No liability is assumed by seller for delay or failure to deliver caused by wars, strikes, fires, floods, droughts, embargos or any other contingencies beyond seller's control. If the purchaser does not accept the goods on these terms, they are to be returned.

## PACKING AND SHIPPING

Plants are packed in lightweight cardboard cartons to make them as light as possible, and are sent Express collect. Our responsibility ceases upon delivery to forwarding company, and any claims for damaged plants should be made to them. We are a "Pinto Tag" Nursery and plants shipped inside California need no "destination inspection" excepting in the counties of Tulare and Ventura.
Plants being shipped to the South Atlantic and Gulf States require "bare rooting." The soil is carefully WASHED from the roots and the plant is RE-PLANTED, in the same container, with pure peat. It may be left to grow as you receive it, or may be transplanted to the garden. Feeding is necessary if left in the peat-preferably liquid. This has been a very successful mode of shipping and, of course, is a big saving on Express charges because of the light weight.

## CRATING

Because of increased costs it is necessary to charge for crating, at cost: gallon .35 and 3 and 5 gal. cans, .75 each.
Plants are packed in light weight cardboard cartons to insure minimum weight and safe arrival. Many of our customers write us complimenting us on "the best job of packing they have seen". Average weight of plants (bare root), packed and ready to ship, is 7 pounds for 1 gal. size and 20 pounds for 3 and 5 gal.

## HOW TO GROW AND CARE FOR CAMELLIAS

In order that you may derive the maximum enjoyment from the lovely Camellias and Azaleas you have purchased from us these cultural hints are offered. Time and experience have proven to us the use of these directions will insure success.

## LOCATION:

The Camellia and Azalea are shade loving plants, so the north or east side of the house or garden is the most suitable planting site; however, protection from the hot summer midday sun is of prime importance, regardless of what location you select. Shade is ideally provided by a lath house, naturally provided by trees, and may be temporarily provided by the erection of a lath or cloth shelter for protection during the summer months.

## PLANTING CAMELLIAS:

Camellias like a well drained soil and a cool, moist condition for their roots. In the lighter soil dig a hole $24 \times 24 \times 24$ inches and mix the top soil taken from the hole with equal parts of moistened peat moss and leaf mould. In heavy soil add coarse sand to the peat moss, leaf mould and topsoil. As a heavy soil often presents a drainage problem, use a post-hole digger to further deepen the planting hole by another 18 inches, and fill this hole as well as the bottom of the larger hole with coarse gravel or broken pottery to aid drainage. Tamp the soil well as you proceed with the planting, otherwise the Camellia will settle and be too deep when the job is finished. The plant should always be set a trifle higher than it was in the original container. The root-ball should be moist at the time of planting, and if the root system appears to be crowded the outer roots may be gently loosened with the fingers or a stick. When the planting is finished water thoroughly and slowly, checking to make sure that all air pockets are filled. Watering is very important-remember a plant in light soil will take more water than one in heavy soil, and a plant in the shade will require less water than one in semi-shade. Frequent syringing of the foliage is very beneficial during the summer months, but avoid either wetting or spraying the foliage during the heat of the day as sunburning will result. There can be no cut and dried rule for the watering of Camellias, they must be kept moist, but they will not stand an excess of water. Each garden will have a different water requirement, so you should check your own by digging down to a depth of several inches in the soil near your planting bed to determine from season to season the amount and frequency of irrigation, and keep the soil moist, not sloppy wet.

## PRUNING AND DISBUDDING

Camellias need shaping, some more than others. Any branch having a tendency to grow irregularly should either be straightened by staking or shaped by pruning. (Do not cut the main or upright central stem of the Chandleri Elegans or Francine until the plant has reached the desired height as their growth will be mostly lateral once the upright central stem is cut.) Some varieties have a spindly habit of growth and will be induced to bush by heading back the growth that occurs in the late spring. Late season pruning may be postponed until blooming time so that no flowers need be lost. Always use a sharp knife or sharp shears so that a clean, easily healed cut will be made. Make a slanting cut close to an "eye" or leaf joint so no stubs remain to die back. Varieties that produce heavy crops should be disbudded. By mid-summer the flower buds may usually be distinguished from leaf buds, and terminal or tip clusters should be thinned to two buds, those along the stems should be spaced to two inches apart. . . . If possible, select buds at various stages of development so the blossoms will not all mature within a short time of each other. Avoid wetting the flower buds once they start to show color.

To enjoy Azaleas to the fullest, it is important to understand the requirements of the plant. Once we understand a plant we will be able to grow it successfully, and it will reward us many times over, and for many lifetimes, with the ultimate in charm and color. It will thrill us more with each passing year and will continue to thrill our children and our children's children.

The flowers may be picked freely and used as decorations or arrangements-their lasting quality is remarkable.

## AZALEA PRICES include PACKING FREE

on 1 gal. and 3 gal. can. When ordering the 1 -year-old plants (grown in flats), please order in multiples of four (4), your choice of any varieties. For less than four of this size packing will be charged at cost.

Azaleas and Rhododendrons like a well drained, light, peaty type of growing medium, quite acid and fairly high humid conditions with shade during the heat of the day ( 12 to 3 p.m.). Do not put them in deep all-day shade. They want to be kept moist at all times but not soggy wet as the roots MUST have air.

A mixture of two parts peat, one part leaf mold (oak, pine or redwood) and one part clean sand seem to be the ideal medium for growing. This mixture allows the air to circulate freely through the roots system, yet holds quantities of moisture, and is very acid. The air circulating through the root system, picks up moisture and immediately around the plant the humidity is fairly high, even in hot, dry weather, which we experience in California summers.

In planting dig a hole two feet square and eight to 12 inches deep-replace with the above mixture to one inch above the soil level-press in tight around the root system. If the plant is potted or canned, loosen the roots with the fingers or by cutting, before planting. In heavy adobe or clay soils we suggest a raised bed rather than digging a hole. If that is not possible in some locations then make a drainage hole with a post hole digger in the center of the planting hole and fill it with rock.

Feed Azaleas (and Camellias) once on April 1, May 1, July 15 and August 15. RHODODENDRONS, April and May only. Without a doubt one of the finest fertilizers for these plants is "4-5-2 yellow tag" (yes that is its name). We highly recommend it as an organic composted food that has been fortified with essential chemicals and iron and sulphur for a very acid reaction. This is also available without the iron and sulphur for general use.

## BELGIAN INDICAS

These are the tenderest and will only stand a low temperature of around 30 degrees. They are very popular because of their large double blooms that start in the fall and reach a peak in March. Better as a pot plant although some are good garden shrubs. Not as long lived as others, evergreen.
