As I have the honour to be one of the constituency of the venerable University, I am free to plead with this admired lawyer, and to ask him not to retain his present character of a subtle pleader ready to take the fee, and the brief of the first comer, no matter what his client's merits or demerits may be, but to act as a judge (such as I hope he yet may be) wisely and impartially, weighing and lifting evidence, and not presenting the pensive public with statements of no foundation.

While writing on the subject of votes for Parliamentary candidates, may I refer to the demoralization which prevails, and to the small sense of right and wrong which, sometimes, is found both in landlord and tenant. The landlord, when he constrains his tenant to vote agreeably to the landlord's will, and contrary to the tenant's conscience, destroys in his poor victim's mind the first principles of honesty. A man does me wrong who steals my purse, and robs me of my raiment, but in doing so he does not require that I should do any wrong. He leaves my conscience unassailed. The landlord who robs the reluctant voter of his constitutional right is a double culprit. He not only commits sin himself, but inexorably demands that the helpless tenant must commit sin also!

It is stated by a metropolitan journal that Mr. Disraeli has preparation made to introduce a Land Bill in the ensuing session. If this able and energetic statesman play this noble part, he will do more to uphold loyalty, morality, independence and brotherly love than could be achieved by all Mr Gladstone's rhodomontade out of doors, or rhetorical gladiatorship in Parliament."

We must, in the North, be no longer beguiled in permitting oppression to shelter itself under the guns of the Conservative fortress.

You, in the South, must plead for a distinct position for yourselves, apart from the association of religious predilections. As an abstract question of simple right and justice, the cause of humanity and wisdom will eventually, perhaps speedily, triumph.

The man who seeks to made capital out of this question for himself, his Church, or his political party is unworthy the approbation of all honest and God-fearing men.

There is much more to be said on this important subject, but "the Press," justly, regards prolixity as objectionable, and I would fain not weary you, nor give umbrage to the "Fourth Estate" by further penmanship.
