KURT OTTENHEIMER WINS HALLOCK CARD AWARD

Helen Ratzer, Chairman of the Hallock Card Award Committee, announced the selection of Kurt Ottenheimer as the 1990 Hallock Card Award. The award is given to recognize the most significant contribution in a single year or a continuing outstanding performance to the club. Kurt was selected on the basis of his outstanding handling of the Perfins Publicity Project. This is the project that has increased the Clubs membership by more than twelve percent since its inception.

Despite the disadvantage of being born in New York City in 1931, Kurt was awarded Bachelor and Master of Science Degrees in Education from the City College of New York and with the exception of his dissertation completed the requirements for a Doctorate in Education from Nova University, Virginia. He had a wide spectrum of teaching and administrative positions in education. These range from Industrial Arts teacher, high school assistant principal, and dean of students. This experience ranged from secondary schools on Long Island to New York University, where he was an Assistant Professor.

Kurt retired in 1987 to pursue his many interests which include:

Stamps - especially perfins, Spanish Civil War, Brazil, China, Japan, First Day Covers, and historic post cards of Long Beach.

Travel abroad and Elderhostel programs in the U.S.

Crafts - Stained glass, leatherwork, woodworking and furniture refinishing.

Helping People as An Arbitrator for the Better Business Bureau and as a tax assistant for the elderly and needy.

Kurt was married on June 8, 1952 and he and his bride of 38 years come next June have three daughters and one son. Kurt has achieved his goal of becoming a "Renaissance Man" in the eyes of his wife, Adele, and family.

CLUB NEWS - Outgoing auction chairman Ed Linn reports the following results for the mini-auction of four lots which were held out of Auction #43. Lot #1 - \$25.85, Lot #2 - \$14.30, Lot #3 - \$9.45, Lot #4 - \$7.70. According to Ed:

It is interesting to note that one lot received two identical bids and went to the first bid received. One lot was not 10% over the next high bid, but it was successful since it was received first. However in two cases, the high bid did not win the lot because it was less than 10% over a previously received bid. The moral, bid early.

Just a reminder, Ed will run Auction #44 which is in this issue. Auction #45 will be handled by Hal Krueger.

Noted in a sales list from James McKenzie, P.O.Box 964, Station B, Willowdale, Ontario, M2K 2T6, Canada: 101 perfins from all reigns QV to ERII including 2 Wilding mint blocks of 4. \$31.00. Since the price is quoted is in Canadian dollars, we may deduct 11% leaving \$27.59. This would result in a price of 27.3¢ a stamp which is a bit high for an lot which is not fully described. However consider the lot contains Victorian issues, which certainly are higher in value than the average perfin. In addition the two mint Wilding blocks also should be consider as of above average value. The list contains 441 offerings ranging from large lots to single stamps of Great Britain. A number of difficult items were listed - Penny red, letters in all four corners, plate 225; a 1½ d OP-PC error and the 2½ d mauve LH-FL error.

John Moller (#2564) has reported that Peter Engelbrecht (#1741), Brenderup Fyn, Denmark passed away suddenly on November 2, 1990. This is a great loss for perfin collectors especially in Denmark. Peter was one of the great pioneers who developed the first half of "The handbook of Danish Perfins", a catalog of Danish perfins.

In addition, John reported that the Danish Perfin Society (DPS) published a new perfin catalog in August 1990. The catalog is entitled Katalog over Danske Firmaperfoeringer. The catalog is printed on

European standard A5 (21x51 cm) in a four ring loose leaf system. This arrangement will permit annual revisions at a lower cost than a bound catalog. The catalog illustrates more than 1,000 perfins in photocontact print. Users, where known; period of usage if the user had a permit, up until 1917; the number of holes; perfin size and if known the position and type of stamps perforated. The catalog contains a price list and according to John this has caused a lot of discussion. The catalog was exhibited at the national exhibition, NIESTVED 90, where it received a Silver Medal.

At present, the society is working on a translation of the Forwards and Instructions in English and German. John has been requested to let us know when these become available as well as ordering information.

Nathan C. Buckwalter (#2865) was kind enough to provide a clipping from The Philadelphia Inquirer, Sunday October 21, 1990. The article, entitled "Collectors' specialty that is full of holes", was written By Dominic Sama, Inquirer Stamps writer. This is another example of the outstanding work by our publicity chairman, Kurt Ottenheimer. John "Bob" Fowler (#2937) dropped us a note about how he put together his award winning exhibit:

Putting the perfins exhibit together was quite a project. Being a new member of the Perfins Club and not having many perfins, or any way to identify them at the time, it was one page at a time and then downstairs to the wife for her approval. With the little writeup that I got out of the book by Richard McP. Cabeen, Standard Handbook of Stamp Collecting, I went to two pages of railroad perfins. The next page consisted of banks and education.

I had several copies of pattern W6, that varied in position from centered on the top to centered on the bottom. Five of those went on one page with the comment "perfin collectors go for centering."

The next two pages were an assortment of perfins that I was able to identify -- at the time I did not have a copy of The Catalog of U.S. Perfins. The next page told how a stamp was fed through a perforator and showed good and bad examples. This brought me up to page nine and I was running out of material. I used an eight stamp exhibit on the PRR that was sent to me when I joined. It was prepared by John Suffka (LM56). With that and a little blurb about the Perfins Club and how to join, my nine page exhibit was completed.

This is a unabashed plug! I have been trying to obtain an advertising cover - perfinned or not -- from the Baltimore Bargain House for an exhibit that I am working on. The quest, of several years, had been unsuccessful until I dropped a note to our Cover Sales Chairman, Albert Spencer. The lot of Maryland perfin covers that he sent on approval contained not one Baltimore Bargain House cover. There were FIVE DIFFERENT ADVERTISING COVERS from this emporium. 



Austin Baldwin & Co. Inc. were shipping and forwarding merchants as their corner card indicates. This time it was for the Eyetinge Co. who was the user of pattern C316. "Eyetinge" has an interesting ring to it, wonder what they did?

Any cover used by forwarding agents may have a stamp of the firm that they were working for at that time.

JA TIMES TWO

You are looking at an unusual pattern. Before you jump to any conclusion about it being a different pattern, I should mention that it is a double punch of pattern J2 from Milwaukee. Evidently, it was made by an employee wiling away some time.

However, in this case we are fortunate, because this perfin can tell us something about this particular device. One pattern has a missing hole. This then definitely indicates a multi-head perforator. The stamp is a 10¢ perforated 11, which preceded the perforation 10. Only eight copies were reported during the last "C" rate survey. The small quantity may be due to use of the perfin only on packages or registered mail rather than all of the company's mail.

EXPERIMENTAL CANCELS AND PERFINS

I have had an interesting correspondence with a stamp dealer that concerned some banknote issue stamps with perfins. My first thoughts were that the perfin was some type of revenue punch cancel. However, the examples had an "experimental cancel." Now my knowledge of cancels is almost nonexistent, except for Circular Date Stamps (CDS). Are these "5"s similar to the ones in TPB, October 1989, p. 177?

Pictured below are some examples. If any of our readers can provide any information, please let me hear from you. The "5" that appears in the stamps is a perfin; however, it could be a security punch. The description accompanying the illustrations was provided by the dealer.


A61 USER IDENTIFIED



Members will want to correct the spelling from "Linderwood" to "LIDGERWOOD" on page 249 of the <u>CATALOG of UNITED STATES PERFINS</u> the confirmation is illustrated above.

This corner card refers to the "NYC" branch office listed in the supplementary data of the catalog. The firm was a very large postage user. Note the print order of 30,000 on September 14 listed in the upper left corner (i.e., 30 M 9-14). This cover has a glassine front, so it may be assumed that they mailed plenty of billings, possibly for wholesale or retail firms.

The addressee, "The Norton Company" is interesting for a multitude of reasons. First, it is obvious that it was a large recipient of mail from the simple address listing only the city. Second, a large amount of this company's incoming mail has survived and is readily available on the philatelic market. Despite a rather diligent search by John Lyding, we have been unable to locate an example of The Norton Company's outgoing mail.

NOTES FROM THE EDITOR'S DESK

Crofton Maryland, January 15, 1991

It is difficult to type 1991 rather than 1990. I find it somewhat easier to do this for the first issue of the year. In December, it is easy to remember that the January issue is dated next year, but by the middle of January, when 1991 should be automatic, I wind up dating things 1990 rather frequently. 

Fresh from Great Britain

I was pleasantly surprised to receive the strip illustrated to the left from W.J. Hanson of Chester, Cheshire, Great Britain, in response to my request for potential single die produced perfins.

This SMS pattern looks like a sure winner. Each punch is in a different position and two stamps show a portion of an adjoining punch. In order to be a single die, each pattern must show two different spacings between adjoining ones. On this strip, only two have these measurable possibilities.

Lay a piece a white paper across and under the top hole of the letter S showing at the edge of perforations horizontally to the second from the bottom hole of the letter M. Mark the position of both holes on the paper. Then move the paper to the corresponding position on the second stamp (i.e., the one with a complete letter S on the right side.) You may be surprised to find that the spacing is the same as on the top stamp.

Regardless of the unusual spacing for each row, the distance between the two dies is the same. If we have done our measurements correctly, this is a multi-head die. Why the operator did not punch the stamps in the vertical format as was intended by the manufacturer or why he shifted position after each punch, is speculation.


Ford Motor Company - F145

Pattern G155 was deleted in Additions and Corrections Number Three (A&C #3 - 11/86) as a partial die variety of pattern G155B.

The patterns illustrated in the article are both pattern G155F. The one without the control hole is a partial G155F. Pattern G155 does not match up well on G155B or G155B.5, but it could still be a die variety partial of either or both.

If a reader has an attached pair or strip, I would appreciate your submitting the item so that I can make a contact print for the Club's proof files.


If no evidence is forthcoming, G155 will be reconsidered for reinstatement as a separate pattern.

GERMAN AFRICAN COLONIAL PERFINS

Only one perfin has been reported from German Offices in Morocco.

Recently, - the 1980's - German perfins with fraudulent colonial overprints are being reported. Though the stamps of only two colonies are listed, the collector is cautioned to be skeptical of possible additional findings. The perfins from German Southwest Africa and Togo receive "F" classifications because of fraudulent overprints.

Seaport administration fees were paid with private revenue stamps. One perfin type has been found on both the Afrika Linien and the Deutsche Ostafrika Linie (Woermann Line) stamps issued from 1903-1922. Though at present it is unknown if these revenue perfins saw use in Africa, they are related items and are included here for the record. There is a possibility that some of the Hamburg American Packet Company (HAPAG) fiscals might have seen use on some African runs. (See Additions and Corrections #6, Sep. '87 for Latin American section of W.P.C.) Obverse and reverse of shipping line stamps are illustrated.



ITALIAN AFRICAN COLONIAL PERFINS


The only known perfin type from the Italian colony of Eritrea has been reported on both postal and special delivery issues. Slight differences in the perfins suggest the possibility of a multi-head machine or two machines. Members are encouraged to report cancellations found on stamps with this perfin.

SPANISH AFRICAN COLONIAL PERFINS

Situated 60 miles off the northwest coast of Africa and owned by Spain since the late 15th century, the Canary Islands provided important coaling station ports for the transatlantic and West African shipping. Similar to those found on Niger Territories stamps (See W.P.C.), the perfin of the Union Castle Mail Steamship Company has been reported on a British stamp, Scott #114, with a Sta. Cruz de Tenerife cancellation.

The only reported perfins on stamps of Spanish Morocco, are those used by the Banque d'Etat du Maroc from various cities. No perfins have been reported on stamps of Spanish Offices in Morocco (1903-1914), nor on those of independent Morocco (1956-present).

Here are two covers submitted by member Paul Gault (#744). Perfin pattern M90 was used in both of these instances by the New York Central Lines. Do any of you railroad buffs have an explanation for the use of perfin pattern M90 by the New York Central Lines? If you do, perhaps you would like to tell the rest of the members. Looking Back

Throughout this century, man has come up with various ideas that would make life easier. The automobile was one, stamp perforators supposedly also were one of these ideas.

The automobile ranks up there with man's great inventions. With our present transportation needs, we could not do without a car. However, its inglorious beginning bore little resemblance to the type of vehicles we drive today. Its humble beginning was merely the old horse carriage with a motor that moved it along at no more than 15 miles per hour.

After learning that a motor car was better than keeping a horse and buggy, the number of firms making automobiles grew and grew. Each one tried to make their car better than the other manufactures. It took several years to get rid of the open cars and enclose it with glass windows. Motors ranged from one to sixteen cylinders. Tires had tubes and you could expect a flat tire or two on any trip and had to carry your air pump and patches.

Here are a few brand names: Abbott, Chalmer, Chandler, Elcar, Hudson, Moon, Overland, DeSota, Overland, Scripps-Booth and Velie. The Stanley Steamer was in a different class.

While going to High School, I had earned enough from selling newspapers, etc. to buy an old used Ford for \$300. I learned to drive and maintain it.

The gas feed was a lever on the steering wheel. I built a foot feed instead. Reverse and brake were two of three pedals that gripped rotating bands. When the asbestos brake pad wore out, one pushed the reverse pedal to stop. The gas tank was under the seat and had a gravity flow. A full tank was needed to climb certain hills. Like all new inventions, gradual changes evolved into the cars we drive today.

Since perforators were supposed to be the business man's friend, what are our reader's opinions of this new device that was heralded as preventing the theft of stamps? Was it a theft deterrent, or was it a another gadget?

In general, the Post Office Department made little or no attempt to verify if other than the designated firm was using the perforated stamps. Little changed in the firm's offices except that an office boy or junior clerk was given extra work using the device and to sweep up the tiny confetti (frips).


I have seen many pieces of mail of an apparent personal nature that carried a firms pattern. To my knowledge, no records or information exists as to how much thief was avoided and if the cost of the device and of the clerk's time was ever recovered the cost of the perforator. A great idea but, did it accomplish its objective?

G. Wills & Co. GW/F & GW/P

In <u>Black Swan</u>, September 1987, p. 132, Brian Pope reported that he had located a reference in the Departmental Register AA:PP 23 to the effect that G. Wills and Co. had written to the DPMG in Perth requesting permission to use GW/F as their perforator.

In the March 1988 issue of the same journal, Ivor Stockwell, extended the data about this perforator and reported that August 1904 at Fremantle is the earliest known usage and that the latest usage was accomplished by adding a pin to the letter "F" to convert it to a letter "P." This later usage, according to Stockwell extended until 20 February 1936.

In September 1988, Perfins Club member, Dr. Derek Pocock (#425), completed the story. His article is reprinted below:

MORE ON THE GW/F PERFORATOR



I enjoyed Ivor Stockwell's article in <u>Black Swan</u> March 1988, dealing with this perfin of George Wills & Co although it reminded me of my own delay in getting down to studying perfin material. Believing that if you don't do it now, you never will, I looked up my GW/F and GW/P material and found that the story can be extended as can some of the dates. I believe we can extend Ivor's two types to at least three with several variations which can almost be dated during the life of the perforator.

Firstly, the GW/F itself has a full stop after both the G and W. (Fig 1). I can extend the Fremantle period from 27 July 1904 through to April 1907. I have a Perth date (MRR Perth) of February 1907 but this is probably a 'rogue' posting.

It is after the arrival of the perforator in Perth that it starts to go wrong. Sometime around 1914-15 the bottom pin of the F breaks off, followed by two pins on the side of the G. Next the right side of e W becomes weak and finally the full stop after the W breaks off.

(Fig 2). This takes the machine to about 1918 when it was repaired and modified to GW/P apparently by removing one pin from the bar of the F and adding a new one to make a P. (Fig 3).

This first GW/P appears to have lasted until 1921-22 but the tops of the W and the P became damaged. (Fig 4). About 1922 the machine was renovated and the original F bar restored, making a flat top P. (Fig 5). My only copy of this is on a 2d rose scarlet of 1922.

In the next 3 or 4 years this pattern shows gradual deterioration. First the full stop of the W breaks off followed by lower pins in the G and the W and later still at the top of the W. (Fig 6).

In 1926 the machine was again mended but with a crooked right side to the W and no full stop after it. (Fig 7). This pattern appears to continue until the machine was withdrawn from use in 1936 although my last example is 1934.

So, a fascinating little story. Many of the dates are assumed from the issue dates of the stamps themselves because the perfins are commonly found with a machine cancellation showing no dated portion. Finally, as I traced the stages, I reflected on the minutiae of our hobby such as the study of progressive plate flaws on stamps. Now, in similar fashion, we can trace the deterioration and repairs to a small perforating machine. Are we fast reaching a stage of knowing everything about nothing? And if so, does it matter so long as we enjoy ourselves?





All Five Varieties Used On First Day Cover, Long Beach, Calif.







This second envelope posted on January 20, 1956 from the same Spruce Street Address bears the same Keen Kutter logo in the corner card. However, a new name, Shapleigh Hardware Company is in use. In addition a new logo (DE in diamond) has been added to the corner card. The rear of this second cover (illustrated on the back cover) provides some additional details and we can note that E.C. Simmons name has been replaced in the Keen Kutter logo by Shapleigh.

The second envelope was mailed with a 6¢ T. Roosevelt stamp with perfin pattern D36. If we look that pattern up in <u>The Catalog of United States Perfins</u> the user is listed as Norvell-Shapleigh Hardware Company of Saint Louis. Simmons Hardware Company is listed in supplementary data as an additional user.





American Appraisal Company

I discovered the item shown to the left in either one of two accumulations. These are a batch of precancels my dad purchased from an unknown source sometime prior to 1972 or it was one of a bunch of "seconds" found when I helped clean out a flooded basement following the Kingston, PA flood in 1972.



All stamp collectors are in truth accumulators and consequently this item lay fallow among other things until I started to look at my perfins as a result of Bob Murrin's (LM2) offer to purchase U.S. perfins that he needed. I mailed Bob a few of my duplicates and he suggested that I might consider joining the Club, which I did.

Along with my membership application, I sent in a request for information about the illustrated "AMERICA" punch. I was delighted to receive detailed information about my copy, which does not quite match the entry in <u>The Catalog of United States Perfins</u>, the letter "E" missing a pin and the letter "R" being slightly different. The illustrated copies are on a pair of Scott Catalog number 635, precanceled "MILWAUKEE" (PSS T&T 236).

I decided to provide this article for the <u>Bulletin</u> for several reasons. The catalog article is dated; not all members have a catalog; and finally, Secretary Ralph Smith provided some additional details about this perfin.


The various perforations above have been found on postage stamps. All have been percancelled except for numbers 1 and 3. The following examples shown were submitted by various members.

According to the catalog these perforations have been found on postage stamps. All have been precanceled except for numbers 1 and 2. The catalog fails to note that these were precanceled "MILWAUKEE".

Among the data provided by Secretary Smith were the following illustrations showing the complete words "AMERICAN" and "APPRAISAL" as illustrated below.



These perforations were used by the American Appraisal Company, Milwaukee, Wisconsin on mailings in 1933. The assistant secretary of this company provided the information that the wrong die was inserted in the perforator, this die not having been designed to perforate postage stamps. While many segments of this pattern exist, few complete copies are known to exist and most having missing holes.



The <u>Catalog of United States Perfins</u> perfin pattern A18 (shown to the left) is attributed to the American Appraisal Company of Milwaukee, WI. The catalog entry also indicates that this is a positive identification. Based upon these data can we assume that the American Appraisal Company device was equipped with replaceable dies, one set for postage stamps and the other which was used to certify or authenticate appraisals made in the course of business.

Perfin Patterns on the 2c Shield

Joseph Laura, Jr. (#1238), P.O.Box 249, West Wareham, MA 02576

Perfin patterns on this stamp, Scott Catalogue number 319, have previously been listed under the "02" series. I am listing them as they should be, as a separate issue. This will make a change in the listing of previous tally sheets for the 1902 issues. The 2¢ denomination, Scott Catalogue number 301, which is the only 2¢ value in the series is perhaps one of the rarest U.S. stamps found perfinned. This is despite the fact that the stamp by itself is of insignificant value as a used stamp. Perfins known on this issue (Scott Catalogue number 301) will be listed on a following tally of the 1902 issue.

The 2¢ shield is a challenging specialty collection, there are four color varieties and two die varieties. In this tally, I have listed only the ones that are in my personal collection. Readers are asked to submit their listings of perfin patterns which are not listed. These contributions will be added to a revised tally list.

I will gladly buy or trade for any patterns not on this list.

Perfin Prices at Bourses

Alan Sandy (#2539), P.O. Box 2159, Petaluma, CA 94953

At bourses, Great Britain perfin collectors are asked to pay too much for perfins. Having learned that some collectors do want perfins, many dealers figure that they can get premium prices for them. Even dealers with modest pricing goals want 40 percent of 1990 Scott (which would be on average about 30 percent of 1988 Scott). These dealers do not understand that perfins collectors are interested in the pattern rather than the stamp. Most mount their perfins face-down and pay little attention to which stamp they are mounting. It is frustrating to a perfin collector to see perfins that he or she may want and to be unable to buy them at a fair price. So maybe the question is whether we perfin collectors should develop a pricing policy of our own.

At the first meeting of our new Northern California chapter of the Perfins Club, we discussed the problem of values and agreed that ten percent of catalog is about the right price for higher catalog items. This figure has to be adjusted for the catalog used, but the point is that it sends a message: perfins are sought by only a small number of collectors and we do not intend to pay as much as the typical bourse buyer will pay for un-perfinned stamps.

I have found that I need to set myself a rule before I shop for perfins. I do not buy anything later than Edward VII, since most later stamps have little or no market value and since I hope to find them in large lots at a penny or so each. I tell myself (and sometimes the dealer) that, where the catalogue is above \$2.00, I will pay 10 percent of catalog for Victorian and Edwardian perfins THAT I WANT. When the catalog value is less than \$2.00, I will pay a reasonable percentage and full catalog for any Victorian stamp that I want cataloging 20¢ or less. Obviously, this rule is more symbolic than actual. A perfect CDS on a bright and fresh Jubilee with a complete sharp perfin will make me bend my rule.

One reason for this tight-fisted approach is the method I find myself forced to used when locating perfins. Sure, I recall some of the patterns in my collection; but usually when I see a perfin for sale, I just do not know whether I have it or not. My collection sits on my shelf in 13 three-ring binders -- the <u>Tilles</u> pages with facing blank and also some home-made leaves for covers and spacing varieties etc. I have not quite gotten around to making a list of what I have because one needs the illustrations to discriminate among the many similar patterns.

Anyway, the upshot is that I have to buy perfins I may already have, so I just have to pay a price I could mostly redeem through trading.

Some specialized collectors save by "pattern and face". This sort of accumulating can hardly go on if high prices are paid. The essence of perfin collecting is that one gets a large number of stamps and thus a lot of fun for little money. Another type of collecting is the "synoptic" collection: one tries to get a perfinned copy of every stamp from a country. I have the impression that there are relatively few such collectors, but for them I can

understand that the stamp is more important than the pattern, so they might be willing to pay more.

My scheme is directed primarily at bourse dealers. When we buy perfins in the club auction or from Perfin Club circuits, we have the chance to check our collections against the patterns. Then indeed, the market value of perfins at all levels goes up some from my rule. And of course, there are special markets for various types such as monograms, officials, line-engraved, etc. Perhaps other Great Britain perfin collectors can write up the problems of valuation in these specialized areas.



W111 - State of Wisconsin

ITALIAN AFRICAN COLONIAL PERFINS

The only known perfin type from the Italian colony of Eritrea has been reported on both postal and special delivery issues. Slight differences in the perfins suggest the possibility of a multi-head machine or two machines. Members are encouraged to report cancellations found on stamps with this perfin.

SPANISH AFRICAN COLONIAL PERFINS

Situated 60 miles off the northwest coast of Africa and owned by Spain since the late 15th century, the Canary Islands provided important coaling station ports for the transatlantic and West African shipping. Similar to those found on Niger Territories stamps (See W.P.C.), the perfin of the Union Castle Mail Steamship Company has been reported on a British stamp, Scott #114, with a Sta. Cruz de Tenerife cancellation.

The only reported perfins on stamps of Spanish Morocco, are those used by the Banque d'Etat du Maroc from various cities. No perfins have been reported on stamps of Spanish Offices in Morocco (1903-1914), nor on those of independent Morocco (1956-present).

By way of introduction the best we can say is that Paul received this from Dorothy Hazard (LM92) when he joined the club. The information may be found in the previous U.S. Catalogue (Lougee 1966). It was not continued in the current <u>Catalog of United States Perfins</u>, (Balough and Balough). Paul notes that the coding for pattern configuration and the underscore used to indicate serif on specific characters were ignored in the current catalog.


Ten symbols and a few rules govern the cataloging of U. S. and most foreign Perfins.

Most Perfins are arranged on a horizontal plane in either one, two, or three lines. But some Perfins consist of fancy monograms or letters within letters. The ten symbols shown below are used to describe all Perfins.


The envelope was posted at 7 a.m at Tamaqua, PA on July 26, 1932. A date stamp at the bottom shows "Jul 29, 1932" which I take to be a receipt stamp at the Philadelphia Electric Company in Ardmore, PA. To compound the mystery the written notation in blue pencil is in part overwritten in black pencil. This states, "1-11-4 / Due 62¢ / Due 7/21/32 / P.E. Reutter / 118 Revere Rd / Memom Park, PA".

The letter was mailed at Worcester, Mass. post office with a written destination of the Norton Company at Greendale. A hand stamp of "WORCESTER, MASS." was applied. Did the postal clerk apply it since he knew that the Norton Company was local or, did someone at Brewer catch it? Is it possible that Greendale is a section of Worcester?

During my last term, we were able to produce catalogs of Railroad Perfins, Romanian Perfins, Indian Perfins and Bavarian Perfins. We also saw a variety of smaller projects developed such as the listing of 1902 perfinned issues and the checklist of U.S. perfins. Our Bulletin has developed constantly. The World Perfin Catalog continues with the Americas section completed and we are well into the African pages. We hope to publish the American section completely revised and in catalog form in 1991.

The growth of membership over the past year has been astounding and much of the credit for this goes to Kurt Ottenheimer for his most efficient and diligent handling of the brochure and sample perfin program of public relations. 
Sylvia M. Gersch (#1825F)

The article about J.A. Roebling's Sons Co. use of perfin pattern R5, <u>TPB</u>, July August 1990, pp. 161-2 led my husband Bill an I to check our collection. We found a number of items, which are described later in this article. After reading the article, Bill recalled that John Roebling had been associated with the building of the Brooklyn Bridge.

A summary of an article on John A. and Washington A. Roebling from <u>The Encyclopedia Britannica</u>, 15th. edition (1978), Macropodia, Vol 15, Chicago, pp. 983-984 is provided below:

John Augustus Roebling was a pioneer in the design of steel suspension bridges. His best known work was the Brooklyn Bridge. He was among the

first to recognize the resilience of steel wire and to weave it into massive cables of great strength and flexibility.

JOHN A. ROEBLING'S SONS CO.

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He was born in Mulhausen, Prussia on June 12, 1806 and trained as an engineer before emigrating to the United States in 1831. He settled in a small colony near Pittsburgh, PA which later was named Saxonburg. He married and had nine children,

the oldest of whom was Washington Augustus.

After several years as a farmer he obtained employment with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania as a civil engineer. His first assignment was to replace the hemp hawsers on the canals with wire cables. He developed methods for standing and weaving the cables and established a factory to manufacture such cable in Trenton, NJ. This factory became an industrial complex producing everything from chicken wire to 36-inch cables. It remained a family owned business for three generations.

Washington Roebling, a graduate of Rensseleer Polytechnic Institute, joined his father's business. Father and Son built four suspension bridges: two in Pittsburgh, one at Niagara Falls, and one across the Ohio River. The one across the Ohio River connecting Cincinnati, OH to Covington, KY is name the John A. Roebling Bridge.

John was appointed the chief engineer of the Brooklyn Bridge, which at the time it was built was the longest such bridge, spanning 1595 feet. Unfortunately, he died in 1869 after contacting tetanus as a result of an accident at the bridge footing.

Washington was then appointed chief engineer of the bridge. The requirement for slow decompression after being under pressure was not well understood in those days and Washington was removed from one of the compressed-air chambers unconscious after spending 12 hours there. His health was permanently affected and although he lived to be almost 89 he was unable to return to the bridge site. He continued to supervise construction by using a telescope from his bedroom window to observe the spinning of cable. His wife to conveyed his instructions to the engineers and foremen. The bridge took 13 years to build and was completed in May of 1883. Washington Roebling died on July 21, 1926.

In our collection, we have two items with the "JAR" perfin. One of these, illustrated on the previous page, is from the "Kinkora Works of John A. Roebling's Sons Co, Roebling, NJ." Like the previously published cover it is also addressed to the "Scranton Silk Machine Co.", but at Allentown rather than Scranton. The postmark of August 23, 1916 is almost exactly 3 years later than the previous item. The second item, shown on the next page, is a personal use in April of 1924 from "Margie" and is addressed to a Mrs. Wilfred Moore in New Britain, CN.

The <u>Britannica</u> article states that the Roebling Industrial Complex remained a family owned business for three generations. We would be interested if anyone has been able to trace this company. We have not been able to find a listing in the <u>Thomas' Register of American Manufactures</u>, <u>Dunn's Marketing Services</u>, <u>Ward's Business Directory of Major U.S. Private Companies</u>, or <u>Standard and Poor's</u>.

Also, we would be willing to trade a JAR perfin for a railroad perfin on Scott Catalog number 922, the 1944 Transcontinental stamp.

Robert T. Dann (#484) bet that I would receive at least 50 answers about my query on the use of a NYC perfin on Michigan Central Railroad stationary. See *The Perfins Bulletin*, February 1991, p. 39. Well it was not quite that large a response, but Bob provided the following data:

From Robert G. Lewis' Handbook of American Railroads, Simmons-Bordman, NY, 1956.

Fourth largest U.S. railway in standpoint of mileage is The New York Central Railroad Company. Total system milage, excluding that of the separately operated Pittsburgh and Lake Erie, was 10,613 as of April 1956. About 60 percent consists of lines operated under lease or contract, principally the Cleveland, Cincinnati, Chicago & St. Louis (Big Four), the Boston & Albany, the Michigan Central, the Peoria & Eastern and the West Shore. Operations extend into 11 states and two provinces of Canada. From point of revenues, both freight and passenger, the Central is second only to the Pennsylvania.

The Encyclopedia Americana, 1981 adds the Toledo and Ohio Central Railway to those operated under lease by the New York Central. Railroads affiliated with the New York Central through stock ownership at that time, in addition to the Pittsburgh and Lake Erie, were the Chicago River and Indiana Railroad Company. From a book on the New Haven Railroad I learned that the Boston & Albany lease to the New York Central was negotiated in 1900 to last 99 years.

Considering just the leased lines, we could keep an eye out for NYC perfins on stationary normally associated with these perfins:

The New York Central even had substantial stock ownership in the Reading Company, Rdg/Co. (R47) as did the B&O, but I do not believe that they participated in its day to day management.

Interlocking ownership arrangements seemed to be the rule among the railroads, as each firm sought to complete its routes to major markets and assure itself of through freight business. No wonder they eventually came under control of the Federal Government through the Interstate Commerce Commission.

* * *

Robert W. McQuown (#1963) responded from the viewpoint of the Michigan Central Railroad and adds history through today. Citing *Poor's Manual of Railroads*, 1903:

Chartered in 1864, and purchased from the State of Michigan the Detroit to Kalamazoo, 144 miles. The extension to Kensington (ILLINOIS) was put in operation in May 1852. At Kensington connection is made with the Illinois Central RR., and 14 miles of that line are used to reach Chicago. In 1903 the New York Central and Hudson River R.R. owned about 86 percent of the capital stock of this company. The railroad forms part of the New York Central system, but is operated as an independent organization.

The original Charter of this company was repealed by an act of the Michigan Legislature in extra session, 1900. The company, therefore, resolved to surrender its charter and to incorporate under general railroad law. This was accordingly done, and certificate of such surrender and incorporation was filed Dec. 30, 1901.

This railroad was controlled by the New York Central System and subsequently was part of the Penn-Central system when these two lines merged on May 8, 1968. We all know that Penn-Central went bankrupt and evolved into Conrail which is government owned.

There were dozens of short lines that made up the Michigan Central R.R. and many of them have been almost lost to history.



In the interim, we have been granted permission to print the summary which appears in the center section of this issue (Pages 82-83).



B153 USED IN LOS ANGELES

Reading the eight line corner card on this cover shows that the firm is an agency. This probably means that there is a headquarters and other branches.

Pattern B154 also uses the letters "BLC" but in a different design. However, pattern B154 is attributed to Lincoln Export Co. and the letters do not match. This may be a misidentification of the pattern's user. Now how did this happen and do we have sufficient information to determine if a correction should be made?



The firm could have disposed of their perforator and it was acquired by Lincoln Exports or the firm itself could have been acquired by Lincoln Exports. I doubt it as there is a very logical explanation.

Some mail rooms removed stamps provided for replies and placed them into stock where they were used as needed. The fact that they were punched with initials had no bearing on the matter.

When the stamp was finally used it could wind up on the reply to the original query or any other outgoing mail. When a cover is found where the perfin pattern has no resemblance to the firms name this is often the case.



PERFINS ON LARGE SIZE STAMPS

Harry Rickard (#1802) and John Lyding (LM106)



Large size stamps are not very popular with perfins collectors. When mounted on standard size pages preprinted like the *Catalog of United States Perfins*, they just do not fit. Mixed in with regular sized stamps, they just do not seem to fit. That is probably why Harry did not soak off the illustrated perfin until long after he retired as U.S. Catalog Editor.

The pattern is listed in "Additions and Corrections Pages Number 3 (11/86) as the personal pattern of George E. Shuck.

Mr. Shuck was a member, but he is not listed in our current membership list. Why did we loose a member who was willing to spend a fairly substantial amount of money to purchase his own perforator? What happened to the device? Did member Shuck find that perfins were not his cup of tea, or is there some other reason why we no longer have the pleasure of his company. We suspect that time and age may have made their mark, but we are not sure. If you know, drop a note to the editor, John Lyding at P.O.Box 3342, Crofton, Maryland, 21114-3342.

Whether or not you get enjoyment from collecting perfins depends upon what you put into it. Here are some of the ways that we have found to increase our perfins holdings:

- Write to members with similar collecting interests, offering to trade, buy or sell.
- Place an advertisement in the Perfins Bulletin offering to trade, buy, or sell.
- Try an advertisement in the philatelic press. For many years, Harry had a standing wanted advertisement in *Linn's Stamp News* offering to buy perfins.

BACK TO BASICS

Getting Started -----

In Manchester, New Hampshire, at the recent joint convention of the Precancel Stamp Society and the Perfins Club, the members present were unanimous in the opinion that a monthly column slanted towards the beginning perfin

collector is needed in <u>The Perfins Bulletin</u>. This sounds easy to do, but when confronted with the task of preparing a monthly column, it is hard to visualize how to answer such an obvious need. The past few months when I should have been writing this column, I found that I needed to think through what it is I want to present to you. You can now determine if I have succeeded in that effort.

Even beginning collectors can follow markedly different paths. One major factor is what material is available to collect? Is a collection available to use as a starting point? Is a large unsorted lot available? Is there another collector available to suggest the direction in which he thinks you should head? Do you have enough perfins already accumulated so that you have some ideas as to what you would like to collect? The answers you give to these questions hopefully will be of some help in getting you started.

A question invariably asked by a beginner relates to whether or not to buy the Catalog of United States Perfins. My mentor urged me to buy the Perfins Club catalog and to use it as an album. The first part of that advice is excellent; the last part is questionable. Certainly buying the catalog gives you access to the perfin patterns that have been used in the United States and in addition provides a wealth of details about who used each pattern and where the pattern was used. However, you may want to emphasize what you have rather than what you do not have. In that case, you would be better off not to use the catalog as an album; instead use a loose-leaf notebook for an album rather than the album itself.

Many who buy the album may be repelled by the minor differences which distinguish a low-rated perfin from an expensive one when both of them were used by the same company. At the start one may want to try to get only one pattern from each issuing organization. That would hold expenses down and give a representative collection. If even that seems like to big a project one can narrow down the field of interest.

One choice could be to concentrate on railroad perfins. These are not only relatively abundant and inexpensive and a major attraction is that the perfins club has available the Railroad Perfins of the United States and Canada. This is the work of Robert Gray and having been published in 1987 it is of recent vintage.

The <u>Catalog of United States Perfins</u> comes complete with a number of Additions and Corrections pages (A&C). It is my recommendation that you make these corrections in sequence (i.e., add A&C #1 completely before going on to A&C #2, and so forth). Transcribing the additions and corrections into my catalog was a tedious time consuming job; however, it is important that it be done in a correct fashion to prevent problems later on. Changes are made and then often unmade. Many of these seem not to make any sense, but were based upon the best information available at the time that the correction was published. While there is a revised edition of the catalog under consideration, you must remember that this may turn out to be a long term effort.

In order to see a perfin pattern it is best to look at the back of the stamp. That means that when mounted with a stamp hinge the front of the stamp is not exposed and it may only be seen when it is flipped up or it is removed

from the album. This assumes that hinges will be used to mount perfins; however, such mounting can cause problems. If the perfin is punched into a valuable stamp, the collector will not want to risk damaging the stamp by hinging the face of the stamp and thereby reduce the value of the stamp itself.

In conclusion, it should be noted that perfin collecting should be a fun thing to do and it should be done the way that you want to do it/. Listen to advice, but heed it only when it squares with your own aims. Also, please remember that this column is intended to be of help to you, so please feel free to send me your questions as well as suggestions that you would like to pass along to others.



OF NO VALUE

The rather strange looking item on the next page is a tea bag. That is to say an envelope used to ship a sample of tea from Calcutta, India to New York City. The heavy manila paper was reinforced at the bottom and at the top (under the stamps) with a glued in stiff cardboard support. It apparently was sealed with string tied through the three holes that can be seen and a fourth one under the stamps. We owe our thanks to the neat mail room clerk who cut the string rather than the bag and then removed the tea and put the string inside the empty bag.

The corner card of Heath & Co. (Calcutta) Ltd., 60C, Chowringhee Road, Calcutta, India to Messrs. Jas. R. Harding Co., 80 Wall Street, New York, U.S.A with two pence in postage. The postmark on the stamp is smudged and can not be made out. The oval rubber stamp which partially obliterates the address can not be made out with the exception of the letters "A.V.M." in the lower half.



The use of four ½d King Edward VII stamps indicates usage in 1936 or shortly thereafter. All four stamps are punched JL/C°. This is perfin pattern J493.2A according to Perfins of Great Britain, by H. Tilles.

Dale also has four different handstamp dates on Baltimore and Philadelphia integrals. I guess all fields are plagued by SAPS*.

A MESSAGE TO NEW MEMBERS

Harry Rickard (#1802)

I was pleased to hear that a number of new members joined the Perfins Club after reading the article I had written for <u>Linn's Stamp News</u>. A sad thing is that some of our new members do not stay with us very long.

After analyzing the situation and comparing it with my experiences as a novice, I believe that there is a solution that will keep new members happy for the rest of their collecting career. Read on, about some of my experiences as a beginner, and see if you can ascertain what members must do to really enjoy the search for perfins.

After a brief period of buying from the Club's supply of stamps, I began writing to long time members, and asking if they had any perfins to sell. All seemed to have some and I obtained many good patterns, reasonably priced. Eventually, I had some duplicates which witch I could do some exchanging by making a listing and asking the other person to list what they had and thus arrange for a trade.

This first step was the result of being a doer and not waiting for something to happen.

The next step was placing a buy ad in <u>Linn's Stamp News</u>. At first, it was just for U.S. perfins. Some respondents also wanted someone to take their foreign perfins, so I started buying those too. That started me on world wide collections and I wrote to various members who collected other countries and traded with them. I was always busy and wrote articles showing various patterns and thus developed new sources of trading.

The next step was to attend the Club's annual meetings. I have written about these in a previous article and will not repeat it here.

I would also write articles showing some interesting stamps and learned that members also liked to collect specialty items. The most sought after group was the 1902 issues. I made a listing of what I had and submitted it for publication in The Perfins Bulletin.

To really enjoy perfins collecting, one needs to be a doer and venture into as yet untried fields that others have known about for a long time. By ordering older <u>Bulletins</u> of five or six years ago, you will see many articles that will give you ideas that will help your collecting.

Members who are doers will always find more perfins and enjoy this interesting hobby more than the person who does nothing to advance their holdings. Why not volunteer to keep a chart of some types of topical and have members report new finds to you. Periodically you would have the new list published.

To really enjoy perfins collecting, one needs to be a doer and venture into as yet untried fields that others have known about for a long time. By ordering older *Bulletins* of five or six years ago, you will see many articles that will give you ideas that will help your collecting.

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NEW MDR PATTERN

Harry Rickard (#1802)



I wonder how many members have this MDR pattern and believe it to be M97? I hope that there are at least a few, as my nice looking copy actually has a thinned section on the face side.

During the early period of perforator usage, probably as late as the beginning of the rotary press issues, single die perforators were very common. The reason for this popularity was price.

Always check your early copies with catalog photos. I am please to report that some members have taken the trouble to do this and as a consequence, they were able to report the discovery of new patterns.

It is not difficult to visually check this pattern against the catalog photo to locate the differences. Here they are:

- Compare the right legs of the letter "M" where they meet in the V section. The catalog copy shows the top hole of the V below the vertical leg. In this copy the first hole is at the same height as the top hole of the right hand vertical leg. The joint forms a right angle rather than an acute angle.
- In the letter "R" there are differences in the rounded portion. The catalog shows the first three holes in an almost straight line. This illustration has the first hole opposite the vertical leg almost level with the top hole. The second hole is noticeable lower than the first hole. The third hole is also lower than the second hole.

These differences are probably the result of an single die device. Templates were usually used in the manufacture of multi-head machines. This resulted in similar patterns, except for an occasional mishap or a repair.

British Commercial Overprints

Most perfin collectors who have become greatly involved with the area of study are also interested in various other methods of security endorsement. All of this started with the officially approved underprints and overprints on the penny reds of Great Britain. The use of perfins followed this usage and seemed to take over as the most used method of security endorsements. Searching through early stamps of India, Ceylon, Straits Settlements, China, Japan, and several other countries will bring forth security endorsement overprints.

One area of collecting of security overprints has blossomed into quite an interesting field. That is the area presently being referred to as British Commercial Overprints. It has been noted that the Great Britain Collectors Club here in the United States has been paying attention to these stamps and has started a listing of known designs. Also, the Perfin Society in Great Britain has some of them offered in their recent auctions.

A new group was formed in Great Britain in December of 1988 as a subsection of the Precancel Stamp Society of Great Britain and shortly thereafter became an independent organization. This new organization is The British Commercial Overprint Study Circle. The group now totals over 40 members and has so far produced two of the four proposed catalogs of the British Commercial Overprints. The first section is made up of overprints of Utilities (i.e., Electricity, Gas and Water Boards and Companies). The second section contains the overprints of Banking and Insurance.

Section three is planned to be published sometime this year and which will contain the overprints of Local Governments. Section four will complete the catalog and will list the overprints of private firms.




Both stamps are partially perfinned examples of either M106A or M106B the "MET/LIFE" perfin. On the left example, the "M" is reversed at the lower right and for the right stamp the "M" is reversed, but now at the lower left. I have a complete copy of this perfin M106B on this particular stamp (Scott Catalogue number C-2).

We are also indebted to Robert Gaganon (#2698) for providing a copy of "Philatélie - La chasse aux perfins peut être giboyeuse; il en existe 40,000" by Denis Masse which appeared in *La Presse*, Montreal, Canada, Saturday, September 22, 1990. A portion of the article is illustrated below.

In commenting on "G.Wills & Co. GW/F & GW/P", TPB February 1991, pp. 42-3, Jack Brandt (LM14) notes that he can extend the Fremantle period of usage of G.W./F State 1 to May 28, 1907. In addition Jack also noted that your editor screwed up his own ZIP code on page 26 of the same issue.

The June 1961 edition of the *Perfins Bulletin* was produced on a mimeograph machine and contained the following advertisement:

Dress up your collection with a cover and 10 other off-cover singles of the 1917-19 issue. I will send you P-#53, which is P(CS), Ex 11-(4-4), used by Crucible Steel Company of America, from Pittsburgh. One copy on cover, plus 10 other different off cover, all for \$1.00 Without cover, 75¢. Also available a few 1914-15 issues.

The advertisement was inserted by member #475 who is no longer with us.

Elwood Meschter (#1966) writes:

The misuse of the Philadelphia Electric Cover on the back page of *TPB* for March 1991 may be a puzzle, but it falls short of a "mystery."

Try this scenario: A salesman for Atlas Powder visiting the coal mines in the Tamaqua area simply reached into his briefcase and pulled out a perfin and stuck it on the preadressed envelope to pay the electric bill. (Perhaps Atlas Powder even had a branch office or warehouse in Tamaqua.)

In years of searching for correctly-used perfins on envelopes with corner cards, I have discovered that the improperly-used ones, like this, far outnumber those correctly used.

I find that there is too much emphasis paid to perfins that were obviously misused. Here in the Chicago area, "I WILL" perfins once were a drug on the market, being used on private correspondence as well as on a wide variety of business envelopes and only a rare cover of the City of Chicago corner card.

I have long since misplaced the articles that described how enterprising city employees peddled sheets of perfins to local businesses at a discount. I have no idea of how long the practice lasted or when it stopped, but I guess it continued for many years.





F144 - F.O. Pierce Company

The FOP design is poorly located on the stamp and the stamp was not only placed upside down, at an angle and lower than normal. Perhaps they did not expect to be there much longer.

This issue was produced perforated 10 and 11 by 10½ and the former are the toughest to find.


This firm, Henry W. Peabody & Company used two perforators. H207, shown here, appears on 1911 and 1912 issues. Pattern H208 is found on Scott Catalog number 707, indicating that the company may have had a replacement device made some time between 1912 and the later date. This cover unlike many other covers

sent to this company is addressed to the ""Norton Wheel Company." Wheel, of course refers to grinding wheels, the main product of the Norton Company.



American Radiator Company


The listing of fifty company locations that used perfins is evidence that they were a leader in the field of radiator heating. I remember seeing radiators in schools and commercial buildings, but I never enjoyed their welcome warmth in a home. I do however remember the whistle of escaping steam. Coal furnaces and fire-side grates were the mainstay in the Pittsburgh area where I formerly lived.

Of the fifty patterns listed, I note that 19 have had their ratings changed as result of various surveys. Buffalo has eight different patterns credited to its usage. While this is possible, it is improbable. However, there may be someone out there who can explain what circumstances would require so many perforators.

The only possibility that I can think of is that they used several single die devices at different offices. Or that because of a high pin breakage rate replacements were required. A study of the town cancels found on these stamps and the Scott Catalogue numbers of the stamps also might help.

B55 - Possible Additional User

The B.B Hanak Company is listed as the positive identification user of perfin pattern B55 in the *Catalog of United States Perfins*. Here is the possible identification of an additional user, Marque Furniture Company of 78-81 La Salle Avenue, Chicago, IL. This is either an exchange of postage or the evidence of some relationship between the B.B.Hanak Company and the Marque Furniture Company.

FRENCH AFRICAN COLONIAL PERFINS

This section of the African catalog lists the following French affiliates: French offices in Egypt, including Alexandria and Port Said, Algeria, French East Africa, French Morocco, French West Africa, Madagascar, Reunion, and Tunisia.

French stamps were used in Algeria before 1924 and again between 1958 and 1962. Consequently, certain French perfins can be found with Algerian cancelations. Along with Algiers--Morocco, Tunis, and Tripoli comprised the Barbary A French perfin has been reported with Tripoli de Barbarie cancelation--an indication that it is likely other with North French perfins will be reported No listing of these items will be made at this cancelations. time, but further reports may warrant inclusion on an A&C page.

Because of the variations in the Banque d'Etat du Maroc perfins (BEM), your editor thought it advisable to provide spaces for copies canceled in various cities. Blank spaces are provided for additional stamps from cities not yet listed. It is not known at this time if perfins were distributed from central office locations to selected communities, or if each local office had its own perfin device.

Tunisian T perfins are listed in the official classification (C) because the perforation converted the postal stamps to postage due issues, T being the symbol for TAXE.

Diagonal crossed lines, once considered precancels, are common on most of these perfins. However, some covers show that the crosses tie the taxe stamps to the envelopes as a cancelation.

There are three major types of the T punch: small holes (rarest), large holes with four or five holes (commonest) in the stem of the T. The larger hole varieties are found normal, inverted, double, and sometimes sideways. Illustrations show the three major types and a few secondary varieties.

Because perfins occur frequently on large size stamps of certain French colonies, accommodating spaces are provided for those who wish to use the catalog as an album.







British Graphite Perfins

Robert Schwerdt (#505), Foreign Catalog Editor

It seems that thirty years should be sufficient time for most British Graphite perfins to have been discovered and reported. However, occasionally new types are found in auction lists.

The graphite lines, applied as an experiment from 1957 to 1959 to expedite the sorting of mail by electronic means, are found on two types of watermarked paper: Multiple E2R and crown and multiple Saint Edward's crown. There were six and eight denomination respectively. Remaining stocks of some graphite denominations ($\frac{1}{2}$, 1, $\frac{1}{2}$, 2 of the E2R watermark and 2, $\frac{1}{2}$, 3, 4, $\frac{4}{2}$ of the St. Edward's crown watermark) were coated with phosphorescent bands, thus inaugurating a new system for speeding up mail.

The accompanying chart shows that seven phosphorescent graphite denominations and one non-phosphorescent graphite denomination have not yet been reported with perfins. To date thirty-three perfin types have been reported on fifty-eight issues.

This article is an attempt to compile a current listing of these interesting issues by encouraging collectors to report any stamps not on the list. Please report as follows:

Scott Catalog Number (or denomination and watermark), <u>Tilles'</u> Perfin Catalog Number (and/or British Perfin Catalogue number - or send photocopy) whether or not stamp has phosphorescent bands.

Potential Varieties

Harry Rickard (#1802)



A potential variety of perfin pattern H218 is illustrated to the left. Although this pattern appears to resemble perfin patterns H218 and H218A it is different than those patterns. The top of the letter "C" is quite different than the rounded on pattern H218 or the flat one on H218A. In addition the hole placements are different.

This copy is on Scott Catalog number 332. If you can match this pattern, please drop a note to me or the U.S. Catalog Editor.



The perfin pattern illustrated to the left resembles perfin pattern P60 which was used by the New York State Police. The perfin is on Scott Catalog number 332 and because of the small letters, it may represent a second die which did not quite match the original. Study the letter "P" and compare it with the entry in the Catalog of United States Perfins. You will note differences in the staff and that the curved portion differs some what. In addition, close comparison will show differences in spacing and design.



As a freshman member of the club my first project was the study of TRAV patterns. At that time, only one pattern was listed (T81). It really was a headache as all of the patterns seemed to be so much alike. However, I gradually figured out the differences in contours and hole placements. Since then, several additional TRAV patterns have been found. So, do not be surprised when more turn up. Travelers Insurance did have many offices and it appears that each one had their own perforator.

When I acquired a TRAV envelope from Utica, NY, I decided to check it. I removed the stamp for checking and sure enough, it did not match any of the existing listed patterns. There were similarities, as should be expected but, none of the listed patterns were a positive fit.


I tried a new and seemingly infallible method of checking. Laying the stamp face down, I laid a straight edge across the top edges of each row of holes. This shows the variations in hole placement. By using a piece of white paper, it gave a good contrast with the stamp placed on a dark background.

The hole variations were clearly seen and it was definitely not one of the existing patterns. So, check any copies that you have against this copy until this new pattern is illustrated in the next set of Additions and Corrections (A&C) pages.

Because of the methods used photos in the <u>Bulletin</u> do not necessarily match catalog photos, hence caution should be used in matching patterns.

C184 - C.LS.&A RR



Concord is the Place for August

The 1991 Precancel Stamp Society/Perfins Club Convention will be held from Tuesday, August 6 through Saturday August 10, at the Concord Holiday Inn, Concord, CA. For those who just can not wait to get started, there will be an Early Bird session on Monday, August 5, 1991. A whole week may seem like a lot of time to spend stamping in one room, but you will be amazed at the number of stamps available and the interesting people to talk to. For precancels, even a week is not sufficient to see all the stamps available. And there will also be perfins, perfins, and perfins. You also will have the opportunity to meet some of those people whom you have only met through the pages of the *Bulletin*. Our President, Dick Mewhinney, liked the past two Conventions so much that he is coming all the way to California for this one.

The Convention normally runs from 9AM to midnight each day, except that the Early Bird session is informal and the Convention will open about 10AM on Tuesday to allow the setup of Bourse tables. Tuesday evening, there will be a PSS welcoming party for all those with registration badges (one registration for all attendees) about 5PM. Registration is not required if you just want to come in and browse around. There will be a Perfins Club party Wednesday evening, 5-6PM. There will also be two tours offered, one on Wednesday and one on Friday. The Perfins Club business meeting will take place on Thursday evening.

The Holiday Inn is right off of I680 in Concord at 1050 Burnett Avenue, just around the corner from the Concord Avenue exit. The telephone number is (415)-687-5500. Concord is about 30 miles from San Francisco. If you fly, it is preferable that you fly into Oakland, which is closer to Concord and has a convenient shuttle to take you to Concord, where the hotel van will pick you up. 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Membership in The Perfins Club is \$7.00 per July-June calendar year, \$6.00 of which is for a subscription to The Perfins Bulletin.

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

We still have on hand accumulations of U.S. Perfins selling for \$1.25 per thousand, postpaid. New accumulations coming in all the time. Write to -----

Underprints and overprints at \$1.00 and perfins at \$1.75 per thousand have gone the way of the mimeograph machine that was used to produce that copy of *TPB*. We thought that you might like to know what perfins cost 30 years ago.



R.D. Matthews (LM49)' 3252 Dunkirk Ave, Coquitlam, BC Canada V3E 1G4 submitted the perfin pattern illustrated to the left as a potential variety of perfin pattern H127. He wrote: This does not appear to be just a case of broken pins because I am sure that broken pins would be far more random. I would say that it has had the pins purposely removed. Notice that it still reads HNB. Larry 0would appreciate in hearing other peoples thoughts on this perfin.

Many of us get a bit of a kick out of complaining about the service of the postal service and this little article submitted by President Dick Mewhinney might prove amusing.

Recently our former club secretary, Floyd A. Walker received via mail three issues of *The Perfins Bulletin*. They were dated October 1975, November-December 1985, and January 1986. These arrived at his home on three separate days.

All three had been addressed to James M. Chemi, editor of *The American Philatelist* at a Phoenix, AZ address. The bulletins were sent out just about the time that we were changing from first class to second class mailings. The return address was Floyd's.

This is really a mystery -- Did the post office have the bulletins for over 15 years? Did they get into the mails recently? If so, how did it happen? Were they delivered many years ago and now thrown out? Because they have no stamps on them and were permit mailing, we will probably never know.

"An Enigma?" TPB, April 1991, page 73 asks if Greendale is a section of Worcester. Bob Szymanski (#2862) writes:

Living near and working in Worcester, I can say without doubt it is still called such by the locals. The area is still dominated by the Norton Company and the letter

having been mailed to Worcester would have no problem reaching the proper destination without the handstamp. If I can match the handstand type with any other letters, I shall forward these to you at a later date.

Joseph Laura (#1238) provided the information that "Greendale, Station E, Worcester, MA is listed in an old postal directory of the late 1880's. Stanley Alsis (#2727) wrote that Greendale is a part of Worcester and that:

The Norton Company in Greendale is a large manufacturer, fulfilling many government contracts. A few years ago the Norton Company underwent a buyout by a British firm. The Norton Company owners took the British offer over another offer from the workers.




Figure 1 is an example of a block of four perfins that were made by Sylvia Gersch (#1825F) with a Logitech Scanner and printed from PSPLUS. Figure 2 was transferred to a Prosoft printshop program (FONTASY) and the size was adjusted slightly.

Neither figure has been "cleaned up" by adding missing pixels to the scanned picture. I am not satisfied with either print, but the *Bulletin* editor tells me that these are much better than he can produce with his Logitech Scanner and PaintShow Plus. If there are other members with scanners available, please contact John Lyding with examples of the quality that you can obtain.

Eugen J Buckler (#2858) has certainly doing his bit to make perfins popular. His latest effort at Stamporee '91, May 10-12 in West Palm Beach, FL produced two silvers a silver/bronze and a bronze. A four frame exhibit of U.S. Airmails including perfins took a silver. A four frame exhibit entitled "Perfins at their Best" took a silver, while another two frame exhibit of "Perfins" took a bronze. In the non-perfin category, he won a silver/bronze for a four frame exhibit of "U.S. Precancels". Eugen is coordinating checklists of perfins on airmails and parcel post stamps. William Hanson (#2651) noted that the stamps shown on the "Tea Bag" shown on page 92 TPB, April 1991 are in fact Edward VIII. He also noted that:

Tea bags and perfins are, in fact, kindred spirits as they both rely on perforations for fulfillment.

What was so important about this company that loads of mail arrived continuously with out a post office box number or street address of any kind? At some period in my perfin collecting, I had gotten a group of covers from around the 1912 era. Most of these were addressed, "Norton Co., Worcester, Mass.", nothing more.



While preparing the covers for our <u>Bulletin</u>, which takes days of preparation, photocopying, trimming and writing, I noticed one cover that was different. It was one of the few with a hand written address and it was so lightly written that I had not bothered trying to read it. It gave me the answer to part of my problem.

This unique cover was addressed to the "Norton Emery Wheel Co." Now, the question is whether they were a one product company or did they supply a diversity of wares? If you have this knowledge, please contact me. I will supply the information for all to know.



Horizontal Format



Club members who have been collecting for a period of time know that many perfins are found in horizontal format unlike the illustrations in the Catalog of United States Perfins. To make vertical patterns read horizontally, the catalog editor must first make a print so the photo shows correctly, reading left to right. Next, he cuts out the small pattern picture and pastes it on a blank vertical stamp. Then, when the catalog pages are printed, all patterns are shown in vertical format, reading from left to right.

Many single die users broke sheets into strips to make the stamps more convenient to feed into the perforator. This matter of convenience produced horizontal perfins like this copy of pattern B188A. This pattern is illustrated in the new issues section of Additions and Corrections Pages Second Update issued in May 1985 in a vertical format.

Unknown Sender and Recipient

This cover presents an interesting situation which I will try to solve. The window envelope deprives us of the addressee' name and address. The corner card referring to a

room number on Seneca Street in Oil City, PA is not of much help unless someone out there can has access to a 1944 Oil City directory.

The <u>Catalog of United States Perfins</u> lists Oklahoma City as the origin of pattern S128 which is the perfin pattern used on this envelope. Both Oklahoma City and Oil City have oil connections, so there is a possible tie-in for this cover.

Did an Oklahoma City petrochemical company send a perfinned stamp to Oil City for a response to an inquiry? If this was the case the illustrated cover shows the use of a courtesy stamp and it is of interest, but of little consequence.


On the other hand, if a petrochemical company in Oil City, PA had sent a stamp with their perfin pattern to a company in Oklahoma City and that company used it on the cover which was later used to identify the city of usage for pattern S128, we have a incorrect identification in the catalog.

I think that the latter is the case; however, this is based on circumstantial evidence (i.e., the D rating for pattern S128 and the use of window envelopes which indicate a high volume of mail).

The U.S. Catalog Editor has been requested to consider this cover and article for possible use in the preparation of the next Additions and Corrections (A&C) pages.

Fulton Bag & Burlap Co. - E71





National Bank of the Republic

Harry Rickard (#1802) and John F. Lyding (LM106)

The National Bank of the Republic is the only one that we know of who had their name on a ten die perforator (i.e., NBREPUBLIC). The picture of the first two letters was the first and only proof, I know of that the name was in one continuous pattern. This proof was sent to former U.S. Catalog Editor K.F. Lougee by a member about the same time he received an inquiry as to whether the pattern was a continuous ten letter one.

The illustration shown below is from a letter sent by Lougee to former Club President, Dave Stump. Unfortunately that letter is not of sufficient quality to permit reproduction here and therefore it has been quoted in its entirety.

August 14, 1962

Dear Dave-

Recently one of our newer members sent me a small lot of perfins asking that I identify them for him.

Among the various patterns was a PAIR on one stamp the letter N appeared, and on the other the letter B. Each letter is just under 11mm tall, and I believe that this pair is the first real evidence of the elusive perfin NBREPUBLIC.

The B, which apparently is the first B of the pattern, and seems to be our #2 on the B list.

The N, apparently is #3 on the N list.

Probably the R is of the same height.

Since these two letters are apparently the first two letters of the pattern, I am assuming that the letters <u>EPUBLIC</u> are of smaller size probably around 8 or 8½ mm.

I would appreciate your checking your holdings and see if you have any of the other letters which might be a part of this perfin.

A photo of the pair is enclosed for your file.

I have written the owner of the pair seeking to learn, if possible, where he obtained this pair from, and any other information concerning the pair.

NOTE. If one had only a single of the B, I see nothing by which it can be determined whether it is the Breck item or the Bank item. If memory serves me well, one of you gentleman has a Breck cover. Will you please see if you can find any distinguishing feature. Thanks.

We can only speculate whom ASB was and what is the mysterious "Breck Cover". Did Mr. Lougee mean perfin pattern B2 attributed to Joseph Breck & Son of Boston, MA? That pattern, B2 does resemble perfin pattern B1 which is the identy that the "B" in NBREPUBLIC is currently assigned in The Catalog of United States Perfins. In any event there are some interesting questions to be answered. We have attempted to trace development of this group of patterns checking the Catalog of United States Perfins by Joseph J. and Dorothy Balough, 1979. The below listed patterns are attributed to the National Bank of the Republic by that source:

There are several interesting items about the table of extracts from the catalog. First, the sizes do not seem to be consistent. We can assume from Lougee's letter that the suspected N of National was 11mm, and in fact the catalog entry lists 11mm. The N of the sample from the Lougee letter shown above measures in at 10-3/4mm as does the B. But these are photocopies of photocopies and therefore their size can not be established with any certainty except to say that they both are of the approximately the same height.

By measuring the size of the catalog photos from center of hole to center of hole, we get some interesting comparisons, as noted below.

The table above indicates that Joseph and Dorothy Balough measured to within a quarter of a mm and that they rounded to the nearest half mm as the measured rather than comparing all of the <u>NBREPUBLIC</u> perfins as a group.


The following questions arise:

- Why is their no notation of this as a group in the catalog? The existence of the group was not only known, the catalog entries hint at a group.
- o Why is the description of pattern C1 listed as "*C*" rather than "C"?
- o Why is only one of the group (i.e., pattern I4) known precanceled?
- o Where is the elusive "U" of "REPUBLIC", is it pattern U1 which seems to fit the mold?

Obviously, we are unable to provide any answers to our questions. We leave it to the U.S. Catalog editor to see if he can improve the listings. We leave the task of providing positive identification for pattern E1 to someone who may be lucky enough to locate that pattern on a cover with corner card. And finally, we leave the identification of the letter "U" up to someone with a pair or strip containing that letter.

Editor's Note; A second article about the National Bank of the Republic was submitted to *TPB* about the same time at the previous article was being prepared. That article is printed below. The article was prepared by F.J. "Joe" Miller. Joe was formerly a major contributor to *TPB* and his articles were noted for their thorough research and accuracy. Welcome back, Joe.

The illustrated perfins are quite controversial. This is a reconstructed set of an extremely rare "Blanket Type" perfin. Blanket is the term applied to a device when the letters of the perforator cover more than two stamps. Illustrated above are:

- N2 "N" of the National Bank of the Republic
 - B4 "B" of the National Bank of the Republic
 - R3 "R" of the National Bank of the Republic
 - E1 "E" of the National Bank of the REpublic
 - P2 "P" of the National Bank of the RePublic
 - U1 "U" of the National Bank of the Rep<u>U</u>blic
 - B1a "B" of the National Bank of the RepuBlic
 - L2 "L" of the National Bank of the RepubLic
 - I4 "I" of the National Bank of the Republic
 - C1 "C" of the National Bank of the RepubliC

Also illustrated above the reconstructed blanket perfin is perfin pattern B1 which is also may have been used as the "B' in RepuBlic.

We know that this Chicago bank was granted Charter No. 4605 on July 28, 1891. The bank was placed into voluntary liquidation and absorbed by the Central Trust Company of Illinois on July 25, 1931.

The entries in the Catalog of United States Perfins can assume to have been verified by covers which are no longer available to the Catalog editor. Since there are individuals who doubt the existence of the machine which made these perfins, I wish to appeal to all members to report their covers with a contact print of the perfinned stamp "in situ" on cover.

It is my hope to locate all ten perfins on cover. To start, please send photocopies to the *Bulletin* editor: John Lyding, P.O.Box 3342, Crofton, MD 21114. John and I will sort through these and if we have all varieties reported, we will contact those individuals with the covers which we hope to use as "Proof" covers. One of the problems that faces all organizations is the cost of mail. At the Motor Vehicle Administration, my division mails approximately 75,000 renewal notices each month. Unfortunately, a number of these "pieces" are returned because the driver failed to notify the State that they moved.

the neighborhood", May 1991. Just finished the informative article. As a stamp collector your reference to the "I WILL" slogan got my attention.



There is a segment of stamp collectors who collect perfins. These are stamps perforated by private businesses, with post office approval, usually showing the initials of the business. The city of Chicago has be perfinning their stamps for more than 60 years with the "I WILL" slogan.

Enclosed is a 1940's stamp showing the perfinned slogan. I'm not certain that they still do it today.

I now know how the "I WILL" slogan came about. Thank you for helping me and other philatelists answer this riddle.



Since the town's main manufacturing specialty, as listed in Webster's New Geographical Dictionary, is Optical goods, the C238 cover seems like the logical home of the American Optical Company. Boston, perhaps, was the chief business office for Eastern sales.


Many of the other covers shown in this series addressed to The Norton Company have come from the East Coast or Midwest. For a change, here is one

mailed by airmail from California. Unfortunately the 6¢ orange stamp did not reproduce too well. Since this was mailed in 1937, when the depression was on the wane, Caterpillar was willing to spend the extra postage to speed up service.

This cover has a corner card showing San Leandro, CA as the location. The Catalog of United States Perfins p. 93. lists the city of usage as Oakland, CA. Can this be considered as a correction for the Supplemental data section in the next revision of the catalog?

O76 - New Location

Well, Well, look what we have here. An envelope from the Otis Elevator Company postmarked in Newark, NJ; however it has a Harrison, NJ corner card.



The Catalog of United States Perfins lists New York, NY as the firms location with a supplemental usage in Boston, MA. The U.S. Catalog Editor has been requested to consider adding Harrison, NJ as an supplemental location.

The first page of the letter "S" listing in the Catalog of United States Perfins, by Balough lists ten patterns with the letter "S" inside a design. Pattern S8, John Simmons Co. of New York City is the first one listed. The "would be" cover is a front panel rather than a complete cover. It does show the extra penny postage required on mail to help fund the costs of the First World War.

If you have any additional denomination or companies perfins on parcel post stamps, please drop me a note so that I can update the list. I will provide an updated copy to the Perfins Club Library.



This positive identification was submitted by *Perfins Bulletin* publisher Helen Q. Ratzer (LM47F). The amazing thing about this "cover" is that it is in the form of a wooden box with the dimensions of 3-7/8 x 2-3/8 x 7/8". The box has dovetail joints and a sliding lid. Presumably it was used to mail small pairs of spectacles or just the lenses. From the corner card we learn that F.A. Hardy & Company were wholsale opticians located at 10 South Wabash Avenue, Chicago, IL.



The two lower holes of the letter "E" of C116 have been hand-drawn, and the extra holes in the letter "I" have been whitened out.

Air Mails

Harry Rickard (#1802)

More stamp collectors turn to perfins out of curiosity than for any other reason. Many members should penetrate stamp shows with exhibits of the various types of perfins that they collect. Air mails are merely one of the many facets of perfins that we can present to non-collectors. Give it a try.



Historic Data

Harry Rickard (#1802) provided a copy of a letter mailed to him by the late David C. Stump in November of 1980. The letter quality precludes reproduction and the Editor has removed personal and gratuitous remarks.

... there were seven different types of machines, those with one, two, three, five, ten as well as ones with 100 dies. However, while I have seen all of these I understand that there is a rotary type in England. I have not seen it and I am not sure how it rotates, other than the pins rotate. Only the "SP" and the "GP" have the 100-die models, as far as I could learn in this country. ... some are hand operated, others foot-operated and some electrically operated

The one-die is made differently than the others. Two steel bars about three feet long are bolted together. The "female" bar is one inch wide and about 1/8th. inch thick. The "male" bar is one inch wide and almost 3/8th. inch thick. The "female" bar is on top for the operation of drilling.

The desired design is drawn on the "female" bar in pencil, and then a punch is used to make a little dent on the pencil holes. Then a high-speed drill with a 7/16th. inch stop on it goes into the dents, through the female bar and nearly through the "male" bar.

The two bars are then placed in a shear and cut off so that the two pieces are about one inch square. Then the steel pins are DRIVEN into the "male" bar, but are not screwed in or welded in. (This explains why they sometimes come out.) The pins stick out about ½" on the "male" piece. The "male" piece is ALWAYS welded into top of machine.

The "female" bar is then placed over the male section (pins will be in the "male" section slots). The machine is then closed and welded into place.

On the larger (2-10) machines, the design is NOT marked on the "female" strip, but on the one-inch wide sheet metal template. It is then drilled, and examined by holding up to the light to ensure correct spacing of the holes This thin template is then placed on top of the "female" bar, and the holes drilled through the template and the two bars. Then the template is moved down about an inch on the "female bar" and a new set of holes is drilled, so on down the bar until the correct number of dies appear on the bar - either two, three, five or ten.

Then the two bars are sheared so that each bar is in one piece. pinned and welded the same way as are the one-die bars.

Now, if the template was right side up, or wrong side up, it makes no difference to the man who will drill the holes -- just so long as he stays and finishes with the template in the same position.

Job is done, and now the template is marked and stored away. At a later date another machine may be ordered, and then the template is brought out and a new multiple die is made. But, bear in mind, if there were two ten-die machines, by the time the twentieth (or last hole, if you wish), the template holes may be considerably at variance with the first hole drilled.

There is one other consideration; the template is very thin - about 20 gauge. It is much softer metal than the bards, and of course, many times softer than the extremely hard drill. So, after drilling through the template holes several times, the holes get larger and larger, with a resulting variation is size as the end of the bit is reached.

Pictured below are two revenues stamps with perfins. The 3¢ is Scott Catalogue number RB13b and the 6¢ is RB18b. The pattern is listed in the Revenue Perfin Listing as pattern rA-24.

This series of proprietary stamps was used until June 30, 1883. No cancellations are evident. The perfin arrangement gives one the sense of a Sloper product. Is this one of Mr. Hills early experiments with a perforating machine, prior to his patents of 1887?



How to Mount a Flimsy Cover

When I do not have an appropriate seleve or glassine to slide a "flimsy" cover into, I improvise as shown below.



I use a page protector, cut down with a little flap added for more protection. I use about four short pieces of "Magic Tape" evenly spaced to hold the flap in place. Then I trim off one end, to within one-half inch of the overall length of the cover. All this, of course, after the cover is inserted.

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

Norman W. Touchette (#1035) provided the following additional information about the use on perfin pattern E71 by Fulton Bag & Burlap Company in Saint Louis, MO.

Having worked at the Fulton Bag & Cotton Mills in Atlanta, GA from 1950 to 1956, I have some information on the Elsas/Fulton Bag & Burlap Co. perfin cover show in the June 1991 issue of *The Perfins Bulletin*, pp. 139-140.

America's Textile Reporter on May 21, 1953 gave the history of the Fulton Bag & Cotton Mills in an article about Norman E. Elsas, chairman of the board. In 1868, Jacob Elsas and others founded a bag manufacturing operation in Atlanta known as the Southern Bag Manufactory. Soon Mr. Elsas acquired all the stock of the company from the several other partners. He saw the need for locally produced cotton cloth and in 1876 he launched the Fulton Cotton Spinning Company. The Fulton Bag & Cotton Mills were chartered in 1869 in Atlanta, GA. Soon Fulton Bag had plants in New Orleans, Saint Louis, Brooklyn, Dallas, Kansas City, Denver, and Los Angeles.

Of interest to us now, of course, is the Saint Louis plant. In 1896, Fulton Bag purchased the factory of the Keokuk Company and moved it to Saint Louis. Thus it appears that the Elsas perfin (E71) can logically be attributed to Fulton Bag and Cotton Mills and further this perfin pattern could be found from a number of locations where the company had factories.

From its founding in 1889 through at least 1956, the company was headed by the Elsas family. It is my understanding that some time after 1956 the company was split up and subsequently the name has been lost. Furthermore, during a train excursion around Atlanta about four years ago a statement was made that the Fulton Bag factory was being converted to a shopping area.

During my association with the company (1950-1956), I was unaware that a perfin had ever been used so we must assume that use had been discontinued prior to that time.

U.S. Catalog Editor, Douglas J. Cutler, notes:

We now have an additional proof cover of the "Fulton Bag & Cotton Mills" from New York. It is postmarked "New York, NY, Sta. V, Feb. 19, 1915. It appears that Mr. Elsas used the perfin (E71) in his travels from plant to plant. I would say that the three bits of evidence that we have are all legitimate usages.

Nice note from John Fowler (#2937) letting us know that:

Perfins are alive and well in Vermont. At VERPEX '91 in Rutland, my three frame exhibit on railroad perfins & Covers picked up a first award and an American Topical Association Gold Award. This is my first Gold and I am please pink about it. I wish to extend my thanks to the members of the Perfins Club who have helped me build my exhibit of RR perfins.

I will be entering the same exhibit in the Vermont State Fair in Rutland, August 31 through September 8 this year. After that, no doubt, it will go back into the album. Collecting and exhibiting is great fun, more people should try it.

Paul N. Davey (#2971) in response to the note about scanners in TPB, June 1991, p.125 reports:

I too have tried a Logitech scanner with mixed success. Those that are clear enough to photocopy come out OK. The poorer strikes are not satisfactory. One tip I can give, thought. Photocopy onto a clear acetate sheet (as used for presentations on overhead projectors) and then simply reverse the sheet and re-photocopy this onto paper.

This has solved my problems of how to show perfins which appear "normal" on a darkish stamp. It also enables you to overlay patterns to look for small differences which may only become apparent by careful measurement.

Paul reports that he hopes to get around to trying a HP full sheet scanner with associated software in the near future. If he pulls this off, he will provide an update. Interesting sidelight: Paul's letter about the June issue was posted in England on July 13, 1991.

I know that Pat Callis was happy to see his "Perfins Patterns of Q1-Q2" appear in TPB, July/August 1991, pp. 152-154, 159-162. But, a letter to Pat from Daniel Owen (#2552) which reported additions must have helped his ego:

What a tremendous and painstaking job you and your predecessor assistants have done . . .

From New Zealand, F.G. Buckland (#2756) reports:

I have just returned from a trip to Australia, attending stamp shows and trying to track down perfins on cover, which are as scarce as hens teeth. In about two years of searching and poking around, I have only managed to come up with one USA, two GB and one German cover.

Kurt Ottenheimer, Public Affairs Chairman, has managed to place announcements about our sample perfins packet in Delbert Reasons' "Collector's Corner", *The Courier-Times*, New Castle, Indiana July 15, 1991 and in the highly respected *Detroit Free Press*, "Stamps", by John Foxworth, July 20, 1991. John Foxworth is a past president of the American Philatelic Society.



NATIONAL BANK OF THE REPUBLIC (follow up).

The June 1991 edition of *TPB* contained two independent articles on the National Bank of the Republic Perfins. (see *TPB*, June 1991, pp. 141-144. F.J. "Joe" Miller submitted his article about the time that Harry Rickard and John Lyding were polishing up their article. We decided to run both articles in the *Bulletin*, because they were mutually supporting and because both of the articles contributed to our knowledge about these elusive perfins.



Joe Laura, Jr. (#1238) responded to those articles with the photocopy shown to the left. This is an unsevered pair - E and P - (Perfin patterns E1 and P3) of the National Bank of the REPUBLIC. The two letters are in complete alignment with each other and are on the 1908 TWO CENT red.

Our thanks to Joe for this contribution, which is the first response to either article. This unsevered pair builds evidence that the blanket perfin exists and thus far, I have seen evidence that NB and EP pairs exist. Photocopies of the pair have been forwarded to U.S. Catalog Editor, Doug Cutler.

Still wanted, additional confirmations, especially items on cover.

At least, Edward S. Hoyt (#292) has been looking at the illustrations that go with some of the articles. Regarding the corner card used by our founder, Hallock Card, illustrated in *TPB*, March 1991, p. 61., he offers the following observation:

"Perfins and Precancels" is the heading. Now the cover is very distinguished looking, but - I shouldn't say this, since I'm just as guilty)- why didn't someone comment on it -- or -- do some people look with out seeing: Cornercard...

When suggestions were being passed around, why wasn't this -- the original -- brought forward?

With regard to page 72 of the same issue, Ed suggests that:

The Philadelphia cover, shown, was used as a bill or invoice held on file to record a payment/ refund of a service rendered.

And Ed's comment about the Caterpillar Tractor cover on page 148, TPB July/August 1991, was:

... when was the last time you talked to your dealer, in California, about your Caterpillar Tractor? Oh! I see. You just go down the street to your agents office?

Then, why do so many people seem to think that every time they see a different town mentioned under the name of a large firm (on a cover) means that they moved?

Actually, Ed what is suggested was that the U.S. Catalog editor should consider adding San Leandro, CA to the Supplementary data section of the catalog.

Received a nice note from Gary Shayler (#3014) reinforcing the theory that the least expensive location to purchase stamps is outside of their country of origin. According to Gary:

One of our members was right in saying we are paying more for our perfins in this country than in the U.S.! I managed to pick up a few U.S. pieces and covers as a lot in one of our local shops. They seem to work out at 15¢ each. Covers at \$2.00. I may have a few bargains.

Gary also provided photostats of several covers. One has the corner card G.M. & N. News, 71 Conti Street, Mobile Alabama. Pattern G128 "GM/&N is listed in the *Catalog of United States Perfins* as Gulf, Mobile & Northern RR, Soledad, CA and also as the Gulf Mobile & Ohio Railroad. Neither the postmark nor the perfin are clear. If anyone out there has any ideas, please let Gary or me know.

Two "Per Steamer" covers one rubber stamped "LAPLAND" with the KNK perfin of the Machod & Kuhe of New York, NY mailed in 1920 were also in the lot.

Ed Hoyt (#292) reports that he has four covers addressed to "The Norton Company" (See *TPB*, January 1991, p. 21; February 1991, p. 25 & 30-31; April 1991, p. 73; May 1991, pp. 102-3, 105, 117-8; June 1991, pp. 127-8; and July/August 1991, pp. 148-9. These covers are from:



The Catalog of United States Perfins lists the user of perfin pattern G67 as G.D.Barnhard & Company, Saint Louis, MO. The user was Geo. D. Barnard & Co. as shown in the above illustration. Use of "Geo." as an abbreviation for George was very common in 1913.

The cancel does provide a clue as to the date of usage, on February 24, 1913 which is very clear on the back side of the envelope, which is shown below.



"SAINT LOUIS, STA. NO. 36, MO. - FEB. 24, 1913" is the way that this registered letter received its postmark, to indicate that the envelope was received for mailing in a "sealed" condition. The receiving postmark is "NORTH YAKIMA, WASH. FEB. 28, 1913"



There are always some times when collecting is at a stand still, especially in winter time. How would you like to add something different to your perfins

collecting and help dissipate those dull days?



Member Joe Miller has been interested in plating perfin pattern for many years. He was fortunate enough to have been to have been able to acquire thousands of perfins when they were floating around by the thousands. Sorting them out, he made photocopies of his plating and sent copies to me when I was U.S. Catalog Editor.

Recently, I discovered something that I had previously overlooked. As you will see, the illustration above is from a multiple die device (probably a perforator with two heads). Some differences can be noted among the vertical pairs of perfin pattern U55. The illustration shows three different punches from a multiple head device. Please note that each pair is in vertical alignment while they are not horizontally aligned. There is a possibility that the differences may add a new variety to Catalog of U.S. Perfins: The top and bottom dies are similar, but not exactly the same. The letter "M" has some slight hole differences and there are difference in the hole alignment on the letter "o".

Members who have lots of perfins, either loose or in collections, will probably have some copies from both dies and they may not recognize them as such. I have reported this and other dual die finds to the U.S. Catalog Editor.





More Mail to Worcester

This illustration is a bit different than the many pieces that have been shown addressed to the Norton Company. In addition to having a different


addressee, it was a small package as may be noted by the 68¢ postage.

The shipping label and all printed information is in a green color. The round seal has a green border and red background with the brand name in green and outlined in white. The word molybdenum has been hyphenated apparently to make pronunciation easier. I used to think of it as MOLY-B-DENUM, so I could spell it.

The 16# insignia on the mailing strip, signifies that it may have been a metal part requited by Merrill & Usher Company. The perfin used was pattern C305. Viewing them through the heavy wrapping paper, shows them to have been made by a multi-head perforator. One copy appears to be missing a pin at the bottom of the letter C. The perfin initials stand for Central Steel Corporation and therefore it is conjecture if the company added Alloy to their name or if they omitted the letter "A" to save space.







BOOK REVIEW

Austria Perfins, Compiled by John J. Nussbickle, published by The Perfins Club, 1991, 158 pages, 8½ x 11 inches, 40 # paper cover, drilled for an American three ring loose leaf binder, Available from the Perfins Club Catalog Sales Division, Price \$15.

A labor of love. This catalog follows the newly developing practice of illustrating the perfin pattern against a white background without bothering to show a stamp outline. As I have noted in previous book reviews, the traditionalist may have a problem accepting this arrangement; however, I am convinced that it is the wave of the future.


There are 18 entries on each page arranged in two columns. Pages are printed on both sides. Considering that very few pages are devoted to other than entries, I estimate that there are about 2,700 entries which is a monumental effort. Also provided is an introduction, a copy of the April 1877 postal decree relating to perfins, an explanatory legend.

Entries are provided for the following sections:

- General designs
- Designs
- Numerals
- Austrian Levant Issues
- Bosnia & Herzegovina
- Patterns on stamps of Germany (1938 to 1945)
- Allied Occupation Issues (1945)
- Revenues
- Postal Stationary

There also are accompanying maps showing the locations of Austrian Post Offices in the Levant, and Bosnia & Herzegovina.

A sample entry is shown below.



The arrangement of entries is functional and easy to use. Being drilled for an American 3 ring binder, permits some additional flexibility in catalog design. In addition, if a "D" type binder is used, the pages will lay flat, which is a great advantage.

The illustrations are crisp and clear. Unfortunately, the frame lines are not as smooth and crisp. While the latter does not interfere with use of the catalog, it can become distracting. I would have preferred that the compiler incorporate a rating or scarcity value in the catalog, but I understand the difficulties and magnitude of the work associated with a rating value and understand the compiler's reticence to open that Pandor's Box.

In fact, the most serious criticism that I can offer is that the index does not have page numbers

The volume is a welcome addition to the perfin collector's library and no serious collector of Austrian or world perfins collections can afford to be without this catalog.

Not Just an Address

When an old-time collector learned that I had started to collect perfins he asked if I had a copy of the one identified as "1512 Fairfield Avenue" from Fort Wayne. I did not have a copy, but a look at the catalog entry (W133 WM/G) aroused my curiosity.

A trip to the library and the address in question provided sufficient information to establish that the perfin consisted of the initials of William M. Griffin, an early Fort Wayne entrepreneur. U.S. Catalog editor, Douglas Cutler provided me with a cover bearing the perfin that was postmarked "FORT WAYNE/INDIANA/MARCH 31, 1911". The corner card was a stark: "Kidd Building/Fort Wayne, Ind."



Pouring over 25 years of city directories¹ establish the "Kidd" was J.W. Kidd, M.D. Kidd founded a medical supply house, incorporated as J.W. Kidd Company in 1903. William M. Griffin was the secretary. By the next year, 1904, Griffin had become President and Treasurer of the medical supply business and as president of the newly formed Wm. M. Griffin Company. By 1911 the only mention of Kidd in the City Directory is a listing as a physician at an unrelated address!

In 1909 the Kidd and Griffin companies had moved into a spacious brick building located "north of the P.R.R. tracks." The address of this new location was 1512 Fairfield Avenue. There is no listing for the Kidd Company in the 1914 edition and while the Wm. M. Griffin company is still listed Griffin apparently was no longer connected to the firm bearing his name. The perfin in question (WM/G), was probably properly used by the mailroom of either company - or the two companies may actually have been merged.

Griffin does appear in the 1914 City directory as president of the Wayne Oil tank and Pump Company. It is not hard to associate the initials of that company with those of WTO, pattern W198. That company changed its name to Wayne Tank and Pump Company in 1922. By 1972 the name was reduced to the Wayne Company, which is the entry in the Catalog of United States Perfins.



In 1921, my wife was living with her parents in western Florida - where her father had been sent by a Windsor, Ontario doctor to recuperate from a serious illness. When her father passed away, my wife and her mother returned to Canada by train accompanying the body. My wife's uncle, George W. Hillman, went to Cincinnati by train from Detroit (across the river from Windsor) and enroute took out accident insurance. The round trip insurance - see back of the card -- cost 50¢ for two days.

When her uncle died, my wife found this card among his papers. The 1 cent Washington stamp bears the perfin SAI (pattern S25) of the insurance company - Standard Accident Insurance Company, Detroit Michigan. Apparently the 50¢ fee included a notification card and postage as the card was post marked at Cincinnati, OH on January 28, 1921.

Convention Great Success

For the third year in a row, the Perfins Club joined with the Precancel Stamp Society (PSS) at their annual convention. This year we increased the number of our members by a full 30 percent with 51 signing in. The Perfins Club booth was manned each day from eight in the morning to nearly midnight. People came and people went with often half a dozen at a time talking, trading, buying, and selling. The one big trouble was that we did not have enough perfins to provide for the people. 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
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

One of the Perfins Club members in attendance at the convention was Joann Thomas (835F). She had on display a neatly mounted perfin collection including the above postal card showing a punched "B" and dated Dec 2, 1882 well before the 1908 authorization date.

Several U.S. postcards have been reported with perfins, but this is the first, and perhaps the earliest, that this writer has seen with a "B" punch.

Also illustrated with this article is a UN card from the writer's collection showing the British American Bank Note Company SPECIMEN punch. The "Bs" of the two cards do not quite superimpose, but the similarity is remarkable.

Other than private, exhibition, and various dated, paid punches, U.S. postal cards known to this writer are: perfin patterns I106, L34, N136 and I&C (diagonal), L/B, and N/Ps. Perhaps members can provide additional examples?





Who Shot My Stamp?

Joseph Coulbourne (#2574)

I originally submitted this article to the Great Britain Collectors Club (GBCC) in response to a challenge by the Editor, Tom Current, to come up with some sort of perfins article for the Club's *Chronicle*. When the article came out in print, our Editor (John Lyding) dropped me a line asking for a rewrite to the Perfins Club *Bulletin*. As you read this keep in mind that this article was written for collectors of Great Britain's stamps, NOT perfins.

I also manage the perfins circuit for the GBCC. Great Britain Collectors Club membership is \$15.00 a calendar year for North America, \$22.00 overseas. Membership information is available from Mr. Frank Koch, P.O. Box 309, Batavia, Ohio, 45103.

First off, let me explain that I am NOT an expert (EX meaning previous and SPURT being a drip under pressure). I started dabbling in perfins three or four years ago when I bought a mixture that had a large number of perfins mixed in with the rest of the stamps. The next step was to soak them off their paper fragments, sort them by country, and stash them away in a glassine envelope - sound familiar?

As I succumbed to "MACHIN Mania" (a term that has been coined for collectors of the GB stamps series of the same name), I bought more and more mixtures (in a vain attempt to gather one of each major variety used) and accumulated more and more Great Britain perfins. When I started filling up the second #4 glassine, I realized that it was time to catalog and mount them properly, or to trade them to someone who could find them a home. I kept them.

I then progressed to buying perfins and found out that perfins are NOT expensive. U.S. perfins are assigned a degree of rarity in the *Catalog of United States Perfins* and collectors can expect to pay more for an "A" than an "E" perfin. But, I have not seen many "rare" U.S. perfins sell for over \$25.00. Perhaps this is because they do not surface very often. In the Great Britain arena ten cents a stamp is the average price and five cents for more common patterns is not unusual. Early perfins run 15 cents to \$10.00 or more. Perfins on cover are usually priced at under \$10.00 per cover. Try to buy perfin covers with a corresponding company's address or logo on the envelope. Illegal usages, such as a private individual using a company's perfinned stamps are also desirable.

Finding a place or dealer from which to buy perfins is another story. Most of the dealers that I know do not maintain a stock of perfins. Many dealers and collectors consider perfins to be damaged stamps. The average perfin collector can attend a stamp show or bourse and make a number of "finds" in the quarter cover and nickel stamp boxes

Another good source of perfins are the few specialized perfin or perfin/precancel dealers that are around. Roy Everett (#2635), 2 Coldnailhurst Avenue, Braintree, Essex, England CM7 7SJ is the only GB perfin dealer I know. Roy is a member of the Perfins Cub

and the Perfins Society (GB). He has a monthly price list with photocopies of the stamps as seen from the rear. The Perfins Club's sales circuits (Stamps Sal. Guarini (#1220), Covers Albert Spencer (#1261)- see the second page for addresses) is outstanding and a good place to find perfins in quantity including GB perfins. Friends that I have made through membership in the Perfins Club and CBCC have provided thousands of perfins for my collection and have been the single largest source of material to date. Advertising in the classified section of the major periodicals might be an other way to come up with a number of perfins although I have not tried that method yet.

Perfins are collected by pattern, or by stamp type, or by any scheme that makes sense to you. For example, I collect MACHINs by both pattern and type and have pages full of the PAC (Prudential Assurance Company) on different MACHIN head stamps. These show a multitude of phosphor varieties including some of the "booklet only" issues. Collecting various patterns on early GB stamps can be fascinating and it is possible to make a nice collection of different patterns on the Penny Red with letters in all four corners (Scott Catalog number 33).

Mounting perfins can be a problem. The Perfins Club sells blank pages with black background that are an excellent for mounting British perfins (Catalog Sales, Jackie Ryan (#2601) address on second page). The standard way to mount perfins is to hinge them face down on a page with a black background to show off the perfin pattern. Mounting stamps this way may cause other problems. First of all, today's hinges are not a peelable as one would like and if you peel the hinge off later, it may take part of the stamp with it. It is best to soak off hinges if you choose this method.

Secondly, when you try to mount MACHINs to show different stamps, phosphors, or printing methods, you really need to mount the stamps face up. If you mount the stamps face up, the perfin pattern does not show up very well.

While there had been a lot of discussion about the "best" method to mount perfins, I believe you should mount them in the manner that will illustrate what you are attempting to show. I mount the majority of my British collection with hinges, face down. I mount my MACHIN perfins face up to show the phosphor varieties and I then mount one duplicate face down in the upper left hand corner of the page to show the perfin pattern. For me, this is the "best of both worlds."

I began buying every perfin catalog that was offered. Although there was no Great Britain Catalog for sale at the time there was an ongoing effort by the British Perfins Society to revise the aging Tilles' Catalog of the Perfins of Great Britain which was published by Harvey Tilles of the Perfins Club. This new work is A Catalog of Great Britain Perfins (or the Edward's catalog as the new work is more commonly called). I joined the Perfins Society and purchased the catalog. In addition I also purchased The Tomkins Catalog of Identified G.B. Perfins (more commonly called Tomkins) which was compiled by Tony Edwards (now Dr. T.A. Llewwlyn-Edwards #2741). I like the new catalog in that it shows the period of use of the pattern.

Unlike the Catalog of United States Perfins, the GB catalog consists of two parts. The Edwards catalog contains illustrations of British perfins and its catalog number is easily crossed to the older more commonly used Tilles' numbers. The Tomkins catalog shows identified users for, period of use, and size data. Even though each part can be used independently, both parts are really necessary to get a comprehensive listing of British perfins.

One pitfall is the price. It has been estimated that there are more than 25,000 different perfin patterns. With this many patterns, the catalog is about three inches thick with 49 patterns top a page (for comparison, the U.S. Catalog with supplements is just over two inches thick with 30 patterns per page). The price is high. The last time that I checked the Edwards catalog was £56.60, airmail or £40.60, surface. The Tomkins catalog was £12.00. The Perfins Society's address is: J.M.Rucklidge, 13 Moncrieffe Road, Sheffield, England S7 1HQ.

One project that I would like to undertake is to compile a listing of all of the patterns punched into MACHIN stamps and the specialized varieties in which the pattern is punched. I can use everyone's help on this one just like all of those members that have helped to update the Black Hardings for the Club. If you collect GB MACHIN perfins and have either a Tilles or Edwards catalog, how about letting me have some of your time? I would like to know which patterns you have on the MACHIN series and, if you can - which stamp of the MACHIN series. I have all of the specialized MACHIN catalogs and most of the major dealers buy/sell lists, so any way you choose to identify them is Ok with me.

BOOK REVIEW

Catalog of Romanian Perfins Supplement No. 1, 1991, Robert J Schwerdt, 10 pages, 8½ x 11 inches, no cover, drilled for American three ring loose leaf binder. Available from the Perfins Club Catalog Sales Division, Price \$1.00.

Who said that a dollar will not buy anything anymore? This supplement to the Catalog of Romanian Perfins provides a page containing 10 illustrations which are better than those shown in the original catalog and 15 illustrations of variants of patterns illustrated in the original catalog. In addition, 31 new perfin patterns are provided and two pages (62) of revenue and miscellaneous perfin patterns. The author chose to renumber the fiscal patterns shown on these two pages

The author, in his usual methodical style, has corrected several errors caused by listing partials and the inadvertent inclusion of several perfin patterns into the main body rather than including these in the German occupation list of the original work.

Necessary for the collector of Romanian perfins and well worth purchasing.



Book Review

Additions and Corrections #6 of 1991, Douglas J. Cutler, 20 pages, $8\frac{1}{2}$ x 11 inches, no cover drilled for American three ring loose leaf binder. Available from the Perfins Club Catalog Sales Division, Price \$2.50.

The long awaited A&C pages revert almost back to its roots, the *Catalog of United States Perfins*, by Joseph and Dorothy Balough. I say "almost" because the catalog entries have been expanded to include Lougee type (see *TPB*, March 1991, p. 63), hole measurements, and hole counts. This is not quite the layout of the 1979 edition. There are 209 entries illustrated and cataloged, a page of corrections, and 3 pages of additional identities for perfin patterns.

Of great importance is page 16, which explains the errors that exist in A&C pages 1 through 5 and several errors in the original catalog. The main body of the work describes the additional patterns. The illustrations are the problem in that several, especially U104A, are so faint as to defy identification. The author has promised us an errata sheet for publication in *The Perfins Bulletin*. That will be printed when it becomes available. I would hope that the same errata sheet will be provided to individuals who purchase a copy in the event that they do not want to cut up the *Bulletin*, if they are not a member, or if they join the Club after the errata sheet is published. All in all there are about eight offending illustrations. I hope that my comments have not put you off of purchasing this set of A&C pages because an errata will be provided.

PERFINS ON FALKLAND ISLAND STAMPS


Perfins or security punches were introduced in great Britain after permission had been given by the GPO in 1868 and it was used to prevent the staff from stealing the company's stamps for private use or to resell to other companies or persons.

This method of making stamps protected from theft was spread all over the world and may still be used somewhere although the general practice ended in the 1950's and today most companies have franking machines.

One would think that it would not be necessary to use perfins in the Falkland Islands, but at least one company used this method in the early 1900's. One stamp with a perfin was recorded in the *Upland Goose* in december 1974 and this was repeated in the *F.I Digest* No.2 on page 82. It was recorded as KE VII 1d with the letters "WC" if looked upon upside down but it was later recorded as "CW" in the catalog of the American Perfins Club. For many years nothing more was heard, but then suddenly a year or so ago a strip of three KE VII 1d turned up with the same perfin and in this case "CW" appears if the strip is looked


at from the back and upside down. Recently another KE VII 1d and a KE 2½d was found and one more KE VII 1d was sold in a small auction. They all have the same perfin "CW".

The next question to arise is: what does CW stand for? Someone suggested that it may be Cable & Wireless Ltd but this company didn't come to the Falklands until 1974 so that doesn't seem likely. By pure chance I happened to see an early postcard of what later became the Globe Store in Stanley and on the roof was a sign "Charles Williams". Charles Williams is supposed to have run a banking and retail business for a number of years and this was continued by Louis Williams (Charles Williams son?). When Louis Williams died, the business was run as TheLouis Williams Estate for some time but it is more widely known as the Globe Store.




Postcard: Heyburn B-18-b

I assume that Charles Williams was the only one, except the Falkland Islands Company of course, who would have had enough employees to justify the use of perfins and therefore it seems likely that this is where the perfins originated.



The technical details of the perforation are:

The letter C consists of 10 pinholes, and the letter W of 15pinholes. The pinholes have a diameter of approximately 0.8mm, i.e. slightly larger than a normal perfin hole. The strip of three, a single 1d and the $2\frac{1}{2}$ have been examined and it is clear that all of them have had the holes of the perfin punched from the back of the stamps.



It is interesting to note that the perfin seems to have been applied not on single stamps but more likely on part sheets or whole sheets of stamps, and that the arrangement in the perfin machine doesn't match the size of the stamps and therefore the perfins appear almost anywhere in the stamps. This is especially clear on the strip of three where the perfin gets more and more misplaced and there are really only $2\frac{1}{2}$ perfins on the three stamps. This suggests that the machine used was made for stamps of some other size, possibly British stamps. The $2\frac{1}{2}$ stamp has the perfin vertically.

As to the period of use, very little can be said other than it must have been within the KE VII period 1904-12, since none of the examples recorded here have a clear postmark.

Further information, comments or corrections would be very much appreciated, especially dated examples or more information about Charles Williams and his business.

"Perfins on Falkland Islands Stamps - Frank Mitchell"

The Charles Williams referred to by Stefan Heijtz in the December *Upland Goose* was a solicitor from Cheltenham who emigrated to the Islands around the 1870's. Following an early flirtation with sheepfarming he acquired the Globe Store, at the junction of John Street and Philomel Street, and Waverley House which was opposite. Following the tragic death of Louis Williams, ownership of the business was vested in two ladies, Mrs Williams and her sister, and traded under the name "Estate Louis Williams" until shortly before the 1982 conflict. They appointed a manager Ernesto Rowe who had impressed them whilst he was working for a bank in South America. Ernesto was a wonderful character and I commend anyone interested in the Estate Louis Williams to read the article about him in

the Falkland Islands Trust publication "Those were the Days" which also features an article on the monthly sailings of the mailships.

It is unlikely that any other organization in the Islands used perfins, certainly not the Falkland Islands Company. I believe that their use by Charles Williams was for promotional purposes not security. The banking and retail business was run competitively and I think it likely that farmers on the West were sent the perfins to encourage them to place orders with the store and to conduct banking operations additionally. The higher value stamps and the strip of three would be for registered items.

Foreign Catalog Editor's (Robert Schwerdt) Note:

I know of two members that own the "C.W." and have it listed in the America's section of *The World Perfins Catalog*. Because of the large size of the letters and due to the remoteness of necessity, I assumed it might be some sort of semi-official. As a result I tentatively assigned a "C" designation in the catalog. I agree with Heijtz that the C.W. could represent Chas. Williams.

Note the Catalog of United States Perfins, pattern C376 (CW/S), New York City. Somewhere, in the back of my mind, I recall they sold shoes among other things. My mother told me that when she was a young girl out of the 8th grade, she got a job at Chas. Williams store (Brooklyn or New York City - I can not recall). At any rate she worked in an office alongside a gentleman. The gentleman's brother was in the army and he encouraged my mother to write to "a lonely soldier. (1917-18)" A romance developed and they married (1921). I was the end result (1923).

In addition to the covers illustrated in *The Perfins Bulletin*, February 1991, p. 47-48 which were used by Simmons and Norvell-Shapleigh Hardware Company of Saint Louis, three other related covers have been found. The earliest is a cover from Simmons Hardware Company dated March 10, 1910. The razor on this cover is beautifully printed in silver and the "Keen Kutter" logo on the razor provides the clue that the keen edge was on something other than hardware tools. Shown inset is the Coldwater, Michigan receiving mark on the rear of this cover.



The use of Norvell-Shapleigh as a combined name is illustrated by the cover below. This cover has the familiar perfin D36 that was used by the three different business names (i.e., Simmons Hardware, Norvell-Shapleigh Hardware, and Shapleigh Hardware). Note the postmark date, February 9, 1911. A portion of the back of this cover shows a Kenwood, MO receiving mark. The DE, Diamond Edge logo is also illustrated. This is the earliest use I have noted of the "Diamond Edge is a Quality Pledge" slogan. This slogan appears in the circle around the diamond edge logo.





The user, Stratton & Terstegge Company of Louisville, Kentucky was probably a manufacturer of some type as is indicated by the "Office, Factory and Warehouse" line in the corner card.

Since the corner card also shows that the company was incorporated, there are two possible sources of additional information about this user. A 1922 Louisville, Kentucky City Directory of the 1922 Kentucky Registry of Incorporated Businesses. IFO - Imperial Fire Office

The British cover illustrated on page 217 bears a 1d lilac Victorian issue (Scott Catalog Number 89) the perfin "IFO". This perfin pattern is listed in Tilles, *Perfins of Great Britain* as:

91. <u>IF</u>O 7,11,10 5

The user is unknown. As may be seen from the reverse side of the cover the user has been identified as The Imperial Fire Office from the blue embossed mark. The receiving station mark on the back of the cover shows London, WC, November 28, 1891. From the duplex cancel we note a November 1891 usage probably at NW 57. The cover is addressed to G Wheeler Esq, 64 Lambs Conduit Street, NW.



J181 - The James & Law Company

A rather new and fairly common perfin is used on this window envelope posted at Clarksburg, WV on February 23, 1973. The users full name and address is given as James & Law Company, Incorporated, 217 W. Main street, Clarksburg, west Virginia 26301. The company was booksellers, stationers, school and office outfitters.





The Courtesy Stamp

Various articles in the *Bulletin* have noted some of the reasons why incorrect perfin pattern ownership has been attributed to a firm as a consequence of providing postage for a reply. This bewildering pattern is the result of such an event.

The recipient of a perfinned stamp punched their pattern into the stamp. Although the result is unsightly, it is not difficult to determine the chronology of events.

The "USP" pattern is complete and it belonged to U.S. Steel Products Co. of New York. I assume that this was a sales office for the various products of U.S. Steel. The other pattern is a large "W", representing one of the American Steel Wire Companies plants or offices.

We have a wire making firm that needs steel to make wire and U.S. Steel which manufactures steel. The assumption then is that the perforated "W" was sent with an inquiry to U.S. Steel's New York office where it was re-punched. But, even if this assumption is correct, they used an early 10¢ Franklin, so what did they expect to be returned?

Envelopes Tell a Story

Harry Rickard (#1802)

Among the numerous covers that were used to write a series of articles about the Norton Company were these three covers mailed by The National Supply Company of Toledo, OH. At first glance they did not seem significant. However, I had an advantage over you in that you are looking at a black and white photocopy and I examined the originals. For the originals one may note that all three were typed with a different color ribbon.

The first cover was typed with a purple ribbon, the second with a well used black ribbon and the last was with a bright blue ribbon. They were probably all produced by a different typist since the placement and style of the addresses differs.

The first two covers were postmarked on the same day, about two hours apart. Thus we may conclude that two different typists addressed these envelopes. The other cover is postmarked "March 50, 1912. The postal clerk thought that he had used a 3, but he erred. Since this ribbon was bright blue and since the address style is do different we may assume that it was also produced by a different typist.

Now the questions? Since National Supply had at least three typists, it must have been a fairly large organization but, what did it supply? What did Norton buy, and when they bought it, what did they do with it?

After 5 days return to THE NATIONAL SUPPLY CO., TOLEDO, OHIO



INDEPENDENT NATIONS AFRICAN PERFINS

Except for the perfins found on the stamps of Egypt and Sudan, the relatively few found on other independent African nations can be classified as cancel punches or SPECIMEN punches.

Much of the information found on the Egyptian pages of this catalog is from <u>Perfins of the Middle East</u>, a catalog published by Dr. Harvey G. Tilles in 1975.

By means of keyed numbers, an attempt has been made to indicate periods of use for each of the Egyptian perfin types. Considerable information is lacking here, so members are encouraged to report additions.

Only one perfin type has been reported on the fiscal stamps of Egypt.

Though there are some commercial perfins on the stamps of Sudan, the most common varieties are official perfins found in five patterns in varying size letters. Scott catalog numbers are listed for these officials.

One unusual, but incomplete, punch is listed for an overprinted Army Service issue.



It was nothing for a firm to have branch offices with their own perforator pattern. In many cases the difference were in the form of control holes.


The left hand illustration is the <u>Catalog of United States</u> <u>Perfins</u> listing of pattern number C95. The right hand illustration is on a 2¢ presidential issue (Scott Catalogue number 806) and it shows what appears to be a control hole under the letter "D". I am quite surprised that other copies have not shown up before

now. Perhaps some members may have copies and they do not consider this to be a control hole.

This variety requires confirmation, please let me or the U.S. Catalog Editor know if you have a copy. If you mention what Scott Catalogue number the perfins was used on it will help establish the usage period.

Long Distance Personal Use Perfin

The writing on the upper left hand side of this envelope covers the corner card of Clyde Steamship Lines. The stamp is perforated with pattern C182 of Clyde Steamship lines. The indistinct cancel is Jacksonville, Florida, July 16, 1913 and the letter is addressed to the writer's spouse or mother.

During the early part of the 20th. century, Jacksonville was a resort area for winter tourists. In those days, one did not hop into a car and head south. There were few paved roads and not many gas stations outside of the cities. Long distance trip were made by rail or sea.

It would be pure conjecture to guess just why Mr. Hoffman was in Jacksonville, Florida in the middle of summer. He may have been an agent of Clyde Steamship Lines, he may have taken a ship there to drum up business, he may have started as a tourist, and any one of a multitude of other reasons might be the reason. In any event, he probably obtained the stationary and stamp in the writing lounge of the ship on the southbound portion of his trip and never got around to using the perfinned cover until mid-July.

M104 - Manhatten Electrical Supply




Prior to submission of this cover by member Paul H. Gault (#744) the user of perfin pattern N13 was unidentified in The New

Amsterdam Casualty Company of Baltimore, Maryland used their perfin pattern on this November 12, 1915 mailing to Dayton, Ohio.




N113 - New City

N133 - Additional User




Names You May Remember

Flanned to run from Harrisburg to Boston, shop and main office to locate in Jonestown, Pa. no rail was put down but grading was done in the Jonestown & Hamburg areas, went bankrupt in the post Civil War depression in 1873. Posted in Baltimore, Maryland at 6:30 p.m. on January 12, 1921 this cover has its 2 cent red Washington stamp perforated with perfin pattern K4. The corner card provides the users identification as Kingan Provision Company, 350-352 North Holliday Street, Baltimore, MD. The spelling of "Holliday" with a double "I" is not a typographic error, the street in downtown "Charm City" is named Holliday.

Pattern K4 is listed in <u>The Catalog of United States Perfins</u>, Balough & Balough as being used by Kingan Provision Company of Indianapolis, IN. Supplementary data lists the Baltimore company with the same name; however, Kingan & Company is the name listed for branches in Richmond, VA and Jackonsville, FL.

PERFINS, PRECANCELS AND TOPICALS

At a recent meeting of the Florida Precancel club Meeting, I bought a very small collection of perfins. The first three pages were old clippings from some publication. Unfortunately, the publication's name, the date and page numbers were missing. This is a hint to those of you who save clippings. Please write the name of the publication, date and page numbers on the clipping. It may save future generations some research time.

Being a relatively new member, I made photocopies of the clippings and sent them to TPB editor, John Lyding. He was able to identify these as articles that appeared in Linn's Weekly Stamp News back in the days when that publication periodically devoted entire issues to some aspect of stamp collecting. The Perfins Club participated in this arrangement. All of the articles were edited and coordinated through a single point of contact in the Club. Current Perfins Club President, Dick Mewhinney, was the last member to serve in that capacity.


Victor J. Van Lint who authored an article on using perfins in a topical collection and Alex G. Findlay who wrote on perfins and precancels closed their albums for the last time; however, their themes live on.

Van Lint noted that there are adequate opportunities to either develop a topical perfin collection or to incorporate perfins into a topical collection. He notes at least 21 American Oil Companies that used perfins, and 11 perfins that incorporate stars in their pattern. In addition, one might consider railroads, banks, insurance companies, the entertainment industry, etc.

Findlay's work on perfins and precancels simply point out a fact that has been rediscovered in the past several years - perfin collectors and precancel collectors have a lot in common. Out participation with PSS at their annual convention has been beneficial to both organizations.

The third article devoted to the methodology used to classify and cataloging of perfins describes the method used by the Club prior to the photo catalog. However, John Lyding

notes, "Recent experience in classifying and cataloging stamps has pointed out a need to return to the pre-photo catalog methods."



How Perfins Are Classified And Cataloged

A complete Perfin catalog listing includes the following:
The letters of the design arranged according to rules below;
A code symbol, from the list below, showing the type of design;
The height of the letters in the same order as (a) to ½mm; letters are measured from center-to-center of outermost holes;

The name of the Perfin owner;

The main office of the owner unless this Perfin is used only from a branch office, in which case the branch office is given.

In listing the letters, the symbol -&-is treated as the 27th letter of the alphabet and the numerals follow in their order. However, unless 1 and zero are identifiable as such, they are treated as I and O, letters of the alphabet.

The break between lines is shown by the diagonal bar -/- and the presence of a serif on a letter is shown by the underline or by the use of an italicized letter. One or more letters enclosed in parentheses indicates that those letters are enclosed in the letter immediately preceding the indicated letters.

One of the following code symbols will always be used:

One or more letters in one horizontal line (1)

two such lines (2)

three such lines (3)

D letters diagonally in downward echelon (4)
Du letters diagonally in upward echelon (5)

letters arranged in the arc of a circle (6)

Exogram- one letter is larger and encloses another (7)

Endogram- a letter is enclosed in a geometrical figure (8)

a monogram or miscellaneous (9)

Auxillary symbols used with the above

Co Combined- two letters share a line of holes (10)

Overlap- two letters share a single hole, as by crossing (11) A letter is reversed (12)

Fancy- the letters are script or fancy (13)

In reading a monogram, the letters are listed in the order that they can be read, from left to right.

Where all of the letters are of equal height in a line, the dimension is given but once; the same measurement for two lines is not repeated. If a group of letters reads equally well either way, e.g. AM or MA, it is listed at the point of correct identification, if known, and if this is not the first alphabetical place for it, it is cross-referenced from the first

Point to the proper listing.

Where the foregoing information is not sufficient to clearly distinguish a design, additional explanation or an illustration will be used

to assist.

Topicals Are A Perfin Category

If you like topical collecting, you can find real pleasure in Perfins.

The most popular topic in Perfins is railroading. A nice little collection of this sort can be built up with about 60% of the possible items easily available and only a half dozen rarities making eventual completion difficult.

Each railroad maintains hundreds or even thousands of stations and each of these has need for stamps; it is only natural that the idea of Perfins was early taken up by the roads.

The Great Eastern in England was among the first ten users. Also the railroads continue to be the largest group of users. Although meters are found in nearly all the large officies, it is impractical to install them in all the small way

So you can depend on finding a number of the more common railroad Perfins in any handful you pick. You will probably also be introduced to your first variety. PRR comes in two Dies, easily distinguishable if looked for.

Over the years the consolidations have caused the disappearance of many roads as separate entities. For example, the MC/RR, BIG/4 and LS/&/MS roads are now part of the NYC. Perfins of these types must be sought among the older accompletions with the second control of the NYC. cumulations but they are still not too hard to find because they were

plentiful to begin with.

The case of the RPR is different. The case of the RPR is different. The Panama Railroad used Perfins for only a few years and then was granted the franking privilege. The perforating machine was shipped to the Canal Zone and the two R's were removed from the dies. The remaining letter P was used to form the early Canal Zone officials. As a result the original RPR Per-As a result, the original RPR Perfin is sought for by Canal Zone spe cialists as well as by Perfin Collectors.

There are many other interesting topical fields in Perfins. Banks, insurance companies, colleges and state and local governments are all promising fields.

For collectors of foreign Perfins, there are many countries that have perforated their stamps for official use. Foreign catalogs, notably Yvert & Tellier, list many of these but no one catalog lists all types and there are a few well-docu-mented types not found in any

Perfins Fit Well Into A Topical Collection

Victor J. Von Lint

Perfins have successfully invaded the topical field. As we know, topical collecting came about as an alternative for the stamp collector who found a general collection either too expensive or too large a field to cover. Often however, a topical collection is quite limited. For instance, the collector of "Lighthouses on Stamps" will find that there are only about 56 different which will fit in this topic and it is clear that once they are all there, the activity is stymied.

No wonder therefore, that the thematic collector is always on the lookout for ways and means in which he can broaden his field of activities.

This has now, in many cases, successfully been accomplished by adding perfins to certain collections. Two examples will be discussed here in detail. Others will be mentioned and could be treated in subsequent articles.

Let us first go to the philatelist who has chosen "The Petroleum Industry on Stamps" as his subject. Besides those such as Colombia Scott No. 437 and many others, he can broaden his field of activities quite considerably by encompassing also the perfins of oil companies into his collection.

There are 21 known perfins of U.S. oil companies as can be seen from the list in Table 1. The last column has the known range of Scott numbers in the case of Continental Oil, the second item listed, the range is from the lc 1922 to the 1942 "Win the War" issue, a theoretical total of nearly 350 different issues, but as a practical matter this figure must be reduced to probably 50.

It can easily be seen how this materially adds to the collecting possibilities of our topical collector and that is not all. Looking at the oil company perfin No. 14, SO of the standard Oil Co. we detect two extra holes inside the letter, O. The relative position of these two extra holes determines the particular town where this perfin is issued and used in a Standard Oil Co. office. By varying the position and combination of these holes, Standard Oil Co. has differentiated more than 50 offices. Actually, the practice began before the break-up of the old "trust" and was continued by the N.J. and Indiana Companies. There has been no duplication among the subtypes. This broadens the field of the collector even more.

It can be stated therefore that adding the perfins of the oil companies to his topical collection can give the collector an additional field of as many as 2,000 possibilities.

Aithough Israel has already issued nearly 100 stamps in its eight years of existence, they are mostly so readily available that there is very little room for real collecting activity. No wonder therefore that some of the Judaic theme collectors have contacted me regarding specific perfins that they'd like to add to their collections. In this case, attention is concentrated especially on perfins with 5 and 6 point stars on them, the so-called star of David.

In the third list of this article, all presently known perfins with \$ and 6 point stars are given.






The illustration to the left is not a postal perfin. We were of the opinion that our members would like to know that perforators are still in use. This illustration shows the perforations in the billhead of the J.F.Johnson Lumber Company located in Millersville, Maryland. It was produced on a Cummins device and the purpose of punching the Billhead is to let the "yard" workers know that the invoice has been paid and that the materials may be loaded.
