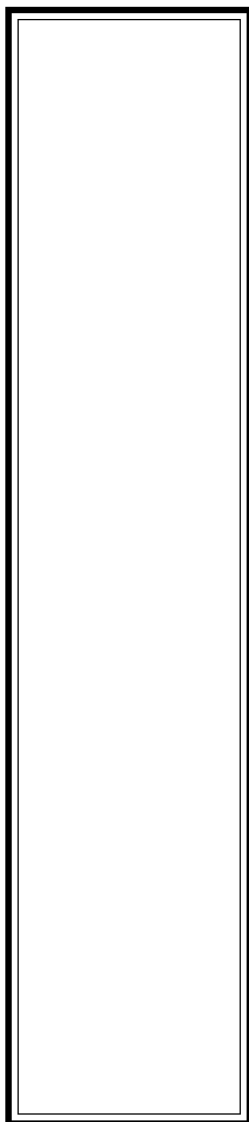

SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

This *Supplement to Part 23 of Papers of the NAACP* reproduces the working case files of the NAACP's general counsel and the legal department staff for the period 1960–1972, focusing on the years 1965–1972. The case files in *Supplement to Part 23* pertain to demonstrations and boycotts, employment discrimination, school desegregation, discrimination in the criminal justice system, and voting rights. The files consist of correspondence discussing strategic decisions in the litigation process, exhibits, briefs, lawyers' notes, depositions, and transcripts of court proceedings.

Due to the massive size of the NAACP Legal Department Case Files, *Supplement to Part 23* is organized into several series based on geographic location. Series A covers southern states and is further divided into three sections. Section I covers Alabama, Arkansas, and Florida. Section II covers Georgia, Maryland, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Virginia. Section III covers Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, Tennessee, and Texas. Series B covers northeastern states, while Series C and D cover the Midwest and West, respectively. This guide provides a reel index as well as an alphabetical index of correspondents and subjects for the cases in Series A, Section III.

Series A, Section III contains files from several cases relating to various forms of student protest. The most well-documented episode in this edition is a confrontation between Texas Southern University (TSU) students and the Houston police on May 16 and 17, 1967. For several months prior to the clash, TSU students had been engaged in several different protests against discrimination in Houston. Then, on the night of May 16, a student threw a watermelon that landed on a police car parked on the campus. The police arrested one student, Douglas Wayne Waller, for loitering and possession of a firearm. After Waller's arrest, other TSU students started a fire in the middle of one street, while others began throwing bottles, rocks, and firecrackers. The police increased their presence on the campus and, apparently believing they had been fired upon, opened fire on the students. In the midst of this confusion, two police officers were wounded and one police officer was killed. The students and the NAACP argued that this officer was actually killed by a bullet fired from the gun of another police officer.

After the shooting stopped, the police arrested over four hundred students on riot charges and charged five students, John Parker, Trazawell Franklin Jr., Charles Freeman, Floyd Nichols, and Douglas Wayner Waller, with murder and assault with intent to murder. The files for this case, beginning at Frame 0024 of Reel 12 and continuing through to Frame 0989 of Reel 17, include extensive background

information on the incident, including depositions, newspaper clippings, and excerpts from the U.S. Senate hearings on “Riots, Civil & Criminal Disorders.” There are also materials on several of the criminal and civil cases that arose from the confrontation. The criminal cases involved the murder and assault with intent to murder charges, while, in the civil cases, the TSU students sued for being denied their guarantees of freedom of speech and due process.

Two cases from Tennessee also concern student protest. These cases are *Jones v. State Board of Education* and *United States v. Brooks*. In *Jones v. State Board of Education*, Kenneth Jones sued, claiming that he had been wrongfully expelled from Tennessee Agricultural & Industrial State University after he had participated in several different protests against university policies. The university also expelled two other students, Frederick H. Brooks and James Booth, for their participation in protests. As a result of the expulsion, Brooks’s draft status was reclassified. His deferred status as a student was removed, and he became eligible for induction into the U.S. Army. At the induction ceremony, however, Brooks refused to be inducted, citing particularly his opposition to the Vietnam War. *Jones v. State Board of Education* begins at Frame 0339 of Reel 7 and continues through to Frame 0823 of Reel 8. *United States v. Brooks* begins at Frame 0001 of Reel 9 and continues to Frame 0109 of Reel 9.

The most well-documented criminal case in this edition is *Shinall v. Mississippi*. In this case, Cloudies Shinall of Palmer’s Crossing in Forrest County shot and killed Frederick L. Humphreys, a Forrest County constable who had a reputation for police brutality. On the day of the shooting, Shinall and several friends visited several bars in Palmer’s Crossing. Outside of one bar, Humphreys confronted Shinall and his friends; Shinall sped away from Humphreys, and Humphreys followed. When Shinall lost control of the car, Humphreys approached the car and Shinall shot him. Shinall was convicted of murder and sentenced to death. The files for this case pertain to Shinall’s appeal to the Mississippi Supreme Court, and there are also a few items from the original criminal case, *State of Mississippi v. Shinall*.

Employment opportunities for African Americans have been an important part of the NAACP agenda since the 1930s, and this edition includes several files on employment discrimination cases from Louisiana, Tennessee, and Texas. The Louisiana cases are *Chapital v. Chrysler Corp.*, *Hampton v. Standard Brands, Inc.*, *Heard v. Plastic Craft Corp.*, and *Parson v. Kaiser Aluminum & Chemical Corp.* The Tennessee cases are *Holmes v. Kroger Co.*, *Hunter v. Buhler Mills, Inc.*, and *Jackson v. Cutter Laboratories, Inc.* The Texas cases are *Jenkins v. United Gas Corp.* and two cases involving labor-management relations: a National Labor Relations Board case between Farmers’ Cooperative Compress and the United Packinghouse, Food and Allied Workers, AFL-CIO; and a National Mediation Board case involving the Missouri Pacific Railroad Company and the Colored Trainmen of America. There are also cases from Louisiana and Tennessee that resulted from NAACP-led protests against employment discrimination. In *Jewell v. Douglas*, John M. Jewell, owner of Jewell’s Pharmacy in New Roads, Louisiana, sued Emmitt

Douglas and members of the New Roads NAACP branch in order to stop them from picketing in front of his pharmacy. Douglas and his fellow NAACP members had been picketing Jewell's Pharmacy because of Jewell's refusal to hire African Americans. In *Hogue v. NAACP*, the NAACP branch in Memphis, Tennessee, instituted a boycott of Hogue & Knott Supermarket No. 1. The owner of the store, Hugh H. Hogue, sued the Memphis NAACP branch, seeking an injunction against further picketing.

School desegregation has remained an important area of litigation for the NAACP after 1965, and there are small files on desegregation cases in Mississippi and Texas. The Mississippi case is *Sutton v. City of Hattiesburg*. The Texas cases are *Amarillo NAACP v. Amarillo Independent School District*, *Broussard v. Houston Independent School District*, *United States v. South Park Independent School District*, and *United States v. State of Texas*. The NAACP's campaign against segregated schools in the period before 1965 is documented in UPA's *Papers of the NAACP, Part 3: The Campaign for Educational Equality, 1913–1965*, and in *Part 23: Legal Department Case Files, 1956–1965*.

Other important topics covered by cases in this edition concern rights of prisoners (*Berry v. Edwards*), discrimination in blood banks (*Bryant v. Gremillion*), police brutality (*Harris v. Memphis Police Department* and *McGowan v. City of Memphis*), and home ownership and property rights (*Joiner v. City of Dallas*).

This edition of *Papers of the NAACP* represents the third section of legal case files microfilmed by UPA focusing on the period after 1965. Other parts of *Papers of the NAACP* that contain significant documentation on the NAACP Legal Department are *Part 23: Legal Department Case Files, 1956–1965*; *Part 22: Legal Department Administrative Files*; and *Supplement to Part 16: Board of Directors File, 1966–1970*.

SOURCE NOTE

The documents microfilmed for this edition are held by the Manuscript Division of the Library of Congress, Washington, D.C. The files selected for this edition were drawn from Group V, Legal Department, Case Files, of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) Records collection.

EDITORIAL NOTE

Professors John H. Bracey, Jr., and Sharon Harley compiled this edition of *Papers of the NAACP* after a thorough survey of the Legal Department Case Files in Group V of the NAACP Records collection at the Library of Congress.
