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Audit questions CHS purchases

Athletic expenditures appear to run afoul of Title IX

From new football uniforms three years in a row to a window-mounted air conditioning unit for a football player's home, some school officials claim spending in

the football department this school year at Citrus High School has been out of balance.

Questions about the equitable treatment of boys' and girls' athletics at the school prompted a recent review focusing on football and vol-

leyball for the 2008-09 and 2009-10 school years.

According to Citrus County Schools Superintendent Sandra "Sam" Himmel, the audit revealed that the school is out of compliance with Title IX federal rules governing the comparable distribution of resources.

In an April 26 letter to former CHS Principal Leigh Ann Bradshaw, Himmel informed her that she "could

not recommend that Bradshaw be permitted to continue to serve in any administrative or supervisory capacity within the Citrus County School District."

Himmel also mentioned in the letter Title IX compliance concerns that "must be rectified."

In a *Chronicle* interview, Himmel said if one school is out of compliance, it puts the whole district out of

compliance and if corrective action is not taken it could threaten the federal funding that the school district receives.

Kenny Blocker, executive director of businesses services for the district, said that means about \$20 million. "It's very important to the school district," he said.

Himmel said the principal is responsible for making sure money is

distributed equitably among a school's athletic programs.

A summary of significant findings from the audit noted that two health insurance policies for two football players were purchased from the "Kids Relief Fund." "No policies were purchased for athletes on any of the other teams or for any other students," according to the audit.

School board missing attorney

Bradshaw on leave of absence

With the school board attorney on personal leave, board members asked each other at Tuesday's meeting what they would do for legal advice.

"As much as I like Mr. Bradshaw, I don't know how he represents us. There's a big elephant in the room and it's hard to talk about it," said board member Lou Miele.

"As I understand it, he's on a \$1,500-a-month retainer," board member Bill Murray said. "What are we getting for that, now that he has recused himself? What other services are provided?"

Wes Bradshaw, the school board attorney, asked for a temporary leave of absence following an investigation into the relationship between former Citrus High School principal Leigh Ann Bradshaw, who is his wife, and former school head football coach Randall Roland.

Board Chairwoman Pat Deutschman said the investigation "has nothing to do with our current attorney."

Miele referred to a presentation earlier in the meeting by Bob Bedford, a lobbyist for education issues, who told the board that 64 bills impacting education passed during the recent legislative session in Tallahassee that are going before the governor. These new laws would affect budgets, practices, classroom sizes and teaching standards based on student performance, a bill the governor vetoed. Bedford said the teaching-standards bill is expected to come back next year.

"Student performance is part of the evaluation system and the evaluation system is part of the salary structure," Bedford said.

Bedford also reminded board members that the issue of classroom size will go to the voters in November.

"Bob Bedford said at least a dozen times we'd need legal advice," Miele said.

Murray also said that without an attorney, he had no one to ask about the current status of the E-Rate case. The district was supposed to receive rebate checks from a business called E-Rate Consulting Services, but did not. The case is ongoing and dates back to 2004.

Deutschman said she had spoken to Bradshaw, and he had seemed willing to return. However, Deutschman said, "The

As Homosassa Elementary School Principal Scott Hebert circled over his school in a small airplane Wednesday morning, tears filled his eyes.

More than 370 students from kindergarteners to fifth-graders gathered outside the school to form a giant heart as a show of their support for their principal of three years. As the plane passed over the school, Hebert enthusiastically waved to his students from 1,000 feet above. "That's awesome!" he said on first glance.

Hebert, the 1999 Florida Teacher of the Year and a 20-year educator in Citrus County, spent three years as assistant principal at Homosassa Elementary School before taking over as principal for the past three years.

At the end of this school year Hebert will be leaving the school to assume the principal duties at the Citrus Springs Elementary.

Reflecting on the short flight and the message from his students and staff he said, "Tears came to my eyes. I just can't believe the support I have from the kids and staff."

"I leave with mixed emotions," Hebert said. "I'm excited about the opportunity (to move on) but I'm going to miss everybody there."

GOP taps Tampa for 2012 convention

Party hopes choice will help woo state voters in election

OXON HILL, Md. — Republicans chose Tampa as the site of their 2012 presidential convention Wednesday, hoping the swing state of Florida will help them defeat President Barack Obama.

A Republican National Committee panel recommended the Gulf Coast city during a closed-door meeting, rejecting GOP strongholds of Salt Lake City and Phoenix. The decision came amid calls from Hispanic groups and others to boycott Arizona

From the ability to attend a national convention to energizing the party on a grassroots

level, Republicans are excited to have a week of such significance just 70 miles down the road.

"I just sent an e-mail out to our group with the good news," Citrus GOP Chairman Richard Windle said. "I think it's a good deal. It'll bring a lot of attention

into a hotel hallway as she danced out of the closed-door meeting.

"I think that we are one of the bellwether states. ... We'll be stronger for 2012. It will give us an opportunity to strengthen our

Austin brushed off reporters' questions regarding whether the committee could raise more than \$40 million to stage the convention.

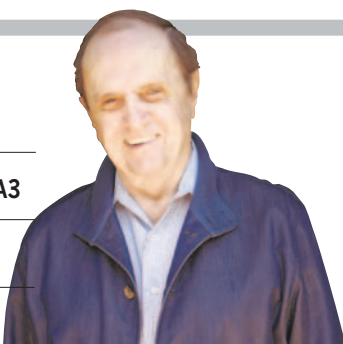

Difficult fight ahead for class size amendment

TALLAHASSEE — For school administrators, convincing lawmakers of the need to loosen class size limits was the easy part. Convincing parents, teachers and other voters now looms as the far more difficult task.

Supporters of the change still must capture the attention of a fickle electorate and persuade 60 percent of them to vote to change the constitution. A Ron Sachs Communications/Mason-Dixon poll released Wednesday shows voters virtually divided on the issue. The poll, which surveyed 625 registered voters from May 3 to May 5, found that 44 percent of the voters favored the change and 39 percent opposed it, while 17 percent remain undecided. There was a 4 percent margin of error.

"It's going to be difficult to pass, I don't think there's any doubt about that," said Wayne Blanton, executive director of the Florida School Boards Association, which supports the change.

The issue has split the education community, with the teachers' union largely opposed to any changes to the class size caps put in the constitution eight years ago,

while administrators and school boards have sought the changes, saying the current law places a virtual stranglehold on school districts. And all sides are amping up to mount a public relations campaign to reach the voters.

In 2002, Florida voters overwhelmingly approved an amendment to cap class sizes at 18 students for kindergarten through third grade, 22 in fourth through eighth grade, and 25 in high school. Smaller classes have been phased in since 2002, but at the start of the 2010 school year, every classroom will have to meet those hard caps. The joint resolution would roll back the requirement so that class size would be calculated at a grade-level average, not an individual classroom cap, allowing some classes to go above the original capped number.

School principals have said they fear that the hard caps would back them into a corner if they were at maximum capacity and just one more student moved into the district. If all third grade classes were at 18 students and a student moved into the district, administrators said they believed they would have to break up a class or bus that student to another school.

Higher ed would get extra \$\$\$ for buildings in proposed budget

TALLAHASSEE — Millions of dollars in construction projects for colleges and universities that got little or no funding in the original House or Senate proposals made their way into the final version of the budget after college and university leaders made their case to budget chiefs in the final days of the 2010 legislative session.

The House and Senate budget chiefs, Rep. David Rivera, R-Miami, and Sen. JD Alexander, R-Lake Wales, held a joint meeting eight days before the passage of the budget that gave college and university officials the chance to publicly lobby lawmakers on individual institution projects, which are funded by what's called public education capital outlay dollars, PECO for

short. The funds come from a utility tax.

And by the end of the process, several additional projects found their way into the overall state budget, which included \$254.8 million in PECO dollars for colleges and \$339.4 million in PECO money for universities.

The Florida Board of Governors and the State Board of Education each approve a list prioritizing school construction projects prior to the legislative session, so that lawmakers know which projects have been thoroughly vetted and how they may impact the state. Projects that have already begun get top billing, but the boards' input stops there.

"These, however, are only recommendations," said BOG spokesman Bill Edmonds. "The ultimate decision lies with the Legislature."

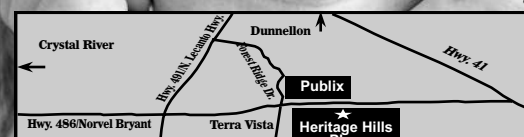
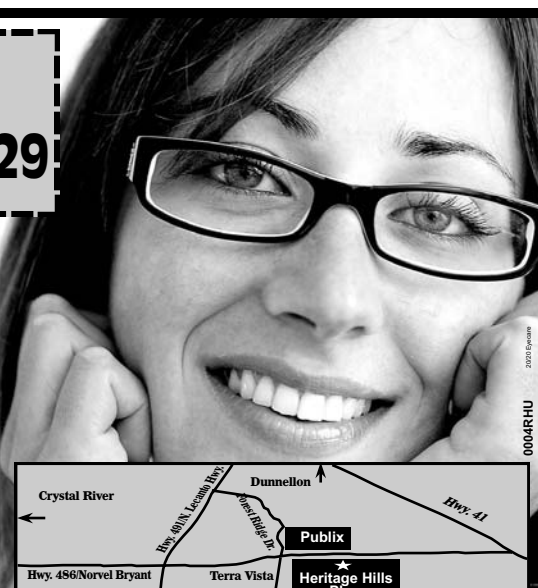

Possible pipe bomb found in Floral City

Deputies discovered a possible pipe bomb Wednesday afternoon in Floral City.

According to Gail Tierney, spokeswoman for the Citrus County Sheriff's Office, dispatchers received a call at 3:53 p.m. about a possible pipe bomb at a home at 8832 E. Freeman Court.

Deputies found what appeared to be a legitimate pipe bomb device in the bed of the homeowner's pickup truck, authorities said. Law enforcement described the device as a metal pipe, capped at both ends, with a fuse attached.

Four homes close to the incident location were evacuated from the area. The CCSSO's bomb unit responded to further assess the device, Tierney wrote in an e-mail.

The device was never activated, and no injuries were reported.

Tierney said the bomb unit transported the device to a spot next to the Central Landfill in Lecanto to render it safe.

The case has been assigned to a detective for further investigation.

Chassahowitzka ramp reopening delayed

County officials said Wednesday that the replacement of the public boat ramp at the Chassahowitzka Campground will take a few days longer than originally scheduled because of unforeseen circumstances that delayed construction. It will not be open for the weekend.

The problem was temporary, not serious and not the contractor's fault, but it meant the delay of a few days, they said.

Officials had hoped the project would be finished Friday evening but the revised schedule means it will not be opened until the middle of next week.

Crist officially shuns GOP

Governor changes status on voter rolls to 'none'

ST. PETERSBURG — Gov. Charlie Crist has made it official, stopping into the election supervisor's office Wednesday in his St. Petersburg hometown to declare his political independence.

Met by a gaggle of reporters and TV cameras, Crist, a candidate for U.S. Senate, signed documents changing his status on the voter rolls from "Republican" to "none."

Crist announced the switch last month after rival Marco Rubio took a big lead in the polls and looked like he might trounce him in the Republican primary.

At the same time, polls suggested the popular governor, running as an independent, could win a three-way race over Rubio and likely Democratic nominee Kendrick Meek.

Crist said being independent allows him to stay true to his beliefs.

Jilted GOP sells portrait for \$7,700

TALLAHASSEE — The Florida Republican Party can't seem to get over being jilted by Gov. Charlie Crist.

The party said Wednesday it's sold an oil painting of Crist for \$7,700 on eBay. Spokeswoman Katie Betta said the buyer was a

registered Florida Republican who wanted to remain anonymous.

In a letter to members, the party sought donations to help "move forward from the sordid legacy of Charlie Crist and Jim Greer," the former party chairman.

Restoration work begins at Potts Preserve

Project being done to restore natural flow of water

A seven-week project to restore the natural water flow to Potts Preserve in the Hernando pool of Lake Tsala Apopka began Wednesday.

The project involves removing a total of 15,100 cubic yards of fill material in 15 different locations. Its purpose is to restore the natural flow of water between the Hernando pool of Lake Tsala Apopka and the preserve, said Michael

Holtkamp, operations department manager of the Southwest Florida Water Management District.

"Hopefully the historic hydrology will be restored and functioning this summer," he said.

Landowners put sand roads in place in the 1950s and '60s, but the roads have interfered with the natural water flow through the area.

The District's Withlacoochee River Basin Board is funding the project, which will cost \$74,000.

Boaters are asked to stay

a safe distance away from equipment while work is in progress. The project will impact some hiking trails, which may become submerged. Hikers on the west side of the preserve are asked to use caution.

Quick facts about the Potts Preserve project (from the Southwest Florida Water Management District):

- Potts Preserve is in Northeastern Citrus County east of Inverness.

- The restoration project is designed to restore the historic natural flow pat-

terns of water between the preserve's marsh and the Hernando pool of Lake Tsala Apopka.

- Fill material being removed by the District was built by previous land owners to connect upland islands to provide access to the more remote parts of the preserve and to increase the amount of usable land for cattle grazing.

- The project includes the removal of material at 15 locations including Otter Slide.

- A total of 15,100 cubic yards of material will be removed.

- About 5 acres of filled

area will be graded down to historic wetland levels.

- The project cost is \$74,000. The District's Withlacoochee River Basin Board is funding it and the project will last about seven weeks.

- The District acquired the 8,500-acre preserve to protect the area's groundwater recharge, as well as important surface water features and wetland habitats.

- The preserve's wetlands play a role in both the Tsala Apopka Lake chain and the Withlacoochee River systems, part of the Floridan aquifer's recharge/discharge system.

County, paver agree to split cost of road repairs

Resurfacing had damaged Cardinal Street

Officials with Citrus County and a Lecanto road paving company reached agreement on splitting damages resulting from a resurfacing project on Cardinal Street.

The county commission on Tuesday unanimously approved adding \$45,200 to the \$663,000 contract for Pave-Rite Inc.

County Administrator Brad Thorpe said the county's settlement represents about 40 percent of the cost for repair work when the resurfacing damaged the roadway.

Thorpe said Pave-Rite is eating about \$67,000 of the cost to make the repairs.

Cardinal is one of 10 road-resurfacing projects worth a total of \$7.8 million. The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act paid for

the projects.

County officials said a vibrating rolling machine designed to compact asphalt caused the damage.

According to county files, county officials and a consultant told the contractor to stop using the roller because of the damage, but the contractor refused. Pave-Rite disputes that allegation.

Thorpe said it made better sense to settle the issue rather than press it with the contractor's bonding company.

The county's end is not covered by

the federal incentive dollars, however.

Repair work is to begin Monday and is expected to conclude June 15.

In other business Tuesday, commissioners approved a \$750,000 community development block grant application to extend a water line along U.S. 19 from U.S. 98 to a proposed Walmart Supercenter at Cardinal Street.

County officials were quick to point out that any development in the area will benefit from the water line, not just Walmart.

61 local nonprofits face tax-exempt deadline

The crucial filing deadline of Monday is looming for many tax-exempt organizations that are required by law to file their Form 990 (or 990-EZ or 990-N) with the Internal Revenue Serv-

ice or risk having their federal tax-exempt status revoked.

The Pension Protection Act of 2006 mandates that all nonprofit organizations, other than churches and church-related organizations, must file an informa-

tion form with the IRS.

This requirement has been in effect since the beginning of 2007, which made 2009 the third consecutive year under the new law.

Any organization that fails to file for three consecutive years automatically

loses its federal tax-exempt status.

The National Center for Charitable Statistics at the Urban Institute has created a tool where you can search for those groups in your area that may potentially lose their tax-exemption.

Markets rebound

NEW YORK — A dose of good economic news sent stocks sharply higher Wednesday and erased the Dow Jones industrials' big plunge of last week. The Dow rose 148 points to return to where it stood before Thursday's tumble that briefly took the average down nearly 1,000 points. The technology-dominated Nasdaq composite index led major indexes with a 2.1 percent gain. Investors moved into tech stocks ahead of earnings from network gear maker Cisco Systems Inc. and following an upbeat forecast from IBM Corp.

Analysts say the market's rebound from last week's drop reflects investors' growing confidence that Europe's debt problems are contained for now. Fears that losses on debt would spill over to the U.S. fed the market's plunge. Economic reports from the U.S. and Europe helped reassure the market that the global recovery is intact. The Commerce Department said exports rose in March to their highest levels since 2008. That was a welcome signal for the manufacturing industry, which has been getting stronger since last year. In-

Stocks surged around the world Monday after European leaders agreed to a nearly \$1 trillion bailout to contain fears of a debt crisis that pounded markets last week.

While stocks have rebounded, currency markets are still in flux. That signals that investors are still somewhat uneasy after last week's slide. The euro edged higher against the dollar Wednesday but is still hovering near a 14-month low.

Uncertainty over the long-term health of the euro helped lift gold to a record high. Investors worry that the euro could still lose value as European countries try to work through debt problems by taking on more debt. Investors have turned to gold as an alternative to holding currencies.

Max Bublitz, chief strategist at SCM Advisors in San Francisco, said the swings of the past few weeks spooked investors who had become overconfident. Now, the focus can return to the U.S. economy. Expectations of a recovery have driven the market higher since major stocks indexes hit 12-year lows in March last year. The market made steady gains from February-April before concerns about Greece briefly erased stocks' gains for the year.

Political games affect local schools

In a rational world, schools wouldn't hire professional staff in August that may not be needed after November. Unfortunately, our state Legislature is not always rational, and legislative infighting has created tough choices for local schools.

One of these tough choices is how to deal with the class-size amendment that was passed in 2002. That amendment sets strict limits on class sizes, and the final phase is set to become a requirement this year.

If proposed changes to the class-size amendment pass in November, schools could meet the class-size requirements on a "school average class size" rather than being required to meet the limits of the amendment in each class offered. This means that a school could be over the average in one class if the excess size is balanced by another class at the school with fewer students.

Legislation was introduced during the last legislative session to delay the class counts to determine compliance until February, after the elections. However, the bill died, so compliance will be determined by the October count, before the elections.

Changing the class-size amendment has long been a goal of some legislators, just as preserving it has been a goal of many others. Earlier this year, Gov. Charlie Crist — who had

previously opposed weakening the amendment — came out in favor of asking voters to approve modification.

But that was before Crist decided to run as a no-party-affiliation candidate in the fall Senate race. As an independent run appeared more likely, the estrangement of the governor and the Legislature grew — and schools got caught in the crossfire, with some observers believing that the Legislature held to the October count requirement as a way of creating enough of a crisis to assure the public would pass changes to the class-size legislation in November.

As a result of having the class count in October, the Citrus County School system is looking at hiring 56 new teachers to meet the requirements of the state's class-size amendment — even though the amendment could be changed in the November elections.

The difference in how meeting the amendment is determined could mean as much as \$3 million to the school system in the cost of teachers and facilities.

Hiring extra teachers to meet a requirement that could change before the end of the first term doesn't make sense, but sometimes what makes sense in the political world doesn't make sense outside of it. This looks like one of those times.

Standing for sanctity of life

"Henry Hyde was one of my heroes," House Minority Leader John Boehner told a crowd on a rooftop in Washington, D.C., over a month after the historic vote on health care legislation in the House of Representatives.

Receiving from a pro-life group an award named after Hyde, the late Illinois congressman legendary for his opposition to abortion, Boehner shared emotional memories of his large family and his humble upbringing, and delivered a passionate reminder of the stakes involved in the fight for human life.

Boehner's comments at the event echoed his remarks from a few years ago, at Hyde's memorial in 2007. There, Boehner remembered his longtime colleague: "Henry was at peace in the presence of others — even those who disagreed with him most — because of his unshakable faith in the sanctity of every human life. In a vocation often marked by senseless, noisy debate, Henry Hyde was a clear, calm and commanding voice for justice; for the defenseless; for the innocent."

The health care bill that passed this year was opposed by the nation's Catholic bishops, despite the bishops' stated desires for "universal" health care. It was opposed because on life there can be no compromise. Boehner knows this, and he's not giving up. "We may have lost the battle," he said at his award ceremony, "but we will not lose the war."

Joining him at the ceremony, held by Americans United For Life, was another Republican congressman, Chris Smith of New Jersey. Smith is a great defender

of human life, here and abroad. He doesn't always vote along party lines on some other issues, but he's garnered a great deal of respect nonetheless. Also there was Daniel Lipinski, a Democrat from Illinois, who was the only pro-life member of his party left standing firmly against the health care legislation in March.

The AUL event could very easily have been a continuation of another celebration I attended earlier in the week. There was an ecumenical, bipartisan gathering at Saint Patrick's Cathedral in New York City in honor of the late John Cardinal O'Connor. O'Connor's moral voice from that Fifth Avenue pulpit frequently had something to offer by way of guidance and rebuke to the politics of his day. But it was never confused for partisanship, and it continues to be a challenge to all parties.

Perhaps O'Connor's most palatable legacy was the establishment of the Sisters of Life, a religious order of women who protect and defend human life through prayer and service. They take in women and their children, and minister to people suffering from the consequences of abortion. Pregnant women frequently come to the Sisters after referrals by pregnancy-care centers, priests, or women who have previously been served by the Sisters. The Sisters of Life help form the backbone of the pro-life movement.

The Sisters were part of a coalition of Catholic religious orders that issued a statement in opposition to the final health-care legislation in the House. The statement read, in part: "Protection of life and freedom of con-

science are central to morally responsible judgment. We join the bishops in seeking ethically sound legislation."

After the vote, Lipinski told a hometown columnist, "I could not vote for a bill that would change the status quo on funding for abortion." His honesty and clarity on the details and principles helped him be honest about other problems with the legislation, too. "There were aspects of the president's package that I liked. Helping people get insurance, that sort of thing. But we weren't really voting for health reform. We were voting for a bill that is financially unsustainable. And I couldn't support that bill," he said.

At the O'Connor celebration, Helen Alvare, a law professor who has worked with the National Conference of Catholic Bishops helping to direct its pro-life campaign, credited the late cardinal with "enabling the pro-life movement to survive and to thrive" through his leadership and encouragement at a time "when we felt outspent and overpowered."

In the wake of the passage of that health care legislation, it's a familiar feeling. But the "strictly non-partisan," as Alvare described it, message of Cardinal O'Connor, along with his living legacy — the work and the prayers of the women of the Sisters of Life — should serve as inspiration to Boehner and Lipinski and every Catholic and other American legislator, activist and voter discouraged by our culture's deepening embrace of death and despair. For a movement is kept viable in no small part through leadership.

region, test infrastructure and bring in millions of dollars. Tampa officials said transportation plans and security top the list of priorities.

"The host committee's hard work and dedication resulted in a tremendous bid that we are confident will produce a successful event," RNC Chairman Michael Steele said.

Walking away from reporters after the meeting, Steele insisted that the Arizona immigration uproar played no part in the convention choice. He said it was "purely a business decision."

Holly Hughes, a national committee member from Michigan who led the selection process, also told reporters that it was a decision based on technical requirement, not politics or personalities.

"That was not part of our decision whatsoever," she said. "It's hotel space, the delegate experience — are

we going to be able to accommodate the media; will the venue hold what we need it to hold?"

Personalities, though, are the sideshow of the event slated to be largely staged at the St. Pete Times Forum.

As the committee was rejoicing over the announcement, Florida Gov. Charlie Crist was changing his party affiliation from Republican to "none" in his hometown of St. Petersburg. That cleared the way for Crist to seek the open Senate seat as an independent without first winning an uphill Republican primary campaign against tea party favorite Marco Rubio.

As governor, Crist will be the honorary event chairman for a party he left. He said he would work on the convention "as much as I can."

"Whether it was a Republican convention or a Democratic convention, it wouldn't matter to me. As a Floridian, I'm really proud it's in our state. That's what matters first," Crist said.

Presidential hopefuls typically de-

camp to Florida during the final weeks of a campaign, and nominating conventions dominate local news coverage and help drive the parties' message to voters who might otherwise ignore the formalities.

Republicans met in Minneapolis-St. Paul in 2008, hoping to swing Minnesota to the GOP. It went for Obama. Democrats similarly met in Denver in the hope of making the Mountain West friendly territory. The president won Colorado.

It is a GOP strategy, though, that has worked infrequently. The last time Republicans held a convention in a swing state and won was when Ronald Reagan took Michigan in 1980 over Jimmy Carter.

The selection committee's recommendation still needs formal approval when the RNC meets in August in Kansas City, Mo., but that is considered a given.

The last Republican convention in Florida was in Miami in 1972 when the party nominated President Richard M. Nixon and Vice President Spiro Agnew.

to Republican candidates."

Former Citrus Republican chairman Bill Grant said a convention so close allows plenty of opportunity for local participation.

Supervisor of Elections Susan Gill said the convention also would help drum up excitement for the election.

"It's another piece of the election puzzle," she said. Grant said the conven-

tion would provide a rallying point for local Republicans.

"It's a very good boost for the local party, especially with our proximity to Tampa," he said. "It just gets everybody excited."

Man accused of posing as student out of jail

ODESSA, Texas — A 22-year-old man accused of posing as a high school basketball player in Texas was released from jail Wednesday.

Guerdwich Montimere posted \$500 bond a day after he was arrested on a charge of failure to identify himself to a police officer, said Ector County sheriff's Sgt. Debbie Bruce.

School officials said Montimere admitted posing as Jerry Joseph, a 16-year-old sophomore who led Permian High School to the state playoffs. Suspicion about the player's identity arose when three Florida basketball coaches recognized him last month at an amateur tournament in Little Rock, Ark.

If convicted of the misdemeanor, Montimere could face up to six months in jail and a fine of up to \$2,500.

The allegations mean Permian will probably have to forfeit the 2009 season.

Officials: 7 killed in Sadr City bombing

BAGHDAD — A bomb in a parked car ripped through a Sadr City neighborhood Wednesday evening, killing seven young people who had gathered at a nearby cafe to drink tea and play dominoes, Iraqi officials said.

The attack comes just days after a string of shootings and bombings convulsed the country in Iraq's worst violence so far this year. The violence appears designed to stir up sectarian tensions at a time when Iraq still has no new government after inconclusive parliamentary elections and as U.S. troops prepare to go home.

Sadr City is the eastern Baghdad stronghold of anti-American cleric Muqtada al-Sadr and the scene of one of Iraq's most deadly attacks this year. Insurgents in April targeted worshippers gathered for Friday prayers in a string of explosions that killed 72 people, mostly near Shiite mosques and places of worship in Baghdad.

Earlier on Wednesday, three people were killed and 23 were wounded in northwest Baghdad when a booby-trapped body exploded near a grocery store.

Dutch boy sole survivor of plane crash

 TRIPOLI, Libya — A 10-year-old Dutch boy lay in a hospital bed, head bandaged, skin pale and legs shattered — the lone survivor of a plane crash Wednesday that killed 103 people in the Libyan capital. Most victims were Dutch tourists returning from vacation in South Africa.

Little was known about the dark-haired boy, who was rushed to a hospital in Tripoli where he underwent surgery for multiple fractures in both legs.

The barely conscious child muttered "Holland! Holland!" after he was found, a Dutch official said.

Libyan TV footage showed the boy, one eye bruised and swollen closed, breathing through an oxygen mask with multiple intravenous lines connected to his body and a monitor at his bedside. Doctors later said he was out of danger.

The boy appeared groggy as he was tended by a doctor in green scrubs and a veiled, gloved and masked nurse. The injured youngster wore a crisp pink gown and lay on a blue disposable pad. A bandage of layers of white gauze and hand-lettered with the date — 5/12 — covered his head.

The Libyan jetliner crashed minutes before

landing after a more than seven-hour flight across the African continent from Johannesburg. Little remained of the Afriqiyah Airways Airbus aside from its tail, painted with the airline's brightly colored logo.

Sixty-one victims were Dutch, many of them families headed home after spending spring break in South Africa, according to the Royal Dutch Tourism Board. Authorities released no names.

Officials had no immediate explanation for the boy's survival. However, aviation experts said that lone survivors, while rare, are not unknown. There have been at least five cases this

decade of a single survivor in a commercial plane crash. Last summer, a young girl was found clinging to wreckage 13 hours after a plane went down in the water off the Comoros Islands.

"The idea of a lone survivor might seem a fluke, but it has happened several times," said Patrick Smith, an American airline pilot and aviation author. "The sole survivor of last year's Yemenia crash off the Comoros Islands was a 12-year-old."

Flags were lowered Wednesday throughout the Netherlands and campaigning for parliamentary elections was suspended to mourn the dead.

Series of failures lead to gusher in Gulf, probes find

 WASHINGTON — Bad wiring and a leak in what's supposed to be a "blowout preventer." Sealing problems that may have allowed a methane eruption. Even a dead battery, of all things.

New disclosures Wednesday revealed a complex cascade of deep-sea equipment failures and procedural problems in the oil rig explosion and massive spill that is still fouling the waters of the Gulf of Mexico and threatening industries and wildlife near the coast and on shore.

The public also got its first look on Wednesday of oil gushing from the broken pipe that rests nearly a mile under water as BP PLC, the well's operator, released a video taken by a remotely controlled camera. Oil flowing from a break in the yellowish pipe becomes lighter in color as it mixes with natural gas. Over the past 21 days, more than 4 million barrels of oil have been released.

A litany of worrisome events and findings that were at play on the night of the well explosion and pipe rupture was described in internal corporate documents, marked confidential but provided to a House committee by BP and by the manufacturer of the safety device. Lawmakers released them at a House hearing.

A senior BP executive, Lamar McKay, cautioned, "It's inappropriate to draw any conclusions before all the facts are known." But the documents established the firmest evidence to date of the sequence of catastrophic events that led to the explosion and worsening spill, a series of failures reminiscent of the loss of the space shuttle Challenger.

Congressional investigators revealed Wednesday that a key safety system, known as the blowout preventer, used in BP's oil-drilling rig in the Gulf had a hydraulic leak and a failed battery.

They said that BP documents and others also indicated conflicting pipe pressure tests should have warned those on the rig that poor pipe integrity may have been allowing explosive methane gas to leak into the well.

In other developments Wednesday:

- The White House asked Congress to raise the limits on BP's liability to cover damage from the spill beyond the \$75 million cap now in law. It also wants oil companies to pay more into a federal oil spill cleanup fund.
- BP president Lamar McKay said the company will pay any legitimate claim of damages beyond cleanup costs despite the federal cap.
- On the Gulf Coast, a new containment box — a cylinder called a "top hat" — was placed on the sea floor near the well leak. Engineers hope to work out ways to avoid the problem that scuttled an earlier effort with a much bigger box before they move the cylinder over the end of the 5,000-foot-long pipe from the well.
- Executives of the companies involved have sought to shift blame on one another at Senate and House hearings this week on the spill.
- BP has cited the failure of the blowout preventer owned by Transocean, which in turn has raised questions about the cementing process conducted by Halliburton, a BP subcontractor.

Gas prices going ... down?

Experts: \$3 a gallon unlikely

 Gas prices are poised to fall as Memorial Day approaches, a welcome change for motorists who have gotten used to seeing increases cut into their summer vacation money.

Experts who had been predicting a national average of more than \$3 per gallon by Memorial Day now say prices have likely peaked just beneath that threshold. Rising supplies and concerns about the global economy have helped send wholesale gasoline prices plummeting by 22 cents a gallon since last week.

The decline in prices is starting to filter down to motorists, but it will take several weeks for the full effects to be reflected in pump prices, which average \$2.90 nationwide.

By summer, the nationwide average could be below last summer's peak of around \$2.70 a gallon, says Tom Kloza of Oil Price Information Service.

Analysts were forecasting a nationwide retail average well above \$3 a gallon just a few months ago. So what changed?

- The European debt crisis escalated. This undermined confidence in the strength of the global economic recovery and prompted analysts to lower their energy demand forecasts.
- Supplies of gasoline have risen steadily. As of Friday, the U.S. had 222 million barrels of gasoline in storage — about 5 percent more than a year ago.

The oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico has had no impact on prices because it's had minimal impact on petroleum production, analysts say.

Nine killed in latest attack at Chinese school

 HANZHONG, China — An attacker with a cleaver hacked to death seven children and two adults at a kindergarten in northwest China on Wednesday, the latest in a string of savage assaults on the country's schools. Eleven other children were wounded.

The killer, 48-year-old Wu Huanming, returned home after the attack on the outskirts of the city of Hanzhong and committed suicide, the local government reported.

The official Xinhua News Agency said Wu owned the property used by the school and had argued with the

school's manager, who was among the victims.

It was the fifth major assault on young students in China since late March and occurred despite increased security at schools country-wide, with gates and security cameras installed at some schools and additional police and guards posted at entrances. It was not clear if security had been beefed up at the school attacked Wednesday.

The latest deaths were sure to fuel speculation about why assailants — usually lone males — are targeting schools.

Sociologists say the recent attacks that have killed 17 and wounded more than



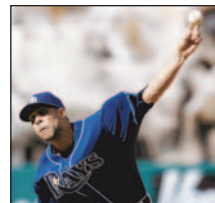

to take revenge on society," said Zhou Xiaozheng of Beijing's Renmin University.

After past attacks, authorities have banned or limited media coverage, and early reports on Wednesday's attack were removed from Chinese websites or moved to less prominent pages. There was no mention of it on state television's national evening news report.

The apparent attempts to play down the assault may indicate fears that coverage inspires other assailants, but authorities may also have wanted to avoid the embarrassing news, especially during the World Expo in Shanghai, a pet government project.

Overcoming Obstacles

In football Woythaler was one of the state's best punters, earning him first-team Class 3A all-state honors and winning a *Chronicle* Athlete of the Year nomination.

Citrus senior Woythaler returns to fields of play after two-year absence, excels as 'Canes premier punter

For Citrus senior A.J. Woythaler, sports have always been a part of his life.

"Ever since I was a little kid I loved sports, because they were fun and I was active," he said. "I loved the people you meet along the way. Coaches are all good to you."

His love for sports continued to his teenage years as he planned to play in high school. However, that dream came to a screeching halt his freshman year.

The Citrus teen explained halfway through his first soccer season in high school he started having problems breathing. He was later diagnosed with pectus excavatum, a deformity to his chest bone. He underwent surgery to correct the problem, but contact sports were no longer feasible for two years. No football and no soccer, but baseball would be allowed.

Two years after surgery, though, Woythaler — with his doctor's approval — decided to try out for football.

"I'd always wanted to play and did once in middle school," he said. "I'd watch on TV and liked the big hits. So, two years after surgery I decided, 'What the heck! I'll play football!'"

Woythaler not only earned a spot as a wide receiver but also became the Citrus Hurricanes punter.

Overcoming his medical obstacles, playing football for the first time, resuming his soccer career and excelling on the baseball diamond led to Woythaler becoming a nominee for the *Chronicle's* Ath-

lete of the Year.

The senior from Citrus said he could barely believe those words when he was told by a woman in his high school's front office.

"I just stood there," he said. "I was shocked because it's such a big accomplishment."

"After everything I've been through...I overcame surgery and was taken out of sport for two years," he continued. "I got back in for my senior year and it was pretty amazing."

Citrus baseball coach Jon Bolin agreed Woythaler's ability to overcome adversity is unbelievable. He pointed out the teen returned to the baseball diamond three months after his surgery.

"I was allowed to play baseball after three months," Woythaler said. "So I played baseball. That's all I could play."

Bolin, however, could barely believe his eyes at the plays Woythaler was making.

"He was 14 or 15 when (his surgery) occurred," the coach said. "He goes through that and then he's diving all over the place on the field. He's the kind of athlete every coach wants on his team."

On the baseball team, Woythaler batted in the No. 4 spot with a .330 batting average, one home run and 14 RBIs. Bolin counted on the Hurricane senior's bat to put up consistent numbers.

"He proved to be a good batter in the lineup," Bolin said, explaining the No. 4 spot is a pressure position. "He's a care-free guy. He was calm under pressure. He really took on that No. 4 spot for us."

While he was excellent in the batter's box, Bolin pointed out

Woythaler's defensive skills in the outfield were not always up to par. The coach said he was tempted at one point to make Woythaler a designated hitter and put another player in the outfield.

"As the season progressed, he got better and better on defense," Bolin said. "I witnessed a much better outfielder this season than in years past."

The Citrus coach attributed his improvement to Woythaler's willingness to work hard.

"He constantly wants to improve," Bolin said.

His hard work carried over to other sports as well.

In football, Woythaler kicked 47 punts in 10 games and finished with a 41.9-yard average. His longest punt of the season was 58 yards. Of his 47 punts, 12 (25 percent) fell inside the 20-yard line with eight of those inside the 10-yard line.

Disbelieve it: Montreal does it again

Canadiens beat Penguins 5-2 in conference semis

PITTSBURGH — The Montreal Canadiens followed up a monumental upset by pulling off another, and now the Pittsburgh Penguins are joining the Washington Capitals in sitting out the rest of the Stanley Cup playoffs.

Brian Gionta had two power-play goals, Mike Cammalleri scored his seventh goal of a series in which he upstaged Sidney Crosby and Evgeni Malkin and the Canadiens built a stunning four-goal lead before beating the Penguins 5-2 in Game 7 of the Eastern Conference semifinals

Wednesday night. Believe it, Canadiens. Disbelieve it, Penguins.

Montreal, about the last team anyone would have picked to beat the top-seeded Capitals, much less the reigning NHL champion Penguins, accomplished what no team has done since the current playoffs format was adopted in 1994. And that's beat the Presidents' Trophy winners and the Stanley Cup champions in successive rounds as an eighth-seeded team.

When it ended, the Canadiens crowded around goalie Jaroslav Halak, who made 37 saves in a performance not quite as dominating as that in Montreal's 2-1 elimination win of Washington, but one that sent the Penguins home and shut down the NHL's oldest arena.

As remarkable as the upset was — the Canadiens

trailed 3-2 in the series before rallying to win the final two games — it was how they did it. They silenced the standing room crowd of 17,132 in the last game played at 49-year-old Mellon Arena by seizing a 1-0 lead

with only 32 seconds gone after Crosby took a bad penalty on his first shift, then built it to 4-0 with barely 25 minutes gone.

Gionta scored on that

Dying for a drink of water to rehydrate

By the time you read this column, it is late morning or even later in the day.

You probably have had your morning coffee, because you read last week's coffee column and believe it is sufficient hydration for the day.

If this article saves your life, remember Senior Master Sgt. James B. Lackey, because his actions inspired this column.

"...he didn't eat until everyone else had food and water...he made sure his soldiers stayed hydrated in the triple-digit heat.."

At age 53, he died of a heart attack in Afghanistan, collapsing after a physical training session.

When I was living in Arizona, a 22-year-old girl decided to hike up Camelback Mountain in the center of Phoenix in 90-degree heat with three bottles of water. An hour later, a life-flight helicopter had to evacuate the girl in a coma. Her only problem that day was drinking too much water.

It is possible to drink too much water, i.e. 'water only.' When your kidneys

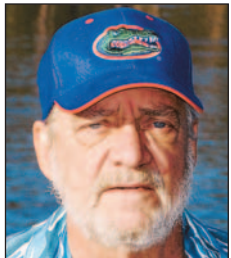

Hide from wind and catch fish

Reader Mike O'Feild reports he tried fishing the Barge Canal last week, but the water was so murky with silt all he could dredge out of it was a few catfish, small grunts and even smaller black sea bass.

O'Feild said the water was dirty as far out as 13 miles with water temperatures running between 70 and 72 degrees. Visibility in the canal was 1 foot and not much better at the 13-mile mark.

I remember getting a report from O'Feild last year at this time. He and a friend visiting from Mississippi caught whiting and sugar trout until they got tired of it. The difference, of course, is all the rain we had last week. Now that things have had time to settle, look for good action in the canal for saltwater panfish.

Capt. Mike Byron reports fishing has improved out at The Humps just beyond the Spoil Banks. He said his clients have been getting nice catches of Spanish mackerel free-lining live shrimp on a long-shanked 1/0 hook, as well as under a Cajun Thunder cork with a 3-foot leader. Byron has been working the area between Short Point and the gravel beds for trout too. Best results have been with a D.O.A. glow tail on a one-eighth-ounce Bass Assassin jig head.

Windy conditions of late have kept most anglers on the lee side of mangrove islands and keys, but that hasn't been a bad thing for Capt. William Toney. He reports the keys north of the Homosassa River all the way to Crystal River are holding good numbers of redfish with the high end of an incoming tide the most productive time. Most fish are holding on the rocky areas of the keys, but they're scattered. The water has not been clear enough for dependable sight casting.

With those conditions, an angler's best bet is to drift the keys, cast ahead of the boat in a fan-shaped pattern and work an area thoroughly before moving forward. It's easy to spook fish under these conditions, so caution is the order of the day.

When prospecting this way, a good choice is a bright spoon such as the gold Rex in quarter- or half-ounce. It casts well in the wind and can be seen a long way off by the reds and trout.

Rock piles and other structures in 5 to 10 feet of water are holding bluefish, cobia, jacks, Spanish mackerel and trout. Toney said it

took some experimenting to come up with the right combination. The D.O.A. Deadly Combo with an eighth-ounce jig head under the cork on a leader from 25 to 30 inches has worked best for him.

Once things calm down and the water flattens out, Toney said he will switch to a quarter-ounce jig head and 5-inch MirrO lure soft mullet in bone silver.

I've had reports of a few tarpon south of the Chassahowitzka channel, but zero reports of hookups. It is most likely because of the windy conditions. A new moon is coming, and the incoming tide is around mid-day all week. So, if the wind cooperates, there should be plenty of action.

A caller to the Chronicle Sound Off line was apparently the victim of some misinformation, which in turn triggered questions from a couple of readers. To set the record straight, Florida residents 65 years of age or older (not 75 years, as the caller claimed) are eligible for a free fresh or saltwater fishing license as well as many other goodies. All items are available at the local tax collector's office. That exemption has not been rescinded, either by the latest revisions to fish and game license laws or any previous changes.

Prove your age and residency, and you will get a license. Under the provisions of a reciprocity agreement, the license is good in Georgia waters as well.

To learn the facts about fishing and hunting licenses, visit www.MyFwc.com or call the Florida Fish and Game Conservation Commission. Do not rely on what your neighbor said he or she heard, nor forwarded e-mails on the Internet. Facts trump hearsay, every time.

While I'm at it, I'll dispel another rumor: You will not be charged with possessing a fish such as snook or tarpon out of season or without the proper tag if you merely remove the fish from the water in a reasonable and sensible manner to take a photograph for posterity. If you make a big deal out of it and keep the fish out of the water for a dangerous period of time, or handle the fish in such a way as to endanger its recovery, then you may well be charged.

Outdoors entertainment

Parents today have quite a struggle on their hands when it comes to keeping children occupied with healthy, productive and wholesome pastimes.

Parents deal with the likes of cyberspace, Playstation 3, Nintendo, cell phones, e-mail, MySpace, and well, a zillion other things. What is a parent to do?

Introducing a child to the great outdoors is a superb way to get them out of the electronic-induced coma that many fall into. One adventurous, affordable and easy way to do this is to take a kid fishing.

We are blessed to live in an area of Florida which offers many fishing opportunities. And despite what many non-fishing parents may think, it isn't rocket science.

Our state has many different fish species, from easy to catch bluegill, grunts, pinfish and bass, all the way up to the really big boys who require a bit more skill such as tarpon, shark and Goliath grouper.

Let's start off with the initial fishing gear you will need to introduce a child to fishing. Closed-faced spinning reels are a great way to start. Zebco is a good choice and has been a highly rated manufacturer of the so-called "push-button" reels for many years. These rigs are great for beginning fishermen because of the ease of operation factor, and they won't break the bank.

Spinning reels are another good choice if the angler has some knowledge about fishing. These come in a variety of styles and prices. But the best bet is buying a "combo" unit, which includes the reel paired with a rod and spooled with fishing line. Combo units can be found for under \$25 at retail outlets.

Go past the section containing revolving spool reels, also known as bait-casters. While very popular with veteran and professional anglers, the reels take a long time to master and will create more havoc than they are worth when it comes to the beginning fishermen.

Most retailers offer a basic tackle pack consisting of hooks, sinkers and bobbers. Stay away from lures for the time being. If the youngster gets interested in the sport, he or she will buy many, many lures in the future. For now, the rule is to keep it simple.

Get a pair of long-nose pliers to de-hook the catch along with a floating bait bucket and a long piece of rope. Depending on the quarry, frozen or live bait could be used. But we will get into that later.

Other items to bring along include hats and sunscreen, needed to keep the sun's harmful UV rays at bay. Bug spray and a fillet knife are also regulars in most anglers' tackle box as is a pair of sunglasses. Take comfortable seating, such as the inexpensive, fold-up camping

style chair. Bring along a camera as well, because the memories will need to be recorded. A small cooler is a plus to keep drinks and sandwiches cold and to keep the catch on ice if you keep and eat it.

There are a few fishing piers in the area and pier anglers are usually happy to offer tips on how to catch fish or the best bait is to use. They will gladly lend a hand to tie a knot or show a novice angler a thing or two about casting a rod or setting a hook.

Be sure to ask questions at the bait shop for any helpful tips or advice. You can get a wealth of knowledge in a short period of time that may help. Ask them to show you how to tie a simple knot, such as the Palomar. Let them know you are a novice, and you'll get invaluable help. Fishermen are a friendly lot for the most part, and most love helping others learn.

Both live and frozen shrimp are a fan-favorite bait when it comes to saltwater fishing. Frozen squid is another because it is durable and tough, stays on the hook and will lure many different species of fish. Live shrimp will catch fish, but carefully handle the abundant crustaceans. They have a sharp horn on the top of their head that will give you a nasty poke. So, due care is a must. Cut bait, such as mullet and pinfish, are also widely used and will catch a variety of fish.

For freshwater fishermen, shiners, worms and crickets can be the ticket to success. Crickets are at the top of the menu for panfish and bass love the taste of minnows and shiners.

Piers draw fish in large numbers because of the food, structure and shade they provide that draws smaller fish, which in turn draws bigger fish. It's a domino effect in the food chain. Most fish feel more comfortable hanging around structure than they do swimming out in open water; hence piers are a natural attraction.

Due to tidal conditions in saltwater, you will want to have a variety of sinkers.

The main goal is to get your bait to the bottom and have it stay there. If the tide is running strong, you will need more weight. If it's a slack tide, little weight will be needed. A small No. 1 to 3 long-shank hook, fitted with a shrimp or a small piece of cut squid, will draw a bite almost anywhere off a pier.

Freshwater anglers will want to fish with their bait under a cork. The bait need to suspend off the bottom, so it can freely move around to attract fish.

After casting your bait, keep a somewhat tight line to feel when the fish bites. When you feel the nibble, or the bobber disappears, draw the rod upwards to set the hook and start to reel in the line.

You don't want any slack in the line. If the fish starts pulling out line, let the drag on the reel do its job. Then continue to reel in your catch.

Another tip is to cut up extra bait and "chum" the area from which you are fishing. Canned cat food can work magic as a fish attractant. This gets the fish into a feeding frenzy. Sooner or later, the fish will find bait. If you aren't getting any bites, move to another area.

Another caution needing to be observed is when you take the catch off the hook. Most fish boast strong, sharp dorsal fins that can take the fun right out of a fishing trip if one gets stuck. Catfish are doubly dangerous, so it's a good idea to use a glove or a towel to hold the fish before de-hooking it. Tools are available for this task, but be careful nonetheless.

The main goal is to keep it interesting and have fun. Talk about the environment, observe the pelicans, ducks and seagulls and keep your eyes on the water. Many fish have been caught after showing its location with a swirl.

Fishing is a relaxing and fun hobby, and getting a kid "hooked on fishing" sure beats many other bad habits

are unable to urinate or excrete excess water, the salt or sodium content of the blood is diluted. This results in nausea, vomiting, headache, disorientation, fatigue, seizures and coma.

This 'hyponatremia,' the dilution of your body's salt with drinking too much 'water only,' is seen in endurance athletes who drink large amounts of water. This is relatively rare in most adults with normal kidneys, but occurs too commonly with significant sweating and drinking water only in the quest for hydration.

As you watch the next hot muggy NASCAR race, you can bet it is a very scientifically thought out fluid mixture of water and electrolytes such as sodium, potassium, magnesium, proteins and sugars that drivers drink to maintain their ability to navigate the hot track.

This is the origin of 'Gatorade' and its many copies that have come into play, including energy drinks and smart and vitamin waters.

Why is it important to have sufficient fluid intake and how much should you drink each day? Lack of water can lead to dehydration, a condition that occurs when you don't have enough water in your body to carry out normal body functions.

Even mild dehydration can drain your energy and make you tired. The basic defect is not enough fluid, thus blood pressure, is available to the heart to pump around the body to provide oxygen and nutrients to muscles or organs.

Dehydration is secondary to increased fluid losses because of exercise, especially in hot and humid conditions. This accelerated fluid loss may occur quickly or over a period of days. This article is not referring to the dehydration resulting from illness, food poisoning or the morning after the boys' night out.

Mild to moderate dehydration may rapidly occur with exercise in hot and humid conditions where extra sweating is common place. Early symptoms are a dry mouth, muscle weakness, dizziness or muscle cramps and spasms. This may occur with even a small amount of dehydration or what may be perceived as an easy workout.

This can quickly become serious with severe dehydration, a medical emergency. Symptoms include a very dry mouth and low blood pressure resulting in severe dizziness, low or no urine output. It may progress to delirium, unconsciousness and coma.

A boatload of studies explains how much water to drink when working out or not.

Every day you lose water through breathing, sweat, urine and bowel movements whether you exercise or not. To function properly, you must replenish your body's water supply by consuming beverages and foods containing water.

Numerous factors, both pro and con, explain how much water is needed per day. Factors increasing water loss primarily through sweating are altitude, heat, humidity and activity level. Breathing alone will result in water loss.

How much water does the average, healthy adult living in a temperate climate need? In general, go with the recommend 8 or 9 cups of water, vitamin water, Gatorade, smart water or equivalent. Do not drink all at one time. Hydrate throughout exercise.

On average, food provides about 20 percent of total water intake. Many fruits and vegetables, such as watermelon and tomatoes, are 90 percent or more water.

With increased heat and humidity, make sure to drink more balanced fluids. Any signs of dizziness, blurred or double vision or confusion, then STOP the workout, tennis match or golf game.

Lie down and start increasing your fluid intake by drinking fluid with minerals (electrolytes). Severe dehydration needs intravenous treatment by an EMT on the spot.

Many high school and college football players are toughened up by withholding sufficient water in spring and summer football camps. Better and safer ways exist to get them tougher.

The best treatment is prevention. Hopefully, this column helps you enjoy a safer summer at the 'shallows', on the golf course, fishing or boating.

Have a great summer playing, fishing, golfing, whatever it is that keeps you in shape and enjoying our wonderful area. Keep drinking and be careful because alcohol doesn't count.

The tone was set when Crosby was called for driving Josh Gorges into the

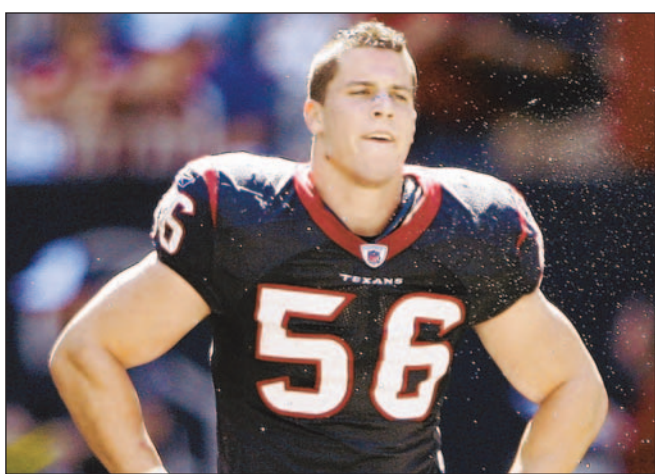
boards with 10 seconds gone — it was Pittsburgh that took the bad penalties, made the wrong decisions, stood around as the other team skated past them.

Cushing retains AP defensive rookie honor

NFL broadcasters, writers revoke and still select Texan

NEW YORK — A positive drug test notwithstanding, Houston Texans linebacker Brian Cushing is still the Associated Press NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

Five days after he was suspended without pay for four games, a nationwide panel of 50 sports writers and broadcasters who cover the NFL voted again to give Cushing the award. He didn't receive anywhere near the 39 votes of his previous landslide victory, but the 18 he got in Wednesday's revote were enough to reclaim the honor.

"I was just glad to hear the news, that people stuck by me. Very honored," Cushing said. "I'm very happy to have the award once again, and I'm just happy with how everything turned out."

Although Cushing said he took a non-steroid substance, the league still considers it a performance-enhancer.

The AP decided to have a revote, in which Cushing finished five votes ahead of Buffalo safety Jairus Byrd. Green Bay linebacker Clay Matthews III got 12, Washington linebacker Brian Orakpo earned three votes,

and St. Louis linebacker James Laurinaitis got one.

One voter was not available to cast a ballot, and two voters abstained. In all, 19 voters switched from Cushing to another player, and one voted for Cushing after picking Byrd originally.

"I'm good," Byrd said, referring to the result. "Yeah, I'm fine with it."

In the original balloting in January, Cushing received 39 votes to six for Byrd, three for Matthews and two for Orakpo.

Cushing did lose his spot on the All-Pro second team, for which he originally had five votes and now has just one.

"If Brian Cushing had come out with a plausible excuse as to why he failed a test for prohibited substances, he could have kept his defensive rookie of the year award as far as I was concerned," said voter Dan Pompei of the Chicago Tribune. "But his silence was deafening, disturbing and damning."

Not to some voters.

"If I had known in January when we initially voted that Brian Cushing had tested positive for a banned substance, I might not have voted for him," said Charean Williams of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram and president of the Pro Football Writers of America. "However, Cushing won the award in January, and I don't feel like we should revise history. I am concerned about the precedent."

Favored for Preakness

Super Saver early favorite for Saturday race at Pimlico

BALTIMORE — Kentucky Derby winner Super Saver was made the early 5-2 favorite Wednesday for the Preakness Stakes, and he'll break from the starting gate next to beaten Derby favorite Lookin At Lucky.

Trained by Todd Pletcher and ridden by Calvin Borel, Super Saver drew the No. 8 post in the field of 12 — two short of the maximum — for Saturday's 1 1/2-mile race at Pimlico. "Eight is perfect," Pletcher said. "It will give Calvin an opportunity to survey things. He'll be able to see who's doing what."

"He's tactical enough that I think he's probably going to land in the first tier. We're not committed to anything. We're just going to let our horse run his race."

Last year, Borel rode favored filly Rachel Alexandra to victory over the boys from the No. 13 post on the far outside.

Seventy favorites have won in the 134-year history of the Preakness, including the last two years. Besides 9-5 Rachel Alexandra last year, Big Brown was the 1-5 favorite when he won in 2008.

After winning the Derby by 2 1/2 lengths on a muddy track with a patented rail-hugging ride, Borel predicted Super Saver would become the first Triple Crown winner since 1978.

"I hope he's right," Pletcher said. "I love the fact that Calvin has a lot of confidence in him. Some of that is because he believes in the horse and he likes the way he's been working. I want a guy up there who's confident."

Lookin At Lucky was the 3-1 second choice of Pimlico oddsmaker Frank Carulli. He'll start next to Super Saver in the No. 7 post after starting the Derby on the rail and finishing sixth. He'll be ridden by Martin Garcia in the Preakness, with Garrett Gomez switching to 10-1 Dublin.

"I am so relieved," trainer Bob Baffert said after the traditional post position draw under a tent in the Pimlico infield. "As soon as the '1' went by, I said, 'That's good.' I wanted the 7, 8 or 9, but you still have to get away well and everything."

The last beaten Derby favorite to win the Preakness was Point Given in 2001. He was trained by Baffert, who hasn't won the race since 2002.

Lookin At Lucky has had anything but luck this year. He got checked into the rail in the Santa Anita Derby and rallied to finish third. In his 3-year-old debut in the Rebel, he got cut up, then came his compromised post position in the Derby.

"I'm just glad that the horse finally drew a decent post position," Baffert said. "Now he's going to have to run hard. The way he's been training, I don't see why he wouldn't."

Paddy O'Prado, the third-place Derby finisher, is the third choice at 9-2. He'll break from the No. 10 post.

"It's fine," said trainer Dale Romans, who also will saddle 20-1 First Dude. "In a 12-horse field, there is not a terrible position. I didn't want to be in the 1 or 12. Anything else we were going to be happy with."

Super Saver arrived Wednesday from Louisville, Ky., where he had been training. He was one of nine Preakness horses on a flight that originated in Southern California to pick up Caracortado, listed at 10-1.

Super Saver and his companions were loaded onto four vans, with a police escort leading the first van with the Derby winner into Pimlico.

Jackson Bend, one of five Derby horses chasing the second leg of the Triple Crown, was on the flight. He's trained by Nick Zito, who hasn't won the Preakness since 1996, and is 12-1.

Pletcher also will saddle Aikenite, who drew the No. 1 hole and is one of three horses listed at 20-1.

Trainer D. Wayne Lukas is taking two shots at winning his sixth Preakness, and his first since 1999. He saddles Dublin, who was seventh in the Derby and got the No. 12 post in the Preakness, and Northern Giant, who ran ninth in the Arkansas Derby. Northern Giant and Yawanna Twist, trained by Rick Dutrow Jr., are the two longest shots in the field at 30-1.

"I feel bad for Wayne," Baffert said. "He didn't want the 12."

The field lost a potential starter Wednesday when a left hind leg injury knocked out Hurricane Ike.

The nine-part 1994 series "Baseball" was a refuge for fans during a year the sport was shut down for a strike.

PBS says Burns is following it up with "The Tenth Inning," a four-hour documentary that will air Sept. 28 and 29, just before playoffs begin.

The film essentially covers Major League baseball since 1994. Covered are the rise in performance-enhancing drugs, the sport's international flavor because of Asian and Latino players, a new Yankees dynasty and the breakthrough of the Boston Red Sox.

A DVD and Blu-ray disc will be available a week later with two additional hours of material.

NEW YORK — Oprah Winfrey is joining with Alan Ball to produce an HBO film based on the nonfiction best-seller "The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks."

The network said Wednesday that Ball, creator and executive producer of HBO's drama series "True Blood," will develop the project with Winfrey and her Harpo Films studio.

Written by Rebecca Skloot, "The Immortal Life" tells the true story of Henrietta Lacks, a poor black woman who died of cervical cancer in 1951. Without her consent, pieces of the tumor that killed her were removed and used for medical exploration and to build a billion-dollar research industry.

No production schedule or air date for the film was announced.

Hepburn honored on postage stamp

WASHINGTON — Katharine Hepburn, star of such classic movies as "African Queen" and "Little Women," took her place on a U.S. postage stamp Wednesday.

The 44-cent stamp was dedicated in ceremonies in Old Saybrook, Conn., and is on sale nationwide.

The red-haired actress becomes the 16th star to be honored on the U.S. Postal Service's Legends of Hollywood stamp series.

During her long career Hepburn won four Academy Awards, the first for her performance in "Morning Glory" in 1933.

Her other Oscar performances were in "Guess Who's Coming to Dinner," 1967; "The Lion in Winter," 1968; and "On Golden Pond," 1981.

Hepburn also received an Emmy for her performance in "Love Among the Ruins," a 1975 made-for-television movie.

Golden memories

Bob Newhart celebrates 50 years in show business

"Fifty years!" Bob Newhart marveled. "It's like 'Where the hell did the time go?'"

The comedian was ruminating recently as he relaxed between concert dates on a 14-city tour celebrating his golden anniversary in show business.

"I'll tell you how the world has changed," he said in the living room of his secluded Bel-Air home. "We were all called the sick comics. Time magazine did an article on all of us: Lenny Bruce, myself, Shelley Berman and Mike Nichols and Elaine May. Lenny was knocking over all kinds of sacred topics, and we all were called 'sick.' I was making people sick because I made fun of a president — Abe Lincoln. Compared to today, it's hard to believe."

Newhart's very first gig was at a night club in Houston. His act went north — but downhill — from there.

"I was in Windsor, Canada, and I died every night," Newhart recalled. "Not a snicker, not a laugh. I almost went back to accounting (his previous endeavor). I told myself, 'That's it.' Then I played Winnipeg, and it was fine. But there isn't a standup comedian who hasn't had just one but a bunch of bad performances."

Two weeks after his debut in Houston, he recorded "The Button-Down Mind of Bob Newhart." "It then went crazy and went beyond anyone's expectations, especially mine."

At 81, Bob Newhart has reached the age when many performers call it quits.

"I've had time off and it drove me nuts," he claimed. "I was crawling up the wall."

"I know some people who say, 'I wanna quit making people laugh. I'm tired of making people laugh.' That doesn't make sense to me. Why would I want to stop doing it? When you do a show and it works and you come off stage and they've had

a good time and you've had a good time. Why stop doing that?"

He explained his modus operandi: "I have an idea and I'll try it in Seattle and maybe refine it a little more in Calgary and refine it a little more in Vancouver. The art of it is doing it 10 million times and see what happens. That's a kick. The art of doing it 10 million times but make it seem like the first time. That's the art of it."

"About 6 p.m., I start pacing up and down getting ready for the show. You never take it for granted, but when you do it will slap you in the face and make you wake up."

He was asked if he ever lost his place during a performance.

"Oh yeah,"

he responded.

"In Las Vegas one time I was doing two shows a night, seven days a week. You start telling a joke, and it wasn't getting the

reaction that I thought it usually did. I'd do it again and they're all staring at me and saying 'Why is he telling this joke again?'"

Newhart seems little changed, though his hair line has retreated. "I got up to 175 pounds, and I was miserable; I've never been that heavy in my life," he said. "I forced myself to get on the stationary bike and I got it down to 165. I'd like to get it down to 160."

"I don't have any health problems," he commented, "but flying is a pain in the ass: lost luggage, canceled flights. But once you are there, it's easy."

Newhart is forever working new material into his routine.

"I'll try out this idea I have about being Catholic and the guilt that comes along with it," he said. "I'll try it out and maybe parts of it will work and parts of it won't."

"It's like a car, I guess. You take out the engine, you put a new one in. That's the fun part. You'll change a word and it doesn't work. What was it that worked yesterday and it didn't work today?"



'GH' has 18 Daytime Emmy nominations

"As the World Turns" was not nominated for best daytime drama. Two of its actors — Jon Lindstrom and Michael Park — were among the five nominees for best lead actor in a soap. Maura West was nominated for best actress.

The National Academy of Television Arts & Sciences will give a lifetime achieve-

ment award to Agnes Nixon, a creative force behind many soap operas. One was "All My Children," whose star Susan Lucci said Nixon helped create the very fabric of daytime TV.

Besides Lindstrom and Park, best actor nominees were: Peter Bergman and Doug Davidson of "The Young and the Restless," and James Scott of "Days of Our Lives."

Joining West as top actress nominees were Crystal Chappell of "Guiding Light," Michelle Stafford of "The

Young and the Restless," Sarah Brown of "General Hospital" and Bobbie Eakes of "All My Children."

The ladies of "The View" have a chance to repeat last year's win as best talk show hosts. Their competition includes Rachael Ray, Bonnie Hunt, Dr. Mehmet Oz and the team of Regis Philbin and Kelly Ripa.

PBS dominated the children's categories. Eight of the 10 shows nominated in the categories of best children's series, best children's animated program and best preschool children's series were on public broadcasting.

Crystal River eatery offers more than just coffee, sweet treats on its menu

Specialty sandwiches each month, easy chairs and an easy, friendly atmosphere make Koffee and More Kafe a replica of authentic Pacific Northwest bistro coffee shops on the east side of Crystal River.

The barista at the cafe offers all the beloved espresso, cappuccino, latte, tea, flavored smoothies and other favorite coffees, both hot and iced. C.J. Rome, a native of Pueblo, Colo., tends the kitchen, turning out an array of delicious sandwiches, soups and breakfast items.

The panini press is a preference here and the sandwiches are traditionally grilled with the cafe's signature ciabatta bread and include such winners as Reubens, clubs, Italian (ham, pepperoni and salami), turkey pesto (much in demand), Monterey chicken, Asiago steak, Buffalo chicken and hot ham and cheese. Whole sandwiches are \$7.45 and

half size are \$4.50.

You can also get whole-wheat wraps and combination fillings on homemade breads. Soups might include Italian wedding soup or specialties like gumbo, bisque and others.

There are breakfast paninis, too, stuffed with your choice of fillings, plus croissants and Kaiser rolls from an area French bakery, 10-inch wraps and New York-style bagels that include blueberry, onion, sesame seed and others. Bagels plain or toasted are just \$1.19 each plus extra with cream cheese, stuffed with bacon, egg and cheese and other options. There is a western omelet panini on ciabatta and turkey sausage is available.

The cafe is the brainchild of Steve and Candice Lasko, who assumed ownership of the establishment last fall. Lasko said he was a consulting engineer for the lumber industry until just after Sept. 11, 2001, when "the industry took a nosedive." Channeling his love of photography and his wife's love of horses, the couple began a new career of motor-home travel to horse shows and events around the country and created a business of photographing the shows. Many of his framed photos are on the walls and for sale in the cafe.

Lasko said they decided to settle in Crystal River because his mother, Patricia Archer, makes her home in the area. She formerly published a Penny Saver in Southeast Florida and later the Fort Lauderdale Tribune newspaper before retiring.

Lasko is a native of Michigan City, Ind., and Candice is an Oregonian, thus the decision to redecorate the cafe to resemble a typical Northwest coffee shop ala Starbucks and others that followed in those footprints.

"Far and away the most popular sandwich is the pesto turkey panini," Lasko said, but the "sandwich specials of the month" such as the March Reuben and April's made-to-order and made-

from-scratch egg salad on home-baked bread are also much in demand.

The cafe seats 28 comfortably at tables inside and four more tables on a very attractive patio outside, sheltered from the weather. In addition, patrons can lounge on two plush loveseats and two overstuffed easy chairs. Checkers anyone? A board is set up at one of the tables.

The Laskos are affable hosts and obviously enjoy meeting and getting to know their customers. The cafe is a delightful place to relax for breakfast and lunch.

Koffee & More Kafe is located in the Bella Vista Plaza just east of Publix Supermarket on State Road 44. It is open Monday through Friday from 6:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. (summer hours). The menu advises that call-ahead orders will be ready when the caller arrives and delivery is available. Call 564-2633 for more information.

Following are recipes shared by C.J. Rome from his 20 years of restaurant experience:

ITALIAN WEDDING SOUP

- 1 50-ounce can of Swanson's chicken broth
- 2 cups diced celery
- 2 cups diced carrots
- 2 cups cooked ground beef (about 1/2 pound)
- 1/2 cup orzo pasta, uncooked
- 1/4 teaspoon parsley flakes
- 1/4 teaspoon Italian seasoning
- 1/2 to 2 ounces frozen spinach, chopped
- Pinch salt and pepper

In a skillet, cook ground beef. While beef is cooking, dice carrots and celery. In a soup pot, sauté celery and carrots and add to broth. Add spinach, Italian seasoning and parsley flakes and bring to boil. Add orzo pasta and cook until orzo pasta is tender. Salt and pepper to taste. Makes about 6 servings.

Tomato growers take fight to blight

Problem best known for causing Irish potato famine

CLAVERACK, N.Y. — As farmers and home gardeners set out their tomatoes this spring, plant experts offered suggestions for preventing another outbreak of late blight, which destroyed millions of dollars worth of tomatoes in the eastern U.S. last year.

Chris Cashen said the tomato plants on his organic farm in the Hudson River Valley were taller than him last July when he discovered some collapsed on their trellises. Within weeks, 80 percent of his crop, which included more than a dozen varieties of cherry, plum, heirloom and hybrid

slicer tomatoes, had died.

Late blight, best known for causing the Irish potato famine of the 1850s, infected tomato plants in at least 23 states and Canada last year, causing millions of dollars in damage and extra labor and pesticide costs. With the outbreak extending from New England to Florida and as far west as North Dakota, farmers had to spend much time and money spraying expensive pesticides to prevent infection or risk losing entire fields.

Cornell University plant pathologist Meg McGrath said another outbreak is likely this year. Late blight has already hit gardens in Florida and Louisiana, but farmers

and gardeners can cut their losses by isolating plots, removing remnants of last year's plants and inspecting for signs of disease.

Agriculture experts also recommend buying plants from local nurseries to avoid the spread of disease over long distances.

"Most other diseases, we can live with," McGrath said.

STRAWBERRY CRUMB PIE

CRUST

- 1/2 stick butter
- 3 ounces cream cheese
- 1 1/4 cups all-purpose flour
- Pinch salt

CRUMB TOPPING

- 1/3 cup sugar
- 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 3/4 cup oatmeal
- 4 tablespoons butter, melted and cooled slightly

FILLING

- 6 cups (2 pounds) quartered strawberries
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice
- 2 1/2 tablespoons cornstarch

In the bowl of a food processor, combine butter and cream cheese and process until smooth. Add flour and salt and process just until mixture come together to form a ball. Re-

move dough from processor and shape into a disk; wrap in plastic wrap and refrigerate for at least 1 hour.

While the pie crust is chilling, prepare the crumb topping. Combining the 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 cup flour and the oatmeal in a small bowl and toss to combine. Add the melted butter and stir thoroughly to incorporate. Refrigerate until chilled. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Working on a lightly floured surface, roll out dough to a thickness of 1/4 inch and fit into a 9 to 10-inch pan. Return piecrust to the refrigerator for 20 minutes. Then blend. Bake until lightly golden brown, about 18 minutes. Cool while you assemble the strawberry filling. Increase oven heat to 375 degrees.

In a mixing bowl, combine the strawberries with the sugar, lemon juice and cornstarch and toss to combine. Spoon the strawberry filling into baked pie crust and spread the crumb topping evenly over the top of the filling. Bake in middle of the oven for 1 hour or until filling is bubbly and crust and crumbs are golden brown.

STRAWBERRY POPPY SEED SALAD

- 1/2 cup salad dressing (low fat if desired)
- 1/4 cup milk
- 1/4 cup white sugar
- 1/8 cup distilled white vinegar
- 1 tablespoon poppy seeds
- 1 head romaine lettuce, torn into bite-size pieces
- 1/2 red onion, sliced
- 1 cup sliced fresh strawberries
- 1/2 cup toasted pecans

In a small bowl, mix together salad dressing, milk, sugar, vinegar, and poppy seeds. Refrigerate until ready to use. Combine lettuce, onion, strawberries

and pecans in a salad bowl. Toss with dressing.

SPINACH, STRAWBERRY & FETA SALAD

- 1/2 shallot, finely chopped
- 2 tablespoons raspberry vinegar
- 2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
- 1/2 pound baby spinach
- 1 cup strawberries, thinly sliced
- 1/3 cup sliced almonds, pecans or walnuts, toasted
- 2 ounces fresh goat cheese, crumbled

In a large bowl, whisk together shallot and vinegar. While whisking constantly, drizzle in oil to make a vinaigrette. Add spinach, strawberries, almonds and goat cheese and gently toss to combine. Serve immediately.

The 20 Burgers of Summer: Chris Kimball

Editor's Note: Get ready to celebrate the delicious diversity of the great American hamburger. Each week for 20 weeks the AP will feature a new burger created by the biggest names in the food world.

When you're dealing with the king of persnickety cooking, you expect a little hassle for your food. You also expect big-time payoff.

The good news? Christopher Kimball, the man behind the pleasantly obsessive-compulsive wing of the food world — Cook's Illustrated and Cook's Country magazines — delivers on both counts. In fact, for a burger as good as Kimball offered up for the AP's 20 Burgers of Summer series, I'd suffer twice the hassle.

No pre-ground beef is harmed in the making of these burgers. Kimball starts with sirloin steak tips and boneless beef short ribs, which are chilled until firm in the freezer, then coarsely ground in a food processor. This produces burgers that are tender, meaty and incredibly moist.

Hands down, they are the best hamburger I have ever eaten. Ever.

"This style of burger is nothing like most modern burgers," Kimball says. "It is rich, thin, craggy, crusty, salty and comes with an incredible sauce. Instead of a softball of meat, you are getting a modest layer of intensely flavored beef and a classic roadhouse burger sauce."

True to form, you earn that goodness with a fussy method for making it. The meat is barely handled, and never gets packed into a patty. The process is more of a gentle shaping of the chopped meat, which is on

a tray, not in your hands. The raw burgers (and the cooked ones, for that matter) are delicate, so it's important to follow Kimball's method carefully. And he adds that the cooked burgers don't hold well. So if you're doubling the recipe, cook the burgers in batches and serve them immediately before frying the next batch.

OLD-FASHIONED BURGERS WITH CLASSIC SAUCE

Start to finish:
1 hour 15 minutes

Servings: 4

- 2 tablespoons mayonnaise
- 1 tablespoon ketchup
- 1/2 teaspoon sweet pickle relish
- 1/2 teaspoon sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon white vinegar
- 1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 10 ounces sirloin steak tips, cut into 1-inch chunks
- 6 ounces boneless beef short ribs, cut into 1-inch chunks
- Kosher salt
- 1 tablespoon unsalted butter, divided
- 4 soft hamburger buns
- 1/2 teaspoon vegetable oil

- 4 slices American cheese
- Thinly sliced onion

To prepare the classic sauce, in a small bowl whisk together the mayonnaise, ketchup, relish, sugar, vinegar and black pepper. Set aside.

To prepare the burgers, place the steak and rib chunks on a baking sheet in a single layer, leaving 1/2 inch of space around each chunk. Freeze the meat until very firm and starting to harden around edges but still pliable, 15 to 25 minutes.

Place half of the meat in a food processor and pulse until it is coarsely ground, 10 to 15 quick pulses, stopping and redistributing the meat around bowl as necessary to ensure the beef is evenly ground. Transfer the meat to the baking sheet, overturning the bowl and without directly touching meat. Repeat grinding with remaining meat.

Spread the meat over sheet and inspect carefully, discarding any long strands of gristle or large chunks of hard meat or fat.

Gently separate the ground meat into 4 equal mounds. Without picking up the meat, use your fingers to gently shape each mound into a loose patty 1/2 inch thick and 4 inches in diame-

ter, leaving the edges and surface ragged. Season the top of each patty with salt and pepper. Using a spatula, flip the patties and season the other side. Refrigerate.

In a heavy-bottomed 12-inch skillet over medium heat, melt 1/2 tablespoon of the butter until foaming. Add the bun tops, cut-side down, and toast until light golden brown, about 2 minutes. Repeat with remaining butter and bun bottoms. Set buns aside and wipe out the skillet with paper towels.

Return the skillet to high heat. Add the oil and heat until just smoking. Using a spatula, transfer the burgers to the skillet and cook without moving for 3 minutes. Flip the burgers over and cook for 1 minute. Top each patty with a slice of cheese and continue to cook until the cheese is melted, about 1 minute longer.

Transfer the patties to the bun bottoms and top with onion. Spread 2 teaspoons of burger sauce on each bun top. Cover burgers and serve immediately.

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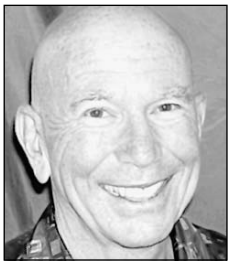
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Wine offers health benefits

It's a men's product advertising itself as a "skin rejuvenator." If we are to believe the ads this stuff will make us guys look younger. Rub a little on and voila, youth.

WINES
& SUCH

Wine's potential health benefits are legion and date back to Biblical days. "Drink a little wine for thy stomach's sake, and other infirmities" suggests the Biblical ancients believed wine taken moderately contained therapeutic benefits. Over the ages wine played an important role in medicine probably because it was a lot safer to drink than the local water.

Hippocrates (450 B.C.) recommended wine as a disinfectant, as medicine, and as part of a healthy diet. The Roman physician Galen (second century A.D.) wrote extensively about the medical benefits of wine, especially as a disinfectant of wounds. The Jewish Talmud stated, "Wine is the foremost of all medicines."

Wine used as medicine continued in Europe through the Middle Ages, practiced in monasteries, hospitals and universities for many years. One amusing story recited a dispute in France in the 17th century, when the physician of Louis XIV proscribed Burgundy for the monarch instead of Champagne, provoking a conflict between two famous wine regions.

Jump to the recent past (1990) when the TV show "60 Minutes" featured a story regarding the health of French wine drinkers, who in spite of a diet rich in world-class-artery blockers (fats from plenty of butter and heavy cream) somehow managed to outlive their cousins across the pond, due to a reduced risk of mortality from heart disease and stroke.

This circumstance was aptly labeled "The French Paradox" and elicited much attention from the media. What was the "magic ingredient" in wine that allows these good people to live longer than Americans who are ultra-conscious of diet? The answer is: no one knows for sure. Yet, hundreds of scientific studies, worldwide, and over a period of many years have demonstrated statistically that moderate wine drinkers live longer than non-drinkers, as well as beer and spirit imbibers. "Moderate" is defined as 4 to 12 ounces of red wine per day, one to three glasses.

In addition to lowering risk from coronary heart disease and stroke, broad studies have pointed to a number of positive health benefits with regard to other common diseases.

Older folks who drink wine on a regular basis are less likely to develop dementia or one of its forms such as loss of cognition or Alzheimer's. Vision has been shown in a 1998 study to be improved by the reduction of impairment due to macular degeneration. As with heart disease wine's anti-coagulant and

anti-oxidant properties may be responsible.

Osteoporosis, or loss of bone density, is right up there as a health problem with diabetes and kidney stone. Heavy drinkers are at risk for bone fractures, but certain studies show an improvement in bone density for moderate consumers of wine. There are too many other positive examples to list here.

Two schools of thought exist with regard to life pleasures. The conservative Puritan school railed against gratification as equal to sin and evil. This narrow view is opposed by a majority today who believe pleasure enhances a healthy lifestyle.

Correct use of wine signifies for many good people hale and hearty entertainment. In mysterious ways good food, pleasant friends and neighbors, and a glass or two of one's favorite wine seem obvious benefits to life's pursuit of happiness. Add to that daily exercise and you have a formula for good health.

Who can argue that happy folks with positive attitudes will outlive a scrooge? It's not a scientific axiom and really cannot be proven by epidemiologic study, but it sure does make good common sense to me.

Two more suggestions for warm-weather drinking are the newly released California Geysers Peak Sauvignon Blanc, crisp, clean and fresh, and the equally delicious New Zealand Bancroft Sauvignon Blanc. At a recent tasting patrons found both delightful, with the American wine holding an edge on floral character, and the latter defined by flavors of grapefruit and citrus. Widely available at about \$10.

And, if you want to smear lotion laced with wine essence on your face, go to it. Surely it can't hurt.

I left mine uncovered and it does not look like the frost hurt them. My plants are beside the house and are protected more from the frost. I sure do hope warmer weather is on the way, though!

Last week, we processed 24 quarts of rhubarb juice, which everyone is enjoying again. I'd like to make some more juice this week. I used one cup less sugar than other years and it still tastes sweet enough. I wash the rhubarb stems, put them in a pot, cover with water, and cook until the rhubarb is tender. Then I strain the juice off the cooked rhubarb to get the juice.

The rhubarb is still growing really fast. The bountiful harvest has also allowed us to have our share of homemade rhubarb custard pie. Yum!

Radishes and lettuce are on the menu, both being plentiful in the garden now. And my winter onions should be ready by next week.

Our little chicks are growing fast. We lost a few, but the rest are doing good.

I stated in my last column that the White Mountain are layers but was mistaken, they are broilers. Our white layers will come in two or three weeks. The White Mountain are chickens that we will butcher for meat. Usually, they are ready to butcher in about four to six weeks, which will fall right about church time.

As far as I know church services will be here in about four weeks. Holding church services in the home like we do requires a lot of cleaning and preparation. Also, four weeks away: the end of the school year. Time just doesn't stand still. They are all excited to soon be out for the summer.

Sunday was Mother's Day, which the children celebrated by giving me two nice potted plants. One is a potted mum and the other is a called an azalea. Both are very nice flowers. I have one hanging in the plant holder by the dining room window. The other makes a very nice centerpiece on our kitchen table.

The children also all

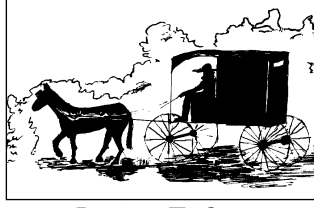
made nice cards for me. The girls made breakfast on Saturday evening and stored it in our gas-refrigerator overnight so I would not have fix breakfast on Sunday morning before church.

On Sunday morning, we walked to the neighbors' house as church services were held there. Since it was Mother's Day the men waited on the tables and washed dishes while the women sat and visited. We were invited back for evening supper, but since a few of our children weren't feeling well we decided to stay home. Then for supper Joe went out and bought pizza. - 1/2 cup warm water

“With late blight, you lose everything, and it’s very contagious, with spores carried on the wind.”

Late blight is caused by a fungus-like organism called an oomycete that’s spread by airborne spores. It flourishes in cool, wet conditions and can survive during the winter in living tissue, such as potatoes buried underground.

Last year was unusual in that late blight arrived early in the season rather than the fall, when it typically shows up, and it thrived throughout the unusually cool, wet summer, McGrath said.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture didn’t investigate the cause of the outbreak. But pathologists suspect mass-produced tomato plants shipped to big box stores from the South were the source because blight was found on tomato seedlings at garden centers for the first time and the same strain was found in 23 states, McGrath said.

This year, big nurseries are

being aggressive in spraying and taking other steps to prevent infection, and the outbreak shouldn’t be as bad, she said.

Alabama-based Bonnie Plants, which grows 125 million tomato plants a year for sale at big box stores, pulled all its tomato plants from Home Depot, Lowe’s, Kmart and Walmart stores in New York and New England when the blight appeared. The company said the plants had likely been infected after shipment.

Bonnie Plants uses a strict spray program to prevent infection and since last year’s outbreak, it has added three new fungicides for late blight to its regimen, president Stan Cope said.

Still, Cashion said he fears there could be another outbreak linked to plants from big box stores because their employees aren’t trained to spot infections as farm workers are. He doesn’t spray, but plants tomatoes from his own greenhouses in numerous, separate plots on his farm in Claverack so it’s harder for any disease to infect all of them.

John Mishanec, a coopera-

tive extension agent in eastern New York, advised home gardeners to buy tomatoes and other plants from local growers, not only to support the farms, but to avoid infections that might be carried from afar.

Because the blight can survive over the winter in potatoes left in the field, McGrath advised growers to throw out any potatoes left from last summer and destroy any potato plants that sprout from last year’s tubers. The disease doesn’t survive over the winter in soil, she said.

“The blight strain we had last year really liked tomatoes, but it also was able to infect potatoes,” McGrath said. “We’ll see it again this year if we don’t get rid of all the potatoes that were infected.”

Amy Hepworth, an organic grower whose customers include Whole Foods and co-ops in the New York City metropolitan area, fought off late blight with fierce tenacity on her 25 acres in Milton. As an organic farmer, she could not use fungicides but could spray with copper, which leaves a protective blue residue but must be reapplied after each

rain. “Sometimes when it was really bad, we’d be spraying three to five times a week,” Hepworth said. “It was unprecedented. I’ve grown tomatoes for 20 years and never seen that kind of pressure.”

When she found signs of blight, Hepworth burned the plants with propane torches and carried the remains out of the field. The effort paid off.

“We sold tomatoes up until the first week of December,”

Hepworth said. Cornell University in recent years has developed tomato varieties resistant to late blight, including Mountain Magic and Plum Regal, but the seeds aren’t expected to be widely available until next year, McGrath said.

The best advice for tomato growers, whether they are gardeners or commercial farmers, is to be vigilant, watching for black patches on stems, leaves and fruit, and catch any

sign of disease early, McGrath said. Growers who suspect blight should have it confirmed by a cooperative extension agent who will alert other growers.

“This is a community disease,” McGrath said. “If you’ve got it, you have to tell everybody. We have to know where it’s occurring to protect farms.”

Blight-infected plants must be pulled up, bagged and disposed of in the trash.

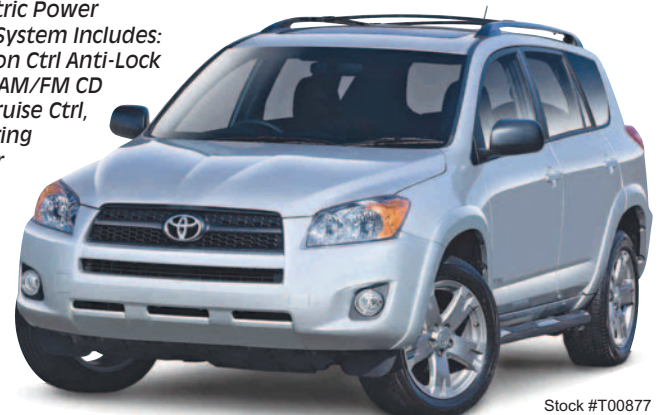
