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## State probing House campaign

*Man claims attorney offered incentives to run for office as spoiler to draw votes from opponent*

CRYSTAL RIVER — The State Attorney's Office is investigating claims by a Floral City man that attorney Bill Grant offered him financial incentives to run for the state House of Representatives as a spoiler to draw votes from Nancy Argenziano.

Jim Brunswick, who twice has had unsuccessful runs for Citrus County Commission, said he rejected Grant's offer and later was told by state Rep. Jimmie T. Smith, the incumbent in the race, they had found someone else to run

instead. That other person was Robert Goocher, a 28-year-

old auto mechanic who works for his father's business in Inverness. Goocher,

who did not campaign publicly, finished second in the Democratic primary with 28 percent of the vote. Records show he did not vote in the primary. Assistant state attorney Mark Simpson said he met Aug. 13 with Brunswick,

who detailed the allegations. Simpson also said he subpoenaed Goocher to his office for an interview. He declined to say whether subpoenas have been issued to Grant, Smith or others. Grant, through Dade City attorney A.R. "Chip" Mander, denied any wrongdoing. "We dispute everything

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## Brazil making strides in manatee preservation

*Experts aim to increase awareness of the sea cow*

CRYSTAL RIVER — Brazil's efforts to preserve its manatees began in earnest 32 years ago by declaring one of its two sea cow species endangered. Then it was time to figure out if South America's largest nation even had any left to protect, according to Fabia Luna, the head of Brazil's National Aquatic Mammal Center in Brazil.

Luna was one of three speakers

discussed biology of manatees.

The other speakers were researchers Bob Bonde and Roger Leep.

Capt. Mike Birns of META said the goal of the event was to increase awareness about manatees and to promote tourism to the area because of the mammals.

Wednesday at the Manatee Eco-Tourism Association (META) of Citrus County's informational meeting at the Plantation on Crystal River, helping locals prep for the area's annual crush of manatee watchers and those seeking to swim with them.

Luna shared her nation's fledgling efforts at preservation and protection for the manatees. She also talked about the challenges of educating a public, some of whom subsist on manatee meat, about the need to not harm them.

Luna said Brazil has two species of manatees: the Antillean, which is similar to the ones in Florida and inhabit the coastal regions of Brazil, and the Amazonian, which differs from the Antillean and often have a white patch on their bellies. The Amazonian species is found in the Amazon River basin, according to Luna.

She said authorities first launched a major search effort in the 1980s in various coastal fishing communities

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## Possible tax changes reviewed

### Amendment 4 'convoluted'

LECANTO — There was little love for Amendment 4 at the Citrus County Economic Development Council meeting.

Thursday was the EDC's annual meeting and the board of directors meeting.

As the EDC was finishing its agenda, Inverness City Manager Frank DiGiovanni brought up the amendments that will be on the Nov. 6 ballot.

He described Amendment 4 as complicated and convoluted.

"Amendment 4 would erode the ability of society — in this case government working with the business sector — to be able to have the funds to invest in the very infrastructure, social programs and services that we deem desirable," he said.

Amendment 4 is one of 11 proposed Florida constitutional amendments that will be on the ballot. At least five of them concern local taxes.

DiGiovanni asked the EDC leadership to begin looking at sharing information with people.

"I don't think we can ignore these," he said.

Citrus County Property Appraiser Geoffrey Greene provided a detailed explanation of Amendment 4, which some economists have labeled the most costly of all the amendments in terms of local tax revenue.

He explained the three parts of the proposed amendment. Part 1, Non-Homestead Assessment Limitations, would reduce the annual growth in assessment limitations on certain non-homestead property from 10 percent to 5 percent. It would also delay the sunset date of the non-homestead assessment limitations until 2023.

Part 2 would prohibit increases in assessed value where just value has declined. It would prevent what is commonly referred to as "recapture" in years when the value of a property decreases.

"And finally, the next one is very confusing," Greene said. "It is a 50 percent homestead exemption for first-time homebuyers — someone who has not had a homestead exemption for three years. They can receive an additional homestead exemption equal to 50 percent of the property's just value (fair market value), not to exceed the

that man said, and we're confident there won't be any charges filed," Mander said. "We're prepared to fight it to the bitter end."

Smith, a first-term legislator, issued a statement.

"At no time have I, or my campaign, interfered with the Democrats' selection of a candidate in the race for the state House," Smith wrote. "Nor have I asked anyone, at any time, to interfere with the Democrats' primary."

The state House District 34 race has been shrouded in mystery from the start.

Democrat Lynn Dostal announced plans in the spring to drop from the race after Argenziano, running as an Independent, filed for office.

Goocher entered the race in May, prompting both Argenziano and Dostal to declare him a "shill" for the Republican Party, designed solely to draw votes from Argenziano in a three-candidate race.

Dostal re-entered the race and easily won the primary. He then dropped from the race, leaving only Argenziano and Smith on the Nov. 6 ballot.

Goocher's mother rents store space from Grant, an Inverness attorney who represents the Citrus County Hospital Board and is a significant contributor to Smith's campaign. Goocher's father, Robert Alan Goocher, is one of Grant's clients.

Grant recommended the elder Goocher for a governor-appointed vacancy on the hospital board. Smith sent the recommendation to Gov. Rick Scott; however, accord-

ing to Smith, he didn't realize Goocher's name was included with four others until a reporter told him last week.

Smith alluded to that recommendation in his Thursday statement: "Furthermore, any advancement of people for gubernatorial appointments was done with one goal: ensuring the governor had a list of highly qualified people to consider when filling positions important to our community. Period."

Argenziano, a former state representative and senator from Citrus County, had a press conference late Wednesday afternoon to provide a forum for Brunswick to make his claims.

Brunswick said Grant called him in April and asked him to run for state House. He said he told Grant that he supported

Smith in 2010. He said Grant told him his role would be not to win, but to draw votes from Argenziano.

Brunswick said he told Grant campaigns are costly and he didn't have any money. He claimed Grant told him: "You will be taken care of, Jim."

Simpson acknowledged Brunswick told him the same thing.

Brunswick said Grant wanted to meet the next week for lunch to discuss the details. Brunswick said he didn't call Grant back, but called his office a month later and a staffer said Grant was out of the country.

Brunswick said he then called Smith, who said "they had secured another guy, who was young and had a 'clean' record."

Simpson said Brunswick related the same information to him.

Simpson said the legal issue is whether Grant offered financial incentives other than full backing of a Brunswick campaign. He said the case turns criminal if Grant offered to provide a monetary gain for Brunswick to run for office. "That's what we're looking at," Simpson said.

Argenziano said she told Simpson she planned to take Brunswick's claims public. Simpson said he neither supported nor discouraged her from doing that.

"I basically told her we like to keep investigations close to the vest," he said. "Obviously I could not make her not talk to the press. I told her to use her best judgment." Argenziano said she

wanted the allegations exposed now because the investigation may not conclude until after the election.

Mander, Grant's attorney, said that shows politics is behind the allegations.

"The political nature is pretty evident," he said.

Brunswick has history with Grant. He hired Grant in 2010 to defend him in a mortgage foreclosure lawsuit, and then Grant withdrew in December 2011. Brunswick said Grant claimed Brunswick owed him \$2,600 and would not continue as his attorney without the payment.

Brunswick said there is no connection between the lawsuit and his allegations against Grant.

median just value for homestead property in the county. It is for nonschool taxes and drops 20 percent a year phasing out after five years.

One board member asked, "is that a good thing or a bad thing? Is it good because it brings people in or bad because we lose so much tax money?"

"People want 100 percent of the services, which cost 100 percent," DiGiovanni replied. "Is that a good thing or a bad thing? Who's going to pay for it? That's what you have to ask yourself."

Greene mentioned the Florida TaxWatch position on the amendment. According to a news release, Amendment 4 will create jobs, increase the personal income of Floridians and reduce uncertainty for both personal and business investment.

Prior to the amendment discussion, Joe Meek, EDC president and Citrus County commissioner, went through the detailed Aug. 29 presentation made to the Duke Energy Business Development Team.

"They want to be an active partner," he said.

The EDC also presented the port plan, medical corridor and possible turnpike expansion.

"We talked in depth about their facilities and some of the things they can do on their site," Meek said. "From that presentation we've got multiple meetings set up to continue that discussion."

Progress Energy Florida spokeswoman Suzanne Grant said the Duke Energy business development team

came to Florida to get to know the service territory and determine what the available assets are. The team met with economic development representatives from the utility's 35-county Florida service area.

Progress Energy Florida is a subsidiary of Duke Energy. "This is the first step in the process that we will be part of and that has been very successful in previous communities," she said. "They target several industries to evaluate for job production and growth."

"This is very exciting for Progress Energy Florida; this is something we were not able to do in the past, but will take full advantage of now."

trying to figure out if there were any manatees left.

She said in Brazil, until recently, manatee hunting was considered perfectly OK.

Luna said after some manatees were discovered both on the coast and in the Amazon basin, her agency began research and rehabilitation work with the mammals.

She said because of the extensive rehabilitation work her agency does with the manatees, Brazilian sea cows are used to people and very engaging.

Luna, however, lamented

the challenges of working with the native populations of the Amazon basin whose only accessible source of red meat has been the manatee.

"It is very hard to tell them they have eat fish everyday or they have to go to town to get cow meat, but we are trying with our campaigns," Luna said.

She said the young are especially targeted in the educational campaign. Ecotourism is also on the rise with guided tours, but with restrictions on numbers of tourists and prohibitions regarding touching.

Luna believes there are probably 500 manatees left in Brazil.

Reep and Bonde, who are

authors of what many consider the seminal book about manatees, "The Florida Manatee, Conservation and Biology," discussed the biology of the mammals. Reep talked about manatee physiology, including how manatee ages are determined.

Reep said the age of a manatee is determined by reading the lines in the ear bones.

Bonde talked mostly about the genetics of manatees and his team's work internationally.

Bonde said they have

trained people in Belize and Cuba how to do check-ups on the mammals and how to tether them to monitoring devices.

Michael Lusk, Crystal River National Wildlife Refuge manager, who was recently in Brazil, told the audience people in Crystal River should feel special.

"This is the only place in the world where you can swim with the manatees, touch them, and the water at Three Sisters Springs is so clear you can see them," Lusk said.

**BOCC adopts tentative budget**

Commissioners met at a special session Thursday to review and adopt the tentative millage rates and the tentative budget.

During the public hearing before the Citrus County Board of County Commissioners (BOCC), no one gave public input.

Board members voted unanimously to establish 5.9783 as the total county-wide rate, 0.8014 as the rate for the fire protection taxing district and 0.3236 as the rate for the special library district.

The aggregate rolled-back rate is 7.0677 mills and the proposed aggregate millage rate is 7.0641 mills. The percentage millage decrease is 0.05 percent.

The budget was adopted by a 4-1 vote. Commissioner Winn Webb said he would support the millage but not the budget because: "Everybody's not a player."

The final budget hearing will be 5:01 p.m. Sept. 5, Room 100, Citrus County Courthouse, 110 N. Apopka Ave., Inverness.

**Tussock removal under way**

Mechanical harvesters have started the process of removing the tussocks at Parson's Point in the Tsala Apopka chain of lakes.

The project site is approximately 14 acres just north of Gilchrist Island, between Croft and VanNess lakes.

Tussocks are island-like rafts of plants that can be problematic if they block public access, hinder flood control, impair navigation or interfere with fish habitat.

The project began Aug. 28 and is scheduled to be completed in November.

**Energy assistance available for elderly**

Citrus County Support Services currently has funds available for the Emergency Home Energy Assistance for the Elderly Program (EHEAP). This is a sister program of the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP).

Income-eligible clients who are 60 years and over are able to receive assistance once per season. There are two seasons in the year, The cooling season which runs April 1 to Sept. 30 and a heating season which runs Oct. 1 to March 31.

There must be a delinquent or disconnect notice for electric service. Proof of income will be required for anyone in the home 18 years and older. Gross income for one-person household is \$1,396.25 a month or less; \$1,891.25 or less for a two-person household; and \$2,386.25 or less for a three-person household.

**Officials: Apartment fire was arson**

CRYSTAL RIVER — A Wednesday morning apartment fire has been declared arson and the man who was transported to the hospital now stands accused of starting the blaze, according to the Citrus County Sheriff's Office.

Michael Scott Farmer, 49, North Gardenview Terrace, is facing a single count of arson of a dwelling.

According to an arrest affidavit, Farmer's neighbors smelled smoke coming from

his unit at about 12:40 a.m. and attempted to alert him, but he barred entry to the unit after initially acknowledging them.

When emergency crews entered the unit, they found a small fire in one bedroom and Farmer was in another room, showing symptoms of smoke inhalation.

Farmer, however, was reportedly combative with crews and deputies had to use a Taser on him to remove him from the unit. During his tussle with emergency crews he reportedly also tried to remove a firefighter's oxygen breathing apparatus in a smoke-filled unit.

After Farmer was transported to Seven Rivers Regional Medical Center, and while sifting through his apartment, investigators discovered several red plastic gas containers.

One container was in the room where investigators believe the fire started and another three were ob-

served in the living room. In the bedroom Farmer was removed from, there were two other gas containers in the closet and one extra container was sitting outside the apartment unit near the front door.

Fire Marshal Tom Hall concluded the fire was caused an open-flame device held by the occupant of the unit.

**Justice Dept. OKs early voting plan**

TALLAHASSEE — Florida voters across the state will likely be limited to no more than eight days of early voting during this year's crucial presidential election.

The Obama administration formally signed off on a proposal late Wednesday that will limit early voting days in five Florida counties covered by the federal Voting Rights Act.

The Justice Department

decision ends a lengthy battle over a controversial election law passed by the GOP-controlled Florida Legislature last year, although a separate lawsuit filed by U.S. Rep. Corrine Brown against the early voting changes is still pending in a Jacksonville federal court.

Battles over early voting have been a flashpoint across the nation this year, especially in swing states that could determine the outcome

of the presidential election.

Florida legislators in 2011 kept the same number of hours available for early voting but cut back on the number of days from a maximum of 14 days to eight days. They also eliminated early voting on the Sunday right before Election Day. Many black churches had been organizing "souls to the polls" drives where they would encourage people to vote right after church services.

But those changes did not take effect in five counties where any changes in election laws must be approved by the Justice Department or federal court because of past racial discrimination.

A federal court in Washington, D.C., refused initially to approve the state's move to cut back on early voting days, saying it could discourage minority voting, especially among black voters. The court said that evidence

presented in the case clearly showed that black voters utilized early voting much more than white voters, especially in the 2008 election, when President Barack Obama carried Florida.

The judges, however, said they might change their mind if the five counties — Hillsborough, Collier, Hardee, Hendry and Monroe — agreed to a schedule of 12 hours of early voting over eight days.

**County commission seeks help to find funds**

Feeling worse tension at budget time each year, the Board of County Commissioners discussed a new way to fund itself through hiring a consultant for revenue analysis.

"It's coming up with other buckets of money," said County Administrator Brad Thorpe.

Commissioner Rebecca Bays introduced the idea Tuesday at the regular meeting of the Citrus County Board of County Commissioners (BOCC). Bays brought up the subject at a previous budget hearing out of concern for future budgets as the county has been dipping into reserves to maintain levels of service.

"Our taxable values have dropped by \$3.4 million," Bays said. "The millage rate is not sustainable at this level to fund the necessary programs and requirements of the county."

Bays said she asked the county to look at revenue analysis and alternative revenues.

"I believe a budget gap is a potential shortfall be-

tween revenues and expenditures," Bays said. "If we're looking at a long-term financial outlook, we have to be able to identify and understand the outlook."

The 2012-13 budget has been approved for the roll-back rate, but Bays said it was not going to be sustainable in the long-term.

"Even if we take the roll-back rate and we continue where we're at we're only filling a partial gap," Bays said.

The commission is not even identifying its capital improvement program, Bays said. Roads could be repaired only every 40 years.

"With the path that we're on, I don't think we can get where we need to be as a county," Bays said. Bays asked the board to start identifying revenue analysis and some alternative revenues. One of the alternatives would be to raise revenues through Municipal Services Benefit Units (MSBUs) and Municipal Services Taxing Units (MSTUs), assessments for services that benefit specific areas.

However, "If we were to

create an MSBU or MSTU program, we have to do that before year end," Bays said. "We have to figure out a way for everybody to pay a little something so that it's not all going to be on the backs of ad valorem."

Thorpe said he supported this.

Commissioner JJ Kenney said: "It's an excellent idea. We've robbed Peter to pay Paul long enough and we have to look at all avenues. I support Commissioner Bays' recommendation."

Commissioner Joe Meek said the budget currently before the board was "going to be it as regards to moving forward. It is incumbent on us as the local governing body to ensure that we are sustainable into the future."

Meek said the board had to look at revenue analysis, but it did not mean it would advocate MSBU and MSTU programs. Whatever the choices, Meek warned, the county's bond rating would have to be maintained. That would preclude constant dipping into reserves.

"The value of the county's properties has shrunk almost \$4 billion," said Com-

missioner Dennis Damato, citing data from the county property appraiser's office. "What is good for the taxpayer is not good in another way and that is that it is our duty to go ahead and fund services that are core services."

Thorpe said, "What you're trying to do is fund a level of service that is not supported by ad valorem taxes completely. Every year since 2007-2008, you have been running at about a \$5 million deficit. And you've been taking reserves to balance your budget. If you do not avail yourself of this option, to come up with other buckets of money, the only avenue you have of producing more revenue next year is raising the millage. That's it. If you decide as a board not to raise the millage, the only option I have is to cut the budget."

Bays recommended the law firm of Nabors, Giblin & Nickerson, which has offices in Tallahassee, Tampa, Fort Lauderdale and Fort Myers, as the consultant to conduct the revenue analysis. However, Commissioner Winn Webb did not like the expense of \$22,000 attached

to the study. "Why should we pay someone to tell us how to tax ourselves?" Webb asked.

Theodora Rusnak, speaking as a member of the public, suggested the board seek bids.

Thorpe said the board had no time to solicit for bids and that the law firm was familiar with the county as it had done work for the sheriff in 2005.

The motion to hire the law firm passed by 4-1, with Webb opposed.

In other business: ■ Animal advocate Frank Yuelling of Floral City came to a compromise with the BOCC regarding his standing request for a resolution declaring the Citrus County Animal Services a "no-kill" shelter. Previously, the term raised conflict because of its restrictions. Animal Services already was implementing many policies advocated by the No-Kill Nation campaign. Therefore, Yuelling asked the board to agree to "Strive for Life" instead.

# Drum major's parents condemn Florida A&M response to suit

ATLANTA — Florida A&M University's insistence that it is not to blame for a drum major's death during a hazing ritual shows school officials are not taking responsibility for the safety of students, the band member's parents said Thursday.  
 Pam and Robert Champion Sr. said at a news conference in Atlanta they were disappointed by court documents filed Monday by FAMU in response to their lawsuit against the school. The university said in its filing that 26-year-old Robert Champion, as a top leader in the band, should have refused to participate in the ritual. The school asked a judge to toss the lawsuit or at least to delay action on it until criminal charges against band members are

resolved. Twelve former members have pleaded not guilty to charges of felony hazing.

"As a mother, I have to wonder what kind of people are we entrusting our students to," Pam Champion said. "They clearly didn't care about my son, who thought the world of this school, who would always promote it and talk it up. Robert did all the right things. The school didn't do him right."

Her husband called the school's response a "slap in the face."

"This is an opportunity for the school to say we do have problems and we're going to fix it, but instead they're in denial, so I say FAMU beware," he said.

Robert Champion died in November after he was beaten by fellow members of the famed Marching 100

band aboard a charter bus parked outside an Orlando hotel. The school said in its filing that no public university or college has a duty to protect an adult student from what happens as a result of that person's own decisions to participate in dangerous activities off campus and outside of university-sponsored events.

"FAMU is not 'blaming' anyone for this tragic loss; rather, the university has asked the court to decide the legal question of whether Florida's taxpayers can be held financially liable to Mr. Champion's Estate according to the facts of the case as detailed in the pleadings and exhibits of record," Richard Mitchell, an attorney with the Gray-Robinson law firm hired by FAMU, wrote in an email Monday.

Chris Chestnut, a lawyer representing the Champions, said the school is refusing to address the root problem.

"FAMU wants to make this about Robert Champion. The Champions have lost their son. This is about the decades of hazing that led up to Robert's death and the decades beyond this point where there's an opportunity for FAMU to rid itself of hazing and still have a very successful band program."

The lawsuit was filed by the Champions, who live in suburban Atlanta. University trustees had discussed trying to mediate the lawsuit, but the school's response this week may have doomed that effort. Chestnut said the lawsuit needs to go forward so the school is held accountable.





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

# Board asks for more funding as schools warn against cuts

TALLAHASSEE — Even as universities prepared contingency plans to deal with a budget cut of as much as 5 percent, the Florida Board of Governors approved a plan Thursday asking for as much as \$118 million in new funding to be divided up among its 12 institutions based on performance.

According to the board, the proposed funding would go to state universities based on unspecified measures of their progress. And in a key caveat, mem-

bers of the board and Chancellor Frank Brogan both made it clear that they took the Legislature at its word that a one-time, \$300 million reduction meant to cause a drawdown of university reserves wouldn't be repeated in the coming fiscal year, which begins July 1.

"Once those reserve dollars are gone, they are gone," Brogan said.

Indeed, the reserves were a key topic of discussion during a board meeting focused on the budget for the current spending year and the next. System officials said they expected

the amount of funding in university reserves to fall by half — even as some schools were forced to find the cuts elsewhere because their reserves were already close to 5 percent of their budgets, a requirement of state law.

And board members and university presidents looked for ways to make a repeat of the cut less likely, whether by breaking out committed funds that are technically still in universities' reserves or by increasing the level of reserves that the schools are required to set aside.

He also reconfigured guidance radars so they could be installed on luxury ships.

In 1991, he retired and moved to Homosassa, Fla., where Barbara and Carroll would live the rest of their lives in a home they designed in Sugarmill Woods. A few years after his wife, Barbara, passed away in 2007, his daughter Teri and son-in-law Fred moved into the Homosassa house to help care for him.

Carroll was predeceased by his wife of 57 years, Barbara Bond, and leaves behind two daughters, Linda and her husband Russell Rabinowitz of Raleigh, N.C. and Teri and husband Fred Learned, formerly of Ft. ## Retired Endeavour heads to California on Monday

CAPE CANAVERAL — The baby of NASA's space shuttle fleet is about to leave home — for good.

At sunrise Monday, Endeavour will depart Kennedy Space Center for a museum in California, with a two-day stopover in Houston, home to Mission Control and the astronauts who flew aboard the replacement for the lost shuttle Challenger.

Endeavour is the second of NASA's three retired shuttles to head to a museum. The youngest shuttle will make the four-day trip to Los Angeles atop a modified jumbo jet, bound for the California Science Center. Discovery landed at the Smithsonian Institution's display hangar in Virginia last spring. Atlantis will remain at Kennedy.

After taking off from the former shuttle landing strip Monday morning, Endeavour and its carrier jet will fly low over Kennedy and the beaches of Cape Canaveral, then head west toward NASA points along the Gulf of Mexico. The pair will swoop over Stennis Space Center in Mississippi and Michoud Assembly Facility in New Orleans, where the shuttle booster rockets were made.

Next stop: Ellington Field near NASA's Johnson Space Center in Houston.

Endeavour will remain at Ellington until Wednesday morning so space cen-

ter employees can see the shuttle up close. Houston had bid for a shuttle; the loss still nags many there. NASA chose New York City as the winner for the shuttle prototype Enterprise, which was relinquished by the Smithsonian to make room for Discovery.

NASA's two other shuttles during the 30-year program, Challenger and Columbia, were destroyed during flight, with 14 astronauts altogether killed. Endeavour was built to replace Challenger and made its flying debut in 1992, six years after the launch accident. It performed the next-to-last shuttle mission in May and June 2011.

During its 25 missions, Endeavour logged 299 days in space and circled Earth 4,671 times. Total off-the-planet mileage: 122.8 million miles.

After leaving Houston on Wednesday, Endeavour will stop for fuel at Biggs Army Airfield in El Paso, Texas, and then perform a low flyover of the White Sands Test Facility in New Mexico, which served for decades as an emergency shuttle landing site. Then it will head to NASA's Dryden Flight Research Center at Edwards Air Force Base in California, another

old shuttle touchdown venue.

On Thursday, Endeavour will fly to Northern California, home to Ames Research Center in Mountain View. NASA plans low-level flights over San Francisco, Sacramento and other major cities before heading to Los Angeles and a late-morning arrival at Los Angeles International Airport.

NASA was mum Thursday regarding the exact times of all these flyovers for security reasons. Officials warned that the weather needed to cooperate to allow for such a full and busy schedule.

The shuttle will make its final 12-mile journey from the airport to the California Science Center, via city streets, on Oct. 13. It will go

on public display beginning Oct. 30.

Atlantis' road trip — from a Kennedy Space Center hangar to the visitor complex — is scheduled for Nov. 2.

NASA retired the shuttle fleet last year under White House direction in order to focus more time and money on travel beyond Earth's orbit, first an asteroid and then Mars in the coming decades.

Private companies, meanwhile, are trying to pick up where NASA left off regarding the International Space Station. Until those businesses can provide spaceships for flying people, U.S. astronauts will need to rely on Russian rockets to get to the orbiting lab.

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# US travel outfits decry tighter Cuba rules

HAVANA — When the Obama administration loosened travel restrictions to Cuba, the thought was that Americans were going to pour into the forbidden island on legal cultural exchanges.

But if backers hoped to foster greater understanding between people on both sides of the Cold War's longest lingering disputes, critics saw an opening for rum-slurping beachgoers to toss around dollars and prop up the communist government. They wanted it stopped.

Score this round for the critics.

Several U.S. travel operators complain that, just over a year after the U.S. re-instituted so-called people-to-people exchanges to Cuba, applications to renew their licenses are languishing, forcing cancellations, layoffs and the loss of millions of dollars in revenue.

Many say that's due to a deal struck between the White House and a Cuban-American senator, something the lawmaker's office proudly acknowledges.

The new requirements, which went into effect May 10 as many yearlong licenses were coming up for renewal, have forced travel operators to fill out piles of paperwork to justify their itineraries and provide painstaking details on visits already taken.

"We have to essentially justify every minute of every day as a legitimate people-to-people activity,"

said David Harvell of the New York-based Center for Cuban Studies. He said his group's renewal application, still unfinished, runs several hundred pages, and the extra paperwork has forced cancellation of six upcoming trips.

The dispute comes down to the nature of the visits allowed by law.

American tourism to Cuba is prohibited by Washington's 50-year economic embargo, but U.S. citizens are allowed to come on reli-

gious, educational or cultural visits so long as they are covered by a license.

The Obama administration reinstated people-to-people exchanges in April 2011, and the U.S. Treasury Department's Office of Foreign Assets Control, which enforces the embargo, has granted travel operators 140 licenses for everything from tours of Cuban schools to visits to cigar factories and musical venues.

Key requirements are the trips give participants a

chance to interact with ordinary Cubans and they be educational in nature. That means seminars and workshops rather than salsa and mojitos.

But critics say many travel operators have abused the system.

Insight Cuba, which has brought more than 2,000 Americans here since the summer of 2011, boasted itineraries including a "Havana Jazz Experience," an "adventure into Cuba's enthralling music and art scene" and

tours of the island's scenic tobacco country.

That brought the group a rebuke from Sen. Marco Rubio, a Florida Republican, in a speech on the Senate floor in December. The Cuban-American called the people-to-people program a "charade" that "borders on indoctrination of Americans by Castro government officials," and demanded the Obama Administration enact stiffer controls.

"This is nothing more than tourism. This is

tourism for Americans that, at best, are curious about Cuba and, at worst, sympathize with the Cuban regime," Rubio said.

It is not clear how many Americans have taken advantage of the people-to-people exchanges, but the number is certainly in the thousands.

For months, Rubio held up Senate confirmation of a key diplomat, Assistant Secretary of State Roberta Jacobson, until the White House took action on people-to-people. Alex Conent, a spokesman for Rubio, acknowledged a quid pro quo was reached in March, leading to Jacobson's confirmation and toughened Treasury guidelines that he called "an overdue and welcome step."

Four operators say Rubio's claims are unfair and will hurt ordinary Cubans, including new entrepreneurs who have taken advantage of a limited free market opening under President Raul Castro to set up private restaurants and other small businesses.

"Detractors of travel always talk about how the regime is propped up by Americans going there, but what they never talk about is the effect American travel has on the Cuban people," said Tom Popper, Insight Cuba's director. "These travelers are not going to the beach. They are engaging with people on a personal level, and that creates hope and understanding, and it creates an economic benefit that is unique. To take it away is almost cruel."

## State BRIEFS

### Albright: Talk needed after violence

MIAMI — In the wake of attacks that killed four Americans at the U.S. Consulate in Libya, former U.S. Secretary of State Madeleine Albright said Thursday the U.S. government must stress that Americans treasure their freedom of speech, but they need to be mindful of how they exercise that freedom.

She said that would require empathetic dialogue on both sides: explaining to Americans that the group who set fire to the Libyan embassy doesn't represent the entire country; and getting Muslims in the Middle East to understand that just because an inflammatory video pops up on the Internet, doesn't mean the U.S. government agrees with the values it expresses.

Albright was in South Florida supporting President Barack Obama in a two-day stop, emphasizing "Florida is the key" for winning the election.

She defended the Obama administration's commitment to Israel, and criticized GOP Presidential nominee Mitt Romney for his attacks on the administration.

### Plans continue for train to link cities

ORLANDO — A privately financed company that wants to link a 240-mile train system extending from South Florida to Orlando International Airport is still trying to hash out a feasible plan.

The *Orlando Sentinel* reported All Aboard Florida already has worked with Florida East Coast Railway to access tracks from Miami to Jacksonville.

But the project remains without a current path to Orlando's airport.

All Aboard Florida executive vice president Husein Cumber said talks are continuing with the Orlando-Orange County Expressway Authority, which has a toll road that could be a viable location for a possible train path.

The billion-dollar project could be completed by 2014 and present competition for air carriers that connect central and South Florida.

Future plans for the train call for service that would include Jacksonville.

### Alligator bite victim gets bionic hand

MOORE HAVEN — A southwest Florida teenager who lost part of his right arm to an alligator attack has been fitted for a bionic hand.

The *News-Press* reported Fred Langdale chose a custom camouflage design because he loves hunting, airboating and the outdoors.

Langdale was attacked by the gator while swimming in the Caloosahatchee River with friends. The teen is one of the first in the world to receive the new technology. He is the first U.S. recipient.

### T.S. Nadine nears hurricane strength

MIAMI — Tropical Storm Nadine is just below hurricane strength as it swirls in the Atlantic far from land.

The storm's maximum sustained winds early Thursday are near 70 mph with some strengthening expected.

Nadine is centered about 770 miles east-northeast of the Northern Leeward Islands and is moving northwest near 16 mph.

### Ohio cat stows away for Disney trip

ORLANDO — When an Ohio woman packed her bags for a Disney vacation, her cat didn't want to stay behind.

Sometime Monday, Bob-bob the cat found his way into Ethel Maze's suitcase, made it through screening at Port Columbus International Airport and was loaded into an airplane for a flight to Orlando.

The *Orlando Sentinel* reported the black cat popped out when Maze unzipped her bag after checking into her hotel Monday night. Maze, of Circleville, Ohio, said the 14-month-old cat was shaken but still purring.

Maze was part of a group of disabled veterans and volunteers making an annual trip to Orlando.

Mike Groleau, who handled the bags for the group, said he thought he saw the bag move, but loaded it along with the other bags heading to Orlando.

### Facebook photo leads to mistrial

MIAMI — A lawyer posted a photo of her client's leopard-print underwear on her Facebook page, prompting a South Florida judge to declare a mistrial in a murder case.

The *Miami Herald* reported 31-year-old public defender Anya Cintron Stern was fired Wednesday.

According to the newspaper, Stern snapped a photo of the underwear with her cellphone as corrections officers inspected a bag of clothing Fernin Recaide's family had brought for him to wear to the trial. Officials said the caption suggested the family believed it was "proper attire for trial."

Someone reported the photo to Miami-Dade Judge Leon Firtel, who declared a mistrial.

Recaide is accused of fatally stabbing his girlfriend in 2010.

The judge must assign a new lawyer and set a new trial date.

### Hotels win big during convention

TAMPA — A winner has emerged from the Republican National Convention: the Tampa Bay area's hotels.

The *Tampa Bay Times* reported that during the week of the RNC in August, the Tampa-St. Petersburg-Clearwater area saw the biggest performance boost among the top 25 hotel markets in the country.

According to Smith Travel Research Inc., the Tampa Bay area hosted more than 50,000 guests for the RNC and saw a 73 percent occupancy rating — a jump of 48 percent compared to the same week last year.

The average amount hotels charged guests for a room each night they stayed for the RNC was up 107 percent compared to 2011. Last year, the average room rate was \$82.65. During the convention it jumped to \$171.14.

# Time to end hospital litigation

The dueling boards fighting for control of Citrus Memorial hospital are negotiating an end to most of the litigation between the two boards.

Earlier this week, the Citrus Memorial Health Foundation Board met with its attorneys to discuss ending all litigation with the Citrus County Hospital Board (CCHB), except the governance lawsuit that is now under review by a district court of appeal.

While this is a welcome development that will save some legal fees, it will not resolve all of the issues that divide the boards. The most fundamental issue is who will ultimately control the hospital, and this will not be decided until the governance lawsuit is finally resolved.

Although ending some of the litigation doesn't move the two boards to any final conclusion, at least it keeps them from sliding backward and spending more money on legal fees that should go to patient care.

For this reason, ending some

litigation is a good step, and further discussions the boards are having regarding transfer of money from the CCHB to the hospital for debt payment and indigent care will benefit the hospital.

Battles between the boards have been unsettling to the hospital and the entire community and have damaged the hospital's reputation. This dimension seems all too often to have been lost in the legal maneuvering.

Both boards need to keep in mind that the hospital exists to treat sick people in our community, and when governing boards spend time and money arguing with each other, they are being distracted from their most important responsibility of assuring the hospital is capable of carrying out its primary mission of healing.

We encourage the boards to work toward resolving their conflicts, and once the governance lawsuit is finally resolved, to move forward cooperatively for the good of the hospital and the community it serves.

**OUR OPINION:**

# Crist: Man without a party

There was a lot of buzz about former Florida Gov. Charlie Crist speaking at the Democratic National Convention, given that he's served in numerous elected offices during the past few decades as a Republican.

After one term, Crist left the governor's office in 2010 with support across party lines. Affable and exceedingly polite, his door was open to legislators in both parties. He was considered a moderate, in part because of his measured positions on education and environmental issues, and his willingness to include the minority party in his decision-making.

Instead of running for a second term, Crist opted to run for the U.S. Senate. His bipartisan support and non-combative nature made him an attractive general election candidate for people weary of political gridlock. But his willingness to veto unpopular legislation passed by his Republican-led legislature made him vulnerable in the primary. And indeed, he drew an opponent, former Florida House Speaker Marco Rubio.

Republican loyalists were disappointed with Crist's propensity for compromise and cooperation, traits once considered admirable. But as long as he held the power of the governor's office, and controlled the party's finances and organization, they fell in line. As a result, Crist was able to amass a large campaign war chest.

But once the legislative session ended — and bills were either signed or vetoed — his power began to wane, along with his hold of the party's resources. During this same period, his hand-picked chairman of the Republican Party of Florida, Jim Greer, was mired in legal and fi-

ancial problems for questionable practices. Rubio, then a dark horse, benefitted from Crist's woes with the hardcore party loyalists.

An astute politician, Crist decided his best course was to run for the Senate as an independent. But it's a daunting task to run without the backing of a political party, which brings volunteers, events and the mother's milk of politics, money.

Once he left the party, Crist's fundraising dried up. Long-time supporters proved more loyal to the party than to the man. And his ability to attract Democrats diminished because there was a Democrat in the race, Kendrick Meek. With Republicans angry with him and Democrats supporting their own candidate, Crist was literally in no man's land.

Interestingly, more and more voters these days are registering either as Independents or as "no party affiliate." But candidates who run as independents or NPA have a tough time raising money and reaching significant numbers of voters.

So today, nearly two years after losing in a three-way race, Crist, the once-rising Republican star who was considered for vice president in 2008, remains an outcast. Like a bad breakup, the GOP no longer wants to date Charlie Crist, but neither does it want him to date anyone else.

While still not affiliated with either major party, Crist recently endorsed President Obama for re-election, setting off widespread speculation he might be eyeing a run for governor in 2014 against Republican Rick Scott, who is struggling in the polls.

Crist's speech at the DNC infuriated Republican loyalists. The

response was quick and furious. Ads were aired to discredit his integrity and sincerity, painting him not as the liberal they believe him to be, but as a conservative who would not be acceptable to Democrats.

Which begs the question: is the GOP worried about a Crist comeback as a Democrat? The RPOF claims it just wants to point out his record of changing his mind, his position and his party. But why waste party resources if he's not viewed as a future threat when those funds could be used in this election cycle? Are the party's actions fueled by fear or loathing?

Still, the key question is, will Democrats, who are happy to accept Crist in the party, be willing to back him for governor over others who feel they've earned the chance to top the ticket after years of working in the trenches? Are Florida's Democrats so eager to replace Scott they will back Crist if he proves their best chance?


Democrats were lukewarm to Crist at the DNC even after what should have been a huge applause line: "I didn't leave the Republican Party; it left me."

Part of his problem is he is viewed as a political opportunist, a view the Republican Party is happy to stoke.

There is only one possible political move for Charlie Crist. If he is serious about seeking another term as governor, he will have to run as a Democrat. Recent polls show he has a very good chance of becoming the Democratic nominee. But will the Democrats embrace him or will there be hard feelings?

Is Crist a man without a party or a political opportunist? Depends on whom you ask.

The King's Bay Spring in Crystal River, once an important contributor to the river's first magnitude spring system, now flows very little. A multitude of smaller springs in the river no longer flow at all.

Loss of water clarity and the outsized growth of lyngbya are just some of the river's challenges. Yet, SWFWMD last month granted 10-year water pumping permits on commercial property located near the river. This OKs daily water withdrawal up to 153,400 gallons (per day in the highest water-use month. Yearly average, 76,700 gpd). The two companies who received the permits plan to sell their product to an Ocala water bottling plant.

Just because it's legal doesn't mean it's ethical.

# Fears rise in wake of ax killer's pardon

*Perpetrator welcomed home as national hero*

MOSCOW — Shortly before dawn, an Azerbaijani in an English course in Hungary crept into the room of a fellow student from arch-enemy Armenia. In a frenzy of ethnic hatred, Ramil Safarov hacked the sleeping Armenian to death with 26 ax blows — nearly decapitating him.

Convicted of murder, the Army lieutenant was sentenced to life in prison, and the lurid case largely faded from memory for nearly a decade.

It rose like a wrathful ghost last month, when Safarov was sent home, pardoned and embraced as a national hero. The affair now threatens to wreck 20 years of international attempts to reconcile the two ex-Soviet neighbors, which fought a war in the 1990s that killed some 30,000 and put a large section of Azerbaijan under Armenian control.

While there's no sign that war is about to erupt again, the Safarov dispute shows genuine peace to be further away than ever.

The tensions worry both Russia and the West, which are jockeying for influence in a region seen as a buffer between Europe and Iran and as a key player in the world oil market.

It all started in February 2004, when Safarov and Armenian Guren Markarian, also a military officer, were living in the same dormitory while attending a NATO-sponsored language course in Budapest.

Safarov was given a life sentence in 2006 by the Budapest City Court after he confessed to hacking Lt. Gurgen Markarian of Armenia while both were in Hungary for a 2004 NATO language course.

On a trip to a supermarket to get food and cigarettes, Safarov bought an ax as well.

Two days later, after finishing his homework, the Azerbaijani sharpened his weapon, smoked a few cigarettes and waited in the hallway until 5 a.m., when his victim would be in his deepest sleep, according to his own court testimony.

Safarov opened the unlocked door to Lt. Markarian's room. He turned on the light. The ax blows came raining down, 26 in all, on head, neck and body — as Safarov flung insults at his victim.

When it was over, Safarov told Markarian's Hungarian roommate that he wouldn't hurt him. He smoked a cigarette and threw the butt at the victim, before calling a fellow Azerbaijani officer and showing him the body.

Then he left to hunt down a second Armenian officer in his room.

Finding the door locked, Safarov started screaming: "Open up Armenian, open up, we're going to cut the throats of all of you" — and started breaking down the door with his ax.

Hayk Makuchyan, the intended victim, told The Associated Press

that he wanted to open the door to see what was going on, but was stopped by his roommate.

Police arrived and drew their weapons on Safarov, forcing him to lay down his ax.

Safarov was given a life sentence by a Hungarian court in 2006. At trial, the Azerbaijani officer said he committed the murder to avenge the killing of his relatives by ethnic Armenian forces during the 1990s conflict over the disputed territory of Nagorno-Karabakh.

He also said the Armenian officers subjected him to ridicule,

throwing a basketball at him, teasing him over his studious habits and insulting the Azeri flag. Those claims weren't proven in court and ultimately rejected by the judge.

His lawyer said Safarov felt he was doing his duty. "He believed that he was defending his country," said Hungarian defense lawyer Gyorgy Magyar.

On Aug. 31, Hungary sent Safarov back home after receiving assurances that he would continue serving his sentence there.

Instead, Safarov was covered in glory. President Ilham Aliyev granted him an amnesty upon his arrival. He was promoted to the rank of major, provided with a new apartment and given back wages for his eight-and-a-half years in custody.

Armenia exploded in anger. It immediately cut diplomatic ties with Hungary as protesters in the Armenian capital threw tomatoes at the building housing Hungary's honorary consulate, and tore down the Hungarian flag.

A barrage of bluster statements from Armenian and Azerbaijani officials raised the fears about a renewed outbreak of the six-year war, which ended in 1994.

The Nagorno-Karabakh region of Azerbaijan and some adjacent territory has been under the control of Armenian troops and local ethnic Armenian forces since the war's end; shootings and other incidents have been frequent.

Negotiators from Russia, the United States and France, under the umbrella of the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe, have led efforts to settle the conflict, producing little result. Worried about a resumption of hostilities, Washington, Russia and the OSCE quickly condemned Azerbaijan's move.

# Islamists practice rough justice in northern Mali

*Robber has foot, hand cut off*

BAMAKO, Mali — Speaking from his hospital bed, a young man whose hand and foot were amputated this week by the radical Islamic group controlling northern Mali described an agony unlike any other — "a pain that made me forget everything."

Youssef Hamidou borrowed the phone of a hospital attendant and braved the guards posted outside his door to call a journalist hundreds of miles away in Mali's capital and tell the world what he went through.

He is one of five cousins, all in their 20s, and all but one from the village of Fafa, who were convicted of carrying out highway robberies.

It's a crime punishable by double amputation, according to the strict form of Shariah, or Islamic law, being applied with increasing frequency in the northern half of Mali, which fell to al-Qaida-linked rebels five months ago. Since then, an adulterous couple was stoned to death, a thief's hand was cut off and numerous people have been publicly whipped, including at least one woman.

Monday's amputations of the five cousins in the northern city of Gao shows how much Mali, once praised for its democracy and whose undulating deserts and camel caravans were a magnet for Western tourists, has changed in just a few short months.

"When it was my turn, they took me blindfolded, and tied my right arm and my left leg just above the ankle with plastic ties to stop the circulation," Hamidou said. "Suddenly I felt a pain in my right hand that was out of this world. My hand had just been chopped off. They put a compress on it. Very quickly they cut off my left foot, and they also put a compress on it to stop the bleeding."

"At first I was afraid — but the pain I felt made me forget everything, even my fear. Then the Islamists put us in a car and drove us to the hospital."

The 25-year-old spoke to The Associated Press on a phone handed to him by a hospital worker. He spoke in his native Sonrai language in a voice so weak that, at times, the attendant

had to take the phone back to relay his words. The interview, conducted over several hours Tuesday evening, was interrupted more than once when the guards posted by the militants checked on the amputees.

Before the north fell to the rebels in April, Hamidou and his cousins belonged to the Gandakoy, a self-defense militia made up of people from the Sonrai ethnic group.

"When our militia was chased out we held on to our weapons, and we used them to hold up buses on the road between Gao and Niger. That was until someone denounced us" to the Islamists, said Hamidou.

North Mali's Islamist rulers make public spectacles of the brutal Shariah punishments.

Ibrahim Toure said he was talking with friends near the public square in Gao, some 750 miles north-

east of Bamako, when the Islamists drove up and ordered people to gather around.

"We understood that they were going to carry out a Shariah punishment, but we could not have imagined what was about to happen," Toure said.

The crowd tried to enter the square, but the fighters stopped them. "The Islamists told us to go outside the square, and to stay behind the iron bars that encircle it. ... It was then that we started to really worry, because normally when they whip people, they let us inside. ... So we realized that something even more horrible was about to happen."

Toure and his friends watched as the fighters brought out a chair and tied its legs and back with a rope to a pillar on a stage inside Independence Square. Then the long-bearded "cadi," or Islamic judge, arrived and gave a sermon, saying that within the territory the Islamic militants control Shariah law

would be applied.

"He said that for highway robbers, Shariah calls for the right hand and left foot to be cut off. And that four people had already had their limbs cut off. And immediately a small child came running out of one of the cars with a bag. We saw that it was dripping with blood," said Toure.

The judge said the chopped off hands and feet of four of the accused were inside the bag. The fifth man's limbs would be amputated in public in order to serve as a lesson.

The militants then brought the young accused robber out of the car, and pushed him toward the chair:

"It was unbelievable. The young man, he just followed calmly," said Toure. "He had his eyes closed with a bandage. ... He put out his hand to be cut, then he put out his foot to be cut. ... He didn't cry out, he didn't even move. It's my impression that they must have drugged him — if not how can you accept to let someone cut off your limbs?"

One of the doctors who helped treat the amputees, said the Islamists initially asked the medics to carry out the amputations.

"We categorically refused," said the doctor, whose name is being withheld by AP out of concern for his safety.

The fighters left, and returned sometime later, carrying in the five young men

who were trailing blood, he said.

Last week, the government in Bamako, which still controls the southern half of Mali, asked the 15 nations in western Africa for military help to take back the north. Radical militants in northern Mali were drawing disaffected youth from other countries, warned the U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees Antonio Guterres.

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

**Feds: Fishery disaster in N.E.**

BOSTON — The U.S. Commerce Department on Thursday declared a national fishery disaster in New England, opening the door for tens of millions of dollars in relief funds for struggling fishermen and their ports.

Acting Commerce Secretary Rebecca Blank said the declaration comes amid “unexpectedly slow rebuilding of stocks,” which is forcing huge fishing cuts for 2013 that are jeopardizing the New England industry. Blank said her agency also determined the troubles with fish stocks have come even though fishermen are following rules designed to prevent overfishing.

**Purported cartel leader caught**

MEXICO CITY — A man believed to be the leader of the Gulf drug cartel, which controls some of the most valuable and violently contested smuggling routes along the U.S. border, was arrested by Mexican marines and presented to the public Thursday morning.

The capture of Jorge Eduardo Costilla Sanchez is a major victory in the military battle against drug trafficking, but it could open a power vacuum and intensify a struggle south of the Texas border in north-east Mexico, a region that has seen some of the most horrific violence in the country’s six-year war among law enforcement and rival gangs.

Adm. Jose Luis Vergara, a navy spokesman, said the burly, mustachioed man detained Wednesday evening in the Gulf port of Tampico was the capo known as “El Coss.” One of Mexico’s most-wanted men, the 41-year-old is charged in the U.S. with drug-trafficking and threatening U.S. law enforcement officials. U.S. authorities offered \$5 million for information leading to his arrest.

## Fed rolls out latest round of measures

WASHINGTON — The Federal Reserve unleashed a series of bold and open-ended steps Thursday designed to stimulate the economy by boosting the stock market and making it cheaper for people to borrow and spend.

The Fed said it will spend \$40 billion a month to buy mortgage bonds for as long as it deems necessary to make home buying more affordable. It plans to keep short-term interest rates at record lows through mid-2015 — six


months longer than previously planned. And it’s ready to try other stimulative measures if hiring doesn’t pick up.

“The idea is to quicken the recovery,” Chairman Ben Bernanke said at a news conference. But Bernanke made clear that he thinks the economy will need the Fed’s help even after the recovery strengthens.

Stock prices rose steadily after the Fed’s announcement at 12:30 p.m. Eastern time. The Dow Jones industrial average closed up more than 200 points. Other stock averages also surged.

The Fed’s policy committee announced the aggressive actions after a two-day meeting. Its moves pointed to how sluggish the U.S. and global economies remain more than three years after the Great Recession ended.

Thursday’s announcement marked the Fed’s latest dramatic intervention since the financial crisis erupted in 2008 and the Great Recession shot unemployment into double digits. The Fed cut its benchmark short-term rate to near zero and has kept it there for nearly four years.

### Officials struggle to respond to worldwide Muslim protests

WASHINGTON — The Obama administration was caught by surprise by the ferocity of the Sept. 11 attack against the U.S. Consulate in Benghazi, Libya, that killed the ambassador and three other Americans. Now it is bracing for another potential eruption of violent demonstrations in parts of the Muslim world after Friday’s weekly prayers — traditionally a time of protest in the Middle East and North Africa.

Angry demonstrations over an anti-Islam video already have occurred in Egypt and Yemen, and officials theorize that well-armed Libyan extremists hijacked a similar protest in Benghazi, where several Libyan security guards also were killed. The U.S. put all of its diplomatic missions overseas on high alert, and Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton delivered an explicit denunciation of the video as the administration sought to pre-empt further turmoil at its embassies and consulates.

“The United States government had absolutely nothing to do with this video,” she said before a meeting with the foreign minister of Morocco at the State Department. “We absolutely reject its content and message.”

“To us, to me personally, this video is disgusting and reprehensible,” Clinton said. “It appears to have a deeply cynical purpose: to denigrate a great religion and to provoke rage.”

U.S. officials said they suspect that the attack at the Benghazi consulate, which had also been the target of an unsuccessful attack in June, may have been only tangentially related to the film.

They also stressed there had been no advance warning or intelligence to suggest a threat in Libya that would warrant boosting security, even on the 11th anniversary of the terror attacks of Sept. 11, 2001.

“As we did with all of our missions overseas, in advance of the September 11 anniversary and as we do every year, we did evaluate

the threat stream and we determined that the security at Benghazi was appropriate for what we knew,” State Department spokeswoman Victoria Nuland said.

The intelligence leading up to the attacks will be examined to “see if there was any way of forecasting this violence,” as in any violent incident, House Intelligence Committee member Adam Schiff, D-Calif., said in an interview Thursday. But he said the focus now “has to be on finding out who is responsible and bringing them to justice.”

President Barack Obama, speaking at a campaign event in Golden, Colo., also vowed that the perpetrators would be punished.

“I want people around the world to hear me,” he said. “To all those who would do us harm: No act of terror will go unpunished. I will not dim the light of the values that we proudly present to the rest of the world. No act of violence shakes the resolve of the United States of America.”

## Hopes high for deal in teacher strike

### Both sides optimistic; students could be back in school Monday

CHICAGO — The city’s public schools will stay closed for at least one more day, but leaders of the teachers union and the school district kept talking Thursday, with both sides saying they hoped to complete a deal soon to end the nearly weeklong strike.

“We are optimistic, but we are still hammering things out,” said Karen Lewis, president of the Chicago Teachers Union.

Word of the progress in negotiations came less than a day after the school board offered a proposal to modify a system that would use student test scores to help

evaluate teacher performance.

Under an old proposal, the union estimated that 6,000 teachers could lose their jobs within two years. An offer made late Wednesday included provisions that would have protected tenured teachers from dismissal in the first year of the evaluations. It also altered categories that teachers can be rated on and added an appeals process.

The union called a special delegates meeting for Friday afternoon, when the bargaining team is scheduled to give an update on contract talks.

Negotiations resumed Thursday with an air of op-

timism. Lewis said students could be back in class by Monday, a week after teachers walked out.

“We’ve made progress in some areas, but still we have a way to go,” she added. “Teachers, paraprofessionals and clinicians remain hopeful but energized.”

After Wednesday’s late-night bargaining session, school board President David Vitale was also more positive.

Roughly 25,000 teachers have been on the picket line in the nation’s third-largest school district.

The new optimism also was evident among teachers who marched Thursday

along Michigan Avenue. They were joined by marching bands and protesters carrying balloons, pushing strollers and waving Chicago flags.

Among them was high school history teacher Anthony Smith, who wants the district to be fair and give all public schools the same resources so they can succeed. Among the negotiating points is a policy to hire back teachers who get laid off due to school closures.

“One school being closed down because they didn’t give it proper resources and proper attention is unfair,” said the 25-year classroom veteran.

## Amazon to begin taxing Calif. sales

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — Online retailer Amazon.com has tried to become all things to all consumers, but in California, it is about to take on a role it has fought against for years: tax collector.

The change, which takes effect this weekend, comes after years of bitter back-and-forth between the world’s largest online mall and the California Legislature over whether Internet retailers should have to charge sales tax. The two sides reached a deal in 2011 that included a one-year grace period set to end Saturday.

The deadline has spurred at least some consumers into impulse-buying mode, making big-ticket purchases and stocking up on essentials before the tax collection kicks in.

“Even the mailroom is laughing at me,” said Derek Daniels, 37, who has had Amazon packages delivered to his Los Angeles office every day this week. He’s loading up on household supplies like trash bags and collecting birthday and Christmas presents for his Superman-loving 2-year-old.

“We are hoping he won’t fall in love with Batman by the time November rolls around,” Daniels said.

The looming deadline prompted San Diego artist John Purlia to finally buy that Samsung flat-screen television that had been sitting in his Amazon shopping cart for months. He also picked up four CDs, an external hard drive and an oddly decorated \$17.99 kitchen cutting-board — a gag gift for his sister.

“The TV was the motivating factor and the other stuff came along for the ride,” said Purlia, 52. “I know I’m going to be back at Amazon before Saturday looking to take advantage of this. It’s like the final days of a sale.”

Technically, Purlia and Daniels owe taxes on all of this: California residents are supposed to calculate their obligation and send it directly to the state. But fewer than 1 percent do, according to the Franchise Tax Board.

Lawmakers have long complained that the increasingly popular e-retailer was depriving the state of millions of dollars by refusing to charge taxes at checkout. But Amazon said it was shielded by a 1992 U.S. Supreme Court ruling that prohibits states from forcing businesses without a physical presence in the area to collect sales tax.

The e-commerce giant said it did not have a physical presence in California because it does not have warehouses or other buildings there.

# Citrus boys golf nips CR by a stroke


"We did play well," said Citrus coach David Assumpcao. "But Lecanto played very well, to their full potential."

# Citrus wary of Rattlers

Citrus' inspiring second-half comeback effort against West Port last Friday was "too little, too late," according to Hurricanes coach Rayburn Greene. Class 5A Belleview is coming off a similarly grueling close loss, to Lake Weir (1-1), albeit under contrasting circumstances. With a 9-yard TD run by sophomore Rattlers



quarterback Erik Pitts, the Rattlers took a 20-16 lead with just over four minutes to play despite being significantly outgained and running fewer than half as many plays as the Hurricanes. Lake Weir responded, however, with a TD drive that included a 4th-and-12 conversion and left just a minute on the clock to help secure a 22-20 victory.

"I told our team that no one is going to feel sorry for us," Greene said. "Belleview is coming off a close loss as well and they're going to want to win badly."

"I didn't sense an emotional hangover with our players," he added. "We talked about it. I know all coaches say it, but you can't let a team beat you twice in terms of having a hangover cause you to lose the next game."

Both of these teams were burdened with injuries last week, with Citrus losing do-everything speedster James Pouncey and junior tailback Tyric Washington for most of the game on top of the absence of senior tailback Darius Chapes.

## Here comes the mustache

*Gordon rejuvenated heading into Chase*

CHICAGO — The infamous mustache is making a comeback — and Jeff Gordon believes he is, too.

The four-time NASCAR champion grabbed the final spot in the Chase for the Sprint Cup championship away from Kyle Busch with a vintage performance last week. He will try to end his long "Drive for Five," starting Sunday at Chicagoland Speedway.

It's fair to say he's feeling just a little rejuvenated.

"This is the defining moment for me at this stage of my career," Gordon said. "Not making this Chase could have had devastating results."

He's in because of a dramatic performance at Richmond.

Gordon came in trailing Busch by 12 points and beat him by three, making major adjustments to his Chevrolet throughout and coming on strong after falling a lap behind to finish second in a race hampered by rain.

Now, the question is: At age 41 and 11 years removed from his last championship, can he string together 10 strong races to capture title No. 5?

If nothing else, he's showing he's a man of his word.

Gordon had vowed to bring back the mustache he sported at the start of his NASCAR career if he made the Chase, and his facial hair is once again the talk of the sport. He had a salt-and-pepper 5 o'clock shadow, the early makings of a beard, on Wednesday.

He insisted it will be a mustache by the weekend.

"My wife started all this because

she reminded me and Twitterville of the commitment I had made a month or month and a half ago," Gordon said. "I meant it when I said it and I hoped that we would be in this position, be in the Chase and sporting the 'stache. So here we go. Get ready."

Gordon couldn't remember exactly what led to the vow to bring back the mustache, widely ridiculed after its debut when he was a 21-year-old Sprint Cup Series rookie.

Bringing it back might have popped into his head from a comment on Twitter. He's not sure. He just remembers the reaction to his promise.

"They were all like, 'Yeah, yeah, yeah,'" he said. "I have fans all the time on Twitter, off Twitter, other competitors, messaging me, 'Bring back the 'stache.' And I guarantee, it's not because I was cool."

Other drivers had some tips for Gordon.

"You can't leave out the mullet, too," said five-time champion and Hendrick Motorsports teammate Jimmie Johnson. "I've seen some

discussion on the old trucker hats, but I'm just impressed. ... He's doing it gray and all, so I'm proud of him. He's a lot older now, so I think his mustache is going to be more defined. And he might not be so porn 'stache-ish. There might be a bit more of Tom Selleck or something along those lines."

Defending champion Tony Stewart joked, "He's got to bring back the eyebrows, too, to match it. It's got to be a matched set. He had that big 'stache, but if you don't have the eyebrows, it's not going to look right. It's fun for Jeff and it will be for his fans too."

Those fans will really be loving it if he pulls off the title.

At this time last year, Stewart defied his own expectations. He won at Chicagoland after stumbling into the Chase and won five of the 10 races, including the season finale, to tie Carl Edwards for the championship and take the title on the tiebreaker.

Can Gordon be this year's Stewart, the guy that gets hot at just the right time even if he is admittedly past his prime?

# UConn faces future with unproven head coach

## Ollie takes over for Huskies legend Calhoun

STORRS, Conn. — Kevin Ollie can win as many games, even as many national championships, as his predecessor and former coach did at Connecticut. But he can't transform the program. Jim Calhoun did that already.

During his 26 seasons in Storrs, Calhoun turned a regional New England program into a powerhouse, becoming one of just five coaches to win three national titles or more. Add to that seven Big East tournament crowns and 10 regular-season championships. No wonder the 10,000 seats were usually filled at Gampel Pavilion, the arena Calhoun gets credit for building.

All those accomplishments are history now.

What's left are high expectations for a rookie coach.

Ollie, who played for Calhoun from 1991-95, went on to a long NBA career and returned two years ago as an assistant, took over Thursday — a choice Calhoun fully supported.

"Simply put, he epitomizes what we want our students to be about," Calhoun said. "When I started here we felt we could do anything and I feel that way now, everything's in place. This is an exciting time as we go forward."

And a difficult one. He takes over a team that is banned from the Big East and NCAA tournaments because of poor academic performances.

With a one-year contract, Ollie won't have much time to show what he can do on the bench and on the recruiting trail. And his depleted roster isn't likely to add to Calhoun's stellar numbers — 27 players selected in the NBA draft, including 13 lottery picks.

"We're going to attack this thing head on," Ollie said at a news conference at Gam-

pel, where he once thrilled UConn crowds with his hustle and defense. "We have enough to do it. Coach will be there right beside me as he has always been. He's been a second father to me from the day I arrived here as a recruit and believe me, that won't change."

Ollie's contract will pay him a prorated \$384,615 and ends on April 4, the last day of the 2012-13 basketball

season.

Athletic director Warde Manuel said there's a reason it's a single-year deal.

"I like to win and Kevin does, too. We're not here just to participate in games," Manuel said. "I'm looking to see how he is on the sideline. How he handles decision-making, substitutions, things that are normal in a game. How does he handle losses with the

team and motivate them the next day to come back and play?"

"It truly is a long-term plan, but I want to see where Kevin is before we extend that contract. The commitment is there. He knows it."

Ollie refused to get caught up in the discussion.

"Everything I've done has prepared me for sliding over into that chair," he said. "I'm going to coach this team like I've got a 10-, 15-year contract. I hope it's for a lifetime. I want to retire one day from the University of Connecticut like Jim Calhoun did."

Ollie will have some familiar faces on the bench since all four assistants are staying.

"Kevin has always been a great listener," associate head coach George Blaney said. "He's a potential superstar as a coach, no doubt about that. Sure he'll be different than Jim, but there was only one Jim Calhoun."

Several former UConn players were there to see one of their own become coach.

Kemba Walker, who led UConn to the national championship with an incredible 11-game run in 2010-11, isn't worried in the least.

"He's one of the toughest guys I know," said Walker, who plays for the Charlotte Bobcats. "Kevin's UConn just like Coach is UConn. It's not one person here. It's everybody who played here. We are a family and it will stay that way."

Connecticut has never faced a season like this one.

It will have its first new head coach in 26 years and he is only guaranteed seven months on the job. There are only five players returning who saw significant playing time last season. There will be no postseason play at all. Those factors should make the job as tough as any faced by a coach in Division I.

Don't tell that to Ollie.

"I told my players this morning, 'It's all stairs now. No escalators,'" he said. "Escalators are for cowards. Every day now will be one step at a time."

# Koreans lead Open

## Ryu, Kang tied atop Women's British Open

HOYLAKE, England — So Yeon Ryu won the U.S. Women's Open last summer in Colorado and backed it up with a victory last month in the Jamie Farr Toledo Classic.

The 22-year-old South Korean player made another big statement Thursday at Royal Liverpool in her Women's British Open debut, shooting a 2-under 70 for a share of the first-round lead with Haeji Kang.

"After I won (in Toledo), I was a little more relieved and that helped me a lot," Ryu said. "How can I say, even when I was winning the U.S. Women's Open, a lot of people said it might be just one tournament or just a dark horse like that. But after I won the Toledo championship, I broke that."

Coming off a victory last week in a Korean LPGA event, Ryu had five birdies and two bogeys in relatively calm conditions on the difficult links course.

"This is my first time played in England, so I never played this type of golf course," Ryu said. "It's really tough, but fun. Always the first experience, really fun and a little tough, but I want to enjoy this type of golf course."

"Actually, Tuesday and Wednesday was so bad, so today feels like a really great weather. But you know, in Korea it was a little really strong wind, and a little different from this course. This wind might not be a bad wind. I think today the weather was really great."

The 2-under leading score is the highest in the first round since the tournament became a major in 2002, in relatively calm conditions.

The 21-year-old Kang, also from South Korea, had six birdies, two bogeys and a double bogey.

"I hit it pretty good out there," said Kang, winless on the LPGA Tour. "My iron shots were just inside 20 feet all the time, so I could just putt it out."

She hit 13 greens in regulation and needed only 27 putts in her morning round.

"Oh, it was much better this morning," Kang said. "As soon as I made the turn, it started blow. But I played yesterday the practice round with the rain, also, so I'm ready."

Australia's Karrie Webb, the tournament winner in 1995, 1997 and 2002, was a stroke back along with 16-year-old English amateur

Charley Hull, Jiyai Shin, Ai Miyazato, Mika Miyazato, Stacey Keating, Lydia Hall, Vicky Hurst and Kate Kutcher.

"I think it counts for a little bit," Webb said about her experience in the event. "But you've still got to go out there and hit the shot, and you've got to commit to the lines that you want to hit your shots on. ... There's a lot of links courses that there's a side to miss on, and I don't think this course, especially

off the tee, there's a side to miss on. You've just got to get up there and hit a good shot."

Shin, the 2008 winner at Sunningdale, won the Kingsmill Championship on Monday in Virginia, beating Paula Creamer on the ninth hole of a playoff.

Two-time defending champion Yani Tseng opened with a 72. She played alongside Ai Miyazato and Creamer.

"I feel pretty good, first day of

the tournament," Tseng said. "I feel like I'm hitting so many good shots out there, making some good putts to save the par, and I'm very happy and very enjoyed playing with Ai and Paula today. It's a four day tournament, just have to be patient on this tough golf course, and today maybe it's kind of a good day to make some more birdies but I don't think you want to try too hard out there, because the harder you try, the worse you get."

## New York maintains share of AL East lead

BOSTON — Derek Jeter shook off an injury to tie Willie Mays for 10th place on the career hits list, backing Phil Hughes and helping the New York Yankees beat the Boston Red Sox 2-0 Thursday night to maintain a share of the AL East lead.

New York won consecutive games for the first time in a month and kept pace with the Baltimore Orioles, who completed a three-game sweep of the Tampa Bay Rays with a 3-2, 14-inning win.

Hughes (15-12) retired his first 10 batters and gave up five hits in 7 1-3 innings. He struck out seven, walked one and allowed just three runners past first base, ending a streak of seven straight starts in which he allowed home runs. Hughes has given up two or fewer runs in five of his last six starts.


Rafael Soriano pitched the ninth for his 38th save in 41 chances.

Jeter started at designated hitter after leaving Wednesday night's 5-4 win when he pulled up lame lunging for first base trying to avoid a double-play grounder in the eighth.

He was 0 for 3 then blooped a run-scoring single to center field in the seventh inning for the 3,283rd hit of his career to match Mays. Eddie Collins is next at 3,313.

New York, which led the division by 10 games before play on July 19, went 5-5 on a trip to Tampa Bay, Baltimore and Boston.

## Healthy McCoy making impact for Bucs' defense

TAMPA — Defensive tackle Gerald McCoy is healthy again, and Tampa Bay's pass rush suddenly is showing signs of dramatic improvement.

The third-year pro had one of three sacks of Cam Newton in a 16-10 season-opening victory over Carolina, while also helping the Buccaneers defense limit the Panthers to 10 yards rushing.

McCoy was the third overall pick in the 2010 draft, selected two spots behind Detroit's Ndamukong Suh. But while the Lions' young defensive tackle immediately established himself as a rising star, McCoy struggled to stay on the field the past two seasons because of injuries.

The Bucs were last in the NFL with 23 sacks in 2011, when McCoy missed two games because of an ankle injury and the final eight weeks of the season tearing his right bicep trying to make a tackle in a loss to New Orleans. He sat out the final three games of his rookie year with a torn left bicep.

Without him, Tampa Bay's went downhill in a hurry, finishing 30th in yards allowed and yielding a NFL-worst and franchise-record

494 points.

"Gerald is real instrumental," said first-year coach Greg Schiano, noting McCoy has a combination of strength and quickness that could help the former Oklahoma standout develop into a dominating player in the Bucs' new defensive scheme.

"He is a disruptive force," Schiano added. "Even when he doesn't make the play, he's got such get off and penetration ability that he makes plays bubble, he makes plays redirect."

That ability was evident Sunday, when McCoy led a relentless pass rush against Newton, who was pressured into a pair of interceptions and held to 4 yards rushing on five attempts.

McCoy finished with two tackles, both for losses, and nearly had a second sack when he managed to get his arms around Newton but was unable to get the 245-pound quarterback on the ground before Newton released a pass for a short gain.

"Coach tells me all he wants me to do is my assignment. That's all I went out there and did. My job," McCoy said, playing down what arguably was the best performance of his career.

"One thing we're focusing on this year is us. We have to

come in and grade ourselves critically about what we did wrong and what we can do better," he added. "I did some pretty good things ... but I also left some plays out there."

Nevertheless, McCoy left Raymond James Stadium feeling pretty good about his performance. That is, until he heard from former Bucs All-Pro Warren Sapp, now a television analyst. McCoy is the highest-drafted defensive tackle selected by the Bucs since Sapp was the 12th overall pick in 1995.

Sapp, part of Tampa Bay's Super Bowl champion defense of 10 years ago, has spent time with McCoy on and off the field to help the 24-year-old with his game.

"Sapp called me and said, 'Look, if you've ever got a quarterback in your grasp like that and you let him out, me and you are going to fight.' I said, 'I don't want none of that,'" McCoy said, laughing.

"I've got to make the plays that come to me. I made a good move on my man, got to the quarterback. You've got to make it," he added. "This is the NFL. Getting to the quarterback is not easy at all. And I've proven it two years. It's not easy, so when I get there, I've got to get him on the ground."

# Contrast of styles

## No. 18 Gators, No. 23 Vols play differently

GAINESVILLE — Steve Spurrier and Johnny Majors probably would not approve.

No. 18 Florida is running the ball early and often, a slow-it-down, ground-and-pound attack featuring senior Mike Gillislee.

No. 23 Tennessee is throwing it all over the field, relying on junior Tyler Bray's accuracy, arm strength and decision-making skills to direct an up-tempo, often no-huddle offense.

The contrasting styles are working to perfection for the Southeastern Conference rivals. Gillislee helped the Gators (2-0, 1-0 SEC) eke out wins against Bowling Green and Texas A&M. Bray carried the Volunteers (2-0) to victories over North Carolina State and Georgia State.

Whichever team keeps it going Saturday probably should have a big advantage in the Eastern Division showdown.

"They're going to want it slow and we're going to want it fast," Tennessee coach Derek Dooley said.

Bray leads the league in passing, averaging more than 320 yards a game. He has completed nearly 74 percent of his passes for 643 yards, with six touchdowns and no interceptions.

The Gators, meanwhile, rank last in the SEC in passing. They prefer to keep the ball in Gillislee's hands. A former backup to speedsters Jeff Demps and Chris Rainey, Gillislee leads the league with 231 yards and four scores.

He has scored twice in each of Florida's victories,

but also finished last week's game at Texas A&M with a groin injury. Gators coach Will Muschamp insists Gillislee will be fine for Saturday game in Knoxville, Tenn.

Florida needs him at full speed, too, given the team has unproven backs behind him and an even less experienced quarterback. The Gators have had to scratch and claw for each win.

"I told the guys at the end of the game, 'We're going to have to win some games like that this year. This is kind of who we are,'" Muschamp said. "I know nobody wants to hear that, but that's the facts of life. Sometimes you've got to put your realistic glasses on and see who you are."

The grind-it-out Gators are a far cry from Spurrier's "Fun 'n' Gun" teams that revolutionized the SEC. Between 1991 and 2000, the Gators won six SEC titles and played for two more.

If Florida gets back to Atlanta for the first time since 2009, Gillislee certainly

will be leading the way.

"Mike Gillislee is a great running back," center Jon Harrison said. "He has a lot of heart, a lot of drive. He's the one coming back to the huddle, 'Guys, get me the ball. We've got to go, let's go. Get me the ball. I will get this first (down), I will get this touchdown.'"

"We love that about him. We love having a back in the backfield that all he wants is the W's for the team, and he's going to give it his all, even if it's sacrificing his body."

Bray, meanwhile, has gotten through the first two games unscathed — the best possible news for Tennessee.

He missed five games last season because of a broken right thumb, and the Volunteers weren't the same without him. He has shown a penchant for big plays, the kind of QB play rarely seen during Majors' tenure (1977-92). Some believe Bray has a chance to be the school's best signal caller since Peyton Manning.

*A look at Channing Tatum's five films in 2012*

If it seems like Channing Tatum is everywhere, it's probably because he is. He's appeared in five films this year alone, with the latest being this weekend's ensemble comedy-drama "10 Years." The roles have come in every imaginable genre, each strikingly different from the last.

And hey, what do you know? Five is a magic number around here. So let's rank Tatum's 2012 performances, in order of preference:

■ "21 Jump Street": Comedy is so underappreciated, and what Tatum does here is especially tough: He plays the straight man opposite a much more established comedian, Jonah Hill. (Who is, come to think of it, also the straight man.) And yet, Tatum also has to let himself get a little goofy and toy with his hunky image as the film itself gets goofy, which he does with great enthusiasm. Satirically inspired by the '80s TV series, "21 Jump Street" features Tatum playing a former jock who returns to high school as an undercover police officer alongside his partner (Hill), the nerd he used to torment way back when. It's rowdy and raunchy but Tatum and Hill share an unexpectedly sweet chemistry.

■ "Magic Mike": The perfect blend of Tatum's muscular good looks, dramatic ability and dance skills. Steven Soderbergh's behind-the-scenes look at the life of a male stripper also happens to be one that's close to Tatum's heart: He worked briefly as an exotic dancer before breaking into acting. Anyone who saw the original "Step Up" from 2006, the movie that put Tatum on the map, knows what a gifted dancer he is. But here, he's just mesmerizing: confident, creative, acrobatic and, above all, seductive. He's just as charismatic offstage, though, as he shows a young Alex Pettyfer the ropes and tries to show Pettyfer's sister he's a good guy after all. Tatum also enjoys a couple of intense showdowns with Matthew McConaughey as the swaggering strip club owner.

■ "The Vow": Tatum shows his romantic leading-man side in this old-fashioned, heart-tugging amnesia story. He stars as Leo, who struggles

to remind his wife, Paige (Rachel McAdams), that they were happily in love after a car accident wipes out the last five years of her memories.

**"21 Jump Street" features Tatum playing a former jock who returns to high school as an undercover police officer alongside his partner (Hill), the nerd he used to torment way back when.**

Tatum is saddled with a whole lot of explanatory voiceover, full of obvious platitudes about life being a series of moments of impact, blah blah blah, but his sense of ache and sorrow is believable. It's a nice idea: experiencing what it's like to fall in love all over again for the first time. Tatum and McAdams sometimes make the execution of it more tolerable than it should be, but not often enough. This movie was hugely popular, grossing nearly \$200 million when it came out back in February. I found it contrived and treacherous because I'm cold and soulless.

■ "Haywire": In Tatum's first pairing with Soderbergh this year, he mainly had to act like MMA superstar Gina Carano wasn't going to beat the complete crap out of him. At least, not immediately. Because she easily could have — and she could have with all her stars, including Michael Fassben-

der and Ewan McGregor — which required her to hold back a little while doing her own stunts here in her feature film debut. At the film's start, a hungover and impatient Tatum meets up with Carano's character, a covert ops specialist, after a mission in Barcelona. He was her partner on the job, and he may or may not be trustworthy. A tense conversation quickly turns into a knock-down, drag-out brawl in a small-town diner.

■ "10 Years": His latest isn't exactly his best. Then again, he's part of a large ensemble that includes larger personalities, including Ari Graynor, Chris Pratt and Anthony Mackie, and his role is comparatively low-key and formulaic. Tatum plays one of several old friends who've gathered for their 10-year high school reunion. He's brought with him his longtime girlfriend (played by his real-life wife and "Step Up" co-star, the equally gorgeous Jenna Dewan). He's also brought along the engagement ring he plans to give her; but he's had trouble finding the right opportunity to pop the question — plus, as we learn in one of the film's many intertwined storylines, he still has some emotional loose ends to tie up with his ex-girlfriend (Rosario Dawson). There's not much to his character — the prom-king-turned-mortgage-broker, he's kind of a dud — but at least he's fun to look at, as always.

## Lead and supporting cast creates classic 1980s feels in 'Arbitrage'

### AP MOVIE REVIEW

Greedy is good, until it isn't anymore, is "Arbitrage," a guilty-pleasure thriller for these tough economic times.

In directing his first feature, writer and documentarian Nicholas Jarecki shows great command of tone — a balance of sex, danger and manipulation with some insiderish business talk and a healthy sprinkling of dark humor to break up the tension. His film is well cast and strongly acted. And while it couldn't be more relevant, it also recalls the decadence of 1980s Wall Street, shot in 35mm as it is, with a synth-heavy score from composer Cliff Martinez (who

wrote similar music for "Drive"). "Arbitrage" is a lurid look at a lavish lifestyle that allows us to cluck disapprovingly while still vicariously enjoying its luxurious trappings.

Richard Gere stars as Robert Miller, a billionaire hedge-fund magnate who, at the film's start, is magnanimously sharing his wisdom in an interview with none other than CNBC's Maria Bartiromo. As he turns 60, Robert would seem to have it all — looks, wealth, a loving family and respect among his peers. And yet he always wants more, and feels emboldened by the different set of rules and morals

that seems to apply in his rarefied world.

So he "borrows" \$417 million from a fellow tycoon to cover a hole in his portfolio and make his company look as stable as possible as it's about to be acquired by a bank. This is otherwise known as fraud. And despite the loyalty and support of his smart, beautiful wife (Susan Sarandon), he has a hot (and hot-headed) French mistress on the side (former Victoria's Secret model Laetitia Casta) who runs in stylish, hard-partying art circles. (That's another '80s throwback: the blasé coke consumption.)

Both these schemes explode in his face over the course of a few fateful days. An audit of his firm has raised some red flags, making the potential buyer turn reluctant and evasive. This prompts the suspicions of his devoted daughter (Brit Marling, every bit Gere's equal), who's also the company's chief financial officer and heir apparent. But more immediately and dramatically, Robert is involved in a deadly accident that puts the police on his tail (Tim Roth plays the lead detective with a wonderfully thick New York accent) and requires him to enlist the help of a kid from Harlem (Nate Parker) who's the son of his late, longtime chauffeur.

## 'Silent House' shocker

Even though it's not quite October, the cool fall air had me craving scary movies. "Silent House," starring Elizabeth Olsen, made a good appetizer to the Halloween season with enough foreboding, suspense and shock to mix up a quiet, refreshingly tense little horror film.

"Silent House" follows Sarah (Elizabeth Olsen), her father (Adam Trese) and uncle (Eric Sheffer Stevens) as they repair their decrepit, old vacation home. If the fact that there's no power in the moldy, rat-infested dump isn't creepy enough, window-smashing squatters frequent the place.

The emotional climate is tense when Sarah's uncle storms out after a brotherly squabble.

Nevertheless, Sarah works to clean the home. Then, Sarah hears an evil-sounding thunk. She calls her father. No answer. Alone, Sarah fumbles around the pitch-black house, desperately holding back screams to avoid murky intruders.

Trese and Stevens flop as Sarah's father and uncle. They are no better than unenthusiastic teens trapped in a school play. Their lines are painfully rehearsed!

Thankfully, Olsen's performance eclipses the robotic duo. First off, Olsen makes herself incredibly likeable as Sarah from the get-go. In tamer sequences, she introduces us to sweet, matter-of-fact mumbler girl.

When things become hostile, I couldn't help but feel anxious for Olsen's character.

Also, I almost felt a little guilty watching "Silent House," because Olsen's terror is so convincing. I admire Olsen for hyperventilating, yawning, weeping, slobbering — pretty much performing every unsightly hysteria — while crinkling her face into a fearful raisin. She really lets herself go.

The real-time camerawork has a haunting quality too. "Silent House" isn't exactly like surveillance film or a home movie, but has a human shakiness to it. The hand-filmed footage has this inhuman capacity to hover in the air, swoop and fly across the floor and burst through nooks and crannies in what looks like one seamless shot. This ethereal motion paired with frenzied jostling and a pulsating depth of field feel like a cinematic out-of-body experience.

Even though we see Sarah throughout the movie, the camera movement externalizes her emotions. For instance, the one moment Sarah escapes, the camera bobbles blurrily above her running feet and the scruffy, flowering weeds. For me, the shot captures an escape's tentative peace.

All in all, "Silent House" is well worth a watch. I give it a B+.

With a running time of 85 minutes, "Silent House" is rated R for violent content and terror. "Silent House" is available for rental at Redbox kiosks.

That's a lot of plates to keep spinning at once; just the financial storyline alone could have sufficed without the affair messing things up further. What's surprising about "Arbitrage" is Jarecki never judges this man for the tricky position he's gotten himself into, and never tries to steer our feelings toward him, either: Gere is so charming, so irresistible when he's on top of the world — when he's got all those plates humming in unison — he kind of makes you root for his character to get away with it all. His smooth, placid demeanor is perfect here, which make the few times he does snap seem that much more startling.

The film's strong women don't quite get enough to do until the third act, when Sarandon and Marling have powerful showdowns with Gere. But the entire supporting cast is well-chosen, down to the actors who appear in just a couple of scenes, like Stuart Margolin as Robert's dryly funny lawyer and Vanity Fair editor Graydon Carter as the head of the bank that's acquiring Robert's company.

Robert may not learn anything by the

end, and teetering on the brink of serious trouble doesn't make him a more decent person; actually, he gets nastier and more demanding as the screws tighten.

As Parker's character puts it: "You think money is gonna fix this?" Robert doesn't miss a beat in responding: "What else is there?"

"Arbitrage," from Lionsgate and Roadside Attractions, is rated R for language, brief violent images and drug use. Running time: 100 minutes. Three stars out of four.
