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## McGOVERN WINS NOMINATION!



Recently completed studies of aerial photography have led to intensive speculation in the scientific community that there may be life in northern South Vietnam. In between the huge craters and in portions of the wide, vast areas of coastal plain, which is so empty it seems to have been scraped by giant bulldozers, researchers have discovered small, dark patches of what a few optimistic biologists think may be a stunted, bushlike growth that somehow manages to exist in the poisonous soil. Unlike the moon, the Quang Tri region of Vietnam does have natural groundwater and an atmosphere, and it has long been theorized that a crude
kind of pond scum could thrive in the shallow pools of water that fill some of the larger craters, but the purported discovery of a more sophisticated form of vegetation is certain to be as rich a source of controversy and excitement as the celebrated episode in 1970 when an overeager seismologist mistook the detonation of a series of delayedaction bombs for signs of geological activity similar to those found by Apollo 14 in the lunar highlands. A final determination of the matter will have to depend on higher-quality photographs, since members of the scientific community are extremely reluctant to participate in any manned ex-
plorations of the area. As one put it, "I'd rather make a space walk in a raincoat."

In response to the recent decision by the Supreme Court outlawing the death penalty, the Department of Justice and the Federal Aviation Administration are said to be considering introducing a "prison plane" as a strong deterrent to potential skyjackers. The concept calls for conversion of a Boeing 707 into a flying penitentiary in which convicted air pirates would serve out all or a large part of their lengthy prison terms. Under present plans, the penal aircraft would circle the country constantly, landing once every month or so at virtually every major airport in the United States, thus serving as a
visible reminder of the consequences of a hijacking attempt. Prisoners would be served regular airline meals and be provided with one two-year-old copy of U.S. News and World Report, a copy of Saturday Review with the Double-Crostic already filled in, and the 1969 Christmas recipe issue of Redbook. To quell any uprisings, a movie screen mounted behind a Plexiglas shield would be available for an endless showing of Chitty Chitty Bang Bang, and in extreme cases, a specially trained airline employee would be prepared to speak over 150 carefully positioned, high-feedback loudspeakers, pointing out places of interest, explaining the theory of lift and drag, or commenting on the extent of


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isobaric thermo-inversion and its effect on the formation of strato-cumulus clouds until the inmates gave in. The prisoners would be allowed three hours of exercise at each airport, which they could use jogging around a baggage-claim wheel or walking under guard to the terminal rest-room and back. American Civil Liberties Union officials who have heard of the proposal have described it as "medieval" and "the epitome of cruel and unusual punishment."

There have been a number of as yet unsubstantiated reports that the Air Force has been having some difficulty with the "smart bombs" it has been using in the recent heavy bombardment of North Vietnam. According to sources at air bases in Thailand, several of the bombs have refused to leave their racks during raids, and others have dropped off while the planes were still over Thailand and have landed without exploding. A crate of the bombs recently found on the runway at the Udorn base was crudely marked "machine tools" and stenciled with an address in Canada, and nearly fifty of the explosive devices, several of them covered with slogans like "Hell, no, we won't go off!" were discovered on a makeshift raft floating downriver toward Bangkok.

A Japanese land-development company building a huge new community outside of Hiroshima, called Lake Havasaki, has reportedly made an offer to buy New York City's 59th Street Bridge, immortalized in "The 59th Street Bridge Song." City officials, who had not offered the bridge for sale, are nevertheless said to be giving the proposal "serious consideration" as a possible means of making up part of New York's huge budget deficit. It had originally been thought that the Japanese had mistaken it for the older and better-known Brooklyn Bridge, which, as a national landmark, cannot be removed, but a spokesman for the developers said the Japanese were perfectly satisfied with the less spectacular span and would be "happy as a cram" to get it.

Following the phenomenal success of the movie The Godfather, a major studio will shortly begin the filming of an obvious imitation with a similar emphasis on violence and with an equally amiable treatment of an odd code of ethics. Called The Gottführer, it will center on Adolf Hitler, the immensely personable and dedicated leader of a traditional German political organization who struggles to "extend his territory" and preserve his power against rival groups, sometimes with extreme, but colorful, methods, as when he

During a series of Senate hearings in the course of which he was asked to comment on Senator McGovern's proposal to cut the Pentagon budget by $\$ 35$ billion, Secretary of Defense Melvin Laird remarked that, in the event of such a drastic reduction in defense spending, $\$ 1$ billion should be set aside "for the purchase of white flags" to signal an American surrender. It has now been learned that Defense Department analysts, either mistaking the Secretary's remark for a serious proposal or genuinely convinced that-such an expenditure will be made necessary by McGovern's election, have prepared a procurement program for the flags. Allowing for cost overruns and inflationazy adjustments, the Pentagon will be able to obtain 497 of the flags, complete with poles and halyard, for $\$ 1.45$ billion, although it will be necessary to include a 10 -percent escalation clause should complications in the design of the eyelets, turnbuckles, and sophisticated raising machinery occur.

Last week, with its 3,457 th consecutive day, the perennial smash war Vietnam! edged past the lesser-known British hit of the fifties, The Malayan Counterinsurgency, to become the longest-running military conflict of the century. Vietnam!, which opened to mixed, but generally favorable, reviews more than ten years ago, has spawned a number of imitators during its phenomenally lengthy engagement, including Cambodia! and the poorly publicized underground belligerency Laos!, and yet another, Thai-
land!, has reportedly been optioned and is scheduled to begin casting next spring, but none of them seems likely to approach the attendance figures of the original, whose magic nearly two million Americans journeyed to the old Pacific Theatre to be a part of. A money-waster bigger even than unforgettable South Korea!, Vietnam! is likely to be the last of the elaborately
staged American shows of force that some trace back to the 1898 comic operetta Remember the Maine! "The day of the big, brassy wars is over," lamented one old-timer. "No one's got twenty or thirty billion to sink into a brush-fire production that might close in the U.N. after nine months. And there's no talent. Why, a lot of these kids, they just get out there and die, they've just got no stuff. The lure of the light at the end of the tunnel, the smell of the napalm, the roar of the shells, that old 'the slaughter must go on' spirit, they just don't have it in their blood." There are rumors that Vietnam! will officially close late this summer, but, according to Pentagon Productions, it is expected to continue "for several more years" with an allVietnamese cast.

In an unusual gesture of cooperation growing out of the successful Moscow summit, U.S. nuclear warheads will be placed on ten Soviet ICBMs, which in the event of nuclear war involving the superpowers will be jointly launched by Russian and American missile crews at targets in France. "We felt we should exploit areas of agreement between our two countries wherever they appear," explained a State Department official commenting on the plan, "and, frankly, neither of us likes the French." $\square$

Mrs. Barton became angry when her son Joey, fourteen, kept changing channels, and slapped him. At that point, her other son, Rick, sixteen, joined the argument, and she picked up a . 22 -caliber pistol loaded with bird shot and shot the older boy in the legs. A scuffle then ensued in the course of which all three suffered multiple wounds.

From the moment God cooked Adam's goose with a sparerib to the time his Son served Himself for supper, through all the ages in which fat was rendered unto Caesar and Sir Loincelot rode to the Meate d'Arthur, honest Dutch burghers ignored the Rump Parliament and millions of tons of perfectly good ground round was buried in the poppy fields of Amiens while children starved in China, fundamental questions have been raised regarding meat. As the German pessimist Flanken has it in his monumental Meataphysics, "Are we not merely meat arranged to facilitate the passage of irrelevant electric currents? And if so can we not eat our sister?"

Other questions crowd the plate. Will the meat inherit the earth? In a tight spot should you sell your chicken stock? What is a sweetbread? ## Excerpts from the Presidential Commission Report on World Population and Food Production

". . . the apparently lethal paradox that exists when a factor that is constantly expanding (the human race) is dependent on an environment that at some point remains constant (world food supply) can be resolved by the simplest of definitions. All that needs to be done is to redefine that portion of a population that is in excess of its ideal size, not as population but as food. This element is consumed, leaving a balanced population, which, through further reproduction, ensures a continuing source of still more consumable units . . ."
"We will now examine a practical applicatioh of the program in a major territorial area. India's present postpeak population of $600,000,000$ and its established optimum peak of $180,000,000$ implies an attrition total of $420,000,000$ over twenty years, or twenty regularly decreasing increments, starting with a program-inception high of $40,000,000$ through a program-completion low of 2,000,000 (DPPP). Current birthrate stands at forty per thousand with growth rate at 2.01 , implying child consumption
of twenty per thousand at programinception through one per thousand at program-completion (PGR).
Program-inception in India would thus generate, under DPPP, $40,000,000$ adult units at a mean live weight (semimalnourished) of seventy-five pounds, or three billion pounds. Under PGR, $12,000,000$ child units would be generated at a mean live weight of twenty pounds, or $240,000,000$ pounds, a total of just under 3.25 billion pounds. Postpeak population being reduced to $560,000,000$ by eat-back, every surviving man, woman, and child in India would receive at program-inception 6.43 pounds of meat.

Since in India roughly 10 percent of the population is in no need of extra sustenance, and since roughly 10 percent of the population is to be consumed, it would act as a great incentive to families affected by the lottery if they received the unwanted 10 percent in exchange for cooperation. In other words, when a parent or family presented a consumable unit to its local reception-distribution center, it would receive an additional 6.43 pounds of meat per unit over and above the statutory issue. Thus some individuals, widows, for instance, could receive as much as 12.86 pounds of meat in toto. ..."
"In conclusion the Commission is aware that the present program is much less drastic than the original proposals placed before it by the Chief Executive and his advisers. These were felt to be a little gross, and, if the present program is considered a compromise, it is only because, under its provisions, the most a man can take from his neighbor is his neighbor. The Commission's overriding conviction has always been that no one, least of all a child, should be excluded from the banquet of life. It is an inalienable right. And among the 42.8113 children who will have died in the time it takes to read this report, there were indisputably several who had that right."

# BY LAND ROVER THROUGH FORGOTTEN QUEENS 

Your Society's Expedition Finds<br>That This Primitive Borough Has<br>Some Links to Contemporary<br>Civilization

Photographs by Emerson Greene Queens: As we drew near, the very sound of the name quickened our pulse. After checking our supply of attractive trinkets, and doublechecking our Land Rover, we pushed on once more. Few modern expeditions had penetrated to the center of Queens, and although we had heard from every reliable source that its inhabitants, aimless and primitive, existed at the cultural subsistence level, we were anxious to prove that there was something of value to be learned in a trip there. We of the Society have discovered that no part of the world, however savage and remote, is without interest. We have found that people, however far back in the wake of evolution and progress, are always, or almost always, human, and therefore worthy of cursory scientific voyeurism at the very least.

It was with these convictions in mind that our expedition had crossed the treacherous East River and begun the journey into the very heart of this forbidding fogbound peninsula. Once across the river we had encountered, as many had before us, a buffer region inhabited by cultural mulattoes, who, although ethnically of the Queens race of white men, nevertheless displayed many of the traits we regard as "civilized." We did not tarry long here, for our mission was to encounter if we could the Queens culture in its pure form. What now did we hope to find?

We had heard that each autumn ritual games were held in a gigantic amphitheater called "Shay." We had heard that, after the ceremonial imbibing ("go Chug-a-Lug") of a rather repulsive, slightly intoxicating beverage called "Shay-fur" (evidently, "drink of Shay") the natives of Queens engaged in an extraordinary religious celebration involving reverent, almost fanatical, screams in honor of the harvest god METZ. In order to witness this, we hoped to secure the cooperation of the

Astonished at the complexity of Queens culture, we collected a broad variety of artifacts. Working in such bizarre materials as aluminum foil, plastic, and rubber, native craftsmen display unsuspected ability and are even familiar with the rudiments of ceramic china.

"Tee-vee," consisting of broiled meat and a vegetable, is the most common form of food in Queens. It is customarily served in aluminum-foil trays before the "toob," a machine through which are broadcast the common myths of Queens culture. These myths are unique in the history of human cultures, for they are found boring even by the natives whose lives are informed by them.
The "Chug-a-Lug" ritual inspires Queens natives with a state of intoxication not unlike the frenzy of the old Dionysiac revels. Participants imbibe fermented hops and barley from cylindrical aluminum cans, which are afterward arranged in the common pyramidical formation. Males are admitted to the "Chug-aLug" in early adolescence, women later.

The Cowper clan, a typical Queens affinity unit, consists of the primarily monogamous male-female "parent" couple and two offspring, plus a totem animal - in this case the bear "Yho-Gee." Their dwelling is neat and clean but undistinguished as to architecture and constructed on an infirm foundation. It is also felt to be inhabited by a maleficent spirit called "Mor'gidge."





Natives "go Chug-a-Lug" when invited by us to don little-used traditional formal tribal apparel. They seized on the occasion to drink several liters of "Shay-fur" and perform such ritual dances as the "jidder bug," the "tsa-tsa," the "lyn-dee," and the "twis." The following day they were possessed by a spirit called "Heng-



Know, O suppliant Mortal, that the $I$ Chink $\mathcal{O}$ represents the accumulated wisdom of nearly two generations of priests at the Temple of the Yawning Buddha at Tsinghen during the Han Dynasty, circa A.D. 1750-1820. Instructed by the illustrious Shogun T'shen Wen Fen to produce an accounting for tax revenues absorbed by the temple, the wise priests thereof lapsed into a divine meditation for forty years and spoke not, nor emerged from the temple, until they had created the $I$ Chink© . The illustrious T'shen's successor, the wicked Pro Ko-Fef, then impounded the holy work in the forbidden Circular File and set the reverend monks to performing onerous burdens and meaningless tasks about the highways and parks of Tsinghen.
Nevertheless, the wisdom of the 1 Chink@ survived and has subtly permeated the thoughts and works of great Chinese men ever since. In 1892 the governor of Sinkaing employed the $I$ Chink $\odot$ to determine the appropriate wife for his son from a choice of three wealthy maidens. With his thusly chosen bride the youth flourished, growing into a promising man who would have benefited the district greatly, had he not been mysteriously poisoned the very night his father also
was murdered by unseen assassins. In 1900 the I Chink© was employed to set the date for the celebration of the Emperor's birthday in Peking, and the festivities were splendid and unmarred except by torrential rains. The warlord Fe Fi Fo cast the I Chink© in 1911 to devise the formations by which his army would counter the forces of Sun Yat-Sen. And in 1970 the celebrated physician Tim Le-Ray consulted the I Chink@ for advice on whether to remain in prison or yield his bodily safety and well-being to the Weathermen and the Black Panthers.

Witness the spreading popularity of "group swapping," a trend that originated with rockiom's "star" set and rapidly caught on with suburban teen-age bands, who, aping their heroes and attempting in their naivete to be fashionable, have found themselves headed toward the heartbreak of . . .

I started out like any other kid and his guitar-with a chord book and a stack of Chuck Berry 45's. T'd spend night after night in my cramped, shabby, lower-middleclass bedroom working out chords and riffs until my fingertips were raw and bleeding. I dreamed of one day putting a group of my own together-how happy we'd be!

Then I met Rick. He taught me things I'd never known existed-Jimmy Reed tunes, original Willey McCoy, Robert Johnson. We started to practice together in his cramped, shabby, lower-middle-class bedroom, and before long decided to form a group. We got a job playing in a local teen club for pennies a night, and it was great for a while-but after a few months I began to feel confined, that I wasn't growing musically. Rick understood, and we parted friends. . . .

About a year later, I met Carl and Bob. We got it on from the start, playing blues and our own stuff, too. But we had a manager who insisted on rushing us into a contract. We found ourselves cutting an album we weren't ready for-it was contrived, undeveloped, and embarrassing. The group broke up soon afterward.

I moved to the Coast and joined up with the Chickens. We cut one good album before P. got juiced up one night and smashed all our equipment. The rest of us disbanded in disgust. Later we found out that P. had formed another group and was making a fortune smashing his guitar at the end of every gig. It saddened me....
M. and myself formed the Ballbreakers about six months later. We had a dynamite blues sound and did two albums together, but F. had gotten strung out on coke and would disappear for weeks at a time. He called us from Marrakesh one night-he'd gone off on a lark with Joni M. and was ripped off in a dive for all his bread and my Les Paul! Our manager, Dick, tried to talk us into staying together, at least for the sake of our unfinished LP, so we tried to patch things up. But then H. got hit with a misdemeanor rap for exposing himself at a concert, and C. picked up hepatitis from running skag. That was the last straw for me. I had Phil draw up papers to end our contract.

Not too long after that I formed the Milk with Z. and K. We put out three fantastic albums before we got bored with each other and split up. I'd met Y. of Blind Sweat
and Blood around this time and really got turned on by the "big" sound. It was terrific for a while: we got into swapping with some other groups and I dug the scene until I found myself swapped out of my contract with Columbia and into a lawsuit! Soon as the contract thing was straightened out, I went on tour with Domnie and Bonnie as a back-up man. While we were on the road, I ran into G., an old friend of mine and a fantastic drummer. We decided to try and get a thing together with J., one of the greatest bass players around. We formed Hot Shit and were a hit even before our first LP because we were all so famous. That was the problem-we were all so great we couldn't decide whose material to do. Our producers tried to talk us into staying together at least for the sake of this tour we'd signed for, but we never got that far.

That was about a year ago. After Hot Shit split up, I got a place in the country to get my head together and write. Believe me, T've had it with groups. . . .

X . is only one of countless young musicians who have lived the needless tragedy of Fillmore Divorce. I myself have faced the heartbreak of group breakup more than a few times and have thought in recent months, "If only I'd known then what I know now!"

It's my hope that by sharing my experiences with you in a frank discussion, by pinpointing the major causes of Fillmore Divorce and dealing with them in a candid way, hundreds of young people who still have a chance may be better able to avoid group breakup in the future.

## 1. Play the field!

Sure, jam around all you like, but don't sign those papers until you're sure you've found the group that will make you happiest. There are plenty of fish in the sea, so don't make the mistake of joining up with the first group to catch your fancy!
2. Is it the "real thing"?

Don't let meddlesome producers and backers force you into a group you're not ready for! No matter how wellintentioned, they can wreck a group before it has a

chance. Ask yourself, "Is this the real thing?" and, most important, "Am I mature enough to handle the responsibility of a group?" before you consider making the big commitment.

## And now that the honeymoon's over

Why do groups fail? Here are the four most common causes of Fillmore Divorce. . . .

## Drugs

Roller coaster to catastrophe .
In my book there's nothing wrong with smoking a little weed now and then to be sociable-as long as it stays within reasonable bounds. But watch out! You may be tempted by your "friends" to sample "uppers" or "downers," or even to "shoot up"! Too many rock stars have found out the hard way that taking drugs is a oneway collision course to disaster. ...

Remember: a real musician should be able to "get off" on his own chops!

## Long-Term Separation <br> Shortcut to divorce!

Richard Goldstein once asked me if I thought a group and a career were possible at the same time, to which I replied, "I think the group is a career!" And that still goes. Any leader who's fool enough to gallivant around the country making movies and cutting solo albums can expect to find his group in pieces when he comes home!

## Rhythm-Section Neglect

Don't take your "better half" for granted. . . .
Leaders! Your rhythm section will only be faithful to you as long as you treat it with respect. Don't expect your companions to bask in the reflected glory of your own success. Encourage them to be creative-to do arrangements, to write songs. And most important, never forget that those "little things" can spell the difference between a successful group and a bitter failure. Be on time for rehearsals and gigs. Pack up your own equipment: don't make them do it. Find ways of making them feel appreciated-they'll love you for it. And don't let publicity "commitments" keep you away too often, or you may find your rhythm section shopping around for a new leader!

Another word of caution: every conscientious leader must beware the pitfalls of "ego tripping," a major cause of group breakup in itself. Even the most shy and retiring rock star can launch off on an ego trip if he isn't careful. For example, just after $\mathrm{P}^{\prime} d$ done the album with Mayall, word got around that kids were writing "Clapton is God" on walls all over the U.S., and I found myself wondering, "Does this make me bigger than Lennon?"

## Group Swapping <br> "Playing around" is playing with fire!

Few things are likely to break up a group faster than the dangerous and degenerate game of "swapping." Jamming with other groups at parties and such is fine, but beyond the innocent jam lies a booby trap of trouble. Don't make the same mistake X. and others have-there are plenty of "thrills" to be had in your own group.

## The Mixed Group

Modern society demands that we learn to accept and relate to people of colors and creeds foreign to our own. The musical profession is no exception in this respect. Today's musician often finds himself thrown together by chance with those of different cultures and faiths. These encounters can be educational and are quite valuable in the sense that they broaden our perspectives and offer us deeper insights into the world of music. Indeed, foreign and colored peoples have much to teach us.

However, we must bear in mind that where seemingly superficial differences of race or religion can be successfully "papered over" in social situations, they run too deep not to create innumerable hardships and heartaches in the more intimate context of a group. In a perfect world, perhaps, those of diverse religious persuasionsay, your Jesus Freaks, your T.M. types, your Indian mystics, your Black Muslims-would have no trouble brooking social antagonism, would not be plagued by internal conflict, would be able to produce as much mixed music as they felt inspired to without fear of reprisal.
But since we do not live in a perfect world, the responsible and mature musician must consider that it takes more than a "good beat" or "clever fingers" to make a group work, and that a mixed greup cannot hope to survive for long without tragic consequences for everyone. $\square$

 Michael O'Donoghue shows you how to write a Johnny Carson Monologue in five minutes or less!There are words funny in and of themselves, words such as "Edsel" and "Liberace" and "tacoburger." The mere use of such a word invokes instant mirth. While Komic Keywords and Phunny Phrases have long been used both by comedians (i.e., Jack Pearl's "Vas you der, Sharlie?" Joe Penner's "You wanna buy a duck?" and even Benny/Cavett's "Now wait a minute!") and laymen (i.e., the commonly used humorous synonyms for "drunk": "stewed," "zonked," "polluted" (archaic), "smashed," etc.) alike, it took Johnny Carson to base an entire routine on them.

A copy of Johnny's comic-word-and-phrase list recently came into my possession and we're reprinting it here in its entirety with a few explanatory footnotes of my own. I have also included a sample monologue to demonstrate how it works. Simply fill in the blanks, using the words and phrases found on the list. Many have already been done for you.

You may wish to watch "The Tonight Show" and add to your list. You'll soon discover that, as a rule, most Southern California towns, roads, and used-auto dealers are funny, and that it would be difficult to come up with an undergarment that is not hilarious. It should also be pointed out that although "bippy" and "Walnetto" are valid Komic Keywords, they are not on this list because both originate from another show.

Here are a few hints on delivery in case you are tempted to try the completed monologue on your friends. When Johnny loses his place, he usually "marks time" by discussing some point of grammar with Ed ("Which is proper there, Ed, 'who' or 'whom'?"). If a joke "bombs," doggedly repeat the punch line. And never forget that it's impossible to overuse the word "weird."

# OurWhite Heritage

## White Myths and Stereotypes

Although White people have been in America for over four hundred years, there still exists an enormous amount of misunderstanding about Whites, some of it willfully malicious, but most of it the result of a lack of proper education or just plain ignorance. Millions of otherwise good citizens regularly contribute to the atmosphere of fear, confusion, and mistrust in which Whites have to work and play by repeating racial slurs they have heard to their children or to their friends, never stopping to think of the damage they might be causing. You can do your part to dispel a lot of the misinformation that surrounds uncolored people by "debunking" these common myths whenever and wherever you hear them voiced, or by protesting strongly whenever the media or anyone in public life resorts to one of these demeaning stereotypes to describe or portray persons of Anglo-American ancestry:

Whites have "natural reason," or extra lobes in their brains, which makes them good aesthetes.
They are adult-like, brooding, and worry a great deal.
They spend all their money on stocks and bonds.
They smell good, talk too softly, and can't dance.
When they move into a neighborhood, they tear down

## Are Jews White People?

all the bars and pool halls and put up historical societies and Christian Science Reading Rooms, and send real-estate prices sky-high.
They are sexually frigid, or "hung like hamsters."
They won't accept welfare.
They eat nothing but cantaloupe and caviar and lie around "white linening," that is, drinking vintage wine out of bottles wrapped in napkins.
They all look like Commander Whitehead or the Arrow Shirt Man, and they go around reflectively rubbing their chins and saying, "Slide rule do your stuff," or "Brain don't fail me now."
They are clean, chaste, and prudish.
You should also discourage racist humor, of which the countless series of "Standard \& Poor" jokes is by far the most common example. One sample of these demeaning and racially insulting jokes should be a sufficient illustration of their tastelessness:

## Whites in America

The first White person to hold elective office in America was William Bradford, who served as governor of Plymouth Colony from 1621 to 1632.

A mere few years later, in 1634, the first White Studies program was inaugurated at the College of William \& Mary in Williamsburg, Va. The curriculum consisted of a number of courses in White culture, including mathematics, geography, geometry, rhetoric, political economy, the sciences, Latin, Greek, theology, oratory, composition, medicine, and law.

With the ratification of the Articles of Confederation in 1781, Whites gained their basic rights.

Among the many all-White military units that distinguished themselves in battle in the course of the Civil War were the Army of the Potomac and the Army of Northern Virginia.

Throughout the Civil War thousands of White people fled north on the Overground Railroad thanks to the courage and selfless dedication of countless engineers, conductors, and brakemen of, among others, the Chesapeake \& Ohio, the Norfolk \& Western, and the Alabama \& Northern railroads.

Although many came to America in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, the largest influx of uncolored people occurred in the latter part of the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries, when hundreds of thousands of whites traveled to these shores in giant steamships, often undergoing a considerable amount of unpleasantness along the way, while shipping-line owners made a tidy sum on their "human cargo." Packed in groups of two and even three, in stuffy cabins with difficult-to-open portholes or, for the unlucky passengers with inside cabins, no portholes at all, these White people suffered from seasickness, nasty tumbles on the promenade deck, boring table companions, rude stewards, inconveniently timed lifeboat drills, and poor deck-chair assignments, to name just a few of the many hardships.


In the 1930s noted author and literary figure Ernest Hemingway led a back-to-Europe movement, which at its height saw thousands of White persons return to the continent of their origin to renew their ties with the peoples whose racial ancestry they shared. But in all too many cases, after a century or more of separation, the gap proved too great to bridge, and after finding difficulties adjusting to new languages, different money, and a foreign measurement system, or disgusted by the lack of central heating, telephone service, and indoor plumbing, most came back to America.

Ralph Bunche, the first American citizen to hold high office at the United Nations, had "a touch of the old whitewash."

## Our White Cultural Heritage

Archaeologists have long believed that Whites had developed a rich, flourishing civilization in the Mediterranean Basin area, possibly as early as 2,500 b.c., and from time to time over the last several centuries a number of important artifacts that tend to support this theory have come to light in Greece, Italy, Egypt, Crete, Southern France, Spain, and North Africa. It is now generally accepted that by the time of the birth of Christ (who was, Himself, technically a White man) Whites did in fact possess at least the rudiments of a culture, and ethnic historians who hold this view point to such varied artistic accomplishments of that era as the Iliad, Plato's Republic, the plays of Sophocles, the poems of Horace, the Venus de Milo, and Euclidean geometry as further proof of their hypothesis.

## Portraits in White

Throughout history, Whites have played an important, even deciding, role in the events that have shaped mankind. The list of White achievers is a lengthy and distinguished one, and "calling the roll" of these giants of the uncolored world would take a long, long time indeed (according to Dr. Livingston Wingate of the White Studies department at Tulane, if twenty persons each read the name of one White achiever every three seconds, twenty-four hours a day, it would take 114 years!), so here is just a sample to give some feeling of the depth and diversity of the White experience:
All of the participants in the Thirty Years' War were Whites.
Emperor Charles IX of Sweden was a White man.
Cardinal Lanfranc was uncolored.
The population of Bruges, noted center of Flemish culture, was in former times, and remains today, entirely White.
The famous composer and organist Dietrich Buxtehude was a White man.
Gouverneur Morris, one of the original signers of the Constitution, was of Anglo-American ancestry.
Emile Durkheim was a White man.
Both of the pretenders to the Hapsburg throne in the War of the Spanish Succession were White men.
Lake Meade is named after Gen. George Meade, a White man.
Xenophon was White, as were all of his Ten Thousand. Spinoza was, technically speaking, a White man.

## Talking White

A number of White expressions have become a part of our language-in fact, the noted semanticists and ethnologists Merriam, Webster, and Roget collected more than 140,000 such usages! Here is just one that illustrates the extent to which White words have enriched our daily speech:

Angstrom-a measurement of light-wave length equal to one ten-thousandth of a micron
Tort - any wrongful act not involving a breach of contract for which a civil action will lie
Debenture-any of various instruments, either secured or unsecured, issued by a corporation as an evidence of debt
Erg-a unit of energy expressing the work done by one dyne acting through a distance of one centimeter
Oxymoron-a combination for epigrammatic effect of contradictory or incongruous words
Metope-the space between two triglyphs of the Doric frieze
Chiasmatypy-the supposed spiral twisting of homologus chromosomes about each other during parasynapsis
Appoggiatura-an accessory tone preceding an essential tone as an embellishment of melody
Teleost-a fish of the group Teleostei, the bony fishes, as distinguished from the ganoids, dipnoans, and elasmobranchs
Futtock-one of the crooked timbers scarfed together to form part of the compound rib of a vessel
Syzygy-the point in its orbit at which a planet is in conjunction or opposition

## Spotlight on White Music

Centuries ago, one had to frequent remote concert halls to hear White Music, but today one can't step into an elevator or wait in an air terminal without sampling a White Music medley that usually includes at least one of the following: "Thumbelina," "The Petticoats of Portugal," "The Naughty Lady of Shady Lane," "Holiday for Strings," or "The Pizzicato Polka." This "pop" music originated in the prep schools of Connecticut and came down the Merritt Parkway to Tin Pan Alley, where, quick to grasp its potential, such capable performers as Fred Waring and the Pennsylvanians and "The Singing Rage," Miss Patti Page, soon had Caucasians all over the country two- (or "box") stepping to these memorable melodies. Of course, much of the credit for the advancement of White Music must go to Arthur Fiedler, who, in any given concert, spans the White Musical experience by performing both light classics (i.e., "The Typewriter Song") and serious works (i.e., "The Grand Canyon Suite") alike.

Protection of overseas investments from illegal seizure without just compensation
Speedy repayment of development loans
Allotment of votes in the United Nations based on member states' contributions to the U.N. budget
Recognition of the use of force as the primary means of settling disputes between nations
Noninterference with military interventions in First World spheres of influence
An end to exorbitant "blackmailing" of First World countries in the sale of oil and the use of territory for air and naval bases
Unhindered access to worldwide natural resources for responsible consortiums
Acknowledgment of the fundamental right to rule for white minorities
Acceptance of the First World nuclear-weapons hegemony as the soundest basis for a stable world order
Immediate payment of reparations for the religions, moral codes, and languages; the educational, legal, and governmental systems; the traditions of hard work and fair play; and the centuries of efficient rule provided to former colonial possessions for free by First World countries
Universal adherence to the principle of narrow selfinterest in the conduct of international affairs.

## White Pride

What you can do to further the cause of White Pride in your community:

Join with other uncolored people in planning and participating in activities as part of the Fifth White Awareness Millennium (A.d. 1,000-2,000).

Insist on the display of White symbols, such as the American flag; busts of Shakespeare, Descartes, and Plato; and quotes from Ralph Waldo Emerson in schools and other public buildings.
See to it that your local school provides your younger children with reading texts that contain depictions of farm animals, pastures, suburban life, and other scenes they can relate to, and make sure that American History courses stress important events in White history like the discovery of the New World, the American Revolution, the Louisiana Purchase, and World War I.
Plan a White meal for your family. (Places specializing in White foods are easy to find: just look in the Yellow Pages under "Supermarkets" or, if you prefer to eat out, under "Restaurants.")
Arrange a neighborhood Scrabble tournament.
