Dear Calytrix Member,

With great regret this is my last Newsletter, through poor response, lack of good cutting material and viable seed. I have been unable to successfully propogate the species. Some seeds have germinated and then like most of the Members I have not been able to grow them on. In the case of propogation by cuttings, I have had some success and have a few in the garden, notably Calytrix tetragona, A. alpestris, and C. sullivanii. There is some confusion with regard to the species, particularly C. tetragona and C. brunioides being one and the same plant.

Viable seed of the rarer gems from W.A. is very hard to obtain and this limits my ability to supply the Members with suitable material.

Calytrix tetragona from the Eastern States is a variable shrub with green or grey foliage and white to dark pink flowers, Calytrix sullivanii is usually some shade of pink, C. glutinosa and beautiful pale mauve. Yellow flowered forms include C. depressa and C. aurea.

Seed, which looks like a parachute should be sown in the upright position with the awns or hairs attached to the calyx resting on the potting mixture. This mixture should be one third each of washed sand, loam and peat. Pot on into tabes as soon as they can be safely handled, as they have delicate root systems. Plant out into the garden situation when good progress is noticed as they die off if held too long.

Cutting material can be taken twice a year. Firstly, soft wood in late Spring after flowering when the new growth has reached 5 cms to 10 cms and has become firm. Secondly, hardwood cuttings should be taken in Autumn, also 5 to 10 cms, bearing in mind that this will make a difference to the flowering.

Recently on a trip to Darwin and envitons, I saw C. estipulata growing and flowering prolifically in the area of Darwin and Fogg Dams.

Although botanically described as being 3 metres tall it was not seen to be more than 2 metres. Seed was immature and therefore not viable.
