted as men. NASA chose four women and four men that year.

Koch and Hague will continue the battery-swapping work that McClain and Hague began last Friday outside the space station. Old nickel-hydrogen batteries in the solar power grid are being replaced with new, powerful lithium-ion batteries.

McClain will get another shot at spacewalking April 8 when she ventures outside with Canadian astronaut David Saint-Jacques. There are six U.S. spacesuit tops on the station — or hard upper torsos, as NASA calls them — with two considered spares. Both Hague and Saint-Jacques take large.

Southwest 737 Max makes emergency landing in Orlando

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — A Southwest Airlines Boeing 737 Max made a safe emergency landing Tuesday in Orlando, Florida, after experiencing an engine problem, the Federal Aviation Administration said.

The crew declared an emergency after taking off from Orlando International Airport around 2:50 p.m., and returned to the airport safely. No passengers were on board, and the aircraft was being ferried to Victorville, California, where Southwest is storing the airplanes.

The 737 Max was grounded in the U.S. March 13 after a deadly crash involving a Max in Ethiopia on March 10. It was the second fatal crash involving the airplane. U.S. airlines are allowed to shuttle the

planes but cannot carry passengers.

The FAA says it’s investigating but the emergency was not related to anti-stall software that is suspected as a cause of the two fatal crashes including one last year involving a plane from Indonesia.

Fennell says the airport’s other two runways remained open, and normal operations weren’t affected.

Southwest said the plane’s pilots reported a “performance issue” with an engine shortly after taking off for the California airport, where it was flying to be in short-term storage. The Max 8 jet was to be moved to Southwest’s Orlando maintenance facility to be checked, a company statement said.

Miami Beach police chase ends with woman dead, officer hurt

MIAMI BEACH (AP) — Authorities say a woman died in a crash that occurred as a Miami Beach police officer chased a stolen car.

Miami Beach spokesman Ernesto Rodriguez tells news outlets the patrol vehicle sheared the hood off the woman’s car late Monday. The woman wasn’t involved in the chase.

Rodriguez says the officer remains in stable condition with a head injury.

The incident began around 11 p.m. when a blue BMW was stolen while the owner was inside a store. Rodriguez says the officer spotted the stolen car a short time later. The driver didn’t stop and a chase started.

Rodriguez says the chase ended two blocks away when the officer crashed into the woman’s car. Other officers followed the BMW and the driver later rammed into two patrol vehicles and fled on foot.

Endangered Florida panther dies after being hit by car

IMMOKALEE (AP) — An endangered Florida panther has died after being struck by a vehicle.

It’s the fifth fatal collision this year, out of seven total panther deaths.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission says the remains of a 7-month-old male panther were found Sunday in Collier County, northwest of Immokalee.

Florida panthers once roamed the entire Southeast, but now their habitat mostly is confined to a small region of Florida along the Gulf of Mexico. Up to 230 Florida panthers remain in the wild.

Senate OKs bill for armed Florida teachers

TALLAHASSEE — Florida teachers who volunteer could be permitted to carry guns in classrooms so long as they undergo firearms training and a mental health evaluation under legislation approved Tuesday by a state Senate committee.

The Senate Infrastructure and Security Committee voted 5-3 for a broad school safety bill containing the armed teacher provision. Teachers would only be eligible for the so-called guardian program if their local school board approves and they meet the other criteria.

The bill is a reaction to the

February 2018 massacre that killed 17 people at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland. It also contains expanded student mental health services and sections regarding physical hardening of school campuses, but arming teachers is the most controversial provision.

The main sponsor, Republican Sen. Manny Diaz of Hialeah Gardens, said the Stoneman Douglas shooter might have been stopped with less loss of life if a trained teacher had been carrying a gun.

Like its House counterpart, the bill would require more than 100 hours of firearms training for teachers who seek to join the guardian program.

None would be required to take part and it would be up to local school boards to decide to whether to approve it. So far, 25 Florida school districts have guardian programs, put current law prohibits teachers whose sole focus is the classroom from joining.

“It remains optional. No teacher is obligated to do this. No district is obligated to do this,” Diaz said.

Opponents, including Democrats, many teacher groups and parent organizations, raised numerous objections centering on whether teachers should be transformed into essentially law enforcement personnel. They also worry about lost

weapons, how police would know an armed teacher isn’t an assailant in a chaotic mass shooting and whether a teacher might mistakenly shoot a child or fellow staff member.

The Republican-led committee voted down amendments to remove the armed teacher provision and another amendment that would have allowed parents to opt their children out of classrooms with gun-toting teachers.

The Senate and House versions are moving through committees and eventually will be set for a floor vote. A final compromise would have to be worked out before a final bill is ready to send to Republican Gov. Ron DeSantis.

Bills bans 2 of 3 forms of oil, gas fracking in Florida

TALLAHASSEE — Two forms of fracking for oil and natural gas exploration would be banned in Florida under a bill that cleared state House and Senate committees Tuesday, leaving in place a third technique opponents say would still threaten water supplies and the state’s fragile environment.

The House Appropriations subcommittee on agriculture and natural resources voted 10-2 for the bill, which would permit a rock-dissolving

technique called matrix acidizing but ban two other common forms of fracking. Later Tuesday, the Senate Innovation, Industry and Technology Committee voted 6-4 for a similar bill.

Environmental groups call that a loophole, putting underground aquifers at risk of contamination from potentially dangerous chemicals. The petroleum industry also opposes the bill because it would halt use of other fracking techniques.

But legislators who voted in favor called the measure a major step forward in curbing

the practice in Florida.

The Senate version also leaves in place the matrix acidizing fracking procedure.

Only New York, Vermont and Maryland have enacted total bans on fracking, which uses high-pressure liquids to create cracks in underground rock, allowing pockets of oil and gas to flow freely.

Nationwide, fracking has been credited with dramatically increasing U.S. oil and natural gas production, with about two-thirds of the nation’s active wells using fracking techniques. Yet critics have long been concerned about

environmental issues, including a sharp increase of earthquakes in Oklahoma, possible water and air contamination and use of deep ground injection to dispose of waste.

In Florida, environmental groups say the state’s porous limestone rock makes fracking an even greater threat, particularly since most of the state’s drinking water comes from underground aquifers.

There have recently been five small earthquakes along the Florida-Alabama border where some oil and gas production takes place. Experts are unsure of the cause.

necessary to pull it off earlier. Pence warned that if NASA can't put astronauts on the moon by 2024, "we need to change the organization, not the mission." The space agency must transform into a leaner, more accountable and more agile organization, and must adopt an "all-hands-on-deck approach," he said.

NASA Administrator Jim Bridenstine assured Pence that NASA will do everything possible to meet the deadline. Some outside experts were skeptical of the new timeline.

"I will be astonished if this happens," said Jonathan McDowell of the Harvard-Smithsonian Center for Astrophysics in Cambridge, Massachusetts, noting that a lunar lander still needs to be designed, built and tested.

"That is a hard challenge on a

five year time scale even without political budget infighting," he wrote in an email.

This summer marks the 50th anniversary of the first manned moon landing. Since Apollo astronauts last walked on the moon in 1972, no country has made a serious attempt to send humans back to the lunar surface. For decades, NASA has flip-flopped between the moon and Mars, a victim of changing presidential administrations. More recently, President Barack Obama targeted Mars as astronauts' next big destination, while President Donald Trump has favored the moon.

In order to get astronauts on the moon by 2024, Bridenstine said the space agency's new megarocket will be needed, but its development and pace will need to be faster. Two weeks ago, he said NASA was considering using private rockets instead to launch its new Orion capsule around the moon without a crew on a test flight next year.

Banks, technology companies power a rebound for US stocks

Stocks finished broadly higher on Wall Street Tuesday, erasing the market's modest losses from a day earlier.

Financial, technology and health care stocks accounted for much of the rally. Banks got a boost from rising bond yields, which let them charge higher rates on loans.

Energy companies led the S&P 500 higher as the price of U.S. crude oil moved briefly above \$60 a barrel. Oil hasn't closed above \$60 a barrel since November.

Homebuilders slumped on new data showing the pace of newly started residential construction projects fell sharply last month.

Even after losing some of its early strength, the broad upward

turn in stocks marked a reversal for the market, which started the week on a downbeat note after racking up losses last week.

On Tuesday the yield on the benchmark 10-year Treasury note edged up to 2.42 percent from 2.41 percent late Monday. However, it's still below the yield on the three-month Treasury bill, which may see as a warning sign of a possible recession.

The S&P 500 index gained 20.10 points, or 0.7 percent, to 2,818.46. The Dow Jones Industrial Average rose 140.90 points, or 0.6 percent, to 25,657.73. It briefly climbed 279 points.

The Nasdaq composite added 53.98 points, or 0.7 percent, to 7,691.52. The Russell 2000 index of smaller company stocks picked up 15.30 points, or 1 percent, to 1,528.17.

Sex Worker Outreach Project told the committee that laws aimed at punishing men who seek out prostitutes don't work.

"Criminalization is the root cause of trafficking. Prohibition did not end drinking and it can't end sex work. What it can do is make it more dangerous," said Hanavan, who isn't a sex worker but advocates for them. "Sex workers should be your best resource for fighting violence and exploitation in the sex industry. We need to stop

going after men who pay for sex and go after the men who think they can just take it."

But despite the offers to help, Fitzenhagen said she wasn't interested.

"In case it was lost on you, a consensual sex worker, a.k.a. a prostitute, is committing a crime," Fitzenhagen told the committee. "It is not my intent to work with them moving forward."

After the meeting, Taylor said she isn't a prostitute, but rather dresses up to create a fantasy for her clients.

"Professional dominatrix is not illegal," Taylor said.

Just 14 Republicans joined all voting Democrats in Tuesday's futile effort to void Trump's declaration of a national emergency at the Southwest border.

By invoking that power, Trump has said he will shift \$3.6 billion from military construction to erecting barriers along that boundary. Congress has voted to provide less than \$1.4 billion for border barriers, leaving Democrats and some Republicans fuming that Trump

is abusing his powers by ignoring Congress' constitutional control over spending.

Despite his veto remaining intact, Trump may not be able to spend the money for barriers quickly because of lawsuits by Democratic state attorneys general and others that could take years to resolve.

Trump insisted during his campaign that Mexico, not taxpayers, would pay for the wall. To keep the issue alive into the 2020 campaign season, House Democrats may force fresh votes on the emergency declaration in six months, as the law allows.

felony counts related to making a false report that he was assaulted by two men. The actor insisted that he had "been truthful and consistent on every single level since day one."

"I would not be my

mother's son if I was capable of one drop of what I was being accused of," he told reporters after a court hearing. He thanked the state of Illinois "for attempting to do what's right."

In a statement, a spokeswoman for the Cook County prosecutors' office said the dismissal

came "after reviewing all of the facts and circumstances of the case." Tandra Simonton called it "a just disposition and appropriate resolution" but also said it not an exoneration.

In some dropped cases, prosecutors will insist that the defendant accept at least a measure of responsibility. Outside

court, neither Smollett nor his legal team appeared to concede anything about his original report in January.

Defense attorney Patricia Brown Holmes said Smollett was "attacked by two people he was unable to identify" and "was a victim who was vilified and made to appear as a perpetrator."

Authorities alleged that Smollett, who is black and gay, knew the men and arranged for them to pretend to attack him.

Emanuel, who is in his final weeks in office after two terms, said the hoax could endanger other gay people who report hate crimes.

Activity is essential for those who suffer 'a little arthritis'

DEAR DR. ROACH: I'm a 67-year-old black female who's been diagnosed with "a little arthritis" in my right hip. Now retired from a desk job, I unfortunately still am not getting enough exercise. My issue is that after sitting for a length of time, I'm in excruciating pain and can't stand up at all. Once I straighten up and get moving, the pain subsides. I've been told "you're getting old," but I'm not old! I'm about 30 pounds overweight. Also, when I stand for any length of time, my lower back aches. Would taking a morning walk and a yoga class alleviate this problem? I'm so embarrassed when I get out of my car or get up from the dinner table. — S.H.

ANSWER: There are many types of arthritis, and the answer to your question varies a bit depending on type. I think you probably have the most common form, osteoarthritis, so I'm going to answer you assuming that's the case.

Stiffness in the morning, quickly relieved by exercise, is a hallmark of osteoarthritis. It's common, treatable and not something to be embarrassed about.

Exercise is an effective treatment for osteoarthritis. It can be difficult to get started, but the more people exercise, the more they are able to do. Walking and yoga both are excellent ideas, but the best exercise is the one you will want to keep doing.

Osteoarthritis affects a fair number of 67-year-olds, but it's

important to remember that it's not your age that is causing the pain: It's the arthritis. Although we know of no treatments that can reverse the course of osteoarthritis, medications (including a few supplements), exercise and physical therapy all can ease symptoms and improve function. Losing weight takes stress off the joints and is recommended, but is not easy.

Finally, severe arthritis can be treated surgically, with a joint replacement. That's not a procedure to take lightly or have done too early.

DEAR DR. ROACH: In a recent column, you mentioned that your smartwatch warns you every hour to stand up. Is this a good idea? What else is it good for? — D.K.

ANSWER: The evidence that standing periodically has health benefits is fair. One study showed that when people did light intensity activity (such as walking)

for two minutes a day instead of sitting, premature death rates were reduced. Prolonged sitting is associated with heart disease, diabetes and overall cancer rates. The evidence isn't definitive, but it's suggestive enough that I do get up and walk around (when I can) when my watch reminds me that I've been sitting for a long time.

It's not 100 percent clear that exercise trackers like pedometers and more advanced devices, such as a smartwatch, increase activity for everyone. It clearly does motivate me. I think it's a personal decision that needs to be made based on whether you need more exercise (nearly everyone would benefit) and whether it would be motivating.

I will say that, for many people, the social aspects of it do get some people to exercise more than they would have otherwise. Some devices let you see your friends' activity and engage in friendly competition and support.

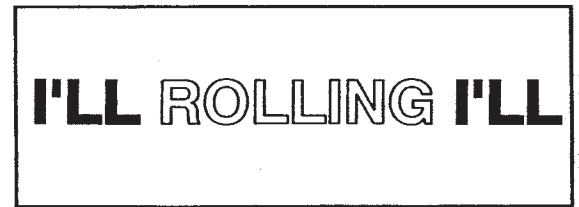

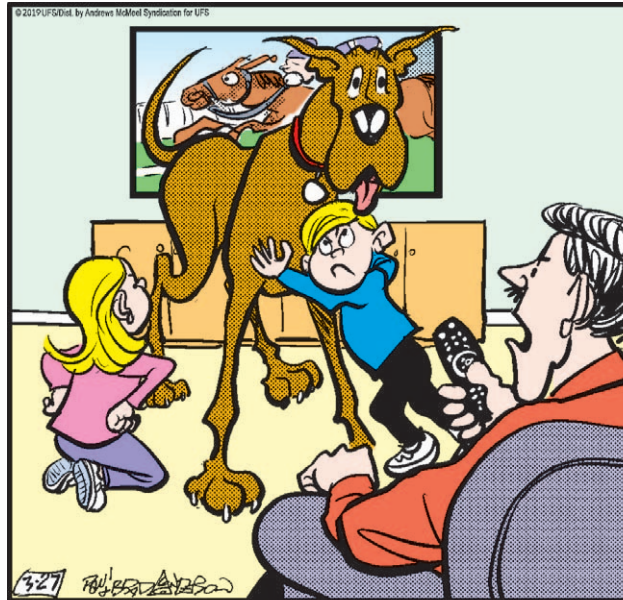

South in today's deal was Australian Liam Milne. Milne's bid of seven clubs might have been a bit too brave, but there was bridge reasoning behind it. Had East contented himself with a five-diamond bid, instead of six, Milne would have been perfectly comfortable bidding six clubs. In that light, seven clubs does not seem like such a big stretch. Also,

he felt it was likely that East-West would soldier on to seven diamonds, which he would double for a larger penalty than he would get against six diamonds.

Milne caught a very suitable dummy, but the contract was far from cold. He won the opening diamond lead in hand with the ace and stopped to think. East had no more than four diamonds and would not have bid six diamonds with a balanced hand. Unless West had opened three diamonds with a five-card major on the side, which was most unlikely, East's singleton had to be in clubs. Backing his judgment with his play, Milne cashed the ace of clubs at trick two. The queen fell from East, so Milne led the 10 of clubs and ran it when West played low. A club to the king drew the trumps.

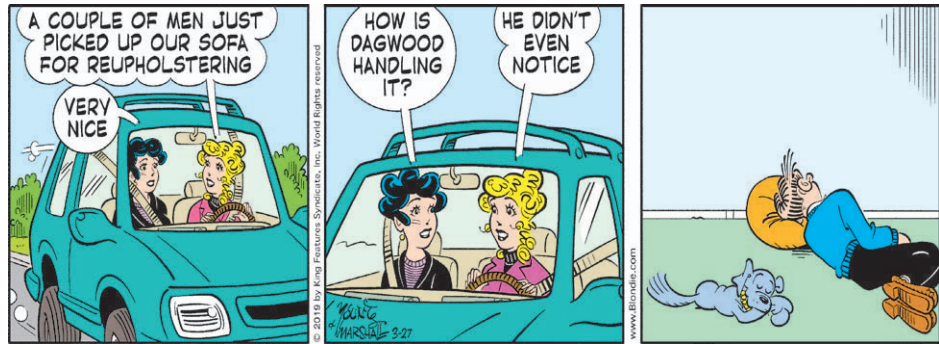
Milne cashed dummy's ace and king of hearts, planning to take a ruffing finesse against East for the queen. The fall of the queen from West resulted in a quick claim for declarer. Very nicely played!
