

Cameroon Rockfowl, Rainforests & Sahel 22th March to 2nd April 2014

Trip report compiled by Tour Leader: David Hoddinott

Tour Summary:

Our private 12-day tour of Cameroon was a most successful adventure; covering a selection of habitats enabled us to notch up a superb total of 381 species in just 11 days of birding. On top of this we found many specials including Grey-necked Rockfowl and Egyptian Plover...

Our tour started off with a morning visit to a small coastal patch of mangroves and gardens where we found a remarkable diversity of species. Some of the highlights included Blue-spotted Wood Dove, Bluebreasted and African Pygmy Kingfisher, a cute family of Little Bee-eaters, African Pied Hornbill, African

quarry. It was then time to head for the airport to catch our flight north to Garoua.

It was a nice surprise to have the flight being on-time for once and after a comfortable journey we arrived in Garoua, where we were soon at our hotel enjoying dinner before settling down for a good night's rest.

An early start saw us heading to the Benoue River on the edge of town the following day, and here we enjoyed great sightings of Greater Painted-snipe, Crested Lark and several White-rumped Seedeaters.

Grey Woodpecker, beautiful and showy Brown-throated Wattle-eye, Yellow-throated Leaflove, Chattering Cisticola, Yellow-breasted Apalis, a host of sunbirds including Mangrove, Reichenbach's, Green-headed and Olive-bellied, Black-necked Weaver, Grey-headed Nigrita and dainty Black-crowned Waxbill. Thereafter we had time for a quick visit to a nearby wetland where we found African Pygmy Goose, African Darter and confiding Simple Greenbul. After a delicious lunch we stopped by a regular site for Rufous-vented Paradise Flycatcher, where we quickly found our

Our next destination was Benoue National Park, where the major habitat consists mainly of Guinea Savannah that supports a wonderful diversity of species. A further feature of interest in the park is the

Kingfisher, Red-throated Bee-eater, huge Abyssinian Ground Hornbill, Bearded Barbet, Fine-spotted, Golden-tailed and Brown-backed Woodpecker, Black-headed Gonolek, African Blue Flycatcher, Grey-rumped and Preuss's Swallow, Moustached Grass Warbler, Red-winged Grey Warbler, quaint Oriole Warbler, Blackcap Babbler, Yellow-bellied Hyliota, Long-tailed Glossy Starling, Whitecrowned Robin-Chat, Heuglin's Wheatear, Pygmy and Beautiful Sunbird, Red-headed Weaver, elusive Oliveback, cracking Grev-headed Dybowski's Twinspot and Black-bellied and Black-faced Firefinch.

During our drives from Garoua to Benoue and back we recorded some great birds as well including African Cuckoo-Hawk, a very unexpected Scissor-

lazy Benoue River which, although very wide, supports just a trickle of water at this time of year. We enjoyed time exploring these areas and some of the highlights during our stay included family groups of Stone Partridge, a very cryptic White-throated Francolin, flocks of Abdim's and a lone Saddle-billed Stork, a fabulous White-backed Night Heron, Goliath Heron (rare in Cameroon), a pair of displaying African Hawk-Eagle, Senegal Thick-knee, smart White-crowned Lapwing, the highly sought-after Egyptian Plover, fantastic Four-banded Sandgrouse, rare Adamawa Turtle Dove, Senegal Parrot, stunning White-crested and Violet Turaco, a day-roosting African Scops Owl, Pearl-spotted Owlet, beautiful Abyssinian and Blue-bellied Rollers, Grey-headed

tailed Kite, several Fox Kestrel, Bruce's Green Pigeon, Northern Red-billed Hornbill, Whiteheaded Barbet, social Yellow-billed Shrike, the strange corvid, Piapiac, and Grey-backed Fiscal.

From Garoua we took the flight back to Douala via N'Djamena, Chad and Yaoundé. This took a while but we arrived in Douala not long after the expected time and were soon on our way to Edea, where we enjoyed a delicious dinner and overnighted at a comfortable hotel.

The next morning we left early for the Sanaga River and were soon watching a large flock of African Skimmers fishing across the still waters, a magical sight! It took a bit longer to find the desired and stunning Grey Pratincole, but once we did we soon noticed dozens of them and they allowed good scope views. White-crowned Lapwing, Woollynecked Stork, White-fronted Plover and a lone Spur-winged Goose were also in attendance. The surrounding area was productive and we quickly found a large flock of Preuss's Swallow, several Red-

headed Ouelea, a pair of Blue-headed Coucal, and then a magnificent Black-bellied Seedcracker which put on a great show. Leaving the river we found the splendid White-bibbed Swallow before making our way to the nearby forest. Although our visit was brief we picked up some great birds including Lizard Buzzard. Mottled Spinetail, the immaculate Chocolate-backed Kingfisher, Speckled Tinkerbird, obliging Western Nicator. Yellow-browed Camaroptera, and a Chestnut-breasted Nigrita drinking from a puddle in the road. The star sighting however was finding a calling Zenker's Honeyguide, a very rarely-seen species. Delighted with this, we set off to Kribi where we relished our lunch at the beach.

Hornbills, smart Red-rumped Tinkerbird, Yellow-billed Barbet, Cassin's Honeybird, Green-backed, Brown-eared and Gabon Woodpecker, a male Rufous-sided Broadbill displaying, White-spotted Wattle-eye, a fabulous flock of Rufous-bellied Helmetshrike, superb Blue Cuckooshrike, Sabine's Puffback, Forest Penduline Tit, a host of greenbuls including Ansorge's, Xavier's and White-bearded and confiding Yellow-lored Bristlebill, Violetbacked Hyliota, Fraser's Rufous Thrush, Yellow-footed Flycatcher, Cassin's Malimbe and an unexpected Long-legged Pipit. The absolute highlight though was of course watching Greynecked Rockfowl around their roosting site. What a

Moving on to Campo Ma'an National Park, we enjoyed a fabulous two full day's birding in this superb lowland rainforest. After some recent rain the activity in the forest was good and we enjoyed many memorable sightings. Some of the star sightings included migrant European Honey Buzzard, Afep Pigeon, amazing scope views of Black-collared Lovebird, flocks of Grey Parrot, Great Blue Turacos (which put on a great show – at one time we had five individuals in a tree only thirty metres away!), Blue Malkoha, Sabine's and Cassin's Spinetail hunting overhead, Blue-throated Roller, Red-billed Dwarf, White-thighed and huge Black-casqued

show they gave us and we enjoyed spending an hour with these amazing pre-historic looking birds!

Leaving the rainforest we next travelled to the Bamenda highlands, a lovely change from the hot and humid lowlands. En route we stopped at La Digue once more in search of the fabulous Carmelite Sunbird. It did not disappoint and we enjoyed superb views of a male, female and juvenile, as well as a fabulous pair of obliging Black Crake. Further along the journey a comfort stop yielded magnificent views of the often rather shy Brown Twinspot.

Bamenda highlands, although The degraded, still yielded a remarkable variety of species including all the specials. Notable sightings were a male Western Marsh Harrier, several Rednecked Buzzard, scope views of African Hobby, stunning Bannerman's Turaco, a day roosting Greyish Eagle-Owl, Black-shouldered Nightjar, Willcock's Honeyguide, tricky Banded Wattle-eye, Yellow-breasted Boubou, Mackinnon's Shrike, Sun Lark, Cameroon and Cameroon Olive Greenbul, confiding Bangwa Forest Warbler, Green Longtail, Black-collared Apalis, Ruwenzori Hill Babbler, Starling, Robin-Chat. Neumann's Mountain Cameroon, Splendid and Orange-tufted Sunbird, Bannerman's, Baglafecht, Brown-capped

Black-billed Weaver, Shelley's Oliveback, Red-faced Crimsonwing and African (Cameroon) Pipit.

This then brought an end to our wonderful adventure and we headed back to Douala to catch our return flights home. This had been a most memorable trip and would not have been possible without such a wonderful group of enthusiastic participants. Thank you very much to everyone! I am greatly looking forward to sharing many more wonderful adventures with all of you!

Annotated List of Bird and Mammal species recorded

When the taxonomy differs from that of Clement's, the Clement's name will be written in brackets or differences will be explained in a note below the species.

BIRDS (total: a fabulous 381 species!)

Guineafowl Numididae

Helmeted Guineafowl

Numida meleagris

Up to ten observed daily in Benoue NP.

NOTE: The nominate N. m. meleagris (Helmeted Guineafowl) of East Africa, is sometimes regarded as distinct from the western N. m. galeata (West African Guineafowl – the form we recorded in Cameroon) and the southern N. m. mitrata (Tufted Guineafowl.) Few authorities recognize these splits.

New World Quail Odontophoridae

Stone Partridge

Ptilopachus petrosus

This species was encountered in Benoue NP which included excellent sightings near the roadside.

Pheasants & Allies Phasianidae

White-throated Francolin

Peliperdix albogularus

We had magnificent views of one in the woodland at Benoue NP.

Double-spurred Francolin

Pternistis bicalcaratus

This francolin was encountered at Benoue NP.

Ducks, Geese & Swans Anatidae

Spur-winged Goose

Plectropterus gambensis

We had great views of one at the Sanaga River.

African Pygmy Goose

Nettapus auritus

We had fantastic views of six at a roadside wetland near the Sanaga River.

Yellow-billed Duck

Anus undulata

We recorded one at Lake Awing, Bamenda. This is a very range restricted bird in West Africa, only occurring in this area in Cameroon and marginally in neighboring Nigeria.

Storks Ciconiidae

Yellow-billed Stork

Mycteria ibis

We had good views of four soaring high overheard near the town of Campo.

African Openbill

Anastomus lamelligerus

We had wonderful views of two birds in Benoue NP.

Abdim's Stork

Ciconia abdimii

Several small flocks of these intra-African migrants were seen in Benoue NP and our final sighting was of ten at Yaounde airport.

Woolly-necked Stork

Ciconia episcopus

One was seen in Benoue NP and a further three at the Sanaga River.

Saddle-billed Stork

Ephippiorhynchus senegalensis

We enjoyed great scope views of one in Benoue NP.

Marabou Stork

Leptoptilos crumenifer

Otani had good views of a flock of thirty at N'Djamena, Chad.

Ibises, Spoonbills Threskiornithidae

Hadada Ibis

Bostrychia hagedash

Small numbers were seen daily in Benoue NP and a further two en route to Campo Ma'an NP.

Herons, Bitterns Ardeidae

White-backed Night Heron

Gorsachius leuconotus

We had wonderful scope views of one in Benoue NP.

Black-crowned Night Heron

Nycticorax nycticorax

Three were seen along a small tributary of the Sanaga River.

Striated Heron

Butorides striata

We enjoyed a good sighting of one at a roadside pan en route to Sanaga River and another one in Benoue NP.

NOTE: This species group is often treated as 3 species, the nominate Striated Heron, B. striata, Green Heron, B. virescens of North America and Lava Heron, B. sundevalli of the Galapagos.

Western Cattle Egret

Bubulcus ibis

Ubiquitous, conspicuous and regularly seen throughout, especially in association with herds of cattle NOTE: This group is split by some authorities into 2 species, the nominate Western Cattle Egret, B.ibis and the Asian/Australasian Eastern Cattle Egret E. coromandus.

Grey Heron

Ardea cinerea

A well-known, widespread heron, but rather scarce in Cameroon, we recorded two in Benoue NP and three at the Sanaga River.

Black-headed Heron Ardea melanocephala

A fairly common species in the north, several were seen en route to Benoue NP.

Goliath Heron *Ardea goliath*

We had fair views of one in Benoue NP.

Great Egret Ardea alba
One of this familiar species was seen at Douala airport.

NOTE: This species is sometimes split into Western Great Egret, A.alba of the Americas, Africa & Europe and Eastern Great Egret, A.modesta of East Asia and Australasia. This split is as yet not recognized by Clements.

Little Egret *Egretta garzetta*

Three were seen at La Digue and a further two at the Sanaga River.

NOTE: Clements lumps Little, Western Reef E. gularis and Madagascar's Dimorphic Egret E. dimorpha into a single species. This treatment is not widely accepted.

Hamerkop Scopidae

Hamerkop

Scopus umbretta

This unique species was easily seen in Benoue NP.

Cormorants Phalacrocoracidae

Reed (Long-tailed) Cormorant

Microcarbo africanus

Seen at wetlands throughout the country. A few were seen at La Digue and a further few at the Benoue River.

Anhingas, Darters Anhingidae

African Darter

Anhinga rufa

One was seen at a roadside wetland near the Sanaga River and another on a large river en route to Campo Ma'an NP.

NOTE: Darter is sometimes split into three species, African Darter, A.rufa, Oriental Darter, A.melanogaster and Australasian Darter, A.novaehollandiae. Clements does not yet accept these splits.

Kites, Hawks & Eagles Accipitridae

Black-winged Kite

Elanus caeruleus

Up to four were seen during the drive from Garoua to Benoue NP.

NOTE: This species is sometimes split into Black-winged Kite, E.caeruleus of Africa and Asia and Black-shouldered Kite, E.axillaris of Australasia.

Scissor-tailed Kite

Chelictinia riocourii

We had great views of one thirty kilometres south of Garoua, unusual this far south. This was voted as one of the top birds of the trip!

African Harrier-Hawk (Gymnogene) Polyboroides typus

A distinctive raptor recorded daily in Campo Ma'an NP.

Palm-nut Vulture *Gypohierax angolensis*

Recorded in the wetter south with regularity. First seen at La Digue, Douala.

European Honey Buzzard Pernis apivorus

Two were seen in Campo Ma'an NP.

African Cuckoo-Hawk Aviceda cuculoides We had great views of one en route from Benoue to Garoua.

Hooded Vulture Necrosyrtes monachus

We had good views of twenty at Garoua.

Long-crested EagleLophaetus occipitalis

We enjoyed scattered sightings of this impressive raptor throughout with great sightings of one in Benoue NP.

African Hawk-Eagle

Aquila spilogaster

We had good views of a pair soaring, in Benoue NP.

Lizard Buzzard

Kaupifalco monogrammicus

Our first sighting was of one at the Sanaga River with further sightings of several in the Bamenda highlands.

Gabar Goshawk

Micronisus gabar

We found one melanistic individual during the drive from Garoua to Benoue NP as well as several normal grey individuals.

Shikra (Little Banded Goshawk)

Accipiter badius

Two were seen in the woodlands in Benoue NP.

NOTE: We recorded the Northern Shikra A. b. sphenurus that some authorities consider distinct from the southern African Southern Shikra A. b. polyzonoides. These forms may also be split from the Asian nominate A. b. badius and other Asian forms. Clements does not as yet recognize any of these splits.

Western Marsh Harrier

Circus aeruginosus

A superb male was seen en route during the drive from Douala to Bamenda.

Montagu's Harrier

Circus pygargus

One was seen during the drive from Garoua to Benoue.

Yellow-billed Kite

Milvus aegyptius

This ubiquitous, fork-tailed raptor was found in good numbers throughout the country and recorded on most days.

African Fish Eagle

Haliaeetus vocifer

Not a very common bird in West Africa, one was heard calling in Benoue NP.

Grasshopper Buzzard

Butastur rufipennis

We enjoyed two sightings of this species en route from Garoua to Benoue NP.

Red-necked Buzzard

Buteo auguralis

This handsome buzzard was noted at a number of localities on the tour, we had magnificent sightings en route from Garoua to Benoue with further sightings in the Bamenda highlands.

Falcons, Caracaras Falconidae

Common (Eurasian/Rock) Kestrel

Falco tinnunculus

This widespread, familiar raptor was seen daily in the Bamenda highlands.

NOTE: Some authorities split this species into Common Kestrel, F. tinnunculus which we observed and occurs in East and West Africa and Rock Kestrel, F. rupicolus, which occurs in Southern Africa. Clements does not as yet recognize these splits.

Fox Kestrel

Falco alopex

We had superb views of up to eight during the drive from Garoua to Benoue NP.

Eurasian Hobby

Falco subbuteo

We had good views of two en route from the Sanaga River to Campo Ma'an NP.

African Hobby

Falco cuvierii

We enjoyed great scope views of one in the Bamenda highlands.

Lanner Falcon

Falco biarmicus

We had great views of two during the drive from Garoua to Benoue NP.

Flufftails Sarothruridae

White-spotted Flufftail

Sarothrura pulchra

This secretive, forest rallids hooting call was heard in Campo Ma'an NP.

Rails, Crakes & Coots Rallidae

Black Crake Amaurornis flavirostra

A pair was seen very well at La Digue, Douala.

Common MoorhenGallinula chloropus

We observed two at a roadside wetland near Bamenda.

Stone-curlews, Thick-knees Burhinidae

Senegal Thick-knee

Burhinus senegalensis

We had good views of at least four in Benoue NP.

Plovers Charadriidae

Spur-winged Lapwing (Plover)Vanellus spinosus

The northern counterpart of the familiar Blacksmith Plover. These vociferous birds were first seen at

the Benoue River, Garoua with further sightings in Benoue NP. **Black-headed Lapwing**Vanellus tectus

We enjoyed great sightings of a pair with two young in Garoua. A very attractive species.

White-crowned Lapwing Vanellus albiceps

First seen in Benoue NP with a further sighting of two at the Sanaga River

Three-banded PloverCharadrius tricollaris

We had wonderful scope views of two birds in Benoue NP.

White-fronted Plover Charadrius marginatus

We enjoyed good scope views of one at the Sanaga River.

Egyptian Plover Pluvianidae

Egyptian Plover

Pluvianus aegyptus

This remarkably beautiful bird was encountered with regularity on the Benoue River in Benoue NP. We managed a total of at least 4 birds.

Painted-snipes Rostratulidae

Greater Painted-snipe

Rostratula benghalensis

We had cracking views of two birds near Garoua.

Jacanas Jacanidae

African Jacana

Actophilornis africanus

A widespread and characteristic wader, conspicuous in wetlands. We found one at La Digue and a further two at the Benoue River.

Sandpipers, Snipes Scolopacidae

Common Greenshank

Tringa nebularia

One was seen in Benoue NP and a further one at the Sanaga River.

Green Sandpiper

Tringa ochropus

Up to three were seen along the Benoue River in Benoue NP.

Wood SandpiperTringa glareola

A couple was seen near the Benoue River at Garoua.

Common Sandpiper

Actitis hypoleucos

A common migrant, seen at La Digue with scattered sightings elsewhere

Little Stint *Calidris minuta*

We had great scope views of three at the Sanaga River.

Coursers, Pratincoles Glareolidae

Collared Pratincole

Glareola pratincola

We had good views of one flying high overhead whilst calling at the Benoue River, Garoua.

Rock Pratincole

Glareola nuchalis

A total of 4 birds were seen on a large river en route to Campo Ma'an NP.

Grey Pratincole

Glareola cinerea

At least 30 of these beautiful pratincoles were scoped on sandbars on the Sanaga River.

Gulls, Terns & Skimmers Laridae

African Skimmer

Rynchops flavirostris

We encountered a great flock of 150 birds on the Sanaga River.

Sandgrouse Pteroclidae

Four-banded Sandgrouse

Pterocles quadricinctus

We had spectacular views of a pair at the roadside in Benoue NP.

Pigeons, Doves Columbidae

Rock Dove

Columba livia

Common in Douala and other large towns

Speckled Pigeon

Columba guinea

A common species in the north, first encountered at Garoua with further sightings in Benoue NP.

Afep Pigeon

Columba unicincta

We had good scope views of one at Campo Ma'an NP where at least four birds were seen.

Adamawa Turtle Dove

Streptopelia hypopyrrha

We enjoyed good views of three in Benoue NP. A rare species.

Mourning [Collared] Dove

Streptopelia decipiens

At least six birds were seen at the Benoue River, Garoua.

Red-eyed Dove

Streptopelia semitorquata

A fairly common widespread species, especially notable in more wooded areas and around towns

Vinaceous Dove

Streptopelia vinacea

This richly marked dove was common in the Benoue area with peak numbers of fifty daily in Benoue NP.

Laughing (Palm) Dove

Spilopelia senegalensis

A familiar species and in Cameroon recorded regularly at Garoua

Black-billed Wood Dove

Turtur abyssinicus

The common wood dove of the dry, northern savanna, up to twenty seen daily in Benoue NP

Blue-spotted Wood Dove

Turtur afer

Not uncommon in secondary growth in the moister south. We had fantastic views of two at La Digue.

Tambourine Dove

Turtur tympanistria

A forest equivalent of the wood doves, we encountered one near the Sanaga River and another at Campo Ma'an NP.

Blue-headed Wood Dove

Turtur brehmeri

A deep forest species restricted to West Africa. We heard several in Campo Ma'an NP.

Namaqua Dove

Oena capensis

A fairly common species in the dry north, we saw two during the drive from Garoua to Benoue NP.

Bruce's Green Pigeon

Treron waalia

Small numbers were seen en route from Garoua to Benoue NP. We were treated to great views of a small flock feeding in a large fruiting fig tree.

African Green Pigeon

Treron calvus

Commoner in the south of the country, where good numbers were noted throughout. Seen well in Benoue and Campo Ma'an NP's

Parrots Psittacidae

Black-collared Lovebird

Agapornis swindernianus

We had wonderful scope views of four in Campo Ma'an NP. Seeing this rare species perched was yet another highlight of the tour!

(African) Grey Parrot

Psittacus erithacus

So much better to see them in the wild than as the usual cage bird! Two were seen flying over at La Digue and thereafter we enjoyed daily sightings of up to 50 in Campo Ma'an NP.

Senegal Parrot

Poicephalus senegalus

A parrot of drier savanna and woodland, we found several in Benoue NP including great scope views of a pair.

Turacos Musophagidae

Great Blue Turaco

Corythaeola cristata

Arguably one of Africa's most spectacular birds, this huge frugivore was seen exceptionally well in Campo Ma'an NP.

Yellow-billed (Verreaux's) Turaco

Tauraco macrorhynchus

A commonly heard turaco of the interior forests. We had good but brief views of two in Campo Ma'an NP.

White-crested Turaco

Tauraco leucolophus

Three birds were seen very well in Benoue NP. A spectacular bird! Tauraco bannermani

Bannerman's Turaco

One of these stunning endemics was seen in the Bamenda Highlands. **Violet Turaco** Musophaga violacea

Another stellar turaco, we had superb views of four birds in Benoue NP.

Western (Grey) Plantain-eater

Crinifer piscator

Seen in small numbers daily in Benoue NP

Cuckoos Cuculidae

Senegal Coucal

Centropus senegalensis

The most commonly encountered coucal throughout with good views at La Digue and in Benoue NP.

Blue-headed Coucal

Centropus monachus

We had good views of a pair at the Sanaga River.

Blue Malkoha (Yellowbill)

Ceuthmochares aereus

We had good views of one in Campo Ma'an NP.

Note: Some authorities split this species into Green Malkoha, C. australis that occurs in East and Southern Africa and Blue Malkoha, C. aereus that we observed and occurs in West and Central Africa. Clements does not as yet accept this split.

Diederik Cuckoo

Chrysococcyx caprius

We had good views of one at the Benoue River, Garoua.

Klaas's Cuckoo

Chrysococcyx klaas

This brood parasite, favoring the cup nests of woodland birds, was heard at several locations and seen well at Benoue NP.

African Emerald Cuckoo

Chrysococcyx cupreus

Generally more shy and less common than its congeners, we heard one at the Sanaga River.

African Cuckoo

Cuculus gularis

We enjoyed good views of two in Benoue NP and a further three in the Bamenda highlands.

Typical Owls Strigidae

African Scops Owl

Otus senegalensis

We enjoyed great views of one of these tiny owls in Benoue NP.

Greyish Eagle-Owl

Bubo cinerascens

We had awesome views of one perched up on a rocky escarpment at Bamenda.

Pearl-spotted Owlet

Glaucidium perlatum

We found this vocal species during the day in Benoue NP.

Nightjars Caprimulgidae

Black-shouldered Nightjar

Caprimulgus nigriscapularis

We enjoyed brief views of one during the day in the Bamenda highlands.

Swifts Apodidae

Mottled Spinetail

Telacanthura ussheri

We had superb views of two birds at the Sanaga River.

Sabine's Spinetail

Rhaphidura sabini

We enjoyed good views of one in Campo Ma'an NP.

Cassin's Spinetail

Neafrapus cassini

We had stunning views of three in Campo Ma'an NP.

African Palm Swift

Cypsiurus parvus

Plentiful throughout most of the tour, especially in the north

Little Swift

Apus affinis

The common urban swift throughout the country, seen on many days

Mousebirds Coliidae

Speckled Mousebird

Colius striatus

Not as common as elsewhere in Africa but nonetheless encountered regularly in open and secondary habitat in the Bamenda highlands.

Rollers Coraciidae

Abyssinian Roller

Coracias abyssinicus

A common roller recorded throughout the dry north of the country. Another spectacular species!

Blue-bellied Roller

Coracias cyanogaster

A single bird was seen in Benoue NP.

Blue-throated Roller

Eurystomus gularis

We had great views of three birds near Campo Ma'an NP.

Kingfishers Alcedinidae

Chocolate-backed Kingfisher

Halcyon badia

We had cracking scope views of one at the Sanaga River.

Grey-headed Kingfisher

Halcyon leucocephala

We had our highest total of four birds in Benoue NP.

Striped Kingfisher

Halcyon chelicuti

Rather drabber than its spectacular cousins, this small, savannah kingfisher was found in woodland at

Benoue NP.

Blue-breasted Kingfisher

Halcyon malimbica

This forest equivalent of the Woodland Kingfisher was first seen at La Digue, Douala with a further sighting in Benoue NP.

Woodland Kingfisher

Halcyon senegalensis

Not uncommon in open habitat in the south often perching on telephone wires next to the road.

African Pygmy Kingfisher

Ispidina picta

This beautiful little bird was first seen at La Digue, we recorded them again at various widely scattered localities. This must be the best country to see this species; we observed a total of 8 during the trip.

Malachite Kingfisher

Corythornis cristatus

We enjoyed a superb sighting of one near Campo Ma'an NP. **Giant Kingfisher**

Megaceryle maxima

The Goliath of the kingfisher world. Seen in Benoue NP and again at Bamenda

Pied Kingfisher

Ceryle rudis

The world's commonest kingfisher was seen in Benoue NP.

Bee-eaters Meropidae

Little Bee-eater

Merops pusillus

Small numbers were seen at La Digue and the Sanaga River. **Red-throated Bee-eater**

Merops bulocki

The northern equivalent of the more familiar White-fronted Bee-eater and every bit as beautiful. We had great views of many daily in Benoue NP.

White-throated Bee-eater

Merops albicollis

This species which breeds in the Sahelian savanna and winters in the Equatorial forest belt was seen near Campo Ma'an NP.

European Bee-eater

Merops apiaster

Thirty were seen flying over Campo Ma'an NP.

Wood Hoopoes Phoeniculidae

Green Wood Hoopoe

Phoeniculus purpureus

Three were recorded in Benoue NP.

Hornbills Bucerotidae

African Pied Hornbill

Tockus fasciatus

Common throughout forested areas in Cameroon including two birds seen at La Digue.

African Grey Hornbill

Tockus nasutus

The common savanna hornbill in Cameroon, with small numbers being seen in the drier northern part of the country. First recorded en route from Garoua to Benoue NP.

Northern Red-billed Hornbill

Tockus erythrorhynchus

A common hornbill of dry woodlands in the far north. We recorded three during the drive from Garoua to Benoue NP.

NOTE: This species is sometimes split into five species, Northern Red-billed Hornbill, T.erythrorhynchus which we observed, Damara Red-billed Hornbill, Tdamarensis of N.Namibia, Southern Red-billed Hornbill, T.rufirostris of Southern Africa, Tanzanian Red-billed Hornbill, T.ruahae - endemic to Tanzania and Western Red-billed Hornbill, T.kempi of Senegambia. Clements does not as yet accept these splits.

Red-billed Dwarf Hornbill

Tockus camurus

A flock of four of this scarce species was seen very well in Campo Ma'an NP.

Piping Hornbill

Bycanistes fistulator

Up to twenty were seen daily in Campo Ma'an NP.

White-thighed Hornbill

Bycanistes albotibialis

Up to six were seen daily in Campo Ma'an NP.

Black-casqued Hornbill

Ceratogymna elata

We had wonderful views of several daily in Campo Ma'an NP.

Ground Hornbills Bucorvidae

Abyssinian Ground Hornbill

Bucorvus abyssinicus

We were extremely fortunate to find three walking through tall woodland in Benoue NP. This is a scarce species in Cameroon.

African Barbets Lybiidae

Speckled Tinkerbird

Pogoniulus scolopaceus

This scruffy bird was seen in forests and forest edge. We found several in Campo Ma'an NP.

Red-rumped Tinkerbird

Pogoniulus atroflavus

We enjoyed cracking views of one near Campo Ma'an NP.

Yellow-throated Tinkerbird

Pogoniulus subsulphureus

This species is similar to its more familiar yellow-rumped cousin but with a more rapid tempo to its "tinking" call. This species was often heard and one was seen in Campo Ma'an NP.

Yellow-rumped Tinkerbird

Pogoniulus bilineatus

A common forest-edge species. We heard one calling in the Bamenda highlands.

Yellow-fronted Tinkerbird

Pogoniulus chrysoconus

A savanna species which was seen very well in Benoue NP

Yellow-spotted Barbet

Buccanodon duchaillui

A rather beautiful Barbet, heard at several forested sites in the south. We obtained great views of a few in Campo Ma'an NP.

Hairy-breasted Barbet

Tricholaema hirsuta

This forest barbet was seen very well in Campo Ma'an NP.

White-headed Barbet

Lybius leucocephalus

This localized and often elusive barbet was seen very well en route from Garoua to Benoue NP.

Bearded Barbet

Lybius dubius

We enjoyed great views of several in Benoue NP.

Yellow-billed Barbet

Trachyphonus purpuratus

This elusive forest barbet was seen briefly in Campo Ma'an NP.

Honeyguides Indicatoridae

Cassin's Honeybird

Prodotiscus insignis

We had good views of one in Campo Ma'an NP.

Zenker's Honeyguide

Melignomon zenkeri

We had stunning views of one calling near the Sanaga River. This species is very rarely seen and was another highlight of the trip.

Willcock's Honeyguide

Indicator willcocksi

We enjoyed scope views of one in the Bamenda highlands. Lesser Honeyguide

One was seen in Benoue NP

Indicator minor

Greater Honeyguide Indicator indicator We obtained good views of two birds drinking in Benoue NP.

Woodpeckers Picidae

African Piculet

Sasia africana

This diminutive and endearing species was heard on several occasions in Campo NP and only seen by the leader.

Fine-spotted Woodpecker

Campethera punctuligera

This lovely woodpecker was seen very well in Benoue NP.

Golden-tailed Woodpecker

Campethera abingoni

We had great scope views of one in Benoue NP.

Green-backed WoodpeckerCampethera cailliautii

We had good views of one in Campo Ma'an NP.

Buff-spotted WoodpeckerCampethera nivosa

This diminutive and rather dark woodpecker was seen in Campo Ma'an NP.

Brown-eared Woodpecker Campethera caroli

Two were seen in Campo Ma'an NP.

Cardinal Woodpecker Dendropicos fuscescens

We enjoyed superb views of a male in the Bamenda highlands.

Gabon Woodpecker Dendropicos gabonenis

We had superb scope views of two in Campo Ma'an NP.

Yellow-crested Woodpecker Dendropicos xantholophus

We had superb scope views of a pair in Campo Ma'an NP.

African Grey Woodpecker Dendropicos goertae

Two birds were located at our hotel in Douala and a third was seen at La Digue.

Brown-backed Woodpecker Dendropicos obsoletus

We enjoyed fabulous views of one in Benoue NP. A scarce, dry country species.

Broadbills Eurylaimidae

Rufous-sided Broadbill Smithornis rufolateralis

A magnificent male was seen displaying in Campo Ma'an NP

Wattle-eyes, Batises Platysteiridae

Chestnut Wattle-eye

Platysteira castanea

Both male and females were seen in Campo Ma'an NP.

White-spotted Wattle-eye

Platysteira tonsa

After some patience and perseverance we were rewarded with fabulous views of a male in Campo Ma'an NP.

Banded Wattle-eye Platysteira laticincta

One of Cameroon's most threatened endemics. We found a superb male and juvenile in the Bamenda Highlands.

Brown-throated (Common) Wattle-eye Platysteira cyanea

The most frequently encountered Wattle-eye on our trip and seen very well at La Digue.

Helmetshrikes Prionopidae

White-crested Helmetshrike

Prionops plumatus

We had great views of a flock of five in Benoue NP.

NOTE: This species is being considered for a 3-way split. P. p. cristatus would become Curly-crested Helmetshrike, P. p. poliocephalus would become Southern Helmetshrike and the nominate P. p. plumatus, the form we recorded would become Straight-crested Helmetshrike. Clements does not as yet recognize these splits.

Bushshrikes Malaconotidae

Orange-breasted Bushshrike

Chlorophoneus sulfureopectus

A widespread African savanna species that was heard in Benoue NP

Black-crowned Tchagra

Tchagra senegalus

The most widely distributed tchagra that was seen well near Bamenda.

Sabine's Puffback Dryoscopus sabini

We had superb views of a male in Campo Ma'an NP.

Northern Puffback Dryoscopus gambensis

Restricted to the north, we heard one in Benoue NP.

Tropical Boubou Laniarius major

We heard a pair calling in Benoue NP.

NOTE: Some authorities have split this into 3 species, Tropical Boubou, L. major the one we observed, Ethiopian Boubou, L. aethiopicus of Ethiopia and nw Somalia and East Coast Boubou, L. sublacteus of coastal Kenya, NE Tanzania and Zanzibar.

Black-headed Gonolek Laniarius erythrogaster

Three of these beautiful birds were seen in the gallery forest on the Benoue River in Benoue NP.

Yellow-breasted Boubou Laniarius atroflavus

A total of 6 of these stunning and confiding shrikes were seen well in the Bamenda highlands.

Nilaus afer Brubru

One bird was heard calling in Benoue NP.

Cuckooshrikes Campephagidae

Blue Cuckooshrike Coracina azurea

We had great views of one in Campo Ma'an NP.

Shrikes Laniidae

Yellow-billed Shrike Corvinella corvina

A flock of six birds was seen during the drive from Garoua to Benoue NP. An unusual, gregarious

Mackinnon's Shrike (Fiscal) Lanius mackinnoni We encountered a total of two birds in the Bamenda highlands.

Grey-backed Fiscal Lanius excubitoroides

We had good views of three whilst en route from Garoua to Benoue NP.

Northern (Common) Fiscal Lanius humeralis

A widespread species but not encountered often on our tour, we encountered small numbers in the Bamenda highlands.

Figbirds, Orioles Oriolidae

African Golden Oriole Oriolus auratus

One was seen in Benoue NP.

Western (Black-headed) Oriole Oriolus brachyrynchus

Up to four birds were seen daily in Campo Ma'an NP.

Drongos Dicruridae

Dicrurus atripennis **Shining Drongo**

This forest interior drongo was seen very well on several occasions in Campo Ma'an NP.

Fork-tailed Drongo Dicrurus adsimilis

A familiar, ubiquitous bird. A few were seen in Benoue NP.

Monarchs Monarchidae

Trochocercus nitens **Blue-headed Crested Flycatcher**

We heard one calling in Campo Ma'an NP.

Rufous-vented Paradise Flycatcher Terpsiphone rufocinerea

We had fantastic sightings of one near our hotel in Douala.

Red-bellied Paradise Flycatcher *Terpsiphone rufiventer* We had daily sightings of this striking species in Campo Ma'an NP.

African Paradise Flycatcher Terpsiphone viridis We enjoyed good views of several including sightings at La Digue and in Benoue NP where we also observed a splendid male black-and-white morph individual.

Crows, Jays Corvidae

Piapiac

Ptilostomus afer

Small numbers were seen en route from Garoua to Benoue NP.

Pied Crow

Corvus albus

A common and familiar crow, recorded in good numbers throughout.

Rockfowl Picathartidae

Grey-necked Rockfowl

Picathartes oreas

We had simply amazing views of four in Campo Ma'an NP. Yet another major highlight of the tour!

Fairy Flycatchers Stenostiridae

African Blue Flycatcher

Elminia longicauda

A wonderfully common and beautiful bird, which constantly fans and wags its tail, we had several sightings in Benoue NP.

White-bellied Crested Flycatcher

Elminia albiventris

We had great views of one in the Bamenda highlands.

Tits, Chickadees Paridae

White-shouldered Black Tit

Parus guineensis

We heard one calling in Benoue NP.

NOTE: Most authorities split this complex into 2 full species. The nominate dark-eyed M. l. leucomelas remains White-winged Black-Tit and the more northern and western yellow-eyed M. l. guineensis (the form we recorded in Cameroon) becomes White-shouldered Black-Tit. Clements has recently recognized this split

Penduline Tits Remizidae

Forest Penduline Tit

Anthoscopus flavifrons

We had good scope views of one in Campo Ma'an NP.

Nicators Nicatoridae

Western Nicator

Nicator chloris

This vociferous songster was seen near the Sanaga River and again in Campo Ma'an NP.

Larks Alaudidae

Crested Lark

Galerida cristata

We had great views of two near the Benoue River, Garoua.

Sun Lark

Galerida modesta

We found a single bird in the Bamenda highlands.

Bulbuls Pycnonotidae

Common Bulbul

Pycnonotus barbatus

A ubiquitous species and recorded on most days of the trip, with high daily tallies.

NOTE: Another very confusing polytypic species complex. Several Asian and African forms have already been recognized as distinct species within the super-species.

Cameroon (Mountain) Greenbul

Arizelocichla montana

Two were seen during our time in the Bamenda highlands.

Western (Mountain) Greenbul

Arizelocichla tephrolaema

This common, although range restricted species was quite common in the Bamenda Highlands.

Slender-billed Greenbul

Stelgidillas gracilirostris

The common greenbul of forest canopy, we had good views of up to three daily in Campo Ma'an NP.

Little Greenbul

Eurillas virens

This, the commonest forest edge greenbul was heard at all forest sites and seen near Campo Ma'an NP.

Ansorge's Greenbul

Eurillas ansorgei

We enjoyed good views of two in Campo Ma'an NP.

Plain Greenbul

Eurillas curvirostris

We had good views of one in Campo Ma'an NP.

Yellow-whiskered Greenbul

Eurillas latirostris

A greenbul of forest undergrowth and mid-storey, we had good sightings of two in Campo Ma'an NP.

Golden Greenbul

Calyptocichla serinus

We had great views of up to three daily in Campo Ma'an NP.

Honeyguide Greenbul

Baeopogon indicator

This species was heard in Campo Ma'an NP.

Sjostedt's Greenbul

Baeopogon clamans

A low density and rather shy species. We heard this species in Campo Ma'an NP.

Spotted Greenbul

Ixonotus guttatus

We secured excellent views of up to twenty daily in Campo Ma'an NP.

Simple Greenbul

Chlorocichla simplex

We had superb views of two at a roadside wetland en route to the Sanaga River.

Yellow-throated Leaflove (Greenbul)

Chlorocichla flavicollis

Small numbers were seen at La Digue.

Swamp Greenbul

Thescelocichla leucopleura

We had brief views of one flying overhead in Campo Ma'an NP.

Cameroon Olive Greenbul

Phyllastrephus poensis

We found several in the undergrowth in the Bamenda highlands.

Icterine Greenbul

Phyllastrephus icterinus

At least three birds were encountered in Campo Ma'an NP.

Xavier's Greenbul

Phyllastrephus xavieri

Very similar to the previous species but with a different call, we had great views in Campo Ma'an NP.

White-throated Greenbul

Phyllastrephus albigularis

We had good views of two in Campo Ma'an NP.

Red-tailed (Common) Bristlebill

Bleda syndactylus

One was seen briefly in Campo Ma'an NP.

Yellow-lored (Lesser) Bristlebill

Bleda notatus

Commoner than it's congener in Cameroon, we enjoyed great views of three in Campo Ma'an NP.

NOTE: The Green-tailed Bristlebill complex is often split into 3 species, Yellow-lored Bristlebill, Bleda notatus which occurs in West Africa and is the one we observed, Green-tailed Bristlebill, B.eximius which occurs in the Upper Guinea area and Yellow-eyed Bristlebill, B.ugandae which occurs in Uganda and the DRC.

Red-tailed Greenbul

Criniger calurus

We found two in the canopy of Campo Ma'an NP.

White-bearded Greenbul

Criniger ndussumensis

Another Congo forest special, we saw up to six daily during our say in Campo Ma'an NP.

Swallows & Martins Hirundinidae

Square-tailed Saw-wing

Psalidoprocne nitens

We enjoyed good views of several daily in Campo Ma'an NP.

Black Saw-wing

Psalidoprocne pristoptera

Two were seen in the Bamenda highlands.

Grey-rumped Swallow

Pseudhirundo griseopyga

Small numbers were seen in Benoue NP.

Sand Martin

Riparia riparia

We found one at the Benoue River, Garoua.

Barn Swallow

Hirundo rustica

Small numbers were seen throughout Cameroon.

NOTE: This cosmopolitan species complex may be split based on the Old World nominate form and its congeners which would become Eurasian Swallow H. rustica and the New World Barn Swallow H. erythrogaster. Further splitting within the group may also be done e.g. the distinctive H. r. savignii, which breeds in the Nile Valley and would be named Egyptian Swallow. We only recorded representatives of the Palaearctic migrant Barn/Eurasian Swallow. Clements does not as yet recognize any of these splits.

Ethiopian Swallow

Hirundo aethiopica

Small numbers were seen at many scattered sites throughout the trip with our first sightings at La Digue.

Wire-tailed Swallow

Hirundo smithii

Small numbers were seen in Benoue NP.

NOTE: This species complex is likely to be split based on the African nominate form which would become African Wiretailed Swallow and the Asian Wire-tailed Swallow which would be H. filifera. Clements does not as yet recognize this split.

White-bibbed Swallow

Hirundo nigrita

We enjoyed fair views of two at the Sanaga River.

Rock Martin

Ptyonoprogne fuligula

Four were seen in the Bamenda highlands.

Lesser Striped Swallow

Cecropis abyssinica

A widespread African swallow that is fairly common in Cameroon. We found small numbers throughout the country including six in Benoue NP.

Red-breasted (Rufous-chested) Swallow Cecropis semirufa

We had wonderful views of two near the Sanaga River and a further six near Campo Ma'an NP.

Preuss's [Cliff] Swallow

Petrochelidon preussi

Commonly encountered at the Sanaga River and in Benoue NP

Crombecs, African warblers Macrosphenidae

Moustached Grass Warbler

Melocichla mentalis

One of these attractive warblers, a denizen of rank grass, was seen in Benoue NP.

Grey Longbill

Macrosphenus concolor

We had great views of two near the Sanaga River and heard several in Campo Ma'an NP.

Northern Crombec

Sylvietta brachyura

The crombec of dry Acacia woodland, we had good views of one in Benoue NP.

Green Crombec

Sylvietta virens

The commonest and most widespread forest crombec, though small and inconspicuous (except by call). We heard it daily in Campo Ma'an NP.

Family Uncertain Incertae Sedis

Green Hylia

Hylia prasina

Its "HEE-lia!" call was heard in Campo Ma'an NP.

Leaf Warblers & allies Phylloscopidae

Willow Warbler

Phylloscopus trochilus

One was seen in Benoue NP.

Reed Warblers & allies Acrocephalidae

Greater Swamp Warbler

Acrocephalus rufescens

We had a good sighting of one at the Sanaga River.

Sedge Warbler

Acrocephalus schoenobaenus

We found two near the Benoue River, Garoua.

Eurasian Reed Warbler

Acrocephalus scirpaceus

We had good views of one along the Benoue River, Garoua. **Dark-capped Yellow Warbler** *Iduna natalensis*

We heard one in the Bamenda highlands.

Western Olivaceous Warbler

Iduna opaca

Another Palaearctic migrant, we found two in Benoue NP.

NOTE: Clements has recently split this species into Western Olivaceous Warbler, H. opaca and Eastern Olivaceous Warbler, H pallida.

Grassbirds & allies Locustellidae

Bangwa Forest (Scrub) Warbler

Bradypterus bangwaensis

We managed to get great views of this rather confiding and handsome *Bradypterus* in the Bamenda highlands. A range restricted species endemic to western Cameroon and neighboring eastern Nigeria.

Cisticolas & Allies Cisticolidae

Red-faced Cisticola

Cisticola erythrops

This moist grassland and swamp dwelling cisticola was seen well in Benoue NP.

Chattering Cisticola

Cisticola anonymus

A secondary growth and scrub species, we encountered them regularly in the south including good views at La Digue.

Chubb's (Brown-backed) Cisticola

Cisticola chubbi

We encountered this noisy and conspicuous bird in small groups on the forest edge in the Bamenda Highlands.

Winding Cisticola

Cisticola marginatus

We found six birds along the Benoue River, Garoua.

Rufous Cisticola

Cisticola rufus

We found two of these rather uncommon and localized cisticolas in woodland in Benoue NP.

Zitting Cisticola

Cisticola juncidis

We had good views of one near Garoua.

Pectoral-patch Cisticola

Cisticola brunnescens

Two birds were seen in anthropogenic grassland in the Bamenda Highlands.

Tawny-flanked Prinia

Prinia subflava

Another noisy and familiar African warbler, we recorded this species in small numbers en route from Garoua to Benoue NP.

Green Longtail

Urolais epichlorus

We enjoyed good views of three in the Bamenda highlands.

Black-collared Apalis

Oreolais pulchra

A beautiful apalis that we had stunning views of in the Bamenda highlands. We saw at least 6 birds during our time there.

Red-winged Grey Warbler

Drymocichla incana

Up to four of this smart species were observed daily at Benoue NP.

Yellow-breasted Apalis

Apalis flavida

This widespread, woodland apalis is not very common in Cameroon. We observed a pair at La Digue.

Black-capped Apalis

Apalis nigriceps

A canopy apalis, we had good views of a pair at the town of Campo.

Grey Apalis Apalis cinerea

We had sightings of four in the Bamenda highlands.

Oriole Warbler Hypergerus atriceps

One of these unusual creatures was located in riverine vegetation in Benoue NP.

Grey-backed CamaropteraCamaroptera brevicaudata

The bleating calls of this common bird were heard in wooded habitat at several localities on the tour. We enjoyed great sightings at La Digue.

NOTE: Most authorities now recognize the nominate green-backed forms of this widespread African warbler as distinct from the grey-backed forms C. brevicaudata. We encountered the grey-backed form in Cameroon. Clements lumps these two groups.

Yellow-browed Camaroptera Camaroptera superciliaris

This handsome warbler was seen very well at the Sanaga River.

Olive-green Camaroptera Camaroptera chloronota

This species was heard calling at Campo Ma'an NP.

Senegal Eremomela Eremomela pusilla

A common species recorded in woodland in Benoue NP where up to six seen daily.

NOTE: This species is sometimes lumped into the East African E. pusilla (Green-backed Eremomela.) The enlargened species is called Green-backed Eremomela.

Rufous-crowned Eremomela Eremomela badiceps

One was seen in Campo Ma'an NP, a leader only sighting.

Ground Babblers Pellorneidae

Brown Illadopsis

Illadopsis fulvescens

Two were seen well in Campo Ma'an NP.

Laughingthrushes Leiothrichidae

Blackcap Babbler

Turdoides reinwardtii

Turdoides plebejus

Another tricky species to see well, we found a family group of five in the gallery forest in Benoue NP.

Brown Babbler

We enjoyed superb views of four in Benoue NP.

Sylviid Babblers Sylviidae

Ruwenzori (African) Hill Babbler

Pseudoalcippe atriceps

We had good views of eight in the Bamenda highlands.

Note: This species is sometimes split from African Hill Babbler, P.abyssinica. Clements does not as yet accept this split.

Common (Greater) Whitethroat

Sylvia communis

One was seen in scrub near the Benoue River, Garoua.

White-eyes Zosteropidae

African Yellow White-eye

Zosterops senegalensis

We found two in Benoue NP and a further six in the Bamenda highlands.

NOTE: The birds in the forests of Mt. Kupe and Bokassi are sometimes split off as Forest White-eye, Z. stenocricotus.

Dapple-throat & allies Arcanatoridae

Grey-chested Babbler (Illadopsis)

Kakamega poliothorax

One of these highly elusive birds was heard calling in the Bamenda highlands.

Hyliotas Hyliotidae

Yellow-bellied Hyliota

Hyliota flavigaster

We recorded a pair of these stunning birds, in woodland in Benoue NP.

Violet-backed Hyliota

Hyliota violacea

We had cracking views of a male in Campo Ma'an NP.

Treecreepers Certhiidae

African Spotted Creeper

Salpornis salvadori

We heard one calling at our lunch stop en route from Garoua to Benoue NP.

NOTE: Spotted Creeper has recently been split into Indian Spotted Creeper S. spilonotus and African Spotted Creeper S. salvadori. This split is not as yet accepted by Clements.

Starlings Sturnidae

Purple-headed Starling

Hylopsar purpureiceps

Up to six birds were seen daily in Campo Ma'an NP.

Lesser Blue-eared (Glossy) Starling

Lamprotornis chloropterus

We found a small flock of six whilst en route from Garoua to Benoue NP.

Bronze-tailed (Glossy) Starling

Lamprotornis chalcurus

We had superb views of three in Benoue NP.

Splendid (Glossy) Starling

Lamprotornis splendidus

This spectacular, large starling was seen well on a couple of occasions in the Bamenda highlands.

Purple (Glossy) Starling

Lamprotornis purpureus

Another stunning starling, up to twenty was seen during the drive from Garoua to Benoue NP.

Long-tailed Glossy Starling

Lamprotornis caudatus

Good numbers of this impressive species were seen in our wanderings in the woodlands of Benoue NP.

Violet-backed Starling

Cinnyricinclus leucogaster

This stunning bird was seen in woodlands in Benoue NP.

Neumann's Starling

Onychognathus neumanni

One of the giants of the starling world, this impressive bird was seen only in the Bamenda Highlands where we enjoyed great views of one male.

Oxpeckers Buphagidae

Yellow-billed Oxpecker

Buphagus africanus

Three were seen in the Bamenda highlands.

Thrushes Turdidae

[Fraser's] Rufous (Flycatcher-) Thrush Stizorhina fraseri

We had good views of two in Campo Ma'an NP.

African Thrush

Turdus pelios

This is a fairly common bird in Cameroon. We obtained views at many sites often in anthropogenic habitat and particularly good views were had in Benoue NP.

Fire-crested Alethe

Alethe castanea

We heard this species in Campo Ma'an NP.

NOTE: The Lower Guinea form is sometimes split from the nominate White-tailed Alethe of West Africa, becoming A. castanea.

Chats & Old World Flycatchers Muscicapidae

Fraser's (African) Forest Flycatcher

Fraseria cinerascens

We enjoyed superb views of three birds daily in Campo Ma'an NP.

Grey Tit-Flycatcher

Myioparus plumbeus

We heard one calling in Benoue NP.

Northern Black Flycatcher

Melaenornis edolioides

Two were seen in Benoue NP and a further two in the Bamenda highlands.

Swamp Flycatcher

Muscicapa aquatica

One bird was seen very well in Benoue NP.

African Dusky Flycatcher

Muscicapa adusta

A common forest-edge species with two seen in the Bamenda highlands **Yellow-footed Flycatcher** *Muscicapa sethsmithi*

We obtained superb views of one in Campo Ma'an NP.

Sooty Flycatcher

We had good views of up to four daily in Campo Ma'an NP.

Mountain Robin-Chat

Muscicapa infuscata
Campo Ma'an NP.

Cossypha isabellae

We had excellent views of this endemic in the Bamenda highlands where at least 2 birds were seen.

Snowy-crowned Robin-Chat

Cossypha niveicapilla

Seen in small numbers at Benoue NP and in the Bamenda highlands

White-crowned Robin-Chat Cossypha albicapillus

A very large and showy *Cossypha*, much enjoyed by all. We had a total of 8 birds in riverine bush at

Benoue NP.

Whinchat Saxicola rubetra

We had good views of one near Bamenda.

[African] Stonechat Saxicola torquatus

This widespread species was seen very well in the Bamenda highlands.

White-crowned (Mocking) Cliff Chat Thamnolaea coronata

We had wonderful views of a male and female near Bamenda. **Heuglin's Wheatear** *Oenanthe heuglini*

We encountered two of these uncommon intra-African migrants in Benoue NP.

Familiar Chat

We encountered several birds in the rocky areas in Benoue NP.

European Pied Flycatcher

Ficedula hypoleuca

We saw two in Benoue NP and a further two in the Bamenda highlands.

Sunbirds Nectariniidae

Fraser's (Scarlet-tufted) Sunbird

Deleornis fraseri

A confusing species that often looks more like a greenbul than a sunbird, we enjoyed good sightings in Campo Ma'an NP.

NOTE: The species is sometimes lumped with the East African Grey-headed Sunbird D. axillarus.

Mangrove (Mouse-brown) Sunbird

Anthreptes gabonicus

We had stunning views of one at La Digue.

Little Green Sunbird

Anthreptes seimundi

We saw small numbers daily in Campo Ma'an NP.

Grey-chinned (Green) Sunbird

Anthreptes rectirostris

We had good views of two in Campo Ma'an NP.

NOTE: This species is sometimes split into two forms, the Eastern Grey-chinned Sunbird A. tephrolaemus and the nominate Western Yellow-chinned Sunbird.

Collared Sunbird

Hedydipna collaris

This is a very widespread species on the continent. We saw one near the Sanaga River

Pygmy Sunbird

Hedydipna platura

We saw good numbers of these beautiful, long-tailed sunbirds in Benoue NP.

Reichenbach's Sunbird

Anabathmis reichenbachii

We saw this species at La Digue and Kribi where we enjoyed great sightings of several striking males.

Green-headed Sunbird

Cyanomitra verticalis

We had superb sightings at La Digue.

Blue-throated Brown Sunbird Cyanomitra cyanolaema

This forest sunbird was seen in the canopy in Campo Ma'an NP. **Cameroon Sunbird**Cyanomitra oritis

We enjoyed five sightings in the Bamenda highlands.

Olive Sunbird Cyanomitra olivacea

Small numbers were seen daily in Campo Ma'an NP.

NOTE: The Olive-Sunbird species complex is sometimes split into two full species, namely the nominate Eastern Olive-Sunbird C. olivacea and the form which we recorded in Cameroon, Western Olive-Sunbird. There has been a review of this split and several authorities are in doubt of the validity, which is based upon the presence, or lack there-of, of pectoral tufts in the females of the various subspecies within the complex.

Carmelite Sunbird

Chalcomitra fuliginosa

This rather striking sunbird, restricted to coastal areas, was seen very well at La Digue.

Green-throated Sunbird

Chalcomitra rubescens

We enjoyed good views of a female near the Sanaga River.

Scarlet-chested Sunbird

Chalcomitra senegalensis

Seen daily in small numbers in Benoue NP

Olive-bellied Sunbird

Cinnyris chloropygius

This is a typical forest edge species, seen at La Digue and near the Sanaga River.

Northern Double-collared Sunbird

Cinnyris reichenowi

We found several in the Bamenda Highlands.

Beautiful Sunbird

Cinnyris pulchellus

This exquisite sunbird is found only in the drier northern savanna, we enjoyed sightings in Benoue NP.

Orange-tufted Sunbird

Cinnyris bouvieri

We were fortunate to find two stunning males of this rare bird in the Bamenda highlands.

Splendid Sunbird

Cinnyris coccinigastrus

Two stunning males were seen in the Bamenda highlands.

Superb Sunbird

Cinnyris superbus

We found this beauty near Campo Ma'an NP.

Variable Sunbird

Cinnyris venustus

A stunning male was seen in Benoue NP.

Old World Sparrows Passeridae

Chestnut-crowned Sparrow-Weaver

Plocepasser superciliosus

One was seen in Benoue NP, a leader only sighting.

Northern Grey-headed Sparrow

Passer griseus

Cameroon's commonest sparrow was plentiful throughout the country even in urban areas.

NOTE: The Grey-headed Sparrow complex P. griseus has been split into five full species with the Cameroonian form being retaining in the nominate grouping with the same nomenclature.

Bush Petronia

Gymnoris dentata

Common in the north of the country, two birds were seen in Benoue NP.

Weavers, Widowbirds Ploceidae

Baglafecht Weaver

Ploceus baglafecht

Two birds were seen near Bamenda.

Bannerman's Weaver

Ploceus bannermani

This range restricted and endangered bird was seen only in the Bamenda Highlands. We counted a total of 5 birds in the area.

Little Weaver

Ploceus luteolus

This is a diminutive dry-country weaver and was seen in small numbers in Benoue NP and at Garoua.

Spectacled Weaver Ploceus ocularis

Two were seen in Benoue NP.

Black-necked Weaver Ploceus nigricollis

This snappy-looking weaver of forest edge was first seen at La Digue with further sightings at Benoue NP.

Black-billed Weaver

Ploceus melanogaster

This dapper bird of forest fringes was seen very well in the Bamenda highlands.

Village Weaver

Ploceus cucullatus

This is one of Cameroon's most conspicuous birds, with large colonies found in many towns.

NOTE: This widespread African complex is also a candidate for multi-species splitting and the nominate subspecies which we recorded in Cameroon will remain within the nominate Village Weaver P. cucullatus group. These splits are not as yet recognized by Clements.

Vieillot's Black Weaver

Ploceus nigerrimus

Flocks of this beautiful species were noted at all localities in the southern lowlands of Cameroon.

Black-headed Weaver

Ploceus melanocephalus

We found a flock of twenty non-breeding birds near Garoua and several in Benoue NP.

Brown-capped Weaver

Ploceus insignis

This attractive weaver was seen in the Bamenda highlands.

Cassin's (Black-throated) Malimbe

Malimbus cassini

We had superb views of 4 in Campo Ma'an NP. There are few accessible sites to see this species and we were lucky to find this rare bird.

Blue-billed (Gray's) Malimbe

Malimbus nitens

A secretive species that forages in thick tangles, we found a few daily in Campo Ma'an NP.

Red-headed Malimbe

Malimbus rubricollis

We were fortunate to find two in mixed species flocks in Campo Ma'an NP.

Crested Malimbe

Malimbus malimbicus

This is a fairly common species and was seen in small numbers in Campo Ma'an NP.

Red-headed Weaver

Anaplectes rubriceps

One stunning male was seen in Benoue NP.

Red-headed Quelea

Quelea erythrops

At least four birds were seen at the Sanaga River.

Yellow Bishop

Euplectes capensis

Six birds were seen in the Bamenda highlands.

Yellow-mantled Widowbird

Euplectes macroura

We had good views of twenty in Benoue NP.

Waxbills, Munias & Allies Estrildidae

Chestnut-breasted Nigrita

Nigrita bicolor

This attractive seedeater was seen well near the Sanaga River.

Grey-headed Nigrita

Nigrita canicapillus

The commonest nigrita. It was seen at La Digue.

Shelley's (Fernando Po) Oliveback

Nesocharis shelleyi

This beautiful little bird was a nice surprise in the Bamenda highlands where we enjoyed great views of two birds.

Grey-headed Oliveback

Nesocharis capistrata

We enjoyed wonderful views of three birds in Benoue NP and another surprisingly in the forest in the Bamenda highlands.

Red-faced Crimsonwing

Cryptospiza reichenovii

We found one splendid male in the Bamenda highlands. Typically shy and rather uncommon.

Black-bellied Seedcracker

Pyrenestes ostrinus

We had superb views of a male at the Sanaga River.

Western Bluebill

Spermophaga haematina

A remarkably beautiful bird. We heard this species on consecutive days in Campo Ma'an NP.

Brown Twinspot

Clytospiza monteiri

We enjoyed a superb sighting of two whilst en route to Bamenda. A beautifully patterned finch.

Dybowski's Twinspot

Euschistospiza dybowskii

We had cracking views of one in Benoue NP.

Black-bellied Firefinch

Lagonosticta rara

This large firefinch was seen particularly well in Benoue NP where we observed at least six individuals.

Red-billed Firefinch

Lagonosticta senegala

Small numbers encountered in Benoue NP.

African Firefinch

Lagonosticta rubricate

We enjoyed good views of one near Bamenda.

Black-faced Firefinch

Lagonosticta larvata

A rare Firefinch, we had great views of 4 in Benoue NP.

Red-cheeked Cordon-bleu

Uraeginthus bengalus

This is a common and delightful bird of savanna and was seen in Benoue NP and again in the Bamenda highlands.

Orange-cheeked Waxbill

Estrilda melpoda

This was a common species of forest edge and scrub throughout. We had great views of twenty at the Sanaga River.

Black-rumped Waxbill

Estrilda troglodytes

This species was only seen near Garoua where we found six.

Common Waxbill

Estrilda astrild

A flock of ten was seen during the drive from Douala to Bamenda.

Black-crowned Waxbill

Estrilda nonnula

This is an attractive species that was first seen at La Digue with further sightings near Bamenda.

Bronze Mannikin

Lonchura cucullata

We found this to be a ubiquitous species in scrub in most areas.

Black-and-white Mannikin

Lonchura bicolor

We enjoyed good views of one near the Sanaga River.

NOTE: This complex may be split two-ways, the southern and eastern Brown-backed Mannikin L. nigriceps and the northern and western nominate group, which would remain as Black-and-white Mannikin. The latter is the form we recorded in Cameroon. Clements does not as yet recognize this split.

Indigobirds & Whydahs Viduidae

Pin-tailed Whydah

Vidua macroura

This familiar bird, which parasitises small seedeaters, was seen very well at the Benoue River, Garoua.

Wagtails & Pipits Motacillidae

Western Yellow Wagtail

Motacilla flava

Small numbers were seen at La Digue and again at the Benoue River, Garoua.

Mountain Wagtail

Motacilla clara

We enjoyed great views of two in the Bamenda Highlands.

African Pied Wagtail

Motacilla aguimp

A common and familiar African bird, we saw one in Benoue NP.

African (Cameroon) Pipit

Anthus cinnamomeus

We had good views of several in the Bamenda highlands.

NOTE: Cameroon Pipit, A.camaroonensis is sometimes split from African Pipit.

Long-legged Pipit

Anthus pallidiventris

We had great views of 1 in Campo Ma'an NP.

Tree PipitAnthus trivialis
We enjoyed great views of one in the Bamenda Highlands.

Finches Fringillidae

White-rumped Seedeater

Crithagra leucopygia

We found five near the Benoue River, Garoua.

Yellow-fronted Canary

Crithagra mozambica

This species was seen in small numbers daily in Benoue NP and in the Bamenda highlands.

Thick-billed Seed-eater

Crithagra burtoni

Small numbers of this odd seedeater were seen daily in the Bamenda highlands.

We had fantastic views of thousands in Douala.

Squirrels Sciuridae

Striped Ground Squirrel

Euxerus erythropus

One was seen in Benoue NP.

African Pygmy Squirrel

Myosciurus pumilio

One was seen in Campo Ma'an NP.

African Giant Squirrel

Protoxerus stangeri

We had good views of one in Campo Ma'an NP.

Mongooses Herpestidae

Slender Mongoose

Herpestes ichneumon

We had great views of one en route to Campo Ma'an NP.

Genets & Civet Viverridae

Common (Small-spotted) Genet

Genetta genetta

We had a good sighting of one in Campo Ma'an NP.

African Palm Civet Nandinidae

African Palm Civet

Nandinia binotata

We had good but brief views of one during our night drive in Campo Ma'an NP.

Hyraxes Procavidae

Western Tree Hyrax

Dendrohyrax dorsalis

We heard this species on consecutive days in Campo Ma'an NP. It was surprising to hear this nocturnal species calling during the day on several occasions.

Hippopotamuses Hippopotamidae

Hippopotamus

Hippopotamus amphibius

At least 20 were observed in Benoue NP.

Giraffes Giraffidae

Giraffe

Giraffe camelopardus

We had great sightings of 2 in Benoue NP.

Bovids & Horned Ungulates Bovidae

At least 3 of these striking antelope were seen in Benoue NP.

Bush Duiker Sylvicapra grimmia

Two were seen in Benoue NP.

Red-flanked Duiker

Cephalophus rufilatus

Up to 6 daily were seen in Benoue NP.

Kob

Kobus kob

This was a fairly common mammal in Benoue NP where daily totals reached 30.

REPTILES

Red-headed Rock Agama

Agama agama

We had good views of many in Garoua and Benoue NP.

Nile Crocodile

Crocodylus niloticus

We had great views of 10 in Benoue National Park.

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
