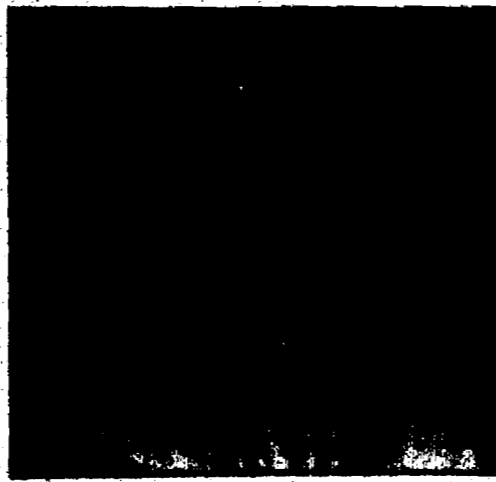

Boy's shooting death mourned

Daniel Carter was a typically playful 8-year-old boy with a quick smile, and he loved school. His accidental shooting by an older friend has prompted his grieving mother to set up a memorial fund to help other students.

Children will play, and when they play with guns, children will die.

That lesson won't save Daniel Carter, 8, who was accidentally shot to death Wednesday while playing with a 10-year-old neighborhood

friend who had been left home alone, with a .22-caliber rifle in the house.

But Daniel's 31-year-old mother, Kelly Titus, is pleading for parents to learn from the nighttime tragedy that occurred at 34238 Dayton Court in Westland, where Daniel had been told not to play.

"Don't leave your babies alone," Titus said, tears rolling down her cheeks as she sat at the kitchen table of her best friend's house. "If you've got to have a gun, lock it up and take the key."

The two boys and a third neighborhood child had been playing with toy guns inside the house when the 10-year-old, whose mother was working, brought out the rifle. Police would only say that the gun belonged to a relative.

"It was a stupid accident," Titus

Board united behind Moore

For the first time in 29 years, a Wayne-Westland school superintendent has been selected unanimously by a school board that has high hopes of ending the divisive politics that tarnished the district's image.

The seven-member board gave sweeping praise to South Lyon schools chief Duane Moore, the lone Wayne-Westland superintendency finalist who stood up under intense scrutiny when local officials visited his district.

"I have not heard one negative thing about Dr. Moore, and that made me feel good," said board member Francis "Bud" Winter, who also surveyed South Lyon coffee shops, golf courses and restaurants to gauge public opinion about Moore, 53.

The board's vote during a special session Thursday evening marked the first time that a Wayne-Westland superintendent had been selected unanimously since 1966, when Harry Howard was appointed, Winter said.

"I'm just really gratified in the confidence that (the board) has shown in the school system and what I might be able to contribute to it," Moore said Friday evening. He said he was "pleasantly surprised" by the 7-0 vote.

"My message was that if I came (to Wayne-Westland), we were all in this together," Moore said. "I'm excited, and I'm looking forward to working in the district."

Rape defendant waives hearing

Rape defendant Anthony Guy Walker had earlier boasted that criminal charges against him would be dropped when he had his moment in court during a preliminary hearing in Westland District Court.

When that moment finally came Thursday, Walker didn't even put up a fight, deciding instead to voluntarily waive his hearing and to be bound over for trial in Detroit Recorder's Court.

Walker, 37, is charged with raping and robbing his 25-year-old next-door neighbor before fleeing to Colorado, where he was captured 20 days later. The woman said Walker attacked her at 2 a.m. Dec. 20 after coming to her

residence on the pretense of borrowing children's Tylenol for one of his two young stepsons.

The incident occurred at Westland Meadows, a mobile home park northeast of Van Born Road and Merri-man.

One week before Thursday's proceedings, Walker had angered 18th District Judge C. Charles Bokos by claiming that he couldn't get along with his court-appointed attorney.

Bokos, saying he didn't want to possibly damage the case, granted Walker's request for a new lawyer.

With a new attorney, Thomas Strauch, at his side Thursday, Walker waived his twice-delayed hearing. The proceeding was initially postponed to give an attorney time to re-

view the case, and then again when Walker sought another lawyer.

"It upsets me that I got brought down here again and again," said Walker's accuser.

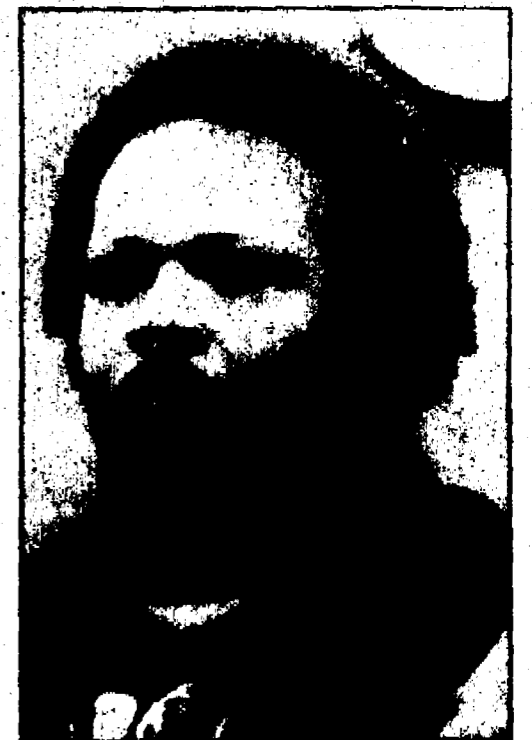
She said she is eager to see justice done.

"I'm going to be there every single step of the way, right in his face, until this is over," she said.

Walker could face life in prison if convicted of first-degree criminal sexual conduct and armed robbery. The woman said he raped and robbed her at knifepoint, taking \$80 from her.

After being captured in Colorado in January, Walker fought being extradited to Michigan, but lost his battle.

Glenn students learn about what it's like to be homeless

A group of John Glenn High School students learned the hard way what a homeless person experiences on a chilly spring night.

Twenty-eight members of the school's National Honor Society slept outside several weeks ago in cardboard boxes and sleeping bags. The only heat came from a fire in an empty 55-gallon drum.

They brought their own food and pillows, but nothing else. No battery-operated radios, TVs or Walkmans.

The chapter used the activity as a fund-raising project.

NHS president Coleen Howell said \$700 was generated through members' pledges with the money donated to the Coalition of Temporary Shelters, a private, non-profit organization which provides support and money for homeless persons and agencies

that serve them. What did the students learn from sleeping in the high school's courtyard for 12 hours on a recent Saturday night and Sunday morning?

"I wouldn't want to be homeless," commented Katherine Longdorf, a Glenn junior.

She noted that a grandfather was homeless for a while as a young man.

Following the recent NHS experience, Katherine said she may work with a friend's church, the Church of God, in Westland, to volunteer in the soup kitchen which serves homeless people.

Lynn LeBlanc, faculty sponsor of the honor chapter and a Glenn English teacher, said that the group was looking for a community service project.

"I saw another group do this (staying out all night to simulate what's like to be homeless) and suggested it to the chapter," Le-

Blanc said. Howell, a senior, planned and organized the event, he said.

She said heard about an identical project done at St. Richard Catholic Church, on Cherry Hill between Wayne Road and Newburgh through a friend who attends that church and took part.

The lesson Howell said she learned that it's hard to be homeless every day.

"We did it for only one night," she emphasized.

Initially, the teacher said he wanted the "sleep-out" to be in the dead of winter but there wasn't time to get it started that quickly.

Actually, the low temperature on the night the Glenn students slept outside was only in the low 30s, without a predicted rain.

LeBlanc feels the chapter will continue the fund-raising project in upcoming years.

Professor's new book describes sports, government connection

Stephen R. Lowe, a college professor in Illinois whose parents live in Westland, has just published a book, "The Kid on the Sandlot: Congress and Professional Sports, 1910-1992."

Lowe, a 1964 graduate of Central Christian School in Plymouth, is the son of the Rev. and Mrs. Stephen Lowe.

The author is a professor at Olivet Nazarene University, in Kankakee, Ill.

His book provides the first comprehensive examination of the relationship between Congress and professional sports, said a spokesman for Popular Press, part of Bowling Green State University, Ohio, which is publishing the book.

Lowe's book is described as an interpretive narrative of Congress' involvement in the professional sports world. Since World War II, Congress has held dozens of investigations and debated hundreds of bills on such subjects as organized baseball's antitrust



exemption — a topic once again arousing heated debate — the National Football League's television blackout policy, the role of organized crime in professional football and basketball, and franchise relocation.

"In every meeting between Congress and professional sports, the public image and tradition of individual sports has been a decisive factor in congressional treatment," said the publisher.

"Thus baseball, a sport surrounded by sentimentality, nos-

talgie, pastoralism, and tradition in American life, has met with kindness and inaction from Congress, while boxing, a sport plagued by rumors of fixes and crime figures, has met with hostility from the national legislature.

"Testimony is included from many sports figures, such as Ty Cobb, Jackie Robinson and Casey Stengel, Muhammad Ali and Sonny Liston, Don King and Rick Barry. Also heard from are such legislators as Jack Kemp of New York, Estes Kefauver of Tennessee, Phillip Hart of Michigan, Sam Ervin of North Carolina, and Howard Metzenbaum of Ohio.

Lowe, who teaches in the college's history department, received his bachelor's degree in 1988 from Olivet Nazarene and his doctorate in 1993 from Ohio University.

Portions of his book were presented as papers to the Popular Culture Association and the North American Society for Sports History.

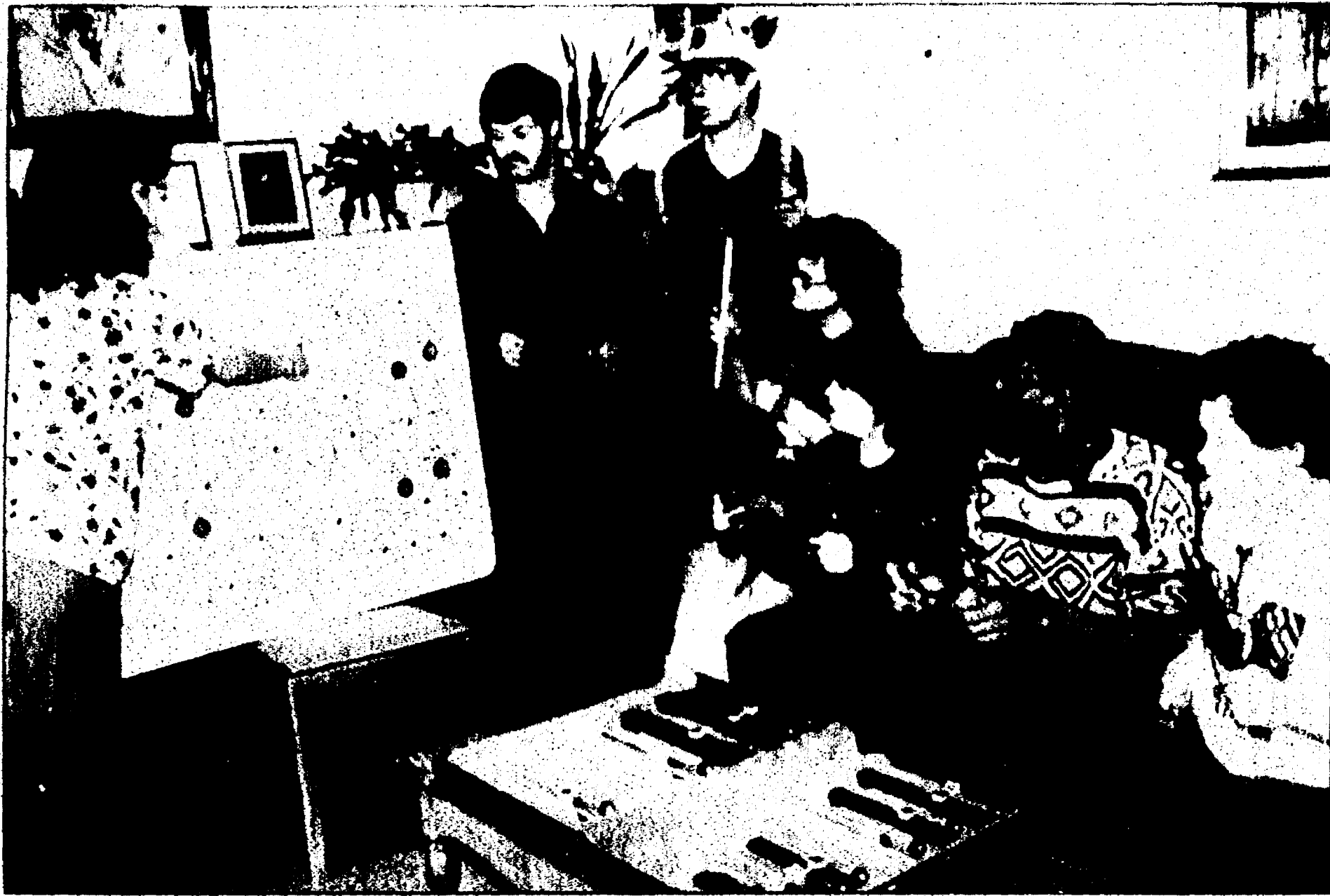

Madonna program puts spotlight on global business

A series of Madonna University seminars that begins Tuesday will have an impact halfway around the globe, organizers hope.

The International Trade Advisor Program consists of three day-long seminars during the next three weeks under the auspices of the School of Business at Madonna.

The Livonia university will bring in experts from government, the corporate world and legal profession to give area companies the in-depth expertise necessary for doing business overseas, particularly expanding Asian markets.

The seminars, scheduled for Tuesday, April 25, May 2 and May 9, are co-sponsored by more than a dozen agencies, including federal and state trade groups and the Livonia Chamber of Commerce.

It's the most comprehensive foreign trade program put together to date by the private, 4,200-student university, said John Cale, associate professor in the business school.

"Our previous programs have focused on the 'how-to' part of doing business in foreign markets. This will offer more information on why you need these skills," Cale said.

Cale expects a broad spectrum of participants — from area auto suppliers, to the Mexican Chamber of Commerce, to Madonna students — at the programs. They may be taken individually or as a package and a certificate of completion or student credit is offered for each.

Dave Joslyn of Air Gage will attend the seminars and speak on international marketing strategies.

The company on Globe in Livonia manufactures dimensional gauges and testing equipment for the auto, medical and computer industries.

"We've had a joint venture in China and we probably ship almost daily to some international destination," Joslyn said. "I need to continue to update myself on

new conditions and developments."

Tuesday's program is on marketing strategies. The May 2 seminar covers international financing and logistics and the final program legal issues.

"The legal area is probably the most complex — and most disconcerting — for American companies seeking to export," Cale said. Much of the world operates under common law rather than the civil system familiar to the U.S.

"Then there are the cultural differences. We just do business differently from most of the world."

For example, Cale said the "take-charge" leadership style lauded in the U.S. would likely backfire in the Far East. Asian countries often take a family or group approach to decision-making, soliciting opinions from everyone at the table before slowly reaching a conclusion, he said.

Cale, 62, is a retired Chrysler Corp. employee, working in the carmaker's International Operations Group. He also runs a consulting company that deals in international issues, mostly for automotive suppliers.

Noting U.S. Commerce Department estimates that some 80,000 American companies would benefit by exporting but choose not to, Cale said reversing the trend will be a key to maintaining a healthy U.S. economy in the 1990s and beyond.

"If we don't get more people involved in exporting products and services we will become less and less competitive in the global marketplace."

The event spotlights talents honed throughout the year in Very Special Arts programs by adults and children with sight, hearing, mobility, emotional and development impairments.

"We're excited," said Peter. "As long as they're willing to come here, we'll have fun enjoying the entertainment. The festival created a lot of excitement and positive comments from customers and tenants. I know I really enjoyed it. There were some awesome acts

involved."

Vocalists, string and brass players, tap dancers and entertainers of all kinds will perform from 10 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. both days. In addition, there will be hands-on art activities and a 60-piece visual art exhibit straight from its month-long showing at Urban park-Detroit Art Center in Greektown's Trapper's Alley.

The Schoolcraft Players, a Redford Township chime group consisting of Peter McGrath, James Jones, Julie Krebaum, Laura Sherman, Margaret "Peggy" Digiovanni and Don Hinsman, will perform "A Whole New World" from Aladdin 10:40 to 11 a.m. Saturday.

It's apparent, the Players are just as excited as Peter and the rest of the tenants at Wonderland Mall about the performance. When asked at a recent rehearsal under the direction of music therapist Katherine Micallef if they were looking forward to their upcoming performance, a chorus of voices sang a resounding yes.

"They enjoy performing in front of people. It's a high energy level when they perform and they like it when people applaud," said Dan Cunningham, the group home's assistant coordinator.

"It gives them a little more self-esteem," added Micallef of Commerce Township.

Residents of one of the Evangelical Community Homes, the Schoolcraft Players work full-time in the community, some at two to three jobs in businesses such as Taco Bell, Pizza Hut and Wonderland Mall.

In the last four years the group's members have increased their attention spans and quickened understanding due to weekly hour-long music sessions with staff from Creative Arts Therapies.

With a chime in each hand, the Players read letters from a chart as they anticipate their parts. The hour-long sessions encourage

group participation and interaction along with skills like letter identification.

Founders hope the festival acts as a catalyst to join disabled and non-disabled people. The event celebrates the power of the arts to triumph over mental and physical challenges.

Very Special Arts, an international organization started by Jean Kennedy Smith in 1974, was founded for children and adults unable to participate in the sports of Special Olympics because of their disabilities.

VSA/MI, the state chapter, supports programs in dance, drama, literary, visual arts and music in schools, therapeutic and nursing centers. It is associated with Special Education Services Michigan Department of Education; and Michigan Council for Arts and Cultural Affairs.

"There are activities for everyone from young to senior citizens.

Change what you eat to feel much better

Twenty-percent of Americans think they have food allergies. Experts say only 2 percent really do. Are the others just confused about what's really wrong? While the experts debate this issue, studies show that eliminating certain foods from diets of hyperactive children calms them down. If you suffer from ulcers, stop eating acidic foods, and you'll feel better.

The most common foods people are allergic to are milk, eggs, soy, strawberries and shell fish. When some people eat these foods their immune system mistakenly identifies the food as a harmful substance, and begins its attack.

The immunoglobulin produced stimulates the production of histamine and other substances, which in turn cause reactions ranging from sneezing and tongue sensitivity to asthma or hives. The worst cases can result in shock.

As for the other 18 percent — those who do not immediately react to food with classic allergy symptoms — experts say they probably suffer from gluten enteropathy (the inability to tolerate gluten in wheat, rye, oat, barley and other grains), or lack sufficient quantities of enzymes needed for digestion.

People who claim to have food allergies, but show no visible immune system response, could be suffering from stress.

Stressful living

Practitioners of environmental medicine blame the very basis of civilization for our modern ills. Our ancestors did not eat the same things every day because they couldn't.

Animal species passed through regions depending on migratory patterns. Flowers and grains bloomed at different times of the year. Problems began when we learned to how to grow and store grain and domesticate animals.

These days, we tend to eat the same foods and types of foods everyday. The result — with no extended break from many foods, we develop sensitivities to the things we eat most often. All this is fine and dandy and somewhat informative, but what can the person who claims to suffer from food allergies do to help alleviate the problems associated with a food allergy?

What to do

The only solution is to stop eating foods that you suspect are making you sick. If symptoms persist there are allergists, clinical ecologists and immunologists. But remember, they differ in their ideologies and methods of treatment.

Before contacting a specialist, keep a detailed food log indicating everything you eat for at least 14 days. Note any specific symptoms or problems that occur when eating the foods.

Should you choose to search out an allergist, ask for a referral from a local medical center or your family physician.

Look for an allergist who specializes in food. Food allergists can identify problem foods through testing, and might possibly prescribe injection therapy thereby allowing some patients to eat their problem food on a rotational basis.

Practitioners of environmental medicine, also known as clinical ecologists, say that ordinary chemicals in our environment make us sick; everyday foods can be toxins and contaminated food can be linked to such diverse conditions as depression, heart disease and arthritis. For a referral, contact a doctor specializing in holistic medicine or talk to the owner of a health food store.

Referrals to an immunologist can be obtained from an allergist.

There are also support groups that meet throughout metropolitan Detroit that offer innovative menus, recipes and a list of practitioners.

Contact your local hospital's director of patient information for a list of contact people. Many hospitals sponsor monthly meetings. Magazines like "Eating Well," and "Prevention," often offer helpful information.

If you think you're suffering from a food allergy, help is available for the asking. Do it today.

Food does wacky things to some people

Going to a professional sporting event seems like a pretty harmless family activity. But for 7-year-old Michael Russell of Plymouth, it can be deadly. Michael's allergy to peanuts is so severe that the dust from the nuts could put him into a severe — and potentially deadly — shock.

"We can't go to Tiger Stadium or Joe Louis Arena where they sell peanuts. (People) throw peanuts at each other and Murphy's Law would say that the peanuts would be thrown at my son," said his mother Anne Russell.

Michael is one of thousands of people who suffer from food allergies, or other diseases where the body mistakes certain foods for foreign particles.

Allergies are different from intolerances, according to Dr. Michael Rowe, an allergist who practices in Novi. Allergies are caused by specific types of antibodies formed against the food, while an intolerance means the body doesn't get along with the food.

"It's not usually associated with life-threatening illness," he said.

Michael Russell doesn't even have to eat peanuts to make him ill.

Smelling or touching them can put him into anaphylactic shock during which his throat or bronchi can swell, or blood pressure may drop. He could also lose consciousness or die. According to the National Institutes of Health, about 60 anaphylactic cases per year end in death.

When her son was an infant, Russell recognized Michael's eczema as a sign that he may have food allergies. So she avoided feeding him the most allergenic foods to children — peanuts and other legumes, chocolate, eggs, milk and soy — until he was 15 months old. (Adults react primarily to shellfish, peanuts, tree nuts such as walnuts, fish and egg.)

Still, the former pediatric nurse at the University of Michigan hospitals, learned the hard way. "I let him have some scrambled eggs and he went into hives about a half hour after he ate them. The same with chocolate milk."

His most severe reaction came about a year later when she gave him his first taste of peanuts.

"At age 3/4, I gave him a lick of peanut butter for the first time and he went into immediate anaphylaxis and nine minutes after he had a lick of peanut butter he was in the

ALTERNATIVE BAKING INGREDIENTS

White Rice Flour: Milled from polished white rice, this has a bland flavor and is often combined with another gluten-free flour. Finely ground white rice flour gives more lift to baked products. 7/8 cup rice flour equals one cup of wheat flour.

Brown Rice Flour: A bran-flavored flour milled from the unpolished rice. It is high in nutrient value and good for baked goods where bran flavor is desired. 7/8 cup brown rice flour equals one cup of wheat flour.

Rice Bran: This is obtained from polishing brown rice and is sometimes added to cookies, muffins and some breads. It rates high in minerals, vitamin B & E, protein, and fiber.

Sweet Rice Flour: Made from "sticky rice," it is a good thickening agent for sauces that are to be refrigerated or frozen because as it inhibits separation of the liquids.

Rice Puff: This is a soft, fluffy, cream-colored flour made from the hulls of brown rice. It causes muffins, breads and cakes to be lighter. Like rice bran, it has a high concentration of minerals and B vitamins.

Potato Starch Flour: A very fine white flour with a bland taste, excellent for baking when combined with other flours. This is also a good thickening agent for cream soups but it must be mixed with water first, and you should use about half the amount you would need of a wheat flour. Potato starch flour produces better baked products than potato flour. 5/8 cup potato starch flour equals one cup of wheat flour.

Potato Flour: This is a heavy flour with a definite potato taste. It can often be replaced with Potato Buds or mashed potatoes.

Tapioca Flour: A very light, white, velvety flour obtained from the cassava root, this gives a bit of "chew" to baked goods such as English muffins, French bread, and pizza crusts.

Soy Flour: A yellow flour having high protein and fat content, this has a nutty flavor. 1/2 cup soy flour plus 1/2 cup potato starch flour, or 1/2 cup soy flour plus 1/2 cup potato starch flour equals one cup of wheat flour.

Cornstarch: A refined starch obtained from corn. It's good for thickening for puddings and fruit sauces.

Corn Flour: A flour milled from corn, this can be blended with cornmeal when making cornbread and corn muffins. 1 cup corn flour equals one cup of wheat flour.

Xanthan Gum: A powder milled from the dried cell coat of a microorganism called *Xanthomonas campestris* grown under laboratory conditions. Baked goods that include xanthan gum hold together better and do not have a grainy texture.

Guar Gum: A powder derived from the seed of the plant *Cyamopsis tetragonolobus*. Be aware, however, that it is sometimes used as a laxative and it can cause distress to some people whose digestive systems are sensitive.

Rhubarb, asparagus delectable springtime treats

Springtime in Michigan always brings some delectable foods and flowers to make your mouth water and add excitement to meals.

Rhubarb is a welcome spring fruit. Botanically, rhubarb is a vegetable but is recognized by most people as a fruit. The spring stalks of rhubarb are the most tender. Pink to red and all shades in between make rhubarb flavorful. Rhubarb's long celery like stalks are edible but the leaves and roots contain oxalic acid which are toxic.

Rhubarb, after picking and left at room temperature will wilt rapidly. Place in a moisture proof container and refrigerate. Rhubarb can be stewed, made into jam or jelly, used in coffee cakes, pies, cobbler, salads, cookies or into sauces for meat or poultry.

Rhubarb is extremely tart so it will need a lot of sugar unless you add another sweet fruit, such as strawberries or pineapple.

One pound of fresh rhubarb makes about two-and-one-half cups sauce or one bunch makes about four-and-one-half cups sauce. Two pounds will make a generous eight- or nine-inch pie. Rhubarb freezes well. Cut up and freeze in a moisture proof freezer container or bag.

Asparagus

Asparagus is another spring-

time delicacy, that is grown in Michigan. Most of the Michigan asparagus produced goes to processors so the fresh supply here is limited or comes from California, or comes from your back yard. Asparagus is a member of the lily family.

Shop for firm, fresh, crisp, bright green stalks. (There is also white asparagus that is picked as the tip breaks the ground.) Most of Michigan asparagus is hand snapped above the ground so it is green. Asparagus tips should be tightly closed, compact and uniform in shape so it all cooks in the same amount of time.

When you get the asparagus home, separate the woody portion from the green stalk. The stalks will break or snap easily just below the most tender part of the stalk. Wash in cool, salt water to remove sand and grit. Pat dry and refrigerate immediately. You can also refrigerate spears upright with stem ends in water. Either way, it should keep a week. When asparagus is kept at room temperature rather than refrigerated, it loses about half the vitamin C within two days.

Cook asparagus quickly, overcooking makes it limp, discolored and bitter. Test the doneness with a kitchen tong, pick up the stalk, if it bends slightly, it's done. Drain and serve hot or plunge into cold water and then refrigerate to serve cold. Avoid heavy cream or butter sauce on asparagus, use instead a light lemon or dill seasoning so you can taste the asparagus. Leftover as-

paragus can be used in a soup. You can eat the stalks raw, but they should be very fresh. Asparagus can be frozen by blanching, then cooling quickly in cold water, draining thoroughly and freezing.

Edible flowers

To decorate the fresh spring dishes, edible flowers can add color, flavor and fragrance. Edible flowers can be used as a garnish or as a salad ingredient. If you are unsure of the safety of a flower or part of the flower, don't use it. Find a complete list of edible and poisonous flowers at the library or from a reputable garden center to make sure what you eat is safe.

Do not pick and serve flowers from a pesticide sprayed backyard or exhaust coated roadside or from a florist. You'll need to get edible flowers from a gourmet shop, a mail order company or your unsprayed garden. Only use clean flowers that you know for sure are edible. Gather edible flowers in the early morning, just after the dew is dried. They can be gently washed and patted dry, and held several hours. Dip in ice water to refresh before using. In a salad, only add edible flowers after all the other ingredients and dressing has been mixed, prior to serving, this keeps them looking fresh.

Some common edible flowers are, daisies, nasturtiums, geraniums, lavender, marigolds, pansies, roses, and violets. Nasturtium blossoms add a peppery flavor to salads and taste like water-

crues. Rose petals are a natural fragrant addition to fruit salad or sandwiches and lavender makes a delicate flavored jelly. Don't forget about the vegetable blossoms such as garden pea and squash, especially zucchini flowers. Some of these blossoms are large enough to stuff with cheese and deep fry, made like this, they are an Italian specialty.

Herb flowers like oregano,

thyme and borage taste just like the herb. But remember, flowers from some herbs can have a laxative effect. Blossoms from apple, peach, plum, orange and lemon trees are fragrant and flavorful. Flower oils and vinegars are easy to prepare and use. Be sure to store them safely so they are flavorful and not moldy.

Flowers can also be crystallized and used as elegant decorations

for desserts and cakes. Edible flowers are indeed beautiful, just make sure you know what you're eating.

Spring gives us new flavors and fresh garden produce that never taste as good as they do in the spring.

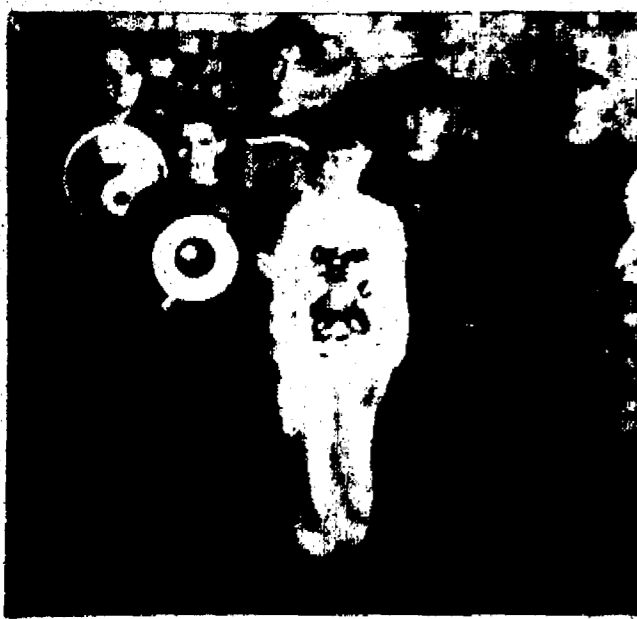

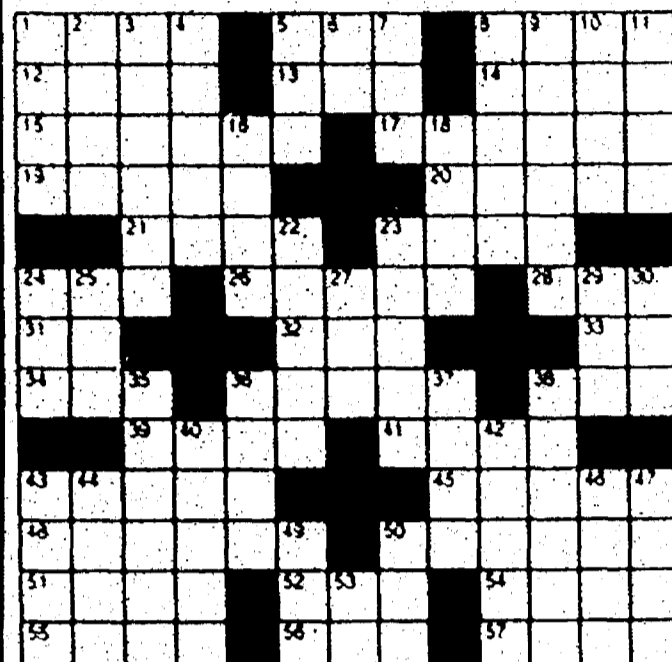

Speedster sets high standards

The Eastern Michigan University men's track program has an impressive lineage.

Olympians such as Hayes Jones, Hasely Crawford and Earl Jones come first to mind.

Carl Lowe is not there yet, but the fifth-year senior from Westland John Glenn has made quite an impact... and the best may yet to come.

Despite injuries and sickness during the early outdoor season, Lowe

has been productive as a middle distance runner.

At the SeaRay Dogwood Relays, April 7-8 at in Knoxville, Tenn., Lowe was a member of two first-place relay teams.

Eastern finished fourth overall in the 50-team field with 27 points. Only Seton Hall (38), North Carolina (34) and Clemson (31) beat out the Eagles.

Relay contributor

In the distance medley, Lowe ran a 400-meter leg, teaming up with Jason Bootroyd, Greg Rhymer and Paul McMullen for a first-place time of 9:45.74. The same foursome also cap-

tured the 3,200 relay (7:29.41).

Individually, Lowe took 10th in the 800 in 1:49.81, but that was well off his personal best of 1:48.91.

"Carl has got a lot of talent, a very talented athlete is the first thing that comes to mind," said EMU head coach Bob Parks, now in his 29th season. "He had to develop a work ethic when he came here. It's still not 100 percent, but it's better than it used to be."

Lowe was Mid-American Conference indoor champion in the 400 and was third outdoors in the MAC. He was also the anchor leg on EMU's first-place 1,600 relay squad (outdoors).

Standout at Ohio

On April 1, Lowe helped EMU win the Ohio University Outdoor Invitational with a first place time of 48.46 in the 400. He also teamed up with Wayne Memorial product James Gra-

dy, one of EMU's top hurdlers, to win the 1,600 relay (3:15.69).

"I want to be MAC champion outdoors in the quarter, I've always seemed to come up short in that event," said Lowe, whose personal best is 47.3. "And in the 800 I'd like to qualify for the NCAA's."

Lowe would need a 1:47.5 to make it in the 800. The NCAA takes only the top 16 by time from across the country.

The former All-Observer standout is overshadowed on the EMU squad by Cadillac's Paul McMullen, the NCAA indoor champ at 800.

At the Dogwood Relays, McMullen ran a 3:39.40, breaking Earl Jones' EMU varsity record of 3:40.64. It was also a Dogwood record and met the NCAA qualifying standard.

According to sources at WSU,

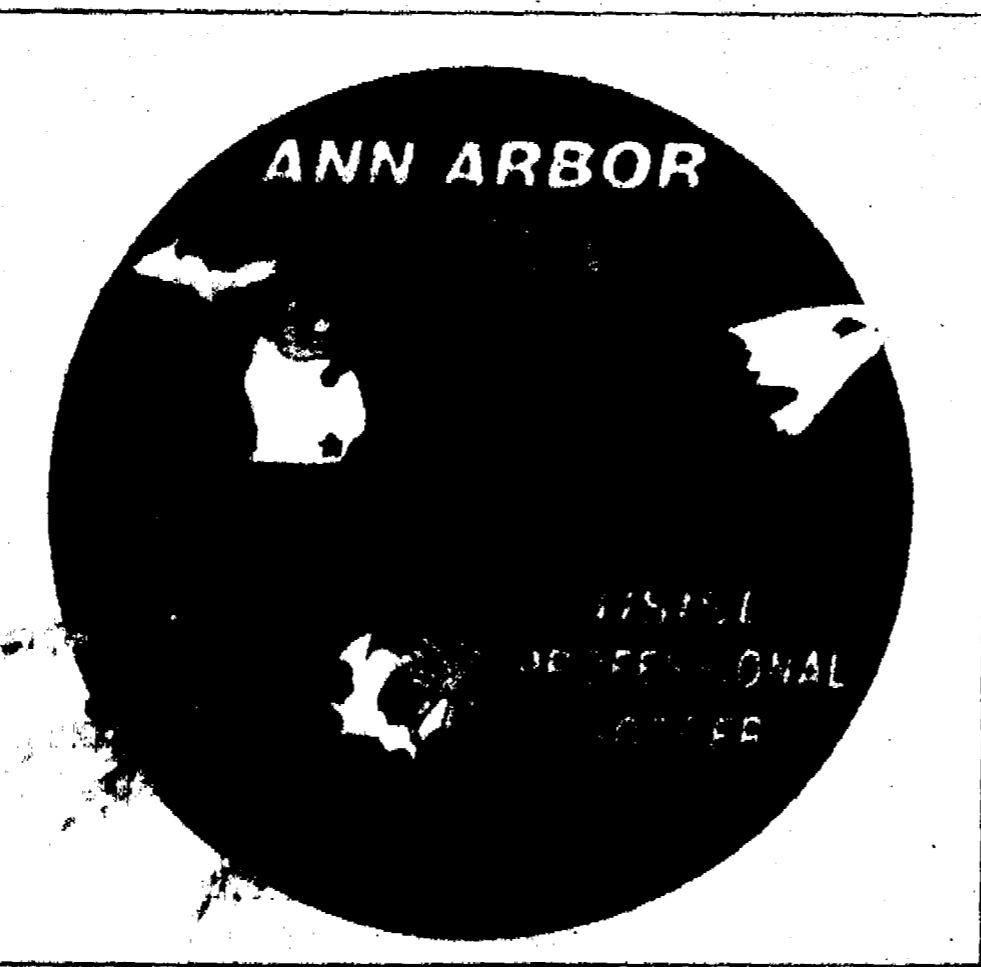

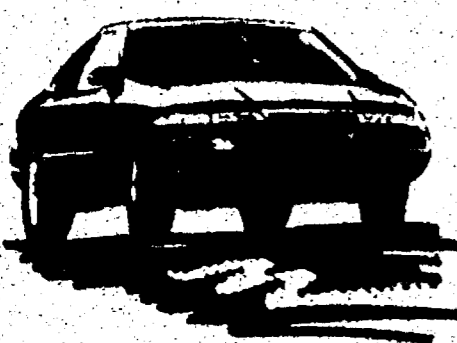

FORD TRUCKS '95 Bronco Turns 30 This Year

Ford trucks have always been on hand for all the dirty jobs, the rough jobs, even the job of taking you to the opera in the evening. For 1995, there's no exception. Ford provides a truck for any situation possible — from people hauler to trailer hauler to hauling butt just for fun.

Still leading the pack in full-size cargo and passenger vans, the Ford Econoline and Club Wagon now have driver's-side air bags as standard equipment and stainless steel exhaust systems. Ford will no longer offer the RV-stripped chassis version of the van.

The best news for Econoline and Club Wagon is the addition of a new 7.3-liter direct injection power stroke turbo diesel engine. It replaces the naturally aspirated engine.

This engine is also available on the F-Series pick-up

trucks for 1995. Other changes on the F-Series include an Eddie Bauer version added to the F-150 regular cab and supercab style-side models, rear jump seats have been dropped as standard on the supercab and the F-Super duty commercial stripped chassis has been discontinued.

Now entering its 30th anniversary gracing

American roads, the Ford Bronco remains the leading nameplate among all sport utilities. For 1995, an XLT sport model has been added, along with cab steps available with the Eddie Bauer version and all paint colors now have 100 percent clearcoat.

The Aerostar, Ford's only rear-wheel-drive minivan, has a number of significant changes this year, including side door intrusion beams added. The Aerostar wagon is available in only one trim model, XLT, and the van is only available as a two-wheel-drive regular length cargo van.

The Windstar, first introduced in March 1994 as a 1995 model, is Ford's first-

ever front-wheel-drive minivan. Windstar has just a few changes, including a 3.0-liter engine that is now standard on the GL and the speed control/tilt steering wheel, which is standard on the LX.

Options added include a trailer towing package, there's now a seat/bed option, interior convenience group (includes a ton of storage bins), fog lamps, load leveling suspension and leather seating surfaces available on the LX version.

Still the best-selling line of compact pickup trucks in the U.S., the Ford Ranger has a host of changes for 1995. Anti-lock brakes, brake/shift interlock with automatic transaxle and a better engine cooling system is now stan-

dard. On the outside, there's a smart new grille in front.

On the inside, Ranger has a new instrument panel, the driver's-side airbag is now standard and there are new seat trims and styles. There's also a new 12-volt power point added to the instrument panel this year to accommodate cellular phones, radar detectors and the like.

Added to Explorer's 1995 lineup is a new two-door model, Expedition, now that Mazda's two-door rebadged Explorer, the Navajo, is dead.

Ford hopes the Expedition, aimed at singles and adventurous outdoor types, will provide a sportier two-door look.

Outfitted with standard dual airbags, adjustable three-point front seat belts, 4-wheel anti-lock disc brakes, a new double wishbone front suspension to replace the old Twin I-Beams, rack-and-pinion steering for car-like handling, a superb new on-demand four-wheel-drive system called Control Trac, a new grille and rear taillamp assembly, it's clear Ford is ready to meet the demands of the 1990s buyers.

With the obvious aerodynamic grille change, Ford should boost appeal to younger buyers who like the Grand Cherokee but have found the old Explorer to be too stodgy and family-like.

The new suspension and rack-and-pinion steering provide a car-like handling experience. Larger knobs on the new dash are easier to use than the old Explorer's knobs. The horn is located in the steering hub, where it should be.
