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



NEWS FROM HEADQUARTERS

MEMO ON REINSTATING MEMBERS, 1968

(For Reinstatements approved during the period of January 1 — December 31, 1968)

When a member applies for Reinstatement, (who is less than 60 years of age) he signs an application for reinstatement, which he turns over to his Chapter, with the following payments:

Does for the full Current Year of 1968 (12 months dues) \$ Charter Reinstatement fee of \$ 1.00

AND \$3.00 for each of the delinquent years 1967, 1966, and 1965, BUT for no more than three (3) years

After the Chapter has passed favorably on the Reinstatement, the Secretary will certify as to the date the member was reinstated, on the back of the application, and send it to the Supreme Lodge Headquarters, with \$7.75 Per Capita Tax for the full year of 1968, PLUS the appropriate fees for the delinquent years. The Chapter will retain the \$1.00 reinstatement fee.

FOR EXAMPLE: If a member last paid chapter dues to Dec. 31, 1945. OR to Dec. 31, 1962, he would pay Chapter Dues for the full year 1968. \$1.00 reinstatement fee, and \$9.00 for his 3 or more delinquent years. Then, of this amount collected, the Chapter would remit only \$16.75 to the Headquarters, with the completed reinstated application.

FOR EXAMPLE: If a member has paid his Chapter Dues to Dec. 31, 1965, and wants to

reinstate, he would pay the Chapter Dues for the full year of 1968, \$1.00 reinstatement fee, and \$6.00 for his two delinquent years (1966 and 1967). Of this amount collected, the Chapter would remit \$13.75 to the Headquarters, with the completed reinstatement application. Also, if a member has paid to Dec. 31, 1966 and wanted to reinstate, then the amount due Headquarters from the Chapter would be only \$10.75.

MEMBERS WHO HAVE REACHED OR PASSED THE AGE OF 60 YEARS, when applying for reinstatement, pay ONLY dues for the full current year of 1968, plus the \$1.00 rainstatement fee. The Chapter sends to Headquarters only the 1968 Per Capita Tax of \$7.75, with the application. NOTE: Any member who is 60 or more years of age at the time of reinstatement WILL NOT participate in the Death Benefit or Emergency Fund.

HOWEVER. members who are delinquent, and who are 60 or more years of age. MAY place themselves in good standing by paying ALL back dues to the Chapter, and the Chapter must remit ALL back Per Capita Tax to the Hezdquarters. Over-age members can thus retain their participation in the Emergency Fund, or avoid a reduction in Fund benefits, as provided in the Official Constitution.

His teaching specialties have included History of Western Civilization. American Foreign Policy and Introduction to Political Science. His achievement, in public services were recognized nationally, when he was selected to appear in the 1965 edition of "Outstanding Young Men of America."

George Athansan is a man of deep convictions and intellectual awareness. Exemplifying his many civic interests are his having served on the Charter Revision Commission of Hartford, Board of Directors of the Greater Hartford Council of Churches, the Greater Hartford Chamber of Commerce and as State Chairman of the Connecticut Committee for Refugees and the Connecticut Citizens for Better Health.

His Greek Community career includes service to the St. George Greek Orthodox Church as Chairman of Membership and Fund Raising Committees and as a Parish Councilman. He has given numerous lectures in all parts of New England on behalf of the Cyprus cause—having specialized on the subject, after devoting his Thesis for his Master's Degree on Cyprus—. His devotion to Ahepa and its ideals is exemplary. His administration as President of the Hartford Chapter for two terms, saw the Chapter rise to the top of the District.

His anticipated elevation to the Office of Yanker District Governorship, is anxiously awaited by his many friends, who have been looking for a dynamic leader to bring the District back to its justion of progress and macional importance it enjoyed in the past.

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A 13 year-old heart patient from Nicosia, Cyprus, will undergo open heart surgery next week in Pittsburgh's Childrens Hospital, a Christmas gift from friends in America he had never met.

Soterios Maimaris, who was born with a hole in the wall between two heart chambers, probably would not live another two years, doctors estimate, without the operation. In spite of a healthy appearance, the boy suffers from frequent blackout spells and periods of shortness of breath.

Soterios's father is dead. He lives with his mother and his five brothers and sisters in Nicosia. Recently his case came to the attention of the Pittsburgh Chapter of AHEPA.

Members of the chapter donated money to pay Soterios's hospital bills (which may run as high as \$3000) and the doctors at Childrens Hospital have agreed to donate their services free. The money for the boy's flight to the U.S. came from donations contributed by Air France employees in this country.

Soterios was admitted to Childrens-Hospital Wednesday for two days of tests. Doctors say that they will probably operate Monday, December 18. The boy is accompanied by his uncle, Andreas Maimaris, a government employee who is on leave of absence from Nicosia.

On arriving in the U.S. Soterios was met by officials from AHEPA and Air France. Turning to his uncle, Soterios asked that he translate into English.

"Tell them that when I am better and my heart is bigger, I will be able to thank them better," he said.

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
The Order of Ahepa was founded July 26, 1922, in Atlanta, Ga., and its jurisdiction extends to 49 states, Canada, and Australia, with 430 local chapters. The Order of Ahepa is a secret fraternal organization, which is non-political and non-sectarian. The word "AHEPA" is an acrostic, and is derived from the first letters of the following: American Hellenic Educational Progressive Association.

Membership in the Order of Ahepa is open to men of good moral character who are citizens of the United States of America, or Canada, or who have declared their intention to become citizens.

The "AHEPA FAMILY" is composed of four separate organizations, all of which work in harmony on a local, district and national level. They are: The Order of Ahepa—The Daughters of Penelope (senior women's auxiliary)—The Sons of Pericles (junior young men's auxiliary)—Maids of Athena (junior young women's auxiliary).

OBJECTS OF AHEPA

- 1. To promote and encourage loyalty to the United States of America

Members of the Ahepa take justifiable pride in Ahepa's record of accomplishment. Ahepa has championed the cause of cducation—it has successfully fought for the freedom and self-respect of the minorities in its Justice for Greece and Justice for Cyprus programs, and Ahepa has always displayed its benevolence and generosity to the stricken victims of disaster both here and abroad

WHAT DOES THE ORDER OF AHEPA OFFER?

The Order of Ahepa offers its members the opportunity of membership in an organization with an unexcelled reputation for good fellowship and family participation in an active social program.

District Conventions are held annually in each of the 24 Districts, and a Supreme Convention is held during August of each year, Ahepa Conventions are always "family conventions" wherein full programs of social events, combining fun and relaxation, are provided for all in attendance. At the local chapter level, many social and educational affairs are held during the year so that Ahepa Families may join together in fellowship and relaxation.

CITIZENSHIP

The Ahepa Medal for Scholastic Excellence in the Greek Language is presented annually to their local Greek Schools by Ahepa Chapters. The Seven-Volume set of the "Greek Classics" are donated to high school and college libraries by Ahepa Chapters, and also donated as scholastic awards to outstanding high school graduates. Annual scholarships are awarded through the American Farm School, and Anatolia College, in Thessaloniki, Greece. Surveys are conducted of courses offered in colleges and universities in Modern and Ancient Greek, and in the Classics of Greece. 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Country Doctor: 8-County 'Miracle Man'

(Reprinted from the Jacksontille Journal)

The tood for the anxious and suffering in eight Florida councie- leads to Newberry and George William Karelas, councily doctor.

An amazing throwback to horse and buggy medicine, Dr. Karelas serves the vast but impoverished farm areas west of Lake City, Gamesville and Ocala and east of Tallahassee

He knows no regular office hours, sends no bills and as likely as not is paid in home-grown produce. His Rx includes a warm smile. wit, aml a keen knowledge of and concern for the people he serves.

His spare time" hobby is producing mir-

· During the great crop freeze of 1958, some 1,500 jobless migrant workers were stranded in Immokalee Karelas found people literally dying of hunger, dead babies in harrels, diseases spreading at an epidemic rate.

With an elderly, ill doctor and a nurse, he labored almost around the clock providing molical aid. He wrote to national food and drug companies-pleading for their assistance He contacted neighboring cities and raised

Attracting national attention, he became the force behind getting new protective laws through the Florida Legislature. Mission completed, he slipped back to his obscure Newberry

· A rickety bus loaded with transient fruit pickers had collided with a freight truck. The tiders medical needs were crucial and Karelas, the only doctor located within 25 miles of the accident, ministered to them with great care combined with amazing speed.

"Absolutely unhelierable!" a reporter at the cene marvelled. One ductor working alone attended to fourteen seriously injured men in hards one bour

· Then there's that elderly Newberry citizen Gainesville specialists gave up for dead in 1964 who's still alive today, the aging homeless whose family doctor built for them a small. inexpensive but comfortable home; the penniless cripple who now owns a pair of special

"I am my brother's keeper, Karelas said I'm a dentist, surgeon, obstetrician, laboratory technician, psychologist, social worker, philosopher, lecturer, instructor, community leader. I am what I have to be. I am a doctor. It is experted of me

The typical Karelas punent is a migrant farmer, illiserate, elderly and very, very poor, The doctor sends no bills. When the parients pay, it's frequently with seasonal crops okra, curambers, potatoes, squash, bananas, fresh ezzu, a cured ham-or an antique, a marbie statue, a prized shell collection.

In any instance it was a wad of bubble game from a grateful child.

Why, then, does a nationally recognized physician from Boston go to work in an isoland nown and concentrate his efforts on what Karelas calls "the neglected seament of the population the old, the poor, the young?

Being a country doctor is a beautiful life, Karolas said. It's hard work, but it's beautiful and peaceful here. And the work's very satis-

But this is just part of the reason.

San of a transient worker who died when he was I. Karrias went to work early to help sup-

port his family. He "moonlighted" his way through high school, working full time during the day and going to school at night. He has three children, one with multiple mental re-

He truly knows the people he serves: the poor, the transient, the handicapped, Helping them is the most natural thing in the world.

They, in turn, have responded to his efforts. Perhaps the biggest miracle at Newberry is Karelas medical rounda, valued at more than \$50,000. No country doctor and few rural communities could afford such an elaborate building. But it became Karelas' dream shortly after purchasing a 17-acre pie-shaped tract off State Road 26 for \$3,000.

The people of Newberry brought their timber and stone and toiled beside their doctor for three years. His total expense was \$15,000.

Inside, the spacious rooms are lined with curios, vivid paintings, photographs—tokens given to him in payment for medical services.

The building and its contents belong to the people of Newberry," he says proudly. "The rotunda assures them they'll never be without a physician.

His dream now is to donate the remaining 15 acres for a non-profit, interdenominational retirement center for elderly persons with low

He has the blueprints and has talked to University of Florida officials about having their advanced students get practical training by donating their time to the center. "All that needed now," Karelas noted, "is financial backing.

"Money," "specialization" and "nurses" are the current ills of the medical profession. according to Karelas.

It's time we break the specialist bubble. Medical schools are graduating prima donnas. Specialists aren't doctors. They're nothing more than technicians. They know more and more about less and less. They charge exorbitant fees and rerire early.

What has happened to dedicated service: Some doctors own drug stores. Others get prescription sale curs. This is ridiculous.

Karelas admitted specialists play an im-portant role in the medical program. But what we need desperarely is general practitioners. Few schools today even have a general practice department.

Nurses, Karelas said, bave wired control of the office.

They handle the phones. ("Ninety-nine times our of 100, the caller wants to speak directly to the doctor.") They select the order of patients. Tither first come, first served or regular customers first I select my own patients, on the basis of immediate medical oreds. ("No patient should be rutned away.

Karelas offered two suggestions to alleviate the rural area medical problems.

Encourage women to become doctors. They have that conderful maternal instinct. In Russia, the majority of doctors are women and they do one back of a job

Require the medical school graduate to apend his first five years in general practice. A person must be 'nined up' no adequately serve the public. Some specialists have never learned

The ability to be self-supporting or guarantees from relatives or friends that the immigrant will not become a public charge is one of the few really major requirements for the would-be American.

Detailed information on how to obtain visas, immigrant alien papers, quota positions, and other immigration requirements are an important part of this new fact-packed book. The families of those wishing to become citizens and resident aliens hoping to apply for citizenship will find it a valuable guide to the steps that must be taken and the requirements set up by the Immigration and Naturalization

THE EMANCIPATION **PROCLAMATION**

On January 1, 1863, 105 years ago. President abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation, freeing slaves in the states which were in rebellion against the Union. The Proclamation delared that all slaves in those states were then, thenceforth, and forever free." In fact, however, it actually freed no slaves for it applied only to the Confederate South where the Federal government then exercised no control and it specifically exempted all Confederate regions under Federal military occupation. The Proclamation was, nevertheless, an important declaration of policy which rallied support for the Union cause both at home and abroad:

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DON AVLON (Diomedes Avlonitis)



After 40 years in the metropolitan New York area as a music teacher, performer, band leader and composer, Don Avlon moved to Arizona. Last spring he was appointed as the first full-time music director of the Payson public Schools in Payson, Arizona.

Since his arrival in New York at the age of 20, he has made a career in the music world. He started by playing in Dance Bands, in theaters, in movie houses for silent films. He later conducted his own orchestra. In 1926 he founded the Greek Radio Hour and gave lectures and converts on the radio.

He also started a music school of his own, and then, after studying for degrees at Columbia University, he began teaching in public schools. In conjunction with his other activities, he composed music, mostly popular, compiling about 40 or 50 of them. IMMIGRATION AND NATURALIZATION OUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Must I File an Alien Address Report in January, Even If I Haven't Moved?

Question: I arrived in the United States receptly and notified the Immigration Service of my address. Will I again bate to file an address report in January, even though I base not moved?

Answer: Yes All aliens with the exception of those in diplomatic status and foreign representatives of international organizations of which the United States is a member, must file address reports in January. They can obtain ad-dress report cards at the local United States Post Office or at the nearest office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, and should return the card to the clerk from whom it was received. It should not be mailed. Parents or guardians of children under 14 must fill out address reports for them. Aliens who are ill must send a friend or relative to obtain the address report card (Form I-53) for them and then have it returned to the issuing clerk after they have filled it out. Resident aliens who are not in the United States during January must report their addresses to the Service within 10 days after they return.

Should I Apply for Citizenship After Having Lived Here Illegally for Many Years?

Question: I lived in the United States illegally for many years, but regularized my status and became a permanent resident only three years ago. Before that I had several brushes with the law, but because I had an American wife and children, was given suspension of deportation. Is it now possible for me to apply for citizenship or will all my old troubles he brought up again it I do?

Answer: If you have had no difficulties since you achieved permanent residence status (through the technical procedure known as "suspension of deportation"), you are eligible for citizenship. As you are married to an American citizen, you are eligible for naturalization after three years lawful residence, that is, from the date on your alien registration card. Because of your background it may take longer than usual before your application for naturalization is approved. Probably there will be an investigation into your earlier circumstances, but that will not prevent you from being naturalized. Naturalization should protect you from any future immigration problems, and it is in your interest to apply for citizenship.

I Have Lost My Alien Registration Card. How Do I Get a New One?

Question: I have lost my alien registration card. How do I go about obtaining a new one?

Answer. To obtain a new card you file an application on Form 1-90. You can ger this form from the nearest office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service and should file it there with photographs and a fee of \$5. In ductourse a new alien registration card will be mailed to you.



The bicentennial celebration will take place at New Smyrna Beach, Florida, on May 4, 1968.

Ahepa Supreme President Andrew Fasseas of Chicago, Ill., announced that Supreme Governor James S. Scofield of St. Petersburg, Fla, will be chairman of the Ahepa National Committee for the bicentennial celebration.

"We are hopeful that Ahepans and non-Ahepans will fill the city of New Smyrna Beach on that day, to take part in this fitting celebration of our Hellenic Heritage in America," Supreme President Fasseas said.

Americans of Greek, Italian, and Minorcan descent will participate in the all-day celebration, in cooperation with the Volusia County Historical Association of New Smyrna Beach, Fla.

The New Smyrna Colony was founded in 1768 by Dr. Andrew Tarnbull. It was the largest single colonization ever attempted in America, under British rule, outranking even Jamestown and Plymouth Rock. About 400 of the 1,405 colonists who landed in New Smyrna in 1768 were Greeks.

Honorary co-chairman of the national Ahepa committee are Ahepa Mother Lodge members Nicholas D. Chotas of Atlanta, Ga., and George A. Polos of Miami, Fla., and Ahepa Past Supreme President Kimon A. Doukas of New York City. William G. Poulos of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., past supreme governor, and Angelo P. Demos of Miami, Fla., current governor of the Florida Ahepa Catrus District, are vice chairmen. Dr. Peter Dukas of Tallahassee, Fla., is secretary.

REMEMBERING ABRAHAM LINCOLN

The celebration of Lincoln's birthday this year, following so soon after the rededication of Ford's Theater, where he was assassinated, carries a special poignancy. Probably the most beloved of American Presidents and leader of the American people during the years of the Civil War, Lincoln brought the nation to victory, and then at the moment of triumph was shot by an assassin on April 14, 1865, barely a month after his second inaugural.

The shooting occurred while President Lincoln and his wife and several friends sat in a box in Ford's Theater in Washington, watching a play. After he was shot, Lincoln was carried across the street to the Petersen house where he died the next morning

The theater was never used again. Instead it was purchased by the government and turned into an office building and storehouse for the War Department. In 1896, the government also purchased the Petersen house. In 1932 the Ford's Theatre building was made the Lincoln



Museum and both it and the house where Lincoln died were made National Memorials under the administration of the National Park Service.

Over the years millions of visitors have seen the vast collection of Lincolniana — letters, documents, photographs, objects and mementos pertaining to Lincoln — in the Ford's Theater or Lincoln Museum, and probably almost as many have crossed the street to see the small room where Abraham Lincoln died on the morning after he was shot. Added to the collection of the Museum and shortly to be on display will be the suit and overcoat Lincoln wore the night he was shot. These had been given by Mrs. Lincoln to one of the

President's bodyguards in appreciation of his "devoted attention" to the President, and were purchased from one of his descendents and presented to the Government only a few days ago.

Now the Government, at a cost of several million dollars and as a part of the Lincoln Museum, has restored Ford's Theater. The restored theater, however, is on a smaller scale and will seat only 600 persons compared with the 1700 who could be accommodated in Lincoln's time. A nonprofit repertory group will present plays dealing with Lincoln and his times, including some presented at Ford's during the eighteen sixties. The first will be "John Brown's Body" by Stephen Vincent Benet. It will be the first theatrical production at Ford's since Lincoln's assassination.

In re-dedicating the theater on January 21. Vice President Humphrey quoted from Lincoln's second inaugural address in 1865.

"With malice toward none; with charity for all; with firmness in the right, as God gives us to see the right, let us strive to finish the work we are in; to bind up the nation's wounds; to care for him who shall have borne the battle, and for his widow and his orphan – to do all which may achieve and cherish a just and lasting peace among ourselves and with all trations."

"That," Mr. Humphrey said, "is the authentic voice of America today, tomorrow and for all ages."


The Order of Ahepa was founded July 26, 1922, in Atlanta, Ga., and its jurisdiction extends to 49 states, Canada, and Australia, with 430 local chapters. The Order of Ahepa is a secret fraternal organization, which is non-political and non-sectarian. The word "AHEPA" is an acrostic, and is derived from the first letters of the following: American Hellenic Educational Progressive Association.

Membership in the Order of Ahepa is open to men of good moral character who are citizens of the United States of America, or Canada, or who have declared their intention to become citizens.

The "AHEPA FAMILY" is composed of four separate organizations, all of which work in harmony on a local, district and national level. They are: The Order of Ahepa-The Daughters of Penelope (senior women's auxiliary)-The Sons of Pericles (junior young men's auxiliary)-Maids of Athena (junior young women's auxiliary).

OBJECTS OF AHEPA

- 1. To promote and encourage loyalty to the United States of America

Members of the Ahepa take justifiable pride in Ahepa's record of accomplishment. Ahepa has championed the cause of education—it has successfully fought for the freedom and self-respect of the minorities in its Justice for Greece and Justice for Cyprus programs. and Ahepa has always displayed its benevolence and generosity to the stricken victims of disaster both here and abroad.

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WHAT DOES THE ORDER OF AHEPA OFFER?

The Order of Ahepa offers its members the opportunity of membership in an organization with an unexcelled reputation for good fellowship and family participation in an active social program.

District Conventions are held annually in each of the 24 Districts, and a Supreme Convention is held during August of each year. Alepa Conventions are always "family conventions" wherein full programs of social events, combining fun and relaxation, are provided for all in attendance. At the local chapter level, many social and educational affairs are held during the year so that Ahepa Families may join together in fellowship and relaxation.

CITIZENSHIP

Ahepa's requirements stipulate that members must be citizens, or have indicated their intention to become citizens. Ahepa chapters assist non-citizens in attaining their full citizenship, and also inculcate their members with the obligations that go hand-in-hand with citizenship.

EDUCATION

Ahepa has been participating in the awarding of Scholarships to worthy students for the past 41 years on local, district and national levels. The Ahepa Hall for Boys and the Ahepa School, both at St. Basil's Academy, Garrison, N. Y., have been donated to the Academy by the Order of Ahepa. In Greece, an Ahepa Agricultural School was established. More than 40,000 American books have been donated to schools and libraries in Greece by Ahepa. The Ahepa Medal for Scholastic Excellence in the Greek Language is presented annually to their local Greek Schools by Ahepa Chapters. The Seven-Volume set of the "Greek Classics" are donated to high school and college libraries by Ahepa Chapters, and also donated as scholastic awards to outstanding high school graduates. Annual scholarships are awarded through the American Farm School, and Anatolia College, in Thessa-Ioniki, Greece. Surveys are conducted of courses offered in colleges and universities in Modern and Ancient Greek, and in the Classics of Greece. A new national program of Ahepa Scholarships on a chapter, district and national level will shortly be introduced, whereby some 500 Ahepa Scholarships will be available annually to worthy students.

CIVIC PARTICIPATION

The local chapters of the Ahepa are active in their own civic affairs and projects, all of which conforms to Ahepa's program of urging its members to be model citizens through planned civic activity. Ahepa chapters are foremost in aiding and contributing to worthy fund drives.

SPORTS PROGRAMS

The Ahepa sponsors annual national tournaments in basketball.

bowling, golf and track events. Local chapters maintain active sports programs, and District tourneys are offered.

INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

Ahepa's aid to the people of Greece in various respects such as Greek War Relief; Ahepa Hospitals in Athens and Thessaloniki; seven Ahepa Health Centers in Greece at Chrysoupolis, Kalavryta, Melighala, Thebes, lerapetra (Crete), Farsala, and Filiatra; Ahepa Preventorium in Volos; American Books for Greece; CARE Tool Kits for Greece; annual Ahepa Excursion to Greece; various Relief Drives for Greek disaster victims; Ahepa Refugee Relief Committee enabling Greek citizens to emigrate to the United States; Daughters of Penelopian Shelter Home in Athens; annual donations to the Queen's Fund; annual donations to the Blind in Greece; these are all some of the outstanding examples of Ahepa's own "People-to-People" program. Ahepa has been a forerunner in this major American program of aid to less fortunate peoples of the world.

THE AHEPAN MAGAZINE

The fraternity's national magazine is mailed to all good standing members without additional charge.

THE EMERGENCY FUND

A benefit payable to the beneficiary upon the member's death, usually in the amount of \$200, but dependent upon the member's age at time of initiation or reinstatement.

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

SEN. DIRKSEN TO RECEIVE AHEPA SOCRATIC AWARD

WASHINGTON, D. C. – U. S. Senator Everett McKinley Dirksen (R-III.) will receive the coveted 1968 Socratic Award of the Order of Ahepa at its 18th biennial National Banquet honoring the Congress of the United States to be held in Washington, D. C., on Monday, March 18 at the Washington Hilton Hotel.

Ahepa Supreme Secretary and Banquet Chairman Alfred G. Vonetes of Hopewell, Va., in making the announcement for the Ahepa Supreme Lodge, said Dirksen will receive this tribute because "his life's work embodies the principles of the Socratic philosophy; for his courageous devotion to the tenets of Democracy; for his contributions to world humanity; and for his statesmanship and strength of integrity."

"The Senate Minority Leader," Vonetes continued, "has long been a friend and spokesman in both houses of Congress for the Hellenes. He has made significant contributions toward the recognition of Greek Orthodoxy as a major faith in the United States."

Presented in 1966 to President Lyndon B. Johnson, and in 1964 to the late Time Life Publisher Henry R. Luce, the Ahepa Socratic Award is in the form of a bronze bust of Socrates, the ancient Greek philosopher, done 3/4 life size, and mounted on a stone base. It is the work of Greek sculptor Constantine L. Seferlis, and is a bronze interpretation done in the manner of ancient Greek bronze, and finished in antique green bronze.

Ahepa Supreme President Andrew Fasseas of Chicago, Ill., in inviting the members of the 90th Congress of the United States to this Congressional Banquet of the Ahepa, said:

"Never forgetting our blood ties with immortal Hellas, where our civilization was born, we, the members of the Order of Ahepa, the Daughters of Penelope, the Maids of Athena, and the Sons of Pericles, remain forever loyal and faithful to this young, but universally respected country—the United States of America—where Western Civilization has found its most ardent and sincere exponent and practitioner."

The Congressional Banquet is held, Fasseas stated, "Because it is Ahepa's way of showing its appreciation and gratifiede to our distinguished legislators who hold within the scope of

their actions and decisions the very existence and future well-being of the American people."

Ahepans from throughout the United States are expected to travel here to host their Congressional representatives in Congress at the event. They are encouraged to visit their Congressional offices while in Washington. Representing the Supreme Board of Trustees will be its chairman, Panayes G. Dikeou of Denver, Colo.; the Sons of Pericles Supreme President Dean Stavrakas of Chicago, Ill.; the Daughters of Penelopes Grand President Mrs. Zoc Rummel of Chicago, Ill.; and the Maids of Athena Grand President Miss Connic Contos of Flint, Mich.

Senator Dirksen is a dues-paying member of Ahepa Chapter No. 254 of Peoria, Ill., of the fraternity which has 431 local Chapters in the United States. During its 46 years of existence, the Order of Ahepa has devoted its programs and accomplishments in the fields of citizenship, educational projects and charitable endeavors.

Senator Dirksen was first elected to the U. S. House of Representatives in 1932 and in 1938 addressed the 3rd Ahepa Congressional Banquet. Dirksen served eight consecutive terms in the House. In 1950 he was elected to the U. S. Senate where he has enjoyed a long and distinguished career, taking the forefront in the leadership of his party, and the Senate. Currently serving on the Judiciary and Finance Committees, the Senator has served on the Committees on Territories, Immigration and Naturalization, Banking and Currency, and Appropriations. He is married to Louella Carver of Pekin, Ill., and they have one daughter, Mrs. Howard H. Baker, Jr., wife of the U. S. Senator of Tennessee.

NEW SMYRNA CELEBRATION

WHEREAS, all Americans should honor their debt to the past and their obligations to the future: and.

WHEREAS, our freedoms are the result of the sacrifice, wisdom, perseverance and faith of our forefathers; and,

WHEREAS, the more fully we understand and appreciate our history and heritage the more we will be able to prove worthy of it, and

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BOOK REVIEW

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NEW SMYRNA

An Eighteenth Century Greek Odyssey
By E. P. PANAGOPOULOS

In this most interesting story of the colonization of the New Smyrna area in Florida, the author, Mr. E. P. Panagopoulos gives a very accurate account of the events that led to the settling in that part of Florida of a mixture of Greeks, Ialians, Minorcans, and Corsicans, under the direction of Dr. Andrew Turnbull, in a British Colonial enterprise of great magnitude.

Most previous accounts of the event acre parrow in scope, expressing a traditional version, with crophasis on the sufferings of the original settlers and with condemnations for Dr. Andrew Turnbull, the founder of the Colonia.

To achieve maximum authenticity in his bords. The author did extensive on the spot research. This included many visits to the Manuscripts Division of the Library of Congress, the National Archives in Washington and especially the hospitable library of the Saint Augustine Historical Society, where he spent the summer months of four years, studying the special collections of documents and the rich local material which the Society has diligently gathered.

To clarify the many questions that arose on the puzzling personality of Dr. Turnbull, he travelled abroad, searching for material in the celebrated Library of the British Museum and the Public Record Office in London; in the Archives of Mahon, Minorca and the Archives General de Indias in Seville; in the Public Archives of Ajaccio, Corsica and the Archives Nationales de France in Paris; in Athens and Livorno. Through this extensive personal research, he weathered a wealth of material, which placed the story in its proper setting and showed its profound moving quality.

The story as Mr. Panagopoulos relates it, is a fascinating page of American Frontier History. A large number of people, gathered from various parts of the world, of different languages, habits, religious and customs, find themselves isolated in a swampy area on the eastern shore of Florida. The then Governor of Florida, James Grant called it in 1768, 'the largest importation of White inhabitants that was ever brought into America at a time.'

As the story of these people unfolds, it tells of a warming tale of human endeavor, where hope and pain and desperate struggle, anticipations, frustrations and eventual success are projected against a plot in which the fate of people is involved, as a state emerges from the mixture of the people who settled there from across the ocean, contributing to the birth and expansion of the American nation.

The everyday life and work of the colonists, their accomplishments and failures, personal relations, religious ceremonies, dissemination of justice, confrontation with Indians, revolts and frustrations, all make an absorbing and fast moving account. The struggles of these courageous people, who left their old countries in a quest for freedom, and who, after so many disappointments and agonies, did manage to create their life anew, projects the picture of an amazing fusion of cultures.

Breaking the boundaries of local history, this remarkable British colonial enterprise is projected against a gackground of international rivalry, harsh robust's politics, and a relatious America. Previously, unknown facts reveal the impact of the American Revolution on the minds of the inhabitants of Florida, on their political developments and on their military involvement. These were all bound with the fate of the New Smyrna Colony.

Mr. Panagopoulos, the author, after having the opportunity to talk with men of great wisdom in his search for information about his book, after hunting for material in some of the most enchanting places of the world, and reliving the reconstruction of the story, considers the soul searching drama of the New Smyrna people what Plato would call "megiston mathema", a "very great lesson" indeed. And the professional historian, as well as the general reader, can look upon this moving chronicle of the emerging of an international fusion of cultures from the swampy wilderness of Florida, both as a profoundly interesting story and an accurately authentic account of the events.

March 25, 1968 marks the 147th Anniversary of the Greek War of Independence of 1821. Freedom loving people throughout the world cannot forget the gallant struggle of the handful of Greek people against fifty million Mohammedans, who, displaying an unmatched gallantry in action, proved to the world once again that their enthusiastic zeal and devotion to liberty, is indeed a trademark of the Hellenic race.

True descendants of the epic days of Thermopylae and Marathon, the heroic people of little Greece proceeded to put an end to 400 years of subjugation under the mass harbaric conquerors known to man, in their continuous struggle to preserve and spread civilization and to uphold the standards of Christendom before the onslaught of the Asiatic invaders.

It was only name deat the United States, fresh from gaining their own independence from colonialism some fifty years before, would be the first nation to acknowledge the struggle of the heroic people of Greece, and lend them moral and material assistance. On the convening of Congress, in December 1822, President Monroe made the revolution of Greece the subject of a major portion of his annual message, by declaring, "The mention of Greece fills the mind with the most exalted sentiments, and arouses in our bosoms the best feelings of which our nature is susceptible. Superior skill and refinement in the arts, heroic gallantry in action, disinterested patriotism, enthusiastic zeal and devotion in favor of public liberty, are associated with our recollections of ancient Greece. That such a country should have been overwhelmed and so long hidden as it were, from the world, under a gloomy despotism, has been a cause of unceasing and deep tegret to generous minds for ages past. It was natural, therefore, that the reappearance of these people in their original character, contending in favor of their liberties should produce the great excitement and sympathy in their favor. which have been so signally displayed throughout the United States. A strong hope is entertained that these people will recover their independence, and resume their equal station among the nations of the earth. That she may obrain that rank, is the object of our most ardent wishes.

The eloquence of Daniel Webster, Henry Clay and Edward Everett will always be gratefully remembered by Greeks everywhere, as they championed the cause of Greek freedom in the halls of Congrees and the bar of public opinion.

In support of his Resolution in the House of Representatives, for the appointment of a commissioner to Greece, Daniel Webster raised his voice in behalf of the Greek cause, "I wish to take occasion of the struggle of an interesting and

gallant people, in the cause of liberty and Christianity, to draw the attention of the House to the circumstances which have accompanied that struggle, and to the principles which appear to have governed the conduct of the great states of Europe in regard to it; and to the effects and consequences of these principles upon the independence of nations, and especially upon the institutions of free governments. What I have to say of Greece, therefore, concerns the modern, not the ancient; the living and not the dead. It regards her, not as she exists in history, triumphant over time and tyranny and ignorance, but as she now is contending, against fearful odds, for being and for the common privileges of human nature.

Henry Clay, supporting the Webster Resolution, denounced on the floor of the House of Representatives as "low and debased" those who did not "dare to express their sympathies with suffering Greece"

The message by President Monroe and the Webster Resolution are believed to be the first official expressions favorable to the independence of Greece, by any of the governments of Christendom, and unquestionably helped to arouse public sentiment throughout the civilized world, which eventually led to the Battle of Navarino and the liberation of a portion of Greece from the Turkish volc.

of Greece from the Turkish voke. The speeches of Webster and Clay in behalf of liberty for Greece, rank among the greatest of American orations and have identified the House of Representatives with the Independence of Greece. The strong voices of President Monroe, Congressmen Webster and Clay, and other supporters of the liberation struggle, stirred the imagination of the American people, who hastened to offer their moral and financial aid to the cause. Men like Samuel Gridley Howe, Jonathan Miller, Colonoel George Jarvis, John R. Stuyvesant and others offered their very lives for the freedom of Hellas. For these, Greeks everywhere are forever indebted for the American contributions to their freedom cause.

Today, as Hellenes throughout the world, prepare to celebrate this 147th Anniversary of their War of Independence, people everywhere look to the United States of America as the Champion of Freedom and Democratic Principles and Ideals. As the struggle against world Communism unfurls in the four corners of the universe, the United States continues to give hope and inspiration to all freedom loving nations, whether large or small, as they unite their efforts to safeguard and preserve the very same principles which the Greek nation gratefully acknowledges and proclaims.

PATRICK HENRY'S FAMOUS SPEECH

On March 23, 1775, 193 years ago, Patrick Henry, famous Virginia patriot and orator, and first governor of his state, made a speech in the Virginia Assembly which is still widely quoted, particularly the final lines: 'Is life so dear, or peace so sweet, as to be purchased at the price of chains of slavery? Forbid it. Almighty God! I know not what course others may take; but for me, give me liberty, or give me death!" Patrick Henry was one of the co-authors of the Virginia Bill of Rights, which anticipated the Declaration of Independence by nearly a month. Its provisions and its phrases are strikingly similar to those of our Declaration of Independence. During the Revolution and the postwar era Patrick Henry served four terms as Governor of Virginia.

WHEREFROM SMYRNA IN THE U.S.A.

Malaga girls are pretty, but Smyrna girls are better! Be that as it may, the name Smyrna has taken a good place in American nomenclature commemorating the Greek city on the Aegean coast of Asia minor - the reputed birthplace of Homer and source of charming dames. New Smyrna in Florida is the first place in America to recall the ancient city, but it specifically commemorates the beautiful Greek woman from Smyrna who inspired the Scottish nobleman, Dr. Andrew Turnbull, to conceive the idea of a Greek colony in Florida nearly two centuries ago. Under his driving force, some 1,000 Greeks sailed from the Aegean lands in 1767 to colonize Florida

The saga of Turnbull's Greeks in Florida under British rule is dramatically and meaningfully told by Professor Epaminoudas Panagopoulos in his exceptional essay on New Smyrna as an Eighteenth Century Greek Odyssey, (Gainesville: University of Florida, 1966). While the Greek colony of New Smyrna faded into the growth of Florida, its name spread into some 16 states of the Union. All of the American places that honor the ancient Greek city, revitalized by Alexander the Great, could also take pride in the pioneering spirit of Florida's Greek colonists.

The second largest American Smyrna is in Delaware, located in Kent County, but the oldest after Florida is thriving in Georgia. On the Dixie Highway and in the County of Cobb. Georgia's Smyrna was founded in 1838 by the Methodists as a center of social and religious life in the pioneer days "for all denominations. The est of America's Smyrnas are small places. The Smyrna of North Carolina (Carteret County) is a neat fishing village of "shiningly painted houses" with no more than 200 souls. The Smyrna of Tennessee in Rutherford County is much larger with about 1,500 folks, who may some day rename their town Sam Davis in honor of the home-boy hero-the fearless scout, who was executed by General Dodge during the civil war because Sam refused to betray his commander.

The rest of America's Smyrnas have their own story in Indiana, Iowa, Maine, Nebraska, North Carolina, Michigan, Ohio, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Virginia and Washington. Whatever the immediate cause of their name, they all go back to ancient Greece when Smyrna was known as the 'most beautiful city under the sun'."



NICHOLAS P. KAFKALAS

Brigadier General Commanding General 78th Infantry Division Pennsylvania Army National Guard

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Brigadier General Nicholas P. Kafkalas assumed command of the 28th Infantry Division, Pennsylvania Army National Guard, on 24 April 1967.

General Kafkalas' military career began on 6 March 1939, when he enlisted as a Private in Company D, 110th Infantry Regiment, 28th Infantry Division. He has been a member of the division for all but. a portion of his World War II active duty service.

In February 1941, he was a Sergeant when the 28th Division was called to active duty. He left the division at Camp Livingston, Louisiana, in April 1942, to attend Infantry Officer Candidate School at Fort Benning, Following graduation on 14 July 1942, he was assigned to the 54th Armored Infantry Regiment, 10th Armored Division as a Second Lieutenant.

He served successively as Platoon Leader, Assistant Operations and Training Officer and Company Commander. He was promoted to First Lieutenant in November 1943, and to Captain on 6 June 1944.

General Kafkalas was Commander of Company C. 54th Armored Infantry Battalion when the 10th Armored Division landed in France on 12 September 1944. In the fighting that followed, he was wounded once and he twice earned the Silver Star for gallantry in action.

He participated in three major campaigns: Ardennes, Rhineland and Central Europe.

His last assignment during World War II was as Commander of Company C. 318th Infantry Regimeir. Soils Division. He was separated at Fort Dix in November 1944, and joined the Officer Reserve Corps.

He was released from active duty at Fort Jay. New York, in December 1953.

He immediately rejoined the 28th Infantry Division, then being reorganized on an inactive duty basis, and was assigned as Division G-3, Operations and Training Officer. He was promoted to Lieutenant Colonel, 21 January 1954.

ONION-RING IDEA TEARFUL SUCCESS

Grand Island, Neb.-Some might have wept at the futility of it all back in August 1962 when Bill Peterson and three employees sat down to process a new product with a meat cleaver.

Now Bill and some 114 employees cry all the way from the bank with pay roll checks amounting to some 400 thousand dollars a year.

In just 41/2 years, the Delicious Foods Company, that started on a shoestring, has both feet firmly planted in the million-dollar-a-year class.

Tears for such unusual expansion? You would cry happy tears, too, if you sliced and processed up to 30 thousand pounds of onions a day.

But Bill and his employees are now used to it and beam proudly in claiming their company is the second or third leading processor of fresh frozen onion rings in the country.

The company has sales outlets in some 35 states under its own Tri-M (try-them) trade-mark and reaches into all the others by processing onion rings for other companies.

Ciric Leader

No wonder they call Bill and his general manager, Pete Kyros, "the Greek onion kings of Nebraska."

Peterson a Greek name?

Tim a Mediterranean Swede, chuckles Bill, one of this city's most go-getting rivic leaders. "I did come from Greece in 1930 but the family name, Petropolos was changed. My father's first name was Peter. I'm his son so I'm Peterson."

Mr. Peterson, former cafe operator

here and a petroleum dealer, said a couple of stock-holders in the infant company had come to him with their idea of processing fresh, frozen onion rings and isked him to invest in the venture.

"Three employees and I started in the old Fairmont building here cutting up onions by hand with a meat cleaver," he said. "We use only the sweetest part of the onion and our own special batter and breading and then quick froze them in an hour to retain the tenderness and flavor!

Aided by the booming popularity of onion rings in steak houses and driveinns, the product won instant popularity.

'Future Unlimited'

But just when they got rolling good, fire in August 1963 nearly wiped out everything but our determination," Mr. Kyros said. "But we started again, moing to an available plant at Hastings when space could not be found here. We stayed in Hastings two years, moving back to the present Roberts building plant in February of 1966. We wanted to come back to Grand Island for the simple reason this is our home."

Here, operations, previously limited to regular size rings sold only to chains and institutions, were expanded to include bite sized onion rings sold at retail.

The future is unlimited," said Pete who added the quip:

We are the only people in the world who cry for a living

CHOLAKIS ELECTED RENSSELAER COUNTY D.A.

Con G. Cholakis, a member of Trojan Ch. No. 306 of Troy, N.Y. took the oath of office last month as D.A. of Rensselaer County, after his overwhelming election at the polls.




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

REMARKS OF HON. EDWARD J. DERWINSKI OF ILLINOIS IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES ON MONDAY, MARCH 25, ON THE OCCASION OF THE 147th ANNIVERSARY OF GREEK INDEPENDENCE

Mr. Speaker, March 25, 1821, 147 sure ugo, the heroic people of Greece ros to wage a straggle for independence reasons the Ottoman Empire and their victorious efforts preduced for them resurrection of Greece as in independent nation. It is especially appropriate that we make note of this siniation at a time when the government of Greece is submitting to citizens of that land a proposed new Constuation which will be submitted to 3 national referendum, Sunday, September 1. For the past year the government has been effectively rebuilding the Greek nation which suffered from a tragic breakhiwn in its parliamentary structure. During this period the Greek government has been subjected to intense criticism from abroad although the people of Green have clearly provided it with resport and support.

I especially point out to the Members that the proposals of the new Constitution are in complete conformance with the historic principles of Greek democracy. The new Constitution is a legitimate sucressor to the aspirations of the Greek patriots who 147 years ago rose against Turkish oppression to achieve recognition for their land in the family of nations. May I point out that the Greek people and its government are among the few steadfast affies that the United States possesses at the present time. The progress towards a new Constitution in Greece should restore our faith in the great strength and dignity of that fand and gives us every reason to be confident of future cooperation between the governments of the United States and Greece and their respective people

He then proceeded to laud the efforts of the United States Congressmen, comparing them with the Ancient Athenians, who, in the words of Pericles "decide all debate, carefully and in person, all matters of policy, holding not that words and deeds go ill together, but that acts are foredoomed to failure when undertaken undiscussed.'

His Eminence Archbishop Iakovos continued the tribute to our Lawmakers. naming the "primary goal and concern of their public service, freedom and human dignity, justice and equal opportunity, prosperity and peace, progress and the welfare of the world community." calling on the Lord and Ruler of the Um verse "to fortify you so that you may excel in the fulfillment and execution of the awesome responsibilities of your high office."

The Honorable Spito T. Agnew, Governor of Maryland, conveyed the thanks and admiration of the fifty governors of the United States, to the wonderful leadership in the Congress of the United States. Congressman Nicholas Galifianakis followed Governor Agnew, and in his

brief remarks thanked the Order of Ahepa and lauded the precepts and principles for which it stands, in education, in Hellenic culture, and in individual freedom. He was succeeded by Congressman Peter Kyros, who in thanking the Order of Ahepa, paid tribute to "men of Hellenic Heritage, men of Greek tradition like Leonidas of Thermopylae, who have fought and died for freedom for many, many years". Speaking of the contributions of ancient Greece to modern civilization, he said "we can remember tonight the heriatge of ancient Greece, upon which America was founded. And, to these two ideals of courage and freedom, of the courage to die for what is right and the freedom to do what is right, let's rededicate ourselves tonight, for if we truly love this great country of ours, we can't do any less."

Congressman John Brademas followed, and proceeded to extol the efforts of his colleagues in Congress, congressmen Galifianakis and Kyros, as well as those of Governor Agnew. "For all of them agree", he said, "with the declaration and admonition of Pericles. We do not say, he said, in that famous funeral oration of his, that a man who takes no interest in politics minds his own business. We say he has no business here at all. And so, as Americans proud of their Hellenic Heritage, but above all, as Americans, we are glad to be here tonight as the Order of Ahepa does honor to the men and women who have made politics their business, the service of law and justice."

Honorable Ramsey Clark, United States Attorney General, was the next speaker. Taking his theme from the famous Know Thyself" of Socrates, as applied to individuals and to nations, he said, "Human nature changes imperceptibly, if at all. Jefferson noted at the height of the Revolution that human nature was the same on both sides of the tlantic. There is much wisdom, much simple and beautiful wisdom, from the glory that was Greece. If we can but apply it to our very complex times. Some of the observations of their great philosophers seem startlingly relevant, so much so that you would hardly expect to find them where they are. Book One of the Republic, Plato says that poverty is the mother of crime. Aristotle said that the universal and chief cause of the revolutionary impulse is the quest for equality. There is nothing more important to us than the instilling in the heart of every young American a respect for the rights of others, which is essential to civilization and which is the role of law. The passage from Pericles' great oration that has always impressed me most is where he said. Happiness is the flower of freedom, and freedom is found only where there is courage

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

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NEW SMYRNA BICENTENNIAL CELEBRATION

MAY 4, 1968

A historic plaque commemorating the first landing of Hellenes in the New World will be dedicated during the New Smyrna Bicentennial Celebration at New Smyrna Beach, Fla., on Saturday, May 4, 1968.

The Order of Ahepa will present and unveil the plaque during special ceremonies here on that day. Ahepa Supreme President Andrew Fasseas of Chicago, Ill., will represent the fraternity at the official ceremonies.

The Ahepa Plaque will be dedicated in memory of the more than 400 Greeks who landed in New Smyrna, Fla., in 1768, and will be located in Old Fort Park where the original settlers congregated two hundred years ago, and directly across from the boulevard from City Hall. The plaque will be mounted on a base of toquina, mined from a nearby quarry which produces much of the world's finest toquina, a shell rock similar to limestone.

Americans of Greek, Italian, and Minorean descent will participate in the all-day celebration, in cooperation with the Volusia County Historical Association. The New Smyrna Colony was founded in 1768 by Dr. Andrew Turmbull. It was the largest single colonization ever attempted in America under British rule, out ranking even Jamestown and Plymouth Rock. About 400 of the 1,403 colonists who landed in New Smyrna in 1768 were Greek's

SOCIETY SPONSORS ITS FIRST LECTURE

The newly-formed American Society for Neo-Hellenic Studies, Inc., sponsored its first lecture on February 8th in Vanderbilt Hall of New York University. Dr. Deno Geanakoplos, Professor of Byzantine History, Italian Renaissance History, and Greek Orthodox Church History at Yale University delivered the lecture entitled: 'The Greco-Byzantine Cultural Tradition: From Athens to Byzantium, to Venice and the Modern World." Dr. Geanakoplos emphasized the continuity of the Greek tradition and its enrichment through a fusion with Christianity during the Byzantine period and the time of its transmission to the West.

The substance of the lecture is also a recent discovery in Renaissance scholarship – that Byzantines or post-Byzantines did not come westward as refugees, but, essentially as emigres. They had a second homeland in the Greek colony of Venice, from which point, through the medium of learned Greek, scholars as well as painters, Greco-Byzzantine learning was diffused to all areas of Western Europe. Dr. Geanakoplos noted that, formerly, this influence of the Greek community of Venice and of the Byzantine "refugees" scholars had been overlooked by researchers.

The American Society for Neo-Hellenic Studies, Inc. is an independent non-profit organization. It works for the promotion of knowledge and scholarly research concerning the language, literature, history, theology, philosophy, art, and folklore of modern Greece, as well as the cultural activities of Greeks in the United States and throughout the world.







AHEPA IN CANADA

ALBERTA CENTENNIAL PROJECT — ORDER OF AHEPA

With the marking of Canada's 100th Birthday in 1967, the Order of Ahepa in the Province of Alberta joined in the spirit of the occasion by instituting a major Centennial Project in the field of Education. Under a two-city chapter committee headed by Brother Ted B. Gardener of Edmonton, several months of research went into the final selection of a project deemed suitable.

Using Canadian History and Education as a base for their studies, the committee decided to honor the first registered teacher of pure Indian blood in the Province of Alberta and after contacting a large group of organizations, it was ascertained that Henry Bird Steinhauer was the first such teacher in the province.

Mainly due to the efforts of Mrs. Florence Scoffield, Archivist of United Church College in Edmonton, a virtually complete history on Henry Bird Steinhauer was obtained, detailing his lengthy career from 1820 to 1824 in the field of religion and education. Henry Bird Steinhauer was educated by a Philadelphia citizen who lost his own son, Henry Steinhauer, and thus the Indian lad took this name for his own. He was a great scholar; he taught from East to Northwestern Canada. He was the first scholar to translate the Bible from Hebrew and Greek into the Cree language.

As the Centennial Project of the Province of Alberta, a \$9,000,000.00 Museum and Archives Complex was under construction in the City of Edmonton. The Committee made representation to the Curator and the Provincial Secretary, to obtain further ideas as to the form the Order of Ahepa's project might follow.

After several meetings, it was agreed that aside from the written history of Henry Bird Steinhauer, for inclusion in the Provincial Archives, the museum section would be interested in a permanent display, should the Order of Ahepa wish to commission an original sculptor of Steinhauer. Following this idea, the Committee approached the noted Indian Sculptor, John Redbird, who agreed to the task of creating the Steinhauer Bust from existing pictures owned by the United Church Archives.

At this point, the committee met with representatives of the Canadian Broadcasting Company and arranged for the creation of a half hour television program covering the Order of Ahepa as well as the Centennial Project. In addition, James

Osborne of the Canadian Press wrote an article under the heading, "Indian Sculptor Doing Bust of Indian Educator." This appeared in most Canadian newspapers and radio circulation. Our Project was stated as being a positive Canadian Centennial." one

Official presentation of the Henry Bird Steinhauer statue was made at a luncheon held in the Corona Hotel, October 8th. Edmonton, with Morris Taylor, P. Pres., the Master of Ceremonies. Pearson with the Order of Canada Award, spoke on behalf of the lastery and the family. The Honorable Ambrose Holowach, Provincial Secretary. spoke on the contributions of Immigrants to Canada and our culture. After the un-

Many original findings have emerged from laboratories, each one helping to hasten the day when the major killers of our era will be wiped off the tace of the earth



On a never to be forgotten day of singular accomplishments, the Order of Ahepa attracted world-wide attention when it dedicated the Ahepa Memorial Plaque in honor of the first major landing of the Hellenes in the New World during historic ceremonies at New Smyrna Beach, Florida, on Saturday, May 4th.

The Memorial Plaque is an Ahepa tribute to the past, a memento of the present and a legacy for the future. It is mounted on a giant block of native coquina stone in a beautiful, landscaped site amid giant oak trees and attractive Grecian benches in the heart of the city—in Old Fort Park 4 ross the boulevard from City Hall.

The Hellenic settlers of the Turnbull Colony congregated in this very park after landing nearby in 1768 as members of the largest single colonization in America under British Rule, surpassing even Jamestown and Plymouth Rock.

They would be just as proud of the memorial as were the Ahepans and visitors who were awed by its impressive appearance and magnificent natural location among the abundant greenery of sunny Florida.

Governor Claude R. Kirk, Jr., of Florida, who participated in the plaque unveiling, joined Ahepans from throughout the nation to commemorate the intrepid Hellenes of two centuries ago. He spared no words in praising the contributions of Ahepa and the Hellenes of America toward the progress of the nation and of Florida.

It was a proud moment in Ahepa history as the leading Hellenic fraternal organization proved once again that it can gain international prestige for Hellenism with its accomplishments.

Attention was focused on the Ahepa phase of the New Smyrna Bicentennial by utticles in The New York Times, stories in newspapers throughout Florida and the south, articles in national Greek newspapers, Voice of America broadcasts, USIA coverage, a Congressional resolution, salutes from President Lyndon B. Johnson and Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, and a statewide proclamation to all citizens of Florida by Governor Kirk.

A Birthday for Florida's New Smyrna

Piarrhis Atlantic Claritics and Tribinal Atlantic Claritics and Tender City will celebrate its 200th anniversary next Saturday. The observance will bring together many descendants of the early settlers, including Senator Spesard Holland of Florida, he is a direct descendant of Dr. Andrew Turnbull, a Scottish physician who led the colonizing expedition to these shores.

Although New Smyrna
Beach is barely half the age
of St. Augustine, the nation's oldest city, it is one
of the oldest in Florida.

Largest Colony

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A little-known fact about the 1768 colony that settled here is that it was the largest single group of colonists under British rule to come to the New World More than 1,400 persons, including some from Minorca, Greece and Italy, settled here at one time.

time.
The 400 Greeks among them were the first of their nationality to colonize in America. For this reason, the American-Hellenic Eduthe American-Hellenic Edu-cational Progressive Associ-ation will take a prominent part in the anniversary ob-servance. Also among the guests will be members of the Florida Historical So-ciety, which will be holding its annual convention in nearby Daytona Beach.

Named for Wife

Dr. Turnbull named the colony New Smyrna in hon-or of his wife, who was born In old Smyrna in Asia Minor. He and his leaders, who in-cluded several British noble-men, selected this site bor-dering on the Atlantic Ocean and the Indian River and be-gan the cultivation of indi-go, maire, sugar cane and rice.

The colony apparently flourished for nine years; then dissensions arose be-cause of a shortage of funds,

cause of a shortage of funds, political intrigue and minum decretandings with the overseers. The result was abandonment by the colony's residents, many of whom fled to St. Augustine.

According to local historians, much had been accomplished at New Smyrna, including a system of drainage canals that is atill in use. The ruins of coquina wells, foundations and indigo, vals indicate the wide acope of activity of the tolonists. The permanent



settlement of the city took place in 1803, when land grants were given. Despite the fact that it lies only 15 miles south of bustling Daytona Beach, New Smyrna Beach grew slowly both as a place of residence and a tourist spot. But a new day in its appeal to tourists is now dawning. It has the same wide hard-It has the same wide, hard-packed sandy heach as Day-tona, with which it is now connected only by U.S. It eventually, a bridge over Ponce de Leon Inlet will unite the Iwo beach areas into one streich of mure than 30 miles.

Bridge to Beach

One of the things that has One of the things that has given unmediate impetes a New Sanyena's development as a resort area is the repeat completion of a second bridge connecting the maintained with the beach area. A new four-story, 10t-unit Holiday Inn will be built on the owenfront this is only one of the new lodging facilities under construction or soon to be started. These include several apartment houses facing the ocean, one of them a condominum. There are about eight miles of occanfront

property available for devel-opment, and the present boom in building may be only a beginning.

Not Overcrowded

New Smyrna Beach is not overcrowded. Its boasts are that visitors can "retreat to quiet every night" and that "we make you feel like a guest instead of a tourist."

Although this little resort Although this little resons city in apreading its wings as a seaceast haven of rest and becoming more modern, there are lingering evidences of the antiquity of this area. One of the most interesting reminders is the Turtle Mound Misturic Memorias, the terreson of the state of t the largest and oldest Indian on Flicta's rass

Antheologists say it was an important sits in early indian culture, and it also served as a navigational guide in the 17th century. The first written observation of the mound came from Alberto Maxia, a Spanish suder, who in 1605 was assigned to scout the area south of St. Augustine. According to his report, the Indians used the mound as a lookout point, for it stands 50 feet above the otherwise flut creatal landscape.

Early Indian inhabitants around Turtle Mound In-cluded the Juroros, the Mor-orocos and the Surruques, who apparently enjoyed a diet made up largely of oyaters. Plants growing on the mound point to Indian occupation, especially the Georgia hackberry, the seeds of which were used as a staple food, and yaupon, from which the Indians brewed a ceremonial bever-age known as "black drink."

Other Mounds Destroyed

Mr. BRADEMAS. Mr. Speaker, a historic plaque commemorating the first landing of Hellenes in the New World was dedicated during the New Smyrna Bicentennial Celebration at New Smyrna Beach, Fla., on Saturday, May 4, 1968.

The Order of Ahepa, American Hellenic Educational Progressive Association, an international fraternal organization with more than 450 chapters of persons of Greek descent in the United States, Canada, the Bahamas, Australia, and Greece, presented and unveiled the plaque during special ceremonies there. Ahepa Supreme President Andrew Fasseas of Chicago, Ill., represented the fraternity at the official ceremonies. In recognition of the occasion, the New Smyrna Beach City Commission had authorized the Order of Ahepa to erect the plaque in order to commemorate its participation and that of all Hellenes in the bicentennial.

Mayor Robert C. Pattillo, of New Smyrna Beach, has written to Ahepa Supreme Governor James S. Scofield of St. Petersburg, Fla., chairman of the Ahepa Bicentenni. Committee:

At a special meeting, the City Commission has authorized the placement of a plaque commemorating the participation of the Greeks in the colonization of New Smyrns. by the Order of Ahepa A suitable base for this plaque will be provided by the city. The City of New Smyrns Beach is delighted to learn that your organization will participate in our Bicentennial observance. We feel that it will certainly make the occasion a more colorful and more meaningful one, since many of the original citizens of the New Smyrns Oclony were Orcek.

The Ahepa Plaque was dedicated in memory of the more than 400 Greeks who landed in New Smyron, Pla., in 1768. 299-924-12032 The plaque is located in Old Fort Park where the original settlers congregated 200 years ago, and directly across the boulevard from city hall. The plaque is mounted on a base of coquina, mined from a nearby quarry which produces much of the world's finest coquina, a shell rock similar to limestone.

Mr. Speaker, Americans of Greek, Italian, and Minorcan descent will participate in the all-day celebration, in cooperation with the Volusia County Historical Association. The New Smyrna Colony was founded in 1768 by Dr. Andrew Turnbull. It was the largest single colonization ever attempted in America under British rule, outranking even Jamestown and Plymouth Rock. About 400 of the 1,403 colonists who landed in New Smyrna in 1768 were Greeks.

On May 1, I introduced a House concurrent resolution to commemorate the 200th anniversary of the first landing of the Greeks in the New World at New Smyrna, Fla. This bill, House Concurrent Resolution 774, was referred to the Committee on the Judiciary.

Whereas, The Order of Ahepa (American Hellenic Educational Progressive Association), the largest organization of Americans of Greek descent, is observing the bicentennial anniversary, of the First Landing of Greeks in the New World at New Smyrna Beach, Fla., in 1766, in conjunction with the City of New Smyrna Beach, Pla., and the Volusia County (Florida) Historical Association, by erecting a commemorative plaque in the City of New Smyrna Beach Pla., on May 4, 1989.

"Whereas, The Commemorative Plaque of the Order of Ahepa reads as follows:

To the past, to the present, to the future. Dedicated On This 200th Anniversary In Honor of Those Intreptd Hellenes Who Came To the New World in 1768 as Settlers of the Historic New Smyrna Colony of Florida By Americans Proud of Their Hellenic Heritage Who Cherish Their Participation In the Great Ideals of Democracy and Freedom As embodied In Our American Way of Life So That Generations Yet Unborn May Puifill the Hopes Engendered by These Priceless Legacies.

Presented by the Order of Ahepa American Hellenic Educational Progressive Association, May 4, 1968.

Therefore, be it resolved: That the United States Senate and the United States House of Representatives extend their greetings and felicitations to the members of the Order of Ahepa, on the occasion of the Two Hundredth Anniversary of the Landing at New Smyrns, Pia., and the United States Senate and House of Representatives further express their appreciation for the distinctive services rendered to the Nation by the Order of Ahepa, and by Americans of Greek descent during these many years.

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GOV. KIRK'S ADDRESS AT NEW SMYRNA CELEBRATION

It is a very great privilege for me to be here with you today, and I want to thank you for giving me this opportunity. Not only are we celebrating the 200th anniversary of the coming of the first of the Greek people to America – we are also, at the same time, paying tribute to the ideals of the Greek founders of the democracy we have tried to carry out in our form of government.

There were 400 citizens of Greece among the 1403 original settlers who came here in 1768 to found the New Smyrna Colony – the largest settlement in America ever attempted during the

period of British rule.

Those 400 inhabitants of the oldest of the western nations brought with them to the New World a heritage of freedom and self-government that has never been surpassed since the time when Athens was the light of the world.

In fact, the history of western civilization since that time Las been measured not by its temporary successes – or by its territorial acquisitions – or by its wars – or by its material wealth. It has been measured critically against that standard of human dignity which is still a living legacy for all of us from ancient Greece.

All too often in the course of our history, we have failed to measure up to the standards Greece imposed upon itself so long ago. But because we have had those lessons of the past from which to learn, we have continued to strive — and even when we have felt ourselves about to be overwhelmed by evil men and evil times, the simplicity and steadfastness of the Greeks, who saw, despite the imperfections of man, the flame of dignity and honor within the human soul, have given us the strength to press onward.

The history of the Greek people in America has lived up to the teachings of your great forbears. Everywhere you people have gone in this great land, they have brought with them honor and dignity, work and progress, leadership and

loyalty.

We are indebted to ancient Greece for much of our western tradition and the culture of our civilizations. In architecture, in literature, in our universities, in our theatre, in our tradition of free thought and searching inquiry—in our very concepts of liberty and freedom and democracy—we remain indebted to those enlightened citizens of Greece who first led the war.

And just as we are indebted to them for the things they created, we are equally indebted to you and to the citizens of

Kirk Makes May 4 Bicentennial Day

Florida Gov. Kirk has proclaimed Saturday, May 4, 35 New Smyrna Beach Picentennial Day, and has sainted the Order of Ahepa for its prominent role in the celebration of the first major landing of the Tellenes in the New World.

Kirk signed the proclamation at the State Capitol in Tallahassee Friday in the presence of Florida State emator L. A. "Skip" Bafalis, a member of the West Palm Beach Ahepa Chapter, who is of Hellenic descent.

The Order of Ahepa, international Heilenic fraternal organization, will dedicate a plaque in honor of the Heilenes who were members of the New Smyrna Colony during ceremonies to be held in the city half area of New Smyrna lieuch at 2:00 p.m. May 4.

Ahepa Supreme President Andrew Fasseas of Chicago, Ill. will head the Ahepa delegation Supreme Governor James S. Scotield of St. Petersburg is chairman of the Ahepa National Committee for the bicentennial celebration.

The New Smyrna Colony was founded in 1768 by Dr. Andrew Turnbull. It was the largest single colonization ever attempted in America under British rule, outranking even Jamestewn and Plymouth Rock. About 400 of the 1.403 colonists who landed in New Smyrna in 1768 were Hellenes.

modern Greece for showing us that the heritage of the past can be passed down intact from generation to generation and that each new generation can be taught to breathe new life into the freedoms it inherits.

In the kind of lives you have led in this country, you have taught all Americans a reverence for the value of freedom and of culture and of civilization — and you have provided steadfast examples of loyalty to America which are in the finest traditions of your inheritance.

The first objective and the primary purpose of AHEPA is "to promote and encourage loyalty of its members to the country of which they are cirizens." The proof of your dedication to this ideal is seen in the daily lives of your 40,000 members.

The armos of Greece have always been in the forefront of the battles for freedom and democracy. It was Greek fighters who in World War II delivered the first defeat to distatorship when the Greek armies shattered the invincibility of Mussolini's

Fascist armies. And it was those same Greek armies who fought shoulder to shoulder with the Allied armies to drive the last Germans from the soil of Greece four years later – and who then took up arms against the first of the Communist attempts to take over the free nations of

President Kennedy took note of that fact when he said, "The whole civilized world is deeply indebted to Greece, not only for the great contributions she has made in all fields of human endeavor, but especially because of the invaluable assistance which Greece gave to the United States and the free world during World War II and immediately thereafter, when the Communist conspiracy sought to subjugate the indomitable Greek people.

And today wherever freedom is to be defended, it is that same spirit of ancient Greive that inspires those who fight upon the barricades. In the United States of America, AHEPA is carrying on that noble tradition. No one could subscribe to the principles of AHEPA who is not firmly committed to the principles of demacracy and freedom. No one has a letter claim to be their defenders.

As your Governor, it is a matter of great pride for me to join you in this erlebration — and to mark the fact that it was in Florida that the first Greeks to come to America landed. This makes a direct link, a living connection, between the ideals of thos, who founded democratic government of the state that is now Aroerca's eighth largest.

Let us continue together to build an even creater state and a greater nation upon those still living ideals which in their mibility of spirit and in their stead-fastness of purpose, have never been surpassed.

The Supreme Lodge of the Order of Ahepa cognizant of the services rendered by members of the United States Congress to the various causes espoused by Ahepa and the Hellenic people in general throughout the years, decided to pay tribute to them for these services, in conjunction with the Biennial Ahepa Banquer, held in Washington on March 18, 1969.

Supreme President Fasseas, upon discussion with members of the Supreme Lodge, the Supreme Board of Trustees and political leaders of all groups, authorized and designated the Supreme Secretary Alfred G. Vonetes to prepare a study to determine which Congressmen were to receive Ahepa Plaques in appreciation of their support of our fraternity, its programs and its activities, and for their contributions as members of Congress. Upon completion of the study, Brother Vonetes was authorized to proceed and order the manufacturing and inscribing of the Plaques and implement a distribution program, starting from March 18, the date of the Ahepa Biennial Banquet.

A total of 149 Plaques were ordered, 48 for U.S. Senators, one for Vice President Hubert Humphrey, one for Presidential Aide Mike Manatos and 99 for U.S. Representatives. These Plaques were made available to Chapter representatives attending the Biennial Banquet for presentation to their Congressman. Many of them were presented on Capitol Hill, at the offices of the Congressmen, and some of those photos appear in this issue of the Ahepan. Others were taken by the Chapter representatives to be presented



PROFESSOR REXINE LECTURES ON SEFERIS

The AMERICAN SOCIETY FOR NEO-HELLENIC STUDIES, INC. sponsored its third lecture on May 9th at New York University. Dr. John E. Rexine, Professor of the Classics and Chairman of the Classics Dept. at Colgate University, delivered the lecture entitled; The Classical Flements in the Poetry of George Seferis

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MIKE MANATOS: The Man on Call to Presidents

The February 14 issue of the "Congressional Record" sarried a Tribute to Mr. Mike Manatos, Legislative Co-Ordinator between the Senate and the White House, by the Senate Majority Leader Sen. Manifield (D. M.). Senator Manifield introduced also the following article on Mr. Manatos, which appeared on February 3rd as the "Rocky Mountain Neus" of Denver, Colorado:

PHONE RINGS OFTEN FOR WHITE HOUSE AIDE FROM WYOMING THE MAN ON CALL TO PRESIDENTS (By James Foster)

WASHINGTON, February 3.

-The President is as close as the telephone. It rings often.

The mild-mannered Wyomingite at this end of the direct line is Mike Manatos, administrative assistant to two presidents and one of Rock Springs High School's most distinguished graduates.

As Senate liaison officer, Manatos is President Johnson's chief arm-twister on Capitol Hill. It is his job to grease the skids to get Administrative legislation through a sometimes balky congress.

Since Lyndon B. Johnson is considered one of the most effective arm twisters of all time, Manatos knows he is working for a pro. The job, he says with a chuckle, offers both challenge and satisfaction.

The President may call Manatos from the chief executive's oval office right down the sarpettel corridor. Or from Texas. Or from West Germany. Or from Austalia.

"There are standing orders around here that the President is always available," the 55-yearold explains, straightening his black, silver and gold stripe tie. "On the other hand, he (the President) has no hesitancy in calling you—and it doesn't make much difference what time it is

The calls from Australia and Germany came at night there, Manatos resalls. The President wanted to check the progress of some special legislation.

T asked the President if he didn't want me to wait until morning to call him back but he said 'no,' call him back right away.

IMMEDIATELY

In the LBJ time scheme of things, this means immediately, if not sooner,

means immediately, if not sconer.

"Fortunately I had most of the information he wanted in my head. The rest of it I got quickly and called him back. He was waiting for my call."

The urgency of the presidency also means the phone in the Manatos home will ring ar any hour of the night. The White House operator says, The President is calling, and the next voice on the line is the familiar Texas drawl easily recognized by all Americans.

But, Manatos says, all members of the President's staff are required to operate on a high-octane formula of total performance.

He sums it up simply Both President Kennedy and President Johnson have expected total effort. Both have expected results. Manatos sips coffee and relis with im-

Manatos sips coffee and relis with indentable pride of the events that led him from modest mining rown beginnings to the inner sanctum of top Government.

My father, Nick, was a coal miner. He was a Greek immigrant from the island of Crete. He still lives at Rock Springs. My brother, Tom, is head of the math department at Rock Springs High School."

But the dwindling coal mines offered little attraction for Mike. After high school he came to Washington to attend Strayer's College. He received an accounting degree from George Washington University.

ACTIVE MAN

Active in the Wyoming Young Democrats, Manaros returned to the nation's capitol in 1947 as administrative aide to a succession of Wyoming seriators: Harry Schwartz from 1945 to 1945, Joseph C. O'Mahoney, 1945 to 1953, Lester C. Hunt, 1953 to 1954; O'Mahoney again from 1954 to 1961 and J. J. Hickey beginning in 1961.

Manatos also had been elected president of the U.S. Senate Administrative Assistants Assistants has an honor denoting prestige and experience amid the intricate legislative lattice work of "The Hill."

GOT CALL

Within a month after going to work for Hickey, Manatos received a call from Lawrence O'Brien, new postmaster general.

O'Brien known as the key legislative architect of the New Frontier, had helped engineer the campaign of the new young Demoerat President from Massachusetts, John F. Kennedy. O'Brien told Manatos his experience could be put to greater national service as a presidential aide.

I reported for work Feb. 7, 1901," Manatos recalls. "A couple of days later I srepped into President Kennedy's office to thank him. He shook my hand warmly and said, Welcome aboard. The President then said. You've been on The Hill a lot longer than I have. I'll need your help, and that was that."

Manatos remembers asking O'Brien what the hours of the new job would be. 'O'Brien said I could come in any time betieve 9. He didn't say what time I could leave.

That's the hirch, Manaim came to find our. For members of the Presidential result, the work is never done. Manaton still comes in any time before 9 and considers himself lacky to get home before 7 30 or 8 pm. It's a 6-day work week sometimes 7—although morma/p he only travels weekends when senators a company the President to the Texas ranch or elsewhere to hammer out key legislation.

DRAWBACKS

The schedule leaves something to be desired as far as home life is issueerped But, Manania

declates, his wife, Dorothy, a native of American Fork, Utah, and their two children still at home would not ask him to give it up, Andrew, 22, a student at American Uni-

Andrew, 22, a student at American University here. Daughter Kathleen, 16, attends public high school. Another daughter, 23-year-old Ann (Mrs. George Hatsis), lives at Salt Lake City, Utah.

Although the Manasos family lives comfortably in the above average suburb of Chevy Chase, there is admitted contrast in dealing with matters of state and those at home.

"Im afraid Im spoiled by this existence," Manatox says, no more than a buzzer away from every type of service "I'm chauffered up to the Hill every day in a White House limousine. Then, when I have to take my own car (a 2-year-old Chevroler) to the garage to have the oil changed I sometimes catch myself thinking somebody else ought to be doing it."

NEAT OFFICE

Manatos office though small, is nice; the art work blends, the magazines are current and the coffee cups, bearing the White House seal are clean.

However, on the wall hangs two reminders of the prevarious pinnacle on which public servants perch.

They are certificates of his appointment under the two Presidents. In fine script they allude to prudence and integrity "I other qualities Westerners take for granted.

But then in the last line, Manatos points out with mixed-amisement, is the phrase "... for the time being." That means, he explains, that in politics particularly the good guys one day aren't always considered good guys the next day. "That little phrase there on the end," he says, keeps you on your mertle."

Several times Manatos has "seriously considered" jumping into the political waters. In 1966 his name was widely circulated as a candidate for the U.S. Senate. It would have meant a fight in the Wyoming democratic primary with his beylood chum, Rep. Teno Roncalio.

HAD BLESSINGS

Manatos, understandably, had President Johnson's blessing But in 1960, while Manatos worked for Johnson-backer Sen. O'Mahoney, Romalio beat the Kennedy drum. The primary fight, therefore, could have reverberated clear to the top of the Democratic organization.

"I finally decided," Manatos says, "that the party or its chances were not best served by having a knock-down, drag-out fight with Temo."

Manage fights now are concentrated on Capitol Hill. I found my greatest challenge—



SAVINGS BONDS AND FREEDOM SHARES NOW EARN HIGHER INTEREST YIELDS

On May 31, President Johnson announced increased interest rates for Series E and H Savings Bonds, as well as Freedom Shares (U. S. Savings Notes) effective June 1, 1968. The ninth meeting of the 1967-68 season of the Hellenic Philatelic Society of America was held recently at the Collector's Club, in New York City.

"Androkles the Mysterious Greek" brings in full view fantasies and thrilling immortals and is carried out with a writing technique that is unmatched at this only attempt to bridge myth and sciencefiction.

The writer, Mr. Stelio J. Lefes, published this book as his first, however, he is not a stranger to pen and ink. 



GARY AHEPA REMEMBERS VIETNAM SERVICEMEN

Editor's note: The following is reprinted from an Editorial in the Gary Post-Tribune.

Gary Order of AHEPA, in close cooperation with SS Constantine and Helen Greek Orthodox Church, is engaged in a positive and encompassing project to let area servicemen of the Greek-American community who are on duty in Vietnam know they are well remembered and strongly supported back home.

This is a copy of a letter going to all servicemen involved, and it pretty well spells out the feeling of the sponsoring group on the home troot.

"As you know, these are turbulent times. All you see and hear are demonstrations. Some people are demonstrating for their civil rights, other people for more welfare and better conditions. Still others are demonstrating against the 'system,' whatever that means.

"Our lodge would also like to demonstrate. We would like to demonstrate our appreciation to a fine young man of our community who is demonstrating his patriotism by fulfilling his obligation to his country."

"We, the Gary Order of AHEPA, commend you and want you to know that we are behoud you boys in the service wherever you are. If there is anything we can do to be of service to you, please don't hesitate to write to us.

"We wish you Godspeed and a safe return home."

That letter, no matter how great a morale booster, is but an opening phase of the campaign, JOHN THANOS, AHEPA president explained.

With each letter goes a questionnaire on which the individual serviceman is asked to list his correct mail address in present assignment. The questionnaire is also designed to provide AHEPA with complete information on the serviceman so that packages and other articles related to his individual needs and desires may be provided.

He is asked to list hobbies, games enjoyed, whether books are desired ("If so what type sports, detective, Western, historical, education"), smoking neets ("cigarers, name brand; pipe, cigars", It's a most comprehensive questionnaire, planned to give AHEPA a true picture of the individual serviceman so that his personal needs can best be met.

Thanos said the project will give AHEPA a complete mailing list that will enable the organization and church members to correspond regularly with the servicemen and see that any personal needs and desires of each is supplied as far as possible.

This is not to be a hit and miss thing," Thanos said, "but a regular, sustained cambaign Most of all, we want those young men over there to know that we back here are with them every day, every week. We want them to know there is a daily link with the people back home who think so much of them."

AHEPA and the church are not geared to embrace all area servicemen, as much as they would like to. EAST CHICAGO, HAMMOND INDUCT LARGE CLASSES INTO MEMBERSHIP

East Chicago a better city.

Included in the Nicosia class also were Robert Pastrick, city controller; George Lamb, city councilman; Nick Blosky and Alex Gembala, city police officers: Charles Dahlin and William Gaskey, teachers in the public school system; George Kouros, restaurant owner; Bernard Dross, a barber, and four applicants from Gary Chapter, John Vlahos, Nick Harris, Chris Sakalaris and Andrew Sakes. Past District Governor Louis K. Tsaros of East Chicago presided and among those in attendance were Past Supreme President Leo J. Lamberson, who gave Mayor Nicosia the Ahepa application for membership at the latter's request; Past Supreme Counsellor George Stratigos, who hails from South Bend with Brother Lamberson, and James Kostopulos of Hammond, former supreme governor.

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

CONVENTION AHEPA FAMILY CODE OF ETHICS

- All functions of Sons and Maids must be chaperoned and attended by their Advisors. Ahepans or Daughters.
- No liquor or alcoholic beverages are to be served to minors.
- 3. Any conduct or behavior unbecoming of any members of the Ahepa Family (Ahepans, Daughters, Sons or Maids) shall be reported to the Grievance Committee, and an inquiry made into each instance. The same shall apply in the case of any unbecoming behavior or conduct for any "visitor" or "participant" in an Ahepa affair or convention. Where necessary, such offenders may be asked to leave the convention or affair, or precluded from any right to participate in the social and business functions.
- 4. All Sons and Maids functions must terminate by 2:00 a.m.
- All minors must observe the curfew time of 3:00 a.m.
- No minors are to be allowed to stay at a convention hotel without proper chaperones.
- All room parties should be quiet and orderly: there should be no private parties of Sons and Maids, or minors.
- 8. At Supreme Conventions, all Sons and Maids affairs are to be chaperoned by at least two members designated by the Grand Lodge, two members designated by the Supreme Lodge, and one member each designated by the Sons of Pericles and the Maids of Athena. At District Conventions, these chaperones shall be designated by the Ahepa and the Daughters District Lodges.


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

Naturally, because the various members of the Foundation were busy men drawn from a wide geographical area, frequent meetings of the Foundation were impracheal Yet, I am happy to report to you that five meetings were held - but more than that - that the meetings were fruitful: that the members of the Foundation worked together harmoniously .. with complete, unanimous agreement - and that the future for the Foundation and for the Order of Ahepa is bright. Ideas are wonderful. But all the ideas in the world mean nothing unless they are reduced to practicality and brought to fruition Your Foundation has passed the idea stage. We have appointed the Riggs National Blank in Washington, D. C. as the fiscal agent to administer our funds.

We have established our guidelines for the awarding of scholarship grants. A copy of these guidelines is attached to this report in substance, it is our program to amass a minimum capitalization of \$100,000 — then from the income derived from that capitalization, to issue the appropriate scholarships. True, \$100,000 is a lot of money. Some cyaics might think the sum is so prohibitive that we will never get off the around.

At a breakfast meeting called by the Chairman, and through various personal contacts, we have found the following program to interest our people strongly enough to be able to report to you pledges from 14 members of the Ahepa, toraing over \$105,000. In truth, I consider this very significant and I hereby report the plan to the Supreme Lodge and the entire membership of the Order of Ahepa where I am serie, we will find an abundance of interested contributors.

The Greek immigrants who came to the United States seeking their fortune established themselves in all parts of this visit country. After many years at struggle becoming members of their communities, we find them prosperous businessmen, their children attending local schools and universities; and they are willing to leave a scholarship bearing their name in appreciation for the community that gave them their early bearingings and success.

The money pledges for up to 10 years will not be used for scholarships until the full amount is established and invested by our official fiscal ingent, the Riggs National Bank From the earnings of the member's pledge will be created a scholarship in his name, or the name of a loved one, at the school of his charge.

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You have no idea the pride I feel right now — knowing that I have been given the privilege of being part of this magnificent pragram. This is real Ahepa. It is experiences like these that makes years and years of work worthwhile.

May I publicly thank the members of the Foundation for having worked so cooperatively and so unself-thly to make this a reality. George E. Johnson began his fund raising career within the Ahepa organization almost from the time of his initiation in the Queensboro Chapter of New York City in 1926

In 1927, while Vice President of this chapter, he conducted a raffle which netted the then unheard of sum of \$3,000 for a building hind

In 1929, while chairman of the Combined Ahepa Ball Committee of New York City, the chapters netted \$25,800 for a one night performonce

In 1953, while Chairman of the Hauston Ahepa National Convention. Brother Johnson raised \$15,000 from the delegates, which was matched with a like sum from the Supreme Treasury, for the Jonian Earthquake Relief.

In 1964 at the San Diego National Convention, while the Order of Ahepa was in financial difficulties in meeting its contractual obligations incurred in behalf of the Truman Memorial in Athens. Greece. He undertook it, and within one hour raised \$18,000 for the project.

Brother Johnson's interest in fund raising has been in all fields. such as Greek War Relief where he was Director for the State of Nevada and Southern California. The funds raised in the State of Nevada exceeded all per capita contributions in the United States. While living in Nevada, he was fund raising chairman for the University of Nevada Athletic Scholarship Committee

He was fund raising chairman for the building of a new Greek Orthodox Church in Sacramento, California. Seven years after its dedication he headed the highly successful drive which raised \$137,000 and thereby paid off the mortgage indebtedness of

He has been a tower of strength in all community fund raising compaigns: especially as chairman of the Lincoln Christian Center Drive, a children's home in Sacramenta, where he is credited with over subscription of a \$275,000 campaign goal.

With this wealth of experience, Brother Johnson was the logical choice of your Supreme Lodge to be the Chairman of the outstanding members appointed to comprise the Ahepa Educational Four-

GUIDELINES OF THE AHEPA EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION (Approved at meeting of the Board, March 16, 1968)

The Foundation shall establish National Ahepa Scholarships at various institutions throughout the Ahepa jurisdiction as is consistent with the financial resources at its disposal, beginning with the school year 1969-70. Such Scholarships will be for \$500 or mare in special cases. The latter shall be determined by the Foundation.

The initial selection of institutions shall be made with the objective of achieving an equitable geographical distribution, until full jurisdictional coverage is achieved. Major State Universities, supported by public lunds, where turnon is usually the lawest, and where an Ahepa Scholarship would offer the student the greatest financial benefit will be selected preferentially.

The University would be supplied with specific rules and regulations under which the selection of the scholarship recipient would be made. Uniform scholarship opplications would be supplied to the school as needed. With respect to the above, the Foundation shall provide the necessary information.

Applicants for National Ahepa Schalarships would make their application directly to schools affering such scholarships. The avail ability of which shall be published through the Ahepan Magazine, and Ahepa District Publications.

The selection of a recipient will always be made by the Scholarship Office of the respective universities or calleges on the basis of financial need and scholarship. An applicant for a scholarship must have the following qualifications.

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A MEDICENTER FOR ALBUQUERQUE

THE VOTE

The passageway to the room with six voting machines manned by hawkeyed tellers was lined with the bipartisan staff of the credentials committee carefully and deliberately screening every delegate's qualifications before giving him a ticket entitling him to vate. It was a slow process - but necessary for an honest election in a hotly contested campaign for Supreme Lodge offices at Ahepa's 46th Annual Supreme Convention at New York's famous Waldorf Astoria. Inconspicuously, at the end of the screening line, sat the shirt-sleeved, perspiring, and fired secretary for the Board of Trustees, Atty. Ernest Dematatis, securing signatures of delegates to a resolution pertaining to Ahepa's Albuquerque property. The delegates filed past for 81/2 hours, and Demotatis sat for those same 81/2 continuous hours, asking each delegate. Have you voted for the Albuquerque resolution?

Then finally, waving a sheat of legal-sized sheets containing signatures on a district basis, he certified to the convention and particularly to Paul A. Karras, acting chairman of the Board of Trustees, that 667 duly registered delegates had voted for the resolution. The three-fourths vate of approval by a restriction in the Ahepa deed had been more than safely met. Partisan politics had been cast aside. Constructive deliberation had won out. Firm achan had finally been taken on the Albuquerque property.

THE RESOLUTION

WHO IS MEDICENTER?

Chairman of the board is Wallace E. Johnson, president of Holiday Inns of America, Inc. President is Kemmons Wilson, chairman of the board of Holiday Inns of America, Inc.

As of January 1968, eleven medicenters, were in operation in eight different states, with thirteen additional scheduled to commence operation during the year 1968.

A medicenter provides medical care for convalescents who are on the road to recovery. The average stay is 18 to 20 days. It is designed to fill the gap between necessary but expensive hospitalization, and home convalescence. Patients receive first class accommodation at a ane-third or one-half saving of the regular hospital expense. The 12 x 25 feat carpeted roams, with telephone, patient-nuise intercom, TV, pravide a result-like atmosphere.

The construction of such facilities and the consequent relief to congestion of hospitals is meeting with encouragement both from the haspitals themselves and the medical profession.

The unit proposed to be built in Albuquersive a virtually indice-ing the largest hasptal in the city, and very close to a second

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major haspital. And since the kind to be conveyed to the Albuquerque Convolescent Company does NOT include the entire Ahepa plot, the balance of the property will obviously increase in value and potentral

A LIMITED PARTNERSHIP

In this company, the Trability of the Ahepa as a partner will be limited to the extent of Ahepa's capital contribution which will be primarily the real estate invalved. Medicenters of America, Inc. will be a general partner with liability beyond any capital contribution. Medicenters will operate the facility under a management contract, giving to Ahepa the right of first refusal to purchase facility in the event of a dissolution.

THE NEGOTIATIONS

The collective [and considerable] business acumen of the entire Supreme Board of Trustees under the active chairmonship of Paul Karres (who conferred constantly with the temporarily incapacitated Chairman Panayes Dikeou) scrutinized the entire proposition at several meetings - on the site in Albuquerque, at the offices at Medicenters in Memphis, Tennessee, and in New York. After the Board of Trustees UNANI-MOUSLY approved the project, they met in joint session with Supreme Lodge in New York City when the Supreme Lodge likewise UNAMIMOUSLY opproved the project Atty. Charles J. Panagopoulos, then 5u-

preme Counsellar, recalled the beginning of the negatiations in this way: At the request of the Supreme President.

Andrew Fasters, Supremer Vice President Gus Cherevas and I left at the conclusion of the District No. 8 Convention at which Gus had been the main speaker on the might of June 23, 1968, and flew to Chicago. The next morning we met Fasseas on the ampliane and flew to Albuquerave. New Mexico, where we met with flour Sorren, acting chairman of the Board of Trusteet.

After meeting with Brother Nick Kay who discussed several possibilities for the development of the Ahepa property, they met with a local realter who was acting in behalf of Medicenters of America, V Korl Kortemeyer, and subsequently with the Regional Director of Medicenters. The minutes of the Supreme Board of Trustees indicate that on July 12:13 in Memphis, Tennessee, a meeting was held attended by Paul A. Karres, Ernest E. Dematatis, Chris Boulos, Gust Herouvis, Sam Nakos, Peter G. Chingos, Michael Callias, Dr. James Rogers, Supreme President Fassegs, Supreme Vice President Cherevas, Supreme Counsellar Panagapoulos and former trustee member Spero Zepatos. Ilt is the writer's impression that Bra. Zepatos was requested to attend at the joint request of the Supreme President and Louis Manesiatis, leador of the Ahepa First party, so that the project would have a bipartisan appraisal. Bra Zepatos became an ordent and outspoken advocate of the proposition, and, as chairman of the convention committee in New York, dealing with the Medicenter proposal, very ably steered the favorable deliberations of that committee. Bro Panagopoulos as Supreme Counsellor

guided the Supreme Lodge and the Trustees in the necessary legal discussions with the officials of Medicenters, actively assisted by the legal talents of Bro. Dematatis. whereupon all the remaining members of the Board of Trustees who had been unable to attend the meeting IBros. Dikeou, Heos. Demos, Gianukos, Georgeson, Zolotos some of whom were attending the funeral of Bro. Sekles), added their approval to the project through proxy. Their approval was actively reaffirmed at the Supreme Convention

No one person was responsible for the adoption of the proposal. The leadership of the Supreme President and Supreme Vice-President was self-evident. The guidance of the Supreme Counsellor and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees was obvious. The deft but positive handling of the entire proposal by the Acting Chairman of the Trustees, from start to finish was readily apparent. The very active interest of the various trustees - all serving without compensation and travelling at personal inconveniences — was manifest. The enthusiastic reception by the delegates in New York is history.

WHAT NOW

The details of the necessary and various contracts are presently being reviewed, with early signing anticipated. It is expected that the facility will be ready for its first occupant fifteen months after execution of the documents. A preliminary study anticipates that annual net profit (after mortgage payment and depreciation) will approximate \$90,000.

A TRIBUTE TO SOCRATES V. SEKLES

On July 10, 1968 in Pontiac, Michigan one of the most influential and well-laved personalities on the American and Hellenic scene, bid linal tarewell to his host of friends and well wishers.

Sociates V Sekles was barn June 21, 1900 in the small village of Katafigion, Kardina, Thessalia, Greece, one of seven children.

Like many others he migrated to the United States in 19)2 and established himself in Pontioc Michigan—matried the charming and loving Georgia and together, they proceeded to build their family and life amid their new surroundings and tirends.

Not content to be a successful restauranteaur, he engaged in the community and political life of his adapted country getting into the thick of things and in no time he was recognized as a doer and a leader of men.

It was not long before he was rivited into the inner circle of advisors of the State and National Democratic Party. He became advisor to Presidenti on Greek American problems since the time of President Woodrow Wilson. He was active on the People to People programs since first he was appointed by President Delano Roosevelt.

Although setting in America, he did not forget his Greek Orthodox faith, not his matherland Hellas.

He intested and speathended the movement in Bloom Field Hills, Michigan to buy acreage for \$9,000 for the building of the St. George Greek Orthodox Church and Community Center—which acreage is valued today at over \$300,000.00

He was a member of the National Mixed Council of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese and also of the 7th District Diocese the was a life member and contributor to the Archdiocese Fund.

He was always always in the toretrant

of any and all movements on behalf of and and assistance to Greece and he was the recipient of many commendations from the Greek government, and in 1966 was signally honored on being Knighted by the King of Greece.

He was a member of many organizations among which were the Masons, the Shriners, the Thessalian Association, the Democratic National Committee, the State Democratic Committee, the YMCA, the Pantiac Chamber of Commerce, and the Order of AHEPA.

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The Order of AHEPA was his closest and one might say all-consuming love. He had tremendous dreams about the organization's potential.

In 1926 he was initiated into the AHEPA and the following year he worked to establish the Pontiac Chapter #135. He served the AHEPA from 1926 in his Chapter—in his District—and on the Supreme Lodge and on the Supreme

Board of Trustees

His greatest accomplishment was as General Chairman of the 1965 Athens Supreme Convention. Never before in the annals of fraternal organizations or of aviation history, was there accomplished such a mass movement of approximately 15,000 Ahepons to attend a Convention in Athens, Greece And it was accomplished, natwithstanding the many obstacles thrown in the way of its successful consummation by those who wished to sabotage the success of the maxement.

To his many close friends and intimates, Socrates V. Sekles would confide that his hope and dream and expectation was to become President of the fraternity he served so well and loved so much—just for one year. Unfortunately, this was denied him. He was called his ha Maker on July 10, 1968 after several months illness.

He is survived by his wife, two sons. Alexander and Nicholas: two daughters, Kik and Mrs. Frances Kontos, three grandchildren, two brothers, and two sisters.

That the incoming Supreme Lodge shall make a detailed study of the proposals of the Insurance-Emergency Fund Committee, and report to the 1969 Supreme Convention on the matter.

That is detailed study be made of the proposals of Mother Lodge Member George A Polas concerning the Supreme Board of Trustees and report to the 1989 Supreme Convention on such proposal, taking into account the positifity of repealing the present Article XXVIII of the Constitution and reeffecting it in substance as originally enacted in 1953:

That the Sans of Periodes Constitution shall be amended by lawering the age land from 25 to 23 years.

That the 1968 Supreme Convention authorizes and mandates the incoming Supreme Ladge to execute an appropriate employment contract with Brother George J. Leber as Executive Secretary for three years at an annual salary of \$15,000 per year and necessary increments, during the terms of which he shall not be removed except for just cause and misconduct in office, after hearing and by vale only of two-thirds of the Supreme Ladge.

That the Order of Ahepa erect a national Ahepa Shrine in Atlanta, Georgia to commemorate and honor this birthplace of the Order of Ahepa, and the intreprid and dedicated men who founded this great fraternity. That, all of the net proceeds of the forthcoming Atlanta Supreme Convention be devoted to this paragraph.

GOOD OF THE ORDER (DISTRICT GOVERNORS)

That the Supreme Ladge-District Ladges Seminars be continued, as established this past year. That the nearest Sunday of each year to the date of July 26 be set aside as a national day commemorating the founding of the Order of Ahepa on July 26, 1922, and that the Supreme Ladge communicate with the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese fur their approval to request that the Archdiocese instruct each parish priest in every city that has an Ahepa Chapter to recognize the Order of Ahepa on that Sunday.

BUDGET-FINANCE COMMITTEE

That beginning with the Supreme Convention of 1969 the expenses and revenues of all funds be budgeted; That the Supreme Lodge establish permanent effective machinery for the collection and recovery of all past due Ahepa Student Loans, and collection agencies be used it necessary. That the Transportation Fund be incorporated into the General Fund with the income and expenses of the Transportation Fund becoming a part of the income and expenses of the General Fund; That the General Fund Budget as approved by the 1968 convention is presented with the assumption that the consolidation of the Transportation and General Funds will be approved by this convention. CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS APPROVED BY THE 1968 NEW YORK CITY SUPREME CONVENTION

(1) ARTICLE VIII. SECTION 9, AHEPA CONSTITUTION (Chapters of the Order) (Page 7): ladd the following to the end of Section 9) ... and such Chapter or Chapters are authorized further to initate American or Canadian citizens residing in Greece. (Nate: This amendment authorizes Ahepa Chapters in Greece to initiate new members into the Oder who are American or Canadian citizens and who reside in Greece. The Ahepa chapter in Greece did not previously have this authority.)

(3) ARTICLE XXII, Section 3 (d) AHEPA CONSTITUTION [The Supreme Convention of the Order) [Page 29] (Amend Section 3, paragraph d to now read as follows:

The Supreme President and the Chairman of the Supreme Board of Trustees shall correspond with all cities to obtain bids and offers from city Chambers of Commerce, local convention bureaus and municipal administrations at least five (5) years in advance of the war in which the convention city bid will be made so that the nomination

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to convention cities is held five (5) years before the convention is actually held and in this way further provide for election of the convention city a year after the nomination and actually four [4] years before the convention is held. [Note: Convention cities must now be nominated 5 years before the convention year, and selecvention year.

(4) ARTICLE XXII, SECTION 4 (THE SUPREME CONVEN-TION OF THE ORDER |- Time for Election Delegates |- (Page 30) (Section 4 is amended by deleting the word Legal in Line 7 thereof and substituting therefore the word Regular and also including On Reasonable Notice for the Supreme Convention - (Note: This amendment is concerned with the section in reference to Time for Electing Delegates for both Supreme Conventions and District Conventions, and amends the Supreme Convention section of the Constitution to coincide with the District Convention section of the Constitution, so that both conventions will then state Regular Meetings and the words. On Reasonable Notice in reference to the time for electing delegates.

(5) ARTICLE XXII SECTION 15 (THE SUPREME CONVEN-TION OF THE ORDER) [PAGE 317] - Strike out from the 10th line of Section 15 the words as a and insert instead the words as if in . The sentence will now read as if in a Committee of the Whole. (Note: When sitting as a Committee of the Whole the regular presiding officer relinquishes the gavel to another to preside, whereas when sitting as if in Committee of the Whole the gavel is not surrendered to another.)

(6) ARTICLE XXII, SECTION 7 ITHE SUPPEME CONVEN-TION OF THE ORDERI (PAGE 32 and 33 - Delegates Presence and Credentials Section 7 (a) and Section 7 (b) will remain as is, HOWEVER, the following NEW Paragraphs (c), (d) and (e) have been added as follows.

Section 7 (c). Only Delegates and Alternates registered by 1.00 p.m. on Monday of the week during which the convention is held shall be eligible to vote for the officers of the convention. The voting strength of the convention shall immediately thereafter be compiled and certified by the Credentials Committee and the nomnations and election of convention officers shall proceed forthwith.

Section 7 (d). The Credentials Committee shall be in session and available for the registration of delegates and alternates during the week in which the convention is held, at least during the hours of 1.00 p.m. to 6.00 p.m. on Sunday, and the hours of 700 a.m. to 600 pm on Monday 1.00 p.m to 6.00 pm on Tuesday, and 1.00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. on Wednesday.

Section 7 (e) Late Arrivals Barred. No delegate or alternate who is not registered with the Credentials Committee by 6.00 o clock Wednesday evening of the week during which the Convention is held, shall be eligible to participate in the deliberations or vote at said Supreme Convention.

(7) ARTICLE XXIII, SECTION 1, THE SUPREME LODGE (PAGE 38) -Section 1 of this Article is now amended to read as fallows

SECTION 1. Supreme Lodge Officers - The Supreme Lodge of this Order shall be comprised of the following Supreme Officers: Supreme President, Supreme Vice President, who shall be a citizen of the United States, Supreme Vice President of Canado, who shall be a chizen of Canada, Supreme Secretary, Supreme Treasurer, Supreme Counsellor, and Six (6) Supreme Governors who shall be onzens of the United States.

(Note: This Amendment places the Supreme Vice President of Canada 3rd in line on the Supreme Lodge in order of rank, and also stipulates the citizenship of the Supreme Vice President and the Supreme Vice President of Canada)

(8) ARTICLE XXIV, SECTION 7 (DUTIES, POWERS AND PREROGATIVES OF THE SUPREME LODGE OFFICERS! - IEXECU-TIVE SECRETARY) - PAGE 421

Section 7 was amended by deleting the figure \$13,500.00 and inverting in its place the figure \$15,000.00

A NEW SONS OF PERICLES AND MAIDS OF ATHENA GROWTH EXPANSION PROGRAM

The Junior Auxiliaries of our Order have always been a topic warm and near to me. There are many reasons for this. The many youngsters with whom I have worked over the years. The friendships that have accumulated as they grew older and entered their respective. Senior Orders. Their treshness and brightness of spirit which only the young can contribute.

However, the most important role they play as the Junior Order is in the preparation and experience required for leadership in the Senior Orders.

We have only to look around us and we see the many active Ahepans and Daughters who had graduated from the Sons and the Maids. The vast majority of them are or have been leaders not only in the Senior Orders but also in their respective communities. Accordingly, I have made a study of the status of the Sons of Pericles and Maids of Athena chapters and activity as they exist today in their respective districts.

This you will find butlined below in a simple to read and easy to digest form it reflects a re-cap of the major study which has been undertaken and which will be printed in a subsequent issue.

True, all arganizations, at some time or another, have their ups and downs -

since growth is not always consistent as measured by membership

This past year, has been an excellent one in membership growth for the Sons of Pericles A total of 1,784 paid members in good standing for 1968 reflecting an increase for the year of 563 members.

This total membership is the highest since

I congratulate Past Supreme President Dean Stavrakas and his staff for a superb effort which is reflected in this increase.

However, there is great work to be done.
I call your attention to the chart to note how many of the chapters of the Sons and the Maids are inactive.

I call your attention, too, to the vast number of the Ahepa chapters which never had a Junior Order, namely Sons of Pericles and or Maids of Athena.

True, that in many instances the membership of the Senior Order in some chapters due to the area involved was not conducive numerically to maintain a Junior Auxiliary. However, in studying the master chart, one is quick to note the many, many chapters which have a substantial membership, or are located in cities with a heavy concentration of our people: wherein the Junior Orders have either become inactive or never, at pay time, have maintained a chapter of the Sons of Pericle: or Maids of

Time is no doubt that this is not due to the fact that they were not wanted. Perhaps the Senior Order, in these instances, were too accupied with their own activity within the Order to formulate plans to incorporate a Sons or a Maids chapter, or perhaps both, within their environs.

I say to you however, that if the Order of Ahepa and the Daughters of Penelope are to continue to grow and to prosper, and to enjoy the fruit of their labor, then we must provide the luture leadership so necessary for our survival

We must reactivate these chapters which have become inactive and we must inaugurate new chapters where none have existed! This is an insurance policy — this is common sense, this is the cornerstone of our foundation.

But not only must we reactivate chapters and commence new chapters but the important thing is to help to maintain them, to guide them, to assist them to grow, so that their membership, experience, with their vitality, with their thinking and their ambition which is so synonymous with youth, take their honorable place in the Order of Ahepa and the Daughters of Penelope to continue their efforts for our froternity and for the Hellenes — wherever they may be.

It is to our advantage therefore to expand this program to every corner of our country, to every town and to every city where it is numerically feasible, to large chapters and to small chapters, and to the new chapters which may arise.

The flag must be raised, the purpose is profound, and the end result is continued progress.

I shall make it my duty this year as part of my program to communicate in some way with all chapters which do not have a junior auxiliary and to press and to exert my every effort toward the establishment of additional new chapters and the reactivation of those which are currently machine.

I urgently request, therefore, every chapter of both Senior Orders which does not have a junior auxiliary to sincerely investigate their membership with the view of formulating plans to inaugurate a junior chapter within its boundaries or to reactivate that which is inactive.

I am sure that if we bend our every effort, we shall succeed.

Nothing gives more strength of purpose than responsibility! Nothing adds more zest to our lives than youth! Nothing is enduring unless there is a constant flow of new blood new ideas (albeit, sometimes erratic) and a constant reservoir of leadership material.

We connot heutate! We shall not heutate! We will not heutate!

A program for the preservation of Hellenism in America

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PART 1

WHAT NEXT, AHEPA!

By Supreme President, GUS CHEREVAS

In 1966, Anatolia College of Boston, Massachusetts, an accredited institution founded in 1886, inaugurated a summer program in Thessaloniki, Greece, for the purpose of giving girls between the ages of 15 and 18 of Hellenic parentage in the United States the opportunity of visiting the land of their parents, to learn the Greek language, to study the arts and the culture at their heritage and in the final stages to visit various sections of Greece and become eye witnesses of their ethnic background.

This venture had not just, hastily, been put together. A tremendaus amount of research, planning and panence had been exerted by the officials of the College to make certain that every facer of the program be investigated to provide for favorable results, not anly for the financial investment which would be involved but also, and perhaps most important, that the integrity of the school be uphelid. As a result, the program was put into operation in the summer of 1966 with justifiable results. The initial group numbered forty students (after they had been screened by the College) from various sections of the United States.

The school in Thessaloniki is modern in every respect. It is administrated via American standards and techniques. The faculty consists of American teachers with some recruited in Thessaloniki proper who are graduates of Anatolia College. The professional standards are of the highest degree, the compus equipped with modern class-rooms and darmitories.

From what I have been able to ascertain, the initial program was most successful in every way so far as the students who made the trip were concerned and they returned to the United States filled with great enrhusiasm and elation for the program and the various aspects of their journey.

As a result, plans were immediately put forward by Anatolia College for a similar program for 1967. However, due to administrative changes within the College, it was decided to forego further planning until 1968 so that the summer program planned for 1969 would go forth with a larger group of students and, as a result of their experience in 1966, with an expanded curriculum.

The total all-inclusive cost to the student by Anotolia College would be \$1,400.00 for the eight-week course.

The thought of Anatolia College at Thessalaniki, Greece as a possible base for some type of educational project was first brought to my attention in a varied discussion of matters concerning the Order of Ahepa with some members of the fraternity, one of who had in turn heard of the 1966 program of Anatolia College from Mrs. Patricia Farris. Past District Governar of Hoosier District #12. It was immediately impressed from the point of view of am educational scholarship program for the Order of Ahepa

I pandered too, of the possibility of enlisting the Direck Government to participate, in a tangible manner, in this program together with the Order of Ahepa.

I decided to up to Greece

Accordingly I visited the Consul General of Greece in New York, the Honorable George Vianapoulos, and requested that he arrange an appaintment for me with Mr. Theofiliphes Papakonsundings. Minister at Education of Greece

Mr. Vranapoulas advised me that he would also be in Greece at this time and would accompany me on my yest with Mr. Papakanstandinou

I arrived in Greece on July 29, 1968.

Lammediately contacted No. Robert J. Huyden, President of Anatalia Callege in Greece and told from at my plans 1 asked the Historiable Mr. George Vianapoulas, the Consul General of Greece of New York, who was in Greece at the time, to accompany me on my visit with the Minister of Education, Mr. Papakonstandinas I also met Brother At Vonetes, Supreme Secretary of the Order of Ahepa and Brother James Scoffeld, Supreme Governor, who were in Greece. I asked them to also accompany us to our meeting with the minister.

Mr. Papakenstandinou was most gracious as I outlined to him the purpose of my visit and requested that the Greek Government patticipate on a fifty-fifty basis with the Order of Ahepa, namely, \$700,00 from the government and \$700,00 from the Order of Ahepa for each student qualifying for the scholarship to a total of 100 students.

At the conclusion of our discussions, Mr. Papakonstandinou advised me that he was most interested and requested that I present the program as discussed in writing and that he would see what could be done.

I immediately and personally delivered the letter as requested, at which time he advised that the Greek Government was interested and that it would participate as per my request in the amount of \$700.00 per student. He also advised that they would forward to Acarolia College the amount noted above for each student on the program.

Mi. Mayden President of Anatolia College, advised me that upon my return to the United States I should contact Mr. David Savoy of Anatolia in Baston who would be empowered to work out any details and with whom I could collaborate to make any changes in the original program as scheduled for 1969.

Immediately upon my return to the United States I communicated with Mr. Sovoy in Boston and advised him that we wished to make some changes in the original program and requested that he citit me in New York City so that we may discuss them in person

I wish to call your attention to the fact that the most important change I wished to make was that the program be made available to airls and boys, namely, Sons of Pericles and Maids of Athena, in equal numbers, 50 Sons and 50 Maids.

So much for the Anatolia College program. I request that you read and inspect it completely. You will find it one of the most complete, unique, comprehensive and most interesting programs at an educational nature ever presented. I particularly call your attention to the detailed day by day planning. This is no hadge-podge creativity, not it is a program slapped together for the purpose of expediency. I know you will agree that it is carefully prepared, intelligently outlined and purposefully assembled to provide to the applicant the utmost namely to do the work for which the entire summer program is intended—to learn, to enjoy and to keep alive our Hellenic heritage.

Now then, we come to the marter of the administration and the implementation of the program as concerns the Order of Aheps I have thought deeply on this subject and I present to you the following for your approval.

I Up to 100 scholarships to be given annually divided its equally as possible between Sons and Maids as presented under the reading. Qualifications in the Fragram in addition, effective after the summer program of 1969 such Sons and Maids must be members in good standing from the month of December at the year immediately prior to the scholarship applied for.

2. Of these 24 will be District Scholarships, one from each District, with \$350,00 being derived from District funds and \$350,00 contributed by the Asepa Educational Foundation.

3 The remaining scholarships, including any not used by any of the Datrich as alonesaid, shall be allocated an a district trave of one for each 250 Ahepans in good standing in such districts.

4 in the event that any District does not elect to, or does not have adequate financial resources to secure in full complement of scholarships, the unused scholarships so allocated shall revert to the Atepo Educational Foundation to be distributed equitable to any Districts that have used up their allocation.

5" In the event that the full number of scholarships made avail-

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able by the Ahepa Educational Foundation in this program are not used by the Districts as aforesaid, the balance of the unused scholarships shall then be distributed equitably by the Ahepa Educational Foundation on a chapter basis to whatever chapters are prepared to make the necessary contribution.

OUTLINE PROPOSAL FOR "A SUMMER IN GREECE" IN 1969

Submitted by Robert I. Hayden, President August 5, 1968

INTRODUCTION

The following plan for a Summer in Greece program for 1969 follows the successful program held at Anatolia College in 1966. This document provides a fairly detailed outline of a program which should be of particular interest to the parents of second and third generation Greek-Americans.

In brief, the plan offers an eight-week Educational course in Greece during July and August 1969. Marnings will be filled with intensive courses, afternoons are set aside for further cultural studies, rest, and planned recreation, in the evenings there will be parties, trips to the cinema, music groups, guest speakers, and free time. Week-ends are used for go-native sight-seeing, and the program is climaxed by a 13-day tour of Greece.

OBJECTIVES

- To present a package which will appeal both to parents and children of the Greek-American community in North America.
- 2. To bring a group of girls and boys aged 15-18 to Anatolia College where they will participate in a course designed to instill in them a love of Greek culture and traditions, a basic knowledge of the language, and a desire to appreciate the existence of Ancient and Modern Greece.
- To utilize the facilities of Anatolia College as a cultural exchange center for Greek-Americans.
- To provide this program at a minimum cost to the parents of students interested in this program.
- To provide for a more meaningful educational program for the Order of Ahepa.

QUALIFICATIONS OF PARTICIPANTS

- 1 The group will be limited to a party composed only of girls and boys who are members of the Som of Pericles and Maids of Athena. In areas where there are no junior auxiliaries, students can become members of a nearby chapter.
- Parhopants will be restricted to students only between the ages of 15 and 18 years.
- 3. The number of students forming the group should be 100
- 4 If the party falls below 30, the program will be concelled
- The student we are seeking is one who is serious in his intentions to learn the Greek language, meet and communicate with the Greek people and learn about the history and culture of Ancient and Modern Greece.
 - the should be intellectually curious, of high moral character, able to find excitement and stimulation in classroom lectures as well as in the varied recreation program.
 - b. The selection procedure should be designed to eliminate all unsuitable condidates.

SELECTION PROCEDURE

- 1. The selection procedure will now be changed, as agreed by President Hayden in a conference with Mr Gus Cherevas. Supreme President of Ahepa, and subject to further modifications in conference with Mr. David Savoy, Vice President for Development, Anatolio College.
- 2. It is emphasized that the success of the program is very much dependent upon selecting young people of high caliber who fit in with the objects of the program, not those who are out for a good time, or pressed into the program by their parents. The College and the Order of Ahepa have a responsibility to make clear to all candidates the purpose of the program
- Final selection of students will be the responsibility of the Vice President for Development

CHAPERONS

Four chaperons and the Assistant Director will be required to accompany the group from the United States to Greece, and to supervise the students while in Greece. A full description of their duties is listed on a later page.

- 1. Qualifications: The chaperon mothers and fathers must be responsible for the job of looking after 25 students each, under tining conditions. They must be able to maintain discipline, but be warm and fair. It is preferable that they have one or more of the following qualifications.
 - a Know Greek
 - h Know nursing
 - c Be a teacher or used to student contact

The chaperon may be the mother or father of one of the participants of the program. The Assistant Director will have more responsibilities than the chaperons.

- 2 Remuneration: The choperons will receive no payment for their duties, but will receive the full program free of charge. This will correspond to a salary of approximately \$600 to \$700 a month. The Assistant Director will receive a payment of \$300 in addition to the free program for extra responsibilities.
- 3. Recruitment: The chaperons and Assistant Director will be recruited at the discretion of the Vice President for Development. It is suggested that all candidates for the SIG program should be informed of the opening for chaperons
 - Chaperon condidates should be asked to fill out a questionnaire and then be invited by the key man for an interview. Candidates successfully passing this screening should then be interviewed by the Vice President for Development who will be responsible for the final selection of the chaperons. These candidates should. of course, be subject to a much more careful selection prozedure than the student participants.
- Responsibilities
 - II. U.S.A.-Greece: The Chaperons are responsible for escarting boys and girls and baggage through customs in the U.S.A. with help at travel agent representative, airline representable, and Vice President for Development and Assistant Director in Athens they will supervise the same procedure, but with the assistance of the Director of the program.
 - tr. At the College. At the College the Chaperons are responsible for maintaining discipline of the students outside of the classroom program. They will report to the Assistant Director any problems relating to the program including breach of discipline which requires more serious consideration than routine problems. They will assist all aspects of the program except for teaching. They will accompany the group to the beach and alternate with the Assistant Director if sick boys or garls need supervision in the afternoons in the infirmary. They will accompany the group on all weekend trips and on the two-week tour at College expense.
 - c. Hours of duty. The Chaperons will normally be free at all ames while the students are in class, but may attend classes

if they so wish. They will be on duty from 1:00 p. m. until the students are in bed at night. They will usually be free one day per week at a time to be agreed upon by the Director.

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INSURANCE

The following type of insurance should be provided by the program:

- I. A policy to protect the school and the Ahepa against possible claims or suits against the school lithe College already possesses this coverage!
- 2. A policy insuring the life of each participant while making trans-Atlantic crossing and while in Greece.
- 3. Baggage insurance for each student and chaperon up to a maximum of say \$1,000.
- 4. Hospital and surgical insurance to pay for any participant who requires hospitalization while in Greece

- 1. All girls will be accommodated in Ingle Hall, the girl's dormitory. All boys in the boys dormitory Students will live two to a

- Food will be provided by the Anatolia kitchens located in the student dormitories. An excellent menu is served which received the highest praise in the previous Summer in Greece program. A soft drink is served with each meal. No alcoholic beverages will be consumed by the students. Breakfast, noon lunch, evening meal, and bed time snack are provided.

The house mother and chaperons will receive no remuneration for their work in the program. The tour shaperon will probably be a member of the administrative (affice) staff at the Callege and travel with the group on Callege time at no cost to the program except for tour costs.

This experience will do much to bring the students into a real Greek situation. Family lies will be carefully selected by the Director of the program from among parents of Anatolians. Girls and boys will be placed in homes that have daughters or sons of approximately the same age wherever possible. The families will be carefully selected by the Director of the program. The experience will be used to form the basis of discussions and exchange of impressions during later classes. After classes on Wednesday, July 30, parties of students will deport to the selected families They will return to the College on Sunday afternoon, August 3.

EDUCATION: A KEY TO THE FUTURE

Wilbur J. Coben
Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare

Many renturies ago Plato wrote that the direction in which education starts a man will determine his future life. The truth in his statement has never been more widely acknowledged than it is today for today we are living in a period which future historians may refer to as the age of education. In the past five years alone the Congress has passed more than 40 bills supporting education. Perhaps this would be an appropriate time to pause and reflect on some af the progress and problems in education.

Anyone who is interested in the nation's future must help with the job of improving our schools so that they can adequately prepare our children for responsible adulthood.

The problems that education faces today are broad and complex and if we are to deal with them adequately the resources of the whole community must be tapped. For example, the trad range of talents and skills of the business community could be more effectively used in the schools.

- Businessmen could be encouraged to participate in classroom, totoring and counseling activities.
- Training programs and work study programs could be run cooperatively with business.
- -Businessmen could help in developing

curriculum that is relevant to the needs of the labor market.

Let us try to imagine what education will be like in the next couple of decader.

- I envision educational opportunities for all Americans from age 9 months to 90 years—with every child having the opportunity for creative, stimulating early education, every youth having the opportunity to continue education as far as his or her talents will take them, and every adult having the opportunity to continue learning throughout life.
- I see research uncovering the secrets of learning and creativity, finding ways of fostering intellectual growth, beginning with infancy throughout the life span.
- —I see the barriers between home and school, school and work, school and community crumbling and education penetrating even more formidable barriers—between old and young, rich and poor, city, farm, and suburb.

I envision an educational system tailored to the needs of the individual rather the other way around.

I see many new special educational services for the creative, brilliant child, as well as for the retarded, the physically handicapped, and the average child, that will help every child develop his full potential.

I see our Nation accepting learning as a truly jayous experience, with a wide variety of choices for each individual, and the learning force continually increasing in quality and quantity—far exceeding the lobor force.

I see the day when every child will be a wanted child, who receives all the love, attention and the medical care he needs regardless of his family's color, religion, or income, a child who will have all the apportunities our society can provide, and there will be many to grow into a healthy, mature and well educated adult.

Through education the individual will gain a respect for learning in the present, a hope for the futrue, and a sense of purpose and direction in sharing the problems, challenges, rewards and responsibilities of society.

Dreams, you may say. But I believe that we have already begun to implement the most important dream of our time—education for everyone who wants it and will work for it. Many of the foundations have already been laid. But ahead of us lies a great testing of our Nation to see whether we have the will and the determination to fully achieve them. I believe that we do and that we will help to realize one of the most exciting and demanding dreams in the Nation's history.

As we live our modern lives - just over 100 generations removed from the Golden Age of Greece - we can't help but be mindful both of the stark contrasts between life then and now yet, equally as important, the many legacies of that earlier time that have not only survived over these countless generations but permeate the very ideals and culture of modern Western man. Since the inception of the Order of of needs imagin-Ahepa in 1922, our Constitution has provided that one of our major principles actions and an important part of our program must ons. We be the encouragement of the study of business Hellenic ideals and Hellenic Culture e oppor We are The Order of Ahepa, since its first begin nings in 1922, has worked towards a blends those and all

ang of the finest ideals and principles of Americansm and Helleniam. It is no accordent that these three letters.— American—ttellenic.— Educational—are the first three letters of the word AHEPA.

The very foundations at American history and government have been nourished and ted by the Greek Classics and the teachings of the ancient Greek immortals. The Order of Ahepa, which represents the American chizens of Greek descent, has endeavored to impress upon its members their debt, and the debt of the entire world to ancient Greece.

The efforts and contributions of the frater nity for over forty-five years toward the attainment of these worthy objectives have been many and varied. Much effort and many socrifices have been made by the officers and members of the Ahepa Family to forge a vibrant and constructive program of educational and cultural contributions. Thousands of dollars have been amaked on National District and Chap ter levels and channeled into various areas of assistance and service for our people While the sum total of the traternity a past efforts has been impressive and we have much to be proud at a condid, objective and critical analysis of the needs of aupeople in recent years clearly revenled the necessity to expand our energies and resources in more tangible and concrete areas of service

Past Supreme President Nicholas J. Chirekos, while amultaneously serving the fraternity as Supreme Secretary and Director of Ahepa's Scholarship and Education Program in 1962, undertook is survey at colleges and universities in the Unded States and Canado aftering courses in the Careek Clausia and Modern Greek Brather Chicekos published his revealing Kadings in a report to the delegates of the 1962 Chicago Supreme Convention entitled Ahepa's Educational and Scholarship Programs

The report was enthusiastically received by the delegates; results of the survey, findings, and recommendations were diseminated through the medium of The Ahepan magazine to the Ahepa Family.

The basis for the report was a careful examination of a questionnaire and survey of 1400 colleges and universities in the U.S. and Canada to determine the extent Greek studies were taught both in the undergraduate and graduate levels, as the following categories Ancient Greek Language, Modern Greek Language, Greek History, Greek Philosophy, Greek Classics, Greek Drama and related subjects.

Replies were received from 525 colleges and universities, approximately 37% of the 1400 calleges and universities contacted With regard to Ancient Hellenic Culture, the percentage of schools offering courses in Ancient Greek, New Testament Greek and the Greek classics in both the ancient Greek language and in English was high. More than 87% of the 525 colleges and universities who replied offered courses dealing with Hellenic Culture. The numbers of such courses offered were as low as four or five, and as high as 51 courses at the University of Washington in Seattle. Washington Only tixty-three colleges indicated that no special courses were offered in Hellenic Culture, and these were small school

Over-all, the 462 calleges and universities, covering 46 states, the District of Columbia and 8 provinces of Canada, offered 2,979 various subjects and 11,997 hours of study. Generally, the survey indicated that our higher institutions of learning did not offer many facilities for the study of Modern Greek Language, a situation due mostly to a lock of demonst for such courses on the sent of students. In certain areas, it a demond for sources in Modern Greek was generated, the courses could be added to the college curriculum. There were, how ever, nine schools who offered courses in Modern Greek and four others planning to do so

The study further revealed that New York State led the nation with 33 colleges and amwerates offering a combined total of 267 vinious subjects embracing 263 hours of study for credit purposes Pennsylvania trained second with 34 colleges and universities offering 246 subjects and 877 hours of study, and Ohio runked that with 26 colleges and universities offering 220 submillinges and universities offering 220 submillinges and universities offering 220 sub-

jects and 907 hours of itudy. In Canada, the Province of Ontaria, with 5 colleges and universities responding ranked first, offering 47 subjects and 197 hours of study. An analysis of the variety of subjects aftered by the 462 colleges and universities responding to the survey was informative and most revealing. Of significance was the lact that Elementary Classical Greek ranked first. The study of Intermediate Classical Greek ranked seventh with 130 colleges offering such courses. However, the study of Advanced Classical Greek ranked. 21st with 36 colleges offering courses.

Studies relating to the History of Greece ranked second with 220 colleges and unversities feaching the Hatary of Greece. Third in rank was the study of Philosophy. offered by 202 colleges and universities. The studies of Plato ranked sixth, with 149. colleges and universities offering courses. Courses dealing with Aristotle ranked 16th. with 44 institutions offering courses Socrates ranked 36th, with 3 colleges and universities offering courses. Further, the study of Homer ranked 8th, with 174 institutions offering courses. The Materian Herodatus ranked 15th, with 49 colleges and versities offering courses, and the stept historians, Thurwardes, ranked 17th with 42 colleges and universities. The influence of the great Orozors, such as Demoutrieres, was remarkably revealed by the fact that Greek Grators, as a course ranked 19th and the subject was taught in 38 mm. tytion, and that Demoutheres Rimielt ranked 30th with 17 institutions. 

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

My Dear Brothers:

Once again, via the medium of the Ahepa Magazine, our excellent publication which helps so very much to keep

us in touch with one another, I greet you with warm and kind thoughts and fraternal Good Wishes.

Since my last message to you I have been quite busy with many things. These include the normal operations of the fraternity, answering the voluminous amount of mail which is addressed to me, and, of course, weighing and making decisions on new matters which arise daily

However, the bulk of my time has been spent on the various projects which were approved by the recent Supreme Convention in New York City. Of these the one closest to my heart, and to that of the Ahepa Family, is the "Summer in Greece" program for the Sons of Pericles and Maids of Athena.

am certain that you are aware of the program as outlined in the August-September-October issue of the Ahepa

To refreshen your memory the project calls for an eight week National Scholarship Program to Greece sponsored by the Order of Ahepa under the guidance of Anatolia College in Thessaloniki for our Sons of Pericles and Maids of

the Order of Ahepa under the guidance of Anatolia College in Thessaloniki for our Sons of Pericles and Maids of Athena, age 15 to 18 based on academic and behavioral excellence. The first six weeks will be spent at the College with studies in our lan, age, our Hellenic Culture, our History — as a matter of fact everything and anything that is Greek. The final two weeks will be spent on a tour of Greece and the Greek Islands. There is no doubt that the program has "caught fire". I have carried the message to seven of our districts thus far and the reception has been overwhelming. It is my intention to visit every district with reference to this program and to do everything within my power to help in the promotion of this project. As I mentioned previously, the entire program was outlined in full detail in the August-September-October issue of the Ahepa Magazine. If you have not received your copy or if you failed to notice it, your District Lodge will have all the particulars. The administration and the implementation of the program as outlined below is self-explanatory.

- Up to 400 scholarships to be given annually divided as equally as possible between Sons and Maids
 as presented under the heading. Qualifications in the Program. In addition, effective after the summer
 program of 1969, such Sons and Maids must be members in good standing from the month of December of the year immediately prior to the scholarship applied for.
- 2. Of these, 24 will be District Scholarships, one from each District, with \$350.00 being derived from

District funds and \$350.00 contributed by the Ahepa Educational Foundation.

If a District fails to procure its District Scholarship by February 1, 1969, it shall forfeit its right to qualify for the additional scholarships allocated to that district.

The remaining scholarships, including any not used by any of the Districts as aforesaid, shall be allocated on a District Basis of one for each 250 Ahepans in good standing in such Districts, as of December 31, 1967. The District Scholarship is included in the computation.

For the additional seventy-six (76) scholarships, each applicant must submit \$350.00 with his or her application and the balance of \$350.00 will be defrayed from the Ahepa Educational Foundation.

- The Ahepa Educational Foundation shall derive its funds from contributions of individuals, chapters and district. lodges in each district. All funds which are raised in each District shall be credited to that Districts Account. A pro-rata share of the actual expenses for the program will be applied against each District from funds raised for mailing, postage printing of circulars, magazine inserts and advertising expenses. No monies will be used by anyone for traveling expenses for the purpose of promoting this program. All monies raised for this program should be sent to Ahepa Headquarters. Checks made out to the Ahepa Educational Foundation for the account of the "Summer in Greece Program
- In the event that any District does not elect to, or does not have adequate financial resources to secure its full complement of scholarships, the unused scholarships so allocated shall revert to the Ahepa Educational Foundation to be distributed equitably to any Ditricts that have used up their allocation.
- In the event that the full number of scholarships made available by the Ahepa Educational Foundation in this program are not used by the Districts as aforesaid, the balance of the unused scholarships shall then be distributed equitably by the Ahepa Educational Foundation on a chapter basis to whatever chapters are prepared to make the necessary contribution.

The number of scholarships available to each district and the amount required may be found in the chart noted on another page of this magazine.

All that remains is for your chapter and for the chapters within your district to make the arrangements in whichever manner you choose to raise the necessary funds.

As a member of the Educational Foundation, Brother Nakos has made invaluable contributions to the progress of that body. At the last Supreme Lodge meeting in Washington, D.C., he was appointed by the Ahepa Educational Foundation as the Chairman of the Foundation's Fund Raising Drive with special emphasis on the Anatolia College Project. We are certain that with Brother Nakos chairing the Drive for that most important program, the project will be a complete success. Ahepa is not the only beneficiary of the philanthropic qualities of Brother Nakos. The "Birmingham News", in a front page story last month, announced the latest generous gesture of Brother Sam. He was joined by Dr. S. Richardson Jr. and Dr. Charles A. McCallum Jr., Deans of the medical and dental schools in praising Mr. and Mrs. Sam Nakos for their generous

gesture.

To make the Hippocrates statue more meaningful and complete, a rooted cutting from the original Tree of Hippocrates from the Island of Kos in Asia Minor, where the Father of Medicine was born, will be planted on the same plaza as the statue. This is the same tree under which the Greek physician



is said to have taught his students. Brother Sam Nakos migrated to the United States in 1914 from his native Greece, with very little English at his command. As many of his fellow Hellenes, he learned the restaurant business the hard way, and before long he owned restaurants and grocery stores both in Texas and Birmingham. Among his other business interests today, is distributorship for the Sterling and Pabst beer companies, which he operates as a family affair, involving two sons-in-law, a brother and a nephew.

From that day when he arrived penniless in the United States, to this day when he so generously shares his wealth through his humanitarian contributions to worthy causes, Brother Nakos has displayed with pride and in a most glorious way those Hellenie characteristics that he has been so bountifully endowed with. May he live many more years, and may God grant him all his wishes, for he certainly has lived a Godly and graceful life

THE DAUGHTERS OF PENELOPE Its Inception, History and Progress

The inception of the Daughters of Penelope may be considered as synchronous to the organization of the Ahepa Golden Gate Chapter #150 of San Francisco, Calif. The idea was first discussed during a visit there by the then Supreme President V. I. Chebithis, by Dr. Emanuel Apostolides.

In 1929, when Dr. Apostolides became President of Golden Gate Chapter, he decided to proceed with the organization of the Ahepa Auxiliary under the name Daughters of Penelope. After many months of research work, drafting of constitutions, By-laws and Rules of Order, revising, restudying and final redrafting, the original idea of the auxiliary bore fruit and the EOS (Dawn) Ch. No. 1 was organized on November 16, 1929, with a Charter membership of 25. In 1930 the Mother Lodge was incorporated under the laws of the State of California. Attorney William Petros then Vice President of the Ahena Golden Gate Chapter, was very instrumental in assisting the Eos Chapter with its incorporation and other legal matters.

For the first 2 years after the incorporation of the Chapter, Dr. Apostolides, who was then Deputy Supreme Governor of District No. 12, remained with the Chapter, attending their meetings, encouraging, helping, advising the officers and supervising its proper operation, with Mr. William Petros at his side ready to assist with the legal and other problems.

The Golden Gate Chapter of Ahepa was very helpful at this stage of the life of the Daughters of Penelope, lending them their Bible, flags, gavel and other equipment nevessary to operate.

A petition of Affiliation was sent to the Kansas City, Boston and San Francisco Ahepa Conventions. But at that time Ahepa, for very sound and logical reasons, did not deem it feasible to affiliate an Auxiliary. It wasn't until 1931 that the Daughters of Penelope were officially adopted as the Senior Auxiliary of the Order of Ahepa.

In the meantime, one after the other Chapters of the Daughters started getting organized throughout the land. Arete Ch. #2 was organized in Cedar Rapids, primarily through the efforts of the President of Cedar Rapids Ch. #194 of Ahepa. Elektra Ch. #3 followed, through the help of Heart of America Ch. #73 Secretary S. A. Agnos, In 1933, Brother George Bezaites. President of Oakland Ch. #171 was instrumental in starting Echo Ch. #4, and President of Sacramento Ch. #153 J. C. Phillips started Artemis Ch. #5. Olympus Ch. #6 was formed through the efforts of Miss Zoe Carros. just in time to greet the Ahepans to the District Convention in Chevenne, Wyoming. It was only proper that the great metropolis of Chicago would follow suit with the rest of the country. and through the labors of Brother George Spannon of Chicago, the Nausicaa Ch. #7 joined the Daughters.

The list of Chapters continued throughout the years, catching like fire, from one end of the country to the other. Today there are 300 Chapters organized in 24 Districts, geographically located like the Ahepa Districts. Thus, this society that had its virgin beginning on the Pacific Coast 39 years ago is today sprinkled throughout the breadth and length of the country, with some chapters even across the seas, assisting in the great crusade for Hellenism throughout the world.

A VISIT To cyprus

By A. E. ANDREADES

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I was privileged to take part in the chartered flight to Greece by the Pan American under the auspices of the Order of AHEPA. This excursion to Greece was of seven weeks duration. The participating group, all members of AHEPA, left by jet on April 1st, arrived in Athens the 2nd day of April and returned to the U.S.A. on the 18th day of May.

It was an unforgetable pilgrimage to Greece and from the views expressed by many, each enjoyed himself or herself; the nostalgia to encounter his own beloved in Greece and to recapture the spirit of his childhood environment were consummated. All participated in the religious festivities during Easter and returned with memorabilia that will soothe the mind and soul in the future. The Order of AHEPA deserves the gratitude of its members for organizing such a trip to Greece at such a nominal expresses.

My visit to Cyprus was the climax of this trip. I could not excuse myself for not visiting Cyprus while visiting our mother land. I grieved, ached and somewhat labored for the political status, for the future and destiny of this island, this diamond island in the Mediterranean, and was anxious to see it in person. The flight from Athens to Nicosia takes about one and a half hours. I left Athens at 5:30 P.M., and reached Nicosia at about 7:00 P.M. The fare is about \$23.00 cround trip.

\$93.00, round trip.

On landing in the airport of Nicosia you are confronted by the majestic profile of the Troodos and Kyrenia mountains, running from West to East, parallel to each other and almost equidistant from Nicosia. From the first step of discembarkation, custom house procedures, immigration and passport details, you become aware that you are within a modern, well organized, competent, courteous and civilized State. Cyprus is no more a geographic expression. The sentiment for the island magically turned into an

intense affection and admiration. I reached Nicosia on May 4th; the next day, Sunday, I joined a bus excursion at 8:00 A.M. to Troodos Mountains. The majority of the tourists were English, New Zealanders and Australians. We drove through the plain, southwest of Nicosia, somewhat arid, and reached the top of Mountain Olympus, 6400 feet high, the highest point of Cyprus. The beauty and panoramas of these mountains (Troodos) are apocalyptic. A green enchantment woven by the luxuriant trees, pine trees. You are drenched in warm and lucid sunshine. The lucidity of the air, the exquisite Vistas, the verdure of the mountains fill you with a spirit of animation. You feel as if you are suspended in the air. I was so deeply impressed by this beauty that when I saw his Beatitude, Archbishop Makarios. President of the Republic of Cyprus on May 8th. I told him that the inspiration that the beauty of the mountains evokes to a stranger is such that every delegate or representative of the United Nations or foreign governments must be escorted to these mountains, in order to appre-

ciate the grandeur of the island, its inviolability, territorial integrity and indivisibility and that any incision to her body will constitute an international crime and a democratic mockery. I was graced then by a kindly nod of approval. We had a delicious luncheon at the summer resort of Platres and we returned to Nicosia at 7:00 P.M., driving by the Monastery Kykko, Petra and Peristerona, breathless with delight. The next day at 2:00 P.M., I joined the excur-

The next day at 2:00 P.M. I joined the excursion to Kyrenia. Although quite conversant with the situation in Cyprus, the words "enclave" and "convoy" were sheer abstractions to me. At about 2:15 P.M., our bus joined the convoy assembled north of the City of Nicosia, the north of which is the Walled City controlled by the Turkish community near the Village of Ortakeuy and not very far from the Gate of Kyrenia, and we proceeded north toward the placid and beautiful Town of Kyrenia, on the Mediterranean, facing Asia Minor, the distance from Nicosia to Kyrenia is about sixteen miles and is controlled for about eleven miles up to the close pass through the mountain of Kyrenia by the Turkish community and is interspersed with military quarters. billeted by Turkish-Cypriote soldiers exhibiting the Turkish flag.

exhibiting the Turkish flag. I felt a trauma in my solar piexus when I witnessed this infestation and affliction in the immaculate organism of the island. All the celestial peaks of these glorious mountains of Kyrenia which run parallel to the Mediterranean Sea with the exception of the peak which nestles the St. Hillarion Castle is occupied by the Cypriote National Guard, a group of young handsome, disciplined and dedicated sons of Cyprus ready to die for its territorial integrity In about an hour we reached this graceful town, this charming and picturesque resort. We visited the famous Kyrenia Castle, an amalgam of Byzantine, Genose and Venetian construction and architecture. We visited Bellapais Abbey and admired its cloistral buildings now partly in ruins, and its great refectory. Visiting Kyrenia and its environment one will relish Laurence Durrell's book "Bitter Lemons" who so exquisitely and poetically etched the beauty of this region and of its people. The New York Times published a perceptive article about Bellapais Abbey and the Village Bellapais on June 2, 1968 in the Resorts and Travel Section, Were I able to write such a book as Laurence Durrell, this great poet, novelist and Philheilene. would have entitled "Cyprus, the fragrant The return of last convoy from Kyrenia to Nico-sia leaves at 4.00 P.M. Our bus had to return picturesque communities of Karavas, Lapithos,

The return of last convoy from Kyrenia to Nicosia leaves at 4,00 P.M. Our bus had to return to Nicosia by another road and proceeded the road westward from Kyrenia We passed the picturesque communities of Karavas, Lapithos, and on reaching Myrtou, the bus turned left and through the town of Skylloura, we reached Nocosia at about 7,00 P.M. Driving west of Kyrenia on an excellent highway built by the government of Cyprus, with the Mediterransan on the right and the resplendent Kyreniah range on the left, breathing the delicious watt from

the orange groves lying near the foot of the mountains was a transport to joy. One could mournur, stimulated and meamerized by this sensuous alchemy, "Opprus, the fragrant!"

Tuesday, the 7th of May, I joined the excursion to Famagusta. I doubt whether the State of Florida has any town that malches the beauty of Famagusta. This city which possesses all the amenities for a bourgeois life, has a beautiful port. Several steamers were moored at the pier. We visited the Turkish quarters in the Walled where St. Nicholas Cathedral and the Othello Tower are located. After visiting the ancient city of Salamis and St. Barnabas astery, we proceeded north toward Cantara Castle. This castle dominates the horizons and the Mediterranean Sea, north, east and south. We passed the Viltage Tricomo where General Grivas was born. This trip to Cantara Village and Cantara Castle over 2000 feet high was an extravaganza in beauty that transcends any ordinary sensious experience. We had a sumptuous but inexpensive dinner at the Hotel Florida, Famagusta, including mullets, the famous barbounia, at \$3.00 for the whole course. I returned to Nicosia hypnotized by the spell of the island. Despite this enchantment in the silent contemplation of my subconscious mind I was listening to this question, "How can the Greek race permit the mutilation of this cosmogonic masterpiece

May 8th, Wednesday, at about 5:00 P.M., Mr. Andreas Aristidou, the private secretary to his Beatitude, picked me up at the hotel for sight-seeing of Nicosia. It is a town with a population of 100,000, including the suburbs. The town is teeming with newly constructed governmental buildings, schools, hospitals, institutes and churches. We visited the Archbishop's palace and the House of Representatives. At that time High School students were leaving their afternoon classes and I was so impressed by the deportment, demeanor and manners of the students, particularly the girls. If only some of famous professors of education could see them. What a pleasure to look at such girls, healthy looking, dressed in immaculate blue dresses radiating finesse, femininity and de-

Mr Aristidou then suggested to drive to Larnaca. On our way to Larnaca, we drove near a Village inhabited by Turks. These villagers were not blackmailed into finding so-called protection in an enclave by the Turkish-Cypriote leadership. These villagers looked free and undisturbed, unmolested in pursuing their daily business. I saw their children playing in the streets, close to their mothers.

it was a thrill to be in Larnaca. Placidity and gentleness permeated the town. The Turkish quarters is in the southern part of the town Larnaca has a small port. The day I was there the people were arranging for a strike the next day to demand and appeal to the Government to build a larger Port This community is not far from the site of ancient Citium, the birthplace of the stoic philospher. Zeno. How can you justify, explain and interpret the implicit, express, inflexible and unconditional stoicism. moral courage, patience and will to survive as Greeks and Greek Orthodox for so many centuries, but to the influence of and implicit faith in that great philospher, the precusser of the founder of Christianity. After a delectable custronomic and mental symposium indulged in hy my host and myself, my scholarly and hospitable host took me back to the hotel. skirling closely the Green Line separating the two communities

On the 8th Wednesday, at 12:15 ncon-time, I had the distinct provinge to be received by his Brattude. Archdishop Makarios, the President of the Republic of Cyprus. I treasured the thought that my picayane inferest in the Cy-

prus question was justified. He is tall, slim, monastic and magnetic. Softness and kindness adorns his face. He is charismatic, His moral and spiritual height match and reach the gran-deur of the Troodos and Kyrenia ranges. He seems to possess the character amaigamated by the philosophy of Zeno, the religiosity and scholarship of St. Basil and the pure patriotism of the Greek, unspoiled by the opportunism and machinations of the average Greek politician. He is the antithesis of that political malaise Anown as "phaviocratia" which is so endemic

in Greece and which reached its apogee in the Greek political horizon since July 1965 in the face of his Beatitude you recognize an other St. Francis of Assisi. The whole Greek race particularly the Greeks of Cyprus must be proud of this religious and political leader He has been impervious to diplomatic intimida tions and blackmail. He was like a reel against which uneasy and turbulent dipiomatic waters tought arousing nothing from his granitic personality, except an enigmatic and graceful smile. Time does not permit to describe the simple elegance of the Presidential Palace. A great man is surrounded by simple elegance but by a galaxy of elequently articulate, competent, talented and evangelically dedicated as-

felt the grace of his blueish eyes and his contagious smile when he rose to greet me. kissed his hand and expressed my gratitude for receiving me. We did not discuss the political situation of Cyprus. I did most of the talking I wanted to tell him what I saw and observed in Cyprus. I told him what I saw and observed during those excursions I have described above. I pointed out to him the tangible, intangible, material and immaterial assets, values, stare at you all over the island, already possessed and enjoyed by the people and in the process of realization. I pointed out to him the efficiency, the creative spirit and the technocratic fever that pervade the atmosphere of the island I told him that all the servicemen in the National Guard looked so well dressed, dedicated, disciplined, handsome and excellent in deportment and appearance; and that all of whom I made inquiries were high school graduates, eager to pursue university studies upon discharge from the service.

told him of the beautiful and large schools that I saw that evoked my respect and of the high standard of living and of the apparent prosperity which are evident all over. I congratulated him for his courage and diplomatic savoir-fair in dealing with Mr. Cyrus R. Vance, the representative of President Johnson, in his efforts to emasculate and disband the National Guard I stated also to him his general attitude, his wisdom, his spunk and courage restored in many of us our faith in the Greek

people. He told me of the success of the five-year-plan. just terminated, of the inauguration of the second five-year-plan and the progress in the economy, agriculture, building construction, in education and in the fields of social and economic development since 1960, the year of independence. I replied that the manifestation of this progress was evident. He spoke also of the plans to further tourism and mentioned the fact that the available accommodations presently do not justify a promotional campaign to attract tourism. He mentioned however, the fact that many hotels are being built toward that end, a fact which I also noticed. Concerning politics he only stressed the fact that all efforts are taken by his government to deflect any designs from any source which may prejudice the physical and territorial integrity of the island. He expressed singular respect and affection for the Greek-Americans, especially for those who hailed from the island.

I kissed his hands again and felt a desire to

embrace him. Gracefully he escorted me to the door. When I left him, all my fears about the integrity of the island were dispelled

Everyone whom I spoke to, especially the young men of the National Guard, live by the credo that they would rather die than see the island partitioned. They do not feel any fear. They have complete confidence, respect and affection for their leader. They expressed their loyalty by the recent elections. 95% of the voters could not be wrong. A feeling of peace, enthusiasm and energy hovers over the island. It is burning with energy and creativeness. Indeed, the frenzy of building highways, schools, hotels, ports, etc., and the rythm of creativeness and the promotion of the media of culture, music and education, indicate that there is no fear in the years ahead. I asked a beautiful girl, whose name is Agathe, a graceful name meaning kindness and decency, who was working in a curio shop in Nicosia 50 feet away from the green line, if she was alraid of riots. civil and racial strife or attacks that the two communities may be involved in and she said 'No" in a tone suggesting that I must be mis-

taken to ask such a question. A real miracle is emerging in Cyprus since 1960: Were the people of Cyprus to be left alone for about 10 years, they would have reached such a level of material, social and economic advance and such culture that commentators will be referring to the miracle of Cyprus as they speak presently about the mir-acle of Italy and Germany after World War II. Time does not permit to dwell on the political status of Cyprus or to refer to the treaties of London and Zurich, Israel is not the only bastion of Democracy in the Near-East. Cyprus exemplifies the best criteria of political, social and economic Democracy. His Beatitude is a man of good will, of good intentions and of Christian charity. With regard to the communal strife, his Beatitude knows that the Turkish Cypriots are used by the Turkish government as a pawn and decoy to mislead international public opinion, to maintain tension and strife between the two communities and ultimately to effectuate partition (taxim) or double Enosis. The ideal, the democratic and internationally recognized solution and alternative to the present status is the establishment of a unitary form of government, like that of France or Greece or Turkey, where majority rules and minority checks and censures; and in view of the fact that the Turkish minority is a distinct racial minority, it should be granted complete autonomy in religious, social and educational matters not inconsistent with the sovereignty of the Republic. Cantonization or federalization of the island as proposed and desired by Turkey amounts to decimation of the island and is the first step toward partition. The very mountains of Troodos and Kyrenia will fling their anathemas against those who contemplate such crime, such a gross and craven moral and

international offense. The good will and sagacity of President Ma-karios is unlimited. Only in March of this year he addressed a statement to U Thant, the Secretary General of U.N., concerning the lifting of all existing restrictions in respect to the Turkish quarter of Nicosia, thereby allowing freedom of movement for the Turkish Cypriots throughout Cyprus. This gesture of good will by the Archbishop was not reciprocated by the Turkish leadership, despite U Thant's appeal to them, I was able to enter the Turkish quarter in Famagusta with my American passport while in a group with other non-Greek persons. Before this group went in I was able to enlist the promise of protection and immunity of septuagenarian English ladies in case the Turkish guards excluded me. No Greek is allowed to enter their quarters, their sanctum sanctorum. They believe, I presume, in the illusion that the de facto sovereignty or local partition will evaporate on letting Greek-Cypriots enter

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The question of Enosis, this great desideratum of all the Greeks, has been shelved primarily because of the sophomoric mentality of the Greek government. Time does not permit to narrate the information elicited by my questions posed regarding the questions of Enosis. General George Grivas and other controversial such matters. The slogans Enosis', Long live the King', etc., are still posted over the island. While sojourning in Greece during this trip I heard charges which were egregiously untrue, namely, that the Cypriots did not want Enosis and that 40% of the Greeks of Cyprus are Communists. These charges are flagrant syco-phancies. The natives of Greece, the superpatriotes and those who developed a touch of paranoia from a professional sort of anti-Communism, mistake the cooperative and synergetic spirit that is manifested in their affairs in Cyprus as socialistic or communistic. These so-called 40% of the Greek Cypriots are not are mega-Greeks. They want to live, to build and to create a Society as envisaged by men and leaders like the late President John F. Kennedy and the very late Robert F. Kennedy these fervently lamented and deeply missed American agonistes of Democracy, these heroic figures of tragic Americana. These Greek Cypriots are committed to progress. They intend to live, not to exist. They want to build a Democracy in accordance with the criteria ex-empliefied by some of the European Democracies. They are not tainted by the complex "Psoro-costena" inherent in the soul of the Continental Greeks even today in some degree.

They are succeeding because all the assistants of His Beatitude and the cabinet ministers are dynamic young men, sincere, cultured first class technicians, capable executives and technocrats. They made a commitment, and they have the economic resources. When I asked Mr. Aristidou where they get the moneys to build such beautiful and spacious schools that adorn the island, he answered. "Don't you know, Mr. Andreades, that this island is rich." Cyprus, with a population of only 1/6 of that of Greece exports almost as much as 1/6 of the Greek exports. Thousands of boxes with potatoes were lying at the port of Famagusta in the process

of being exported. I visualize the island with a Greek population of one million by the end of the 2nd millenium, 2000 A.D. There the Greek race could build a second state, a sort of city state, that may consummate the ultimate in Democracy. With a normal increase of the population from birth by 2 - 3% p.a. the diminution of emigration from the island and the eventual repatriation of the Greek Cypriots, who now live in the Diaspora, to Cyprus, this thought is not a Utopia. Most of the Cypriot Greeks who live in the Diaspora are successful businessmen, restaurateurs, shopowners, doctors and technicians and on repatriating to Cyprus, they will pursue profitably their respective business or profession. The opportunities are galore in the island. There is no governmental red tape or bureaucracy and unemployment is virtually non-exisis there any better place than Cyprus,

climatologically speaking?
The repatriates will not only be the pioneers but will also assist the government to establish a first class tourism. I met in Nicosia a gentleman operating an immaculate luncheonette who owned a similar business in New York City at 8th Avenue and 42nd Street. He told me that be attended also the University of Indiana He was glowing with domestic happiness, his lovely wife helping him in the shop. With pride he showed me his beautiful child and pointed at

his brand-new car, parked outside.

or local Cypriots

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With regard to the Greek Cypriots living abroad, who demonstrated their singular affection for the island during the last several years during her days of heroic agony. I hope the current five year plan just inaugurated will contain a provision proclaiming a period of in-gathering to the island as in the case of her neighbor, the State of Israel.

In fact, I wonder why the existence of over one quarter of a million of Greek Cypriots in the Diaspora was not adequately adduced before the public opinion and before the international forums, or why this fact was never documented. If you were to include all these Cypriots in the population of the island, then the proportion of the Greeks to the Turks

the proportion of the Greeks to the furks would be 9: 1.
Friday, May 10th, was approaching. I was teeling like "veni, vidi. I was conquered by the island." I had to leave. Thursday, the 9th of May, was the day of leisure. I visited the Cyprus Museum, outside the walls, There I saw the majestic statue of Septimus Severus, the Roman Emperor. I viill feel the pangs of guilt because in order to let me see all in the museum, they kept it open almost ½ hour longer. Who was 17 Such felicity! I feel like coining another phrase to categorize Cyprus. "Cyprus, the felicitous." I also visited the Concert Hall again, near the Museum, where a

concert was given during that week.

Music, opera, fine arts, savoir vivre, humanisties,
humanism, languages, antiquities, archeology
and all cultural expressions are amenities highly respected and enjoyed on the island. I confess, however, that I am not endowed with any
expertise in such matters. The culinary delights
of the island including the famous cheese
(Haloumi) I relished with gusto. In Cyprus besides the excellent restaurants I have seen

some of the best waiters.

The Cypriote press is excellent, ethnically and professionally as a rule. It is not an automaton serving selfish interests and dark forces. It is a vigorous and honest instrument of enlightenment, evaluating social, ethnical and political problems according to their conscience and for the good of the country. As to the feminine pulchritude, they add to the fragrance and grace of Cyprus. The average young man and young woman speaks both Greek and English very well. I hope the usage of both languages

will be preserved.

I regret time did not permit me to take the excursion to Limassol and Paphos, so as to round out my Cypriot travelogue. My sentiments and affection for the island were so exulted, that had I visited Paphos I might have been taken in by some ignis fatuus or mirage that I might mistake as the Goddess Aphrodite.

May 10th I took a taxi to go to the airport by a newly built highway. There I experienced more politeness and consideration. If I praised the mountains of Cyprus I did not mean to underrate the human equation. It is the character of the Greek Cypriots that exult you and revive your pride and faith in these people and through them for the whole Greek people in general. Would that they infect the continental Greeks with their commitment, their evangelical mission and enthusiasm, they deserve our assistance and understanding in their crusade to make Benegraeva and heldleine live.

mission and enthusiasm, they deserve our assistance and understanding in their crusade to make Democracy and Hellenism live. Considering the above phenomena I was doletully thinking that these cultured, sophisticated and industrious people, whose culture and mode of living are as high as those of the best West-Europeans are shackled and live under colitical disability imposed by treaties.

When about to ascend the plane I made a wish that the axiom and truth lone man, one votel solemnly enunciated by our Federal Supreme Court become a reality in Cyprus as well and that it be recognized and respected by the whole world, including the Turkish minority.

WHERE HE STANDS – THE LIFE AND CONVICTIONS OF SPIRO T. AGNEW

The life of Republican Vice Presidential Candidate is unfolded before the reader in a true modern Horatio Alger story fashion. It tells how Spiro T. Agnew, the son of a Greek immigrant, who was not too proud to earn an honest livelihood peddling vegetables on the streets of Baltimore during the Depression years, helped his father while attending school.

In its pages you will realize the wisdom of Richard Nixon in selecting Governor Agnew as his running mate, as he was searching for a man of action. who could meet the challenges of change with the right mental attitude . . . an emotionally mature man who could perceive the necessity to lay the foundations to prevent in the future the difficulties of the past and present. In the preface Presidential Candidate Nixon had this to say ". . . . Ted has come through the fire. He has experienced poverty and prejudice and risen above them on his own merits . As a champion of social and racial justice, he has experienced the fire of reverses in local politics, only to be vindicated by the voters and returned to even higher office."

The book also brings out the point that candidates for national office in our time have been members of the mil-

lionaires club, but that Agnew, having gome through the experiences of many Americans in the past turbulent years, and as a result understanding their problems, is definitely in the tradition of our log cabin presidents.

IN MEMORIAM JOHN L. MANTA

Past Supreme President—Order of Ahepa. Born: Island of Icaros, Greece, 1838: Died Nov. 19, 1968.



Brother John was initiated into our fraternity on January 25, 1926, and culminated his years of active leadership within the fraternity with his election to our highest office as Supreme President at the 1965 Supreme Convention.

Born on the Island of Icaros, he came to the United States in 1903, and in the following years, possessed of an indomitable spirit and the will-power to succeed, achieved success in the business world to an outstanding degree. He gladly assumed civic responsibilities and philanthropic obligations, both for his adopted country and his Motherland. He has received honors for his civic and philanthropic contributions from his city, state, country, and from the government of Greece.

Past Supreme President Mantahas been a prime mover in the promotion of Hellenic Culture amongst the younger generation of Greek-Americans, His steadfast faith in the mission of the Order of Ahepa, his native sense of humor, his common sense approach to the questions of the day and his sincere desire to serve the Order, endeared him to the membership at large.

He worked diligently on many projects of the Ahepa, including the Greek War Relief efforts, U. S. Savings Bonds drives, the Ahepa Truman Memorial in Athens, the Truman Library Fund, Justice for Greece Committee, the Cyprus Committee, the Ahepa Hall for Boys and the Ahepa School at St. Basil's Academy.

Peter S. Marthakis Past Supreme Vice President

Brother Peter S. Marthakis, Past Supreme Vice President was called to his maker while visiting his native village of Kiveri, Argos, Greece. Migrating to the United States as a young boy, he settled in Salt Lake City, gaining a Bachelor of Science degree in Engineering from the University of Utah. Following World War I, in which he served as an Engineering Officer, he taught Mathematics at West High School, a post he held for more than 40 years.

Brother Marthakis was one of the first Greek immigrants to be elected to State office, having served six years in the Utah House of Representatives and four years as a State Senator. In Ahepa he served his Chapter in all capacities including that of President, as District Governor, Supreme Governor and Supreme Vice President. In addition he was a member of Tau Beta Pi, an honorary engineering society, AF&M. Shriners, the Scottish and York Rites, the American Legion, a past master of the Odd Fellows and others.

IN MEMORIAM George J. Demetropolis

Rear Admiral, USN (Ret.)
Rear Admiral George J. Demetropolis, USN (Ret.) died in Athens, Greece on November 20, at his home. He was a graduate of the U. S. Naval Academy, class of 1931, and a member of the fraternity since 1931 when initiated by Hermes Chapter No. 136, New York City. He was born in New York City in 1910.

Brother Demetropolis was one of the first Greek-Americans to have graduated from the U. S. Naval Academy, and retired with the rank of Rear Admiral several years ago, at which time he moved to Athens,

Past Supreme Counselor Born: Nov. 9, 1909; Died December 12, 1968



Brother Peter C. Charuhas was initiated into the fraternity by Chapter 236, Washington, D. C. on August 7, 1934, and was elected to the office of Supreme Counsellor at the 1962 Chicago Supreme Convention.

During his 35 years of active service in the Order, Brother Charuhas attended practically all Supreme Conventions of the fraternity as a Delegate, and served on many National Committees by appointment of several Supreme Lodges.

He served in the U.S. Army during World War II as an officer, and was an active participant in the Army Reserve. An attorney, he served with the U.S. Department of Justice in Washington, D.C., for more than 30 years, and received a commendation from former Attorney General of the U.S., the late Robert F. Kennedy, for his services.

Brother Charuhas was General Chairman of the 1966 Washington Supreme Convention, one of the most successful conventions of the fraternity.

Greece. S. Mission to Greece. He transferred his membership to the Athens, Greece Ahepa Chapter in 1962.



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Program for growth of Sons of Pericles and Maids of Athena

In the August, September, October issue of The Ahepan Magazine as well as in my supplementary report issued during the recent Supreme Convention, I outlined some of the projects to which I have dedicated myself during my term of office.

Among these and perhaps the most important for the future growth of the Order of Ahepa, has to do with our Junior Orders, The Sons of Pericles and the Maids of Athena.

I am sure that you will agree that growth of the Senior Orders not only numerically within their ranks but also for the future leadership of both depends on the Sons and the Maids.

Elsewhere in this magazine you will find a complete listing by district showing the complete Ahepa family. This survey displays in stark reality the weak points within the Order; namely the present status of the Sons and the Maids.

When one notices the Sons and the Maids chapters which are inactive and the number of Ahepa chapters which are large enough to have a junior order under their wing, one can readily see the deplorable situation which exists and which must be corrected if we are to keep the Order of Ahepa strong and healthy.

Looking at it realistically, we must put the blame on ourselves. We have simply neglected this most important phase of Ahepa activity. Most certainly there is no reason why the vast majority of Ahepa chapters do not or can not have a Junior Order at its side. Most certainly, too, there is no doubt that in the vast number of communities within our ranks there are sufficient youngsters who can and should be organized into

a Junior Order.

We all know that being with young people brightens our lives and exerts our imagination. Those of you who have been scout leaders or are or have been active in your local PTA know this salient factor to be true. For even as the roots of the tree must be firm and strong, so must everything be built block by block, on solid foundation, if it is to endure and survive.

It is for these reasons that I feel a strong responsibility to push forward to the reactivation of all Sons and Maids inactive chapters and to further propel my energies to the formation of new chapters wherever feasible. The second half of my administration will be exerted in this direction.

If you feel as I do, if you have the same sense of responsibility to the Order of Ahepa, and I know that you do, you will help me in this most important of all projects. We must increase the membership of the Sons and the Maids and more important we must see to it that they remain as members and ultimately to enter our senior orders.

You will hear from me further on this subject. In the interim I ask you again to turn to that section of the magazine which contains the study of the Ahepa family and to note the lack and the void in Sons and Maids chapters. We must do something about it.

If there is anything that I can personally do in this direction, or if there is any information which you may require please write to me and I shall do everything in my power to be of assistance.


