## Schultz: Scallop season, now

*Homosassa representative asks governor to start season early due to concerns about oil spill*

The Deepwater Horizon oil spill has caused state Rep. Ron Schultz to ask the governor to open harvest season for bay scallops two weeks ahead of schedule. Schultz, R-Homosassa, sent

a letter Wednesday to Gov. Charlie Crist asking to have scallop season start June 15. The regular season runs from July 1 to Sept. 10. "From Tarpon Springs to Steinatchee, summer business is driven by recreational scallop harvesting," Schultz wrote. "Given the fact that the

oil may well be lethal to our filter-feeding marine life, the premature harvesting may not impact future seasons."

Although no oil from the spill has reached Citrus County and isn't expected to anytime soon, Schultz said he made the request because he has concerns about how the oil from the spill and the dispersants used in the Gulf of Mexico might impact scallop populations.

"It could be a very real danger to our scallop industry," he said in an interview Thursday. "Let's get started. Let people come out and enjoy themselves." Citrus County tourism director Marla Chancey said

## EDC: Get ball rolling ASAP

The county can help business growth by reviewing development applications before they are submitted, the head of the community development division said Thursday.

"My goal is to network, because we want people to be comfortable in calling us," Jenette Collins said during the monthly meeting of the Citrus County Economic Development Council's board of directors.

"We offer preapplication meetings," Collins said. "We invite people to go through the application with us in a roundtable discussion."

Staff sitting in on the discussion would include those from such areas as planning, engineering, utilities, building and fire services: "anybody who is going to review the project."

"This gives them a lot of information as they are doing their due diligence of that property," Collins said.

In other business:

■ Commissioner Joe Meek, EDC president, said a committee would start meeting next week to form a framework for developing a medical corridor along County Road 491.

■ Meek said Citrus County is part of the Tampa Bay Partnership's cluster study that it commissioned from Stanford University, and would use information to update the county's comprehensive plan.

John Siefert, EDC executive director, said the study already had started, and that Stanford would send staff here to conduct focus groups. The study will look at current job skills and which skills would be needed in the future.

"By the first quarter of next year, we should have the results," Siefert said.

■ Directors agreed to a budget for the next fiscal year. The EDC would ask the county commission for \$110,000 from the business license tax.

Director Dixie Hollins urged board members to increase the membership and to get more people to attend the annual barbecue fundraiser.

## Homosassa man arrested for child porn

Citrus County deputies arrested a 63-year-old Homosassa man Wednesday on multiple child pornography charges.

Lee Everett Hendry, 10539 W. Halls River Road, Lot 122, was jailed on \$210,000 bond.

According to a Citrus County Sheriff's Office arrest report, a detective with the Internet Crimes Against Children unit identified an Internet protocol (IP) address possibly from Homosassa that was sharing files con-

taining child pornography.

"I downloaded a couple of the files listed and viewed them to which they depicted images of child pornography," the detective wrote in her report.

A subpoena request was sent to Bright House Networks to identify the account holder and the results came back to Hendry's residence.

A circuit judge signed a search warrant for the home and when the detective returned to her office, she reportedly noticed the same IP address was actively downloading child pornography.

Several deputies arrived at the home to serve the search warrant while child pornography was still being downloaded, the report stated.

"Upon knocking on the front door and announcing ourselves, I observed a figure get up from the couch and begin to do something before coming to the door," the detective wrote.

Worried that the person was deleting evidence, the detective opened the front door and went inside, the report stated.

## Embarrassment at Arlington as remains misplaced

An Army investigation has found that potentially hundreds of remains at Arlington National Cemetery have been misidentified or misplaced.

WASHINGTON — An Army investigation has found that potentially hundreds of remains at Arlington National Cemetery have been misidentified or misplaced, in a scandal marring the reputation of the nation's preeminent burial ground for its honored dead since the Civil War.

Army Secretary John McHugh announced Thursday that the

cemetery's two civilian leaders would be forced to step aside, and he appointed a new chief to conduct a more thorough investigation to examine the graves and sort out the mix-up.

"I deeply apologize to the families of the honored fallen resting in that hallowed ground who may now question the care afforded to their loved ones," McHugh told a Pentagon news conference.

Arlington National Cemetery is considered among the nation's most hallowed burial sites, with more than 300,000 people buried there with military honors. An average of 30 funerals are conducted there every day.

Among those buried at the cemetery are troops killed in Iraq and Afghanistan, as well service members from past conflicts dating back to the Civil War.

Famous presidents and their spouses, including members of the Kennedy family, also have been buried there. The cemetery, located across the Potomac River from Washington in northern Virginia, attracts more than 4 million visitors annually.

An Army investigation was launched last year after reports of employee misconduct, first reported by the Web site Salon.com.

Led by the service's inspector general, Lt. Gen. Steven Whitcomb, the investigation found lax management of the cemetery, where employees relied on paper records to manage the dozens of burials each week and maintain the thousands of existing gravesites.

Whitcomb said at least 211 remains were identified as potentially mislabeled or misplaced and that there could be more.

"We found nothing that was intentional, criminal intent or intended sloppiness that caused this. ... But of all the things in the world, we see this as a zero defect operation," he told reporters Thursday.

Whitcomb could not say how old the mixed-up remains might be or from what conflict, saying only that the problem had been confined to three areas of the cemetery known as sections 59, 65 and 66.

Whitcomb said he did find two cases of mis-marked graves in section 60, the area for veterans from Iraq and Afghanistan. He said those mistakes had been corrected.

Dorothy Nolte, 68, of Burns, Tenn., said she learned last year that the remains of her sister, Air Force Master Sgt. Marion Grabe, who had been buried at Arlington in March 2008, had been moved to a new grave site. Nolte said she went to Arlington to find out that her sister's urn had been buried on top of another soldier, but then it was disinterred and moved to another grave site. She said she had not been informed of the transfer.

"I made them unearth the urn so I could see the name," Nolte said in a phone interview Thursday from New York. "I have peace knowing my sister is indeed in the right place."

As for the Army investigation, "I think that it's a good thing that the truth is coming out, and it's certainly a situation that needs to be rectified," she said.

Separately, the Army is investigating whether the cemetery's deputy superintendent, Thurman Higginbotham, made false statements to service investigators. Higginbotham,

who ran the day-to-day operations at the cemetery, has been accused by former employees of creating a hostile work environment and breaking into their e-mail systems.

Higginbotham is on administrative leave, pending further review.

According to a defense official familiar with the case, who discussed the details on condition of anonymity, Higginbotham won't face criminal charges because of a lack of evidence. But, the official said, the Army will ensure he never works at the cemetery again.

The official wasn't authorized to speak publicly about the case because it is ongoing.

Higginbotham's boss, John Metzler, is set to retire on July 2. Service officials

say he is being pushed out with a letter of reprimand that blames him for failing to rein in Higginbotham's mistakes.

Taking their place will be Kathryn Condon, a former civilian head of Army Materiel Command who as executive director will in charge of fixing any burial errors. Patrick Hallinan, a director with the Veterans Affairs Department, is temporarily being assigned as the cemetery's superintendent.

McHugh also announced the creation of an independent advisory commission that will be led by former senators and Army veterans Max Cleland and Bob Dole.

After securing Hendry in handcuffs and reading the search warrant, the detective reportedly saw a picture of a girl about 11 years of age clothed on Hendry's computer in a cheerleading pose.

Once Hendry was read his rights, he is reported to

have admitted to deputies that he was downloading child pornography files when they walked up.

According to the report, Hendry said he knew it was illegal to download the files and told deputies he had been downloading the files for the past couple of years. Once he was done viewing the files, Hendry reportedly said he would delete them from the computer so his wife didn't

see them and because he knew it was illegal to have them.

A site preview of Hendry's computer revealed he was in possession of more than 20 images of child pornography, his arrest report stated.

Authorities charged Hendry with one count of knowingly promoting the sexual performance of a child and 20 counts of knowingly possessing photos/videos/etc. of sexual conduct by a child.

**McCollum: \$2.5B from BP**

*AG cites report on likely economic damage to state*

PENSACOLA BEACH — Florida's attorney general demanded Thursday an immediate \$2.5 billion escrow payment from oil giant BP PLC for damages from the massive gulf spill, citing a report that says it will seriously harm the state's economy.

Bill McCollum cited a University of Central Florida report that says the state could suffer \$2.2 billion in losses and see a sharp rise in unemployment because of the spill. The state's annual economy is worth about \$600 billion and unemployment rate is 12 percent.

BP didn't immediately return a

call seeking comment. The spill began April 20 when a BP oil rig off the Louisiana coast, killing 11 workers and unleashing an underwater gusher that is spewing between 600,000 gallons and 1.8 million gallons into the gulf daily. Tar balls and other oil began washing ashore along the western Panhandle last weekend.

Meanwhile, Escambia County Commissioners held an emergency meeting Thursday and approved \$700,000 to salvage tourism businesses on Perdido Key and Pensacola Beach.

Outside the commission meeting, about two dozen grizzled commercial fishermen and charter captains, some in fishing waders, walked silently in a circle carrying signs chastising BP.

"BP: Broken promises," read one sign. "Victim of Oil," read another. Another marked the date Aug. 14, 1559, when Don Tristan De Luna y

Arellano landed in Pensacola Bay and formed the first Spanish settlement, as the start of Pensacola fishing and April 20, 2010, as the day it ended.

Dennis Miller, 60, said he has fished since 1963 and recently worked on charter boats. He said the men are frustrated because there is nothing to do.

"We're just worried," Miller said. "We're trying to figure out what we're going to do when they shut the whole Gulf down. And we know that's coming."

Derek Astley, a chef at the Four Seasons restaurant across the street, came outside in his uniform, shook Miller's hand and wished him good luck.

"Your industry affects our industry," Astley said. "We're all in this together."

Passing cars honked their support. Inside the county building, fears and frustration grew.

County emergency crews and environmental specialists told commissioners heavier oil and tar balls were expected on Friday and through the weekend.

The oil sheen had already begun breaking through a booming system shielding the Pensacola area's inland waterways. The county is relying on the booms and 24-hour monitoring by spotting crews to corral the oil using skimming boats and keep it from creeping inland where it will be more difficult to clean.

The county has placed warning signs on six miles of beach between the Alabama state line and the Gulf Islands Seashore National Park warning beachgoers not to swim or fish in the oiled waters.

Pensacola Beach-area business owners told commissioners restaurants, hotels, bars and other businesses have been devastated by reports of tar on the city's once-pristine beaches.

**Poll: Scott tops GOP race for gov.**

TALLAHASSEE — Naples millionaire businessman Rick Scott has surged into a double-digit lead over Attorney General Bill McCollum in their race for the Republican nomination for governor, a poll released Thursday shows.

The Quinnipiac (Conn.) University poll has Scott with a 13-point lead over McCollum, a career politician whose campaign has struggled despite recent television ads featuring former Gov. Jeb Bush on his behalf.

Scott, a former chief executive officer of the for-profit hospital chain Columbia/HCA, was favored with 44 percent to McCollum's 31 percent in a poll of 814 likely Republican voters conducted June 2-8. The survey has a margin of error of plus or minus 3.4 percentage points and is a snapshot of voter preferences at the time they are polled.

Scott told The Associated Press on Thursday that moving ahead in the poll will only further motivate him to stay on a message that apparently has resonated with Republican voters.

"My job is to continue to talk about what I believe in and let people know what I believe in so when they elect me they know what they have as their governor," Scott said. "Our goal is to make sure I have enough money and raise enough money to make sure our message gets out."

McCollum's campaign was still confident he could overcome the poll deficit.

"As Florida voters learn more about the real Rick Scott, his support will evaporate," McCollum campaign spokeswoman Kristy Campbell said.

she would rather have scallop season extended to Sept. 30 instead, because a June 15 start date doesn't allow enough time to get the message out to potential visitors.

Scalloping is a major component of summer tourism in Citrus County.

"Without question it's the reason why our hotels, motels and restaurants stay busy most of the summer on the west side," Chancey said.

An extra two weeks would give tour operators a little

more time to reap the benefits of scallop season.

"I think it would be nice," said Jake Johnson, owner of Nature Coast Manatee Tours in Crystal River. "I think they should do that for us. It's not like it's going to deplete the scallops that are here. I've wanted a longer season for scallops anyway."

Johnson said news of the oil spill might discourage some customers from visiting, but he hasn't had any cancellations yet.

"They get scared as soon as they hear oil ... I've had people call and ask if oil's going to affect their vacation in August. I just tell them right now we're under no

threat."

Johnson said currents in the Gulf of Mexico would likely keep oil away from the Citrus County coastline.

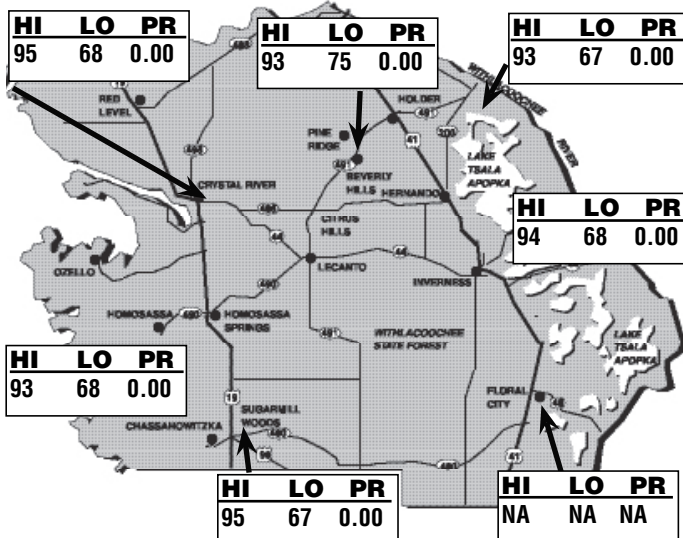
"It's common sense," he said. "I don't see it. I'm not afraid of it."

Both Johnson and Chancey say scalloping activities themselves won't be

hindered by the oil spill.

"I don't think scallop season is going to be affected at all this year by what's going on," Chancey said. "The scallop population is extremely healthy this year. All indicators are positive that this is going to be a fantastic summer boating recreation season."

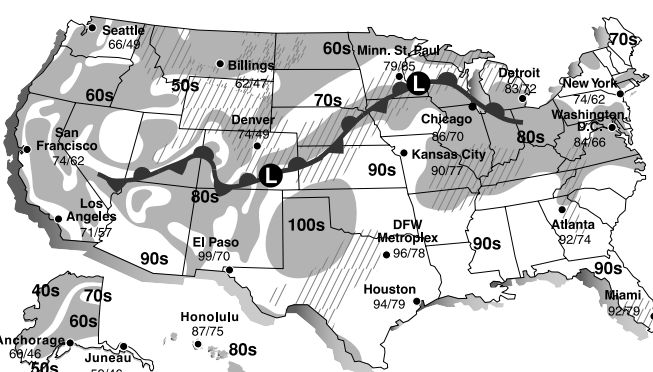

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# Congress begins merging financial overhaul bills

WASHINGTON — House and Senate lawmakers began assembling a massive financial regulation bill on Thursday, dividing sharply along partisan lines as Democrats vowed to fend off efforts to weaken its major provisions.

"This is a very strong bill and it is time we get it to the president's desk for his signature," Senate Banking Committee Chairman Christopher Dodd said, kicking off a meeting of lawmakers selected to blend House and Senate versions into one bill.

Such a House-Senate panel, called a conference committee, is a relatively rare occurrence in Congress. Though it is the textbook means of reconciling competing bills, congress-

sional leaders in recent years generally have bypassed conferences and worked out legislative differences in private.

With Democrats aiming to wrap up their work before the end of the month, banks, retailers, consumer groups — even car dealers — all mustered a final lobbying thrust to influence the 1,900-page legislation.

The Obama administration, meanwhile, looked for quick completion of the bill, eager to have a House-Senate agreement in time for President Barack Obama's trip to Toronto later this month to meet with the Group of Twenty nations. The world's largest economies are working to coordinate their financial regulatory schemes.

Expedience could run headlong into a potentially

chaotic process. Rep. Barney Frank, D-Mass., who will chair the conference committee, promised efficiency. "I will put forward one qualification for this job — my impatience," he joked. "I think it will serve us all very well."

The far-reaching regulatory bills aim to prevent a recurrence of the financial crisis that precipitated the 2008 recession, from which the country is only now recovering.

The bills would allow regulators to liquidate large, failing financial companies, create a new consumer protection entity to safeguard borrowers and impose new regulations over complex securities that had previously traded in shadow markets.

Republicans cast the bill as an overreaching effort to control the private marketplace and complained that

Democrats failed to include any regulation on the giant, government-affiliated mortgage companies Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac.

"The American economy will once again become the laboratory for another grand Democrat experiment in big government and central management," Sen. Richard Shelby, R-Ala., said.

Much of what ends up in the final bill will still be negotiated behind closed doors, mainly by Democrats. But Dodd and Frank vowed to hold public votes on final changes in the legislation.

From the outset, though, House and Senate Democrats privately worked out the base bill, relying mainly on the Senate-passed version, adding technical changes and incorporating some provisions from the House bill. None of the

changes affected the central elements of the legislation.

Still, Shelby complained that House-Senate agreement came with no Republican participation.

"It appears we're off to a rocky start," he said.

Frank later gave a boost to a Senate-passed provision to limit the fees merchants pay to banks and credit card networks when customers pay for goods or services with debit cards. Led by credit unions and community banks, the financial industry has been lobbying heavily against the measure, which passed the Senate 64-33.

"With that very strong vote in the Senate, I don't think the House will try to resist that," Frank said, adding, though, that the provision could be modified.

One of the key issues facing the conference is a tough

provision that would force banks to spin off their lucrative derivatives business. Its leading proponent is Sen. Blanche Lincoln, D-Ark., a member of the conference.

Obama administration officials and a number of banking regulators say Lincoln's provision goes too far. But on Thursday Lincoln delivered a strong defense of her proposal, which primarily would strike at the nation's largest financial institutions, including Goldman Sachs and other firms that dominate Wall Street.

"It is this economic activity that contributed to these institutions growing so large that taxpayers had no choice but to bail them out to prevent total economic ruin," she said. "This provision makes clear that derivatives dealing is not central to the business of banking."

## 5,500-year-old shoe found in Armenia

WASHINGTON — About 5,500 years ago, someone in the mountains of Armenia put his best foot forward in what is now the oldest leather shoe ever found.

It'll never be confused with a penny loafer or a track shoe, but the well-preserved footwear was made of a single piece of leather, laced up the front and back, researchers reported Wednesday in PLoS One, a journal of the Public Library of Science.

Worn and shaped by the wearer's right foot, the shoe was found in a cave along with other evidence of human occupation. The shoe had been stuffed with grass, which dated to the same time as the leather of the shoe — between 5,637 and 5,387 years ago.

"This is great luck," enthused archaeologist Ron Pinhasi of University College Cork in Cork, Ireland,

who led the research team. "We normally only find broken pots, but we have very little information about the day-to-day activity" of these ancient people. "What did they eat? What did they do? What did they wear? This is a chance to see this ... it gives us a real glimpse into society," he said in a telephone interview.

Previously the oldest leather shoe discovered in Europe or Asia was on the famous Otzi, the "Iceman" found frozen in the Alps a few years ago and now preserved in Italy. Otzi has been dated to 5,375 and 5,128 years ago. Otzi's shoes were made of deer and bear leather held together by a leather strap. The Armenian shoe appears to be made of cowhide, Pinhasi said.

Older sandals have been found in a cave in Missouri, but those were made of fiber rather than leather.

The shoe found in what is now Armenia was found in

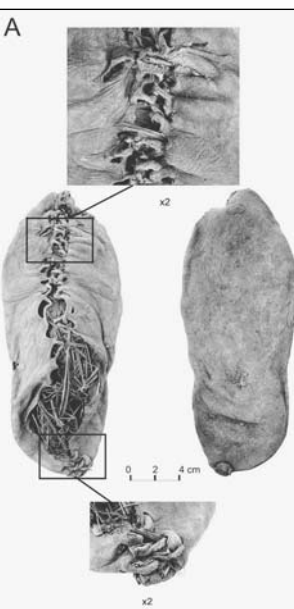
a pit, along with a broken pot and some wild goat horns.

But Pinhasi doesn't think it was thrown away. There was discarded material that had been tossed outside the cave, while this pit was inside in the living area.

The Armenian shoe was small by current standards — European size 37 or U.S. women's size 7 — but might have fit a man of that era, according to Pinhasi.

He noted that the shoe is similar to a type of footwear common in the Aran Islands, west of Ireland, up until the 1950s. The Irish version, known as "pam-pooties" reportedly didn't last long, he said.

"In fact, enormous similarities exist between the manufacturing technique and style of this (Armenian) shoe and those found across Europe at later periods, suggesting that this type of shoe was worn for thousands of years across a large and environmentally diverse region."

## SEC puts in new 'circuit breaker' rules

WASHINGTON — Federal regulators on Thursday put in place new rules aimed at preventing a repeat of last month's harrowing "flash crash" in the stock market.

Members of the Securities and Exchange Commission approved the rules, which call for U.S. stock exchanges to briefly halt trading of some stocks that make big swings.

The major exchanges will start putting the trading breaks into effect as early as today for six months. The New York Stock Exchange will begin today's trading session with five stocks: EOG Resources Inc., Genuine Parts Co., Harley Davidson Inc., Ryder System Inc. and Zimmer Holdings Inc. The exchange will gradually add other stocks early next week, expecting to reach by Wednesday the full number

that will be covered.

The Nasdaq stock market plans to have the new program fully in place on Monday.

The plan for the "circuit breakers" was worked out by the SEC and the major exchanges following the May 6 market plunge, which saw the Dow Jones industrials lose nearly 1,000 points in less than a half-hour.

Under the new rules, trading of any Standard & Poor's 500 stock that rises or falls 10 percent or more in a five-minute period will be halted for five minutes. The "circuit breakers" would be applied if the price swing occurs between 9:45 a.m. and 3:35 p.m. Eastern time.

The idea is for the trading pause to draw attention to an affected stock, establish a reasonable market price and resume trading "in a fair and orderly fashion," the SEC said.

■ Siefert encouraged attendance at the oil spill public workshop from 9 to 10:30 a.m. Friday, June 18, at the conference center of the College of Central Florida in Lecanto. He said it would be attended by a representative of Alex Sink, Florida's chief financial officer, to advise people about filing claims for economic damages.

■ Gary Maidhof, operations and projects officer for the county, reported the progress of the incentive program committee, which is examining the EDC's current programs to help businesses. The incentives help with job creation and utility expansion.

Maidhof said the program was not integrated, and the applications should be streamlined so that an applicant would not have to provide the same information many times. He also said the board should consider limits and caps on awards to help more businesses.

The awards are for targeted industries, which include manufacturing, agriculture, recycling, technological development, medical and biomedical.

■ Maidhof said the transportation planning organization agreement would be signed soon and its voting members would establish its bylaws.

■ Director Gail Oakes asked the EDC to support her efforts to amend an ordinance about the time alcohol can be served in restaurants on Sundays.

"It's antiquated to have to wait until 1 p.m.," Oakes said. "I can't do a wedding on Sunday morning and do a champagne toast."

Director Andy Houston, Crystal River city manager, said a restaurant that serves food should be able to serve alcohol.

The board agreed to support Oakes.

■ Phil Geist, area director for the Small Business Development Center, said the center is involved in a new program to help businesses impacted by the oil spill,

whether physically or economically.

The government would provide short-term loans of up to \$25,000 to small businesses who have fewer than 100 employees. The applicant would have to demonstrate economic injury.

The loan would be interest free for the first 12 months. The interest rate

would be 12 percent for the next six months and 18 percent thereafter.

"Florida First Capital Finance Corporation is the partner with the Small Business Development Center on the technical assistance part of the process," Geist said.

The FFCFC is the state's largest nonprofit certified

development company that promotes economic development and job creation.

Geist said the oil company, BP, would have a representative in each office where claims would be processed.

"The applicant must first apply to BP to get a claim

number. Then they would go to the Small Business Center for the disaster loan, and then they can apply for an emergency bridge loan," Geist said.

The process was set up to stop fraudulent claims, Geist said. He also said he would attend a conference

later this month to design the forms to file for the loans.

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# Europe sets tight biofuel standards

## Environmental concerns take center stage

BRUSSELS — The European Union's top energy official set out tough standards for producing biofuels sold in the EU, demanding producers meet strict environmental criteria.

EU Energy Commissioner Guenther Oettinger put forward the world's "most stringent" certification regime to make "sure our biofuels meet the highest environmental standards." Biofuel makers must prove they do not create greenhouse gas emissions or destroy forests or wetlands.

The rules take effect immediately. They foresee a regime of certificates to guarantee that all biofuels — whether grown in the 27-nation European Union or imported — are sustainably produced on land already used for farming in early 2008.

Production must be independently monitored to see how much fertilizer is used to grow the crop, how much to process it into fuel and how much to transport it to the market.

Only biofuels that represent at least a 35 percent saving in greenhouse gas use compared to oil or diesel would be allowed and would get financial help from governments, such as low taxes or direct payments to suppliers.

The European Commission says it could revoke the certificates at any time if biofuel suppliers are not providing truthful information.

About 26 percent of biodiesel and 31

percent of bioethanol used in the EU in 2007 was imported — mostly from Brazil and the United States.

Environmental groups took a dim view of the plan.

They said it will not tackle the most acute problem: that the move toward more biomass production drives deforestation, damages the environment, creates greenhouse gas emissions and encourages land-grabbing in Asia and South America.

The EU has set a target that by 2020 at least 10 percent of transport fuel comes from biofuels — up from 3.4 percent in 2008 and 0.5 percent in 2003.

Biofuels are mostly bioethanol made from sugar and cereals and biodiesel from vegetable oils.

"Europe's policy on biofuels is inherently unsustainable," said Adrian Bebb, food and agriculture campaign coordinator for Friends of the Earth Europe.

"The EU should abandon this folly and invest in genuine energy reductions in the transport sector."

The environmental group Greenpeace said the certification scheme does nothing about the displacement of agriculture that happens when farmers move crops or cattle ranching elsewhere to make room for biofuels for EU clients.

To make sure most of its biofuel reduces real greenhouse gas emissions, the European Commission will create a system to calculate how much greenhouse gas is used to produce and transport the fuel until it arrives at the gas pump.

# S. Koreans disappointed about rocket failure

SEOUL, South Korea — A South Korean rocket carrying a climate observation satellite apparently exploded 137 seconds into its flight early Thursday, the country's second major space setback in less than a year.

The two-stage Naro rocket operated normally during and after liftoff from the country's space center, Minister of Education, Science and Technology Ahn Byong-man said. But then communications with the rocket were lost after it reached an altitude of about 43 miles (70 kilometers).

"We believe that the Naro rocket is likely to have exploded," he told reporters. "We are sorry for failing to live up to people's expectations."

An image from a camera aboard the Naro brightened like a flash of light, possibly evidence of an explosion, Ahn said.

He said South Korean and Russian experts were trying to find the cause of the mishap. The first stage of the rocket was designed and built by Russia and the second by South Korea.

Ahn said that South Korea will begin preparations to announce a new launch date as soon as the origin of the problem is determined.

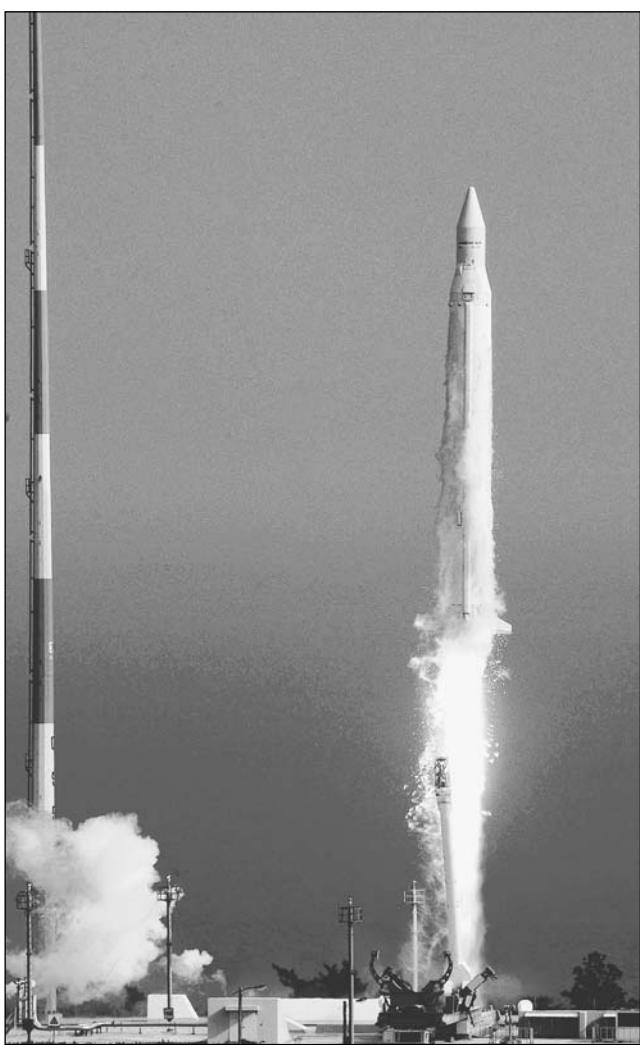
Ministry spokesman Pyun Kyung-bum said that debris from the rocket is believed to have fallen into the sea some 292 miles south of Oenaro Island, which is home to the space center.

The blastoff at the coastal space center in Goheung, 290 miles south of Seoul, was the country's second launch of a rocket from its own territory. In the first attempt last August, the satellite failed to reach orbit because one of its two covers apparently failed to come off after liftoff. The rocket on which it was carried functioned normally, so South Korea saw that launch as a partial success.

Since 1992, South Korea has launched 11 satellites from overseas sites, all on foreign-made rockets. The launch was originally scheduled for Wednesday, but was delayed a day because of a fire retardant suddenly sprayed from three nozzles set up near the launch pad to extinguish any blaze.

South Korea wants to put a satellite into orbit to study global warming and climate change.

South Koreans are intensely proud of their coun-

try's rise from devastation and poverty after the end of the Korean War, as well as their reputation for advanced technology and were closely observing the launch. About 100 people watched it on big screen televisions at Seoul's main railway station. People applauded when the rocket blasted off, though the mood turned anxious after the first news of a problem. "I'm disappointed because maybe this tells me that Korea doesn't have the right technology yet," said Yoon Ho-soo, a writer who was sitting in front of a central Seoul subway station Thursday night.

South Korea's Ministry of Education, Science and Technology, which oversees the space program, says South Korea plans to develop a space launch vehicle with its own technology by 2020.

China, Japan and India are Asia's current space powers. Japan has launched numerous satellites while China sent its first astronaut into space in 2003 and carried out its first spacewalk in 2008.

India launched a satellite into moon orbit in 2008, but had to abandon it nearly a year later after communication links snapped and scientists lost control of it.

Despite the series of problems, South Korea wasn't about to give up on space.

President Lee Myung-bak urged the country's space engineers and experts to avoid feeling frustrated over the setback and aim for success next time.

"Though it's regrettable, much more can be learned through failure," he said in comments posted on the presidential website.

### Marina Semyonova, 102

MOSCOW — Marina Semyonova, the Bolshoi Ballet's prima ballerina for two decades during the Soviet era, has died. She was 102.

The Bolshoi Theater said that Semyonova died at her apartment in Moscow on Wednesday just a few days after marking her birthday. Spokeswoman Katerina Novikova did not say the cause of death.

Semyonova was born in St. Petersburg in 1908. She graduated from Agrippina Vaganova's ballet school in 1925 and joined the Bolshoi in 1930.

She performed with the Bolshoi until 1952. Her repertoire included Princess Florine in "Sleeping Beauty," Odette-Odile in "Swan Lake," as well as the title characters in "Raymonda," "Giselle" and "La Esmeralda."

In 1935, she danced as a guest at the Paris Opera, where she performed "Giselle" with French star Serge Lifar.

Two years later, her husband, Lev Karakhan, a senior Soviet diplomat, was executed as part of Josef Stalin's purges.

After ending her dancing career, Semyonova worked as a ballet coach, teaching Natalia Bessmertnova, Nina Sorokina, Nadezhda Pavlova and Maya Pliset-skaya, among others.

The Bolshoi had no immediate information about funeral arrangements.

You don't have to travel to Tampa or Orlando to get your ServSafe Food Protection Manager's Certification.

The University of Florida/IFAS Citrus County Extension Service will provide training to help food managers and staff keep food served to Florida's consumers safer.

This is a comprehensive training that provides the most up-to-date information and current regulations.

The ServSafe manager's exam is given at the end of the training, which provides a national certification that is good for five years.

Certification is required in Florida for food managers of all establishments licensed by the Department of Business and Professional Regulation, the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services and selected licenses of the Department of Health.

The next class will be Wednesday, July 7. It will begin promptly at 8:30 a.m. and run approximately seven hours; then participants will take the national certification exam.

There is no "test-only" option.

Participants should bring valid picture identification with them, as well as a sack lunch.

Training will be at the Citrus County Extension office at 3650 W. Sovereign Path, Suite 1, Lecanto (from State Road 44, go south on County Road 491, turn west on Saunders Way, go one block, turn left onto Sovereign Path. The extension building is the first building on the right).

Stocks surge on U.S. jobs data, China trade growth

NEW YORK — Investors have sent the Dow Jones industrials back above 10,000 after a stream of upbeat economic news convinced them that maybe things aren't so bad after all.

The Labor Department said new claims for unemployment fell by 3,000 to a seasonally adjusted 456,000. While that figure fell short of economists' forecast, investors were heartened by figures showing total claims last week dropped by the largest amount in almost a year.

The Dow rose 273 points to 10,172. All the major indexes climbed more than 2.5 percent. Falling Treasury prices pushed interest rates higher as demand for safe investments eased.

Energy stocks led the market higher after they slid in Wednesday's late trading on concerns that BP would be forced to cut its dividend because of the Gulf of Mexico oil spill. BP rose 12.3 percent from a 14-year low, while Anadarko Petroleum Corp., which has a minority stake in the rig that caused the spill, rose 12.4 percent.

Most bank stocks rose but Goldman Sachs Group Inc. fell 2.2 percent after its lowest

Markets around the world rose after China said exports rose 48.5 percent in May, while imports jumped 48.3 percent. The increase in trade provides some relief to fears that debt problems in Europe would halt a global economic recovery.

'Chevy' is as good as 'Chevrolet,' GM says

DETROIT — Relax, Chevrolet fanatics. Turns out you can take your "Chevy to the levee" or any other dam place you please.

General Motors Co. on Thursday backed off what it called a "poorly worked" internal memo that asked employees to refer to the brand only as "Chevrolet" instead of its long-standing and well-known nickname.

GM said in a statement that it "in no way" is discouraging anybody from using the name Chevy. The internal memo was part of an effort to develop a consistent brand name as it tries to broaden its global presence.

"We hope people around the world will continue to fall in love with Chevrolets and smile when they call their favorite car, truck or crossover 'Chevy,'" the statement said.

GM said the original memo, obtained by The New York Times, spurred an "emotional debate" that reverberated on social media networks and websites Thursday.

# Small donations a big investment

From the Civil War to current conflicts, the Citrus County Fallen Heroes Monument was designed to preserve the names of county residents who have paid for American freedom with their lives, preserving their legacy of sacrifice.

These names are inscribed on the black granite obelisk in Bicentennial Park in Crystal River. It is the only monument in Citrus County to honor county residents killed in military service during a time of war.

Original supporters of building the monument included the late Pete DeRosa and many Rotarians. Names of other donors appear on the base of the obelisk. The Citrus County Commission approved the project and in 2003, the monument was constructed with private donations. Then the group that had been formed to see the monument built dissolved, believing its task was completed.

Later, the county, some local veterans and others worked to reestablish a community-based

organization to help maintain the monument. Apparently some skateboarders have used it and the wheels have created some jagged edges along the top of the base that supports the obelisk, so some of the

granite tiles need to be replaced. And as unthinkable as it seems, in the past the monument has been vandalized.

While the county maintains the landscaping, keeping the monument looking as it should is a responsibility we all share. Since late 2008, a new board of directors for the re-incorporated Citrus County Fallen Heroes Monument Inc. has been meeting monthly to focus on a plan to support the monument's upkeep.

That is why the organization's leaders have asked every person in the county to donate \$1. It is important to have a reserve fund to replace broken tiles and repair other damage over time. Preserving its appearance is an important way to show that the sacrifice these soldiers made will never be forgotten.

**No paddle**

# War of choice won nothing

Vice President Joe Biden repeated as recently as last month that the administration is keeping to its scheduled promise to remove all combat troops from Iraq by the end of August. Even though violence is on the increase and the Iraqis have not yet made the necessary compromises among the rival political parties to create a government, the U.S. commitment to leave the country will be honored.

A contingent of troops will remain to guard the embassy in Baghdad and other U.S. facilities in the country. This so-called palace guard will provide advice and assistance when needed, but will not participate in combat operations. Once the front-line troops are gone from Iraq, the war is over as far as America is concerned. What did we accomplish? The short answer, unfortunately, is not much.

Here's the ledger as we see it. U.S. troops succeeded in removing Saddam from power, but failed to keep the peace in the immediate aftermath of his downfall. The power vacuum created by the absence of a brutal leader allowed an ethnic struggle to erupt, revealing how little U.S. policymakers understood about Iraq and the blood feuds that shape the country's culture and politics. Americans learned you can't

disrupt cultural ties that go back centuries with "shock and awe," and that military force can't replace political accommodation. Eight years after the U.S. invasion that deposed Saddam, Iraq teeters on the edge of civil war. The ruling Shia government is fighting to stay in power, and the Sunnis, the minority ethnic group, are still threatening to take up arms if their rights are not sufficiently guaranteed.

The U.S. invasion interrupted the flow of oil from Iraq, which we were told was going to pay for the war. This should have made Americans more wary about relying on the Middle East for such a valuable resource. We apparently learned little about developing alternative sources of energy, or we wouldn't be in such a fix today with the BP oil spill in the Gulf threatening the ecology of a region and the lifeblood of its people.

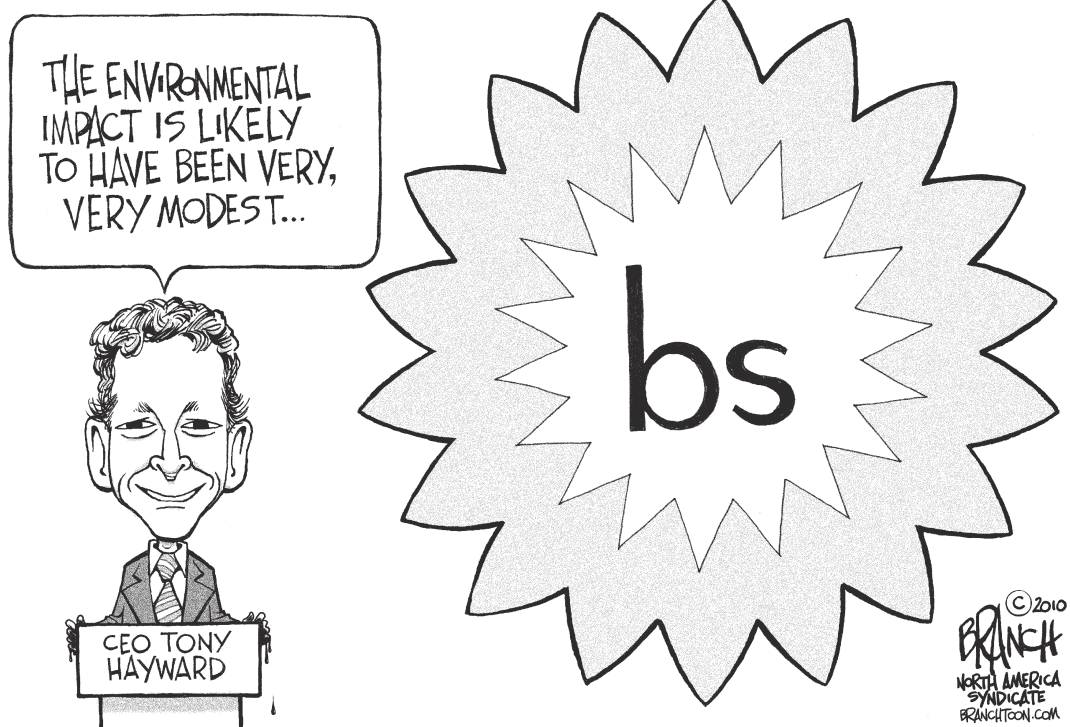
The Bush administration argued that regime change was needed in Iraq to stabilize the region. Saddam was a threat to his neighbors, and if he had nuclear weapons, as he claimed, the terror that he could inflict on the entire region was reason enough to go to war.

Of course we learned that Saddam did not have nuclear weapons, and just used the threat of them to keep his enemies off guard. The story has been recounted many times over about

how intelligence was cherry picked and the administration used fear of a mushroom cloud to advance its ideological goals. The end result is America waged a war of choice that political leaders portrayed as a war of necessity.

Backers of the war who want to justify the cost in both lives and money point to Iraq as a much needed democratic ally in the Middle East. The extent of Iraq's democracy is still to be determined, as is its geo-political allegiance. The current prime minister of Iraq, Nouri al-Maliki, has welcomed closer ties with Iran, where he lived for eight years when he was in exile from Iraq. It's understandable that Maliki would want good relations with a country on his border, but it's not what U.S. policymakers had in mind when they launched the Iraq War. The goal was to create a strengthened Iraq that would serve as a counterweight to Iran. Instead, America's actions have brought the governments of Iraq and Iran closer together than they had been for decades, creating bonds that should make the Obama administration, indeed all of us, very nervous.

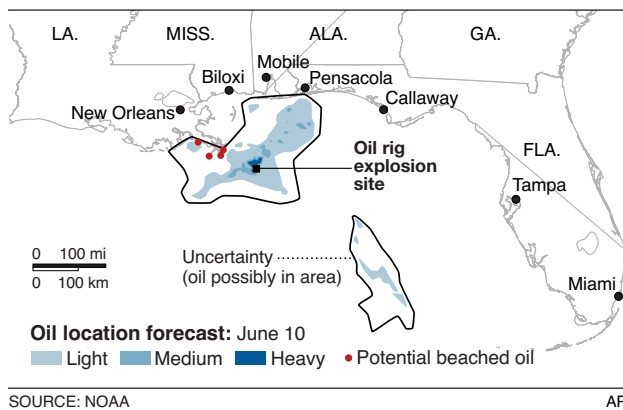
**Louisiana leaders: Resume drilling now**

NEW ORLEANS — At the same time they are venting their fury on BP over the Gulf of Mexico spill and its calamitous environmental effects, Louisiana politicians are rushing to the defense of the oil-and-gas industry and pleading with Washington to bring back offshore drilling — now.

As angry as they are over the disaster, state officials warn that the Obama administration's temporary ban on drilling in the Gulf has sent Louisiana's most lucrative industry into a death spiral.

They contend that drilling is safe overall and that the moratorium is a knee-jerk reaction, akin to grounding every airplane in America be-

cause of a single crash. They worry, too, that the moratorium comes at a time when another major Louisiana industry — fishing — has been brought to a standstill by the mess in the Gulf.

"For God's sake, don't finish us off with a moratorium," Louisiana Attorney General

Buddy Caldwell said this week.

The oil-and-gas industry is the backbone of the Louisiana economy, bringing in billions of dollars in revenue for the government and accounting for nearly one-third of the nation's domestic crude production.

It took a heavy blow when

the government imposed a six-month offshore drilling moratorium in the wake of the spill that has sent upwards of 50 million gallons of oil into the Gulf in the biggest environmental disaster in U.S. history. The government imposed the ban while it reviews the safety of deepwater drilling in light of the BP disaster.

Louisiana lawmakers have railed against the moratorium, saying it could put more than 100,000 people out of work, shutter businesses and destroy livelihoods. A bill asking the administration to shorten the moratorium passed the Legislature unanimously.

But persuading the administration to take such action could prove to be extraordi-

narily difficult at a time when globs of oil are fouling marshes and beaches, images of oil-soaked birds are a fixture in the news and no apparent end to the spill is in sight.

Interior Secretary Ken Salazar has acknowledged the potential damage to energy companies and their employees and promised a Louisiana senator the administration would demand that BP compensate businesses for their losses.

The moratorium put a halt to the 33 deepwater exploratory rigs in operation in the Gulf in addition to all new deep-sea drilling permits. Platforms that are already producing oil along with rigs in shallow waters are allowed to remain in operation.

**Trapped man tried cutting off arm**

HARTFORD, Conn. —

Jonathan Metz had been trapped for two days in his basement with his left arm stuck in a broken furnace. Smelling rotting flesh, he decided that amputation was his only hope.

So the 31-year-old fashioned a tourniquet near his shoulder and began cutting. He made it almost all the way through, but wasn't able to free himself.

He was rescued Wednesday after three days in his West Hartford basement when worried friends called police, and firefighters cut the furnace apart.

Doctors said the attempted self-amputation probably saved his life, preventing the infection in his gangrenous arm from spreading to the rest of his body.

**Afghan wedding attack kills 40**

NADAHAN VILLAGE,

Afghanistan — Body parts in trees. Mud walls flattened. Corpses riddled with ball bearings.

NATO and the Afghan government on Thursday blamed a Taliban suicide bomber for the grisly scene at a wedding party where at least 40 people were killed by an intense explosion. But the Taliban claimed they played no role in the blast in the Arghandab district, an insurgent stronghold near the southern city of Kandahar.

Stunned survivors said they suspected a NATO airstrike was responsible, a view that reflects either their deep suspicion of the U.S.-led coalition or fear of Taliban retribution.

The groom was among the 74 wounded. Women guests were in a separate house with the bride.

**16-year-old missing at sea**

*Rescue launched for Calif. girl on solo world sail*

LOS ANGELES — A 16-year-old Southern California girl attempting a solo sail around the world was feared in trouble Thursday, thousands of miles from land in the frigid, heaving southern Indian Ocean after her emergency beacons began signaling and satellite phone communication was lost.

An international effort to rescue young Abby Sunderland began, but the vast distances meant long hours of waiting for her family and support team, which expressed confidence that she was alive because the beacons were deliberately turned on rather than set off automatically.

"She's got all the skills she needs to take care of what she has to take care of; she has all the equipment as well," said brother Zac, himself a veteran of a solo sail around the world at age 17.

Australian Maritime Safety Authority spokeswoman Carly Lusk said three vessels were sent from the French territory of Reunion Island and an aircraft was dispatched from Perth early this morning on a four-hour flight to Abby's location more than 2,000 miles from both Africa and Australia.

It was not clear when the surface vessels left, but it would take a day for the nearest ship to reach the area. Reunion Island is off Madagascar, the very large island along the east coast of Africa.

Support team member Jeff Casher said the two emergency beacons were continuing to broadcast and GPS location data showed they were together and drifting at 1 mph. He believed the beacons were on Abby's boat but said they could be with her on a raft.

Casher offered several scenarios: The boat may have flipped over and Abby could still be inside; the boat's mast may have been damaged; or she was injured and could not pilot the boat. He said that if the boat flipped, the hull would prevent her from calling from her satellite phone.



Conditions can quickly become perilous for any sailor exposed to the elements in that part of the world.

"We've got to get a plane out there quick," said family spokesman Christian Pinkston, adding that the teen's family in Thousand Oaks was asking for prayers for her safety.

Her brother said Abby was prepared and mentally tough. "I really wish I could see her and hope she gets through this one," he told reporters outside the family home.

Abby last communicated with her family at 4 a.m. PDT Thursday and reported 30-foot swells but was not in distress, Pinkston said.

Casher said Abby had to make repeated calls with her Iridium satellite phone because of sketchy connections. He said she had been in rough weather and had a problem with her engine, which she eventually managed to start. The team then asked her to check other things on the boat.

"She hung up to go check some things and she never did call back," he said.

An hour later the family was notified that her emergency beacons had been activated, and there was no further communication. Her brother said the boat

was most likely not completely submerged because another beacon would be triggered at a depth of 15 feet.

Derrick Fries, a U.S. sailing instruction and safety expert, said Abby's circumstances were very unclear.

"It's hard to determine if she's rolled over, swamped, or washed overboard. She has to have a dry suit on to have any chance," he said. "To be capsized in the middle of the ocean with waves crashing relentlessly down, not just for hours, but days, I can't tell you how difficult those conditions are."

A lifelong sailor whose father is a shipwright and has a yacht management company, Abby set sail from Los Angeles County's

Marina del Rey in her 40-foot boat, Wild Eyes, on Jan. 23 in an attempt to become the youngest person to sail around the world alone without stopping. Her brother briefly held the record in 2009.

Abby soon ran into equipment problems and had to stop for repairs. She gave up the goal of setting the record in April, but continued on.

Information on her website said that as of June 8 she had completed a 2,100-mile leg from South Africa to north of the Kerguelen Islands, taking a route to avoid an ice hazard area. Ahead of her lay more than 2,100 miles of ocean on a 10- to 16-day leg to a point south of Cape Leeuwin on the southwest tip of Australia.

**Senate rejects greenhouse gas regs challenge**

WASHINGTON — In a boost for the president on global warming, the Senate on Thursday rejected a challenge to Obama administration rules aimed at cutting greenhouse gas emissions from power plants and other big polluters.

The defeated resolution would have denied the Environmental Protection Agency the authority to move ahead with the rules, crafted under the federal Clean Air Act. With President Barack Obama's broader clean energy legislation struggling to gain a foothold in the Senate, the vote took on greater significance as a signal of where lawmakers stand on dealing with

climate change.

"If ever there was a vote to find out whose side you are on, this is it," said Sen. Barbara Boxer, D-Calif., chairman of the Environment and Public Works Committee.

The vote was 53-47 to stop the Senate from moving forward on the Republican-led effort to restrain the EPA.

Republicans, and the six Democrats who voted with them to advance the resolution, said Congress, not bureaucrats, should be in charge of

writing climate change policy. They said the EPA rules would drive up energy costs and kill jobs.

But Democrats, referring frequently to the Gulf oil spill, said it made no sense to undermine ef-

orts to curtail greenhouse gas emissions and reduce dependence on oil and other fossil fuels.

The effort to block the rules “is an attempt to bury our heads in the sand and ignore reality,” said Sen. Tom Udall, D-N.M.

The White House earlier this

week issued a veto threat, saying the resolution would block efforts to cut pollution that threatens Americans' health and well-being.

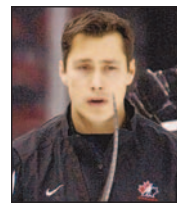
The EPA crafted standards on greenhouse gas emissions by big polluters after the Supreme Court ruled that those emissions could be considered a danger to human health and thus could be regulated under the Clean Air Act. The rules are to go into effect next January.

The poor chances of the anti-EPA measure overcoming a veto and becoming law did not deter fierce debate.

Senate Republican leader Mitch McConnell of Kentucky called the new regulations a “blatant power grab by the administration and the EPA.”

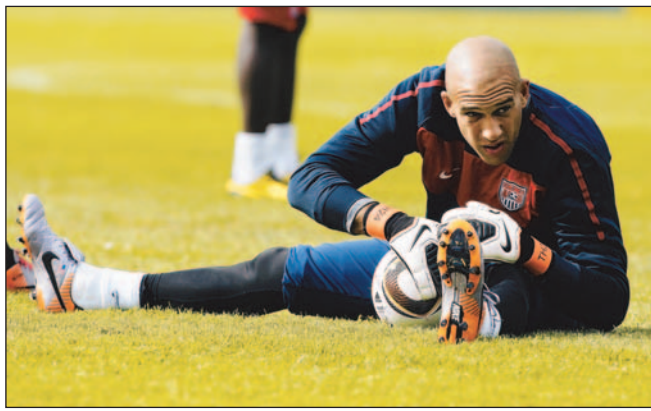

## Fans out in full force at 2010 World Cup

IRENE, South Africa — The bars are stocked across America, and the pubs are getting ready in England. A 70½-foot billboard of Clint Dempsey stands near Penn Station in Manhattan, and there's even a large poster of Landon Donovan in a store along Piccadilly Circus.



American soccer has never been more popular in the United States or its players more well-known across the world. And on Saturday comes the first competitive match between the U.S. and England since the great American upset at the 1950 World Cup. For one afternoon, millions will be watching from California to

New York island. Like never before in the United States, this is the sport's moment.

"I don't know what's going to be better, at the bar with my friends back home watching it, or actually playing it, because it's going to be special," goalkeeper Tim Howard said Thursday.

On the first cloudy day since the U.S. team started workouts June 1, the Americans practiced in Pretoria. Then their red-white-and-blue bus with "Life, Liberty, and the Pursuit of Victory!" on the side made the two-hour drive to Rustenburg, where the big game will be played.

Thousands of tickets in refurbished 38,646-capacity Royal Bafokeng Stadium were purchased back in the United States for the match at the foot of the Magaliesberg mountain range in the North West Province. Stevan Galich, a fan from Chicago, organized transportation for 350 American fans from Sandton, a north Johannesburg suburb, to Rustenburg on Saturday. His party plans to meet outside the stadium with Sam's Army and the American Outlaws, two supporters' groups. They hope

## Celtics tie series at 2-all in 96-89 win over Lakers

BOSTON — The Boston Celtics have tied up the NBA finals, and they owe it more to "Big Baby" than the Big Three.

Backup Glen "Big Baby" Davis scored half of his 18 points in the fourth quarter, leading the Celtics bench as it pulled away from the Los Angeles Lakers to win 96-89 on Thursday night and even the best-of-seven series at two games apiece.

Game 5 is Sunday night in Boston. The Celtics' win guaranteed them a trip back to Los Angeles and averted a 3-1 deficit that has never been overcome in NBA history.

Kobe Bryant scored 33 points and Pau Gasol had 21 for the Lakers.

Paul Pierce scored 19 points, Kevin Garnett had 13 and Ray Allen bounced back from a seven-quarter shooting slump to score 12 points for Boston.

At halftime, Gasol scored 13 points, Bryant added 12, and the Lakers held a 45-42 lead over the Celtics.

The Lakers were halfway to what has been an insurmountable lead in the finals. Every team that has gone up 3-1 in a series has won the championship.

They were getting helped by some poor Boston shooting. The Celtics made only 41 percent from the field and only half of their eight free throws.

Paul Pierce had 12 points for the Celtics after struggling the last two games, but Ray Allen was still slumping. He made a layup a minute in after going 0 for 13 from the field in Game 3, but his jumper remained off and he was only 1 of 6 at halftime of Game 4.

## Colorado heads to Pac-10

### Six other teams may bolt from Big 12 as well

DENVER — The college sports landscape began a much-anticipated shift Thursday with the University of Colorado accepting an invitation to join the Pac-10.

The Buffaloes might not be the only team bolting from the Big 12. Nebraska could become part of the Big Ten as soon as today, and speculation is heavy that Texas, Texas A&M, Texas Tech, Oklahoma and Oklahoma State may also jump to the Pac-10 to possibly form a 16-team super conference.

"This is the dawning of a new day for the Pac-10," commissioner Larry Scott said shortly after announcing Colorado as the league's 11th member.

And this just might be the demise of the Big 12, the highly successful conference that was formed in 1994 when the Big Eight invited in the four Texas schools.

If the Big 12 is further raided as expected, that would leave Missouri, Baylor, Iowa State, Kansas and

## NCAA sanctions hit USC

LOS ANGELES — The NCAA threw the book at storied Southern California on Thursday with a two-year bowl ban, four years' probation, loss of scholarships and forfeits of an entire year's games for improper benefits to Heisman Trophy winner Reggie Bush dating to the Trojans' 2004 national championship.

USC was penalized for a lack of institutional control in the ruling by the NCAA following its four-year investigation. The reported cited numerous improper benefits for Bush and former basketball player O.J. Mayo, who spent just one year with the Trojans.

The coaches who presided over the alleged misdeeds — football's Pete Carroll and basketball's Tim Floyd — left USC in the past year.

## Izzo talks to Cavs about job

### Michigan State coach could leave college for NBA

CLEVELAND — Tom Izzo has flirted with the NBA before. He may finally be ready to commit.

Michigan State's highly respected coach visited the Cleveland Cavaliers on Thursday to get a firsthand inspection of a franchise undergoing a major makeover as it prepares to try and re-sign LeBron James, the free-agent-of-a-generation.

After flying to Cleveland in one of Cavs owner Dan Gilbert's jets, Izzo spent several hours visiting

with members of the front office and touring the team's facilities.

Izzo, who has been courted by pro teams in the past, is believed to be mulling a contract worth up to \$6 million a season from the Cavaliers, who fired Mike Brown last month after they lost in the second round of the playoffs to Boston despite having the league's best regular-season record for the second straight year.

It is not known if Izzo gave the Cavs a decision or a timetable for one.

If Izzo and Cleveland do not come to terms, the team could turn its attention to former New Orleans and New Jersey coach Byron Scott, whose resume would make him attractive to Cleveland. Scott won three NBA titles as a player and has experience in

coaching such stars as Jason Kidd and Chris Paul.

A phone message to Scott's agent, Brian McInerney, was not immediately returned.

New Cleveland general manager Chris Grant said the Cavaliers have spoken to a "number" of candidates, but did not divulge any names. The team has inquired about Milwaukee assistant Kelvin Sampson.

Izzo recently said he would stay with the Spartans until they won another national title. But earlier this week, Izzo seemed to have a change of heart and met with his current players. He told them to continue to work hard, but did not say if he was leaving the school, associate head coach Mark Montgomery said.

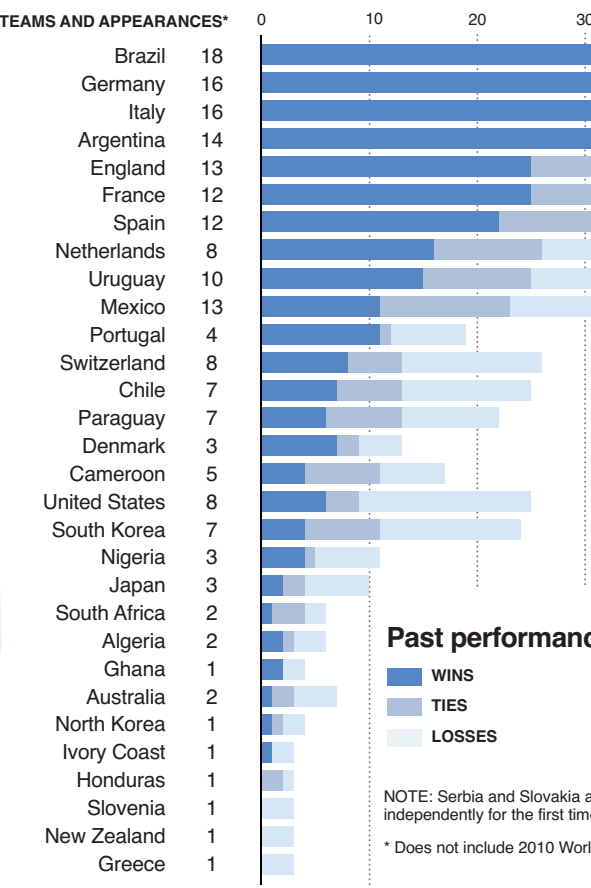
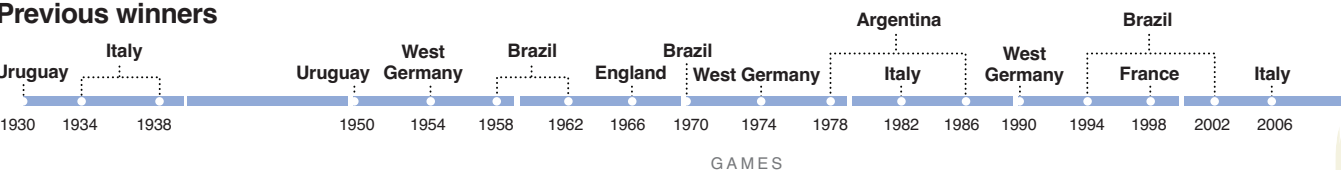

Magazine. The cover of Time Magazine. Anybody remember when that last happened for soccer?"

The Irish Pub, a few blocks from Carnegie Hall in Manhattan, is packed many weekend mornings for English Premier League games. Last month, it doubled in size in preparation for the World Cup.

Youth soccer teams are planning to meet to watch together, and several Major

League Soccer stadiums will open for viewing parties.

Adidas, Nike and Puma have been busy selling World Cup gear. More than 55,000 fans went to Philadelphia's Lincoln Financial Field for the U.S. team's sendoff game on May 29.

Interest ratcheted up last June when the Americans upset Spain in the semifinals of the Confederations Cup, a World Cup warmup tournament in South Africa.

The Americans ended the European champion's streaks of 15 wins and 35 unbeaten games.

The December draw boosted it even more when the United States was matched up with England to get things started.

It's far different from 1990, when the U.S. team returned to the World Cup for the first time in 40 years and few American fans made the trek to Italy. There wasn't much

to root for, with the U.S. losing three straight games.

"We thought we knew what the World Cup was. And you know what? Reality slapped us right in the face," said Marcelo Balboa, a defender on that U.S. team who is covering this tournament for the radio network Futbol de Primera. "Soccer has just grown so much. Look at where we're at now, and look at where we stood in '90?"

ST. PETERSBURG — Brett Cecil won his fifth consecutive start, Alex Gonzalez homered and drove in two runs and the Toronto Blue Jays beat the Tampa Bay Rays 3-2 on Thursday night. Cecil (7-2) allowed one run and three hits over 6 2-3 innings. The left-hander has given up six earned runs in 36 1-3 innings over that stretch.

The Blue Jays had been outscored 19-1 in losing the first two games of the three-game series.

Carlos Pena hit his 129th homer with Tampa Bay, which set a franchise record. The Rays have won six of nine against Toronto this season.

Tampa Bay All-Star left fielder Carl Crawford was out of the starting lineup for the second time in the past three games for what Rays manager Joe Maddon called "preventative maintenance." Crawford did pinch run and steal second in the ninth.

"There's nothing wrong," Maddon said. "We just want to get him off his feet, especially on the (artificial) turf. He's always had trouble with this particular field."

Maddon said Crawford will play in all three games of an interleague series with Florida that starts on Friday.

Kevin Gregg, who allowed a solo homer to Sean Rodriguez, pitched the ninth to record his 15th save.

Rays right-hander Wade Davis (5-6) gave up three runs and seven hits in seven-plus innings.

Gonzalez put the Blue Jays up 1-0 on a second-inning homer. The Blue Jays, who lead the majors with 98 homers, had not gone deep in the previous 20 innings.

Pena tied it at 1 in the bottom of the second on his fifth homer over the past four games.

Toronto went up 2-1 in the third on Adam Lind's RBI single. Gonzalez added an eighth-inning sacrifice fly.

Westwood opens with 7-under 63 for lead

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — Lee Westwood took advantage of no wind and a rain-softened course to shoot a 7-under 63 Thursday that equaled his best PGA Tour round and gave him a one-stroke lead in the suspended first round of the St. Jude Classic.

Severe thunderstorms stopped play Thursday night before the round was suspended nearly an hour later with 20 golfers still to finish.

Casey Wittenberg shot a 64, and Padraig Harrington had a 65.

Feng takes early lead at State Farm Classic

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. — Shanshan Feng made five early birdies and shot an 8-under 64 on Thursday, taking a one-stroke lead over Juli Inkster and Na Yeon Choi after the first round of the State Farm LPGA Classic.

Meena Lee, Alena Sharp, Anna Nordqvist, M.J. Hur and Song-Hee Kim were two shots back on a crowded leaderboard at Panther Creek Country Club. Seven other players were within three shots of the lead, including Cristie Kerr and Sophie Gustafson.

Feng's round was so clean, her only near-blemish came on the 410-yard, par-4 18th, when she had a poor stance on her second shot. She was forced to pitch out, knocked a three-quarter pitching wedge to 8 feet and made a sidehill putt with a deft touch to save par.

MGrane, Goddard share lead at Estoril

ESTORIL, Portugal — Damien McGrane of Ireland and Luke Goddard of England shot 8-under 64s to share the

lead after the first round of the Estoril Open on Thursday.

Stuart Manley of Wales and Eirik Tage Johansen of Norway were a stroke back.

MGrane and Goddard wondered if they had equaled the record or set a new one for the holiday resort course of Penha Longa.

Philip Price of Wales shot a 64 at Penha Longa in 1994. However, par then was 71. In recent years, the course has been lengthened to 6,903 yards and par increased to 72.

Rescue launched for girl on solo world sail

LOS ANGELES — A 16-year-old Southern California girl attempting a solo sail around the world was feared in trouble Thursday thousands of miles from land in the frigid, heaving southern Indian Ocean after her emergency beacons began signaling and satellite phone communication was lost.

An international effort to rescue young Abby Sunderland began, but the vast distances meant long hours of waiting for her family and support team, which expressed confidence that she was alive because the beacons were deliberately turned on rather than set off automatically.

"She's got all the skills she needs to take care of what she has to take care of, she has all the equipment as well," said brother Zac, himself a veteran of a solo sail around the world at age 17.

Australian Maritime Safety Authority spokeswoman Carly Lusk said three vessels were sent from the French territory of Reunion Island and an aircraft was dispatched from Perth on a four-hour flight to Abby's location more than 2,000 miles from both Africa and Australia.

Qantas airlines said in a statement that an Airbus A330 tasked by the safety authority took off at 7:53 a.m. Friday Perth time (23:53 GMT) and its crew would try to spot the sailboat.

## Tom Logano needs to let his racecar driving son fight own battles

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Joey Logano made it clear on pit road at Pocono that he's sick and tired of being pushed around. It's about time. Logano, the scrawny new kid on the playground, finally stood up to one of the neighborhood bullies by essentially telling Kevin Harvick he was done playing nice. If the confrontation following Sunday's race wasn't enough to make his point, Logano followed up with three pointed shots at the veteran driver in a live television interview.

One of them was about Harvick's wife! Who knew the kid had it in him? After all, it was a long overdue display of backbone for Logano, who likely earned a fair share of respect for finally standing up for himself after a season-and-a-half of being polite. Problem is, his newfound moxie has been somewhat overshadowed

by the presence of daddy.

Ah, yes, Tom Logano. Back in the center of the storm. The elder Logano learned a hard lesson last year, when NASCAR pulled his credential for entering pit road to confront Greg Biffle following the Nationwide Series race at California. He was angry at how Biffle had raced his son, who only two weeks earlier had rolled his car seven times in a spectacular accident at Dover.

Young Joey was clearly shaken following that wreck, and his post-accident demeanor raised questions about his mettle. It didn't help that TV cameras caught Tom Logano making a panicked sprint to the care center, painting a picture of a scared little boy in need of his father.

It was probably an unfair characterization, but big-time pro sports can be cut-

throat and Joey Logano endured a decent dose of whispering about the back-to-back incidents and the role of his father, the overzealous protector.

Yet there he was again Sunday at Pocono, where he was the second to reach Joey's car after he was spun by Harvick in the closing laps. The first was a Joe Gibbs Racing crewman, who made an honest effort to keep the driver from wading into the sea of yellow-clad team members who had formed a barrier around Harvick. The guy might have succeeded, too, if Tom Logano — a tall, fit, hot-tempered Italian — had not pried him away from his son.

What happened next is up for interpretation, but multiple replays seemed to show the father encouraging his son to confront Harvick with both a gesture and what appeared to be a shout of "Go Ahead!" Joey

Logano never got that close to Harvick, but he was red-faced and shouting, behavior never before seen in NASCAR from the polite 20-year-old.

At some point in all the commotion, Tom Logano apparently shoved a television reporter out of his way, an action that earned the father his own trip to the NASCAR hauler.

Just like that, NASCAR had its very own Little League dad.

That's not to say Tom Logano wasn't already categorized that way. He's been hands-on for Joey's entire career, which took off after he sold the family's waste management company in Connecticut and used the funds to help his two children pursue their dreams. It was ice skating for older sister Danielle, and her passion took the family to Georgia. There, they could take advantage of liberal restrictions on young racers, and Joey was driving quarter midgets by the time he was 6 years old.

### Jimmie Johnson wins charity race

ROSSBURG, Ohio — Jimmie Johnson led from start to finish to win Tony Stewart's dirt track charity race Wednesday.

Johnson, the four-time defending NASCAR Sprint Cup champion, survived 14 cautions with Kyle Bush on his bumper for each restart to win the sixth running of the Prelude to a Dream on Eldora Speedway's half-mile oval owned by Stewart.

Busch finally lost track position on the final restart with two laps left and finished fourth. Clint Bowyer, who had the fastest qualifying time, finished second, and Carl Edwards was third after starting 17th.

Twenty-seven drivers, including 18 from the Sprint Cup series, competed in late-model stock cars in the 30-lap event that benefited four children's hospitals.

### Front Row Motorsports crew suspended

DAYTONA BEACH — NASCAR has docked Front Row Motorsports owner Doug Yates 150 owner points and suspended three crew members on the No. 38 team for infractions incurred during last week's race at Pocono.

NASCAR fined crew chief Steve Lane \$100,000 and suspended him, car chief Richard Bourgeois and tire specialist Michael Harrold for

the next 12 events. Lane was also placed on probation through the end of the year.

NASCAR cited the No. 38 team for actions detrimental to stock car racing, using nonconforming equipment and modifying the valve stem hardware.

Driver Travis Kvapil was also docked 150 driver points after finishing 22nd in the 500-mile event.

Team co-owner Bob Jenkins took responsibility for the "unintentional" mistake and plans to appeal the penalty.

### NASCAR fines Braun Racing crew chiefs

DAYTONA BEACH — NASCAR has suspended the crew chiefs and tire specialists

for Braun Racing's two Nationwide Series entries for actions during last week's race in Nashville.

Stuart Cooper, crew chief for the No. 10 car driven by Taylor Malsam, and Trip Bruce, crew chief for the No. 38 car driven by Jason Leffler, were suspended for the next two Nationwide events and fined \$25,000 by NASCAR on Wednesday.

Tire specialists Sean Whisenhunt and Kevin Bellcourt were also suspended for the next two events. All four were also placed on probation through the end of the year.

NASCAR determined both teams committed numerous rules violations involving tires.

LONDON — The Roman Catholic Church in Scotland says singing sensation **Susan Boyle** will likely perform for **Pope Benedict XVI** on his tour of Britain later this year.

A spokesman said Thursday that negotiations are still taking place, but Boyle is expected to sing at an open-air papal Mass in Glasgow's Bellahouston Park on Sept. 16.

Benedict's four-day trip will be the first papal visit to Britain since **Pope John Paul II** in 1982.

His itinerary also includes an address in Parliament and the beatification of 19th-century Catholic convert **Cardinal John Henry Newman**.

Forty nine-year-old Boyle became an overnight sensation after her appearance last year on a TV talent show was viewed millions of times on the Internet.

### Johnson testifies at stalker trial

LOS ANGELES — Olympic gymnast **Shawn Johnson's** voice cracked Thursday as a prosecutor showed her a knife found in the car of a man accused of stalking her.

Johnson, however, was mostly composed as she testified against **Robert O'Ryan**, who is accused of breaking onto a studio lot to meet the gold medalist as she competed on "Dancing With the Stars."

Prosecutors say O'Ryan, 36, harbored a dangerous obsession for Johnson and traveled from Florida to Los Angeles with the hope of meeting and marrying her. Johnson was 17 at the time.

O'Ryan has pleaded not guilty by reason of insanity to felony stalking and burglary charges. Johnson won a gold medal in the 2008 Beijing Olympics.

### Jane Fonda honored in Paris

PARIS — The mayor of the City of Light has honored actress **Jane Fonda** in a Paris ceremony.

**Bertrand Delanoë** bestowed the Great Medal of the City of Paris upon the Academy Award-winning actress Thursday.

Fonda said she loves being in France and considers the country "like a second home."

The ceremony took place during a news conference about the Paris Cinema festival, which is scheduled to run from July 3 to 13.

## ACCLAIMED DOCUMENTARY ON DOLPHIN HUNT SPARKS CENSORSHIP DEBATE IN LAND OF THE RISING SUN

Controversy over "The Cove," an Oscar-winning documentary about the annual dolphin hunt in a Japanese village, has widened into a debate over free speech in the country.

Three theaters last week canceled showings of the movie after they were swamped with angry phone calls and threatened with noisy protests by nationalist groups. It was banned on a U.S. military base in Japan as too controversial, and 23 other theaters are still deciding whether to show the film, according to Japanese distributor Unplugged.

After the cancellations, a group of Japanese journalists, academics and film directors signed a letter urging the theaters not to back down and saying the issue "underlines the weakness of freedom of speech in Japan."

Freedom of speech is guaranteed in Japan's constitution, but many Japanese are wary of unruly demonstrations.

Nationalist groups, known for blasting slogans from truck convoys and handheld loudspeakers, often use the threat of protests as leverage. Two years ago, angry phone calls led several theaters to cancel showings of "Yasukuni," a movie about a Japanese war shrine that honors fallen soldiers, including executed military leaders convicted as war criminals.

On Wednesday, over 600 people crammed into a civic hall in Tokyo for a rare chance to see "The Cove," with lines forming hours before the doors opened and viewers spilling out into the lobby to watch via a video feed. Outside of small private showings, it was the first time the movie has been screened in Japan since October, when it was shown at the Tokyo International Film Festival.

The event had originally been planned to discuss the movie, which shows bloody scenes of a dolphin slaughter filmed by hidden cameras and portrays local fishermen as rough goons. But instead the event focused on the theater cancellations, reflecting the changing debate around the film.

"Protesters only threatened to do bad things, and then theaters got scared and pulled out," said Hiroyuki Shinoda, chief editor of "Tsukuru" magazine, which organized the showing.

Shinoda, who signed the protest letter last week, urged those present to contact theaters and ask that the movie be shown.

Ric O'Barry, a former trainer for the "Flipper" TV show who is the central character of "The Cove," made a surprise appearance at the screening. He is now a dolphin activist, but on Wednesday talked instead about freedom of speech and the large number of awards the movie has won.

"Those awards are given for entertainment value, and for that reason alone the Japanese people should be able to see it and make up their own mind," he said. It won best documentary at the Academy Awards this year.

Outside the hall, about two dozen police and plainclothes officers were on duty, but no protests took place, although a few people quietly handed out flyers calling for the movie to be banned. One flyer linked the movie with Sea Shepherd, an anti-whaling group that clashes with Japan's whaling fleet each year.

"Freedom of expression doesn't need to be recognized for a movie made by terrorists," it read.

"The Cove" includes an interview with Sea Shepherd founder Paul Watson. It is presented as the first documentary from The Oceanic Preservation Society, a group headed by Director Louie Psihoyos that lists Sea Shepherd as a partner.

Various right-wing groups consider the movie to be anti-Japanese, saying that dolphin hunts occur in other parts of the world and that any portrayal of animals being slaughtered for food would be bloody and unpleasant to watch.

The groups have led noisy protests outside of Unplugged's headquarters and the home of its president.

In Taiji, the small village where the hunt occurs, the local government and fishing cooperative defend dolphin hunting as a local custom with a long history. The mostly bottlenose dolphins killed in the hunt are not endangered, and hunts are also carried out in other parts of Japan — although very few Japanese have ever eaten dolphin meat.

In the version of "The Cove" shown Tuesday and intended for release in Japan, disclaimers have been added saying those interviewed in the movie are not protesting or supporting dolphin issues. Unlike the U.S. version, the faces of most Japanese are blurred out.

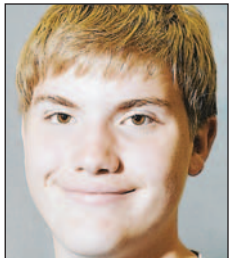

## 'Persia' scores in its movie debut

For as long as I can remember, videogame film adaptations have been categorized as, well, bad. It seems that a curse has been placed on videogame adaptations because whether it's a movie about aliens, assassins or treasure hunters, the movie versions are hardly ever well received.

When the media heard that the immensely popular "Prince of Persia" series was getting its own chance at silver screen fame, people started wondering if the curse could be broken. After the first five minutes, we see the three brothers all grown up and on the way to attack the city of Alamut because they believe that they are selling weapons to enemies of Persia. During this raid, Dastan finds a mystical dagger. No one except the princess of the city, Tamina (Gemma Arterton), knows its true powers.

When the army successfully overtakes the city, the king travels to celebrate with his three sons. Dastan is given a robe to present to the king as a celebratory gift for their victory, but when the kings puts it on, he is

## Review: 'A-Team' is flat-out fun

"Overkill is underrated," says Hannibal Smith, leader of "The A-Team," while planning a particularly elaborate and explosive scheme to trap a bad guy.

Director and co-writer Joe Carnahan apparently subscribes to this school of thought, as well.

If you're looking for subtlety, look elsewhere. Carnahan's big-screen version of the '80s TV series is ridiculously over-the-top, full of wild helicopter chases and exploding sport utility

vehicles and tumbling cargo containers. At times it feels like little more than a cacophony of automatic gunfire and shattered glass.

Then again, you shouldn't really expect anything else given the source material and the director's own filmography. Carnahan previously wrote and directed "Smokin' Aces" from 2007, a piece of wannabe Guy Ritchie bombast about a Vegas assassination attempt — but he also made the tremendous and little-seen drama "Narc" from 2002, starring Ray Liotta and Jason Patric as Detroit cops.

"The A-Team" combines the enormity and stylishness of the former with (some of) the

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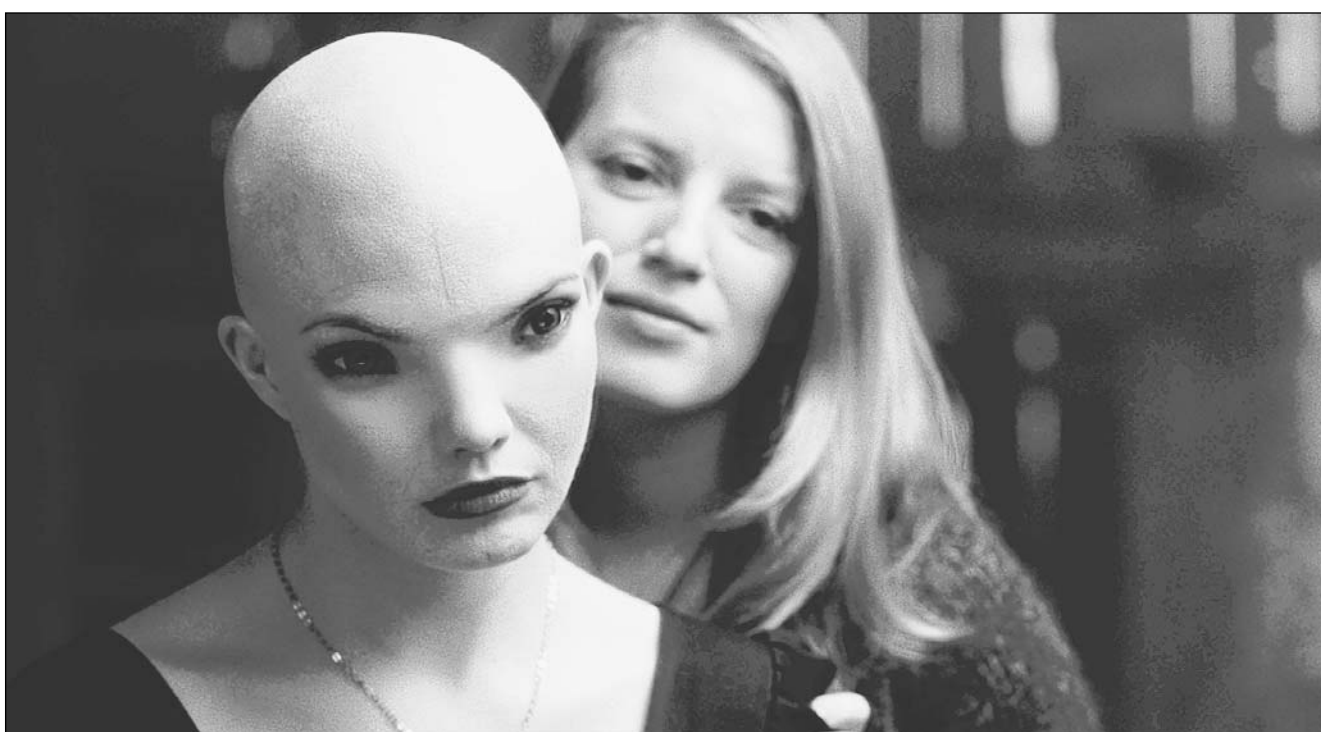

## Dysfunctional science horrifies in 'Splice'

Years ago, the "Species" franchise pushed taboos by featuring an extraterrestrial seductress who conceived alien offspring with unsuspecting men. Unpalatable as this was, "Splice" plummets to unthinkable lows. Not only showcasing a deliberate interspecies affair, it burgesons with incestuous implications.

Regardless, "Splice" begins interestingly enough. Clive Nicoli (Adrien Brody) and Elsa Kast (Sarah Polley) are eccentric geneticists bent on a breakthrough. Young as they are, the couple has already met success, having engineered a unique species. A perfect compilation of animal genomes, the creature produces a virulent protein that would revolutionize the livestock industry. However, Clive and Elsa aren't ones to sit on their laurels, instead vying to tinker with human DNA

in hopes curing genetic diseases.

Operating outside their sponsor's wishes, legality and scientific ethics, they splice animal and human chromosomes. Push comes to shove and Elsa shoots the budding embryo into a womb-like contraction. Within too short a time, the machine gives birth to a hairless chicken-rabbit. Clive is revolted but Elsa cannot bear the thought of hurt-

ing it.

The thing, eventually named Dren, becomes increasingly human. Elsa treats Dren like a daughter, showering her with dresses, jewelry and dolls. Reluctant as he was at first, Clive eventually accepts her, too.

The origins of Dren's "anonymous" human donor, Elsa's festering family secrets and Clive's inability to shirk pubescent come-ons rupture to a mortifying tryst, leading to laughable Jerry

Springer-style mayhem.

I must admit, the first quarter of "Splice" has an edge. Adrien Brody and Sarah Polley fit their (initially) likeable characters. Even at the surface, Brody's distinct appearance, Polley's blazing red hair and both actors' wild wardrobe scream individualism. Defiantly naming their corporation NERD, the unabashed fans of jazz and contemporary art give a hip "thumbs up" to smart weirdoes.

Plus the CGI monsters are beauties! Drably colored and unimposing, the cow-eyed slug creatures Fred and Ginger (named after the singers) are exotic but reined into believability. Following Bad Robot's "Cloverfield" monster aesthetic, Dren's downsized first stage captures a menacing as well as infantile disposition. Though wrought over a jagged frame, newborn Dren's transparent pink skin and visible breathing evidence her fragility.

"Splice's" quirky characters, subtle character design and brainy debate

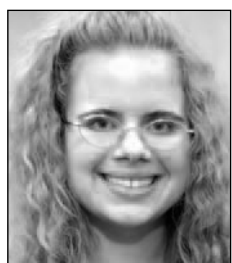
gradually morph to an unforeseen monstrosity. Overstating absolutely everything, it is an engine that blows all its gaskets to burp up a hysterical symphony. Later forms of Dren feature not only a stinger and chicken legs but also aquatic lungs, a human face and retractable dragonfly wings. Someone could not just settle on a concept!

Clive and Elsa, portrayed initially as odd but well-rounded people, partake in uncharacteristically deranged acts. Troubled backstories and quasi-Freudian psychology attempt to give depth to the sickening drama to no avail.

Aside from a promising start, all "Splice" has to offer are some unintentional guffaws for the de-based inner teenager. It's ludicrous and I give it a D+.

Rated R for disturbing elements including strong sexuality, nudity, sci-fi violence and language.

soon killed by poison soaked into the robe.

Suddenly a murder suspect, Dastan flees with Tamina and goes on a quest to clear his name. Soon after they flee, Dastan realizes that the dagger he found is capable of taking back time. Tamina tells him he must protect the dagger at all costs.

The best thing about "Prince of Persia" is that it has top-notch stunts and action sequences — the best I've seen in a long time. One of the things that has made the videogames so popular are the acrobatic abilities of the prince. He can swing off of poles, do back flips across walls and my personal favorite — he can run on walls. So naturally, the film had to include this factor and, for me, it was the most enjoyable part of the film because when you include the classic sword fights and then throw in acrobatic stunts throughout, it goes together very well — almost like "Pirates of the Caribbean" on steroids.

One thing that sets this

film aside from other videogame adaptations is the good story. Most videogame films have poorly thought out story lines because they are strictly based on the video games themselves. In this film, they take elements from the game but then re-craft the story into a more original plot line, much like what producer Jerry Bruckheimer did with "Pirates." This is the way to go because it allows for a more creative approach to the film and its story.

All in all, "Prince of Persia" has almost every element that one could want: great action, great stunts, ro-

mance, suspense, and a good script. I think it is now clear that all videogame films do not have to be terrible. The "curse" has been broken. Three stars out of four.

"Prince of Persia: The Sands of Time" has a running time of 116 minutes and is rated PG-13 for intense sequences of violence and action.

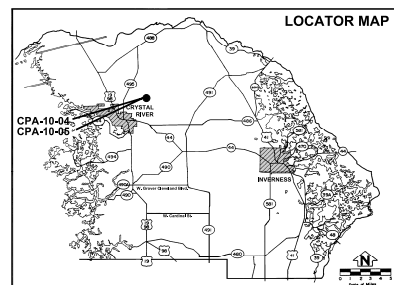

he and his mother, Sherry (Taraji P. Henson) now live.

Dre hates it in China — doesn't understand the language, can't use chopsticks, etc. — but when he meets a pretty violinist named Mei Ying in the park, he's smitten. School bully Cheng (Zhenwei Wang) doesn't like this development, though, and goes on a mission to make Dre's life even more hellish than it already was. Enter Mr. Han, who not only fights off Dre's enemies, he heals the boy's injuries and puts him through his own peculiar training regimen.

We all know where this is headed: The Big Tournament. But first, "The Karate Kid" stops at the Great Wall and the Forbidden City — you know, just because they're picturesque — which contribute to the movie's overlong running time. Still, Chan is solid in an extremely different role, one that's much more serious and understated than his well-known, playful persona. All the trademark acrobatics are there, but without the cheerful mugging. After decades on screen, it's refreshing to see Chan shift gears like this.

Functioning in the Mr. Miyagi role, Chan also has decent chemistry with Smith. But things are awk-

ward between Smith and Wenwen Han, the Chinese version of Elisabeth Shue's Ali-with-an-I. Their ages, her shy demeanor, her English (which is sometimes hard to understand) — all these factors conspire against them, and the film.

The ending is still rousing enough to make the film a crowd-pleaser, though. But after this, hopefully some '80s classics like "Sixteen Candles," "Better Off Dead" and "Revenge of the Nerds" will remain off-limits.

"The Karate Kid," a Columbia Pictures release, is rated PG for bullying, martial arts action violence and some mild language. Running time: 135 minutes. Two stars out of four.

intelligence and character development of the latter — a surprising amount, given the time of year it's hitting theaters. But mainly it's just flat-out fun, with a cheeky sense of humor — way more enjoyable than you might expect when you consider the ignominious history of movies inspired by TV shows. ("Leave It to Beaver," anyone?)

Carnahan keeps things moving, making the two-hour running time fly by. The film's fluid editing is especially noticeable during the big set pieces — impossibly complex, intricately timed missions that the team makes look easy.

The strength of the cast helps: Liam Neeson as Hannibal, the team's cigar-chomping mastermind, whom George Peppard played on television; Bradley Cooper, an ideal choice to

step into the Dirk Benedict role as charmer Templeton "Face" Peck; and "District 9" star Sharlto Copley bringing equal amounts of humor and danger to the role of "Howlin' Mad" Murdock. Even mixed martial arts star Quinton "Rampage" Jackson offers a solid presence, filling the intimidating shoes of Mr. T to play B.A. Baracus. One would, in theory, pity the fool asked to do that; Jackson does just fine in his first film role.

The basic details are the same, though the period has shifted to the present day; having said that, it's also a bit of a prequel to the show's adventures. Instead of being Vietnam veterans, they're in the final days of troop withdrawal from Iraq in the script Carnahan co-wrote with Brian Bloom, who has a small but pivotal supporting part.

Still, Hannibal, Face, Murdock and B.A. are former Army Rangers framed for a crime they didn't commit; "The A-Team" follows their

efforts to clear their names and find the real culprits behind a botched attempt at stealing back some U.S. currency plates. Jessica Biel is all business as the Army captain who chases them once they escape and go on the run, and Patrick Wilson's pretty-boy looks make him ideally smarmy as the CIA operative with mysterious motives and allegiances.

While several of the action sequences flow beautifully and have a great energy about them, others look fake and cheesy, with distractingly cartoony special effects. Still, the pyrotechnics should please the guys in the audience looking for mindless summer fun. And for the women... Cooper has his shirt off early and often. And he's clearly been to the gym.

"The A-Team," a 20th Century Fox release, is rated PG-13 for intense sequences of action and violence throughout, language and smoking. Running time: 118 minutes. Three stars out of four.

## Review: Rivers talks in bio flick

She would seem to be the most brutally straightforward woman in America, but Joan Rivers emerges as a jumble of contradictions in the documentary "Joan Rivers: A Piece of Work," beginning most immediately — and superficially — with her appearance.

There's the voice, which still has that recognizable raspy edge to it, that amped-up indignation, even in her mid-70s. But then there's the face, which doesn't move regardless of the intensity of her stand-up comedy rants — the result of too much plastic surgery, which she's all too happy to discuss. Nothing is off limits when she's talking about herself, which is simultaneously part of her appeal and part of her narcissism.

There's the desire to be taken seriously as an actress, as evidenced by how deeply cut she feels when the London reviews of her one-woman play aren't exactly raves, but also a willingness to endorse any product and a genuine enthusiasm for the opportunities that might arise from appearing on Donald Trump's "Celebrity Apprentice."

And then there's the acerbic wit that spares no one and nothing, a trailblazing comic presence, juxtaposed with a traditional, almost quaint longing for loyalty, honesty and trust — one that brings her to tears — even after all these years in show business.

Rivers is never boring, that's for sure, even when the film itself grows repetitive by hammering home a few key points. Directors Ricki Stern and Annie Sundberg followed her around for a year, starting with her 75th birthday, and at various times Rivers herself or those around her state the obvious: She's a performer. She's hardworking. She's a perfectionist.

Because she gave the filmmakers unlimited access to her home and her life, we get to see the meticulously la-

beled file cabinets in her office — a wall full of them — containing note cards with every joke she's ever told for decades. We see her arrive at hotels in the middle of the night after performing a set, only to be awakened scant hours later to hop on a plane, fly somewhere else and do it all over again.

Rivers' drive is awe-inspiring, while her desperate yearning to be back on top is more than a little sad. When looking at her calendar, she jokes that she has to wear sunglasses because the whiteness of the empty pages is blinding (apparently Kathy Griffin now commands all the big Las Vegas and comedy-club gigs). She sells jewelry on QVC to help support her lavish lifestyle, and her gaudy New York apartment is a sight to behold.

But after 40 years as a comedian, what is she waiting for? What will finally make her happy? Family alone doesn't satisfy her; daughter Melissa, an only child, is only

half kidding when she says that growing up she had a sibling: "the career." Filling in for Johnny Carson as host of "The Tonight Show" was, of course, a career-defining highlight. But having other female comics approach her with reverence, thanking her for having opened the door for them, inspires her to respond that they can go (expletive) themselves.

Yes, the biting sense of humor is undeniably still there, and aside from her unexpected flashes of vulnerability, that's what sticks with you most after watching "A Piece of Work." Watching her do stand-up is mesmerizing: the rhythm of it, the relentlessness. So maybe we're lucky that Rivers doesn't want to retire on a beach somewhere — that she still wants to talk.

# Busy stage schedule will follow June lull

Encore Ensemble Theater Inc. has graciously accepted the gift of a trunk full of theatrical supplies. Included in these donated treasures are play catalogs (perhaps a bit outdated), scripts, paperback books on stagecraft and suppliers, along with books of collected plays by famous authors. Among these are the collected works of Noel Coward and Neil Simon.

Most directors, actors and theater lovers are familiar with the name Neil Simon. Many of his plays are comedies with an underlying message, yet written in such a way that causes theater people to be so receptive to his scripts and find them so endearing. He writes from life experiences with characters and situations that are so real, yet often so humorous, that audiences can identify with them. It would be a rare occasion to find a community theater that has never staged a Simon play. The late Gulf Islands Civic Theater found great success with "Barefoot in the Park" and "The Prisoner of Second Avenue" during its 30-some years of providing theater productions to this community. Both of these plays were produced at five different locations with five different casts. "The Odd Couple" was another hit that Gulf Islands performed more than once. The Art Center Theater recently performed Simon's "The Gingerbread Lady" and "Lost in Yonkers." His writing is so popular that many of his plays have been made into movies.

Any accredited theater critic will be able to name at least five of the greatest English playwrights of the past 100

years, Neil Simon included. Among these are George Bernard Shaw, Arthur Miller, Eugene O'Neill, Tennessee Williams, Edward Albee and William Inge. Where Simon is noted for comedy, some of the others were known for realistic drama regarding moral, political or economic issues, biting dialogue, pessimism and tragedy, with the exception of Shaw, whose plays were often fraught with incisive comedy.

Shaw, who passed away in 1950, was an Irish dramatist and critic who won the Nobel Peace Prize for Literature in 1928. The musical "My Fair Lady" was based on his play "Pygmalion." Another of his works, "Arms and the Man," set the scene for the operetta "The Chocolate Soldier." His "Major Barbara" was the idea behind the musical "Guys and Dolls," which drew large audiences at our Art Center Theater last summer.

No doubt, the name Arthur Miller is known to most everyone. His claim to fame should not be the result of his fleeting marriage to Marilyn Monroe, but for his literary accomplishments; "Death of A Salesman" is rarely staged by community theaters though it is an all-time Broadway favorite. The part of beleaguered salesman, Willie Loman, is one that many actors consider a plum role. This play and another of his writings, "The Crucible," have been put on film. Art Center Theater chose to stage his "All My Sons" a few years ago. Though a heavy drama, it was critically acclaimed by local audiences.

Other contemporary playwrights whose names are recognizable are

Noel Coward ("Privates Lives," "Blithe Spirit"), Tennessee Williams ("Cat on a Hot Tin Roof," "The Glass Menagerie," "A Streetcar Named Desire") Eugene O'Neill ("Mourning Becomes Electra," "The Iceman Cometh"), William Inge ("Bus Stop," "Picnic") and Edward Albee ("Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf"; "A Delicate Balance"). With the exception of Coward, these playwrights are recognized for outstanding dramatic plays.

Encore Ensemble Theater Inc., although a relatively new entity, has become recognized for audience participation mystery/comedy dinner theater and for musical revues. At this time, an original musical and a musical revue along the lines of the award-winning "One Hundred Years of Musical Memories" are in the offing. The Art Center Theater opens next month with its summer musical, "The King and I," adapted from the book "Anna and the King of Siam." Nature Coast Performers' Janie Smith and husband Donald have just returned from a camping trip in the Colorado mountains. Nature Coast Performers Inc. has opted to postpone the summer show and will open the season in September as planned.

Our theater volunteers deserve a little time away from their theater commitments, but knowing their dedication and love for all theater activities, they won't be taking much time off. Though June is a quiet theater month, look for productions coming up in the very near future.

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# 5 TV shows that should be movies

**Editor's Note:** Another in a series of five "whatevers" keyed to a new movie. This week, critic Christy Lemire plays off today's release of "The A-Team" with a list of five more TV shows that should be turned into movies.

LOS ANGELES — The cinematic landscape is littered with terrible movies based on television shows. From "Leave It to Beaver" and "Bewitched" to "The Dukes of Hazzard" and "Starsky & Hutch," the vast majority of these adaptations have not exactly been must-sees. And we won't even begin to discuss movies based on "Saturday Night Live" sketches. There simply aren't enough hours in the day.

But with "The A-Team" arriving in theaters this weekend, it's a good time to ponder some other programs that are ready to make that leap:

■ **"Arrested Development."** One of the smartest, funniest, most inventive shows ever, it barely lasted three seasons. Critics loved it, few others watched it. But while there's been talk of bringing the dysfunctional Bluth family to the big screen ever since the series ended in 2006, the project remains up in the air. David Cross, who played Tobias Funke, said he doubted it would happen. Will Arnett, who played Gob Bluth, said at the Fox upfront that the movie

would be a go someday, but that a new comedy he's doing with "Arrested Development" creator Mitch Hurwitz was delaying production. And Jason Bateman, who was at the center of the family as Michael Bluth, also has said he was optimistic. If anyone knows for sure, we'll be hanging out by the banana stand.

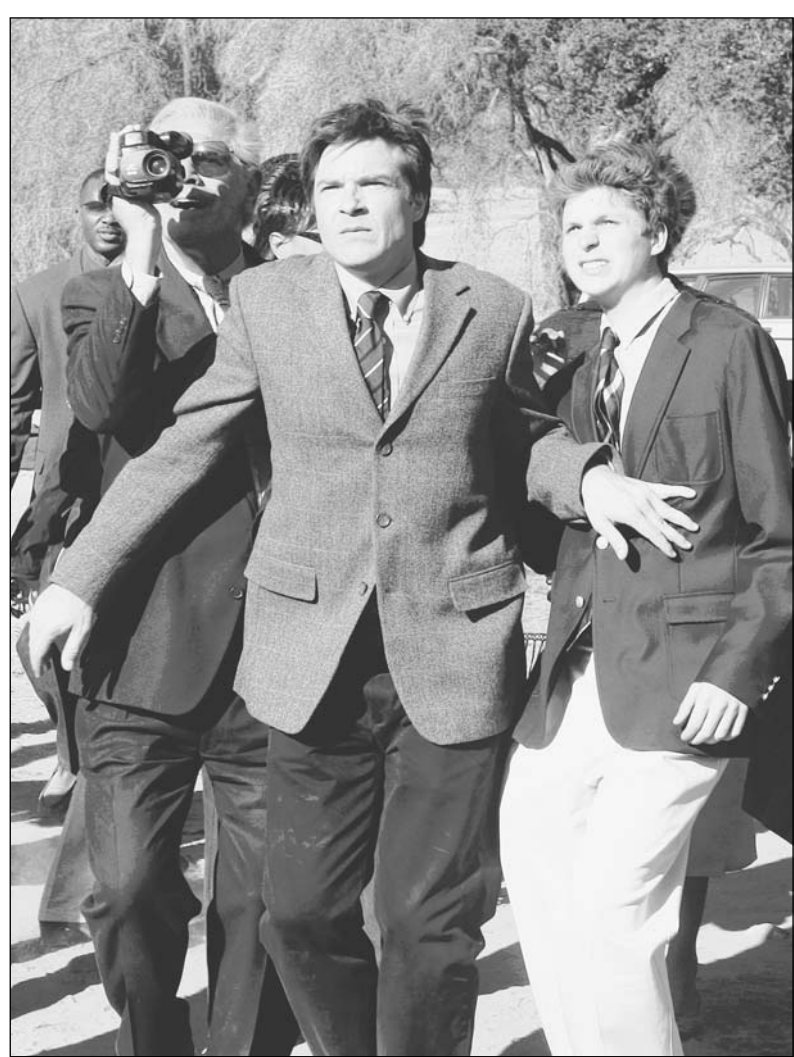
■ **"The Golden Girls."** Even though three of the four stars are no longer with us — Bea Arthur, Estelle Getty and Rue McClanahan — the series' core concept and its mix of brash humor and friendship would seem to be a hit with moviegoers, especially those of a certain age, for whom the pickings are slim at the multiplex. Just think about it: Four older women with distinct personalities, sharing a home in Miami, teasing and sometimes bickering with each other but remaining loyal throughout. The raucy jokes that marked the show's sense of humor could be even more daring in film form. It could also be known by its alternate title, "Sex and the City 3."

■ **"Jeopardy!"** There are so many potential benefits here. First, by seeing it repeatedly, you can look like a total smarty pants in front of your friends, who will have no idea you're just memorizing the answers. Ooh! Sing-alongs to the theme song during the Final Jeopardy round. To make it even more interactive, people in the audience could throw fries at the screen whenever Alex Trebek

pronounces a word in show-offy, perfect French. And speaking of Trebek, there could be flashbacks attached to various questions, revealing the path he took to game-show greatness. That's never been done before.

■ **The "Joan Rivers Classics Collection" on QVC.** The comedian and "Celebrity Apprentice" winner can talk, as we know from her catchphrase. And she's been peddling her line of jewelry and accessories through the home-shopping channel for about 20 years. Wouldn't it be more fun to see her sell her stuff with all the foul-mouthed candor of her stand-up routine? You could watch her work blue as she tries to sell you a turquoise-colored necklace and matching earrings. And this would be a rare opportunity in which you'd be encouraged to use your cell phone in the theater — 'cause there'd be no way to resist dialing in and making that purchase right NOW!

■ **"Yule Log."** It's a Christmas-morning staple at local television stations across the country: a shot of a piece of wood, burning in a fireplace, for hours on end while traditional carols swell in the background. Now imagine spending Christmas morning watching it on the big screen. It would seem ... warmer somehow, right? Buy a present for yourself, sneak a little eggnog in, maybe even make some new friends. 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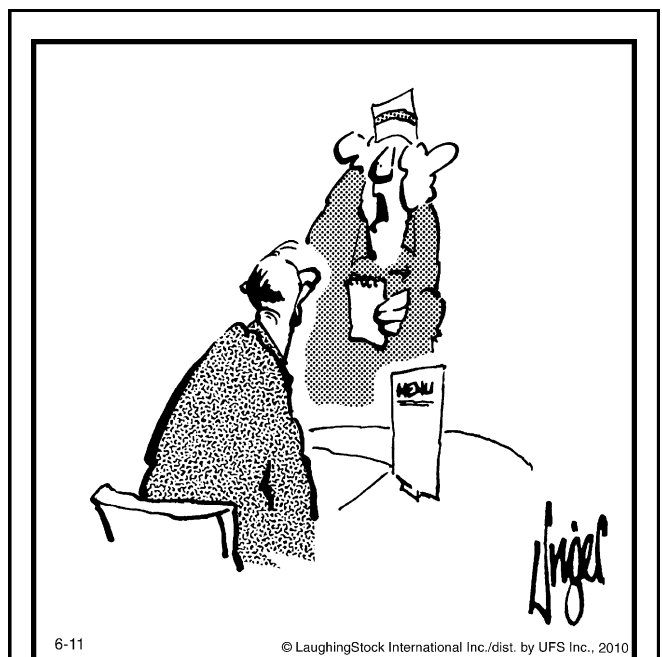
