# POSTOFFICE TO ASK BIDS








# <sup>4</sup> EDITORIAL TAX BURDEN IS FAST BECOMING INTOLERABLE.

The scores of loopholes and tax exemptions that a lot of wealthy people, churches and foundations make use of has bugged a New York man Frederick Walz so that he has done something about it. He is a sort of one-man army fighting such matters which throw an added load onto the poor already overloaded taxpayer.

Walz bought a tiny plot valued at \$100, pays only \$5.24 tax a year. But he filed suit against the NY City Tax Commission, contended that state law exempting church property increased his tax, indirectly forced him to support churches in violation of his constitutional rights to freedom of religion.



He points out that churches benefit three ways: gifts are tax-deductible; they do not have to pay real estate taxes on land used for religious purposes; and, most controversial, they are not required to pay the standard 52% US corporate income tax on any business they own, even if unrelated to religion.

It is estimated that churches run these tax-exempt things as bowling alleys, parking lots, camps, cemeteries and schools, total about \$100 billion! And it rises some \$5.5 billion a year. This is at a time when it is said respect for organized, unionized religion, is declinging, while the need for tax relief is apparent everywhere.

Once again the Supreme Court is going to have to make a memorable decision in the Walz case. At least every little taxpayer will be interested in seeing just how this question is handled.

It is indeed a fine line of decision as to just where religious aid and freedom begins and the load of taxation slips off onto the bending shoulders of the little taxpayer!

Residents of Alpine know that we need lower taxes, but at the same time we do not want to harm our churches, without which, where would the country go in these perilous times? - CI




Betty Brooks is enrolling in Grossmont College for a few night classes, wants to finish, so she can get her degree.




#### 16 EASTERNERS LOVE ALPINE

ALPINE MAGNET FOR ASTRONOMERS






# ARMY HONORS ALPINER'S SON
