WRWSA plans call for water transfers from Citrus to Hernando counties

It is a simple dotted oval on an engineer's map, but to Al Grubman, it's the start of something big and bad.

Grubman, president of the water-watchdog group TOO FAR, told county commissioners Tuesday that regional plans call for water transfers from Citrus to Hernando counties.

That wasn't news to three commissioners who are members of the Withlacoochee Regional Water Supply Authority, or WRWSA, which is developing a

master plan on a variety of issues in the four-county district.

Grubman said the authority board on June 16 will consider several recommendations from WRWSA Executive Director Jack Sullivan, including developing plans for a new well in Citrus County that includes pipes to a new well and an existing well in Hernando County.

He provided a district map showing five current wells, represented by solid oval lines, and oval lines. The Citrus County well is near Meadowcrest.

"The most bad, insulting, nasty thing is the Withlacoochee Regional Water Supply Authority is piping water to Hernando County," Grubman said.

The water authority, which serves Citrus, Hernando, Marion and Sumter counties, is recommending four new public wells in the district. It also recommends

# Remodel complete, Key Center's Sweets and Stuff hosting grand reopening

Barnes & Noble and Books-A-Million with their in-store coffee shops have nothing on the Key Training Center's Sweets and Stuff shop in Inverness.

After closing briefly for a complete remodel, the combination used bookstore and place to get a cup of coffee or a soda and a homemade sweet treat is open for business.

Sweets and Stuff is adjacent to the Key Center thrift store on West Main Street in Inverness.

Upon entering the shop, one of 10 Key Center program participants ("consumers"), such as 25-year-old Andre Wade greets you. If you have kids with you, there's a children's section with kidsize tables and chairs and a lot of children's books.

# Great Escape veteran dies at 97

Harrison, a gardener at POW camp, was RAF pilot

LONDON — Jack Harrison, who survived the Great Escape plot by Allied prisoners in a German prison in World War II, has died at age 97, his family

Harrison died Friday at Erskine veterans' home in Bishopton, Scotland. As one of the camp's gardeners, Har-

rison helped dispose of the dirt exca-

vated from three escape tunnels. He was 98th on the list of some 200 inmates designated to make the escape on March 24, 1944, but only 76 got away before guards detected the breakout and raised the alarm.

The breakout was celebrated in the 1963 film "The Great Escape" starring Steve McQueen and James Garner. Only three men managed to reach

British news reports said Harrison was believed to be the last survivor of the plot, but this could not be confirmed. In addition to the 200 men who won places in the escape queue through a drawing, others were also involved in preparations.

"I guess it was a blessing in disguise I never made it through, as most were shot," Harrison said in an interview last year with the Scottish Sun newspaper. "But the main purpose wasn't just to escape. It was to outfox the Germans. It was a huge moral victory. It humiliated Hitler and gave the Nazis a bloody nose."

Of the three tunnels dug by prisoners, two had been found by guards and closed before the escape attempt.

When the escape was detected, Harrison said he had to quickly burn his disguise as a Siemens engineer and get back into his prison uni-

"I was to be a Hungarian electrician so I became Aleksander Regenyi, who was employed by a German firm," he recalled.

Harrison was a Royal Air Force pilot who was shot down and captured in November 1942 on his first mission, a raid on the Dutch port of Den Helder. He was taken to Stalag Luft III prison near Sagan in eastern Germany — now Zagan,

Poland. After the war, Harrison resumed his teaching career. He retired in 1975 as director of education for the isle of Bute.

"To others he was considered a war hero, but to us he was much more than that. He was a family man first and foremost, as well as a church elder, Rotarian, scholar, traveler and athlete," his son Chris and daughter Jane said in a

statement. They said Harrison took up marathon running in his seventies to raise money for

#### Body discovered at **Ozello restaurant**

A man's body was discovered near Peck's Old Port Cove restaurant on Ozello Trail in Ozello Tuesday afternoon. Authorities received the call at 2:35 p.m. and the body was partially in the water and partially out of the water on the shoreline near the restaurant parking lot, said sheriff's office spokeswoman Gail Tierney. According to a Citrus County Sheriff's Office news release, "CCSO detectives are saying that the man's death appears to be consistent with a suicide. A possible weapon also has been recovered. Tentative identification has been made, but next of kin have not yet been notified. Cause of death will be determined by autopsy." The investigation is continuing.

TALLAHASSEE — BP brought another \$25 million to Florida on Tuesday, but instead of a thank you they got a lot more criticism.

Between barrages, Gov. Charlie Crist and three independently elected Cabinet members asked for more money and they want it fast to help Floridians recover business losses resulting from the oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico now invading the state's coastline.

# Beautification effort is phase four of city's downtown improvement plan

Workers are putting the finishing touches on Dampier Street in Inverness and the road will likely be open to traffic by the end of next week.

The project to beautify and improve the approximately 2.5 blocks of Dampier Street from North Apopka Avenue to Wallace Brooks Park is the fourth phase of the city's downtown streetscape plan. So far, the city of Inverness has spent about \$3 million on the and trash receptacles. The traf-

streetscape projects using Com-Development Block Grants, according to Ken Koch, the city's development services director. That figure includes \$450,000 for the Dampier Street portion.

The Dampier Street project adds almost 30 parking spaces to the area, including on-street spaces, as well as 16 spaces inside a new parking lot at the end of the road.

The road has brick crosswalks, elevated speed tables, streetlights, curbs, gutters, benches

# **School board** votes to put tax change on ballot

Citrus County School Board members voted unanimously Tuesday to approve an amended resolution directing the Citrus County Commission to place a measure on the ballot for the Nov. 2 general election to increase schools' capital outlay tax rate from 1.5 to 1.75 mills.

Kenny Blocker, executive director of business services, said the quarter mill would mean \$25 annually per every \$100,000 of taxable home value.

School Board Chairwoman Pat Deutschman said a resolution previously adopted had to be revised, which is why the resolution slated to go before county commissioners Tuesday was pulled shortly before the meeting. One of the changes to the referendum is that the millage rate change will only be approved for two years instead of being open-

ended, she said.

Despite the increase, Deutschman said the tax rate will remain at what is has

been for the last two years. The capital outlay tax rate now stands at 1.75 mills. The state Legislature removed 0.25 of a mill from school districts' capital outlay funds, but allows them to recoup the money through voter referendum.

Deutschman said she doesn't believe the school district has had a referendum for a change of taxes in a public vote before. It's just a new thing and

nobody's happy about it," she said. School board attorney

Wes Bradshaw said the revised resolution is slated to go to the Citrus County Commission on June 11 in order to be on the agenda for the June 22 meeting and go to the supervisor of elections before the end of the month.

#### Two men killed in crash with fountain

Two Spring Hill men were killed over the weekend in a crash involving a decorative fountain.

#### State to fine contractor over late test scores

#### Three found dead outside house

The Volusia County Sheriff's Office says a man killed a former girlfriend and her husband outside a home in Deltona before fatally shooting himself.

A sheriff's office spokesman says the gunman shot his former girlfriend in a car parked on a driveway at her home and then shot the woman's husband when he came to the front door Tuesday morning. The shooter then turned the gun on himself and later died at a hospital.

#### Wife of man who killed 4 had recently left

The wife of a South Florida man who authorities say went on a shooting rampage, killing four and injuring three others at a restaurant, had moved out of their home a few days earlier.

Hialeah police Det. Carl Zogby says Liazan Molina had recently moved out of the couple's Coral Gables home.

Investigators say her husband, 38-year-old Gerardo Regalado, showed up at the Yoyito Restaurant late Sunday, shooting and killing Molina outside and then taking aim at six other women inside. Regalado, the half brother of former baseball star Orlando "El Duque" Hernandez, was found dead in an apparent suicide.

#### Billionaire sex offender settles fee dispute

Billionaire sex offender Jeffery Epstein has settled a dispute over legal fees that threatened a deal he made to avoid federal prosecution over alleged assaults of multiple young women and girls.

Court papers filed Monday in Miami indicated Epstein had reached a settlement with lawyers appointed to represent some of his alleged victims. The lawyers claimed Epstein's failure to pay violated his agreement to avoid federal charges. Epstein said there was no violation and disputed the \$2 million figure.

#### **Crist: Quick action** likely on bill

TALLAHASSEE - Gov. Charlie Crist says he'll probably make a decision "sooner than later" on a bill that would require women in most cases to get an ultrasound before they can obtain an abortion.

Crist, who abandoned the Republican Party to run for the U.S. Senate as an independent, on Tuesday again expressed concerns about the GOP-sponsored legislation (H.B. 1143).

He's worried particularly about a requirement for women seeking a first trimester abortion to pay for the ultrasound. It can cost from a few hundred dollars to about \$1,500.

Crist said he thought lawmakers put off sending him the bill until Monday, more than a month after the legislative session ended, to give supporters more time to campaign against

#### **Judge denies series** of motions in case

ORLANDO — A Florida judge has denied a series of motions by defense attorneys in the case of a mother charged with murdering her 2-year-old daughter.

Chief Judge Belvin Perry ruled Tuesday that Casey Anthony's jail visitation log records can't be sealed and he denied a request from defense attorneys seeking forensic research from prosecutors. The judge also said prosecutors had complied with an order to list the aggravating circumstances which

if Anthony is convicted.

Anthony has pleaded not quilty to first-degree murder and has said a baby sitter kidnapped her daughter, Caylee. Her trial is set to start next May.

#### **Person dies after** being hit by train

DADE CITY - Police are investigating the death of a person who was hit by a train in Florida Gulf coast area.

Authorities said they are trying to identify the person and find out what happened that led to the Tuesday crash.

#### **Pair injured in** parasailing accident

#### **Marvin Isley, 56**

R&B LEGEND

CHICAGO — Marvin Isley, the bass player who helped give R&B powerhouse the Isley Brothers their distinctive sound, has died at a Chicago hospital. He was 56.

Isley died Sunday morning at an inpatient hospice at Weiss Memorial Hospital, according to hospital spokeswoman Catherine Gianaro. She could not confirm a cause of death.

Islev stopped performing in 1996 after suffering complications from diabetes that included a stroke, high blood pressure, the loss of both legs and use of his left

He joined his brothers' band in 1973. By that time, the Isley Brothers had established themselves with hits like 1959's "Shout," which sold more than 1 million records. Isley splintered off to form Isley-Jasper-Isley in the 1980s and returned to the Isley Brothers in the 1990s. The group was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 1992, their career has spanned six decades.

At one point, there were five Isley brothers in the group, including Marvin. Today, only Ronald Isley is touring full time after a three-year stint in federal prison for tax evasion.

The group's hits included "Twist and Shout," later recorded by The Beatles, "Love The One You're With," and the Grammy-winning 1969 smash, "It's Your Thing."

In a 2001 interview, Marvin Isley told the Atlanta Journal-Constitution he regretted spending decades ignoring his diabetes.

"If I would have listened, if I would have understood diabetes like I understood music, maybe these things wouldn't have happened,' Isley said at the time.

Milgrom wrote a threevolume series on Leviticus, interpreting Jewish dietary and purification rituals, as well as the Bible's position on homosexuality. He concluded the ban on homosexuality applies only to Jewish

Relatives say he died on Sunday at Hadassah Uni-Hospital Jerusalem of a brain hemorrhage after a fall.

He was born in Brooklyn, New York. He chaired the department of Near Eastern Studies at the University of California at Berkeley and retired to Israel in 1994.

He is survived by his wife, Jo. four children and 14 grandchildren. His funeral was Monday in Jerusalem.

Born in Khartoum, Sudan, in 1931, Voutsinas played parts in films such as Mel Brooks' "The Producers" and "History of the World: Part 1," as well as Luc Besson's "The Big Blue."

He directed Fonda in the brief Broadway show "The Fun Couple," later describing her as "the only great love of my life."

AMSTERDAM — Dutch voters seeking fiscal discipline and tighter immigration laws appear ready to back a new right-wing government in a national election today — and may even

ernment in nearly 100 years — the Peoples Party for Freedom and Democracy, known as the VVD - has taken a commanding lead in the polls. That positions Mark Rutte, its 43-year-old leader, to be a potential prime minister and form the country's next cabinet.

Rutte has not ruled out bringing Wilders into a governing coalition.

The country's fourth election since 2002 comes after the Labor Party brought down Prime Minister Jan Peter Balkenende's centrist government in March over its refusal to extend the Dutch military contribution to fighting the Taliban in Afghanistan.

But Afghanistan has barely been mentioned in the three-month campaign, as budget cuts rose swiftly up the agenda and immigration remained a key issue.

Wilders, the maverick politician who denounces Islam as a fascist religion, seized the spotlight early with a program that included a tax on headscarves the economy. worn by Muslim women.

# Thomas retires not a moment too soon

ome prejudices are tolerated by elites in this country. Examples: One can regularly smear political conser-

vatives as know-noth-Evangelical Christians as believers in a fantasy; Roman Catholics for their church's stand against abortion and birth control; and Republicans as greedy people who care only about profit and power. Bill Maher regularly serves up a menu of these prejudices on his HBO program. Comedy Central

is working on a cartoon series mocking Jesus Christ, but altered a sketch featuring the Prophet Muhammad for fear of a Muslim backlash. Some prejudices must be controlled.

One prejudice seems to be gaining a certain cachet. Like a volcano, it occasionally erupts to reveal what has been churning below the surface. That prejudice is anti-Semitism and the exploding volcano that set it off is Helen Thomas, the longtime "senior" White House correspondent for United Press International and more recently a columnist for Hearst Newspapers. That is until Monday, when Ms. Thomas, bombarded by criticism over her recent statements regarding Jews in Palestine, relinquished her frontrow seat at presidential press briefings and announced a hasty retirement.

Ms. Thomas' latest trouble began on May 27 at a White House ceremony marking Jewish Heritage Month. Rabbi David Nesenoff saw Thomas and asked her opinion about recent developments in the Middle East. Thomas, who is of Lebanese de-

scent, said the Jews in Israel should "go home to Germany, Poland and the United States.'

Should the "Palestinians" go home to Jordan, which is where many of them are from? Where would Thomas like to send the 1 million Jews from Arab countries, or the Ethiopian Jews? Perhaps Thomas should "go home" to Lebanon. Besides, the Jews are home.

After her remarks went viral on the Internet, Thomas issued one of those statements that could have come from a politician she has covered: "I deeply regret my comments I made last week regarding the Israelis and the Palestinians. They do not reflect my heart-felt belief that peace will come to the Middle East only when all parties recognize the need for mutual respect and tolerance. May that day come soon." Cue "The Age of Aquarius" music.

A generous person might forgive a one-off "slip of the tongue," but Helen Thomas has a long history of questioning and opposing anything Israel does in its own defense. While not all criticism of Israel should be translated as anti-Semitism, Thomas' rhetoric over the years seems to betray a deep-seated hatred of Jews.

During the Israeli battle with the terrorist organization Hamas in Gaza in 2008-2009, Thomas was interviewed by NPR and, according to Yid With Lid, a Weblog of commentary on Jewish issues, compared the Israeli Defense Force action to Nazi Germany. That is like blaming African Americans for police brutality during the civil rights movement.

Has Thomas forgotten that many of the Jews she wants to "go home" to Germany and Poland had relatives who died in the Holocaust because they could not escape from those countries? One -but by no means the only — reason Israel was reconstituted as a nation in 1948 was so that Jews would have a place to go should their existence again be threatened. Jews also have a long-established and legitimate relationship with not only the land in which Israelis now live, but also a much wider geographical, cultural and religious heritage, which they have relinquished in repeated bids for peace.

I have known and sometimes admired Helen Thomas for many years, but every professional — be it an athlete, or a journalist needs to recognize when it's time to go. And, thankfully, Helen Thomas knew it was time to go. Most employers would not want to be associated with a prejudiced employee, now Hearst Corporation won't have to.

#### On trial

In opening statements, defense attorney Sam Adam Jr. told jurors Blagojevich is an honest man who "didn't take a dime" but had the bad judgment to trust the wrong people. "The guy ain't corrupt," Adam whispered, after slamming his hand down. In her opening statement, federal prosecutor Carrie E. Hamilton methodically laid out what she called a pattern of lying, scheming and extortion that consumed the former governor's time in office, and intensified as his personal financial troubles deepened. Blagojevich has pleaded not guilty to trying to sell or trade President Barack Obama's former Senate seat.

#### **Several missing in 2nd Texas blast**

DARROUZETT, Texas — A sheriff's official says several people are missing and others are injured after a natural gas pipeline exploded in a remote part of the Texas Panhandle.


Vickie Nelson of the Lipscomb County Sheriff's Office said Tuesday's blast was near the small town of Darrouzett, a few miles from the Oklahoma border.

Nelson didn't have details about the exact number of missing or injured.

The blast about 270 miles northeast of Lubbock is the second natural gas line explosion in Texas in as many days. A line exploded in Cleburne, south of Dallas, on Monday as utility workers were digging in the area. One worker was killed in that blast.

# Leak may be bigger than BP says

NEW ORLEANS — While BP is capturing more oil from its blown-out well with every passing day, scientists on a team analyzing the flow said Tuesday that the amount of crude still escaping into the Gulf of Mexico may be considerably greater than what the government and the company have claimed.

Their assertions — combined with BP's rush to build a bigger cap and its apparent difficulty in immediately processing all the oil being collected — have only added to the impression that BP and the government are still floundering in dealing with the catastrophe and may be misleading the public.

The cap that was put on the ruptured well last week collected about 620,000 gallons of oil on Monday and another 330,000 by noon

Doug Suttles struck an upbeat tone about the anticipated progress of the oil containment, saying that the spill 'should be down to a relative trickle by Monday or Tuesday."

Suttles told The Associated Press in a stop in Alabama that the arrival of a second vessel in the coming days to help pump the oil from the deepwater gusher will allow engineers to make significant progress, even as others involved in the disaster were much less optimistic and continued to criticize BP over its litany of failures to control the spill.

A team of researchers and government officials assembled by the Coast Guard and run by the director of the U.S. Geological Survey is studying the flow rate and hopes to present its latest findings in the coming days on the biggest oil spill in U.S. history.


In an interview with The Associated Press, team member and Purdue University engineering professor Steve Wereley said it was a "reasonable conclusion" but not the team's final one to say that the daily flow rate is, in fact, somewhere between 798,000 gallons and 1.8 million gallons.

"BP is claiming they're capturing the majority of the flow, which I think is going to be proven wrong in short order," Wereley said. "Why don't they show the American public the before-andafter shots?"

He added: "It's strictly an estimation, and they are portraying it as fact."

Other members of the team also told AP they expect their findings to show higher numbers than the current government estimate, but they weren't ready to say how much higher.

# At inmate's request, Utah prepares firing squad for third time

SALT LAKE CITY — Barring a last-minute reprieve, Ronnie Lee Gardner will be strapped into a chair, a hood will be placed over his head and a small white target will be pinned over his heart.

The order will come: "Ready,


The 49-year-old convicted killer will be executed by a team of five anonymous marksmen firing with a matched set of .30-caliber rifles. He is to be the third person executed by firing squad in Utah — or anywhere else in the U.S. — since the death penalty was reinstated in

Utah was a long holdout in keeping the method, which it has used in 40 of its 49 executions in the last 160 years. Utah lawmakers made lethal injection the default method of execution in 2004, but inmates condemned before then can still choose the firing squad.

That's what Gardner did in April, politely telling a judge, "I would like the firing squad, please." Neither he nor his attorneys have said

Critics decry the firing squad as a barbaric method that should have been relegated to the dustbin of the frontier era.

"The firing squad is archaic, it's violent, and it simply expands on

Gilmore's story inspired author Norman Mailer's Pulitzer Prize-winning novel, "The Executioner's Song.

Utah last used the firing squad in 1996 to execute John Albert Taylor, who was convicted of the 1989 rape and strangulation of an 11-year-old girl. It is the only state that allows execution by firing squad, though Oklahoma law calls for that method if both lethal injection and electrocution are deemed unconstitu-

# Unemployed vet wins S.C. Dem nomination

WASHINGTON — An unemployed military veteran has stunned South Carolina Democratic Party leaders by winning the nomination to challenge Republican U.S. Sen. Jim DeMint.

Thirty-two-year-old Alvin Greene of Manning defeated 64-year-old Vic Rawl of Charleston in Tuesday's primary. Rawl is a former judge and legislator, who had about \$186,000 cash available and had already scheduled a fundraising event for Thursday. Greene raised no money in the contest, had no signs and no website.

Democratic Party Chairwoman Carol Fowler says Greene will be a much weaker candidate than Rawl going into November against tea party favorite DeMint.

Across the country Tuesday, political outsiders tested their strength on the busiest day of an unpredictable pri-

But it's not the simple. It's not always that equitable.

The reason the USGA's cutoff for top 50 in the world is a month before the U.S. Open is to figure out how many spots should be allocated for 13 sectional qualifying sites across the country. For the U.S. Open, college kids should have every right as a PGA Tour player.

Even so, it's easy to make an exception for the Memorial, which typically has one of the best fields in golf on one of the top courses, is run by the greatest name in golf (Jack Nicklaus) and is played just two weeks before the U.S. Open.

The USGA can alter its criteria to find a spot for the Memorial champion without causing any problems. Remember, Bo Van Pelt and Bill Haas were among the players who could have been exempt from qualifying had they won because it would have been their second victory since the last U.S. Open.

The Masters saves room for PGA Tour winners until the very last week, although it never has a full field. It rarely has 100 players. The British Open takes the leading player not already eligible from among the top 10 at the two PGA Tour and European Tour events before the British Open.

#### Nationals 5, Pirates 2

WASHINGTON — Over-hyped? Are you kidding? Stephen Strasburg went beyond the hype — and anyone's reasonable expectations — by striking out 14 batters in his electric major league debut.

With a standing-room-only crowd cheering every pitch, the Washington Nationals phenom put on a dazzling display of pitching power Tuesday night in a 5-2 win over Pittsburgh. His fastballs reached 100 mph, and the Pirates found his nasty curves nearly impossible to hit.

Last year's No. 1 overall draft pick the one with the record \$15.1 million contract — threw his first pitch 97 mph and got stronger as the game progressed. He struck out the last seven batters he faced, and all nine Pirates in the starting lineup fanned at least once.

The 21-year-old right-hander took a curtain call after pitching seven innings. He allowed four hits, two earned runs and didn't walk a batter, piling up the most strikeouts in a major league debut since J.R. Richard fanned 15 for Houston in 1971.

Karl Spooner also struck out 15 in his debut with the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1954. He and Richard are the only two pitchers with more strikeouts than Strasburg in a big league debut since 1920 — and Spooner and Richard both had three walks.

Strasburg also tied Max Scherzer of the Detroit Tigers for most strikeouts in a game in the majors this season. Scherzer had 14 on May 30 against Oakland.

Strasburg was removed for a pinch

hitter in the bottom of the seventh with a 4-2 lead. When it was announced that he had set a team record for strikeouts since the franchise's move to Washington in 2005, the crowd roared again

and Strasburg emerged to the top step

of the dugout and tipped his cap. He threw 94 pitches — roughly the limit imposed by management before the game — and 65 were strikes. He made one noticeable mistake, a 90 mph changeup golfed by Delwyn Young into the first row in right field for a two-run homer in the fourth inning.

#### **Patriots sign rookie UF's Aaron Hernandez**

FOXOROUGH, Mass. -The New England Patriots have signed former Florida tight end Aaron Hernandez, their fourthround pick in the 2010 draft.

The 6-1, 250-pound Hernandez had 68 catches for 850 yards — both school records for tight ends — while playing with star quarterback Tim Tebow last season.

The 113th overall selection in the draft, Hernandez acknowledged that he violated the substance abuse police once in college but denied published reports he was a multiple offender.

# Fun with flumes

hen the summer heat has left you panting, cool off by slipping, sliding and splashing into spring-fed fun at Buccaneer Bay. The water park is part of Weeki Wachee Springs State Park. Every day, 117 million gallons of 72-degree water bubble out of the spring that serves as the stage for the worldfamous mermaid show — and also feeds the water park's four flume rides, lazy river and play area for children 6 and younger.

John Athanson, a park spokesman, said visitors love the flume rides, especially the two that empty into the Weeki Wachee River — Pirates Revenge, a twisting, turning descent; and The Thunderbolt, a pair of straight slides that send riders on a speedy descent. Athanson said another draw is the opportunity to swim in

the spring itself. "That's always a favorite," he said.

He noted that Buccaneer Bay is Florida's only spring-fed water park.

According to the park's website, the basin of the spring is 100 feet wide with limestone sides. The spring is so deep that the bottom has yet to be found.

# Just how useful are those marigolds?

Visitors to my garden frequently comment, upon seeing a few marigold plants growing in my vegetable beds, that I must have planted them for pest control.

After all, marigolds are helped supposed to be one of the workhorses of biological pest control. Plant them and plant pests will be killed or if they are lucky appealing concept: ing? sunny plants that thwart pestilence and blight even as they brighten your garden with blossoms

#### **HOW MARIGOLDS ARE PEST UNFRIENDLY**

Marigolds' greatest claim to pest control fame is their effect, documented in numerous studies, on nematodes, which are a kind of worm that in some cases is destructive to plants.

Like other members of the daisy family, marigolds also do their share in feeding nectar to beneficial insects, such as syrphid flies, who prey on aphids and other insects that attack garden plants. Members of the daisy family do not yield nearly as much nectar as flowers of the parsley family — dill, for instance — but daisy family flowers keep the nectar flowing longer.

Other beneficial effects of marigolds are less dramatic or useful. They have been shown to have some slight effect in repelling cabbage worms from cabbage and their kin. And some marigolds, especially a variety called Stinking Roger, repel flies, except that the flies are the kind that bother cows and other domestic animals, not plants.

Read and listen to claims made for marigolds, and you also could press it into service as a fungus killer, an insect killer, even a selective weed killer.

#### **WEIGH PROS AND CONS**

Hold on a second, however, before you blanket your garden in marigolds. Some of these claims have

been blown out of proportion.

Those marigolds that repel cabbage worms: They also stole water and nutrients from nearby cabbages. So which is better? Stunted cabbages, or those with some leaves merely repelled, right? It's lacy from caterpillar feed-

Marigolds, especially the Gem varieties, also are a favorite food of slimy slugs and Japanese beetles. As such, they have been used to stop Japanese beetle damage — by attracting the beetles away from other garden

Yes, perhaps West will decide that East would have played the queen at trick one if he had it, but that would not be best if West had led from A-K-x-x or A-K-J-x. At least, though, South has given West something to think about.

If instead South plays the two at trick one, West knows East has played his lowest spade. And with doubleton queen-six, East would have played the queen, hoping for the best.

The rule is: Play like the third hand. If you want the leader to continue his suit, drop an unnecessarily high card (an encouraging signal). If you prefer the leader to shift at trick two, play your lowest By playing his eight and hiding the two. Now West might believe card (a discouraging signal).



If the doctor's office looks like a showroom, the focus is on sales and cosmetics, not medicine. You're no longer a patient. You're a customer.


