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Some years ago The Natural History Museum, South Kensington suggested a new edition of the *Dictionary of British and Irish Botanists and Horticulturists*. A commercial firm had already been engaged to transfer the entire text to a database. Christine Ellwood, a librarian in the Botany Department of The Natural History Museum, checked this conversion. Although she subsequently left to take up another appointment, I have been extremely fortunate to retain her services for the data inputting of my corrections and new material for this revised edition. Her familiarity with the book and her reliability have considerably eased my task. I must also thank Thomas W.Graham, Librarian at the University of York and staff of the Computing Service, for use of the University's computer facilities.

This revision includes many additional bibliographical references for existing entries and the scope of the book has been extended. Flower painters as well as botanical artists are now listed - more than 1400 are recorded. The popularity of garden history has persuaded me to include garden designers, amateurs as well as professionals.

Bibliography of British Gardens (1988). I know of no other biographical dictionary which provides a comparable coverage of British and Irish horticulturists; more than 1500 gardeners and 1800 nurserymen are now to be found in this new edition. The terminal date for periodicals scanned for this dictionary is December 1990; a few articles beyond that date have been included where they contribute some important item of information. This date limitation does not apply to books. Some changes have been made in the layout of the book. An author's publications are shown in a separate paragraph within his entry, and the subject index has been rearranged into three categories: Professions etc, Countries etc, and Plants. The names of counties in use before the local government reorganisation of 1974-1975 have been retained since the plant records of many British botanists are listed in the older county floras.

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Preface to 1977 edition

The Swedish traveller, Peter Kalm, writing in 1751 to the American botanist Cadwallader Colden observed that "there is nothing we want so much as a Biographica Botanicorum; the old were very negligent in that: there are many of which we hardly know any other thing but the name; nay, if we seek yet to the history of their life, we are obliged to pick up here and there a word in the writings of their contemporaries". Many men and women survive only in the names of the plants commemorating them; apart from this brief reminder of their existence they have disappeared without trace. We may never know why they were singled out for this honour. The pages of *Curtis's Botanical Magazine* frequently record the names of soldiers, sailors and merchants who during their travels collected new and unusual plants, which they brought back to eager gardeners and nurserymen in England.

It was in a commendable attempt to provide a biographical guide not only for such plant collectors, but also for the more important figures in botany, that James Britten and George E.S.Boulger collaborated in a series of regular instalments in the Journal of Botany from 1888 to 1891, which were revised and published in 1893 as A Biographical Index of British and Irish Botanists. Its compilers intended it "mainly as a guide to further information, and not as a bibliography or biography". Its proven value as a work of reference encouraged A.B.Rendle of The Natural History Museum to revise it in 1931. He preserved the conciseness of the original work which he enlarged from 1825 entries to over 2700. In this revision of the 1931 edition the number of entries has been almost quadrupled. This has been achieved not only by scanning books and periodicals published up to 1975, but also by substantially enlarging the scope of the work. Rendle admitted he found it "hard to draw a line of exclusion especially on the side of horticulture and in dealing with plant collectors". He solved his dilemma by rigorously excluding horticulturists. I have not sought to make such distinctions, and so for the first time nurserymen, gardeners and horticultural writers join botanists, plant collectors and botanical artists. All recipients of the Victoria Medal of Honour awarded by the Royal Horticultural Society have also been included. The entries relate mainly to people born in the British Isles but occasionally other nationals who made significant contributions to British plant science have been added. Some of the entries are brief due to the lack of any further information, but as I know from personal experience even the barest details (merely approximate dates when flourishing and place of residence) can be a useful starting point in research.

The sequence of the data given in the entries follows the pattern established by the previous editions:

- 1. Name (maiden name and title where applicable).
- 2. Dates and places of birth and death.
- 3. Education. Qualifications. Honours. Officership in relevant societies. Brief details of career. Selected publications. Editorship of periodicals.
- 4. Biographical references in books and periodicals.

- 5. Location of plant collections, herbaria, manuscripts, drawings, portraits. Sale of collections.
- 6. Any plant commemorating the individual followed by the abbreviated name of the person responsible for the plant name.

For reasons of economy abbreviations have been used but they are largely confined to the biographical references in books and periodicals. The author's own works are cited in full except for the use of the ubiquitous 'Fl.' for 'Flora'. The Hunt Botanical Library in Pittsburgh is performing a valuable service in assembling a collection of photographs of portraits of botanists. Since copies of all these photographs are readily available on request I thought it would be useful to identify them by the phrase "Portr. at the Hunt Library". The brief statement of the location of plant collections (Cambridge, Kew, Oxford, etc.) usually refers to the botanical institution in the places mentioned. It has not been possible to list all known locations or to confirm that plant collections are still in existence. Some were destroyed during the last war or have been lost through neglect or wilful destruction.

I have been surprised and sometimes confused by the errors that creep into obituaries and biographies. For instance, James Ramsay Drummond was reported by the Journal of Botany and the Kew Bulletin as having been born in Scotland on 13 May 1851; the Proceedings of the Linnean Society however preferred the more romantic setting of a maritime birth off the coast of Madras. There being far too many of these contradictions for me to investigate I must leave it to other research workers to establish the true facts. What is particularly disconcerting is to encounter obituaries of people still very much alive. In September 1912 the Journal of Botany lamented the demise of the eminent mycologist, Dr Mordecai Cooke on 3 July. The Kew Bulletin which had reported that he had peacefully passed away at his residence on 19 August 1912 announced sheepishly in a later issue that it gave them "much pleasure to learn from Dr Cooke himself that he is in excellent health". Dr Cooke, who had this dubious pleasure of reading his own obituary, defiantly survived the shock for another two years. I have always given the facts as recorded, correcting them when I knew them to be wrong. Errors there must be but even the august Dictionary of National Biography is not without blemishes.

The Subject Index is a new feature classifying many of the entries under profession, plants or the country where the flora has been studied and collected. The chronological arrangement under each heading could serve as a useful introduction to the study of the historical development of a discipline, profession or trade. I also thought it would be of some interest to list English botanists and nurserymen under counties (the new administrative counties have not been adopted in this book).

I have spent the best part of eight years scanning books and long runs of periodicals to collect the raw material for this book. I believe I have searched most of the important published sources of information, but a number of marginal books and periodicals have not been consulted simply because there was not sufficient time to do so. Also unfortunately two major works, J. Harvey's *Early Nurserymen* (Phillimore, 1974 [1975]) and Miss B. Henrey's *British Botanical and Horticultural Literature before 1800* (Oxford University Press, 1975, 3 vols), appeared too late for consultation. Nevertheless I hope this new compilation will eventually prove to be indispensable for historians working in the fields of British botany, horticulture, botanical art and local history.

I wish to acknowledge my indebtedness to Mr. J. Harvey with whom I have exchanged information on nurserymen over a number of years. He has generously supplied me with details of many early nurserymen which he has obtained from scanning contemporary trade directories. Professor J. Ewan, Dr G. Ainsworth, Mr. B. Bolt, Mr G. Claxton, Mr R. Davidge, Mr D. Kent, Miss S. Raphael, Dr W.T. Stearn, Dr T.D. Whittet, Mrs S. Wickens and many others have kindly provided me with references. Above all I must thank my wife without whose patience and encouragement the work would never have been completed.



Historical Introduction

In the Linnaean dissertation Flora Anglica publicly defended at Uppsala on 3 April 1754 by a student I. A. Grufberg, who may have done little more towards its production than pay for the printing, Linnaeus stated that, whereas at the beginning of the previous century the English nation seemed little suited, indeed alien, to the study of botany, it had produced by the end of that century as many botanists as the whole of the rest of Europe. Moreover they had studied the plants not only of Britain but of the Indies. He listed 25 who had contributed to the study of the British flora as enumerated in John Ray's Synopsis methodica Stirpium Britannicarm (3rd ed., revised and enlarged by Dillenius; 1724) which was long the best guide to British plants. In fact Ray and Dillenius named at least 42 contributors, without including such notable predecessors as William Turner, John Gerard and Thomas Johnson. Whether judged by their callings or their social standing, these cooperative enthusiasts for plants were a motley crowd; among them were apothecaries such as Samuel Dale, Samuel Doody, James Petiver and Isaac Rand, physicians such as John Martyn, Charles Preston, Richard Richardson, Robert Sibbald and Hans Sloane, antiquaries such as Edward Lhwyd and Robert Plot, clergymen such as Adam Buddle, Thomas Lawson and John Ray, gardeners such as Jacob Bobart and Thomas Knowlton, merchants such as Joseph Dandridge and Charles Dubois, soldiers such as Gedeon Bonnivert and Thomas Willisel and a writer with such miscellaneous interests as John Aubrey. Some like Dubois, the Sherards and Sloane became very rich, some such as Willisel and Lhwyd remained always poor. Ray, Willisel and Lhwyd made long and extensive herborising journeys, others did not go far afield but recorded the plants of their immediate neighbourhood. Indeed all they seem to have had in common was their enthusiastic interest in the plants of Britain.

This interest had grown slowly since the 16th century when William Turner published his Libellus de Re Herbaria (1538), his Names of Herbes (1548) and his New Herball (1551-1568). It had its origin in the study of plants for medicinal purposes, a study which can be traced back to the herbalists of Ancient Greece. This accounts for the large number of medical men recorded in Britten and Boulger's Biographical Index of British and Irish Botanists (1891) and the present work. Turner's remark that he was "unworthy to act as a bottle-washer to the most learned Doctor Clement" indicates the existence of others in the 16th century who were equally interested although they published nothing. Without a continuously growing body of people united by such an interest, Turner, Ray and others would have published in vain. Physicians and apothecaries and indeed clergymen, who then and much later "grudged no personal fatigue to attend the sick-bed of the peasant, in the double capacity of physician and priest", as was said of George Crabbe, had a professional interest in plants for their uses, but there were undoubtedly many others whose interest sprang purely from delight in the beauty and diversity of flower and leaf. Ray himself recorded that he began his study of plants at Cambridge in 1650 when convalescence after illness gave him leisure to observe in detail "the cunning craftmanship of nature" manifested in the wild plants of Cambridgeshire. Gardeners too had a professional interest in distinguishing the kinds of plants. What they all needed were practical classifications and convenient

names, but to achieve these demanded not only much ingenuity but also a much more intimate knowledge of plants than anyone could then acquire; not until the 19th century did the microscope in vastly improved forms come to importance for such studies. The procedure in making a classification is to group plants according to their major resemblances and then to name them as members of the groups thus formed; defining such groups has always been the chief difficulty in creating acceptable lasting systems. The change from Turner's essentially alphabetical arrangement of 1538-1568, by way of John Gerard's essentially utilitarian one of 1597 with "all sorts of herbes for meate, medicine or sweet smelling use" grouped together, to Ray's scientific one of 1698 with dicotyledons and monocotyledons separated as major groups, was a lengthy and gradual process with its further development interrupted in the 18th century by the success of Linnaeus's convenient but admittedly artificial "sexual system". Every new system called for further observation of characters to which little attention or emphasis had been given before; thus the foundations for yet other systems, of which Bentham and Hooker's in the 19th century was the most influential for the English-speaking world, became broader and more solid and this affected botany as a whole. Botany is coordinated systematic knowledge of the plant kingdom; thus it covers not only what plants are but what they do, in other words, their physiology, ecology and distribution as well as their morphology, anatomy, biochemistry, cytology and genetics; all provide some information which a taxonomist can use. To such knowledge the amateur and the professional, the gardener and the botanist can contribute and indeed in Britain have often jointly contributed.

The distinctions now made in our age of specialisation between different kinds of botanists and horticulturists, sometimes with very invidious results, become meaningless when applied to their predecessors. Thus Gerard (1545-1612) was a barbersurgeon, a herbalist and a gardener. The present Dictionary unlike its predecessors, Britten & Boulger's Biographical Index, of 1893 and 1931, has not attempted to distinguish between botanists and horticulturists by excluding the latter. With a liberality of approach, which has immensely increased the labour of its compiler and has equally increased the reference value of the book, it includes them all, nurserymen and seedsmen along with botanical professors. An intermediate group, the gardener-botanists, including A. H. Haworth, William Herbert, George Maw, H. J. Elwes, W. R. Dykes and E. A. Bowles, has made outstanding contributions to knowledge of such groups as succulent plants and petaloid monocotyledons, e.g. Crocus, Iris and Lilium, which cannot be understood from herbarium material alone. Moreover a number of distinguished botanists, such as W. B. Hemsley, R. A. Rolfe, E. H. Wilson and John Hutchinson, began their careers as working gardeners. Philip Miller was professionally a gardener all his life but the lasting importance of his great Gardeners Dictionary rests upon its botanical content. Botany and horticulture played equal parts in the astonishing career of John Lindley. Because of their botanical interests such men have gained places in reference works, but contemporary nurserymen and seedsmen, despite their importance for the spread and maintenance of horticulture, have until now lacked any comprehensive listing. One of the especial merits of the present Dictionary is that it brings them together for the first time. By coming down to 1975 and thus covering the very fruitful 19th century, it supplements Blanche Henrey's elaborate three-volume British Botanical and Horticultural Literature before 1800 (1975).

A biographical dictionary with its entries alphabetically arranged for convenient reference cannot, of course, by itself give any impression of the continuous growth and achievements of botany and gardening in the British Isles but the subject index added to the present work, with entries in chronological order, will provide valuable guidance to anyone investigating its subjects historically. The entries in their turn provide concise guides to widely scattered biographical and bibliographical information never before so thoroughly correlated and indexed. The general history of a subject can thus be built out of these records of the labours of the individuals who forwarded it. For taxonomic botanists, whose labours are of necessity historically based and dependent upon those of their predecessors, since the number of plants in the world is far too great for any one generation to be able to describe and classify them anew, the Dictionary has practical utility by indicating not only the major publications of authors but also the location of their herbaria and manuscripts. Such information is indeed internationally important. Linnaeus, as mentioned above, referred to the interest of British botanists not only in the plants of the British Isles but also in the Indies. There is now hardly a region of the world to which they have not paid attention in floristic or monographic studies or else have visited and made collections.

British botany has indeed had an international aspect from its beginning and has never been isolated from the mainstream of European botanical learning. The "father of British botany", William Turner (d. 1568), has twice to leave England for his personal safety in periods of lethal religious persecution; during his exile, however, he profited by travel in Germany, Italy, Switzerland and the Low Countries, by study under Italian teachers of such importance as Brasavola at Ferrara and Ghini at Bologna and by friendship with Fuchs, Gessner and Valerius Cordus. The effect of this Continental experience is evident in his publications from 1548 onwards: thus of one plant he remarked "I have sene it in east Freslande [Friesland] by the sea syde", of another "it groweth very little in Englande that I have sene, but about Bon [Bonn] it groweth in many hedges by the vineyards", of another "it groweth in gardines in Bonony [Bologna]", of yet another "it is very much in highe Germany besyde Embis [Ems] bath, and besyde S. Goweris [St. Goarl". Turner's Names and Herball abound with such references to the Continental occurrence of plants based upon his own observation. "I wente", he wrote, "into Italye and into diverse partes of Germany to knowe and se the herbes my selfe and to knowe by practise their powers and workinge not trusting onlye to the olde herbe wives and apothecaryes (as many Physicianes have done of late yeres) but in the mater of simples myne owne eyes and knowledge". Ray's Continental travels in the 18th century took him even further and gave him a much wider and more detailed knowledge of European plants. Continuance of such a British interest in the European flora, often resulting from holiday travel, led to the inception at Leicester in 1956 of the Flora Europaea project. This has proved a very successful international cooperative undertaking to which, for volumes 1-4 (1964-1976) including all the vascular cryptogams, gymnosperms and dicotyledons, 149 botanists representing 27 countries have contributed; of these Great Britain has provided 62 contributors, followed by Germany with 10, Austria with 9, Czechoslovakia with 7, the others with 1 to 5.

The overseas expansion of the British people by trading, settlement, conquest and colonisation from the early 17th century onwards led to the

introduction of many exotic plants into British and thence into Continental gardens and was reflected in an increase of botanical and horticultural literature. This took many forms, from concise octavo lists of plants in botanic gardens, such as Bobart's Oxford catalogue of 1648 and Sutherland's Edinburgh catalogue of 1683, to the great comprehensive folio works of Morison and Ray late in the 17th century, followed by the many editions of Miller's Gardeners Dictionary in the 18th century. Miller's works are valuable not only for recording the plants in cultivation in Britain, which more than doubled during the 18th century but also for accounts of the techniques of their cultivation. Botanical exploration in the British Isles and overseas also provided the material and the stimulus for Floras, i.e. works devoted to listing the plants of a given area and often indeed describing and illustrating them. Among the most impressive examples of these are Sloane's Voyage to the Islands Madera etc. (1707-1725), which includes the natural history of Jamaica, in the 18th century and Sibthorp and Smith's Flora Graeca (1806-1840) in the 19th century. During the 19th century the efforts of local almost entirely amateur botanists resulted in a succession of county Floras, which have made the flora of the British Isles the best-documented one in Europe. Thus by the time of his death in 1974 N. D. Simpson had collected a library of over 6000 books relating to British and Irish plants. His Bibliographical Index of the British Flora (1960) has some 65 000 entries. Outside the British Isles, the economic and scientific needs of the expanding 19th-century British Empire resulted in the production of colonial Floras, the most extensive being Bentham's Flora Australiensis (1863-1878) and J. D. Hooker's Flora of British India (1872-1897) based for the most part on herbarium material accumulated at the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew. During the first half of the 19th century, many botanists, either for research purposes or the satisfaction given by collecting, assembled large private herbaria. During the second half of the century, such collections passed more and more into the keeping of institutions. This transfer of herbaria from private to public ownership and responsibility is discussed in Natural History Auctions 1700-1972; a Register of Sales in the British Isles (1976) edited by J. M. Chalmers-Hunt. Wherever known the present location of these collections is indicated in the Dictionary.

Since modern botany grew out of the study of medicinal plants, for which correct identification was essential, matters of classification and nomenclature accordingly formed the major part of botanical activity throughout Europe well into the 19th century until progress in other disciplines, particularly chemistry, made possible physiological investigations; at the same time the development of microscopes and staining techniques provided adequate tools for anatomical and cytological work. Towards the end of the 19th century in Britain and elsewhere the supremacy of taxonomic work gave place in academic esteem, though hardly in achievement, to these more stimulating new fields which had grown so lustily in Germany with its numerous mostly small universities providing scope for academic diversity and innovation. Their effect on botany in British universities was profound. As F. O. Bower (1855-1948) wrote in his autobiographical *Sixty Years of Botany in Britain (1875-1935)*,

"at the middle of the nineteenth century British botany was marked by strange contrasts. It witnessed the production by its seniors of descriptive works of fundamental importance, such as the *Species filicum* and the *Genera plantarum*; overshadowing all was the *Origin of species*. But up to 1875 the universities almost

entirely failed to train students who as juniors should be preparing to take the place of the veteran authors. Moreover it was collecting, classifying and recording that were the order of the day; while anatomy, physiology and the study of the complete life-cycle, especially in the lower forms, were given only a minor place in the university curricula, if indeed they were not wholly neglected. It seems strange now to look back upon the deadness of botanical teaching in the universities in the years prior to 1875, though this was a period of extreme brilliance of individual production; read the *Life and Letters* of Darwin, Hooker and Huxley, books which reveal the intense personal activity of these giants."

To the younger British academic botanists in the 1870s, publications coming from Germany revealed fascinating new fields of enquiry; they quickly learned, as Robert Brown had been well aware so much earlier when in 1800 he was industriously studying the genders of German nouns at breakfast time, "knowledge of German was essential for the pursuit of botany". Two of the most brilliant teachers and investigators were Anton de Bary (1831-1888), professor of botany from 1872 to 1888 at Strassburg (Strasbourg), and Julius Sachs (1832-1897), professor of botany from 1866 to 1897 at Wurzburg. To their laboratories in the 1870s and 1880s went from Oxford and Cambridge a succession of promising young men, notably S. H. Vines, Francis Darwin, F. O. Bower, Walter Gardiner, D. H. Scott and Marshall Ward, who later introduced new attitudes, some of them long-lastingly detrimental to taxonomic teaching in England, new fields of enquiry and new research methods and techniques to Oxford, Cambridge, Glasgow and Kew. They had little time or interest for the "collecting, classifying and recording" of their predecessors in which so many amateur botanists had taken part. The new botany of their new laboratories became less and less open to contributions by amateurs on account of the facilities and specialised knowledge required and the great British tradition of taxonomic botany might almost have perished but for the Royal Botanic Gardens of Kew and Edinburgh and the British Museum (Natural History). However, the separation of laboratory and field work which might have made a great gulf between professional and amateur has fortunately never in Britain become very rigid and, through the development in particular of ecology, has often diminished. Moreover its foremost biological society, the Linnean Society of London founded in 1788, has always welcomed both in its promotion of natural history. It was possible for J. Reynolds Green to provide in 1914 A History of Botany in the United Kingdom from the earliest Times to the End of the 19th Century which gave a reasonably detailed view of the progress in all botanical disciplines in the British Isles. Now each discipline requires its own history. Through the references in the Dictionary specialist historians of both botany and horticulture can trace their way backwards to earlier and firsthand sources of information.

In 1863 Berthold Carl Seemann, an extraordinarily enterprising German botanist over many years in the service of the British Government as naturalist on exploring voyages, founded *The Journal of Botany British and Foreign*. The inclusion of the words "British and Foreign" in its title is significant. The word "British" was a tribute to the need of amateur botanists concerned with British plants to have a medium for publication. The word "Foreign" indicated a breadth of coverage more suited to the professional botanist. Until its much regretted and certainly avoidable death in 1945 the *Journal of Botany* provided convenient and

esteemed means of publishing biographical and bibliographical as well as botanical information of great diversity, although primarily taxonomic; for amateur and professional alike, it indeed "filled a position which, even now, is covered by no other periodical". The list of contributors to volume 1 (1863) includes many distinguished names, among those who were then amateurs being J. G. Baker, then a draper, later Keeper of the Herbarium of the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew, and James Britten (1846-1924), then apparently a medical student, later Senior Assistant in the Department of Botany, British Museum (Natural History) and from 1880 until 1924 editor of the Journal of Botany itself. Although a competent botanist "with a good eye for plants and a wonderful memory", Britten was above all interested in the bibliographical and biographical side of botany. His interests coincided in this with those of the many-sided George Simonds Boulger (1853-1922), at first professor of natural history at the Royal Agricultural College, Cirencester, later professor of botany at the City of London College, and the author of well-prepared "solid and good" books on trees, wood, elementary geology and British wild plants. Both felt the need in the 1880s of "some reference-list of byegone workers in Botany". After several years of preparation they began the publication of their biographical list in the Journal of Botany in 1888 and completed this in 1891. It included 1619 names. In 1893 they issued it in book form as A Biographical Index of British and Irish Botanists with 1825 names, their aim being to include "all who have in any way contributed to the literature of Botany, who have made scientific collections of plants, or have otherwise assisted directly in the progress of Botany, exclusive of pure Horticulture". They issued supplements in 1899, 1905 and 1908, but never lived to produce the contemplated new edition, for which however Britten bequeathed money in his will towards the cost of printing. Edited by A. B. Rendle, after his retirement as Keeper of Botany in the British Museum (Natural History), the second edition appeared in 1931 with about 2700 names. The present work has more than 8000 entries, many of them more detailed than their predecessors.

Much side information can be gleaned from these entries even as they stand, e.g. the longevity of botanists in different fields. To take successive Keepers of the Kew Herbarium, Daniel Oliver (1830-1916) died at the age of 85, J. G. Baker (1834-1920) at 86, W. B. Hemsley (1843-1924) at 80, O. Stapf (1859-1933) at 76, A. D. Cotton (1879-1962) at 82 and W. B. Turrill (1890-1961) at 71. A more healthy appointment would seem to be that of Director of the Singapore Botanic Garden, H. W. Ridley (1855-1956) dying at the age of 100, I. H. Burkill (1870-1965) at 94, and their successor Eric Holttum (b.1895) celebrating his 81st birthday in 1976 and publishing six pteridological papers this year.

The achievements of the present rest upon the achievements of the past to a much greater extent than is commonly appreciated and can often only be understood in relation to them. For those who would learn about the British and Irish botanists and gardeners, men and women, amateurs and professionals, who by their collective endeavours over four centuries have gathered the specimens preserved in the herbaria of the British Isles, have introduced, maintained and propagated the many plants grown in these islands, have written and illustrated innumerable books and articles about them and the plants of other lands, have made notable contributions to paleobotany and the manifold other disciplines of modern botany, for all such enquirers the brief records of their lives and achievements in this *Dictionary* will be found an indispensable time-saving guide often leading to

obscure sources of information which otherwise could be traced with difficulty or not at all. Its scope is, however, far from being insular. Names familiar to workers on the plants of Canada, the United States, the West Indies, southern Africa, India, Malaya, Australia, New Zealand and China as the names of collectors or investigators occur throughout its pages. It should accordingly be destined for as much or more wear and tear by grateful users as its predecessors of 1893 and 1931.
