In the word **peuns/puns** (pound) the initial 'p' becomes a 'b' after **dew/deu** and **mil/myl** (thousand), and 'f' after the word **tri/try**. For example: £1000.00 = **myl buns**, £3.00 = **tri feuns**.

In the word **diner/dynar** the initial 'd' becomes 'dh', (pronounced like the 'th' in English 'though'), after **dew/deu**. For example: £3.02 = **try funs ha deu dhynar**.
