New group to watch commission

LAKE WALES – Over the past several months, Lake Wales Deputy Mayor Robin Gibson polled 73 leaders by email, city leaders who either work for or populate boards of non-profit organizations in Lake Wales about what five

things he or she prioritize the most in terms to improve the Lake Wales community.

Gibson described the 73 leaders as The Leadership Council, an informal group of people that Gibson organized to lobby action from the Lake Wales City Commission.

Of the 73 leaders

polled, 16 voted to do something about the completion of the Walesbilt Hotel revitalization, the topic which received the most polling votes. Lake Wales Depot Museum Treasurer Robert Connors asked what they could do as a group to force change in a private development.

“They are subject to a

building permit,” Gibson said. “That building permit expires in March and there is the potential

Bok Academy North appeal filed with state

LAKE WALES – On behalf of the Lake Wales Charter School Board of Trustees board lawyer Robin Gibson said he filed an appeal to the

Florida Department of Education in the Polk County School Board's recent denial of their application for Bok Academy North.

The Lake Wales Charter School Board of Trustees and the Polk

County School Board have been at odds over Bok Academy ever since it opened. When the Polk County School Board denied their initial charter in 2009, the Lake Wales Charter School Board of Trustees appealed to

state education officials and won.

Gibson said the appeal was sent on grounds that it took longer than 90 days for the Polk County School Board to process the Bok Academy North application. The Lake

Wales School Board of Trustees applied to replicate Bok Academy on Aug. 1, and 103 days later – Nov. 14 – the Polk County School Board denied the application.

According to DOE spokesperson Audrey

Walden, the appeal has been received.

Gibson disclosed the appeal during an event that he organized called The Leadership Council Thursday in Lake Wales..

Scientists going after HLB from many angles

LAKE ALFRED – The preamble of a 1917 Florida law that authorized the creation of what is now the University of

Florida Citrus Research and Education Center states a facility was needed to research the “loss of many thousands of dollars (to the citrus industry) from attacks of insect pests, fungus

diseases and other causes not well understood.”

Now 100 years later, the loss of “thousands of dollars” is one grove damaged by disease.

Local scientists, staff and visitors celebrated

the 100th anniversary of CREC Nov. 29. As part of the celebration, more than a dozen of the scientists opened up their labs to share the kind of work they are doing to solve the latest threat to

the global citrus industry, Huanglongbing, also known as citrus greening.

According to these scientists, the Asian citrus phyllid insect has relentlessly spread the HLB disease to 80 percent of

all citrus groves in the state, decreasing production from 170.9 million boxes in 2011-12 to 78 million boxes in 2016-17. Globally 33 countries have been battling the

It's beginning to look like . . .

"Christmas" is the expected end to the phrase at the heading of this editorial, and the term is appropriate.

But the word that occurs to us after devastation wrought by Hurricane Irma nearly three months ago is "normal."

The first and most important relief was restoration of electricity and other infrastructure, largely by workers from around the nation who responded to repair hurricane damage in all the areas hit by Irma and other hurricanes.

The speed with which they responded and restored vital services was nothing short of remarkable.

Also responding from around the nation were tree trimming and removal workers.

While many individual homeowners and businesses took a major hit to their property from the storm, the most widespread destruction, in our observation, was to the trees which make Polk County an especially beautiful region.

Oaks, in particular, were hard hit by high winds.

Our Viewpoint

To the casual observer, most oak trees look alike, but those of us who have grown up enjoying their stately appearance and welcome shade are aware that their various varieties differ widely in durability and longevity.

While we profess limited expertise in these matters, some oaks are particularly vulnerable to disease in their "senior citizen" years. They become subject to losing major branches without warning, taking down utility lines and damaging homes.

Some have a bad reputation for putting out roots that can uproot sidewalks.

Others, on the other hand, are popular for their hardiness and low maintenance.

We have heard many comments on the relative infrequency with which falling trees and branches

came down on homes in September's hurricane. The exception is swimming pool screen enclosures, which seem to have an almost magnetic attraction for trees.

In the weeks immediately following the storm, it seemed that piles of storm debris defied the ability of trash crews to remove them, and that fallen trees were destined to become permanent features of the landscape.

But tireless work by homeowners, tree maintenance and stump removal companies, debris removal workers, and others committed to landscape beautification at a personal or professional level have restored a high level of normalcy.

Of special note, numerous neighbors and other thoughtful young adults went door to door offering their help.

Those property owners with significant structural damage still have challenges ahead of them, but for most of us, it's beginning to look a lot like normal.

Also a lot like Christmas.



'It's not about the money . . .'

"When a man says 'It's not about the money; it's the principle of the thing,' it's almost always about the money."

The passage of time — maybe as much as 40 or 50 years — has thrust into obscurity the name of the cynical sage who first made that observation to me, but I rank it among life's great truisms.

It was brought to the fore by a single aspect of two otherwise unrelated mega-stories in the headlines of the last few weeks: severance packages paid to the growing number of powerful men accused of sexual harassment and worse, and to college football coaches who fail to meet the expectations of the fans.

Heading the list of the former, in my opinion, is Matt Lauer, who I have long considered to be the stabilizing presence on the NBC Today show. While the names of other nouveaux bad boys were barely known to me, Matt Lauer has been a breakfast companion in our household for many years.

He was fired only a day or two after word of his sexual misconduct became known to NBC execs, or so the network claims.

Lauer quickly made a sincere-sounding mea culpa. Given the transitory nature of the day's news, his name will soon fade from the headlines.

Receiving only casual notice is the New York Post's report that Lauer wants a \$30 million pay-out for the year-and-a-half remaining on his contract, and CNN's report that NBC officials say they won't pay.

Do you figure that the issue is the money or the principle of the thing?

Bill O'Reilly was paid \$25 million in severance, an amount representing one year's salary on his four-year contract, according to CNN.

Other golden parachutes in amounts that mere mortals can hardly imagine — mortals who keep their pants

zipped and their hands to themselves — have been reported in other misconduct dismissals.

College football coaches fall into a different category of rewards paid for professional failure.

The term "contract" when applied to their employment agreements is a misnomer. These pacts supposedly are binding on both parties.

But successful coaches are free to jump ship without so much as a fare-thee-well when somebody waves a few million more bucks at them, while universities (or their alumni) must pay dearly when a coach who fails to produce winning teams is fired and typically gets millions of dollars to soothe the unpleasantness of unemployment.

The University of Florida reportedly will be paying eight-figure salaries to three coaches at one time: ex-coaches Jim McElwain and Will Muschamp and their latest successor, Dan Mullen.

On the other hand, FSU's Jimbo Fisher, after coaching the Seminoles to a losing season (up to the date of his

departure), quit before season's end to take a job in Texas, where coaching pay, like just about everything else, is bigger.

It was not until he had left town that the 'Noles evened their season at 6-6, maintaining their eligibility to take part in a post-season bowl game.

I have never been a Jimbo Fisher fan because of the way he and the university gave the bum's rush to Bobby Bowden, a man whose legendary coaching skills were matched by his character. It is a rare combination among the sport's mega-coaches.

I once saw Bobby Bowden quietly refuse a \$500 honorarium for speaking to a high school football banquet.

It wasn't about the money; it was the principle of the thing.

A look at Lucerne Park . . .



Bob Gernert Beneath the Chinaberry Tree

Bob Gernert is a student of Winter Haven history and founded the Museum of Winter Haven History.

Traveling northeast from Winter Haven beyond the Florence Villa community is an area designated as "Lucerne Park." There is minimal mention of the area in historical references though the road is referred to as "Lucerne Park Road" which keeps the name in use.

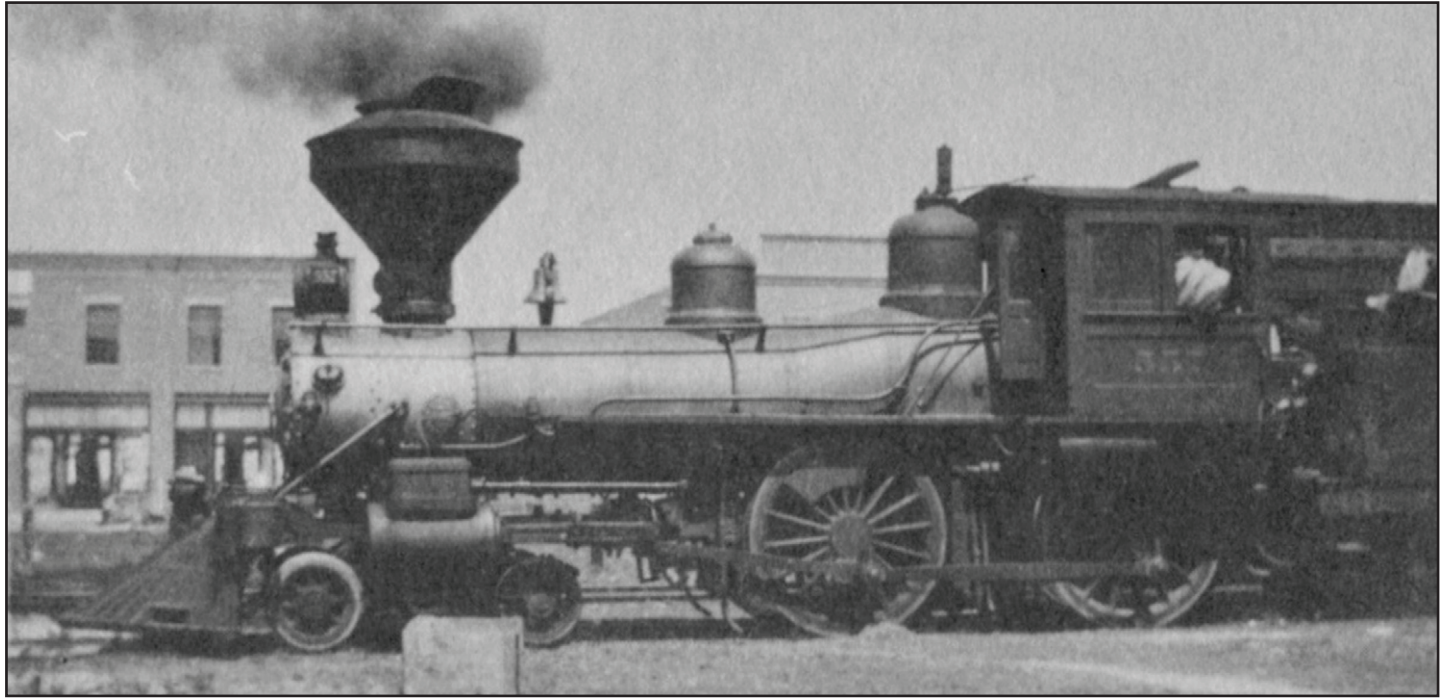
Earliest activity in Lucerne Park is attributed to the Lucerne Park Fruit Association which had facilities on what is now "Old Lucerne Park" road. Some of the earliest names associated with the enterprise include A.S. Beymer. Beymer was involved in developing several major downtown buildings including the "Beymer-Mann" (aka Ritz) Theatre. Beymer Memorial Methodist Church also pays tribute to the family name.

In the 1910-20 era it is noted that a small steam engine ran daily from Bartow to Lucerne Park and on to Lake Alfred where residents would turn out in numbers to help "turn the train" on a huge manual turntable so the train could make the return trip to Bartow. "Peggy," as the train was called primarily spotted fruit cars in the various destinations helping to move citrus to market.

As Florida approached the real estate boom of the 1920s, Lucerne Park Fruit was no different from other Florida companies and looking for the opportunity to develop its extensive holdings (see map this page).

Serving with Beymer on the company's board was a man named D.C. Gillett. His father, M.C. Gillett was born in Wisconsin in 1858 and at some point following 1878 his physician in Akron, Ohio, recommended a move to Florida where he expected to die of consumption (tuberculosis). He settled in Marion County and then was frozen out of the citrus business in the great freeze of 1895. Gillett went on to found Buckeye Citrus Nurseries. He later moved to Tampa where he served as mayor during the time of the Spanish-American War.

M.C. Gillett joined with LPFA and proposed to develop an exclusive community called "Lake Lucerne." According to an elaborate promotional brochure produced by the McFarland Publicity

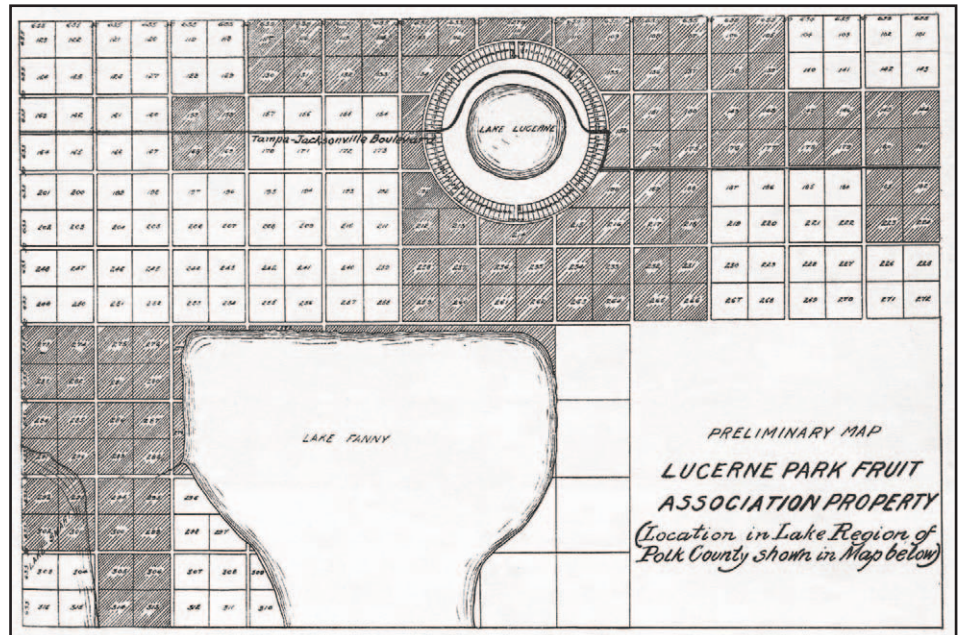
Service of Harrisburg, PA, "The purpose (was) to make of Lake Lucerne a most exclusive winter home resort." Buyers could buy land for a home as well as grove land.

The pamphlet went on to note, "Under no circumstances will a grove be sold by the Lucerne Park Fruit Association to persons of other than unquestioned business and social standing." Lake Lucerne was to be a "community of congenial people. The lake was to be the private property of the owners for their use in "fishing, rowing and bathing." The company also noted "gentle exercise can be indulged in at all times,"

The owners were asked to consider putting up \$500 for the construction of a clubhouse/casino, a plan that was projected to raise \$50,000. LPFA pledged to donate the land for the clubhouse.

The pamphlet goes on as follows: "Our property is within gunshot of the best black bass fishing in America, and on the best hunting rounds in Florida. Whenever the guest at the Florence Villa (Hotel) want a day of "sure enough fishing" as we say in the South, they invariably go to Lake Hamilton. It is considered an unlucky day indeed when several six- to ten-pounders are not caught, along with a large string of two- to four-pounders. Indeed, twelve- to fifteen-pounders are not at all unusual."

As with many of the grand plans of the Florida real estate boom, "Lake Lucerne" never became a reality though one

Florida Chief account mentions a hotel in the area. Lucerne was never a "park" for public enjoyment but has historic connections in early citrus production. The name "Lucerne Park" today serves to designate an unincorporated area in northeast Winter Haven.

Lucerne Park Fruit Association was later sold to Joseph DiGiorgio.

About the series

Early in Winter Haven's history, a large Chinaberry tree grew near the middle of

Central Avenue at the corner of the Snell Bank (now the Times Square building). It was beneath this tree that early residents shared the news and solved the challenges of the day.

Holiday decorating safety tips

'Tis the season for festive lighting, windowsill candles, and ornamented Christmas trees – trademarks of the holidays. Now that Thanksgiving has come and gone, many people will begin decorating their homes for the upcoming holidays. I'd like to share with you a few important tidbits that might be useful as you decorate your home, and celebrate the season.

According to the National Fire Protection Association, "Between the years 2009-2013, U.S. fire departments responded to an average of 210 home fires each year which started with Christmas trees."

What a horrible thing to occur ... it's the most wonderful time of the year, and then a preventable fire destroys your tree, the gifts, the house, or worse.

The good news is that many artificial Christmas trees are fire resistant. If you plan to purchase a new artificial tree, look for something on it, or its packaging that specifies this type of protection.

If, however, you plan to purchase a fresh Christmas tree, place it away from fireplaces, radiators and other heat sources. Water your Christmas tree periodically so the spruce/pine needles do not become dry and brittle; therefore, less flammable.

While decorating your tree, or even hanging lights on your home, consider replacing any string of lights with worn, broken cords, or loose bulb connections. Connect no more than three consecutive strands and a maximum of 50 bulbs for screw-in bulbs and

never use lit candles to decorate the tree. When you go to bed or leave your home, always turn off the Christmas tree lights and other decorative lights inside or outside your home.

Now let us turn our attention to a few things that might keep your holiday season crime-free.

If you go out to do your Christmas shopping, keep you wallets and purses secure at all times. Thieves are out there looking for easy targets. If you're going from one store to another, make sure you place your purchases in the trunk, or out of sight. And if you shop online, make sure you shop from trusted web sites, and use secure Internet connections.

Let's go back to the subject of your Christmas tree. Consider placing it and the presents towards the interior of your home — away from the front door or windows, or at least, concealed from view. If the bad guys look into a window and see all of those wonderful gifts, they

think it's their invitation to do a little shopping, at your expense.

Still working hard at cleaning up after Irma

Because this is my first column an introduction is in order. I am a Polk County native growing up in Bartow. A UF grad, retired Air Force Reserve pilot, retired airline captain, currently a blueberry farmer and county commissioner living in District 3. My purpose in writing this column is to keep you up to date on what your county government is up to so here we go;

Hurricane Irma left a mess in Polk County. Current estimates are we have picked up about 80 percent of the total volume of debris. We expect there will be more than 2 million

cubic yards picked up when we are done. These things take time. We don't have the ability to snap our fingers and make debris crews appear. I'm sure homeowners with blue tarps wish they could make roofers appear, it just doesn't work that way.

We began the cleanup on Sept. 18 moving south to north. We had more than 100 crews at one point. Unfortunately, many debris crews have loaded their trucks on barges and headed to Puerto Rico.

As always in a clean-up like this as time goes by people lose their patience, I understand. Unfortunately, somebody has to be last. The county will continue the debris pickup and will make three passes so if you did not have room to put everything out the first time put it out now so we can get it on pass two or three. We will finish the process in

early January.

Reasons your debris may be skipped; you live on a dead-end road and the trucks can't turn around. Mixing household garbage with debris, putting debris on a phone box or power box, low hanging powerlines preventing the truck from using the claw, living on a private road and not signing a waiver for entry. We have several sites around the county where you can dispose of debris yourself.

The debris pickup will cost our county approximately \$40 million. All of this money is fronted by the county out of reserves.

This money came from you, the taxpayer. We will file paperwork with FEMA for reimbursement but there is no guarantee from FEMA it will reimburse us. We settled our last claim with FEMA for the 2004 hurricanes in 2015. There is a process to follow when dealing with FEMA. Not complying with FEMA

procedures results in no reimbursement and that is something Polk County and its citizens cannot afford. For more detailed information on storm debris see our web site www.polk-county.net

suggested city leaders dedicate time toward furthering five goals. As written by Gibson in the event paperwork distributed, one of those suggested goals was transferring the Hardman School Complex to the charter school board for use as a Bok Academy North campus.

Last summer, Lake Wales City Attorney Chuck Galloway told City Manager Ken Fields that based on Lake Wales city code, it would be unethical for Gibson to vote on or discuss transferring the city-owned Hardman School Complex to the

charter school board for Bok Academy North while acting as a city commissioner and lawyer for the charter school board.

Gibson then requested guidance from the Florida Commission on Ethics as to whether it was ethical for him to vote on whether the city should donate the Hardman School Complex.

On Oct. 20, the Florida Commission on Ethics spent more than an hour discussing the guidance inquiry. Their team of lawyers drafted a report stating that it was unethical for Gibson to vote or advocate in any capacity for Bok Academy North as a city commissioner and lawyer for the charter school

board. The ethics board voted 3-3 to publish their finding as drafted. Because they could not reach a consensus, the board told Gibson it needed more time to draft another finding to vote on and that it would contact Gibson with more guidance.

Given the legal opinions from the city attorney and lawyers from the Florida Commission on Ethics, Gibson was asked why he was still advocating to give the Hardman School Complex to the Lake Wales Charter School Board for a school whose charter had recently been denied by the Polk County School Board.

Gibson said he disagreed with the city attorney's legal opinion.

Friday Fields said regardless of any Florida Commission on Ethics finding, city code is more stringent and relevant.

"Article 2 of the city code on conflict of interest is a little stricter than state ethics code," Fields said. "That is the basis for the opinion of the city attorney and myself."

Fields said Gibson could not vote or advocate but city code would not disallow him from advocating for such outside of a city commission or CRA meeting.

Gibson subsequently said he will be traveling to Tallahassee Friday when the Florida Commission on Ethics Board will vote again on the matter and that all ethical consideration involving the transfer

of the Hardman School Complex to the Lake Wales Charter School Board is likely moot. Gibson said Bok Academy North would likely start in a Lake Wales church if they win their appeal for a charter.

There are two upcoming appeal hearings in reference to Bok Academy North. In February, Gibson said the Polk County School Board will be giving the Bok North Academy charter another review. The DOE appearing date has yet to be set. If either hearing rules in favor of the charter school, it can proceed with opening at a location other than the Hardman School Complex.

"I had a lot to do with organizing the

community-wide effort that made (Bok Academy North) happen," Gibson told the Florida Commission on Ethics Oct. 20. "To maintain that I or anybody associated with my principal is in it for private gain cheapens the whole effort."

In a follow up email Gibson added that with no private gain there is no statutory conflict of interest.

"The only difference in opinion occurs in the instance where the property is donated and (the Lake Wales Charter School Board of Trustees) receives an asset of value," Gibson wrote.

The city attorney believes otherwise as do the lawyers on the Commission on Ethics.

disease, affecting every country where citrus is commercially grown. The tiny insect carries a bacteria which, when injected into a citrus tree, slowly kills it somewhat like how humans can die when their blood circulation is limited. There is currently no cure.

In May, politicians helped secure \$61 million in additional U.S. Department of Agriculture funding to develop a cure. The citrus industry also supports HLB research as do

Department of Defense grants.

According to a November 2016 presentation by the Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency, as much as \$200 million has been spent battling HLB since it first appeared in Florida in 2005.

Winter Haven-area scientists are tackling the global HLB problem from multiple angles.

Inside one of the Lake Alfred labs last week, Winter Haven resident and University of Florida Associate Professor of Entomology Dr. Kirsten Pelz-Stelinski showcased some work from her department. In layman's

terms, in her department they are trying to remove the damaging bacteria from infecting insects and trying to replace the "bad" bacteria with a bacteria that does not damage citrus.

Andres Sandoval-Mojica helps to grow the bacteria with green sugar water.

"They won't eat the sugar water unless it's dyed green," Sandoval-Mojica said. "Little by little we are generating knowledge. I feel like I'm making a difference."

Pelz-Stelinski said Department of Defense funding may be at play because the work they are doing has global

applications. Citrus is not the only crop at risk from infection, whether natural or intentional.

Fellow postdoctoral researcher Dr. Gustavo Rivas used a microscope attached to a homemade glass syringe to force feed "good" bacteria into a psyllid insect during the open house. Visitors had the opportunity to walk through each station and ask questions.

In another lab, University of Florida Associate Professor of Entomology Dr. Lukasz Stelinski, Kirsten's husband, talked about how psyllid insects can become resistant to pesticides. Scientists in his

department are studying quarantine efforts and behavior-modifying chemicals. Stelinski said insects in one grove may become resistant to chemicals that insects in other groves are not, which makes solutions challenging.

"It's a real chess game," Stelinski said.

Buses took visitors on tours of area groves to show off other HLB-management techniques. Some growers have been building expensive screen enclosures around entire groves called CUPS (Citrus Under Protective Screen). The latest development is hanging screen on poles

to surround groves with no roof. Scientists say the insects don't fly high enough to make a roof necessary. The process of surrounding groves with screens has shown that up to 80 percent of citrus trees benefit.

Hunt Brothers President Frank Hunt III spoke on behalf of his cousin G. Ellis Hunt Jr., chairman of the Florida Citrus Commission, who was in Washington lobbying for citrus relief.

"Our industry is very challenged right now and we need our partners here working on our behalf," Hunt told the about 500 celebrating the anniversary.

for an extension of six months. The city commission will have to make a decision as to whether to extend that building permit. (The Leadership Council) may make the decision that they've waited long enough and to bring to bear the influence of the entire community to say do not extend that building permit."

While it is not public record, according to three reliable sources, Gibson has previously legally represented a Lake Wales developer who submitted a bid to renovate the Walesbilt Hotel years ago.

Somebody in the audience then asked what would happen when the permit ended.

"Enforce the code violations and city take ownership," Gibson replied.

When another audience member said that could take years, Gibson

seemed to agree.

"It will take awhile but then we could move on with another developer," Gibson said. "And that potential also builds a fire under the present developer, get things done."

The present developer, Winter Haven-based Ray Brown, chose not to comment when contacted the following morning. Also worth noting, building permits are not a function of the Lake Wales City Commission.

Gibson repeatedly tried to get the leaders to

vote to prioritize his five suggestions: rehabilitate the Walesbilt Hotel and put it into productive use, revitalizing the 44-year-old downtown streetscape, promoting the construction of the Lake Wales Trail, restoring the Hardman School Complex for use as Bok Academy North and building an all-purpose civic center.

Lake Wales resident Charlene Bennett asked why the trail should be a group priority when it appeared the city government had already

approved funding and accepted a bid to start construction. Gibson replied he feared construction would be stalled and The Leadership Council could maintain pressure on the city commission to keep going.

Gibson is the deputy mayor of Lake Wales and all of the other commissioners were present at the meeting. Gibson was the only one to speak.

Those present could not reach a consensus on his five suggestions and somebody motioned to have the 73

leaders vote on their five highest priorities. A second meeting of The Leadership Council has yet to be scheduled but the group agreed to have voting take place over the next two weeks.

Five leaders agreed to lead The Leadership Council Steering Committee, which would meet more frequently than the entire group. They are Rob Quam, David Price, Larry Bossarte, Linda Kimbrough and Rich Thompson. Around 40 people attended.

Car crashes into Carlton's

WINTER HAVEN – There they were, doing business as usual Monday, Nov. 27, when a car crashed into their store.

As Joshua McNair, store manager of Carlton's Music Store said, "It was just another day at work in the office.

"I'm on the phone talking about guitar effects with pedals with one of our regular, long-time customers. I then hear car brakes squeal from outside, followed by the distinct crash sound that happens when vehicles collide," he said.

And McNair notes that having been with Carlton's more than 10 years, he has heard that sound at least once a year, sometimes twice.

At the same intersection, Avenue D Northwest and 4th Street Northwest.

"You never forget that sound," he said.

"I popped my head up from my desk once I heard the first smash, then not even a second later, I see a Ford Taurus approach our front doors and smash our

windows," he said.

"It was surreal," noted McNair. "I tell my customer on the phone, 'sir I apologize profusely, but a car just went through our front door, I have to call you back. I need to call 911."

And according to the Winter Haven Police Department, the crash was not what would be considered a major one.

WHPD spokesperson Jamie Brown said at 2:57 p.m. Nov. 27, a 2005 Ford Taurus driven by 66 year-old Charles Joseph Kintner of Winter Haven was southbound on 4th Street.

"He stopped at the sign to go straight across Avenue D NW. A vehicle was stopped going west on Avenue D NW to make a left turn," she said. And as Kintner proceeded to enter the intersection, the WHPD said he failed to check for traffic that was going eastbound.

According to a report, Kintner's vehicle collided with a 2003 Toyota Corolla driven by 19-year-old, Kervin Nicolas that was traveling east on Avenue D NW. The vehicles met in the intersection and

instead of hitting the brake, Kintner hit the gas and ran up on the sidewalk striking the roll down door of Carlton's, said the WHPD. Estimated cost of damage to the door was about \$4,000, said the WHPD.

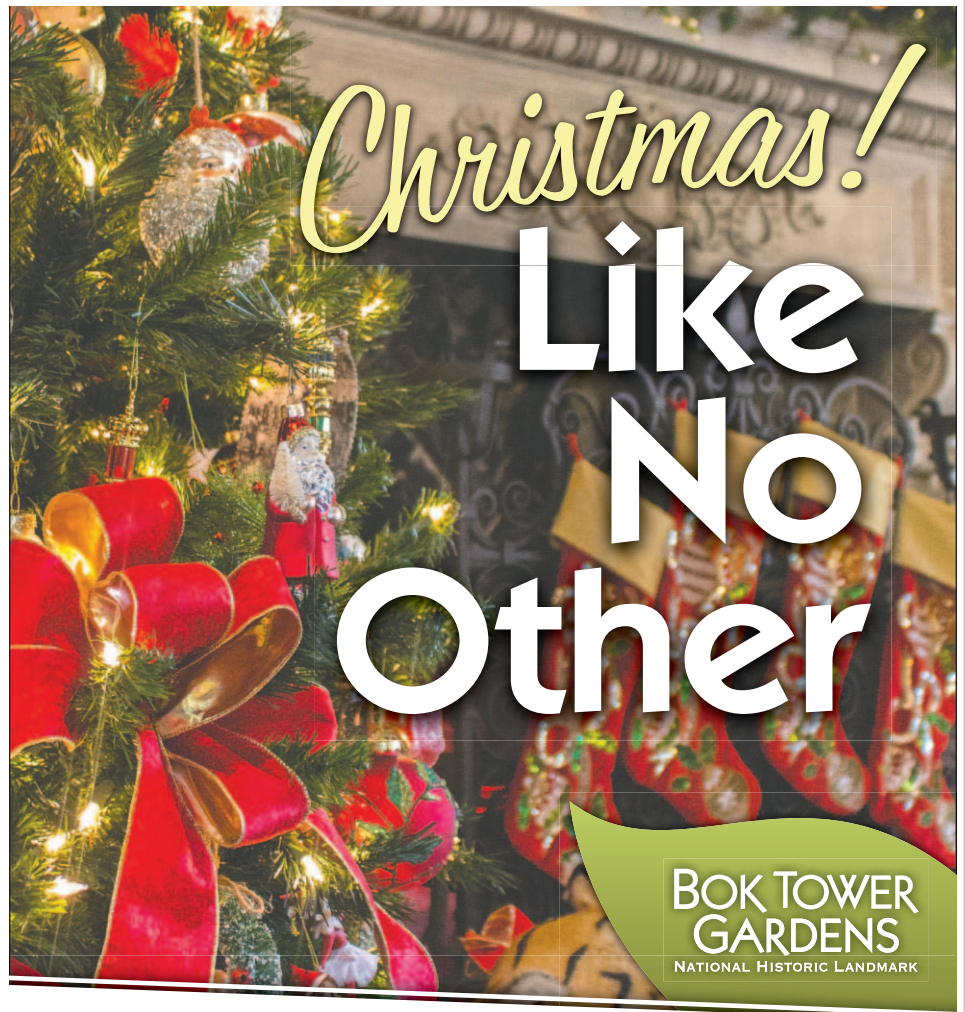
All three were transported to Winter Haven Hospital for medical evaluation, but non-life-threatening injuries, according to a report, and Kintner was cited for the crash.

"Fortunately, nobody was hurt," said McNair. "But even more fortunate is that no customers happened to be walking through our front doors."

Minutes after the crash, a young man carrying an instrument made his way around the wreckage and into the store.

"This intersection is flat dangerous," said McNair. "What is it going to take to make it a four way stop? How serious do the accidents need to be in order for something to change?"

According to Donna Sheehan, assistant to the city manager of Winter Haven, the city has not received any formal complaints about the intersection.



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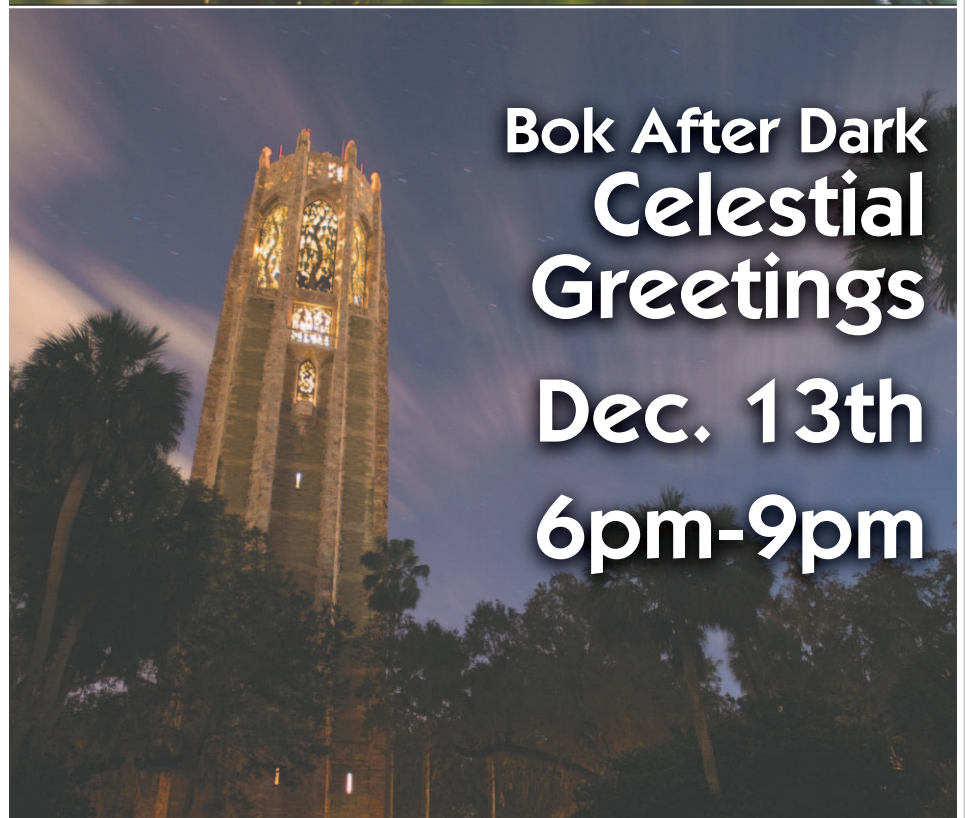

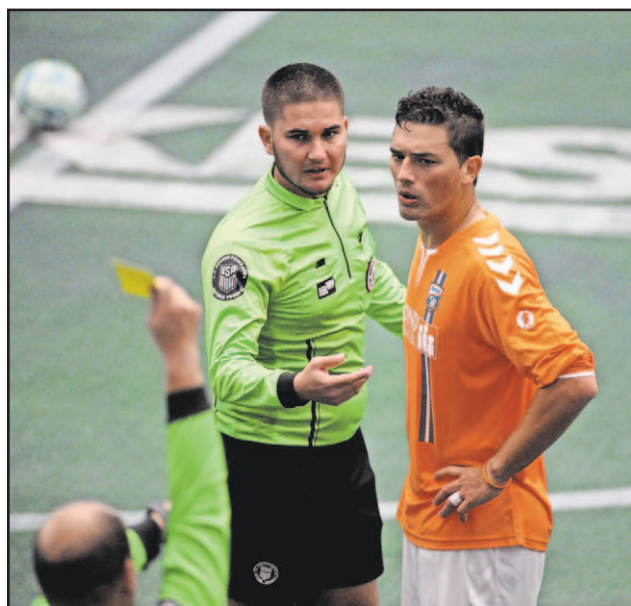

Shupsky hopes the flourishing will continue

(The ironic thing about Morgan Shupsky's involvement in making sure that county kids with physical or emotional challenges can get on the pitch is that soccer isn't, or at least wasn't, her first love when it came to sports. The Santa Fe senior is an all-county volleyball player, actually, where she was involved with Special Olympics but spends a lot of her "sports time" at Lakeland FC, one of the state's largest youth soccer organizations with some 3,000 kids, running the club's TOPS program. For you see, a handful of those 3,000 can't quite run, or kick, or process what's happening on the pitch quite as well as most kids, and that's where the program comes in. Started in 1991 by U.S. Youth Soccer, TOPSoccer (which stands for The Outreach Program for Soccer) is offered now by both Lakeland FC and the Lake Wales Soccer Club. Morgan's father, Dan, is a Lakeland FC board member. Lakeland started its program in 2015, as Megan was entering her sophomore year in high school, and Lake Wales just this fall. Most players are teamed with volunteer "buddies" to help them on the pitch. The program is flourishing in Lakeland, although Shupsky worries a bit because as a high school senior, she'll be heading off to college next year, and she doesn't want to see the program suffer in her absence. Read on to find out more about the program, and about how you might be able to help.)

SCMG: Have you gotten out of the program what you were hoping for when you started it a few years ago now?

MS: "I have gotten so much more out of it than I thought initially. When I was going into it, I really didn't have any expectations because I didn't want to get my hopes up. So we started our first season with eight athletes, and I thought that was just awesome. I really didn't think we'd get eight. When we started we didn't have any other program to go off of, we just set up stand at registration and hoped that people would come."

SCMG: And it just grew from that?
MS: The next season we had 16, so we doubled, and that was an awesome season. I think it was the second season when I was like, 'This is really cool. People are spreading the word and really enjoying it.' That's when we started playing games, and



we had a lot of the same athletes come back from the first season, and we had more buddies. The first practice of our second season we had so many athletes we didn't have enough buddies. We weren't ready for that many athletes. We've got buddies from George Jenkins, Lakeland, Lakeland Football Club, from all over."

SCMG: In some ways, it seems as important to the parents as it is the athletes, because parents get a chance to just sit back and watching their kids be kids.

MS: "It definitely is. I know the parents, whole families, would come to the practices, and the last practice would be a full game. We had ref there, we had the lines drawn out. There were grandparents there, aunts and uncles there. A lot of them don't get a chance to see their kids compete, so they don't really see what their kids can do. And the kids come out and are doing all this awesome stuff and their parents are on the sidelines crying because they're like 'Oh my gosh. We never thought my kid could do this.' And that's happened with so many of the athletes, that's really, really cool."

SCMG: Now you're going with sessions both in the spring and fall, correct?

MS: "Yes. This past fall we had about 22 athletes, and we probably have about 25 to 30 buddies, but it's grown a lot. We've almost tripled. We hope to keep growing, so we're trying to get the word out. This is my last season with TOPS, so we need someone to take over the program, A lot of the people who are volunteering are my friends who are also leaving also, so we're trying to find prospects to help take over."

SCMG: What's the actual schedule for one of the seasons?

MS: "We would practice very

Saturday for about 10 weeks for an hour. For the first five weeks its just practice, things like basic ball skills, and then we'd start doing like half practice and half actually playing which works really well. We have kids all over the spectrum."

SCMG: And for your dad, from your perspective as a board member, how important is it for Lakeland FC to offer this kind of program?

DS: "I'll just repeat what the parents said. There are very few programs that give the parents of special needs children an avenue for their kids to be part of a team, and to have some success. These parents said when their kids get up, and they can pull their uniform on and be part of a team, it makes their whole day. Having that for the parents, they've said its overwhelming. Their kids are having fun, it's really cool."

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Working hard to become a charter

WINTER HAVEN – Working diligently with the Polk County School District, Our Children's Director Tandria Callins said she is working on a new application to turn part of the school into a charter school and is getting help to do it correctly.

The school has been denied charter school status five times and part of the reason for that is because it is a private school. According to state law private schools, parochial schools and at-home schools are not eligible to become private schools. The latest application was recommended for denial by the Review Team and the School Board followed that on Nov. 14 with most of the members telling Callins if she were

to re-apply by the Feb. 1 deadline it is likely it would become a charter school by August.

In the last attempt the application was given back to the school for revisions and explanations to what was unclear and despite that Callins had responded within the seven days required, it was not sufficient, said Melissa Brady, the school district's director of charter schools.

"We have a form and it has to be brought to our office," she said. At the bottom it lists what has to be corrected. She said. This is done early in the process. The answers Our Children's provided was not what was required.

"It was kind of like entering evidence after the fact," Brady said.

In the application, Our Children's is seeking for grades kindergarten through the eighth grade

to become a charter school. The high school would remain a private school. To that end, Callins said she is also seeking a place off the current campus to place the high school to ease any confusion between the two schools. In reference to the school being private, there is a way to have the school be eligible for charter school status and that is through shutting it down and reopening as a new, public school.

"One question has been what was the intention?" Brady said. "A private, parochial or home school cannot which means (Our Children's) cannot apply as a private school. Their 501-C3 cannot be. What happens is you close the private school and if it is approved you have to send a letter to each parent that this school

will close and market the second school. It's been done in Miami with parochial schools. They were closed at the end of the school year and reopened the next year as a charter school."

Callins said in order to accomplish this, once the application is done it has to go to the board of directors of Our Children's for approval before it can be submitted to the school district.

Callins said the Feb. 1 deadline which is new helps because there is an urgency at the school to get the lower grades into charter status. With this deadline – as opposed to the Aug. 1 deadline – Our Children's could still open next August as a charter school if the board OKs the application.

"It's urgent to open as a charter in August," Callins said, adding the

school has two options. Either resubmit the application in February or appeal the school board's recent decision with the Department of Education.

"We're waiting," she said. "We hired a lawyer and he's reviewing the information and once we have a board meeting with our school we need to make a decision."

In the meantime, Callins said she is totally redoing the applications. There was some question in terms of the budget. With part of the school remaining a private school and part to be a charter two budgets will have to be done.

"We're working on it from scratch," Callins said. "I'm not going to do any copy and pasting. We still have to submit 10 binders so they have to review the whole thing with the corrections, of

course. I want to meet with the board members and employees and get their feedback. Already the school has two separate entities in budgetary items that have to be kept separate. There is the school's budget and there is the rehabilitation center which is its own non-profit organization that provides the services to the school.

There was a concern with that from the Review Team, Callins said, though it wasn't in the reasons for the denial, she said. However, on the end of moving the high school to a different campus, Callins said that is not required, but she wants to do that to ease any concern.

"We're going to relocate the private school. The private and public school will no longer be in the same location," she said.

Montessori school is growing

 – Many times when one hears the phrase “Montessori school,” it brings to mind a private school, with perhaps an expensive tuition, elusive to the common family.

But in Winter Haven, there is a free public charter school for children in grades K-8: Cypress Junction Montessori.

According to American Montessori Society, the education method developed by Dr. Maria Montessori, “is a child-centered educational approach based on scientific observations of children from birth to adulthood.”

“Montessori in the traditional sense and purpose can be for every child, and by founding CJM as a public charter school, we have made it possible for a greater population of families,” said Karen Winningham, who is also the school’s executive director and principal.

There are 160 private Montessori schools in

CJM’s history so far

Katrina Hill, board of directors and one of the founders of CJM, said CJM was founded by local moms worried about the future educational options for their then toddlers, who sat down in 2014 and decided to open a Montessori charter school. Those moms, including Hill, were Tasha Keppler and Karen Winningham. They worked with Polk County Public Schools, receiving approval October 2015.

“Since then, the team has expanded and partnerships have been formed across Winter Haven to bring Cypress Junction Montessori charter school from a dream to a reality,” said Hill. “Future plans include growing the preschool program to full enrollment and offering additional scholarships through our Early Education Scholarship Fund so CJM can bring an affordable, quality

early childhood educational program to Winter Haven,” she added.

What is Montessori?

Self-directed activity, hands-on learning and collaborative play are all key components of Montessori.

“In Montessori classrooms, children make creative choices in their learning, while the classroom and the teacher offer age-appropriate activities to guide the process,” she said.

The concept is children work both in groups and by themselves in the learning process.

“The underlying assumption in a traditional classroom is that every student can grasp the same amount of concepts throughout a school year, but anyone who has been in a classroom will tell you that there is no way all the students will be able to work through every lesson at the same pace,” said Winningham.

“Dr. Montessori believed that school should foster the development

and growth of children,” she added.

Students are selected through a random lottery draw following the open enrollment application period. CJM’s open enrollment period goes through Jan. 31 for the 2018-19 school year.

Families can enter by applying on CJM’s web site at <http://cypressjunction.org/parents-families/enroll/>

Class size and age mix

Cypress Junction Montessori currently serves students 3 through the seventh grade. The preschool is not free, as there is a tuition. But K-seventh grade is free. In the 2018-19 school year, CJM plans to add eighth grade as part of a multi-year growth plan.

Total enrollment this year is 180 students, and the school expects to add between 25-30 students next school year.

Seven classrooms have a mixed-age environment where older children serve as the mentor and help teach younger students.

The younger students are then guided to develop and learn at their own pace, said Winningham. The classrooms range in size from 25 to 44.

“Each classroom has two Montessori guides who work collaboratively within the model to follow the child, develop their interests, and also ensure accountability to the learning process,” said Winningham.

All teachers/guides have the same requirements as traditional school teachers in that they have to obtain a Florida Teaching Certification. Additionally, guides are required to obtain a Montessori certification from AMI (Association Montessori Internationale), AMS (American Montessori Society), Montessori Accreditation Council for Teacher Education, or other widely recognized Montessori program, said Winningham.

Guides do not have to be certified in order to apply, as they may begin training at the same time as they receive a job.

Love our Montessori school

Hill said her favorite moments come when she can peak into a classroom during a visit to the school and see the students and teachers hard at work.

“I love to listen to their stories about how they enjoy the school, how it’s different from previous experiences and how it’s benefiting that individual student or family,” she said.

Parent Michelle Rozar loves the school and said that back when her five children would come home every day from their previous school, two of her girls would be in tears.

“The other three were just so fed up that they weren’t learning. And the overwhelming amount of bullying had them never wanting to go to school again,” said Rozar.

“The environment at CJM has provided my children with encouragement, love, safety, and a sense of belonging,” said Rozar. “Their experience also led me to a career change into education.

Florida fighting for ag relief money

The Florida delegation to Washington is putting up a fight to get federal money to fight the losses coming the agriculture industry because of Hurricane Irma.

After Florida Agriculture Commissioner Adam Putnam sent a letter

to the Florida's congressional delegation seeking disaster relief, in which more than \$2.5 billion damage was done in Florida, the entire delegation put the Trump Administration and Congressional appropriators on notice that the agriculture industry is being shortchanged when it comes to disaster relief.

During a delegation

meeting last week, the members indicated they would withhold support for the upcoming disaster aid bill unless the state's agriculture industry is included.

"The Florida Delegation is in agreement that Congress must include relief for Florida agriculture in the upcoming aid package," said Rep. Dennis Ross, R-Lakeland.

"As representatives of Florida, it is our duty to advocate for those who have been devastated by Hurricane Irma and citrus greening. We must join together to ensure that Florida is not left behind."

If the delegation holds firm, 16 Republican votes and 11 Democrats would not be available to leadership to pass the measure. California's

delegation, with 14 Republicans and 39 Democrats, is also reportedly not happy with the lack of any funding following the devastating wildfires that state has endured over recent months.

Florida leaders have yet to convince the White House and Congress to include an estimated \$761 million in losses to the citrus industry in a

series of disaster-relief packages this year.

Putnam implored Florida's congressional delegation on Tuesday, Nov. 28, to support U.S. Rep. Tom Rooney's proposal to add \$1.5 billion for Florida's agricultural industry to a \$44 billion disaster-relief request sent to Congress on Nov. 17 by the White House Office of Management and Budget.

BARTOW – It's at a different time but it's in the same place, same times, familiar and educational though you may not know it.

It's the Cracker Storytelling Festival. Usually held near Halloween so it's taken on that theme but in its 29th year the festival at Homeland Heritage Park is planned Dec. 6-9 (Wednesday through Saturday) postponed because of Irma. "This year we so far have 35 schools attending," Sullivan said. "That's one-third of the schools (from Polk County) and they are from all the levels."

kids and \$6 for those older than 12. It runs from 9:30 a.m.-2 p.m. each day but on Saturday the story telling ends at 12:30 when the whip cracking contest takes place. That costs \$10 per entry. Tickets to the event are available at the gate.

Storytelling is the use of words, gestures, facial expression and body language to bring a story to life in the listener's imagination. Storytellers engage linguistic, logical, musical, spatial, inter-personal, intra-personal, and kinesthetic learners alike, at the same time it strengthens listening, visualization, vocabulary acquisition and comprehension. Audience participation is encouraged.

"We definitely have a lot about Florida," Sullivan said. "We have a poet cowboy and he re-enacts life in the 1800s. We have ethnic storytellers, we have someone who is a Cracker Cuban. There are Cajun tellers and native Americans."

Sullivan said the venue is also an historical one at Homeland Heritage Park, which teaches students

about the history of their area.

"Start with the fact that it is in an historical park when you come to the event with many historical landmarks, churches, the old school house ... you get history by just being there. And you get to see a campfire re-enactment and see what it was like to be a cattleman in Florida in the 1800s."

The event was originally called the Spirit of Suwannee Harvest Story Festival, it became the Cracker Storytelling Festival in 1991, its third year. It was named that to honor the pioneer spirit of the cracker in Florida. It moved to Homeland Heritage Park in 1995 when the whip cracking contest was added.

All the money goes into the operating costs of the festival, she said.

Crossing Guard to be removed

Engineering in Lakeland. A spokesman there said more will be planned.

"We are about halfway through and have engaged close to 700 students in programming, robotics, and coding. The kids are having a blast programming their robots to mimic driverless cars while the teachers love seeing their students learn new concepts, work together, and have fun!" said Urmila Wadnerkar, MOSI Manager of Group and Outreach programs, and one of the robotics instructors.

Robot Roundup is funded through the George W. Jenkins Fund within the Givewell Community Foundation's Impact Polk annual grant program. Funding from the Rooms To Go Foundation allowed MOSI to bring this hands-on program to 16 low income schools in Lakeland, Winter Haven, Davenport, Fort Meade, Lake Alfred, Poinciana and Auburndale.

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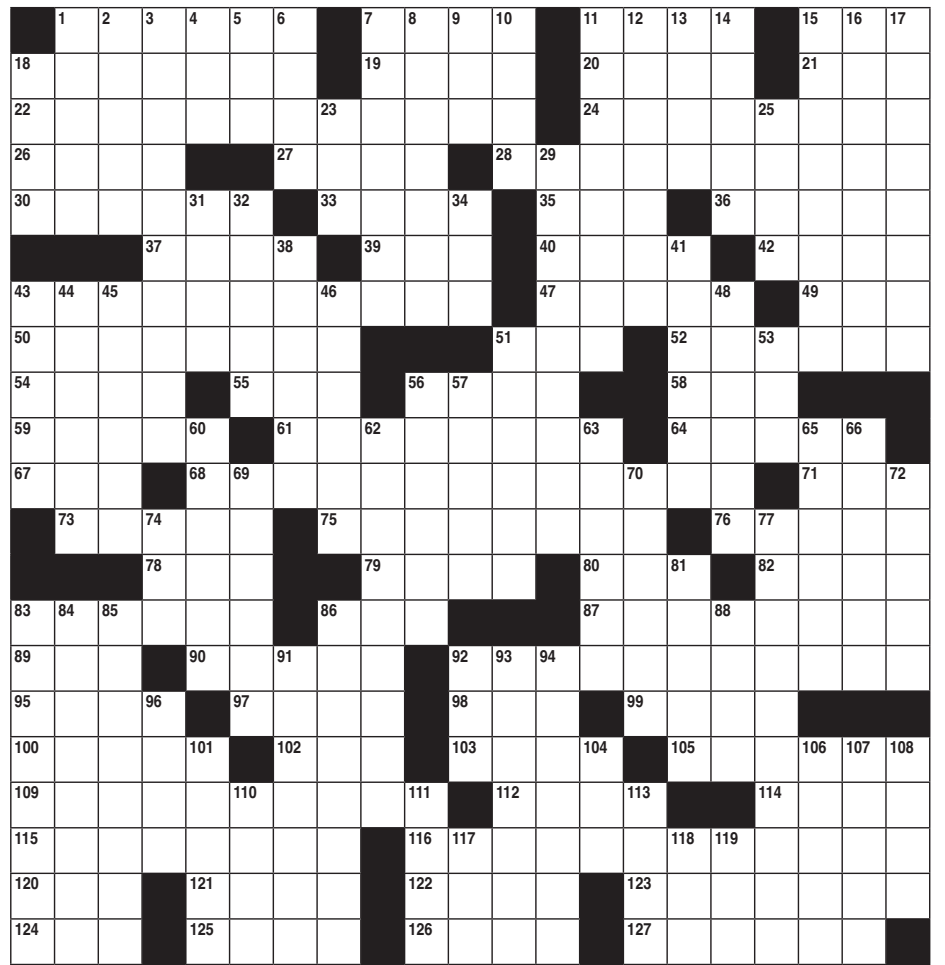

Firefighters save man's life from car wreck

Shortly after 6 a.m. Saturday, Dec. 2, when the Winter Haven Fire Department got a call that a car wreck happened on Lucerne Park Road and U.S. 27 personnel arrived and found the car sinking into a canal and only part of the trunk was visible.

Riner and firefighter Jon Hinkle jumped into the water and Riner punched through the rear window, cleared the glass and dove into the car.

He had found Hakeem McGhee, 26, unresponsive inside and pulled him out of the car. He and Hinkle then dragged McGhee to shore where Lt. Medic Kyle Miller and paramedic Marty Johnson administered life-saving care. McGhee was then flown to Lakeland Regional Medical Health Center.

Riner and Hinkle both went back to the car to see if other occupants inside.

There were no others inside. A Dundee fire squad that responded attached a winch to the vehicle and pulled it out of the water.

"The actions of these firefighters and paramedics, in no doubt, saved this man's life," said Winter Haven Fire Chief Chris Humphrey.

Escaped prisoner captured in Winter Haven

Winter Haven police followed a man Sunday in a reported stolen vehicle past Central Park quietly as Carols in the Park were taking place and once the car passed out of the area, they turned on their lights and arrested a 20-year-old Lake City man who escaped from prison, officials reported.

At about 10 a.m. Police were made aware of a stolen 2016 white Chrysler 300 that was tracked in Lake Wales and was being driven by Devonte Madison of Lake City.

With help from the Polk County Sheriff's Office air unit, the vehicle was spotted on First Street South traveling past LongHorn restaurant. The vehicle went along First Street approaching the downtown area where Bodison turned onto Avenue B towards

downtown. Winter Haven units were behind the vehicle. Once the vehicle was past the downtown area officers activated emergency equipment and stopped it at 3rd Street and Avenue D NW. As officers approached the vehicle, Bodison took off again where he got back to First Street North and turned onto Avenue O NE.

Bodison traveled along Avenue O NE where he ultimately left the roadway striking a concrete lawn ornament causing the front wheel of the vehicle to come off. The car then flipped over on its side and skidded down the road about 20 feet where it came to rest in a yard.

Bodison exited through the sunroof and ran into the yard of a home at the corner of Avenue O NE and Fairfax Avenue where he was apprehended by Winter Haven officers Ryan Neely and Davendra Bharratt.

Bodison was booked into the Polk County Jail for possession of a stolen vehicle, two counts of fleeing to elude, one count of resisting arrest without violence, one count of leaving the scene of an accident with property damage and Columbia County DOC escaped prisoner charges.

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Albritton: Sticking to my beliefs

BARTOW – After serving in the state House of Representatives for seven sessions Rep. Ben Albritton said he has scars.

“But they are on the inside so I’m OK,” he told the audience at the Tiger Bay Club of Polk County last week.

Among the hardest things to do, he said, is remaining faithful to his beliefs and how to combat what others associated with government say to distort his how he stands based on his votes.

“There is a distortion and it’s not from the media or social media, but in the way campaigns are run,” he said.

To illustrate his point, the man who is now running for the Florida Senate in a seat being vacated by Sen. Denise Grimsley who will run for the Department of Agriculture seat currently held by Adam Putnam, said there was a bill on the floor a few years ago dealing with foster parents.

The bill would allow would allow a financial incentive for state employees to adopt foster children. Long a

proponent of helping foster and special needs children, Albritton was behind the bill. It would provide home lives for children and ease the cost burden that for children raised in group homes. Along the way, amendments were added concerning not allowing gay couples to adopt and home schooling.

“The bill got complicated,” Albritton said.

He liked the bill, the amendments not so much.

“If you don’t vote you’ll get accused of not covering and your opponent will let it be known. What other political poison could there be? I was put in a position to vote.

“There are two ways you can look at it,” he said.

Say you love 80 percent of a bill and hate 20 percent of it.

“I could vote on the 80 percent or I could vote on the 20 percent. What would you do? I voted for the bill because the good outweighed the bad.”

He said overall this bill would be good for foster children, good for families even with the amendments. He felt the gay adoption was a political move – an amendment

inserted by gay legislator David Richardson – could be struck down in court, but now, he said, his opponents would say he was against gay adoption.

“You have to fight all the time and I’m willing to put up the fight,” he said.

Albritton said he learned the fight early in his state lawmaking career. When he first arrived in Tallahassee he was asked by a constituent how he would vote on a bill that outlawed abortion with the exception of

rape or incest or health of the mother. He said he would.

“Then I was told I was not pro-life,” he said.

“It can get so ideological that nothing is defined by a single action,” he said.

Albritton’s point of view was clear when it came time for the audience to ask questions, a regular feature of the Tiger Bay meetings. When asked what he thought about people owning guns in light of the mass shootings that has happened,

Albritton said being raised with weapons available in his home, he said he has a concealed weapons permit and he believes people should have guns and his reason, though it may sound ridiculous to some, it is the way his “brain works.”

“After the shooting in Texas being in a church I couldn’t think how can I not be able to protect my family and defend them? I can shield my wife, but I can only do one. That’s why I have a concealed weapon. I love my family.”

When asked how to make a workplace sexual harassment, Albritton said he had a pretty simple answer to the recent plaque people have been seeing.

“Maybe I’m simple minded, but in my opinion, don’t do it. There are predatory men and women but we have to respect each other.”

He said no one is a saint, but he emphasized that people should not be stupid about it. When he is meeting with a lobbyist or anyone else in his office, he always has a fellow staff member present. He doesn’t share drinks with fellow legislators, lobbyists or constituents because it doesn’t make

sense.

“If you see a 27-year-old perfect looking female lobbyist and a legislator in his 40s you know you could have problems,” he said, adding when he first got to Tallahassee he was told about a bar called Clyde’s where he could get to know co-horts. Overall, he said, it doesn’t make sense.

“I don’t do it ... it doesn’t make common sense.”

As far as changing the law, Albritton said it would be difficult. There seems there would always be a problem of people’s individual rights that would likely see a bill go to court.

When asked what keeps him up at night, Albritton said he sleeps pretty soundly and that is mostly because he is able to stick with his beliefs. He said he vowed to himself, his wife he would not violate his beliefs. And he said the important thing is keep the ball rolling forward.

“I support the principles I hold dear ... family, foster kids ... it gets gray sometimes but you’ve got keep up and get to the next thing. These are sometimes hard decisions to make,” he said.

BARTOW – While fight against AIDS, both with the disease itself and the perception, has come a long way in the 29 years since the first World AIDS Day, there is a still a way to go, said Dr. Daniella Chiriboga of the Department of Health in Polk County.

At Saturday's event at the health department in Bartow, she told the people, "When I was with patients in the 1980s (who had AIDS) I told them they had three months to live. Now people's life expectancy is 70 years," she said.

However, there is still a stigma associated with AIDS and while it is changing, it is changing slowly she said.

"The biggest stigma is it can keep families from talking to each other. People still think it is due to a bad lifestyle. There is still a lot of fear."

However, many thoughts of how pervasive and contagious it is has moved forward. No longer to people think

AIDS can be spread by sitting on a toilet an AIDS patient used. No longer do people think being near someone with AIDS can spread the disease. However, she said it still exists, she said.

"I knew an older Haitian woman and her family would not let her cook for them or the grandchildren," Chiriboga said.

To help her family understand, Chiriboga said she had the woman hold her baby daughter.

"I walked up to her and handed her my daughter to hold and you should have seen the look on her daughter-in-law's face," Chiriboga said.

However the fear of cooking does exist, the doctor said. People are afraid of people with AIDS cutting themselves.

One of the best ways Chiriboga tries to get the message through to people on the fear of AIDS is through the story she told the crowd at the beginning of her talk about the life expectancy and examples she uses of well-known people with AIDS who live productive

lives.

"The only ways AIDS can be spread is through unsafe sex, blood transfers and intravenous drug use. And, she added, the cases where people get the disease through blood transfers has been reduced to almost none. There are many procedures in place where blood is tested and it has been successful in fighting the spread of the disease, she said.

"In my nine and half years we haven't had a single case through transmission. That's amazing for that amount of time," she said.

She also said a pill has been developed that prevents the spread of the disease. It is used by people who are sexually active or by couples where one person is HIV positive and the other is not.

"It's a pill a person can take every day," she said.

While the treatment of AIDS is still expensive, Chiriboga said there are many programs available where it can be affordable.

"There are programs

where they don't have to pay for medication. It covers you unless you are 400 percent above the poverty line. There are plenty of them," she said. People can get information about them from their doctor or through the Department of Health.

One group on hand for the World AIDS Day event was Clear Health Alliance, an insurance company from Miami that caters to AIDS patients in Florida.

Armando Sanchez-Aballi, a community relations manager with the company, said the service not only has financial

help for AIDS patients, it provides for case management, counseling and other support patients need.

"Those who choose us we get them the help they need," he said.

"The case manager stays in touch, helps people with their medication and we direct them to support groups and get individuals to be highly functional. We're here to restore and maintain their lives," he said.

AIDS awareness is one of the top priorities of the county's Department of Health, spokesperson Nicole Riley said.

"We have a lot of

outreach teams and we are at a lot of health fairs and other functions. The HIV-AIDS team is very active and we are always in the community to bring awareness," she said.

She said while there is still a stigma associated with the disease there is also the problem that people have the disease and don't know it. She estimates there is about 14 percent of people who are HIV positive who don't know it.

"As we work together, it will be a team effort to ensure our health get this down to zero," said Dr. Joy Jackson, the director of the DOH in Polk.

If there are none, the petition must so indicate; (e) A concise statement of the ultimate facts alleged, including the specific facts the petitioner contends warrant reversal or modification of the agency's proposed action; (f) A statement of the specific rules or statutes the petitioner contends require reversal or modification of the agency's proposed action including an explanation of how the alleged facts relate to the specific rules or statutes; and (g) A statement of the relief sought by the petitioner, stating precisely the action the petitioner wishes the agency to take with respect to the agency's proposed action. 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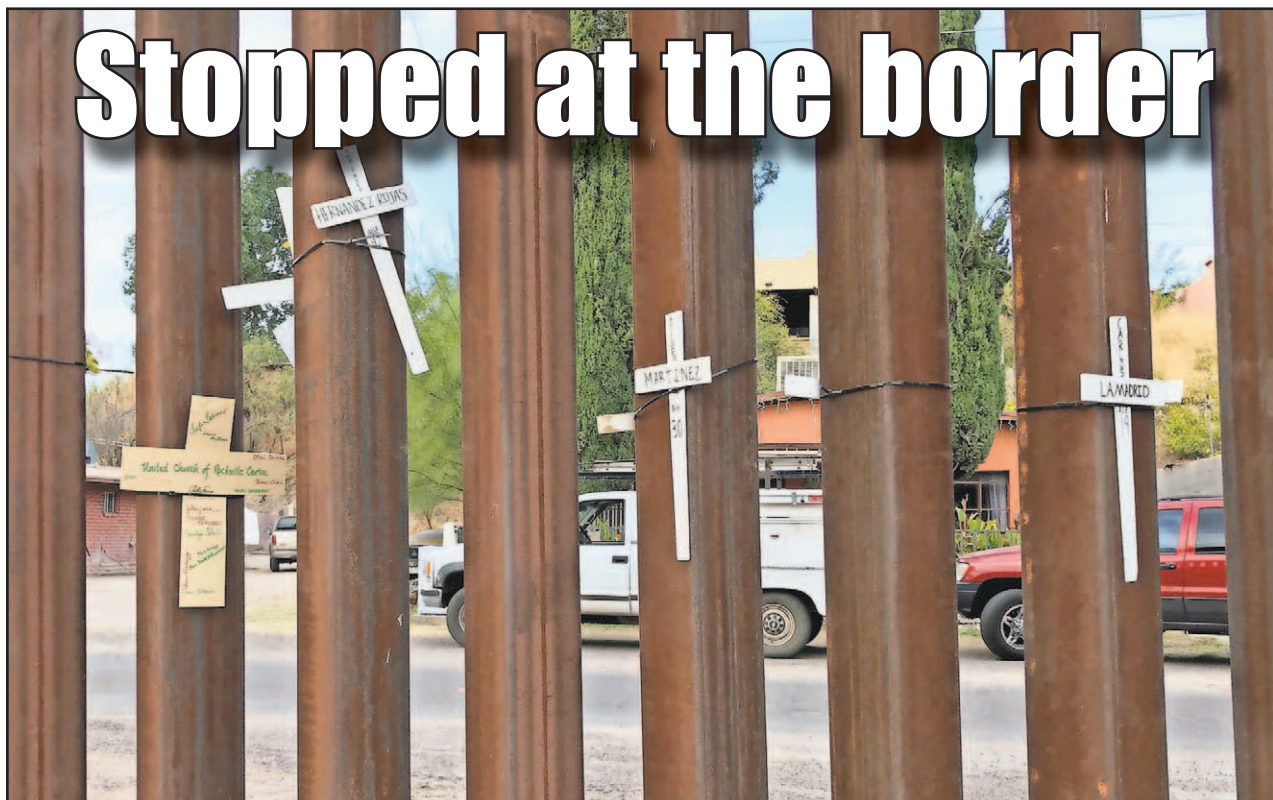

Detentions spike, border arrests fall in Trump's first year

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump's immigration crackdown has produced a spike in detentions by deportation officers across the country during his first months in office. At the same time, arrests along the Mexican border have fallen sharply, apparently as fewer people have tried to sneak into the U.S.

Figures released by the Department of Homeland Security on Tuesday show Trump is delivering on his pledge to more strictly control immigration and suggest that would-be immigrants are getting the message to not even think about crossing the border illegally.

Even as border crossings decline, however, Trump continues to push for his promised wall along the border — a wall that critics say is unnecessary and a waste of cash.

The new numbers, which offer the most complete snapshot yet of immigration enforcement under Trump, show that Border Patrol arrests plunged to a 45-year low in the fiscal year that ended Sept. 30, with far fewer people being apprehended

between official border crossings.

In all, the Border Patrol made 310,531 arrests in fiscal 2016, down 25 percent from a year earlier and the lowest level since 1971.

Officials have credited that drop to Trump's harsh anti-immigration rhetoric and policies, including widely publicized arrests of immigrants living in the U.S. illegally.

"There's a new recognition by

would-be immigrants that the U.S. is not hanging up a welcome sign," said Michelle Mittelstadt, of the non-partisan Migration Policy Institute think tank. She pointed to Trump's rhetoric, as well as his policies. "I think there's a sense that the U.S. is less hospitable."

But Mittelstadt also stressed that

Conyers resigns from Congress amid harassment allegations

DETROIT — Democratic Rep. John Conyers resigned from Congress on Tuesday after a nearly 53-year career, becoming the first Capitol Hill politician to lose his job in the torrent of sexual misconduct allegations sweeping through the nation's workplaces.

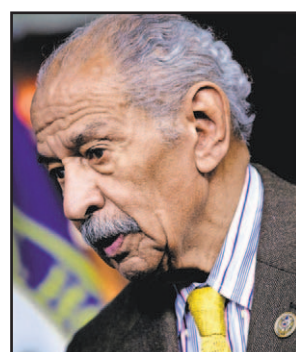
The 88-year-old civil rights leader and longest-serving member of the House announced what he referred to as his "retirement" on Detroit talk radio, while continuing to deny he groped or sexually harassed women who worked for him.

"My legacy can't be compromised or diminished in any way by what we're going through now," said the congressman, who called into the radio show from the hospital where he was taken last week after complaining of lightheadedness. "This, too, shall pass. My legacy will continue through my children."

He endorsed his son John Conyers III to succeed him.

Conyers, who was first elected in 1964 and went on to become a founding member in 1971 of the Congressional Black Caucus, easily won re-election last year to his 27th term in his heavily Democratic district in and around Detroit.

But after being publicly accused by one woman after another in recent

weeks, he faced growing calls to resign from colleagues in the House, including Democratic Leader Nancy Pelosi.

Then and now: Why 1986 tax bill was everything 2017's isn't

WASHINGTON — They don't do tax reform like they used to.

The legislation that House and Senate Republicans have embraced has revived memories of Congress' most recent major tax overhaul three decades ago.

But the similarities tend to end there.

The Tax Reform Act of 1986 was everything this year's version isn't. It was the product of a year and a half of spirited deliberations. It won support from both Democrats and Republicans. Its benefits flowed more to ordinary taxpayers than to corporations and wealthy individuals. And it added nothing to the federal deficit.

Assessing the measure on its 20th anniversary, the conservative Tax Foundation said it "stands as a rare example of bipartisan support for fundamentally sound tax policy."

That was then.

The 2017 tax overhaul? It was written on the fly. Congress held no hearings on the key details. The bill drew no Democratic votes. Independent analyses have said most of the gains will flow to corporations and rich individuals.

In the Senate, some provisions were scribbled onto the bill in nearly illegible handwriting in the final hours. Republicans released a 479-page version of the bill just before the vote, leaving senators with scarcely time to absorb what was in it. Democrats complained that their information about the measure was coming mainly from lobbyists.

The Senate bill would permanently slash the corporate tax rate to 20 percent from 35 percent. By contrast, the tax cuts for individuals would expire after 2026. The measure would revamp the estate tax to cover fewer wealthy families.

The bounty from the Senate bill would go increasingly to the wealthy: In 2019, 15 percent of the tax cuts would go to

the richest 1 percent of taxpayers. In 2027, their share of the benefits would rise to 62 percent, according to the nonpartisan Tax Policy Center. By 2027, according to Congress' Joint Committee on Taxation, households that earn under

\$75,000 a year would actually face a tax increase.

The House's version contains provisions that could drastically raise taxes on financially fragile Americans, including graduate students and divorced people who pay alimony.

the numbers are part of a larger trend that began well before Trump's inauguration: Mexico's improving economy and more opportunities at home have stemmed the tide of people flowing across the border for work.

"You've really had a realignment in migration from Mexico," she said, noting that the numbers of Mexicans apprehended in 2017 fell by 34 percent from the previous year.

The decline in border crossings continues a trend that began during the Obama administration, and marks a dramatic drop from 2000, when more than 1.6 million people were apprehended

crossing the southwest border alone.

Overall, U.S.

Immigration and Customs Enforcement said, deportations over the last year dropped about 6 percent from the previous year — a number tied to the sharp decline in border crossings as well as a backlog in the immigration courts that process deportations.

But that number masks a striking uptick in arrests away from the border. Those arrests have sparked fear and anger in immigrant communities, where many worry the government is now targeting them.

ICE said the number of "interior removals" — people who are apprehended away from the border — jumped 25 percent this year to 81,603. And the increase is 37 percent after Trump's inauguration

compared to the same period the year before.

"The president made it clear in his executive orders: There's no population off the table," Thomas Homan, ICE's acting director, told reporters in Washington on Tuesday. "If you're in this country illegally, we're looking for you and we're going to look to apprehend you."

In February, former Homeland Security Secretary John Kelly, who now serves as Trump's chief of staff, scrapped the Obama administration's policy of limiting deportations to people who pose a public safety threat, convicted criminals and those who have crossed the border recently, effectively making anyone in the country illegally vulnerable to apprehension.

Trump campaigned as an immigration

hard-liner, accusing Mexico of sending rapists and other criminals to the U.S. and promising to build "a great wall on our southern border." As president, he has signed a series of travel bans aimed at curtailing who can enter the country,

pushed to overhaul the legal immigration system and tried to crack down on so-called sanctuary cities that refuse to share information about illegal immigrants with federal authorities. He has also pushed for funding for his border wall.

the remaining year in Conyers' two-year term. State Sen. Ian Conyers, a grandson of Conyers' brother, said he plans to run for the seat.

On Monday, yet another allegation was lodged against Conyers, when a woman who said she worked for him for more than a decade, Elisa Grubbs, said he slid his hand up her skirt and rubbed her thighs while she was sitting next to him in the front row of a church.

Grubbs also said she repeatedly saw Conyers touching and stroking the legs and buttocks of other female staffers. Such behavior "was a regular part

of life while working in the office of Rep. Conyers," she said.

Grubbs is the cousin of another accuser, Marion Brown, who reached a confidential, taxpayer-funded settlement of more than \$27,000 over allegations Conyers sexually harassed her. That settlement came to light in mid-November, setting off the cascade of allegations against the congressman.

At least two other women who worked for him have accused him of sexual misconduct.

"This is about much more than one congressman," Grubbs' attorney, Lisa Bloom, said in an email after Conyers resigned. "Systemic change is urgently needed so no other women have to endure the retaliation, secrecy and delays my

client Marion Brown and others experienced."

While Hollywood and media titans accused of sexual misconduct have been swiftly fired in recent weeks, including studio boss Harvey Weinstein and TV news hosts Matt Lauer and Charlie Rose, that has not been the case in Congress, where lawmakers have spoken of due process and clung to the argument that the voters have the final say.

Democratic Sen. Al Franken of Minnesota, Republican Rep. Blake Farenthold of Texas and Democratic Rep. Ruben Kihuen of Nevada have all rebuffed calls to step down, though Barton has said he won't seek re-election next year.

Conyers said in a statement read Tuesday on the floor of the House

that he was resigning "to preserve my legacy and good name."

Conyers regularly won elections with more than 80 percent of the vote.

responding to widespread complaints that the tax code was unfair, had directed his administration to produce a plan that would make taxes simpler and fairer for everyone.

The next year, House Democrats — led by Speaker Thomas "Tip" O'Neill and Ways and Means Chairman Dan Rostenkowski — agreed to work with Reagan, who put his Treasury Secretary James Baker on the case. The result was essentially a trade-off: The bill would cut tax rates. But to pay for those lower rates, it would also close many costly tax breaks and loopholes that corporations and wealthy individuals had long enjoyed.

"Tax reform was designed to appeal to both Republicans and Democrats — the Democrats getting the elimination of special-interest tax breaks, the Republicans getting lower tax rates," says Jeffrey Birnbaum, who co-wrote "Showdown at Gucci Gulch," an account of the '86 tax reform. "There was something for everybody."

The Ways and Means Committee held 30 days of hearings on tax reform proposals. And then it spent 26 days crafting the legislation. The Senate Finance Committee held 36 days of hearings stretching over 1985 and 1986 and then spent 17 days producing its bill.

"People knew what was in it," says James Thurber, political scientist who founded American University's Center for Congressional and Presidential Studies. "It wasn't rushed through the way this one was."

Of course, even in

1986, nothing was easy. Corporate lobbyists sought to torpedo the bill. And it endured several near-death experiences. But in the end, the House approved the final measure 292-136. Republicans backed it 116-62, Democrats 176-74.

Two days later, the Senate followed with a 74-23 vote, with Republicans backing it 41-11 and Democrats 33-12. Reagan signed it into law on Oct. 22, 1986.

"The Cinderella team came out on top," the president declared once it became apparent that the bill would pass.

The measure added nothing to the deficit: \$120 billion in tax breaks for individuals over five years were offset by \$120 billion in tax increases for business, according to the Committee for a Responsible Federal Budget, which advocates for reduced budget deficits.

But America's political terrain looked very different three decades ago, with each party populated by centrists who prided themselves on meeting the other side somewhere in the middle.

"Back in the 1980s, there were still a lot of moderates in Congress," says Keith Poole, a political scientist at the University of Georgia. Over the years, Poole has measured the widening partisan divide on Capitol Hill: Congressional Democrats have moved left since 1986, and Republicans have moved right even faster. There's little common ground left.

"You couldn't do now what we did then," says David Brockway, who was chief of staff at the Joint Committee on Taxation in 1986, "because the world is different."

Senate eyes possible no-fault insurance repeal

TALLAHASSEE — A key Senate committee next month will take up a proposal that would replace the state's no-fault auto insurance system, while a similar bill has already sped to the House floor.

Senate Banking and Insurance Chairwoman Anitere Flores said the proposal (SB 150) by Sen. Tom Lee, R-Thonotosassa, will be among the first discussed by her committee when the annual legislative session begins Jan. 9. The committee had been slated to take up the issue Tuesday, but time ran out in a scheduled two-hour meeting.

"The intention will be to have a vote on this bill, up or down, at that meeting," said Flores, whose committee heard several other bills

Tuesday before starting a discussion on Lee's proposal.

The proposal would repeal the no-fault law, which requires motorists to carry \$10,000 in personal-injury protection, or PIP, coverage to help pay medical expenses after accidents. It would require motorists to carry \$5,000 in what is known as medical payments coverage, or MedPay, and minimum amounts of bodily-injury coverage that would increase over time.

During the 2017 legislative session, Lee's proposal was dubbed "PIP renamed" by Rep. Erin Grall, a Vero Beach Republican who sponsored no-fault repeal legislation in 2017 and is carrying the House bill (HB 19) for the 2018 session.

Lee said he expects the competing proposals will start to be matched

up as the Senate version advances towards a floor vote.

"The most important thing to me is we get coverage rates up for people that are injured in an accident in our state, and right now \$10,000 gets eaten up on just about every accident that happens," Lee said.

The requirement that motorists carry \$10,000 in PIP coverage essentially hasn't changed since 1979. The no-fault system is designed to help limit lawsuits stemming from traffic accidents.

The House proposal does not include a requirement of carrying MedPay coverage.

Sen. Rene Garcia, R-Hialeah, surmised that Lee's proposal could result in higher premiums — particularly for inner-city residents in minority communities that rely upon personal-injury projection

for their only coverage — and would increase litigation.

"They will be litigating with the insurance companies as opposed to the health companies as to who is going to pay what and what amount of damages they're going to pay," Garcia said.

Lee acknowledged that people only paying for minimum coverage now would likely see rate increases, particularly residents of urban areas such as Southeast Florida where rates are already higher. But he doesn't anticipate much change in the courts.

"It's not that you'll be unable to recover, it won't be a pot of money sitting there to attach by a lot of service providers, except in an emergency situation, where I wouldn't want to leave people bare or the providers bare, who have no choice, as you known,

but to take care of these patients when they arrive in the emergency room," Lee said.

Before introducing an amendment that more narrowly defined the MedPay requirements, Lee's proposal was projected to raise rates about \$8 to \$12 a year, as the savings from the elimination of no-fault

would be offset by increases in premiums for bodily-injury liability coverage and uninsured-motorist coverage.

The House measure, which faces opposition from some insurers, business groups and medical providers, has been projected to save motorists on average about \$80 a year.

Florida deputies: Couple left boy alone in trailer 2 months

PENSACOLA (AP) — A Florida couple who authorities say left a minor living alone in a trailer without furniture and often without food is charged with child neglect.

The Pensacola News Journal reports 34-year-old Jennifer Nichols and 32-year-old Joshua Sanders were arrested Nov. 30.

A witness told

Escambia County sheriff's deputies that the couple began renting the trailer in September and she realized at some point that the child was living alone.

A police report didn't list the boy's age. He told investigators he was occasionally able to contact the couple and they would bring a small amount of money and a meal or two, but he said he often couldn't reach them.

The couple was being held in jail Tuesday and jail records didn't

indicate if they have a lawyer.

Ex-Florida child welfare spokesman accused of child porn

GAINESVILLE (AP) — A former spokesman for Florida's child welfare agency is accused of having child pornography.

A Gainesville police report says 67-year-old Thomas William Barnes was arrested last week. On Monday,

he was charged with 10 additional child porn charges.

The Gainesville Sun reports the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children received a report in August that a Yahoo user later identified as Barnes sent a graphic photo of a man and a girl. Police searched his computer and found multiple folders of child porn, according to authorities.

Spokeswoman Jessica Sims said in an email that Barnes left the agency more than

10 years ago.

Barnes remains in jail on a \$900,000 bond. Records don't list a lawyer.

Florida deputies: Autistic man beaten, robbed

TAMPA (AP) — Authorities say an autistic Florida man trying to make friends on a basketball court was beaten and robbed.

WFTS-TV reports the 22-year-old man approached and explained his disability

while playing basketball Sunday in Tampa when he was grabbed by the throat and had his cellphone and shoes stolen.

Hillsborough County deputies said when he tried to recover the items, he was kicked and punched.

Deputies charged 25-year-old Terrell Newton and a 16-year-old accomplice with robbery and abuse of a disabled adult.

Jail documents don't list a lawyer for Newton.

Ventura wildfire rages over 45,000 acres, destroys more than 150 structures, triggers evacuation for 27,000

VENTURA, Calif. — A fast-moving, wind-fueled wildfire swept into the city of Ventura early Tuesday, burning 45,000 acres, destroying homes and forcing 27,000 people to evacuate.

At least 150 structures — including at least one large apartment complex and the Vista Del Mar Hospital, a psychiatric facility — were consumed by flames, and many more were threatened.

But the destruction appears to be much worse as the sun rose Tuesday, revealing fire sweeping through whole neighborhoods in the hills above Ventura.

There was no containment on the fire

as of 7 a.m., with 1,000 firefighters battling the blaze and more on the way, said Ventura County Sheriff's spokesman Tim Lochman. One helicopter was dropping water and authorities were hoping winds would die down so they could deploy fixed-wing aircraft soon, he said.

The wind appeared to be pushing the fire east toward Camarillo and north toward Ojai, Lochman said.

The fire started near California State Highway 150 Monday evening and spread into Santa Paula. From there, the fire followed Foothill Road from Santa Paula to Ventura, taking out homes and winding along canyons in the process.

On Tuesday firefighters will continue trying to save homes in Ventura, where

flames are actively burning. They face a red-flag wind advisory that notes ridge line winds of 35 to 45 mph, with gusts up to 70 mph. Winds are expected to decrease somewhat

in the afternoon, said Chad Cook, Ventura County Fire Department division chief.

The fire hopped through hillside neighborhoods, burning some homes and sparing others.

Some residents sensed the the worst might be over in the early hours of the morning when winds died down. But they picked up with a fury around daybreak, causing more destruction.

Engulfed in flames, the Hawaiian Village Apartments collapsed about 4 a.m.

Water gushed down North Laurel Street as firefighters worked to put out the flaming complex and residents watched, holding cameras and cellphones. The sound of bursting propane tanks filled the air.

Hundreds of firefighters working through the night tried to prevent the blaze from spreading, block by block, as they were confronted by wind gusts of up to 50 mph.

One firefighter was hit by a car while he was

protecting homes. He is at the hospital being evaluated, said Ventura County Fire Capt. Scott Quirarte.

Fire officials said the intensity of the fire, coupled with the high winds, made it pretty much unstoppable.

Schools in the Oxnard, Ventura, Hueneme and Santa Paula school districts will all be closed Tuesday.

California authorities have secured a grant from the Federal Emergency Management Agency to assist in firefighting efforts, the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services announced Tuesday morning.

Fire officials expected flames would rip through at least 50,000 acres in the mountains between Santa Paula and Ventura.

Atlanta voters choose mayor in potentially historic election

ATLANTA (AP) — Atlanta residents are choosing a new mayor in what could be a historic election.

Voters in Tuesday's runoff for Atlanta mayor are deciding between Mary Norwood and Keisha Lance Bottoms.

If Norwood wins, Atlanta would have its first-ever white female mayor.

A victory by Bottoms would continue what has been called the city's black

political machine, which has dominated the mayor's office since the mid-1970s.

Atlanta's last white mayor, Sam Massell, left office in 1974 and was succeeded by five African-American mayors in the next four decades: Maynard Jackson, Andrew Young, Bill Campbell, Shirley Franklin and the current Mayor Kasim Reed.

Regardless of who wins the runoff, Atlanta will have its first female mayor since 2010, when former mayor Franklin left office.

Polls closed at 8 p.m. on Tuesday. Results were expected overnight.

Lawsuit challenges Trump's financial bureau appointment

NEW YORK (AP) — A federal credit union in New York City has sued President Donald Trump, saying his acting director of the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau is "trying to minimize its existence."

The Lower East Side People's Federal Credit Union lawsuit was filed Tuesday in Manhattan federal court. It says the bureau created in 2010

after the 2008 financial crisis is an independent watchdog to protect consumers of the U.S. financial services industry.

The lawsuit challenges the Republican president's appointment of White House budget director Mick Mulvaney as the bureau's acting director. It says Mulvaney doesn't like the bureau's existence and is trying to minimize it. It asks a judge to declare bureau deputy director Leandra English the acting director.

Similar litigation has been rejected by a Washington federal judge.

The government hasn't commented on the lawsuit.

ABC says Ross will no longer cover stories involving Trump

NEW YORK (AP) — Suspended ABC News reporter Brian Ross will no longer cover stories involving President Donald Trump following his erroneous report last Friday on former national security adviser Michael Flynn.

The network on Tuesday confirmed the order by

ABC News President James Goldston, who expressed his anger over the error on an internal phone call that was leaked to CNN.

Ross was suspended for four weeks without pay over the weekend. He had reported incorrectly that Trump, when he was still a candidate for president, had told Flynn to make contact with the Russians. Instead, Ross later said that Trump's instructions came when he was president-elect, not a candidate.

It was immediately seized upon by Trump as an example of "fake news."

Palestinians: Trump says he'll move US Embassy to Jerusalem

BETHLEHEM, West Bank — Palestinian officials said Tuesday that President Donald Trump had informed Palestinian leader Mahmoud Abbas in a phone call that he planned to move the U.S. Embassy in Israel to Jerusalem.

Opposition has been building in the Arab world and beyond to any move by Trump to either move the embassy or recognize the contested city as Israel's capital.

A spokesperson for Abbas, Nabil Abu Rudeineh, was quoted by the official Palestinian news agency as saying

Abbas told Trump that such a step would harm peace prospects and also threaten regional security.

The status of Jerusalem has long been a flash-point. Israel claims the entire city as its capital; the Palestinians want the city's eastern sector as the capital of any future Palestinian state.

Palestinians have threatened to cut off contacts with Washington if Trump makes unilateral decisions about Jerusalem's status.

It has long been the consensus of the international community that the city's future should be determined by negotiations. That is why foreign embassies are mainly

located in Tel Aviv.

The Palestinian statement did not say if Trump relayed any timetable to Abbas when the two spoke earlier Tuesday.

Sharp warnings against any move to declare Jerusalem the Israeli capital or move the U.S. Embassy have come from Turkey, a NATO ally, and a number of Arab states.

Saudi Arabia, a key U.S. ally whose help the United States has sought in trying to forge a Mideast peace accord, has counseled against unilateral steps regarding Jerusalem, and European allies including France have also said such a step would heighten tensions.

Russian strategic bombers visit Indonesia in military show

MOSCOW (AP) — The Russian military says its strategic bombers have flown to Indonesia, a visit that showcases Russia's military power.

The Russian Defense Ministry said two Tu-95 strategic bombers landed on Biak Island on Tuesday. They were accompanied by two heavy-lift Il-76 transports that carried support crew and supplies. The ministry said the bombers flew from Russia's far-eastern Amur region and were refueled in the air by Il-78 tankers over the Pacific.

The visit by the bombers capable of carrying nuclear weapons underlined Russia's resurgent

military might and its desire to expand its foothold around the world.

Mueller subpoenas bank records in Russia probe

FRANKFURT, Germany (AP) — A German business newspaper is reporting that former FBI director Robert Mueller has subpoenaed records from Deutsche Bank as part of his investigation into possible Russian involvement in the U.S. presidential election campaign.

The report in the Handelsblatt newspaper cites only "informed circles." Several other media outlets had similar reports, also citing anonymous sources familiar with the situation.

A bank spokesman said Tuesday that Deutsche

Bank had no comment on the Handelsblatt report. The bank said additionally in a statement that "Deutsche Bank takes its legal obligations seriously and remains committed to cooperating with authorized investigation into this matter."

Handelsblatt said it was not clear whether the records demand sought information regarding U.S. President Donald Trump or on other members of his circle. It said the subpoena was received several weeks ago.

Deutsche Bank has been one of the few major banks willing to regularly lend to Trump, who alienated large banks in New York with his past financial troubles. Over the years, the bank's cumulative loans to Trump added up to billions, and

loans originally worth \$300 million remain outstanding.

In May, five Democratic members of the House of Representatives sent a letter to Deutsche Bank CEO John Cryan asking the bank to turn in any records relating to Trump's accounts and any ties to Russia. The bank refused, saying it had to respect legal requirements to keep client data private.

Mexico rights commission denounces 2016 military abuses

MEXICO CITY (AP) — The National Human Rights Commission on Tuesday alleged abuses were committed in a 2016 case by members of the military, which is heavily involved in prosecuting

Mexico's war on drug gangs.

The commission said that according to testimony from a father, elements of an airborne unit detained his son, nephew and two other people last year inside a home in Tepatlitan de Morelos in Jalisco state.

Its statement said two hours later three of the detained were hustled into the back of a vehicle while the fourth was released. Two days later, two of those taken away were found dead on a ranch and the third was hospitalized with wounds.

The commission alleged multiple rights violations in the case: arbitrary detention; sexual violence and torture; forced disappearance; and extrajudicial killings.

Thumbs-up from athletes for IOC decision on Russia

PARIS (AP) — Athletes who were denied medals at the Sochi Olympics because of a Russian doping program that propelled its countrymen to the podium are giving a broad thumbs-up to the International Olympic Committee's decision to let Russians compete at the upcoming Pyeongchang Games under a neutral flag.

Stuart Benson, who raced on the British four-man bobsled team that placed fifth in Sochi but is now in line for a bronze medal after two Russian sleds were disqualified, said: "It sounds like a really good compromise to me."

It's possible that you and your partner would have reached a different contract on this deal. It came up late in the cocktail hour and North had been enjoying himself. He had a blind spot over South's three spade bid and thought that South had opened one spade and rebid hearts,

instead of the other way around. Anyway, the play's the thing.

The opening club lead went to South's jack. South had only been drinking iced tea. Declarer cashed the ace and king of hearts, and then ruffed a heart in dummy. This was followed by the ace and king of diamonds, and then a third diamond. East saw no point in ruffing, so he discarded a club as declarer ruffed low.

South cashed the ace of clubs and led a club to dummy's king. That was nine tricks in the bag with two hearts, two diamonds, and three clubs, along with a ruff in each hand. Declarer still had the queen-jack-seven of trumps remaining and there was no way for the defense to prevent him from scoring another trump trick. Four spades bid and made!

East-West didn't feel too bad about this, telling themselves that South would surely have taken nine tricks in the more traditional contract of three no trump.

Storing bacon

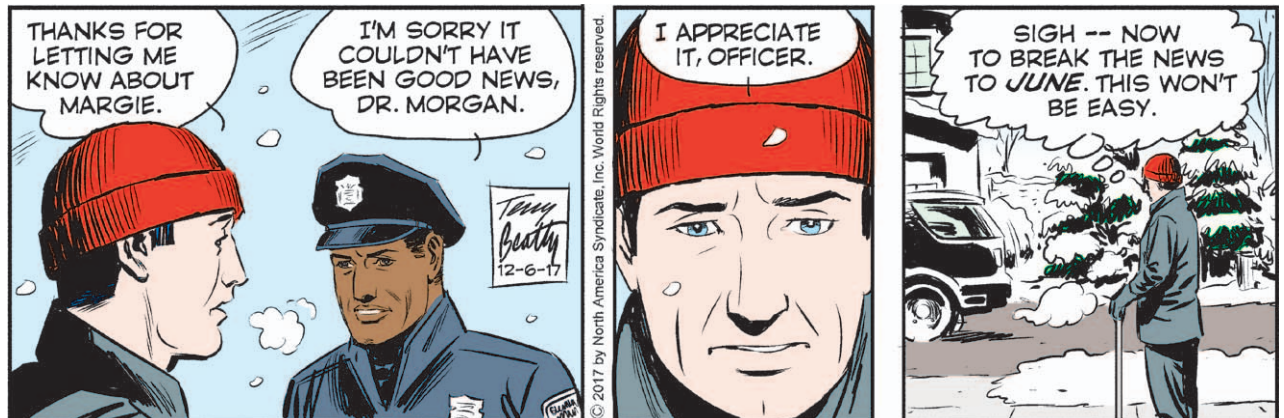
