Paris, Oct. 11.-(/P)-The United States told the Peace conference today it was ready to join in any United Nations defense of Greece "If Greece's security is endangered by the acts of an aggressor nation." The U. S. ambassador to France. Jefferson Caffery, speaking on the peace treaty with Bulgaria, said the United States had consented to leave Bulgaria only because Americans relied up-on United Nations safeguards to protect Greece from any attack. "Can Be Counted Upon to Act" "The United States delegation rangive full assurance that the United States can be counted up-on to act" in necordance with such measures, Caffery told the dele-sates. Ancient Indian Cultural Ties Reached South of the Border

(P) Newsfeatures Norman Okla .-- A cultural exchange between Indians living in what is now Mexico and the southcentral region of the United States, conturies before the arrival of

centuries before the arrival of white men, has been established to the scattaraction of scientists at-tending a University of Oklahoma archeological symposium. The shapes of pipes, ornaments, bowls, and burial mounds left by ancient Oklahomans show a marked similarity to similar ob-jects made in Mexico about the year 3000, it was agreed by Ed-uardo Noguera, director of Mexi-ce City's National Museum of An-tropology and fellow Mexican archeologist, Wilfrido du Solier.

Evidence that the cultural exchange did not entirely originate south of the border was given by Pere Armilias, another Mexican expert, who said the use of copper in the Mississippi valley pre-dated its use in his country. Copper used by Okla-homa primitives is believed to have come from the Great Lakes

Dr. Kenneth G. Orr. University of Chicago teacher who has di-rected field work for the Univerrected field work for the Univer-Oklahomans had a culture 2,000 years old. He explained that it flourished long before the intro-duction of Mexican techniques by roaming America






