GRUNDY CENTER — Andrea Doubet may not know what to do with herself when school returns this fall. Every year since she was 5 years old the routine has been the same whether she was in elementary school, high school, college or teaching herself. Next year, however, will be different.

Last Friday the long-time Grundy Center teacher said goodbye to her final set of students for a final time, ending a 45-year teaching career that started the same place it ended, in Grundy Center.

Doubet's teaching career in Grundy Center started just after she graduated from UNI in 1970. She has taught her students' children and even some of their grandchildren.

"I never expected (to stay in Grundy Center this long), but it's a small enough system that every year something changed so I didn't teach the same thing," she said.

Through most of her career, Doubet has taught fifth grade, including science and reading. She taught in the old elementary building, the upper elementary, the current elementary and the secondary building, including this year in a brand new classroom in the tornado safe addition to that building.

Doubet called fifth-grade the best level to teach in Grundy Center because the children have usually been the youngest in their particular building.

"When they're the youngest in the "It's hard every year (to see the building you can challenge them to be more mature and take on more responsibilities and they go for it and they just soar," she said.

When students are older, she said, particularly the oldest in a building they are different.

"They are ready to move on and they are sort of spreading their wings and want to be less confined," she said. "That's all right. That's part of growing up."

As a science and TAG (talented and gifted) teacher, Doubet has seen teaching go from days when nobody had heard of a computer, let

Council votes down Creekside zoning change

The Grundy Register GRUNDY CENTER planned development of Grundy Center's proposed Creekside, Inc. property hit what appeared to be a temporary snag with a decision of the Grundy Center City Council Monday.

Council turned down a second reading of an ordinance that would have changed the property's zoning from agricultural to R2 residential, allowing for both single- and multiple-family homes.

Councilman Al Kiewiet asked why the zoning was to be changed to R2 instead of R1, which would allow only one- or two-family dwellings. Mayor Brian Buhrow said the R2 proposal was to accommodate an assisted living facility that could also be built in the proposed subdivision.

Kiewiet and Councilman Dave Stefl expressed concern that what had been presented to the council only involved the single-family units and that they had not been spoken to about the proposed assisted living facility.

"The initial presentation would whether or not he could legally re-hour of comp. time, though Council have been an R1 presentation," Stefl lease the location.

Neither Kiewiet nor Stefl said they were opposed to the new proposal, only that it had not been presented to the city council. Stefl said he feels the R2 proposal will eventually be acceptable, though he said he felt the initial proposal was a bit deceptive.

The motion for the second reading never came to a vote as the initial motion never received a second. Stefl asked that Creekside, Inc. return to the council and present their updated plan so that Council can decide whether a zoning change would be appropriate.

IN OTHER BUSINESS, Council approved a resolution to file a citation for Chapter 145 - Dangerous Building. The decision came following a 20-minute closed session to discuss eminent litigation. The location of the building cited was not announced during the meeting and was not disclosed upon further questioning after the meeting due to Mayor Buhrow's concerns over

Historic Preservation Commission member Joan Schuller presented the group's proposed historic district to the council. The district would be on both sides of G Avenue from Sixth Street west to Orion Park as well as the area north of G Avenue to D Avenue between Sixth and Eighth Streets and the area south of G Avenue to K Avenue between Sixth and 12th Streets. The district would also include the entire block on which Orion Park is located.

Council approved a resolution setting wage rates for the city's appointed officers and employees, including the city clerk, public works director and police chief. There was discussion about how to compensate Police Chief Doug Frost for time over his contracted 40 hours. Through the current fiscal year, Frost has been compensated for overtime with compensatory time that he could cash out for his regular hourly rate for each hour he had accrued. The initial proposal was to allow Frost to cash this out on a time and one-half rate for each

changed that proposal to simply pay

Council approved a resolution allowing the Grundy Center Archery Club to use property north of the concrete pile on the city's north side for an archery range. Archery Club member Tyler Witte approached Council about allowing the club to lease the property from the city for \$1 to absolve the city of any potential liability issues and received approval to do so.

Council also approved a resolution authorizing fiscal year-end transfers between funds and approved a request to use Community Betterment Funds to send some members of the Historic Preservation Commission to a Summit Workshop in Winterset June 25-27. It also approved final lease agreements between the City and the YMCA, Grundy Center Preschool and Childcare Center and Grundy County Headstart for use of space at the Upper Elementary Building.

The council approved resolutions updating the city's investment policy, allowing Buhrow to sign an agreement with CPA Dennis Donovan for the Fiscal Year 2015 audit and appointing Jerry Smith as the zoning administrator for the city. Smith later discussed proposed building inspection procedures with the council.

Mary Doak was appointed to the Historical Preservation Commission for a term ending Dec. 31, 2016, replacing Brent Wilson. Buhrow said Doak plans to serve on the Commission only temporarily and will step down at the end of the vear to allow Wilson to return to the Commission.

Council also approved liquor licenses for Scotty's Saloon, The Grundy County Agricultural Society (the Fair Board), the Felix Grundy Festival and Casey's General Store's each location. Cigarette licenses were approved for both Casey's locations as well as Scotty's, Dollar General and Family Foods.

It approved street closures for the Felix Grundy Festival July 10-12, the Kling Memorial Library Reading Program July 29 and Arlington Place June 27 for a car show.

The next city council meeting will be Tuesday, July 6 at 6:30 p.m.

Wellsburg church to dedicate organ

WELLSBURG —The Wellsburg Reformed Church will be dedicating the Hinners pipe organ in our sanctuary on June 14, 2015, at 2 p.m. with a ceremony and organ recital presented by Michelle Andersen, JoAnn Santee, and Dr. Christina (Bausman) Hargis.

The Hinners organ was purchased and placed in the church in 1913 for an approximate cost of \$3,000. It featured 11 sets of pipes and three keyboards. By mid-century, an electric blower filled the organ's wind chest relieving the young men of the congregation from filling the wind chest by turning a pump handle. The organ was refurbished by Watson-Hovind Pipe Organ Company of Galesburg, Ill., in 1976, detaching the console, and including electronic action to the keyboards, plus a variety of new stops.

In 2014, the organ and pipes were taken to the AB Pipe Organ Service in Bolingbrook, Illinois, where the pipes were cleaned and revoiced, the console was rebuilt, a new wind chest, winding, supports and swell enclosure added and a solid state Syndyne MS8400 Control System added. The pipes still remain impressively displayed in the front of the sanctuary.



Supervisors discuss possible economic development changes

GRUNDY CENTER — The Grundy County Board of Supervisors Monday spoke about possible changes coming to the Grundy County Development Alliance.

Supervisor Jim Ross said that there is a possibility that the GCDA could merge with the Butler County Development Corporation. Ross, the Board of Supervisors' representative on the GCDA Board, said Jeff Kolb, who currently serves as director of both the GCDA and Butler County group, said it has been difficult to find a person to fill the Grundy County group's program director position, which is part-time. Ross said if the groups would merge, a fulltime person would be hired to serve roles in both counties and that there would be an attempt to have equal

financial contributions from both Butler and Grundy Counties.

The merger would combine both oversight boards and the groups' as-"Jeff just feels that there are simi-

larities between the counties and that we could work well together," Ross Ross said a decision on the pos-

sible merger would likely be made by the end of the year.

In other business, Supervisors approved a request from Grundy Center's Main Street Iowa Task Force for an in-kind donation of \$750 worth of copying. It also approved a plan document and summary plan description for Grundy County's partially self-funded health plan and third-party administration service and approved a fireworks permit for Kent Nederhoff.

Obedience

The story of Adam and Eve is difficult to understand. Why was eating from the tree of knowledge of good and evil prohibited? The knowledge of good and evil is the root of having a conscience, and having a conscience is invariably praised as a good thing. The account in Genesis links eating from the tree of knowledge with death: "You are free to eat from any tree in the garden; but you must not eat from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, for when you eat from it you will certainly die." (Genesis 2:16-17) Why was it necessary for them to die if they ate from this tree? These are perhaps unanswerable questions, and while it certainly is cause for wonder why knowledge of good and evil is linked to our mortality, perhaps a simpler way to look at this story is to remember that it is part of the creation story, and God is making the rules as he makes the world. What he says literally creates the rules, just as it creates the world, and Adam and Eve were cut off from the tree of life because they were disobedient. Jesus restored our access to it by being obedient to God's will, accepting an agonizing and ignominious death on a cross. Are we being obedient to God's will in our life?

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


the timer. I could cook - I've always been able to make a mean corn souffle and made a few tasty pies when I was younger — I just didn't cook.

dad actually said he was impressed with the way I did things. That felt good to hear.

We'd done a few other fairly simple things together before deciding to get a little more adventuresome Saturday ... with meatballs. I remember the great meatballs my mom made when I was growing up and had mentioned once to her that I might like to try that someday. She said she'd never done them herself either and seemed a little hesitant at first, though we decided to give it a go Saturday.

She called her mom for a recipe and after a quick jaunt to the grocery store we were ready to go. Step one: chop onions. I didn't want to admit this to her (she won't, in fact, know it until reading this) but I had never chopped an onion before. What seems like such a simple task proved to be a major adventure for me. The rest of the prep was really simple until it came time to combine the ingredients and I discovered that I should have chopped my onion into smaller pieces.

Once I got the meatballs into the pan I confess that I was more than a little pleased. Other than the gigantic onions they looked great. And other than a few falling apart as they cooked, they cooked great, too.

Overall we were pleased. We'll make a few changes to the recipe, including adding a little more garlic, and might use a different type of sauce in the future, but I can safely say this one was a success!

Something Pastor doesn't do a lot of at our church is invite guest speakers. Sunday was an exception, and an exceptional one at that.

Clay Geiter was one of those high school kids who really stuck out to me. He had a friendly demeanor and seemed to have good leadership skills ... enough that he took it upon himself to push the GCHS band to fund-raise for new drums and then led the band's new drum line.

Two years later, Clay was asked to speak at this year's baccalaureate service and Pastor said he was so impressed that he felt the need to invite him to speak to our congregation.

Clay's story is a common one — one that a lot of us, including your's truly, can identify with. He went to college and did what he described as "the college thing" for awhile, and it wasn't working out the way he had hoped. He told us Sunday that a chance visit to some friends changed his life. They told him they had seen the cross on his door and then some of the things he was doing and told him he had a choice.

The way Clay described things to us, he had the choice of either walking out the door and likely never talking to those guys again or turning things around. He chose the latter and the rest seems to be history.

Clay's message to us was about not just being Christians when we're at church, but about being Christians all the time. I think that's something we all struggle with at times ... I know it's something I struggle with particularly when I'm alone.

I didn't get a chance to talk to Clay after the service. If I had I would have told him that his words were inspiring and to keep doing what he's doing.

Northey Comments on Iowa Crops and **Weather Report**

DES MOINES – Iowa Secretary of Agriculture Bill Northey today commented on the Iowa Crops and Weather report released by the USDA National Agricultural Statistical Service. The report is released weekly from April through October.

"Unfortunately wet weather continues limit the ability of farmers to get into the field. Soybean planting is now four days behind the five-year average. Southwest Iowa has been the most delayed by the weather with only 37 percent of soybeans planted compared to 78 percent for the statewide average," Northey said

The weekly report is also available on the Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship's website at www.IowaAgriculture. gov or on USDA's site at www.nass. usda.gov/ia. The report summary follows here:

CROP REPORT

Cool temperatures and persistent wet conditions hindered fieldwork in Iowa during the week ending May 31, 2015, according to the USDA, National Agricultural Statistics Service. Statewide there were only 2.3 days suitable for fieldwork. Operators reported standing water in some fields and the need to replant in areas of some fields. Producers are still concerned about muddy feedlots and limited spraying due to wet fields.

Topsoil moisture levels rated to 0 percent very short, 2 percent short, 76 percent adequate and 22 percent surplus. Subsoil moisture levels rated 0 percent very short, 6 percent short, 79 percent adequate and 15 percent surplus. Southwest and south central Iowa both reported 50 percent surplus topsoil moisture levels. South central Iowa reported over one-third surplus subsoil moisture levels.

Ninety-seven percent of the corn crop has been planted, behind last year's progress for the first time this season. Corn emerged reached 90 percent, just 2 days ahead of last year and the 5-year average. Eighty percent of the corn crop was rated good to excellent. Soybean planting reached 78 percent complete, one week behind 2014, and 4 days behind average. Southwest and south central Iowa continued to lag behind in the planting of their expected soybean acreage with only 37 and 50 percent of their soybean crop in the ground, respectively. Soybean emergence reached 53 percent, slightly behind last year and normal. Oat emergence is nearly complete, while oats headed reached 8 percent this week, almost one week behind the 5-year average. Oat condition rated 81 percent good to excellent.

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



Tick season underway in lowa

Spring in Iowa means planting fields and gardens, outdoor recreation, warm days, cool nights and, as a reminder from the Iowa Department of Public Health (IDPH), it also means the start of tick season. IDPH encourages Iowans to enjoy the many opportunities to be active outdoors, while remembering to protect against ticks. Ticks can carry the organisms that cause Lyme disease (the most common tick-borne disease), Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever, and Ehrlichiosis. In 2014, there were 194 confirmed and probable cases of Lyme disease in Iowa; so far this year, there have been two

"The best way to prevent tick bites is to avoid wooded and tall grassy areas, where ticks are usually found," said IDPH Public Health Veterinarian & Deputy State Epidemiologist, Dr. Ann Garvey. If you do

spend time in these areas:

· Wear long-sleeved shirts and long, light-colored pants tucked into socks or boots;

• Stay on trails when walking or hiking and avoid high grass;

• Use insect repellants that contain DEET. Read and follow the label directions for application (DEET is not recommended for use on children under 2 months of age);

• Check yourself, your children and your pets for ticks as soon as you get back home. Ticks tend to prefer the back of the knee, armpit, scalp, groin, and back of the neck.

Not everyone who gets Lyme disease will have the same symptoms, but the best and earliest sign of infection is a rash that may appear within a few days to a month, usually at the site of the tick bite. The rash will first look like a small, red bump, then expand until it begins to look like a bull's eye, with a red center and a red ring surrounding a clear area. It is important to contact your health care provider immediately if you develop this type of rash.

The Iowa State University Medical Entomology laboratory conducts tick surveillance across the state and encourages Iowans to send in tick samples for identification. 



On Thursday, March 19, 2015, competed for scholarship prizes and Joseph Janssen was among 57 students who competed in the National History Bee Middle School Regional Finals held in West Des Moines, Iowa. 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Spartans send Schupbach out a champion

AMES — Grundy Center High School girls' golf coach Rick Schupbach likes to say everything is about the kids. Tuesday in Ames, it was about more than the kids. It was about one more title for the iconic coach of the state's premier Class 1A girls' golf program.

Monday and Tuesday the Lady Spartans overcame the odds that had them as underdogs and brought the school its state-record 14th state championship with a 10-shot victory over New London and Nashua-Plainfield in the Class 1A girls' state golf tournament at the Ames Golf and Country Club.

Senior Maddy Grineski, who along with fellow senior Josie Mc-Martin, played on her third straight championship team said this title means a little more than the others because of the way the Spartans had to overcome the odds.

"We were not really expected to win, we weren't expecting to win honestly," she said. "We were definitely going to try our hardest but we knew that New London was going to be really good because they had all their top scorers back and then Nashua, they have a very good team, too."

"We've had a lot of ups and downs this year in many ways and for them to rise to the occasion I think really speaks to the tradition of our program," Schupbach said.

To emphasize that tradition, the coach brought all five members of the 1991 Spartan team, the first to win a state championship, to talk to the girls.

"I really felt it was important for (this year's team) to see the beginning," Schupbach said. "Hopefully this isn't the end but for me it's the end and it was really nice. I'm really proud of their accomplishment. This is really unexpected so it's really rewarding."

Schupbach was far more interested in talking about the accomplishments of this team than he was about closing this chapter in his own legacy with another title.

"As I've always said as a coach, it's about helping other people achieve their goals, so it's exciting

for me to see this.

"For Jill (Itzen), a dual sport (athlete) to do what she did today and make the difference for us today was amazing; to see the Hockemeyer twins get to play together at the state meet was amazing; to see Kate Ross play steady golf the entire time where last year she had some struggles is very rewarding and then of course to see the seniors go out as they did, three-time state champions, once runner-up, as a coach that's what's rewarding. It is truly not about me, it's about each of the athletes and I am just so proud to see them overcome adversity to win this.

Though Schupbach downplayed the fact that he is retiring from coaching, his players were not afraid to admit they were motivated knowing that this was his last time out.

"That was something we definitely tried for," Itzen said. "We talked about it at regionals. Maddy and Josie said 'We don't want you playing for us, we want you playing for Mr. Schupbach and that's really what it was."

Grineski said the team has often talked among itself about wanting to send their coach out with one more special memory.

"We've had plenty of talks just as a team, not with any of the coaches, about how we need to bring this home not for us but for Schupbach since this is his last year. We knew it would mean a lot to him. We wanted it, too, but mostly for him."

"We definitely wanted to do this for Mr. Schupbach in his last year," McMartin said. "Everything he's done for us has been a great life les-

The Spartans entered the meet ranked No. 3 by the Iowa High School Golf Coaches Association and placed second in their regional. Yet they led by three shots after one day and pulled away slightly on the second day of the 36-hole tournament, shooting seven shots better than any other team. That did not, however, mean there was no drama. Even as scores came in the Spartans were unsure they had won until final tallies were posted on the Iowa Girls High School Athletic Association's Web site many long minutes after competition had wrapped up.

"Oh my goodness I've been an emotional wreck," Grineski said of the long wait. "I've been crying and I've been laughing. I have awesome teammates to back me up and tell me things are going to be all right ... we definitely stick together. This is a one-of-a-kind team."

In the end the Spartans won for the third straight time, sending seniors Grineski and McMartin home knowing that they had been part of teams that placed in the top two at state the past four years. McMartin was at the top of her game both days, placing second in the individual medalist race with a 36-hole total of

"Finishing second, I can't complain, but I left a lot out on the course," McMartin said.

Grineski was the Spartans' second-leading scorer with a 193 while Sarah Hockemeyer shot 194, Abby Hockemeyer 199, Itzen 200 and Kate Ross 201. Though Itzen's score was the Spartans' fifth-best, her second-day 91, a career-best, after an opening-round 109 was the difference between first and second place for the Spartans.

"I just knew that today I was going out to play for not only our seniors but also Mr. Schupbach," Itzen

MARSHALLTOWN – As the Grundy Center boys' golf team saw the first day of competition at the Class 1A meet come to an end Friday, there was a bit of irony in the first round results. The Spartans had posted a 325 total, an identical number to what the team shot on day

one of last year's state meet.

This year, the 325 score put Grundy Center in a tie for fourth place going into day two of the competition. The Spartan team set out to duplicate last year's second day effort of 318, but the second round did not unfold as planned. Unfavorable weather conditions Saturday caused scores to be somewhat elevated, to the point where instead of taking seven strokes off their day one total, the Spartans' two-day total increased by seven strokes.

After all scores were in, Bishop Garrigan would repeat as state champs with a team score of 604, 19 strokes better than last year's winning mark of 623. East Buchanan improved on their fourth place showing last year, taking runner-up honors with 624. New London finished third with 640, Alta-Aurelia went fourth with 649, and Grundy Center ended in the fifth place team spot with 657.

Freshman Kaleb Hagge of Winfield-Mt. Union shot a 74 in the first round and 71 in the second to take medalist honors with a combined score of 145. Sophomore

Logan Capesious of Bishop Garrigan claimed the runner-up spot with 71 and 75 for a 146. Last years' champion Chris Cooksley of East Buchanan ended in a third place tie with Wes Buntenbach of Belmond-Klemme, both shooting 147's.

Sophomores Jake Bangasser and Jesper Holke-Farnam led Grundy Center, both with total scores of 163. Senior Nick Saak came in with a 165, and junior Austin Burroughs shot a 169. Sam Thompson and Tanner Pelzer finished with 171 and 178 respectively.

"The state championship is the collection of the state's best teams and the individual performances at this year's meet was extremely strong," Coach Dirks said "Each of the top four teams posted at least four rounds in the lower 70's over the two days, and even three teams behind us had at least two rounds below the 80 number. We unfortunately only had Jesper Holke-Farnam's first day score of 79 to match with our competitor's numbers."

"Our fifth place finish at the state meet does not diminish the many accomplishments of this team," Dirks said. "Ending the season with a record of 49-8 did not come by accident. This group worked as hard as any I've ever coached."

As the state tournament came to a close three seniors, Nick Saak, Sam Thompson, and Tanner Pelzer wrapped up their golfing careers with the Spartans.

"These three have meant so much to our program over the past four years," Coach Dirks said. "They each helped keep the program's tradition alive while setting the course for a bright future ahead for Grundy Center boys' golf."



The road to state also included a 5-0 win over Center Point-Urbana Thursday, and a 1-0 shootout win over Columbus in the opening round.

I tried to tip it but luckily I got a good spin off the goalie and Erik (Knaack) was right there for the header. It just worked out perfect for us."

"Colton and Josh did all the hard work, I was just there to clean it up," Knaack said.

"Right before that play happened I switched Colton (Dinsdale) and Cam (Kickbush) because Cam looked fatigued and Colt, although he works really hard on the defensive end, I think he's got a little more endurance than Cam," G-R head coach Kirk Dinsdale said. "It was just something we had to do. It was at that point where, do we push him up and take that chance or try and get it to overtime, go to a shootout, what do we do?"

G-R had other opportunities, particularly late in the first half and early in the second half, but Benton's Hermsen either smothered or de-

alone have one in their classroom, to the time when computers are everywhere. She said she was one of the first in the district to get a computer in her classroom after her TAG students were selected to participate in a National Geographic science program. Suddenly her world was much, much larger with teammates all over the world.

"Immediately I understood that we weren't just Grundy Center anymore," she said. "For the kids it opened up to them because we could communicate anywhere, we could gather information anywhere. They put a phone line into my room so we could hook up a modem. It was exciting to do."

One of the National Geographic units tested acid rain. The Grundy Center students put up collectors, tested the rain and shared their data with others who were part of the program. "It was real science that we were

doing," she said. "The kids could see that they were making a difference. It was exciting to them to be a part of that." Science teaching as a whole, she

said, has come leaps and bounds

from when she started.

"When we started out it was in a textbook, they had a few experiments but not many and the textbooks were terrible," she said. "They told us, for instance, for male worms you could take a permanent marker and mark the worm so you could tell them apart. But (the worms) shed their skin, so as soon as they shed their skin the mark's gone and you can't tell one male from another. So they hadn't done the research or they wrote up an experiment and hadn't done it."

Today's science teaching is all about activities and learning from

"It's all activity-based and learning from that and applying what you learn and try it out and deductive reasoning," she said. "(We teach the kids better today) because now if they have that thinking process they can apply it to their life. When they're 25 or 45 if they come across a problem, if something happens in their house, they can figure out how to go through it. I think the thinking process is more almost more important than the outcome."

The reading has also been one of Doubet's favorite things to do with

her students.

"With the reading you get to go anywhere you want," she said. "You pick the topic and you can be anybody you want and go anywhere you want, so that made that fun, too." During Monday's retirement cer-

emony, teachers presented Doubet with the chair she often read in which had been signed by students from throughout the Secondary building.

Doubet admitted it was a difficult decision to retire but admitted that the school's recent financial challenges made her decision easier.

"I figured if there was a financial stress in the system, and I had 45 good years here, that it was time to bow out and let somebody else, younger, have the experience," she said. "Somebody left so I could get hired; it was my time to let somebody else come in."

Doubet said she hopes to travel during her retirement, possibly returning to Europe and seeing the two states that she has never been to, Alaska and Hawaii. She said she also hopes to volunteer in the




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
