

HAROLD RENO. 1961 WORLD CHAMPION, AIDS IN SUCCESS OF NATIONAL RURAL FAMILY RECREATION SEMINAR

At the recent National Rural Family Recreation Seminar held the early part of August at the Thor Research Farm Center at Huntley, Illinois, Harold Reno, 1961 World Champion, was one of those invited to demonstrate horseshoe pitching as one of the sports for which the seminar was being held. He was assisted in the demonstration by Ellis Cobb, News Digest Editor. As was revealed in a letter to the News Digest editor, Mr. Robert Budler, Public Relations official of the Thor Power Tool Company, Aurora, Illinois, expressed his thanks for the splendid job that was done and the many favorable comments received.

In attendance were recreation specialists from government, industry, education and news media. The two-day seminar concluded with the drafting

of reports from the different sessions.

Seminar participants considered several major implications of the sociological impact of the cutback in farm acreage for production and the flood

of citizens seeking recreational areas outdoors.

The development of wholesome family activities on areas already available to farm families was stressed to the seminar by Neil C. Hurley, Jr., in his remarks at the opening session of the seminar. Hurley is the president of the Thor Company and founder of the research center.

A huge cookout supper capped the day's activities for seminar partici-

pants on the shore of the eight-acre lake at the center, where many of the

ideas developed have been placed into practice.

BROWN GAINS THE NOD IN BAKER, MONTANA OPEN

The second annual Baker Open Horseshoe tournament was held at Baker, Mont. Earl J. Brown of Miles City took the championship with 6 wins and 1 loss. Ira Jensen of McCabe, Mont., and Phil Prescott of Poplar, Mont., tied for second place with Jensen defeating Prescott in the play-off game by a score of 50 to 27. Jensen pitched the high ringer percentage of the Tournament with 54.0%.

Class B ended in a three-way tie for the Championship between Robert Baird of Wibaux, Mont., Leslie Young of Sidney, Mont., and Clarence Keller of Glendive, Mont., each with 5 wins and 2 losses. Each player pitched 100 shoes (using the count all method) to break the tie. Baird came out on top with 176 points, Young was next with 139 points and Keller scored 132 points.

Seven trophies were awarded to the first and second place winners in

each class and to the player pitching the highest ringer percentage.

Roger J. Barnaby, Secretary-Treasurer of the Montana-Dakota Division of the N.H.P.A. from Wibaux, Mont., handled the Tournament. Roger also presented the awards to the winners. The Fallon County Horseshoe Pitchers Ass'n of Baker, Mont., sponsored the Tournament.

THE FLORIDA STATE TOURNEY — SUNSHINE PARK, ORLANDO NOVEMBER 23-24, 1962

Through negotiations between our National Association and the Miller Brewing Company, Milwaukee, Wisc., the 1962 State Tournament will be sponsored by the Miller Company and also the Florida Horseshoe Pitchers Assn. The Orlando Club is our host, and its President, Frank P. Wise, extends an invitation to all Florida horseshoe pitchers to participate in the event. The Championship Class A, will be N.H.P.A. sanctioned, and contestants in that class will be required to have his 1962 N.H.P.A. membership card. While Class B and C contestants will not be required to be National Assn. members, it is hoped and recommended that they become affiliated. Florida State Assn. cards will be required of contestants in all classes. National \$3.50, and State \$1.50 membership cards will be available Nov. 23 at tourney site, or can be acquired at any time by writing your State Secretary.

We plan 3 classes, 10 men Class in A, 6 in Class B, and 6 in Class C. If entries permit, the two lower classes will be enlarged to accommodate everyone wishing to enter. Class A will play 4 games while Class C is playing 5 games Friday afternoon and evening, Nov. 23. On Saturday Nov. 24, Class A will play their remaining 5 games, while Class B is playing 5 games. All ties involving 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th place in Class A, and 1st and 2nd place in Classes B and C will require a playoff. Other ties will be broken by percentage points. Controversial points of play will be settled by the tournament manager and committee.

Entry fee will be \$3.00, that fee will include the 100 shoe qualifying round. A second 100 shoe round will be permissible if desired, on payment of an additional \$2.00, the higher score to be the classifying factor. For convenience of out of town entries, qualifying rounds may be taken on your home or available courts where supervision is maintained, prior to tournament time. It is expected that these qualifying rounds be perfectly honest and supervised by local club members or officials, and the entry fees to be paid at time of qualifying. Score cards and entry fees to be forwarded to Frank Wise, 10 Church St., Orlando, prior to 2:00 p.m. Friday, Nov. 23, the deadline. This is a closed tournament and entries will be restricted to Florida residents only. Eligibility requirements: (1) At least 6 months residence in state during calender year 1962, (2) a Florida drivers license, (3) and shall not have played in any other closed state tournament during 1962. All games will be 50 point cancellation horseshoes, and any contestant not completing all his scheduled games will be considered forfeit. Rules of play will be those laid down by the National Association of Horseshoe Pitchers. Every effort will be made to notify entrants of their classification, however, this responsibility lies in contestants being available at a specified time, and committee will not be responsible in cases where contestants cannot be readily contacted.

The Championship Trophy will be furnished by the Miller Co., a hand-some piece, selected with all good taste. Winners of 2nd, 3rd and 4th place in Class A, and 1st and 2nd place in Classes B and C will also receive hand-some, carefully selected trophies. The latter awards will be furnished by the Florida Horseshoe Pitcher's Assn. Remember, this 1962 State Tourney is for all Florida Horseshoe Pitchers. There is a class for everyone. Let's make it the best tournament ever.

A buffet luncheon will be served by the Orlando and Bradenton ladies, with an assist by the State Assn., for out of town contestants and their families and local club members and their families. This will be served promptly at 12:00 noon, Friday, Nov. 23.

It is hoped that all local entries will be qualified Friday morning or prior to that date, in order that all qualifying rounds may be completed by deadline time, 2:00 p.m., Friday, Nov. 23.



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
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
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
