

BAKED STUFFED EGGPLANT

1 eggplant, 1 cup soft, stale bread crumbs, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 tablespoon finely chopped onion, sait and pepper, 1 egg, weil beaten, buttered bread crumbs.

Cook eggplant 15 minutes in boiling, saited water or ham stock to cover. Cut slice from top and carefully remove pulp with spoon, taking care not to break skin. Chop and add crumbs. Estonia, Land of Forests,

Streams, Lakes, Marshes The native Estonians are chiefly of Finno-Ugrian stock, unlike the in-habitants of neighboring Latvia and Lithuania, but related to the Finns and Hungarians. It is believed they came originally from the Ural mountains, between Europe and Asia, with other tribes that wandered westward to settle finally in Fin-

iand and other European countries.

The tribes that chose Estonia for their home found a land of forests, streams, lakes, and marshes. Low and flat, it is especially suited to some kinds of agriculture, despite its northern climate, with snowfall often crowding the harvest season. About 70 per cent of the Estonians eggs, and bacon were exported to Estonia's best customers, Great Britain and Germany.

The chief crops are rye, wheat, barley, oats, flax and potatoes. Estonia lives up to an old description of it as a "fair land of potatoes and stone." Rock-dotted, it normally produces so many potatoes that nearly a ton could be given annually to each inhabitant. Forests are still abundant, and in peacetime provide many articles of export, including lumber, matches, furniture, carved toys. Oil shale is important in the national wealth, yielding asphalt, if, for instance, it was put into fight-pitch, lubricating and fuel oil, some benzine and gasoline for motor cars and planes.

Mint Family

Perilla belongs to a group of the mint family of Asiatic origin. It is sometimes used as an ornamental plant because of the bright-colored foliage. The seed yields an oil with the quality of drying rapidly and is, therefore, utilized in the paint and linoleum industries where it is blend-ed with other oils in the manufacture of various varnishes, enamels, linoleums, and allied products. In Japan it was used in the manufacture of paper umbrellas, oil paper, and artificial leather. Imports of perilla oil into the United States in 1935, amounted to approximately 75,000,000 pounds, valued at 16½ cents a pound. In Manchuria, perilla oil, or Su-Tzu as it is known, is used as a fuel for lamps; a vehicle for pigments especially on metal objects where its rapid drying qualities are needed; in some cases as a food; and as a fence row to protect edible forage crops from animals. Apparently the strong pungent odor of perilla was sufficient to act as a barrier against grazing livestock.

Wood Sugar

In the interval between the two world wars, Scholler of Germany worked out an improvement in wood hydrolysis technique. The subdivided wood waste is packed in large, tile-lined, steel cylinders that are stationary and equipped with a filter cone at the bottom. Successive batches of hot dilute sulphuric acid are introduced at the top of the converter under pressure and percolate through the wood mass to the bottom of the percolator where they are successively drawn off in the form of sugar solutions, cooled, neutralized, fermented to alcohol, and distilled. By carrying on this process through a number of acid batches, all of the cellulose and hemicellulose content of the wood can be converted to simple sugars. and recovered in fermentable form with a very high yield.

Coconut Products
Coconuts supply the natives of
Central America with a highly nutritive vegetable milk, important proteins and oils. The young leaves and shoots of the coconut tree are recommended as a green vegetable. The dried meat of the nut, copra, is the source of coconut oils used in making oleomargarines and other butter substitutes, candies and confections, as well as manufacturing candles and imitation waxes, perfumes, glycerin, cosmetics, various pharmaceuticals and an unknown number of other uses. The pulp of this copra makes the feed for livestock, particularly sheep, hogs, poultry, and cattle.

Before putting curtains into cool sudsy water, loose dust should be shaken out. Let them soak for about lukewarm suds, either in the washer or tub. Run the washer about five minutes for fragile curtains; eight or ten minutes for the more durable ones. Before going into the washer, lacy curtains should be put into thin pillow slips so the agitator washing, a light rubbing against the washboard or between the hands may be needed to remove all the evenly over the line, being sure to square the corners.

those with a net or mesh weave, shrink during washing. This should be taken into consideration when they are purchased or made. If no such allowance has been made and facing the top and bottom hems, or by adding fringe to the bottom hem, by a bias fold of contrasting

Food Yeast Processing

Food yeast has a protein value twice that of meat and, more important still, is exceedingly rich in B complex vitamins. It costs as little as 10 cents a pound, and can be easily manufactured, shipped, stored and used.

The present manufacturing methods were developed in England in 1940. It is made from molasses and ammonia, and will soon be in full production in both this country and England. The process, a continuous one, consists of planting 125 pounds of this new yeast strain in a vat containing 7,000 gallons of water, a ton and a half of molasses and some amyeast would ferment the sugar, re-sulting in alcohol, but in the aforementioned manufacturing process, the mixture is stirred by 1,000 cubic feet of air per minute, which prevent vat as a ton of creamy mass which is then dried and ready for use.

"Food Yeast-a newly discovered in the health of our country and the feeding of starving European populations," Capt. E. K. Gubin, A.U.S., Washington, D. C., says in Hygeia, the Health Magazine, but admonishes that it will not actually admonishes that it will not actually take the place of meat and other

staple foods.

Food yeast is a strain of the Toruwhich is fresh and live, with a somewhat unpleasant taste, or with brewer's yeast, which is dry and bitter unless specially treated.

"Some have become overly optimistic over food yeast," Captain Gubin explains. Physicist's Discovery

Lengthens Light Beam The United States lighthouse service in peacetime operates 33,000 navigational aids ranging from lanterns hung on posts along our great rivers to the 9,000,000 candlepower beam of a modern lighthouse.

With our entrance into the war, the lighthouse service came under the direction of the United States coast guard and the jurisdiction of the United States navy.

The peacetime operation of a lightcentury physicist who discovered that lenses and prisms could be so arranged and manipulated that they would collect and concentrate even a feeble flame and multiply it into a tremendous beam of many candle-

power.
Typical of what his discovery made possible is the \$20,000 lens of the Navesink (N. J.) lighthouse where a modest 2,400 candlepower lamp is magically multiplied 9,000,000 candlepower, a light that probes easily through 22 miles of
