Recession, tight monetary policy drives economic forecast for 2023

As the overall economy shakes off the effects of the Covid-19 pandemic, economists and commodity experts were cautiously optimistic for the year in their reports during the University of Georgia's annual Ag Forecast held in Tifton on Jan. 27.

Nick Place, dean of UGA's College of Agricultural and Environmental Sciences, opened the meeting, noting the school's efforts to help farmers in research and education.

He touted the university's new Institute for Integrated Precision Agriculture. The institute opened last year, and its work will involve precision agriculture research and the development of new technologies to improve crop and livestock yields.

"The significance of that is it brings together not only our college but a number of other colleges across the whole of the University of Georgia (system), which is pretty darn cool," Place said. "It brings together engineering, veterinary medicine, forestry sciences to really push this forward so that we can really put a flag in the ground related to the innovative technology in support of agriculture."

Place also reported that CAES currently has about 1,500 undergraduate students and 700 graduate students and will work to increase enrollment by 2,000 and 1,000, respectively, in the next 5-6 years.

Board, provided the keynote address, overviewing what occurred in 2022 and providing some of his thoughts for the coming year.

With a presentation slide, Chambers showed a list of words and phrases that he said many in the audience may have seen in

media reporting on the macro, or worldwide, economy. They included "U.S. and Global Inflation," "Ukraine-Russia conflict," "Energy Prices," and others.

Chambers used the illustration to make the point that a lot of factors are going into how the economy will work this year, and while things appear to trend for the better recently, there is still a lot of uncertainty.

"The economy was very pessimistic earlier in (2022), but that pessimism seemed to peak, I would say, around October," Chambers said. "I don't know if I can say we are optimistic now, but we are certainly less pessimistic."

Among factors that have an effect on agriculture, Chambers said he could be optimistic about a drop in worldwide oil prices and natural gas. Both oil and natural gas spiked upward at the start of the war in Ukraine last year. Since then, prices and uncertainty have dropped as the markets adjusted.

"It was a crisis earlier. There was a Russian invasion, and there were all sorts of problems. The price of gas spiked, and there were fears of shortages. It was very high and volatile, and then the situation resolved somewhat. I'm not sure if natural gas is cheap, but it's down from where it was. It's less pessimistic. It's not as bad a problem as we would have thought, say, in September."

Chambers said another point to be more optimistic about is inflation. The federal Consumer Price Index in December was down from the previous month. The CPI measures consumers' average price change for consumer goods and services. Although

the CPI dropped in December, it remains up from the previous year.

How the CPI affects agriculture remains to be seen as the Federal Reserve attempts to lower inflation. Chambers tempered anticipation in the room by noting the Federal Reserve will still likely increase federal interest rates but less than was done in the previous year.

Chambers said cotton experienced some of the most significant effects in the past two years of all the commodities the USDA's World Agricultural Outlook Board follows. USDA data showed that global cotton consumption fell to the second-lowest level in the last nine years. In turn, the U.S. experienced its lowest cotton exports in seven years.

In researching the reason for the drop in cotton, Chambers said he went so far as to look at data on clothing imports in the U.S., which also experienced a sharp drop. He asked rhetorically if this was the answer. Chambers said, "Not sure."

"Back when people were really pessimistic, maybe people pulled back. We've had these supply chain issues, and we read sometimes the importers had more than they knew what to do with, then they had bulk and had to move product, so maybe that affected it, which all would suggest that this is going to bounce back."

Georgia Cotton Commission names inaugural Trustees Award winners

Louie Perry, Jr. of Moultrie and Mike Lucas of Cochran were named recipients of the inaugural Trustees Award winners by the Georgia Cotton Commission at the commission's annual meeting on Jan. 25.

The commission created the Trustees Awards to recognize individuals who have dedicated themselves to the advancement of the cotton industry in Georgia. Producers, research and extension specialists and other cotton industry associates who have given exceptional service to the cotton industry are eligible to receive this award, according to a press release announcing the award winners.

The award was named after the Georgia Colonial Trustees, who set out to create an agricultural colony and expedite agricultural productivity. In 1734, the trustees established a 10-acre Trustee Garden in Savannah to display modern farming techniques. They experimented on many crops that first year, but cotton was the crop that thrived and has been planted in Georgia every year since.

Perry is the fifth-generation farmer to own, operate and live on his family farm,

which has always produced cotton. Perry also raises purebred limousine and commercial cattle and grows peanuts, grain, hay, corn and tobacco.

He began his farming career in partnership with his father on Pineywoods Farms

in Moultrie in 1962. His great-great grandfather established Pineywoods with a 490-acre land grant from state of Georgia in 1830. Over the decades, the farm's acreage has expanded to 1,300.

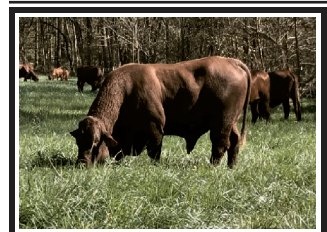

Halstead offers cooking tips, life lessons in new cookbook

Joyce Halstead is always wanting to help. She explained she was doing so with her daughter with a Thanksgiving dessert that changed her life. She turned a single recipe into a second career with a large Facebook following and a cookbook.

The recipe, a family favorite, pecan pie pizza, had frustrated her daughter, who was hosting a Thanksgiving gathering at her house.

After phone calls and texts between her and her daughter, Halstead wasn't making much progress. The idea came to her to make a video to show her how to make the dish.

"I thought, if I could just show her how to do it, it would be so much simpler," Halstead said. "A friend was here, and I asked her to video me making it. It turned out well, so I sent it to my daughter and the other family members, and they just loved it."

The video was so good Halstead's daughter urged her to post other recipes online to help people. After recently retiring from Southern Regional Technical College in Thomasville as vice president for student affairs, Halstead said she was up for a new challenge.

She and her husband, Doug, created the name "Home with the Halsteads" for their Facebook page and posted the first video in June 2021. "To be honest, I didn't know if anyone would be interested or not, but people began to follow, and they were very supportive."

She had about 800 followers for the first few months. Halstead said people began to notice her heading into

Thanksgiving of that year. She posted a video on how to make a chicken and stuffing recipe. Apparently, a lot of people needed help with that dish, and they kept coming back. In one year, "Home with the Halsteads" grew to 18,000 followers.

Her secret to success is no secret. Halstead said she keeps things simple. Most ingredients she uses are basic and can

include count your blessings, be kind to everyone, save for a rainy day, and learn from your mistakes."

be found in anyone's pantry. Accuracy in the recipes are also important. Although the recipes are familiar to her, many are family favorites, with some handed down from her mother. Halstead said she spends hours preparing before making a video.

"I tell them what I'm going to do, and then I show them how to do it, then I tell them what I've done, and I taste it," she said. "They love for me to taste it and show them how a pie cuts or how it serves and looks when it's finished."

Her Facebook followers, family and friends wanted her to do a cookbook. Halstead said she could not say no and published "South Georgia Favorites" last year.

The book is more than an extension of what she's done with the videos. Halstead dedicates the book to her mother. Halstead said her mother taught her not only how to cook but how important it is to help others. Many recipes in the book are from her mother, and some Halstead said she has used for years.

"(The recipes) are simple, easy to follow, and they're delicious. Throughout my book, I give helpful hints, and I also have some of my favorite scriptures that I've just put here and there," Halstead said. "I have a sampling of life lessons I've learned along life's way in the back of the book. Some of those

GOOD TO GROW: Healthy plants start with healthy soil

The winter months are a great time for gardeners to start catching up on projects they have postponed or to begin planning crop rotations and ordering seeds for the upcoming year. One of the most critical steps to ensuring a productive growing season is to test and prepare the soil, as it will be the foundation that your plants — and success — depend upon.

“Healthy soil is an investment in your landscape,” said Carole Knight, Agriculture and Natural Resources (ANR) agent for University of Georgia Cooperative Extension in Madison County. “Ultimately, the beauty and health of the plants in your landscape are direct results of the health of your soil.”

Soil is alive

Soil is a bustling ecosystem — a large community of living organisms linked together through nutrient cycles and energy flows, explained Knight. Every teaspoon of soil is home to billions of microorganisms.

First, macro-organisms, like worms and insects, chew and shred larger organic matter into smaller pieces. Bacteria and fungi continue to break down those dead plant and animal tissues, which become nutrients that are taken up through plant roots. Nematodes also eat plant material and other soil organisms, releasing vital nutrients in their waste. Specialized mycorrhizal fungi form symbiotic — or mutually beneficial — relationships with plants, bringing hard-to-reach nutrients and water directly to plant roots, while the plants provide the fungi with essential carbohydrates.

Remembering that soil is alive helps growers better recognize the time and attention required to build a healthy foundation for plants. So, how can you encourage this in your own garden? Understanding your soil composition is the first step to fostering an optimal soil ecosystem.

Soil testing

“Throughout the year, Extension agents take calls from gardeners and farmers baffled at the slow growth of their crops or how stunted the crop is,” said Greg Pittman, ANR agent in Jackson County.

Soil testing is always the first recommendation, he said. A basic soil test measures the level of organic matter, pH, and macronutrients — nitrogen (N), phosphorus (P) and potassium (K).

It sounds like something from high school chemistry, but

soil acidity is a key factor for home gardens and production farms, Pittman explained. The acidity, or alkalinity, of the soil is a chemical factor that affects crop growth and development and is referenced using a numerical pH value.

Soil pH is the measure of hydrogen-ion activity in the soil. This is where the chemistry part comes into play. The pH is measured on a scale of 0 to 14. Anything below 7 is considered acidic — the lower the number, the more acidic it is. For example, lemon juice has a pH of 2 and battery acid is 0. Anything above 7 is a base (or alkaline if we’re being technical), examples being baking soda at 9 and household bleach at 13. The most common example of a neutral item, having a pH of 7, is water.

Knowing the soil’s pH will help indicate how well plants can take up important nutrients needed for growth and maturity. For example, if your soil pH is 5.0, this means that the hydrogen-ion activity is preventing plant roots from absorbing important nutrients such as nitrogen and potassium. Correcting soil pH is a relatively straightforward process

— spreading lime can increase the soil acidity and adding sulfur can decrease it. Before spreading, however, it is important to have a soil test conducted through your local Extension office. Each soil test can provide different recommendations based on what crops you wish to grow in an area, as some crops require different pH levels to thrive.

“There are a couple of different types of lime that you can purchase,” said Jacob Williams, ANR agent in Towns and Union counties. “Ag lime is very common and is made up of calcium, carbon and oxygen. Ag lime will do a good job of raising the pH in your soil. Dolomitic lime also raises the pH level of soil, but it has magnesium in it as well. So, if your soil is both acidic and deficient in magnesium, dolomitic lime is a good option.”

Adding mulch

Additionally, Knight explained that incorporating mulch or another form of organic matter is important to building healthy soil. Organic matter improves physical properties such as air and water availability in soil, which are essential for plant roots and soil microbes.

Excessive tillage can cause soil compaction, reducing the pore space between soil particles. This makes it hard for plant roots to penetrate the soil, absorb water and nutrients, and interact with beneficial microbes. Compaction can also lead to drainage issues which can waterlog plant roots and increase runoff. Disturbing the

topsoil also resurfaces buried weed seeds, exposing them to light and increasing germination — in other words, encouraging more weeds.

Finally, mulching bare soil around plants prevents the splashing of soil particles and soilborne pathogens onto leaves and stems, reducing the occurrence of some plant diseases.

Our friends at the Georgia Peanut Commission combined the main ingredient of those two days into a delicious peanut pie recipe.

Ingredients

- 20 Ritz crackers, crushed fine
- 1 cup sugar
- 3/4 cup roasted peanuts, chopped
- 1/4 tsp cream of tarter
- 3 eggs whites
- 1 tsp vanilla
- grated unsweetened chocolate

Instructions

Preheat oven to 350 F degrees.

Combine crackers, peanuts and 1/2 cup sugar. Set aside. Beat egg whites and cream of tartar until stiff, gradually adding other 1/2 cup sugar. Stir in vanilla.

Fold the cracker/peanut mixture into egg white mixture. Bake in pie pan (use your favorite pie crust recipe) for 25 minutes at 350 F degrees. Cool and top with whipped cream and garnish with chocolate.

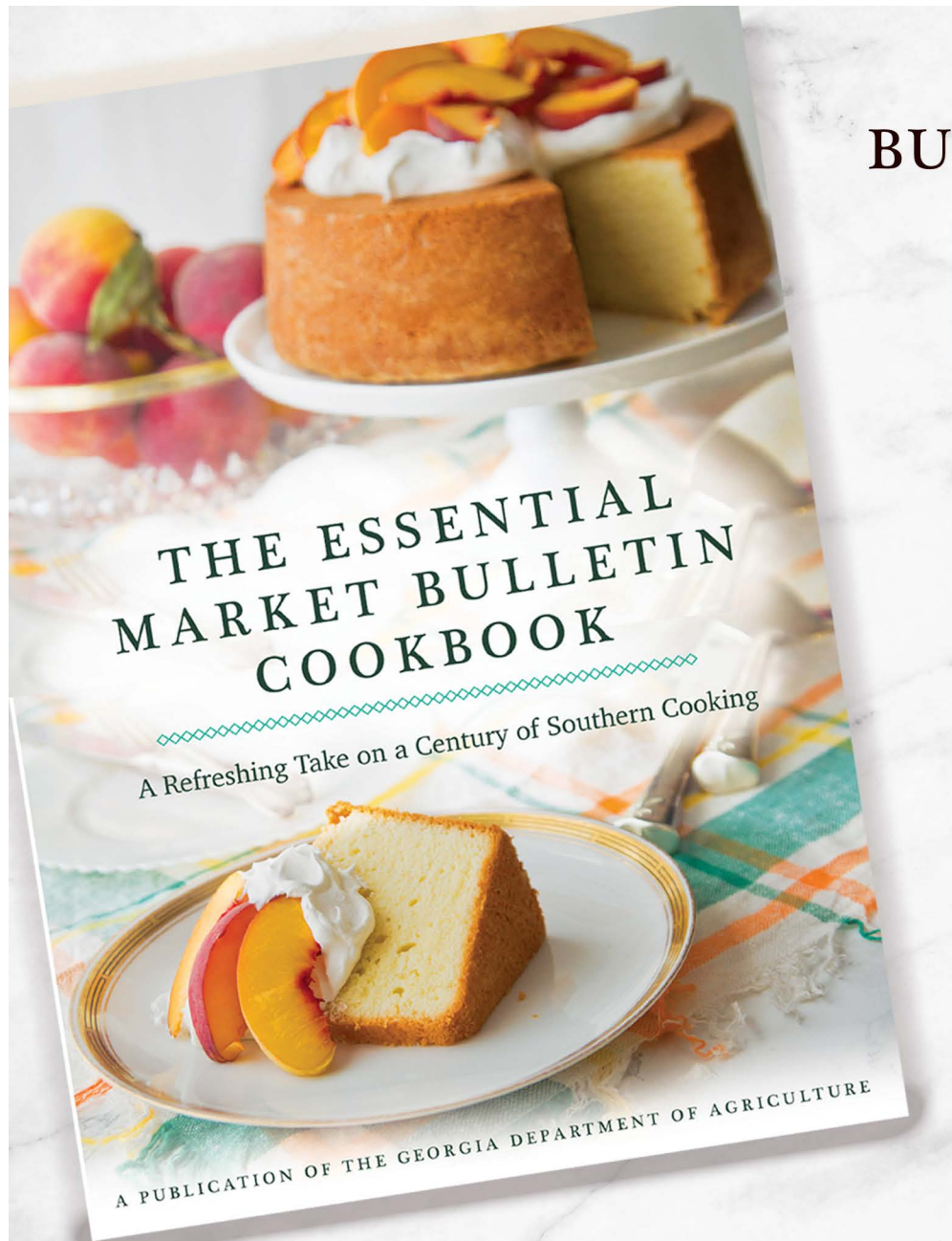

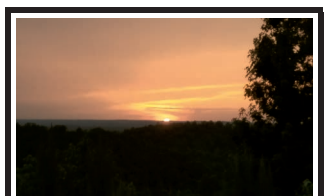

Through his 48-year farming career, Perry received several ag awards and remains active with numerous agriculture groups. Some of his services have included being chairman of the Georgia Cotton Commission Board, 2000-2012, former president of Southern Cotton Growers, Inc., producer delegate and board advisor to the National Cotton Council, director of Cotton Incorporated. Perry had also served as chairman and president of the Georgia Cattleman's Association.

Perry attended the University of Georgia in Athens and majored in Agribusiness. He

settled down with his wife, Becky, and they raised their children together and are now enjoying their grandchildren.

Mike Lucas grew up in Cochran, and after graduating from Bleckley County High School, he began working on his grandfather's farm as a teenager. Lucas' original 105-acre farm, passed to him by his grandfather, has expanded to over 500 acres today. Lucas' family represents the third generation on this farm.

Lucas's farm is a diversified row crop operation growing cotton, peanuts, wheat and soybeans. Lucas also raises beef cattle

and operates a small cow/calf operation.

Lucas served as director of the Georgia Cotton Commission, chairman from 2012-2017, director of the Cotton Board and Southern Cotton Growers, and producer delegate of the National Cotton Council.

He also served as an active volunteer with the Bleckley County Farm Bureau, Georgia Farm Bureau, Bleckley County FSA committee, and Bleckley County Extension/4-H County Board member.

He currently serves as the Secretary/Treasurer of the Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation of Georgia, Inc.

Lucas is married to the former Sharon Britton, who also grew up in Cochran.

Georgie's Drive Thru Buena Vista

Hello! I'm Georgie, the Georgia Grown mascot. I travel the state of Georgia promoting our #1 industry, agriculture! There are lots of brave young men and women who were born and raised in this state. The other day, I found the monument to one of our heroes in his hometown of Buena Vista.

Luther Story served as a private in Company A, 9th Regiment, 2nd Infantry Division during the Korean War. On September 1, 1950, Private Story's regiment was repeatedly attacked and nearly surrounded by enemy forces. He took the machine gun from a wounded trooper and killed about one hundred enemy soldiers crossing a river. He stood in a road in front of an approaching troop transport throwing every grenade he had at it. His position was overrun, and he had to run for cover in a rice paddy. At that position, Private Story was severely wounded and knew he would slow down his troop's withdrawal. He volunteered to stay behind and cover his troop's exit. He threw everything he had at the enemy to slow them down. He was never seen again alive. On the courthouse square, there is a bronze plaque in honor of his posthumously receiving the Congressional Medal of Honor.

Winter is the time to prevent prickly weeds in summer-time lawns

Walking barefoot through soft grass is one of life's greatest joys — the warmth of the ground, the tickling of the blades of grass on your feet, toes wriggling free from the confinement of shoes — it is just spectacular. In the summer.

In the midst of winter, after cold and rainy weeks, it sounds miserable, but if you are looking forward to that summer experience, you may want to prepare your lawn now.

Last year I had a lawn burrweed (*Soliva pterosperma*) emergency week. Almost everyone who called the office that week wanted to know what to do for “stickers” in the yard that were making playing barefoot in the lawn uncomfortable for kids and pets.

Unfortunately, by the time strolling barefoot becomes a joy, it is too late to control burrweed. Burrweed is a winter weed, and the “sticker” that can lodge painfully in your foot is the already-developed seed, or burr.

You can apply herbicide to the plant, but as summer begins the weed's life cycle is ending, and once the burr is developed, it is there to pester you until next year. If you had this problem in your lawn last year, treat for burrweed now — during the first months of the year — and

kill the plant before the burr develops.

University of Georgia Cooperative Extension weed scientist Patrick McCullough recommends applying a two- to three-way broadleaf mixture product formulated for con-

trolling lawn burrweed in Bermuda grass, tall fescue and zoysia grass. Herbicide rates can be found on the product's label and vary according to the product. Rates will also vary according to the type of grass to which the herbicide is applied. Always read and follow the instructions printed on the herbicide label.

“Available at most big-box retailers, these herbicides include Trimec Southern, Triplet and ‘Weed B Gon.’ Atrazine offers better selectivity in controlling lawn burrweed in centipede grass and Saint Augustine grass due to increased injury potential from other herbicides in the spring,” McCullough said.

Herbicides with 2,4 D or 2,4-D+MCP+dicamba will provide good control for Bermuda, zoysia and tall fescue, but you may have to re-treat. Atrazine will provide excellent control for centipede, zoysia and dormant Bermuda. January and February are ideal times to treat burrweed.

Even if now is not the weather for sun-drenched picnics on your lawn, it is just around the corner. Take a moment to ensure your moment of barefooted bliss, undisturbed by stabbing burrs.
