FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Fellow Ministers,

Lynda, Trinity, and I just got back from a trip to Brazil. While there, we helped the First Presbyterian Church of Petrolina celebrate its 26th anniversary. The church received us with typical Brazilian hospitality. We ate wonderful food, saw the sights, and got to tour a fruit orchard and a vineyard/winery. I always thought that grapes needed a winter freeze, but not these. Since the weather is always warm, and there is little rain, the vine growers use irrigation from the river to get two or three harvests per year. After a harvest, they simply stop the irrigation, and the vines "think" that winter has come. The leaves fall, and the plants go into hibernation, and they get pruned. After a few weeks, the vine growers turn the water back on, and "spring" begins for the vines. New growth happens. Flowers bloom, and fruit forms.

This process reminded me that God works in a similar way with us. Jesus tells us in John 15. "I am the true vine, and my Father is the vinedresser.... My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit...." God wants us to produce the fruit of the Spirit: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. God also wants us to bear fruit by bringing new souls into the Kingdom. Sometimes God moves us into times of discomfort by trimming off unnecessary parts of our lives, or, like the Petrolina vine growers, maybe God turns off our water. In these times of discomfort we can choose to complain, or we can focus on the fruit God wants us to produce. In order for us to become more loving or patient, God gives us opportunities to practice love and patience. In order to show his power and grace most effectively. Jesus shines through us when we are broken, weak, and dependent on him.

Where are you in the process of bearing fruit? Whether you are feeling well-nourished or dry, comfortable or struggling, just remember, if you are in Christ, you were made to bear fruit!

HELPING Pastors often give care to people who are going through illness, grief, or some other painful struggle. We do know, however, that pastors can't be everywhere all of the time. The twelve Deacons who serve First Presbyterian Church Richmond seek to serve others and, on many occasions, are able to come alongside a sister or brother in Christ in their time of need. We are reminded through the Holy Spirit that we are all ministers of God's grace and mercy to one another. Compassion and thoughtfulness happen in many ways throughout our church...every day and every week. Let's try to reach out even more in the days to come and follow Paul's instruction in Galatians 6:2, "Carry each other's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ."



Every Friday of the month six bags of food are distributed to needy families in the Richmond community. The following are some of the items that make up a bag of groceries for the needy: canned fruit,

breakfast cereal, peanut butter, jelly, spaghetti, pasta sauce, canned soup and cups of soup, tuna, packages of pasta or macaroni and cheese, canned meat, rice, and beans. We do accept perishable items but ask they be delivered to the church either on Thursday before 1:00 PM or Friday before 10:00 AM. Items can be brought to the church office during office hours. Tom Welton is our Deacon in charge of the pantry. He does all the preparation of the bags each week and distributes them on Friday morning. If you have any questions regarding this loving ministry ask a Deacon.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT:

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL-things you didn't know and how you can help

Did you know that VBS is older than anyone in our church? Chances are that many of us attended VBS when we were young.

The origins of Vacation Bible School can be traced back to Hopedale, Illinois in 1894. A Sunday School teacher felt she was limited by time constraints in teaching the Bible to children, so, she started a daily Bible school to teach children during the summer. The first Bible school enrolled forty students and lasted four weeks. In 1898, the director of the children's department at Epiphany Baptist Church in New York started an "Everyday Bible School" for slum children at a rented beer parlor in New York's East Side. Subsequently, a handful of summer schools were established through the Baptist Mission Society, which were taught by students from the Union Theological Seminary. During one summer, one thousand students were enrolled in five different schools. In 1922, the World Association of Daily Vacation Bible Schools was founded. One year later, Standard Publishing produced the very first printed VBS curriculum - a five-week course for three age levels.

Today, many churches run their own Vacation Bible School programs using themed curriculum programs from their denominations or from independent publishing houses which provide easy preparation. Modern programs usually consist of a week-long program of religious education including Bible stories, religious songs, arts and crafts, skits, or puppet shows which cater toward elementary school-aged children.

Each year First Pres has about 100 church and neighborhood children enroll for our VBS. This is a wonderful gift to our community but it takes a lot of people to make it happen. All the children are divided into "crews" with crew leaders and helpers so leaders and helpers are needed. This year's theme is "WEIRD ANIMALS, where Jesus' love is one-of-a-kind" and includes games, snacks, crafts, stories, and really super music! Sanford Hall will be totally transformed for the theme, and a creative crew has already started making the decorations. More help is needed during the July 28-August 1 VBS week to assist the kids with making the daily crafts, setting up and supervising games and activities

for the different age groups, donating and setting up the daily snacks, registration, directing traffic in the parking lot, greeting parents, and more. Introduce children you know to VBS. Come have fun and help our children grow in the Lord.

Property discussion:

- Storage issue update: continued for further study; possibility of obtaining an additional steel shipping container discussed.
- Church grounds clean up postponed to August
- Capital improvements Miracle Sunday fund drive estimated amount received almost \$41,000 as of April 20.
 - Furnace replacement completed May 19 for \$17,230
 - Second priority carpet for Sunday school rooms and Verkuyl
 - Next priority painting projects
 - Next priority renovation of Verkuyl considering PLM needs
- Changing locks will cost \$45 per door so suggestion is to set up key log and hold off on change action
- Bike racks continued to June meeting
