Amagasa (Dodd) L	Deep reddish-orange flowers with red blotches on this low-growing, rounded azalea. Shiny, dark green foliage.
Amy (Dodd) M	semi-double flowers with rich pink petals fading to very pale pink toward the center, Plant matures at 4' to 5'
Annapolis (Marshy Point) M	Large double white flowers enhanced by a lovely green center.
Berlin (Marshy Point) M	Named after the once-divided city in Germany, the azalea has huge, rich pink flowers and wonderful deep green leaves.
Betty Ann Voss (Robin Hill) L	Large double coral pink flowers enhanced with a lovely green throat. Very low, tight plant with rounded leaves
Ben Morrison (Glenn Dale) LM	Upright, flowers bi-color white with prominent red flush. An unforgettable display in spring.
Blaauw's Pink (Blaauw) M	Upright, flowers of salmon-pink.
Bopaluta (Marshy Point) E	Vigorous early blooming azalea has large vibrant pink flowers.
Breathless (Marshy Point) M	Almost called "Colossus" because of the size of the 4-inch plus white flower. Great flower, great foliage, great plant.
Bridal Gown (Marshy Point) M	Flowers are large, single, and white with green spotting in the upper lobe. Large leaves are pointed and glossy.
Buccaneer (Glenn Dale) EM	Glenn Dale azalea with bright orange-red flowers. Upright and spreading.
Carol Kittel (Marshy Point) M	Double white flowers with the edge of each petal frosted with pale lavender pink; fill medium growth. Very Hardy.
Cambridge (Marshy Point) M	Excellent, deep green foliage adorns this upright grower. Flowers are huge double white, a great looking azalea.
Conversation Piece (Robin Hill) LM	Low Spreading plant, flowers are large, white with pink sectoring and solid pink flowers.
Corsage (Gable) EM	Flower single lavender. Very hardy. Broad and open grower, giving willowy appearance.
Daisy (Marshy Point) M	Stunning shade of pink on single flowers. Great green foliage of medium-size leaves.

Dayspring (Glen Dale)	E	One of the first azaleas to welcome spring in late April. Lovely light pink, shading paler towards the throat. An upright, robust grower.
Dorothy Hayden (Robin Hill)	L	Low and mounding, flower very large single white with green in throat. Exceptional dark green foliage.
Dr. H.R. Schroeder (Schroeder)	M	Low to medium growth. Flower single, pastel pink with darker pink edging. Very hardy.
Delaware Valley White (Mucronatum)	M	Medium size plate with white flowers.
Elsie Hyatt (Schroeder)	M	Flowers are pale pink and fully double. Low and dense with excellent foliage. Very hardy.
Elsie Lee (Shammarello)	LM	Low to medium, upright growth. Double, lavender flower. Very hardy.
Evelyn Hart (Linwood)	EM	Medium and full, flower double H-H, clear pink. This late April, early May show piece blooms its head off.
Fancy Pants (Marshy Point)	EM	Azalea flowers don't get fancier than this one. Frilly double, wine red flowers with light lavender center. Plant habit is upright.
Fashion (Glenn Dale)	M	Hose in hose salmon flowers adorn this Glenn Dale azalea. Good fall color. Makes a showy hedge.
Flame Creeper		Low and spreading with orange red flowers.
George Hyatt (Schroeder)	M	Flowers are ruffled orchid-purple with a red blotch. Low and open growth.
Girard's Crimson (Girard)	M	Vivid deep red flowers with large, glossy green foliage. Compact, rounded grower.
Girard's Fuchsia (Girard)	M	Low, upright and compact; flowers single wine purple.
Girard's Rose (Girard)	EM	Rose pink flowers on this upright grower. Foliage darkens in winter to deep red tint.
Girard's Scarlet (Girard)	M	Fiery red flowers with deep blotch and waxy texture. Small, co
Girard's Pleasant White (Girard)	LM	White single flowers with green spotting in throat. Blooms in mid-may after Delaware Valley White. Growth habit is low medium.
Glacier (Glen Dale)	E	Large white flowers with faint green tone. Vigorous and upright. Excellent textured, large green leaves make this a superior white.
Hardy Gardenia (Linwood)	LM	Low compact growth, flower pure double white. Flower looks like a Gardenia bloom. Excellent dark green leaver.
Hahn's Red (Kurume)	M	Large bright cherry red flowers. Good foliage and medium growth.

Helen Curtis (Shammarello)	M	Low and compact growth, flower double white with yellow in the throat.
Hino Crimson (Kurume)	E	Medium size plant, flowers, small single red.
Hilda Niblet (Robin Hill)	VL	Wonderful large light pink flowers with sectors and splashes of deeper pink. Excellent low and rounded plant habit. Highly regarded, recently introduced, considered one of the best Robin Hills. Zones 5-8, height 1ft by 3-4ft.
Holly Coady	M	Low grower stunning pink and white bi-color flowers.
Irish Cream (Vines)	M	Large, 3"-4", single, white flowers with green-yellow blotch flow like rippling water on this low, spreading azalea. Excellent foreground plant guaranteed to draw attention in any garden.
Janet Rhea (Linwood)	M	Fancy double flowers with red and white shading; low spread growth.
Johanna (Kaempferi)	M	Deep red flower, glossy foliage with red stems.
Kaempo (Fowle)	L	A cross of R. Kaempferi x Gumpo. Flowers are deep silver pink; low thick spreading growth. Covered with flowers in late May.
Karen (Kurume)	E	Fragrant, wavy purple flowers adorn this early bloomer. Foliage turns burgundy in winter.
Lady Baltimore (Marshy Point)	M	Flowers large white with a flush of pink. Outstanding foliage.
Lady Robin (Robin Hill)	L	Low and spreading habit; flower large, white with pink stripes and sectors.
Laura Morland (Robin Hill)	L	Low and upright, flowers semi-double pink with occasional red stripes and sectors.
Laurie Russell (Marshy Point)	L	Delicate double white flowers flushed with pink. Low grower.
Lavender Miss (Marshy Point)	M	Semi-double lavender pink border with pale center make this azalea a knockout. Great foliage on a very vigorous grower
Linda Stuart (Yavorsky)	M	This fabulous azalea's flower buds are white on the lower half and pink on the upper half. If it never flowered, but only formed buds, Linda Stuart would still be a star in any garden. However, its flowers do open to a lovely H-H white with each petal tipped pink. Very hardy.

Lizetta Lynn (Marshy Point)	ML	Very bright, rich, single, pink flowers. Low-medium and compact grower. A very hardy bloomer.

Lolly (Marshy Point)	M	Impressive, very large bi-color flowers with bright red border and light pink center.
Madame Butterfly (Deerfield)	M	Medium, mounding; flower white, flushed lavender. Very hardy and most vigorous azalea of which we know.
Marilyn Merlot (Marshy Point)		Dark green foliage, low growing habit. Wine colored flowers. 1-1/2' x 2-1/2'
Martha Hitchcock (Glenn Dale)	LM	Medium open, flower white center with deep purple margins, very hardy.
Michael Hill (North Tisbury)	L	Single flowers of bright pink cover this ground-hugging azalea. Excellent ground cover.
Midnight Flare (Harris)	M	Deep waxy single red flowers rich in color and substance. Foliage is large and textured and turns dark red in fall. Has Red Red as one of its parents
Mildred Mae (Gable)	EM	poukhanense x mucronatum. early mid season Very spreading. One at Gable's grew 30 feet wide in 50 years.
Miss Suzie (Harris)	M	Flowers are hose in hose red with red stems; plant habit is low and spreading, similar to Hershey's red, but better.
Mother's Day (Kurume)	M	Large vivid red hose-in-hose to semi-double flowers. Rounded, compact grower.
Mrs. Mary Schroeder (Schroeder)	M	Upright, flower single clear pink with red dorsal spotting. Excellent new pink similar to Tradition, but a prettier flower.
Mrs. Nancy Dippel (Schroeder)	EM	Beautiful double cream flowers are accented with lavender markings. A hybrid of Elsie Lee that keeps its parent's hardiness.
Nancy of Robin Hill (Robin Hill)	LM	Low, flower large double, soft pink. Very showy and very hardy.
Ocean City (Marshy Point)		Large Glossy foliage and soft single pink flowers. Tinges of yellow in the throat. 4' x 4'
Olga Niblett (Robin Hill)	LM	Flowers have a yellow cast with deeper flush of yellow from the throat. A tall and full growing plant.
Opal (Linwood)	Fall	Double lavender pink flowers bloom in the fall. Plant growth is low-medium and spreading.
Pam Corekran (Marshy Point)	M	Exciting new bicolor with dark green foliage and magnificent flowers with dark red borders and light pink centers. The impressive show comes all at once in mid-season.
Peggy Ann (Kaempferi)	EM	Low and dense. Hose-in-hose white flower with ed edge.
Pink Pancake (North Tisbury)	VL	Prostrate, flower light pink with red flare spreading from upper lobes.

Pink Sky	M	Hardy selection, has a bountiful strong single pink flower. Dark green foliage. 3' x 4'
Powder Cheeks	M	Good grower has an elegant flush of single pink flowers. 4' x 4'
Purple Splendor (Gable)	M	Rich orchid purple hose-in-hose flowers on this vigorous, upright grower.
Red Magic (Marshy Point)	M	If you like big glossy rich red flowers, this is it. And how about the foliage? How does large shiny and deep green sound?
Red Romance		Blooms in spring and in late summer. Red flowers. 3' x4'
Renee Michelle (Girard)	L	Large watermelon pink flowers on a low, full grower. Foliage is dark green. A cross of Boudoir x Pink Gumpo
Robin Hill Gillie (Robin Hill)	M	Large peach pink frilly; low medium growth and spreading.
Ruth Foard (Marshy Point)	M	Large bicolor flowers have peachy red borders with cream center. Low medium growth.
Ruth May (Oliver)	M	Delicate salmon-pink flowers with a white band from tip to throat of each petal. Uncommonly warm tone. Medium, compact.
Secret Wish (Roslyn)	LM	This azalea has the largest, double white flowers we have seen. There are so many petals that the flower resembles a camellia. Plant habit is full, growing up to 5 feet.
Seigai EM "Spider Azalea"		A most unusual azalea , a selection of the species, r. linearifolium. Leaves and flowers are very narrow and long, giving it a shaggy dog appearance. Flowers are luminous pink. Leaves are fuzzy. Medium, upright growth habit.
Show Girl (Marshy Point)	M	Large frilly double white flowers with a light pink flush. Foliage deep green and pointed.
Silver Sword (Girard)	M	Medium grower, flower rose pink, foliage is silver-variegated.
Sir Robert (Robin Hill)	L	Very low and dense, flower very large pale pink with deeper stripes and sectoring. Has rounded and neat appearance.
Superstar (Marshy Point)	LM	This Ben Morrison sport has its parent's upright habit. Flowers are gorgeous pink and white bi-color with a star shaped variegation.
Susan Pool M (Schroeder)		Single, bright red flowers. Hardy.
The Robe		Strong variegated foliage and red flowers. 3' x 3'
Tina's Whorled (Clagett)	M	This azalea is unique for its strap petals of rose-maroon that are formed in a whorl. It will grow to 3 to 4 feet, with a round appearance.
Touchdown (Marshy Point)	M	Hose-in-hose, large deep red flowers with larger glossy leaves.

White Goddess (Marshy Point)	M	Large, frilly white flowers with green dorsal spotting. This azalea is a vigorous grower and has beautiful deep green foliage.
White Gumpo	L (Satuski)	Dwarf, compact, flower large, white, single.
White Head (Robin HILL)	L	Low and spreading, flower large white, with salmon red sectoring. Similar in flower appearance to Conversation Piece, but has superior plant habit and is much hardier.
W.W.Vines (Vines)	VL	Narrow, pure white petals combine to make the flowers on this azaleas a read attraction. Blooms mid-June and has a low growth habit.
YUKA (North Tisbury)	L	Low and spreading. Large, single flowers can be white with green throat, white with shades of light pink, white with rich pink, totally light or rich pink. Also sectors, stripes and flakes. Great foliage, as well.

Absolute Citron (Rabideau) -15F M	Bright yellow color, compact habit and heavy budding combine with hardiness, good foliage, and bigger flowers with a blotch . Flowers open from deep yellow buds to bright, medium-yellow with red speckling on the upper lobe. 4x4 feet in ten years.
Accolade M (Shipiro)	Purplish-red in bud opening white, suffused strong purplish pink. 6' x 5' (30 yrs)
Adelphia (Dexter) -5F	Flowers ruffled, medium purplish pink at edges palling to white at center. 5ft in 10 yrs.
Albert Close L (Frazer,Gable) -10F (Max x Macrophyllum)	Bright rose pink, chocolate-red spotting in throat. Connical truss of 23. 5 FT/10 years Leaves bluish green retained 3 years. Heat and sun tolerant.
Anita Gehnrich M (Waldman)(Hon. Jean Marie x Yakushimanum) -15F	Same parents as Solidarity. Same very dark green foliage of heavy substance but Anita's leaves and flowers are smaller. 4' x 4' Flowers many retain more color than Solidarity when opened.
Ann Cree M (Degronium ssp. Yakushimanum, exbury form x chevalier felix de sauvage) 10 F	Low and compact, to 1.5ft, midseason, covers itself with deep pink buds opening to light pink flowers with prominent deep pink blotch. Truss holds 25 ruffled flowers

Arlequin(harlequin) M (Vossberg) -5F	Flower widely funnel-shaped, frilly, 3¼" across, deep purplish-pink at edges, fading to near white at center and 2 small rays in dorsal throat. Held in ball-shaped trusses of 10-15 flowers. Leaves elliptic to narrowly elliptic, apiculate apex, cuneate to rounded base, flat with slightly undulate edges, 4" - 6" long, slightly glossy, olive green, retained 2 years. Upright grower. (Pygmalion x haemotodes) x (Wellfleet) 5'/10yrs.
Azurro M (Hachmann) -15F	There are not many, other good low dark purple Rhodies. Intense, dark violet with an even darker purple flare from the throat. Excellent dark green foliage with red stems. Low, compact and wide. 4 ft. tall.
Babylon E (Reuthe) -10F	(calophytum x praevernum) Tall mounding plant, Magnificent trusses 4"-5" white flowers with striking red blotched throat. Exceptionally long leaves with red stems. Although a hybrid it retains the look of a Calophytum 6' x 6'
Balfourianum EM -10F	A species, this selected Phettplace seedling opens apple-blossom pink on a hardy plant growing to 5'tall x 4' wide.
Barmstedt M (Hachmann) -15F	Red buds open to lovely shades of rose pink with a lighter center. Dark leaves are held upward and erectly, giving an interesting appearance. New foliage is silvery blue.
Beechwood Pink M (Herbert) -15F	Joe Gable cross. Registered by Charles Herbert founding member of the Phila. And Valley forge chapters. Flowers bright fuchsia pink in large trusses. 6ft in 10 yrs.
Bellefontaine L (pike) -15F	Fortunei x Smirnowii, Flowers deep-purplish-pink with olive-brown flecks on dorsal lobe openly funnel shaped waxy lobes. Fragrant. Leaves glossy dark green, slight white indumentum retained 2 yrs.
Bellringer M (consolini) -15F	Creamy yellow flowers with strong yellow blotch. It develops into an erect, well shaped plant with shiny dark green leaves. An excellent plant for a spot of mid-season color. 6' x 4'
Belva's Joy EM (C. Smith/Sanders) -5F	Flowers campanulate, red non-fading, in flat trusses of 15-20. Leaves oblanceolate, glossy, dark green, with white felt like indumentum, fades to tan. Low, compact grower, dense, upright habit, reaches 2'x3'.
Berliner liebe ML (Berlin Love) -5F	Flowers rose pink, center paler with brown spotting, fading to a harsh bluish pink, in compact trusses of 14-21. Thick pointed leaves on a compact, dense plant.
Betty Hume M -15F (Dexter/Baldsiefen)	4" ruffled, fragrant, multi-colored pink flowers of heavy substance in mid-May. A 4 x 4 feet, sun-tolerant plant.
Big Deal M-ML (Mezitt) -15F	Cream flowers have a deeper yellow blotch. The overall effect makes the flowers seem more yellow. An added winter delight is the greenish-yellow-tinged flower buds. The foliage is dark, matte green, large and rounded on a densely branched, compact plant. Blooms the third week of May. 3x4 feet in ten years.

Blanch's Pride M (Orlando) -15F	Excellent plant habit, vigorous growth, good doer, very floriferous. (Catawbiense V. Glass-Catalgla x Catalode) 8' x 12' (25 yrs)
Bondira's Red EM (Bondira) -10F	Flowers in ball shaped trusses of 15. Openly funnel shape, 5 wavy lobed, strong red in bud, opening to vivid red throughout with small star shape, moderate red marking in throat. Leaves held 2 years, dull dark green, bullate. 4' x 4-1/2' (8yrs)
Bravo ML (Leach) -25F	Flowers light purplish-pink shading lighter in center with sparse brown spotting. Truss holds 11-12 flowers. 6FT in 10 years. Catawbiense, white form x {Fortunei x (aboreum ssp. Aboreum x Griffithianum)}
Brown Eyes M (Dexter) -20F	One of the best all-round growers, it has large, pink trusses set off by a strong bronze flare in the flower. It is very hardy and blooms in the early mid-season. An additional feature is good, deep green foliage with an interesting twist. 5x5 in ten years.
Bureavii M -10F	Flowers Campanulate, white flushed pink to pink sometimes spotted purple. 4ft in 10 yrs. Leaves elliptic up to 5" long salmon pink indumentum turning deep rusty red.
Burning Copper -10F	A charming selection of R. bureavii with dark cinnamon indumentum on the leaves. A low, compact plant with shiny leaves. The flowers are white with maroon flecks.
Buzzer Beater M (Mehlquist/Brand/ UConn.) -20F	Mid-May bloom, the flowers are held in dome-shaped trusses of pale orange-yellow with a strong greenish yellow v-shaped flare on the upper petal. Foliage is moderate olive green. 4x5 feet in ten years.
Cadis LM -15F (Gable)	In late mid-season Cadis blooms fragrant, ruffled, light pink with a yellow flare in the throat. Reaches 6 x 6 feet.
Calsap -25F LM (Gable)	6x5 feet. Blooms third week of May. A super-hardy, well-shaped, upright grower. White flowers in a formal truss with bold purple flare on the upper lobe. A show-stopper.
Calsap LM xPachysanthum -10F	Compact plant with flowers that a white with a maroon blotch. It has compact trusses, on a hardy plant with light tan indumentum. 3' x 3' in 10yrs.
Cape White -10F (Heritage Plantation)	Blooms second week of May with pale lavender buds turning pure white, ruffled flowers with remarkable grace.
Capistrano ML-L (Leach) -20F	From bud stage to finish, the color is pure, medium to light yellow on a full and dome-shaped truss. A dense, rounded plant, which blooms in mid-May it complements mid-season reds or purples. 4x5 feet in ten years.
Caroline ML (Gable) -15F	Flowers a delightful orchid pink with a light fragrance which is enhanced by warm afternoon sun. Heavily clothed with green leaves with an interesting twist. Thrives almost anywhere, resists root rot.

Carol's Super White (Gable) LM -20F	This is a Catalpa cross from Joe Gable. He describes it as very sturdy, like a loosely branched tree. However it is difficult to root.
Catalina ML (Leach) -15F	Pink flowers that fade to white in the center, resulting in a picotee effect. It has a medium mounding habit with attractive dense foliage with some indumentum. Is somewhat sun tolerant. Considered one of Leach's best. Probably has Yak in its background.
Catalode(county of York) (Gable) -15F	East coast classic from Joseph Gable. Large white flowers accented with a yellow flare, held in a conical truss. Its apple green leaves can be up to a foot long. It's easy to please and fast growing.
Catawbiense Album - 25F LM	A self or hybrid of Catawbiense. Upright, full white truss with yellow-green spotting in the throat. Vigorous, full grower, hardy. To 6 feet.
Charlestown M -5F (Dexter/Everitt/Herbert)	A mid-season bloomer with pink flowers that have a chartreuse throat. To 6 feet x 6 feet in ten years.
Charles Loomis M (John Thornton) -15F	John Thornton has been hybridizing for heat tolerance through the extensive use of the species Hyperthrum. Flowers are rounded trusses emerging first as blush pink quickly fading to white muck like a yak hybrid. The foliage is narrow and recurved. The plant is full and retains its leaves 3-4 years. Buds heavily. Tough plant.
Cherry Cheesecake M (Hachman) -10F	Improved form of Hachman's Charmant. Flowers are white with red edges and a red blotch. Large lush mounding foliage 5Ft in 10 yrs.
Chionoides M -15F	Low medium, white flowers with green spotting in the throat. Very full growing, long, narrow foliage. Unlike most, does not droop foliage in winter. To 4 feet.
Cinquero E (Goheen) 0F 4 ft in 10 years	Flowers Campanulate, deep pink fading to light pink with red basal nectaries. Flattened dome-shaped truss 12-14 flowers. Leaves elliptic, cuspidate apex cuneate base 6"-7" lg. convex bullate, glossy, tan indumentum retained 3 years. Upright dense growth
Consolini's Windmill M (Consolini) -15F	Stunning picotee flowers funnel-shaped wavy edges, fragrant. Vivid purplish-red with longitudinal white band inside 0.4" wide extending along each lobe, with speckled yellowish-green flare on upper lobe. Ball shaped truss 13 flowers. Grows to about 6 ft. tall in 10 years. Cold hardy to 10° F (-12° C). Heat tolerant in zone 9A. Hybridized by Aromi.
R Schlippenbachii (Zone 5b-9a) -25F	Densely branched shrub with leaves in distinctive whorls of 5 at the end of brachlets. Leaves sunburn in sunny locations. Flowers, slightly fragrant, pale pink to rose pink or white, spotted red-brown on 3 upper lobes. Open immediately before leaves emerge. Hardy to -25F 4'/10yrs.
R. 'Snowbird (Biltmore Estates) -15F	This selection from the Biltmore Estate is a natural hybrid of R. atlanticum x R. canescens with grey/green foliage and very fragrant white flowers. Height to 4' x 4'
R. 'Spring Sensation (Aromi)	A Dr. Aromi R. canescens hybrid. Flowers are pastel pink with faint pale yellow blotch. Blooms late April/May.
R. vaseyi (Pinkshell Azalea) (Zone 5-8)	One of the earliest native azaleas to bloom in the spring in shades of pale pink to purplish-pink, and rarely white. It is only found in four mountainous counties in NC at elevations of 3,000 to 5,500 feet. R. vaseyi has interesting wavy edged leaves and outstanding red fall foliage. It is slow to establish in the garden, eventually reaching 6-15'. Seedlings



R. viscosum 'Summer Eyelet' (Zone 4b-9a)	A selection of R. viscosum by Transplant Nursery. Fragrant white flowers in June. Glossy dark green foliage on a compact growing plant to 5'.
R. viscosum (Swamp Azalea) (Zone 4b-9a)	White, occasionally with a pink tinge, rarely completely pink, flowers appear after the leaves have expanded with a strong sweet fragrance in June. The flower buds are very colorful, and give added interest in the winter. R. viscosum has wide distribution in the wild from Maine to Florida and makes a good garden plant growing from 3 to 10' tall.
R. 'Weston's Innocence (Mezitt) -25F	Fragrant white flowers on a vigorous compact upright growing plant . It covers itself with blooms in mid to late June. It has glossy leaves, red fall color, and can take full sun. A tremendous native azalea hybrid for the landscape. Height 5' x 3'
R. ' Weston's Lemon Drop (Mezitt) -25F	A Viscosum native azalea hybrid. Peach buds open in July to light yellow flowers with a lemony fragrance that hold up well in full sun. 4 x 4" Winter stems are a distinctive reddish brown.
R. 'Weston's Lollipop (Mezitt) -25F	Blooms in mid-June with fragrant pink flowers with a yellowish flare. 5' x 4.5' Mildew resistant foliage.
R Weyrichii	Large deciduous shrub or small tree with smooth reddish branches. Diamond shaped leaves arranged in whorls of 3 at ends of branches, covered with short brownish hairs. Flowers, openly funnel-bell shaped, mid-spring to early summer., salmon pink to brick red with spots. This seldom seen species is truly a collector's item.
R. 'Weston's Parade (Mezitt)	Blooms last most of July with a vanilla fragrance. Flowers are a strong dark pink with orange blotches. Height 5' x 3'. Leaves turn a bronze-green and orange in the fall.
R. Wood Nymph (Beasley)	A Beasley selection of the Oconee azalea R. flammeum, a natural hybrid, in bright pink/orange.

These fall-blooming hybrids are becoming standard fare in the coldest areas where Camellias are grown.</p>	
<p>Autumn Spirit</p> <p style="text-align: center;">(zone 6A)</p>	<p>This exceptional selection starts blooming very early in the season with some of the most intensely colored flowers of any of the cold-hardy fall bloomers. Many bright, deep-pink petals make up the small-to-medium-sized peony-form flowers. This bushy plant has small, deep-green leaves and is a moderate-to-vigorous grower.</p>

<p>Twilight Glow (zone 6A)</p>	<p>This compact, hardy cultivar was selected from the same test plot as ‘Mason Farm’. The flowers are rose colored, single and the blooms appear in the middle of the fall season, often near Thanksgiving. The flowers tend to open all at once and the blooms cover the whole plant for a spectacular display. The plant grows wider than tall and forms a nicely shaped and dense bush.</p>
<p>Winters Peony</p>	<p>This introduction has light pink peony form flower and it blooms heavily in November and December. The plant develops a bushy pyramidal shape at a moderate rate of growth with small leaves. (<i>C. oleifera</i> ‘Plain Jane’ X <i>C. sasanqua</i> (Narumigata X Shishigashira)</p>
<p>Winters Sunset</p>	<p>For the variegation fanatics, here is a light green margined leaf that appears quite stable. The plant has moderate upright growth and lavender pink single flowers. The small sized blooms are fairly...</p>

ACKERMAN CAMELLIA SELECTIONS

Dr. William Ackerman bred these plants at the National Arboretum after several cold winters, when the only living *Camellia* plants left were *Camellia oleifera*. Dr. Ackerman used *C. oleifera* as one parent of many hybrids to increase cold hardiness, while retaining the showier flowers of *C. sasanqua* and other species. In general, these plants are heavy bloomers and produce a colorful show in mid-autumn.

COLD-HARDY *Camellia JAPONICA*,
INCLUDING THE ‘APRIL SERIES’

There are a very large number of spring-blooming species, but of these, *Camellia japonica* is the best known. The main bloom season starts when weather moderates, possibly as early as February. In general, these are upright-growing shrubs to small trees with a moderate rate of growth. In the years, plants will reach 6 to 10 feet tall while ancient (hundreds of years old) plants may reach 30 feet or more.

The following varieties are the most cold-hardy *C. japonica* cultivars available and are the best choice for growing outdoors in zone 6, the coldest area where Camellias can be dependably grown. A protected site is very important when growing Camellias in colder areas and spring planting is highly recommended. The ‘April’ series was selected from thousands of hybrid seedlings and have been named for the time they are expected to bloom in cooler northern areas. The ‘April’ series survived -9F temperatures. Some Ackermans and a few, old, tested varieties are also listed here.

April Dawn (zone 6B)	The candy-stripe flowers make this a unique plant for several reasons. The flowers are mostly white with a few deep pink streaks which makes it special and occasional branch sports will result in various color patterns such as half deep pink and half white flowers. The formal double flowers are produced in profusion over a long season from mid to late season. The habit of the plant is upright and very vigorous. At first young plants will grow rapidly and after a few years they fill in very nicely. A five foot specimen in New Jersey has bloomed well for several years. ('Bernice Boddy' × 'Herme')
April Rose (zone 6A)	- This very compact and relatively slow-growing plant has rose-red formal double flowers. The medium sized blooms are very pretty and bloom late in the season. After the severe cold of January 1985, this was the only Camellia among thousands in our collections, to open flowers to any degree, and cold-induced dieback was not recorded in any of the three individuals in our test plots. ('Bernice Boddy' × 'Kumasaka')
April Snow (zone 6b)	This relatively slow growing, well formed plant has white, rose-form double flowers. The medium to large flowers open late in the season. Good white clones have been the most difficult to select in general because the white petals show cold injury much more easily than pinks and reds. The leaves are exceptionally large. ('Triphosa' X 'Betty Sheffield Supreme')
Governor Mouton (Zone 6b)	This eighteenth century introduction survived our coldest winters and huge plants can be found in older gardens. The medium sized peony form flowers are an oriental red often with white splotches. The bloom season is early and the plant is vigorous with a slightly spreading growth habit.
Kuro Delight (zone 6A)	This plant has the darkest-red flowers of an of the cold-hardy Camellias. The medium-sized, maroon-red flowers are usually semi-double and mid to late season. At first, the plant has slow, spreading growth, but becomes a moderate, upright grower, once established in the ground. The leaves are long and narrow, like those of a peach tree.

HARDY TEAS

These varieties are the plants that green, black, white and oolong tea are produced from. Each type (green vs. black) is made using different amounts of 'fermenting' and processing before drying of the leaves. If similar processing is used, each of the varieties produces a tea with very similar taste. Tea is harvested many times a year (as often as every 10 days) so a large plant can produce quite a pit of tea, but a hedge may be needed to supply a family with a daily supply. Freshly made tea is much superior to tea which has been stored for even a few months. Tea blooms in early fall to early winter. They have survived temperatures down to 0°F.

Camellia sinensis var. sinensis ‘Small Leaf Tea’ (zone 6B)	An excellent shrub for the landscape that has small white flowers in the early autumn, and a compact branching habit. The plant usually grows as a multi-stemmed, small shrub, usually not growing more than 6 feet tall. Tea is tolerant of a wide variety of conditions, from full sun to deep shade, although the ideal situation is light shade or half a day of sun. This variety is widely cultivated in Japan.

Acer japonicum ‘Paul James seedlings	
Acer Palmatum ‘Red Filigree Lace	One of the most finely cut Japanese Maples. Color deep red/crimson. Pendulous habit. Grows slowly 4 x 5ft. In fall turns to bright crimson.
Acer palmatum ‘Butterfly’ (zone 5-8)	An upright, variegated small-growing Japanese maple. Much admired for its foliage.
Asimina Triloba(Paw Paw) (zone 5-8)	15-20' high and wide. Leaves turn brilliant yellow in fall. Unusual, fleshy 3-5" long, round to oval fruit, green when young, ripen to brownish/black with wrinkled texture. Becoming soft when ripe. Almost custard like, sweet rich taste similar to bananas.
Cercis canadensis (Eastern Redbud) ‘Little Woody’ (zones 5-9)	Slightly smaller reaching 8 x 6 feet with crinkly leaves of attractive blue-green.
Chamaecyparis Nookatensis ‘Green Arrow’(Yellow Cedar) (zones 4-8)	Native conifer of pacific northwest. Narrow growth habit 15-18' x 2' (10 years) matures 30-35'tall x 4-5'wide. Full sun best but tolerates part shade. Drought tolerant once established.
Clethra barbinervis (zones 6-9) (Japanese Tree Clethra)	A small tree, to 20 feet, grown for its peeling, stewartia-like bark, blooms in summer with hanging, white sprays.
Clethra alnifolia (zones 6-9) ‘Ruby Spice’	Heady fragrance in pink flowers which do not fade with dark green foliage make this a priceless new plant. Grows to 5 feet by 5 feet.
Franklinia alatamaha (Ben Franklin Tree)	A small tree found by John Bartram in Georgia and named for Ben Franklin, it has never been found in the wild again. White flowers in late summer into frost, resemble camellia. Prefers azalea growing conditions. Grows to 20 feet.
Halesia Carolina(carolina silverbell)(zones 5-9)	A native tree from our south, white, bell blossoms in spring borne in 2-5" clusters, best viewed from below. Grows to 20-40' tall, 15-30' wide. Leaves turn bright yellow in fall. Decorative bark peels in large flat scales.

Idesia polycarpa (Zone 6a)	This tree of medium size produces large pendulous clusters of persistent red berries. This species is the most spectacular berry-producing tree in our garden, a rapid grower with large leaves and light colored bark. Usually male and female plants are needed for berry production. These are unsexed seedlings. 50' high x 25' wide
Magnolia virginiana (Sweetbay Magnolia) (Zone 5-10a)	Creamy white lemon scented blooms in May/June. Leaves are dark lustrous green above and glaucous beneath. Needs moist soils and tolerates shade. Height to 20'
Oxydendron aboreum(Lily of the valley tree/ sorrel tree) (zones 6-9)	Deciduous tree 20-30' high 10-15' wide. Fragrant lily of the valley like flowers in summer. Excellent native tree. Flowers attract hummingbirds & bees.
Sabal Minor (Zone 7a)	This palm sends up fan-like leaves from an underground stem. One of the most hardy palms and native to the Southeastern U.S. 10'tall x 15' wide.
Stewartia Monadelpha(zone 6-9)	Lg shrub to Sm. Tree Dark green foliage turns maroon in fall. Bark cinnamon & smooth in maturity. Flowers early summer for a month white 1" wide Part to full sun.
Stewartia Pseudocamellia(Japanese Stewartia)(zone 5-7)	White flowers in July, exfoliating gray bark, red-orange
Styrax Americana(native snowbell) (zone 5)	This fine textured small tree has small white flowers in profusion early in the season. The flowers are like small bells that hang down from the spreading branches. 10' tall x 10' wide
Styrax Obassa(Fragrant Snowbell) (zone 5-8)	Understory tree 20-30 ft Bell shaped white fragrant flowers with yellow stamens, in 8" lg. racemes in Late May early June. Smooth gray exfoliating bark gives way to orange inner layer in winter.
Trachycarpus fortunei Windmill Palm (zone 7)	Windmill Palm Trees are one of the most cold hardy Palms available. The Windmill Palm Tree has leaves that are arranged in symmetrical crown that is about 8 feet wide. Trunks that are usually covered with a loose mat of coarse gray or brown fiber and can grow to heights of 20-40 feet.
*** SHRUBS ***	
Aesculus parviflora (zone 5-8) (Bottlebrush Buckeye)	A large, upright native shrub, 8-12 feet tall, spreading by suckers to form a grove with foot-long panicles of white flowers in June. Great for massing under shade trees.

Aesculus pavia (Red Buckeye) (Zone 4-8)	The red buckeye forms a large bush to a small tree 12 ft in height. Native to SE but hardy to New England. Small tubular red flowers in loose clusters, May and early June.
Calycanthus floridus 'Athens' (Sweet Shrub, Carolina Allspice) (Zone 4-8)	This is the yellow flowered cultivar of the native Sweet Shrub. It has lustrous deep green leaves and yellow flowers with a sweet pineapple fragrance in May/June. Height to 6'
Chamaedaphne Calyculata 'verdant' (zone 3-8)	1-1/2' high x 3' wide spreading plant. Fine texture with dainty sprays of small evergreen leaves with little white bell shaped flowers that resemble blueberries.
Chimonanthus praecox (Zone 6b)	The fragrant flowers are produced in profusion in early winter. The long glossy leaves give this large shrub additional interest in the summer. This grows well in partial shade and fairly moist soil. 20'tall x 15'wide.
Choisya ternata 'Sundance' (zone 7)	This wonderful small shrub has evergreen foliage with the most recent flush of leaves staying a bright golden yellow and fragrant white flowers in late spring. It requires excellent drainage in partial sun. This is a hugely popular plant in England and France where it is seen in almost every garden center. 6' tall x 5' wide.
Clethra Hummingbird (zone3-9)	Fragrant white to light pink flowers borne on bottlebrush like inflorescences . Mid to late summer 3Ft x 3 FT. Yellow fall color. P/shade for best bloom but is fine in sun or shade.
Clethra sixteen candles (Zone 4-8)	Dirr introduction. Hold flowers upright like candles on a cake. White flowers 4" to 6" lg. From late June into July. Dense mound of foliage and stems. 30" x 42" in 7 years. Spent flower remain upright in winter
Crepe Myrtle America	Red flowers bloom on this beauty in mid-summer
Crepe Myrtle Pink Ruffles	
Enkisanthus campanulatus (zones 4-7)	Elegant, deciduous shrub with clusters of bell-shaped flowers from white to red, these have a graceful, upright form, growing 8 feet high x 4 feet wide. Pest free, in sun or partial shade.
Euonymus americanus Jenkins strain	
Fothergilla "Jane Platt"(zone 4-8)	This smaller fothergilla will reach 30 inches in height.
Fothergilla MOUNT AIRY (zone 4-8)	Introduced by Michael Dirr, this vigorous, upright grower displays a spectacular blend of autumn color and a delightful spring floral show.

V. 'Aurora'	Aurora is a new blueberry variety of <i>Vaccinium corymbosum</i> . It is a productive, very late ripening variety with high fresh market quality intended for areas where northern highbush varieties are grown successfully. Plants of Aurora are vigorous and upright. Canes are numerous, moderately branched and the fruit are well exposed. Its berries are moderately large, have small, dry picking scars, excellent powder-blue color, delicious flavor and excellent firmness. Aurora has a harvest season that begins about 5 days after the variety known as 'Elliott.'
V. 'Briggita'	Bred in Australia from a Lateblue X Bluecrop cross. Upright vigorous bush with production similar to Bluecrop in Australia. Fruit large and firm with a small dry scar. Very light blue. Clusters are loose and ripening is concentrated. Excellent fruit quality and shelf life. Limited availability in the United States.
V. 'Chanticleer'	Chanticleer is a very early type that may compete with Weymouth in New Jersey,
V. 'Collins'	Ripens about 5 to 7 days after Earliblue; susceptible to winter injury; bush is vigorous and upright with some spreading canes. May not sucker freely. Fruit is large, firm, light blue, and has very good flavor and a small scar. Has narrow soil adaptation and produces only moderately
V. 'Duke'	A vigorous, upright bush bearing medium-sized, light blue, firm fruit with a small dry scar. Blooms late, avoiding early frosts, but ripens relatively early, slightly after Bluetta. Plant has numerous canes that are stocky and moderately branched. Buds and wood tolerate fluctuating winter temperatures well. Harvest can be completed in two or three pickings. Flavor is mild-sweet.
V. 'Earliblue'	Season is early, bush is vigorous and upright-spreading; fruit is large, firm, and light blue with fair flavor. Not recommended commercially in many areas because of erratic fruit set. Fruit does not drop easily when ripe. Plants have some resistance to powdery mildew.
V. 'Elliot'	Latest of all cultivars. Bush is vigorous and upright; plants are very productive, hardy, and resistant to mummy berry disease. Berry size is medium, light blue, with firm flesh and only fair flavor; late small fruit can be tart, and berry can be fully blue when not fully ripe. Interplanting with another late-blooming variety has provided cross-pollination and improved size and flavor.

<p>V. 'Herbert'</p>	<p>produces medium-blue berries that ripen in late June and are among the largest and best quality of all the cultivars. This is a vigorous, upright bush that is resistant to cracking and does not shatter. This deciduous shrub is dense with an upright, multiple-branched growth habit. Leaves are elliptical, and can be toothed or entire, to 3 inches long, turning red or yellow in the fall. White, sometimes pink tinged flowers to 1/2 inch across are held in pendant terminal racemes. Flowers are followed by edible, sweet, round, deep blue berries to 1/2 inch across. Many varieties are available, check for the ones that are best suited to your local area. Blueberries love acid soil.</p>
<p>V. 'Late Blue'</p>	<p>Bush is erect, vigorous, and very productive. Berries are firm, light blue in color, have small stem scars, and are fine flavored, but tart; high temperature during harvest may lead to excessive stemminess.</p>
<p>V. 'Northcountry'</p>	<p>The fruit of Northcountry is medium sized, enveloped with a waxy bloom of attractive sky-blue color. The flavor of the fresh fruit is sweet mild, typical of the lowbush blueberry (<i>V. angustifolium</i>). Quality of the processed fruit is equal or superior to Northblue, Northsky, and popular highbush cultivars. Mature plants of Northcountry are 18 to 24 inches high and 30 to 40 inches in diameter. Plants can tolerate midwinter temperatures down to 35° F with little injury. Productivity of Northcountry normally ranges from 2 to 5 lb. of fruit per plant. Under optimum conditions 8 year old plants can produce up to 7 lb of fruit. The ripening period begins approximately 5 days earlier than Northblue and extends for 2 to 3 weeks</p>
<p>V. 'Northland' 4' x4' (zone 3-8)</p>	<p>'Northland' Highbush Blueberry Clusters of dainty, waxy, bell-shaped, white flowers bloom in spring. Flowers are followed by tasty blue berries, which ripen in summer. The fruit is a favorite among humans as well as birds, small mammals and box turtles. 'Northland' has bright green leaves that turn orange in fall. It is also well adapted to a variety of growing conditions. Reddish stems can be attractive in winter.</p>
<p>V. 'Patriot'</p>	<p>Ripens with Collins; plant is upright and vigorous, though only small to medium in height. Fruit is large, firm, with a small dry scar, and of excellent flavor. Patriot was developed in Maine and has excellent cold hardiness; plants are resistant to root rot. Fruit must be completely ripe to have good flavor. Hardy during winter, but blooms early and is subject to frost.</p>

V. 'Rubel'	A wild selection with small firm fruit. Bush is erect and very productive. Flavor is fair. Plants are very stemmy during drought or if harvest is delayed.
V. 'Sierra'	A vigorous, upright, productive bush. Fruit is medium sized with a small dry scar, good color, and excellent flavor and firmness. Because Sierra is an interspecific hybrid of four species, its cold hardiness is unknown.
V. 'Spartan'	Plants are vigorous, upright, and open; fruits are large, firm, light blue, and highly flavored, but plant performs poorly on amended upland soils; partially resistant to mummy berry. Blooms late, but harvests relatively early. Late bloom date helps prevent frost injury.
V. 'Toro'	A vigorous, upright bush that is consistently highly productive. Fruit is medium sized with small, dry scars and good color and flavor. Begins ripening with Bluecrop but has a concentrated ripening, and harvest can be completed in two pickings. Tolerates fluctuating winter temperatures well.
Vaccinium corymbosum x V. angustifolium (Half Highs)	Fruit: berry medium-large; bright blue; firm; small scar and good flavor; very attractive to birds. Plant: of dwarf habit; spherical, about 30-cm spread; resembles lowbush species; small leaves turning red in fall; compact growth habit. Yields about 1/2 pint/bush/ requires moist and acid soil, pH 4.5-5.2, high organic matter. Recommended especially as an ornamental
V. 'Chippewa'	A great compact edible ornamental. This new release from the U of Minnesota grows to 3-4 feet tall and wide. A mature plant produces 4-7 pounds of large, light blue, excellent flavored berries. The foliage turns a fiery red each fall. Zones: 3 to 8
<u>V. Friendship.</u>	Friendship is a true wild blueberry, and was selected from a wild blueberry heath near Friendship, WI, by breeders looking for superior wild stock for improving the genetics of lowbush cultivars. Friendship performed so well in trials, it was released just as nature intended. Friendship reaches 36"-46" tall. It is a very vigorous grower producing 4-8# of medium sized, deep blue fruit. Flavor is comparable to the wild blueberry, sweet and aromatic. Fall color is orange-red, and it holds its leaves longer than other cultivars. Ripening is mid-late season, from mid to late July here in Brown County. Zones 4-7.

V. 'Polaris' (zone 3-7)	Polaris, a 1996 release from Minnesota, is recommended where a cold-hardy, early ripening companion to Northblue or Chippewa is desired. The berries are aromatic and very sweet. For best pollination and fruit set, plant Polaris alongside other cold hardy varieties. 3'-4' mature height.
Vaccinium angustifolium (Low Bush)	A low, straggling shrub, usually 6 in. to 2 ft. tall and wide. Multiple stems; twiggy branches. Glossy foliage turns from red-green in spring to dark blue-green in summer to maroon-purple in fall. Small, white, pink-tinged, bell-shaped flowers are followed by edible blue fruit. The berries are relished by wildlife and humans alike.
Vaccinium vitis idaea (Lingonberry)	Mountain cranberry is a common plant in northern regions of America, Europe, and Asia. In Connecticut, however, it is believed to be extinct. The plant has red, edible berries that ripen in August or September.
V. 'Regal' (Lingonberry)	Newer variety of lingonberry_Developed by Eldon Stang at the Univ of Wisconsin from seed collected in Finland. Regal, was selected for its superior fruit size and precocious bearing.
