Tour Summary

Ghana is not only the premier birding destination in West Africa, but also one of the finest countries to visit on the entire continent. Our comprehensive tour travelled the entire length of the country from coastal lagoons in the south to the White Volta River and adjacent Sahelian savannas in the far north at the border with Burkina Faso. In between, we visited the diverse rainforest of Kakum National Park, the endless woodland and savanna of the pristine Mole National Park, and of course made a stop at the world-famous hill forest near the village of Bonkro to see one of the star birds of the entire region. The Shai Hills, Bobiri Forest, and our final location of the tour, the remote Atewa Forest also added immensely to our list. The top three birds as chosen by participants offer a great overview of Ghana's special and diverse avifauna. Number one was the unique White-necked Rockfowl and after a patient wait, we enjoyed an incredible experience as three of these mythical birds hopped around right in front of us. Number two was the stunning Violet Turaco, which revealed itself at the last minute and offered incredible views. The third choice was the one-of-a-kind Egyptian Plover and the main reason for traveling north. We encountered half-a-dozen of this monotypic species, including scope views for as long as we wanted. Honorable mentions went to Rufous-sided Broadbill, Black-bellied Seedcracker, Abyssinian Roller, Chocolate-backed Kingfisher, White-spotted Flufftail, Black Bee-eater, Guinea Turaco, Pygmy Sunbird, West African Seedeater, and Preuss's Weaver. While the birding was challenging at times, we managed to record an astounding 437 species, including several rangerestricted species and specialties. Overall, the weather cooperated, we got to enjoy the famous Kakum National Park canopy walkway, saw a varied cross-section of West African landscapes, and most important of all, had a great time.

Tour in Detail

While some had arrived early, we met officially for the first dinner at the comfortable Erata Hotel in Accra, Ghana's busy and overflowing capital. We enjoyed the first meal together and talked about the plans for the upcoming two weeks.

Our first outing in Ghana took us to the Shai Hills Resource Reserve and we left very early, reaching the entrance road just after sunrise. The Shai Hills offer a great mix of habitats, including rocky outcrops, dense riparian forest, woodland, and grassland. We spent a full and productive morning here, seeing several specialties. Some of the highlights included Stone Partridge, Double-spurred Francolin, Red-eyed, Vinaceous and Bluespotted Wood Doves, Guinea Turaco, Western Plantain-eater, Senegal Coucal,

Mottled Spinetail, and Little and African Palm Swifts. A Long-crested Eagle was a surprise and welcome find, but a locally rare African Barred Owlet remained heard only. A Striped Kingfisher was seen early on and colorful Blue-bellied Rollers had us exiting the vehicle quickly for tremendous scope views, while a single Purple Roller was found later, just outside the park. Both, Yellow-rumped and Yellow-fronted Tinkerbirds showed close and well and Senegal Parrots flew over. We also got a head start on the variety

of cisticolas found in Ghana with Singing, Croaking, and Short-winged all seen well. We also noted a few Palearctic migrants with Spotted and European Pied Flycatchers and Whinchat all seen well. One of

the Shai Hill's specialties is the White-crowned Cliff Chat and upon reaching the right habitat it only took a few moments before we had a pair in the scope. The same area also held a few Rock Martins that circled in front of the cliff face. In addition, we found Simple Greenbul, Common Bulbul, Violet-backed Starling, African Thrush, Pale Flycatcher, Northern Black Flycatcher, Splendid and Copper Sunbirds, Village Weaver, Yellow-mantled Widowbird, Orange-cheeked Waxbill, Bronze Mannikin, African Pied Wagtail, Plain-backed Pipit, and Yellow-fronted Canary. We kept a careful eye on the grassland during the drive out and located a pair of Flappet Larks, the only ones of the tour. We then continued to lunch at a restaurant along the banks of the mighty Volta River and before settling in for a delicious meal, we tracked down a pair of Mangrove Sunbirds at their nest, a very localized species. After lunch, we carried on towards the Kpong Wetlands where we made a short stop and quickly added new species to the list. Foremost was the beautiful White-bibbed Swallow that perched on one of the anchored boats. Other good finds included many Ethiopian Swallows and a Winding Cisticola trilling away in the reeds

that showed well in the scope. The final location for the day was the productive Sakumono Lagoon right along Ghana's coastline and the late afternoon here was very exciting with new species appearing every few minutes and giving our first day a huge boost, pushing the list past one hundred species. The shallows and muddy margins hosted several resident and migrant shorebirds, including Black-winged Stilt, Blackbellied Plover, Spur-winged and Wattled Lapwings, Common Ringed Plover, a cooperative pair of

Greater Painted-Snipes, Whimbrel, Blacktailed Godwit, Ruddy Turnstone, Curlew Sandpiper, Common Snipe, Common Sandpiper, Common Greenshank, and Marsh and Wood Sandpipers. Royal Terns flew along the oceanside while a single, distant Black Tern was more unexpected. Α helicopter doing maneuvers nearby kicked up around sixty Collared Pratincoles that offered great views as the flock swirled in front of us. Herons and egrets stalked through the marsh and included Grey and Purple Herons, Great, Intermediate, and Little Egrets, Western Reef Heron, Cattle Egret, and Squacco Heron. Two Western Yellow Wagtails and a Yellowthroated Longclaw in flight rounded out the first day. We then tackled the traffic as we made our way back into the city, arriving in time for a celebratory dinner after a successful first day.

We began early, eating a quick breakfast at the hotel, and then loaded the vehicle for the drive to Kakum National Park. Of course, we had several stops in mind. At first, we beat the traffic, but as we neared our first birding location at Winneba, the road narrowed, and progress was at a snail's pace. Fortunately, we

still reached the Winneba Plains in time and enjoyed a full morning of excellent birding here, seeing several species we would not find elsewhere. Some of the best sightings included African Pygmy and Woodland Kingfishers, White-throated Bee-eater. Vieillot's and Double-toothed Barbets, and Eurasian Hobby, the latter a very rare bird in Ghana. Incredibly, a pair of African Hobbies circled above us almost at the same time as we discovered the Eurasian Hobby for great comparisons. We also tracked down Blackcrowned Tchagra, Yellow-crowned Gonolek, Sulphur-breasted Bushshrike, and Moustached Grass Warbler. Walking away

from the main track, we eventually found a vocal family of Red-winged Warblers, but best of all were no less than four Oriole Warblers, one of the country's most beautiful birds, that emerged from a thicket to perch in an open bush for enough time to get the scope on them. What a find right before we had to leave the spot. We then carried on to the Cape Coast where we paused for lunch, after a quick stop in the town of Mankessim to admire a small colony of Slender-billed Weavers. We also saw several House Sparrows, a recent arrival to Ghana and a species that appears to be spreading. We carried on towards Kakum National Park and in order to continue with the theme of uncommon weavers at their colonies, we stopped at the Hans Cottage Botel where a small colony of Orange Weavers was present near a much larger colony of Village Weavers. We then checked in at the comfortable Rainforest Lodge and after a short break carried on, to do some initial birding on the edges of Kakum National Park, birding the farm bush and forest patches along the Abrafo Road. The first stop kept us busy and we didn't have to move

for nearly thirty minutes as new birds dropped in all around us. Some of the best finds included African Green Pigeons, Diederik, Klaas's and African Emerald Cuckoos, all offering perched views with the former two showing on the same branch! Circling above us, we found two Mottled Spinetails among the scores of Common and Little Swifts. We could barely keep up with the many new additions and while we only covered a few hundred metres along the dirt road, we added African Harrier-Hawk, African Pied and Piping Hornbills, Black Bee-eater, Nakedfaced Barbet, Speckled and Yellow-throated Tinkerbirds, Yellow-spotted Barbet, Black-

winged Oriole, Fanti Drongo, Red-bellied Paradise Flycatcher, Grey-backed and Yellow-browed Camaropteras, Tawny-flanked Prinia, Red-faced Cisticola, Lesser Striped and Mosque Swallows, Fanti Saw-wing, Common Bulbul, Northern Yellow White-eye, Splendid Starling, Collared, Blue-throated Brown, Buff-throated, Olive-bellied and Superb Sunbirds, Black-necked and Vieillot's Black Weavers,

Grey-headed Nigrita, African Firefinch, Bronze Mannikin, and Pin-tailed Whydah. With our heads spinning from such a diversity of birds, we returned to the hotel for a well-earned dinner.

This day was definitely one of the best of the tour since we spent most of it on the famous Kakum National Park canopy walkway. This walkway allowed us good vistas of the forest canopy and distant forest edge. We left early in the morning and drove to the park entrance and then hiked to the canopy walkway where we remained for the rest of the morning. Cloudy conditions kept the temperatures relatively comfortable and nonstop bird activity kept us busy. From the elevated platform we could study canopy species in detail and enjoyed a long list of highlights. Some of the best finds included Blue Malkohas in the open, Palm-nut Vulture, European Honey Buzzard, and African Cuckoo-Hawk all flying past, White-headed

and Forest Woodhoopoes, brief White-crested Hornbill, Bristle-nosed Barbet, Melancholy and Firebellied Woodpeckers, Violet-backed Hyliota, Green Crombec, good views of Sharpe's Apalis, a regional endemic, confiding Ussher's Flycatcher, Little Green, Grey-chinned, Olive, Tiny, Johanna's and Superb

Sunbirds, Red-headed Malimbe, Yellowmantled and Maxwell's Black Weavers, and Grey-headed and White-breasted Nigritas. The canopy was also busy with greenbuls and we located Slender-billed, Golden, and Spotted. After descending from the canopy walkway, we bumped into a busy feeding flock along the trail which included Brownthroated and West African Wattle-eves. Grevand headed Bristlebill. White-throated Greenbul. Near the park's visitor center, we found a Tit Hylia at an active nest and enjoyed superb views of one of Africa's smallest songbirds. Back at the lodge, we found an active Magpie Mannikin nest, another local species. After lunch and a bit of rest, we returned to the canopy walkway for the late afternoon. It was much quieter, but two star birds made the effort worthwhile. First, we spotted a Long-tailed Hawk that showed well in the scope and minutes later, the same tree

held a male Brown-cheeked Hornbill, another regional endemic. We waited until dusk on the platform in order to look for nocturnal species, but a storm was fast approaching. We left the walkway in time, but the storm caught up with us as we hiked back to the entrance station. The deluge was a first-hand experience why Kakum is a true rainforest. Upon returning to the lodge, we hung up clothes, changed into something dry, and enjoyed dinner.

This morning, we drove towards the northern sector of Kakum National Park, where we spent time exploring forest patches and farm scrub alongside roads and sandy tracks. We made a few stops along

the way towards the main birding site and found Tambourine Dove, Black-throated Coucal, and a cooperative White-spotted Flufftail. Once we reached the Antwikwaa area, we added a perched Red-chested Goshawk, Yellow-billed Barbet at a nest cavity, Grey Kestrel, Black-and-white Shrike-flycatchers, a reluctant Kemp's Longbill, excellent views of Rufous-crowned Eremomela, Swamp Palm Bulbul, and many Black-and-white Mannikins. Once the morning warmed up, we headed back to the vehicle and drove to the Pra River. Here, we carefully scanned the banks and bridge pylons and although the water levels were very high, we spotted several Rock Pratincoles, White-bibbed Swallows, and a

single Cassin's Flycatcher, the latter a rarely encountered species on this itinerary. A quick stop at a small bridge got us hundreds of Preuss's Cliff Swallows near their colony. In the evening, we returned to the entrance area of Kakum National Park and after a near miss found an Akun Eagle-Owl wonderfully perched on a telephone post.

For the final full day in Kakum National Park, we returned to the Abrafo Forest area with several excellent targets in mind and we did very well. Some of the highlights included a vocal Olive Long-tailed Cuckoo seen by most of us, Buff-spotted Woodpecker, a displaying Rufous-sided Broadbill, Red-cheeked Wattle-eye, Lemon-bellied Crombec, Grey Longbill, Green Hylia, Olive-green Camaroptera, Red-tailed Greenbul, skulky Puvel's Illadopsis, Green-headed Sunbird, and an incredible trio of malimbes Redvented. Blue-billed and Crested Malimbes. and secretive Western Bluebill for some. We then walked further into the farm scrub and found an immense flock of beautiful Rosy Bee-eaters, this species is a non-breeding

visitor and prefers specific trees for roosting. It was quite the sight in the scope as dozens of these colorful birds lit up the canopy. In the afternoon, we checked forest patches and farm scrub along the Stingless Bee Center Road and were able to find Blue-headed Crested-Flycatcher that revealed itself to most,

Yellow-whiskered and Little Greenbuls, and had fantastic views of the incomparable Black-bellied Seedcracker for another excellent finish to the day.

With plans to continue towards Kumasi in the center of the country and a stop at the famous Bonkro village along the way, we only had limited time to bird in the morning. We decided to return to the Stingless Bee Center Road in order to improve on some of the species we had only glimpsed the previous

day and to see what we could add to the already impressive list. New finds included Blue-headed Coucal and White-throated Greenbul, while most of us had improved views of Buff-spotted Woodpecker, Redcheeked Wattle-eye, Puvel's Illadopsis, Bluebilled Malimbe, and Western Bluebill. We then returned to the lodge, packed up, and started the lengthy drive north. We stopped for lunch along the way before continuing to the remote village of Bonkro. The area hit the spotlight after the discovery of several colonies of White-necked Rockfowl in the nearby forest. This species was believed extinct in Ghana until it's rediscovery and was now reliably seen with the help of local

guides near Bonkro. We started the hike into the hill forest during the early afternoon. We tackled the trek quickly and soon found ourselves at a rocky overhang in the middle of tall, dense rainforest. After admiring the cup shaped mud nest plastered to the rock wall, we took seats in order to wait quietly for the rockfowl to appear. It was a sunny afternoon and it took two hours of patient waiting, but suddenly a single rockfowl appeared quietly, perching in view for just a moment. We all scanned carefully around us and eventually three birds emerged from the dark forest, sitting in the open very close, preening and foraging, with one bird even hopping along the base of the overhanging rock right in front of us. We could not have asked for better views and after we all had chances to study these prehistoric birds in

detail and got some photos, we started the walk back to the vehicle. We reached the edge of the forest before dark and then continued the drive towards Kumasi where we arrived at our hotel just in time for dinner.

We again packed up early, had a quick breakfast, and drove out of Kumasi mostly before the heavy traffic started. Our first stop was along the entrance road towards the Opro Forest and we were able to bird here for several hours. The open woodland and savanna type habitat yielded a few new species and highlights. Here we were able to

add Red-necked Buzzard, African Grey Woodpecker, Northern Puffback, and seldom recorded Redheaded Quelea. We also spent considerable time tracking down a few skulky species, most notably Snowy-crowned Robin-Chat and the neat Forest Robin, both of which showed well, while the very rare Forest Scrub-Robin was mainly seen in flight. We returned to the main road and carried on with the journey north. The habitat changed from green farm bush and forest to more open savanna. Along the way, we kept a careful watch for raptors and were rewarded with excellent views of Beaudouin's Snake Eagle, Dark Chanting Goshawk, Grasshopper Buzzard, and Western Marsh Harrier. The sought-after

snake eagle showed well in particular with an adult bird perched on a pylon in perfect light, offering great scope studies. We reached the turnoff towards Mole National Park in the late afternoon and made a quick stop at Busunu Pond. We quickly added several species to the list, enjoying great views of White-faced Whistling Duck, Speckled Pigeon, Bruce's Green Pigeon, the only Green Sandpipers of the tour, Black-headed Heron, Malachite Kingfisher, Piapiac, and an unexpected Gosling's Bunting. A great introduction to the birding we had ahead of us for the next two days. We tackled the rest of the distance and arrived at the lodge in Mole National Park in time for dinner.

The lodge in Mole National Park is beautifully situated atop a bluff overlooking wetlands, an elephant wallow, and the endless woodland beyond. After breakfast, we had to make a quick scan from the viewpoint and added several species, including Spur-winged Goose, Helmeted Guineafowl, Senegal

Thick-knee, several Woolly-necked Storks, the first Hamerkop, and Hadada Ibis. We then boarded the vehicle in order to explore the savanna along the extensive road system, focusing on the Samole Loop. Soon, we bumped into lots of bird activity and a large feeding flock. Here we found Black-billed Wood Dove, Pearlspotted Owlet, Green Woodhoopoe, scarce Black Scimitarbill, Northern Red-billed Hornbill, abundant Red-throated Bee-eaters, colorful Abyssinian and Broad-billed Rollers, Bearded Barbet, Lesser Honeyguide, great views of Finespotted Woodpecker, White-breasted and Redshouldered Cuckooshrikes, African Golden Oriole. Senegal White-crested Batis. Helmetshrike, White-shouldered Black Tit, Chestnut-backed Sparrow-Lark, the localized Sun Lark, Senegal Eremomela, Rufous Cisticola, Long-tailed Glossy, Lesser Blue-eared and Purple Starlings. The grassy margins and woodland openings held many seed eating

finches and weavers, including Chestnut-crowned Sparrow-Weaver, Red-headed and Little Weavers, uncommon Lavender Waxbill, pleasantly common Red-cheeked Cordonbleu, rare Red-winged Pytilia, and Red-billed and Bar-breasted Firefinches. A stop at a productive pond and its surrounding dense woodland yielded Levaillant's Cuckoo, a surprise Pallid Swift, Wire-tailed Swallow, habitat specific

Swamp Flycatcher, and a stunning trio of sunbirds with good views of Pygmy, Scarlet-chested and Beautiful Sunbirds. In the afternoon, we returned to the same stretch of road and systematically looked

for some of our target species and successfully located Stone Partridge, Doublespurred Francolin, a family group of much wanted Abyssinian Ground Hornbills, after a dedicated search a pair of Brown-backed Woodpeckers, Brubru, and the infrequently encountered Pied-winged Swallow. A pair of West African Seedeaters was a truly rare find and we had excellent views as the male sang right in front of us. Mole National Park also harbors a great diversity of raptors and careful scanning of the sky and some dedicated watching from the lodge area in the early afternoon got us onto African Harrier-Hawk, Palm-nut Vulture, African Cuckoo-Hawk, White-headed, Hooded and White-backed Vultures, many Bateleur, Brown Snake Eagle, Yellow-billed Kite, and locally rare African Fish Eagles with two immature birds right in front of the lodge. In the evening, we set out to an area of open ground and quickly

found half a dozen Forbes's Plovers, one of the highlights of the day. Yet, despite the sun going down, the birding was not finished, and we found a pair of Four-banded Sandgrouse that showed close and extremely well in the spotlight and added many Long-tailed Nightjars sitting on the road. A return trip

to the airstrip, resulted in close studies of a cooperative Plain Nightjar and we also found an approachable Greyish Eagle-Owl sitting in the road.

Our second full day in Mole National Park also resulted in a day list well above 100 species and we did focus on a different area of the park. We again spent some time scanning the wetland below the lodge right after breakfast and then continued to the savanna around the airstrip where an early highlight included a White-throated Francolin that crossed the road right in front of us twice! We then set out along a loop road skirting wetlands and passing through riparian forest. Some of the highlights of the

morning's outing included Violet Turaco, Sulphur-breasted and Grey-headed Bushshrikes, Glossybacked Drongo, African Paradise-Flycatcher, African Blue Flycatcher, Yellow-breasted Apalis, West African Swallow, great views of the skulky Blackcap Babbler, and had excellent comparisons between Village and Wilson's Indigobirds. Back at the lodge, we kept an eye to the sky and found a locally rare Alpine Swift while new additions to the raptor tally included locally rare Rüppell's Vulture, Martial Eagle, and a pair of African Hawk-Eagles right above the lodge. During the afternoon, we checked some of the same spots from the previous day and were able to add Eurasian Hoopoe, Melodious Warbler, and had excellent studies of several Black-rumped Waxbills near a waterhole.

It was going to be a long transfer day as we had to drive up north to reach the town of Bolgatanga on the northern border of Ghana. After an early breakfast and packing up, we did squeeze in a productive birding session at the lodge, airstrip, and then along the entrance road to the national park. The lodge ground held the only Familiar Chats of the tour and at the 11th hour a pair of Western Violet-backed Sunbirds showed well. We had several specific targets in mind at the airstrip and did very well, finding a handful of missing species before we left the savannas of Mole National Park behind. We were able to track down Swallow-tailed Bee-eater, another

Brown-backed Woodpecker, a single Dorst's Cisticola after much effort, and vociferous Brown Babblers. We stopped at the Larabanga mosque and had close views of the resident Red-chested Swallows. During the drive towards the main highway, we found a Brown-rumped Bunting at the last possible spot and chanced upon a pair of Violet Turacos that showed very well. The first cooperative Lizard Buzzard perched in a roadside tree and a family group of Yellow-billed Shrikes was fun to watch. Then we turned north on the main road and continued driving into the early afternoon, making a stop at the Nasia River after lunch. A short birding session here harbored many new species and by standing on the bridge, scanning the wetlands and grasses below, we added Black Crake, Black-headed Weaver, Red-billed Quelea, and Yellow-crowned Bishop to the list. Before reaching our lodgings for the night, we made a late afternoon stop at the Tongo Hills and during the final hour of the day here located a pair of Fox

Kestrels, soaring Booted Eagles, scores of Gosling's Buntings, an unexpected Common Rock Thrush, a first for the tour, another White-crowned Cliff Chat, and brief views of the specialized Rock-loving Cisticola that we planned to improve on during a follow-up visit. We then drove a short distance to the hotel to check in and have dinner.

For the only full day in the far north of the country, we planned to head to the White Volta River during the morning to search for the second star bird of the tour, the monotypic Egyptian Plover. We made several stops during the long drive to the river, some planned and others impromptu as new birds

popped up along the roadside. The first stop in a section of farmland yielded excellent views of Great Spotted Cuckoo, Greater Blue-eared, Purple and Bronze-tailed Starlings. We then stopped in a stretch of dry acacia woodland where we walked through the habitat for about two hours and located flighty Black-

headed Lapwing, uncommon Eurasian Wryneck, hoped-for Chestnut-bellied Starling, and localized Speckle-fronted Weaver. Here, we also found a Cut-throat Finch that was tending a nest, a rare species in Ghana and usually not a breeding bird. A roadside Gabar Goshawk chasing a Dark-chanting Goshawk was also new.

Driving towards the river, we stopped in various sections of farmland with scattered trees, adding a few species, including Yellow-billed Oxpecker and White-billed Buffalo Weavers at a colony. We reached the river in the late morning and it took only a few moments of scanning before we had a pair of Egyptian Plovers in the scope and then found at least four more further downstream. We walked along a small path paralleling the river and added Mourning Collared and Namaqua Doves, and fast flying Red-necked Falcon to the list. On the edge of a small wetland, we found Zitting Cisticola, Quailfinch in flight, and a flock of African Silverbills. We drove back to town and our accommodations for lunch and some rest. In the afternoon, we drove in the opposite direction towards Tono Dam. The birding in the afternoon was

quieter, but we still managed to add a pair of roosting Spotted Thick-knees, good views of Little Bee-eaters, glimpses of the localized Black-backed Cisticola, and a locally rare Variable Sunbird. Despite our best efforts, we could not find Quailfinches on the ground, but had many close flight views. We then enjoyed a proper sundowner overlooking the lake from the dam before returning to the hotel for dinner and some well-earned rest.

This would be the longest transfer day as we had to drive from the far north to the central part of Ghana and the city of Kumasi where we would overnight. We were able to squeeze

in a short birding session at the Tongo Hills where we had fabulous views of a pair of Rock-loving Cisticolas that true to form hopped around atop the granite boulders. We also had good views of another Lesser Honeyguide and a Red-necked Falcon zipped past. For the remainder of the day, we drove south with a brief break for lunch, arriving at the hotel in Kumasi just in time for dinner.

An early start ensured that we had a good amount of time to bird the tall forest of the Bobiri Butterfly Sanctuary and a long list of targets kept us busy all morning. With a good selection of forest species still missing from our list, we were glad to catch up with quite a few as we walked down the dirt road winding its way through some truly impressive lowland forest. Some of the highlights worth mentioning included a brief Red-thighed Sparrowhawk, excellent views of a Red-billed Dwarf Hornbill, finally views of a

Hairy-breasted Barbet, scope studies of a pair of stunning Blue Cuckooshrikes, Western Oriole, a flock of comical Red-billed Helmetshrikes, a group of Chestnut-capped Flycatchers in the canopy, noisy Fraser's Forest Flycatchers, Red-vented Malimbes finally offered perched views, and everyone caught

up with a Yellow-mantled Weaver. The rare Tessmann's Flycatcher emerged from the tangles to perch in the open and sing, finishing a spectacular morning. We then continued our journey towards New Tafo and the Atewa Forest. After a late lunch, we continued straight towards the farm bush at the base of the Atewa Ridge and despite the afternoon heat found some excellent birds. One of the best finds of the day flew in within minutes of arriving at the birding site, a pair of scarce Little Green Woodpeckers, this regional endemic can be difficult to track down. Other additions included two skulky Marsh Tchagras, Square-tailed Saw-wing, Compact Weaver, and Chestnut-breasted Nigrita. Despite our best efforts that evening, we only heard a Fraser's Eagle-Owl call briefly.

The final full day of birding was devoted to a longer hike into the pristine forest atop the Atewa Ridge. We had exceptional luck with cloudy conditions keeping the temperatures down and bird activity high. Although, at one point it looked like dense fog was going to cancel birding early, we persevered and were well rewarded. It was a long day with some difficult forest birding, but lots of highlights. Some of the best finds included Blue-headed Wood-Dove perched for scope views, several Yellow-billed Turacos

seen, a pair of showy Black Cuckoos, Sabine's Spinetails above, a cooperative Chocolate-Kingfisher, backed Purple-throated Cuckooshrikes, African Shrike-flycatcher, Sabine's Puffback, Many-colored Bushshrike, Shining Drongo, Western Nicator, Blackcapped Apalis, Western Bearded and Icterine Greenbuls, the regional endemic Coppertailed Starling, Little Grey Flycatcher, and, near the end of the day, a beautiful Preuss's Weaver that sat still for scope views. This was a truly impressive haul of new species. The star bird of the day, Blue-moustached Beeeater, took some time to locate, but we all ended up with good views. By the end of the day, we had put in a few miles of walking, but it was well worth the effort.

The final day of the tour had arrived, and we were going to finish strong. Returning to the Atewa Forest, we hiked all the way up to the top of the ridge, tracking down any new species, especially focusing on

birds we had heard only during previous days. While our legs were a bit weary, we continued birding steadily throughout the morning, finding several new species, including Narina Trogon, Fernando Po Batis at the last chance, Brown and Blackcap Illadopsis for some, Finsch's Rufous Thrush, and White-tailed Alethe. We also enjoyed better views of Forest Woodhoopoe, Black Bee-eater, Western Oriole, Black-capped Apalis, and Yellow-mantled Weaver. The final new bird seen by all for the tour was a calling Crowned Eagle, what a fitting finish to a very enjoyable and successful Ghana birding adventure. We returned to the vehicle by midday, drove back to the hotel to pack up and started the return journey to Accra. Back at the familiar Erata Hotel in Accra, we had a celebratory farewell dinner, completed the final checklist, talked about the amazing sightings we shared, and wished everyone a safe homeward journey.
