Attorneys for the city of Venice are objecting to the filing of a brief in the Sunshine case by the Reporters Committee for Freedom of the Press. The brief, written by Judith Mercier of Holland and Knight in Orlando, supports plaintiff Anthony Lorenzo's request for payment of attorney fees in the Sunshine case.

On Friday, Judge Robert Bennett scheduled a hearing on a motion to deny the filing for Friday, Aug. 21.

The Reporters Committee is a nonprofit organization that provides representation, guidance and research in First

Amendment and freedom of information litigation cases.

The brief states "in cases where ... citizens prevail, it should be the unlawful government body, not the citizen serving the public interest, who should bear the financial burden."

"When citizens — or public interest groups, the news

media, or anyone - step forward to bring such lawsuits and prevail, they must not be penalized for doing so, as a denial of attorney's fees and costs here would effectively do," wrote Mercier.

The city previously objected to a brief submitted by Charles Davis, executive director of the National Freedom of Information Coalition, but Bennett ruled his affidavit could be filed.

Conservation authorities claim that shoreline anglers are complying with a new \$9 saltwater fishing license imposed Aug. 1, but on local fishing piers and jetties, some complain about what they see as little more than a new tax.

From Aug. 1-6, the state sold 7,468 new shoreline fishing licenses, according to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.

The revenue generated from the licenses expected to be \$900,000 in its first year — will help pay for marine resource management, research and law enforcement in Florida, the FWC said.

"You take a fish from the ocean — buying a license indirectly helps put another fish back in there," said Wendy Dial, a spokeswoman for the commission in Tallahassee.

Fishing off Boardwalk Pier next to the Tom Adams Bridge Tuesday, Englewood resident John Rose wasn't buying it.

He pointed to barricades near the end of the pier that were placed there months ago, he said, because a portion of it is disintegrating.

"I don't see Florida Fish and Wildlife stocking this pond," he said, waving his rod over Lemon Bay, where anglers go to fish for pompano, mackerel and mangrove snapper. "I could see if they took some of the money to repair the piers."

Bobby Brazilian thought the new license was unfair.

"If you can't afford to buy food, how can you afford to buy a license?" he asked.



Tress, amostvaluble asset

You may have noticed recently a team of Sarasota County arborists trimming trees and palms along Harbor Drive. Having spent some time trying to become educated in the art of proper tree trimming I developed an appreciation for their knowledge, skill and talent.

The team: forester David Godson, arborist foreman Alan Blades and arborists Hong Nguyen, Ryan Burns, Corey Shelton and Dewey Bullock - do work most of us would not dream of attempting.

My first question was, "How they get from the ground up into the tree?" They do it with rope. After securing the rope around their waist and a major fork in the tree, they literally walk and pull themselves up the trunk of the tree. Once in position, they apply the principles they have been taught - and believe me, it is not just sawing off random branches.

It has to be one of the most potentially hazardous jobs a person could sign on to do. For safety, one person is required to be stationed near the tree being trimmed. Seeing this, some folks driving by commented that it was a typical government job — one person watching while one worked. It was pointed out to me that it is an OSHA requirement.

Why are they trimming the trees at all? A properly trimmed tree will allow wind to pass through it with less resistance, therefore reducing damage during high winds or storms. Proper ground clearance of the branches must also be maintained to meet codes.



Tree shape will also be improved so they look better, have better eye appeal and will grow properly. Trimmed branches and fronds are then mulched for recycling.

These arborists, who trim about 3,000 or more trees a year, have earned my respect, and I hope yours as well.

County to update flood maps



New floodplain maps for Sarasota County will be discussed in a series of public meetings beginning this fall.

Sarasota County, with support from Southwest Florida Water Management District, will present updated preliminary floodplain information and explain the basis for the findings.

The meetings are part of an initiative to revise Flood Insurance Rate Maps. The county uses floodplain infor mation for land use and zoning decisions, to help manage development in and around floodplains and wetlands, reduce flood risks, preserve land and water resources and plan for emergencies. The maps also provide valuable information to the public for decisions about purchasing and protecting property. Most of the current FIRMs are 10 to 30 years old and are outdated by natural and physical changes caused by land use, development and erosion. The updated FIRMs will replace paper flood maps for the unincorporated and incorporated areas of Sarasota County. Upon receipt of the preliminary FIRMs, the Federal Emergency Management Agency will begin its FIRM adoption process. A letter of final determination will inform Sarasota County and the public of the date when the FIRMs will be considered effective. A Regional Floodplain Management Planning and Coordination Committee that includes staff from North Port, Venice, Sarasota, the Town of Longboat Key and Sarasota County, has developed a Web site to keep the public informed about progress. SCAT nets \$1 million grant

A \$1 million grant from the U.S. Department of Transportation has been awarded to Sarasota County Area Transit to help expand the county's bus rapid transit program, according to U.S. Rep. Vern Buchanan, R-Sarasota.

'This project will help the county expand its fleet with the most fuelefficient vehicles and the latest technology," Buchanan said in a statement.

The funding was included in the 2009 Omnibus Appropriations Act passed by Congress in February.

The grant will be used to complete the alternative analysis, or planning, phase of the grant application for the Sarasota North-South Corridor Bus Rapid Transit project, SCAT general manager Anthony Beckford said. The alternative analysis must satisfy National Environmental Policy Act requirements when it is packaged with other materials for review by the DOT.

The environmental assessment process, an NEPA requirement, will start with a pair of openhouse meetings Aug. 26-27 at Selby Public Library in Sarasota. An agency meeting involving the U.S. Core of Engineers, the Southwest Florida Water Management Dis-

trict and various municipalities will be held from 1 to 3 p.m. Aug. 26, followed by the first open house from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. The second open house is scheduled the next day from 10 a.m. to noon.

As part of the factgathering procedure, the public is asked to submit written comments regarding the project at the open houses. The comments will be collected and included in the alternative analysis.

Another part of the procedure involves analyzing the physical environment to determine any possible adverse impact by the project.

Beckford said the application package will be reviewed by the Federal Transit Administration, which could reject it or request certain areas be changed or modified before a letter of no prejudice is issued. The letter would enable the BRT project to be eligible for funding along with other federal projects.

Currently, the BRT project addresses only North County transit lines. It is expected to cost approximately \$82 million, Beckford said, but "could rise to \$100 million."

Beckford said the project will be underwritten by state and federal funds. If any Sarasota County money is used, it will be minimal, he said. csakowitz@ sun-herald.com





Conversation leads to arrest

Wednesday was a beautiful day in Venice. Adults were sunbathing on the beach, children were making sand castles and swimming in the warm, salty waters of the Gulf.

Scott DeDomenico was there with his girlfriend. A woman who would overhear a conversation between DeDomenico and another man who was there also.

That conversation would change the day for both of them.

Venice Police Department detectives Ronald Perisho and Alek Gregoire, wearing plain clothes and riding in an unmarked car, were conducting follow-ups on several investigations when a call came over the radio from **DeDomenico**

a concerned citizen.

"The witness said she heard DeDomenico and others talking about narcotics and partying and then they left for the beach parking lot," Perisho said.

The witness followed and saw them take something out of a bag in the car. There was an exchange and then they shook hands.

Perisho called off all marked cars in the area and pulled into the Sharky's parking lot.

"The witness met us in the parking lot and told us the suspects were still on the beach," Perisho said.

Gregoire accompanied the witness to the beach, where she pointed out DeDomenico, his girlfriend and another young man and woman and an older couple.

"Once she pointed them out to us, we asked her to leave the area and I stayed in contact with her," Perisho said. "This witness was fantastic. She talked about all of the families and children at the beach and how she was totally disgusted by what happened.'

Perisho called for one patrol car. As lightning streaked the sky, the group packed up and headed for the parking lot, where officers were waiting for them.

DeDomenico gave officers consent to search him and his girlfriend's car. Perisho said DeDomenico was very cooperative.

"We found nothing on him," he said. "But when we searched the car we found a bag containing numerous prescription and nonprescription drugs in the back seat."

They also found marijuana seeds and residue in the car along with a homemade marijuana pipe and a crack pipe in a sock.

DeDomenico's girlfriend said it all belonged to him and that the other man had solicited them.

DeDomenico told officers that he and his girlfriend had gone for a walk on the pier when the other guy ask them for marijuana. DeDomenico told him he didn't have any.

"When they went back to the beach and into the water, the guy approached DeDomenico again and told him he was a little 'dope sick' and needed something," Perisho said. "DeDomenico said he gave him two 15 milligram Roxicodone tablets. He said he was just trying to help out a brother.'

The other man gave officers consent to search him and his bags. Nothing was found and he was released.

"He'd already taken the pills, so there was nothing for us to find," Perisho said.

DeDomenico, 31, 100 block The Corsco, Venice, was charged with possession of a controlled substance with intent to sell or deliver, possession of a controlled substance and possession of drug paraphernalia. Bond was set at \$3,620.

Tikko joins SCSO

Tikko, a male Hungarian Sable Shepherd, has joined the Sarasota County Sheriff's Óffice K-9 Unit.

Beigel and Tikko trained at the K-9 Academy for 12 weeks in

Drivers, bicyclists need to get along

e were struck — maybe that's a bad choice of words — by a recent letter writer who complained to our daily papers about all those darn bicyclists clogging up the roadways.

A little horrified, really, since he suggested vaguely that some type of "road rage" might be justified at times. (He also mocked tight-fitting Spandex biking outfits, but we'll chalk that up to a matter of personal taste.)

The reaction was swift from the biking community, which is understandable. Anyone who has pedaled along a main road knows how fragile you feel while 2-ton sedans are whipping past at 45-55 mph. The vulnerability only heightens the hope that drivers know the rules of the road and respect a biker's right to a narrow lane of pavement.

Most motorists do. Most understand and are extremely courteous to all fellow travelers. A few, though, just can't seem to resist an obnoxious honk, or a shouted expletive or hand gesture. What jerks.

The more bicyclists the merrier. Biking is fun. It is a healthy activity. It doesn't use up limited resources. We'd be delighted to see thousands more on the roads, but they also have to follow the rules. Cyclists who ride stupidly just fan potential road rage.

All of us who travel with the benefit of internal-combustion engine need to lighten up — that's a good general guideline, no matter the situation. All who share the road should know the law and rules of etiquette.

Here are some basics:

• Bicycles are classified as vehicles under Florida law. They have the same rights and obligations as motor vehicles.

• That means cyclists may ride in the roadway, as close the side as practicable, but not on the paved shoulder.

• It also means cyclists have to obey all traffic laws. Stop at red lights and stop signs. Ride on the right (except in certain conditions, like a left turn or traveling on a two-lane, one-way street). Yield the right of way. Motorists may assume a biker knows this, but be careful all the same. It's always best to drive defensively. A little extra caution may avoid an accident. Better safe, etc.

• It's illegal to ride while wearing headphones, or without at least one hand on the handlebars.

• A bike must have a headlight and a rear reflector at night.

• Only one person to a bike, unless an adult is riding with a child in a backpack or child seat.

• Anyone under 16 must wear a helmet. Everyone else should.

• On sidewalks (which are generally considered more dangerous than roads, because people pulling out of

driveways may not be aware of riders there), cyclists have the same rights as pedestrians, but must yield the right of way and shout before passing.

• On the road, bikers can travel two-abreast only if they are not impeding traffic. It's single file if there are cars on the road.

• Motorists are required to pass a cyclist with no less than 3 feet of clearance. If no other traffic is on the road, it's OK to pull to the left of the center line.

• If a motorist thinks it may be unsafe to pass, it is. Slow down and wait for a safer opportunity. But try not to follow too closely than "reasonable" behind the bicycle. That's dangerous too.

As the Florida Bicycle Association advises, if you are frustrated by having to slow down for a bicycle, "Take a deep breath; you have nothing to lose but stress." That's always good advice.

I drove to Publix. I purchased a potted plant, a greeting card and milk and picked up a prescription. The nice lady at the counter said, "Fran, it's nice to see vou," and she kissed me on the cheek.

I got into my car, closed the door and reached over my body for my seatbelt. I learned I needed to open a car door to get my right arm and hand in place to buckle up. Once I did that I realized I couldn't reach the door handle to close the door. I unbuckled and pulled the door closer, rebuckled and was on my way.

I recall the process was different when I started my journey as the car door started to close after me when I got in the car. I knew then I'd have to face each situation and solve each problem one at a time.

When I got home and looked at my odometer, I saw I had traveled exactly 2 miles. I smiled to myself knowing for sure I could do anything.

When my friend Kathy was visiting me from Cleveland, Ohio, she felt that driving would be easier if I had a knob on my steering wheel. She got me one and installed it. Turning corners is much easier.

One day at the Senior Friendship Centers someone said, "Hey Fran, I see you have a necking knob on your wheel." I never heard that term before. She said when she was a teenager, guys put the knob on their steering wheel so they could keep their arm around their girl even when they were turning the corner.

So, when you see me around town, I'm the one with the cute white convertible with a handicapped sticker and a steering wheel with a necking knob on it.

Funding

Funding for the program would come from one-half percent of the city's capital improvement plan "from the areas of local parks and recreation, transportation, community conservation and government facilities." The language was gleaned from other municipal government policies and does not directly related to the city budget, so its fiscal impact is unknown at this time.

It's akin to implementing a "percent for art" policy under which 1 percent of the construction cost for art is a standard, but the amounts vary widely. Council would have final say over the amount budgeted, under the draft policy.

Staff liaison James Hagler, director of historical resources at the Venice Archives and Area Historical Collection, told the task force the city manager requires a three-month review period before bringing forth new ordinances in front of city council for its consideration. ggiles@



affidavit the case is considered "vitally important" for the preservation of the various open meetings laws across the nation.

"First, it epitomized the challenge of applying open-government laws in the modern technical era. It is the first reported case where a court has ordered elected officials to surrender personal computers for the purpose of retrieving public records," Davis wrote.

"Second, a provision in the settlement agreement achieved in this case represents the first instance where government officials are prohibited form utilizing private e-mail accounts to conduct public business. That this provision is enforceable via a final judgment entered by a court of law is particularly important.

'Open-government advocates across the nation have expressed interest in this case for the purpose of educating governmental officials of



'The settlement reached ... will be heralded as a significant achievement under the right-to-know laws. More important, the case will provide other citizens with the ability to incentivize private attorneys to accept similar cases for litigation and enforcement of the open-government laws."

Attorney Andrea Mogensen requested Davis' testimony in support of her application for attorney's fees and costs, and the use of a multiplier for cases of great public significance.

Her attorney team, which includes legal consultant Michael Barfield and Matthew Leish and Amy Carstensen, both from Carlton Fields, seeks \$2.2 million in attorney fees and costs.

Raise it

There are some exemptions. You need one only if you're between age 16 and 64. If you use live bait and a pole without a reel, you don't need one.

If you can prove that you receive food stamps, Medicaid or cash assistance, or are on active duty, you're exempt.

At the El Jobean Fishing Pier Tuesday, pier fishing was on the "to-do" list for John Gerstung of North Port and his two grandsons from Texas later.

As far as Gerstung was concerned, the new license law poses no problem. A saltwater fishing license for boaters has been in effect for about 20 years.

"I've had one for years for a boat," he said. "I've always bought one."

Bud Hendrickson of North Port has been fishing from the El Jobean Pier for the past 25 years.

"If they use the money for what they say they're going to use it for, there's no problem," Hendrickson said.

He also favored raising the price for nonresident fishing licenses. Part of the local attraction for visitors is the fishing, and more license money means more money to support fishing in general.

"If we go other places, we have to pay exorbitant prices," he said.

Then again, the issue was a simple one for Hendrickson. He's over 65, so he's exempt from the new

law.

Wrong time

Tom Robertroy was on the Boardwalk Pier Tuesday and said the \$9 license is a small price to pay if something good comes out of it.

Although it isn't a cheap sport, for some people fishing is their only entertainment, he said.

"Bait isn't free," he said. "They've got to spend money to come out here."

The license pre-empts a \$15 to \$25 fee the federal government will begin imposing in 2011 for states without an approved licensing system, according to Henry Cabbage, an FWC spokesman.

Revenue from the new license will stay in Florida, and the state will qualify for matching funds, Cabbage said.

"The reality is fisheries are getting depleted, and this is one way to put money back into the state for those who like to fish," Dial said.

But Rose argues that with the economy in a shambles, this is the wrong time for a new license.

"I just can't see what they put back in the ocean to offset the fee for fishing," he said.

Complicated

While saltwater fish restocking - or enhancement — initiatives are on on the drawing board, they're still 10 to 15 years away from development, according to Lee Schlesinger, a spokesperson for the FWC Division of Marine Fisheries Management in Tallahassee. The agency is responsible for maintaining the wild stock of fish.

Fish enhancement stocking is paid for by licenses, but efforts to restock have been more successful in lakes and rivers than in saltwater, Schlesinger said.

"Because of the diversity of saltwater species, it's complicated," he said. "We've had some positive results. The technology is getting better."

came to the Englewood Bait House Tuesday to buy a license but the establishment, along with many others, no longer sells them, he learned. That's because the 50 cents netted for each license sold isn't worth the trouble, he said he was told.

"I can't find one at any of the bait and fishing shops," he said. "They should sell them where people are fishing. If they make it easier to buy them, more people would buy them."

Licenses are for sale at county tax collector's offices, Walmart and a limited number of other outlets.

"We climbed to assess the situation," he said. "We knew something was wrong. We started doing what the book calls for.'

The plane circled the area for two hours but the men were unable to lock in the nose wheel. They used the final half hour to burn off fuel before landing, Fryar said.

Test run

Federal Aviation Administration officials interviewed the pilot and passenger and others. Fryar said the FAA classified the landing as a "minor incident." "It was a mechanical failure in the nose gear," Fryar said. "It wasn't due to anything anybody did. A part just wore out, and we happened to be in the plane when it did. It had nothing to do with the avionics." The Cessna 310, he said, is known to have nose gear problems. He dismissed earlier media reports that said he and the pilot weren't authorized to take the plane into the air. Fryar said he spoke with the aircraft owner, Robert Williams of Land O' Lakes, after the incident. According to Fryar, Williams told the media he didn't know who was flying his plane, not that (Fryar) wasn't authorized to take it up. "We installed a new autopilot system and were going to test it," Fryar said. "I don't have a multiple engine rating, so I asked Leonard, who is a commercial pilot, to fly while I checked to see if it works or doesn't. The customer said, 'I want to make sure it's 100 percent right.' "You've got to take it up in the air to see if it holds altitude or rolls right or left. It's kind of hard to do that on the ground. "I think the customer might have been upset at that moment, realizing he is not going to be out in his plane right now. We weren't out joy riding" or putting in "currency" hours.

Airport Director Fred Watts said Thursday the aviators were putting in some hours for currency certification.

"It was an assumption on my part based on the conversation I heard between the (Venice Police) officer and the pilot," Watts said on Friday. "If they were putting time in on an autopilot, that's legitimate too."

The Gondolier Sun was unable to reach Williams for comment.

Taaffe takes fourth at worlds

Alex Taaffe witnessed the sport of rowing internationally up close and was impressed.

The 18-year-old Pine View graduate just returned from competing in the 2009 FISA World Rowing Junior Championships in Brive-la-Gaillarde, France.

Taaffe, who competes for Sarasota Crew, just missed bringing home a medal in the junior men's Eights (eightrower boat with a coxswain) as the United States grabbed a fourth-place finish.

"It was awesome," said Taaffe, who spent 10 days in France. "It as the greatest rowing experience I have ever had. Actually, one of the greatest experiences I have had, period. I was able to compete in France and compete against different countries and represent the USA."

In their first heat, the U.S. boat with Taaffe at the bow placed second with a time of 5 minutes, 51.49 seconds over the 2,000-meter (1.2-mile) course. Then in the first repechage, the United States grabbed the top spot in 5:59.05 ahead of second-place Spain by 3.70 seconds. The win qualified the U.S. for the A Final against the top five boats in the world.

In the final, the United States boat started out slow and was fifth after the first 1,000 meters then moved up to fourth place after 1,500 meters. Over the final 500 meters, Taaffe's boat had the best time of 1:24.48. Their finishing time of 5:46.82 was only .12-seconds behind Italy, who took the bronze medal.



"Our race plan wasn't as solid as the conditions as we would have like," Taaffe said. "There was a slight tail wind and we were too slow in the first 500 meters and got too far behind. We thought we could catch them but it just wasn't enough. Going into this race, we had the second fastest time in the heats. We had a really good feeling and were shooting for first or second."

Germany captured gold with a time of 5:43.62. Great Britain was second in 5:44.65 with Italy taking third in 5:46.70.

"The German team seemed like they hid their speed," Taaffe said. "In the final race, they kind of dominated."

Taaffe, who will attend and row for Princeton University in the fall, was disappointed but not with his rowing.

"We didn't leave anything out on the water," Taaffe said. "I'm not personally disappointed because I rowed my best. Our effort was there, but our execution wasn't."

Taaffe said the nerves were high the night before the final and just before the race.

"Once I got to the line, the nerves went away," he said. "Everyone was really confident and ready to start."

Taaffe was impressed with the level of competition.

"All the racing I've done has been confined against teams from the United States," he said. "When you get to this level, it is the top eight from the U.S. and the top eight from the other countries. The competition is so tough. Coming in to this we thought we were unbeatable. It seems like rowing is the main sport for high school athletes in Germany and Great Britain. Everyone in the United States inspires to be a football player while in Germany and Great Britain, they inspire to be on the international rowing team.' Germany won seven of 13 events at the junior worlds.



Seven decades as a priest ... and counting

Father Joel has been a priest longer than most local residents have been alive.

Remember that the average age in Venice is 68.

Today, Aug. 15, Father Joel celebrates his 70th anniversary in the Carmelite Order.

"Thanks be to God and the patience of the people I have tried to serve over all these years," Father Joel said about his longevity as a priest.

A Venice area resident since 1986, Father Joel has garnered numerous accolades over the years. There was a "Father Joel's Week" declared in Teaneck, N.J. He has been named both Citizen of the Year and Man of the Year in different years and different places. A street was named for him in Texas.

It is said that he brought a spark of ecumenism to an area never witnessed before.

Speed racer

In the 1960s and 1970s he won NASTAR awards for skiing. As an athlete he has also excelled in basketball, football and baseball.

Holder of a private pilot's license for many years, he flew a single-engine plane whenever he had the opportunity. He participated in flying clubs and in Civil Air Patrol.


All that pales in comparison to his most meaningful and rewarding recollections - his membership in the Carmelite Order.

As he has enjoyed diversity in his own life, he was attracted to the Carmelites initially for the order's variety of opportunities to serve.

Father Joel's apostolates have been as high school and college teaching, travel for missions and retreats, parish work, education, administration and even a 15-month sojourn to the Austrian Alps to live the life of a hermit. His order also provided him with the chance to serve in Illinois, Texas, New Jersey, Canada, Rome, Massachusetts and now Florida.

In 1986, Father Joel began his long association with Epiphany Cathedral, where he has been fondly regarded by parishoners for his spiritual Masses and outstanding homilies delivered seemingly from the heart - and without notes.

For many years, he headed Jewish/Catholic relations in the Diocese of Venice, and he is still active in the work of the marriage tribunal.

Father Joel felt the calling to become a priest when he was in fourth grade.

When he graduated from high school he went directly to the novitiate, taking his final solemn vows four years later in 1939. He was ordained to the priesthood in Chicago in 1942.

At one time, Father Joel began an apostolate to the workplace as the first director of a Carmelite chapel in Peabody, Mass., in the Northshore Shopping Center. St. Therese's chapel within the malls seats 450 people and offers three daily Masses, three Sunday vigil services, five holiday masses and confessions all day on Saturdays.

Father Joel chuckled when he said the mall was not open on Sundays in those days so, with no Masses, Sunday was his day off.

Residing currently in the 10-year-old Carmelite home on Laurel Road, Father Joel has the company of five other Carmelites. Among the 16 Carmelites who live in the general vicinity of Venice, some are still active at Our Lady of Mount Carmel, St. Francis and St. Raphael.

The Carmelite order has survived for 801 years from its humble beginnings at the top of a mountain in Palestine. One can visit Mount Carmel during a trip to the Holy Land. Carmelites look to Elijah and Mary as their inspirations and models.

Principally a group of hermits, the original Carmelites were given their rule in 1207 by St. Albert, the patriarch of Jerusalem, remaining isolated there until the Islamic resurgence in the area. Eventually the Carmelites became known as the Whitefriars (from the color of their choir robes) in the mendicant tradition of the church as they spread to all corners of the world.

Father Joel said he loves being a Carmelite because he enjoys his fellow Carmelites and their prayerful lives. And, he said, they can still either talk about God or baseball.





Three out of four executives surveyed said that just one or two typos in a resume is all it takes to put an otherwise qualified job applicant in the "fat chance" file, according to the Aug. 2 Los Angeles Times. And 40 percent of the 1,000 executives who participated in the recent Accountemps telephone survey said that even a single typo took a candidate out of the running.

A lot of people might think that pristine resumes and cover letters are hopelessly out of reach. After all, there's so much to know - everything from whether commas go inside quotation marks to how to choose between "I appreciate you taking the time to meet with me" and "I appreciate your taking the time to meet with me.'

But the truth is that most employers don't know any more than you do about such things. If you think that you need a bachelor's degree in linguistics to get it all right, think again. The only thing standing between you and a managerapproved resume is a little extra effort and one keen-eved friend.

For about 12 years off professional copy editor them all is "it's" versus

and proofreader. In recent years, I've gotten really good — good at catching other people's errors, that is. But my own work is a different matter. I make lots of typos, and I find it much harder to catch them.

We look at our own writing with a different eye. We're more focused on the big picture of what we're trying to say than the minutiae of whether every single little letter is just right. That's why a friend can often catch things you can't.

But anyone can overlook errors. That's why, even before you send it to a friend, you should do everything in your power to assure your resume is 100 percent error free.

Start by running spell-check. Your computer can catch some things the human eye can easily overlook, like repeated instances of "the" and "to," as well as easily misspelled words like "achieve." But spellcheck won't necessarily catch "lead" in place of "led," "principle" in place of "principle," "lightening" in place of "lightning" and countless other little typos that plague people's writing

That's why I believe that the most important thing you can do to assure a pristine resume is read it aloud. No, the aloud part isn't optional. By engaging your mouth, you force your eye to take in each word individually something we normally do not do when we read our own writing.

The most troublesome typos all involve and on, I've worked as a apostrophes. The king of

"its." Remember that, contrary to how we usually form possessives, the "it's" with an apostrophe is not possessive. It's a contraction of "it is" or "it has" — always. The possessive form used in a sentence like "The department met its goals" never takes an apostrophe.

"Who's" versus "whose" and "they're" versus "their" and "there" follow the same principle: If it contains an apostrophe, it can be expressed as two words. "Let's" versus "lets" is trickier because "let's" is a contraction of two words we don't use together much anymore, "let" and "us." The version without the apostrophe is a conjugated form of the verb "to let." So you'd say "Let's talk Tuesday" but "My experience lets me tackle problems effectively."

With just a few extra steps, you can avoid sending your resume straight to an executive's wastebasket.

And in case you're wondering, experts disagree on whether "I appreciate you taking the time to meet with me" is OK. But all agree that the version with "your" in place of "you" is a solid choice.

And yes, in American English, commas always go inside quotation marks.





A multigenerational musical tradition continues at the Jewish Center of Venice when Joel Reznick leads the choir for the High Holidays in September.

As newly appointed choir director, Reznick will work closely with JCV cantor Marci Vitkus, who just happens to be his daughter. Reznick officiated as cantor and choir director with Chicago Northwest Suburban Jewish Congregation before retiring with his family to Sarasota, where he joined the Sarasota Jewish Chorale. Reznick's father — Vitkus' grandfather — was a cantor and supervisor of music at the Chicago Board of Jewish Education. Reznick's grandfather sang regularly at his Chicago synagogue, and Reznick's great-uncle was a renowned cantor in St. Louis, Mo.

Ask anyone from Venice Presbyterian Church who went on one of the recent mission trips what was their most memorable experience. Chances are the answers range from seeing a different culture to capturing on camera the broad smiles of the adults and children, observing the extreme poverty of the natives, hearing their expressions of gratitude. All would be saying it was one of the most meaningful experiences they ever had.

In Guatemala, a team of 18 people spent a week installing ONIL stoves in 67 Maya homes. This was an especially important project because of the alarming number of children who were treated for burns and respiratory problems — all due to the centuries-old tradition of cooking meals using an open fire pit on the dirt floor of their one-room home.

Excessive smoke inhalation is the leading cause of death in Guatemalan children under the age of 5. Thanks to the invention of the ONIL stove, thousands of rural Maya families are living healthier lives.

"There is now a 45 percent reduction in pneumonias," said Dr. Jim Weeks.

He has traveled to Guatemala since 1991, first on medical teams and more recently on the stove project. The deadly gas carbon monoxide that families were inhaling by using the old cooking method caused acute respiratory infections.

Weeks said the first medical team traveled to Guatemala 25 years ago. Since then, the hundreds of volunteers who have worked with the Maya communities have contributed more than \$100 million of their time and energy to improving the lives of the Guatemalans.

Ruth Smith was another mem-

ber of this mission team. As a former nurse, she was particularly interested in the health of the families, especially the women and children.

"I really felt as if I was making a difference in the lives of the women," she said. "The trip made me more aware of the blessings I enjoy every day and made me appreciate them more."

Would she go on another mission trip to Guatemala? "Absolutely. I would love to," she said.

Weeks and his wife, Lois, are working on plans for two Guatemalan trips next year. He wants to use the dates of Feb. 27 to March 9 and March 13 to March 23. He is planning on 16 to 18 people on each team. Most of the teams will probably be from Venice Presbyterian Church, but he would like to open the trips to others in the community.

Frank Ebertino, an elder at Venice Presbyterian Church and a retired pharmaceutical chemist, delivered and dispensed much-needed medicines to a clinic located in another small Guatemalan village school. He, his medical student granddaughter, Meaghan, and his brother, Charles, assisted a local doctor and his nurses. The medicines were purchased with church mission funds from Blessings International, a nonprofit organization dedicated to alleviating suffering and delivering medicines worldwide.

While in Guatemala, they were the guests of Dr. and Mrs. Erick Estrada, in who's house, the Estradas care for and home-school 11 children, eight of them previously homeless. Venice Presbyterian Church and many friends are supporting this effort, in addition to supporting the construction of a medical clinic in an area where there is no medical service.

During this mission, arrangements were made with the local Habitat for Humanity office to help in the construction. Dedication of the first floor and the treatment of the first patient in the new two-story clinic will probably be in September.

THE SPINAL COLUMN EATING VEGETABLES STRENGTHENS BONES

DR. DAN BUSCH, DR. ERENE ROMANSKI CHIROPRACTOR

While numerous studies have consistently shown that eating fruits and vegetables is good for bones, a new study involving the natural pigments found in plants (called carotenoids) may have discovered the reason why. The four-year study looked at changes in bone mineral density at two areas of the hip and lumbar spine in hundreds of men and women (average age of 75 years). Researchers found that carotenoids (including alpha-carotene,

beta-cryptoxanthin, lycopene, and lutein plus zeaxanthin), particularly lycopene, were associated with some level of protection against losses in bone mineral density at the hip in men and at the lumbar spine in women. These results suggest there is a protective effect exerted by carotenoids against bone loss in older adults.

P.S. There are more than 600 different types of carotenoids, the red, orange, and yellow pigments that give plants such as carrots, strawberries, and peppers their color.

DEAR BENNY:

My wife and I purchased a four-unit rental property for \$935,000 in 2006 and put 10 percent down. The lender split our loan into 80/20 and we have a loan balance of \$650,000 and a HELOC balance of \$192,000. We have an ARM payment on our first mortgage and our monthly mortgage increases annually. It's now getting to a point where we can't pay anymore.

Currently, the property value is \$625,000, so we pretty much are upside down. The bank doesn't want to adjust our loan because it is a rental property and they won't refinance. We also have a problem with a tenant who could not pay rent because she lost her job, and it is hard to find tenants due to the economic downturn. I would like your honest advice on what I should do. Should I just walk away? — Julius

DEAR JULIUS:

It will not be a consolation to you, but I am receiving questions from many, many readers with similar issues.

Unfortunately, there is no easy answer. The federal government and many state governments have started implementing plans and programs to assist people who are in your situation, but there still remains a lot of confusion — and indeed distrust - of many of these operations. More importantly, many lenders are unwilling to work with people whose properties are underwater.

There are a number of options available — but only you and your wife can make the final decision. You can file for bankruptcy relief, but you must consult a bankruptcy attorney to determine what the consequences will be.

You can try a short sale. Contact a local real estate agent, and see if there is any market for your property. Obviously, your lenders will have to approve, and this can take some time.

You can ask the bank if they will take the property back. This is called a "deed in lieu" of foreclosure. Or you can just walk away from the property, and let the bank foreclose. However, once again, you have to determine the consequences.

Many states allow lenders to go after their borrowers for a deficiency judgment. Let's take this example: You currently owe a total of \$842,000 on both loans. If the bank sells the property for only \$600,000, that leaves a balance owing of \$242,000. This is known as a "deficiency." You have to talk with a local attorney to see if your state law permits - or prohibits — lenders from seeking that additional money from you.

I know you have already talked with your lender, and that's the first thing anyone should do. But don't talk to a local bank representative; it's difficult to find a responsible person in the lending community, but make the effort to talk with someone as high in the chain of command as possible.

EX WANTS HOUSE DEED TRANSFERRED

DEAR BENNY:

My husband and I divorced in September 2008. We own a house that was purchased in June 2006. I currently live in it, and according to our divorce decree, my ex-husband pays half the mortgage. Due to the current state of the housing market, we are very reluctant to put it up for sale and potentially lose a lot of money. He has asked me to sign a quitclaim deed and deed the house to him. We are to have the house appraised and split the

equity that we have in the house (approximately \$180,000). He is in the process of refinancing it himself, to get me off the mortgage. I will be allowed to rent the house for several more months until I find a place to live. Do you think this is a wise move? Additionally, are there any tax ramifications we need to be aware of? -Heidi

DEAR HEIDI:

Yes, it could be a wise move if you are prepared to move out of the house. Before you commit yourself to this transaction, make sure that you and your ex reach agreement — to be reduced to writing - as to how long you will be able to stay in house.

The biggest problem that divorcing couples encounter is that even if the family home is transferred to one of the parties, the mortgage lender will usually not let the transferring party off of the loan. But if your husband is prepared to refinance and have the loan in his name only, you have overcome that big hurdle.

As for tax implications, the law was amended back in the 1980s, so that no gain is recognized when the property is transferred — and thus no tax has to be paid. The basis of the transferee (you) will be added to your husband's basis for tax purposes.

But there are limitations and restrictions on

this. First, it does not apply to a spouse (or former spouse) who is a nonresident alien. Second, and perhaps more important, the transfer must be "incident to a divorce.' According to the Internal Revenue Code, a transfer of property is incident to the divorce if such transfer:

• Occurs within one year after the date on which the marriage ceases, or

• Is related to the cessation of the marriage.

The IRS has taken the position that if the transfer is required in the divorce or separation agreement, it is incident to the divorce if the transfer occurs within six years after the date on which the marriage ends.

On the other hand, for transfers that are not made under a divorce or separation instrument, or that do not occur within six years after the end of the marriage, there is a presumption that the transfer was not related to the ending of the marriage.

This is a rebuttable presumption that can be overcome if the parties can demonstrate facts to support the position that this was really part of the divorce requirements.

It is not clear from your situation whether such a transfer would, in fact, be "incident to a divorce." You should consult legal counsel for specific assistance.

BANKS OFFER FREE FORECLOSURE LISTS

DEAR BENNY:

How can I obtain foreclosure lists for my area? I thought this list was free, but everyone seems to be selling them. Any recommendations? —Diane

DEAR DIANE:

That's a surprise to me, since there are literally thousands of Internet Web sites that list foreclosed property 871,000, to be exact, when I did a search. You can also contact local banks and see what they have in their inventory.

But a word of caution: Do your homework, inspect the house, and consult legal and financial advisors before you sign a sales contract.

SHORTAGE OF **ESCROW ACCOUNT**

DEAR BENNY:

I am a senior citizen who is literally being priced out of my home of 10 years due to the consistent shortage of my escrow account. I asked my lender to remove the escrow account from my home loan, but was denied. The lender said that although it understands my desire to establish payment of property taxes on my own, its policy is to maintain an escrow account on all loans where an escrow

McLEAN, Va. — Rates on 30-year mortgages rose this week, remaining above 5 percent after reaching a record low earlier this year, Freddie Mac said Thursday.

REAL ESTATE FINANCES

The average rate on a 30-year fixedrate mortgage was 5.29 percent this week, up from 5.22 percent last week, Freddie Mac said. Last year at this time, the 30-year fixed-rate mortgage averaged 6.52 percent.

"Mortgages rose this week, remaining above 5 percent after reaching a record low earlier this year,"

higher rates could slow down any recovery, since prospective buyers would be able to borrow less money and might decide to hold off on their purchases.



account was required at the time of closing.

My issue is not about having an escrow account. My issue is that every year I am faced with an escrow shortage that affects my monthly mortgage payments.

What I don't get is why the mortgage company routinely estimates my account too low. Property taxes go up every year and obviously enough money isn't being collected; otherwise, there wouldn't always be a shortfall. And, what I also don't understand is if I have paid the entire escrow shortage, why is my monthly mortgage payment being increased as well? — Carol

DEAR CAROL:

There are two reasons why I do not like the idea of having to give a lender 1/12th of my annual property tax and insurance bill. First, most lenders do not pay interest on these escrowed funds, but clearly have the use of the money for a good part of the year. Second and perhaps more importantly - I have had too many clients whose lender either did not pay the real estate tax at all or was late in making the payment.

Many years ago, I was successful in getting the law in the District of Columbia changed, so that if you get a loan of not more than 80 percent of the purchase price of the house, you have the absolute right to pay your own real estate taxes and insurance without escrow.

But that's not the law in most states. Lenders do have the right to escrow for taxes and insurance. In fact, you may have heard lenders talk about PITI — which means your monthly payment includes loan principal, loan interest, property taxes and home insurance.

In your situation, while I understand your concerns, I cannot agree that your lender is pricing you out of your house. Unfortunately, it is the real estate tax that you have to pay whether directly or through escrow — that is causing you pain. Instead of trying to fight your lender which probably won't work — I suggest that you determine the amount of your real estate tax (and insur-

ance if applicable) and budget this on your own. If, for example, you know that 1/12th of your next real estate tax bill will cost you \$100, but if you are sending your lender only \$80 a month for escrow, put aside that extra \$20 into a savings account. At the end of the year, if the lender comes up short, you will at least have the money to pay the deficit.

Additionally, you should check with your local taxing authority. Many states and counties have programs whereby senior citizens can get a break on the amount of the real estate tax they have to pay.

Protecting concrete counters and floors

San Francisco Chronicle— Concrete has become a popular material for contemporary kitchen counters and floors. A mixture of cement, gravel and sand developed by the ancient Romans, it hardens to a rocklike, porous surface. But if not protected, concrete, like stone, will absorb salts, water and oil stains.

Old-fashioned beeswax and elbow grease can help to beautify and protect a patinaed concrete floor or countertop, giving it an attractive, albeit slippery sheen.

Two other, more effective types of sealers have been around for decades but are now improved with stronger resins. They are formulated to protect new stone, masonry and concrete surfaces from acidic citrus juices, wine or vinegar and even soap or salt stains.

The first is a topical urethane or acrylic-based transparent finish that is applied like paint; the other is a penetrating sealer that sinks into the molecular structure of concrete or stone and bonds to it to invisibly ward off spills and stains as an umbrella does rain.

Newly cured concrete floors can be protected with a penetrating sealer that, when brushed or sprayed on liberally, will sink to about 1/8 inch below the surface before it crystallizes and fuses to a slab of stone or concrete. This invisible water barrier will allow the material to breathe.

Concrete continues to

cure and harden for decades. So a freshly poured floor shouldn't be sealed under a thick film of polyurethane that locks out stains and air, because it will also lock in moisture and promote mold.

In certain instances, such as shower floors and kitchen counters, penetrating sealers chemically formulated with silane, a silicone-based molecule, to block oil as well as water are recommended.

AT A GLANCE

EXPERT OPINION: Concrete's alkaline corrosiveness, which diminishes as it dries, decomposes sealers if they're applied too soon.

"Wait for about 28 days before sealing a new concrete floor," says Terry Tomlinson, a spokesman for Prosoco, a Kansas company specializing in stone and concrete sealers.

Most sealers are topical (applied like paint on the surface) or penetrating (under the surface) types. Acrylic-based finishes are applied on the surface. They form impermeable skins that prevent evaporation if water seeps in through cracks. Trapped moisture promotes surface mold or rust in steel-reinforced concrete.

Penetrating sealers form water-repellent crystals just under the surface of masonry, concrete or stone and allow water that sinks in to evaporate.

Even protected concrete surfaces need care. "If you don't wipe off spills, they soak in deeper," Tomlinson says. Oil and water repellents generally incorporate Teflon ideally 3 percent to 4 percent — in their formula. **PROS:** Matte or highgloss topical sealers enhance and seal surfaces simultaneously.

A penetrating sealer typically won't alter appearance, and because it dries below the surface, it won't wear off easily.

Prosoco's SLX100 penetrating oil and water sealer repels soap scum on concrete shower floors. It behaves like a tough topical finish but allows moisture to evaporate.

CONS: A shiny topical sealer looks like plastic. It can blister if any moisture is trapped under it and it is hard to refinish. Penetrating sealers are easier to reapply but are less durable.

PRICE: Prosoco's SLX100 and other oil- and waterrepelling sealers range from \$50-\$150 per gallon or more.



The beautifully restored metallic blue El Camino seen here is truly one of the best I've ever encountered.


Its owner, David Kelley, formerly of the Philadelphia, Pa., area until October 2001, thinks so too.


He should know because his efforts, labor, knowledge of this particular popular model by Chevrolet, along with determination and connections with Al Collision on Placida Road, resulted in a restoration that stands out as excellent.

Kelley cleaned, sanded and painted the firewall after he personally removed its engine, transmission and drive line, and arranged for the suspension and steering parts to be powder-coated. The time required to do this allowed him to take the frame down to bare metal and prime and paint it, as well as the engine; to add some speed equipment; and more.

Every detail was accounted for, then this man reassembled the entire running gear. From start to finish to get it back on the road took five months, often with 8- to 10-hour days involved. It was a labor of love!

Kelley says, "This truck runs great, looks good and is a pleasure to drive. It (engenders) a multitude





of compliments!" I'm sure you'll agree once you've seen this beauty.

At the end of this article will be some factory specifications regarding the El Camino. Meanwhile, I'm really enthused about being able to write some of Kelley's personal background. He was born 1938 in a suburb northeast of Akron, Ohio, where his father and uncle started a trucking company that grew to having operations in New York, Pennsylvania, Michigan, Georgia and Alabama. The home office remained in Akron, where their No. 1 customer was Goodyear Tire and Rubber Co.

Age 10 saw Kelley delivering the morning edition of the Cleveland Plain Dealer until he turned 14. (Note: *Sun* Chairman of the Board Derek Dunn-Rankin and yours truly also were "Newspaper Boys.") Following the paper route period, an after-school position opened up for a mail and file clerk. He stayed there two years and transferred to become a mechanic's helper, then a class A mechanic, and was voted Union Shop Steward by his fellow mechanics.

The company had a terminal in Columbus, Ohio, where, while at college and law school, he would drive a tractor trailer during the school year. For adventure on summer break, he drove long-distance deliveries. Upon completion of his formal education, he went on to practice law for the state of Ohio, followed by service as vice president and legal counsel for several very large trucking companies operating nationally from 1966 through 1981. The years 1982-1988 saw him in the position of similar duties for Vita-Fresh Vitamin Co. Inc. in Garden Grove, Calif., one of America's largest manufacturers of vitamins. Since June 1988, he operates actively as a business consultant. His affiliations and awards/publications fill

an entire page. Known by many as "Kelley," his interest in cars began as a kid, going along with his dad to help pick out a new Chrysler years old, he owned a 1940 Mercury convertible requiring an engine rebuild, which was done by a fellow mechanic and himself. Later, for more power, an Olds Rocket motor was installed. During his early years, several Model A Fords were modified heavily, one had a Hemi V8 using it at drag strips.

About the same time, he struck up a friendship with Eddie Johnson, Harvey Firestone's private pilot and race car driver extraordinaire. Johnson drove the Indy 500 16 times, once finishing in sixth place. Each May, Kelley spent a lot of time at the track, followed with many trips around the USA helping and watching his friend drive varied types of race cars, including sports machines. In one race in Lime Rock, Conn., he finished second to the great Sterling Moss.

The love of cars was truly in his blood, constantly on the lookout for that special one. You'll love this: In 1967, Kelley saw an ad in a local paper listing a 1958 Mercedes needing only a paint job, for just \$1,800. Needless to say, the money was in the seller's hands immediately. Very soon he arranged for a silvercolored paint job, similar to what factory race cars looked like. After many years of great enjoyment, he sold it to finance some real estate investments in Southern California, which were successful.

Many special and unusual automobiles passed through his hands, including the first fuelinjected 1957 Corvette sold in Ohio. His last restoration prior to the El Camino was a 1974 MG Roadster that turned out good enough to go from California to Key West, up to Ohio, and back out West without any problems.

He is satisfied with the Chevy and even though his wife, Maryanne, enjoys riding along, she prefers her 2005 Dodge Hemipowered Magnum. Kelley takes great pride as owner of this fancy vehicle, and as father of Lori Sachs, a longtime chemical engineer for Chevron Oil

Co.

Submersion in water might have fried air-bag system

ear Tom and Ray: I live here in England (my wife is from New Jersey, and she introduced me to you guys). Recently my wife and I drove our "eBay special" Renault Laguna to Twickenham in Surrey. We parked not far from the river and went for a coffee. When we returned to the car an hour later (it was a dry day), the whole street was under water. Our Renault was in about two feet of water. The car started and I backed it out whilst the locals watched me and shook their heads. After drilling holes in the foot wells, we drove home. We got the car dried out at a garage, and the engine is fine. However, the seat-belt pre-tensioners got soaked, and now the air-bag light flashes constantly. The garage could not do a diagnostic of the air-bag system on this 12-year-old banger. Do you think there is a danger of the air bag going off whilst driving? Cheers! — John

TOM: Quite the opposite, John. I think there's a danger that the air bag will NOT go off if you have an accident.

RAY: I'm just impressed that he happened to have an electric drill in the car, just in case he needed to put drain holes in the floor! Now, that's planning ahead!

TOM: When the air-bag light is flashing, John, that

means there's a fault somewhere in the system. The car's computer runs a self-diagnosis every time you start the engine. The flashing air-bag light is telling you that the computer detected a problem, and you can't count on the system to work properly.

RAY: The seat-belt pretensioners are part of the air-bag system, or more correctly, the supplemental restraint system (SRS). They use small explosions to instantly cinch up the seat belts in preparation for a crash, to pull you into the correct position, where you can most benefit from the air bag.

TOM: If your mechanic is certain that the pretensioners are what's causing the light to flash, you can try to have them replaced. You might talk to a collision repair shop, which would have experience in rebuilding cars after accidents involving air-bag deployments.

RAY: But I'm not certain that's all that's wrong. If your mechanic was unable to scan the computer and read the codes, how does he know there aren't other problems with the SRS system? The air-bag sensor itself could have been under water, too.

TOM: So before replacing anything, I'd try to find a mechanic who can perform a proper scan for you. That may require a trip to the Renault dealer. And if you're thinking about returning to Twickenham, you might consider having the dealer install the official Renault bilge-pump and pontoons while you're there. Good luck, John.

How to gently get out of a tight squeeze

Dear Tom and Ray:

It might have been the Red Sox sticker on my car, but I found myself in a no-win situation in New York City a few weeks ago. I had traveled to New York for the weekend, and I was able to secure a perfect parking spot on the street. When I arrived back at my car on Sunday, I came across a gruesome sight. The cars in front of and behind me were parked so close to my bumpers that there wasn't enough lube, crowbars or 1,000-point turns to get

me out of my spot. The cars on either side of me literally were touching my bumpers. So my question is, What to do? Should I "gently" move them (use my car to push the other cars far enough so I can get out)? Or should I just walk to the nearest bar for cocktails to wait them out? — David

TOM: Well, I think you may have little choice, David. You may have to use what some New Yorkers call "persuasion."

RAY: I certainly would give the other drivers a reasonable grace period. Wait around for 15 minutes or half an hour if you can — just in case they stopped to run into a store or pay a quick visit to a friend. But in some parts of New York City, people can park a car and not use it again for a month!

TOM: But even if you're in an area where people have to move their parked cars every day, having to stand around until the next morning is not fair to you. And clearly, those cars weren't there when you parked the car (or you never would have gotten into the space). So both of them knew they were blocking you in. In which case, you are justified in forcing your way out.

RAY: We don't know if a police tow truck or the city help line (dial 311)

would be of any assistance. We tried calling the NYPD to ask, but they suggested we e-mail them Form 4063b and wait until the Martians land for a response (to be fair, we prefer to think they're out preventing crime rather than responding to questions from a couple of jamokes like us).

TOM: But unless the police or parking department will help you, you may have no choice but to force your way out. I saw a guy in Boston with a Lincoln Town Car, and he was in the same situation — he had been parked in. So he was turning the wheel back and forth, back and forth, trying to get out, all to no avail. Finally, he lost his patience.

RAY: So he puts the thing in drive and floors it, smashing into the car in front of him, and pushing that car into the car in front of it.

TOM: Then he realizes he's not sure which guy was more responsible. So he puts it in reverse and floors it again, and does the same thing to the guy behind him.

RAY: Then he puts on his turn signal, which is now dangling from the back of his car, pulls out and goes on his merry way.

TOM: By the way, that's how my brother usually gets INTO a parking space.

RAY: Here's a better way to do it, David: Put the car in drive; make sure you're bumper to bumper, so you do as little damage as possible; and then slowly squeeze the gas pedal (you ultimately may have to push it pretty hard) until the car in front of you moves a couple of feet. Then go backward slowly, until you're bumper to bumper with the car behind you, and do the same thing.

TOM: Once you have room to get out, feel free to leave a sternly worded note on the offending windshields, and go on your merry way. And next time, take the train to New York. It's a wonderful experience.
