Spisak to head trustees

Andrew Spisak was re-elected president of the Wayne-Westland school board Monday during the board's annual organizational meeting.

The re-election to a second term was unusual but not unprecedented. Board member Sharon Scott served two terms in the mid-1980s.

Other officers chosen Monday were Sylvia Kozorosky-Wiacek, vice

Group presses for minorities

Charging that the Wayne-Westland school board isn't meeting the needs of some communities served by the district, a group of residents has formed a committee to press for better representation, particularly among minorities.

"We want to do something about our lack of a voice in this district," said Jim Netter, chairman of the Wayne-Westland Citizens for Education Committee. "Given the political strength of the current board and the

politics in the district, that's not going to happen unless we really go out and pursue it."

The non-profit organization will hold its first meeting 7 p.m. Friday, July 28 in the west boardroom at the Airport Hilton, Romulus. The meeting is open to all district residents.

Netter said the goal will be to push for an eventual ballot issue that would allow residents to elect school board members by district. He said the group plans to start a petition drive later this year.

THE WAYNE-WESTLAND Community Schools district encompasses Westland, Wayne, and portions of Inkster, Romulus and Canton Township.

The current board is made up of six residents from Westland and one from Wayne. There are four women and three men, all white.

Netter, who is black, said last month's school board election proved how difficult it is for minority candidates to succeed under the current setup.

Two black candidates, the Rev. Larry Hines and Jessie Barkett, finished well out of the running as incumbents Andrew Spisak and Kenneth Barnhill were re-elected. Hines finished third with 485 votes, about half of the winners' totals, and Barkett finished last in the five-candidate field with 275 votes.

"Here you have two people who I

would consider qualified to serve on the board and neither one came close," Netter said.

"The way things are now, you're never going to see a black person on this board to deal with the (thousands of) black students this district has adopted."

Some 11.29 percent, or about 1,900 of the 16,904 Wayne-Westland students in 1988-89, were non-white, according to figures compiled by the Wayne County Intermediate School District. Black students constitute the largest minority with 1,537.

Parkway progress is welcomed by some, but not all

Some folks along Carlson Road think the adjacent Central City Parkway is the gateway to Westland's future and a nifty sign of progress.

To others, it's just the end of a sad process that is ruining western Wayne County, turning good land into bad, space into congestion.

It is the good and pretty, and the bad and the ugly unrolled into one mile of blacktop between Warren and Ford.

At the north end, fields and woods stretch back from both sides of the divided parkway. The only signs of upcoming and inevitable commercial activity along the parkway are various signs promising things to be leased or rented, to be built to suit.

BENNIE CAMPBELL owns 3 1/2 acres of land along the west side of the parkway. His is the northernmost house along the parkway, just north of the 22 houses on Carlson, which deadends after running for just a few blocks parallel to the parkway.

Campbell looks serene, sitting on a hot day in the cool shade of a large tree in his spacious yard. Here, hundreds of yards away from concrete trucks and workers busy putting in sidewalks along the houses on Carlson, it is quiet. Birds chirp. The leaves swish in a strong wind. A few yards away, shoulder-high corn

blows. Green tomatoes sit, already plump. Cabbage heads are forming, though it is early July. Two fake owls sit on sticks to scare off birds.

The serenity in Campbell's yard is real, and, yet, it is a myth, too. The lands still feel like country, but since the parkway went in and was opened last December, there's no doubt that this is city, now.

"I can do without the road, let me put it that way," said Campbell, after pausing to reflect. He was one of a generation of auto workers who came up from the south for the big wages of the big-city auto plants. Campbell came north from Alabama, bought his Westland property "28 or 29 years ago" and is in his second year of retirement from General Motors.

"I was living in the country, inside a city, but the boys in Westland city hall changed that real quick," said Campbell, who says sharply rising tax bills since the road went in will soon force him to sell the land and leave the state.

Campbell owns more than 600 feet of frontage, and will leave with a lot of money. But that's not the point, he says. And he didn't want to leave.

"You talk about the price of property going up. But where are we going? What are our children going to do?" asks Campbell. "It's got to stop. We've got to stop being money hungry."

"Maybe I'm old-fashioned. Maybe I'm a dummy. But I was well satis-

fied back here being left alone," said Campbell. "You work all your life for something, and just because they put a road in here, they want to take what you've worked for and come in and put a big value on it and buy it. And City Hall and the real estate people call that progress."

DOWN THE ROAD, Chuck Winekoff and his wife Charlotte, sit out front of the house on Carlson they've owned for 21 years. They think the police could do a better job of ticketing the speeders who use the parkway as a shortcut to avoid Wayne Road, but other than that, they think the parkway is just fine.

"I think the road on average is good for the city. It's another artery," said Chuck. "And it opens up development, which is good."

He said property values will improve with development, and that he is hopeful that city officials and developers will take care to leave in many of the trees that line the parkway.

"We'll still have a pretty view over there," he said, pointing to the woods across the parkway.

"We like it here, and we're going to stay. Some people thought this should be woods forever. Well, you know that's not going to happen. When I bought this property in 1960, I knew then these trees would be gone someday. And it's been kind of fun seeing the progress."

New principal is no stranger

Students who graduated last month from Westland's Adams Junior High School will have a surprise waiting for them when they enter Wayne Memorial High School in two months.

Their former principal, Ronald Stratton, will be waiting for them.

"Some will say 'Oh yes', and some will say 'Oh no,'" Stratton predicted with a smile.

Stratton's appointment as the new principal of Wayne Memorial High School was confirmed last week by the Wayne-Westland school board. He was recommended for the post by Superintendent Dennis O'Neill.

Parents and students can expect the same philosophy of leadership that he perfected at Adams.

"It's more a style than a philosophy," Stratton said.

And basic to any success as an

educator is that:

"First, you have to like kids. If you don't, you shouldn't be in the business," he said.

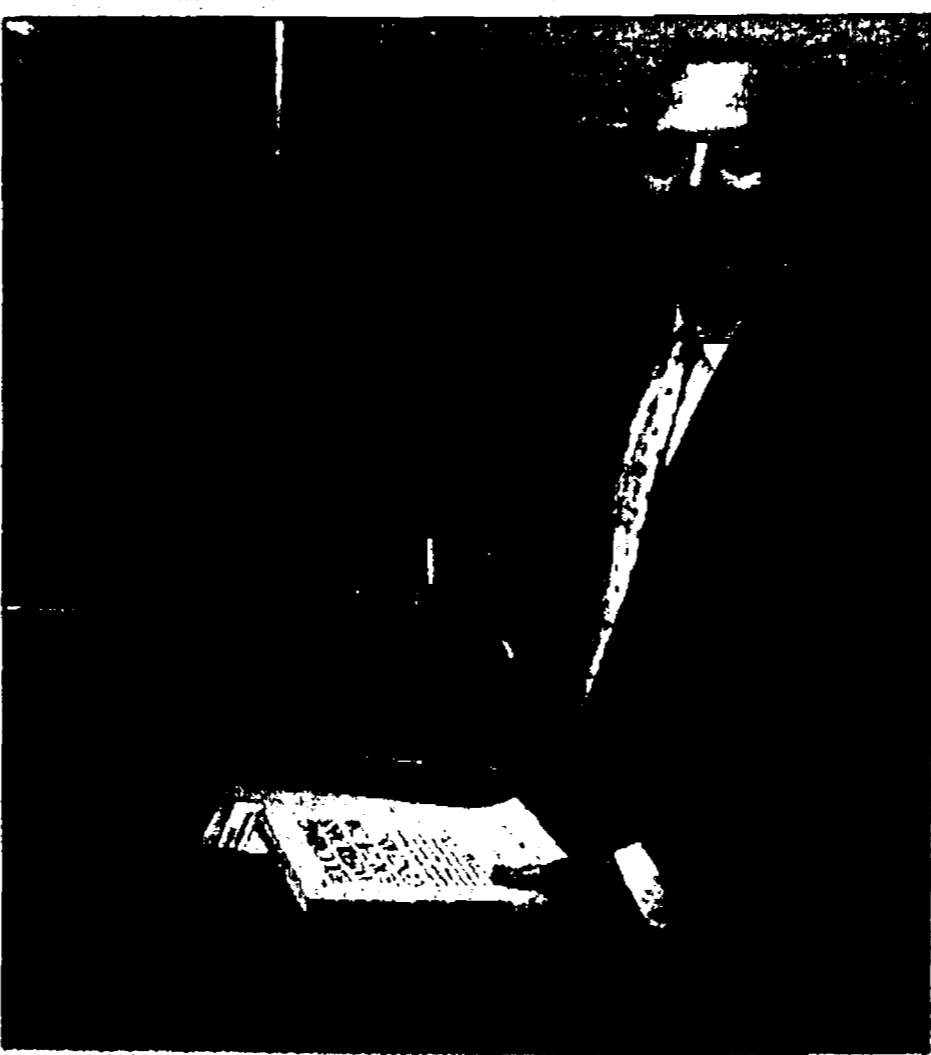
He's also quick to give praise to staff members for several changes implemented at Adams.

"I make changes through the consensus approach," he said. "Four out of five changes were initiated by the teachers."

One significant change at Adams was the way final exams were scheduled.

"What would happen is the last two days were full days with one half day," he said. "The teachers still met with the students," but the time really wasn't productive.

Murder trial set

The trial of a Westland man charged with last spring's fatal shooting of his former employer outside the Ford Road Ziebart Rustproofing store has been set for Monday, Sept. 11 in Detroit Recorder's Court.

Robert Michael Zellin, 47, will face trial by jury with Judge Isidore Torres presiding, said defense attorney Robert Plumpe. The attorney declined further comment on the case.

Zellin is charged with first-degree murder and possession of a firearm during the commission of a felony in the April 22 killing of Michael LaDuke, 40, of Harrison Township.

Zellin, who pleaded innocent to the charges, faces a maximum sentence of life in prison with no parole if convicted.

He is being held in the Wayne County Jail without bond.

LaDuke, branch operation manager for Ziebart Rustproofing, Inc., was gunned down about 2:30 p.m. as he ran from the store on Ford at Venoy, the Westland-Garden City boundary.

According to testimony during a May 1 preliminary exam in 18th District Court, LaDuke fired Zellin from his job as the Westland store manager the day of the shooting.

Zellin returned to the store, grabbed a shotgun from the trunk of his car and confronted LaDuke, witnesses testified.

LaDuke began to run across Venoy, but was gunned down before he reached the other side, witnesses said.

Jill Notarianni isn't going down without a fight. She helped lead the successful fight against a Burger King on the southeast corner of Joy and Merriman, and now she is gathering

signatures for a petition drive against a proposed 7-Eleven store on the same site.

Notarianni said she will present the petition at the city council meeting Monday, when the council will be asked to grant a site approval already approved by the planning

commission.

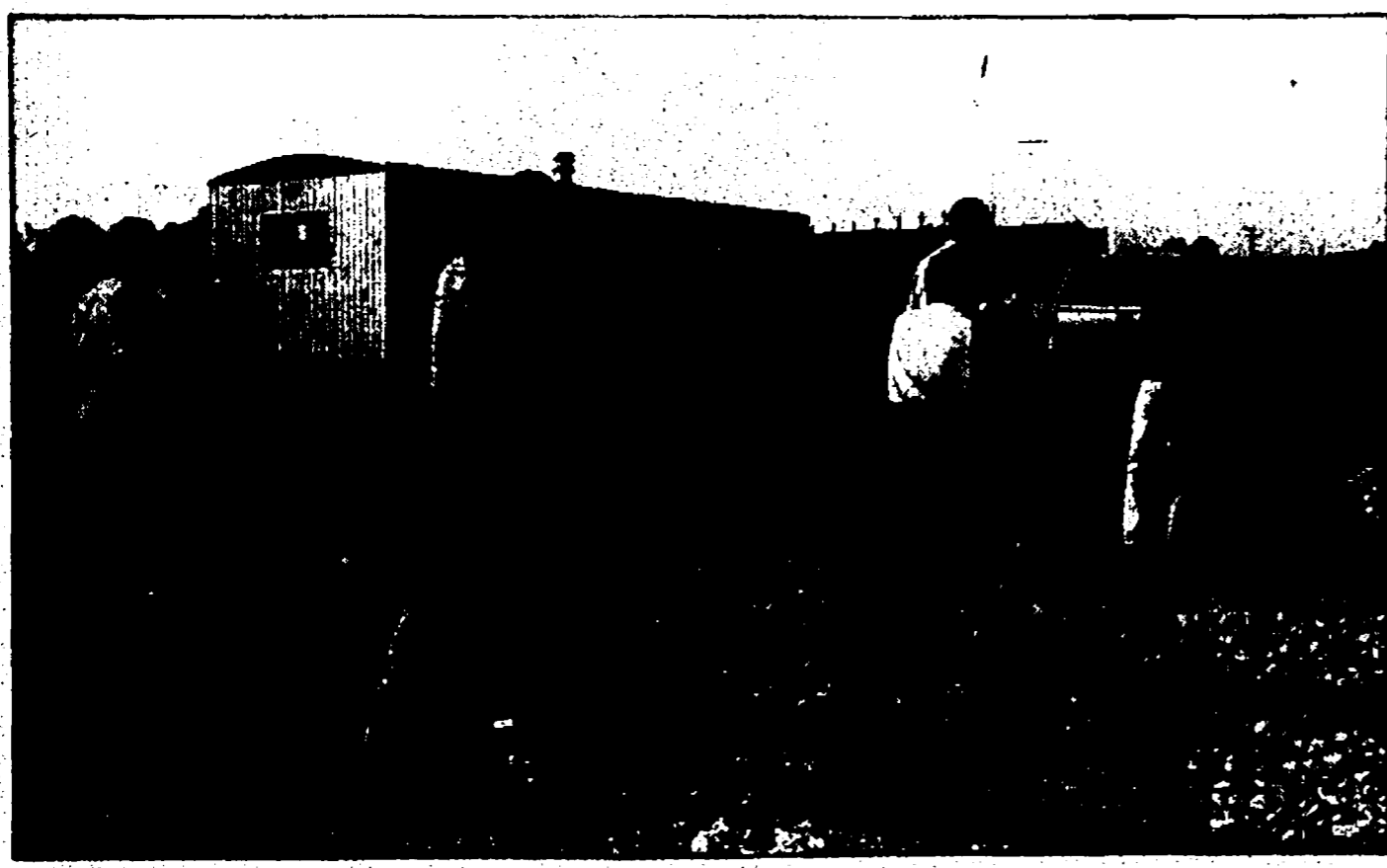
Notarianni said she collected about 200 signatures last weekend in front of Maple Drugs near the Joy-Merriman intersection and will be out again this weekend gathering support.

tle likelihood that protesters will be able to further delay development at the corner, where an abandoned gasoline station now stands.

Two years ago, 7-Eleven asked for a special-use waiver of the zoning

One teacher suggested the last three days be divided into half days, with finals in the morning, and grading and recording the exams in the afternoon. Any changes have to be cleared through the district's curriculum council, Stratton said. But they OK'd it, and the idea worked.

"The students took finals very seriously, and the semester ended very smoothly," he said. It served to formalize the exam method because, Stratton said, "We don't want to reinvent the wheel, just re-inflate it."

The idea was a pilot program but was such a success the district is going to try it in other junior highs. THE IN-HOUSE suspension, and

the district task force for at-risk students under the direction of Adams counselor James Couillard, were two other programs that came into being during his tenure at Adams.

With an in-house suspension the student reports to school but remains in a specific room with a tutor to do assigned homework.

The program for at-risk students brought support group type meetings to the junior high school students involved in substance abuse, who had no other way to get to them.

Stratton has always felt he could accomplish more with praise than harsh discipline, he said.

"Every child has to believe he can learn, he can succeed," he said.

"That way they can come to class and enjoy it, and pass, at least."

Stratton is looking forward to his new responsibilities at Wayne Memorial.

"Good things are happening here," Stratton said.

He noted that Wayne has a long tradition of excellence in athletic and academic areas that needs constant attention.

"Mr. (Francis) Winter (who retired as Wayne Memorial principal last month) initiated 'Wayne Pride,' with the idea of recognizing that you have to have pride in yourself and your school," Stratton said.

"I would certainly try to maintain that."

Of the parkway itself, Charlotte referred to its frequent use by police, fire and emergency vehicles. "It's been a life-saver for a lot of people," she said.

A neighbor, George McKenzie, sat on his porch, eating breakfast. Directly across the parkway from him a large sign announced: "Downtown Westland, office-commercial, separate or together, Land Co. of Michigan."

He doesn't like the traffic much, either. "Late in the evening, there's a lot of speeders. Not 10 miles over, but 20 and 30 miles over."

But of the road itself, McKenzie said: "I've gotten used to it. I think it's nice. When they get everything finished, it's gonna be real nice."

Of development, even if it means an end to the view from his porch of

the nearby woods, he said: "If we lose the trees, we lose them. Nothing

you can do about it. You gotta go with progress."

TWO SCHOOL BOARD members Monday said the racial makeup of the board made no difference in how it set policies or its treatment of students.

"Kids are kids," said Andrew Spisak, board president. "We have given the same educational opportunity in this district to very child, whether he lives in Wayne, Westland, or the old Cherry Hill district (Inkster)."

Spisak said the leaders of the committee "appear to be more interested in creating problems rather than solving them."

Trustee Sharon Scott said the board has been accessible to all segments of the community. "We listen and respond to everybody's concerns," she said.

Scott said the solution to any perceived representation problem is for people to exercise their voting rights. "Look at the (June) turnout

and you'll see that if people don't feel represented that's their fault," she said.

Netter said the committee also intends to take stands on issues affecting the district and "work to eliminate the apathy that I see surrounding our schools."

He said having a group already in place will be a more effective way to respond to situations as they arise, rather than "trying to get things done on the spur of the moment."

president; Kenneth Barnhill, treasurer; and Scott, secretary.

The board voted 8-0 with one abstention on all the officer appointments.

Trustee Mathew McCusker, who abstained in the voting, said only that he had "philosophical differences" with the way the selections were made. He declined further comment.

The board also appointed representatives to three outside organizations. Scott and Spisak will represent the district on the Metropolitan Association for Improving School Leg-

islation; Barnhill was appointed to the Wayne County Association of School Boards; and McCusker was appointed to the Michigan Association of School Boards.

The accounting firm of Plante and Moran was retained as district auditors and three law firms serving the district were also retained.

Spisak said his goal for the 1989-90 school year was to "keep the district on the steady course we have been following for the last several years."

He said priorities for the board would include asbestos removal

from buildings, continuing to monitor the school finance reform situation and contract negotiations next year with the district's 850 teachers.

then in effect and was turned down. Part of the site was then zoned residential but has since been zoned commercial, giving the city council less leeway in denying the site approval being asked for by 7-Eleven's parent entity, the Southland Corp., say city officials.

"It's a permitted use for that particular site, so I'm not sure what would be the justification for turning them down," said George Wilhelm, director of planning.

"If you go to any 7-Eleven in the middle of the night, you may find one or two people. It's not like a fast-food operation," said Joe Benyo. "It's for the people on the way home from work. It's a clean operation. People would be hard pressed to say they (7-Elevens) are detrimental."

Notarianni said she will be at the council meeting despite her perception that city officials are tired of her protests.

"Council President Ken Mehl gets real mad at us," said Notarianni. "I mean, he gets red-in-the-face mad at us. Really mad."

Happy campers

Handicapped kids have summertime fun

Adam, an 8-year-old blond whose cerebral palsy confines him to a wheelchair, was beaming.

Visiting his classroom were a group of Elks, whose donations help make possible the six-week summer camp he attends at West Hills Middle School in West Bloomfield.

As the Elks were introduced to Adam, physical therapist Randi Berry and P.T. aide Heather Schlachter, all Adam could do was smile.

"It (visiting Scamp) makes you feel good," said Bob Schneider, chairman of Major Projects for the Plymouth Elks Lodge 1780. "You never see a child who's unhappy. They say hello to you. Some of them want a hug."

Schneider, of Redford Township, was honored recently as the Elks' top fund-raiser for the third year in a row at the organization's state convention.

He was among Elks from Livonia, Plymouth, Farmington, Clawson and

Troy, Pontiac and Detroit touring "Scamp" on Walnut Lake last week. The Elks' 78 Michigan chapters raise about \$400,000 per year to benefit 500 children. Other community groups, businesses and individuals also contribute to Scamp every summer.

Youngsters aged 3 and up who have mental and/or physical disabilities start their day at Scamp singing "Peanut, Peanut Butter Jelly," "Inka Dinka Doo" and other favorites in the "pit." The ratio of campers to staffers is just over one to one, so almost every camper is seated next to a teacher, counselor or volunteer.

The children hail from 35 school districts in Oakland, Wayne and Macomb counties.

From 8:30 a.m. until 2 p.m., students swim, do crafts, play softball and T-ball, draw, paint, dance and study math and reading.

There are field trips to berry

farms, the Humane Society, Cranbrook and nature centers.

Visitors to Scamp include magicians, puppeteers, mimes and the Blue Pigs, Detroit police who moonlight as musicians.

"This makes the summer for many of these kids," said Jean Walker, Scamp coordinator. "We have 20 children on our waiting list."

"Some people are afraid to come to Scamp — they think it will be real depressing," said Redford's Bob Miller, executive director for the state of Michigan for Elks major projects.

"It's not. They do a marvelous job here. It's a real enlightening feeling."

NO ONE GETS rich working at Scamp. But the rewards are there, say staffers.

Al Kettinger of Union Lake, who teaches sign language and runs an in-school store for campers, said, "there's a real special feeling here. You don't work here for the money; you do it for the satisfaction you get."

"It's neat to see kids get pleasure from such simple things."

"The kids are wonderful. They're all neat in their own ways," said Jenny Houser, a 1989 Plymouth-Canton High School graduate who's worked at Scamp ever since she was 13. "They keep us on our toes and that

keeps it exciting." Like many of Scamp's college-age staffers, Houser is gaining work experience that will help her decide on a career. Houser will be studying occupational therapy at Western Michigan University this fall.

Heather Schlachter, also a 1989 Canton grad, works with a physical therapist at Scamp. Schlachter plans to major in physical therapy at Oakland University in September.

Other counselors are using their jobs to discover more about speech pathology, the hearing impaired or mentally impaired.

While Scamp is a summer job for Steve Price, a health education teacher at Bloomfield Hills Andover, he really doesn't look at it that way.

"This isn't work to me. It's like I'm on vacation," said Price, who joined Scamp 15 years ago.

"It's funny the patience I have here, and the lack of it I have at home with my own kids."

It doesn't take long to figure out how much the campers like building friendships, gaining independence and enjoying fun and educational activities.

Nicole Rubin of Birmingham has attended Scamp for years.

"I like the swimming and singing in the pit" said Rubin. 18

Tamara Taylor wins scholarship

Tamara Taylor of Westland has won a scholarship to study during the next school year at Kelo University in Tokyo, Japan.

The scholarship is valued at \$16,000 and covers admission, tuition and books. It is offered by Western Michigan University's international education and programs department.

Taylor is a junior at WMU in Kalamazoo and president of the school's Japan Club. She was picked an alternative for the program in the past two years.

THE STUDENT, who attended area schools before graduating from Ladywood High School in Livonia, is majoring in finance, Spanish and Japanese studies. She first became interested in

Japanese culture as a college freshman after taking a course in modern Japanese society, required to obtain a general education degree.

In preparation for her year in Japan, to start in late August, Taylor enrolled in Asian studies and took a Japanese language class.

The daughter of former mayor Thomas Taylor and Phyllis Taylor, Taylor plans to spend most of the next year studying the Japanese language and culture in addition to traveling throughout the country.

When she returns next year, Taylor expects to obtain a post tutoring English to Japanese business people and students.

Taylor's interest in the Japanese culture was a key factor in being awarded the scholarship, she said.

McNamara, Ficano iron out differences

A "new spirit of cooperation" exists between Wayne County Executive Edward McNamara and Sheriff Robert Ficano, though both men still await the outcome of a Michigan Appeals Court ruling on control of the county jail.

The county executive and sheriff have reached agreement on a number of key issues, including jail administration, overtime and park patrol, both sides confirmed.

While an Appeals Court ruling could take control of the jail from Ficano and give it to McNamara as a temporary receiver, both sides said they would continue to work together regardless of the court's ruling.

BOTH SIDES acknowledged the agreement included Ficano's appointment of former youth home director Pete Wilson as jail administrator. Wilson had been McNamara's choice to represent him as jail receiver, though that appointment was tied up through Ficano's appeal of Kaufman's ruling.

Wilson now reports to undersheriff Warren Evans, Ficano's second-in-command, in Evans' role as co-chairman of an ad-hoc county jail compliance team.

That unit, including McNamara administration officials, is overseeing improvements in jail conditions under terms of a 1971 prisoner lawsuit. Kaufman had appointed McNamara receiver under terms of that ongoing suit, arguing that Ficano hadn't done enough to bring the jail in compliance.

In related news, both sides announced the jail budget deficit for this fiscal year would be \$400,000 or less, an improvement from the \$2 million debt posted last year.

Filling once-vacant jail staff positions is helping reduce the deficit by reducing jail overtime, Ficano said.

"THERE APPEARS to be a new spirit of cooperation," said Ficano, who filed suit to block an earlier by chief Wayne County Circuit Judge Richard Kaufman that awarded the jail to McNamara. "If this spirit had existed last year, we might not be in

court today."

An executive's department spokesman agreed relations between both sides have substantially improved.

"What we found was that we

couldn't do anything (on the jail)," deputy county executive Michael Duggan said. "We decided getting together would be in everyone's best interest, including the taxpayers."

Duggan and Dale Juriscin, a mem-

ber of Ficano's staff, held several informal meetings earlier this year to hammer out differences between their superiors.

"What we did, essentially, was to sit down together at several Livonia

bars and restaurants," Duggan said.

Details weren't generally announced to the public.

"It's a handshake agreement, a private agreement between the two men," Duggan said.

Health program is called success

Wayne County's new indigent health care program is a success, Senate Majority leader John Engler said, but reforming the county's health care program was a Republican idea.

"That was an initiative that we simply insisted upon," Engler said, recalling the days in late 1987 when the county sought state help to balance its budget. "The reason we were so interested is we'd gotten involved with (William) Lucas when he was the county executive. But he could never implement the program because Gov. Blanchard wouldn't allow it."

Subsequently, when (Edward) McNamara became exec, we literally took the Lucas program and retooled it. That program was rewritten by Republican staffers in Lansing and McNamara now touts its advantages."

Considered a major source of county debt, the health care program for disadvantaged county residents has been restructured along the lines of a health maintenance organization.

Engler, who is considering a run for governor, discussed Wayne County finances during a visit Monday to Observer & Eccentric offices in Birmingham.

Though they acknowledged Engler's help in pushing the solvency package through the state Legislature, McNamara and his associates are committed to backing Blanchard for a third term.

"This is a Democratic administration," deputy county executive Michael Duggan said. "We'll be backing the governor."

Abortion non-issue by '90 race: Engler

Contrary to political leaders, pro-life and pro-choice advocates nationwide, state Sen. John Engler said he does not believe abortion will be an issue in the 1990 Michigan governor's race.

Engler, the Republican Senate majority leader from Mount Pleasant, was in the metro area Tuesday as part of his "exploratory" campaign to run for governor against incumbent Democrat James Blanchard.

Besides the abortion issue, Engler also said he believed enough money is in the general fund to improve education statewide without a tax increase, and said he opposes both proposals on the November ballot to increase the sales tax by one-half cent or by 2 cents.

HE ALSO SAID he thinks school equity and quality issues "are both able to be solved within the current resources of the state." Equity is defined as dollars spent per pupil per district; some districts' spending is disproportionate, which affects quality.

"Any decision we make (on abortion) or any failure to act is immediately applicable to the general population and that's where the decision is going to be fought out," Engler offered as his rationale for why the issue won't play a major part in the governor's race.

He said he would support a bill restoring parental consent, which is opposite the law in effect today that states a minor may seek and receive an abortion without first seeking

parental or judicial approval.

"In effect what the Supreme Court's done with the Missouri decision is really tossed it in the laps of all Michigan voters," Engler said in reference to Webster vs. Reproductive Health Services.

"We're not in the position where the Michigan Legislature can make a final decision."

However, Engler said he probably would assign an abortion-reform bill drafted by Sen. Jack Welborn, R-Kalamazoo, to the Human Resources Committee chaired by Sen. Fred Dillingham, R-Fowlerville, one of the state's best-known abortion opponents.

Welborn's bill parallels Missouri's regulations on how and when a woman may receive an abortion. Engler's decision on which committee would receive the bill was due yesterday.

ON EDUCATION, Engler said he believes there is a need to rebuild education's share of the general fund budget, but he doesn't think that money should come from the November ballot proposals.

Michigan's education dollars come from three sources: the school aid fund, which basically is sales tax; the lottery; and the general fund.

"I think they (the proposals) both represent, particularly A, a \$400 million tax increase with not even a dollar's worth of property tax relief," Engler said. "They're wrongly conceived. They suggest that the only way we can help education is by raising taxes and they avoid the question of new priorities, not new taxes."

No bias here Committee has wrong focus

ARE BLACK students and parents getting a fair shake from the all-white Wayne-Westland school board?

That's one of the questions raised by the chairman of a new committee pushing for more equal representation on the board. James Netter, an informal school board watcher for years and one of the local residents responsible for the recent grand jury probe into the district's adult education enrollment practices, said one reason for the Wayne-Westland Citizens for Education group is "to do something about our lack of a voice in this district."

THE COMMITTEE will also attempt to combat apathy among district residents and address education issues which it considers important in Wayne-Westland.

But the committee's principal goal, according to Netter, is to force a ballot issue that would change the way district voters elect school board members. The committee would like to see the district divided into wards that each elect somebody to the board, rather than the current method of district-wide representation.

Such a change would undoubtedly provide a boost for minority candidates since the minority population is concentrated in several areas of the sprawling district.

We certainly understand Mr. Netter's concerns.

The minority population in the Wayne-Westland district is growing. Approximately 11 percent of the district's 16,904 students in 1988-89 were non-white, up from about 8 percent four years ago.

Two qualified black candidates running for school board last month were soundly defeated by two incumbents. In interviews this spring, both the Rev. Larry Hines and Jessie Barkett expressed similar concern about equal treatment for minority students.

WE THINK every school district, including

Wayne-Westland, should have a representative cross section of residents making policy decisions on education. And realistically, it will probably take awhile before a black candidate is elected to the Wayne-Westland board, especially with the lack of concern from district voters as evidenced by last month's 1.5 percent turnout.

But we see no evidence that the current school board has failed in its mission to work toward the best possible educational opportunities for all children, including blacks and other minorities.

In fact, in recent months the board has explored and approved programs aimed specifically at the district's growing minority population.

For example, the Human Relations Task Force was established last November to address minority issues. The 22-member task force, which will act in an advisory capacity to the administration and the school board, has been charged with:

- Staff development opportunities related to human relations and cultural integration.
- Review of curriculum and text books.
- Developing a plan to increase the number of minority employees in the district.
- Developing a plan of action and/or ombudsman position to work with community, students and parents.
- Review school recognition of Martin Luther King Day.
- Review all facets of the district's testing policies and procedures to eliminate any racial or ethnic bias.

The Citizens for Education Committee has a unique opportunity to enlighten board members and district administrators on minority and other issues.

But changing the way board members are elected isn't a viable alternative. Committee members should concentrate on making a decent system better, not tearing it down.

Summer of '69 It shaped a nation's psyche

What is all this fuss about the summer of 1969?

Why should a mere three months, so long ago, hold any meaning for us today?

For those too young to remember, or who weren't even born yet, that is a fair question, as well as a difficult one to answer.

Even those of us who fully remember that blazing, news-filled summer come away with different interpretations of the same events. As well as questions of our own.

Suffice to say something about America changed that summer, though even now it's hard to say just what.

There were other noteworthy summers — 1967, for instance, was the so-called "Summer of Love," and of urban rioting, summer 1968 brought the infamous Democratic National Convention in Chicago.

Even at that, summer 1969 was different. Its events cast a truer light on the polarization of the times and pointed the way to the divisiveness that would mark this country in each successive summer, each successive year.

SUMMER 1969 was bracketed by two events. There was the moon landing, a hand-over-your-heart highlight for straight, God-fearing middle America. There was also Woodstock, a celebration of the rapidly-growing youth counterculture.

Certainly, there were other events. Vietnam wasn't far from anyone's mind and the grip of that long-ago war has yet to leave us. As late as this July 4, we were still welcoming home our Vietnam vets.

The Manson Clan's grisly murders repelled

Summer 1969 cast a truer light on the polarization of the times and pointed the way to the divisiveness that would mark this country in each successive summer, each successive year.

Americans. The Miracle Mets thrilled them. And Chappaquiddick gave America a political scandal that wouldn't go away.

Still, it is the moon landing and Woodstock receiving most of the attention today. Each in its own way represented an America at its zenith. Or was it its nadir?

Putting a man on the moon became the ultimate symbol of American wealth and might, just as surely as discovery of the New World nearly four centuries earlier secured imperial Spain a place in history. Two decades later, the moon landing still stands as a technological marvel.

Even at the time, however, the necessity of the moon mission was questioned. If we could claim wealth and power, did we not have a responsibility to use them wisely?

WHY SPEND billions on the space program, some argued, while there are people living in poverty? Two decades later, our commitment to space exploration has ebbed. Our wealth and power, while undeniable, are no longer unquestioned. Poverty continues.

Then, there was Woodstock, the upstate New York music festival that — depending upon your age and musical preference — was either an idyllic moment for a youth culture intent on brotherhood and the abolishment of war, hunger and all other social ills, or a bunch of heavily drugged ne'er-do-wells (most of them gate-crashers to boot) rolling around in the mud. If the Woodstock nation's communal spirit represented a triumph of brotherhood, and doubts still linger about that, then it was only a temporary victory.

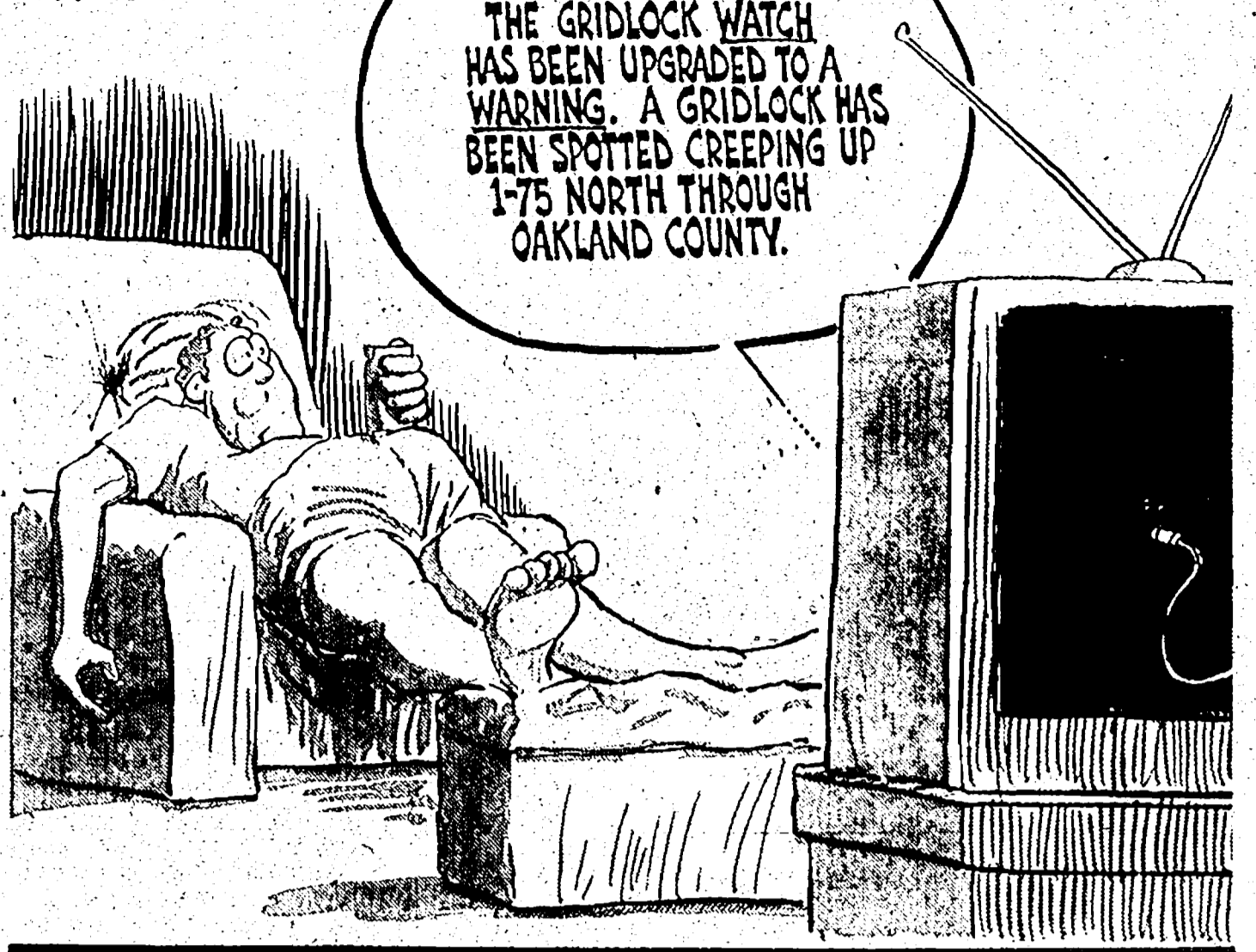
At Woodstock, it was said, people shared food. Who shares anything today?

Preaching brotherhood, saying that another man, race, or culture, is as deserving as oneself or one's own, won't get you elected to too many offices today. It may even get a cross burned on your suburban lawn.

Once, there was a time when we believed we could rise above our problems, whether through a journey to the moon or the inner recesses of human consciousness. Now, we know differently.

In the long run, it comes down to this: Moon rocks are not much different from urban rubble. A peace symbol is not much different from the hood ornament on a Mercedes-Benz.

Ross is a non-stop, driven public official out to accomplish whatever the goal at hand happens to be.

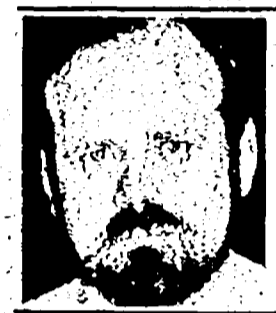
litical career, he has brought a storm of establishment discomfort and protest.

School bailout?

Outstate perspective so different

IT'S A DIFFERENT world in outstate Michigan. Folks raised here in the southeastern corner have only the dimmest grasp of what's going on in the farm belt, in particular.

My observation is prompted by the support many outstate legislators are giving to the school tax increase plans they placed on the 1990 ballot.

Now, those two proposals are heresy in many metro Detroit suburbs. Our assessments are leaping 15 percent annually, and most of our school districts receive no state aid. A sales tax increase for schools? Abominable, we say.

So talk to Eaton County's two men in Lansing.

SEN. JOHN Schwarz, R-Battle Creek, is no big spending Liberal. Schwarz, 52, is a physician and surgeon and was mayor of his city. Public Sector Consultants rates him 75 percent conservative.

Schwarz supports Plan A, a half-cent increase in the sales tax with no property tax cuts. It would pump \$400 million into schools.

They're not having a high technology and office boom in his district. "A lot bought farms at exorbitant prices 10 years ago. A significant number of farmers have gone belly up," Schwarz said.

Despite the drop in farm assessments — and in school revenue — Schwarz said "most farmers still think they're overassessed."

He would go even further than Plan A. Schwarz would like to increase the sales tax a full penny and put it all into education, letting universities have 35 percent of the new money and community colleges 5 percent in addition to 60 percent for K-12 schools.

REP. FRANK Fitzgerald, R-Grand Ledge, gets the same 75 percent conservative rating. An attorney and former assistant prosecutor, he is serving his first term in Lansing. Fitzgerald, 33, is the grandson of a late governor and son of a former state senator and Supreme Court justice.

"Over half my district is cultivated or pasture agricultural land," said Fitzgerald. He supports Plan B, which would raise the sales tax 2 cents, using \$460 million for new school revenue and a net of \$1.1 billion for school property tax relief.

While some of his school districts such as Waverly are doing all right, Fitzgerald said that others are near

the absolute constitutional limit of 50 mills.

Fitzgerald is a strong believer in the tax base sharing a portion of Plan B. That's where part of the property tax would be collected statewide so that Maple Valley could get a hunk of Federal Mogul's revenue.

In our metro suburbs, even Democrats call that Marxism.

THERE IS NO such thing as "the Michigan economy." Memorize that.

One segment of the state can be suffering 15 percent unemployment while others hardly notice the difference. Rural Clinton County last year

saw farm prices plummet 30 percent while in Oakland they're plotting ways to reduce their soaring assessments.

And so we see Republicans like Schwarz and Fitzgerald supporting various tax increase plans while suburban Republicans are almost unanimously against them. Democrats are almost as deeply divided.

Looking over tax votes from the past 18 years, it appears 20 percent of the state wants a tax increase for schools, 40 percent want a Tisch-style tax cut, and 40 percent are in the middle or just don't know. Whatever one group wants, the other two groups gang up and reject it.

Maybe that's why the politicians in Lansing aren't so presumptuous as to say what "the people" want. They usually say "my district."

Abortion not an issue for this Senate race

ABORTION, THE ISSUE of the '90s, won't be the focal point of the 1990 race shaping up in one of Michigan's most affluent, powerful senatorial districts. Neither will who wears socks.

Both state Sen. Richard Fessler and state Rep. David Honigman are anti-abortion. And both, although Honigman more recently, wear socks.

They are expected to be the contenders in the Republican primary for the prestigious 17th Senate district, which includes Bloomfield Hills and Bloomfield and West Bloomfield townships.

Fessler has held the seat for two terms, but hasn't officially announced his candidacy. Honigman has announced. He was outspoken about gunning for the seat — long before Fessler's troubles on the legal and domestic fronts.

NOW FESSLER'S ACTIONS in light of these incidents should overshadow all other issues in voters' minds.

No one, politico or not, gets by without their share of problems in life. But Richard Fessler's problems have been magnified, not by the usu-

al villain — the press — but by his own actions.

Once Marilyn and Rick Fessler must have loved each other.

Marilyn was by his side as he was first elected to the state House of Representatives in 1974, and later as he climbed higher on the political ladder to a state Senate seat.

And Rick isn't the only politician in the family. In 1978, Marilyn ran for and was elected West Bloomfield Township treasurer. At the time, she was criticized for not having the expertise for the job, for trading on her husband's name.

DURING HER term in office, Rick became somewhat of a fixture around West Bloomfield Town Hall. She was chastised for taking four weeks paid vacation that first year and not working well with her fellow elected officials.

In 1980, voters defeated Marilyn Fessler's bid for re-election. In the same election, Rick went on to his fourth term in the House and has now won two successive terms in the Michigan Senate.

But his fortunes changed too. He and Marilyn separated. In 1987, he spent a night in jail after an Oakland County judge found him in contempt of court for not paying the mortgage on the West Bloomfield home where she and two of his children were living.

In 1988, he was convicted of impaired driving and resisting arrest. The attorney-legislator also defied state law by refusing to take a Breathalyzer test to determine the amount of alcohol in his system.

STILL RICK doesn't apparently accept the consequences of his actions. After his night in jail, he emerged calling the contempt charge "an unnecessary, purposeful and very malicious act. After all, three children are involved. They deserved better than they are getting..." (Dare he apply that statement to his own most recent actions?)

Directly following his conviction, Fessler insisted that it won't hamper his effectiveness in Lansing. "It has not affected my abilities to enact legislation in Lansing. I don't see the impact."

And only weeks later, after filing an appeal, he had the audacity to throw his hat into the ring for prosecuting attorney of Oakland County. Predictably, he finished last of four Republican primary contenders.

Now, he and his ex-wife are willing to subject their children to public scrutiny in their bitter custody battle, holding press conferences to aim their weapons.

HONIGMAN'S CANDIDACY by itself would have made Fessler's bid for a third Senate term a major battle. The representative from West Bloomfield has the record, background and financing to make the state Senate seat one more step toward higher political office.

The thing to do, of course, would be to step down gracefully. But that's not Rick Fessler's style. Once again, he will probably let it all hang out, refusing to accept that he is not an appropriate public representative.

And Honigman should knock his socks off.

Q: Dr. Doyle, I have enjoyed your columns because they are down-to-earth. However, several teachers and administrators were discussing one article we believe was limited in its interpretation. The column dealt with a parent whose child was entering kindergarten. There are three kindergarten teachers and the mother said she knows the teachers and who is the best. That's the teacher she wants for her daughter. We believe some teachers are requested because they are popular, not necessarily because they are the best teacher. You indicate that principals know which teacher is the most effective through parent requests. Some of us don't believe that parents are the only ones who can determine who are the best teachers.

I accept your insights and will agree that the response given was somewhat limited in scope because there are, as you indicated, many variables to be considered.

It is true that one teacher's style may appeal to certain students and parents while another teacher's style may appeal to other students and their parents. Furthermore, research has indicated there are different student learning styles, i.e.,

visual, auditory and hands-on (kinesthetic) learning — and that different teaching methods are necessary to address these different learning styles.

Nevertheless, as an educator, I also have to state that, from my experience, a little paranoia exists among educators whenever this issue raises its head. It is almost as if, since teachers are locked into a salary schedule where everyone gets the same percent raise each year, teachers are all equal.

I was a good science and math teacher. I worked next to a great science teacher — that's the way it was.

In professional sports there are superstar players and in education there are superstar teachers. Working with a superstar teacher really shouldn't distract other teachers from their commitment to be and

give the best they have to students. However, it is true, as you indicated, that a popular teacher may be the students' choice while the quiet, reserved, steady, unrecognized teacher may be the one who makes the greatest impact.

I will never forget the arena scheduling days when teachers sat in the gym at a desk. The doors opened at 8 a.m. and classes were filled on a first-come, first-served basis. Some students arrived at 8 a.m. to get the teacher they wanted. It was quite frustrating for me as a young, new, unknown quantity science teacher seated next to the superstar science teacher. Students were jockeying for

position in her line while my line was bare as a bone. At that point, I decided to hook onto the superstar and, indeed, her influence helped me become a much better teacher.

There are great teachers. Let's not be jealous but proud our profession has greatness as a role model to emulate.

'Computer-ese': New gift of gab

The greatest tenor of the century, Enrico Caruso, awed opera audiences with his singing.

On the other hand, Vicki Caruso of

Livonia awed members of the Michigan Hearing and Speech Association with the sound of her voice, a voice made possible by the Artificial Language Lab at Michigan State University.

Vicki was so impressive that, after

eight years of trying to get funding from Michigan Rehabilitation Services, it agreed, in conjunction with the Department of Social Services, to pay for the voice synthesizer Caruso needs to communicate.

Caruso, 31, was born with cerebral

palsy. Because of her cerebral palsy, Caruso was unable to speak, which led many people to believe she was mentally retarded.

A resident at the Plymouth Center for Human Development, her life changed for the better when social

worker Mary Balazs noticed Caruso had eye movement when spoken to and surmised that the 16-year-old was of at least normal intelligence.

"Because you have no speech, they think you don't understand anything," Balazs said.

appeared on several television shows, appealing for help. Her efforts were unsuccessful.

On Caruso's 17th birthday, Mary Gilbertson's daughter, Debbie, took her to the Plymouth Center for Human Development for lunch. Debbie was a volunteer at the center.

They met Caruso and "we all kind of fell in love with each other," said Gilbertson. "She really seemed to fit in with our family."

In 1976, Caruso left the center and moved in with her new foster parents, Gilbertson and her husband Stan.

Once settled in, Caruso began attending school. She graduated from Westland John Glenn High School in 1981 and went on to study liberal arts, with an emphasis on computers, at Schoolcraft Community College. Stan attended classes with her at Schoolcraft and took her notes. She received her associate's degree in 1987.

"I was the person picked to demonstrate a talking computer at a media coverage at the Northville School District," she said.

Eulenberger had been working with the school district on the introduction of the talking computers. At the demonstration, Caruso's first words were "My name is Vicki Caruso."

Lab gives a voice to silent minority

It's a place where miracles are wrought. A place where voices are brought to people condemned to silence.

At a glance, one would guess that this small, cramped room was a storage area with a miscellaneous office thrown in for lack of other space.

The Artificial Language Lab at Michigan State University is in the business of conducting research on augmentative communication — creating voices for people who have been denied one by nature or by accident.

In the two rooms allotted them in the MSU Computer Center, a staff of three full-time employees

Home grown

Interest in gardening lagging

Alar may have given apples a bad name, but the ensuing pesticide brouhaha hasn't resulted in more consumers turning to home gardening to avoid harmful chemicals.

That's probably because most of us are already up to our green thumbs in it.

"We haven't seen any great increase in home gardening," said Dean M. Krauskopf, commercial horticulture agent for the Cooperative Extension Service of Michigan State University. "But national statistics show home gardening is the most common recreational activity in the U.S."

There are things inquisitive gardeners want to know. Plenty of things.

"They ask about everything from

fungal disease to box elder bugs," said Krauskopf, who handles consumer phone inquiries from his Detroit office.

This year, a major outbreak of box elder bugs have been infiltrating area homes. The grayish black insects with a red stripe are named for box elder trees, where they are often found.

"They don't cause a problem, but people don't like them in the house," he said.

Krauskopf doesn't subscribe to the popular belief that there is a higher insect population this year than last year.

"It's a moist year, so there are lots of mosquitoes, but I don't think there is more insects — worms, for instance . . . there are not as many worms," he said.

BUGGING GARDENERS now are

earwigs, potato beetles and cut worms, little critters feed on plant material.

Earwigs are a beetle-type insect so called for the superstition that they seek out human ears to crawl into — a totally unfounded belief. They like moist cool places and can be kept out of homes by using caulking and weather stripping around doors, windows pipes and other places at ground level.

In the garden, place burlap bags or newspapers in shrubbery or mulch. Earwigs will hide under these. The next day shake them into hot water and rapidly spray the area.

As simple as it sounds, one of the best ways to keep the insect population sparse in the garden is to keep a close watch on plants.

"Pick them off," Krauskopf said. "A lot of insects can be controlled with a high pressure hose squirt of water, or use an insecticidal soap."

MSU's Cooperative Extension Service subscribes to the theory of integrated pest management, he added.

"Find the right plant for the right spot, use mulches of grass clippings or composted leaves to maximize vigor and control bugs. Do all you can to maximize benefits. We do recommend pesticides as a last resort."

Weather conditions play a big part, of course. Last summer's relentless heat and drought brought that home.

This year's hot, humid and heavy rains are causing other problems, like a proliferation of fungal diseases.

"Heavy rain and high moisture contribute to fungi that feed on plants. All are harmless, but you wouldn't want to eat them. There's high organic matter in the soil — that's what mushrooms feed on."

HOW TO GET rid of them?
"Just go out there and mow the lawn," Krauskopf said.

Another frisky garden pest in abundance this year is rabbits.

"There are repellents on the market, you might try them," Krauskopf said. "Or you can try animal fences, but bury them deep and they must be fairly high. Or a takeoff on the old scarecrow bit — put some cheap pie pans on a string that can clang or put a radio in the garden."

Krauskopf doesn't guarantee success with any of these methods.

"Some (crops) have suffered from

Lack of public support hurts organic growers

The following is excerpted from a letter by Len Prelesnik, a certified organic grower, to the Organic Growers of Michigan.

"There is a lot of interest in organically grown foodstuffs in the marketplace this year. And buyers are coming to Organic Growers of Michigan to supply them. I can see that we won't have nearly enough growers and food to supply the demand.

"Back in the 1970s when we got little public support, we were getting ready for the public demand. We were investing energy and money in our farms, but we were struggling.

"Many members couldn't hold on. The public wouldn't pay, and the government wouldn't support, our organic farmers what it cost to farm organically and still have a lifestyle like other Americans.

"So, if the public now lacks organic growers, it is because the public didn't care enough. Just as they didn't care enough to save the vast American forests, the buffalo on the range and the purity of water.

"ORGANIC GROWERS can

bounce back. More farmers can convert to the organic method. But it will take time . . . and it won't be the perfect, blemish-free produce that consumers have come to expect in the market.

"Meanwhile public health will suffer. We don't yet know if the public health can recover from air pollution, water pollution, landfill leaks and nuclear waste pollution, etc. Only time will tell.

"There's a myth that organic food is expensive. But we ought to be adding in the hidden cost of pesticide food. Billions are paid, not at the cash register, but in our taxes and bills to cover Superfund and cleaning up of the environment and health losses due to cancer and toxic diseases.

"If a worm does wiggle into an organic apple, no one gets cancer from it. Not from a splotch on an orange, or a carrot that isn't perfectly shaped.

"Organic growers are, or should be, asking parity for their crops. If the growers don't ask for a living wage or price, they are not good business people. If the public won't pay it, sickness will be the outcome.

"Good, healthful food is that important."

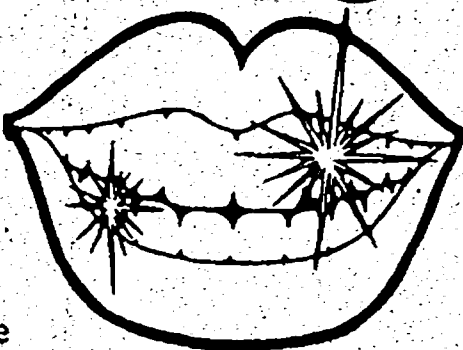

Hospitals look at sick child care

Hospitals and health care businesses in Metro Detroit have recently begun to address an emerging child-care aid, sick-child care.

In a forthcoming report commissioned by Health Care Professionals of Southfield, findings revealed that Michigan parents take between 6 to 8 work days per year to care for their sick children.

Many work days are lost when a child simply needs an extra day to recuperate from a flu or cold.

In response to this problem, two area hospitals have recently set up sick-child care facilities in their pediatrics wards for the children of their employees.

Pontiac General established its "Sniffles Program" two years ago. Botsford General, in Farmington Hills, set up the "Sniffle Stop" program earlier this year.

Neither program accepts children with communicable diseases, such as measles or chicken pox, and both require advance call-in to check for available space.

Oakland general, in Madison

Heights, has recently set up a similar program that is available to both employees and the general public. Their "Kids' Clinic" opened in March of 1988.

THE PROGRAM provides day care for sick children Monday through Friday, 6:30 a.m. - 6:30 p.m. The charge is \$10 per day for employees and \$20 for the general public, including meals and snacks.

Before using the service, parents must call to check that space is available and to be screened to ensure that the nature of the illness is appropriate to the clinic.

The number to call for more information is 867-7594.

Health Care Professionals has tak-

en a different approach to the issue of sick-child care with its Rent-a-Mom program. Through this agency, parents in Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties can hire a short-term nurse aide.

THE AIDES are specifically trained to care for sick children, including the mentally and physically impaired, and they remain in 24-hour contact with a registered nurse.

In contrast with the hospital programs, the aides care for the full range of childhood illnesses.

Although this is a costly alternative (\$9.25 to \$10.75 per hour, depending on location), there is no minimum-time requirement.

Company president Ad Laforet envisions this as the child-care benefit of the future, recognizing that, while not everyone can afford this service, many could within the framework of an employer-supported program.

use of the VOCA's.

and several part-time students work to create voice synthesizers.

Dr. John Eulenberg and his staff in 1974 began researching projects to equip people with workable synthesizers.

"We are dedicated to finding technological pathways for people to communicate with one another," Eulenberg said. "Our work has typically been focused on those with severe communication handicaps."

The research led to the creation of the mini-VOCA, a Voice Output Communication Aid. It is composed of a personal portable computer, a display screen, a switch and a DECTalk voice synthesizer.

"OUR END GOAL is to show that people's lives can be enhanced by being able to speak," said Steve Blosser, technical director of the Artificial Language Lab. "We want to prove that it can be done. Many people have nowhere to go."

The lab is funded entirely by individual projects. It receives no money from the MSU or outside organizations.

"I do recommend the lab to other people, but I also feel very bad that most of the people, who need the services that the lab provides, can't afford them," said Vicki Caruso, a recipient of one of the Lab's synthesizers. "I also feel very angry that the university puts so little value on the work that is being done at the lab by Dr. Eulenberg and his staff. The conditions they must work in are deplorable, to say the least."

Although MSU has offered other rooms to the lab, the rooms are in other university buildings and would cause the work to be too spread out.

"We are thankful for what we do have," Blosser said. "It is better to exist, than not exist. There could be more space, more recognition . . . shown by provisions, but there are not enough employees."

Stacked up in tall rows are shelves filled with a library of video tapes, tapes filled with the lab's success stories.

Every project is video taped and kept for future references. Often, the tapes are of speeches given to Congress by users of the voice synthesizers or of programs highlighting the

WHEN A PERSON with a severe communication handicap is found, and is interested in the program, a conference is held with that person, his family, doctors, therapists and lab staff.

"The process, while not all that involved, is very time consuming," Caruso said. "Usually, there is an evaluation to see that the person is capable, cognitive and physically able to use a system."

The conference allows input from everyone and the system that will be used is determined. Then the effort begins to get the project financed.

"Insurance will not pay for VOCA's," Blosser said. "They'll pay for certain types of replacements of organs, but not for voices."

Each system must be personalized for the user. Depending on the type of handicap a person has, the system may be operated by a toe, the head or the hand. A switch is responsible for communicating with the computer and synthesizer.

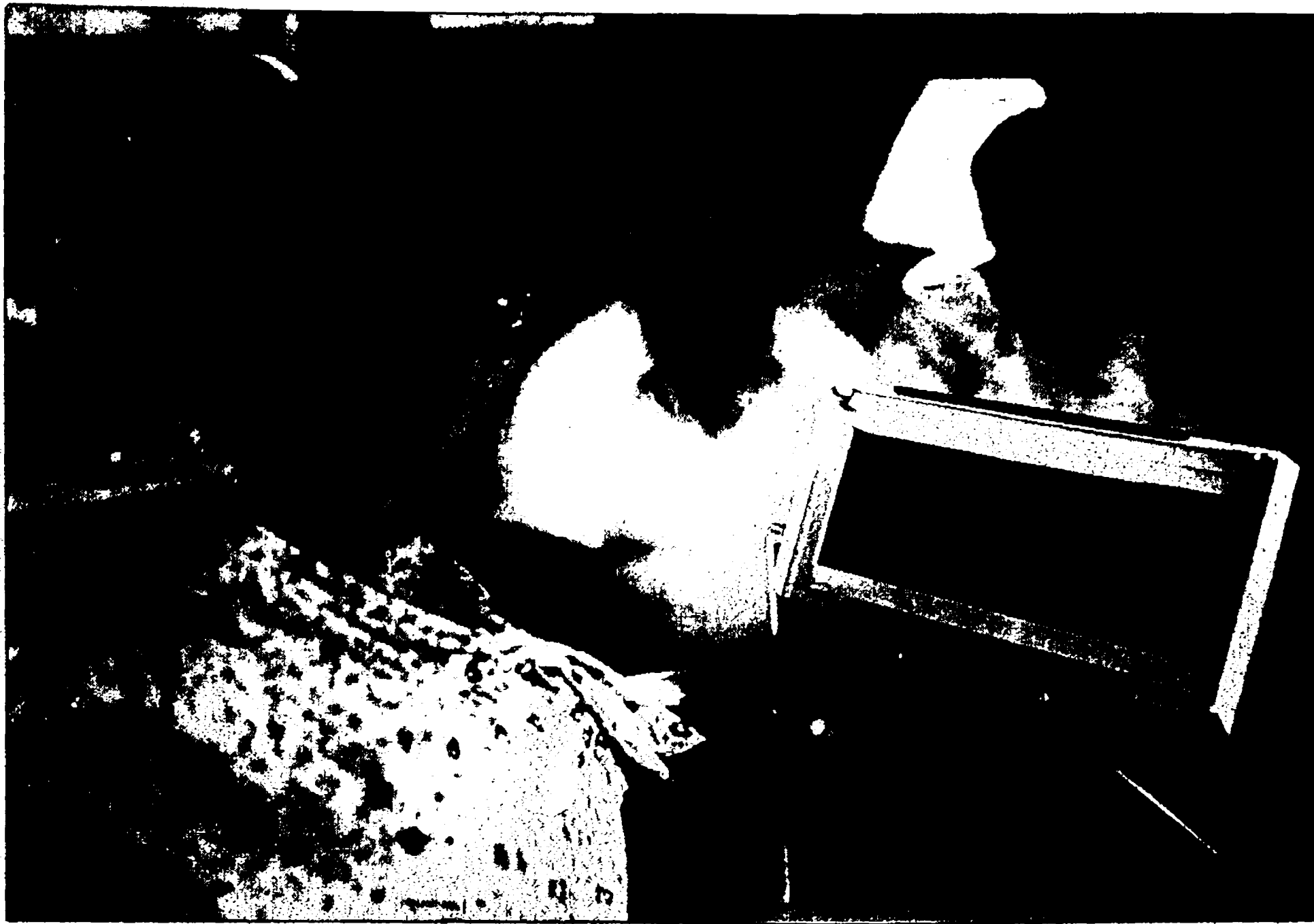
Often the recipients of the VOCA's will assist in the development of their systems. Jim Brooks, a Grand Rapids resident, earned a computer science degree from MSU after receiving a synthesizer. He helps develop systems and aids in research.

Since 1974, the lab has grown to international proportions. It publishes "Communication Outlook," an international quarterly magazine that contains articles on augmentative communication.

THE LAB'S work is also in India where synthesizers are created in several Indian languages. According to Blosser, they are also working to build a Chinese voice synthesizer through a Chinese university.

Here in Michigan, the language lab has work bases throughout the state, including the Northville Public Schools, Jackson County Intermediate School District, the Bureau of Rehabilitation and the Ingham County Intermediate School District.

"Without an effective way to communicate, a person sits on the sidelines watching life pass by, somewhat like watching a parade go by," Caruso said. "Communication is a vehicle that lets you become involved in the parade, and not just a spectator."

Computer gives her gift of 'gab'

IT WAS IN 1981 that Caruso turned to Michigan Rehabilitation Services for money to pay for a voice synthesizer.

"After hitting my head against a stone wall and getting no where, I gave up until March of 1988, when I tackled them again," Caruso said. "After a year's struggle trying to convince them that I could be employable with the right equipment and that the right equipment came from the Artificial Language Laboratory, not somewhere else, the battle was finally won. MRS along with the Department of Social Services agreed to fund the system for me."

"The break came when in April 1989, I was invited to give a speech on augmentative communication and was able to demonstrate first hand the system from the lab."

Caruso's voice synthesizer is known as a mini-VOCA, said Steve Blosser, the technical director of the language lab. The Prentke Romich Company built the controller for her wheelchair which was installed at

the University of Michigan. The switches also control the voice synthesizer.

"Vicki is doing well with the system," Blosser said. "She's been very patient. Some of our first attempts were good ones, but she had problems."

She operated the first system with her foot until she lost movement in it as the result of an operation. Now, it is set up with a monitor on the arm of her chair. The screen displays a page of information that ranges from the alphabet to complete phrases and sentences.

Caruso is able to move a cursor with her head switches and choose what she wishes to say.

THE MINI-VOCA synthesizes a young female voice. The equipment includes a lap-top IBM computer, a back-lighted panel display and a high quality synthetic voice.

"Vicki needs the proper tools to express herself," Eulenberg. "When she does find them, she has the ability to express herself. She has a good

command of the English language."

"I am now able to become involved with people more effectively," Caruso said. "Communication, whether natural or artificial, means you can share fully in the activities of work, family, friends, community and if one should choose, they could even tell someone where to go, and I don't mean give a direction."

"Most importantly, I no longer must depend on someone else to talk for me."

Caruso has held several computer-related jobs since receiving her degree, Gilbertson said. She has done computer consulting work and has worked on a data base for the Oak Park School District. Most of the work is done out of her home.

Currently, she is working on her autobiography and is planning to move into a supported independent living arrangement.

"An SI is where you live with a housemate and have staff that comes in and helps with whatever daily living activities you need help with," she said. "My long-term goal is to have a job, be as independent as

possible and keep enjoying life to the fullest."

Caruso once planned on attending MSU to study computers, but Gilbertson isn't certain if she still wants to do that.

"IT WAS A long five years at Schoolcraft," Gilbertson said. "How much would it really benefit Vicki to get a degree? She's limited in what she can do. We have to arrange our priorities and I don't see it opening any more doors for her."

The lab continues to update and work on Caruso's system. The family often drives up to the lab and spends that day working on her synthesizer. Caruso is able to communicate with the lab through a modem attached to her computer system.

Meanwhile, having a voice has continued to change her life.

"I have been told that I have become a vibrant, outgoing person now that I have a way to communicate," she said. "Lately, I have also heard, 'aren't you ever going to shut up' and 'you have gotten very mouthy lately.' I love it!"

too much water this year — like corn. But if you got the crop in before it started raining, (corn) should be superb."

Best tip for gardeners: It's not too late to contemplate a fresh garden planting of short term crops like lettuce, broccoli, cauliflower and radishes. Plant around Aug. 1.

(Plants) will grow well through the heat of August and can be harvested in September, or October —

even after the first frost," Krauskopf said.

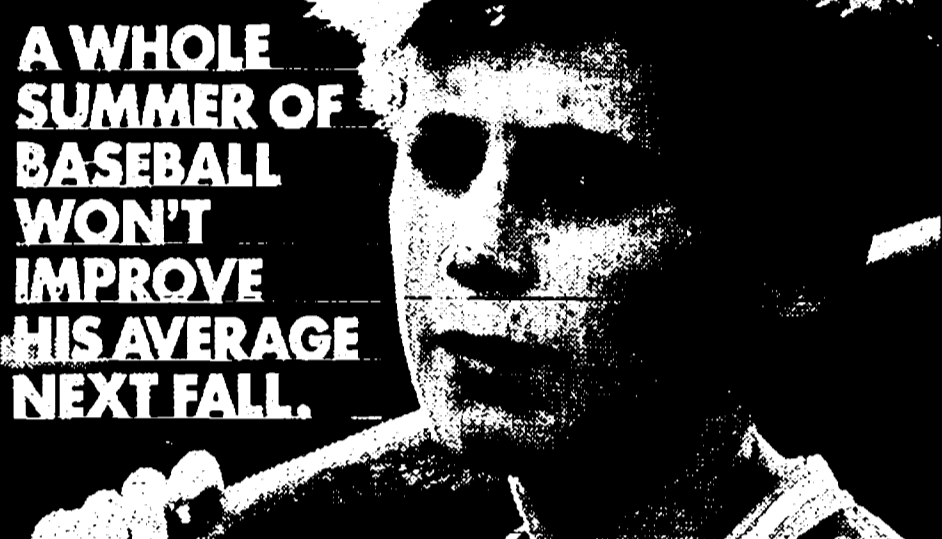

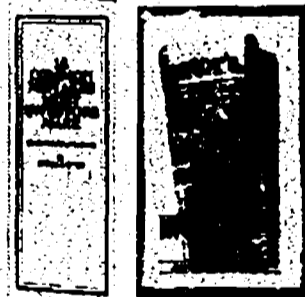

American Catholics reach 'unchurched'

Situations Bishop Leo Beauchamp encounters would leave most members of the clergy shaking their heads. Beauchamp does as well, except he's more likely to nod yes in order to help.

"We had two young people who weren't married and who had a baby," said Beauchamp, beginning to relate one of several situations he deals with as pastor of St. James American Catholic Church in Northville. "They wanted the baby baptized and one of the local churches said they would not do it."

"The mother of the son was a member of the church. She asked me to baptize the baby. I did. They turned it down."

Then there was the mother of a son who had AIDS. She needed some words of comfort. Or the woman who was divorced and hadn't been to Mass in seven years. Most are Catholics who might not feel welcomed in their church.

Beauchamp's St. James American Catholic Church in Northville is serving those people and others who are unchurched. Beauchamp esti-

mates there are 80,000 some Catholics in the Detroit area who are not attending Mass for various reasons.

"We learned that Catholics don't go to other churches," said Beauchamp, who lives in Livonia. "They go home and sit it out. We provide Catholicism they can participate in."

St. James American Catholic Church is not affiliated with the present day Roman Catholic Church, but follows Holy Scripture and church tradition except in four areas. At St. James Church, there is married clergy; communion for all people, divorced or divorced and remarried; birth, control within the marriage; and general absolution at the beginning of each Mass.

BEAUCHAMP SAID his church is part of the Old Roman Catholic Church. The name was changed to American Catholic Church because people associated the other handle with "Latin Mass and fish on Fridays."

The name symbolizes a new beginning in more ways than one.

Church in Northville.

Sunday services have moved to Silver Springs Elementary School in Northville until a permanent church site is found.

Beauchamp attended both St. John and Sacred Heart Seminaries, studying to become a deacon in the Roman Catholic church. He had aspirations for the clergy, but was married at the time.

The dream of becoming a member of the clergy never left. Instead, he later became ordained in the more liberal Catholic Church of America.

"All through high school, nuns wanted me to become a priest," said Beauchamp, who grew up in Alpena. "I said, 'No, no.' . . . I never thought I'd be doing this."

Plans include steady, but gradual movement in terms of growth. Beau-

champ said he would like to see four new American Catholic Churches in the next six years.

THE PRESENT goal is to bring those who normally don't attend church through the doors of St. James. New people are showing up every Sunday.

The biggest concern people have is the authenticity of the church, Beauchamp said. He goes to great effort to emphasize that St. James American Catholic Church — with the exception of the four areas — adheres to the Scriptures.

The same altar book is used as in the Roman Catholic Church; members even pray for the Pope. A brochure on St. James Church lists sources for people to consult on the validity of the Old Roman Catholic Church.

"My opinion on it is that it is not valid from our perspective," said Jay Berman, director of communications for Archdiocese of Detroit. "The Roman Catholic Church, as we know it, is not what that is. Unfortunately, we can't do anything about the word 'Catholic' being used."

The Old Roman Catholic Church is said to have its origins in Utrecht,

Holland, which was missionized under St. Willibrord, Apostle of the Netherlands, in the 7th Century.

Although liberal, the church is careful not to cross the line that would alienate people of Catholic upbringing. The church is firmly against abortion. As for women in the clergy, Beauchamp dances around the issue saying he has mixed feelings on it.

"We're not blazing any new trails," Beauchamp said. "We want to be very Catholic and stay that way."

From that perspective, Beauchamp said the church is not interested in perpetuating divisions between themselves and Roman Catholics. He's not looking for converts.

INSTEAD, HE wants to bring people closer to God.

"Our greatest blessing is our attitude," Beauchamp said. "We never ask someone where they are from or what church they went to before. We accept people just the way they are, which is really exciting."

"I won't turn down anyone who is needed. We do not belong in the judging business. Our main idea is how can we help those people in need."

Oat bran: No one is sure how it works

Q. How does oat bran lower cholesterol levels?

A. The soluble fiber in the oat bran is what lowers cholesterol in the blood. Experts aren't exactly sure how the soluble fiber reduces cholesterol, but one theory is:

The gall bladder excretes bile acids to digest the fat we eat. Normally, the body reabsorbs these acids and recycles them for future use.

These bile acids stick to soluble fiber, which passes right through the digestive tract. So instead of being

reabsorbed, the acids are excreted out the body with the fiber.

Since the body makes bile acids out of cholesterol, when the acids that stuck to the fiber are lost, the body's system takes some of the cholesterol out of the blood to make more acids — and down goes the blood cholesterol level.

The soluble fiber in beans, lentils and split peas probably work in a similar fashion. The insoluble fiber in wheat bran does not bind bile acids or lower cholesterol. It prevents constipation, though, and may help to prevent colon cancer.

Q. Our family has switched to

"lean" lunchmeat products to reduce fat consumption. Are these products as good as they claim?

A. According to CSPI nutritionists, these meat products being sold under the term "lean", "extra lean", "lite", or "low fat" are slightly less fatty than their regular counterparts. Sausage, bacon and bologna are some of the fattiest foods avail-

able in the American diet and reducing the fat by 25% still leaves more fat in the product than the terms lean, lite, or low fat indicate.

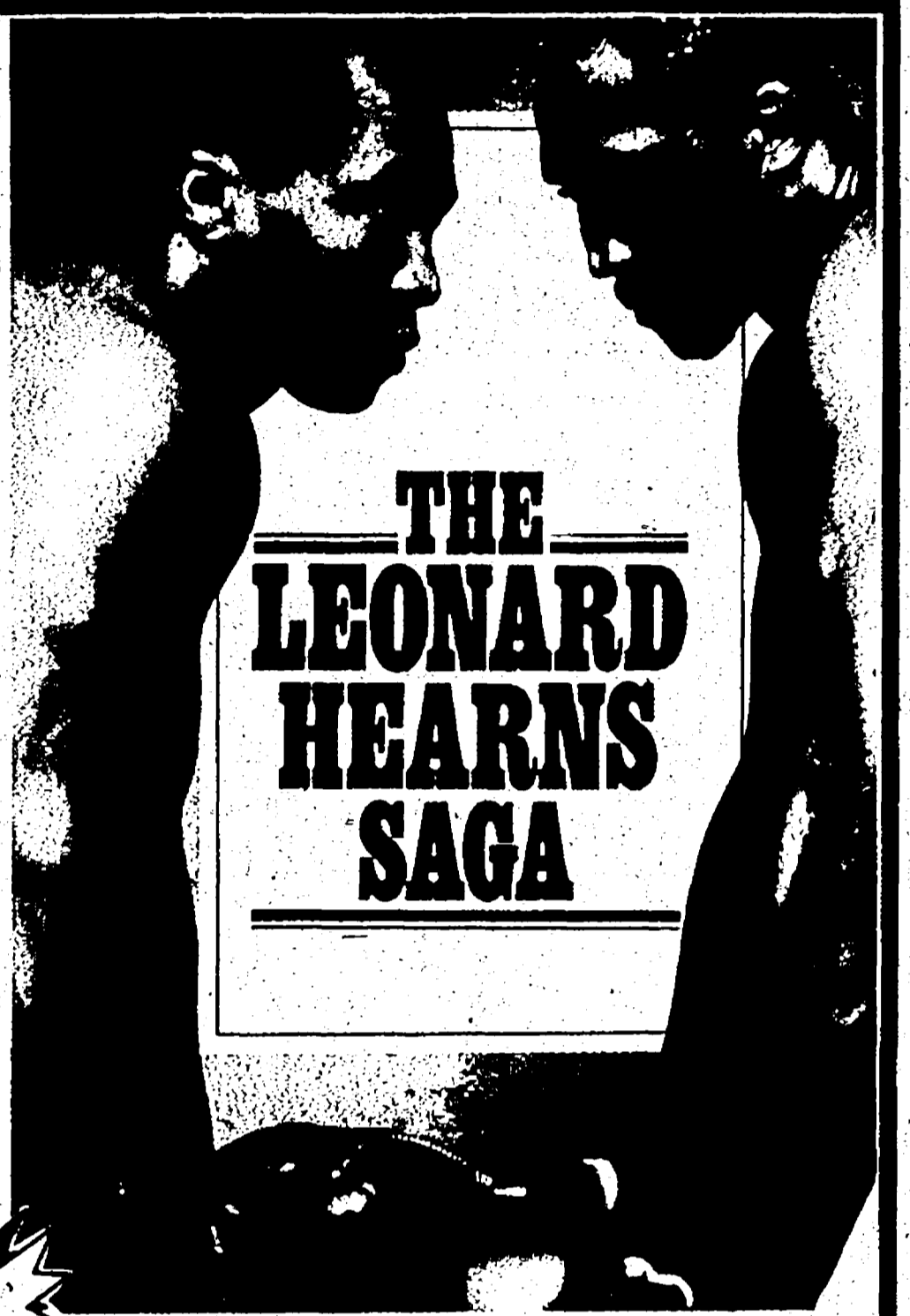

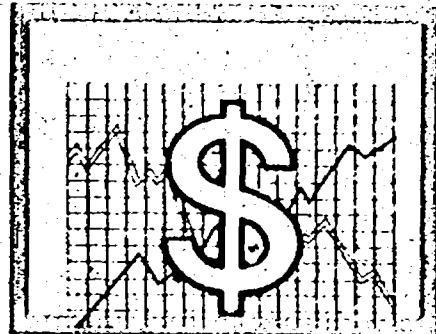

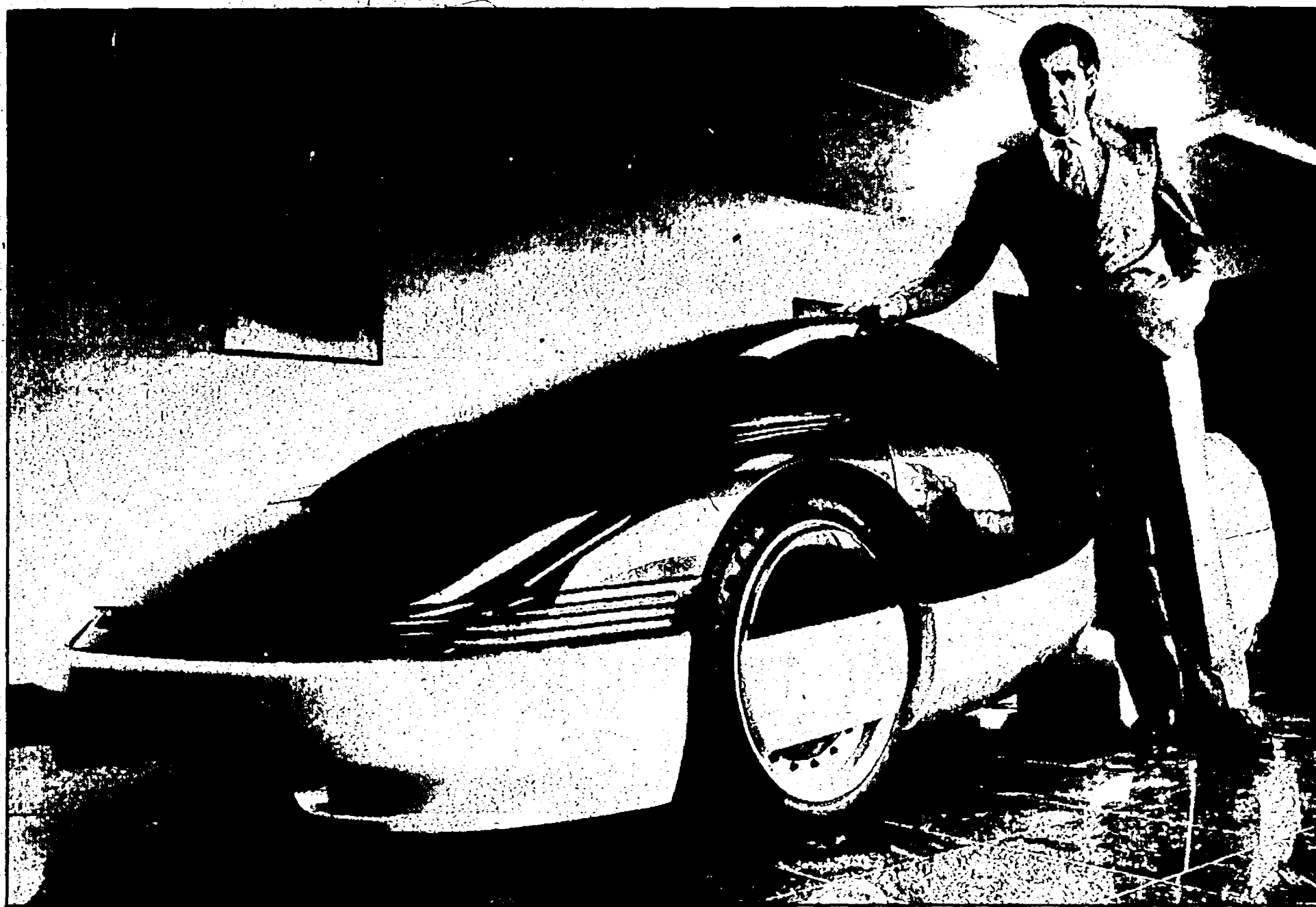

Design studio sets sights as major player here and abroad

They have names like Impact, Allen, Hunter, Interstate and Royale. Concept cars designed for a future where adventure is standard.

But these cars of tomorrow are not built by Ford or General Motors or any automotive company, for that matter.

Rather, International Automotive Design, with three styling studios in Livonia, and world headquarters in Worthing, England, provides futuristic design and engineering services to an automotive industry that places a premium on appearance and individuality.

"Historically, automotive suppliers around town offered a particular service, but in the last 10 years, as the automakers have scaled back, we have grown to fill the particular niches," said Victor Bogdan, design and marketing manager for International Automotive Design in Livonia.

"As it stands now, the automotive companies will develop a car for the

market, market the car, and all the work in between is done by companies like us. That's why the industry is growing."

IAD's revenues have tripled since 1985. Last year they were \$135 million. Bogdan, a Farmington Hills resident, said the company's annual sales grew roughly 20 percent in each of the last five years and should increase by that amount this year.

In addition, IAD was recently honored with the queen's award for Export Achievement by the British government, the company's third in the last four years. The award honors those British companies that maintain a high export level while exhibiting strong sales growth.

SO WHAT IS the company's secret? And why is it building concept cars when the automakers, as Bogdan said, are developing cars of their own?

"We place our emphasis on design engineering and computer-aided design, and we can go from a clay

model design to fiber glass prototypes right here."

Bogdan said IAD's 40,000-square-foot facility was built to serve the U.S. market better and avoid some of the penalties of the weak dollar.

"Essentially we offer our clients one-stop capabilities, where they don't have to travel around the world to check on this or see to that."

BOGDAN SAID IAD, which claims to be Europe's largest styling and engineering company, designs such futuristic cars as the Royale not only to gain international recognition, but to impress upon automotive clients that the company is exploring and setting future design standards.

For example, the Royale, developed with the corporate business person or entrepreneur in mind, offers passengers a personal computer, a facsimile machine, a satellite navigation system, two televisions for rear passengers and front and rear telephones.

Among running prototypes is the

Hunter, a sports/leisure utility vehicle designed to appeal to scuba

Good location not just a lucky choice

After saving for years, Sam opened a restaurant across from XYZ Corp. Although few businesses were in the area, the XYZ corporate offices housed more than 2,000 employees. The only other restaurant in the area was 10 miles away.

In his first six months, Sam did quite well. But then XYZ Corp. confirmed rumors that had been circulating for a long time. The company planned to relocate to another town, approximately 600 miles away. Within a year, Sam's restaurant folded.

Could Sam have prevented his business failure? Possibly. According to the Farmington Hills-based Michigan Association of CPAs, Sam should have researched the location more thoroughly and interviewed people from the community. If he had, he might have realized just how much his success depended on the fortunes of XYZ — and he might have gleaned hints about the company's relocation plans.

AN ESTIMATED 45,000 businesses failed in the first nine months of 1988, many of them because the owners did not take the time to gather information about the location. Manufacturers, for instance, should make sure that their location has quick access to transportation routes and necessary supplies. Retailers need to pay attention to local traffic patterns, community trends and store visibility.

If you are planning to buy property for a small business, start by investigating the overall makeup of several target communities or locations. From the census bureau, find out if the community is growing or shrinking. If shrinking, find out why.

For example, Sara planned to open a children's bookstore in a small town. When she investigated the community, she realized she had selected the wrong location. Employment was hard to find in the town and many young adults and recent college graduates were moving away to find work. Sara still opened the bookstore, but with an emphasis on mature titles rather than children's books.

The census bureau can also provide the population's average income, predominant occupations and median age. By comparing this information with past figures, you can determine if and how a community is changing. You should also find out whether nearby residents tend to be college-educated or blue collar workers. Do they rent or do they own their homes? Have local property values increased or decreased?

CONSIDER THE community's future. For instance, does the town have any plans for construction that may affect your business?

Most background information can be easily obtained from local government agencies, chambers of commerce, the Small Business Administration (SBA), trade associations, census bureaus and local newspapers.

But in your paper chase, don't overlook an important resource: the residents and business owners in the community. Introduce yourself to people in the town and try to get a feel for the community's personality and values. Ask local shopkeepers about the history of stores in the area. What type

Limit unemployment claim before employee is hired

Your new employee isn't working out. It's obvious he doesn't have as much experience as his resume suggested — he just can't keep up with the work. And you've talked to him twice about tardiness. So you figure since he has only been in your employ for a few weeks, you can fire him without fear of having to face an unemployment tax claim.

Wrong.

He goes to the Michigan Employment Security Commission (MESC), which sends you notification that a claim has been filed. Unsure of what to do, you call Quad C Co., a Troy consulting firm that helps small businesses control unemployment taxes. You figure you have a good case, and an expert will surely be able to win it for you.

Wrong again.

Josef D. Bruner, the company's president, said employers must practice what amounts to preventive medicine when it comes to unemployment tax management.

"They don't call us until it's too late," said Bruner. "When you hire people is when you want to limit your unemployment claim."

In the hypothetical situation above, the employer has no recourse if the employee embellished his resume. When it comes to Michigan's unemployment compensation laws, hiring someone is strictly a let-the-employer-beware proposition. If an applicant says he can work a 14th

and you hire him based on his word, you can't fire him because he performs inadequately without being liable in an unemployment claim.

BRUNER'S ADVICE to that employer would have been simple: check references. Or at least lead the applicant to the shop and see if he can pick out the lathe.

An employer can't assume the worker won't be eligible for unemployment benefits just because he is a new employee. If the worker left a job to take a new position and he has

worked at one or the other place for a total of at least 26 weeks, he will be eligible to collect unemployment.

"The law says you can transfer the claim from another employer into this employer's lap," said Bruner. "They can work for you one minute and still collect. The employers become livid because of that."

But what about the warnings you gave about the worker's tardiness? First of all, verbal warnings aren't going to stand up in the quasi-judicial proceedings of an MESC appeal hearing, said Bruner. Secondly, you can't fire someone for being late per se. The only infraction for which a worker can be fired and be ineligible for unemployment compensation is "misconduct," for which the MESC has a five-paragraph definition. And to prove misconduct, you need written documentation of "progressive discipline" because the employer bears the burden of proof at the hearing.

Failing to keep adequate records on problem workers is one of the biggest mistakes employers make in the area of unemployment tax management, Bruner said.

"They are constantly reacting. They're never prepared in advance," he said. "They fire someone, probably for good reason, but they forget to document progressive discipline."

ALL THIS MAY sound simple enough, but most employers are at best vaguely familiar with unem-

ager for Ford's Lincoln-Mercury Division. Most recently, IAD was involved in the design of the Volvo 440/480. BUT IF BOGDAN could put a handle on the 13-year-old company's success, he said recognizing the automotive market as a worldwide entity is paramount to survival. "The industry is very competitive, and it's getting more competitive all the time. The company which is strong on each of the continents will be major players in the 21st century."

IAD opened its Livonia office in April 1988, and it contributed more than \$10 million to the company's total revenues last year. It has similar studios in Huntington Beach, Calif. Other offices are scattered through Europe, with another each in Tokyo and Moscow. The company employs 950 employees worldwide, 70 in Livonia. Leading the way on a tour of fabrication and computer rooms, Bogdan said a credit card security system will soon be in place to ensure that clients' designs will be secure. IAD now has contracts with Ford, General Motors, Mazda, Nissan, Volvo, Opel, Rolls Royce, Renault and others. In the next 18 months, the company plans to break ground on

three new buildings to be added on land at the rear of the present facility at 12743 Merriman. The buildings will house facilities for a spray booth and fiber glassing; another 40,000 square feet for styling studios, and an outside court area for clients to view cars in direct sunlight. Bogdan announced his company has signed a contract with the Soviet Union, valued initially at \$49.3 million, to design and develop a series of Soviet-produced commercial vehicles. Perhaps glasnost will come to mean more than openness, but an open-road vehicle as well.

 placement compensation laws, said Bruner. He said in 11 years of consulting, he has never met an employer who has read the pertinent laws. If a claim is successful, the former employee can collect approximately 70 percent of his or her net earnings for up to 26 weeks (less if he or she gets another job). And it is the employer — not the federal or state government — who must bear 100 percent of the cost of the claim. The good news for employers, Bruner said, is that they have some control over their unemployment tax rate.

said. "It's reducible." An employer's unemployment tax can range from 1 to 10 percent of their taxable payroll. In other words, a company with a taxable payroll of \$1 million could pay from \$10,000 to \$100,000. Part of the tax goes into a reserve fund, which could be used, for example, to cover an unexpectedly large number of successful claims. The percentage charged a company in a given year depends on several variables, including changes in payroll, the number of successful claims against it and the amount it has in its reserve. But in general the fewer claims for which the company is held responsible, the lower its unemployment tax bill will be.

Many firms have in-house industrial relations or human resources personnel who handle unemployment tax matters. But those employees have other duties and usually don't have the required specialized knowledge, Bruner said. "If they lose one unemployment case in a year — that's our fee. You give me \$10, I give you \$50. Are we

of businesses does the community support and which types have failed?

After you decide on the general area in which you want to open a business, your next step is selecting a particular property. A top priority should be gathering in-depth information on the property's traffic patterns — the number of possible customers who pass by on a regular basis. The SBA has a number of publications that can tell you how to use traffic studies.

You should also take note of the proximity of possible competitors, both present and future. Bob and Ann, for instance, opened a small sporting goods store in a town just emerging as a major recreational center. Unfortunately, they failed to ask who had bought the empty lot a mile down the road. When a major sporting goods retailer moved in, the couple tried to compete, but to no avail.

ANOTHER MISTAKE small-business owners often make is ignoring a site's history. If the building has housed four different businesses in three years, it would be wise to take a second look at the property. You may have overlooked a subtle but important flaw in the building's location.

Once you are satisfied with the site, it's time to investigate the building's actual physical condition. Is the facility large enough to permit future expansion? Does the property need major modification to satisfy your business needs?

Selecting the right location can make or break your business. Don't make the mistake that so many do and select a site for reasons that are unrelated to your business like proximity to your home. Do your homework and find the site that is best for your business.

The dubious logic of car demographics

The growing number of hair-restorer ads in Road and Track is one of those low-level demographic indicators that should be sounding an alarm to auto analysts who thought the baby boom would last forever.

The reality is that the pill generation is taking over — those kids conceived only after careful consideration of their impact on their parents' lifestyles, which has meant kids under 20 today are outnumbered by their parents' generation by maybe 3-1.

I suspect this already has had an impact beyond the graying of Road and Track. Cheap cars are not selling well; in fact, Yugo of America is reportedly trying to figure out how to stuff unsold cars in cereal boxes. The usual reason offered by analysts is that Americans have become so affluent they simply sniff at anything with less than a luxu-label.

Fat chance. Little cars always have been bought mainly by recent college graduates and kids who just got their first job. I suspect that the lack of population in the pill generation is the real culprit in sagging small-car sales — which means cheap cars won't recover soon.

All this came to mind after sitting through a couple of weeks of marketing presentations that invariably included some kind of demographic analysis of the potential customer for this particular car.

DEMOGRAPHICS usually are coached in median age, median income and a few suppositions about the lifestyle, although marketing types are usually a little cagey about the latter. I've never seen any car presented as just the ticket for an up-and-coming drug dealer, for example.



I've also noticed that demographic analysis doesn't have much consistency. A \$12,000 car, for example, is supposed to be affordable by a bright graduate making a median family income of, say, \$35,000. Does this mean a young couple making \$17,500 each? Then who gets to drive to work? I don't think \$17,500 would make the insurance payment on a \$12,000 car.

Or take another example. A luxury car was supposed to interest two groups: the 35-46-year-olds,

and the "over 50s." A little arithmetic and you realize there is a mysterious five-year gap here, where you presumably can't buy this automobile.

Another oddity in the same presentation was the notion that a \$50,000 median income was supposed to buy a \$35,000 car. The closing gap between the price of a luxury car and the income of its potential buyer as seen through demographic analysis is a common theme. One company selling a

One company selling a \$90,000 car said the median income of its customers also was \$90,000.

\$90,000 car said the median income of its customers also was \$90,000. Well, maybe that's what was reported to the IRS.

Adding to the elusive nature of just who buys new cars is a methodology called "psychographics," which I assumed was some kind of joke the first time I heard about it.

Not so. Psychographics, which groups potential car buyers according to their emotional relationship with their automobile (loves cars, treats cars as an appliance,

etc.) is taken very seriously among the marketing types. In any case, it makes wonderful charts.

All of this may be meaningless to the average customer who simply wants a ride. After a couple of hours dealing with financial doubletalk and checkbook angst, the last thing he needs to know is that somebody else has his number.

Top-rated bonds have pitfalls

At a recent seminar I asked the following question: "Besides CD, what's the safest, guaranteed investment available today?" The answer came from a 62-year-old millionaire, Mrs. Betty Client: "The safest investment is AAA-rated bonds." This answer typifies the confusion which exists in investors' minds about the safety of high-grade bonds.

THE TRUTH:
Assume you purchase a 8 percent, 30-year, AAA-rated bond for \$1,000. Because of its high rating, you can expect to receive \$40 every six months for 30 years. Also, upon maturity in 30 years, you will receive the maturity price of \$1,000. The potential for default in this case is practically non-existent. This is why most bond investors consider high-grade bonds as both guaranteed and safe.

While the coupon payments and the maturity price are never at risk, this bond, like all its counterparts, carries a great deal of market interest risk.

The accompanying chart articulates this risk. If, subsequent to your purchase of this bond the market interest rate rises to, say, 12 percent, the market price of this bond will drop to \$677, a drop of 32.3 percent. Furthermore, the argument that you have no intentions of selling this bond is also not valid, since you

would suffer the loss whether you sell it or not. In technical jargon, this is known as an opportunity cost.

In addition to the drop in the bond's market price, the higher inflation rate, which is generally associated with higher interest rate, also reduces your real return. This means that even though you continue to receive \$40 every six months, because of inflation the real value of the coupon payments is less than

\$40.

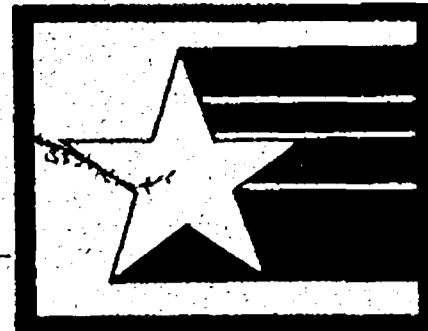

If, on the other hand, you're looking for a fun afternoon or evening on the water and you want to sit back, relax, sip a few brews or uncork an '87 Kendall Jackson Chardonnay while enjoying fine cuisine, then read on.

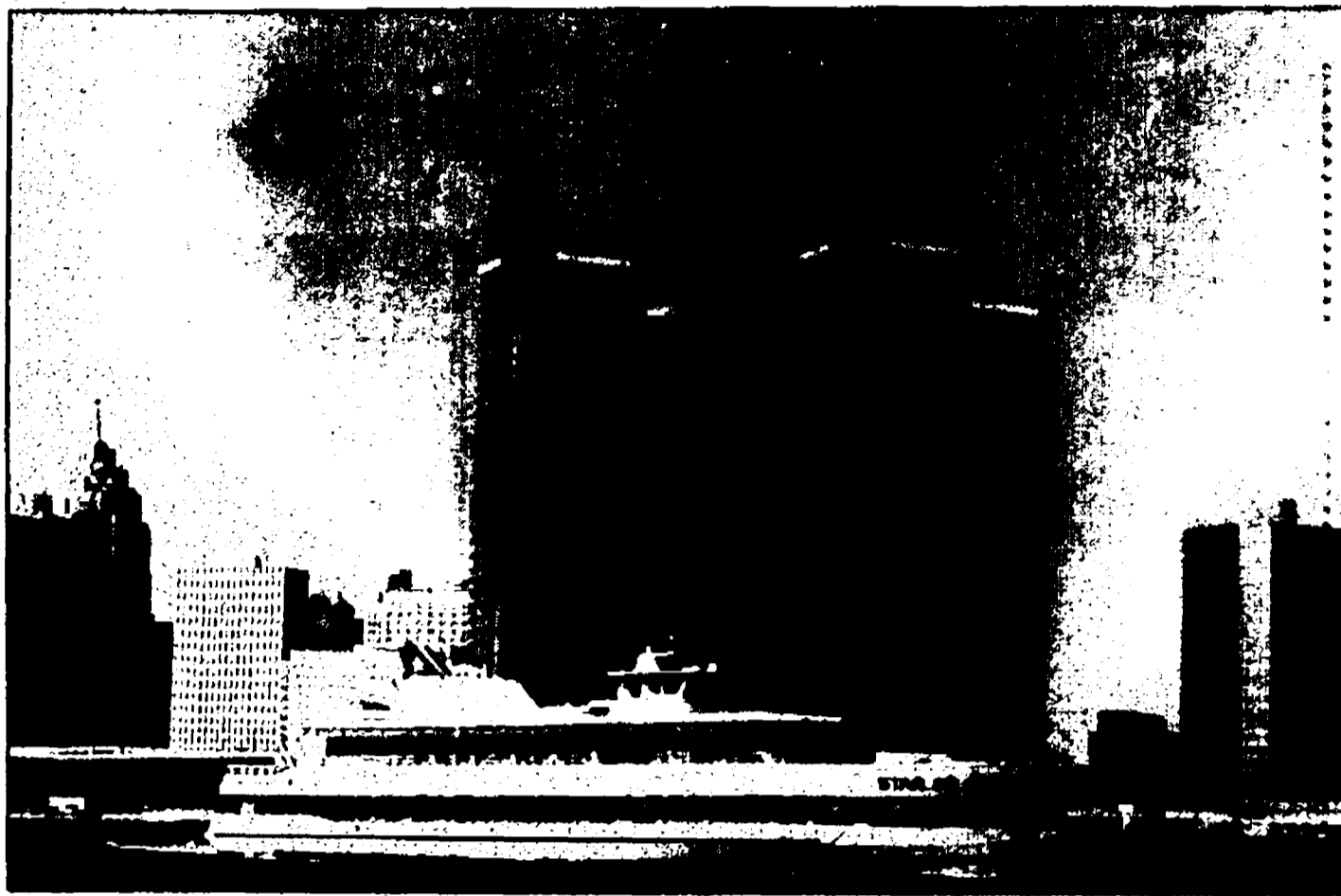
Within the last five years, major investors and yacht brokers have discovered just how glorious and spectacular the Detroit waterways are. And it's about time.

THIS YEAR, AS with the past few, you can enjoy a gorgeous sail down the river and into Lake St. Clair shelling out as little as \$28 per person or as much as \$400 per hour on such notable cruise ships as the Star of Detroit, the Helene, the Star of Detroit Too or the Golden Voyager. 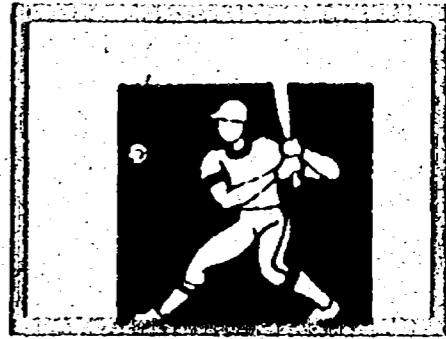

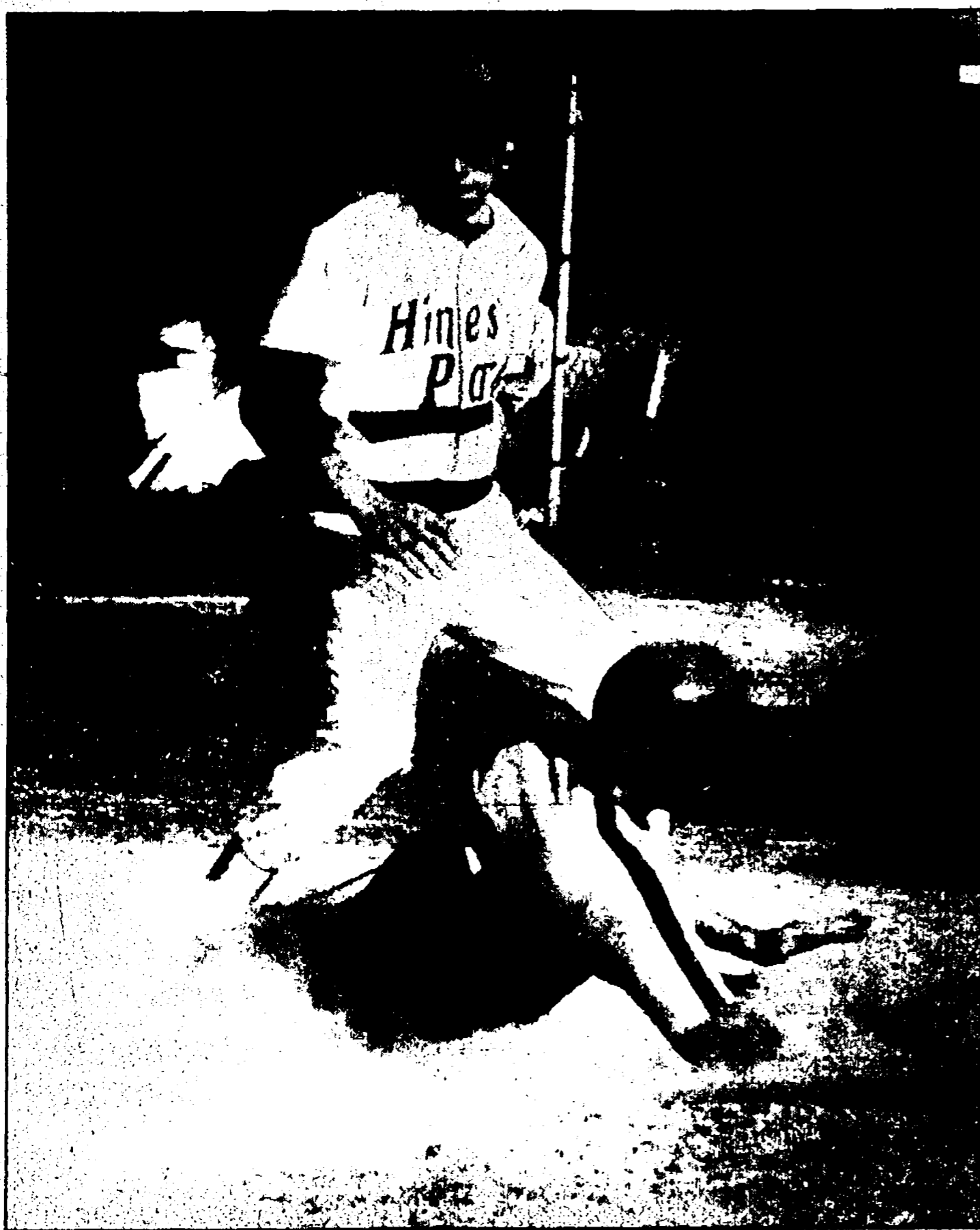

Caesars bombs Hines Park, 14-4

Jim Miller, one of the new additions to the Redford Little Caesars baseball team, had trouble finding his glove Wednesday after Caesars dismantled Hines Park Lincoln Mercury, 14-4, at Ford Field.

Assistant coach Ken Wandzel located the mitt near the Caesars dugout and gave it to his star pitcher before he left.

Miller could have done without the mitt during the game, because all he needed was his strong right arm. Miller, quite a find himself, tossed a six-hitter, leading Caesars to the lopsided win that ended after five innings because of the mercy rule.

The win places Caesars and Hines Park in a first-place tie in the Livonia Collegiate Baseball League at 17-5-1 each.

MILLER, WHO graduated this spring from Waterford Kettering, will play football in the fall at Michigan State University, but for now he's strictly a baseball player.

"He hits, too," Caesars coach John Moraltis said of his cleanup hitter. "He's a good athlete. He wants to go with the dink ball a lot but he throws the ball 85 or 86 (mph) and I said to him tonight, 'Throw it as hard as you can and I guarantee they won't get one or two runs off you.'"

"This was probably the most important win of the year. We're fighting for first with only seven games left."

Caesars gave Miller all the support he could ask for in the first two innings. Hines Park took the game's first lead, 1-0, scoring a run on a bases loaded walk to Bill Bannon, but Caesars put the game away in its first two at-bats.

Hines Park ace Derek Darkowski, now 7-2, was chased after managing to retire only one of the first seven batters he faced in the bottom of the first. Darkowski surrendered a three-run home run to Art George, walked four and was charged with six runs.

HIS REPLACEMENT, Mike Sulak, fared no better. The first batter to face Sulak was Caesars catcher Jack Daniels, who rocketed a shot off the left field light tower for a two-run double.

Caesars continued its onslaught in the second, scoring seven runs off Sulak, highlighted by an RBI single by Miller and a two-run single by Sean Maloney. Combined, Darkowski and Sulak walked nine batters, and seven of the players issued free passes eventually scored.

Bob Files, the third Hines Park pitcher, allowed only one run and four hits over the last 3 1/2 innings, but by then the outcome was decided.

"Our pitching killed us, me and Sulak," Darkowski said. "It was just one of those days. It seemed like everything I threw, I forced. We can't expect to win too many games walking nine batters in the first two innings."

Darkowski has beaten Caesars twice previously, but Moraltis said he knew right away Caesars was facing a tired arm.

"HE'S DECENT when he's got a rest," Moraltis said. "He's got a good curve and throws heat. But every time I look up he's pitching. They use him too much."

Caesars collected 11 hits off Hines Park pitching and the biggest bat belonged to George, who knocked in four runs. George, who attends the University of Evansville, had an RBI single in the second in addition to his three-run homer in the first.

Only lead-off man Tim Napier failed to get a hit in the Caesars lineup, but he was walked twice and scored both times.

"George is the best talent in the league," Moraltis said. "He has soft hands and runs like a sprinter. He leads us in stolen bases."

Chris Sisler had two hits off Hines Park, scored twice and drove in a run. The other major contributor in Hines Park's lineup came from cleanup hitter Dan Niemiec, who had two singles and scored once.

"Miller is hittable," Hines Park coach Dave Racer said. "Sisler hit him hard. Thing is, he throws heat but can't get the breaking ball over. I'm not taking anything away from them — they're a good team. But throw out the first two innings and we beat them."

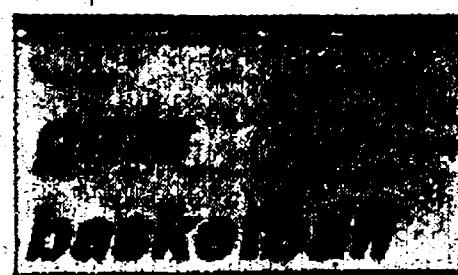
Wayne Memorial High didn't have to go to great lengths to find a successor for girls basketball coach Gary Schwan.

Two-year assistant Jack Furlong will assume the duties, replacing Schwan, who stepped down after three seasons with a 35-27 mark. (The Zebras finished 17-4 last season.)

According to Wayne athletic director Bill Hawley, Schwan stepped down last month because of conflicts with his job at Ford Motor Co.

Schwan, believed to be on vacation, was unavailable for comment.

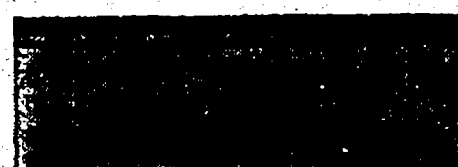
The ex-girls coach, however, indicated he would stick with Wayne basketball in some capacity, more than likely as a volunteer assistant to boys coach Chuck Henry.

Few challengers face Proper Reality in Michigan Mile

It appears Proper Reality will have plenty of breathing room, in-and-out of the starting gate, as a number of qualified nominees have shied away from the 41st running of the \$300,000 Michigan Mile at Ladbroke DRC.

Post-time is 5:40 p.m. Saturday, but not many had committed to the post by mid-week.

Allan Plevier, director of racing for DRC, has been scrambling all week to find a competitive field. By Saturday he hopes to bring in seven to nine other competitors.

As of Tuesday, DRC Public Relations Director Bob Raymond could confirm only "four definites," with the prohibitive favorite being Proper Reality, a 4-year-old brown colt boasting nine wins in 15 starts with

more than \$1.4 million in career earnings.

The other three "definites" include: MI Selecto, a grass specialist and recent winner of the \$150,000 Dominion Day Handicap in Toronto (July 1); Present Value, a two-time winner in '89 being shipped in from Kentucky; and Air Worthy, owned by Farmington Hills cement contractor John Carlesimo.

Proper Reality, bred in Florida and owned by 81-year-old Mrs. James Winn of Hot Springs, Ark., may follow in the footsteps of previous Mile winners Waquoit (1987) and Lost Code (1988), each of whom won in romps.

PROPER REALITY'S TRAINER Robert Holthus has been a leading trainer at three different tracks including DRC (1970-71), Oaklawn Park in Hot Springs (six times) and

horse racing

Hawthorne Race Course near Chicago.

Holthus has trained four different stakes winners, but calls Proper Reality "the best horse I've ever had."

The jockey, 31-year-old Dallas native Jerry Bailey is no slouch either, having been the leading jockey at Hawthorne (1976-77) along with the Tropical Park meeting at Calder Race Course near Miami (1977-78). He has more than 2,100 career wins earning in excess of \$40 million. In 1984 he rode Fit to Fight, who won the New York Racing Association's Handicap Triple Crown.

Rated one of the top 10 thoroughbreds in the country, Proper Reality, assigned a top weight of 120 pounds, has been on the grounds since late last month along with Air Worthy, which the veteran Carlesimo calls "the best horse I've ever owned" in 29 years.

Air Worthy recently returned (June 24) from Churchill Downs in Louisville, Ky., where he won the \$100,000 Stephen Foster Handicap, a Grade III stakes race.

A VICTORY SATURDAY by Air Worthy could make up for a blunder Carlesimo made some 23 years ago.

Only a week before the 18th running of the Mile in 1966, Carlesimo sold Stanilas, which went on to upset favorite Tom Rolfe for the crown.

But make no mistake, some of the country's top thoroughbreds — Seeking the Gold, Blushing John, Crypto-

clearance and Private Terms — are all safe bets to be elsewhere this Saturday.

Because of Michigan rules regarding the use lasix, an anti-bleeding medication, a dream matchup for the 1988 Mile between Lost Code and Californian Cutless Reality fell through.

This year, DRC officials are trying to persuade Simply Majestic, a speed horse with more than \$1.2 million in career earnings and holder of six track records, to make an appearance.

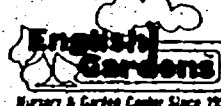

New Ocelots plan to recapture region

Graduation and grades have robbed Schoolcraft College's mens soccer team of some valuable assets. Not to worry: Ocelot coach Van Dimitriou has delved deeply into the local talent pool, cashing in on long-term investments to multiply his dividends.

Those dividends are well-documented in victory totals. Dimitriou's teams were consistently atop the Eastern Conference standings, until the last two seasons, when Macomb CC — SC's No. 1 nemesis — supplanted the Ocelots.

Dimitriou will seek to reverse that trend this fall. And although such standouts as stopper Lee Hunt and fullback Phil Neumaler have graduated, and midfielder Pete Ritsema and forwards Todd Nichols and Joe Messler failed to make grades, there is enough talent among the new recruits to be optimistic.

The secret to Dimitriou's recruiting success — which translates into annual region title runs — is overlapping. Many of the youths he coaches on his Livonia United club team find their way to SC. Four of his top eight field players have performed on a Dimitriou team before.

A TEAM'S success starts in goal; so does the Ocelots'. "Speaking of strengths, we'll be solid in goal with size and experience," the SC coach predicted.

The size comes from newcomers Jeff Shuk, a 6-foot-5, 190-pounder who guided his Nevada high school team to the state finals (nine shut-outs, 0.89 goals-against average), and Jim Robbins, a 6-4, 185-pound transfer from Henry Ford CC from

Woodhaven. Robbins planned to play basketball at HFCC, but after a leg injury decided to switch to soccer.

The experience comes from returnee Chris Moore, a Redford Catholic Central grad. Unfortunately, what Dimitriou doesn't have is a combination of size and experience in the net; Moore, while steady and fundamentally sound, stands just 5-8.

Still, the situation in goal is far better than it's been in recent years. "Are we loaded at goalie," claimed Dimitriou, noting the depth. "Whereas last year, we really had just one goalie."

THERE'S MORE to fuel the optimism. The players who do return all started, at one time or another. Chris Speen, the sweeper from Livonia Churchill, and Doug Sobolak, a fullback from Plymouth Canton, anchor the defense. Brian Thomas, also from Churchill, and Brendan O'Reilly, from Redford Union, lead the offense.

"We should be strong down the middle," said Dimitriou. "How well we do will depend on how well the supporting players come through."

Among the best of the recruits are:

- Khaled Zeldan, the high-scoring forward from Churchill who was injured and missed the Chargers' state tournament loss to Class A champ Stevenson. He was a first-team all-WLAA and all-Observer. "A lot of people think he's among the best in the area. He's fluid and he does nice things with the ball," Dimitriou, however, was concerned that Menary's style was too slow. "He'll have to adjust to my pace of game."
- John Cortese, a midfielder-forward from Canton who was an all-Western Division choice. "He's

goals for Stevenson than anyone else. He has beautiful timing on headers and can play defense, too."

- Chuck Przygoda, a leader for Troy Athens and an all-Eccentric and all-Metro Suburban Activities Association pick as a midfielder/fullback. "He's the steadiest player of the lot," said Dimitriou. "This kid makes no mistakes. He's consistent."
- David Dingle, a big (6-1, 180), physical defender, from Stevenson whose zealous play put him on the sidelines midway through the season (Dingle was suspended after a verbal altercation with an opposing coach). "He brings size and meanness to the team. He's got outstanding moves, and can play any position. He's intimidating back (on defense)."

- T.J. Flowers, another sizable defender (6-2) who started four straight years at Churchill. "He's basically a defender who needs polish and quickness in beating opponents to the ball. He's a hard worker, though."
- Rick Menary, a midfielder from Canton who scored six goals and nine assists and was first-team all-WLAA and all-Observer. "A lot of people think he's among the best in the area. He's fluid and he does nice things with the ball," Dimitriou, however, was concerned that Menary's style was too slow. "He'll have to adjust to my pace of game."

- John Cortese, a midfielder-forward from Canton who was an all-Western Division choice. "He's

small, but he works hard. He's a little limited where speed is concerned."

Both are promising, said Dimitriou; so are Paul Joziorowski and Eric Coulter, both forwards and former co-captains at Redford Union (Coulter was all-Northwest Suburban League).

Ed McCarthy, a forward from Redford, enrolls at SC after playing one season at Siena Heights (he'll be a sophomore), and Tim Ridd hails from Texas (he now lives in Canton). Others to watch are Jon Honhart, from Franklin; Jeff LaFontaine, from Novi; Brian Engel, from Northville; and James Homberg, from Dearborn Heights.

Leafhoppers — Invisible insects of the meadows

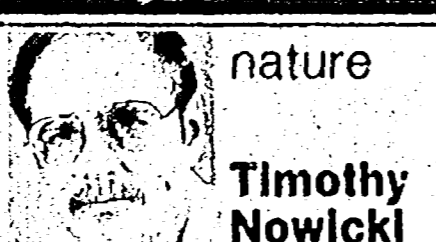
WHEN A person looks out over a meadow in southeastern Michigan, the beautiful summer wildflowers mirror a rainbow, spider webs reflect the morning dew, and the wind waves the whispering grass. Even from the surface, a meadow is a grand place to view.

But just as the ocean surface may reflect the beauty of a sunset, the most spectacular beauty is found beneath the surface. Oceans provide coral reefs with their multitude of colorful fish and corals, meadows hide the world of insects.

Until you take the time to sweep the meadow grasses with a simple insect net, you will not know the real hidden beauty of a meadow. Insects exhibit such variety of forms and colors that it would take volumes to describe. But let's look at one invisible insect of the meadow you will surely find.

Leafhoppers are invisible until you walk through the grasses. Then like kernels of corn, they pop in profusion in all possible directions. They are not much bigger than a kernel of popcorn either. When you examine one that has landed on your pantleg it will be about a quarter-inch long.

One species, the red-banded leafhopper, is blue and red striped. Par-

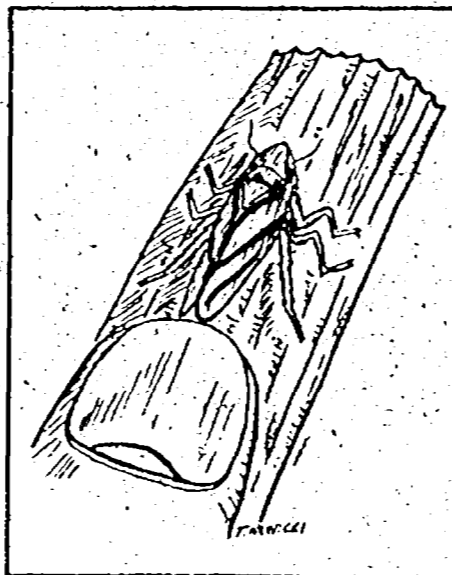

ticularly striking when seen, their beauty often goes unnoticed.

Before it moves away, examine how the wings are held over the back in a tent-like manner. Then, once you have satisfied your curiosity, induce it to jump by gently nudging the tail with your finger. In an instant, the leafhopper has rocketed from its launch pant a distance of 12 inches. A 6-foot man would have to jump the distance of a football field to span an equivalent distance.

Some leafhoppers travel even greater distances in order to find food during the summer. When the adults become active after their winter dormancy, they may fly 150 miles north to find additional food. Young raised in this new area will fly south in fall to take advantage of warmer winter weather.

There are many other insects which are easy and enjoyable to see, if you take the time. Damselflies, dragonflies, beetles and other bugs

are amazing and fascinating to adult and child alike.

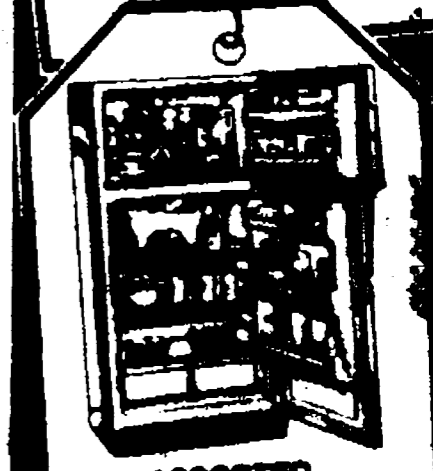

'Office hypertension' — puzzling phenomenon

Dear Jo:
I don't normally have high blood pressure, but when I visit my doctor, I can be sure it will be up. My doctor says I have a condition he calls "white coat hypertension." My blood pressure is always normal before I see him, when the nurse checks it — but within minutes (when my doctor takes it), it's up. Would you please address this subject in your column?

Dear Mrs. G.:
Of the estimated 60 million North Americans who are diagnosed as having hypertension (high blood pressure), many do not have it at all. "White coat hypertension" or "office hypertension," is the phenomenon that occurs when a patient's blood pressure is elevated when taken by the doctor in the office setting. Prior to the visit, the reading is usually normal when taken by a nurse, or technician. Also, these elevated levels usually do not occur at home or at work, or in stressful situations — nor do they stop after repeated visits to the doctor's office.

It is not unusual for people your age to feel nervous about a doctor's visit. The usual symptoms of stress such as a "knot" in your stomach or an increased heart rate do not indicate that you have high blood pressure. Hypertension, for most people,

does not present itself with any symptoms at all.

The cause of white coat hypertension is unknown. Research, including extensive psychological examinations of these people, has not disclosed any hidden anxieties about seeing a doctor.

Those who are most likely to have

white coat hypertension are: women of all ages, and younger people who are slightly overweight.

There is no treatment for white coat hypertension as it is not considered to be a disease. It is important that you have your blood pressure monitored regularly in different settings and by different professionals, including your doctor, over an extended period of time.

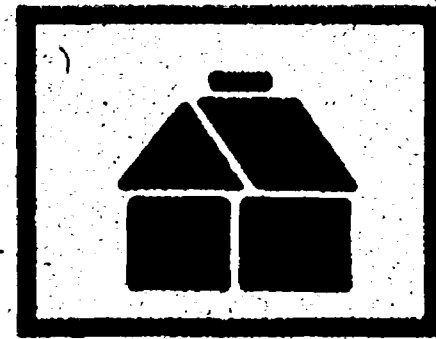

Pan flute dates to dawn of time

When the sound of the pan flute floats through the pavilion and out over the hill at Meadow Brook Saturday evening, it will be an echo in time. The pan flute or the flute of pan dates back 6,000 years — one of the oldest known musical instruments.

Gheorghe Zamfir, pan flute virtuoso, born outside of Bucharest, Romania in 1941, son of a vineyard owner, will bring four pan flutes with him for his appearance with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, each capable of playing 20 octaves. Not only does he make them himself from the finest Chinese and Japanese bamboo, but he composes and arranges for them as well. He has expanded on the traditional 20-tube version, his now contain 22, 25, 28 and 30 tubes.

In his lifetime he has gone from a little boy guarding goats in the Romanian hills to an internationally acclaimed artist with 33 platinum records to his credit.

And even through his musical talent was recognized early on, he has worked very hard to perfect his many musical skills. At 13 he learned to play the accordion and after pleading with his father, was enrolled in the local music school at 14. But, there was no one to teach him accordion, so he was admitted to the pan pipes class.

He graduated from the Bucharest Conservatory after studying harmony, counterpoint and piano. Later he specialized in music education and

was conducting Mozart and Beethoven for orchestra. He also studied voice and spent 12 years in a Romanian opera chorus and developed a liking for Verdi and Puccini. At one time he was conductor of a 350-member Romanian folk ensemble, later a much smaller one. He still has students in Paris and Switzerland, has a home in Paris and another outside of Montreal.

Zamfir's repertoire ranges from Mozart, Debussy, Ravel and Stravinsky to Romanian and other types of folk music, pop, jazz and disco. For concert information, call 377-2010.

Retirees find it fun, challenging

TROY RETIREES Arion Quigley and William Beeler say needlepointing is an interesting, productive way to pass time. Neither falls into an explanation of musel-induced inspiration or unsatisfied, creative longings. Both matter-of-factly say they saw people doing it and decided it didn't look that hard.

Needlepoint pieces by these two relative newcomers to the craft fill a display window in the little lobby at the back parking lot entrance to Jacobson's Home Furnishings store in Birmingham.

It's part of the month-long Customer Exhibit in the needlework department on the lower level of the store. Other needlepointers who are or were clients are: Dr. Robert Brownlee of Wisconsin, who still orders his supplies from there and has his canvasses framed there; and Dr. Benjamin Grundfast of New York, regarded as the department's "pro" stitcher who likes to do advanced "trophy" pieces.

This isn't meant to take anything away from these local guys who can hold their own with the rest of the pack nicely, thank you.

Beeler, who was an automotive engineer with Ford Motor Company, said he started 1½ years ago. "I just thought there was nothing to it. My mother-in-law and my wife's aunt needlepoint and when I watched them I said, 'I can do that!'"

He started with six inch squares, a cardinal and a unicorn, that he bought at Frank's. He recommends that for beginners. They're easy and they go quickly. Since January he's finished three of the four Christmas stockings he's making for his daughters.

"The stockings (canvasses) didn't have names. I put all the names in. They're gonna be for my daughters — they don't know it yet," he said with a wry smile. He added, "I do

wood working, I make my own frames. It's not difficult. I just bought a book and that's it." As to whether he was thinking about making Christmas stockings for his seven grandchildren, he smiled and said, "I'm not taking that order — yet."

Quigley, former counselor at Clara Barton Junior High in Royal Oak, said he has no idea how long it took him to do the 14-piece manger scene. "I always have several things going at the same time." He remembered asking his wife about 12 years ago if it was hard to do. "She said no, it's easy. I went out and got a kit. I never took lessons."

He said that he spent a lot of time in doctors' waiting rooms be-

fore his wife died and said, "While I was sitting there I'd pull it out. When I fly, I take it on a plane. I can't read on a plane, but I can do needlepoint."

He likes to do pictures, particularly frame canvasses with the picture in yarn, (which still has to be covered) rather than printed or painted on.

The men hadn't met before they arrived at Jacobson's to talk about their work although both play in the senior men's golf league in Troy. Almost immediately they

were discussing stitches and asking each other questions about particular pieces and the techniques and yarns used.

Quigley said lots of people see him doing needlepoint, since he works on it in airports and waiting rooms — whenever he knows he's going to be sitting idly for a period of time. Women will frequently comment on his work and how unusual it is to see a man needlepointing. Seldom if ever does a man broach the subject with him.

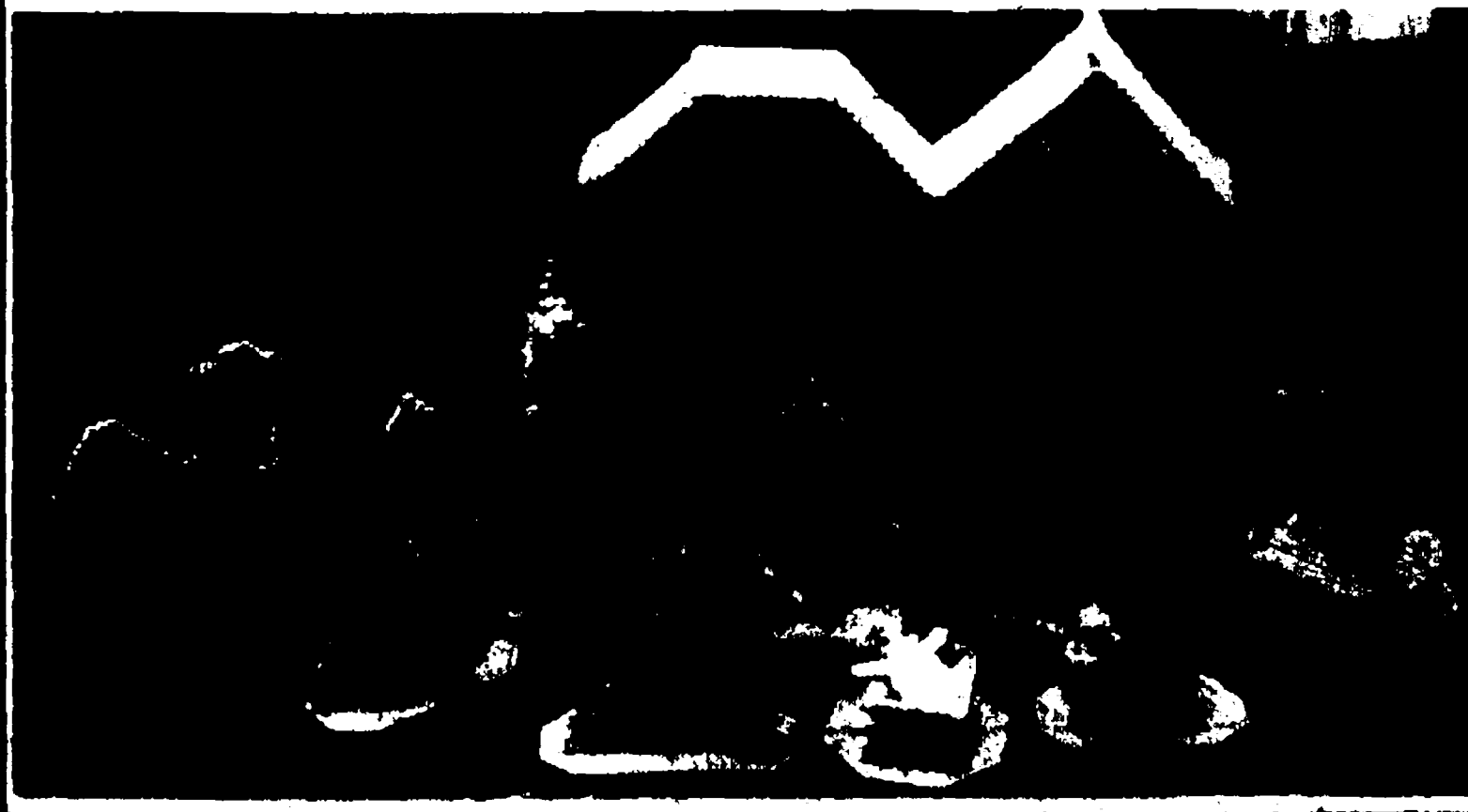

Detroit Images: not pretty pictures

I HAVE been looking at "Detroit Images: Photographs of the Renaissance City," a collection of almost 200 compelling, black-and-white photos of contemporary Detroit. Published recently by Wayne State University Press, the book is edited by John J. Bukowczyk and Douglas Aikenhead, with Peter Slavecheff.

To be sure, there are hopeful images in this book — the Tigers taking the field on a well-attended Opening Day in 1986; a young father embracing his small daughter in Cadillac Square; modest, well-tended homes on Deacon Street, gleaming in the sunshine; two youths traversing a pristine Washington Boulevard on unicycles.

But, for the most part, these are not pretty pictures. Poet Phillip Levine, in an afterword, has called the collection "a book of ruins." Nothing wrong with such a book, of course. The trouble comes when a large number of such images are put together in one place, as they are here. After a time, simply because there are so many of them, the strength and boldness of each image begins to break down and to lose some of its effectiveness. Now and then, it even threatens to take on a kind of ludicrous quality in the repetition.

STILL, THE IMAGES in themselves are so arresting, the photography so remarkable.

The visual journey begins with a dramatic shot of an old factory warehouse going up in smoke and flames, and dwarfing wary bystanders. The collection concludes with a shot of the skeletal remains of another warehouse destroyed by fire. An exposed stairwell clings to a wall that threatens to fall in upon itself, a smokestack juts into a murky sky, a strange, griseous light — present in so many of these images — pervades the scene. There are no bystanders, wary or otherwise.

In between, the photos (the work of 14 different photographers) run the gamut from images of aging shopkeepers who look to be waiting for customers who will never come, to storefront churches resembling small fortresses, with their boarded-

up windows and their barred-over front doors (called "security gates"), to the night-time individuals who resemble something out of "Nosferatu," but are, in fact, revelers at a post-game World Series celebration.

Images of the demolished northern end of Poletown are reminiscent of Depression-era, Dust Bowl prairies. A photo of the ragged remains of the last Untroyal building, taken on a day in 1986, looks as bleak as a picture out of Dresden in the '40s.

In the Cass Corridor, the exterior of an apartment building, its scabrous interior, and its hollow-eyed tenants appear to have been trashed by some nightmarish malignancy.

Beneath the Ambassador Bridge, basketball courts — closed because the soil on which they were built has been found to be chemically-contaminated — seem as eerie as Doomsday.

Here, in a home on Detroit's Near East side, is a family, sitting down to dinner, the children looking tentative, the adults appearing to be little more than resigned to some melancholy fate. Here is an old woman, literally out on the street with her furniture, her beautiful face resigned as well. Here is an old man, alone, at a Labor Day parade somewhere on Woodward Avenue.

Here is the boneyard rubble of another demolished structure, this on Franklin between Joseph Campau and Chene. Here is another on Kanter near Moran. And another at Trombly and Orleans. Here is a Dodge van, stripped and plundered and upside-down at Biltmore near Eight Mile Road. Here is a 1984 Fiero that has suffered the same fate. Here, on Hessel between Prevost and Forrer, is a Mustang, "on location" (we learn from the caption) from July 5 to September 26, 1985.

I don't know — maybe it's best to just examine the photos as slowly as possible, taking them a bit at a time. Perhaps that way, a reader can experience their impact more completely.

In addition to the pictures and Levine's afterword, the book contains an insightful essay on "Picturing the City: Photographing Detroit," by Aikenhead.

Bit of England transplanted

A LITTLE bit of England is nestled in a subdivision in Farmington Hills, where Mr. and Mrs. Paul Paddon live. Last year he was given a past master award (since his garden had previously won) in the Farmington Garden Club's Good Neighbor Garden contest.

This outstanding gardener uses many different plants with great success. The extremely well-maintained gardens shows his love of plants.

Along the driveway and in several beds in the front lawn, flowers abound in riotous color. An evergreen has been fashioned into a topiary. This year the color scheme in the front beds is pink, white and blue.

Two clematises adorn the pillars at each side of the front steps to greet the visitor. Along the side of the house many varieties of columbines gracefully keep watch over lower growing plants, along with lilies in magnificent colors Paddon

was introduced to lilies about nine years ago. He said he loved the spectacular colors, so just kept buying and growing them.

In the center of the side yard are two island beds; one contains a wishing well and the other a bird bath. Both are surrounded with begonias, ageratum and sweet alyssum. The edge of the property hasn't been neglected — everywhere I looked was a treat.

SPECIAL MILDEW RESISTANT zinnias, with blooms as large as saucers, put as a show behind rows of annual statice. Also seen, were primroses, foxgloves and geraniums. I believe Paddon grows most every flower one can name.

Along the back garden, under the spreading arms of a large shade tree, I saw hostas, astilbes, ferns and coleus bordered with ageratum and fibrous begonias.

Next we came upon a full, vegetable garden which is also planted each year. Scarlet runner beans from England have red flowers, besides delicious beans. Other vegetables that are thriving are broccol-

peppers, carrots, onions, cucumbers (to grow on a trellis), rhubarb, and lettuce. Flowering kale ties the flowers and vegetable beds together.

Interplanted among the lilies are rudbeckia and zinnias, so when the lilies are finished, the others will provide color. Salvia, the plume type celosia, and dahlias also play a part in this garden paradise. In the spring cottage tulips, narcissus and others make a show to preview more beauty ahead.

In the backyard is a gazebo festooned with hanging baskets of beautiful flowers.

Along the other side of the house, tuberous begonias, white, yellow and orange, reside with Japanese painted fern and maidenhair fern with lacy leaves. These make a nice contrast to the heavy foliage of the begonias.

What are Paddon's secrets? Work, work, work.

When the catalogs arrive in late December he looks to see what's new. He will try them and always orders the old stand-bys too. New seeds are purchased (they are all hybrids) each year from six seed com-

panies. A small greenhouse attached to the back of the house is the center of many hours of work beginning in January. The seeds are sown in trays and then transferred to six-hole pots. The number of plants involved, boggles the mind.

This gentleman grows all the plants from seeds, uses them all in his garden or gives them away — 7,000 of them. He contemplates what he wants to do with the gardens while traveling and from work. He puts nothing to paper. When the plants are grown up and are almost in flower — when he is ready to set them out, that's when he designs the garden.

The tallest flowers are planted in the back and then the others follow according to height.

Paddon says working in his gardens is his anti-stress therapy. He used to grow the flowers for himself. Now he grows them for everybody.

"There are so many ugly things in the world today if you can put a little beauty back in, you've got it made, that's what I've tried to do," he said.

all about color

Helen Diane Vincent

Q: We have just moved into a house in a new subdivision. The entire area is flat, landscaped with a few shrubs and small trees. We want to dress up the wood deck patio behind the house that overlooks an in-ground swimming pool. Our house is traditionally styled and made of terra-cotta brick. Any suggestions?

A more elegant approach, then look into the newer blue-green and white patio furniture and coordinate it with soft terra cotta and apricot for the table setting and any decorative accessories. Try to adhere to the apricots, or soft orange color even in the choice of flowers to be planted — allowing for the soil and other conditions.

also put into terra-cotta pots and placed around the deck itself. A white trellis with pale violet-colored hanging wisteria positioned at the far end of the pool would add a subtle touch to the color harmony and provide some height to the otherwise flat landscaping. White and a few violet-colored flowers could also be interspersed with the soft orange clusters.

In clear daylight you would achieve an elegant yet relaxed look; with soft night-lighting, these colors would be sufficiently visible to be appreciated.

Q: Recently, our 14-year-old son, who is our only child, has insisted

that he paint his entire room in black and fluorescent colors. It's already jammed with posters and paraphernalia. His father refuses to go along with the idea. However, I'm inclined to let him have his way because, so far, he has offered us so very few problems. What do you think we should do? And should we be concerned with his radical change in color preferences?

A: Don't be overly concerned at this time. Your son is using color as a sign of a need to more clearly establish his own identity and to have some separate control over his environment. Quite typical of this phase of development, he is beginning to

more vigorously explore avenues distinct from parental approval, and outside of conventional, cultural norms.

It's not unusual for teen-age boys, more than girls, to select this particular color combination for its intended shock value. Without excusing his extreme colors, keep in mind that he is exposed to far more hyper colors through TV advertising, rock concerts, and novelty items designed and marketed for the adolescent than you or your husband knew as teens.

The key to this situation is your son's behavior: If he should become overly withdrawn, then you should be concerned. Black will no longer

be a mere novelty, but an indication of a far deeper disturbance. Otherwise, proceed with letting him decorate his room as he wants to. If you over-react or over-interpret his color preferences at this point in his life, you both will make the matter seem more important than it really is.

Just look into techniques for transforming the room without painting the walls, such as using black drapery, and lightly tacking up wide-width felt textiles on the walls. A very inexpensive bedspread, or another cover could provide the background for a fluorescent dye or paint design of his own making. Actually, your more immediate concern should be to make sure he has enough light for studying, since dark colors absorb so much more light than pastels and brights.

Flowers create focal point

To me, plants and cut flowers are as essential in the home as doors and windows.

For just a few dollars fresh cut flowers are available at your neighborhood supermarket. A bunch of daffodils in a vase, when there is still snow on the ground, is a wonderful thing to see. It sends the message that spring is just ahead.

Whenever a large bowl of flowers or a large plant is placed, a focal point is created. Whatever the cost or the scale, flowers in a home should be primarily welcoming and secondly, a clear statement of personal style.

Odd angles and curious recesses that are too small for any human purpose can be filled with plants or flowers.

Large plants can serve as building blocks — separating one activity area from another. Placing plants around and in front of a window sill brings the greenery of outdoors into the interior and intimates a pleasant landscape outdoors where none exists.

The cost of a plant or flower is irrelevant to its inherent beauty. A great deal of money can

be spent on an ugly plant or flower arrangement or very little on a lovely one.

A centerpiece for parties or everyday pleasure can be a wicker basket or brass bowl filled with a variety of African violets.

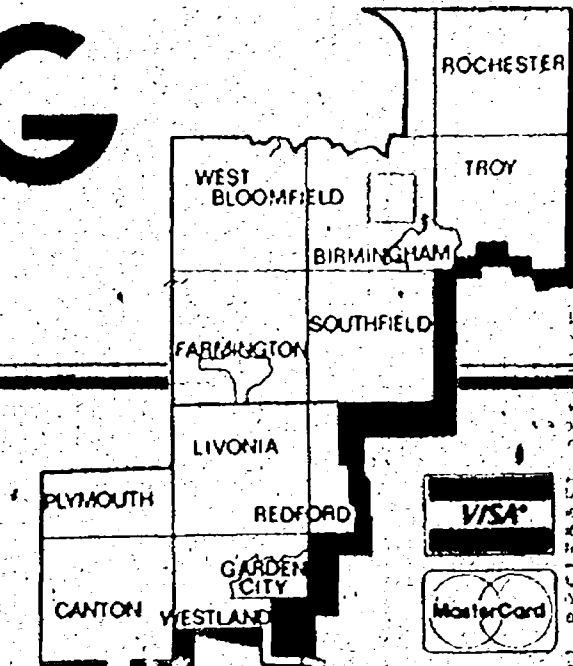
