Shady Grove Post Office to close--for good--on Tuesday?

The Shady Grove Post Office, which has survived several attempts by the U.S. Postal Service to close its doors over the years, appears to have finally lost its battle.

Shady Grove resident Auley Rowell, who rents the facility to the postal

service, told the **Perry News-Herald** Thursday that he was notified by a Postal Service official that morning that they would not be renewing their lease, which expires Friday, May 31, and would be vacating the building Tuesday, May 28.

It is unclear at this time what will happen to the approximately 80 patrons who have post office boxes at the facility, including whether they will receive service in Perry or

Downtown treasure back in local hands

The Bloodworth building has anchored the corner of Green Street and Jefferson for more than a century.

In recent years, the building passed to out-of-town owners and has stood vacant.

Empty, but not forgotten. Now, it is getting a new lease on life with the announcement this week of its sale to longtime downtown businessman Doyle Lundy, owner of Johnson's Bakery.

"It is simply too much a part of Taylor County history to let it go," Lundy said.

"I'm afraid that if it had sat empty and unattended much longer, we'd have another Emporium (referring to another downtown landmark building that had to be torn down due to disrepair). I just didn't want that to happen."

Lundy said his goal is to restore the building to its original condition, with retail space available on the bottom floors.

"We didn't live in town, but when we came to Perry on the weekends,

Man counter sues county for \$2.5 million in damages

A Cedar Island property owner, against whom the Taylor County Commission filed a foreclosure in April 2012 on unpaid fines resulting from code violations at the property,

has filed a counter-claim against the county alleging physical and mental damages in excess of \$2.5 million.

The case involves a parcel located at 105 Cedar Island

Rd. owned by Timothy Brooks, a resident of Cheboygan, Mich.

According to county officials, the code

A tribute to my brother

William "Bill" Merrill never called Perry home. In truth, he never had a chance to put down roots in any particular town.

But he found a home in the military, joining the National Guard at age 17.

As his young brother Paul Merrill—who has called Perry home for the past 58 years--describes it, "the Guard suited him to a 'T'...he was very good at it."

When the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor, Merrill's unit was brought into the regular Army and he became an instructor, preparing men for deployment overseas.

While today finds many families planning to take advantage of the upcoming three-day Memorial Day weekend with BBQs and fishing trips, Paul Merrill wants to take this opportunity to express his gratitude for the sacrifice his brother—and thousands of other soldiers just like him—made in service to their country.

Bill was killed in a bloody battle on foreign shores 68 years ago. He had just turned 23.

"He was the star of the family. I just knew he was coming back (from the war). I was just as certain that I would not. But, I made it back and he didn't," Paul said.

"Bill had become a sergeant and aspired to become an officer. He really loved the Army. His unit went from Camp Blanding (staging area) to Fort Benning, Ga. He didn't like school, but in the Army, he went to every school he could. While at Benning, he ran the company for a while and taught people a number of things, including the new Garand rifle.

"I had a chance to visit him there and saw him teaching officers the Garand. When he was 20, he went to Officers Training School. I had the pleasure of seeing him graduate.

"Bill trained further and then he was sent to Fort McClellan, Ala. He trained

"Taps" will be played as a tribute and remembrance to soldiers killed in action.

Remember when...

Home remedies

Band-Aids.

Alcohol swabs.

And aspirin.

These were the things you'd find in my grandmother's First-Aid kit.

A wad of wet snuff.

A cross made of smut and turpentine.

And a teaspoon of mustard or vinegar.

These items were not in her First-Aid kit, but they were part of the home remedies she used to cure whatever was ailing us.

If one of us was unfortunate enough to be stung by a bee or bitten by a spider or any other insect, my grandmother quickly ushered us across the street to my Cousin Frances' house for treatment. "Hurry up," she would yell, dragging us behind her. "If we don't hurry and put something on that bite mark, it might get infected."

"It's not that bad," we'd respond, in an effort to avoid having to see Cousin Frances. "It'll be okay."

"Are you a doctor?" my grandmother asked in a satirical tone.

"No," was my answer. "But..."

"Ain't no buts," she'd cut us off. "If it gets infected you'll be wishing for a doctor."

As we walked across the road to Cousin Frances, all I could think about was the huge wad of snuff in her mouth.

"Momma, why does she have to take the snuff out of her mouth?" I asked a bit concerned. "Can we just get the snuff out of the can and mix it with water?"

"No," my grandmother answered quickly. "It only works with dipped snuff."

I don't know if this was a proven truth, but my grandmother and Cousin Frances certainly believed it.

Marking a painful spot with a cross made of smut and then tracing it in turpentine was one way to get rid of pain and stiff joints. Whenever one of us received a bruise, a burn, or a cut, my grandmother, Cousin Reatha, or Cousin Fannie Lou would reach inside the wood-burning stove and scoop up a handful of ash then draw a cross over the bruise. They would then trace the cross with turpentine. I can't recall whether or not this really eased the pain, but in our minds, we certainly felt cured.

When it came to a cure for everything under the sun, nothing came close to the healing power of mustard and vinegar. A teaspoon of mustard could fix a stomachache, including curing heartburn and indigestion. And, if you could tolerate the taste, vinegar was a sure-fire cure for any ailment you came down with.

If you had a sore throat, take a teaspoon of vinegar.

Headache? Take a teaspoon of vinegar.

Toothache? A teaspoon of vinegar.

What about a chipped fingernail? You guessed it. A teaspoon of vinegar.

Today, for my minor aches and pains, I open the medicine cabinet and pull out my first aid kit containing Band-Aids, alcohol swabs and aspirin. However, for the real aches and pains, I find a snuff user, a wood-burning stove or a kitchen cabinet.

So, the next time you're feeling a little under the weather, take a teaspoon of mustard or vinegar and call me in the morning.

troops and was very good at it. He probably could have stayed there, maybe for the duration of the war. But he felt guilty, sending troops overseas and staying here himself.

"He put in three or four requests for overseas duty. They finally sent him.

"He soon made 1st lieutenant. His real ambition was to be a captain and have his own company of men by the time he turned 23.

"He had his company when he turned 23 on Feb. 26, 1945, and the next month, in March, he was killed in action by Japs."

If Bill were alive today, he would most likely be the first person to tell you he

was no hero.

However, his actions that long ago day in the Phillipines were nothing short of heroic and deserving of honor.

"Having met a larger force, his company was in danger of being wiped out. My brother went aside and drew fire to himself, thereby saving many, if not most, of the lives of his men. In doing so, he lost his own life.

"My brother loved his country, the Army and his men. His girlfriend at the time—they had plans to marry upon his return—had heard of his death through a mutual friend, a major. She wrote immediately to my parents in Miami. They wired the war department and were assured Bill was

alive.

"They, of course, were greatly relieved. Then, sadly, they got the bad news and his Purple Heart.

"I didn't learn of his death until I returned home from my tour of duty in the European theatre.

"I sought many years to get Bill a medal. However, details from the Pacific were sketchy and I failed. Our younger brother finally succeeded and got him the Bronze Star.

"Bill, if anyone, richly deserves the Medal of Honor. He earned it. Thankfully the nation as a whole is really into thanking those who served and especially those who died."

Paul concluded, "Bill, I salute you—and all who served!"

Greenville. Perry Postal Service officials referred questions to the North Florida District and a call to that office was not returned prior to presstime. (Any updates as to what Shady Grove residents can expect moving forward will be published online at www.perrynewspapers.com.)

The postal service held a public meeting in the community on Feb. 11 to discuss the future of the Shady Grove Post Office.

After that meeting, officials announced that the post office would remain open, but only for two hours per day, from 9-11 a.m.

Property owner fined for code violations

enforcement officer was notified by an area resident that "the property contained numerous abandoned boats in a state of disrepair and that the structure was unsafe and constituted a hazard to nearby residents."

A hearing on the property was held on April 12, 2011, before then Taylor County Hearing Officer William Blue, who resigned his position last year to run for county judge.

Code Enforcement Officer Don Love "testified that Mr. Brooks' property was in violation of [the county's land development code] pertaining to coastal high hazard areas because the pilings supporting the home were unsafe because of cracks in the concrete pilings," Blue said in his order against Brooks.

"Both the home and the boats present a potentially unreasonable hazard to

adjoining homes on Cedar Island in the event of a hurricane or storm surge," Blue said.

In his order, he gave Brooks 35 days to correct the issues before implementing a \$125 per day fine for the abandoned boats as well as a \$125 per day fine for the pilings.

The fines had accumulated to more than \$82,000 by the time the commission filed for foreclosure.

According to County Attorney Conrad Bishop, Brooks filed a response to the county's suit with a counterclaim, and he filed for a dismissal of the counterclaim. The judge then gave Brooks a chance to file a second response, to which Bishop has since responded.

In his counterclaim, Brooks, who is representing himself, states, "The defendant and counter plaintiff is seeking full re-enumeration for inflicted damages (both physical

and mental) and punitive damages. This action has been forced [sic] extended damage to Dr. Brooks [sic] health (at this point physical collapse due to heat stroke, and gangrene and blood poisoning due to being intentionally subjected to lethal cold conditions requiring Dr. Brooks to be confined to bed for most of the last eight months and financial damages)."

Brooks also claims that he has contacted federal authorities, including the FBI, to investigate the situation, stating that the county and its agents have violated his constitutional rights.

Additionally, the counterclaims states, "The county is aware of at least 1000 other properties in the county in worse condition which are not being prosecuted. The county is aware of hundreds to thousands of boats (or more) in the county which have not had the same scrutiny or

prosecution. The county is aware of tens of thousands to millions of items which can be 'potentially hazardous' to others."

In his answer to the counterclaim, Bishop denied 18 of Brooks' allegations and claimed the county is "without knowledge" of 35 others. "The plaintiff/counter-defendant alleges the counterclaim filed by the defendant/counter-plaintiff fails to state a cause of action upon which relief can be granted," Bishop stated.

At Tuesday's meeting, the board agreed to have Bishop file for a final hearing on the suit. County officials have said on several occasions before and during the foreclosure proceedings that the reason for the suit was not about recovering the fines or taking the property, but to get the desired improvements made to the property.

Keaton Beach Fishing Report

Fishing couldn't have been better recently

Wow! It's 92 degrees before Memorial Day and there is no global warming if you listened to Ole George W. Bush and friends?

Fishing couldn't be much better than the last two weeks on board One More Cast as we have had 14 limits in 16 days of charter.

Sunday, Luke, J.P. and Jake Coker of Big Coker Charters fished with me and used Back Bay Thunders and live pinfish in 3.5 - 4.5 feet of water to land 20 trout weighing 38.3 pounds! Monday, I had 20 weighing 36.4 pounds for B.K., Brian and Bear Isom of Valdosta, Ga. We also fished live pinfish under Back Bay Thunders.

There are a lot of small sharks, catfish and ladyfish mixed in, but we only threw back 4 shorts Monday. I caught two nice trout on Panhandle Moon five-inch Shad Assassins under an Original Cajun Thunder. The water temperatures are over 80 degrees now and the grass is shedding and there is a bunch of floating grass out there, but it isn't affecting the trout fishing.

David Bosch of Tifton, Ga., reported that he fished with Chris Norman and his son Carter last Saturday and Sunday morning and they picked up 13 keeper trout

and 2 slot reds the first day and added another 6 trout on Sunday.

Most were caught on pinfish, but a few on assorted plastics and gulps. They fished from 2-7 feet of water and had their best luck with the trout out deep. Here are a few reports from Keaton Beach Marina which I couldn't run last week:

April 26 - Archie and Patsy Davis of Lee had a limit of trout on Chartreuse tail white Gulp in 4-6 feet under a Cajun.

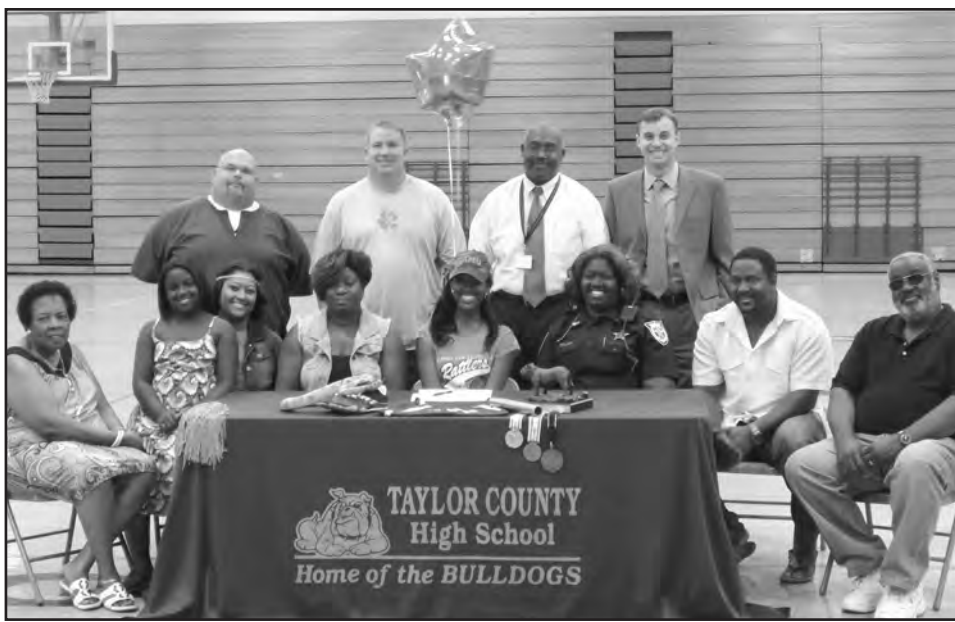
April 27 - George Miguel and his parents Bonifacio and Crispina Miguel from the Philippines caught 12 trout with one 24 inches long.

May 10 - William and Belinda Felts of Adel, Ga., had a limit of trout and one Spanish using live shrimp under a float in four feet of water.

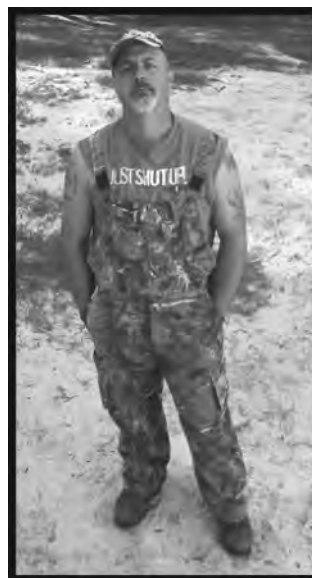

Story issues hard to ignore in 'Star Trek Into Darkness'

Back in 2009, director J.J. Abrams did what many people thought impossible. He rebooted the reversed television and film series, "Star Trek," with new actors filling in the roles of Captain Kirk, Mr. Spock and the rest of the crew of the U.S.S. Enterprise. And he did it in a way that honored the past and blazed a trail to a new and untraveled future, drawing in both hardcore fans and newcomers.

In "Star Trek," a man bent on revenge travels back in time to before the events of the original series, drastically altering the course of history before being stopped by Kirk and company. The resulting "alternative timeline" allows Abrams and those who follow him to play in the "Star Trek" sandbox by putting their own spins on familiar events or speed off into completely new arenas.

So, veteran fans and new ones alike have been eagerly anticipating Abrams' sequel, the ominously titled "Star Trek Into Darkness," to see just what he and writers Roberto Orci, Alex Kurtzman and Damon Lindelof would do next.

Having now seen the new film, I can say Abrams has a firm grasp on his visual presentation of the "Star Trek" universe, building off the themes and concepts he and the crew developed for the first film. Additionally, while the cast had the unenviable task of jumping into such well-recognized roles as these, they once again feel entirely at home in their personas and should be commended from top to bottom.

Unfortunately, while "Star Trek," from its earliest days, has been known for telling intellectual stories through the medium of science fiction, the story for "Star Trek Into Darkness" seems to have been given the least amount of attention. Plot holes large enough to fly a starship through combined with muddled motivations for the primary villain provide problems that simply can't be overlooked as the movie limps to its conclusion.

"Star Trek Into Darkness" looks great, sports plenty of great action and features all-around solid performances, but the finished product is akin to a getting behind the wheel of a Shelby Mustang and discovering they put the engine of a Honda Civic under the hood. Thanks to the suspension and high-end tires, the ride may still feel great, but you know that it could have been so much more.

The story picks up some time after the conclusion of the first film, with Kirk (Chris Pine) captaining the U.S.S. Enterprise with Spock (Zachary Quinto), Lt. Uhura (Zoe Saldana), Dr. McCoy (Karl Urban), Scotty (Simon Pegg), Sulu (John Cho) and Chekov (Anton Yelchin).

On their latest mission, Kirk bends (if not breaks) a few rules, which threatens not only his career but his friendship with Spock.

Back on Earth, Kirk and company find themselves embroiled in an attack on the United Federation of Planets by one of their own, an agent named John Harrison (Benedict Cumberbatch, BBC's "Sherlock") who is seeking revenge for unknown wrongs he feels has been committed by its officers.

Kirk and the Enterprise are armed with new experimental weapons by Admiral Alexander Marcus (Peter Weller, "RoboCop") and sent on a revenge mission of their own, one which could spark all-out war if it goes wrong.

First the good. Like I said, the visual effects and the action are top-notch, featuring space battles, phaser fights and even a foot chase or two. The re-imagining of the Enterprise's interior is once again sleek and fits into the larger visual presentation of the 23rd century.

William Shatner and Leonard Nimoy may have had their offset issues, but their chemistry on screen was one of the great aspects of the original series and Pine and Quinto manage to capture that as well. While the story here has at times too many irons in the fire, one of the benefits of the scattered plotlines is that each of the main crew gets time to shine, which ultimately helps the film succeed where it does despite its flaws.

Series newcomer Cumberbatch is wonderful in BBC's "Sherlock" and brings the same commanding presence to his role here, a role that has been under significant scrutiny over just who is he portraying, something I won't reveal here.

In fact, many of my issues with the story can't be fully explained here without spoiling major plot points, so I'm going to have to be admittedly vague. Where to begin? The film's primary villain has reasons why he has done what he did in the past, and while lines have definitely been crossed, they really don't explain why he is doing what does, nor why he would even think they were good ideas in the first place. A villain's motives don't have to make sense to the good guys, but they should at least appear to make sense to the villain.

Second, the writers seem completely incapable of measuring distances and determining the time necessary to cross them. For instance, the trip to a location seems to take several hours, while the return trip takes about four minutes. While we're on the subject, the writers really need a better grasp of the vast difference between ships traveling at warp speed and those that aren't. Sure, that could be a nerdy complaint, but warp speed is an integral facet of the "Star Trek" universe and the plot of the movie itself, so please get it right.

Finally, I can't even be vague about the final act or two of the film with spoiling significant details, so suffice it to say the script seems to collapse into a series of convenient events, ones that make little sense in the context of the movie but serve to push the story forward by brute force rather than intelligent story telling. It's similar to the moment in "Star Trek" when Kirk gets beamed down to a planet that just happens to be same one where Old Spock has been banished (not to mention being beamed down within a mile of his location). Only this time around, we get about five or six such instances in a row.

I do have to say that there are more than a few inventive allusions to the original series and movies that will entertain fans, including the presence of Carol Markus (Alice Eve, "Men in Black 3"), who was revealed to be the mother of Kirk's son in "Wrath of Khan."

In fact, despite its problems, I did actually enjoy watching "Star Trek Into Darkness." It was only after I left the theater that the nagging issues came to the foreground, and they're serious enough that I can't simply ignore them now. I wish Abrams and company hadn't ignored them while making the film.

The film is rated PG-13 for intense sequences of sci-fi action and violence.

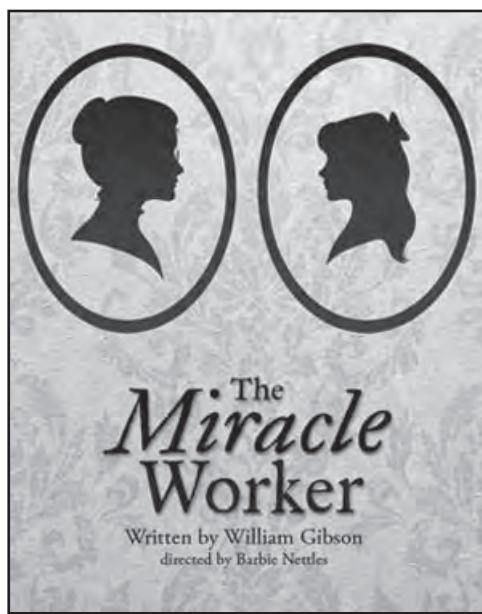
performs with several local groups and has published articles in "Instrumentalist Magazine."

this weekend at the movies

After only getting four movies in wide release over the past three weeks combined, we get three this weekend for the busiest week of the Hollywood summer so far.

Up first is "Epic," the latest animated film from Blue Sky Studios, who gave us the "Ice Age" series and "Rio." The story follows a young woman (voiced by Amanda Seyfried, "Les Misérables") who finds herself shrunk and lost in a world of tiny woodland people just as they face an attack from an evil force. You always risk backlash when you name your film something like "Epic," but it does look like they're going to do their best to live up to the moniker. Unfortunately, the film's trailer seems to have a case of split-personality, combining powerful music and scenes of beautifully animated action with lowbrow slapstick humor. With a solid voice cast that also includes Josh Hutcherson, Colin

Farrell, Christoph Waltz and Beyonce Knowles, hopefully the film has a better idea of what it wants to do than its trailer.

The movie is rated PG for mild action, some scary images and brief rude language.

Next is "Fast & Furious 6," which brings car thief Dominic Toretto (Vin Diesel) and former agent Brian O'Conner (Paul Walker) out of retirement when Luke Hobbs (Dwayne Johnson) informs them that Letty Ortiz (Michelle Rodriguez), who supposedly died in the fourth movie, is alive and connected to a violent car theft ring led by Owen Shaw (Luke Evans, "Immortals"). The "Fast & Furious" franchise has had its ups and downs, but "Fast Five" was by far the best sequel yet, so here's hoping that returning director Justin Lin, who was also responsible for the much less stellar fourth installment, can find similar success this time around.

The film is rated PG-13 for intense sequences of violence and action and mayhem throughout, some sexuality and language.

Finally, we have "The Hangover III," the much anticipated conclusion to the trilogy no one could have predicted would exist before the first film became the highest grossing R-rated comedy in history. Rather than simply doing the same thing again like they did in "The Hangover II," there's a bit more plot this time around for the Wolfpack as they try to track down Mr. Chow (Ken Jeong) before they're all killed by an irate mobster. The first two films combined for more than \$500 million at the box office in the U.S. alone, so there's no reason to think this won't significantly add to that total.

The movie is rated R for pervasive language including sexual references, some violence and drug content, and brief graphic nudity.

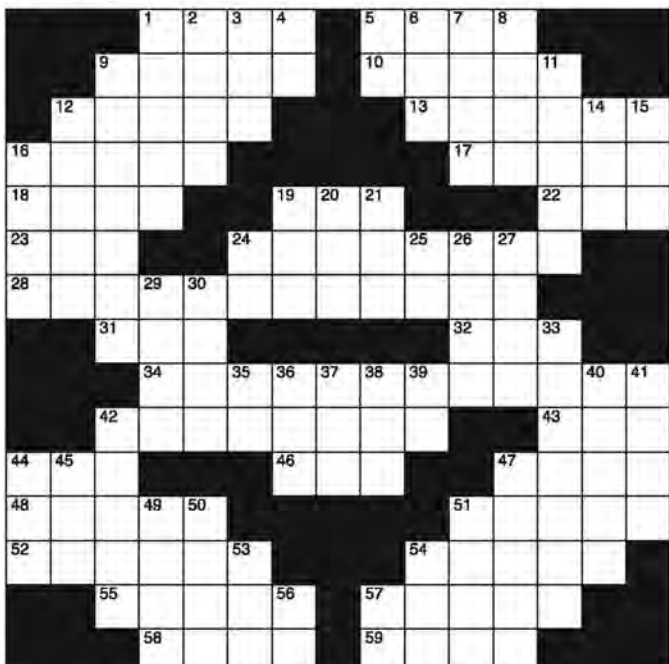

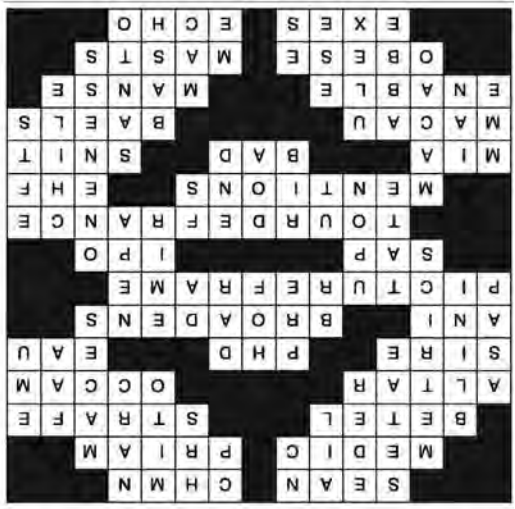
