The luck of the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department may be changing with the approval of two new vehicles for the force.

Wet/dry vote inside city limits will not be on May ballot

Attorney William Leger represents several local businesses who have been attempting to have a wet/dry vote, for inside the city limits, placed on the ballot for the first time in the May Primary elections.

A petition had been circulated in which 25% of voters would have to sign in order to have the issue placed on the ballot in the primary. This means the petition would have to include slightly more than 200 signatures.

According to Leger, the petition contained more than enough signatures to be placed on the ballot but, due to recent changes in Kentucky statutes, the petition's submittal to the county clerk's office was late and the issue cannot be addressed in the May primary. However, Leger, who is

Local company files suit against resident

A local manufacturing company has filed a civil suit, in Rockcastle Circuit Court, against a local resident.

The suit was filed Monday by Eagle Manufacturing of North America and company CEO Douglas N. Thornburg II against Sam Hamilton of Mt. Vernon and charges defamation, libel, slander, intentional interference with economic opportunity and intentional infliction of emotional distress.

The suit claims that Hamilton has made false statements about the plaintiff to third parties, in a fixed medium (reportedly Facebook) and in a transitory form.

The suit also charges that Hamilton's remarks have caused his company to "lose work that they would have had if not for Sam's interference" and the behavior has "caused great stress and pain to both Douglas and his immediate and extended family."

Eagle Manufacturing recently took occupancy of the former Anchor Packaging Building and is in production.

The one thing for certain I know I would not do is to show up at this country's southern border, waving the flag of my home country and with professionallymade signs demanding my "right" to come into this country illegally.



I'm worn down from the work I had done all week so his jacket would have the proper logo and he must think I'm really lazy. I wish I had more energy.

My eyelids were heavy but if I nap, he would think I am just wasting my life away. I wish I were wide awake.

He wants to go experience new things and get out and play. But I'm thinking how tired and sore I am because I had worked hard making the food that had filled his belly. He must think I am so boring. I wish I were more exciting.

I just then noticed my television was on Fox News channel instead of a movie filled with explosions. I need to know what's happening in the world to better protect him.

I wish I didn't have to ask him to repeat everything

he says to me. That must really get on his nerves. But I can't help it. I have terrible ears and can barely hear him. I wish I could hear bet-

I know he wants to go see new things, but, personally, I've been most everywhere and not much is prettier or more soothing than the creek on the back of our place.

My old truck has a lot of miles on it, but it gets me wherever I need to go. I'd rather spend the money keeping up the farm so that someday he will have it.

In an instant, I realized I owe my grandparents an apology.

All of the things I used to dislike about their lives, is now the center of mine. My priorities have changed so much that I have become them. And it turns out, they were right all along.

I wish I had been more patient and understanding. I wish I had known why they lived the way they did and I know that someday, my son will have the same wishes.

belly and he has to wear it almost 24-7. He is allowed to take it out when he's involved in an athletic event as long as somebody is close by with a glucometer and an insulin syringe. The needle location has to be changed every three days. While he has not yet mastered the science of changing the needle by himself, he has been doing his own blood tests and carbohydrate counts since he was age three. Tyler was already a math whiz, 2 years before he started kindergar-

The pump is far less painful than having 3 to 5 insulin shots ever day and the dosage regulation is also much more precise. But the thing that most amazes me is that TKO does not allow the contraption or the disease to slow him down or prevent him from doing anything he wants to do.

Diabetes is the 7th, mostlisted on death certificates, cause of death in our country. However, it is most likely the root cause of a host of other killers such as heart disease, strokes, kidney failure, liver disease, blood poisoning and hemorrhages, to name a few, that are listed as the cause of death without mentioning diabetes.

For example, even

though neither of them has done me in so far, I have had two strokes that the doctors tell me were probably related to my diabetes. The jury is still out on whether my intimate association with Mr. Parkinson was brought on by erratic blood sugar imbalances. The point is that if either of them had proven to be fatal, my diabetes would not have been listed as a cause of death even though it would, most likely, have been the root cause. Thanks to diabetes, I underwent4 eye surgeries in 2015, 2 in 2017 and I am already in need of another round. Diabetes is one of, if not the most absolute, leading causes of blindness and is, by far, the leading cause of lower extremity amputations among adults. I could go on and on, but I think you get the picture. The truth of the matter

is that, other than visual impairment, I am not much bothered with the disease on a daily basis as long as I take a 750mg Metformin pill, orally, twice a day, try to eat responsibly and get as much exercise as possible. Metformin as well as Tyler's insulin pump are only 2 of the dozens of improved diabetes treatment results of ADA sponsored research.





More information about "Dry Drowning"

Recent reports of children dying from what's referred to incorrectly "dry drowning" should not cause parents unnecessary worry, according to the nation's emergency physicians.

"Swimming is not with-

out some risk," said Paul Kivela, MD, MBA, FACEP, president of the American College of Emergency Physicians. "You could develop pneumonia or other infections from inhaling water, for example. But, there are no cases of completely normal healthy children who suddenly die because they went swimming days earlier. If water gets in your airway or lungs, symptoms show very quickly, they do not emerge out of the blue days later. The concept of 'dry drowning' is a misnomer and a myth, let's stop using the term and avoid causing undue alarm."

There are no medically accepted conditions known as "near-drowning," "dry drowning," or "secondary drowning." The World Health Organization, the International Liaison Committee on Resuscitation, the Wilderness Medical Society, the International Lifesaving Federation, the International Conference on Drowning, the American Heart Association, the American Red Cross, and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) all discourage the use of these terms. These terms are often used instead of the proper term, which is drowning. Drowning is a process, with a spectrum of effects ranging from mild to severe with fatal and nonfatal outcomes.

"If a child has breathing problems at any time, a parent should take him or her to the emergency department," Dr. Kivela added. Nonfatal drowning injuries may result in long-term disabilities or potentially permanent brain damage. Every day, about 10 people die from drowning, according to the CDC.

Tips for safety near water can be important for adults and children:

- Supervise children. It takes very small amounts of water and in some cases only seconds for a child to accidentally drown when an adult turns away.

- Learn to swim. Swimming lessons can help prevent people, especially young children, from drowning.

- Learn CPR. Know what to do while waiting for help to arrive. CPR skills can mean the difference between life and death or permanent brain damage.
- Use the "buddy sys-

tem." Do not swim alone.

And, choose to swim in ar-

eas with lifeguards on duty, if possible.
- Avoid alcohol. Drinking alcohol while on a boat or swimming in the water can severely impair a person's judgment, motor skills and cognition. Never consume alcohol while operating a

boat or supervising children

around water.

- Use life jackets. The number of Coast Guard-approved life jackets should matches the number of passengers on a boat, jet ski or other vessel. Keep them in an easily accessible place. Young children should have a life jacket on at all times when on a boat or in the water.

- Air-filled or foam toys are not safety devices. These toys are not substitutes for life jackets and are not designed to keep swimmers safe.

- Know weather conditions. If strong winds or heavy thunderstorms and lightning are rolling in, get out of the water and seek shelter immediately.

shelter immediately.

- Be aware of waves and rip currents. If on the beach, watch for dangerous waves and rip currents. Some currents are stronger than even the most skilled swimmers. Pay attention to weather and current warnings before entering the water. If caught in a rip current, swim parallel to shore. Once free of the current, swim toward the shore.

Headquartered in Dallas, Texas, ACEP has 53 chapters representing each state, as well as Puerto Rico and the District of Columbia. A Government Services Chapter represents emergency physicians employed by military branches and other government agencies.

to buy a new motorcycle of my own. That was late in 1968, and I was twentyfour-years-old. (As I write this, I find it hard to believe that was fifty years ago.)

My purchase was a new, bright gold, Honda CB350 Super Sport. I learned all about the outlying area of Montgomery County on that popular cycle. That model was made from 1968 until 1973. It had a 36 horsepower, four-stroke engine, with a top speed of 110 miles per hour.

As a young teacher, I rode my motorcycle to work at Mt. Sterling High School (MSHS). A good friend of mine, Doyle King, was also one of the football coaches at MSHS at that time. Doyle had played football at the University of Kentucky. From the first time that he saw me on my Honda until this very day, he has always called me "Bronson." If I am in a crowd and hear. "Hev Bronson," I know immediately it is Doyle.

The name that Doyle used in reference to me originated from the 1969 television show Then Came Bronson. Michael Parks played the starring role of Jim Bronson, a vagabond who roamed the country searching for answers in the chaos of the age. He was a hero to many motorcycle riders of the time. The show,

however, lasted only one year. That never seemed to matter in terms of Doyle's new nickname for me—it stuck.

The first time that I recall Doyle referring to me as Bronson was at a faculty meeting at MSHS. As I entered the library door, Doyle yelled, "Hey Bronson, come back here and sit with us!" The faculty screamed with laughter.

In my lifetime, I have owned only two new motorcycles. But I was always surprised and delighted (most of the time) with how many people wanted to take a ride on the back seat of my Honda.

I'm not alone in loving the feeling of fresh air blowing on my face while coasting along the small backroads of Kentucky, most of which afford lovely pastoral and mountainous views. I even took one trip to the Smokies on that gold cycle, but that is a tale for another time.

Meanwhile, my encounters with Doyle will serve to remind me of my days of riding a motorcycle. It was a time well worth remembering. So, frankly, I don't mind at all if you want to call me Bronson.

Deciphering the white bass runs this spring

This spring seems like one long continuation of late winter. As soon as we get a warm day, the temperature plunges and we are back in February again. It even snowed on Monday of the third week of April.

This up and down weather combined with cold rains has the spring fishing season behind by a few weeks. The spawning runs of white bass into the headwaters of reservoirs are scattershot so far this spring, with some movement followed by retreat.

"I don't think the white bass have really had a chance to run yet," said Ron Brooks, director of Fisheries for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. "I think the fluctuating water temperatures are screwing them up a bit. We need a sustained warm front to get them going."

in the low 50s in most reservoirs and streams across Kentucky.

Anglers fishing the head-

Anglers fishing the headwaters of Taylorsville Lake found rewarding, but sporadic, fishing over the last week. "Last Thursday, I took home six white bass, but on Friday, I took home 10, at least four of them over 15 inches," said Clifford Scott, internal policy analyst for Kentucky Fish and Wildlife. "I had to walk quietly out of there because I had the biggest stringer of fish."

Scott took his fish with a combination of old-school 2-inch curly-tailed grubs in white and yellow along with a 2-inch Bobby Garland Baby Shad in pink and pearl.

"I saw small shad all over the place," Scott said. "Once I saw them, I switched to the Baby Shad. You had to fish for the white bass, they were not on a hard run, but produced enough action to keep your interest."

The upper part of Taylorsville Lake WMA grants bank access to anglers that produces fishing comparable to those in boats

Mike Hardin, assistant director of Fisheries, caught some white bass in the upper reaches of Taylorsville Lake this past weekend. "We caught them above the first riffle from the impounded water," he said.
"We caught a mixed bag of
different sizes and caught
more in the evening than in
the morning. The males
were marked up in breeding
colors. We caught a few females, so they are already
staging for the spawn."

White bass populations are by nature cyclic, and good fishing often erupts in lakes over the course of a year or two.

Green River Lake is one of those lakes poised for a white bass breakout. Southwestern Fisheries District biologist Eric Cummins and crew conducted white bass population sampling on the lake last year. They found excellent reproduction in 2014 for white bass, producing an expanding population of fish 14 inches and longer in the lake.

Last week, some bass anglers fishing a tournament on Green River Lake reported incidental catches of white bass while fishing crankbaits for largemouth bass. Anglers should search the Robinson Creek arm from Wilson Creek up to the KY 76 Bridge (Knifley Road) and in the Green River arm above Holmes Bend.

Bank anglers can access the upper end of the Robinson Creek arm at the Elkhorn Ramp and the Wilson Creek Recreation Area. They may also access the upper section of the Green River arm at the Snake Creek Ramp and other roads on the Green River WMA in that area.

Cave Run Lake is another reservoir with growing numbers of white bass. Population surveys conducted in 2017 show high numbers of larger fish, which should mean good fishing in 2018. Search for surface activity to find white bass in spring on the lake.

The fishing peaks in summer on Cave Run, when white bass get in the "jumps" by trapping shad against the surface and ripping through them. The confluence near the mouth

of Buck Creek as well as the areas around the Clay Lick and Alfrey boat ramps make excellent places to search for them when it gets hot. Any shad imitating topwater cast into the jumps will get smoked.

Some anglers caught fish in the Broad Ford area in the headwaters of Nolin River Lake a few weeks ago, but the fishing slowed with the cold rains that accompanied major frontal passages earlier in April. The sustained warm weather in the upcoming forecast will draw waves of white bass into Nolin River Lake above Bacon Creek Ramp.

Fast and furious fishing during the spring runs makes white bass one of the most popular fish anglers pursue. When they are on, you can catch several fish on consecutive casts.

In-line spinners like the venerable Rooster Tail in white, chartreuse and pink all score white bass. You can work an in-line spinner near the surface or let it sink a few feet and retrieve. Vary the depths of the retrieve until you hit fish.

Like what Scott found last week, small shadshaped soft plastic lures or curly tailed grubs also attract white bass. Some anglers fishing the headwaters of reservoirs suspend 1/16-to 1/32-ounce white feather or hair jigs under bobbers and let them drift in the current. Change the depth of the jig until you find white bass.

Anglers may keep 15 white bass daily, but only five of the daily limit may be longer than 15 inches. White bass fishing gives you a fantastic reason to buy your fishing license, so don't forget to get one if you haven't already.





Fill soil should be free of organics, deleterious debris, or rocks larger than 3 inches in diameter. Suitable fill soil should have a plasticity index (PI) less than 25 and a maximum dry density according to the standard Proctor compaction test of at least 100 pounds per cubic foot (pcf).

Beneath proposed building pads, roadways, and other paved areas, the fill shall be compacted to at least 98 percent of the standard Proctor (ASTM D-698) maximum dry density of the soil at moisture content within 2 percent of optimum. The soil should be placed in lifts of 8 inches or less, and should be compacted and tested prior to placing additional lifts. All fill pads should extend laterally at least 5 feet beyond the building before sloping down. Where fill is placed on slopes of 15% or greater, the existing subgrade shall be cut in horizontal benches to prevent sliding failure of the fill material. This will also provide uniform thickness of the fill material which helps deter differential settlement.

In-place density testing shall be conducted for each lift placed to confirm compaction has been achieved.

UNITE vouchers helped two Drug Court grads receive treatment

"I felt like there was no hope, that I would always be an addict," said Aaron "Cody" O'Connor, reflecting on his return to jail a few years ago after failing a Drug Court drug screening. "I (finally) realized I wanted help, I just didn't know how to get it."

Upon qualifying for an Operation UNITE Treatment Voucher, O'Connor was able to enter long-term residential treatment at WestCare-Kentucky's facility in Pike County. On Thursday, April 26, the now 30-year-old stood proud as he was recognized as a graduate from the 28th Judicial Adult Drug Court.

Ashley S. Laxton, Program Supervisor for the Drug Court program serving Lincoln, Pulaski and Rockcastle counties, said after O'Connor returned from treatment he went sanction free, and even organized a fundraiser for the new SKY Hope Women's Recovery Center currently under construction in

"I wouldn't have been able to go (to treatment) without (the UNITE Treatment Voucher). I couldn't afford it," said the Pulaski County resident who had struggled with prescription opioid and methamphetamine use since age 15.

A total of nine individuals were honored as Drug Court graduates. O'Connor was one of two - both Pulaski County residents – whose journey to recovery included receipt of a UNITE Treatment Voucher.

"It's been very, very rough," said Aston Cook, whose drug use began at age 14 following the death of her grandmother.

"It started with mari-

juana," Cook recalled. Pregnant at age 16, things kept progressing until she was into much "heavier drugs" by age 21.

"She has done exception-

ally well (in Drug Court)," Cook said. "She's a good example. She's come a long way.

Cook said sobriety has "made me optimistic and positive that there are people out there who are willing to help. It means my

life, my family, my (three) children."

A Drug Court is a specialty court providing a sentencing alternative of treatment for non-violent offenders through an extensive supervision program. Drug Court is a non-adversarial

"This is one of the best days of the year for me," stated David A. Tapp, Drug Court Judge for the 28th Judicial Circuit.

Tapp likened the graduates' journey to that of American rap artist Eminem - who overcame his own struggles with addiction - and the 2010 album "Recovery," which was dedicated "to anyone who's in a dark place tryin' to get out. Keep your head up ... It does get better!"
"You have worked hard

to get here. I'm sure there were a lot of ups and downs. Lots of struggles," Van Ingram, Executive Director of the Kentucky Office of Drug Control Policy, told the graduates. "We need you in the workforce. We need you to stay involved in your recovery community."

Ingram, turning to the audience, said it was important to do everything possible to reduce the stigma associated with substance use disorders. "Yes, people relapse. But, they recover, too," he stated.

Before the clock strikes midnight, four Kentuckians and 150 Americans will have died from a drug overdose, Ingram noted, adding that while Kentucky is currently on the right path opioid prescribing and drug overdose death rates have declined in the past year we cannot let our guard

"This is a man-made epidemic caused by greed," Ingram stated. "We've let opioids become the default drug for everything.'

Elizabeth Nichols, Specialty Courts Manager for the Kentucky Administrative Office of the Courts and a member of the Operation UNITE Board of Directors, thanked those in attendance for supporting the graduates through the Drug Court process. "Continue to support them," she urged. "They are going to need you

now more than ever."

mean bear activity is on the rise in Kentucky. Complaints about bears raiding garbage are on the rise as well, as hungry animals are looking for an easy meal.

A bear problem may be easier fixed by changing your own habits, rather than trying to change the bear's

Most bear problems center around food, according to John Hast, bear program coordinator for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. To a bear, your garbage or an open dumpster can equate to a quick and easy meal. Even food scraps thrown out to bears in parks can create a problem.

"We've found that time and time again, a fed bear is a dead bear," Hast said. "A bear that is used to human food, whether it's scraps or garbage, begins to lose its where the problems begin."

"Most of the bears that travel though central and west Kentucky are typically males that got kicked out of the breeding range in the mountains during May and June," Hast said. "We had two bears move through central Kentucky last summer; the most noted one was sighted by people in Jessamine County, but never caused any danger to residents of the area."

Residents in bear areas can do more than just keep their garbage in a secure location until pickup. Other suggestions for making an area less attractive to bears include:

- Only feeding outside pets what they will eat at one sitting, and not leaving pet food out overnight.
- Removing birdfeeders in spring and summer. Birds have plenty of natural foods







foster parent of a child who will be enrolled at the school during the term of office. Legal guardians are also considered parents if the child lives with them. Parent members may not have a conflict of interest as defined by KRS Chapter 45A, which deals with doing business with the district. They must not be Roundstone Elementary School or Central Office employees, relatives of Roundstone Elementary School or Central Office employees, or members of the district school board or spouse of district school board member. Parents employed at other schools in our district and their relatives may serve as parent members of our council. For this purpose "relative" is defined as either a father, mother, brother, sister, husband, wife, son, daughter, aunt, uncle, son-in-law, or daughter-in-law.

The Parent Teacher Organization shall oversee the election of two parents to serve on the council. These parents shall be selected during the month of May each year. All parents (except those previously excluded) who will have children attending Roundstone Elementary School during their term shall be eligible to be elected to serve on the council. All parents who will have children attending the school are eligible to vote in the parent elections.

The term of office begins on July 1, 2018 and ends on June 30,

All terms of office for teachers and parent council members shall be for one year with re-election permitted as long as they meet the eligibility requirements. No term limits shall be imposed on members who are nominated and elected to consecutive one-year terms. (KRS 160.345)



Mamaw's Kitchen

VEGETABLE SOUP MIX

Judy, Mum, and Rhonda were visiting me at my dorm when I was a student at Berea College. They had brought me a jar of Mum's home canned vegetable soup mix. Rhonda was about 5 years old and wanted to carry the jar to me. She got excited and started waving at me, forgot about the jar she was carrying, and dropped it. Of course, she dropped it on the sidewalk so the jar broke. She started to cry, but we calmed her. Today she can laugh about it, but at the time it was far from a

laughing matter. 8 potatoes, peeled and diced 4 cups fresh cut off cob corn 16 carrots, diced

4 cups chopped onion, 8 C peeled and quartered toma-

4 cups fresh broken green beans 3 cups chopped bell peppers 8 quarts water

Put all vegetables and water in a large kettle. Bring to a boil, reduce heat and gently simmer for 3 minutes. Pack into hot sterilized jars, adding 1 teaspoon salt in bottom of each jar. Seal and process in pressure cooker at 10 bounds pressure for 70 minutes. Remove and cool before storing in a dark, cool place.

TOMATO PRESERVES 4 pounds medium-ripe tomatoes 1 teaspoon whole cloves 1/2 tablespoon broken stick cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon whole allspice 4 cups sugar

2 cups vinegar

Scald, peel, and quarter tomatoes. Place in large kettle over low heat. Tie spices in a loose cheesecloth bag. Add to tomatoes along with the sugar and vinegar. Simmer over low heat, stirring frequently until thick, but trying not to break up tomatoes too much. Remove and discard spice bag. Ladle into hot jars, leaving about 1/4-inch space at top. Wipe jar rims and threads clean. Cover jars with hot canning lids. Screw rings on firmly. Place jars in a boiling water bath. Cover canner and return water to a boil; boil 5 minutes. Remove jars from canner and let cool. Check seals and store in a cool, dry place.



INSPECTION PERIOD

FOR THE PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENT ROLL

The Rockcastle County real property tax roll will be opened for inspection from May 7 through May 21, 2018. Under the supervision of the property valuation administrator or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the tax roll.

This is the January 1, 2018 assessment on which state, county and school taxes for 2018 will be due about September 15, 2018.

The tax roll is in the office of the property valuation administrator and may be inspected between the hours of 8:30 am and 4:00 pm.

Any taxpayer desiring to appeal an assessment on real property made by the PVA must first request a conference with the PVA or a designated deputy. The conference may be held prior to or during the inspection period.

Any taxpayer still aggrieved by an assessment on real property, after the conference with the PVA or designated deputy, may appeal to the county board of assessment appeals.

The taxpayer can appeal his or her assessment by filing in person or sending a letter or other written petition stating the reasons for appeal, identifying the property and stating the taxpayer's opinion of the fair cash value of the property.

The appeal must be filed with the county clerk's office no later than one work day following the conclusion of the inspection period.

Any taxpayer failing to appeal to the county board of assessment appeals, or failing to appear before the board, either in person or by designated representative, will not be eligible to appeal directly to the Kentucky Claims Commission.

Appeals of personal property assessments shall not be made to the county board of assessment appeals. Personal property taxpayers shall be served notice under the provisions of KRS 132.450(4) and shall have the protest and appeal rights granted under the provisions of KRS 131.110.

The following steps should be taken when a taxpayer does not agree with the assessed value of personal property as determined by the office of property valuation administrator.

- (1) He or she must list under protest (for certification) what he believes to be the fair cash value of the property.
- (2) A written protest must be filed directly with the Department of Revenue, Office of Property Valuation within 30 days from the date of the notice of assessment.
- (3) This protest must be in accordance with KRS 131.110.
- (4) The final decision of the Department of Revenue may be appealed to the Kentucky Claims Commission.

My name is Forest Quillen. I am a drug counselor with Teen Challenge, a motivational speaker for drug awareness and a youth minister. Four years ago, I found myself in darkness; miserable, disgusted, confused and hopeless. I haven't forgotten what it feels like to be in addiction. I lived everyday for the poke that penetrates the skin to escape. Pleasure is a powerful thing! I am 25 years old, I have a beautiful wife who has never touched a drug or smoked a cigarette. I have my first child on the way due in September. I am happy and at peace without living everyday for the pleasure of myself. I Love myself and those around me, but it hasn't always been this

I was raised in a drug influenced home. Both of my parents were IV users of cocaine. Every day was full of animosity and tears. Unfortunately, my childhood lifestyle is common amongst today's generation. I never wanted to do drugs as a kid. I hated the destruction of my home, and never wanted to become like my parents who were most miserable. Even though this was in my heart, I did not have the character or wisdom to keep me separated from the path of bad choices. Every day I would come home and my parents would peek out from behind a door and tell me, "Son go play we are busy." What they were really saying was, "Son, your parents are too busy pursuing their own pleasures, so you go and pursue yours." That's what I did. I surrounded myself with kids whose parents let them do whatever they

wanted to do.

Ultimately, I tried smoking, dipping, drinking and one day I smoked my first marijuana joint. That was the beginning of the end for me; even though I couldn't see it from there I was on the path to darkness. "You always become what you are becoming today", that is what I tell the students I speak with. Your daily routine today determines your destiny. I was blind as a child to the path on which I traveled. As one thing led to another, by the time I had turned 18 years old I was snorting pills, smoking weed, drinking, smoking, dipping and addicted to pornography. The day I turned 18 I was sent to prison for two years for burglary. After getting out, I knew how to manufacture Meth, and became twice the criminal I was. I went back to jail when I was 20 years old to serve out another two-year sentence for other burglaries.

It was in prison that someone first presented a needle to me. I told myself that I would never go that

far but in one weak moment I decided to try the forbidden. Once I crossed that line and pushed through that wall, all my restriction with the needle vanished. At first I was very clean, and paranoid about catching something. Then there was the moment when I had no more clean needles and I reused some of the old ones. I remember the man who looked at me in the face and from the color of my eyes he declared to me that I had hepatitis. I was so terrified of being labeled with an STD. After getting checked and finding out that I was positive, I lost a lot of self worth. I began sharing needles with others who had Hep C. We could never get clean needles. I never wanted anyone to see me buy them because I felt like they would judge me. We used what they call "Horse needles" that we would by from farmers markets. We would toss our needles anywhere and everywhere. We had no conscience or care. The only thing we cared about was our next fix. People think that someone who uses should have a conscience and dispose of their needles properly, but the truth is we are numb and past the point of having a conscience. If we had any type of conscience we would not be doing what we are doing to ourselves and our family. We are bent to pursue pleasure and anything that will allow us to escape or cope with reality. As a drug counselor, and minister who deals with addictions in and out of the streets, I see the carelessness and the hopelessness

in their hearts. Many that I

speak to have been diag-

nosed with forms of hepa-

titis and Aids. I remember when I was in a jail cell after I found out that I had Hep C. I shared a needle with over 30 men on multiple occasions with the same rig. No doubt, others were infected during this

I was against the needle exchange programs when I first heard about them. After I got over the shock of its title and began to think of the possible benefits I changed my mind. So many needles are lying dormant all over the streets, next to our homes, in the rivers and close to our children. An addict will hold the dirty to get the clean. The clean will help prevent the rapid spread of Hepatitis C and Aids. The facts and statistics of this vast

spread of transmitted diseases are in every community. Once you get past the name of these programs and begin to look at the outcome you will see the g good. Peer mentors are at the post of many exchanges reaching out hands to pray with and inform addicts on how to get help. Some people feel if they support such a program they are supporting shooting up drugs, but that's not the case. It's supporting a clean community and seeking to contain the outbreak of transmitted disease that the drug epidemic is creating in every community. I urge you to consider the benefits of the harm reduction program and support the implementation of it in Rockcastle County.

Frankfort Update...

By Jonathon Shell State Representative

An extremely productive 2018 legislative session included huge victories for children and families.

Look no further than the historic reforms made to Kentucky's adoption and foster care systems. It was

the top priority of the House transform the way we handle children held in state care,

and we did that in House Bill

As an adoptive father, I saw many of the troubles with these systems when I took in my seven year-old son, Jaxson. This measure is all about doing what's best for children – with a focus on getting them out of troubling situations and into loving homes in a timely man-

This legislation mandates stricter timelines for the court system to process children, while also establishing more oversight over child welfare in the Commonwealth. It empowers foster parents to have a stronger voice in the process, while also preventing needless delays in a child's placement proceedings. HB 1 also provides for a quicker process to terminate the parental rights of those who abuse harmful drugs prior to giving birth, but refuse to seek treatment. These reforms are fully funded in the final state budget.

Unfortunately, the social workers who deal with many of these issues are woefully underpaid and suffer from high caseloads. That is why our budget set aside money to hire more social workers and raise their pay, including giving the Department of Community Based Services (DCBS) over \$22 million to fund up to 10 percent raises.

We also provided millions in new dollars for updated technology, something recommended by the House Adoption Working Group that will reduce the heavy burden of paperwork on our social workers.

We also passed one of the strongest pieces of legislation to protect the unborn in the United States, something that has been a priority for me ever since entering public office. House Bill 454 bans a particularly brutal form of abortion from occurring after eleven weeks of pregnancy. This follows up on legislation we passed last year that bans all abortion after 20 weeks and blocked any state funding of Planned

This season we also passed welfare reform that cracks down on waste, fraud, and abuse. When able-bodied individuals receive government benefits that they do not deserve, they cut in front of the needy citizens of our community who have actually fallen on hard times.

Our area also received special attention when it comes to judicial redistricting. House Bill 348 added a family court judge to the judicial circuit covering Rockcastle County, which is one of the most overburdened circuits in the entire state. That reality has denied timely court proceedings to numerous children and families, and I was proud to successfully fight to obtain a new judge for Rockcastle in this redistricting effort.

In a time where fiscal responsibility is a must, we nonetheless invested in some critical priorities. Not only did we raise social worker pay and allocate over \$23million to improve foster care placement, but we also provided around \$5 million for Kinship Care. This program provides a stipend for relatives who care for displaced children, including grandparents, and is a valuable program that was discontinued by the Beshear Administration.

Our budget also not only restored proposed cuts to the Family Resource and Youth Service Centers in our schools, but actually increased their funding. These programs serve our students extremely well by breaking down non-academic barriers to learning, and we put them first in the budget.

As a lawmaker, it is my top priority to work in a bipartisan manner to improve the stability and well-being of our children and families. And that's exactly what we did this session in passing a pro-family budget, as well as legislation that works to unite families.

I will also think about those candidates who believe that funding pet projects and studying the effects of cattle belches on


the Ozone layer, is more important than my family keeping what we earn and being able to afford groceries this week.



Shell's is actually half a dozen greenhouses, side by side, and each one feels like a football field under roof.

They aren't actually as large as football fields but they are cavernous and it's worth the drive just to see and smell inside them.

In the meantime I'm wondering why anybody buys plants at the big box stores. Last night, after feeling ill over plant prices at one of them, we stopped at Granny's Treasures on Stanford Street in Lancaster where I scored 4 pink brandywine tomato plants for \$1.50. Same price for 4 banana peppers, less than half what the usual suspects charge.

Early last week we stopped at Jennings Home Supply on 21 just west of I-75 Berea exit 76. Patty Jennings had a vast array of hard-to-find tomato plants but no pink Brandywines. The rest of her plants are reasonably priced.

Ditto for Debbie's

Greenhouse on Short Road

in Paint Lick where you can

find several varieties of both

flowers and vegetables not available elsewhere. That's what we also found at Williams' Greenhouse about a mile out North Dogwood Drive in Berea. North Dogwood is about 200 yards past exit 76 on the west side of I-75. We went there explicitly looking for pink Brandywines.

They didn't have them but we wound up spending \$31.50 on over a dozen varieties we'd never heard of and decided we couldn't live without.

I have raised 3 varieties of tomatoes from seed, giant Syrian, Molly Helton sunburst and mountain man.

I didn't raise pink Brandywines because I hadn't saved seeds and the company I ordered from put me on back order, promising I'd have them soon. That was in February. I'm still waiting. I had promised myself and my wife, that those 4 varieties would be it but Mr. Williams has talked me into trying 3 more and I am anxiously anticipating what an Anna Russian tomato will look and taste like. I've never tried

In the meantime, old friend and distant cousin, John Holbrook drove up from Renfro Valley and dropped off 15 or so tomato cages he had constructed from concrete rebar mesh, the same stuff on which I have been growing beans since 1986. The bean hoops are 32 years old and still sturdy. John's tomato cages will surely out live me.

Immigration requirements: or, how South Korea turned me into a hamster

It was a slow transformation. I didn't wake up to find myself turned into a rodent or anything. In fact, the metamorphosis began last Fall, when I was looking for international teaching jobs.

I grew up in Brodhead and, after finishing high school (RCHS, 2003), I earned an MA in English at EKU (2009) and have been teaching since. I taught writing at EKU for five years and am currently on my third year of university teaching in South Korea.

When my transformation began, I was working at a community college in South Carolina. One Saturday, I went to a coffee house down the street to apply for a couple of teaching jobs, only to find that I had a request to submit an application to Woosong University in Daejeon, South Korea.

That's when it started. Resume. Scans of diplo-

mas. Transcripts. Copy of passport. University application. Departmental application. It went on and on.

But I got an interview.

Before the second interview which, like the first, was late at night because of the 13-14 hour time difference between Korea and home, I had to submit even more paperwork.

But they offered me a job as an assistant professor in the English depart-

Before my wife and I could pull up stakes and go, though, there was even more immigration paperwork. In order to qualify for a work visa, I had to submit a dozen passport photos who needs that many?! among several other things.

Paperwork finalized, we boarded a Delta flight in Lexington and flew to Seoul where an old friend met us at the train station.

I'm a big guy, even by

Kentucky standards, so, at 6'2", I stick out here. But I didn't completely change into a hamster until about a week of doing in-country immigration requirements. To get the Alien Registration Card — the equivalent of a Green Card or work permit in the USA — meant even more paperwork.

Contracts, bank accounts, applications for residency, health checks — drug and disease free, of course — all of which required at least one photo. You'd think the dozen I sent over months ago would've sufficed, but you'd be wrong.

And then the hamstermaking happened. My wife and I were looking for a cheaper way to procure a dozen more photos, and that meant a trip to an ID-photo booth in the subway station. (Strange placement, right?)

Having waited to the last minute, I had enough time to regret my decision but not enough time to do anything about it.

To get the photo just right, you've got to position your face within a box on a screen, which then focuses the lens and take the photo. I step into the booth, then immediately bang my knee on the inside wall.

In terms of leg and head room, the booth was made for someone at least six inches shorter than me! To get my head in the

frame and in focus, I had to hang one leg out of the booth, slouch my shoulders, then stick my head forward.

I had five seconds to make sure my (long) hair was was behind my ears and that my face was appropriately expressionless (for ID photos). Three... two...

Hamster!

The metamorphosis happened somewhere in the development process — my nose all but disappeared, eyes were darker and set farther apart, expression was void of all thought, save where a guy might find a hamster wheel for his new apartment.

In reality, I'm the same guy who left Brodhead one night in February. I'm only a hamster on a handful of Korean government documents and on my campus mailbox.

About two months have passed since the hamster incident and my writing this, and I'm planning to tell more stories about my time here. I'm quite fond of Korea but will do my best to present it fairly!

I'm just happy the immigration process is over and, compared to what people immigrating to the US go through, relatively pain-

ter of generations of children playing in the schoolyard, and even that of their grandchildren. He has seen the birth, life and death of so many of his children who are now burried under the sod of Rockcastle. He has seen young couples on dates going to the movies. He has seen cars of coal, timber, and gravel being exported from the area on the rail road. Since his birth about 1910 to 1912 according to the locals, he has seen about all there is to see in the small town of Livingston.

I can't imagine how many sunrises he has seen. The first rays of light would streak through the pine trees just east of town as the sun would ascend the mountain. The rays soon beamed through his front windows and later that evening shined through his back windows. He has heard the rushing waters of Roundstone Creek and the Rockcastle River. Imagine the blizzards that covered him with snow, the hailstorms that beat against his sides, tornadoes with harsh winds threatening to blow him away, the droughts, and the floods he has seen. He has gone from the horse and buggy days to the Space Age. He has endured world wars and history beyond imagination.

The "Grand Old Gentleman", the Foister Mullins building, has been a commonplace piece of Livingston and the county so much so that he had been taken for granted until Sunday night, April 8th.

Stanley and I were doing some shopping near twilight

in Mount Vernon when we noticed a fleet of firetrucks heading south. On our way home, about three or four more passed us. Getting close to home, we were thankful they went past

our house. Then we decided to go on toward Livingston to see where the trucks went. To our surprise, they and several other trucks were on Main Street Livingston. The town was lit up like a Christmas tree. I've heard about sixteen or more trucks were in town. The Grand Old Gentleman of Livingston was in dire

distress. He was on fire. We were asked to block a street that ran behind him with our SUV to block traffic so the firefighters could bring in a laddertruck to fight the fire. We sat there about an hour until the worst had passed. Thankfully, due to the quick thinking and efforts of the citizens and several fire departments, his "body", so to

speak, was saved and he can be rebuilt on the inside. Even some citizens were able to save some items before it was No human life was lost but there was the life of one

small black and white dog, "Blue", sadly lost in the fire. She was a French Bull dog. Attempts were made to save

The locals will all be pulling together to rebuild this "Grand Old Gentleman of Livingston-the "heartbeat of the town", as Mayor Jason Medley described him. This is something our community wants to pass on to future generations. I believe it can be done because we are "Livingston Strong".

Getting too close can cause nest abandonment

Give nesting eagles the space they need

When trying to catch a glimpse of an eagle in its nest, Kate Slankard reminds people to keep their distance and make visits brief.

"It's natural to be excited when we see an eagle in the wild," said Slankard, an avian biologist with the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources' non-game division. "But we don't want to stay so long that we disturb them."

Researchers have documented more than 150 pairs of nesting eagles in Ken-

tucky this season. The bald eagle was absent from Kentucky's landscape for decades. That began to change after the United States banned the use of the pesticide DDT in 1972 and a nationwide reintroduction effort in the 1970s and 1980s helped restore the majestic bird. Kentucky documented its first pair of nesting eagles in almost 40 years in 1986.

"The comeback of this species is a great success story for the Endangered Species Act and wildlife management," Slankard said.

This growth has reacquainted the public with Kentucky's largest bird of prey, spotted in nearly all 120 counties of the state, particularly during the migration and winter season from September to March. The public's help was instrumental in department's ability to document the eagle nests across the state. Now the department is asking for the public's help again: Please

don't disturb the birds. Protecting their habitat and keeping a respectable distance assures that eagles a broken drone." remain in an area and continue to reproduce in the These safe distance

"They still face a lot of challenges. We just want people to think about how to avoid disturbing them," Slankard said. "If your presence is affecting the behavior of the parents and they are not sitting on their eggs or not feeding the young as often as they should, the chances are greater for lower productivity and nest abandonment."

The federal Migratory Bird Treaty Act provides protection for all native birds, but the Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act gives added strength by making it a federal crime to take, molest or disturb these birds of prev.

"I believe most people are just genuinely excited to see these birds; some are seeing them in the wild for the first time," Slankard said. "But this unfamiliarity with the bird and how they react to being disturbed can create problems for future production. We just need to minimize our time at their nesting sites, and give the birds a break."

Slankard encourages those interesting in watching the birds to keep a distance of 330 feet. Using a spotting scope, binoculars or a telephoto lens are ways to get a better view without disturbing the birds. She also encourages photographers to use a blind to hide behind while photographing birds in their habitat. The one thing that is absolutely prohibited is the use of drones.

"Drones are very disturbing to the birds," she said. "They see it is an aerial predator. Not only is it illegal, but they could attack it and then you're looking at

with other raptors as well, including peregrine falcons, hawks, owls and even vultures, to prevent disturbing them off the nest. Songbirds, such as the

robin and the cardinal, build their nests closer to humans and are not as susceptible to those interactions. Other songbirds may not have the familiarity.

"The robin that nests on your porch light can handle some human disturbance, but if you are interested in watching the nests of rarer, more sensitive songbirds, a distance of 50 feet will usually avoid disturbing their nesting behavior," Slankard

For those that want to view a raptor nesting site without facing the daunting possibility of disturbing the birds, a live streaming video of a peregrine falcon pair and its four chicks is currently active at: https://lgeku.com/environment/ plants-and-wildlife/peregrine-falcons/cam.

The Mill Creek Falcon Cam is made possible through a partnership with Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, LG&E and KU.

ments may vote absentee. According to Allen, the on site absentee vote will

count as long as it is completed in the Clerk's office by 4 p.m. May 21, the day prior to the election However, to perform a

mail-in absentee ballot is slightly more complicated. The voter must call or stop by the clerk's office in the courthouse at least seven days prior to the election and request the application for the mail-in ballot.

Once that request is made, the clerk's office will mail you an application. That application must be completed and received by the clerk's office no later than 6 p.m. on election day, May 22.

A voter may also vote with an actual voting machine prior to the election if they meet any of the previous requirements or will be outside the county on election day, have surgery that will require hospitalization on election day, is a precinct officer or a woman in her last trimester of pregnancy.

one from Wynn Fire Equipment out of Corbin for a 2004 International with 61,000 miles on it for \$89,000 and one from Bradford Fire Apparatus for a 2001 International with 160,000 miles on it for

Action on the bids was tabled until they could be studied more closely.

Tammy Campbell, a teacher at RCHS, and sponsor of the FCCLA (Family Career and Community Leaders of America) Club, was before the court, with several members, to ask for help with expenses for six members who will be traveling to the National Conference in Atlanta Georgia.

The court agreed to give \$800 which will sponsor one of the students attending.

A bill for sports equipment, liability insurance and fencing for the Little League Baseball Program was presented to the court.

The court agreed to reimburse the amount, just over \$6,000, but agreed the reimbursement would have to be made to the Parks and Rec-

Magistrates also agreed that the Parks and Recreation board will have to begin having everything, income and expenses, run through their program because of auditing

requirements. The court approved payment of \$63,393 to Freedom Dodge for two new cruisers, completely equipped, for the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department. The court will

be reimbursed 55% (\$34,866) by a USDA grant. The court also agreed to pay approximately \$12,600 to equip three used cruisers which the sheriff's department bought from Chicago

Four vehicles were pur-

Motors.

chased in 2017 from Chicago Motors but three were destroyed enroute to the county. Rockcastle County Attorney Jeremy Rowe recently filed suit, after months of dispute with the transporter's insurance company. Shortly after the suit was filed, three replacement vehicles were received and accepted by the sheriff's department from Chicago Motors.

The court tabled a request by the sheriff's department for three cruisers to be equipped with an AT&T program which would allow deputies to directly access information on suspects instead of having to go through the process of going through 911 and having the information relayed back, a process which is time consuming, and sometimes dangerous, according to Sheriff Mike Pe-

The startup cost for equipping three cruisers is \$4,484 and the maintenance fee and a priority service fee for one year amounted to \$2,999.79.

The court chose to table the issue at present to obtain more information on the pro-

The court also accepted the Rockcastle County Conservation District's annual budget and plan of work.

The budget shows total receipts available of \$82,731 and total expenditures of \$92,731.

The court approved a \$3,000 donation to the Red Cross's Home Fire Campaign which provides smoke detectors, and information on fire safety procedures, tornadoes and flooding to children, in conjunction with fire departments and schools. Lynne Washbish, a Red

Cross representative, told the court that 47 lives were saved in Kentucky last year through this program.

The court also appointed two members to the Rockcastle County Library board. Barbara Congleton of Olando was reappointed to her term, which had expired, and Misty Ewing of Brodhead was appointed to replace Carolyn Collins-Hunt whose term had expired.

The court also was given information as to the amount the Administrative Offices of the Court will pay as rent to the county for the next fiscal year for the judicial an-

The county will receive \$200,228 in rental income, a slight increse over last year's \$198,828.

Near the end of the meeting, one motion, by Magistrate Mike Mcguire, to provide \$5,000 to the City of Livingston to repair potholes on Black and Mullins Streets in Livingston, failed.

After receiving a second from Magistrate Shannon Bishop, Magistrates Gary Burdette, William Denny and Bill McKinney voted nay. McKinney's problem with the action he said was that it needed to be determined if the \$5,000 would be a loan or through program

McKinney took issue with a loan, saying the court had loaned the city money to buy the Foster Mullins building but that only four payments had been made in the 2017-18 fiscal year and the building was recently heavily damaged by fire and no fire insurance had been obtained by the city.

McGuire countered that the \$5,000 should be considered program support and County Judge/Executive Doug Bishop agreed, saying the county was on track to collect over \$2 million in occupational tax revenue and "we can't give a little town \$5,000 to fix two roads."

McGuire then made the motion again, Bishop again seconded it and Burdette changed his vote to yes, with Denny and McKinney still voting nay.

As a last item of business, the court transferred \$250,000 from the occupational tax account of which \$50,000 will be transferred to the detention center.

who have been hired, retired or terminated this month. Pensol listed teachers who have retired and said the school board would "absorb" those losses instead of hiring replacements.

"All we can do is work with what we have," he said. "And for the good of the students, it's not enough. We are going to keep seeing these adjustments and all we can do is keep the students first and foremost in our plans as we find ways to keep essential programs for our kids."

Pensol noted the student/ teacher ratio will still be well within requirements but that the schools will have to have more students in each classroom to make up for less teachers.

Sweet presented a budget summary to the board which shows tax revenues at \$2,864,000 and SEEK funding at \$13,658,994. Along with other revenues, the board has a general fund budget of \$25,618,966.47 and a total working budget of just over \$32 million.

Of the \$25 million general fund, a huge majority of that is used for instruction - well over \$14 million. The next biggest item in the budget is plant operations and maintenance which is set at slightly over \$2 million. In fact, every other item in the entire general fund budget is slightly over half the instructional budget alone.

The state budget for the

teaching profession affects future teachers even more than those currently working. Members of the board and some department heads agreed that they are very skeptical about college students choosing teaching as their career path.

One department head said what the state budget has done to future teachers is "unbelievable."

Pensol said he and the board will continue to fight for essential programs and will "never sacrifice the good of each individual student" as they attempt to find ways to stay within the budget.

In other action, Director of Facilities Trent Clark caught up members of the board on the RCHS construction project.

Clark listed items included in the project to update and upgrade the school and the schedule for doing each portion of the project. "I am very impressed with their knowledge of the project. There are some good, wellinformed foremen on the job," he said.

According to Clark, the many projects are planned and coordinated so that minimal intrusion of instructional areas will occur during the school year.

However, the new heating and cooling units will be placed and completed very close to the beginning of school next year and Clark is keeping an eye on that schedule to make sure the units are up and running when students return. Clark also informed the

board that the units will be down all summer and many events usually held at the school during summer break may have to be moved. "This will put our high

school in pretty good shape. These are all things that needed to be done and will provide us a safer, more updated school," Supt. Pensol told the board.

Clark agreed. "This work needed to be done. The current heating and cooling system was just days from fail-

Student Service Director Becky Isaacs said the last day of school this year will be on Saturday and will end at 10:30 a.m. She said there are plenty of instructional hours "banked" to meet state requirements. However, the state also requires a number of days of school regardless of how many hours of class has been held. "That's why we are having school on Saturday," said Isaacs. "We have met the requirement for hours but must get in that one

asked if Elam had anything


illegal on her person. She reported that she did not and then agreed to a search of her person. The citation says Mays found a plastic baggie in her



Rockcastle DAR remembers the Sinking of the Lusitania

On May 7, 1915, about a year into WWI, Germany torpedoed a passenger ship, the Lusitania. She was a luxury liner belonging to Great Britian. The ship sank in approximately eighteen minutes, taking 1,198 lives with her. The American lives lost numbered 128.

The unprovoked and surprise attack was in retaliation of the British implementation of a naval blockade of Germany. The attack occurred off the coast of Ireland, and the ship sank into the Celtic Sea.

The event angered the public, especially in Britian and United States. The ship was rumored to be carrying weapons and only in recent years has this been proven true. The

ship's crew and passengers were unaware of the cargo.

This event put great pressure on President Woodrow Wilson, who had been very reluctant to enter the war.

Finally, on April 6, 1917, American entered the war. On April 6, 2018, the Rockcastle DAR encouraged county citizens to wear red as a token of rememberance of the date and the many lives lost in World War I.

On May 7, 2018, the Rockcastle DAR remembers the lives lost on the Lusitania and the event which triggered the United States entering the war. The DAR ladies have decorated the center of town with poppies, the official flower to commemorate World

War I, along with a huge banner made by the RCHS Art Department-Les Scalf, instructor.







To make the filling, whisk the eggs in a large bowl; add the sugar, sour cream, flour, salt, lemon zest, and almond extract. Gently fold in the berries and spoon the mixture over the crust. Sprinkle the remaining flour mixture evenly over the filling; bake 45 to 55 minutes. Cool at least 1 hour before cutting into bars or scoop out of the pan to serve cobbler-style.

Frankfort Update

By Jonathon Shell State Representative Road Plan a Positive for Rockcastle County

One of the most important functions of my job as your state representative is to fight for funding for key road and bridge projects in our communities. And that's

what I did this session, as we passed a road plan that makes some critical investments

county's infrastructure.

Our economy is positively impacted by road dollars coming home. Every dollar invested in our infrastructure stimulates economic activity and creates jobs. Small businesses in particular depend on a safe and reliable infrastructure network, in order to have easy access to their goods and invest in our county.

With that said, Rockcastle County fared very well in a road plan that responsibly allocated dollars towards vital transportation needs. I am proud to have helped bring home infrastructure projects for our community, like the I-75 expansion that is underway. This road plan alone provides nearly \$11.5 million for Rockcastle County roads and bridges over the next two years, a total that doesn't even include the \$41 million allocated towards finishing the I-75 widening in 2018.

The expansion of Interstate 75 was a top priority of mine, and will improve the safety and navigability of this major roadway. Expanding the interstate through Rockcastle County to six lanes will relieve congestion, while also increasing public safety in an area that, as everyone well knows, has seen more than its fair share of accidents.

Our plan also spends millions over the next two years to resurface pavement on I-75, as well as on US-25. It also spends over \$2.5 million to improve KY-461.

On a statewide level, we invested more than \$300 million in resurfacing pavement, putting us on track to catch up to a \$1 billion backlog that has slowly built up.

We prioritized roads and bridges in a responsible manner that prioritizes the most important projects. In the past, Frankfort used to include many more projects in the road plan than there was actually money for. It was different this time around. We changed the status quo and did not make false promises, and that change will pay off for all who rely on our roads. For the most part, this road plan included projects that can be budgeted, meaning that nearly every project included will likely get off the ground by the end of the next fiscal year.

Much of the media out of Frankfort has failed to report on the huge investment we made in rural infrastructure. But it is a huge deal, and will provide a boost to both safety and economic development, especially in our area.

Providing safe and effective means of transportation is a shared priority for both us in Frankfort and President Trump in Washington. Investing in our infrastructure creates jobs and allows all of our citizens to be better served by their govern-

While not related to transportation, I was thrilled to help mark another form of investment in Rockcastle County. It was an honor to join in the ribbon cutting for the new building at the Rockcastle County Fairgrounds in Brodhead. The new 24,000 square-foot facility will be used for various agriculture, recreation, and community events. USDA Enrollment Period for Safety Net Coverage in 2018

Farmers and ranchers with base acres in the Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) or Price Loss Coverage (PLC) safety net program may enroll for the 2018 crop year. The enrollment period will end on Aug. 1, 2018.

Since shares and ownership of a farm can change year-to-year, producers must enroll by signing a contract each program year.

The producers on a farm that are not enrolled for the 2018 enrollment period will not be eligible for financial assistance from the ARC or PLC programs for the 2018 crop should crop prices or farm revenues fall below the historical price or revenue benchmarks established by the program. Producers who made their elections in previous years must still enroll during the 2018 enrollment period.

The ARC and PLC programs were authorized by the 2014 Farm Bill and offer a safety net to agricultural producers when there is a substantial drop in prices or revenues for covered commodities. Covered commodities include barley, canola, large and small chickpeas, corn, crambe, flaxseed, grain sorghum, lentils, mustard seed, oats, peanuts, dry peas, rapeseed, long grain rice, medium grain rice (which includes short grain and sweet rice), safflower seed, sesame, soybeans, sunflower seed and wheat. Upland cotton is no longer a covered commodity. For more details regarding these programs, go to www.fsa.usda.gov/arc-plc.

Update Your Records FSA is cleaning up our

producer record database. If you have any unreported changes of address, zip code, phone number, email address or an incorrect name or business name on file they need to be reported to our office. Changes in your farm operation, like the addition of a farm by lease or purchase, need to be reported to our office as well. Producers participating in FSA and NRCS programs are required to timely report changes in their farming operation to the County Committee in writing and update their CCC-902 Farm Operating Plan.

Federal student loans offer deferments

If you're having trouble repaying your federal student loans, you may be able to apply for a deferment, according to the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA).

A deferment lets you postpone paying your loans if you meet certain guidelines. You may qualify for a deferment if you are:

- Enrolled in college at least half time.
- In a rehabilitation training program.
- Unemployed or can't find a full-time job.
- Having economic hardship. · On active duty service in the military.

If you've defaulted on your federal loans, you may not be able to get a deferment. Talk with the agency that services your loans to see how you can get out of default. If you qualify for a defer-

ment, you will have to submit an application. You must make your monthly payments until the agency tells you that your loans are in deferment.

KHEAA is the state agency that administers Kentucky's grant and scholarship programs, including the Kentucky Educational Excellence Scholarship (KEES). 

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

Highway 150 was shut down for several hours Saturday after a double fatality occurred near Mount Vernon.

Police say Marty Evans, 40, of Mount Vernon, was headed west when an empty utility trailer he was pulling became detached from its hitch and traveled into the eastbound lane.

Two motorcycles, operated by Nathaniel Gilkerson, 24, and Gayle Liver, 69, both of Carlisle, crashed head on into the trailer.

Gilkerson, and Ann Liver, 65, a passenger on Gayle Liver's motorcycle, were both pronounced dead at the scene and Gayle Liver was flown to the UK Medical Center where her condition is reported listed as criti

First responders were called to the scene and Kentucky State Police Trooper Seth Whiles determined the trailer had come loose and caused the crash and the road was closed while police investigated the incident.

The report said the motorcycle operators were wearing helmets at the time.







was in Sevierville right now, I'd be loading up for yet another trip to Cades Cove and if I lived down there, I'd probably do it every day. Mr. Parkinson would just have to learn to live with it.

Neither Andy nor Loretta had ever been to Clingmans Dome, the third highest peak (6,643 ft. elevation) east of the Mississippi River. Located on the North Carolina/Tennessee border, two nearby mountains in North Carolina are reputedly a few feet taller than Clingmans but some Park officials content they were not measured the same way and that GPS calculations will eventually determine that Clingmans is

What Clingmans has going for it is that you can drive almost to the top. The parking lot is over 6,500 feet in elevation. The remaining 100 feet or so to get to the observation deck requires a fairly steep, crooked, half mile hike. Neither Loretta nor Mr. Parkinson had any interest in making the hike and I had been to the summit on numerous, previous occasions. Even from the parking lot, visitors get broad, unobstructed views of the mountain range that are awe inspiring. Instead of looking up at the mountains, you are looking down on them. The perspective literally takes my breath away.

And, for once, Mr. Parkinson was more than glad to sit in the car because the temperature was in the mid 80s when we left Gatlinburg. Twenty-three uphill miles later at the dome's parking lot it was somewhere in the mid 40s. I thought my ears were going to freeze and fall off but Andy hiked to the summit and back in short sleeves and swore it felt good. Suffice to say that my brother and I have radically different comfort zones.

On Friday we spent a few hours at the spillway/tailrace of Douglas Dam some 10 miles from downtown Sevierville photographing big birds. At least 3 different species of herons along with ospreys, ducks and even a bald eagle were on hand along with several large fowl that I have yet to identify. I find it hard to believe that the locals have not capitalized on Douglas Dam because the wildlife photography opportunities certainly rivals Cades

Finally, if you're looking for good, clean motel accommodations at less than half the cost of any other deal we could find, The Wyndham, Apple Valley Days Inn in Sevierville certainly made us happy. It doesn't have a pool and the in-room coffee is more like muddy, sandy water but the price is great. Two nights cost us \$112.00 including nearly \$25.00 in state and local taxes. Those "free" maps, magazines and tourist guides aren't nearly as free as the locals would have you

If I do make a full recovery from this trip, we're going back in October.







spilled fuel and the flames were moving towards the large storage tank of fuel.

Mink was joined in an instant by local resident Sam Hamilton, who also pulled up to the accident, along with a few others who joined them.

Those on the scene soon discovered the driver, Burl Bowling, was still inside the truck and his leg was trapped under the bent metal. Mink said he approached the vehicle to help Bowling out of the truck and heard him yelling 'Don't leave me. Don't let me die here,' and Mink responded, "you are not going to die here."

However, observers were unable to free the victim. "Sam had gone and grabbed some fence posts to try to pry the man out of the truck and the heat from the flames was becoming unbearable," said Mink. "I can't describe the heat from flames all around us." In fact, several local first responders said the flames were the largest they had ever witnessed from a vehicle fire and reports indicate there were 8,000 gallons of fuel on the truck about to ignite.

At that point, King and his wife, Adrian, who is also a Sergeant First Class, pulled up to the scene. King ran to the damaged car and once he discovered the driver was okay, he ran to the truck as it burned,.

Just as bystanders were working to free the leg of Bowling, he suddenly announced his leg was somehow free and the strong arm man reached through the heat between everyone there, climbed into the truck, and grabbed the injured man by the collar, lifting him out of the vehicle. "This strong fellow dragged the man out about fifty yards away from the flames and laid him down," said Mink.

According to Hamilton, King worked his way into the truck through the broken windshield and was not going to leave until he got Bowling out. "He wasn't going anywhere until he got him out of that truck even if he had to die with him," said Hamilton.

Just about then, the Brodhead Fire Department appeared on the scene. "I still can't believe how fast Brodhead Fire made it to the accident," said Mink. "It was just a moment and they were there."

But as EMS workers and fire departments began to show up, Mink raised up from the injured truck driver to thank the Sergeant and "he was just gone," said Mink. "No one knew who he was or where he came from or where he went. He appeared out of nowhere, pulled that man out of the truck and was gone. No one saw him pull up and no one saw him leave."

Mink said Bowling was a lucky man in more ways than one. "I told him myself, I was one minute away from cutting his leg off with my pocket knife to get him out of the truck," he said. "He later thanked me for not cutting his leg off."

Soon, police began a search for the unknown stranger who saved a life Sunday, but King wasn't interested in receiving praise or credit for doing what he thought was the right thing

It wasn't until Tuesday evening that King was tracked down and told reporters, "I don't consider myself a hero."

Mink, Hamilton, King and several others are all being hailed as local heroes after they each risked their lives attempting to free Bowling from the burning truck with full knowledge that the flames could completely engulf the vehicle at

any moment.

However, during the three day search for King, he was being called the hero since no one knew who he was or how he was able to

gather the strength to step into unbearable heat, smoke and fumes to lift Bowling out of the truck. "It was amazing to see the power in that man as he forced his way in without hesitation and pulled Mr. Bowling out of that truck," said Mink.

Still, King said he was simply doing what he was trained to do. In fact, King has already been deployed to Iraq twice where he was assigned to a combat support hospital. "I just know if I was in that situation, I would want somebody to do whatever it takes to get me out," King told reporters with

The huge fire caused se-

vere damage to the highway and melted some of the blacktop as well as spilling fuel along the side of the roadway and burning the grassy area nearby.

The damage to the road

Sunday was so severe, it took until 3:30 Monday morning to re-open the highway and crews were still cleaning up the area Monday afternoon more than 24 hours after the accident. In fact, clean-up is still in progress.

The fire was so large that

The fire was so large that fire departments approached the accident from opposite sides of the highway and battled the flames from each

The driver of the car, Billy

Hensley, and Bowling were both taken to Rockcastle Regional Hospital and Bowling was later flown to UK Medical Center. Reports are he was released Tuesday night.

Many say there were a lot of heroes on the scene of the accident that day, but King is being heralded as the man who clearly didn't consider his own well being and, as he did every day in Iraq, stepped up and put his life on the line to save others.

The Brodhead Fire Department was on the scene within moments and were assisted by many other local fire departments, EMS workers and police departments.

The accident is still under

investigation. *Portions of this story taken from WKYT News*.

of any kind are not allowed at a voting place, voters should dress appropriately and shirt and shoes are expected.

Candidates are not permitted to campaign within 100 feet of a voting location. However, this year that law does not apply if your personal property is within the 100-feet restriction. If a person has a sign in their yard for a particular candidate that lies within the 100 feet limit, or a candidate's property is within that limit, they will not be required to remove the sign this year.

This is a great burden on taxpayers.



trapped rain water through the treatment plant at their chosen pace each day instead of allowing all the rain water to enter the plant each time it rains, causing many thousands of gallons to pass

through the plant at once. This process helps keep the city in compliance with requirements of amounts of water allowed each day to be processed. "This is something we

can look at and consider as a city," said Burton. "We are moving in the right direction now and we are all on board when it comes to doing what's best for the city."

The council also expressed deep concern about the company that is doing the city audits. Since the city is behind in audits (back to 2013) the city hired a company to perform the audits, which is also a part of the requirements of the 2015 agreement with the Energy Cabinet.

However, those audits are also well behind. "This company promised us they would have these audits in our hands long ago. But we are still waiting," said Bur-

Burton said the 2015 audit is complete (though it has not been given to the city yet) and that he was told by the company that the 2016 and 2017 audits are very near completion as

Jacobs said the completion and submission of those audits will be a big help in avoiding any more fines for being behind on the require-

ments of the state. In other action, the council decided to name November 10th as Indigenous People Day. Mount Vernon City Council and Livingston City Council have already

set dates for the recognition. The Brodhead Police Department reported 23 calls last month and six assists to other agencies as well as other duties performed.







Kentucky's unemployment rate is down to 4.0 percent, its lowest level in 42

years. We have more jobs and investment in our people, and economic

growth is starting to produce more revenue to invest in education and infrastructure.

For example, Tennessee doubles Kentucky in terms of sales taxes as a percent of state revenue, yet also has higher levels of household income. They have also seen significantly more jobs and economic growth in the last decade.



My grandfather has also taught me how to care for people. Our family has been blessed with more than enough and we thank God together each morning on the way to school.





Livingston Police Chief Travis Richardson has provided the City of Livingston with a new 2018, Ford 4X4, fully equipped with \$18,000 worth of special police gear, without spending a single dollar of taxpayer money

"It has taken awhile, but I made the first patrol with it Friday," said Richardson. "And the benefit it will provide to Livingston as well as the county was worth the

Richardson wrote an application himself for a 75/25 USDA grant which was set up to provide police equipment in smaller communities. The grant was completed and submitted in early 2016 and it took until

No tax dollars spent last week for the process to

see fruition. "This vehicle will provide citizens with a police vehicle that can help us perform our official duties in a

much more consistent and

reliable manner," he said. In fact, the old vehicle that has been used by the department was a Crown Victoria and Richardson said that somewhat limited

what he could do.

"There are many places that our old cruiser simply couldn't go," he said. "I walked to several calls because the car would not make it down certain roads.

There was also the issue of bad weather. "This new truck will be able to respond and provide mutual aid to the entire county even in inclement weather. Snow is not a deterrent for this truck."

Richardson is right. It is evident from a glance that everything from the suspension to the tires has been modified to meet the needs of a police utility vehicle.

grant The that Richardson received was for \$50,000 and he was responsible for 25% or \$12,500. Through raffles and events that he took part in and donations over the past two years, Richardson was finally able to raise the funds for the vehicle.

Farm Service Agency Makes Administrative Change to the Livestock Indemnity Program

Starting today, agricultural producers who have lost livestock to disease, resulting from a weather disaster, have an additional way to become eligible for the Livestock Indemnity

Program. In the event of disease, this change by USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) authorizes local FSA county committees to accept veterinarian certifications that livestock deaths were directly related to adverse weather unpreventable through good animal husbandry and management. The committees may then use this certification to allow eligibility for producers on a caseby-case basis for LIP.

LIP provides benefits to agricultural producers for livestock deaths in excess of normal mortality caused by adverse weather, disease or by attacks by animals reintroduced into the wild by the federal government. Eligible weather events include earthquakes, hail, tornadoes, hurricanes, storms, blizzard and flooding.

Producers interested in LIP or other USDA disaster assistance programs should contact their local USDA service center.

2018 Acreage Reporting Dates

In order to comply with FSA program eligibility requirements, all producers are encouraged to visit the Rockcastle County FSA office to file an accurate crop certification report by the applicable deadline.

The following acreage reporting dates are applicable for Rockcastle County:

2018 May 31, Nursery (Preceding Year (Report 2018 for 2019)

July 15, All Other Crops and CRP

September 30, 2018 Aquaculture; Value loss and controlled environment crops (except nursery)

November 15, 2018 Perennial Forage

December 15, 2018 Fall Seeded Small Grains

The following exceptions apply to the above acreage reporting dates:

If the crop has not been planted by the above acreage reporting date, then the acreage must be reported no later than 15 calendar days after planting is completed.

If a producer acquires additional acreage after the above acreage reporting date, then the acreage must be reported no later than 30 calendar days after purchase or acquiring the lease. Appropriate documentation must be provided to the county office.

If a perennial forage crop is reported with the intended use of "cover only," "green manure," "left standing," or "seed," then the acreage must be reported by July

Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) policy holders should note that the acreage reporting date for NAP covered crops is the earlier of the dates listed above or 15 calendar days before grazing or harvesting of the crop begins.

Update Your Records

FSA is cleaning up our producer record database. If you have any unreported changes of address, zip code, phone number, email address or an incorrect name or business name on file they need to be reported to our office. Changes in your farm operation, like the addition of a farm by lease or purchase, need to be reported to our office as well. Producers participating in FSA and NRCS programs are required to timely report changes in their farming operation to the County Committee in writing and update their CCC-902 Farm Oper-

If you have any updates or corrections, please call your local FSA office to update your records.

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

38.2% voter turnout here Shannon Franklin received

more votes for sheriff than all the other seven candidates combined. Matt Dees was his closest opponent with 767 votes to Franklin's 2,257

In the highly anticipated race for Kentucky State Representative, between incumbent Jonathan Shell and R. Travis Brenda, Rockcastle County actually decided the race.

Only 123 votes separated the two as Shell was defeated 4,235 to 4,112 district-wide. However, Shell won the election in both Garrard (1,559 to 1,239) and Madison (837 to 433) Counties. But in Rockcastle, Brenda won 2,563 to 1,716 giving Brenda the win.

Many news reports are blaming the surprising loss of the incumbent on the recent state pension system

Fiscal Court sees first budget for 2018-19

The budget shows revenue for the coming fiscal year estimated \$6,504,927. However, there is an estimated carry-over of \$755,685, primarily in the general fund (\$748,200). There is also an estimated transfer out of \$905,902 from the general fund, of which over \$1,000,000 of that amount is currently budgeted to be transferred into the detention Center (\$680,686) and to the road fund (\$117,351).

Other transfers out from the general fund include \$24,747 to the LGEA fund and \$79,268 to 911 for a total budget of \$6,960,612.

County Treasurer Joe Clontz told the court that the budget only reflects monthly support for the sheriff's department through December since the sheriff's budget is set up on a January-December calendar year and a new sheriff will be taking office in January at which time the support issue will be addressed anew.

The amount budgeted from the general fund for the sheriff's department is \$85,000 for monthly program support (July, 2018 through December 2018) \$224,337 employer's share of social security, retirement, insurance, workmen's insurance, audits, property and casualty insurance, etc., all annual costs.

The main revenue expected in the general fund is from the occupational tax, estimated at \$1.9 million. Other revenue sources include: \$535,000 insurance tax; \$287,000 county property tax; \$270,000 net profits fee tax and \$198,828 AOC space rental.

The road department is expected to receive \$1,236,261 in revenue besides the \$117,351 transfer in from the general fund for a total budget of \$1,353,612.

Bomb threat called in to **McDonald's**

Everyone inside the McDonalds in Mount Vernon was evacuated after a bomb threat was received Sunday evening around 6 o'clock.

According to Mount Vernon Police Chief Brian Carter, police received a call that someone had warned the local restaurant managers of an impending explosion. "Someone called the business and told them they had 30 minutes to get out before the building blew

up," said Carter. Police rushed to the scene and immediately evacuated everyone inside

the building, including management, staff and customers and then roped off the

Everyone evacuated was sent off the property, according to Carter, since there was no way of knowing how big the explosion

Once everyone had cleared the area, Carter said police waited until the time had passed for the explosion and then officers went into the building and searched for an explosive device.

Soon, the Kentucky State Police arrived on the scene and used a dog trained to located explosives to search



Thank God for our United States Military and also thank them.



To celebrate and commemorate the battle and victory, the Rockcastle DAR is hosting another segment of the "Paint the Town Red" series in connection with the commu-





Incumbent Magistrate Shannon D. Bishop won reelection over Lee Earl Adams by only four votes, 409 to 405, and Jordan Bales beat Teddy W. Rose in the race for District One Constable by only 20 votes, 255 to 235.

Magistrates William Denny and Mike McGuire won relection for their seats. Denny got 408 votes with his two challengers picking up 334 together and McGuire beat his nearest opponent Mike Smith 492 votes to 373.

Casey McClure won the Republican race for coroner with 2013 over two opponents. He will now face incumbent Marvin Owens (D) in the November General Election.

Donnie Cope won the race for Constable District 4 with 456 votes to Brian Keith Hall's 220 and Albert Carpenter beat his three opponents for the office of Constable District Five by getting 331 of the 765 votes cast in the race.

Representative Harold "Hal" Rogers was another huge winner in the county taking 90% of the vote against Gerardo Serrano in the race for United State Representative in Congress. In the district, Rogers received over 84% of the 88,054 total votes cast. In state races, United

State House District six Democrat Amy McGrath beat Jim Gray in a close race and the House District Six GOP race was won by incumbent Andy Barr over Chuck Eddy.

Voters will now have to pick between McGrath and Barr in the November General Election.

tion Center's total revenue is estimated at \$835,450 plus the transfer in of \$680,686 from the general fund for a total budget of \$1,521,136.

County Treasurer Joe Clontz told the court that the detention center figures would have to be tweaked since the revenue for state prisoners was estimated at \$52,500 a month but the amount received in the last monthly check from the state was \$65,689.

Clontz also told the court that the \$117,351 budgeted as a transfer into the road department would also probably have to be revised since there is still some question as to whether the costs of the repair of more county roads, recently authorized by the court, will be paid from this fiscal year's budget or next year's.

The budget, at this point, Clontz told the court also does not include payments on the \$1.425 million borrowed for Microfoodery since permanent financing of the loan will not be in place until July 1st. Under an agreement

between Microfoodery, the county and the City of Mt. Vernon, Microfoodery will pay interest only on the loan, which was originally set up in February of this year, for the first twelve months after which a repayment schedule will be set up for Microfoodery to repay the loan.





remainder of spring will be

abnormally hot. And it may be stormy a lot. This will mean soft soils, muddy shovels and boots, as you try to garden.

It also means the work someone promised to have done by end of the week, or vour vard mowed before Saturday, just may not happen as expected.

Of course, old timers, especially farmers, know weather dictates a lot of what happens, day to day and week to week.

So, how do you plan your gardening and landscaping this year? Probably do it the best you can in the time you have available. Maybe in the morning if rain is forecast in afternoon? Maybe on the

weekend? Or, maybe take a day off from regular work if it's pretty and get done

what you need to do? If you need someone else to do landscape work, you most likely will have a few weeks between the call and when the work gets done. This has never stopped anyone who wants something done and is willing to be patient. Just make the call, then get the planning done, and a good contractor will guarantee plants to live and grow, no matter if he must get to it in the heat of sum-







RCHS sophomore Autumn King had several outstanding individual performances at the KHSAA Class 2A





Remember the Apostle Paul so clearly writing in Rom.14:23—Whatsoever is not of faith is sin.

We also find there is a type of songs that God will accept psalms hymns and spiritual songs. Hymns are songs of peace and love, spiritual songs are songs that stir our emotions and psalms are from the psalmist. These are the songs that God is pleased with and these are the songs the Church should be singing today.

I really believe if God had wanted us playing musical instruments in the Church he could at least said so, at least one time. He didn't, and do something that God has not authorized, is not walking by faith.

God told Noah long ago to build an ark of gopher wood, and Noah did exactly as God said, the ship floated, and Noah and his family were saved. Noah didn't say, God I think it would be alright to add a little oak or dogwood or popular or spruce. Noah offered by faith and we know he was saved.



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Pocket mouse, water meat, and other adventures in learning Korean

The best way to learn a second language is to be exposed to it from birth, just as you would be to your first language. Think about it. You have your first language, but do you remember acquiring it?

Early on, our brains don't distinguish between languages: a word is a word. So, language acquisition is easier—not necessarily easy—until about puberty.

"Azul" and "blue" refer to the same color, for example, and your brain treats them as such if it learns them early enough. As anyone who's taken French or Spanish as a teenager (or older) can attest, though, it's not so easy once you're in your teens.

Korean and English influence each other here on the peninsula (which is what I call Korea!), just like Spanish and English influence each other in the US. This semester, I'm taking four hours of Korean language classes each week, and am getting a lot of practice outside of class.

It's not necessary, however, to speak Korean if you want to function on the peninsula. Menus in Korean, Chinese, Japanese, and English are common, and much of the important information—road signs, bus schedules, official documents— is available in English.

It's not necessary — but it helps. Especially if you want to do more than func-

Since I'm here teaching English, and plan to be for a bit, it's only reasonable that I'd learn — or at least try to learn — Korean... and I've also found myself in some pretty funny situations!

One of my favorite people on Earth is a Korean lady whom I met when we were both undergrads back at EKU in 2006. We reconnected in 2013 when my wife and I moved to Daegu, South Korea (her hometown, coincidentally). When we returned to Kentucky in 2015, she paid us a visit.

While driving home one night, we came across a possum doing its thing on the side of the road. My friend's English is better than mine, but the English word "opossum" had escaped her memory.

"Ben! What do you call that animal?" She asked. Since I was driving, I didn't see what she was talking about. When I asked, she stammered and said "ah... the, ah... pocket mouse! Is that what it is?"

Sadly, the English language is bereft of such an animal as the pocket mouse.

Through a couple of

translations and after discussing it, we figured out that she was asking about a possum. But how on earth did she arrive at pocket mouse? It turns out that she had transliterated the Korean word for possum directly

trums out that she had transliterated the Korean word for possum directly into English, rather than translating it. She mentally switched the words, letterfor-letter, from Korean to English, instead of translating the idea itself. For example, "la puerta roja" would transliterate into English as "the door red", but it'd translate as "the red door".

In Korean, the word for possum is "¡÷∏"¥œ¡,,", ju moh ni jwi. The first part transliterates as "pocket" and the second part as "mouse". It still surprises me that something as vile as the possum could have as cute of a name as pocket mouse. It loses its cuteness when you translate the concept rather

than transliterating the name, though!

This week in Korean class, animal names came up again. We had been discussing food, specifically how to order certain things in restaurants. The teacher went over beef, pork, and chicken before arriving at fish.

"The kind you eat", she said, "is called a"o±, sang sohn". Easy enough. On the menu, it's sang sohn. "If it's still swimming", she continued, "it's $\pi\infty\infty$ ݱ,, mool go gi. Please, please, don't confuse them."

Well, why?

Fish that's still swimming, she said, transliterates as water meat, and everyone would laugh if we walked into a restaurant and asked for a plate of water meat!

Luckily, my Korean is progressing well enough that I've not accidentally ordered water meat, or encountered a pocket mouse, in my time here. If anything, struggling to learn Korean — more than enough to just get by, I mean — has helped me to empathize a great deal with my students.

Though adults are particularly creative with their first language, the path to acquiring a second is fraught with peril.

And pocket mice.

And water meat.

Shots fired at local officer

Suspect captured after manhunt

"There simply isn't any training to prepare you for being shot at," said Mount Vernon Assistant Chief of Police Joe Rush.

Mount Vernon police officer Dustin Hale found himself in a life or death situation as bullets flew around him last week after he attempted to stop a vehicle that he spotted swerving as it entered I-75 at exit 62 headed south.

According to police reports, Officer Hale spotted the vehicle entering I-75 headed south Tuesday, May 22 and he followed the car to exist 59. The car driven by Joseph Morris, 30, of Livingston, then turned south toward Livingston on US 25.

Officer Hale continued to chase the vehicle onto Big Cave Road when the officer decided to make a traffic stop since the license plate was partly blocked on the

However, once Hale engaged his lights, Morris sped up and a high speed chase ensued. After several miles, the car reached Red Hill Road and then Daugherty Ridge Road where Morris attempted to cross a creek, disabling his vehicle.

Once the vehicle stopped, Morris, and his wife Mikayla Dawn Morris, leaped from the car and began running into the nearby woods.

As Hale began the foot chase Mikayla Morris tripped and fell and when she attempted to get up, Hale forced her back to the ground and told her to remain there.

from last year of \$9,563. City Administrator Josh Bray says this budget is very similar to last year's. "There are no surprises in the budget this year. We are right

where we expected to be." Bray says there was about \$42,000 more revenue than expected last fiscal year and he is proud of the work the city has done on this

budget. "This is a good budget," he said. "Our mayor, city council and everyone who worked on this budget have done a thorough job. Last year we missed a \$5 million budget by \$217 and I am pretty happy about that."

Some of this year's budget shows slightly smaller numbers than some previous budgets but Mayor Bryant said he is pleased with this budget as well.

"We are not really making cuts or diminishing the budget," he said. "We are simply taking a more conservative approach. We are not cutting back, we are managing the budget bet-

Bray agreed. "I am pleased with this budget. There simply isn't anywhere else to cut our water and sewer budget. It is very tight with the new expenses we will have, but the overall budget balances and is well done," he said.

The additional expenses Bray is referring to include the new filtration systems being installed to keep the odor and taste out of the city water.

In fact, Bray announced at the meeting that the problem has been corrected. "We are pleased to say that our recent readings show the byproduct of algae is now below noticeable levels," he said. "The water leaving the plant now does not have the odor or taste that some have complained about."

Bray said it may take a few weeks before the newly filtered water replaces all the water in existing lines but once that is done, he believes the problem has been

"Doing this has cost us a

lot more than we had planned for, but our budget is okay and we are serving our customers," he said.

Councilman Clifford Mullins made a motion to accept the budget and it passed unanimously

If there is a way to milk more money out of people, government will utilize it and I knew this one was coming eventually.



In other news, the big vegetable garden that my brother Andy and I have going is coming right along. Without going into specifics, we have over 50 varieties under cultivation and will add another 10 or so if the Good Lord's willing and we stay able.

Unfortunately, we already have 13 varieties of tomatoes among the 37 mater plants already out there and we'll add one more just to stay away from the number 13. The reason for this has to do with my addiction/obsession with green houses. I'm making a vow to raise every plant that goes into the garden come 2019 will be started from seed by me. Not only that, but 90% or more of the seeds will be saved from stuff I'm growing this year. I'm currently trying to find a 12 step program called green house addicts anonymous.

Of all the small green-

houses I visited this year, not a single one had Big Bertha bell peppers. I wound up buying 2 Big Bertha plants at Wally World for \$3.10 EACH! I'm used to paying 2 bucks for a 6 pack. The only reason I bought them is to hopefully, grow one pepper to maturity and save seeds from it. Pepper is arguably the easiest of all vegetable seeds to save and store. Unfortunately most pepper varieties are hybrid these days, which means the seeds are practically useless. Big Bertha is an open pollinated variety and, in my opinion, the best home garden pepper I've ever grown.

A friend in England sent me seeds of a cucumber called "telegraph" that is wildly popular throughout Great Britain. Telegraph is an open pollinated variety that we loved when I grew them a few years back.

I forgot to save seeds and discovered that the very few seed companies that carry them have them priced like gold nuggets. I emailed my friend, Eloise Sumpter, who lives in The Cotswold's, and she promptly airmailed a couple dozen telegraph seeds. Every single one sprouted after I started them in 4 ounce peat pots and they went into the garden on Memorial Day. As the Donald is fond of saying, "We'll see."

On Monday, May 28th, Mount Vernon Police Sergeant Adam Stallsworth and Rockcastle Sheriff's Deputy Matt Bryant spotted Zachery Ramsey, 24, of Berea on Grace Loop Road near Roundstone. of the Kentucky Music Hall of Fame by the tourist commission.

"They basically just said 'here it is' and tourism took over the balance, the expenses, the debt and the assets. No one actually appraised anything," said

Being late was not the only disappointment during the discussion. Craft also pointed out some issues concerning the city's finances. According to Craft, there was nothing "suspicious" about the finances but instead there were tax returns filed late and the late audit from the tourist commission may cause the city to lose bonding capabilities in some

Also, Craft pointed out a drop in the city's net equity position from last year of \$570,267.

In a letter to the City of Mount Vernon, the auditing company said expenditures exceeded the amounts appropriated in the budget for expenditures. "In the future the city should monitor expenditures closely and amend the budget ordinance with city council approval before overspending the current budget," the letter

Also, the letter stated We noted several material internal control deficiencies that we reported to management of the City of Mount Vernon in a separate report."

However, Craft pointed out some positive sides of the audit as well. "There was \$42,230 more revenue than was budgeted and the city only missed expenditures by \$217," he said.

"I think we have done a pretty good job as a city with a \$5 million budget and only missed it by \$217,' said Josh Bray, City Administrator.

Craft and Bray also discussed extra revenues from the Mount Vernon Police Department from drug busts and property seizures over the fiscal year. "Our police department was a big help this year and was able to purchase new vehicles for the force," said Bray. "We are also up to full staff now and that will save us in our overtime problems."

Mayor Mike Bryant and Bray were well informed of each issue pointed out by the auditor's report and had already dealt with some of the potential problems, according to Bray. "We have already been in touch with the USDA and some other agencies concerning the late aualt and we are trying to make sure we are still in good standing," said Bray. "We dodged the bullet this time I think. We just need to stay on top of it.

Bray also pointed out that timing played a part of some of the audit report.

"There are instances where checks had to be written by a certain time but the money didn't come back to the city until after the bud-

The biggest expense in the general fund is wages budgeted at \$205,000.

The largest expense in professional dervices is insurance at \$16,000.

The biggest administra-

tive expense comes from utilities at \$90,000

The biggest expense for the police department is wages, budgeted \$367,633.

The fire department also shows wages as the top expense at \$28,387.

In the water and sewer department the largest revenue comes from estimated water sales of \$1,744,880 and sewer income estimated at \$430,000.

The largest expense in the water and sewer department is wages with \$597,340 budgeted in the water department and \$145,000 in the sewer department.

Almost every department shows one of the largest expenses as insurance which costs the city, in total, \$293,110 for health/life insurance, workmen's comp, general liability, etc.

large and the search was called off again.

However, later in the day the sheriff's department received a tip as to Morris's whereabouts and Mount Vernon police and state police troopers went to a home on Daugherty Ridge Road where they found Morris and he was taken into custody without incident.

Morris was taken to the Rockcastle County Detention Center where he was charged with carrying a concealed weapon, wanton endangerment of a police officer, fleeing or evading in a motor vehicle, fleeing or evading on foot, improper display of registration plates and attempted murder of an officer. He is being held on a \$500,000 cash bond.

MiKayla Morris was arrested at the original scene and charged with possession of marijuana and drug paraphernalia and fleeing on foot but was released on her own recognizance.



our relation with others. In the sermon on the mount of which our verse is a part is a great deal of language telling us how to deal with our enemies. It tells us clearly that we are to love our enemies and to pray for

There are versions of the golden rule in most of the major religions of the world. We will note that in some of these it says: do not do to others what you do not want done to you. This is negative in the sense that it does not require any positive action towards others.

There are many people who use the golden rule to not get involved or to avoid any type of confrontation. If we are doing something that is not good for us wouldn't we want someone to tell us so that we would not harm ourselves? Of course, we would!

Immediately following the verse of study Jesus talks about the straight

and narrow way and how we will be known by our fruits. The Christian walk is about our relationship with Christ and about

how we should get along with those around us. The next time someone rubs us the wrong way hesitate before we act and think about the rule we are talking about. Do unto others as you

would have them do to you. If you do not attend a local church, you are invited to come and worship with us at the Climax Christian Church located on Climax



Living On Purpose

Memorial means to "remember" and every year on the last Monday in May, we honor those who sacrificed their lives in the line of active military service. On Memorial Day we stop and pay our respect to the ones who were willing to stand in the gap between freedom and tyranny! The First Amendment was not only signed into existence with ink but with the blood of over 1.1 million Americans that have died in U.S. wars along with many more that have suffered from physical and mental difficulties. Over the years, numerous families have suffered loss from war including my own and we have a deep appreciation for the men and women that have served to protect our country. My uncle, Kenny Maye was killed in Korea and I have his tags, casket flag and a rare picture of him. He was only 20 years old in 1950 and his body was never found. Sadly, his existence is nearly unknown and I often wonder about the

We are only a few miles from Camp Nelson National Cemetery and from the highway you can see many rows of the over twelve thousand perfectly lined white marble tombstones. At times I've often driven past without hardly thinking about how each of these individuals at one time or another accepted the call of duty. And what is that call? To defend and protect our liberties - whatever the cost!

life he could have had.

Each one of those brave soldiers was willing to give their life for their country and many did. It is said -"All gave some and some gave all." Truly, the cost of freedom is beyond the imagination. In March 1775, Patrick Henry said, "I know not what course others may take, but as for me, give me liberty or give me death." I am convinced this is the heart cry of all the heroes that have given their lives for our country.

Here is a story about a World War II hero whose name was Lieutenant Commander Butch O'Hare. He was a fighter pilot assigned to the aircraft carrier Lexington in the South Pacific and on February 20, 1942 his entire squadron was sent on a mission. After he was airborne, he looked at his fuel gauge and realized that someone had forgotten to top off his fuel tank. He would not have enough fuel to complete his mission and get back to his ship. His flight leader gave him a direct order for him to return to the carrier. Reluctantly, he dropped out of formation and headed back. As he was returning to the ship he saw something that turned his blood cold. A squadron of Japanese aircraft were speeding their way toward the aircraft carrier which was defenseless. He couldn't reach his squadron and bring them back in time to save the fleet, So, there was only one thing to do. He must somehow divert their attention away from the

last moments, he aggressively dove into the formation of Japanese planes. Wing-mounted 50 caliber machine guns blazed as he charged in, attacking one surprised enemy plane and today the O'Hare International Airport in Chicago is named as an honor to the courage of this brave man. then another. O'Hare was weaving in and out of the now broken formation and fired at as many planes as possible until all his ammunition was finally spent. However – he did not stop there. He continued the assault, diving at the fighters, trying to clip a wing or tail in hopes of damaging as many enemy planes as possible. Suddenly, the Japanese squadron headed off in another direction which was nothing less than a miracle. Deeply relieved, Butch O'Hare and his damaged plane somehow made it back to the carrier. Upon arrival, the film from the gun-camera mounted on his plane told the tale. It clearly revealed his daring attempt to protect his fleet. He had in fact destroyed five enemy aircraft. For this heroic act Butch became the Navy's first Ace of World War II, and the first Naval aviator to win the Congressional Medal of Honor. Sadly, a year later Mr. O'Hare was killed in another aerial battle at the age not allow the memory of this war hero to fade, and

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

USDA Reopens Enrollment for Improved Dairy Safety Net Tool

USDA's Farm Service Agency encourages dairy producers to consider enrolling in the new and improved Margin Protection Program for Dairy (MPP-Dairy), which will provide better protections for dairy producers from shifting milk and feed prices. With changes authorized under the Bipartisan Budget Act of 2018, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) has set the enrollment period to run from April 9, 2018 to June 1, 2018.

About the Program:

The program protects dairy producers by paying them when the difference between the national allmilk price and the national average feed cost (the margin) falls below a certain dollar amount elected by the producer. Changes include:

 Calculations of the margin period is monthly rather than bimonthly.

 Covered production is increased to 5 million pounds on the Tier 1 premium schedule, and premium rates for Tier 1 are substantially lowered.

• An exemption from paying an administrative fee for limited resource, beginning, veteran, and disadvantaged producers. Dairy operators enrolled in the previous 2018 enrollment period that qualify for this exemption under the new provisions may request a re-Dairy operations must

make a new coverage election for 2018, even if you enrolled during the previous 2018 signup period. Coverage elections made for 2018 will be retroactive to January 1, 2018. All dairy operations desiring coverage must sign up during the enrollment period and submit an appropriate form (CCC-782) and dairy operations may still "opt out" by not submitting a form. All outstanding balances for 2017 and prior years must be paid in full before 2018 coverage is approved.

Dairy producers can participate in FSA's MPP-Dairy or the Risk Management Agency's Livestock Gross Margin Insurance Plan for Dairy Cattle (LGM-Dairy), but not both. During the 2018 enrollment period, only producers with an active LGM-Dairy policy who have targeted marketings insured in 2018 months will be allowed to enroll in MPP-Dairy by June 1, 2018; however, their coverage will start only after active target marketingsconclude under LGM-Dairy.

USDA has a web tool to help producers determine the level of coverage under the MPP-Dairy that will provide them with the strongest safety net under a variety of conditions. The online resource, which will be updated and available by April 9 at www.fsa.usda.gov/ mpptool, allows dairy farmers to quickly and easily combine unique operation data and other key variables to calculate their coverage needs based on price projections. Producers can also review historical data or estimate future coverage based on data projections. The secure site can be accessed via computer, smartphone, tablet or any other platform.

USDA is mailing postcards advising dairy producers of the changes. For more information, visit www.fsa.usda.gov/dairy or contact your local USDA service center

Update Your Records

FSA is cleaning up our producer record database. If you have any unreported changes of address, zip code, phone number, email address or an incorrect name or business name on file they need to be reported to our office. Changes in your farm operation, like the addition of a farm by lease or purchase, need to be reported to our office as well. Producers participating in FSA and NRCS programs are required to timely report changes in their farming operation to the County Committee in writing and update their CCC-902 Farm Operating Plan.

If you have any updates or corrections, please call your local FSA office to update your records.

Try the sowbelly

Wanna get to know South Korea?

A person could write books on Korean cuisine, so doing justice to it in a single newspaper column is impossible. The options are plentiful, and almost every restaurant has its own spin on a local favorite.

One such samgyeopsal, which is Korean barbeque made from sowbelly and cuts of skirt meat. It's not only a tasty introduction to Korean food; samgyeopsal is also a pig-framed window into the country's social and economic changes following the Korean War. Since the 1953 armi-

stice, samgyeopsal has exploded in popularity and variety across the country, but it was actually borne of necessity. Up until 1950, Koreans

preferred beef to pork, considering the latter to be unhealthy. Pork didn't catch on until the 1970s but, regardless of the type, meat in Korea was traditionally boiled in soups or stews to make it go further.

During the war and after, however, those lucky enough to have meat had to grill it and eat it quickly before it spoiled, according to Jieun Choi, writing in Korea Exposé, an English-language news website.

On top of that, steaming meat was historically more popular than grilling. Until, that is, after the war.

Thanks to the U.S. military presence on the peninsula, and the country's brand-new oil industry, steel drums were plentiful and, according to Choi, they were a great way to grill meat outdoors.

Starting in the 1960s, people would grill pork and beef over open charcoal fires housed in steel-drum grills. The word bulgogi, which literally means "firemeat" didn't even enter the Korean vocabulary until about this time.

(Bulgogi itself is a quintessential Korean dish of grilled pork or beef and, like $\pm \ddot{E} f^{\circ}$, kimchi, it deserves its own column in the future.)

From 1970 to today, demand for pork has oustripped demand for chicken and beef, which itself reflects social change and economic growth. Rapid urbanization brought loads of people from the country into growing cities, driving demand for pork, which was cheap.

At that time, the government also heavily supported the domestic pork industry, which was supplying the Japanese market. (The two countries normalized diplomatic relations in 1965.)

Even

samgyeopsal houses emulate the steel drum grills of yore. Samgyeopsal is brought to the table raw, then grilled and trimmed by the guests. Many tables today are disk-shaped and made from polished steel, reminiscent of the top of an oil drum, and have a small, inset charcoal grill. Though cooking with

propane griddles at tables of various sizes and shapes is also common nowadays, it's not samgyeopsal if you don't cook it yourself. Near my apartment, there are half a dozen restaurants specializing in

samgyeopsal and, like the many others across town, each has its own spin. The nearest place serves thick, fatty strips of sowbelly and skirt meat, some marinaded, some plain; up the street a few blocks, though, is a place that serves it thincut and (somewhat) leaner.

Those are only two variations of many, but they show how intertwined samgyeopsal is with Korea's history, its present, and very likely its future.

In the 1960s and 70s, as people from the country migrated into northern cities, like Seoul and Daejeon, they brought their preference for thicker cuts with them. Southern port cities like Busan were home to slaughterhouses that served the Japanese export market, though, and the greasiness of thicker cuts didn't suit the palates of local Japanese

In response, southern restaurants began serving thinner cuts that were marinated and served with a spicy pepper sauce.

That adaptation trend continues even today, though you can get southern-style samgyeopsal in northern cities, and vice versa. Restaurateurs here really have no choice, given the fierce competition.

And, they've not stopped with marinades, sauces, and opting for thinner cuts. Here in Daejeon, one of the top places, Phantom Pan Pig -- what a name! -- offers samgyeopsal brushed with olive oil and coated with thyme, rosemary, and other dry herbs.

To beat it all, you cook it at your table -- in a castiron skillet! Other restaurants offer herbs and spices as well, but only the Phantom Pan Pig uses cast-iron

skillets. Sowbelly fried in castiron... what side of the world am I living on again?


