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More Boats, More Patience in 2015

As this issue of Northwest Yachting Magazine goes to press, it's a good time to take stock. This has been a big year for us.

When founder Dan Schworer died, the crew here at Northwest Yachting pulled together quickly,

made adjustments and kept the ship moving forward. We're now looking at ways to serve both our readers and our advertisers even better in the years to come. If you haven't taken the reader survey, please do. You can find it online at nwyachting.com or at the back of this issue on the Index to Advertisers page.

Now for a look back at an incredible year of boating in the Pacific North-

Low fuel prices, unbelievable weather and a stronger economy helped spur boat sales and, more importantly, boat usage. There were more boats on the water, from kayaks

to mega-yachts. Boat yards were busy, anchorages a little tight at times and guest moorages filling up. It seems the Northwest boating community is finally shaking off the doldrums of 2008.

The salmon fishing was mixed in 2015, with the blackmouth strong at the beginning of the year and a great Chinook season in Willapa Bay and the lower Columbia. The coho season wasn't strong, particularly in Puget Sound. Our own Tony Floor has concerns about the effect of The Blob (the wandering area of warm water in the Pacific) and what the poor coho run might portend. Anglers and fisheries experts will be watching 2016 very closely.

In sailboat racing, the most dramatic changes have come at the top end of the fleet. We now have four TP52s in the region plus the slightly-larger Crossfire. They're racing under IRC, so there's no PHRF drama to bog things down. There are few things as exciting as being part a fleet of 50+ footers charging a start line.

On the political front, the Northwest Marine Trade Association (NMTA) scored two big victories.



Hopefully all of us will be able to use our boats more than ever, and get to some remote anchorages. That might require cozying up to another boat or two, which is not a bad thing. Photo courtesy of San Juan Sailing.

The first had to do with health care. The NMTA and several other membership organizations won a court case that will allow them to continue providing affordable health care to their members. The other major victory, years in the making, was passage of the Marine Tourism Bill that enabled boats owned in an "entity-capacity" (usually larger boats owned by an LLC, S-Corp, charter or partnership) to stay in Washington waters 180 days instead of just 60. This was a significant triumph and will be an enticement for more large yachts to visit Washington waters.

There will, of course, be new issues in 2016. Right out of the gate, Seattle boaters are dealing with two big ones. Will a "runway" for float planes be established in Lake Union? Discussion is ongoing. The vehicle traffic disaster that is Seattle may well put some limitations on

As I look forward to this year, I see crowding as an issue bubbling up for all of us. We can expect more boats out there, and we're all going to have to exercise a bit more caution and understanding. Kayaks and SUPs are everywhere, and often not very visible, especially at harbor entrances. Some of these boaters are unfamiliar with the rules of the road, and really don't have an idea of a bigger boat's handling limitations. Anchorages are getting more crowded again, so we may need to exercise a little more patience and

ers around the world. Jake Beattie and the crew at the Northwest Mari-

time Center created a new genre

of non-motorized races. Paddlers and sailors lined up for a 750-mile

(and \$10K) handily, but everyone

admits his trimaran might not have

won in a different weather pattern.

The event is on again in 2016, and

expect even more media coverage

and hubbub this time around.

That said, it'll be a great year. No matter the weather.



Dear Northwest Yachting,

On page 45 of your October issue in an article "Alaska Bound - Part 16," Marianne Scott wrote: "Retracing our route through Grenville Channel, we opted to anchor in highly protected Baker Inlet. . . The chart needs updating as our GPS had us traversing the channel over land."

We at the Canadian Hydrographic Service (CHS) are always anxious to follow up any issues with CHS products that may compromise the safety of anyone using our charts. We are therefore anxious to determine:

*What chart was being used at the time? Is this a CHS product or something else?

*What evidence is there to suggest the chart is at fault? Although based on older data we have checked our product and cannot find the problem being reported. It is possible that there were other factors such as high terrain interfering with GPS reception.

Over the years I have followed up a number of similar issues. While some do prove to be valid concerns, it is more often the case that the chart is blamed for poor navigation, faulty equipment or other reasons. I am also

surprised that people do not follow up by contacting us. If they believe they have identified an important safety concern that may put others in danger, they need to follow up to help prevent possible future accidents. This is an important message that needs to be communicated to boaters at every opportunity.

Hope this helps and look forward to hearing from you if any further information about this potentially dangerous incident can be forward-

Mr. Jackson's message was forwarded to Marianne Scott, who replied:

Dear Mr. Jackson,

About our entry into Baker Inlet from Grenville Channel, let me answer your questions.

We use Coastal Explorer electronic charts. They base their Canadian charts on the CHS.

I've reviewed with my husband the circumstances of the entry to Baker Inlet. This is what we recall:

*The entrance is narrow and drains a large inlet.

*We went into an ebbing tide with at least 3.5 knots of current against us.

*The water was highly turbulent. *The GPS reported we were mov-

ing overland on the port (north) side. *There are some hills around the inlet, but nothing too high, especially after experiencing high mountains during a 3.5 month trip to Alaska and through some of BC's fjords.

*We believe our GPS is OK as this is the only time we moved over land during this long voyage.

*We don't believe this was poor navigation.

You are right that we should have contacted you about this anomaly. We will do so in the future if we run into a similar problem. Baker Inlet is not easy to get into and might be skipped by others who are sailing in this area. This may account for it not being reported before.

I hope this answers your questions.

Hello again Marianne,

All the best of the season to you from a very rainy day in Pat Bay. My apologies for not getting a response to you a little earlier but I wanted to take the time to ensure we did a thorough investigation. We have double checked our chart data in Baker Inlet against independent sources and can find no significant problem with it. Certainly nothing that would explain why a GPS equipped vessel would appear transiting across dry land.

If you refer to the image attached we have overlain the CHS chart on top of a geo-referenced aerial photograph. Typically these images have a

horizontal data accuracy of about 2 metres. As you can see the match is very good which indicates to us that the problem reported is not due to the chart but lies elsewhere. GPS is very good and we have all become very reliant upon it. However, there are problems such as terrain masking, multipath and other errors that do occur, and people may not be familiar with them. A prudent navigator will never rely on a single source of information for positioning and should always use all tools available. We also should all be aware of the different navigation tools that we use and their strengths and weaknesses.

Lastly I would like all boaters to know that we appreciate any client feedback that can help us improve our products and safety to navigation. If anyone does have any information then I would urge them to contact CHS through our website www.charts.gc.ca/index-eng.asp

Mr. Schrappen Goes to Washington and Visits the White House

'get a lot of email, but it's not every day that an invite comes across my desk to visit the White House on behalf of recreational boating. This oncein-a-lifetime invite was part of a larger gathering of business leaders to hear from the Obama administration on how they are preparing for climate change and how businesses are responding to significant storm events.

As a political junkie, it was an unbelievable privilege for me to advocate for all of you. It was an avenue for me to channel you for the four-hour meeting. Cynics might call these dog-and-pony shows. What I found was quite

the opposite. The organizers (an organization called "Business Forward") wanted a dialogue between

President Obama staffers and both temperatures has greatly harmed small and large businesses.

And from the looks of it, that's what they received. In preparation, I focused less on the future aspects of climate change and more on how energy policy affects boating, and how businesses and ports have fared with major weather events.

For starters, I relied on Frank Urabeck, long-time recreational fishing advocate, to educate me on the drought conditions and the current news coming from Lake Washington about sockeye populations. Talk about a real downer: the double-whammy of the drought/lack of snow pack and the hot summer fish counts.

As Frank recounted to me, the water temperatures that coincided with the adult Chinook and sockeye migrations were well above safe levels. The sockeye, in particular, were severely stressed, resulting in two-thirds of them dying before they reached their birth waters of the Cedar River, which is about twenty miles from Seattle's Ship Canal. Historically, Cedar River sockeye have produced very popular Lake Washington sport and tribal fisheries. Not good news for this \$8 million fishery.

Thinking outside of the Northwest, there are other impacts of climate





change worth noting that might serve as a gloomy harbinger (but trust me this entire column isn't all a downer). The next impact worth considering is the link that scientists have made between the influx of zebra and quagga mussels and the warming of waters, particularly in the Midwest.

Everyone remembers the scenes from Hurricane Sandy in 2013. Did you know that storm caused \$1.2 billion worth of damage to New Jersey's \$2 billion recreational-boating economy? With over 10,000 boats destroyed, the state and the boating advocacy efforts have used this crisis as an opportunity to grow boating. In particular in the last couple of weeks, the state legislature slashed sales tax on boats bought in New Jersey by 50 percent. That reduction was a pragmatic approach by their lawmakers to turn a crisis into an economic opportunity. As New Jersey state Senator Jeff Van Drew (D-Cape May), sponsor of the bill, said, "The production of boats and other vessels has declined in recent years due to a range of factors, including the economic recession and the impact of Superstorm Sandy."

While armed with this information for my visit to 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue, I also brought important updates on ethanol and the Land and Water Conservation Fund with me. Frankly, I had no idea what to expect of even if I would get a chance to speak. Who could be in attendance? Could I hit it off with the organizers and then get an invite to hang out with Michelle and Barack?

As you can see, my imagination was running rampant. What played out was a crisply run meeting that allowed business leaders to get updated on the administration's "Clean Power Plan" and for them to hear how we are addressing climate change.

Given that frame and the understanding of how fleeting the moments to speak at these meetings can be, I raised my hand early on in the proceedings to get my money's worth. I'm not exactly sure that Dan Utech, Deputy Assistant to President Obama for Energy and Climate Change, knew what would transpire when he called on me (as I sure didn't).

Anyhow, I hope I did you proud. I'm from the school that it's always best to start with a thank you (hug 'em) and then segue into the "slug 'em" piece. With that mindset, my ditty went something like this:


"I'm Peter Schrappen with the Northwest Marine Trade Association. We have more than 700 members and we represent the \$4 billion recreational boating industry. We are also quite active with the National Marine Manufactures Association (NMMA), which serve as our Federal partners.

"Thank you for the President's support of the Land and Water Conservation Fund in a recent weekly radio address. We would like to see this 50-year program reauthorized before Congress adjourns. I did want to bring up the catastrophe that we fear with the increased ethanol blends. There looks to be a move to increase the blend to E15. That would be devastating to our \$121 billion national industry. I want to make that point to you and the President."

Like I said, he was caught off guard. He reminded me that EPA just released some new numbers and that he appreciated my point. That's code for "um, you caught me flat-footed." The next step is for me to conncect Mr. Utech with the National Marine Manufacturer's Association.

The day ended with a glass of wine (or two) with long-time boating champion Rep. Kilmer (Democrat -West Sound). He's always gracious with his time and always starts our conversations with "How can I be a better advocate for boating?" To that, I, again, did you proud reminding him of the importance of sportfishing, dredging, the Land and Water Conservation Fund and then "got all grumpy" on him with the update on ethanol.

All in all, the day was one for the ages. Each day is different here and some will stand up to the test of time over others. On the flight home after this whirlwind 48-hour trip, I ran into some colleagues. They made the mistake of asking me what I was doing in DC. You can bet they heard an earful from my meeting at the White House. Funny, they must have been the two people who my mom had not yet reached out to with that news.

January Highlights: Great Winter Blackmouth, Seattle Boat Show

o you smell something? I think I detect the aroma of fresh fiberglass. Now, blindfold me and shove me in the door of the Seattle Boat Show, the largest boat show on the West Coast and let me inhale. Ahhhhhhhh, how I love the smell of fiberglass in the morning! Paris has nothing on this fragrance!

Dude! It's happened every January for the last 68 years. And not to be denied, here it comes again, like a train onschedule, beginning Friday, January 29 through Saturday, February 6.

I can't help getting amped-up for the Seattle Boat Show. It's a ritual for this cat, to stroll down the aisles of the Show, drooling like a St. Bernard on a hundred degree day in July. Look at all the awesome fishing boats! Ocean Sport, Grady, Osprey, North River, Hewes Craft, Sea Sport, Weldcraft, Duckworth! OMG, somebody help me!

And check out the free fishing seminars offered by the best of the best fishing speakers in the Pacific Northwest. Crabbing, shrimping, winter blackmouth, summer king salmon, albacore, lingcod, halibut and more. It's a grand salami dude! I can't recommend a better investment of time: To learn from experts on how to improve your

success pursuing fish and shellfish throughout the year.

Winter Blackmouth Fishing

As resuscitation eventually kicks in, I'm also thinking about more winter blackmouth fishing this month. As most of us recognize, blackmouth fishing got off to a rocky start with unprecedented restrictions in central and north Puget Sound, known

as Areas 9 and 10. And, in marine waters behind Whidbey Island, the lack of keeper-sized blackmouth has been beyond boring, setting the tone for questions about survival rates and absence of 22-inch plus fish.

Many of us waited, a month ago, for the blackmouth fishing opener in the San Juans on December 1st, remembering the 2014 opener when it rained big, gorgeous winter chinook salmon in the Islands.

I was there for the first two days of December, fishing with San Juan Islandshighliner angler Derek Floyd. Again, if you fished the Islands last month, the bonanza of December 2014 was not to be repeated. Sublegal sized blackmouth, a lower than normal presence of hatchery produced adipose fin-clipped chinook paved the road to unveil a historical lackluster opener for the San Juan Islands winter fishery.

Hey, coming home from the Islands with two 10-pound chinook will not trigger an orchestra to break out violins for this angler, as I am in the camp that one of these gorgeous fish per day meets the definition of a good fishing trip.

The catch rate for winter blackmouth in the Islands was clearly captured during the Friday Harbor Salmon Classic and Resurrection Salmon Derby on the first weekend of last month.

As many of us know, both tournaments, based out of Friday Harbor and Anacortes respectively, produced about a 100 blackmouth from 170 boats, about half of recent year averages.

But ask Bellingham veteran angler Mike McAuley, who fished with San Juan Islands fishing guru Kirk Hawley and WDFW salmon hatchery manager Pat Phillips during





the Friday Harbor Salmon Classic, about fishing in early December. An 18-pound winter blackmouth, caught near Sucia Island by McAuley delivered \$21,600 to win the tournament! The bag of dough clearly helped with the Friday Harbor bar bill, Christmas shopping and enough grins to turn cheek muscles into biceps.

I've fished with Kirk Hawley dating back to the early 80s in the old Rosario Salmon Derby. Year after year, he was around the money. And if you were fishing next to him, you were clearly in the right spot. Hawley is one of the best anglers in the Islands, in my opinion, who knows the San Juans winter chinook fishery better than Bill Gates understands computers. It was no surprise to see his team standing on the awards ceremony platform again. You rock, Hawley!

Meanwhile, over at the Anacortes Resurrection Salmon Derby, Ryan Kies pocketed \$13,900 by landing a hefty 19½ pound chinook. For Kies, a former Moses Lake baseball coach, this fish was one of the biggest home runs of his fishing life!


The next winter blackmouth tournament is the big Roche Harbor Salmon Classic, January 21-23. If you're considering going, sorry, too late. It sold out (100 boat cap) about a month and a half ago. However, they do maintain a waiting

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

I like to think of rain as a permissive pal, restoring serenity to my daily endeavor while slowing me down. I attempt to make an attitude adjustment by rediscovering the splendors of rain through my senses. I watch the storm with a cup of tea, listening to the melody of the rain on the water. I breathe in the fresh fragrance of rain. I read, I write, I tackle unfinished projects. I putter. I make comfort food...

Comfort food is the equivalent of a cozy sweater, a kiss on the forehead, a favorite blanket. Remember those well-loved recipes from childhood – the ones that conjure up happy,

innocent moments when all was right with the world? However abysmal it really was, childhood seems to look so much more appealing the farther away it gets! But, we're never really too old for "comfort" food – evocative of more peaceful times as a child, reminding us of feeling warm, safe, and happy.

It is difficult to precisely pinpoint a definition for comfort food. It is truly a personal thing and we all have our favorites, I'm sure. However, in talking to friends and family about this, there seems to be a common thread. The foods that fall into this bracket are simple, sometimes bland and creamy, hearty, and very often sweet. Chocolate tops the list with puddings, ice cream, pasta, and soup following. Comfort food is over the top. It is pushing the point – making memories in Technicolor. It is unpretentious, rich in flavor,

and you feel good both making it and eating it. One thing is certain: comfort food is not diet food...

Borrowing fare from our childhood, we add a delightful twist to yet another dreary, bordering on unbearable, January. The next time you are on edge with jangled nerves, treat yourself to something smooth, comforting, and delectable—something that will make you smack your lips and soothe your jaded palate.

Buried beneath the layers of ennui and resignation are these inviting interludes in which to reassess our unconscious attitudes and assumptions. From Noah and his ark to the weatherman's profuse apologies, rain has had a bad rap. I suspect this is because we tend to think of rain as restrictive rather than redemptive. I am of the school that the charms of a rainy day nearly beg for redemption.

Tomato with Basil Soup

30 oz. canned tomatoes, chopped 1 med. onion, thinly sliced 1 T. butter 1 bay leaf 1 heaping T. brown sugar 2 tsp. chopped fresh basil 1 ½ tsp. cinnamon ¼ tsp. cloves 1 tsp. salt ½ tsp. black pepper 1 pt. cream

1 c. milk

Sauté onion in butter and add chopped tomatoes. Add bay leaf, sugar, cinnamon, cloves, salt, pepper, and basil. Simmer, stirring occasionally, until tomatoes are thoroughly cooked – about 25 minutes. Remove bay leaf and transfer mixture to food processor to puree; strain. Add cream and milk; heat through. Garnish with chopped parsley and croutons. Excellent with fresh petits pain for dipping.

Meat Loaf

1½ - 2 lbs. ground chuck (hefty fat content)
¼ lb. ground sausage
1 egg
1½ c. saltine cracker crumbs
¾ c. ketchup
½ tsp. Johnny's Dock seasoning salt
1 garlic clove, minced
1/3 c. finely chopped onion
1 tsp. chopped parsley
2 bacon slices

Combine all ingredients except bacon in a bowl and blend well with fingers. Push into glass loaf pan and top with 2 bacon slices. Cook at 350° for 1 hour or until done. Serve with either macaroni and cheese or scalloped potatoes.

Company Macaroni

1 ¾ c. elbow macaroni 2 c. cottage cheese 1 c. sour cream 2 c. grated sharp cheddar 1 egg ¾ tsp. salt dash of pepper

Cook and drain macaroni. Combine all and turn into 9x9x2" baking dish. Bake at 350° for 45 minutes.

Scalloped Potatoes

Peel 4-5 average sized baking potatoes and slice as thin as possible (my Mother used a "crinkly" slicer). Butter a Pyrex dish and layer with potatoes, flour, butter dots, Accent, salt, pepper, and onion salt until you reach the top. Pour milk overall, cover, and bake at 350° for approximately 1 hour or until done. You might want to lay a sheet of foil on the baking rack under dish to combat spillage.

Jeanne's Peanut Butter Pie

6 oz. chocolate chips ½ c. butter 2 ½ c. Rice Krispies 8 oz. cream cheese 1 can Eagle Brand milk ¾ c. peanut butter 3 T. lemon juice 1 tsp. vanilla 1 c. Cool-Whip 2 tsp. chocolate syrup

Melt chocolate chips with butter and add Rice Krispies. Mix, then press into 9" pie plate. Beat cream cheese, milk, and peanut butter until smooth. Stir in lemon juice and vanilla; fold in Cool Whip and pour into crust. Drizzle chocolate syrup over top and swirl.

Selah Cinnamon Bread

1 loaf frozen white bread dough 12 oz. evaporated milk 2 c. cinnamon/sugar mix 1/4 lb. butter

Thaw dough; cut into ½" slices and dip slices into milk then cinnamon/sugar mix. Place in greased loaf pan in loaf shape. Cut butter into pats, placing 1 pat between each slice. Put extra pats on top. Take 3 tablespoons remaining milk and add enough cinnamon/sugar mix to make a thick sauce – pour over top. Let rise in warm place for 2 hours or until double in bulk. Bake at 375° for ½ hour or until golden brown.



he hardiest of Northwest sailors embarking on a passage to the Baja Peninsula of Mexico may elect to make the first leg of the voyage, most commonly to San Diego, in one long arc taking them off shore for calmer waters and

more favorable winds. The majority of cruising sailors we have met in Mexico, however, have adopted a plan similar to the one we had; that is, they have followed the shorter coastal route, offering the additional advantage of proximity to a harbor

to address other sorts of personal or nautical needs or desires.

Even without the necessity of stopping in this approximately 1,500-mile voyage from Cape Flattery to San Diego, perhaps you will

to find shelter from bad weather or be ready for a stop for fuel, food, and fun by the time you reach the Central California coast. By this time, vou will have been at sea for at least a week and will have successfully rounded the dreaded Cape Flattery, Cape Mendocino, and

Point Arena and may be ready for a change of pace. As former long-time San Francisco Bay boaters, we have two favorite harbors along the coast of Central California that can serve all your needs.

Bodega Bay

The first and most northerly of these is Bodega Bay, approximately 950 miles south of Flattery. The harbor is one of the best protected along the Pacific coast and has both charm and function for the cruising sailor.

The charm of Bodega Bay lies in its nautical history and atmosphere. Thousands of years ago the Coast Miwoks lived and apparently thrived along the shores of this bay; and in the early 19th Century, the Spanish and the Russians contested their claims to this useful port. Later, good of the area including dairy products, grain, fish, potatoes, and other produce were shipped from this bay. This enterprise resulted in the silting of the bay and nearby creek and the subsequent construction of a narrow gauge railway.

Today, fish are the primary export, evidenced by the large numbers of fishing boats docked at the marinas. But its past prominence as a potato harbor is honored in the name of the county marina, Spud Point. One of the pleasures you might take in

Bodega Harbor is to wander along the docks after the fishing fleet has come in. Anumber of the commercial fishermen will have fresh fish for sale off their boats, although they usually sell if it is a tuna catch.

Perhaps, though, you've had such good luck with your coastal fishing along the way that you'll prefer other kinds of walks. You can hike along Westshore Road, running alongside the marinas and up to Bodega Head, to take in the coastal

scene of rugged brown cliffs and boulders where the ocean breaks in crescendos of foaming white water. Between November and April you may well spot the spouts of the migrating gray whales, and, though in smaller numbers, of orcas, humpbacks, fins, and blues.

From Bodega Head, you can continue north to Bodega Dunes State Park, where a variety of shore and sea birds will greet you with their raucous calls, these birds made famous,

or infamous, from Alfred Hitchcock's suspense movie *The Birds*. The only remaining building in town that is recognizable in Hitchcock's film as the schoolhouse is the 150-year-old Potter School from about 7 miles from the marina, fire having destroyed the other structures. On a sunny day—more common in the fall than in the spring—you may choose to enjoy a few hours on Doran Beach, either on the beach itself or on the hiking trails that pass clam flats and a salt marsh.

Bodega Harbor will also afford you the opportunity of topping off your fuel tanks at Spud Point Marina and filling your refrigerator and lockers with fresh produce and meats in town. You can often purchase fresh fish, particularly tuna, off the fishing boats in the marinas; from the fish market in the Tides Restaurant, about one mile from the marina in the small town of Bodega Bay; and from the North Coast Fisheries Market, adjacent to the Spud Point Marina office. The Spud Point Crab Company restaurant, across the street from the Spud Point Yacht Harbor, sells fresh crab.



Identify the two buoys at the entrance into Bodega Bay: "R 30," off Bodega Head; and "BA" (called Jingle Bells locally), off the south end of Bodega Rock. These buoys may be difficult to see in heavy seas or low fog. Regardless of the conditions, however, do not enter Bodega Harbor until you have a visual sighting of "BA" to assure that you also have a view of Bodega Rock. Then set a course from "BA" to take you east of Bodega Rock in order to avoid the rocks under the water northwest of "BA."

Though you may be tempted to follow local boaters through the shortcut between Bodega Rock and Bodega Head, we recommend you resist that temptation. Local Coast Guard personnel are adamant that this is not a viable channel except in the calmest weather, and we have always judged that stipulation to mean it is not a viable shortcut for first-time visitors to Bodega Channel.

The entrance channel into Bodega Harbor runs east to west for the first 0.5 mile before making a northerly run between Bodega Head and the peninsula, Doran Beach, where you'll see parked RV units as you pass in the channel. Carefully stay in this well-marked channel, which has at least 12 feet of water; the water just outside the markers, on the other



hand, is shallow enough to assure you'll go aground.

Marinas

In Bodega three marinas are available to visiting boaters. All three are close enough for you to walk to the market, with Porto Bodega being the closest. The fuel dock is between Spud Point and Mason's marinas.

Spud Point Marina

The first marina along the channel, approximately 1.5 miles from the entrance into Bodega Harbor, Spud Point Marina is a modern facility of 244 slips, serving both pleasure and commercial fishing boats. You may reach the harbormaster at 707-875-3535 or VHF 16 and 68 on weekdays; however, if you're unable to contact the harbor office, you may tie up in any of the empty transient slips, which are marked by a 5-inch red anchor on the dock box and check in later at the harbor office.

To enter Spud Point Marina, turn to port after passing Buoy "G 33" and follow the pair of buoys past a breakwater on the port side. Depths in the channel inside the marina are about 12 feet. This marina has laundry, pump out, and WiFi. The fuel dock, a bait and tackle shop, a deli/mini-market, and access to

public transportation are nearby. Another valuable service at Spud Point Marina is the Weather Information Station on the back deck of the marina office. This information is particularly valuable to boaters transiting the California coastline.

Mason's Marina

Mason's, the second marina after you enter Bodega Harbor, is immediately north of Spud Point Marina. While the staff at Mason's welcomes visiting boaters, working fishing boats generally occupy all the slips here; be aware, too, that the longest slips are for boats 40 feet and under. The depths in this marina are a minimum of 7 feet at low water.

If you'd like to experience the ambiance of a small working marina, call 707-875-3811 to inquire about availability. Sonoma County operates both Spud Point and Mason's, and the office at Spud Point assigns slips for both marinas. Mason's has a small store on the premises that sells snacks and drinks and a few other items such as engine oil.

Porto Bodega

The third marina, Porto Bodega, is at the north end of the main channel in Bodega Harbor. Like Mason's, this marina welcomes visiting boats, but it, too, can handle boats no longer than 40 feet, and depths here are also about 7 feet at low water.

Of the three marinas, Porto Bodega is the closest to the large restaurants, markets, and other businesses of the town of Bodega Bay. Hail the marina on VHF 16 or 71, or call 707-985-2354.

Anchorage

If you'd prefer to anchor out rather than go into the harbor—and if weather conditions permit—the best nearby anchorage is off Doran Beach. You can anchor in 10-20 feet of water immediately outside the harbor, near the west end of the beach and north of the north jetty. You can anchor in 10-20 feet of water. This jetty, almost 1,000 feet long, provides protection from south swells; and the peninsula protects boats from the northerly winds. However, you'll not want to anchor here in southerly winds or a westerly swell.

Most cruisers anchored here take their tenders ashore on the beach behind the north jetty, but another option is to go up the channel and tie your tender alongside the small dock beside the launch ramp south of the Coast Guard station, being careful not to block access to the ramp.

Sausalito

Another gem for a southbound stopover is Richardson Bay, a capacious embayment just inside San Francisco Bay, 55 miles farther south. Sausalito, on everyone's list of favorite cities in the Bay Area, spreads along the west and north shores of Richardson Bay, with the tree-studded hills of the Tiburon Peninsula to the east. The west shore of Richardson Bay, by far the largest embayment in the entire San Francisco Bay, is lined with marinas and marine services for about 2 miles. Among those services is a new, expansive West Marine.

The large anchorage is generally shallow, in many areas precariously so, and the water can be somewhat turbulent while you're there, however, we think you'll nevertheless find the stop here one of the highlights of your coastal passage. From both the anchorage and the marinas, you'll have immediate access to all the services, both marine and otherwise, of this small city of 7,100 residents.

Sausalito has a long tradition as a nautical center, a tradition still much in evidence today. In 1775, when Juan Manuel de Ayala, the captain of a Spanish ship and the first European recorded to have arrived in San Francisco Bay, sailed into this embayment, a reported 2,500 Miwoks lived along its shores. Presumably impressed with the copious amounts of tule grass growing along the shores, Ayala named the bay Saucelito, a derivative of the Spanish for "little willow grove."

In 1838 the first permanent European settlement here began when an English seaman named Richardson obtained a Mexican land grant for Rancho Saucelito. Richardson became and has remained the name of this first large bay inside and slightly

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
north of the Golden Gate and the diminutive Horseshoe Bay.

Along the waterfront remain memorabilia from the era of World War II, when shipbuilding was a thriving enterprise in Sausalito. Though shipbuilding had begun along this bay as early as 1890, the remaining huge barn-like structures date from the shipbuilding of the early 1940s, among them the Marinship shipyard, which built 93 of the Liberty ships, as well as tankers and landing craft, here.

The appeal of Richardson Bay, more commonly referred to as simply Sausalito, go far beyond its history and its access to all the services of the city of Sausalito. One attraction is the surpassing beauty of the

entire scene around the bay. From the anchorage you'll see the tops of the brick-red towers of the Golden Gate Bridge. On summer afternoons billows of fog reliably roll inland from the ocean to cover these towers as well as the green hills dotted with houses above the waterfront of Sausalito. Looking north beyond the anchorage your eyes can follow the estuary as it winds and narrows before it disappears from view. Eastward are the green heights of the Tiburon Peninsula. And by night the lights of the City, across the San Francisco Bay to the south, sparkle like the jewels as they illuminate the shore and climb up the hillsides.

In the 19th Century wealthy San Franciscans built elegant summer





homes on the hills overlooking Richardson Bay. Though you can see some of these Victorian beauties from your boat, you may want to get a bit of aerobic exercise by hiking up the steep hills for a closer look.

Save an hour or two of your sightseeing to visit what may become the most memorable scene of your stay in Sausalito: the Bay Model Visitor Center, located in the Marinship area. Operated by the U.S. Corps of Engineers and free to the public, the Bay Model is a one-acre scale model of the complete San Francisco Bay-California Delta system. Employing hydraulic pumps, the model simulates the ocean tides and Delta River flows to demonstrate the effects on the Bay. You'll walk along the shores of the entire Bay and Delta, in miniature, as the waters slowly rise and recede in imitation of the ceaseless rhythms of this intricately balanced water system.

If you're a fairly competent hiker, you can walk to the Marin Headlands in the Golden Gate National Recreation Area. Follow the shoreline south of Sausalito Point for about a mile to the recreation area, where a hiking trail veers off to the left just before the "Y" in the road. This trail connects with the numerous trails crisscrossing the Marin Headlands, in the spring laden with wildflowers-Blue Lupine, Yellow Mimulus, Queen Anne's Lace, and California

Poppies. Seasonally, migrating birds occupy both the skies and trees on their journey. And year round, hawks, egrets, terns, and pelicans soar above this shoreline.

The practical attractions of Richardson Bay include access to all the facilities available in a small city and convenient ferry service from

Sausalito to the San Francisco Ferry Building, where you can also go on to Oakland, Alameda, and even farther afield, Vallejo. Once at the ferry terminal in San Francisco, you'll have access to the Bay Area Rapid Transit system (BART) to go to the airport or to numerous cities in the Bay Area.

Approach

From Bodega Bay, you'll follow the coastline south for 20 miles to Point Reyes. Continue for 27 miles to the Buoy #7, the easternmost buoy of the

San Francisco ship channel, to avoid the turbulence of the Potato Patch immediately offshore of Point Bonita Light. From this buoy, the Richardson Bay Entrance Marker #2 is eight miles. You'll pass under the center span of the Golden Gate Bridge, past small Horseshoe Cove to the north and, to the south, Fort Point Museum before reaching the entrance into Richardson Bay.

Marinas

Though Sausalito, one of the most popular destinations in the entire Bay, has six marinas, these six often have few accommodations for visiting boaters. The harbormasters of Sausalito Yacht Harbor, Pelican Yacht Harbor and Richardson Bay Marina say they cannot provide slips to visitors. The remaining marinas—Sausalito Cruising Club, Schoonmaker Point Marina, and Clipper Yacht Harbor—are often filled, but the harbormasters at each of these latter three clubs will provide guest berths as availability permits.

In addition to the usual perks that accompany berthing in a marina, you'll find a noticeable difference between the calm waters of the marinas, all well up inside Richardson Bay, and the anchorage, which is much more affected by the waters of the San Francisco Bay, that are often roiled up by the boat traffic, wind and waves of the open ocean immediately beyond the Golden Gate.

Sausalito Cruising Club

The Sausalito Cruising Club, a private marina, sometimes has



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reciprocal slips for a few visiting cruising boats if the captains are members of other yacht clubs.

To reach the Cruising Club from Entrance Marker "2", proceed up the Sausalito Channel, carefully keeping the red channel markers to starboard. At Marker "6", slightly more than a half mile beyond the Spinnaker Restaurant, prominent on the west side of the anchorage, turn to port toward the Sausalito Cruising Club.

Because the depth of the entrance into the marina is four feet or less at low water, enter only at close to high water. To avoid going aground, stay close to the "F" dock of Schoonmaker Point Marina, the marina immediately northwest of the Cruising Club, until you reach the guest dock at the Club. Then go slowly as you turn toward the main dock of the club. Do not turn into the basin until you can see the club facilities directly off your bow. For availability on the guest dock and for up-to-date directions, call ahead to the Club port captain, at 415-994-9950.

In addition to its proximity to the facilities of the city, this marina offers free WiFi to its guests. You may also get permission to leave your tender at this marina's guest dock if you decide to anchor out. The large number of dinghies evident there on most days will help you identify the dock.

Schoonmaker Point Marina

Schoonmaker is strictly an upscale marina, with all the amenities a boater could require, including beautiful wide concrete docks. This marina commonly has berths available for visiting boaters. All this comfort and convenience come at a price, of course, but you'll surely find the price worth paying. This marina has sufficient depths and large enough slips to accommodate boats up to 70 feet long.

Schoonmaker Point Marina is 200 yards beyond the Sausalito Cruising Club, its entrance, leading toward the harbormaster's office, immediately after Marker "6". Call ahead to 415-331-5550 for slip availability.

Clipper Yacht Harbor

Clipper Yacht Harbor, an especially well-run facility, is conveniently located near marine repair facilities, chandleries, and restaurants. In fact, this marina is adjacent to KKMI, a large, well-equipped marine repair facility. A large, 600-slip facility, Clipper has a specific guest berth area; but even when those berths are filled, the harbormaster will attempt to accommodate guest boats if prospective visitors call ahead, at 415-332-3500.

In addition to free WiFi, this marina has a fuel dock as well as pump out and laundry facilities.

Up Sausalito Channel almost one mile beyond Schoonmaker, you can identify Clipper Yacht Harbor by the Chevron sign marking the busy fuel dock. Again, as with all areas in Richardson Bay, stay carefully in the channel.

Anchorages

The best anchorage for visiting boaters is in the south anchorage across the Sausalito Channel from the Spinnaker Restaurant. Shallow water is a problem for those who anchor farther north in Richardson Bay, but water depths in this preferred anchorage are 10 feet or more. Don't be surprised if you find vast numbers of boats anchored here. When we were in Richardson Bay a few months ago, we counted more than a hundred boats at anchor.


From this anchorage, you can take your tender ashore at Schoonmaker Point Marina and tie to the docks inside the basin, south of the office, or at the dinghy dock of the Sausalito Cruising Club. Call ahead for permission to leave you tender at either of these docks.

While most of us cruising sailors relish the challenge of long passages over the water, many of us also enjoy a brief respite from the "swing of the

sea" and the option of provisioning and fueling along the way. We also usually eagerly seize on the possibility of acquainting ourselves with new places and all the pleasures those places can provide. If you're bound for Mexico, or any other points south, and on a tight schedule, perhaps you'll decide you need to be under way whenever you can be. But if you have the option of spending a few extra days along the Central California coast, Bodega Harbor and Richardson Bay in Sausalito, make delightful temporary havens "out of the swing of the sea." **INWY**



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WINTER CRUISING - LOTS OF FLEXIBILITY EQUALS MORE FUN

inter cruising is all about rediscovering familiar anchorages and harbors that are wonderfully calm and peaceful. You can cruise without the crowds and find that you are one of only a few boats in a favorite anchorage or harbor. We have many special memories from our winter cruises.

Generally, winter cruisers are a hardy lot and very capable mariners. I think some of our very

best and longest-term cruising buddies were found on winter cruises. An extra day at a dock because of strong winds can result in chance encounters with other winter cruisers with time to share boating stories. Impromptu gatherings are not uncommon. In our experience, the worse the weather, the higher the probability of a party! On New Year's Eve, 2014, we enjoyed a wonderful

impromptu potluck dinner with old and new friends.

Winter cruising requires more skill, a well maintained vessel, and a bit more independent nature. With a little planning and a good heater, winter is one of the best times for cruising in the Pacific Northwest. This article discusses some of the critical items to ensure that your cruise is an enjoyable experience and suggests a few itineraries to get you started.

Getting the boat ready

A winter trip in some ways is like any other trip. You will want to make sure that you and the boat are well prepared, and that all of the systems of the vessel are in excellent working order. Boating in the winter requires a little more experience. If you are new to boating, make sure that you spend some time reviewing the charts, potential challenges to




The winter provides opportunities for hoisting sails and cruising in San Juan waterways with less boat traffic.

navigation, harbor information, and operation of the electronic equipment, including proper use of your VHF radio.

If our boat has been sitting at the dock for some time or stored out of the water, we will spend a weekend prior to the trip making sure all the equipment is in working order. We will often have our regular engine mechanic come and complete an inspection to make sure that our engine is in tip-top shape. Any maintenance items that were left over from the fall to-do list should be completed before starting a winter

cruise. At a minimum, we check the oil and coolant levels, examine the oil and fuel filters, examine the batteries (make sure there is no corrosion and that they are all at the correct voltage), and check the water intake and exhaust systems. We especially make sure there are no leaks in the exhaust systems for the engine and diesel heaters. During the winter, the boat tends to be "closed-up" and we do not want to get carbon monoxide poisoning or get any unpleasant smells from fumes. I also examine the steering systems, and domestic systems such as the freshwater tanks



and hot water system. We also check the thru-hulls to make sure they are all operating correctly and confirm that the bilge is clean and dry.

We currently cruise on a power vessel, so checking the sailing rig is no longer an issue for us. When we owned a sailboat, I would also do a check of all the standing rigging, halyards, and sheets. There is a high probability of having good winds for sailing during the winter.


Although we always leave our boat in the fall completely ready to cruise in the spring, I am always surprised to find little gremlins have managed to deteriorate some system or other. So in short, we examine everything that we can see!

Fire up your electronics to make sure that the RADAR, AIS, chartplotters, and sonar are working properly. We rarely get overly concerned about an electronic system not working during the summer, since we had many years of sailing experience without modern electronics. However, experience has taught us that the chances of needing a system is directly proportional to the usefulness of the system in the winter. We anticipate that we may be cruising in fog, rain, and wind during the winter. Seeing and being seen is really critical to a safe and enjoyable trip. So, we make sure everything is running according to specification and get it repaired if it is not working.

Check the marine head to make sure it is in excellent working order. Nothing is worse than having to return home early because your head has ceased to function. We had to return home early on one winter trip because the head "packed it in" on the second day.

We make sure the furnace is working perfectly. We assume that the weather will be wet and cold so we want to make sure that we will be warm and dry on board. Our current vessel, Salish Lady, an American Tug 485, has hydronic heating. However, we have had everything from a hot air diesel furnace to a wood burning stove on boats we have owned and cruised. Regardless of the type of heating you have on board, make sure that it is working before you leave the dock. We are avid walkers/ hikers while cruising and we are not put off by a little rain or wind. There is nothing as wonderful as returning to a toasty boat on a cold day, except perhaps the adult hot chocolate when we settle in onboard.

During winter, the air outside of the boat is especially cold and there is more humidity. In these conditions, we want to make sure that the bunks don't get damp. When the

humidity condenses under a bunk, it will be absorbed into the mattress. It is extremely unpleasant crawling into a damp bed at the end of a day of cruising. We make sure that we

have good air circulation and/or Dry Bunk Liner under each of the mattresses. We keep a air-warming circulating fan under each bunk. We make sure that we run the fan for several hours each day. This has been so successful at keeping our mattress dry that we use the air circulating fan all year round. Other boating friends run small dehumidifiers during their winter cruising. They absolutely swear by the results.

Weather Considerations

Weather is a special consideration. We primarily cruise

in Puget Sound, San Juan and Gulf Islands during the winter. In these areas, the weather will rarely be an issue. However, on occasion, the weather can have a very big impact on cruising plans.

We don't worry about rain as a general rule. However, we do worry when we get very strong winds such as those we experienced during our cruise of December 2014. We got

wind is the most challenging part of winter cruising. However, in all the years we have cruised during the winter there have only been two occasions when the wind was so strong

to give, it can be very difficult to put into practice.

Many of us cruise on a schedule. I consider a schedule the worst gear we have on Salish Lady. But as

> long as we need to make a living, it is a necessary evil. So, we always have a Plan B for our winter cruise. In our cruise itinerary, we incorporate several good spots to hunker down during a storm, should it occur and our trip will include several extra days to wait for storms to pass. If we get great weather for the whole trip then we just stay a few extra days in places that we love during the latter portion of the trip.

Last year, we spent our extra days riding out a storm in Roche

Year's Eve Party on Salish Lady. It wasn't part of Plan A, but it was a very fun Plan B. We have some very good friends that are always telling us to be flexible. In winter, flexible



a weather pattern which brought it altered our cruising plans. Fog and Harbor and ended up having a New beautiful sunny, but very cold days from the interior of BC. However, we also got strong winds. In Roche Harbor, we measured winds in excess of 40 knots. In our view, extreme

heavy rain mayalso be a factor.

When the weather gets bad you need to be willing to alter your plans and find a good place to hunker down. Although this advice is easy

is the watch word for an enjoyable trip.

Destinations

Deciding on where to go depends on the amount of time that you have available, where you are starting from, expected weather, and type of boat that you cruise. It also requires a change in attitude towards known destinations. Friday Harbor might be a very busy, tourist trap in the summer. In the winter, Friday Harbor becomes a very charming town with lots of character. Places we might not pick as destinations in the summer transform into wonderful stop-over locations during the winter.

We have had the good fortune to live in Sidney, Vancouver, Seattle, and Ana-

cortes over the last 30 years. So we have had excellent starting points for Gulf Island, Puget Sound and San Juan Island trips. During the winter trips we tend to stay a little closer to home.

The following section provides some potential itineraries for winter cruising. We mention some of our favorite locations, but these are by no means the only great destinations. Our itineraries are generally geared for trips of seven to ten days in duration. Many times we have added and subtracted from the destinations depending on weather, schedule, and the unexpected but enjoyable social gatherings!

San Juan Islands

Salish Lady was moored in LaConner during 2014, a great spot for a trip into the San Juan Islands. We planned a relatively short trip of five to seven days, with most of our time visiting harbors, but we scheduled a few days to just hang out at anchor. Our planned itinerary included Friday Harbor, Reid Harbor, Roche Harbor and Deer Harbor. If we had more time we might have added Rosario, or crossed the border into Canada for a couple of days in Victoria or Sidney if the weather was very settled. This itinerary allowed us to spend most our time visiting places that we find too busy during the summer. Since, we also like to get out and hike, the State Park at Reid Harbor, and the Mausoleum and Sculpture Park and hiking trails near Roche Harbor make these locations particularly attractive destinations for us.

Our first stop was Deer Harbor. The resort and marina is quiet in winter and



we found ourselves pretty much the only transient guests. We had dinner with friends and enjoyed some walks on the lovely trail that heads south from the harbor. If time allows, we often have dinner at the Deer Harbor Inn Restaurant (open for Friday – Sunday dinners during winter.)

From Deer Harbor, we went to Reid Harbor where we spent two lovely nights on the hook. We walked the trails at the State Park and took a walk to the school just outside the Park boundary. From Reid Harbor, we crossed to Roche Harbor. This is where the very nice sunny days included extremely strong winds. We spent three days waiting for the winds to drop. This is when we measured winds in excess of 40 knots.

We also ran into some friends that were planning to celebrate New Year's Eve in Roche Harbor. It wasn't long before the Salish Lady was selected as the destination for an impromptu potluck dinner.

Unexpected social gatherings have become so much a part of the experience that we now pack some extra snacks and party favors. The wind finally died and we moved on to Friday Harbor. We enjoy Friday Harbor, but we especially like it during the winter. The holiday decorations make the town feel homey and a little like the simpler Christmases of years ago. Of course, everything is a little less hectic and everyone seems a little more friendly. We did not stop in Rosario this year because we ran out of time. This is another favorite winter cruise destination for us. Missing Rosario was simply the price we paid for our days at Roche.

Be vigilant about listening to weather reports in the winter and plan some extra days into the schedule for staying in harbor during wind storms.

Gulf Islands

When we lived in Sidney, BC, a favorite trip was to circumnavigate Saltspring Island. We often planned stops in Ganges Harbor, Montague Harbor, Maple Bay (Birds Eye Cove) and/or Genoa Bay. Ganges is always a cheerful small town and Christmas time is no exception. However, it is a place where you must be aware of the potential for strong winds. Montague Harbor is a lovely spot to anchor without the crowds of summer. At the Marine Provincial Park, you can enjoy a lovely walk through the wooded trails and on a white

shell beach. Maple Bay and Genoa Bay have many permanent moorage clients, but they usually have space for visiting boats during the winter. The Genoa Bay Café is open for dinner on Wednesdays and Thursdays, and for lunch and dinner on Fridays and Saturdays. Sunday meals are limited to brunch/lunch.

When we have extra time in our winter cruise, we would add a detour down into Brentwood Bay and anchor in Tod Inlet, behind Butchart Gardens. Alternatively, we would include a stop in Chemainus or Telegraph Harbor. Truth be told, this is one of our favorite routes because it provides lots of alternatives for destinations along the way.


Puget Sound - Southern Trip

There are several interesting trips to be enjoyed when starting from central Puget Sound. When we lived and cruised out of Seattle, southerly portions of Puget Sound were a frequent destination when we had five to eight days available. Aside from being relatively easy to get to, the southern portions of the Sound have some wonderful cruising destinations. A typical trip would have stops in Tacoma, Gig Harbor, and Quartermaster Harbor. If we had time, we would add stops in Olympia and visits to the State Marine Parks near Olympia. This is primarily a southbound/northbound trip from Seattle.

During the winter, you need to pay particular attention to winds. Typically, bad weather in the winter is associated with southerlies. However, our worst weather experience during a south Sound trip came with a strong northerly that brought powerful winds and snow. As a result, we spent an unexpected week in Des Moines. We were able to get a ride back to Seattle to pick up our car, so we could commute to work during the week.

Our two favorite places in southern Puget Sound during the winter are Gig Harbor and Tacoma. Gig Harbor is lovely because of its very quaint main street. In Tacoma, we stay at the Dock Street Marina and enjoy some time at The Museum of Glass. We also anchor out in Quartermaster Harbor when the weather is cooperative. There is a small rowing facility on the tip of Burton peninsula where we land our dinghy. Across the street from the rowing facility, there are some pleasant trails in Burton Acres Park. The trails are popular with hikers and horseback riders.

Occasionally, we have penetrated past the Tacoma Narrows into the very southern reaches of Puget Sound. We have a number of favorite spots in the South Sound, including Jarrell Cove and Hope Island State Parks. If we want to add some urban spice to the southern portion of the trip, we head to Olympia.





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
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Puget Sound Central and Northern Trip

Oddly, a favorite stop after leaving from Elliott Bay Marina was Bell Street Harbor. Although it is only a a mile or so away, being aboard your boat in the heart of downtown Seattle changes the experience. You can easily walk to the Pike Street Market, many shops, and eateries; and you have no worries about parking a car. It was not unusual to include this stop at the beginning or end of a trip. We also like to head north to Edmonds. It has alwaysbeen a very friendly harbor and we like the walk up into town to window shop and stop for a hot beverage. From Edmonds, we head for either Port

Townsend (during settled weather) or Port Ludlow. Port Townsend has a wonderful historic downtown. It is especially nice in the off-season when everything slows down a bit. When we stay in Port Ludlow, we frequently anchor out. It is a great spot to wait out poor weather. The marina welcomes dinghies and there is a nice pub-style restaurant at The Resort at Port Ludlow.



The days are shorter in the winter and you can enjoy watching the sunset during a late afternoon walk.

Our next stop depends on our desire to be in a small town or hanging out on the hook. If we want to hang on the hook we will head for Port Madison. It is often too crowded for our liking during the summer months, but it is the perfect stop in the winter. There is a city dock just south of the Seattle Yacht Club facility at Hidden Cove Park where you can go ashore and there is a twomile trail across the street for a nice woodland walk. From Port Ludlow, we will often head for Poulsbo.

We love this Nordic-themed town and the shops look especially inviting when interior lights glow brightly in the late afternoon. We have the choice anchoring in Liberty Bay or staying at the Port of Poulsbo Marina. If we have another day, we enjoy a short stop in Eagle


Harbor. However, since we would frequently go to Eagle Harbor for short weekend trips, it was not unusual for us to give this a pass. If the forecast was for settled weather, we might add a night hanging on a mooring on the west side of Blake Island. We enjoy hiking around the island in the winter when it was quieter. There are eight miles of trails on Blake Island.

In summary, we hope this encourages you to go cruising this winter. Plan your trip, prepare your boat and then just go and have some fun!

Longboard: A Pacific Northwest Success Story

It's every boater's dream to have the opportunity to have a custom designed boat built to their personal requirements and specifications. I was fortunate to fulfill that dream with the creation of *Longboard*—my attempt at the "perfect" 35-foot sailboat conceived, designed, built, and fitted out all by the world class

expertise we are fortunate to have living in the Pacific Northwest. The ultimate goal was to race this ideal 35-footer to Hawaii with my son, Jim, and my good friend Stewart Jones and his son, Simon.

I grew up racing Flying Dutchmans and 505's and transitioned to offshore racing in my early 20s, and was fortunate to experience the Admiral's Cup, the Fastnet Race, Onion Patch Series, the Newport to Bermuda Race, the Pan Am Clipper Cup, the Round the County Race, multiple S.O.R.C.'s, a couple of Vic Maui Races, and two transat-

lantic deliveries. More recently I've raced Farr 30's, ID35's, and Farr 40's. The lessons from these adventures helped me develop the original design brief handed to the one and only naval architect

I was interested in working with to create the perfect boat. in the mid-1990s and developing

In January 2010, I reached out to Paul Bieker, a well-known naval architect and structural engineer in Seattle, to assess his interest in tak-

ing his original Riptide 35 designed in the mid-1990s and developing a MK2 version. The update would honor the original concept but take advantage of current design thinking and construction technology to enhance performance and make it more suitable for offshore racing and coastal cruising.

Paul was immersed in the BMW Oracle America's Cup campaign at the time but enthusiastically embraced the challenge and over the course of 2010 and early 2011, the new design was developed with extensive use of 3D models, VPP software, and a lot of input from a great group of local sailors.

The original design brief required as light displacement as possible, a high sail area to displacement ratio, relatively cost effective construction, capability for safe, fast offshore ocean racing afar, and comfortable in-shore cruising on the BC coast. The design did not need

to take advantage of any specific rating rule – just be as fast as possible, particularly in the prevailing Pacific NW light wind range we frequently race in and, of course, off the wind on the typical Hawaii race tracks. The handicap rating would end up being whatever it ended up being whether ORC, ORR, or PHRF – maybe not the most strategic choice but my experience is the faster a boat gets down the course in races such as Swiftsure, the bigger the advantage.

At the completion of a very collaborative design process over 18 months, the key characteristics of the MK2 design included:

*Lightweight, hard chined, composite construction with a displacement of 6,000 lbs including rig, sails, and all safety equipment.

*Water ballasted (1200 lbs each side) to allow competitive inshore/ offshore racing with 4 to 5 persons and high volume electric ballast fill pumps in enclosed sea chests.

*Improved keel foil and bulb design.

*Single rudder chosen over transom hung twin rudders but with with cutting-edge tubercles. (see photo).

*Swept-back two spreader fractional Hall carbon mast and boom with chainplates at hull edge and an internal hydraulic mast jack.

*Fat-head mainsail with endless mainsheet controlled by self-tailing mainsheet winches aft of helmsman.


Twin topmast backstays to run under deck and be controlled by cabin top halyard winches with clutches.

*Non-overlapping jib equipped with hanks plus athwartships jib tracks and floating jib leads.

*Telescopic carbon sprit with asymmetrical spinnakers flown off masthead halyard.

*Increased freeboard at bow with side decks sloping aft to open transom to make boat dryer and improve appearance.

*Raised, lengthened, and widened house configuration to provide additional headroom, interior volume, and improved appearance.

*Cockpit seats and extended coamings with built-in helmsman footrest.

*Three cylinder diesel auxiliary to allow cruising speed of 8+ knots.

*Innovative retracting drive unit

*Ease of maintenance with no wood trim on exterior of boat & minimal Douglas fir trim on interior.

*Linear galley with stove/oven, refrigeration, small dinette, enclosed head, and sleeping berths for five (see original sketch from owner's design brief).


All through the long design process, working with Paul Bieker was both rewarding and enjoyable. I consider Paul to be a good friend notwithstanding the debate that continues to this day over my insistence to install a 55 lb stove and oven! Paul was always responsive and respectful of my input into the design. He thoroughly researched and modeled all the design and system components, and introduced some truly in-


novative design elements into *Longboard*; most notably the rudder tubercles and carbon retracting drive unit.


Paul strongly recommended adding tubercles to the rudder (see photo at left) to provide additional steering control when the boat is really powered up off the wind. I agreed to experiment with them and our experience has been very positive as they not only give the helmsman additional control but also have a unique characteristic of giving an early warning sign when the rudder is going to stall out by shuddering a little before the stall occurs. I was originally concerned they may introduce additional drag in light air, however, given the excellent light air performance experienced to date, that would not seem to be the case.

The other major design innovation was the retracting drive unit. Saildrive vibration at high speed had always annoyed me. Paul observed the same thing on the MK1 design when racing to Hawaii during the Pacific Cup. He developed a very innovative concept for a retracting drive unit. The unit can be fully retracted into the hull but when it's lowered the result is a straight drive from the engine with an efficient fixed propeller. Paul was so personally invested in making this work, he painstakingly modeled one in 3D (see photos below), engineered it carefully, and built the carbon fiber strut and drive unit enclosure in his home boat shop. The assembly is surprisingly simple, easy to operate, results in no resistance or vibration under sail and is very powerful, particularly in a seaway. In fact, returning last year from the Round the County Race and powering into a nasty 20 -knot northwesterly, we had to back off the power as we were launching the boat over the waves at 7.5 knots!

In addition to Paul's contributions throughout the design process, considerable acknowledgement must also go to four BC-based sailors that graciously provided their design input. My good friend Stewart Jones of Pro-Tech Yacht Services

who not only crews on the boat, but also helped design the deck layout, specified the Hall Spars carbon mast and boom, and provided all the fixed and running rigging. Simply put, this project wouldn't have been as successful without his input and expertise.


Major contributions during the design phase were also made by Ross Macdonald of North Sails and Eric Jespersen. Both not only contributed key advice during the design phase but Ross did a great job designing and specifying the sail inventory which had to be tough

enough to go offshore but be as light weight as possible. The North Sails inventory has been outstanding and Ross has continued to work with us to design new sails to fit gaps in our inventory and help maximize our potential, particularly upwind where the boat is tricky to sail in medium wind speeds and off-wind in the Vic Maui Race.

Lastly, acknowledgement must go to Andrew McCorquodale, a Vancouver-based professional sailor who brought his considerable TP52 and America's Cup rigging experience to both the deck layout and specialized rigging needs as we prepared for the 2014 Vic Maui Race.

After the design was completed in the spring of 2011, two boat builders were shortlisted to obtain preliminary construction pricing; James Betts Enterprises of Anacortes, WA and Franklin Boats in New Zealand (builder of two other local Bieker designs, Dark Star and Strum.) Both builders had considerable experience with composite boat building. The decision was eventually made to award the contract to Jim Betts given his vast experience in building several Farr 36's and the close proximity of his Anacortes boat shop to my home in Vancouver, allowing for frequent visits during the build phase.

Construction started in the late fall of 2011 and *Longboard's* construction process benefited significantly from the onsite CNC milling machine Jim had in his shop. Paul would produce 3D models for key components of the construction that Jim would take and feed into the CNC machine, producing the hull



and deck tooling plus many of the composite panel components (see photos). Everything installed on the boat was weighed and logged during construction and the eventual asbuilt displacement was extremely close to the design displacement.

Longboard was launched on a clear November morning in 2012 after a year of construction. Working with Jim Betts, his family, and excellent build crew was a complete pleasure. The boat was completed on budget and to a high degree of workmanship. It was very rewarding to make the 40+ trips to the yard over the year of construction. Jim's commitment to craftsmanship and excellence was evident throughout, both in the composite construction of the hull, deck, keel, and rudder, but also in how the equipment, mechanical and electrical systems were planned, and installed.

The carbon Hall Spars mast and boom were installed in Vancouver by Stewart and his excellent Pro-Tech Yacht Services rigging team and we started sailing in early 2013. Our first race was the long course of the Southern Straits of Georgia Race over the Easter weekend. The conditions favored Longboard's characteristics and we were fortunate enough to get the overall win.

One of the great features Paul designed into the boat was the single point lifting arrangement. We remove a cap in the cabin house, fish a 5/8" spectra lifting strop through it and dry-sail *Longboard* using our five ton club crane and a custom storage dolly.


Over the last three years, we have had a lot of fun with *Longboard* as she's very slippery in light air on


all points of sail and excels off the wind in any condition. We are continuing to optimize the water ballast system and are still learning how to sail the boat consistently well upwind in a breeze. Longboard really performed well in the last Vic Maui Race and during the delivery back to Vancouver. She consistently is capable of planning for long periods of time in the 14 to 16 knot boat speed range in 25+ knots of breeze. With the long sprit (originally built for a Farr 36), big A-sails, and fat head main, the MK2 has a lot of power off the wind. However, the helmsman has lots of control and A-sail trimming is easy with crosssheeting to the big Harken sheet winches on the weather side in front of the helmsman. Paul spent a lot of time refining the fullness in the bow section and Longboard is relatively dry off the wind in big

It has been a rewarding three seasons for Longboard with overall wins in major local races such as Swiftsure Lightship Classic (twice), Southern Straits Race Long Course (twice), the Vic Maui Race, Round the County Race, and Fraser River Lightship Race (three times) across four different handicap systems (ORC, ORR, PHRF NW, and PHRF BC). The core Vancouver-based crew deserves much of the credit for making Longboard so consistently successful - Stewart Jones, Jim Salusbury, Jeremy Hill, and Simon Jones.

Overall, *Longboard* has been a dream come true and is a testament to the world class design, construction, rigging, and sail making talent we should all be proud of in Washington and British Columbia.









NORTHWEST YACHTING REPORT

WashingtonState **MARINAS** & Fuel Docks



nce again, Northwest Yachting is pleased to present our guide to Washington State's marinas and fuel docks. While moorage availability has tightened up considerably over the last few years, generally speaking there's still a place for every boat. Liveaboards continue to be welcome at most marinas, and shoreside facilities have improved nearly everywhere.

We suggest that if you're shopping for moorage, keep an open mind. The best option might not be the closest or cheapest marina. Getting to your favorite cruising grounds takes time and fuel. But of course if you're a spontaneous boater who decides at 1630 on an 1730 departure time for an evening on the water with friends, nearby moorage is a must.

We've made some changes this year to make the information more streamlined and accessible. First of all, we've combined the Washington State Marinas report with the Washington State Fuel Docks report that often came out in the March issue.

On the streamlined front, we've replaced a lot of text with some basic icons. While the icons are fairly self-explanatory, you can check out the legend on this page to ensure the symbols make sense to you. For instance, a red fuel pump nozzle means gas and a green one means diesel.

We have chosen not to include rates this year. Rates are prone to change and, depending on what a given rate includes, the comparison between marinas is sometimes unfair. Where possible, we've noted slip availability but that too changes frequently.

Finally, we've roughed out a map (page 63) with specific regions shadowed in contrasting colors. Follow

the corresponding color to the text to find marinas for that area. While our Washington State Marina and Fuel Dock Guide provides a lot of information, we encourage to do your own research. Each entry has contact information including phone number and website, if known. If your research turns up new information, please share it with us so we can make next year's guide even better.

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Alerion Sport 30



Alerion Sport 30 Simply Delivers the Joy of Sailing

a modern boat line after Nathaniel Herreshoff's personal yacht is a bold move. While there's no telling what Captain Nat might say and he knew how to draw a very

about the Alerion Expresses, there's no doubt that the line conjures up a feeling of days gone by, even with more than a cutting edge touch or two to remind you it's a modern boat. In the new Alerion Sport 30, there's even more of the modern to go with the traditional.

The idea behind Alerion was to create a supremely simple, straightforward boat aimed at making sailing

easy, just like Herreshoff's personal Alerions. The ease-of-sailing would apply to the sail handling equipperhaps most importantly of all,

There's no question, naming how it goes through the water. And when Alerion started making their boats back in the 1990s they tapped Carl Schumacher to do the design,

slippery boat, especially one with a narrow beam.

Sadly, Schumacher hasn't been ment, simplicity of systems and, with us for a while. The designers from Langan and Associates show an equally great touch and an impressive attention to detail in the new boat. The new Sport 30 certainly holds true to the Alerion approach, with the added element of "sport"

mixed in.

The Sport 30 features the usual Alerion approach, putting more emphasis on the sailing comfort side of things and less on the creature comforts down below. The cockpit is spacious with the helmsman's area clearly delineated. The jib sheet winches are

located at the aft end of the cockpit seats, accessible to the helmsman and out of the way of any "guests" sitting on the curvy-comfy cockpit seat backs. There's a lazerette aft,

a wonderful feature that has been eliminated in most modern boats in favor of more accommodation belowdecks.

The carbon rig by Hall Spars has swept back spreaders and no permanent backstay, allowing a huge mainsail roach, and there is an option for a carbon bowsprit for flying asymmetrical spinnakers. The hull is vinylester-infused for light weight and strength and there is a carbon-reinforced structural grid to handle any increased rig loading by racers. The Harken jib furler is flush-mounted. In short, The Alerion Sport 30 is one of those wolf-in-sheep's-clothing approaches to sailboat racing. How much wolf there will be has yet to be seen, but the Sport 30 would certainly be an elegant and spirited racer.

While the cabin maybe small compared to the maximized modern cruiser, the space is well utilized and, like on deck, appointed with a number of details that make a boat a pleasure to sail. Options include an electric auxillary.

For the kind of limited time many of us have for casual racing, this type of yacht makes a great deal of sense.

Its simple to sail, doesn't require a big crew and yet is very "yachty" in appearance and function. Add to that the distinctive East Coast look and undeniable aura about anything remotely having to do with Herreshoff, and it's hard not to pay attention to this boat.

After all, if Herreshoff were alive today, even with all the great equipment and high performance boats available, and his penchant for pushing the design boundaries, it would surprise nobody if his personal boat was very much like the Alerion Sport 30.



Selene 50 Europa



The Selene 50 Europa is a Fitting Addition for the Northwest

elene Yachts have been in North America since the late 1990s, forging a reputation for quality and elegance in a modern trawler design. Selene owner Howard Chen is very energetic and, as a naval architect himself, very much hands-on with his business.

The newest yacht in the line, the Selene 50 Europa, is making its debut here in the Pacific Northwest. She's a blue-hulled beauty that conveys a straightforward and elegant feel. With Selene's trademark high bow

and forward bulwarks, it would look right at home tossing off waves from a southerly on a return trip home from the San Juans.

There are 16 models in the Selene line, yet the new 50 distinguishes itself in several ways. For starters, the forward master stateroom features an island berth that's oriented diagonally rather than on the fore and aft axis. This asymmetry gives the stateroom a homier feel while freeing up some space for two large heads and additional staterooms.

The two guest staterooms are adjacent to the central stairs, with a two single-berth cabin to starboard and a double berth cabin to port. This layout contrasts with the two-stateroom layouts in the Selene 49 and the midships master stateroom layout of the 54.

The remainder of the layout is conventional for the Europa-type layout with a compact but complete galley adjacent to a salon with both a dinette and lounge type seating. There's a good-sized afterdeck. The

flybridge is very large with plenty of room left over after the crane and RIB are in place.

Because this Selene, like others, is powered by a single engine, there's ample room in the engine room for a genset, watermaker and tools, plus full access to everything mechanical. That's definitely a plus when checking filters and other components. There are also spacious cockpit lockers under the afterdeck.


Standard power is a Cummins QSL diesel rated 330 HP at 1800 rpm, ample power to push the trawler at a cruise of approximately 9 knots and a top speed of 10.5. There's space dedicated for a genset aft of the main engine. Fuel capacity is 1200 gallons in two tanks, which gives the Selene 50 an ample cruising range.

Selene is well known for producing high quality yachts. The lamination schedule and the high quality components ensure the hull integrity. A series of watertight bulkheads are another way Selene makes the vessel offshore-capable. And then there's the renown Far East carpenters who do such exquisite work.

NWY at 60 mph On Rails in the Life Proof 30



Then the crew at Inventech Marine Solutions asked us to test the Life Proof 30 Convertible, we jumped at the chance. With a top speed of 63 mph and the safety of a closed cell foam collar, it was a great opportunity to get out from behind a computer monitor!

And what a ride it was. Heading out from Elliott Bay Marina, expert driver Doug Clement gave us a taste of the top end before wowing us with some truly amazing handling. Turning on the 30-footer was akin to banking a high perfor-

mance airplane. There was no tendency to skip, and it was no problem to turn at a full 40 knots.

The key to this running-on-rails performance is in the hull design. Bill Hansen designed the aluminum hull with port and starboard "performance fins" that help define tunnels on each side of the hull. At speed in a straight course, air in the tunnels help lift the hull and reduce drag. In a turn, the tunnel on the inside hull locks into the water creating what amounts to a grip allowing very tight turns at exceptionally high speeds. The

closed cell foam collar adds to the performance and gives a certain peace of mind.

As one would expect, you don't go 60 mph on choppy waters in a 8,500 lb. boat without some bounce, but the high end Shoxs shock absorbing seats, both forward and and aft, kept things comfortable. It would make a fine way to get to anywhere on the Salish Sea in a hurry.

Life Proof's Micah Bowers explains the interest so far. "At the Boats Afloat Show, the people who expressed the most interest were those who wanted to get up to the San Juan Islands from Seattle in a hurry, and not get stuck there on a Sunday night, no matter the conditions."

All in all we came away very impressed. As Aaron Bronson, *Northwest Yachting's* U.S. Coast Guard veteran, said, "I was blown away." Look





Before I Forget, a Memoir

by Ben Vermeulen with Marianne Scott

Vancouver's West Bay's founder and chairman of the board tells tales of his long, extraordinary life

Before I Forget...

a Memoir

Then Ben Vermeulen arrived in Vancouver BC in 1959, he had \$52 in his pocket and a compelling ambition to succeed. At what he didn't quite know: his severe dyslexia was undiagnosed but had played havoc with his schooling. Nevertheless, his ability to work with his hands, problem solve and de-

sign complicated machinery in his head and then in actuality led him to becoming a steel fabricator in short order.

In his newly released memoir, Before I Forget, co-authored with well-known marine writer and NWY contributor Marianne Scott, Vermeulen relates his life story with verve and wit. Born in the Netherlands in 1934, he was only six when Hitler's armies

overran his home country. During the five-year occupation, he learned ingenious methods of survival, often helping to find food for the family that grew to seven children during the war (five more arrived after the German occupation).

In the 1950s, he apprenticed in silversmithing, tool and die making, welding and design. By age 22, he'd become his own boss fabricating wrought iron items, repairing weigh scales and making crosses for a religious retailer. Then one day, a friend who'd emigrated to Canada, persuaded Vermeulen that he'd have great opportunities there and that his future would be assured. And so it

turned out.

In his memoir, Vermeulen relates how he wore out his shoe leather pounding the Vancouver pavements during his early job hunts, how he was fired for being too meticulous and how he advanced to ever better paying jobs. One humorous chapter relates his decision to spend three weeks finding a wife in Holland—it

> took more than five months to win Leidy, who also emigrated and became his steadfast partner in their various enterprises.


Almost accidentally, Vermeulen became a boatbuilder. After a venture capitalist project failed and forced a bankruptcy, he moved his company to Delta on the Fraser River and intrepidly hung outaboatbuilding shingle. His first

yacht was launched in 1969.

Decades of boatbuilding followed: tugs, barges, transport vessels, patrol boats and a variety of one-off yachts were launched. Eventually, the company, West Bay, built a 58-foot luxury yacht, of which 99 copies were sold. In this memoir, it becomes clear that Vermeulen's early years, often filled with fear and hunger, his failure at school and the compensation—developing his mechanical and design skills-have shaped his character, taught him to work hard, and led to great success.

his year's Winter Vashon Island Race was started on zephyrs, sailed in nearly no wind and finished on a belated northerly at the north end of Vashon on the shortened course. Even more than usual, the trick was taking advantage of the northerly current in Colvos Passage and the few puffs that touched down in various spots along the long leg down the west side of the island. Among the IRC boats, it was Crossfire first across the finish line, but Steve Travis' Smoke finishing close enough behind to claim corrected time honors. In the PHRF classes, Fred Creitz's Soverel 33 Flim Flam won her class overall, edging out the Farr 30 Nefarious for overall honors by just seven seconds. The reverse start, shortened course and drifting conditions produced some interesting finishes, as some of the smaller boats were able to stave off the biggest and fastest boats at the finish line. Some boats even got swept past the finish line by the current and in no wind, there was simply no way to get back.

For most crews, this Winter Vashon will be remembered as one of the soggiest and hence coldest. It rained virtually nonstop the entire race. The fleet handed out big kudos and thanks to the race committee for shortening the course!

There were several epic tales from boat deliveries. John Thompson of *Gizmo* reported about his delivery from Olympia, "The real story was in the deliveries. One of my R2AK crewmates helped me deliver the boat on Friday. We flew the spinnaker and had the boat surfing and planing all the way. Our average speed was a hair over six knots. *Gizmo's* hull speed is 5.9 knots, and she really doesn't have a planing shape. We had some current push we got when we finally got into the Narrows. The GPS did record seven knots in Budd Inlet where we rarely get more than a half knot push, so we were flying!"

No doubt some of the deliveries from the north weren't quite as pleasant. **INWY**
