Construction of new hangars highlights growth of local aviation services

Like a complaint common to hotel guests, county airplane pilots had a shortage of hangars.

But hangars are on the way at both Crystal River and Inverness airports.

The pads are poured and the walls are going up in Crystal River.

'My past is my past'

Habitat recipient haunted by murder conviction

CRYSTAL RIVER — Julianna Lozoya had hoped she left the past behind when she moved to Citrus County a few years ago.

Lozoya found a job she liked and learned about Habitat for Humanity, the program that helps build homes for working folks who might not be able to afford one on the open market.

Lozoya applied for a home and was accepted. She put in more than twice the required 500 "sweat equity" hours on her home and helped other applicants with

their homes as well Then, on April 7, the day before Easter, Lozoya moved into her

three-bedroom home in DeRosa Village to continue her quiet, unassuming life.

But that quiet was shattered Thursday when a Tampa Bay TV station revealed that one of Habitat's newest clients served 13 years in prison for second-degree murder.

"This thing coming on TV is very upsetting," Lozoya said Thursday afternoon, referring to the report on WFLA-Channel 8. "The people are going to judge it as the negative, not what I am now, which is very positive. I have changed. I have done my time, and now I'm just trying to live my life without answering negative things about my past. My past is my past."

Lozoya was convicted in 1991 for the 1990 stabbing death of her

estranged partner. She was sentenced to 27 years in prison, but was released in 2003 after serving 12 years at a state

Bond raters deliver more bad news to CMHS

Fitch's verdict: BB-

 ${\bf INVERNESS-Citrus\ Memorial}$ Health System's bond ratings continue to tumble as a direct result of the dispute over control of the hospital. Fitch Ratings announced this

week that CMHS's bond ratings dropped for the second straight year, from BB+ to BB-

At the same time, Fitch upgraded the hospital's financial outlook from "negative" to "evolving." CMHS chief financial officer Mark Williams said

that indicated the uncertain outcome of litigation between the Citrus Memorial Heath Foundation and Citrus County Hospital Board. Fitch pointedly said the gover-

nance dispute between the founda-

tion and CCHB has cost the hospital

more than \$10 million in property tax revenue since 2009.

"Fitch believes it is imperative for both parties to resolve this dispute so the organization can return its focus to strategic and operational initiatives," the report states.

Hospital chief executive officer Ryan Beaty said the report, though discouraging, has no practical immediate impact unless CMHS were to borrow money for a capital

'We don't have any large capital needs immediately going forward," Beaty said. "It really has no negative impact on us. If we needed to go to the bond market for construction, it would have an impact on us.'

The report noted that the CCHB has withheld more than \$10 million since the dispute over control of the hospital began in 2009. Despite less reliance on tax support, the hospital

German tourist attacked by shark

A German tourist is in stable condition after being bitten by a shark in waters off Vero Beach on Wednesday.

Authorities said 47-year-old Karin Ulrike Stei, of Konstanz, Germany, was attacked in the afternoon. The shark bit her left thigh, cutting a 12-inch laceration through to the bone.

Scripps Treasure Coast Newspapers reported the tourist was in waist-deep water about 30 yards from shore.

She was being cared for at Lawnwood Regional Medical Center in Fort Pierce.

Tallahassee Hurricane insurance fund inadequate?

Florida might not have enough money to pay off hurricane insurance claims if a big storm hits this year.

An advisory panel on Thursday concluded the state may fall nearly \$2 billion short of the total needed to cover all of its obligations.

Florida created a backstop for insurers in the wake of Hurricane Andrew, which caused widespread damage when it slammed into the state nearly 20 years ago.

The state-owned and operated fund offers insurance companies reinsurance at prices generally lower than

those in the private market. Heading into this storm season, the fund would be liable for about \$17.3 billion. The fund has cash reserves, but would need to borrow the rest. The new estimates, however, conclude the state could not get the full amount.

Results from a national science test show only a quarter of Florida eighth-grade students are considered proficient in science.

Scores released Thursday show 28 percent of Florida middle-school students scored at the proficient level on the 2011 National Assessment of Educational Progress in science. One percent performed at the advanced level on the test, while 62 percent showed basic science knowledge. An advanced level score is considered on par for what is needed to pursue a career in the field

EDC has sights set on a **Target**

If economic development is trying to attract targeted industries, why can't it snag Target?

That question was addressed last week by John Siefert, executive director of the Citrus County Economic Development Coun-

president, when they spoke before the Citrus County Council (CCC),

and environmental groups. 'We're seeing some positive forward movement," Meek said, regarding job growth in the EDC's targeted industries, which inmanufacturing, agriculture, recycling, technological development,

medical and biomedical. "You put in four Wal-Marts and 20,000 dollar stores," Crystal River resident Gail Jannarone observed. "That's going to raise our paychecks so that the expensive stores will want to come in here? How the heck does that happen?'

Many shoppers prefer Target to Wal-Mart, said CCC member Debbie Ressler.

'What happened with Target?" Ressler asked. "People are leaving Citrus County and going to Marion County and we could recoup that sales tax.'

Meek said the county "got in the way" when Target wanted to open a store.

"They're one of the companies that got put through the wringer," Meek said. "We've reached out to them, but Target is in a dormant state, as are a lot of companies.'

Meek agreed Wal-Mart was not among the targeted industries that offer higherpaying jobs. But, in a freemarket system, Wal-Mart can open where it wants to do business. Three new Wal-Marts were coming to the county because the demographic supports them, Meek said.

"Our plan is attracting targeted industries, the type of business that will provide high-wage jobs — TCG, Sibex — that's how you attract other establishments from a retail standpoint," Meek said. "We're not going to stop Wal-Mart from coming into our community, but we are going to go after and try to recruit other businesses to come here. That will bring those other businesses here that those highpaying jobs can support.' Chronicle reporter Chris

FAMU still feeling heat over hazing death

TALLAHASSEE — The longtime director of Florida A&M University's famed marching band announced his retirement Thursday, while a top state official urged the university to keep the band suspended while investigations of a drum major's death continue.

Frank Brogan, the chancellor of Florida's state university system, wrote a blunt letter to FAMU President James Ammons urging him to keep the band suspended. Ammons was expected to discuss the band university board of trustees on Monday.

Former state Sen. Al Lawson, a FAMU alumnus from Tallahassee, said he believed Ammons was leaning page letter to trustees extoward keeping the band suspended.

"There is a considerable amount of pressure being placed on the university and the trustees about the band being able to perform in the fall," Lawson said. "But I think in the light of everything, though, the university is going to have to go in a new direction.'

Lawson said long-time director Julian White's decifighting to win his job back gives the university a chance to recruit new leadership for the band.

White's dismissal was placed on hold while the criminal investigation unfolded, but he insisted that he did nothing wrong and fought for months to get

A total of 52 people — including 51 band members and one cheerleader — had been previously enrolled at the school but were not enrolled at the time of Champion's death.

High court mulling foreclosure case

TALLAHASSEE — A homeowner's lawyer told the Florida Supreme Court on Thursday that the justices can strike a blow against rampant fraud by prohibiting lenders from simply voluntarily dismissing mortgage foreclosure cases to avoid penalties for filing bogus documents.

Such a ban would apply to all types of lawsuits, but a bank's lawyer said it's never been an issue until the state's mortgage foreclosure crisis.

"There has never been a matter of greater public importance in this court's obligation to deter fraud and defend its integrity," said Amanda Lundergan, who made her first Supreme Court oral argument on behalf of Palm Beach County resident Roman Pino.

tices as "robo-signing" by bank employees who often knew little or nothing about mortgage documents they were hired to sign. In Pino's case, the Bank of New York Mellon was accused of submitting a fraudulent assignment of mortgage.

Lundergan's argument got a bit chippy as the justices questioned her choice of words, legal positions and even her client's motive for pursuing an appeal.

The questioning was less intense for the bank's more seasoned attorney, Bruce Rogow, who's participated in 114 Supreme Court cases. He argued that existing court rules prevent judges from prohibiting plaintiffs from re-filing lawsuits that have been voluntarily dismissed.

"The court has no say in those situations," Rogow said. "There is nothing that can be done, and this has been established for years





good," Dawsy added. Dawsy acknowledged a slight reduction — about \$100,000 — in the \$1.5 million contract for the coming year, but said he has been assured the money will be restored in future contracts.

CCSO has been doing child investigations since 2007, and is one of seven agencies statewide doing them

the funding for those services was being switched back to DCF in 2012 at

the request of Dean. Dean has been on record about being approached by Sen. Joe Negron, R-Palm Beach, and budget committee chair, about a need to make a choice between cuts to Citrus County funding and a Baker County mental health hospital. He said then it became a transfer of services from CCSO to DCF, which he was unaware of.

'It's always been about the budget for me," Dean said last October as Dawsy was lobbying to retain the services.

During the last legislative session, Dawsy said it was in the governor's and Legislature's budget to keep the services in Citrus County, but deep into the session it was suddenly dropped and the funds were incorporated into DCF's budget.

Dean said during the session he thought child protective investigations are "an agency role."

Dawsy enlisted the support of Sen. Mike Fasano, R-New Port Richey, and Rep. Jimmie T. Smith, R-Inverness, and the Citrus County commissioners to aid his efforts.

Thursday, he offered his gratitude for their help and for the help of the governor.

"I'm ecstatic," said Dawsy, "to continue serving Citrus County's children and the tax-paying public in this allimportant function.

prison in Broward County.

She said she moved to Citrus County to live with friends because she has no family. That's when she learned about the Habitat Humanity for program.

George Rusaw, a former builder who is president and chief executive officer of the Citrus County Habitat for Humanity, said the agency does not conduct detailed criminal background checks of applicants. Habitat screens for poor credit ratings, outstanding arrest warrants, violations of probation and sexual predators.

Habitat's application process is to determine whether anything in someone's background would prevent him or her from paying a mortgage

Denial is financial-based, not on any moral grounds, Rusaw said.

Lozoya has a full-time job and is able to make payments on the \$80,000 zero-interest mortgage, Rusaw said.

Rusaw said he knew nothing of Lozoya's criminal past until the Channel 8 reporter informed him. Still, he said, it would have made difference.

"She met all the criteria to become an applicant," Rusaw said. "She actually exceeded all the requirements we place on our homeowners."

Rusaw said Habitat has built about a dozen homes in the past 12 months and there are no qualified applicants on a waiting list.

Still, Rusaw acknowledged his concern about media reports regarding Lozoya's past.

"Public perception is very important to us," he said. "The public supports Habitat so much and we hold that very dearly. We don't want to shake the public's confidence.'

Lozoya hopes her new neighbors appreciate who she is today.

"In the end," she said, "I will know who my true friends

reduced its losses from \$8 million in 2010 to \$4.4 million last year.

The report stated that the hospital also noted that 75 percent of its revenue is from Medicare or Medicaid patients, which makes the hospital susceptible to government cuts in those programs.

The hospital foundation and CCHB are locked in litigation over a 2011 law that gives CCHB trustees controlling votes on the foundation, which leases the hospital from the hospital board and oversees day-to-day operations. That case now rests with the District Court of Appeal in Tallahassee, which is expected to rule this summer.

Fitch said the rating could rise, drop or stay the same based on the court's ruling.

"The release of tax revenues collected from prior years to CMH would be viewed positively by Fitch and could warrant positive rating pressure at that time," the report states. "However, further negative rating pressure could occur if there is continued deterioration in CMH's current financial position." Chronicle reporter Mike




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

In Hollywood, companies who want their number removed from the robocall list have to come to city hall, acknowledge the signs have been picked up and pay a fine. Fines range from \$75 to \$250 depending on how many violations a company has had. So far only seven companies have shown up and received citations. though dozens have been targeted with robocalls, Bober said.

City officials did not immediately provide a list of which companies had been cited and paid the fine when requested by The Associated Press.

A few signs still remained in the city this week, including ones advertising an 866 number for DNA paternity testing for \$235 and a handscrawled sign to buy auction cars. The companies did not return phone calls seeking comment.

In nearby Oakland Park, the city commission approved an automated online message system from a different vendor than Voicent. The city can use it at whim when the signs are especially prolific. Each call is about nine cents, said city code enforcement adminis-

trator Jay Quier. The city hasn't used the system yet, saying there's been a lull in signs since tax

season ended. "You've been a nuisance to us now we're going to be a nuisance to you, turn the tables on them," said Quier. 'We hate to be that way.'

Just south of Hollywood, Fort Lauderdale officials are also struggling with signs that littered a busy intersection this week adverchild reductions and credit repairs, including a sign from Caravan Credit Services.

But company officials said they didn't order the sign spam.

"It must have been an old sign. We stopped doing that," said Ross Linthicum, executive vice president of the Houston-based company. "A couple of salesmen took it upon themselves to do that. ... You do get people that still go out there and do it, but it's in our paperwork not to do it."

A volunteer with the Florida Panther National Wildlife Refuge found the 12-week-old male kitten was unresponsive along a road near Naples April 23. Veterinarians couldn't find any major injuries but believe the animal suffered head

Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission biologist Dave Onorato said it's unlikely the kitten will recover enough to be released into the wild. It's been transferred to a Tampa zoo for further rehabilitation.

Sheriff's deputy shot, suspect killed during traffic stop

FORT MYERS — A southwest Florida sheriff's deputy was injured and a suspect was killed when shots were fired during a traffic stop on Interstate 75 in North Fort Myers.

Authorities said the deputy was attempting to get a Dodge Caravan to stop on I-75 Wednesday night. The driver refused to stop and made evasive moves, even swerving at the deputy at one point.

The van left the interstate with the deputy fol-

lowing. When the vehicle stopped, three people got out and ran. Another, 24-year-old Gregory Coleman, was taken into custody.

The deputy got into a struggle with the driver and officials say gunshots were exchanged. The suspect died and the deputy was taken to the hospital where he is recovering.

Florida justices uphold charter county term limits

TALLAHASSEE — The Florida Supreme court says charter counties can have term limits for their elected officials.

The high court on Thursday unanimously receded from a 2002 ruling that struck down term limits for sheriffs, court clerks and other constitutional officers

The new opinion also allows term limits for county commissioners in Florida's 20 charter counties.

Ten of those counties currently have term limits for commissioners. The ruling came after the justices heard oral argument last month over term limits in Broward and Sarasota counties.

Other counties with term limits are Brevard, Clay, Duval, Hillsborough, Orange, Palm Beach, Polk and Volusia. A term limit proposal is on the Nov. 6 ballot in Miami-Dade County.

The justices said their 2002 decision undermined counties' ability to govern themselves under constitutional home rule powers.

Woman pleads guilty to sex-trafficking allegations

BRADENTON — A Bradenton woman has pleaded guilty in federal court to sex trafficking of minors, recruiting four underage girls to work as prostitutes and promoting the business by taking sexually explicit photos of the girls and posting them on the Internet.

The U.S. Attorney's office in Tampa says that Neang Prom faces up to life in prison when she is sentenced. According to a plea deal reached Wednesday, the 30-year-old Prom and her boyfriend, Eric Bell, recruited the girls, who were ages 15 to 17, by offering them a place to live.

Bell pleaded guilty earlier and will be sentenced June 20.

This case was investigated by the Clearwater Area Human Trafficking Task Force, the FBI and U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement's Homeland Security Investigations.

Decorated former Marine pleads guilty to DUI death

TAMPA — A former Marine captain who earned three Purple Hearts and the Bronze Star for heroism in Afghanistan and Iraq pleaded guilty Thursday to killing a man while driving drunk in Tampa.

Scott Sciple, 38, agreed to plead guilty in Hillsborough County on charges of DUI manslaughter and DUI with personal injury. In 2010, Sciple plowed head-on into another car, killing the other driver, a 48-year-old father named Pedro Rivera.

Sciple's family and lawyer blamed the crash on post-traumatic stress disorder and brain injury, both of which he suffered during his time in combat.

The plea means Sciple will be released Friday to a treatment facility in Virginia. The judge sentenced him to a year in jail, but he has already served 363 days.






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



Associated Press NAV Chg The Dow Jones industrial average broke a six-day losing streak Thursday, notching a small gain after the government released better unemployment numbers. The Dow rose 19.98 points

to close at 12.855.04, after rising almost 100 points earlier in the day. The Standard & Poor's 500 index rose 3.41 points to close at 1,357.99. Before Thursday, the Dow

had fallen six days in a row, its longest losing streak since August. Investors have worried

that job growth is fading. They were encouraged by a Labor Department report that applications for unemployment benefits dropped 1,000 to 367,000 in the week ending May 5. That pulled the four-week

average, which economists watch more closely, down to 379,000 — closer to the 375,000 level, which suggests job growth is strong enough to reduce the unemployment rate. Eight out of 10 industry groups in the S&P 500 rose,

with only materials and technology stocks declining. Utilities were the biggest gainers, up 0.9 percent, followed by health care and consumer staples. Tech stocks closed down 0.8 percent, and the Nasdaq

ing gear maker Cisco Systems plunged 10.5 percent after warning that technology spending appears to be slowing and that its revenue would rise much less than analysts expected this quarter. Hardware maker Oracle fell 2.7 percent. Stocks also benefited

from news that Spain would take over Bankia SA, the fourth-largest country's bank, which has high exposure to bad property loans. The government hopes to

convince investors that Spain won't need a bailout. The yield on Spain's 10-year debt fell 0.12 percentage points to 5.95 percent meaning its borrowing costs fell slightly because of reduced worries about its

Spain's IBEX 35 index jumped 3.4 percent.

"Europe's problems are by no means being solved. But the feeling that there is some support there probably helps sentiment a little bit, said Ed Hyland, a global investment specialist with J.P. Morgan Private Bank.

Other European stocks rose, too. Britain's FTSE 100 closed 0.3 percent higher, and Germany's DAX rose 0.7 percent.

after the drugmaker got preliminary approval for an arthritis drug. ■ Avon fell 3.3 percent

ifty years ago, Clarence Earl Gideon, Panama City drifter, sat in his jail cell, took a pencil to paper and wrote a five-page petition to the Supreme Court.

He asked the justices to consider his complaint that a Bay County judge had violated his Sixth Amendment right to counsel

prison for allegedly stealing change and beer from a local tavern. With no money for a lawyer, Gideon had represented himself at trial and lost.

Court took Warren Gideon's case and decided in his favor. The decision said accused felons who cannot afford an attorney have a right to one provided by the state. And so was born the Public Defender System. With a lawyer, Gideon was acquitted in his second trial. He had served two years in prison for a crime he did not commit.

In the years since, the controversy has centered on studies that show defendants with private lawyers receive better representation than defendants with public defenders, mostly because the system is overburdened and underfunded.

best lawyer you can af- land a high-priced attorney. Criminal defense lawyers seek these cases because they bring fame and notoriety - free advertising in a field where most clients have no money. Perhaps that's why two other Orlando attorneys stepped into the media spotlight early to say they represented Zimmerman, though he had not hired them.

Zimmerman is lucky to have a good lawyer. Figures from the Bureau of Justice Statistics show about 82 percent of felony defendants can't afford a private attorney. Not surprisingly, black men are more likely than any other group to need a free lawyer.

No matter what you believe happened that night in February between Zimmerman and Miami teenager Trayvon Martin, our belief in the fairness of the criminal justice system depends on balanced scales of justice.

As Americans, we need to stand up for a system that believes in "innocent until proven guilty." We should be strong advocates for the best criminal defense lawyers to represent the accused to ensure a fair and just verdict is attained. Anything else is inadequate.


Furthermore, this project would forever change the personality of our community and the Ozello skyline.

Prosecution rests in Edwards trial

GREENSBORO, N.C. -Prosecutors have rested their case against John Edwards after calling to the witness stand many of his closest friends and advisers.

The 14 days of testimony was often dramatic. Edwards once-close confidant Andrew Young talked about how he and his wife used money from wealthy donors to hide Edwards' pregnant mistress. Young also testified about the decision to claim paternity of Edwards' child.

Edwards is accused of masterminding a plan to use secret payments from two wealthy donors to hide Rielle Hunter during his run for the White House in 2008.

Edwards' attorneys said he didn't know about the money. They got Young to acknowledge much of the money went to build his dream home.

Edwards has pleaded not guilty. If convicted, he faces up to 30 years in prison.

Russian jet crash puts sales in limbo

MOUNT SALAK, Indonesia - The crash of a new Russian-made jetliner into a jagged, Indonesian volcano during a flight to impress potential buyers threw doubt on dozens of plane sales Thursday just as Moscow seeks a comeback in foreign markets. All 45 people

aboard were feared dead. Search-and-rescue teams climbed through the mistshrouded, jungly terrain for nearly 20 hours to reach the site where the plane roared in at nearly 480 mph Wednesday, exploding and raining debris down a nearly vertical slope.

When the weather clears, bodies will have to be hoisted by nets and ropes onto hovering choppers, said Gagah Prakoso, a spokesman for the national search and rescue agency. -From wire reports

Military class nixed for view on Islam

WASHINGTON — A course for U.S. military officers has been Islam in general, not just terrorists, and suggested the country might ultimately have to obliterate the Islamic holy cities of Mecca and Medina without regard for civilian deaths, following World War II precedents of the nuclear attack on Hiroshima or the allied firebombing of Dresden.

The Pentagon suspended the course in late April when a student objected to the material. The FBI also changed some agent training last year after discovering that it, too, was critical of Islam.

The teaching in the military course was counter to repeated assertions by U.S. officials over the last decade that the U.S. is at war against Islamic extremists — not the religion.

unless you submit," the instructor, Army. Lt. Col. Matthew Dooley, said teaching that America's enemy is in a presentation last July for the course at Joint Forces Staff College in Norfolk, Va. The college, for professional military members, teaches midlevel officers and government civilians on subjects related to planning and executing war.

Dooley also presumed, for the purposes of his theoretical war plan, the Geneva Conventions that set standards of armed conflict are "no longer relevant."

He added: "This would leave open the option once again of taking war to a civilian population wherever necessary (the historical precedents of Dresden, Tokyo, Hiroshima Nagasaki being applicable ...).'

His war plan suggests possible outcomes such as "Saudi Arabia threatened with starvation ... Islam

"But, ultimately, it's a big plus for him — it highlights his willingness to tackle tough issues in a thoughtful but ultimately decisive way."

Opponents of gay marriage depicted Obama as bowing to gay-rights pressure, and predicted his new stance on marriage would jeopardize his re-election chances.

'President Obama has now made the definition of marriage a defining issue in the presidential contest, especially in swing states like Ohio, North Carolina, Virginia, Florida and Nevada," said Brian Brown, Marriage.

Khan-Peterson II officially off; Khan wants belts back

NEW YORK — Amir Khan's promoter has canceled the British boxer's fight against Lamont Peterson because of the American's failed drug test.

Golden Boy Promotions announced that the May 19 rematch for the WBA and IBF junior welterweight belts was called off.

The statement Wednesday cited Peterson's positive doping test and the Nevada Athletic Commission's inability to hold a hearing on Peterson's licensing before Tuesday.

"First of all I'm disappointed because I trained very hard for this fight," Khan told British broadcaster Sky Sports News Thursday. "I really, really wanted to win my titles back and have the fight. But the truth's come out now and it just proves that Lamont Peterson was a cheat really."

Peterson's representatives issued a statement Thursday saying Peterson is distraught over the cancellation.

"In his 18-year career ... Lamont Peterson has never failed a drug test and has always complied with the rules beyond this isolated and explainable occurrence," the statement says. "We still stand behind the fact that he did nothing wrong and he was more than ready to go through with the May 19th fight."

Peterson (30-1-1, 15 KOs), of Washington, defeated Khan in a disputed split decision on Dec. 10 in the U.S. capital to become the WBA and IBF junior welterweight champion.

Khan (26-2, 18 KOs) was granted a rematch after complaining about the referee's decision to deduct him two points for pushing.

With the loss of the main event, the entire May 19 schedule is canceled, Nevada Athletic Commission **Executive Director Keith** Kizer said Thursday.

Richard Schaefer, chief executive of Golden Boy, said he hopes Khan will be given back his WBA and

IBF titles. "We are obviously going to ask the sanctioning organizations, the World Boxing Association and the International Boxing Federation, to rule this fight a nocontest and therefore give back the belts to Amir Khan - where they belong," he told Sky Sports News.

Vikings a signature away from new digs

ST. PAUL, Minn. — The Minnesota Vikings moved to within a governor's signature of getting a new \$975 million stadium on Thursday after the state Senate approved a plan that relies heavily on public financing.

Gov. Mark Dayton has said he'll sign the measure, meaning the Senate's 36-30 vote was effectively the final barrier for the stadium. The House passed it overnight.

After the Senate vote, jubilant Vikings vice president Lester Bagley hugged another team official and shouted, "Let's build it!" Vikings fans broke out in the "Skol Vikings" fight song and the Senate president admonished them to take it outside the chamber.



League looking at replacement refs as negotiations loom

FLORHAM PARK, N.J. — The NFL is looking for potential replacement officials while it negotiates with the officials' association on a new contract.

Rays' woes continue in New York

NEW YORK — CC Sabathia outpitched David Price for the first time in six career matchups between the All-Star lefties, Robinson Cano and Curtis Granderson homered and the New York Yankees beat the Tampa Bay Rays 5-3 Thursday night.

The Yankees overcame a pair of early errors by third baseman Eduardo Nunez to take the series and send Tampa Bay to its fourth loss in five games.

Sabathia (5-0) struck out 10, punctuating his outing by fanning B.J. Upton with two runners on base to end the seventh inning. The burly pitcher twirled on the mound and violently punched the air, catcher Chris Stewart pumped his fist and Upton pounded his bat in the ground

after swinging over a slider. Sabathia allowed two unearned runs in eight innings — the fourth straight start he's gone exactly that long. He finished up by striking out Carlos Pena, who slung his bat all the way to the Tampa Bay dugout in disgust.

Rafael Soriano gave up a run in the ninth for a save in his first try of the season. In 2010, he led the AL in saves with Tampa Bay.

Soriano yielded a single and an RBI grounder, a night after the Rays scored four runs in the ninth off fillin closer David Robertson. Yankees manager Joe Girardi said before the game that it was "doubtful" he would

use Robertson for a third straight day. While this wasn't a must-win for Sabathia by any means, it certainly was a welcomed one. The 2007 AL Cy Young Award winner had won just twice in 14 starts against the Rays since putting on the pinstripes. Price had been a particular nemesis, too. with Tampa Bay winning all five pre-

vious times he faced Sabathia. Price (5-1) never found a rhythm and gave up 11 hits, many of them well tagged. Trying to win five consecutive starts for the first time in his career, he instead wound up on the wrong end of another personal first - never before had two left-handed hitters

homered off him in the same game. Granderson lined a solo shot into the second deck in right field in the second. Cano's tiebreaking, two-run drive in the fifth sailed far over the Yankees' bullpen in right-center.

Nunez started in the field while Alex Rodriguez served as the designated hitter. Nunez misplayed a grounder in the first and made a wild throw in the second. He also singled twice, walked and stole two bases, and was taken out after five innings with New York up 5-2.

Yankees right fielder Nick Swisher threw out a runner at the plate to end the first. He singled to set up Cano's go-ahead homer.

Her 25 million-selling "Tapestry" launched the singer-songwriter era in 1971 and became the first real blockbuster album. She spoke recently as two new projects offer fresh reminders of her legacy — the memoir "A Natural Woman" and a new disc that gathers "demo" recordings anymore. of some of her best-known songs that were made to sell the compositions to other artists.

She hasn't released an album of new compositions since 2001, and on her website's exhaustive list of songs she has written, the most recent are two from 2004.

"At this point I can look back at my life and career as a songwriter and say I've done everything I really wanted to do," King said.

She's not naive. She knows popular culture has long since moved elsewhere. As a teenage music prodigy she knew what young people were thinking about and wanted to hear in music, and she's not there

someone said, 'I want you to write a song for this movie,' I could sit down and do that," she said. "But to just write songs and to throw them out into the marketplace, I don't think this is my time to do that.

With her writing frequently inter-(including work

cratic politicians), the book took King 12 years to write. She was determined to do it herself without a ghost- or co-writer.

The strongest part of the book is also the most shocking. She talks of being physically and verbally abused by her third husband in the 1970s, the man who led her to the Idaho backcountry that she adores and still lives in. Even King found it hard to believe that despite fame, success and plenty of friends, she wouldn't end the relationship the first time she was hit — and even several times thereafter. She finally did leave, and he died of a drug overdose shortly after that, according to her book.

'It was very difficult, too complicated to talk about in a small sound bite," she said. "My editor said to just write about it, you don't have to include it. But I decided to include it because I want other women in abusive relationships to know that "I suppose if I had a reason to, if it's not their fault and that it can happen to anyone.

With her first book is fresh on the market, she's already thinking about the possibility of another one.

'Now that I'm 70, I have bits of wisdom I can offer to a younger generation," she said. "It's not 'This is the way it has to be,' but 'This is my for experience; I hope this helps you.'



Dark Shadows

fails to deliver for director Tim Burton and star Johnny Depp

Review: Film based on '60s TV show filled with sets, costumes and little else

Tim Burton and Johnny Depp are snuggled warmly in their comfort zone in the chilly horror-comedy "Dark Shadows," their eighth collaboration as director and star, respectively, and their weakest by far.

You don't need to know a thing about the late-'60s "Dark Shadows" TV series that provides the inspiration. Tonally, thematically, visually, you've seen this movie before, with its oddball characters, skies in varying

shades of gray and a foreboding sense of gothic mystery. No one gets challenged here; no one gets pushed.

It's actually a wonder Depp hasn't played a vampire before; still, his long-undead Barnabas Collins, who's been buried alive for nearly two centuries and suddenly finds himself back in his insular Maine hometown in 1972, fits squarely within his well-honed on-screen persona. He thinks he's quite the charmer, but he's actually a bit awkward, and that contradiction provides the main source of humor.

Or at least, it's supposed to. The script from Seth Grahame-Smith ("Abraham Lincoln: Vampire Hunter") allows its family full of weirdos to shine intermittently, but they rarely interact with each other; each functions in his or her own selfconsciously quirky bubble. Too often, "Dark Shadows" is crammed with hacky, obvious, fish-out-of-water gags as Barnabas tries to make sense of this strange new world. He struggles to understand modern romance as

'Avengers' does not disappoint comic fans

ack in 2008 when Agent (Clark Gregg) appeared in the first "Iron Man" and spoke the words, 'Just call us S.H.I.E.L.D.," all Marvel fanboys knew what was coming: They were actually going to do it. Marvel was going to attempt to bring some of the world's biggest and greatest superheroes onto one screen to form "The Avengers."

Many thought it impossible, while others thought it would result in a cheesy action flick, but I remained optimistic. After four long years of anticipation, I have finally gazed upon the glory of Marvel's latest blockbuster, and it is worth the wait.

If you haven't seen a Marvel film in the past few years, you will probably be a little confused by the plot. The film centers on the Tesseract (the blue cube from "Captain America") and how Thor's evil brother Loki (Tom Hiddleston) wants it to enslave the world. Now the head of the Strategic Homeland Intervention Enforcement and Logistics Division (S.H.I.E.L.D.), Nick Fury (Samuel L. Jackson) must quickly put together the world's greatest heroes to fight this villain and the alien army he summons.

The roster features the billionaire playboy Tony Stark/Iron Man (Robert Downey Jr.), the World War II soldier Steve Rogers/ Captain America (Chris Evans), the Norse god Thor (Chris Hemsworth), and the gamma-radiated Bruce Banner/Hulk (Mark Ruffalo). On their side are S.H.I.E.L.D. agents Black Widow (Scarlett Johansson) and the archer Hawkeye (Jeremy Renner). Together these heroes must unite against this great threat, but they need to learn how to get along first.

A big part of "The Avengers" is its humor. Comic-book fans know whenever heroes meet for the first time, there will be some insults thrown and some punches dished out. This film is loaded with this much-needed element, and the results will make you crack up.

The funniest character is without a doubt Tony Stark. Downey brings life to this beloved character once again and whether he's making fun of Thor's Shakespearean dialect or calling Captain America an "Old Man," his sarcasm never gets old.



All the characters have their own humorous lines, but in the end it may actually be the Hulk who wins the award for biggest laugh. I'll give you a hint — it involves smashing!

The highest of praise goes to director Joss Whedon, who has also produced an incredible screenplay/ script. This guy knows what he is doing. The nearly 2 1/2hour film gives an equal amount of time to each and every character in the cast, which I thought to be nearly impossible. It's not "Iron Man 3" and it's not "Thor 2.' It is "The Avengers" and it stands entirely on its own.

Whedon also did an outstanding job with character development. Black Widow and Hawkeye are basically new characters to the Marvel Universe, but after the film, I feel like I've known their characters for years. And the way Whedon writes Captain America blows the actual "Captain" film out of the water. This is much more classic and lovable Cap, the way he should

And the screenplay is backed up by top-notch performances for each actor. The most notable is Mark

Ruffalo. He is the third actor to play Banner in the past 10 years and he is by far the best. His Banner is the perfect balance of calm, hesitant and genius — with the occasional outburst of anger. He steals the scenes he is in and I would certainly enjoy a new "Hulk" film with Ruffalo at the

The other noteworthy character is Hiddleston's Loki. After this film, I can say with full confidence that Loki is the coolest and greatest Marvel villain to ever be portrayed on screen. Hiddleston's amazing acting makes Loki shine as the cunning, cruel and downright nasty villain who never seems to lose his smile even if things aren't going according to plan. Evans and Hemsworth are great just like the rest and with Jackson's no-funny Fury, business "The boasts a well-Avengers" rounded cast.





That is very surprising. In this deal, though, note "nine." Why is it relevant to South's plan in six spades after West leads the heart queen?

I approve of North's two-no-trump response, showing a balanced hand with at least eight high-card points. It makes getting to the reasonable slam easy. If North starts with the trendy two diamonds "waiting," the auction would continue two spades - three spades, a rebid that North could make with a middling five-count. Here, South could suggest a slam with a fourclub control-bid (cue-bid). If he does, North should cooperate with a four-heart control-bid. He would prefer to have the heart ace, but he should show some enthusiasm.

South has 11 top tricks: seven spades, two hearts, one diamond and one club. It looks as though the diamond finesse must work. But there is a better line of play. Declarer should take the first trick in his hand, draw trumps ending on the board, and play a diamond to his nine.

If this loses to the 10 or jack, South next plays a diamond to his queen, having lost nothing. But when East has the 10 and jack of diamonds and West the king, this play saves the contract. It increases the chance from 50 percent to 63 percent

When the first Packard Clipper was introduced in April 1941 it was the widest production car on the American road. The stylish Clipper captured the approval of the motoring public. Unfortunately, production of the car ceased about nine months later, in February 1942, when the federal government halted all civilian automobile production because of World War II. Like every other automobile manufacturer, Packard then shifted into the production of war materials.

"Bv the time the war ended," Hamlin says, "the Clipper styling was no longer news."

Hamlin's current 1947 Custom Super Clipper has stamped into the VIN plate the original sales point — Caraval Motor in San Francisco. "There is no saying what the mileage on the car would be as the odometer ceased to function in the 1960s and was repaired only a few years ago," says Hamlin.

Beneath the long engine hood is an equally long straight eight-cylinder engine of 356cubic-inch-displacement. EXPERT REPAIR ADVICE

My Nissan Maxima has 210,000 miles and most of the time it runs beautifully. Out of the blue it starts revving up and bucking and then slowing down, the speedometer needle fluctuates, until the car finally stalls out. Please help! Answer: For the engine to stall and the speedometer needle to fluctuate indicates there is an electrical issue somewhere. My first thought would be a poor ground connection. The problem could have multiple origins, including a problem connection or faulty crankshaft sensor.

The Real World of Potholes and Performance **Tires**

Dear Doctor: I drive a 2011 Corvette Grand Sport with factory recommended Goodyear run-flat tires. The wheels are the standard mag wheels that come with the car. I hit potholes on two successive days. Now the car vibrates between 30 and 40 mph and between 70 and 80 mph. The Chevrolet service manager advised me over the telephone that it sounded to him that I lost a wheel weight. I brought the car to a Goodyear tire dealer and had all four tires replaced because they were worn out. When balancing the wheels the Goodyear employee told me that all four wheels were warped. The new tires and balancing has not fixed the vibration. Is the vibration being caused by the warped wheels? Martin

Dear Martin: Welcome to the real world of potholes and lowprofile performance tires. My advice to you is that you have a few choices: new factory rims, reconditioned rims from a company like Keystone, aftermarket rims from multiple companies, or new takeoff rims (look online). You could also check your insurance company for possible coverage.

Dear Doctor: I bought a used 2005 Honda CR-V with cruise control. Occasionally, the cruise control shuts off. The book states that it may do this when going up or down a steep grade, but so far it only happens when driving on the flat stretch at 45 mph. Also, when the security system is set with the fob the alarm goes off for no reason. I'm told this might be a frequency problem with the lock/unlock system. Have you ever heard of these problems?

Dear Sheree: There are many built-in safety factors in today's electronics, including the cruise control system. To troubleshoot this — and many other faults the technician will need to follow a trouble flow chart. The resou I use are Identifix for any recorded failures in history and Alldata for additional wiring and component location. The technician will first check for any trouble fault codes and then look up any history related to these faults. If you choose an independent shop, then make sure the technician has ASE-certification in electronics.

Dear Doctor: I own a 2008 Dodge Avenger with approximately 40,000 miles on it. The car has a quirk that my mechanic has not been able to resolve. Sometimes when I drive and then stop to sit at a light or otherwise sit and idle for a while, the engine rpm will suddenly drop below 600 and then the car computer presumably over-corrects for the low idle and then the rpm revs high. This only happens at idle with the brake on, or with the gear in park. There are no stored codes in the computer. Are there any service bulletins on this condition? Lou

Dear Lou: I looked on Identifix and Alldata and no ongoing history of the issue is reported. With no codes to help identify the problem, your next step is a road test using a professional scan tool connected. Once on the road, drive the car and observe all the input data and record it. Your technician then will compare the actual sensor information from the engine to known good signal patterns from Identifix or Alldata. A qualified technician should be able to compare the input sensor value with a correct sensor value. The fuel pressure also needs to be checked. A lazy EGR valve or intermittent vacuum leak will also cause this problem.

onda's Ridgeline pickup is the right formula to fill the needs of a range of buyfour-door, The versatile five-passenger creation, built with unit-body construction, fuses the civility of a sedan with the fully designed are the door-pull handles — large, toughness of a pickup.

For 2012, Honda ups the ante with styling enhancements, improved fuel economy and a new model — the Ridgeline Sport. Joining the bench with near-upright seatbacks. Cushions lineup with the RT, RTS and RTL, the Sport was developed to draw buyers wanting four-wheel traction at an affordable price.

Base priced at \$29,995, the Sport adds features to the base RT that give a boost to looks. convenience and capability. The appearance is sportier with a black honeycomb grille with black surround (all 2012 models get a refreshed grille design); fog lights; black headlight and brake light housings; and rear privacy glass.

The standout exterior enhancement is a distinctive set of 18-inch wheels that are exclusive to the Sport model. Measuring an inch larger than the RT's, these five-spoke alloy wheels feature an attractive combination black-painted and brushed-metal effect. Wrapping the wheels are P245/60R-18 all-season tires.

In the roomy cab, the steering wheel is leather wrapped and has audio controls, and the floor is covered with heavy-duty, all-weather floor mats. These thick slabs of protective rubber — front and rear — boost utility for those using the Ridgeline for work and recreational purposes.

The dashboard and center console are practical, utilitarian designs. The speedometer is large, center-mounted and easy to read. Cli-

mate control and radio knobs are also large, with the added grip of a ring of small rubber pads.

If the vehicle gets stuck in mud or deep sand, a press of the VTM-4 Lock button, located to the right of the gauge cluster, overrides the auto system and sends torque to the rear axle. VTM-4 can be activated at speeds under 18 mph in first, second or reverse gears. Also standard is Vehicle Stability Assist that can apply braking force to a wheel with low traction and direct driving force to the wheel with more traction.

A highlight of all Ridgeline models is its 49.5by-60-inch composite bed. Access to the cargo area is via a dual-action tailgate that drops in traditional fashion or can be opened sideways. It also provides easy access to the Ridgeline's lockable 8.5-cubic-foot In-Bed Trunk. The cargo box features eight tie-downs and four cargo lights that do an excellent job illuminating the

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


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
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
