Island juvenile arrested as prime suspect in recent auto burglaries

Sanibel police believe they have solved the rash of auto burglaries in the Gulf Drive area following an investigation of a 15-year-old boy who they say "was a suspect from day one," and the recovery of such items as a wheel barrow, a Shop Vac and a case of caulking.

The boy was arrested Thursday evening, Aug. 20, after a call of someone breaking into a vehicle at a West Gulf Drive condominium was made to the department after midnight. When police arrived, they found the boy's bicycle in some nearby bushes and confronted him as to what

he was doing. He replied that he was just out for a ride, but appeared to be hot and sweaty. Upon examination of the car, a broken window was found on the passenger side and footprints were on the back seat. Closer investigation revealed that the footprint matched the tennis shoe the suspect was wearing, and the boy was taken into custody.

After the boy was arrested he admitted to committing five auto burglaries that evening, and as many as 15 others in the past six months, leading police to look into more. Police officials said if the boy was an adult, he

Consultant to report on goal-setting survey

More than 200 people filled in and returned a questionnaire that was sent to Sanibel voters last spring, and this week some of the results of that survey will be made public.

Jim LaRue, of LaRue Planning & Management Services in Fort Myers, will present a report on the questionnaire to the Sanibel Communications Committee, which meets at 9 a.m. Wednesday, Aug. 26, in City Council Chambers at City Hall.

The "proxy questionnaire" was sent to voters so that

those who would not be able to attend the town meeting held June 16 could still provide input to the community goal-setting process. That meeting was the first of a series of town meetings, the next of which will be held in November.

The form included such questions as: What should be the city's primary areas of concern and focus? What issues, projects or programs should the city direct its resources toward (development regulations, traffic, environment, public safety, etc.)? What areas of the Sanibel city gov-

Andrew hits close to home

Islands brushed by killer hurricane

Sanibel and Captiva, like the rest of Lee County, were prepared for the worst Sunday and Monday, Aug. 23 and 24, but fortunately Hurricane Andrew passed by to the south, causing little damage in the area.

Hurricane Andrew barrelled ashore near Miami at about 5 a.m. on Aug. 23, carrying winds of upwards to 145 miles per hour, dumping heavy rains and pushing extra high tides upon the beaches of the Dade County and nearby areas.

The hurricane, called one of the strongest to ever strike the continental U.S. (the storm varied in strength from a Category 3 storm to a Category 4 storm), swept across the state entering the Gulf of Mexico near Everglades City, south of Naples.

At press time, the storm had scooted out into the gulf, moving reportedly in a direction that would make possible landfall again during the week somewhere along the northern gulf coast.





FISH declines Wegryns' offer for use of clinic space as adult day-care center

Not long ago, the islands' Friends In Service Here organization issued a request for a donation of any available office space that could be used as an adult day-care center. FISH sought a location where it could offer temporary relief to the caregivers of those with Alzheimer's and similar afflictions.

FISH's request was met with a quick response from Dr. Stanley Wegryn and his wife, Roz, who volunteered space in their Wegryn Memorial Clinic on Sanibel-Captiva

According to Abe Lerner, president of FISH, "This generosity was gratefully acknowledged and received widespread recognition."

As Lerner last week revealed in a press release, "All things considered, FISH has regretfully decided, without any reflection on the public-spirited generosity of the Wegryns, not to go further with any plans at this loca-

The reason for the decision, Lerner indicated, was that the space offered in the clinic would require too many structural changes to make the space suitable for such a use. Lerner said the clinic space was built in 1974, and to bring it up to acceptable current fire and safety codes would simply cost too much.

Lerner pointed out that FISH volunteers "will continue ... to offer relief to caregivers of Alzheimer's and similarly afflicted persons through personal visitation. It is hoped that an adult day-care center on Sanibel will still become a reality before too long."

The need for a centrally located facility that is accessible for seniors is one that has been expressed and recognized community-wide for several years.

Ever since the land-swap deal between the Sanibel Public Library and the city of Sanibel was reported a few weeks ago, there has been speculation that the library could eventually be used as an island senior center.

The land-swap deal calls for the construction of a new library facility on city ground adjacent to City Hall. In return for the land use, the city will receive the old library building at the intersection of Library Way and Palm Ridge Road. Under the agreement, the library's board of directors has one year to complete the necessary paperwork



SCUBA SCOOP

Diving conditions this week were good. Despite the continued warm water, we have not yet experienced a severe summer algae bloom here in the local gulf. Visibility remains good here although I have heard of some very low visibility in the keys from a severe algae bloom in Florida Bay.

Divers enjoyed seeing a variety of fish life this week, especially some squid sighted on our night dive. Of all of the dives I have done out here in the daytime, I have only seen a squid on one. At night, however, they can be regularly sighted both singly and in groups. I like watching the groups the best. You'll find them all facing exactly the same direction and when they move, they do so in perfect unison. This spontaneous coordination is truly amazing to watch especially when you think how impossible it would be for us humans to do it. The sea and all its diversity never ceases to enthrall me.

The marine fisheries commission is working on a law to prohibit the use of power heads except for personal protection. It will make even possession of a fish killed by a power head illegal, and I for one heartily approve of this legislation. I have done a lot of spearfishing and have never used or even carried one with me. I'll keep you informed as this becomes law.

Snorkeling has been very good. You'll find less visibility when the surf is up some or after those afternoon storms. We'll be watching closely to see what this hurricane does to our conditions.

Concerning the future of the library, Noon said, "We're waiting for the city fathers to give us direction."



Two blazes doused, investigated by Sanibel fire department

About \$10,000 damage was done to facilities at the Sanibel Recreation Center Sunday morning, Aug. 16, after arsonists used toilet paper and paper towels to ignite

The fire-starters are most likely juveniles, according to Sanibel Fire Chief Charles Frederick, who started the blaze about 2:15 a.m. Fifteen minutes later the smell of smoke alerted an on-duty Sanibel police sergeant. When he noticed flames he summoned the fire department.

The wood frame structure, a restroom facility owned by

Lee County, was a total loss, despite efforts to save it. A power box which provided electricity to nearby baseball and softball fields and tennis courts was also burned. A replacement structure was already underway before the blaze broke out.

In an unrelated matter, the Sanibel Fire Department also responded to a fire in a duplex on Cardium Street last week, Monday. Aug. 17. According to Assistant Fire Chief Don Frye, the fire began with an electrical short, but thrived on "poor housekeeping," when it ignited a stack of trash with a spark.

Damage caused by the passing of the storm through South Florida was extensive, especially those areas directly in the hurricane's path. Hardest hit, perhaps, were Dade County on the east coast and Collier County on the west. Those areas felt the brunt of Andrew's wrath. Several people were reportedly killed in the Miami area.

Sanibel and Captiva reportedly escaped serious damage. Strong, steady winds, with powerful periodic gusts, were registered county wide all Monday afternoon. Heavy rains also fell at times.

All afternoon Sunday there was a steady stream of traffic off the islands as residents and visitors sought refuge

Early Monday morning, the Sanibel Police Department had issued the warning that due to the rising winds -- estimated to likely reach 40 mph and above -- the Sanibel Causeway would be closed to traffic by 10 a.m.

The causeway was indeed closed, as were the bridges to Cape Coral and to Estero Island. By mid to late afternoon Monday, however, all the bridges were again open.

Power was out on Sanibel and Captiva for several hours Monday but when the gusting winds died down that afternoon, work crews headed to the islands to restore electrical service.

Throughout the week, Sanibel and county officials are expected to evaluate the storm situation -- evacuation plans, etc., -- and reports of those evaluations and considerations will be reported in next week's Sanibel-Captiva Islander.



Sanibel Island is the home to several champion trees

Most island residents and visitors know that, among many other things, Sanibel is noted for its pristine, natural beauty; its lush, green foliage -- especially its countless trees.

Many might also know that for four straight years, Sanibel has earned the distinction of being a "Tree City USA," an honor bestowed only to those cities that make the special effort to ensure their tree-greenery.

But did you know that Sanibel is also the home to a number of state and national champion trees?

According to Jeff Mangun of the Florida Division of Forestry office in Fort Myers, Sanibel indeed features five trees that have earned state or national notice.

Mangun recently released a list of the trees in Lee County that are current state and national champs, based upon specific height, trunk circumference and canopy spread measurements.

The Sanibel trees that have earned special distinction are a Geiger tree, which measures 25 feet in height, 50 inches around and has a 23-foot canopy; a Jamaican caper (15 feet tall, 25 inches around, 20-foot canopy); a lime prickly-ash (25 feet tall, 16 inches around, 31-foot canopy); a myrsine tree (30 feet tall, 29 inches around and 17-foot canopy); and a Southeastern coralbean (22 feet tall, 38 inches around, 25-foot canopy).

The most recent of the trees to be crowned was the myrsine, which The Islander reported in its Aug. 4, 1992, issue. Currently only four of the trees -- the Geiger tree, the Jamaican caper, the Lime prickly-ash and the Southeastern coralbean -- are both state and national champions. All the necessary paperwork on the myrsine tree, which is located in the wilds of the J.N. "Ding" Darling Refuge, has been sent in and according to Mangun, it too will likely be named a national champ.

In all, Lee County sports 28 state champion trees, seven of which are also national champs.

And there may be more.

18. He went on to say that he has more to measure and more paperwork to file.

According to Mangun's list, the area community champ with the most champion trees is Fort Myers with 19, seven of which can be found on the Edison Home grounds. Cape Coral has one, Estero two and Buck Key one.

To qualify as a state or national champion tree, the tree must: have a main trunk measuring more than 9 1/2 inches in circumference at a spot 4 1/2 feet above the ground; be more than 12 feet tall; and have a definite crown of branches or fronds.

The trees are then judged on a total points system. Those items tabulated include the circumference of the trunk 4 1/2 feet above the ground, the total height and the average crown diameter.

If a tree's total points exceed that of other trees of the same species, it becomes a champion until it dies or becomes displaced by a larger tree.

The Florida Division of Forestry in Tallahassee keeps track of and registers state champion trees, while American Forests in Washington, D.C., registers the national champs.

Southwest Florida has many state and national champion trees, Mangun said, because the trees that are native to our tropic/sub-tropic area grow nowhere else in the U.S.

Any species of tree is eligible to become a Florida champion -- native or exotic. Only native trees, however, are considered for national champion status.



City wants 'true' vegetative recycling

The city of Sanibel continues to prefer having all of its vegetative waste truly recycled, and will put its money where its mouth is when it signs a contract for another year with Forestry Resources Inc. of Fort Myers.

Two companies -- one large, one small -- submitted nearly identical bids to be the company chosen to process the city's horticultural yard waste: Forestry Resources Inc. in Fort Myers, which currently processes the city's vegetative waste, and Waste Management Inc. of Florida, the current operators of the county landfill.

Remarkably, the financial proposal submitted by each company was identical -- \$23 per ton, with an annual adjustment index suitable to both parties (generally based on the Cost of Living Index).

Both companies offered a return of first-run recycled material (the free-for-the-taking mulch pile near the recycling center). Waste Management offered more mulch than Forestry Resources, but Forestry Resources has increased the amount it is offering this year and has added compost as well. Since the city did not even come close to using the amount made available this past year, the actual amount proposed to be returned was not a considered critical.

What became an issue, however, is the quality of the processed material returned to the city.

When presenting Waste Management's proposal to the City Council Aug. 4, Richard Pringle cited his large company's "financial strength" (it currently processes Lee County's and Cape Coral's vegetative waste) and its close proximity of its horticultural processing facility to the county landfill (it is next to it) as examples of the "difference" between Waste Management and Forestry Resources.

Pringle also pointed out that his company would accept a higher concentration of contaminants (non-organic matter) in the loads and would also accept the waste in plastic bags.

Pringle even boasted that Waste Management has never rejected a load of horticultural waste it has received because the load contained too large of a percentage of contaminants, nor has it ever charged for disposal of the contaminants. Rather than reject the loads, Waste Management would simply charge twice the normal fee to cover the cost of manually sorting the material and disposing of it in the landfill.

A plastic bag containing the "clean" first-run material processed by Waste Management was presented to the council and it obviously contained shredded plastics.

Another selling point Pringle cited: his company has the "exclusive ability" to use this first-run material as "cover material" at the landfill, and said Sanibel would receive full recycling credit for all materials used for cover at the landfill.

Unexpectedly, Pringle presented another plastic bag of material to the council. This one contained second-run material that had been double sailed and was more powdery, suitable for use as a soil supply then rather than a mulch. He said, as a "bonus," Waste Management would deliver for free -- 2,500 tons of this second-run material.

Waste Management's big pical vas followed by Forestry Resources' softer sell.

"Bigger is not necessarily better," sad John Cauthain, president of Forestry Resources. He asseed the council that he runs a small but very stable company.

Cauthain said Forestry Resources is the only horticultural waste recycling company that "embraces the true intent of recycling": absolutely nothing is taken to the landfill, that all material received is "100 percent truly recycled."

Cauthain said the two companies are entirely different and clearly emphasized that difference.

Cauthain described Waste Management's recycling efforts as "going through the motions" of collecting "big piles of horticultural waste in plastic bags," grinding it up and then dumping the material in the landfill as cover material


"It isn't the true intent of recycling to end up in the landfill," Cauthain said.

Forestry Resources believes in source separation, he said. In fact, Forestry Resources does not accept non-vegetative debris of any kind. It is the responsibility of Sanibel's hauler, Browning-Ferris Industries, to source separate and deliver only pure horticultural waste to Forestry Resources

"We're not a disposal facility with a recycling machine," said Cauthain.

A plastic bag containing the first-run material from Forestry Resources was submitted to the councilmen, who passed the three sample bags around for comparison.

Assistant City Manager Bill Mills acknowledged that

Waste Management does have better capabilities of handling the non-organics that could wind up in the vegetative waste, but said this had not been a problem during the past fiscal year with Forestry Resources and it is not anticipated to be one in the future.

Councilman Wally Kain said he was amazed that the bids from the two companies were virtually identical, and wondered how that could have happened.

Cauthain commented that he was amazed, too. After the meeting, however, when asked how that had happened, he told **The Islander** that he had correctly guessed that Waste Management would bid the same amount that it charges Cape Coral for the same service, so he submitted Forestry Resources' bid for that amount.

At the Sept. 1 Sanibel City Council meeting, the coun-

cil will consider signing a contract with Forestry Resources. As per the the draft agreement, Forestry Resources will charge BFI a tipping fee of \$23 per ton.

Forestry Resources also will accept vegetative debris from private vegetation companies that operate on Sanibel, and the rates will be comparable.

In addition, Forestry Resources will provide up to 14 cubic yards of mulch or 5 cubic yards of compost for every 8.3 tons of material received. If Sanibel wants the material to be delivered it will be charged \$125 per 100 cubic-yard bulk load to any one location on the island.

The agreement may be renewed annually for up to two years, but the \$23-per-ton tipping fee would be in effect only until Sept. 30, 1993, and would be subject to renegotiation.

Road for new subdivision approved

Residents out Bowman's Beach Road way soon may see a road where there wasn't one before. The Planning Commission at its Aug. 11 meeting gave Sanibel Realty Inc. tentative approval to build a new 1,000-foot-long road and a water line -- the first thing it must have in order to get permission to subdivide and then develop a 5.4-acre parcel of land located southeast of the intersection of Sanibel-Captiva Road and Bowman's Beach Road.

If Sanibel Realty's entire proposal is approved, the road (the entry of which would be on Bowman's Beach Road about half-way between Sea Bell Road and the intersection) will lead to a cluster development of six single-family residences and a common recreational facility, in a minor subdivision named Leisure Acres.

Attorney Tim Murty, representing Sanibel Realty, described the request, which is a three-stage application: the first is for a development permit to construct the road and

water line; the second is for a development permit to subdivide the 5.4-acre parcel into five lots; and the third is for a development permit to construct a unified residential development consisting of six single-family residences, a common on-site recreational facility and wastewater disposal system on a 4.4-acre parcel of land located in the Leisure Acres subdivision.

While the planners were technically considering only the first development permit at this meeting, all three requests were read so that aspects of each could be discussed at this hearing of the development permit for the road and water line.

The proposed subdivision had been submitted to the Planning Department as a minor subdivision in order to allow Sanibel Realty Inc. to install surface water management and wastewater disposal improvements when the lots are developed, rather than prior to when the parcels are

Bells to replace sirens on bridge

The vehicular traffic warning sirens on the Sanibel Bridge will soon be replaced with bells, according Lee County Department of Transportation Director George Crawford.

The change in the warning signal was prompted by complaints to Lee County Commissioner Ray Judah from the manager of the Punta Rassa Condominium Association. The association claimed the warning siren was wailing for prolonged periods at approximately 2 and 6 a.m. night after night, awakening residents.

The sirens only recently became a problem after the death of a former bridge tender, according to Beatrice Diller, the association manager. She informed Judah that the former bridge tender also was a resident of the Punta Rassa Condominium and was "compassionate in his use of the warning siren on the bridge." Diller claims the present bridge tender may be unaware of the "anguish he is

causing residents," when he sounds the siren for an "inordinately long period of time during each use."

The sirens stay on from the time before the traffic gates are lowered until the gates are fully closed. There is no control for this function, so the sirens are automatically on until the gates are down, according to Nancy E. White, program administrator of the DOT. These are the signals that will be replaced by bells.

The horns used for boaters, however, will remain as is because those warning devices are under the jurisdiction of the U.S. Coast Guard. Coast Guard regulations require that a horn must be audible for at least 1/8 mile. The horns are currently located on top of the bridge tender's building, and Crawford says either the horns will be turned or a deflector will be installed to lessen the impact of the sound on the nearby condominium residents.

Crawford expects the new bell warning signal modifications to be complete in early September.

Some of the ideas the city decided to implement in its overall assessment and community goal-setting process were to set community meetings, to send out the proxy questionnaires, to form citizen's focus groups which would report on specific issues to the council, to actively work on problem-solving and to evaluate the results.

LaRue was hired as an "impartial observer" to oversee the process.

The Sanibel Communications Committee also is a result of LaRue's meetings with staff.

It is a large committee, having 23 members, and is just starting the process of assessing the effectiveness of the city's past relations with the public. The report from LaRue, scheduled for Wednesday, Aug. 26, is the beginning of that ongoing assessment.

The public is encouraged to attend the meetings of the Communications Committee, which will be held at 9 a.m. on the second and fourth Wednesday during August. September and October. Starting in November, the committee will meet on the third Wednesday of each month.





A minor subdivision is usually a short-form application for a permit and is handled by the Planning Department staff (not needing to be heard by the Planning Commission). But in order to qualify as a minor subdivision, there must be a pre-existing and maintained road into the subdivision area; hence, the application first for the road and water line.

Murty said the conditions of the staff reports are acceptable, except for the staff's request (pertaining to the application for the subdivision itself) that one of the lots be swapped with other land within the subdivision. He said there is no authority to move lots from one place to another, and that it is unfair and unnecessary that individual land owners would be required to do so.

Murty said the the permitting process with the Department of Environmental Regulation has already been completed, and if such a land swap were required, it would be

ment for the car, Teitelman rummaged through some papers and said he could not find his license, which the officer could clearly see on the passenger's seat.

very expensive in time and money to go through the process all over again.

During public comment, Mary Louise Craig, who lives in Leisure Acres, expressed concern about the impact of the proposed development, regarding the road, the vegetation, the water line, the sewage facilities, the close proximity of her home to it and, especially, the drainage. She said that drainage on her lot has always been good and hoped the development would not negatively affect that.

Arthur Cataldo, who lives in a ground-level home on two lots in Leisure Acres directly abutting two lots in the proposed development, said he hoped the vegetation buffer is huge enough to screen the elevated homes from his view. He also expressed concern about the wastewater treatment, especially because that area is under water from April to October.

Assistant Planning Director Ken Pfalzer said there is no code requirement that vegetation buffers screen one residential use from another residential use. He said wetlands are not conducive for buffers, so neighbors should not hope to see a lot of vegetation.

Commissioner Jim Levy reiterated the fact that the new homes indeed will be seen from the existing residences, because the vegetation is very low, mainly spartina and Brazilian pepper.

Commissioner Bob Davison asked about the odd lot that was referred to in the suggested land swap.

Pfalzer said the lot is located predominantly in the Lowland Wetlands Ecological Zone and does not meet the minimum lot size requirements in the code. There also would be problems constructing a wastewater disposal system because the lot is so wet, Pfalzer said.

Planning Director Bruce Rogers explained that no one can approve the minor subdivision unless there is a pre-

existing and maintained road, and emphasized to Murty that approval of the road doesn't necessarily mean the subdivision would be approved.

The commission voted unanimously to recommend approval of a development permit for the road and water line. The public hearing will remain open until Aug. 25.

No action was taken by the commission regarding the application for a subdivision. If the development permit for the road is approved Aug. 25, then the staff will handle that application in-house.

The public hearing of the development permit for the cluster development was continued for a period not to exceed six months. The hearing will be re-advertised.



Back to the classroom

Area schools make ready for the start of the 1992-93 year

Lee County kids will be trading bicycles for buses and baseballs for books next week as they pack class-rooms to kick off the 1992-93 school year.

Classes for Lee County public schools, and most of the private schools in the area, begin Monday, Aug. 31. According to most school leaders, after the week or so of getting adjusted, it will be business as usual. Students at Cypress Lake Middle School, now a magnet school focusing on creative and expressive arts, will have some new classes with an interesting flair, and the 20 island students who attend Canterbury School will have a new library to mill around in.

Sanibel Elementary School

As always, it will be an exciting year filled with learning and fun at Sanibel Elementary, according to the Maureen Knapp, secretary to principal Barbara Ward. Although the school hopes to have all incoming kindergarten students registered by now, Knapp urges that any students who have not registered do so as soon as possible.

Parents can also enroll their children in an after school program sponsored by the city of Sanibel's Recreation Department. The program begins on Sept. 14 and runs through the end of the year. Students who attend the program must register; forms can be obtained at the recreation office or at the school. For more details, call Janet Ashby at 472-0345.

An open house will be held at the school on Thursday, Aug. 27 at 7 p.m. Everyone is invited to attend. School board candidate Pat Riley will be speaking at the open house.

Knapp also added that several cases of head lice have turned up lately, and that parents should check their children now to prevent it from spreading in school. Checking the children now will also help Knapp, who will not be able to check the children until about the second week of school.

Dress code: Students attending Sanibel Elementary should wear comfortable clothing, and parents should keep in mind that the students in grades 1 through 5 will be participating in physical education classes and should wear comfortable shoes.

Lunch prices: Lunch is \$1.60, and if a student purchases milk alone to go with a sack lunch, the cost is \$.35. Kindergarten and first-grade students are allowed to bring a healthy snack for the morning, and can bring juice with them, or can buy juice for \$.35.

Starting and dismissal: School begins at 8 a.m. and ends at 2 p.m. The first day of classes is Monday, Aug. 31.

Cypress Lake Middle

It will be an exciting year at Cypress Lake Middle School, according to assistant principal Lucy Schonbrun. Since the school has become a magnet school for students in the sixth grade, all students at the school will be exposed to creative and expressive arts such as dance, music and drama.

Cypress Lake Middle School operates on a "Team System," Schonbrun explained. This helps incoming students who are in middle school for the first time feel more comfortable. About 120 pupils are on one team, and they all have the same group of four teachers for math, social studies, science and English. This allows teachers to bond with the students, and to work together to coordinate lessons and not to waste time by duplicating the learning process.

Middle school presents a big change for students coming in from elementary school, but Schonbrun said everyone at Cypress Lake Middle works to make it easy.

"The students can expect a big change, and we expect them to come to school willing to learn. It will be fun, but it will be a lot of work. We ask that they just come and try to feel comfortable, not nervous. There are more than 400 sixth graders coming and there are

new students coming and going all the time. By then end of the first week, everyone will be all settled in," she said.

The school will be having an orientation on Thursday, Aug. 27 at 10 a.m. Parents and students are invited to attend to tour the school and meet with teachers

Dress code: Hats are not to be worn or carried at Cypress Lake Middle School at any time. Clothes must be free of suggestive or inflammatory messages, art work or advertisements. No T-shirts promoting beer or tobacco are permitted. Shorts must have hems, and shorts and skirts must reach the ends of the fingertips when the arms are extended at the sides. No cut-offs are permitted. Shirts and blouses must be buttoned and must be long enough to tuck in. The following items are not permitted: sun glasses; tank tops; muscle shirts; halter tops; see-thru shirts or shorts; hair rollers; hair paint; backless, strapless and sundresses; midriff shirts or blouses; unbuckled suspenders or belts; Spandex; bike pants; and intentionally ripped or altered clothing.

Lunch prices: \$1.85 per day for hot lunch or deli sandwich.

Starting and dismissal: School starts at 9:30 a.m. and ends at 3:30 p.m. School begins on Monday, Aug. 31.

Cypress Lake High School

High school students can sleep in a little longer this year as the school starting time at Cypress Lake High School has been changed from 7:20 a.m. to 7:30 a.m. School officials have switched from a seven-period day to a six-period day, according to Assistant Principal for Administration Jacki Gruhn.

Gruhn advises that any students who are interested in playing on one of the school's sports teams -- swimming, football, basketball and more -- get in contact with the appropriate coach.

A new student orientation will be held at the school on Thursday, Aug. 27, at 7 p.m. in the auditorium for parents, students and new students of any age. Gruhn also added that anytime anyone has any questions, they may feel free to call the school.

Dress code: Hats are not to be worn at Cypress Lake High School. Footwear must be worn at all times; hair, mustaches and beards must be neat, clean and trimmed at all times. Shorts are allowed so long as they reach the bottom of the fingertips when arms are extended to the sides. No mini-skirts, midriff shirts or blouses, unbuttoned or ill-fitting clothing, tank tops, running shorts, gym shorts or clothing worn inside-out are allowed.

Lunch prices: A standard lunch is \$1.85 per day.

Starting and dismissal: School begins at 7:30 a.m. and ends at 2 p.m. School begins on Monday, Aug. 31.

Bishop Verot High School


Students at Bishop Verot High School will take a step into the computer age when they return to classes this fall. The school was able to open a new computer lab with 25 units thanks to a grant from the Southwest Florida Community Foundation, according to Father Christopher Hudgin, principal of Bishop Verot.

About 520 students have registered with the school so far, which is up about 60 individuals from the previous year.

Students will not be allowed to ride on the bus system that serves the Lee County Public Schools this year, so car pools are forming. Call the school to find out about a car pool in your area.

wear a dress shirt or blouse, slacks, skirts, dresses or culottes and dress shoes.

Lunch prices: Father Hudgin said an average lunch costs \$3 to \$3.50 per day.

Starting and dismissal: Students taking seven classes must report to class at 7:30 p.m. Students taking six classes are to be at school by 8:20 a.m. Students are dismissed at 2:45 p.m.

Canterbury School

The Canterbury School is a private school that accepts children from age 3 and takes them through high school graduation. About 20 Sanibel students attend classes at the Fort Myers school.

According to Headmaster Frank Romano, the school is in the process of renovating its library. Although it is a two-year project, the majority of the work is now complete and students will be able to utilize it this year. Last year the school boasted an SAT average of 1120 and 100 percent of the graduates went on to college, Romano said.

No bus service is provided to the school, but some Sanibel parents have contacted a private contractor to transport students to the school. Any interested parents can call the school to get details.

Dress code: Canterbury School does not require uniforms, but does demand that students be neat and clean at all times. No blue jeans are allowed, neither are short-shorts, message T-shirts or midriff shirts for girls. Every Tuesday is "dress-up day," when male students are required to wear shoes, socks, slacks and a collared shirt, which can be a golf shirt, and girls must wear slacks or skirts or dresses. No shorts are allowed on Tuesday.

Lunch prices: For children in grades 4 and lower, lunch is \$2.05 per day, and students in grade 5 and up will pay \$2.30 per day.

Starting and dismissal: Classes start at 8:30 a.m. The

lower grades are released at 2:40 p.m., upper grades are released at 3:15 p.m. Students in the lower grades are not permitted to get into any vehicle without the teacher's recognition of the driver. If the teacher cannot identify the driver, the student will not be allowed to

go. In the event of a car pool, teachers must be given a list of who drives on what day, and if any change is made, a telephone call must be made to the school and a note must be sent with the student. School begins on Monday, Aug. 31.

The octopus: an unusual member of the mollusk family

I've found that shell collectors on my trips are afraid of these shy creatures, mostly from all those cheap underwater movies where a giant man-eating octopus wrestles down a diver and devours him.

In real life these nocturnal sea animals are using those eight legs and center beak to prowl over rocky ledges in search for food.

Octopuses are one of just a few soft bodies mollusks or invertebrates which don't have a shell. Only one of its distant cousins, the nautilus, has a real shell -- which collectors from around the world cherish.

The first octopus I ever saw was while snorkeling off Boca Raton, way back when during my college years. Another diver and I were looking for lobster when we came up over a rocky ridge and there on the bottom was an octopus I guessed was about three feet long.

It had pulled itself up on the legs and was looking like a giant mushroom. We did some serious swimming backwards and watched as it lowered itself back down and then moved off to the protection of other rocks.

The octopus we accidently find in larger shells hardly ever reach over six inches or so in length. The smallest of the family, around the world, are two inches long at adulthood.

However, there is a Pacific Ocean variety which is said to measure over 32 feet from arm tip to arm tip.

Last winter we were fascinated by the discovery of a

small, sand-colored octopus one of my shellers picked it up. These must of been the inspiration for Chinese handcuffs because once we got to handling it, we literally couldn't put it down.

The suction cups on the underside of the eight legs kept wrapping around our hands and fingers and holding on. Should you find one, it might take a second person to get it off of you, if your intention is to release it back into the water. They seem to have a rather long life out of water, probably several hours or so.

Sea birds and raccoons are always looking for tender things to eat and a stranded octopus is a delicacy to them.

It does have what is described as a beak on the underside of its head. Some of the larger octopus could bite a handler, but of the small ones I've found, there has never been any problem like that.

As a kid, I remember watching the movie 10,000 Leagues Under The Sea and seeing your basic giant bad sea creature catch a submarine. That's when I decided to

stick to shallow-water boating.

I can't recall what they called it in the movie, but I suspect it was a giant squid rather than an octopus.

Squids are rather similar to the octopus, but are much more prevalent and better eating, too.

The squid is the racing model of the shell-less mollusks. They can move at about 15 miles per hour, for short distances.

Squid can appear by the thousands in schools and all over the world, squid are prime meals of everything from whales to crabs.

There is some reference to a really giant squid which had a 50-foot length. It's favorite food was sperm whales. Maybe one that size mistook a submarine for a whale?

Many oriental cultures think that both squid and octopus are some of the finest eating sea life in the world. There are dozens of ways to prepare squid.

I buy frozen squid to use as off-shore snapper and grouper bait and small cuts of the meat make some of the best bait for baitfish.

If you ever do find a large shell washed upon the beach and it starts to move when you handle it, chances are you've also found a frightened little octopus inside.



You definitely can't go home again

Islander returns to Estonia and finds a changed land

You can, but be prepared for the many changes that time has wrought. Nothing will be exactly as you remembered it. Usually it is a time of disillusionment. What should be a joyous occasion is clouded by the ravages of time. Each emotion seems to be determined by the effects of that dratted word "progress" or the state of disrepair.

Those were a few of the feelings experienced recently by an Estonian mother, Amanda Hopp, and her Sanibel island daughter, Marika Luthringer. This summer they returned to Estonia, their Baltic homeland.

Estonia? It has the ring of one of those magical, musical countries that might be the locale of a Franz Lehar or Sigmund Romberg's operetta. Is it a land of proper ladies and cavalier gentlemen proclaiming love of each other and their homeland? Yes.

Do carefree peasants join in the singing and dancing? Yes, whenever possible.

Is there wine, good food and a storybook lifestyle? No. The answers are those of Marika.

Her story begins with the Hopp family and their comfortable existence in Estonia. They were a family of four: father, mother, daughter and son (Erwin).

In 1937, Marika was born in Tartu, the only Estonian city with a university. The country's economy and lifestyle were good. Father's leather factory was doing well, mother's life was filled with child-rearing and social

Marika said, "Then as now, the Estonian people love to sing and dance. There were always summer songfests in the parks and folk dancing in every part of the small country.'

A bit of background of the country seems imperative for the understanding of her family's upheaval.

Estonia is a Baltic country about the size of Rhode Island. The capital city Tallinn, boasts of some 300,000 citizens. It is located approximately 40 miles south of Helsinki, across the Baltic Sea. Tallinn was established in the 14th century and is one of those old, walled cities -- a harbor and busy port.

Estonia was a independent democratic state from 1918 to 1944. There was an elected president and a parliament with ministers from the various small counties in Estonia.

Suddenly, Europe exploded with Germans led by Adolf Hitler marching through the Polish Corridor and directly across the Baltic countries. The Russians counterattacked and soon Estonia found itself under the rule of Communism. This was directly opposed to the way the Hopp family thought and operated. It became imperative that they leave the country as soon as possible.

It was difficult, but the family's escape route took them from the Baltic Sea to Gdansk, Poland. They fled west through Poland by train, truck, any mode of travel possible. The living was hand-to-mouth and any place a bed of straw was available was home to the Hopp family.

The end of World War II in 1945 found them in Germany on the Elbe River. The Allied Forces divided Germany into areas to be run by the armies of England, America and Russia.

The Hopps were placed in an American Displaced Person Camp and provided with food and shelter -- such as it was. This particular DP camp was peopled with citizens from the Baltic countries.

The rumor was spread the the K rians were taking over this particular sector and it became increasingly apparent that an immediate move was necessar. A return to the Russian sector would mean death for many, including the Hopp family.

After much clever conning, an American Army convoy of 26 trucks took all those who could squeeze in, to a new DP camp run by the British located near Hamburg

It was here that Marika and her brother actually grew up. They went to school in Germany and were given a fine education. The constant hope and dream of the family was to come to America -- the promised land.

The requirements for a visa to the U.S. were strict and unbendable. One must be in perfect health, have a sponsor and wait for a place to open on the quota list. After many disappointments, that day of departure arrived. The Hopp family came to the U.S. under the sponsorship of the Baptist Church and settled in Oklahoma City.

"To say that a bit of adjustment was necessary would be the understatement of the year," Marika said. "We had exactly \$150 in our pockets to sustain us in this brave new world where the streets were supposedly paved with gold."

Determination and drive made for a scholarship for Marika at the University of Oklahoma in Norman and a degree in languages.

The Oklahoma climate was much too hot for this Baltic family. Mother Amanda had a friend in Buffalo with whom she had kept in contact. The next move seemed inevitable -- to the cold climes of Buffalo, N.Y., the snow capital of the northeast.

Here Marika met and married Paul Luthringer and birthed and raised a family of three: two sons, Paul Jr. and Enn, and a daughter (deceased).

Next, a move to Sanibel Island and the establishment of a travel agency. The Luthringers carry heavy island profiles. Marika is owner of Island Park Travel Agency and active in many of the island's professional women's organizations. Paul Sr. is director of Universal Travel Institute. Paul Jr. is director of Media Relations at the White House. Enn is a land planner and engineer in Naples.

Mother Amanda expressed a constant desire to return to Estonia. Son Erwin was sent to the homeland on a special mission for the U.S. government in May of this year, so Marika felt that it was time for her to take her mother home again.

Erwin's special mission for the State Department is as director of the International Executive Service Corps of Estonia. He is directly responsible to the American embassy, and is there to try to indoctrinate Estonians in the fine art of free enterprise. This art had been completely lost during the communist reign.

For Mother Amanda nothing was the same. From beginning to end the entire trip was a disappointment for her. She did get to see her mother's grave, visited cousins, showed her daughter Marika the house in which she was born, looked at the ruins of the family's leather factory and many other places, persons and things. But, all had been affected by that shattering foe, Father Time. She wanted to be back in Buffalo.

Of course, Marika noticed little change as she had remembered little from her childhood.

Marika summed it up, "The Estonians are fierce fighters, directly descended from the Vikings. They have just begun to re-establish Estonia as a democratic country. They are the first Baltic Country to issue their own currency and are very proud of that accomplishment. Some feel they were much better off under the rule of Mother Russia, others are overjoyed at the freedom -- despite the hardships.'

She thought a minute and continued, "They are so

naive. They know so very little about free enterprise and the ways of business in a free country."

While Marika was in Estonia with her mother, her brother Erwin arranged a meeting with the lady whose title is minister of tourism.

She said, "I talked with her for hours in Estonian which I still speak fluently. I had my brains thoroughly picked. The one miracle that I related to her was the possibility of a bed tax for tourists. She has invited me back as guest of the government of Estonia for a month to help organize tourism as a source of income.

"One thing is certain," she continued. "My mother will not want to return with me. She is quite happy back in

The invitation to return to Estonia was for the month of November, Marika told the minister of tourism, "I don't know about that. I no longer have any winter clothes."

Her reply, "Never mind. You can buy a sable."



It's a hassle to untangle one blocked suit; today's South had to cope with two.

South took the third heart with dummy's ace and

planned to enter his hand with a spade to try a club finesse. Since the spades would be tangled if South led dummy's low spade first, he got the queen of spades out of the way before taking the A-K-J.

South next led the 10 of clubs for a finesse; and East played low without tell-tale hesitation. When declared then led a club to dummy's jack, East won and led a diamond.

In the way

Now dummy's ace of clubs was in the way (it takes two suits to tangle totally), and South couldn't get his nine winners. He had to try the diamond finesse, whereupon West won and cashed his hearts.

South untangles himself by taking only two high spades before finessing in clubs. If East wins the second club and leads a diamond, South can win with the ace and cash a spade to discard the ace of clubs. His Q-9 of clubs and last spade give him nine tricks.

Weekly question



Alligators: Sanibel's national reptile

I never tire of writing about alligators because they seem to be the main topic of conversation in Sanibel.

They enliven beach, restaurant and cocktail party chatter. They make for lively if not disconcerting reading in the news columns of The Islander and other publications. Alligators bring out the jungle in us and make us forget the cold, lonely winters in Minnesota or Iowa.

Alligators come with the territory. If you're committed to Sanibel, like I am, you have to come prepared to talk or think about alligators some part of every day and come to terms with them.

For example, my wife and I were taking a stroll on the beach recently when she stopped suddenly. "Isn't that an alligator over there?" she asked pointing animatedly. She was eyeing something about a hundred yards down the beach while balancing herself on the balls of her feet as though she were ready to run the hundred yard dash in world record time.

My eyesight is fairly normal but I had to squint hard to see what she was pointing at. It looked like a dead log to me, not a live alligator -- and I told her

"No," she insisted. "That's an alligator. Look at those mean eyes. You'd better call the police. Hurry."

I took a few steps closer to get a better look and my wife screamed at me. "Are you crazy? Do you want to get your toes bitten off? Call the police or else that alligator's going to eat us all."

I tiptoed closer to get yet an even better look while my wife screamed something about it's a good thing I had made up my will recently. Sure enough, it was a dead log. I poked it just to be sure.

"See? It's not an alligator. It's a piece of wood. You're like the boy who cried wolf. You could have panicked half the beach, " I said.

My wife was not to be denied. "Well it could have been an alligator. And if it were, don't you think you were a little too blase about the whole thing? From where I first spotted it, you couldn't really tell if it was or wasn't. Better to be safe than sorry."

I couldn't win. If it was an alligator, I didn't take it seriously enough. And if it wasn't an alligator -- get the drift of my meaning?

But put my wife in another setting and a whole different set of dynamics takes place. Put her in the "Ding" Darling Wildlife Refuge and you'd find her whistling a different tune.

"We've been walking for a half hour and I haven't seen a single alligator. What kind of wildlife preserve is this anyway"? she complained.

"But dear," I tried to explain, "alligators don't walk around with signs around their necks saying, 'Here I am, pet me and play with me.' They're wary of people as well they should be. Besides I thought you're afraid of alligators."

Her explanation seemed perfectly plausible to me. "On the beach I am. Here I'm not. This is where they live."

Go try to figure that one out.

Government, citizens talking together

Eleven "Charter Reform" amendments that might have drastically changed Sanibel city government were tested at the polls in March. They were soundly defeated but a point was made: Many island voters want a greater voice in city government. Sanibel set about to improve communications between its citizens and government.

Our city government is already exceptionally open. All City Council and Planning Commission meetings are advertised, agendas are published, meetings are open and well attended. At every meeting the public is invited to speak on any subject not on the agenda and to input to any item that is. Press coverage by two newspapers is extensive. This openness is unusual and much more than the law requires.

Hundreds of volunteers participate in city committees in areas from bond issues, bridges, and charter amendments to historical preservation, marine environment, vegetation and wildlife. Committee meetings are open and minutes kept.

The public is welcome and streams into City Hall to confer with, lobby and beat on the councilmen, city manager, city attorney, department heads and others, and to do routine business. Phones ring constantly and mail pours in with suggestions, questions and complaints. It is firm policy that these communications not be ignored.

There are town meetings and frequent participation in island gatherings by people in city government.

The city publishes a quarterly news letter which is also used to gather public opinion about such matters as waste collection preferences. A few years ago the city plumbed public opinion with a general opinion poll. The list goes on ...

Can these communications be improved? Energetic efforts are being made. The mayor's goal-setting questionnaire to islanders produced a useful picture: Taxation, speed control, bicycle and moped regulation, signs, unfair assessments and governmental efficiency are heavy on the public mind. An open, professionally-moderated, goal-setting meeting was held and more meetings are planned in the fall. Out of these might come consensus on objectives and priorities for city government.

The "Coffee with a Councilman" program of informal, small, round table discussions with individual councilmen, was kicked off. Every councilman has reported favorably on this experience

and feedback from participants has been positive. Strong early attendance tapered off to small groups of largely repeat attendees. The program has been discontinued until the fall.

A citizen's communication committee of some 23 community leaders has been formed. It has a general mission to help improve government-public communications. Among other things it will look at communications processes and assist in crystalizing issues of public concern. On the process side it may consider such ideas as stimulating participation in the "Coffee with" program, televising council meetings and improved newsletter opinion gathering.

Will these measures give some new sense of empowerment to citizens who want greater voice? Perhaps so.

But I doubt that citizens disappointed with governmental action will ever feel that government is listening and responding to them. Some essential governmental activities like taxation are inherently suspect and unpopular; some of our citizens are disappointed with every action of government, popular or not. And I doubt that ours or any other government can fully satisfy the public's desire for information about governmental issues and actions. But the process of trying has great value -- perhaps greater than the information imparted through new channels -- because it stimulates individual citizen interest in local government.

The interested citizen, determined to keep informed, who votes with a greater sense of knowledge and participation -- even faith -- in representative government is, I am certain, the best answer to the question.

Tomato soup with a dill kicker and Chinese-style baked fish

Today's soup will be a different type of tomato soup. The "kicker" is lots of fresh dill. The first night, serve it hot and the next cold, either way is great. Go to Mitch's vegetable stand on the corner of McGregor Boulevard and John Morris Road and pick out his fresh, beautiful, non-Styrofoam tomatoes.

Follow the soup with a baked fish done in the Chinese manner. It's unusual and very simple. Buy a firm-fleshed white fish such as black-tipped shark or grouper. The trick is you do not over marinate it as the marinade acts somewhat like seviche, which tends to "cook" the fish if left too long.

For dessert? What could be better than some of Mitch's non-plastic-wrapped strawberries. You can see exactly what you are buying as they are not swathed in plastic. You may pay a bit more than you would at a supermarket but it is worth it. Skimp on something else, not food. Always buy the freshest and the best.

Dilled Tomato Soup

- l cup onion, diced
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 4 cups tomatoes, cored, peeled and diced
- 2 cups chicken stock
- 1/3 cup fresh dill, minced
- 1/2 teaspoon sugar
- Salt and pepper
- 1 cup sour cream

In a large heavy pan with a tight fitting lid, melt the butter over medium heat, add the onion, cover and let the onion "sweat" for 15 minutes. Do not let it brown. Remove the lid and add the tomatoes, cook 15 minutes over medium heat. Puree in batches in the blender, pour



back in pan and add the stock, dill, sugar, salt and pepper. Bring to a boil, turn to simmer, cover and cook 15 minutes. Remove from the stove and whisk in the sour

When you serve it the next day do not try to reheat, serve it cold or place it in a double boiler and warm over simmering water, but watch it. This will serve 6.

Baked Fish Chinese Style

- 2 pounds fresh shark or grouper 1 tablespoon fresh ginger root, grated
- tablespoons soy sauce
- tablespoons honey
- tablespoons rice wine
- 2 teaspoons sesame oil

In a glass or ceramic bowl whisk the ginger, soy, honey, wine and sesame oil. Place the fish in the bowl and turn so it is well coated. Cover and refrigerate 2 hours, turning it at least twice. Take cover off and bake for 25 minutes in a 350 degree oven. The baking time is according to the thickness of the fish. Baste at least once during the cooking period. This serves 4.

The following dessert is a real old-fashioned one, the trick is perfect strawberries.

Victorian Strawberry Sweet

- 1 cup claret or port
- 1/3 cup confectionery sugar
- 1 stick of cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoons plain gelatin 1 tablespoon claret or port
- 2 cups strawberries, washed, hulled and cut in half

1 cup heavy cream, whipped

In a small sauce pan combine the one cup of wine, sugar and cinnamon. Cook over low heat for 5 minutes or until sugar is dissolved. In a cup place one tablespoon of the wine and sprinkle the gelatin over it. Stir and let sit 5 minutes. Whisk this mix into the other and cook over low heat for about 3 minutes. Remove the cinnamon stick. Place the strawberries in a serving bowl and pour the liquid over them. Refrigerate for 3 hours. When ready to serve, pipe the heavy cream on top and serve immediately. This serves 4.
