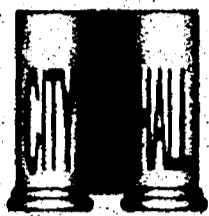

Residents still upset about odor



The county environmental director said there is no public health hazard in the obnoxious odors which he concluded are not coming from the Textron Automotive Interiors plant on Newburgh north of Palmer. But area homeowners still insist there is a problem.

Westland residents in the Palmer-Newburgh area are still mad at the problem of an obnoxious odor, they told city and county officials last week.

But county environmental officials insist that the odor is not coming from the nearby Textron Automotive Interiors plant on Newburgh, just north of Palmer.

They also noted that the problem, first raised by residents in late

March, has lessened in that the odor is noticed less frequently and when it is observed it lasts a shorter period.

When pressed by several homeowners, Jim Murray, director of the county's environmental department, insisted:

"There is no health hazard in the area."

During the two-hour session held June 6 in Madison Elementary School, county officials said they took several air quality tests in the area in recent weeks, finding no evidence of odors. Tests held within the plant,

which produces auto interiors, concluded the tests were well within environmental standards.

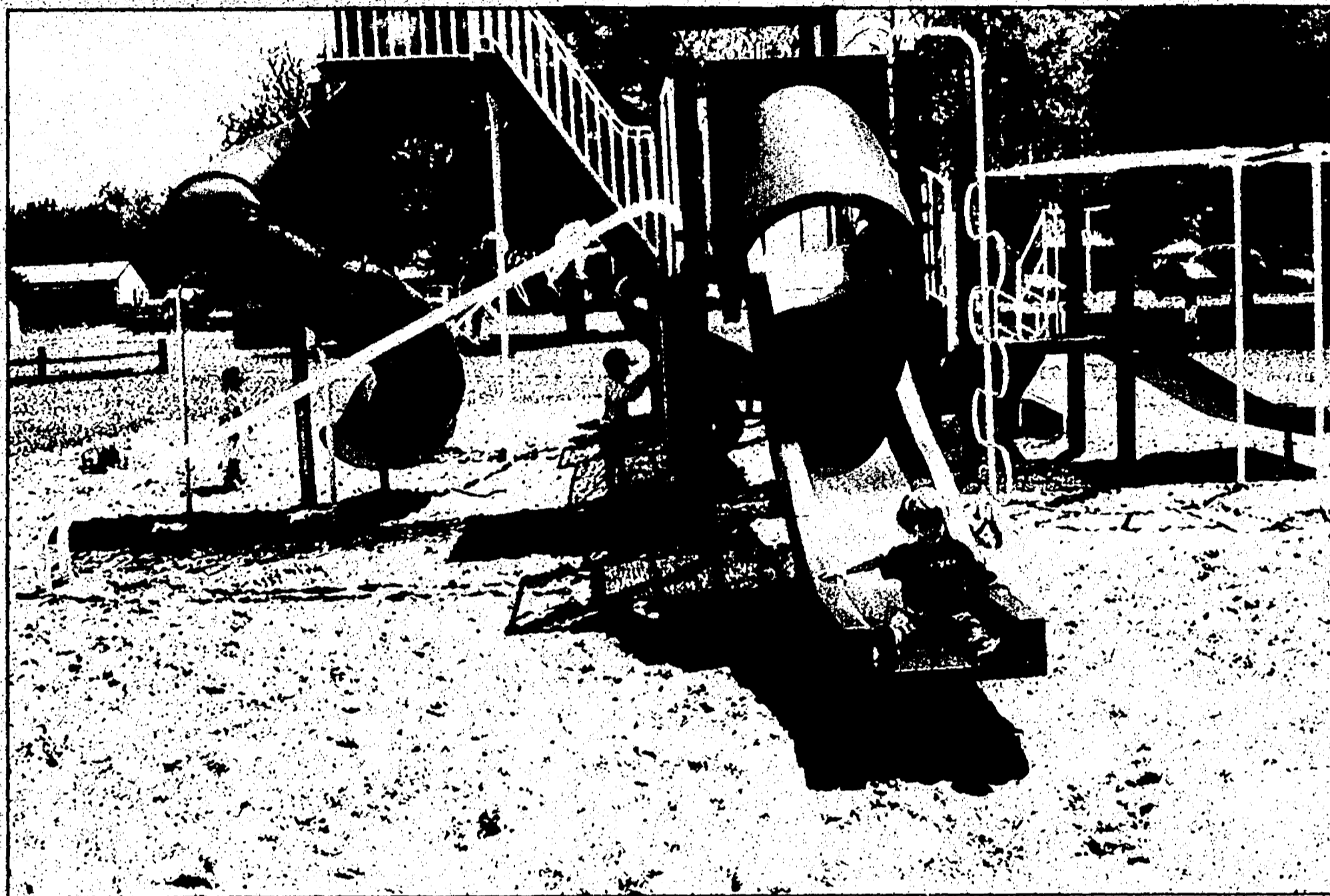
But homeowners insist that they are smelling obnoxious smells, although admitting that they are less frequent than several months ago.

Their position was bolstered when City Councilman Glenn Anderson said Tuesday that he visited the neighborhood three weeks before and smelled an odor.

Murray insisted that obnoxious

Electronics business plan wins city OK

Circuit City, a major consumer electronics business, has won approval from the Westland City Council to build a store on the northeast corner of Warren Road and Central City Parkway.

The location will put Circuit City in competition with two nearby stores, Fretter and Best Buy.

The project had been earlier blocked by council members who wanted modifications to the store's design. Developers made architectural

changes, such as promising an all-brick exterior and scaling back the size from 63,000 square feet to 59,200 square feet.

"We've come full circle on these designs," John Fredrickson, corporate design administrator, told the council.

Some council members had earlier voiced concerns about Circuit City occupying what Councilman Charles "Trav" Griffin has called one of the city's most "prestigious" commercial parcels.

Even he changed his mind Monday, noting that company representa-

tives have addressed his concerns about the building's design. Still, he said he supported the revised plans Monday only because he had no legal reason for rejecting them.

Councilwoman Sharon Scott cast the only opposition vote and said, "I have to be consistent."

On another commercial issue, the Value City furniture store on Warren Road, east of Newburgh, narrowly won council approval for a tent sale that started last week and runs through Wednesday.

Council members on two occasions had voiced concerns that the company hadn't cleared construction debris from its property.

The council voted 4-3 last Monday to approve the tent sale, after company officials promised to have the property cleaned up the next day. Building director Robert Fritz had been told by the council to check the site before allowing the tent sale to proceed.

Company officials apparently kept their word, and the tent sale is in process.

Mom, boyfriend reluctant witnesses in shooting

A Westland woman and her live-in boyfriend are reluctant to testify against the woman's son for allegedly firing a .22-gauge rifle at their residence while they were inside, a defense attorney said Thursday. No one was injured.

Now that family tensions have

calmed, the mother, Kathy Brandt, appeared irritated at times when questioned by a prosecutor Thursday during a preliminary hearing for her son, John Anthony Chmura.

"This is a personal matter," Brandt told assistant Wayne County prosecutor Kellie Gleason-Groff.

Following reluctant testimony from Brandt, 43, and her boyfriend, Der-

rick McPherson, 25, defense attorney Denise Green asked for a reduction in a \$100,000 cash bond that has kept Chmura, 23, jailed since the May 30 incident.

Green suggested that a charge of assault with intent to murder should be reduced to reckless discharge of a firearm. Chmura, who lives in the same house with Brandt and

McPherson, also faces domestic violence and felony firearms charges.

But Judge C. Charles Bokos rejected Green's arguments, refusing to lower Chmura's bond and ruling that Chmura should stand trial in Detroit Recorder's Court on all charges.

Bokos pointed to evidence that

Rouge River cleanup bridges the generation gap

The generation gap was bridged June 3 when teenagers and adults painted stenciled warnings to avoid dumping wastes into

trains connected to the Middle Rouge River. The effort, done in conjunction

with the annual Rouge Rescue cleanup, was part of the campaign to improve the water quality of

the river. Taking part were students in the Churchill (High School)

Stand Up Environmental Group, whose adviser is Churchill teacher John Covert.

Students involved in painting "dump no waste" and "drains to Rouge River" stenciled signs next to sewer grates in the Holliday Park Townhouses, whose sewers drain into the Tonquish Creek, a tributary of the Rouge.

The townhouse development is just east of Wayne Road and south of Joy.

Students taking part were Nancy Lin, a 12th-grader; Jason Malloux and Sarah Sherman, both 11th-graders, and Abby Humphrey and Diana Tarr, both 10th-graders.

Also involved were the Westland Civitans and Junior Civitans.

Bill Craig of the Holliday Nature Preserve Association organized the painting effort.

The painted messages next to the grates are intended to warn residents to avoid dumping of motor oil or toxic materials into the drain.

Council to act on budget

The Westland City Council will hold a special meeting at 7 tonight (Monday) to adopt a new budget for the upcoming fiscal year and set the millage rate.

The meeting will be in the City Hall's council chambers, on Ford between Wayne Road and Newburgh.

Although the charter requires the budget and tax rate to be approved by the first Monday of June, the council delayed action last week.

The proposed budget submitted by Mayor Robert Thomas two months ago calls for \$33.8 million in spending, slightly more than the fiscal year to end June 30.

The general fund tax rate will be \$0.84 per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation. But tax bills will go up 2.0 percent this summer to reflect the increase in property values.

Summer tax bills are expected to be mailed in early July.

Seniors fete center's 10th anniversary

How do you celebrate the anniversary of a municipal building?

The Westland Senior Resources Department did it with a day-long celebration which included food, dancing, a flag-raising ceremony and a review of the Friendship Center's 10-year history.

An estimated 400 persons jammed the center on Newburgh near Marquette to hear numerous city officials review the history of the building, which was

previously a church that the city acquired with federal funds.

Specifically praised was Sylvia Kosorosky-Wiacek, seniors' department director for many years who speakers said provided the leadership for many of the programs housed in the center.

The director herself praised Mayor Robert Thomas and his predecessors for their support of the center at its start and during the past 10 years.

During the program, state

Sen. Loren Bennett, R-Canton, said the center's participants' "love and friendship" are what really hold the building together, not just the brick and mortar.

City Councilman Charles Pickering, who was Westland's mayor in the early 1980s when the center was initially proposed, admitted that was a lot of debate about the center and how it was to be paid for.

He praised the facility for providing a high quality of life for seniors.

During the ceremony, members of VFW Post 3323 and its auxiliary presented the center with an American flag — a repetition of a presentation at the center's dedication 10 years ago.

State Rep. Eileen DeHart, D-Westland, also presented the center with a new state of Michigan flag.

Later in the afternoon, Grace Brown and Merdis Simington were honored as seniors of the year.

Mrs. Brown was cited for her long-time service to the seniors' department and center while Mrs. Simington was praised for her leadership.

A Westland resident for 18 years, Mrs. Brown has been in a volunteer in the seniors' nutrition program since 1977 and a helper for programs involving seniors and elementary school children.

Mrs. Simington, also an 18-year Westland resident, has been a member of the Friendship Center Advisory Council for 10 years and a Commission on Aging member for six years.

In 1979, she was the first person to vocally urge a new center for seniors and quickly became a strong advocate.

During the anniversary, there was music by the Franklin Junior High School band with entertainment by the WACO band and Art Wyse.

odors aren't necessarily a public health problem, adding that some persons are more susceptible to odors than others. Resident Glenn Anderson said the odor he detected a smell coming from a dead animal and worsened as he walked closer to the Textron plant.

changed its procedures to cut emissions by 40 percent. Murray commented that since the company is changing its procedures and that the odor problem has lessened, "it leads us to conclude that the odor is coming from the plant."

Another neighbor, whose home on the 1500 block of Dowling backs up to the plant, said the odor reminds him of dead fish. Dale Hoover, who lives on Selma, added that he experienced a "dry, burning throat sensation which went through my nasal passages into my chest." The odor, he said lasts from 10 to 30 minutes.

Taking part in the presentation of the initial environmental findings were Kay Bedenis, county director of enforcement for the air management division, Mayor Robert Thomas, Fire Chief Michael Reddy, Assistant Chief George Riley, and City Councilman David Cox, co-chair of a council committee formed several months to study the problem. The director said the county will continue to test the air quality in the neighborhood and report back to the residents in August.

Center gets courtyard

Industrialist Jack Russo is making sure that the Burger Center for Aesthetic Students gets a courtyard where pupils can rest and take part in educational classes. Russo showed off the first phase of the courtyard last week when he sponsored his second annual festival at the county special education center run by the Garden City Public Schools.

The courtyard will be finished in two years and include a greenhouse, a place where students can learn about weather, gardens and other topics. Russo hosted his first Burger Center picnic and festival in June 1994 when a playscape which cost some \$100,000 in direct and indirect costs, was dedicated.

Chmura fired four shots at the front door of the house, in the 31400 block of Fairchild, just two seconds after McPherson had stepped away from the door. Chmura could face a maximum sentence of life in prison if convicted of assault with intent to murder. He would face a mandatory two-year term if found guilty of the felony firearms charge. Domestic violence carries a possible 90-day jail term and a \$500 fine.

Judge C. Charles Bokos rejected Green's arguments, refusing to lower Chmura's bond and ruling that Chmura should stand trial in Detroit Recorder's Court on all charges. Brandt testified that her son was "extremely drunk" during the incident at 10:50 p.m. May 30. The violence began when Chmura threw a 2-foot-tall stool that hit her on the shoulder, she said, though she added that she didn't know if he meant to hit her.

House votes 3.4 percent hike for S'craft

On paper, Schoolcraft College's state aid increase of 3.4 percent looks like a big hike over the 2.8 percent recommended by Gov. John Engler.

"This only lets us stay even with inflation," said SC President Richard McDowell. "With new technology, lasers, new programs, the need for new computers, training the faculty, responding to the needs of business, we can't operate on the status quo."

The House of Representatives on June 8 passed a \$255 million aid bill for community colleges, a 2.1 percent increase over the current year and a little above the \$252 million recommended by the governor in February. The bill was sent to the Senate. Center of

the long debate was whether to shut down Highland Park Community College; the other 28 aren't in jeopardy.

Schoolcraft's share: \$9.4 million, 3.4 percent above the current year. Total budget for the two-year college is about \$35 million.

Schoolcraft students will be able to take advantage of a tuition credit against income taxes this year, McDowell said. Public Act 7 of 1995, sponsored by Sen. Loren Bennett, R-Canton, gives the credit to students at community colleges and universities that hold tuition hikes to the rate of inflation.

For Schoolcraft that would mean limiting a tuition increase to \$1.25 a credit hour in the fall semester. Instead the board in April raised in-district tuition \$1

(to \$47) for the spring (May) semester, prior to the start of the fiscal year, with another \$1 (to \$48) in the winter semester of 1996.

"Our revenues are limited to the rate of inflation by three factors," McDowell said:

■ PA 7's cap on tuition. (Many universities are ignoring this, raising tuitions in excess of the consumer price index, costing students an income tax break.)

■ The Headlee limitation — property tax rates are rolled back whenever assessments rise faster than inflation.

■ Proposal A, the 1994 school reform package passed by voters, which caps individual assessments at the rate of inflation.

After rejecting the community college aid bill once, the House

passed it on a second roll call, 73-28.

Voting yes were Republicans Lyn Bankes of Redford, Jan Dolan of Farmington Hills, Gerald Law of Plymouth, James Ryan of Redford and Deborah Whyman of Canton; and Democrats Eileen DeHart of Westland and Tom Kelly of Wayne.

Dissenters, from both parties and all over the state, pleaded the case for Highland Park, one of the oldest two-year colleges in the state. The bill gives it \$6.2 million in phase-out money.

Opposing passage, Rep. Tom Mathieu, D-Grand Rapids, said the bill treated community colleges unfairly compared to universities, which got a total 4.4 percent increase. "That is a substantial disparity," said Mathieu, a

champion of community colleges.

Here is how neighboring community colleges fared under the House bill:

■ Wayne County CC — \$15 million, up 2 percent (Engler recommended 1 percent).

■ Oakland CC — \$18.5 million, up 2.5 percent (Engler recommended 1.1 percent).

■ Henry Ford CC — \$17.7 million, up 2.3 percent (Engler recommended 1 percent).

Losers were Kalamazoo Valley and Monroe Community Colleges, which the governor recommended for 10-plus percent hikes but which got 4.9 and 5.2 percent respectively after budget hearings.

SC hopes to improve SC student services

Schoolcraft College officials say a July 1 administrative reorganization is expected to improve the quality of student services and increase the number of academic scholarships available to students in the Livonia, Clarenceville, Garden City, Plymouth-Canton and Northville school districts.

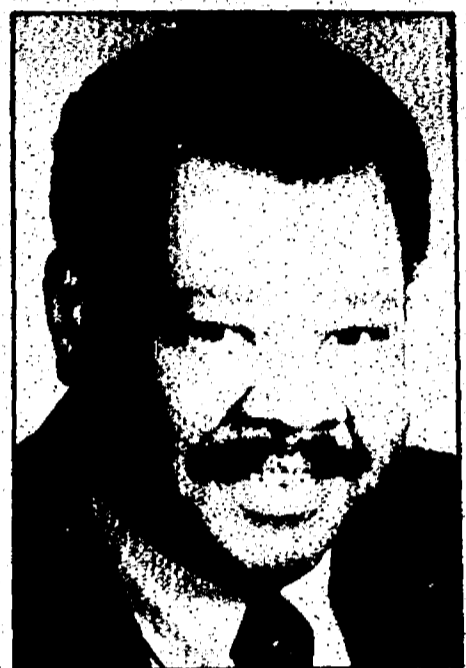
The trigger for the reorganization is the retirement of Barbara Geil, the vice president of student services, after June 30.

Geil's position will be eliminated. Beginning July 1, the current director of admissions and financial aid, John Tomey, will become dean of students. Tomey will inherit all of Geil's responsibilities and retain some of his current responsibilities.

Jean Pike, the current director of counseling and career planning and placement, will work for Tomey as associate dean of students. Responsibility for health services will be added to what she already does.

Tomey will report to Vice President of Instruction Conway Jeffress, instead of President Richard McDowell, as Geil did.

Ultimately, there will be one

less job in the administration, saving the college more than \$60,000, which is earmarked for the Trustee Scholarship Fund.

The fund currently uses about \$80,000 per year to provide about 80 scholarships to high school seniors in the Schoolcraft district and about 70 scholarships to students already enrolled. The addition of \$60,000 would expand the program considerably.

Said Jeffress: "It's just a little bit of consolidation, and obviously there'll be some philosophical

changes. There are a lot of procedural things we do (now) that make getting into the college and getting services harder than they need to be."

Among the changes Jeffress wants is to permit students to register for classes in one visit to

the campus.

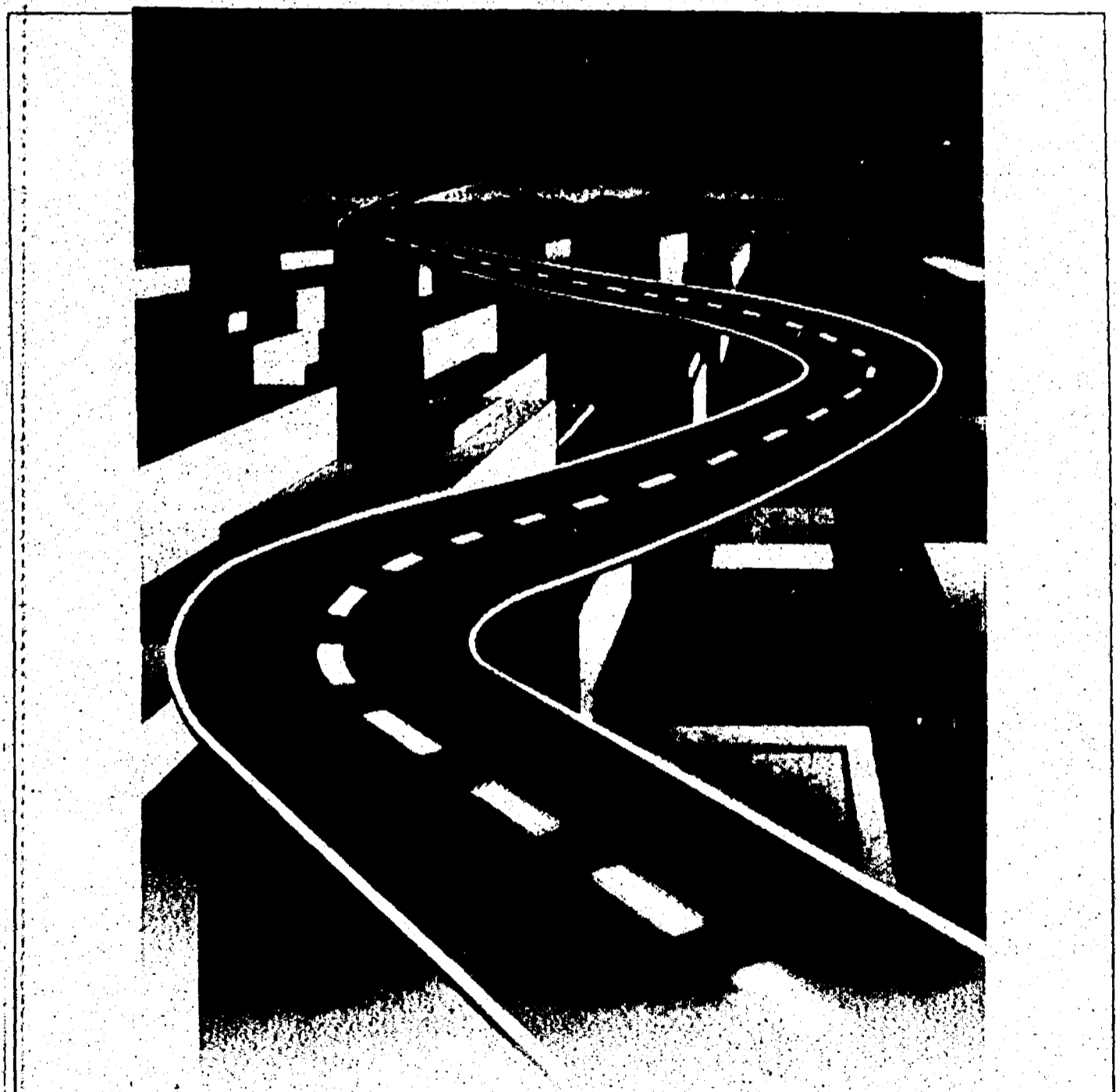
Currently, applicants make three trips to Schoolcraft before beginning classes: First to apply. Second to see a counselor. And third to register. "I think one trip is enough," Jeffress said.

He would also like to follow up with phone calls to students who suddenly cease taking classes, particularly those who quit after one semester.

"There are an awful lot of little things like that that you can change when you're new," he said. Tomey joined Schoolcraft in 1974 after 10 years as director of financial aid for the University of Detroit. The Farmington Hills resident served in the same position at Schoolcraft until 1981. He was acting vice president of student services 1981-82.

Pike came to Schoolcraft in 1964 as a business teacher. The Northville Township resident moved on to become a student activities counselor, an admissions counselor, an academic counselor and director of career planning and placement.

Mental health budget battle turns partisan

State Sen. Robert Geake had a bitter partisan battle on his hands as he guided the Mental Health Department budget to a 22-12 victory.

Democrats in the June 6 debate riled the normally placid Geake, himself a child psychologist, by charging his \$1.6 billion budget sacrificed children and mental health workers to Gov. John Engler's tax cuts.

"This mental health budget continues the trend of downsizing state psychiatric facilities," said Geake, R-Northville. "As we purchase more beds from the private sector, we have less and less need for expensive state beds."

"I hear demagoguery on the other side of the aisle. I'm not highly partisan. But after a \$20 million cut from the executive proposal (due to a predicted revenue shortage), this budget is still \$76 million over the current year."

Geake, chair of the Senate Appropriations subcommittee that deals with the Mental Health Department budget, said that a late amendment to staff hospitals at 95 percent of suggested standards wouldn't harm care.

Some cuts in bed capacity at Hawthorn Center, for the emotionally disturbed in Northville Township, and Fairlawn Center, a children's division of the Clinton Valley Center in Pontiac, were made to put them "more in line with anticipated census figure for 1996," according to a Senate Fiscal Agency analysis.

Voting yes were 20 Republicans and two outstate Democrats. Voting no were 11 Democrats and one Macomb County Republican.

All area senators voted with their parties except David Honigman, R-West Bloomfield, who was absent.

Sen. Alma Wheeler Smith, D-Salem, challenged the GOP idea that private psychiatric care is as good as public. "We know the people they hire are underpaid."

We know the people they hire are overworked. When those workers ball out, we're going to have to ball out. We're going to be hiring people to work at state rates, not \$4.35 an hour (minimum wage)," she said.

"At \$5.50 we're still not talking about a living wage. They (workers) need food stamps to supplement their budgets," Smith said.

"In five months," said freshman Sen. Gary Peters, D-Bloomfield Township, "I've seen a clear trend: tax cuts to the most privileged, expenditure cuts against the most vulnerable." He called the mental health budget "cruel and insensitive."

"Residential centers such as Hawthorn are essential," said Sen. Jim Berryman, D-Adrian. "Privatizing may cost less, but is the care as good? Yes, senator (Geake), we can do it cheaper in the private sector, but can we do it as well?"

Jumping to Geake's political aid were Senate majority leader Dick Posthumus, R-Alto, and Michael Bouchard, R-Birmingham.

The budget bill:

- Eliminates a "multicultural" line item for community mental health operations.
- Cuts staffing 11 percent, from 6,483 full-time equated employees to 5,797.
- Transfers \$17.8 million from state hospitals and centers to "CMH alternatives," community-based services for former hospital patients.
- Hikes MH Director James Haveman's salary 2.9 percent instead of the 19.6 percent proposed by Engler.
- Transfers to the MH department 88 beds in the Huron Valley Center prison.
- Prohibits the MH department from closing or consolidating state facilities until community mental health boards have services in place for the patients.

Court case is 'ticking bomb' for schools

Michigan's Supreme Court deals in law, not economics. Its chief tool is the constitution, not actuarial tables.

And so the high court has an unusually thorny problem in the request of public schools to reconsider its April decision on health benefits for retirees from public schools.

The court's decision "will blow up the system and cause widespread devastation of K-12 educational programs," warned the Michigan Association of School Boards.

Essentially, the justices decided 4-2 that Gov. John Engler erred in the 1991 recession when he decided to preserve state funds by paying future public school retirees' health benefits on a cash basis instead of pre-funding them on an insurance basis.

But if Engler was wrong, the Supreme Court admitted "we have no authority to order the governor or Legislature to appropriate funds" and denied the retirees a writ of mandamus.

4 blank years

The case is called "Musselman" for Ann Musselman and seven other retirees. Engler is the first named defendant; others include the treasurer, budget direc-

tor, auditor general, Public Schools Retirement Board and the Legislature itself.

The problem, as MASB's Justin King describes it, stems from Proposal A passed by voters in May of 1994. Proposal A puts most of the monetary burden of funding schools on the state. But it also reflects Engler's budgeting philosophy that there shouldn't be a line of line-item appropriations floating around. So the state shifted the burden of paying retirees' health benefits from itself to the 560 local school districts.

In 1991-94, said MASB's King, "Funds which had been set aside for paying insurance benefits of future retirees were instead used by the state to help pay the present expenses of Michigan's K-12 school system," an action King called "pragmatic and well-intentioned but legally erroneous."

It leaves local school districts holding the bag to make up for the lack of pre-payment of those benefits in 1991-95. "The cost of correcting past actions could reach \$1 billion for 1995-96," King said. Since state aid to public schools is \$8.3 billion, that \$1 billion obligation is "a bomb ticking which threatens funding for our schools."

Pre-funding required

Under one article of the 1963

Michigan Constitution, Engler as governor has power to cut spending when revenues fall short, with the approval of the House and Senate appropriations committees. It's a grant of legislative power to the governor. Every governor since the 1970s has used it, some several times.

But the constitution's financial article (Art. IX, Sec. 24) says: "The accrued financial benefits of each pension plan and retirement system (of state and local units) shall be a contractual obligation . . . Financial benefits arising on account of service rendered in each fiscal year shall be funded during that year . . ."

Said Justice Patricia Boyle's majority opinion:

"Michigan governmental units do not have the option, however, of not paying retirement benefits. Unlike highway construction or police protection, which a governmental unit can choose to receive less of, it is impossible to receive less service from the pensioner. The pension is payment for work already completed, or deferred compensation."

It quoted the late Richard Vandusen, Birmingham lawyer and delegate to the 1961-2 Constitutional Convention: "It is designed to prevent cities in the future from using the funds which are put into a pension fund to take

care of current service benefits for any other purpose."

Said Boyle: "But the Legislature (including the governor) does not have authority to fail to pre-fund a pension fund, even temporarily."

Concurring were Chief Justice James Brickley and Justices Conrad Mallett Jr. and Michael Cavanagh.

Dissenting, Justice Dorothy Comstock Riley agreed the court can't mandate Engler and the Legislature to pre-fund benefits, but she disagreed on the nature of the benefits.

"It is my belief that health care benefits do not equal financial benefits," she wrote. Retirees don't spend money when they receive health care benefits, so they don't receive "a financial instrument" and no financial benefit. Riley's view, if it prevailed, would take the Legislature and the school districts off the pre-funding hook.

Justice Charles Levin concurred in her dissent. Justice Elizabeth Weaver joined the bench two months after oral arguments were heard and took no part in the decision.

Footnote: Boyle drafted her opinion Nov. 7, six days after the high court heard oral arguments. But the majority decision wasn't announced until April 25.

Incumbents Mary Breen of Plymouth Township, Harry Greenleaf of Livonia and Steve Ragan of Plymouth are running for three six-year terms expiring June 30, 2001.

They are challenged by Brian

Broderick of Plymouth, an attorney with Leikin & Ingber of Southfield.

Trustee Carol Strom of Livonia, who was appointed in February 1994 to fill a vacancy, is running

unopposed for a two-year term expiring June 30, 1997.



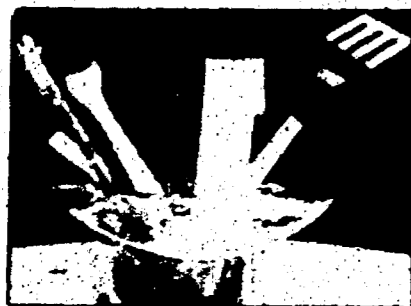

The Bloomfield Plaza at Maple and Telegraph is under new management through Schostak Brothers & Co. of Southfield, following the death of long-time manager Marie Primo.

Tim Grimsky, director of property management at Schostak, said the company won a bid to manage the upscale strip center just three weeks ago.

"We'll do what's necessary to keep up the center's market share and improve it," he said, reviewing all the elements of the project.

"Right now we're analyzing sales figures and meeting the tenants. There are three stores vacant at the property right now, and I under-

stand some deals are in the works. It's important to find the right merchants for these spots."

The Bloomfield Plaza is owned by a group of investors and was first built in 1961 to house a Wrigley's Supermarket at the north end (now Kroger's).

Long-time tenant Don Thomas of Don Thomas Sporthaus said he moved into the south end when it was added in 1963.

"It's a busy plaza," Thomas said. "We have very few problems here. Many of the tenants have been here a long time."

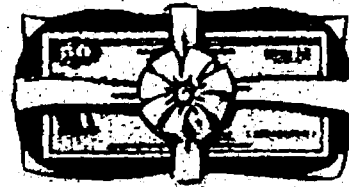

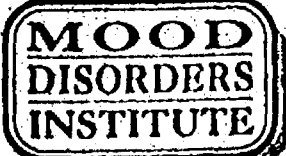

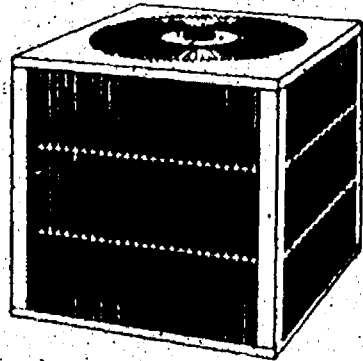

Rouge Rescue a success despite mediocre turnout

Despite lower than expected volunteer attendance, the 10th annual Rouge Rescue has been declared a success.

Organizers expected at least 3,000 volunteers at 30 sites for the cleanup Saturday, June 3, but got 2,000 to 2,500, said Jim Graham, the director of the Friends of the Rouge.

The worst case of absenteeism occurred at the Botsford Park site in Livonia where just two volunteers appeared.

"We've always had exceptional turnout," said organizer Sharon Sabat on the day of the cleanup. "We're just sitting here trying to figure out what went wrong."

Graham characterized the Livonia turnout as a "really strange occurrence," noting that Livonia usually has a good showing.

Other sites, however, drew great numbers. More than 400 volunteered to clear a two-mile stretch of the river in Westland near the corner of Warren and Newburgh, Graham said.

A site in the city of Plymouth attracted 25 volunteers. Redford Township volunteers numbered 75. In Plymouth Township the Western Wayne County Conservation Association accumulated 13 volunteers.

In Farmington Hills there were more than 100 volunteers, and there were 150 in Southfield. "Southfield did their usual excellent job," Graham said. "That's an organizational masterpiece there."

There were no cleanup sites in Garden City or Canton Township.

Although fewer "non-natural" items are pulled from the river each year, Graham said, volunteers in Dearborn found at least two automobiles in the river. "It's a convenient place to put cars

that people don't want to have found," Graham said. "It's amazing some of the things people will put in the river."

In addition to cleaning the river, volunteers also planted trees, built and groomed wood-chip walking paths, stenciled storm drain inlets with a warning against dumping toxic materials like used motor oil, and built and placed nesting boxes for wood ducks, bluebirds, and brown bats.

Friends of the Rouge, a nonprofit community organization, was founded in 1986, and launched the first Rouge Rescue cleanup that year in 13 locations with about 1,500 volunteers.

"I think the river is flowing better today than it did a week ago," Graham said.

Bathe foods in marinade to enhance their flavor

Now that the Janes Gang has a spiffy gas grill, we're finding ourselves on the back deck grilling during brisk fall evenings, a snowstorm, between rain showers and even more so on sunny days.

On Memorial Day weekend, yours truly visited friends in Lansing, and we got into a heated discussion over the benefits of marinating for tenderness.

Improving flavor

I distinctly remember reading somewhere that when it comes to cooking tougher cuts of meats on the grill, marinating does nothing to tenderize the meat.

Despite literally thousands of recipes that would have you believe they do, tests done by a major food magazine found that marinating meat, fish and poultry anywhere from 15 minutes to 24 hours made no discernible difference in tenderness. What they did find, however, was that marinating for several hours can greatly affect flavor.

All this talk about tenderizing came about because acids do break down the cell structure of protein. But according to Harold McGee, author of "On Food and Cooking," (Scribner's, copyright 1984) attempting to tenderize is "more like dissolving; it isn't a bad thing to do, but calling it tenderizing is stretching the truth."

McGee's study indicated that marinade doesn't penetrate more than a millimeter or so into the meat over a 24-hour period. "You're really just turning the surface proteins to mush" wrote McGee.

McGee claims we are tasting the strong flavors used in most marinades, even in fairly low concentrations. Further testing by "Cook's" magazine found that marinating meat and poultry for 15 minutes did not affect the flavor any more than brushing the food with a sauce during cooking.

And if that information isn't startling enough, additional testing indicated that after three hours of marinating, flavor was added to beef and lamb, but the taste of the marinade did nothing to affect the flavor of chicken.

Marinating overnight did wonders for the flavor of the chicken, but in that same period of time, an acidic marinade made with wine or vinegar overwhelmed the lamb. It turned the beef a purplish-brown color and camouflaged its taste.

On a recent trip to my favorite butcher shop I found a casserole of marinated chicken and shish-kebabs with a small sign indicating the chicken and kebabs were marinated in a "flavorizer" making the food "fork tender." When I politely pointed out that no liquid, short of pounding, can produce fork-tender meat or poultry, my butcher assured me that "I would be surprised" at what his flavorizer machine could accomplish. Well, I hate to say "I told you so" but ... I'll admit, the flavor was there, but its ability to tenderize? Hardly.

So what are common folk like you or I to do when looking for anything less than a rubber chicken?

Choice cuts

If you want tender beef or chicken, buy good meat or chicken. Jack Ubaldi, in his book "The Meat Book" (MacMillan, 1987) claims that when it comes to buying chicken, you need to know what kind of a chicken you want for your recipe.

Most of the chickens we buy at the grocers are called White Rocks. The smallest are squab broilers and the rest, averaging 2-3 pounds are dubbed "broilers." Needless to say, these are best broiled, fried, baked or roasted.

Roasters are 4-6 pounds and are best for roasting and braising. Any chicken more than 6 pounds, other than a capon, is best left for stewing or soup.

When it comes to choosing beef, there are more than seven grades, but Ubaldi says the first and most important grade should be the USDA stamp of approval.

The top-of-the-line beef is "prime," and less than 2 percent of beef make the "prime" cut. Supermarkets seldom carry prime, and you'll probably have to search out a "prime" butcher. The next grade is "choice," and it is usually best for grilling or roasting.

Some guys went ethnic, like Haroune Alameddine, who submitted a recipe for hummus tahini dip and Tom Hadjimarkos' Greek breakfast bogatza. Both these chefs live in Farmington Hills.

Men like big food. We had

recipes for a monster sandwich and monster cookies. And we believed Jerome Weingarden of Westland, who said he made his favorite dessert recipe, chocolate peanut butter swirls, often for his kids. The well-worn cardboard recipe he sent had the stains to prove it.

Here then is a sampling of what dads out there are cooking. David Kresky of Farmington likes to grill for his family, even in the winter.

"Cooking is a hobby," said Kresky, who prepares meals for his wife, Cyndy, and kids Chelsea, 11, and Chadwick, 10, both students at Flanders elementary.

"Cyndy and the kids prefer chicken, but I like pork. We do a lot of roasts. Marinade is the important thing."

Comforting smells of dinner in progress greet Susan and Howard Dubin of West Bloomfield when they walk in the door after working all day at Dubin Optometric Clinic in downtown Farmington. Their son, Matt who works at Alexander Hamilton Life in Farmington Hills, and attends Walsh College at night, follows close behind.

Son Art, a cook at Big Daddy's Parthenon, is in the kitchen preparing one of his specialties.

He works 6 a.m. to 2 p.m., and stops for groceries on the way home from work with his grandma, Clara Dubin.

"Then he comes home and makes marvelous dinners," said Susan, adding that all of her friends are jealous.

"His joy is making dinner," said Susan about her son Art. "He loves to wait on people. He's the ultimate host."

For special days, like Father's Day, Art spoils his family by preparing a feast that includes roast turkey with homemade stuffing, his famous green beans seasoned with Hoisin sauce, soy sauce and dill, acorn squash baked with honey, and salad.

"I love to make soup," said Art who doesn't use a recipe when he cooks. "Nothing ever tastes the same thing twice at our house," said Susan. "His stuffing recipe was modified from a family recipe."

Cooking comes naturally to Art

who is an autistic savant. "Long before it was fashionable we bought a microwave oven so he could do things and not get hurt," said Susan. "He's been cooking since he was 7. I've always loved to cook, and Art helped me."

To fine tune his cooking skills, Arthur attended the Eton Academy in Birmingham, and studied culinary arts at Oakland Community College in Farmington Hills. During the summer he attended camp, and when he got older, started helping in the kitchen. He worked at the camp for seven summers.

Arthur, who is very slim, keeps his family healthy by preparing dishes made with natural ingredients, and in-season fruits and vegetables. They eat very little red meat, preferring fish and chicken instead. "We're not freezer, cook ahead people," said Susan.

Arthur is also generous, and cares about other people. "You can't come to my house without getting something to eat," said Susan. And after Arthur finished carving and serving the turkey, he took the carcass over to a neighbor's house so she could make soup.

CHILLED GRILLED SHRIMP IN A CHILE MARINADE

- 1/4 cup peanut oil
- 2 tablespoons lime juice
- 1 tablespoon lime zest
- 4 cloves garlic, chopped fine
- 1 teaspoon hot garlic chili oil

24 medium shrimps (about 1 pound) unshelled

Whisk oil, lime juice, zest, chile paste and a pinch of salt in a glass bowl. If using wooden skewers to grill, soak the skewers in water for 30 minutes.

Thread shrimp on skewers and brush with marinade; reserve remaining marinade. (Can cover and

refrigerate overnight). Heat the grill and place the skewers on an oiled grill rack and cook, turning once, until shrimp are opaque, about 2 minutes. Cool slightly.

Peel and devein shrimps. Add shrimps to remaining marinade. Marinate 45 minutes. Drain, arrange shrimp on a bed of greens and toss with a small amount of addi-

tional marinade. Arrange on a plate and serve. Serves 4.

GRILLED PORTABELLO MUSHROOMS WITH BALSAMIC MARINADE

- 4 portabello mushrooms, stems removed
- 1/4 cup olive oil

2 tablespoons balsamic vinegar

1 clove garlic, minced fine

Place the portabello mushrooms on a lightly oiled grill rack. Place over medium coals and grill, cap side up for 10 minutes.

Turn portabellos over to expose their ribbed underside. Combine

oil, balsamic vinegar and garlic and whisk until combined.

Brush the balsamic vinaigrette over the ribbed underside of the portabellos generously. Cover and cook for 5 minutes. Repeat. Remove from grill and serve. Serves 4.

Chef's secret: If you've never had portabellos before, after cooking, they taste just like steak!

- 1 loaf Challah or onion bread
- 6 onion rolls
- 2 ounces (about 1/4 cup) margarine

1 medium onion

3 stalks celery, chopped

3 carrots, chopped

1/4 bunch fresh parsley

1 1/2 cartons Egg Beaters

26 1/4 ounces Chicken broth (canned or fresh) or onion soup mix with water

2 teaspoons sage
1 tablespoon garlic, chopped
Fresh cracked black pepper to taste

Cube bread and rolls. Place in very large mixing bowl. Melt margarine and onion, celery and carrots.

Saute until tender. Add to cubed bread. Add remaining ingredients. Adjust moisture. Mix well. Place in greased casserole dish. Bake in preheated 350 degree F oven for 1 hour or until desired doneness. If no crust is desired, cover loosely with foil while baking. Serves 8.

SEASONED GREEN BEANS

- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1/4 cup Canola oil
- 2 pounds fresh green beans
- 1/2 cup water
- 2 tablespoons light soy sauce
- 2 tablespoons Hoisin sauce

2 tablespoons fresh dill
Fresh ground black pepper to taste

Saute onion until brown. Add beans. Toss to taste. Add remaining ingredients and cook over low heat until desired doneness. Serves 8.

CHICKEN SQUARES

3 ounces cream cheese

3 tablespoons melted margarine

2 cups cooked, cubed chicken

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon pepper

2 tablespoons milk

2 tablespoons chopped onion
8 ounce can crescent rolls
1/4 cup crushed croutons

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Mix cream cheese and 2 tablespoons melted margarine in mixing bowl. Add chicken, salt, pepper, milk, onion and mix thoroughly.

Separate 8 crescent rolls and lay them on lightly oiled cookie sheet in shape of four rectangles. Flatten mixture and spoon 1/4 cup chicken mixture into centers. Fold in the corners together enclosing chicken and pinch edges shut. Brush remaining one tablespoon margarine on top and sprinkle with crushed croutons. Bake 20 to 25 minutes until lightly browned. Serves 4.

CHOCOLATE PEANUT BUTTER SWIRLS

- 1 cup Skippy peanut butter
- 1/2 cup powdered sugar
- 1/4 cup shredded or flaked coconut
- 1/2 cup light corn syrup
- 2 cups Cheerios cereal
- 1 package (5.75 ounces) milk chocolate chips
- 2 tablespoons water

Mix peanut butter, powdered sugar, coconut and corn syrup in medium bowl. Stir in cereal. Shape mixture into 1 1/4-inch balls, flatten slightly. Heat chocolate chips and water in a saucepan over medium heat, stirring constantly until melted. Cool. Dip tops of balls into chocolate. Place on waxed paper lined cookie sheet. Refrigerate until firm, about 30 minutes. Makes about 2 dozen cookies.

Make cookies for Dad's Day dessert

Reinforcing children's self-esteem through an exploration of family heritage can make this Father's Day go beyond the funny card and new necktie. And when the concept is carried out in the form of delicious dessert cookies to top off a meal of his favorite dishes, the result is sure to be a hit.

An American holiday, Father's Day is traditionally observed on the third Sunday of June. The custom was started on June 10, 1919, by Mrs. John Bruce Dodd, who wanted to honor her own father. The Ministerial Association of Washington, D.C., sponsored the original celebration, and the participants were asked to wear a red rose to honor their living fathers or a white rose to commemorate a deceased father.

The hodge-podge of cultural heritages in America makes the celebration of Father's Day an ideal time to examine the family's background, and tracing family history will create a celebration that is fun for the whole family.

Here are some recipes from the Crisco Kitchens to try.

FAMILY TREE COOKIES

- 1 1/2 cups firmly packed light brown sugar
 - 3/4 cup Crisco Stick or 1/2 cup Crisco all-vegetable shortening
 - 1 tablespoon water
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla
 - 2 eggs
 - 1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
 - 1/2 cup unsweetened baking cocoa
 - 1/4 teaspoon baking soda
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 2 cups (12 ounce package) miniature semi-sweet chocolate chips
 - Icing
 - 2 cups confectioners' sugar
 - 3-5 tablespoons water
 - Decoration
 - Spearmint leaf-shaped gum drops (optional)
- Heat oven to 375 degrees F. Line cookie sheet with foil. Combine brown sugar, shortening, water and vanilla in large bowl. Beat at medium speed of

electric mixture until well blended. Beat eggs into creamed mixture.

Combine flour, cocoa, baking soda and salt. Mix into creamed mixture at low speed just until blended. Stir in chocolate chips.

Refrigerate dough at least one hour. Keep refrigerated until ready to use. Roll dough into ropes 1/4-inch in diameter. Join 2 or 3 ropes to form tree trunk at bottom of cookie sheet. Shape remaining dough on foil-lined baking sheets into tree branches.

Bake at 375 degrees F. for 9-11 minutes, or until cookie is set. Do not overbake. Cool 2 minutes on baking sheet. Remove cookie with foil from baking sheet and cool completely. Peel foil from back of cookie.

For icing, combine confectioners' sugar and 3 tablespoons water. Mix to blend well. Add additional water, a little at a time, if paste is too stiff. Add additional confectioners' sugar if icing is too thin. Place icing in pastry bag fitted with small No. 3 writing tip. Alternately, place in small resealable plastic bag. Snip very small hole off one corner of bag. Pipe names onto branches of tree.

Attach spearmint leaves to branches with icing. (optional). Makes 2 tree cookies.

SUGAR SHIELD COOKIES

- 1 1/4 cups granulated sugar
 - 1 Butter Flavor Crisco Stick or 1 cup Butter Flavor Crisco all-vegetable shortening
 - 2 eggs
 - 1/4 cup light corn syrup or regular pancake syrup
 - 1 tablespoon vanilla
 - 3 cups all-purpose flour (plus 4 tablespoons divided)
 - 1/4 teaspoon baking powder
 - 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - Icing
 - 2 cups confectioners' sugar
 - 3-5 tablespoons water
 - Food coloring
- Combine sugar and shortening in large bowl. Beat at medium speed of electric mixer until well blended.

Add eggs, syrup and vanilla. Beat until well blended and fluffy.

Combine 3 cups flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt. Add gradually to creamed mixture at low speed. Mix until well blended.

Divide dough into 4 quarters. Wrap each quarter with plastic wrap. Refrigerate at least 1 hour. Keep refrigerated until ready to use.

Heat oven to 375 degrees F. Place sheets of foil on countertop for cooling cookies. Cut pattern for shield from heavy paper as follows: Fold a 3-inch square paper in half to form a rectangle. Cut bottom corner off unfolded side to form rounded edge. Cut shallow arc from top of paper. Unfold.

Spread 1 tablespoon of flour on large sheet of waxed paper. Place one quarter of dough on floured paper. Flatten slightly with hands. Turn dough over and cover with another large sheet of waxed paper. Roll dough to 1/4-inch thickness. Remove top sheet of waxed paper. Cut out cookies using pattern.

Transfer to ungreased baking sheet with large pancake turner. Place 2 inches apart on ungreased baking sheet. Roll out and repeat with remaining dough.

Bake one baking sheet at a time at 375 degrees F. for 5-7 minutes. Do not overbake. Cool 2 minutes on baking sheet. Remove cookies to foil to cool completely.

For icing, combine confectioners' sugar and 3 tablespoons water. Mix to blend well. Add additional water, a little at a time, if paste is too stiff. Add additional confectioners' sugar if icing is too thin. Divide mixture into small bowls. Add food coloring, a few drops at a time to achieve desired colors. Place icing in pastry bags fitted with small No. 3 writing tips. Alternately, place in small resealable plastic bags. Snip very small hole off one corner of each bag. Pipe icing designs onto cookies, with flat side on top and point on the bottom. Makes about 3-4 dozen cookies.

PEANUT BUTTER HANDPRINT COOKIES

- 1 1/4 cups firmly packed light brown sugar
- 3/4 cup creamy peanut butter

- 1/4 Crisco stick or 1/2 cup Crisco all-vegetable shortening
- 3 tablespoons milk

Heat oven to 375 degrees F. Place sheets of foil on countertop for cooling cookies. Combine brown sugar, peanut butter, shortening, milk and vanilla in large bowl. Beat at medium speed of electric mixer until well blended. Add egg. Beat just until blended.

Combine flour, salt and baking soda. Add to creamed mixture at low speed. Mix just until blended. Refrigerate dough 3-4 hours. Keep refrigerated until ready to use.

Divide dough into eight balls. Roll each ball of dough into 1/4-inch thick oval on cookie sheet. Press hand with spread fingers evenly into dough. Cut out hand print with knife. Remove excess dough from around hand print. Repeat with remaining balls. Combine scraps to form additional balls. Roll in same manner.

Bake one baking sheet at a time at 375 degrees F. for 7-9 minutes, or until set and just beginning to brown. Do not overbake. Cool 2 minutes on baking sheet. Remove cookies to foil to cool completely.

For icing: Combine confectioners' sugar and 3 tablespoons water. Mix to blend well. Add additional water, a little at a time, if paste is too stiff. Add additional confectioners' sugar if icing is too thin. Divide mixture into small bowls. Add food color, a few drops at a time, to achieve desired colors. Place icing in small resealable plastic bags. Snip very small hole off one corner of each bag. Pipe icing as desired. Decorate with rings and nails, if desired. Makes about 12 hand print cookies.

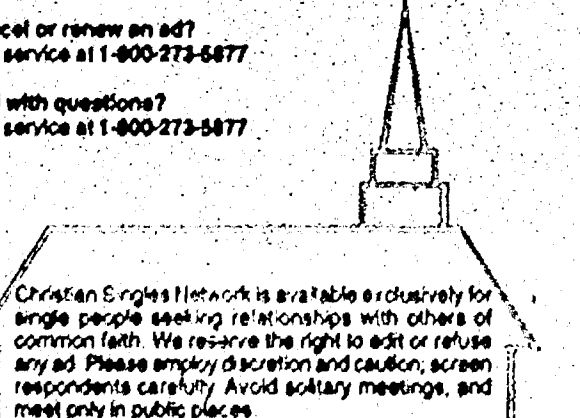

Shamrocks cruise into quarters

Assistant coach Ed Hamacher clutched the Class A regional baseball trophy, and then the players gathered around and touched their good luck charm — his bald head — en masse.

"We haven't done that in awhile," CC head coach John Salter said. "We only do it when we need a rally or when it's a good win."

The Shamrocks never needed any comeback magic Saturday at Monroe High School, but it was a good day for sure as CC won the regional final with a convincing 9-2 victory over Southgate Anderson.

Earlier in the day, CC eliminated Public School League runner-up Detroit Southwestern, 9-0, while Southgate toppled Taylor Center, 12-4.

CC (24-8 overall) now advances to Tuesday's quarterfinal against Plymouth Salem (26-7) in an all-Observersland matchup beginning at 4 p.m. at Milan Middle School.

It was CC's third regional title under Salter, who guided the Shamrocks to 1987 Class A crown and a semifinal berth in 1989.

"Our seniors, as a whole, will really appreciate this win," Salter said. "And we're happy overall because we beat the team (Southgate) that knocked us out last year. It was a hard-fought game until we broke it up late (with four runs in the seventh)."

The Shamrocks excelled in all phases of the game — pitching, hitting and defense. They simply played smart, fundamental baseball.

Despite giving up a homer to ninth batter Adam Alter and a pair of doubles, junior right-hander Chris Karney proved to be resilient. He scattered

six hits and two walks over seven innings, while fanning six, to pick up the victory.

He kept Southgate constantly off balance with a sidearm curveball.

"It's something I like to throw on a 0-2 count," said Karney, who is 4-0. "When I get ahead in the count, I like to mix things up."

"But the defense was outstanding. There were no errors (actually one) and all I had to do was throw strikes and keep it in play."

The offense was just as impressive, as CC collected a total of 11 hits, led by junior third baseman Marty Wilk, who went 4-for-4.

"Since the Madonna Tournament (Memorial Day weekend) Marty has really been coming on with the bat," Salter said. "He had only about 25 at-bats because he had been hurt a lot and had struggled somewhat defensively. But the last three weeks he's really helped us offensively."

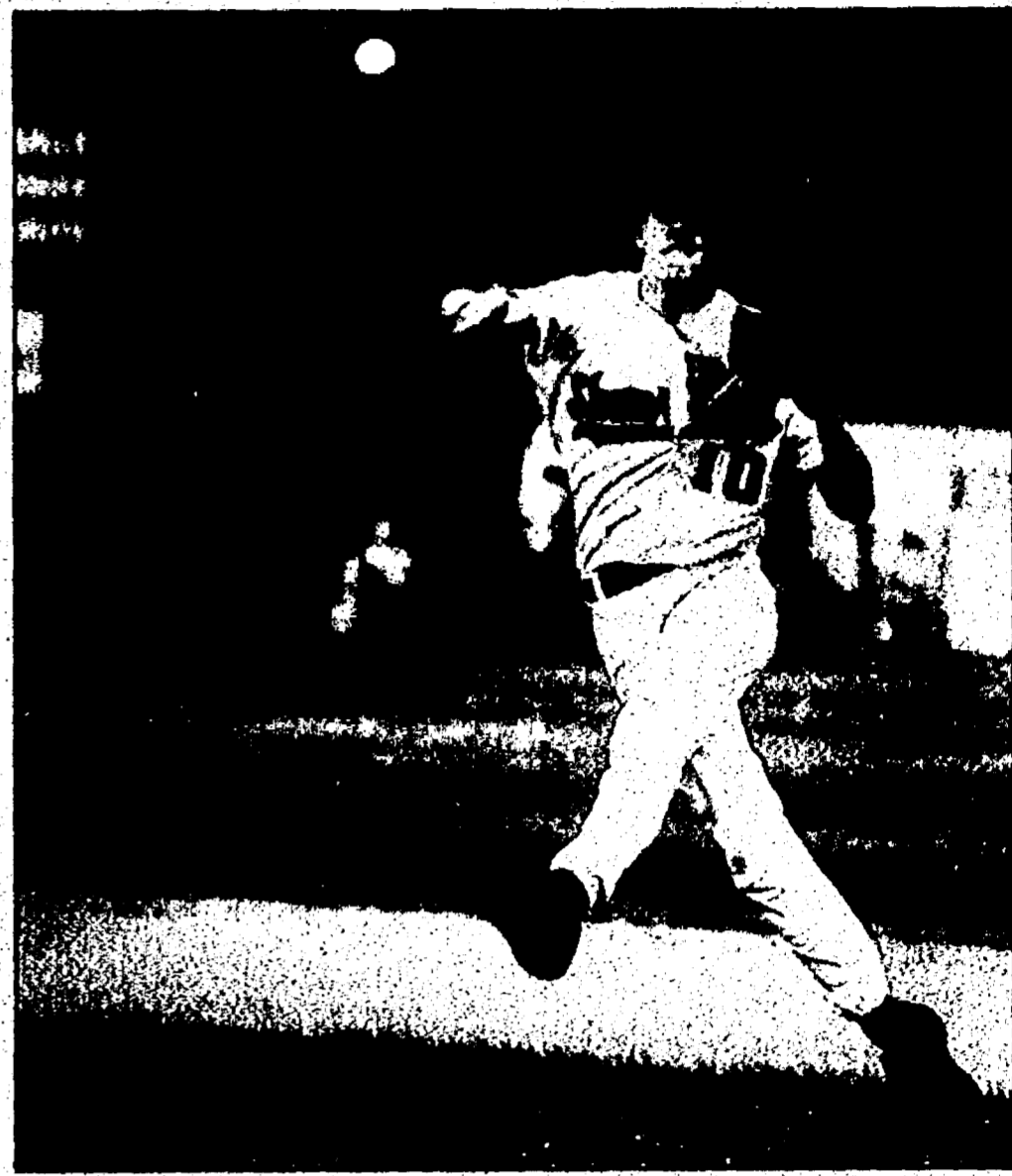
First baseman Mike Daguanno, who collected three hits in the opener, including two doubles, added two more hits in the final, along with freshman Kevin Thomas.

Daguanno is batting close to .450 with 35 RBIs.

CC's glove work also showed. The Shamrocks turned a pair of double plays, while Southgate (17-15 overall) took itself out of a couple of potential scoring threats with poor base running.

"Our defense has been good, especially after we moved (Greg) Rogers over to second (base)," Salter said. "He and Chris Misiak (the shortstop) make all the plays. We've turned more DPs on grounders this year than I can ever remember in my 15 years."

In the semifinal, CC pounced on Southwestern starter Johnnie Rogers

But Knight fanned Jenny Bauer and Jenni Talbot.

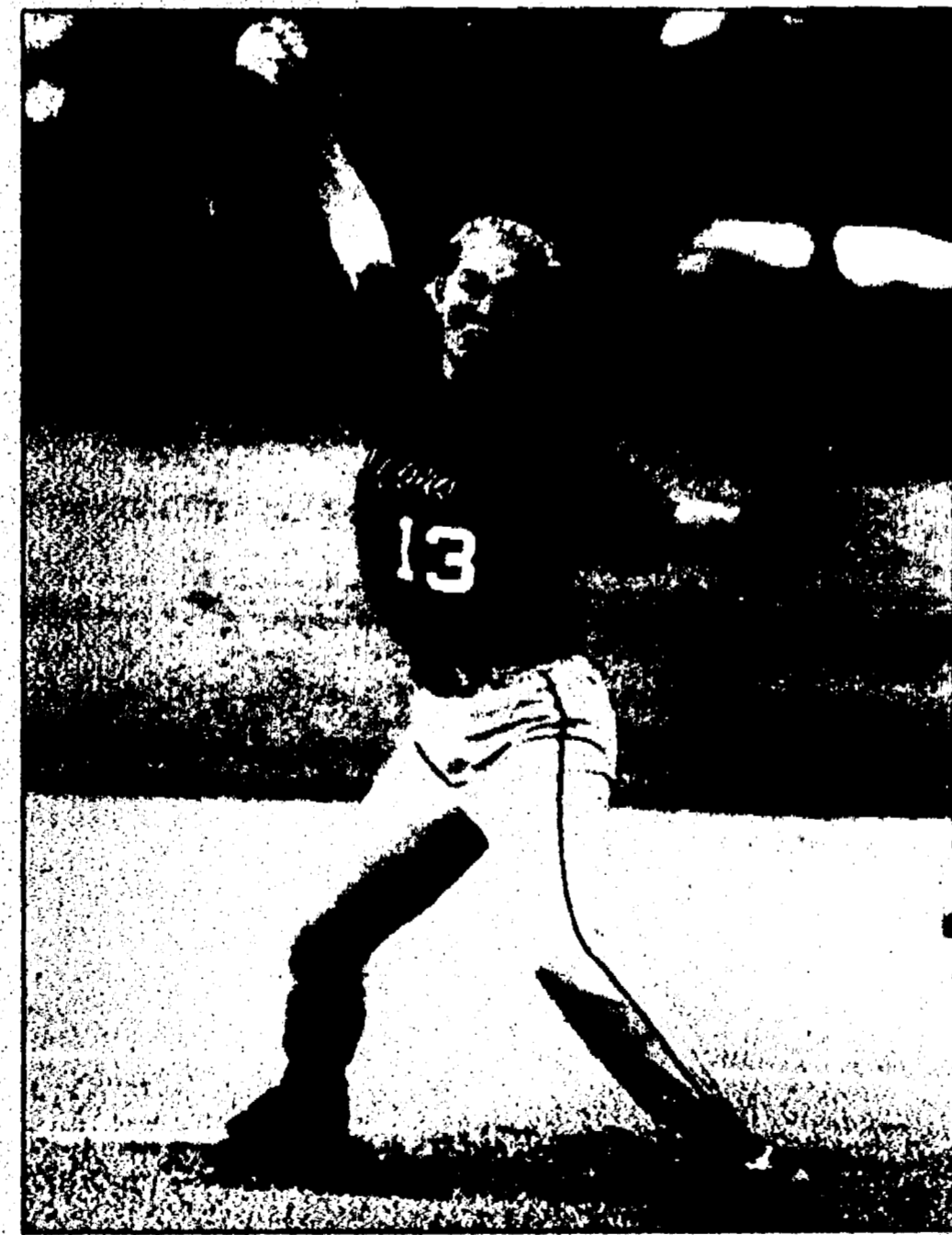
Wutke was then tagged out at the plate to end the threat when she tried to score on a wild pitch.

Neon making its mark with tough twentysomething crowd

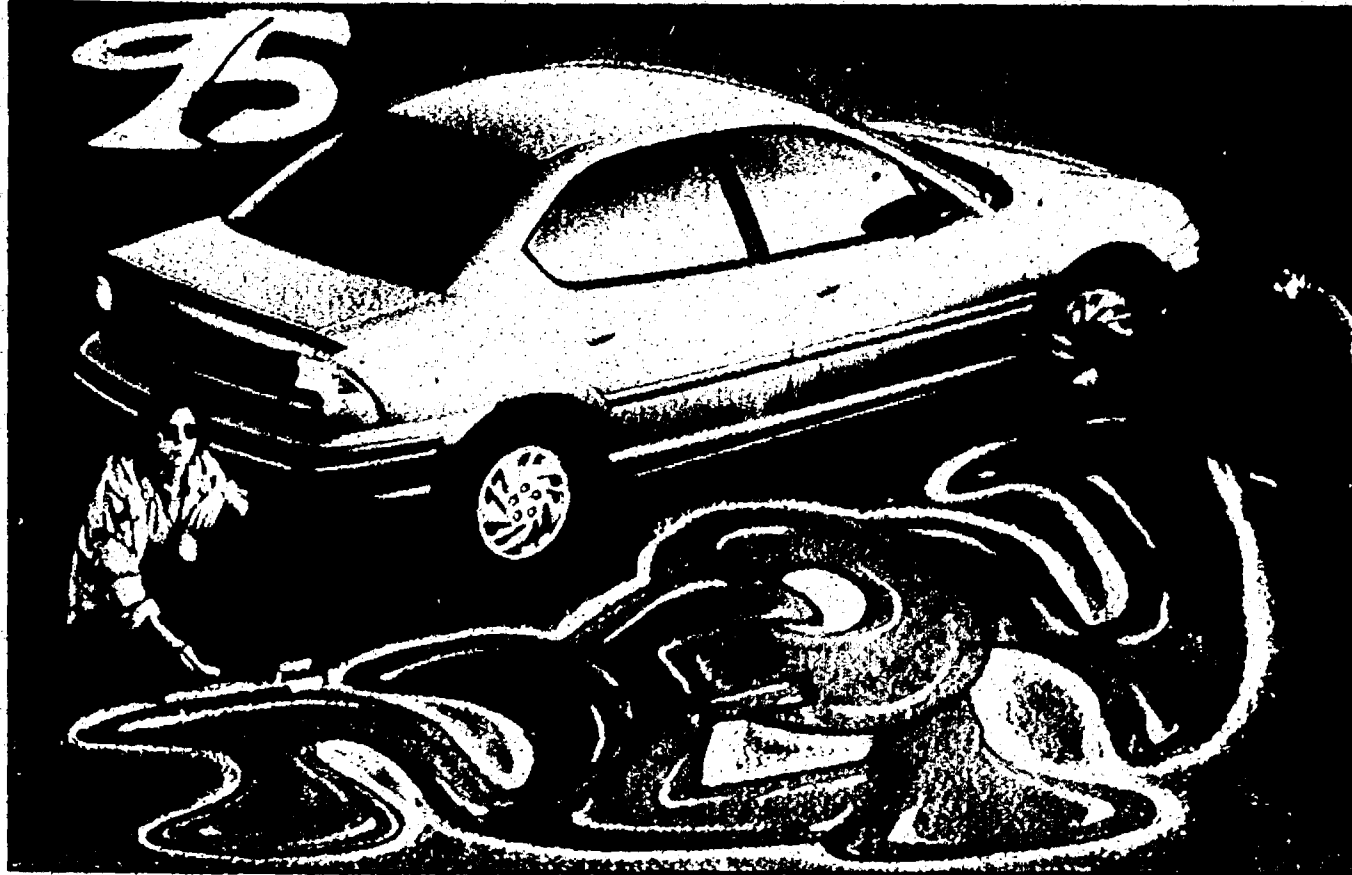
Chrysler Corp. President Robert Lutz borrowed an adage from ex-Chairman Lee Iacocca to introduce the carmaker's first all-new subcompact since 1978: "If this car doesn't excite you, you had better check your pulse because you're dead."

Chrysler is aiming the "no sacrifices" 1995 Neon at the twentysomething crowd, betting value for the dollar is more important than the price tag.

To make a point, Lutz reminds: "Value is more important than price. Yugo proved that."

The new-for-'95 Dodge and Plymouth-badged Neons, which can go up to 125 mph at top speed, come with an \$8,975 price tag. But the carmaker's real goal is to penetrate the lucrative overseas market, so Chrysler-badged Neons are being exported to 18 European markets via the carmaker's 18,000 European dealers.

Theodor R. Cunningham, executive vice president of

sales and marketing, says Neon sales are booming. In April, a record 17,941 Neons were bought nationwide.

And last month in New York, Chrysler accepted the American Marketing Association's 1994 Grand Edison New Product Marketer of the Year award for innovative excellence for its work on the Neon and Chrysler Cirrus. The two cars won individual Gold Edison Best New

Product awards.

The awards were established eight years ago to recognize American marketing excellence and innovation.

Hours after Lutz introduced the new cab-forward-designed Neon to thousands of auto executives and journalists in Frankfurt, Germany, last year, he and Chairman Robert Eaton conducted what amounted to live fireside chats via satellite with U.S. journalists in eight major cities, including Detroit and Washington.

It marked the first time a member of the Big Three automakers had introduced a U.S.-made car abroad.

Eaton was candid about the importance of the Neon to Chrysler's future.

"It is important to make a

profit" with the Neon, said Eaton, who took over as Chrysler chairman when Iacocca retired. "We do not expect to lose money on this car."

"The Neon will dispel the myth that America can't build exciting cars," added Lutz, whose 700-member platform team brought the Neon to market in 31 months at a development cost of \$1.3 billion — about half what it cost to develop the 1996 minivans. "Even though the Neon is being built in North America, it is designed for markets around the world.

"The Neon is a different kind of American small car. It will not be a car of sacrifices. It'll have performance, be environmentally responsible, fuel efficient, stylish ... a car

with personality and character. We want it to be a car people want to own, not a car they buy because that's all they can afford. It's a car that goes beyond expectations. It's more than just transportation."

Lutz expects a good response to the Neon in Europe.

"Chrysler is showing a commitment to the European market," he said. "When we returned to Europe in 1987, some people said American carmakers couldn't innovate without a Japanese or European partner. ... For too many years, American companies were behind the curve. But Chrysler wants to prove with the Neon that it's a whole new game."

Four-door Neons are made in Belvidere, Ill. Coupes are manufactured in Toluca, Mexico. Belvidere can make up to 300,000 Neons a year and Toluca another 75,000.

The 2,320-pound Neon offers a 2.0-liter, 16-valve, single overhead cam 4-cylinder engine and is available in 5-speed manual transaxle or 3-speed automatic transaxle. It comes equipped with dual front-seat air bags, available anti-lock brakes and an integrated child safety seat.

Lutz said the Neon's flashy look could make all the difference to the discerning buyer.

"The young Germans I've met here are particularly taken with the two-door coupe," he said. "They really like the different headlights."

Winter Is Over, but Don't Neglect Your Wiper Blades

- Improperly performing windshield wipers that skip across windshields create annoyances and distractions that interfere with safe driving conditions.

- Inspect wiper blades every six months. Replace when worn, damaged or malformed.

- Ninety percent of all driving decisions behind the wheel are based on vision. Properly operating windshield wipers can improve driving vision for safer vehicle operation.

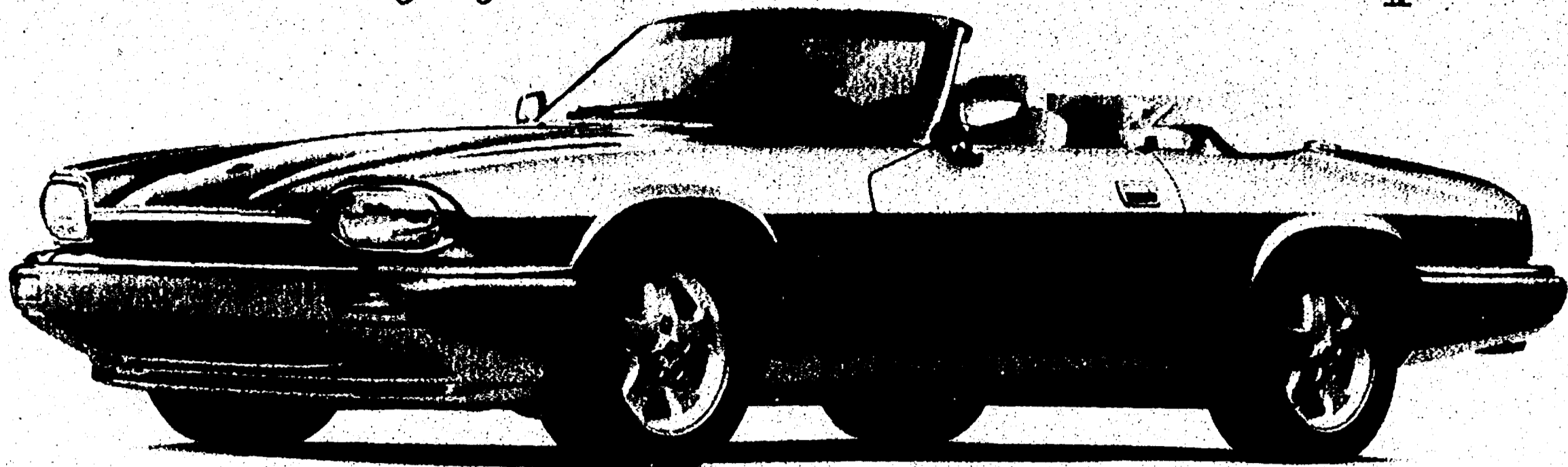
