On returning to Cobleskill he worked in the family funeral home until entering in a parternship in 1950 with his father. In 1970 he became sole owner until selling the business on January 1, 1990. He is still associated with the firm on a consulting basis.

On December 20, 1946 he married Hazel M. Osterhout. They are parents of four children, Penny Linck of Queensbury, Margaret Collins of East Greenbush, David Mereness of Castleton-on-Hudson and Lori Mereness of Sharon Springs, NY. They have also been blessed with 7 grandchildren. in addition to family obligations his main interest is in his new home and his many Masonic

activities. He enjoys woodworking, gardening and an occasional fishing trip. A regular blood donor through the Red Cross he is the proud possessor of a 10 gallon pin and working on the 11th gallon.

In addition to his Masonic memberships he is a member of the Cobleskill United Methodist Church, Life member of the Schoharie County Post 5088 VFW, where he served as Commander in 1949-50. He also served as County Council Commander of the Schenectady County VFW Council in 1951-52. A life member of the American Legion and a Life member of the Schoharie County Historical Society. (This Address delivered In Absentia, as noted in Minutes!)
To the Grand Council:

The time has come for me to render an account of my stewardship as the Grand Master of your Grand Council.

The first thing I will do is to thank those who brought me to where I am today. Where do I begin? The first ones I should thank are those brothers of Cobleskill Lodge who attended a communication some 45 years ago and not seeing enough wrong with me elected me to receive the degrees of Masonry. Next are the members of the other bodies who took me in and advanced me to the presiding officers chair, and have stood by me ever since. I should like to particularly thank the Past Grand Masters who have given me help and encouragement whenever I have asked these past several years. A special thanks should go to Past Grand Masters Beardsley and Weinheimer who have helped me to break in a new Grand Recorder this year. Last but certainly not least I must thank the First Lady, Hazel for the help, support and encouragement freely given over the past 46 1/2 years. Without her I do not believe I would be standing before you today. She, with the members of my Council committee, have put together this Annual Assembly. Please be sure to thank them and her if you are enjoying yourselves. Any complaints see me for as one of our most distinguished Masons once said, "The buck stops here."

It has been my privilege to visit in each of the districts of this state at least once. The reception accorded me has been truly marvelous. My wife, who accompanied me on most of my trips, was very appreciative as you made her welcome. We shall never forget your kindnesses. One of the visits made was a special treat for me and for 14 members of this Grand Council. In January we made a visit to Athens, Pa., the home council of M.'. P.'. Clarence C. VanHorn, then Grand Master of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Master Masons of Pennsylvania. This visit was made to return a visit he made to my official visit to the Third District. The welcome accorded us makes me anxious to visit again. I believe that only good can come from visiting Councils in neighboring states as well as visiting during their Grand Council sessions. I was also honored by receiving Pennsylvania's Ernest C. Reynolds Fellowship award at their annual assembly. Although this award was presented to me I believe that many of the companions were responsible for their efforts on behalf of our Grand Council's continuing dialogue with our sister jurisdictions.

I am very pleased that so many of our sister jurisdictions are represented here today. Our journeys to your jurisdictions and the welcome with which you greeted us only reconfirms that Masonry, as we

are taught in the first degree, promotes true friendship among those who might otherwise have remained perpetually at a distance.

Last November the Grand Line officers were privilged to travel to Cranston, Rhode Island and confer the Royal Master degree at the Multi-jurisdictional Cryptic festival. All the chairs were filled with members of your Grand line and we were complimented highly for a job well done. You can be proud of the ritualistic abilities of your Grand officers. The spirit of fraternalism and friendship was something that those who were involved will long remember. The NY State Grand line has been asked to travel to Maine this November and confer the Select degree. I for one look forward to it. I was also privileged to attend the Tri State festival held in East Hartford, Conn. in March and to feel proud of our own King Solomon Council as they worked the Select degree. I heard nothing but good comments about the work.

During the year I attended many Lodge, Chapter and Commandery. meetings. In nearly all of them I was acknowledged as the Grand Master of the Grand Council. In several of them I was able to explain to the members present what Council is. It is distressing to learn that so many of the members of these organizations do not know that there is such a thing as a Council of Cryptic Masons. We, you and I, have to work to correct this if we are to survive as a viable part of the York Rite of Free Masonry.

It was also our privilege to attend and represent this Grand Council at the annual sessions of the Grand Commandery, Grand Chapter, Grand Lodge and the Grand Council of Deliberation of the Scottish Rite in New York, together with attending the New York State DeMolay convention. My hope is that through these fraternal visits all of our bodies may grow closer together. After all we must all remember that we were Masons before joining these other bodies. One of the things we must do is go back to our symboic Lodges and relearn some of the basic truths taught therein. It was also my privilege to attend ten Grand Council sessions in neighboring states and the province of Ontario. Due to scheduling diffuculties I was unable to visit the Grand Councils of New Jersey and Eastern Canada. Your Grand Council was represented at these functions by our Deputy Master R.'. I.'. Joseph A. Peloso for which I thank him.

MEMBERSHIP

As I traveled from one end of this great state to the other I noticed an enthusiasm borne out by the reports from my District deputies, to whom I owe so much. Cryptic Masonry has many bright spots. Some Councils have gone to work and have greeted as many as ten new Companions. Others were not so fortunate, as will be brought out in the Grand Recorders report. However, we have seen what can be done, now it is up to the rest of us to go to work and follow their example. To those who had a nice gain this past year I can only say, thank you and now that you are in practice and have seen what you can do, do the same next year for your Grand Council and our beloved fraternity.

I am again dismayed that we have lost members thru demits and suspension for non payment of dues. These losses should not happen. If a Companion does not wish to continue his membership, I feel that we have let him and our Council down. We must find out why it happened and work to correct our deficiencies and if possible bring them back into the fold. It is much easier to keep these Companions than it is to bring in new ones.

This past year our fraternity and especially our Grand Council was saddened by the passing of several of our members, especially our M.'. W.'. Sheldon K. Blank, Grand Master of Masons in the state of New York and a past Grand Captain of the Guard in this Grand Council and M.'. I.'. Robert L. Dod, our Grand Treasurer Emeritus. I would ask the Grand Chaplains if they would at this time conduct a memorial service for all our dear departed companions.

During this Cryptic year R.'. I.'. Rev. Dr. Leon W. Bouton felt it necessary, for health reasons to resign as Grand Chaplain. I accepted the resignation, with regret, and appointed him Grand Chaplain Emeritus. I ask you to approve of this decision. I appointed the Rev. Alan Lang of Oxford, NY, a member of Oneonta Council #87, to replace him on recommendation of Dr. Bouton. It was also necessary to accept the resignation of Felix Aguila, DDGM of the 2nd District, also for reasons of health. R.'. I.'. Hugo Roman was appointed to fill the balance of the term. We also welcomed Dr. Dmeter Yablonski to the official family as AGL of the 2nd District, a post that had been vacant.

RECOMMENDATIONS

I trust that the various bodies of Masonry can put aside their petty jealousies and egos so that York Rite Cooperation can truly exist in fact. I would like to see a committee from each of our bodies work toward the goal so that every companion who joins a body based on membership in another body, that that other body is notified and a register set up so that should misfortune fall on him that all the other bodies be notified.

Several times this past year birthday cards sent to our members who have attained their eightyth year were returned by their families as deceased. In one case four years had elapsed. This is truly unfortunate. Surely his Lodge or Chapter must have been notified but not his Council. Our Grand Chaplains send the sympathy of the Grand Council on learning of a death but it must be done in a timely fashion. It is the responsibility of every Companion in every Council to notify the Recorder as soon as possible. Do not wait for the annual return. Your Recorder has cards to notify the Grand Recorder. As I have said all year long, I would rather the Recorder be notified several times rather than miss even one.

I set up a York Rite Cooperation committee this past year composed of Cryptic Masons who are in the Grand Lines of Chapter, Council and Commandry. My hope was and is that as these Companions progress thru the lines of their respective bodies that they will come to know each other, understand the problems each organization has and work toward improving relations. We can not in the forseeable future have joint meetings, as other jurisdiction do, but we must learn to cooperate if we are to survive.

Appended to this report are a list of dispensations granted. All were of a routine nature and would only bore you further if I were to read them.

As I turn the reins of this Grand Council over to my succesor I can say that I have fully enjoyed my years serving this Grand Council and pledge that I shall stand ready to do anything to further its aims and purposes. As long as my health permits, I stand ready to help, aid and assist any and all of the officers who shall follow me.



What About Tomorrow?"

The future of Freemasonry is in our hands! The future of this world is our responsibility! Whether we like it or not, we are the molders and shapers of tomorrow, and whatever choices we make in our lives affect not only ourselves, but, in many instances, even people who have not been born yet!

This is an awesome responsibility if we stop to think about it! Indeed, the implications are almost staggering in their importance and intensity. We don't usually think of ourselves in such terms! Hitherto our estimate and impression of our own sphere of influence has been limited to a rather small circle of friends and acquaintances - now it is opened up to include a tremendous scope of responsibility.

This responsibility has been spelled out somewhat in terms of service to God and man. Having been summoned to this service by virtue of our membership in the human family, we are somewhat hesitant to acknowledge this as our responsibility. Instead we become like the veritable noncommittal members of humanity who say "That's not my job!" "That's someone else's problem!" But, is it?

From the time of Cain and Abel, mankind has been confronted with the question posed by Cain, "Am I my brother's keeper?" There are those who are rather quick to say nobut, when we stop to analyze our relationship with God and humanity, we cannot help but see that the welfare of humanity is, indeed, our responsibility and often, our problem. After all, it has frequently been stated, if we are not a part of the solution, then we are part of the problem!

If no one in this world stood ready to help another human being in need, where would this world be? What would

happen to society? The interaction of people is what makes life interesting and worthwhile. It is only as we participate in the solutions to the problems of humanity that our understanding and appreciation of people grows and we become intensely aware of our own worth and value as a part of God's Creation.

As members of a great fraternity, we have been well-schooled in our responsibilities to God and man. The lessons of brotherhood have been indelibly impressed upon our-minds, but we are still hesitant about getting involved in the problems and needs of the world in which we live. We would rather lock ourselves behind tiled doors and shut ourselves away from the world - hoping that the problems of society will not be able to get in and disturb our complacency!

With attitudes like this, we are like the proverbial Ostrich who buries its head in the sand thinking that if he cannot see the problem or the danger, the problem or the danger do not exist! Is it any wonder that many people, in their criticism of the Craft call it an anachronism - something totally irrelevant to modern society and human need?

Unless and until the members of the fraternity become involved in the needs of humanity and become the vibrant and living part of society which they once were, they will be traveling toward destruction on a banana peel! We are starting to let people know what Masons do, but do they know who the Masons are and where they meet?

Earlier this summer, my wife and I were traveling in the state of Missouri, stopping in a number of places to enrich our knowledge and experience. In the town of Mansfield, Mo. we visited a museum devoted to the author, Laura Ingalls Wilder. At the museum we learned that Laura's husband, Almanzo, was a Mason and a member of the lodge in Mansfield. So we set out to find the lodge hall to take a picture of it. We spent close to an hour driving around the town, asking directions of many people - most of whom were totally unaware that there was a Masonic lodge in the town - until we finally found someone who thought he knew where it was, and then we found it! The irony of this is that we had the lodge's address and people still didn't know where it was!

Now, I ask you, if someone came to your town and tried to find the lodge hall, would people in your town know where it was and what the Mason's do? At one time in our history the lodge was one of the centers of community activity and work. Benevolence was a part of the Mason's responsibility and help was given to those in need by the members of the lodge. Is it so today?

Is the Masonic Temple in good repair or is it falling down? A building which is a disgrace to the Community in which it is located is a pretty poor advertisement for a fraternity which is supposed to care! Does the lodge and its membership serve the community or do they serve only themselves? Do the principles to which we have given our assent find expression in our lives and in the life of the community? Think about these things! If we don't care about today - there will be no tomorrow!!

I recently received a lodge bulletin which contained a poem which I would like to share with you. The title of this poem is ANYWAY.

"People can be unreasonable, illogical and self-centered but love them... Anyway

Do good for others, and your motives will be suspect - but do good....Anyway

Small men with big ideas can be discouraged by big men with small minds - but think big....Anyway

Give the best you have to give and people will find fault - but give yo ur best... Anyway

What you spend years building may be destroyed overnight by well-meaning, thoughtless people - but build....Anyway

If you are successful, you will win false friends and true adversaries - but succeed....Anyway

Question authority and you will stand alone - but ask....Anyway

The good you do today may be forgotten tomorrow - but do good....Anyway

If our fraternity is to live and be a vital force in and among the family of mankind tomorrow - it is incumbent upon each and every one of us to do the very best with what we have today. The influence and example of people working together for the benefit of others is the best guarantee of the future of our Craft.

Service in the name of brotherhood will never be outof-date or old-fashioned. What we do for others will never be useless or in vain. The world needs people who care about people and this is where we fit into the scheme of Let us translate the principles and teachings things. of the fraternity into conncrete service for the benefit of humanity and the welfare of society!

Do this and we will not have to worry about tomorrow!

M:I: JOSEPH A. PELOSO GRAND MASTER GRAND COUNCIL CRYPTIC MASONS of the STATE OF NEW YORK 1993-1994

The Most Illustrious Grand Master, Right Worshipful Joseph A. Peloso, was born on January 1, 1944 to Dominick and Marilyn Peloso in the Bronx, New York. At age 11, he moved with his family to New Jersey and until October, 1990, he had resided at the same location for 35 years. He has travelled extensively in Europe and the United States, where he has enjoyed the last five summers in Maine. A family member was the chief law enforcement officer in Kennebunkport, a town which has gained national and political fame these last eight years.

He was educated at Fairleigh Dickinson University and Lehman College where he majored in Economics and minored in hospital accounting and management. Prior to joining Grand Lodge as Assistant Grand Secretary in 1986, he was employed as the Medicaid auditor at a major inner-city New York health care facility.

Joe had recently purchased a home listed on the National Register of Historic Places, which he claimed was large enough for him to display his collection of military miniatures, mostly US Civil War and his HO train collection. He now resides in Forest Hills and his collections are now back in boxes and stored for future display.

His interest in the US Civil War originates in the fact that members of his family fought for both sides. One great grand-uncle, Sergeant Robert Hoffman, fought for New York and was a hero at one of the major engagements. Another decendent, John Edward Kenna, fought for the South and later distinguished himself as one of the first members of the US House of Representatives from the State of West Virginia. He later went on to further heights of national fame as a distinguished orator and US Senator from West Virginia. Senator Kenna died in office (after an extraordinary career in Congress lasting nearly 30 years) and had his funeral in the Rotunda of the Capitol Building in Washington, DC. A statue, commissioned in his honor by the people of West Virginia, is on display in the Hall of distinguished Senators in the United States Capitol Building, directly beneath the great Rotunda.

Most Illustrious Peloso is a third generation New York Freemason; his grandfather (also named John Edward Kenna) having been a member of Normal Lodge No. 487 and his father having been a member of Garibaldi Lodge No. 542 and Mosaic Lodge No. 184, in New Jersey, and served with a distinguished Masonic career in the York Rite. His older Brother, Robert Joseph Peloso, (a twenty year US Air Force veteran with two tours of combat duty in scenic Southeast Asia - Thailand and Vietnam) is also a member of the Craft who was Raised during the Vietnam War on the scenic island of Okinawa in a military Lodge. His grandmother was a member of City Island Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star, and his mother was a member of Naomi Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star, in New Jersey.

----- MINUTES OF THE 170TH ANNUAL ASSEMBLY

Having received their "CALL" to the 170th ANNUAL ASSEMBLY of the GRAND COUNCIL CRYPTIC MASONS of the STATE of NEW YORK, the Companions assembled in the Cattleman/Cablecar Rooms at the Ramada Inn Schenectady, 450 Nott Street, Schenectady, NY. 12308, on Friday August 27, 1993. At 6:45pm, The Grand Master, Most Illustrious Oliver D Mereness, declared the One Hundred Seventieth Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Cryptic Masons of the State of New York in Order He asked the Grand Recorder to take the Roll Call to determine if a quorum was present. All three of the first three elected officers of the Grand Council and representatives of ten Constituent Councils are present. The Grand Council Officers then proceeded to Open the Annual Assembly in Full Form and the Assembly was declared opened and in order for business. The Grand Master ordered the Captain General of St. George's Commandery No.37 to Post the colors of the United States and Canada, which were then Presented to the East, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance. The Grand Master invited M.I. Douglas K Taylor. Past Grand Master of the State of Maine to lead us in singing one verse of the Star Spangled Banner and one verse of O Canada.

The Grand Master thanked St. George's Commandery for Posting the colors, noting that this has not been done recently. He then welcomed everyone present tonight to the 170th Annual Assembly of the Grand Council. "It is good to see such a nice turn-out, I wish we had more for the opening, but this is what happens when you start on time!" (laughter) Tonight our Grand Musician is going to, with the Grand Chaplain, present some entertainment for the ladies. Normally there would not be any great problem, for we would have two- one here and one with the ladies. But our "Olde Faithful", Jack Ovitt who not only plays for the Grand Council, Grand Chapter, Grand Commandery, & the Grand Lodge of New York, also does a yeoman's job in the Grand Council of Pennsylvania, and if you go up into Vermont his home-base area, there he is again playing the organ-but tonight is in the hospital. R.I. Francis Wilcox, our other Grand Musician, is going to be doing the yeoman's job because right now he is doing all the work.

- 1. That inasmuch as the Proceedings of the last Annual Assembly have been printed and distributed, that we dispense with their reading at this time. Moved by M.I. Charles E Grant.
- 2. That the Election of Officers be the order of business at $1\colon 15$ P.M. Saturday August 27, 1993. That nominating speeches be limited to three minutes and seconding speeches be limited to one minute. Moved by M.I. Edmund Lynch Jr.
- 3. That all Companion Select Masters in good standing be invited to remain as visitors to this Annual Assembly, except at such time as provided by the Constitution. Moved by M.I. John A Sainz.
- 4. That our visiting Grand Masters and Past Grand Masters who are not already Honorary members of this Grand council be made so. Moved by M.I. Jerrold L Hastings.

The Grand Master then called for the following committee reports: Grand Lecturer, Grand Historian, Grand Trustees, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Treasurer, Audit, Grand Recorder, Condition and Extension of the Rite, Masonic Education, Finance and Accounts, (Budget), Jurisprudence and Laws, Ritual, York Rite Cooperation, Library and Museums, T.I.M., Treasurer St.George Council Order of Annointed Kings, and Table Council. Inasmuch as they have been printed and passed out to the Companions present, it was moved, seconded and unanimously carried that they be printed in the Proceedings as written. They appear elsewhere in these proceedings.

The GRAND LECTURER'S REPORT is printed in detail elsewhere in the Proceedings and after R.I.Whittaker gave his report he asked the Grand Master if would assist in presenting each Council in each District with a Certificate for best attendance at the Grand Lecturers Convention. They are as follows:

#8Ø District # 1 Flatbush District # 2 Adelphic # 7 District # 3 Goshen #93 District # 4 Oneonta #87 District # 5N Cyrus #34 District # 5S District # 6 Fulton #5Ø District # 7 District # 8 Bath #40 District # 9 Hamburg #91 also, a Certificate to V. I. Thomas James Ward, the A.G.L. of the 5th District North and R.I. Alvon Macauley DDGM of the 5th District, who had the highest number of Companions present at their District Convention, with 27 present.

The Chairman of the Committee on JURISPRUDENCE moved that the printed report be accepted, seconded and approved. M.I. Hickein then expressed appreciation to the committee for their assistance and counsel. We do have the item of Washington Council #52 to take care of later on. The Grand Master ruled to take care of it at this time. Those present were informed by M.I. Hickein that the Council has not submitted Annual Reports for the past four(4) years, nor has it paid any fees or dues to Grand Council during this period. I think that the members of Washington Council are "just tired". They are excellent companions, they've worked hard, diligently, but they have just "run out of steam" in my observation as Grand Recorder. The Grand Master reported"that last November he called a special Assembly of the Council, and about half of the Grand Line was present with three of their companions for the assembly. They indicated that they were going to do something,- basically we told them to let us know by April 1st. Since then the only communication we have had has been what the Grand Recorder or M.I. Hastings has reported. The last recorder of record, is in a nursing home, they have obtained no candidates, the membership books do not coincide with those of the Grand Recorder. I have instructed the Grand Recorder, as Chairman of Jurisprudence Committee, to move that under the Constitution, they having not made a return for more than two years, not having had a legal assembly, that this Grand Council Suspend their Charter. I hate to do it, but, we cannot keep something like this going on. I kind of think that it is best to mercifully let it die. If at such time as they can revive it, we can grant a new charter, we might be able to give them the same number.

So M.I. Grand Recorder would you please make the motion".
M.I. Hickein made the motion, "that the Charter for Washington
Council #52 be Suspended as a result of failing to make Returns and
submit Fees to the Grand Council for a period of over two(2) years,
and that the Charter may be restored by paying all back dues & fees,
unless modified by action of the Grand Council". We should encourage

the members to affiliate with another Council. Joseph Warren Council is offering affiliation to the members of Washington Council. All on the books, should be allowed to affiliate, with demits, regardless of payment of past fees. Motion seconded & passed.

R.I. Nick Stuffer presented the Report of the Audit Committee, and announced that the 1992-93 Expenses were under the Budget total. This shows that our Grand Line Officers are holding the expenses of Grand Council.(applause) He noted that the 1993-94 Budget has been increased a minor amount of \$800. He moved the acceptance of the printed reports in your booklet, Motion was seconded and unanimously passed.

R.I. Jerry Tryon stated the report on MASONIC EDUCATION is also printed and in your hands. Moved the report be accepted, seconded and unanimously carried. He continued, those of you who attended the Vesper service this afternoon heard a fine message. I urge you all to attempt to get publicity in your local newspapers about our Masonic activities and deeds. It is a fine way to let the public know of our good intentions, even if its only five lines of type.

Apparently there is no regular gavel for the presiding officer of this Grand Body to use, so I have brought two gavels from Cobleskill to be used during these proceedings. One is of our Eastern Star Chapter and the other is out of our archives, having been presented to Cobleskill Lodge in 1893, by a Lodge in Oregon. These are pretty special to our Lodge. (both were then used by the Grand Master) If for some reason you were unable to attend the Vespers this afternoon, you can still leave your donations with the Grand Treasurer. These collections go to the Grand Council Charity Fund.

M.I. John Mauk Hilliard read his report on LIBRARY AND MUSEUM and moved its acceptance. M.I. Hilliard also read his report on YORK RITE COOPERATION and moved its acceptance. Both reports were seconded, approved and appear printed elsewhere in these Proceedings.

R.I.Wayne Carrington reported on the CONDITION AND EXTENSION OF THE RITE, has been submitted and is printed in full in the information which you received when you arrived today. It is a full page report, I ask that you read it and digest it! I will highlight some of the items because I know that our Deputy Grand Master's report is not going to last an hour and fifteen minutes. Because when I'm done he gets five minutes. He did this and then Moved the acceptance of the report and spread on the minutes in full, seconded and approved. Report appears elsewhere in these Proceedings.

The Grand Principal Conductor of the Work then continued—You know when John Mauk Hilliard got up here a few minutes ago and said that "something died" that got my attention. August 4th, I had a full—blown heart attack, and the word "died" is stricken from my vocabulary.(laughter) That word really gets the attention of one who has ever had a heart attack. You are lying there and it feels like you have an elephant sitting on you and you can't breathe and you know that the next kaboom of your heart may be the last one, Life takes on a different meaning. You don't know how glad I am to be here tonight. (applause). The Grand Master responded—we are all glad that Wayne came through the way he did—he is under orders from the Dr. to take it easy. I think the Grand Council and the Grand Lodge, of which he is Trustee are both fortunate to have him as well as he is.

We have gone through all of the Committee reports that I had scheduled for tonight, and unless the Grand Treasurer, Grand Recorder want to give their reports which are scheduled for tomorrow morning, we will listen to the DEPUTY GRAND MASTER'S report, then I will let you all go to---bed---Hospitality Room--- or wherever you want to go.

R.I Joseph A Peloso, Deputy Grand Master prefaced his report with — I guess that occasionally a myth must be dispelled, and there is a myth among active Freemasons that we are all volunteers. I think the next time you hear a notion like that in your Chapter, Lodge, Council or any other Masonic body— the concept of volunteering— it should go out the window. We are consecrated, dedicated, active Freemasons and Cryptic Masons. He then gave the DEPUTY GRAND MASTER'S Report which was received, recorded and is found elsewhere in these Proceedings.

Tomorrow morning we are going to do the same thing we did tonight, with the exception of the Ritual, but at 8:45am the gavel will sound, I have instructed the Grand Council officers to be ready to come in at 8:45, ---we'll see how many of you make the deadline! Immediately after the Grand Council officers come-in we are going to receive our Guests. Only those who are on-time will be recognized. My rule has always been that the 90 who are here on time will not wait for the 9 who cannot make it. He asked if the Grand Treasurer or Grand Recorder had any business--the Grand Treasurer stated that he has the mileage & per/diem checks for those who are entitled to checks. So if you will see me after this Session or sometime tomorrow I will be glad to give your very "large" mileage and per/diem checks. If you do not ask me for them, then you just don't get them. The Grand Recorder reminded the Companions that there are two copies of the Reports and lists of Officers of Grand Council and Constituent Councils--for information/error purposes--so please note corrections on either copy.

The Grand Master has asked our Guests from sister jurisdictions to be "on-time", and since we possibly do not have all names, see our Grand Marshal and Grand Lecturer tomorrow morning by 8:30 to meet your assigned escort. The Grand Treasurer, Recorder and Lecturer will meet with Treasurers, Recorders of constituent Councils and the AGL's in this corner of the room at 8:00am-- while the Grand Lecturer will meet in the opposite corner of the room, with the Assistant Grand Lecturers at the same time, all will finish by 8:30.(Nine Recorders and Five Treasurers attended their meeting) Will the representatives of Councils-Bath #40, Bruce #15, and Hugo Roman of #2 come to my desk after recess tonight? The Grand Master announced that the Hospitality Room will be open shortly after the recess and again in the morning for Continental-breakfast.

R.I. Grand Chaplain Don C Markham gave the Benediction, the Grand Conductor of the Council attended at the altar, and Grand Council Recessed at 8:05pm.

The gavel sounded at 8:45am on Saturday 28 August 1993 to REOPEN THE ASSEMBLY with the R.I. Francis Wilcox #87 as Illustrious Master and the stations filled by Companions from St. George's #74 and Oneonta #87. The Grand Line Officers were then escorted into the room, forming two parallel lines extended from the East to the West. They and the Companions present received the Most Illustrious Grand Master, Oliver D Mereness and accorded him Private Grand Honors upon his arrival in the East. Grand Master Mereness then discharged the Officers of Councils #74 and #87, with thanks, and directed the Grand Line to assume their respective stations. He then instructed the Grand Captain of the Guard to inform the Grand Sentinel that we are ready to receive our Distinguished Guests. While waiting, the Grand Master welcomed all & expressed his appreciation to all who had come.

Grand Master Mereness personally greeted each Delegation. The Visiting Grand Masters and Principal Officers of all delegations were seated as close to the East as Possible.

The Grand Master then called on The Grand Commander and then the Scottish Rite Representative for their remarks.

Right Eminent James A Sullivan addressed the Companions, bringing the greetings of the Grand Commandery Knights Templars of the State of New York, I know you have had a good Year and we wish you the best in your future endeavors and I would like to thank the Grand Council for all of the courtesies extended to me.

Right Excellent and Illustrious Brother Courtland Andrew then said this is an opportunity I did not expect, I am delighted to be here and bring the fraternal greetings of the Most Worshipful and Illustrious Brother Bruce Widger, 33rd Degree Active, Deputy for State of New York. I congratulate the Most Illustrious Grand Master and the Grand Council for the very fine Assembly this weekend and for all of the courtesies extended to me, and wish for him and our prayers are certainly with his wife Hazel and their family and hopefully for a speedy recovery to good health again.

The Grand Master then requested the Grand Treasurer to give his report. M.I. Beardsley proceeded to remark that the Treasurer always breathes a sigh of relief when he hears from the auditors that his records are approved. We ended the year in the "black", with no capital expenditures coming out of the operating fund or the permanent funds. We maintained the expenditures within 2% of the budget. You received these reports when you registered. We also maintain some escrow accounts, with the balance increasing about \$1500. So, I would move the acceptance of the Treasurers' Report, seconded and approved.

The Grand Recorder gave his report, stating his appreciation to the Grand Master, for this is the first time I ever had the opportunity to work with someone who anticipated a report three months in advance and had it out & done. It seems that everything he does, is planned, so that he has time for emergencies or whatever.(I wish I could do the same!) Also, congratulations to Charles VanEtten for representing New York State in working with General Grand Council International. It is a "boost" for us to have someone interested in running for that Grand Line.

The Grand Recorder's Report is in the booklet you received earlier, but I want to be sure to thank Lester Weinheimer. He did yeoman's work in preparing the office of the Grand Recorder to be transferred to a successor. It was not an easy transition, but that is because of my being a neophyte, not being proficient in computer workings.

I delayed in closing the Books until the middle of August. I will NEVER-NEVER do that again. Our Books will be closed as of the 10th of July and I will expect ALL of the Recorders and Treasurers to have done their work and have it Postmarked for this Office before the 10th of July. I will recommend that the Grand Master take prescribed action for any Council not filing their Certificate of Election and their Annual Return by the 10th of July, in accordance with Section 24 of the General Regulations.

I ask all Recorders and Treasurers to complete the Annual Return and Certificate of Election immediately after the Annual Assembly of the Council. If any consequential changes in membership occur and are reported before the 10th of July, I will "revise the Annual Return" and return a photocopy page(s) incorporating the membership changes, so that Grand Council and the Council records will be identical. I need to talk with representatives of Councils from District 3, DDGM and the Grand line Officer visiting there this year. Come up to the Desk before lunchtime for a few minutes to discuss cooperation in the District. The Grand Master stated that it has already been moved that the Grand Recorder's report be accepted.

Zinas "Zeke" Mavadones has "nothing" to Report on TABLE COUNCIL! The Grand Master acknowledged his efforts of the past, and said we expect additional suggestions from you in the future.

Most Excellent Edward Trosin, Grand High Priest was called on, and immediately thanked the Deputy Grand Master of Grand Lodge for providing some training for their Grand Principal Sojourner for his job as Grand Captain of the Host next year. He said that the Grand Council is doing an excellent job in promoting Cryptic Masonry through out the State of New York. I know that the officers work very diligently in their various functions, I know that the Councils in my part of the State are active and enjoy each others fellowship and promote Masonry. It is important that we work together as a "family", I know our Grand Master has preached that the past year and I am sure that your Deputy Grand Master feels the same way. he is also a Past Grand High Priest, although of another State, we still love him. Joe, we wish for you in the year ahead, the best of fortunes in your travels. I want to take a moment to wish the best. to a member of my own Council, the Most Illustrious Charles VanEtten in his pursuit of a position with the General Grand Council. We of Hamburg Council will support him and we look forward to his election. Most Illustrious Grand Master, we have been on a number of visits together over the past six months. We have had a lot of good times together, Barbara and I have enjoyed being with you. I hope for you a long and prosperous retirement. I want to thank you for all of the

courtesies on behalf of myself, my wife and the Grand Chapter.

The Grand Master said "I will retire, I'm going to turn Grand
Council over to the Deputy Grand Master, who called on the Grand
Principal Conductor of Work, Wayne E Carrington Sr, to deliver the
Grand Master's Address.

The following statements preceded the Address! "Obviously I $^4\mathrm{lm}$ not The Most Illustrious Grand Master. Oliver Mereness, Grand Master of Cryptic Masons of the State of New York and his lovely wife Hazel, my wife Dorothy and myself have spent many thousands of miles travelling the East coast.

Right Worshipful Deputy Grand Master, Right Pulssant and soon to be Most Puissant Dalvin L Hollaway and Companions all--I welcome you to this 170th Annual Assembly and hope that your stay will be a fruit -ful one for yourself and for our Grand Council. The Grand Master asked me to remind everyone that....It is the policy of Grand Council to send Birthday Greetings to every Companion who has achieved his Eightieth Birthday. We have many responses to those cards. I would like to read one at the present time----sent to the Grand Master. "June 10, 1993. Dear Brother Mereness, My 95th Birthday is over and you helped make it a perfect one, by sending me a Birthday Greeting. We celebrated by bringing my whole family together at Lake Mohomac Mountain House in the Catskills for a weekend. Our children, their spouses, our eight grandchildren, spouses of those three who are married, and our one great-grandchild. (The Grand Master's Address was delivered and is printed elsewhere) Motion made, seconded and passed to refer Address to the Committee.

The Grand Master returned from talking with Bassett Hospital and remarked that the Grand Recorder has several T.I.M. cards and ballots on his desk, that were not picked-up at Registration Desk by certain companions, so stop for them before lunchtime.

Ill. Companion Calvin A May Jr then gave the CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE report-printed elsewhere in the Proceedings.

The Grand Master said, "there is one other thing-that I want to publicly apologize right now to the Companions of the Council-I want to inform, those of you who read your last 2 or 3 issues of the Royal Arch Mason magazine, the Editor in Missouri blamed Earle Hino for my poor works(laughter). Earle I want to apologize for it--I tried and tried and tried, I got letters of apology but all of them too late!"(Earle responded with"I accept your apology").

There were two sets of figures in the Grand Recorder's Report that

There were two sets of figures in the Grand Recorder's Report that you and I are to blame for--Demits and Suspensions for Non-Payment of Dues. If we had kept the Companions interested, it should not have happened. Tonight at the Banquet we will be awarding two Awards--My recommendation for the Cryptic Mason of the Year Award is Right Illustrious Jack Ovitt, and as you have been informed he is in the VA Hospital in Syracuse, his spirits are good, but when an organist loses his foot it is tough!

I have asked a Connecticut Yankee to respond for the Visiting Grand Jurisdictions. Last year about 30 days into his term as Deputy Grand Master, the Grand Master died, he took over and did so well that they elected him for this year. M.I. James Keaveney, Grand Master of Grand Council of Connecticut. Companion Keaveney responded with— It's a pleasure to be here today representing all of the sister jurisdictions and give this short address. Oliver, Hazel and I have travelled extensively in our visitations into Maryland and throughout New England. We have shared very good times, a feeling shared by the other Grand Masters that have travelled with us. It has been a great year, we all feel deeply for Hazel. I know that our hearts and prayers go out to her at this time and hope that she will have a fast recovery. I want to thank you for your courtesies.

The Grand Master continued....at this time I'm going to turn this gavel, which came from Chadwick Lodge in Oregon, over to a true son of Oregon in the person of Dalvin Hollaway, our soon-to-be Most Pulssant General Grand Master. Companion Hollaway stated that he would like to give us a test at this time. Now the Test is this -- I want everybody to stand up, I want you to shake hands with one another, and when you hear the sound of the gavel, sit down and shut-up.(bedlam)(gavel) Now I'll tell you...you passed the test! The reason for the test was this--1st. I wanted you to stand up so you wouldn't go to sleep when I talked--2nd. so that you might have some fellowship with one another and--3rd, which is most important, when I go home I can tell my wife I had a standing ovation. This gavel, coming from Chadwick Lodge #68 in Oregon is 100 years old and is made from Myrtlewood which only grows in the state of Oregon and northern California and is a unique wood in itself. It is a pleasure to be here and to represent our Most Puissant General Grand Master Evan Fleming. It is a pleasure to be in the State of New York to represent the General Grand. I have ties with the State of New York because two of my children come from stock of New York, my wife is from NY, born and grew up here, coming west and married me. understand that the Most Illustrious Grand Master has been in the Undertaking business--some call it Morticians--others call it Funeral I had a good friend that was a undertaker and every time Directors. that he shook your hand, his forefinger would go up and feel your pulse.(Laughter) That is the true grip of a undertaker. Very nice gentleman, he loved to give you things, and he gave me a suit, a wonderful suit, every time I put it on though, my hands would go like this (hands joined on breast). Like to tell you a little story about Hustling--to hustle. Every morning in Africa a gazelle wakes up and it knows it must run faster than the fastest lion or it will be killed. Every morning a lion wakes up and knows it must run faster than the slowest gazelle or it will starve to death. Now there is a moral to the story--it doesn't matter whether you are a lion or a gazelle when the sun comes up, you better be running.

For a few minutes I would like to talk with you about One More Night With the Frogs. And if the Chaplains will, for a moment let me use some Biblical examples, I think you will find out'where we got One More Night With the Frogs. It seems that in early times of the Hebrew children, they were in the land of Egypt, and being in the land of Egypt, God had sent forth a man to take them out of the Land of Egypt to the Promised Land in the form of Moses. Moses was sent by God to go into Egypt to lead his people from there into a place in which he wanted them to be, but it was not easy for them to leave the land of Egypt because of the slave labor that was being used by the Egyptians, they did not want to lose that labor, and they would not let the people go until God sent forth plagues upon the land of Egypt. One of those plagues that came upon them was a frog that came and was all over the land. We find that it says that the frogs were in their homes, in their beds, were in their cooking ovens. Thev were drinking water that had frogs in it, just think for a moment "living with frogs". Moses was called before Pharaoh and he asked Moses to have God remove those frogs. Moses asked Pharaoh--When? and Pharaoh said "tomorrow". He made the decision--One More Night With I have no doubt that Pharaoh was a strong leader and one the Frogs. of the best leaders that Egypt had ever had. He held in his hands the lives of millions of people both Hebrew and Egyptian, but he made the decision for his people to Live One More Night With the Frogs. As a leader of Freemasonry are we making some of the same decisions? Do we see the plagues that are imposed upon us, the obstacles that

are before us, are we willing to make some changes, and thus be $^{4}\mbox{NoT}$ willing to Live One More Night With the Frogs? All surveys, all indications about Freemasonry if not changed, show we are outdated, obsolete, forgotten, gone, vanished and headed for extinction. need to make some changes in Freemasonry. Not in our esoteric values, but in what Masonry offers the modern family today. We need to create an atmosphere within our Society for our Organization's membership to participate and a fantasy of being able to have some fun in our organization. Freemasonry's teachings are NOT out-dated or antiquated but the way that we practice -- the way of running our Lodges, our Councils, our Chapters and our Commanderies sure are out-of-date! We are in competition with the members' time, with the members' family, with the members' business and, yes, with the members' churches. We have gone through a situation where one of the major religious organizations held a vote as to whether or not Masonry was compatible with their religion, and I was confident that the vote would be as it was. Being a member of the Baptist Church, I knew that members of Masonry would vote to uphold the right for a Baptist to belong to Masonry and also belong to his Church. I was confident of that, and I told people that. Some were really outraged and afraid that they would vote to kick Masons out of the Baptist Church. I'm fortunate that my pastor is a Mason and it is easy for me to worship in my Church with a man being a Mason as Pastor because we have many more things in common. In fact I'm telling you here now that the new General Grand Chaplain of General Grand Council of Cryptic Masons International is a Southern Baptist Minister. could take a message home to the Southern Baptists. He has accepted the position and will do a good job for us. When we are in competition with our Churches in respect to our time for our members, let us learn to cooperate and to be compatible with them. I think it is time for Masonry to get out of the funeral business, by that I mean "let the churches bury the dead"--we can hold memorial services in our Lodges and not be in competition with Churches that feel that we get involved in their rites. It is time we do something so we can be compatible with our individual religion. A Chinese Proverb says-If you don't change directions, you'll go where your head is---we're headed for extinction. Just One More Night With the Frogs? I think not! Freemasonry with a vision can make a difference. We have a positive influence over humanity because Freemasonry teaches morality. We believe that the Holy Scripture is a rule of our Faith and practice--so let us rise again and bring back the guiding light to make the changes so we won't have to Live One More Night With the Frogs. As Masonic Leaders we can look forward to solving some of our challenges without the fear of failure, for we cannot accomplish any thing if we don't try. I again bring the greetings of the General Grand Council and the 190,000 Cryptic Masons in the World. I also invite you to come to Biloxi and be with us in our Triennial and support one of your own, running for General Grand Principal Conductor of the Work. I'm not a predictor of elections but I am sure that he has a very good chance of attaining the office (especially if he gets that \$1,000 to me that he promised). You can be proud of him and the interest that he has. Companions, thank you for your time.

The Grand Master called for the following committee reports, Time & Place, Necrology, Ish-Sodi and Awards. Moved, seconded and passed.

They are printed elsewhere in the Proceedings.
It being exactly 11:15am, the time for the Annual Meeting of the Charity Corporation, the Grand Master called for Most Illustrious, John A Sainz, President of the Charity Corporation, to conduct this meeting. He asked to be allowed to conduct the meeting from his

wheelchair and would like first to dispel a couple rumors as to how my accident occurred. The first one I heard, was that I fell off the ladder, that's not true, the ladder was securely against the tree and was still there when I fell. The second rumor is that I cut off the branch that I was standing on—to my knowledge that is not true! But I know that when that branch went down I followed it rather rapidly. I am pleased that I can be with all of you this morning. I now call the Meeting to Order. * (Sainz's using the brass—head of cane as a gavel)I have a good gavel! The first duty I have is to appoint what some of us would call Tellers but what I call Inspectors of Election. Each year the membership of this Grand Council must elect the Board of Directors of the Grand Council Charity Corporation, therefore I will appoint, as Inspectors of Election. George Savale and Alexander Grone. I will ask these Inspectors to remain where they are in the Assembly, until and if they are needed at the time of Election.

Assembly, until and if they are needed at the time of Election. (The Officers' Report is Printed elsewhere in the Proceedings.) Sainz continued with the statement that the Corporation Treasurer's Report will now be presented. M.I. Beardsley stated that when the Companions Registered, each received a compendium of four pages which constitutes the financial report of the Charity Corporation. I think you will see that being Treasurer of the Charity Corporation is far more complicated than being Grand Treasurer of the Grand Council. To reiterate, any of you who have had dealings with investment markets this past year, realize the extreme volatility & fluctuation. Last year, we didn't renew some Certificates of Deposit and converted much of that money into corporate bonds at a very good rate of interest. but during the year because many companies have called in their corporate bonds and reissued them at much lower rates. By Spring the Board made the decision to place much more of these called-bond monies into our Mutual Fund Investments, where the returns are doing very well, especially in the bond market. We also depend on US Government Notes and GinnyMae's funds. I think a return of over 8% is still a creditable return for the Corporation. All of the new donations we receive are placed immediately into the Permanent Funds and invested. A record of those donations are on the 3rd page of the report and the 4th page gives a record of the Life Memberships. Those Councils which M.I.John Sainz pointed out, have had the best returns, and also have active Charity Fund chairmen or Recorders who are vitally interested in the Fund & send Reports in throughout the year. It is unfortunate that every Council does not have active supporters of the Charity Fund, --it would be increasing a lot faster. The number of Life Memberships (each cost \$50) has gone up each of the last three years, and should continue to increase. Before I conclude I was just handed a Life Membership, which will be issued in the name of Hazel Mereness. If Any other companions desire to make contributions at this time, I will be glad to receive them. M.I.Sainz called upon M.I. John Mauk Hilliard, who stated it is an honor to present to M.I. Sainz, on behalf of Mrs. Charlotte Bentley, a check in the amount of \$1,000. to the Charity Corporation in memory of her late husband M.I. Robert Asa Lincoln Bentley who was very active in support of this Corporation of the Grand Council during his lifetime. M.I. Sainz requested that our appreciation be communicated to Mrs. Bentley. He then called for the report of the nominating committee for Directors for the year 1993-1994. They nominated the following Companions for Directors: John A Sainz, Raymond R Beardsley, John Mauk Hilliard, Emmerich J Bares Jr. and Wayne E Carrington Sr.. There being no other nominations, it was moved that nominations be closed and those nominated be elected. The motion was seconded and carried.

The Board of Directors was requested to meet briefly, immediately after this meeting. There being no other business before the Charity Corporation, President Sainz thanked the Inspectors of Election for their arduous labors and declared the Charity meeting adjourned at 11:30am.

The Grand Master then asked R.I. Edmund D Harrison to give the Report of the TIME AND PLACE Committee, which he did, as the representative of Columbian Council #1. The 171st Annual Assembly will be held in the Holiday Inn, Suffern, New York on August 19 and 20, 1994. This is the same location as the 168th Annual Assembly. The TRUSTEES Report was given by M.I. Edmund Lynch, Jr and is printed elsewhere in the Proceedings.

The Grand Master then introduced R.W. Earle J Hino Jr, Deputy Grand Master of the Grand Lodge Free and Accepted Masons of the State of New York. R.W. Hino addressed the dignitaries and said "you are not going to be subjected to a Fire & Brimstone Speech this morning from me for two reasons. First, I know only too well the only thing that separates you-and that door and lunch is me. Secondly, I have a slight case of laryngitis. Many of you have probably noted this morning that I was seated between the pillars of strength and beauty. I want you to consider-which is which. My Brethren it is my pleasure and joy to be with you this morning and share with each of you the rich and rewarding experience of Grand Council. I extend to each of you the Fraternal Greetings of the Grand Lodge of the State of New York, the Grand Line Officers and Permanent Members, with special Felicitations from our Most Worshipful Grand Master Gary Arthur Henningsen who unfortunately could not be with us. I will see him tomorrow in Boston and relay your sentiments and feelings toward him. My Brethren I can assure you that Freemasonry in the Grand Jurisdiction in the State of New York is 'on the move'. The sleeping giant that once was, has arisen with new vitality and strength and certainly with a vision for tomorrow. Each of you should be an active participant in that advancement. As you know the Grand Master and Grand Officers have only been in office for approximately 3 months. Some of you can attest, many many changes have been brought about and are in force. The last few months we have tried to analyze this Grand Jurisdiction, we are trying to put the right men in the right jobs across the Empire State. New training periods for the DDGM's and Staff Officers have already been implemented and hopefully they will materialize. A considerable amount of money has been invested in the 1500 acres of Camp Turk at Woodgate during the last several years and that belongs to you. The same is true of the George Washington Memorial Shrine at Tappan and the Masonic Home at Utica which the Freemasons of this jurisdiction own in one way or another. The Grand Master and I have gone over many of the accounts, the Committees of Grand Lodge, and I can assure you that all possible savings are being implemented, much to the dissatisfaction of some(which is unfortunate). My brethren, I am sure that many of you will recall from your history that somewhere around the year of 340BC a young Macedonian King by the name of Alexander the Great defeated the largest standing army known to exist, that of Darius King of Persia and that within a period of 10 years Alexander the Great conquered the known world, and died at the young age of 33. The Grand Master and we of Grand Lodge are confident that we can turn-around this Grand Jurisdiction and give it the former glory that was once was, in the next 10 years. I would have you recall that in 1898---100 years -ago, this Grand Jurisdiction stood at 98,000 members, and had a net gain of over 2700 Freemasons. I will also have you recall that shortly after WWI,1918-20, we had an increase of 51,000 Freemasons in

this Grand Jurisdiction in that 3 year period, with a little concerted effort. I will also remind you that it is the health and condition of Grand Lodge and our constituent lodges throughout the Grand Jurisdiction that affords you the luxury of membership in the York and Scottish Rite of Freemasonry. For without healthy and viable lodges everything stands at risk-all your philanthropies, your Masonic Home at Utica, your membership in the York and Scottish Rite. I submit to you that when you leave this Grand Council this weekend and are in the comfort of your own homes, or in your backyard, that you reflect upon this fraternity and try to become the best Freemason that you can possibly be! Support your Lodges, do what is necessary to encourage membership in this, the worlds finest institution every created by the mind of man. And if each of us does his job I am confident that the goals and aspirations, of the Grand Master, the Grand Lodge and of all the affiliated and appendant orders, will be fulfilled. I will leave you with one final thought-I think it appears in William Shakespeare's play Julius Caesar--"The fault, Dear Brutus, lies not in the stars but in ourselves". My brethren it has been my pleasure to be with you this morning, we wish for you and the Grand Council of Cryptic Masons of the State of New York Good Health, Prosperity and Long Life. God Bless You! The Deputy Grand Master, was escorted from the Assembly, which was then Recessed!

After lunch the Grand Master announced the Election, and appointed M.I.Richard Hadley, Ill.Claude Miller and Ill. Arnold Palmer as tellers and that Nominating speeches will be limited to 3 minutes, Seconding speeches to no more than 1 minute(we prefer 30 seconds). Each of the following were nominated and elected to serve for the 1993-1994 Cryptic Year. Each accepted his office.

The Grand Master discharged the Tellers with thanks. We will go on to a real important piece of work—the recognition of those who have worked in Cryptic Masonry and became eligible for awards for membership. Enough members joined this year, that if we hadn't lost those dimits and suspensions, we would have shown an increase. R.I. Harvey Payne gave the Report of the ISH SODI AND AWARDS Committee. During the Report, Certificates were presented to these Councils for Greeting five or more Companions during the Cryptic Year: Columbian #1, Rotica #12, Northern Star #34, Fulton #50, Peekskill #55, St. George's #74, Suffolk #76, Flatbush #80, North Shore #88 and Hamburg #91, ALSO Certificate to Suffolk #76 for MOST GREETINGS--EIGHTEEN!

Three Certificates were awarded to Councils showing a 10% or more increase in Membership by General Grand Council International to: Suffolk #76-19.1%; FLATBUSH #80-21.95% and North Shore #88 -10.91% Fulton #50 received Honorable Mention for a 9.33% increase.

ISH-SODI AWARD recipients: R.I. Kent G Young #25 (subsequent-2nd award); Ill.Richard Gunsales #50; Ill. Rafael Castro #76;

47 Ill.Donald Fingar #76; Ill C Burton Pierce #76; Comp. Michael Perez #80 and Ill.Robert E Schaffrath #88.

Councils that contributed \$5.00 or more per member to the Charity Corporation also received Certificates (amounts are on the Report) -- Central City #13; Bruce #15; Doric #19; Owego #30; Adoniram #36; Corning #53; Peekskill #55; Oneonta #87 and Nun-Da-Wa-Ga #92. Doric Council #19 was awarded the Certificate for Greatest Total Dollar Amount contributed by a Council -- \$955.00.

Columbian Council #1 was presented a Certificate for having the Most Companions present at this Assembly-10!(Oneonta #87-had 16 but ineligible as Host)In 1992 Oneonta had 18 present and received the Certificate. R.I.Payne,in final action as chairman of the Awards Committee, thanked the committeemen.

Grand Master Mereness then presented Honorary Memberships to the Visiting Grand Master's from Sister Jurisdictions, and General Grand.

Grand Master Mereness then received the reports of the Committees of GRIEVANCES AND APPEALS, and GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS. M.I.Van Etten stated that no Grievances or Appeals were received, so no report! The report on the Grand Masters' Address was Received, and Accepted.

Instructions were given to DDGM's and Incoming Officers relative to Installation Procedures. The T.I.M. Degree will be given at 2:45pm. The Incoming Grand Master will meet with the DDGM's and Grand Line Officers immediately after close of Assembly. The Grand Recorder reported that Companions Paul Roshkind #55, Jay A Spadaro #80 and Michael L Klinkbeil #92 were absent and would not receive the Thrice Illustrious Master Degree today. St. George's Order of Annointed Kings will confer the T.I.M. on Wednesday 13 October 1993, in Schenectady Masonic Temple.

Grand Master Mereness asked the Grand Master elect if he would announce his appointments for the coming year. Grand Master Mereness retired amid a hearty round of applause. The Grand Master-Elect invited M.I. Raymond R Beardsley to the East for the purpose of Installing the newly elected Officers in Tiled Assembly. Who asked M.I. Fred G Hickein to be Installing Grand Marshall.

Most Illustrious Beardsley Obligated the Officers and Installed Joseph A Peloso as Grand Master. The Grand Master was escorted to his station and M.I. Beardsley called upon the Companions to join with him in according our Most Illustrious Grand Master his first Private Grand Honors. Most Illustrious Beardsley stated that inasmuch as the Public Installation is to follow at 4:Øpm the Charges to the Officers would be given at that time. He presented the Gavel of authority to Most Illustrious Peloso, and congratulated him on his ascension to this high office. Grand Master Peloso thanked M. I. Beardsley and M.I. Hickein for being Installing Officers for the 170th Cryptic year. The Grand Master addressed the Companions and charged them to encourage dedicated work for the future. He then reminded us of the schedule for the remainder of the day. M.I. Peloso then determined there was no further business, and proceeded to adjourn the 170th Assembly, by asking R.I.Edmund Harrison to recite the Charge-Benediction by R.I. At 4:00pm the Assembly was reconvened so the Ladies and the Public could witness the Installation of the Officers. M.I. Raymond R Beardsley, Installing Grand Master, assisted by M.I. Fred G Hickein, Installing Grand Marshal and R.I. Don C Markham as Installing Grand Chaplain, installed the Officers in due form. M.I. Joseph A Peloso installed the District Deputy Grand Masters. Past Grand Master Mereness expressed his appreciation for the kindness shown to him. He presented Most Illustrious Peloso with the Grand Masters Jewel with Chain Collar, the traveling Grand Masters Jewel and his Apron. He

also presented him with a certificate which stated that he had been installed as Grand Master on this day. Grand Master Peloso thanked Past Grand Master Mereness for the presentation. He then presented Past Grand Master Mereness with a Past Grand Masters Jewel bearing his name, and said it is entrusted to him to wear during his pleasure and when he no longer receives pleasure in wearing it, it should be returned to the owner, which is the Grand Council. He also presented him a certificate, stating that he had served this Grand Council as Grand Master for the 1992-1993 year. Most Illustrious Mereness thanked the Grand Master.

Grand Master Peloso thanked the Installing Staff for a fine installation.

Grand Master Peloso asked for the Benediction and then Declared the 170th. Annual Assembly closed in Ample Form.

Highlights of the Grand Masters Banquet

The Reception and Banquet were held at the appointed time. Most Illustrious Oliver D Mereness led the Companions and their Ladies in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag followed by one verse of the Star Spangled Banner and O Canada. The invocation was given by R.I. Rev Allen C Lang and all enjoyed a delicious dinner. After the dinner the Grand Sentinel introduced the Head Table, while the Grand Master introduced his family and guests. Those present were aware that Mrs Hazel Mereness is in Bassett Hospital, in a serious health condition.

R.P. Dalvin L Hollaway and M.I. Oliver D Mereness presented the General Grand Council International Adult Leadership Award, after diligent search, to Ill. Harrison Raymond Jr of Cayuga Council #90. The Grand Master announced that the recipient of the General Grand Council International Cryptic Mason of the Year Award is R.I. Jack Ovitt and is not here tonight as he is in the VA Hospital in Syracuse The Award will be presented to him "As Soon As Possible"

The following were called upon for Remarks:

Miss Heather Allen, State Representative of the Organization of Triangles.

Roger H Pelham II, State Master Councilor of Demolay.

R.W. and M.I. Earle J Hino Jr, Deputy Grand Master of the Grand Lodge, Free and Accepted Masons State of New York. Each responded with appropriate remarks.

Right Puissant Hollaway presented Most Illustrious Mereness with a Plaque, his Membership Card and Lapel Pin as a Permanent Member of General Grand Council Cryptic Masons International.

Grand Master Mereness announced that the Hospitality Room would be opened for Fellowship and Refreshments following the Banquet. Continental breakfast will again be available Sunday Morning.

The Banquet was closed with a Benediction by Right Illustrious Rev Allen C Lang.

The Grand Recorder thanks Right Illustrious Cullen O Henry for his assistance during this Annual Assembly.

To the Grand Council:

The report of the business in the Grand Recorders Office for the year ending July 31, 1993 is as follows:

I would like to express my deep gratitude to M..I..Lester G Weinheimer, Jr Grand Recorder Emeritus, and to Ginny, for their deep concern for the well-being of our Grand Council. They have made the transition of office responsibilities as reasonable as possible. This neophyte Grand Recorder would still be at a "loss" if it were not for them and their understanding of the working of the office.

I am still learning many of the details necessary to complete the work, but hopefully by the end of August, I will understand even more about the "job" (especially after conclusion of the Annual Assembly). The Office is quite time-consuming and exacting, as I want to avoid making errors, and accuracy is required at every step.

All of the Delinquencies from last years report were made good with the exception of Washington Council #52. There still has been no Annual Meeting held and no Annual Return received by the Office of the Grand Recorder. The Grand Master and Jurisprudence Committee will give reports on Washington Council. The Companions are worthy of our assistance and mean well, but are "worn-out" in their efforts to maintain the Council.

Records from Adelphic Council #7 and Manhattan Council #95 have been received verifying their Merger into Adelphic Council #7. members from Manhattan have been given opportunity to demit and affiliate with Adelphic. Logistically, we have considered them as

Of our 46 Councils reporting this year, 44 Affidavit of Election, and Annual Return forms, have been received (5 are partial) as of this date. No Affidavit of Election, or Annual Return, has been received from Ancient City Council #21 or Washington Council #52. NO Per Capita Fees have been received from Ancient City Council #21, Washington #52 or Catskill Council #78. Partially completed Annual Returns have been received from five councils which continued to delay my being able to complete this report or properly record the membership information in the computer and card files.

The Constituent Councils are supposed to finalize their Annual Reports by June 30, and have them in the Office of the Grand Recorder by July 10th. As such, all of the records should be calculated by 31 July. My conversation with some Recorders gave me "high hopes" that the Reports would be in my hands by that date--BUT!!!! Next year if you re-elect me, I will have to finalize records as of the mail received 7/11/94. I should do a better job next time(hopefully). Next year,

476 Birthday Cards were sent to Companions, Eighty Years Old or Older, having the return address of the Grand Master. This continuing program is beneficial to Grand Council since quite a few "happy" responses are sent to the Grand Master, also we are able to update address changes when we receive cards returned by the Postal Service, or correspondence from the family that our Companion has moved or is deceased. This information is also forwarded to the appropriate Council for their records. Some Recorders respond to me with confirmations but others seem to ignore the information sent to them. We will again provide "cards with stamps" for your convenience in advising us of "change of address, death, demit and suspensions."

No equipment was purchased this year for the office, though it was necessary to replace the "drum" on the photocopy machine and the power supply unit for the computer "gave out".

In our Annual Budget we allocate \$750.00 for" Equipment Repair and Purchase". I support the suggestion made by M.I. Weinheimer, in that the unused portion of this account be deposited into the Escrow Account for future purchases. This will allow for a reserve to replace equipment as it wears out. At the present time all equipment is paid for.

You may recall that M.I.Weinheimer suggested last year that since we have no Past Grand Master's Jewels in inventory in the Grand Recorder's Office something needs to be done. The Budget Committee was apprised of this situation, and I understand that they have a suggestion for resolving the dilemma.

I received one Past Grand Masters' Jewel for refurbishing for our retiring Grand Master. Consideration should be made at this Annual Assembly on future consideration of this problem.

In accordance with the General Regulations, Section 10. Paragraph L. I have filed with the Grand Trustees a renewal of the Dishonesty Bond in the sum of \$10.000.000 with Western Surety Company, Sioux Falls, SD., Bond # 68255404, covering the Grand Treasurer, Grand Recorder, Three Grand Trustees, and the Charity Corporation Trustees. Policy period 6-16-92 to 6-16-93. in addition to the above, the equipment and furniture in the Grand Recorders Office is insured with The Hanover Insurance Company, 100 North Parkway, Worcester, MA. Consisting of Data Processing \$1,890.00, Data Processing- Additional Benefits \$10.000.00 and Miscellaneous Equipment \$6,275.00, coverage. Policy Period 7-9-93 to 7-9-94 is in the Inland Marine Floater.

A new inventory of equipment in the Grand Recorders Office was submitted to the Insurance Company in February 1992.

I might mention here that my predecessor carried the \$10,000.00 Dishonesty Bond, and Loss or Damage Insurance on the equipment in the Grand Recorders Office. I have continued to do the same. It has been brought to my attention, and I agree, that this should be part of my report, as a good business practice.

During the 1992-1993 year we transferred our financial accounts to banking institutions that could be used by the Grand Recorder's Office for the Escrow Accounts (Wilber National Bank in Oneonta) and

by the Grand Treasurer's and Recorder's Office for the checking account(Key Bank NA for Fairport and Oneonta branches). The Balances on the books maintained in the Grand Recorder's Office agree with the Balances in the Grand Treasurer's Office. 1992-1993 Income and Expenses give a BALANCE AS OF 31 JULY 1993 OF \$17,254.26. in KeyBank and \$5,520.45 in the Escrow in Wilber Bank. Issued Vouchers #219 to #228 and #1001 to #1038...... \$41,244.67

I believe that our Grand Treasurer is doing a fine job for you, and our individual records of balances agree. Grand Council's duplicate records system of receipts expenditures eliminates most bookmaking errors. I find the Voucher System to be excellent and it is reasonable that the Grand Master, Grand Treasurer and Grand Recorder all be involved in the transactions of the Grand Council. between the Annual Assemblies.

I have no idea of the exact number of hours this work involves. but realize that it is many more that I initially projected in my estimates. I do not regret any of the time involved, only wish that I have more time to devote to the work.

CHARITY CORPORATION REPORT

Proper notice of this August 28, 1993 meeting of the Grand Council Charity Corporation having been officially given in the Call for this Annual Assembly, 1 now call the meeting to order.

The Grand Council of Cryptic Masons, Inc. meets at this time during the Annual Assembly of Grand Council, as required by Article IV, Section 1, of its ByLaws. The officer of the Corporation report on the activities and stewardship for the past year.

The Permanent Fund of the Corporation increased approximately \$ 10,000 during the 1992-1993 fiscal year, bringing the principal of the Fund to nearly \$ 253,000. Contributions exceeded the prior year. Life Membership contributions about the same as last year. Bequests are pending, but none received. The following Councils each contributed \$ 300, or more:

Several Councils made no donations to the fund. We ask, again, that at least one Companion in each of those Councils make a donation. Such an example may spur others to do likewise. The Trasurer's Report will follow, with an over-view of the income and investments.

An estimated one million Americans are afflicted with Parkinson's Disease. This debillitating mid-brain disease eludes a definitive cure. New bio-chemicals emerge, showing potential for slowing or even reversing the disease growth. The development of bio-genetic techniques add to the promise of future cure. One on the main difficulties, however, is how to place the bio-chemical or a specific gene in the desired mid-brain locality. Highly skilled medical personnel and state-of-the-art equipment are essential. The Grand Council's dedication to the support of the PDF is important to the difficult task of ameliorating and, hopefully, eliminating this dread disease. The Parkinson's Disease Foundation is the focus of our charity, and received \$ 7,500.00.

In addition, continuing support of the Masonic Medical Research L abortory's Summer Youth Fellowship Program received \$ 1,750.00. This program gives youth interested in medical research an opportunity to obtain hands-on experience, and to participate in interesting and useful seminars with the reserch staff.

A donation of \$ 2,000.00 was budgeted for the Grand Council display in the Grand Lodge Library & Museum at Utica. The planned work was delayed, and thus the funds were not expended.

The Directors, after reviewing the list of past recipients, which, except for the PDF, are subject to change from year to year, concluded that donating to other charitable funds did not enhance the image of our Grand Council Charity Fund. Thus, more selectivity is being exercised in choosing recipients. An added factor for selectivity is the trend to lower interest rates, and the calling-in of high-grade, high-yield industrial bonds, which decreases the return on investments. This is evidenced by the 8.22% return on our investments this year, versus 10.4% the prior year. The Directors would welcome suggestions and recommendations of charitable causes that might be considered for the future.

On behalf of the Board of Directors and the recipients of our donations, I want to express sincere thanks to all who have supported this on-going endeavor.



You know the words from that time honored song "There's no place like Home", don't you my Companion? Well, finding a place to call home, keeping the one they have or reconstructing their Secret Vault in a new home was an added part of the labors performed by several of the Councils I visited this past Cryptic year. Specifically it was my privilege on behalf of our Grand Council to have visited the Third District in the Mid-Hudson Valley and the Seventh District along the Southern Tier. In the latter, Masonic properties seem to be the hottest deal in town judging from the number of Masonic Temples that were sold there. In the 3rd District as well, both the Kingston and Hudson Masonic Temples are experiencing financial difficulties. By contrast, the Poughkeepsie Masonic Temple concluded a favorable deal. In return for giving up their spacious ground floor dining hall and lounge, the new commercial occupant is contributing toward the conversion of a previously unused room upstairs - one adjacent to the Masonic meeting room - into a new dining hall. Speaking of which, on my visit to King Solomon's Council #31 there, I was privileged to share in their annual Table Council. Take note my Companion! Your Council received a copy of their script/toast list last year. That Council received a copy of their script/toast list last year. means that better than half your preparation has been taken care of for you. That simply leaves the meal that the Companions will share. On the evening of my visit, we enjoyed a home-cooked one. I'd gladly share the names of each entree provided by Ill. Comp. Zinas Mavadones but to be honest my Companion....they were all Greek to me!

We likewise sat around the table in Goshen Council #93 but for different reasons. The I.M. was unable to muster a quorum for a formal Assembly. That was especially true with my travelling Companions and me as we were led down the stairs into an honest to goodness subterranean Secret Vault located below street level! The Assembly was punctuated with laughter and spirited Masonic humor in equal measure to their attention to the Ritual and seriousness of purpose during the formal portions of the meeting. As no new Councils were formed or Chartered in New York State this past year, there was no extension of the RITE. Our Councils continue to have loss in Members and this does not result in growth and new councils being formed. On the positive side there is some interest in forming of a new Council in the Watertown area, however this is at present only in the very early stages.

The Condition of the Councils in New York State is good, however it could be much better with a very little work and effort. In some Councils we see excellent work and Degrees. We see enthusiasm and friendship in many Councils; we see desire to have candidates to witness Degrees; and we commend all of those who " MAKE THINGS HAPPEN".

There are also some Councils that are smaller and their lack of numbers is very discouraging to the Companions and Officers that are trying to keep those councils alive. Poor attendance is a concern of the Officers and Companions, and when the Officers don't attend their Councils regularly, how can we expect the Companions to attend? The average age continues to increase, this also is a factor of attendance.

There are some Councils in New York State that are larger and have the ability to do good work and are prosperous, however there are also some Councils that have memberships under $35\ \mathrm{and}$ are struggling to exist. These smaller Councils need help. may come from larger councils near by or may be accomplished only by a merger or consolidation with another Council. It may be that two smaller Councils could consolidate to form a stronger Council.

In spite of our problems there are many good things happening in our Councils. The variety of programs such as Family Nights, Guest Nights, Ladies Nights, Special Speakers and Special Programs, and any variety of programs that are available all tend to increase attendance. Table Councils and good ritual work is in many instances a key to good attendance. We salute those groups that do good Ritual, be they Blue Lodge, York Rite or Scottish Rite bodies or the Shrine. Quality leadership is leadership that is headed in the "RITE DIRECTION".

It is my personal belief that we as masons must support all the bodies especially our symbolic Blue Lodge, for if we as a Council are to grow, so must our Blue Lodges grow. They need help, guidance, suggestions and our support. This is after all where our new members come from.

- 5. TO COOPERATE WITH THE DISTRICT DEPUTY GRAND MASTER IN ARRANGING AND HOLDING A CONVENTION IN HIS DISTRICT ATLEAST ONCE A YEAR, FOR THE EXEMPLIFICATION OF THE WORK OF THE RITUAL AND THE PROMOTION OF THE INTEREST OF THE RITE.

YORK RITE COOPERATION

28 August 1993

To The Grand Council:

The York Rite Cooperation Committee has not met this year. The original mandate of this committee, which was to create a model wherein the Grand Chapter and Grand Council might jointly hold their annual Convocations and Assemblies, and to cooperate in other ways such as joint degree festivals, and joint programs of Masonic Education, has regretably proven to be a chimera. This committee met with its counterpart from the Grand Chapter for several years in pursuit of this elusive goal. The two committees outlined the essential elements of a joint annual meeting scheme, and all that remained was for proposed enabling legislation to be drafted by the judge advocates and/or constitutional authorities in both Grand Bodies, and for the resulting legislation to be favourably acted on in the respective Grand Bodies. That action was never taken because the two Grand Lines appeared to have lost interest in the possibilities inherent in the proposed scheme of arrangements.

Those who wish to examine the details of the joint agreements are invited to peruse the previous annual reports of this Committee which are to be found in Grand Council Proceedings of the last five or so years. Since this committee is moribund, and its mandate no longer a priority of either Grand Body, and since there appears to be little current interest in creating formal institutional York Rite cooperation, it is recommended that it be permanently disbanded.

Any future initiatives which are designed to create specific mechanisms for York Rite Cooperation and Unity in New York State will be equally futile unless they are undertaken by both Grand Lines directly, meeting jointly, and hammering out specific plans as a "committee of the whole". Such immediate and direct negotiation between both the Grand Chapter Line and the Grand Council Line will insure that any consensus and agreements reached on these issues will have the true support and active committment of the immediate future Grand High Priests and Grand Masters, and of the powerful caucuses of the Past Grand High Priests and Past Grand Masters, whose influence and consent must be solidly behind such initiatives if they are to be realized.

The Committee on Libraries and Museums is pleased to report that the Chancellor Robert R Livingston Masonic Library and Museum-Utica Branch is fast becomming the central archive for the principal documents, books, artifacts, and objects d'art relating to the history of the Grand Council of Cryptic Masons (formerly Royal and Select Masters) of the State of New York. As one of the world's premier Masonic collections, the Livingston Library and Museum, at both its Manhattan and Utica divisions, represents one of the most important elements in the survival of Freemasonry in North America. The libraries and museums of the Ancient Craft preserve a model of fraternal living which can be transmitted to the future. As Freemasons seek to rediscover the essential identity, integrity, and character of their great institution, as they attempt to celebrate anew the great historical, literary, and ritual traditions that undergird the Craft, these repositories become a major tool of renewal.

The Committee therefore heartily recommends that all New York State Cryptic Masons, individually and collectively through their Councils, embark on an immediate campaign of support for the Livingston Library and Museum. Please consider earmarking your 1993-94 Brotherhood Fund contribution for the Livingston Library and Museum. You, your lodge, and district will receive full credit for this contribution in your Brotherhood Fund totals. The sums thus garnered will be utilized to facilitate the forthcoming critical move of the Manhattan Division from the 17th Floor of the Masonic Hall to newly renovated quarters in the building, and will support annual operational budgets for acquisitions, conservation and preservation, education and circulation, and general overhead.

At some point in the near future, Livingston Library and Museum Trustees will initiate a capital endowment compaign to permanently secure the future of the institution, and the Grand Council is urged to assume a major role in that vital process. Since the Livingston is likely to be the principal repository of the history of this Grand Council, it behooves us as Cryptic Masons to generously provide for its continuance.

"The Measure of Greatness!"

Again we pause during our Annual Assembly to take a few minutes to remember those of our Companions who have been summoned from our midst by death during this past Cryptic Year. It is altogether fitting and proper that we do this, for those whom we here remember were important to us as Companions and as a part of this Grand Council. Each one of them brought an influence to bear upon us in some form or other. Each one of them was a laborer in the quarries of our fraternity and our life. The activities and efforts of each were of great benefit and importance to our fraternity and our world. Indeed, the world of our acquaintance is a little bit brighter and better because they lived.

In the rush and press of life with its emphasis upon great causes and lofty goals, it is easy to lose sight of the individual. Quite often we pursue lofty goals and enjoy the benefits of the labors of others without ever stopping to think about those who made it all possible! That is why we need to take time to reflect upon the influence which other people have upon us and upon all aspects of our lives.

As members and participants in the largest fraternal fellowship in the world, it behooves each of us to think in terms of the importance of this fellowship and all who are a part of it. In a world guided and governed by power, prestige, and money, little emphasis is placed upon interpersonal relationships - but this is what our great fraternity is all about. Freemasonry teaches the importance of people and seeks to cultivate the best in every member of its fellowship. Within the fraternity we are taught to take the raw, unpolished ashlar fit for but the crudest of purposes, and smooth out the roughness, polish it and make it fit for the highest and noblest of edifices.

There are those who would be detractors of Masonry - determined to cause its downfall because they are afraid of the influence which it may bring to bear upon others. The strength of our fraternity lies in the fact that it is a fraternity - a linking together in fellowship of those who share common beliefs, philosophies, and practices. It is this bridging of the gulfs between people which many individuals and institutions are neither willing nor able to

accept. It is easy to find and stress the differences between and among people but it is quite another thing to discover and emphasize those elements which unite us with other members of the human family. Many years ago Edwin Markham wrote these words:

"He drew a circle which shut me out; Heretic, rebel, a thing to flout; But love and I had the wit to win, We drew a circle that took him in!"

These words stand as a clear and succint example of what Freemasonry in all its branches is about - inclusiveness! We need to build upon the foundation of those elements in which we agree rather than upon our differences. Only by emphasizing our commonalties will our fraternity grow and prosper! The bonds which unite us must be stronger than the differences which might drive a wedge of misunderstanding and distrust between us. If we can find it in our hearts and minds to emphasize and appreciate the positive elements in life, we will not only enjoy life all the more, but we will also help our fraternity to grow and prosper.

During World War II there was a popular song which contained these words:

"You've got to accentuate the positive, Eliminate the negative, Latch on to the affirmative, And don't mess with Mr. In-Between!"

This is good advice to be followed at any and all times -particularly in our inter-personal relationships. In a world and society known for its negativism, we need a positive force which may help individuals become the best that they can be in every aspect of life. This positive force may well be our fraternity - particularly if we are able to restore the emphasis upon and appreciation of people to the place which they ought to occupy in the philosophy and activities of the fraternity.

The people whose passing we mourn today were Companions in the work of our Cryptic Rite. During the years of their activity, all of them contributed greatly to the activities and influence of their various Councils, and as they have been summoned from their labors to the realm of eternal rest and peace, they leave behind them a heritage of love and concern which may serve to inspire those who have come after them.

Were we to just stop and think about the many people whose contributions of life, love, and service have been of inestimable value in making this fraternity what it is and has been, we might just learn to appreciate the worth and value of the people who have lived, now live, and will live in this world. Thomas Paine, a great Philosopher of the Eighteenth Century, said: "Reputation is what men and women think of us; character is what God and angels know of us." The individuals whose influence we sense and feel are those who have given so much of themselves into the life of our fraternity and society. All of them have labored for God and man and their efforts and labors have made this world a better, brighter, and more beautiful place because they have lived in it and been a vital part of it!

Our Masonic forebears were men of character - strong character - who were zealous in their pursuit of goals which they deemed important. The goals which they considered so valuable were friendship, morality, and brotherly love. These men believed strongly and unequivocally in the Brotherhood of Man under the Fatherhood of God, and because they so believed, the rights of humanity have been preserved in such documents as the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution, and the Bill of Rights.

These individuals possessed in their own lives those qualities which mark greatness. They were not content with themselves, their lives, or their service and labored constantly and conscientiously for the betterment of society, government, family, and fraternity. They were everwilling to travel the extra mile in service to others, and because they were thus willing - their society benefited greatly. Their restlessness helped to bring about great achievements and foster great ventures. Their love for humanity bore fruit in the many benevolent institutions which they sponsored and supported. The call of a brother in need was always answered and assistance given insofar as was possible, depending upon the length of the cabletow. And, somehow, the cabletow seemed to stretch as much as was necessary to alleviate the need.

As we gather together in this Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Cryptic Masons of the State of New York, we do not need to look for a magnificent cenotaph or plaque marking the accomplishments of our deceased Companions - all we need do is to look around us - for our Grand Council has grown and prospered and shed its beneficent influence abroad in the world of Freemasonry because of the dedication and zeal of many Companions who are no longer among us physically, but who are ever with us in spirit and whose works serve as a monument to their zeal for the Craft.

During the Cryptic Year of 1992-1993, 103 of our Companions were summoned from labor in the quarries and admitted into the presence of the Supreme Architect. In this number there were some who bore the rank and title of Illustrious; some who were called Very Illustrious; and also a number who carried the designation of Right Illustrious; together with one whose title was Most Illustrious. The greater majority of those who were thus summoned, however, were known as Companion - and this title is the one which we all should be extremely proud to bear.

Within that number there were also several who, at the time of their passing, were a part of the Official Family of this Grand Council serving in various capacities in either the Grand Council or their individual local Councils. These individuals were as follows:

To the Most Illustrious Grand Master and Companions of the Grand Council:

Companions, this is my first report as Grand Fraternal Correspondent. You will find that, while the format has not changed, the presentation will differ somewhat. This is only natural. Your Fraternal Correspondents will be as unalike as the proceedings we report. The duty of the Grand Fraternal Correspondent can be compared to that of a searcher on a beach, armed with a metal detector. Each stretch of the beach appears to be the same, as most proceedings seem to be the same; but at the same time, each is different. The material found will vary, on the beach discoveries will range from pennies to a Rolex watch, and in proceedings from the mundane to the memorable; but the item value is there, waiting to be found and shared. There is always some individual presentation, biography, or committee report which provides exceptional reading.

Our Cryptic Rite spans the full gamut-- from a less-than-formal gathering, to one filled with legalisms and Orders of Precedence. But each evinces a concern for our Order, and many have thought long and hard concerning ways in which Cryptic Masonry can be improved. While some of those methods may have only local application, others may be applied universally. The manner of presentation is different, as each region is different.

In this, our world of Cryptic Masonry, some topics have received a large amount of attention: Constitutional changes, and monies devoted to the upkeep of Grand Council paraphrenalia are two items which have appeared in many of the Proceedings; but other topics have also shared the limelight.

In membership, it can be seen that only Arizona and the Eastern Jurisdiction of Canada have positive net gains. Many of the other jurisdictions have now attempted to find new answers to the old problem of membership gain and retention. Those with large losses are now directing their attention to those NPD suspensions, to "stop members escaping out the back door," as one Past Grand Master worded it. In Arkansas, the problem and a possible solution were given, rather tersely, by Companion Thomas Mason, Chairman of the Membership Committee, who said, "so what we greeted and what we reinstated never even came close to what we killed and what we kicked out," but advised that many Councils have the solution backward; they should plan for degrees and get candidates— and not the other way around. It has worked for his Council in Arkansas.

Other ideas in membership have included a new direction toward approaching the over 50 group (Montana) and retaining the older members (North Dakota) who have worked so long to hold their Secret Vaults together. Some jurisdictions (such as Louisiana) have put together new pamphlets to attract Royal Arch Masons an bring them to more light in the Cryptic Rite.

Recognition is also a need that many have addressed in the Cryptic Rite. An Unsung Hero Award has been established in Maryland; not only for the Companions, but also the Ladies who, the Local Council feels, work behind the scenes for the benefit of the Cryptic Rite. In addition, recommendations were made for: a certificate of proficiency for those who learned and could perform the work (Oklahoma), and a special ceremony for Ish-Sodi holders (Arizona).

Our charitable nature has been addressed by such Grand Councils as Massachusetts, which made the General Grand Council Research Fund their main Charitable Activity. Standings in the fund are being emphasized especially in Utah and North Dakota. The Grand Council of Louisiana took a more visible route for their donations: noting that the George Washington National Masonic Memorial is not handicapped-accessible, they voted to spend monies to provide the necessary facilities to open this monument to all of the public.

Under York Rite Masonry, there are a substantial number of ideas, some of which are impressive. For example, although Grand Chapter had not agreed to combined York Rite Sessions in Ohio, the Most Illustrious Grand Master of that jurisdiction arranged to have a York Rite Unity Candlelight Service. Well attended, it showed what could be done. There have been both positive and negative remarks made concerning a total "York Rite Union," but for those, I refer the companions to the attached report.

This introduction can only be a "recap" of some of the highlights of the various jurisdictional proceedings. Read on for some feeling of the joy, humor, some sadness and a tremendous amount of activity reported throughout the Cryptic Rite!

Rt. Ill. Paul C. Edwards Grand Fraternal Correspondent ALABAMA: "Beam He Up, Scotty"
154th Annual Assembly: Feb. 23-25, 1992 (combined York Rite
Bodies), Birmingham, Alabama. Councils: 18, Membership: 4,952;
Net Chg: -155...Solidifying the support of the family in his
tenure, Most Illustrious Companion Richard Sim Hamilton was
invested with the Jewel and Apron of his office by his wife,
Dorothy. The Companions of Alabama will soon see the effects of
explorative thinking...Most 111. Companion Hamilton retired from
the Marshall Space Center as an Electronic Technician for the
Civil Service.

ARIZONA:

"Who Pays for Success?"

71st Annual Assembly: Oct. 24, 1992 (combined York Rite Bodies),
Yuma, Arizona. Councils: 13, Membership: 1734; Net Chg: +22
...Yes, the number above is a plus, the first net gain in eleven
years for this jurisdiction...However, the charter of Verde
Council No. 13 was suspended for a continuing failure to submit
annual returns...The Most Ill. Companion George Martin called two
special sessions of the Grand Council prior to the Annual
Assembly; the first on October 10, 1992, to constitute the
Sanctuary of Super-Excellent Masters as a separate constituent
element of the Cryptic Rite of Arizona. The second special
session, on October 21, 1992, to confer the Ish-Sodi Award upon
12 candidates...as PIGM Donald W. Monson had been primarily
responsible for the final draft of the ritual for the evening,
the MIGM requested that he take the East acting as Most
Illustrious Grand Master...The Grand Recorder, at the first event
(and as the first order of business), reminded all that his
office had certain priorities...such as what budget would pay the
bills!

ARKANSAS:

"Putting it in Perspective"
130th Annual Assembly: Mar. 12-14, 1992 (combined York Rite
Bodies), No. Little Rock, Arkansas. Councils: 20, Membership:
2451; net chg: -116... Comp. Thomas Mason, Chairman of the
Membership Committee, took the new membership data and reported
that: "...so what we greeted and what we reinstated never even
came close to what we ki//ed [my italics] and what we kicked out
[my italics]." He stated, however, that "somebody is doing
something right..." In Batesville, "They set a date [for
Degrees], then they went and got candidates. Let's try that
again. We set a date then go get candidates. If you want to
embarass yourself with no candidates, fine and dandy. If you
want to put on a good show, get some candidates, if you do it
that way you will have success." The statement speaks for
itself.

COLORADO:

"A New Start in Line"

97th Annual Assembly: Sept. 7, 1991 (combined York Rite Bodies),
Denver, Colorado. Councils: 22, Membership: 2029; Net chg:
-87...The Jurisprudence Committee recommended that a "Grand
Herald" be added to the Grand Line of Colorado. This was
proposed because there are 9 officers in the progressive lines of
Grand Chapter and Grand Commandery, but only 8 in Grand Council!
This action would balance out the progressive grand lines in the
York Rite Bodies. There are no duties described for this new
entry position for the Grand Line...

CONNECTICUT:

"A Truly Traveling Man"

174th Annual Assembly June 6, 1992, North Haven, Connecticut,
Councils: 20, Membership: 2133; Net chg: -82...In his term as
Most Puissant Grand Master, Comp. Thomas Maxwell II traveled to
all Councils, oversaw the merger of two, and basically (according
to his successor in office) "left a clean slate." Not unusual in
a companion who was in Peace Corps in the 1960s and backpacked
his way home via Asia, the Middle Bast, North Africa and Europe!
...The Grand Historian provided, by request of several Grand
Officers, a history of Connecticut's endeavors to join (or not
join) the General Grand Council. It took ten pages of the
Proceedings to trace the history of Connecticut and the General
Grand Council!...Companion Maxwell reported that, during his term
a new Officers Manual and Installation Service had been provided;
and that at the Annual Festival 35 new companions were greeted
(almost half the total of greetings in the State).

DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA: "Next Year, Haybe"
73rd Annual Assembly: Mar. 21, 1992, (combined York Rite Bodies),
Councils: 3, Membership: 360; Net chg: -41... The Most Ill.
Grand Master, C. Macauley Ward received both good news and bad.
The good news was that he received a Meritorious Service Award
from the International Supreme Council, Order of DeMolay, which
was personally presented by the Jurisdictional Master
Councilor...The bad news came from the Trustees, who reported
that no more Past Grand Master's jewels were in their
possession...The Grand Council is now busily preparing for its
seventy-fifth Anniversary in 1994.

CEORGIA: "Cast Your Bread Upon the Mater"
149th Annual Assembly: Apr. 20, 1992, Macon, Georgia, Councils:
68, Membership: 8,893; Net chg: -479...Two years ago, at the
Grand Convocation, our Most Ill. Comp. Charles Van Etten had his
room broken into and all money and credit cards stolen. This was
brought to the attention of Grand Council and Grand Chapter, who
took up a "love offering." This year, Most Ill. Comp. Van Etten
repaid their kindness with generous checks to the Council and
Chapter for their respective Charities...The outgoing Most Ill.
Grand Master, Comp. Thomas Gaines, used a catchy motto for his
term in office... "Gain with Gaines."

INDIANA:

"Poetry in Action"

137th Annual Assembly, Apr. 30, 1992, (combined York Rite Bodies), Indianapolis, Indiana, Councils: 61, Membership: 8,226; Net chg: -315... The Most Ill. Grand Master, Vonn G. Hoffman, "ended his address with a poem, as has been his custom during his entire year."....but the Companions of Indiana will still hear his recitations...the Incoming Grand Master appointed MI Companion Vonn Hoffman as the Assistant Grand Lecturer...MiGM Vonn Hoffman reported an outstanding Super-Excellent Masters Degree with six candidates...one of whom was the Most Wor. Grand Master of the Grand Lodge, and another the Deputy Grand Master...Most encouraging to the Grand Master was the "increase these past few years in the number of Table Councils being held, the good food, fellowship, and the inspiring messages that are presented is an added boost for our Rite."...

KANSAS: "The Sound of Masonry"
124th Annual Assembly, Apr. 4, 1992, (combined with Grand Chapter), Salina, Kansas, Councils: 27, Membership: 4,420; Net chg: -133...The outstanding major activity was the annual pilgrimage to Pike's Peak to check on the Cryptic Depository. The time capsule contained there will be opened in 1999. MIGM Dee D. Dutweiler will be able to broadcast the opening directly, as he has a radio-telephone license, and has been a studio announcer and transmitting engineer. He now owns his own electrical sound company. The new Most Ill. GM, Comp. David F. Snyder will be able to assist-- his degree is in electrical engineering!..."And now live, from high atop Pike's Peak...!"

KENTUCKY: "Death of a Mason"
165th Annual Assembly, Sept. 22, 1992, Louisville, Kentucky,
Councils: 44, Membership: 7,154; Net chg: -219...This
Jurisdiction went through the most difficult situation in
Masonry. The Most Ill. Grand Master, Comp. Hugh Smith and the
Assistant Grand Recorder were killed in a tragic car accident.
The new MIGM, Comp. Edward Toebbe, accordingly served as DGM
acting as MIGM. The death of the Most Ill. Grand Master meant
that some items (notably a planned amendment to increase the Per
Capita), could not be accomplished...The Chief Arch Deputy
(equivalent to our Grand Lecturer) reported that inspections has
improved in overall scores (81.77 as opposed to 81.33).

LOUISIANA:

"A Timely Gift"

137th Annual Assembly, Mar. 8-10, 1992, Westlake, Louisiana,
Councils: 34, Membership: 3,753; Net chg: -191..."Comp. Huston
Booth, Jr. has developed an excellent York Rite MembershipVisibility Program," it was reported. It will be interesting to
see at their next Grand Sessions how effective the program has
become... It seems that communications might be a bit difficult
as the Committee on Publications reported that, "since we have no
publications, we have no report."

[Louisiana, cont'd]...The Grand Council noted that the George Washington Masonic National Memorial is not handicapped-accessible. It moved that a one-time \$1.00 per capita assessment be forwarded to the Memorial to help in the construction of ramps, etc., to make it accessible to all; and that from January 1993 until December 1994, \$5.00 per candidate will be sent for the same purpose.

MAINE: "Cryptic Bichelin Guide"
138th Annual Assembly, May 1, 1992, So. Portland, Maine,
Councils: 17, Membership: 2,738; Net chg: -81...Rarely do
transactions of Grand Councils require that the Fraternal
Correspondent have a full meal before culling information. The
Grand Council of Maine's report carries not only inspection
results, but also a course-by-course description of these dinners
enjoyed before and after. For example, one Council, "... serves
the best steak supper around and also provides cake or pie before
we leave for home..." St. Croix Council won the 4-Star rating
with a repast of Atlantic Salmon and strawberry shortcake! How
Most Ill. Companion Charles Van Etten heard of the event and
managed to get Down East to participate will have to be left to
the imagination....Ayeh.

MARYLAND:

"Me Acknowledge You"

118th Annual Assembly, May 11, 1992, Hagerstown, Maryland,
Councils: 17, Membership: 2,954; Net chg: -180...the Grand
Council has begun an Unsung Hero Award, "... which is given at
the Grand Visitation to a Companion or Lady who, in the eyes of
the local Council, had worked behind the scenes and made a quiet
contribution to that Council." The names are listed in the
Proceedings and give added publicity to those who would otherwise
not receive acknowledgment of their efforts...

MASSACHUSETTS:

"A Few Good Men"

164th Annual Assembly, Dec. 10, 1990, Milford, Massachusetts,
Councils: 31, Membership: 5,009; Net chg: -185...This Grand
Council had never, with the exception of DeMolay Scholarships,
had a continuing charitable activity. This year the situation
was corrected with the adoption of the Cryptic Masons Medical
Research Foundation as their charity. The agreed upon assessment
was \$1.00 per member...The Grand Lecturer's Report stated that
rather than have local Councils provide members to do the work at

122nd Annual Assembly, Apr. 23-25, 1992, Rochester, Minnesota,
Councils: 11, Membership: 1,515, Net chg: -38...At the beginning
of the Installation Ceremony, the Grand Council of Minnesota
received a Sword and Trowel from Southgate Council Council No.
15, and will no longer have to borrow the necessary equipment to
hold an Installation in "due and ancient form."

MISSISSIPPI: "Closing the Exits"
137th Annual Assembly, May 8, 1992 (combined with Grand Chapter),
Jackson, Mississippi, Councils: 40, Membership: 7,539; Net chg:
-301...The Grand Lecturer, Most III. Companion T. Olin Gore,
proposed that each Council have a Suspension Committee to,
"...stop members escaping out the back door." Most III. Grand
Master Jimmie L. Windham recommended that Grand Commandery be
approached to join their Sessions with Grand Council and Grand
Chapter, so that the Convocations will be truly "York Rite" in
nature.

MISSOURI:

"Ritually, More than One Hat"

127th Annual Assembly, May 1, 1992 (combined York Rite Bodies),
Hannibal, Missouri, Councils: 33, Membership: 8,361; Net chg:

-304...In an unusual move, the Most Ill. Grand Master recommended
that provision be made for the employment of a Grand Lecturer.
This move is to be made in cooperation with Grand Chapter and
Grand Commandery, as, under this proposal, the Grand Lecturer
would serve all three Grand Bodies!...In order to keep and gain
members who might otherwise be lost, the Grand Council moved that
Dual and Plural membership be permitted in the Jurisdiction...the
losses reported above are, in fact, decreased from the previous
year by 33%1...One section of the MIGM's Annual Report came under
the title "Decisions" and the Most Ill. Grand Master reported
that..."At this time it is my pleasure to report that no request
for any decisions have been received, and that I know of no
compelling matters requiring decision. Apparently, then, peace
and harmony prevail...and this is good."[... and California has
the reputation of being the "laid back" state!]

MONTANA:

This is a group, he states, which we should be more active in attracting to the Craft...The MIGM had a difficult year...he broke an ankle and missed most of his scheduled activities for the winter, and during the Grand Council Session, the tape recorder broke down. Nevertheless, the session was adequately minuted [someone had been asked to take notes].

NEVADA:

"Gaining Patio Space Plus"
67th Annual Assembly, June 9, 1992, Carson City, Nevada,
Councils: 8, Membership: 931; Net chg: -67...The Grand Recorder's
Office has moved to the Masonic Building in Reno. The Grand
Recorder reported that, "the reason for opening an office outside
my house was that the Grand Bodies had overrun my house. I
gained one spare bedroom, a portion of our master bedroom, all of
my garage and two patios..." [All companions can see the desire
to regain space at home-- but one question automatically comes to
mind-- What Grand Council equipment was stored on the patios?].
The Most Ill. Grand Master recommended that meetings be held in
the smaller cities near the chartered Secret Vault location.
While this would require a dispensation, it would allow
Companions to shine as they hosted Council meetings in their own
Temples.

State until 1957...It's good to note that in the Cryptic Rite
Brooklyn will have another reason for pride.

NORTH DAKOTA: "To Remain Distinguished...and Active"
75th Annual Assembly, April 19, 1991, Grand Forks, North Dakota,
Councils: 9, Membership: 619; Net chg: -9...The Pride showed
through in the report of the Chairman of the Cryptic Masons
Medical Research Foundation. The Companions almost doubled
donations and the goal is now to overtake Maine for the No. 5
spot...While there has been a movement for the merger of some of
the smaller Councils, the Most Ill. Grand Master responded that
this would adversely affect those older sideliners who had
supported their home Councils for 25 to 50 years.

OREGON: "Everything is Relative..."
106th Annual Assembly, Apr. 10, 1992, Eugene, Oregon, Councils: 21, Membership 2,104; Net chg: -110...Noting the negative number in net membership, Comp. Steve R. Mead, the Grand Lecturer, pointed out that if the figures were compared with those of 1931, the Cryptic Rite of Oregon would show a decline of only 56 and an increase of five councils!

PENNSYLVANIA:

Councils: 48, Membership: 8,141, Net chg: -291...The incoming

of the current Recorders, who at last diligently caught up with
reporting all deaths and suspensions to date. The indications
are that he would have preferred to have the "housekeeping" done
on someone else's watch.

Mar. 20, 1992, Edinburgh, Scotland (The Cryptic Rite Degrees are under the authority of the Supreme Grand Chapter, Royal Arch Masons, which meets in quarterly communications in Edinburgh)...

The Grand Chapter would celebrate its 175th Anniversary at Crieff in August...The Grand Superintendent of Bendel State in Nigeria reported a "very trying" time in his District. The Immediate Past Grand Superintendent died, and then the Chartered Grand Superintendent. (Demits & Suspensions=72) We requested that each of the Councils provide copies of their current By-Laws for committee perusal to ensure that all conform with the Constitution and General Regulations of the Grand Council.

We received all or parts of By-Laws from 23 of the then 47 Councils and have reviewed them sufficiently to determine that their is a definite lack of uniformity in the order or content. Most Council By-laws generally conform in logic, --but accuracy of content would be easier to determine if they conformed to a certain specified order of subjects. A "sample or outline By-Laws" could be developed.

We suggest that the Grand Master and his successor, should as a priority, either appoint a special committee or request the Jurisprudence Committee to solve this situation as soon as possible. The former Committee should have "paperwork" available to use as a starting point.

We have reviewed the Dispensations issued by the Grand Master and concur that they conform within the bounds of his jurisdiction.

We note that Owego #30 and Cayuga #90 are continuing to meet at "temporary locations" for up to about 12 months duration, under Dispensation.

Jurisprudence provided consultation to several Councils on matters concerning the Constitution and General Regulations and provided forms necessary for the well-being of Grand Council.

We do not believe that we have left any items unsolved which have been referred to the Committee.

- TO PROMOTE AND ADVANCE THE INTERESTS OF THE CRYPTIC RITE AND TO ENCOURAGE CLOSER FELLOWSHIP THROUGHOUT THE JURISDICTION.
- TO REPRESENT THE GRAND MASTER IN SUCH MATTERS AS MAY BE COMMITTED TO HIM.
- TO INSPECT THE RECORDS OF THE RECORDER, TREASURER AND TRUSTEES OF THE COUNCILS IN HIS DISTRICT AND MAKE A REPORT TO THE GRAND MASTER AS TO THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH RECORDS AND FUNDS ARE KEPT AND SAFEGUARDED.
- 6. TO INSPECT AND IMPART, UNDER THE DIRECTION OF THE GRAND LECTURER, THE RITUALISTIC WORK OF THE RITE, AND TO MAKE A REPORT TO THE GRAND LECTURER IMMEDIATELY FOLLOWING THE INSPECTION.
- TO ARRANGE FOR AND HOLD A CONVENTION IN HIS DISTRICT AT LEAST ONCE IN EACH YEAR FOR THE EXEMPLIFICATION OF THE WORK OF THE RITUAL AND PROMOTION OF THE INTERESTS OF THE RITE.
- 8. TO ARRANGE TO ASSIST THE GRAND OFFICER ASSIGNED TO HIS DISTRICT OR COUNCILS THEREIN, IN MAKING HIS OFFICIAL VISIT(5).

VISITS OF DESIGNATED GRAND OFFICERS TO DISTRICT

THE GRAND MASTER MAY DIRECT THE ELECTIVE OFFICERS OF THE GRAND COUNCIL AND PAST GRAND MASTERS TO MAKE OFFICIAL VISITS TO DISTRICTS AND TO INDIVIDUAL COUNCILS, FOR THE PURPOSE OF ENCOURAGING CLOSER FELLOWSHIP AND ADVANCING THE INTERESTS OF CRYPTIC MASONRY THROUGHOUT THE JURISDICTION.
