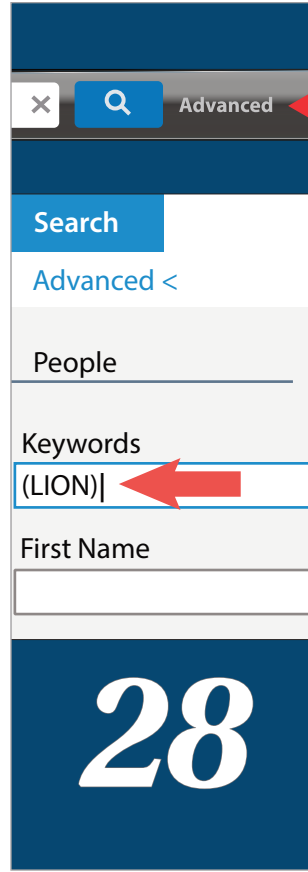

John M. Silberstein

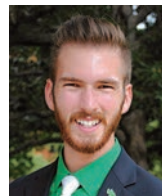
(Chapman, Theta Psi '85)

PIKE HAS ARRIVED!

2016 INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION

NEW ORLEANS, LOUISIANA

Brass bands, bright lights, and promising visions took the stage for the 2016 Pi Kappa Alpha International Convention. A total of 922 undergraduates, alumni and guests ventured to the Big Easy – New Orleans, Louisiana – to take part in the largest biennial event in Pi Kappa Alpha history. The Crescent City shone with garnet and gold throughout the four-day extravaganza at the massive Hilton Riverside Hotel. Many got their first taste of the lively French Quarter and Bourbon Street sights, while Convention veterans renewed friendships.

Day one: The long-awaited 70th Pi Kappa Alpha International Convention finally arrived. Day one began with Chief Real Estate Officer Dan Corah (*Colorado State, Epsilon Theta '83*) as he reached out to the undergraduate audience in an entertaining orientation for Convention first-timers. Following the first of many sessions, attendees were able to meet their regional presidents and new chapter consultants for some face-to-face interaction.

Undergraduates and alumni alike enjoyed the flavor of the Big Easy, and the excitement of the upcoming Convention events.



Excitement grew as business for the day was complete, and the evening's welcome reception began.

"We are going to celebrate, work hard, and have fun," said Executive Vice President Justin Buck (*Southeast Missouri, Epsilon Iota '96*) during his opening remarks. The Supreme Council garnered an enormous response as each individual was introduced. Fifty-three Raymond L. Orians Chapter Excellence Awards winners were recognized. These chapters enjoyed a hearty recognition along with an invitation for a chapter representative to sit at the head table during Sunday's International Awards Luncheon. Curiosity ensued as attendees exited the ballroom, received handfuls of beads, and began to hear a New Orleans-style

brass band playing in the lobby. They were directed to head outside as the second line parade was about to start. Over 600 Pikes and guests danced, cheered and whistled through the streets as trumpets, saxes, drums, tubas and trombones paraded everyone to the welcome reception at Generations Hall. One thing was clear – New Orleans knew Pi Kappa Alpha had arrived.

Day two: The day started with a bang as Risk Awareness Advisor Tom Olsen (*Illinois, Beta Eta '02*) provided attendees with recruitment strategies that will prepare each chapter for campus success.

Delegates filed into the legislation room where the official business of Convention was to take place. Undergraduate and alumnus delegates scanned the multiple row seating arrangement, looking for the gold name plate bearing the designation of their own chapters. Impressive reports were presented by international officers, including the State of the Fraternity report, in which Executive Vice President Justin Buck proudly announced another “best year” in Pi Kappa Alpha history. Ear-to-ear smiles filled the room as everyone in attendance had the

statistics to prove what they have always known: We are part of the best Fraternity in the world.

JOSEPH J. PLUMERI RECEIVES DISTINGUISHED ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

At the 2016 International Convention, Joseph J. Plumeri (*William & Mary, Gamma '64*) was awarded the Judge Elbert P. Tuttle Distinguished Achievement Award. Established in 1936, the Distinguished Achievement Award is presented annually to the alumnus member who has achieved the most distinguished resume in his vocation, profession or field of public service. It is named after Elbert P. Tuttle (*Cornell, Beta Theta '17*), a veteran who served in both World Wars, then as Chief Justice of the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals from 1961-68, and as a Senior Justice until his death in 1996. Under Tuttle's leadership, the Fifth Circuit became recognized as a leader in the fight against segregation.

Plumeri is vice chairman of the First Data board of directors and former CEO of Willis Group, Citibank North America, and Primerica. Since joining First Data, he has played a pivotal role in the company's transformation from a transaction processor to a payments technology company and solutions provider to merchants and financial institutions.

Prior to joining First Data, Plumeri served as chairman and CEO of Willis Group Holdings plc. Among his notable milestones while at Willis, in addition to an extraordinary return to public ownership, was his public leadership against conflicts of interest in the insurance industry.

Before joining Willis, Plumeri had a 32-year career at Citigroup and its predecessor companies. As CEO of Citibank North America, he led the integration of the consumer businesses at Citicorp and Travelers Group. He also served as chairman and CEO of Travelers Primerica Financial Services, vice chairman of the Travelers Group, and

president and managing partner of Shearson Lehman Brothers. A widely admired leader in the insurance industry, Plumeri was named to *Treasury & Risk* magazine's list of "100 Most Influential People in Finance" in 2009 and 2010. He was also recognized by St. John's University School of Risk Management as Insurance Leader of the Year in 2006.

Plumeri is a generous philanthropist; an avid sportsman and baseball entrepreneur; and a national best-selling author. He serves on the boards of the National Center on Addiction and Substance Abuse; Mount Sinai Medical Center; the Jackie Robinson Foundation; and the Churchill Museum at the Cabinet War Rooms in London.

Plumeri is an owner of the Trenton Thunder, the AA-affiliate of the New York Yankees; and the Lakewood Blue Claws, the A-affiliate of the Philadelphia Phillies. In 2015, he published his first book, *The Power of Being Yourself: A Game Plan for Success – by Putting Passion into Your Life and Work*. Based on his life experiences, he offers simple yet profound guidance on how to stay positive, motivate yourself and others, and achieve success in your life and work. All of the author's proceeds from the book are donated to the Make-A-Wish® Foundation and the Center on Addiction and Substance Abuse at Columbia University. Most recently, Plumeri committed \$5 million to create the Joe Plumeri Center for Social Justice and Economic Opportunity at New York Law School (NYLS). The center will allow aspiring law students to provide critically needed law services to those who would otherwise be unable to afford it.

Plumeri received his bachelor of arts in history and education from the College of William and Mary, and attended New York Law School. In 2011, William and Mary awarded him an Honorary Doctorate of Public Service for his philanthropic endeavors, where he delivered a speech to the 2011 graduates – "Go Play in Traffic (and Follow the Signs Along the Road)" – which was hailed by the *New York Times* as one of the best speeches of the year. National Public Radio ranked his speech among the "Best Commencement Speeches, Ever" joining 350 other speakers going back to 1774. In 2015, NYLS awarded him an honorary law degree and his speech was rated one of the best of the year by Time.com.

EDWARD A. PEASE RECEIVES LOYALTY AWARD

Edward A. Pease (*Indiana, Delta Xi '71*) was recognized with Pi Kappa Alpha International Fraternity's Loyalty Award for his service to the Fraternity, his community, and the nation. Established in 1969, the Loyalty Award was created to annually recognize an alumnus who has displayed significant support to the Fraternity at either the local or international level.

Pease has served the Fraternity for 42 years in multiple roles including national president, national vice president, Foundation trustee, Midwest regional president, and as chapter advisor to both Theta Omicron and Delta Xi Chapters. Additionally, Pease was a founding member of two alumni associations and worked as director of alumni affairs with the Pi Kappa Alpha International Fraternity. He currently serves on the alumni advisory board and house corporation for Theta Omicron Chapter.

Pease's engagement in the community is extensive, holding positions on the governing boards of a number of local, state, and national not-for-profit organizations, including the National Council of the Boy Scouts of America, the National Interfraternity Conference (NIC), and the Historic Landmarks Foundation of Indiana. He has received numerous awards including the Pi Kappa Alpha Distinguished Achievement Award, Order of the Arrow National Distinguished Service Award, the Boy Scouts of America Silver Beaver Award for distinguished service to youth, and the NIC gold and silver medals. Pease is also a member of the PIKE Foundation's prestigious Order of West Range.

Pease's involvement with the Boy Scouts began more than five decades ago. He earned his Eagle Scout Award in 1965 and has served in numerous local and national capacities since that time. Prior to his selection as the Boy Scouts of America Alumnus of the Year in 2015, Pease served the organization as chairman of the national organization, on the national Order of the Arrow committee, and on the advisory council, among other roles. He has received the Distinguished Eagle Scout, Silver Antelope, and Silver Beaver awards recognizing his extraordinary volunteer service.

Pease began his political career in 1980 as an Indiana State Senator. Between 1980-92, Pease served as chairman for the Senate Judiciary Committee, the Indiana Commission on Trial Courts, and the Indiana Code Revision committee. He was also a member of the natural resource committee, the environmental and consumer affairs committee, and the Indiana criminal law study commission.

Following a position as vice president for university advancement at Indiana State University, Pease was elected to represent Indiana's 7th District in U.S. Congress, where he served from 1997-2001. During his term in Congress, he served on the House Judiciary Committee, the House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee, the House Small Business Committee. He also served as Assistant Majority Whip with extensive service as Speaker Pro Tempore.

After leaving Congress, Pease joined Rolls-Royce North America in 2001 as senior vice president of government relations.

For his extensive service to the Fraternity, his significant impact on his community, and his commitment to our nation, the Pi Kappa Alpha International Fraternity is proud to honor Edward A. Pease with the 2016 Loyalty Award. ❖

Milstead discussed Pi Kappa Alpha's service to the United States Armed Forces. Following the program, attendees were given exclusive access to three of the Museum's most prominent exhibits, including the Road to Tokyo, which highlights the story of Pi Kappa Alpha alumnus and Medal of Honor recipient Jacklyn L. "Jack" Lucas (*High Point, Delta Omega '56*). Other attendees went out for an evening in the French Quarter, Bourbon Street, and Jackson Square where Pikes filled the restaurants to truly experience a New Orleans Friday night.

Day Four: The final full day of events began as undergraduates had educational programming followed by their last meeting with their chapter consultants and regional presidents. The International Awards Luncheon was underway and Excellence Award winning chapter representatives had the honor of sitting at the head table with their awards. The men of Zeta Epsilon Chapter (*Western Kentucky*) were presented with the 2016 Harvey T. Newell Award for the most improved chapter. As the international awards presentation continued, Director of Real Estate Reuben Rodriguez (*Bowling Green State, Delta Beta '07*) presented the Improvement Project of the Year Award to Alpha Sigma Chapter (*California-Berkley*), as well as the House of the Year award to the Alpha Gamma Chapter (*Louisiana State*).

The banquet room darkened and the words of Robert Edgar Smythe blasted through the ballroom. At long last, the Smythe presentation was underway. Chapter consultants in white gloves marched toward the stage, carrying the coveted Smythe Awards as the room erupted with cheers. Twenty-three chapters walked away with the prestigious award. Immediately following the awards luncheon, attendees packed the legislation room one last time with the hopes of a sneak peak at the new Supreme Council, which will govern and guide our great Fraternity over the next two years. (See story on page 2.) Initiated attendees were then able to be a part of the Ritual session held by Dr. Jerry Reel, followed by a special initiation of Preston L. Doerflinger (*Oklahoma State, Gamma Chi '16*), Oklahoma secretary of finance and revenue.

As evening began on the final day of the 2016 International Convention, international officers traded their suits and ties for white dinner jackets and garnet sashes in preparation for the traditional Duck Walk. As attendees waved their dinner napkins and cheered, each officer made his way to the three-tier head table.

After the final dinner, the new Supreme Council was introduced, and Immediate Past International President Bobango took the pleasure of introducing and pinning Shad D. Williams (*Oklahoma State, Gamma Chi '90*) as the newly elected Pi Kappa Alpha international president.

As International President Williams finished his remarks, Pikes from across North America concluded their 2016 International Convention experience. Brothers left New Orleans with newly-built relationships, fresh ideas, and gratitude that the Big Easy was capable of providing an incredible venue for the 70th International Convention. ❖

The award recognizes up to nine alumnus members under the age of 35 for their professional accomplishments, contributions to their community, and their involvement as volunteers for Pi Kappa Alpha, all while displaying the values of a True PIKE.

Joseph Beard (*Louisiana-Monroe, Eta Omicron '05*), at the age of 23, became the advisor for Eta Omicron Chapter, providing mentorship and guidance to chapter leadership. His efforts contributed to the chapter earning multi-year recognition as a top-performing PIKE chapter with standout accomplishments in academics, community service, campus leadership, and athletics.

Outside of the Fraternity, Brother Beard is involved in his community and with his alma mater. He serves as Ouachita Parish chapter president for the University of Louisiana-Monroe alumni association, as a ULM athletic foundation trustee, on the North Monroe Baptist Church finance committee, and as a member of the Mortgage Bankers Association.

Professionally, Beard serves as vice-president for the Southeast region of The Money Source, a top-15 correspondent mortgage company in the United States.



Dzenan Berberovic (*South Dakota, Kappa Pi '08*) has served in various development capacities for the University of South Dakota, raising more than \$20 million for the university through major philanthropic commitments. In his first two years with the USD Foundation, he was promoted three times, recently being named to the organization's leadership team. Michael Crabb (*Nebraska-Omaha, Delta Chi '07*) currently serves as a board member and treasurer for the Omaha Conservatory of Music, a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization dedicated to providing musical instruction for all ages, instruments, and ability levels. Prior to serving as treasurer, he worked with the Conservatory staff to create financial forecasts for its String Sprouts program. The program, which provides free string lessons for children ages 4-10, was implemented in 2013 and has since grown to serve an expected 1,277 students in 2016-17.

In addition to his work with the Conservatory, Crabb gives back to the community as a big brother with the Big Brothers Big Sisters program and as a youth interest group leader in the Omaha Venture Group.

He is deeply involved in the local community while also balancing his professional career as an associate for Tenaska Capital Management and serving as the chapter advisor for Delta Chi Chapter.



Justin Crosby (*New Mexico, Beta Delta '01*) joined the Department of Energy in 2007 and has excelled through his commitment to the advancement of the organization and its people. In 2014, he was promoted to manager of the headquarters program section within the Office of Ac-

quisition and Project Management, making him the youngest manager in the department. Crosby strives to maximize the potential of his team and the organization by stretching his capabilities, taking risks, sharing opinions, and defending controversial positions.

In 2013, Lunn founded Kopis Mobile to build software applications and electronics to be used by the Department of Defense, law enforcement, and private security markets. The Robertson Award honors Pi Kappa Alpha's outstanding graduating senior. Pi Kappa Alpha first recognized its outstanding graduating senior in 1926 with an award administered by the alumni chapter of Buffalo, New York, and the award's first recipient was Howard Bell Arbuckle Jr. (Davidson, Beta '25).

Hirsch was selected as the University of Central Arkansas department of nursing undergraduate outstanding student, recipient of the Dr. Lauretta Koenigseder nursing scholarship award, Outstanding Greek Man, and graduated summa cum laude in April 2016.

He has donated countless hours of community service, supporting a variety of causes including Top Soccer, Bear Essentials Food Pantry, Mothers Against Drunk Driving, Special Olympics, Susan G. Komen Race For The Cure, Walk-A-Mile In Her Shoes, and the American Red Cross.

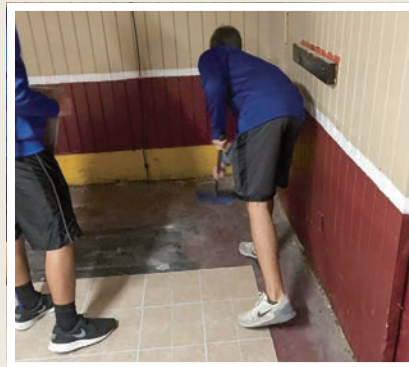

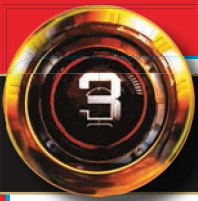

SECRETS OF A CORPORATE RECRUITER

Leveraging LinkedIn in your job hunt

It's not what you know, it's who you know.

That is a key phrase that I have heard throughout my career. I joined Pi Kappa Alpha through the recommendation of a friend. I got my first recruiting internship through a family friend. I was recruited into the position I have today at PepsiCo by a friend of a friend. A solid network can be a powerful weapon in your quest for a job.

What is my position and why do you care? I am in talent acquisition with PepsiCo, a Fortune 50 global food and beverage company. You likely know us by our many popular brands, such as Pepsi, Fritos, Lays, Doritos, Cheetos, Quaker, Tropicana, Gatorade, Aquafina, Mountain Dew, etc. As a corporate recruiter in talent acquisition, my role is similar to that of a recruitment chairman. It's my job to identify, attract, and get people to join PepsiCo. I credit many of my basic people attraction skills to my days of being the summer, fall and formal recruitment chairman for Alpha Nu Chapter at the University of Missouri.

In the business world, networking is key. Professional networking/social media sites like LinkedIn enable you to gain valuable knowledge and insight about people. Understanding how LinkedIn works is a major weapon in your battle for employment. Prior to LinkedIn's launch in 2003, finding online connections was difficult, making the art of conversation necessary to learn what a person does in your network. Today, tools like LinkedIn give you mobile access to see who is connected to your friends, family, Fraternity brothers, colleagues or anyone in your network. The big trick is knowing how to leverage this data and put it to use for you in finding that job opportunity as an internship, as a full-time job or as a second job when you are out of school.

What is LinkedIn? LinkedIn operates the world's largest professional network on the internet with more than 433 million members in over 200 countries and territories. Professionals are signing up to join LinkedIn at a rate of more than two new members per second. With more than 40 million students and recent college graduates on LinkedIn, they are the company's fastest growing demographic. (Source:LinkedIn.com)

FINDING A JOB IS YOUR JOB

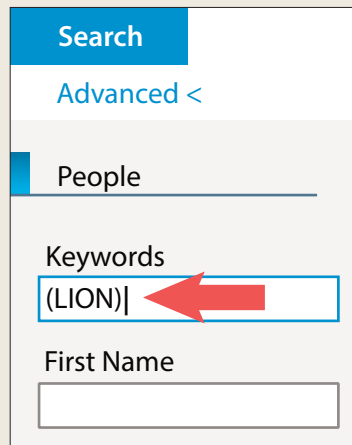
College provides an education, the Fraternity provides experience. Recruiters are interested in your accomplishments. Take on projects with committees or run for positions in the chapter, then add your results to your resume.

Don't wait to start building your network. Are you on LinkedIn? If not, build a profile today! Start by reaching out to the people that you know – friends, family, professors, coaches or anyone in groups that might help build your network. You want to have 50 or more connections when you start reaching out beyond people you know well – many people will dismiss profiles with low numbers as not serious or spam.

TIP – Many times, the most connected people on LinkedIn will let you join their network. They designate themselves as LinkedIn Open Networkers (LIONs). Why is this important

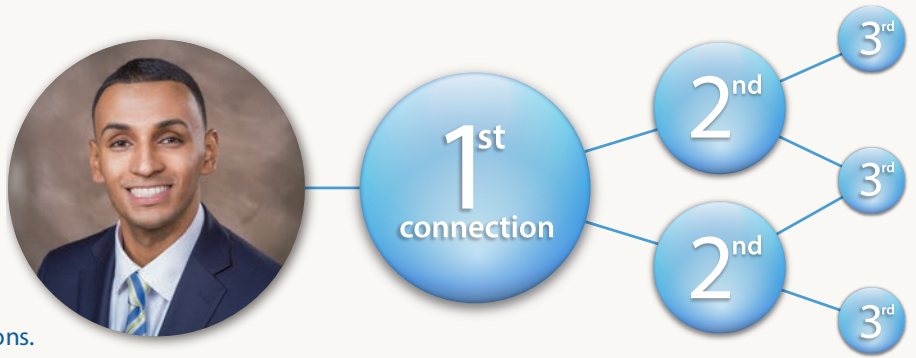
to you? The closer you are in a connection to them, the more names you have access to view and connect to on LinkedIn. To find LIONs, open LinkedIn and click on "Advanced" next to the search bar.

Then in the Keywords field enter "(LION)". I also advise typing in a word that describes your networking focus (ex. accounting). Entering field of interest will narrow down the list to LinkedIn Open Networkers in your area of interest.



THREE DEGREES OF LINKEDIN

LinkedIn works on connections – 1st, 2nd or 3rd level connections show how close or distant someone is to you. Let's say your roommate and chapter advisor are 1st level connections to each other. You connect with your roommate (1st level), and your chapter advisor is now your 2nd level connection. And your advisor's 1st level connections are now your 3rd level connections.



I also recommend connecting to your career services leaders at your school. You will then be able to network with recruiters who are linked to the career services leaders.

BRAND YOU:

Think about when you rushed the Fraternity. How did you land at Pi Kappa Alpha? Did someone reach out to you or did you reach out to PIKE? Did you go through formal rush? What about Pi Kappa Alpha was a differentiator? What is it that about the Fraternity “brand” that made you want to join? By being a member of Pi Kappa Alpha, you are now affiliated with the organization and the PIKE brand.

Now think about yourself individually. Your personal brand is how others perceive you – everything counts. All of your social accounts, how you present yourself in person, and your personal character all build your personal brand. Are you demonstrating the qualities that make you a competitive new hire? Building a solid profile on LinkedIn is helpful to building your story and personal brand. Make sure your photo is professional and not too over the top. Remember, LinkedIn is a professional and business network, so treat it as such – save your crazy pictures for Snapchat. ❖

WHEN BUILDING YOUR PROFILE ON LINKEDIN, MAKE SURE TO:

- ADD A PROFESSIONAL PROFILE PHOTO – Your photo should have sharp resolution and look professional. Avoid cartoons, logos or family and vacation pictures.
- ADD A PROFESSIONAL HEADLINE – Headlines capture viewer interest. Use something other than your job title – be creative, but professional.
- INCLUDE A SUMMARY – An excellent way to highlight your experience and responsibilities
- COMPLETE YOUR EXPERIENCE – In a nutshell, the “Experience” section of your LinkedIn profile is your online resume. Include a short note about your accomplishments or responsibilities within each role.
- RECOMMENDATIONS – Ask peers, professors, and business partners for recommendations – these are a fantastic selling point for anyone connecting with you.
- FOLLOW THE “PI KAPPA ALPHA INTERNATIONAL FRATERNITY” COMPANY PAGE to help you connect with the larger PIKE network.

Pi Kappa Alpha continues to be successful and relevant on our campuses and within our communities. Despite a challenging environment and sometimes unfavorable opinion regarding Greek life, Pikes across North America are having a positive impact and ensuring a top-quality collegiate and alumnus experience for one another. In 2015-16, PIKE chapters added 5,806 brothers to the roll of our 281,748 lifetime initiates, marking the third highest number of

initiations in our history.

PIKE chapters continue to provide the experiential piece of undergraduate education where men develop into future leaders. With an average chapter size of 73 men, the leadership opportunities available in each chapter provide a level of responsibility and accountability that prepares our members for future success. Our chapters combined to raise over \$2.58 million for charities and performed over 368,000 hours of community service.

PIKE University continues to be the premier fraternal education experience with 3,474 Pikes attending these events. PIKE University continues to update and refine curriculum to ensure all chapters have the know-how and tools to stand out on their campus. Looking ahead to 2016-17, the *True PIKE Experience* membership development platform has been updated and will be implemented in chapters throughout North America. The upcoming year will also bring a renewed assessment and focus on member education to ensure our continued success.

Our alumni engagement continues to thrive with over 2,800 brothers serving as local volunteers to mentor undergraduates with over 90 percent of chapters supported by an alumni advisory board. "Once a Pike, Always a Pike" is actively promoted through 150 chapter and area alumni associations and that number is growing.

Highlights from last year follow in this section, but I'd like to highlight some specific areas of success and support as follows:

- Completely revamped curriculum and tracks for all PIKE University Summits. Curriculum is tailored to PIKE University certification levels to ensure fresh and relevant content for each Pike attending Leadership Summits.

- Chapters continue to excel with 30 chapters performing at the "Excellent" level and 76 at the "Near Excellent" level even after re-baselining the chapter assessment to raise the bar on expectations of success.
- Since adoption of the Health & Safety initiative in 2014, chapter consultants have delivered FHSI training to 90 percent of chapters on preventing sexual assault, responsible use of alcohol, and moving into this year, understanding the dangers of hazing and how to prevent hazing from taking a foothold in chapters.
- Addition of several new online educational modules and volunteer programming curriculum to support our 2,868 PIKE Volunteers
- Addition of new young alumni and regional volunteer recognition
- Over \$9 million dollars invested by PIKA chapters and house corporations into PIKA Real Estate
- Completion of a three-year plan to provide some much needed improvements to the Pi Kappa Alpha Memorial Headquarters
- Enhanced focus on marketing and communication, including a new website which was awarded by an industry trade association as the second best website among all Greek organizations
- Held the most highly attend convention in Fraternity history in New Orleans, Louisiana, with over 850 Pikes in attendance. Both undergraduates and alumni reaffirmed their commitment to success and the best lifelong fraternal experience in the world.

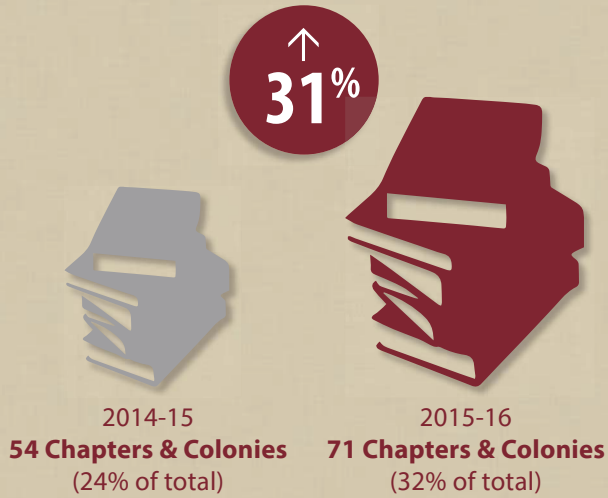

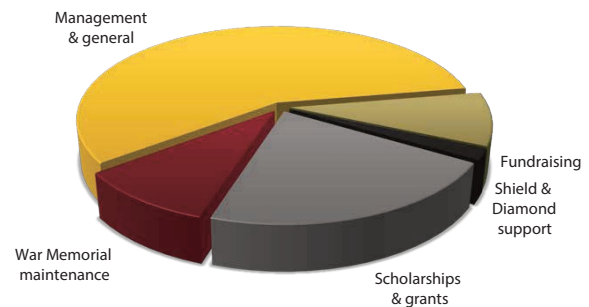

The Pi Kappa Alpha Foundation is supported by Pikes, their friends and families. Revenue comes from individuals (cash, stock, bequests), chapters (via the $\phi\phi\kappa\alpha$ Club), company matching, family foundations and other organizations, as well as investment income. The PIKE Foundation's investment portfolio is managed by a professional firm with oversight from the board of trustees. In 2015, contributions and revenue totaled \$2,531,627 and the Endowment Fund

realized an increase of nearly a half million dollars. Over the past seven years, the Endowment Fund has grown by 119% and has a balance of \$8,709,221 as of June 30, 2016.

The PIKE Foundation is committed to practicing good stewardship with all monies entrusted to us. Accordingly, the financial reporting and operations of the Foundation are independently audited each year. Like most nonprofits, the PIKE Foundation classifies expense in three categories: program expenses, fundraising expenses and administrative expenses. Our program expenses are the funds used to help achieve measurable results for the Fraternity and its members. Program expenses not only include the dollars awarded to the scholarship and grant recipients, but also the cost associated with achieving the Foundation's charitable mission as qualified by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). In 2015, program expenses totaled \$793,838 (57% of total), up 3% from 2014.

MICHAEL L. AINSLIE

(Vanderbilt, Sigma '62)

Former President and CEO, Sotheby's

Brother Ainslie has enjoyed a long career in business and not-for-profit leadership. In 1984, he became president and CEO of Sotheby's, the worldwide auction and real estate company. Over the next decade, he led a team that changed the global auction business into the lively private collector auction world of today. In addition to strengthening Sotheby's 85 global offices and sales rooms, he led expansions in Russia, Japan, Korea, and Israel. Ainslie served as the first chair of the Posse Foundation board, partnering with founder Debbie Bial to make Posse the country's leading college access program for inner city public high school graduates. Additionally, Ainslie has served on many boards, including Vanderbilt University, the United States Tennis Association, the St. Joe Company, the International Tennis Hall of Fame, and Lehman Brothers. He was recently involved in a campaign to establish the Sigma Leadership Fund, a scholarship for members of the Colony at Vanderbilt, held by the PIKE Foundation. Ainslie, a Tennessee native, graduated from Vanderbilt University where he served as Sigma Chapter treasurer before completing a term as president of the student body. After traveling abroad on a Corning Foundation World Travel Fellowship, he attended Harvard Business School, receiving his MBA in finance in 1968.

Student's Memory Preserved in Scholarship

Chad Eatherly (Missouri, Alpha Nu '97) was more than just a member of Pi Kappa Alpha. He was a shining example of the Fraternity's values. A former University of Missouri student, Eatherly died on March 5, 1999. His memory has been kept alive, however, through the Chad Eatherly 5K Memorial Fun Run in Columbia, Missouri, where he made such a huge impact.

Eatherly was born in Memphis, Tennessee on March 4, 1978, and was the second of three children to Charlie and Cheryl Eatherly. He pledged the Fraternity in 1996, and alumni fondly remember him as a new member educator. He often roamed the halls of the chapter house, for example, to make sure new members were adjusting and had someone to talk to about college life.

"After Chad's death, several of his Fraternity brothers wrote us to share the impact Chad had on their lives," Cheryl said. "The resounding theme was how he stood up for his values and taught them how to cherish the little things in life. He willingly listened to their problems and showed them how to be better men."

Others remember him for his commitment to bettering lives as a peer educator for the Wellness Resource Center. He would teach MU students about rape awareness and the dangers of alcohol. Before his death, the university announced he would receive an Unsung Hero Award for his tireless efforts. He received the award posthumously on March 6, coincidentally the day after his death.

Kim Dude, director of the Wellness Resource Center, founded the memorial fun run and has carried the torch of Eatherly's memory since the beginning.

"It has been an honor to carry on the legacy of Chad Eatherly for all of these years," Dude said. "I love his family and friends have enjoyed becoming part of such a wonderfully supportive group of people. No wonder Chad was such a fantastic person."

April 17, 2016 marked the 18th and final run.

"Over the years, the run became a celebration of Chad's life, and particularly a celebration of his accomplishments while at Mizzou," Charlie Eatherly said.

Chad Eatherly's older sister, Christy, is married to Aaron Cassat (Missouri, Alpha Nu '99), and they have three children in Memphis. Eatherly's younger brother, Chase, also became a Pike (Virginia Tech, Epsilon '01). He and his wife, Melissa, have two children and they live in the Washington, D.C. area.

In addition, the men of Pi Kappa Alpha raised more than \$10,000 during PIKE Spike 2000 to establish a scholarship in his name. The annual \$500 scholarship recognizes the chapter's most outstanding new member, and it was awarded at the run to pay tribute to Chad's role as an educator and mentor.

The PIKE scholarship will continue for new members, and Eatherly's legacy is still taught to incoming classes. Anyone who visits Alpha Nu Chapter can view a painting of Chad that hangs in the front room. His favorite quote was, "Build your hopes on things eternal, for they are the things that never break." For many, his memory is eternal. ❖

IT'S A BROTHERHOOD THING

The Pettus brothers draw on skills learned in the Fraternity as they run their industry-leading business.

A deafening roar fills the stadium as the engines are started. A volcano of cheers erupts, spilling joy, as the team scores the game-winning touchdown. We've all sat in a stadium where bonds were strengthened and lifelong memories were made. Estate Planning Ideas for Retirement Accounts

With retirement plan assets subject to federal estate and income taxes, approximately 70% of these assets can go to the IRS instead of your intended beneficiaries at the time of death. Of course, retirement plans still serve very valid purposes – such as income tax deferral during your lifetime. The tax problem principally arises at the time of death. Is there a better way? Yes. IRAs and other retirement plan assets make the perfect charitable gift at the time of death.

Planning Idea #1. 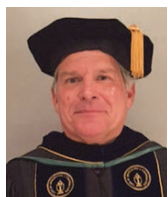

LaForge Takes Office as President of Gulf Coast Conference

Delta State University President **William N. LaForge** (*Delta State, Zeta Beta '69*) will add another prestigious leadership post to his list of accomplishments as he takes office as the president of the Gulf South Conference at the league's annual summer meetings. He has spent the past two years as vice president of the GSC.

"I am thrilled and honored to be able to serve the GSC and Delta State in this new capacity," said LaForge. "I look forward to working with the CEOs, ADs and staffs of our member institutions, Commissioner Matt Wilson, and the conference office staff in advancing the interests of the league. We are in a position of strength to expand and I welcome the opportunity to work with colleagues as we move the GSC forward."

The GSC, with offices in Birmingham, Alabama, sponsors 17 sports at the NCAA Division II level and features membership across Alabama, Georgia, Florida, Mississippi and Tennessee. In its 46-year history, the GSC has won 49 national team championships in 13 sports and more than 100 regional titles.

The president of the GSC oversees the board of directors for the league and is responsible for chairing all board and general session meetings; appoints all standing and special committees and their chairs; calls all special meetings of the conference and executive committee; represents the conference in all of its business; and is legally empowered to bind the GSC when the commissioner is unavailable.

"The Gulf South Conference is lucky to have President LaForge serve as president of the GSC and chair of our board of directors," said Wilson. "He is a great supporter of the Division II model and is a consistent advocate for the GSC, its member institutions and student athletes. I look forward to working alongside President LaForge during his term."

LaForge's election as president of the GSC continues Delta State's longstanding tradition of leadership

within the league. In the summer of 1970, DSU was one of six charter institutions that formed the GSC. Since that time, the Lady Statesmen and Statesmen have won 44 league championships, including the 2015-16 women's basketball and men's baseball titles.

"The GSC is one of NCAA Division II's premier conferences, and President LaForge's leadership will be a major asset to the league as we move forward," said Ronnie Mayers, DSU director of athletics.

Earlier this spring, LaForge was selected to serve on the NCAA Division II Presidents Council, the highest governing body of Division II responsible for implementing policies adopted by the NCAA Board of Governors.

LaForge represents those active Division II institutions in Region 2, which include schools in Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, Puerto Rico, South Carolina and Tennessee.

The council is a 16-member body that is based on a weighted regional representation by institutions and includes one president or chancellor per region for every 22 institutions in that region. In addition to setting policies adopted by the NCAA Board of Governors, the Presidents Council establishes and directs the general policy for Division II, with all other Division II committees reporting either directly or indirectly to it.

Lambda Mu Chapter at Embry-Riddle inspires a brother's dream of becoming an American

“To me, The United States is the ultimate beacon of hope. You can be anything in this country. I owe it to myself to make my dreams happen because I'm here. I'm driven by pride, [knowing] I can contribute to society. The rest of the world looks up to that motivation. That's powerful.”

Ben-Joel Ndjami (*Embry-Riddle, Lambda Mu '13*) was born in Cameroon. When Ndjami was 14, his mother made the courageous 6,882 mile move to the States in order to find a better life for her family. As the oldest son, Ndjami stayed behind to watch after his brothers and sister. Two years later, his life was changed forever as he and his siblings reunited with his mother in Maryland.

“Immediately, I realized that everything, down to the way people think in Africa, is different compared to America. It was a shock.” Ndjami notes that getting acclimated wasn't easy – especially meeting people. Knowing that he wasn't born here made him work that much harder. “My mother took a risk by coming here alone. She chose to work tirelessly for my education. Anytime I want to get lazy, I think of her and get up,” he said. Small norms such as ordering food were intimidating. “I learned quickly to start small and learn from there. Conquering social conversations has been a milestone for me,” he said.

Despite the challenges, discouragement never broke his spirit. “I began to treasure everything I learned. When I could recognize a meaningless country song, it felt like a blessing.” However, social norms weren't the only thing that interested Ndjami. Full of fire to succeed, he developed a passion for aviation. After graduating high school, he enrolled at The Aviation Institute of Maintenance in Virginia where he studied for 18 months.

Hungry for more, Ndjami packed up once again and moved to Daytona Beach, Florida for Embry Riddle Aeronautical University. “When I got to ER, my drive to create my own destiny really kicked in. I began to question myself about self-limitations.” I wondered, “Have I been aiming too low?”

As he started to create goals for his career, he realized he was missing the American culture he desired. “The day I noticed Pikes, they were all in suits. Curious, I sparked a conversation. I realized they were the perfect gentlemen, involved on campus, and to me, they seemed like ideal men of society. I knew then that I wanted to join them and grow.”

“At Embry Riddle, my PIKE brothers were from everywhere – some were immigrants just like me. PIKE taught me how to make friends. Recruitment and social events forced me to go out and just talk to people. I feel like I'm finally at a place where these things are second nature,” said Ndjami.

“My brothers encouraged me to be myself and celebrated my differences,” said Ndjami. Yet, his time in the Fraternity amplified his motivation to become an American. “I never

wanted to be a citizen more than when I spent time with them. Taking part in events such as Fourth of July began to stir my desire deeper. As a PIKE, I felt proud to be a part of a team,” he said.

After waiting five years to become eligible for citizenship, he applied in fall 2015. Soon after, they took his fingerprints and ran a background check while he studied for his test. “I was ready to prove myself. I longed to be a part of the way Americans cheer for each other in times of crisis and in celebration,” he said.

The day of his citizenship ceremony, Ndjami's PIKE brothers were in attendance. It was his moment to be celebrated. Of course, his persistent personality hasn't stopped him from peaking that day. “I'm very proud to be an American. But, until I meet all of my goals, it feels like a half-measure. In my heart, I ask if I'm truly an American now. I want to know without a shadow of a doubt that I've given this country all I can. It will always be a journey,” he said.

Ben-Joel Ndjami has now relocated to Washington, D.C. where he works for The Boeing Company as a financial analyst. Long-term, he wants to start his own airline and is determined to fulfill his potential. Short-term, Ndjami is excited to vote in his first presidential election this November. “I look forward to creating history. No matter what happens, this is still the best country in the world.” ❖

Brother Watkins attended high school at Sidney Lanier in Montgomery, Alabama and attended Auburn University, where he graduated in 1956.

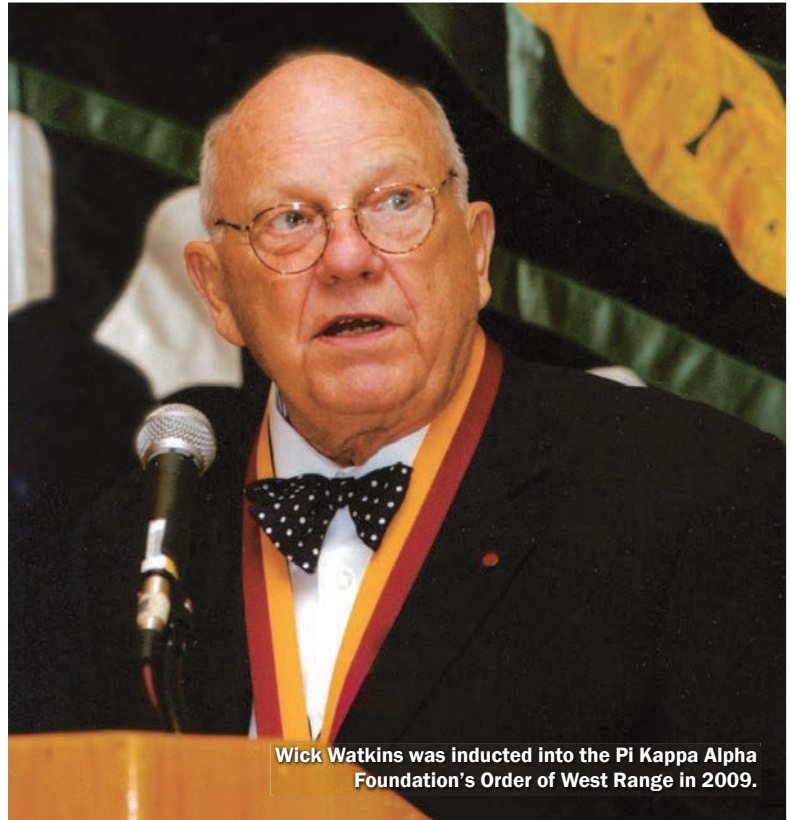
While attending college, he served in the U.S. Marine Corps from 1953-55, one of the proudest achievements of his life.

Wick sold roofing for Ruberoid and worked in real estate in Charlotte, North Carolina for many years until moving back to Alabama in the early 1970s. Soon after, he invested into the ICEE business and was the franchise owner of the Atlanta and Birmingham branches. He completed his successful career with ICEE many years later and resided in Auburn, Alabama until his death.

A true southern gentleman to the core, Brother Watkins was a devoted husband and loving father, brother and friend. His passions were his family and many friends, classical music, life on Lake Martin in Alabama, and all things related to Auburn University, of which he was a proud member of the University’s 1856 Society. He was a generous supporter of Auburn University Athletics, Auburn University’s nursing school, Troy University and Huntingdon College, where his wife Shirley received her degree. He also supported the Auburn Knights Orchestra and their alumni association.

On a humorous note, Wick was a founding member of a weekly Friday lunch club of seasoned Auburn-area gentlemen affectionately referred to as the ROMEO Club, an acronym for Real Old Men Eating Out. After one too many times hearing Wick rave about the fun this group had each week, his wife Shirley drove to the restaurant one Friday, sat down at the table with Wick and his buddies, and promptly announced she was joining the club. Immediately thereafter, the lunch club was renamed ROMEOS – Real Old Men Eating Out – and Shirley.

Brother Wick took great pride in doing things his way, including how he corresponded with others. One medium he refused to embrace was email. If asked for his personal email address, he would always reply “www.Wick.com.” When

challenged that this was not an email address, he’d respond, “Just keep sending it to that address – it’ll reach me sooner or later.” Of course it never did, much to Wick’s delight.

Fraternally, Wick was a long-time supporter of Upsilon Chapter at Auburn, serving in various roles, advising the chapter and working with the house corporation. In 2001, he generously established the William C. “Wick” Watkins Endowed Scholarship Fund with the PIKE Foundation which supports Upsilon Chapter’s participation in PIKE University programs. Brother Watkins’ generosity to PIKA earned him membership in the PIKE Foundation’s 1868 Society and the Oak Trust.

The PIKE Foundation recognized Wick for his generous support to both Upsilon Chapter and the entire Fraternity by inducting him into its prestigious Order of West Range at the Orlando Convention in 2006.

WILLIAM EARL "BILL" SEXTON
(Alabama, Gamma Alpha '52)



Bill Sexton entered Chapter Eternal on May 14, 2016. As a student at Huntsville High School, he lettered in basketball, which led to a scholarship to the University of Alabama. Serving as the basketball team captain during the 1954 season, Sexton earned letters in both basketball and tennis.

After receiving his bachelor's degree in education, he continued his education at the University of Alabama, earning his master's degree. Following graduation, he served as a 2nd lieutenant in the United States Army.

In 1959, Sexton entered the dry cleaning business and started Sexton, Inc., a family investment company engaged in private equity, real estate and venture capital. He became a highly respected entrepreneur, businessman, philanthropist, and community leader.

He was instrumental in the creation of the Industrial Development Association, a branch of the Decatur Chamber of Commerce, in an effort to attract new businesses and industry to the area. He was a member of the University of Alabama President's Cabinet, as well as a member of the John C. Calhoun College Foundation, and board chairman of the Decatur Municipal Utilities Board. In addition, Brother

Sexton was a founding director and chairman of the board of First American Bank. When First American merged with Alabama National Bancorporation, he joined the board of Alabama National.

Sexton was a founding member of Decatur General Hospital's Foundation Board and spearheaded a \$1 million campaign to build the Oncology Clinic at the hospital. For his efforts, he was Decatur General's John A. Caddell Gala IX honoree.

In 1994, Sexton established the Sexton Family Charitable Foundation which he used to support charitable organizations both locally and throughout the state, primarily focusing on health care and research, education, the arts, and athletics. The William E. Sexton Endowed Scholarship in Education was established in his honor the same year.

After graduating from college, my career took me away from Louisiana. Five years later, I had the opportunity to return to Monroe and start my own business. At that time, Regional President Tommy Walpole (*Louisiana-Monroe, Eta Omicron '80*) contacted me asking if I would be interested in an advisor role. My undergraduate time in PIKE taught me professional skills that helped me after college, so I knew that I wanted to give back to the lives of other young men. Tommy, sensing my commitment to serve, said, “I have the perfect opportunity for you. How about being the education advisor?” I knew it was the job for me, so Tommy and I spoke for a few hours about all of the possibilities of serving in that role.

Before I became the education advisor, the chapter had a good continuing education program, but I saw some opportunities for improvement. The original program featured a monthly guest speaker, but I felt the topics weren't quite what a college student needed to hear. To have more relevant topics, I wanted to involve members during the initial planning process.

At the beginning of each semester, I spend time with the continuing education chairman and the rest of the chapter, gauging their interests and identifying possible educational topics for the academic year. By the time we are finished, we usually agree on six to eight different topics. An important part of the

program's success is having the continuing education chairman involved.

Today, the continuing education program is more engaging than ever before. One of the most useful topics I cover is *financial stewardship*. We discuss what it means to establish credit and the brothers are challenged to create a budget a stick with it. These skills are invaluable as they move into the real world.

I am also establishing a mentorship program with the junior and senior members. This will allow them to mentor our freshmen and sophomores, establishing accountability and further strengthening our culture here at ULM. It's an honor to teach as the education advisor, and a blessing to live life with these great young men.

As the education advisor, I believe it is my responsibility to ensure our members are getting the most out of their experience in Pi Kappa Alpha before they graduate. If you're looking to improve your chapter's continuing education program, I would encourage you to get the chapter's opinions and thoughts about the new program and content. Be relevant. Be transparent. Go beyond the “norm.” Create excitement and challenge them. You may help them see beyond the present day and show them a better way in the future as they start a new chapter in life.
