


Local champions and stories of transition in Kerry

Kerry Sustainable Energy Co-operative (KSEC): is a community based co-operlocal ownership of Renewable Energy.




KSEC aims to substitute imported fossil fuels with locally sourced Renewable Energy, creating benefits to the local community. We seek to fulfil the vision of a 100% Renewable Energy Kerry by 2030. www.ksec.ie

Niamh Ní Dhúill (Transition Kerry): The community resilience education programme has been run in 6 communities in Kerry since 2014. One of the actions that came from this programme is the community fruit and nut orchard project. Transition Kerry also works

Siamsa Tíre: Caitríona Fallon and her team launched their 'Greening Siamsa Stamsa Tree Tíre' initiative in October 2017. This organisation has recognised the role it can play in reducing the impact of its activities on the environment. It is currently developing policies which will create a long-term environmental strategy for the organisation. This will encompass

a wide-ranging approach to reducing its carbon footprint, waste and water management and improving biodiversity in the grounds around the building. The building has been upgraded recently in all areas of energy efficiency and worked with KSEC, SE Systems and KCC on this Better Energy Community scheme. www.siamsatire.com

Plastic Free Dingle: This is Transition Corca Duibhne's Zero Waste Initiatve. The main aim is for Dingle Food Festival to be waste free by 2020. This year TCD ran a successful volunteer initiative to reduce waste at the Dingle food festival by introducing a festival



pack of reusable tableware and encouraging festival-goers to bring their own tableware from home. Rinse stations to clean dishes between tastings and manned waste segregation bins were located around town. Food outlets were encouraged to use compostable disposables in the transition to re-usables. ttcorcadhuibhne@gmail.com

Some facts about Food that you may not be aware of

If the trucks stopped coming into our ports from the UK and the wider world, the shelves would be empty within how many days?

How much do we spend on importing food (including fruit and vegetables)?

€1 billion

- How much do we spend on imported apples? €100-150 million
- How many commercial apple growers do we have left in the country? Only 40!!

What can we do to change this around?

Grow some of your own food, fruit, vegetables and herbs in your own garden, school or community spaces

Get involved on a local community garden or allotment project

Support your local farmers by buying from them or shops that supply locally grown food

Start a CSA - community supported agriculture scheme where the farmer is guaranteed an all year round income and you get fresh food most of the year

Check out the National Pollinator Plan (www.biodiversityireland.ie) - contact the local biodiversity officer in Kerry County Council and see how your community or school can get involved.
