BACK from Vancouver this week came the editor with another first-place award for best editorial page. It was the P. George Pearce Memorial trophy for top editorial page in Class II of the Better Newspapers Competition of the Canadian Weekly Newspapers' Association.

That trophy had spent the last twelve months in our possession and it is coming back for another year.

Pleased were we when word arrived of our newspaper's success. But so regularly have the awards been coming our way over the past year it becomes a bit embarrassing to acknowledge them. In addition to the successive wins in CWNA competition the News also won, in February, the Printed Word trophy for best editorial page among Ontario weeklies.

This could become monotonous, but perhaps other judges with better judgment will put us in our place another year. In the meantime we mean to continue expressing

our opinions in these columns whether or not they prove acceptable to others. Our 'letters' column will remain open for the expression of divergent views and we trust it will be made use of by thinking readers.

Editorial page points are given not only for writing content. The make-up and general appearance of the page are judged and contributing to these wins were the typesetters, pressmen, even the proofreader. These trophies are a tribute to the excellent work of every member of the News' staff. They all share in the glow of victory.

To them and to all those friends who have expressed pleasure in this latest News' accomplishment, our most sincere thanks.

Talk Up Plans For That Hospital

ASPECIAL committee interested in a hospital for Alexandria has been visiting area municipal councils to inform them on various aspects of the plan, including possible methods of financing. They have had a cordial reception wherever they went, we understand, and that is nice to know.

Members of these Councils have not gone so far as to tie their municipalities down to any specific grants to aid in building a hospital here. They have not even been asked to go so far at this time. But they have indicated personal interest in the project and have encouraged the committee to proceed further on plans. We understand several of the reeves have been named to represent their boards on the Steering Committee.

That will be an important committee, dealing with plans for the proposed hospital and ways and means of financing its construction. It will be well to have outside

councils represented on that committee. But it is only fair that these members of township and village councils have the active support of their ratepayers when approaching this problem of grants to build a hospital here.

Each resident of the rural areas who favors the project should make it a point to see his elected officials and give them that support. They will be in a much stronger position to vote funds if they know their ratepayers want a hospital and are willing to share in the cost of its erection.

Hospitals come high. But if the burden is shared over a wide enough assessment the cost to the individual may amount to but a dollar or two a year.

Alexandria can have a hospital that would benefit the entire area. We will have one if all who see the need get out and work toward its realization. A few words to your elected officials could be a big help at this stage.

We Liked Vancouver

WE have just returned from our first visit to Vancouver and we can vouch for the fact Canada's Gateway to the Pacific is a beautiful city. Our western doorway must provide an inspiring first impression of this country for travellers from the Orient.

We liked the accommodations and the service provided by the CPR's fine Hotel Vancouver where most of our time was spent. We admired the wide range of home architecture shown us in a tour of the British Pacific Properties where modern homes of every conceivable shape and size are rooted in the rock of Vancouver's surrounding hills. We toured the British Columbia building at the flower-decked Pacific National Exhibition grounds and there saw the vast extent of the Rockies in a relief map of the province.

Our first complete trip through the Rockies had left us indescribably impressed with their rugged beauty and vastness. But this model of the entire province opened our eyes to the fact we had been seeing only a sizable sample of British Columbia's mountain ranges.

We enjoyed a night in Chinatown where we learned something of the customs of Canada's citizens of Chinese extraction. We sampled a full ten-course Chinese dinner, saw a charming model show of the rich, colorful clothing worn by Chinese women in the days of the dynasties, witnessed a traditional fireworks display. This convention of CWNA had its emphasis on the countries bordering the Pacific Ocean and we

were entertained at a reception by the Japan Trade Centre. There were talks, too, on conditions in Communist Russia and other countries touching on the Pacific.

Rain is not unknown in Vancouver, we have heard; and more than one newspaperman had come complete with raincoat. But the weather was perfect right across the country, both ways, and in Vancouver its citizens were marvelling at a stretch of some forty days without rain. We saw fog, but no hint of rain in those few sun-drenched days.

We Easterners were struck by the friendliness of Vancouverites, an extension of the warm Western hospitality we had previously enjoyed on the Prairies. The street throngs seem not as hurried as would be the shoppers in Toronto or Montreal. Neither do they seem so hurried; there were few frowning faces among the city's pedestrians and that may have been because they were on such friendly terms with the Vancouver motorist. The traffic was heavy here, too; but we noticed more concern by car drivers for the pedestrian than his Eastern cousins show.

We like what we saw of Vancouver and would have liked to linger longer and see more of this bustling, thriving city of the Pacific. But duty called; and next year Canada's Atlantic seaport will be calling members of CWNA. It should prove interesting to visit these two far-flung bastions against the sea within a year and see how they stack up in the eyes of an inland editor.

Take Pills In Private

(Stratford Beacon-Herald)

Parents of young children often are reminded to keep drugs, medicines and household chemicals under lock and key, or at least well out of the reach of the small-fry. The objective, of course, is to reduce the possibility of accidental poisoning.

One other aspect of such accident prevention generally is overlooked. It is reported in the current issue of the Journal of the American Academy of Pediatrics. In brief, parents should take their pills in private.

In a study last year at the Norwalk (Connecticut) Hospital's poison centre, Dr. Alfred J. R. Koumians found that sixty-seven per cent of the children who had swallowed potentially-poisonous pills had watched their parents taking similar pills. Not only should medicines be kept out of sight and reach of children, Dr. Koumians concluded, but the use of them should also be kept out of sight.

In the first half of this year Alberta's poison control service recorded 413 cases of accidental poisoning from drugs and medications. No one can say how many of these cases resulted from children seeing their parents taking medicines, but no doubt the figure is substantial.

Let's Save CBC Pennies

(The Durham Chronicle)

Speaking in general terms, we heartily approve of the CBC operation. We believe it is well worth the money it costs. However, there are ways in which the budget could be pared.

Here is one small example that comes to our view. The CBC seals all its press releases and so pays first class postage. Yesterday and today, for example, the CBC news items were in envelopes with stamps of eight cents and 11 cents. Unsealed, they would have been two cents.

Other multi-million-dollar corporations in Canada are satisfied to send their press releases out with a two-cent stamp.

On two mailings a saving of 15 cents isn't very much. But multiply this by 100 for a full year and then multiply that by 1,000 for mailings to all newspapers in Canada.

And, if the CBC started to save on postage stamps, they might discover other savings along the line.

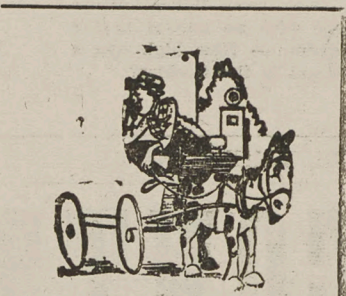

In Better Newspapers competitions Ontario newspapers took 16 awards. The Abbotsford, B.C., News took the best all-round newspaper award in Class I, circulation over 3,000. The Yorkton, Sask., Enterprise had best editorial page in this class, and the Courtenay, B.C., Comox District Free Press had the best front page.

In Class II, circulation 2,000 to 3,000, the Milton, Ont., Canadian Champion was best all-round paper. The Glengarry News won the best editorial page award and the Westkwin Alberta Times had best front page.

Class III, circulation 1,001 to 2,000, saw the Portage la Prairie, Man., Leader, win best all-round honors. The Atikokan, Ont., and Kimberley, B.C., papers shared editorial page honors and the best front page saw another tie between the Kimberley and Portage la Prairie weeklies.

The Nanton, Alberta, News was best all-round paper in Class IV, circulation 1,000 or less, and it swept both the other top placings as well.

Thursday night saw Ian Lasalle give McCrimmon a 1-0 lead which became 2-0 when Ronda MacSweyn scored their second goal. Alexandria made it 2-1 on a goal by Ronnie Levert. In the late minutes of the game Bevans MacMaster added the clincher which gave McCrimmon the junior cup for the second consecutive year. —Contributed.

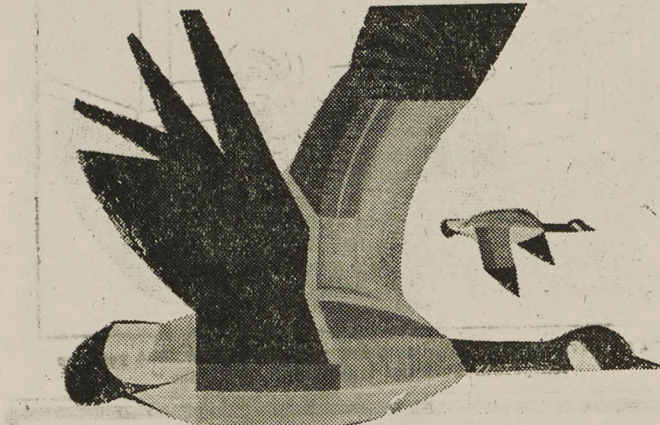
DEATHS REGRETTED
