Grevillea excelsior Flame grevillea, as seen on West Australian wheatbelt roads. It attracts it's fair share of birds, bees and insects. Grevillea maccutcheonii, McCutcheon's Grevillea has flowered profusely this year and seems to have really liked the drier winter and a spring with fewer frosts. It is considered as endangered with only one population of 12 plants around the Busselton area of Western Australia. This makes it more common in gardens than in the wild. Its major threat is that the population exists on a roadside reserve, which, makes it particularly vulnerable.

The Grey Shrike-thrush nests in a hanging basket under the verandah, these chicks have now fledged. Both the parents Grevillea excelsion build and sit on the nest, and the birds are currently Photos: Ian Julian back at the nest.

October Meeting/Expo Report...

Norbert welcomed 17 attendees to our October meeting, including a special welcome to our newest member, Shirley, who joined at our Spring Expo. Norbert went on to explain we would have 2 presentations for the evening: The first, a report on this year's Spring Expo and following on with a slideshow of flora and scenic images taken by Jeanine while touring to WA and back during September 2019.

Before handing the floor over to lan, Norbert mentioned that our Expos are the result of a strong effort from the committee and all the extra volunteers, extending special thanks to Mike Williams who supports our group with a great deal of time, effort, loaned items, knowledge and expertise. This year our floral display contained a significant number of both *Eremophila* and *Grevillea* species, with special thanks for this to Russell Wait, Brian and Lorraine Weir, who put more than substantial effort into bringing in, identifying, naming and setting up these fabulous displays. Norbert went on to say how pleased he is to see our Expos, as they are a chance to showcase the wide range of native plants that can be grown in our region.

On taking the floor Ian began by asking: Was our Expo a success? How do you measure success? It depends on how you measure it. In this year's case it was busy all day, flat out all morning, and with attendees still coming in and making purchases right up to 3pm. Ian's full report follows: **2019 Expo and Sale the biggest and best yet!**

With all the preparation work completed throughout the year by the committee, the hard work for Expo weekend began on Friday afternoon. This included setting up the floral displays from all the specimens collected including 160 different *Grevillea* from Brian and Lorraine Weir. The plant stalls were setup along with the Book stall, the Gardens for Wildlife display, the West Australian diorama, photo display and by 6:30pm we were ready for pizza and a drink. It was an early start Saturday morning at 7:30am for the sellers to set up and be ready to open the doors at 9am. At that time all was pretty quiet in Sydney Street, then one, two, three people entered the door and soon we were flat out with the number of people coming in.

The 2019 Expo and Sale turned out to be the best yet, with 282 attendees keeping everyone busy. The time passed very quickly to midday with little time for rest. Usually the afternoon slows down, but people were still buying at the advertised closing time. The book sales, door prize raffle and refreshments also were a great success. All of the sellers were very happy with the results for the day. With extra hands to pack and clean-up the hall was ready to lock up by five o'clock. Thanks to everybody who helped on the day. Regular members who weren't there due to circumstance where missed.

The Expo is made possible by the grant received from Bendigo Community Bank of \$750. The rest of our evening was spent viewing a small portion of photos that Jeanine took while on a road trip across the Nullarbor and into the south coast area of Western Australia (with husband Mike), where they toured mainly around Esperance, Cape Le Grand, Frank Hann NP, Lake King, Lake Grace, Hyden (Wave Rock), down through the Stirling Ranges to the Porongurup Ranges and travelling back via Albany, part of the south coast to Bremer Bay, and briefly touching on the western edge of Fitzgerald River NP. Chocolate & Vanilla Lilies...

Chocolate and vanilla scented lily flowers are a lovely feature of our bushland during Spring. There are 5 species that may encountered, all share the features of having fibrous roots and a tuber, so they are perennial. All occur as a small tufted plant with fleshy, grass-like leaves that appear in Autumn, flower stalks occur in Spring and the leaves die off over Summer. Some of these species are uncommon or occur outside this region.

Their identification is complicated and has been subject to revision. These plants are now grouped in the Order *Asparagales* and Family *Asparagaceae* but were formerly considered as members of the *Liliaceae*. This reallocation has been based on molecular phylogeny; there are no consistent morphological features in this heterogenous family. However this grouping includes plants with bulbs, corms and tubers and an additional common feature is the presence of a black pigment, phytomelanin, in the seed coat. To complicate identification further, the chocolate and vanilla lilies are generally identified as *Arthropodium* species (based on Latin for joint/small foot) but some botanists identify two species as belonging to the genus *Dichopogon*, a name more favoured in NSW. The differentiation is based on the presence of beard-like attachments on the anthers of these two species. Thus *A. fimbriatum* and *A. strictum* are synonymous with *D. fimbriatus* and *D. strictus*. Other species of *Arthropodium* include the large plants *A. cirratum* the Renga-Renga or NZ Rock Lily; *A. caesioides* and *A. neocaledonicum* from Madagascar and New Caledonia respectively.

The species of *Arthropodium* found in Victoria, as described in the Flora of Melbourne (M. Bull) are:

A. fimbriatum: (name refers to fringing of the petals) the Nodding Chocolate Lily; the unbranched flowering stem has clusters of 1-4 mauve-violet, drooping (nodding) flowers to 3cm width, anthers are purple with purple appendages. Occur in central and western Victoria in drier areas.

A. milleflorum: (literally 1000's of flowers) the Pale Vanilla Lily; clusters of 2-9 pale pink, mauve or white flowers of 20mm width occur on branched stems, anthers are purple, the filament has white then purple hairs near the anther. Favours creek lines in grassy woodland, found in WA and all eastern states, especially the southern tablelands of NSW.

A. minus: (name suggests less or smaller) the Small Vanilla Lily; drooping violet flowers of 10mm width, usually on an unbranched single stem, the filament has white to purple hairs and anthers are green to white. Found in the eastern states and Tasmania; recorded at Werribee and south of Melton.

A. species 3: small chocolate lily of erect appearance, several flowers of 25mm width at each node on a branched flower stem, dark anthers, margin of leaves are fringed. Recognised in limited sites around Melbourne.

A. strictum: (name means compressed) Chocolate Lily, chocolate or caramel smell, erect flowers violet to deep pink, 3cm width, on an unbranched stem, petals have a wavy edge, anthers are purple with bright yellow appendage. Widely distributed around Melbourne.

These lilies may be grown by division of the rhizome or from seed. Collect after the seed capsule has turned a pale straw colour. Leave the capsules to dry before breaking them open. The mature seeds are black, 2-3mm long. Planting should occur in Autumn, seedlings are vulnerable to snail and slug activity and the young flower stalk is attractive to rabbits. In a bush setting, these flowers are a beautiful feature of Springtime, providing a vivid contrast to the yellow and white of other wildflowers. Consider these for garden planting, to create or enhance a bush-like environment, especially along pathways, in tubs or in rockeries. They are extremely resilient and will survive drought.
