EPOCHS.

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THE SEASONS.

- Vernal Equinox begins March 20th, 1h. 30m. Morning; continues 89d. 1h. 6m.
- Summer Solstice begins June 21st, 10h. 0m. Evening; continues 92d. 20h. 30m.
- Autumnal Equinox begins September 23rd, 0h. 15m. Morning; continues 89d. 17h. 59m.
- Winter Solstice begins December 21st, 6h. 14m. Evening; T. year, 365d. 5h. 50m.

ECLIPSES.

There will be four Eclipses during the year, none of them requiring much remark. But we give the particulars:—

I.—On the 16th of April, there will be a total Eclipse of the Sun Not visible to us.

II. On the 1st of May next, there will be a partial Eclipse of the Moon. Invisible to Canadians.

III. On the 10th of October, there will be an annular Eclipse of the Sun. Not visible in Canada.

IV. On the 24th of October, in the evening, there will be a total Eclipse of the Moon, ending in the morning of the 25th. Visible as follows:—Begins at Montreal at 0.48 on the 25th; Toronto, 0.25. Total in Montreal 2.6, where totality ends 2.49. Total in Toronto 1.43, where totality ends 2.18. Ends in Montreal 3.58; in Toronto 3.35.

PLANETS.

Venus will be Morning Star until February 23rd; Mars after July 5th; Jupiter after October 5th; Saturn from January 24th until the 5th of May.

Venus will be Evening Star from February 23rd until December 8th; Mars until July 5th; Jupiter until the 5th of October; Saturn until January the 24th, and after the 4th of May.

Mercury will be brightest the latter end of January, February, and October, also about the middle of April and August, and the first week in December. Venus will be brightest November 2nd; Jupiter March 17th; Saturn August 3rd.

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cart, truck, or other two-wheeled vehicle, \$2; for every waggon or four-wheeled vehicle drawn by one horse, \$6; for every waggon or four-wheeled vehicle drawn by two horses and made to carry a load under 4,000 lbs. weight, \$7; for every heavy waggon, float or other four-wheeled vehicle drawn by two or more horses, and made to carry heavy articles or materials weighing 4,000 lbs., or upwards, \$9; for every Diable, \$4.

The second class shall include all carts waggons, or other vehicles used by merchants, traders, manufacturers, or contractors, for the conveyance or delivery of the articles or effects dealt in, manufactured, or made use of by them, for each of which there shall be paid, in addition to the rates charged for in the first class, \$2.50.

The third class shall include all carts, waggons or other vehicles used by expressmen, bakers, brewers, distillers, farmers, or gardeners, for each of which there shall be paid, in addition to the rate charged for in the first class, \$5.

Parties obtaining licenses as aforesaid, shall moreover pay the annual assessment on all working horses employed in drawing the above-mentioned vehicles or carriages, at the rate of \$2.50 each, and also twenty-five cents for each number granted by the Chief of Police.

Dogs.—License of \$3 for every female dog; and \$2 for every male dog.

Milk.—An annual license of \$1 for selling milk.

Firewood, green, or from rafts, half a cord, three feet long, 20 cts. Furniture or Luggage, per load, 20 cents. Lumber, green or hard from rafts, 500 feet, board measure, 20 cts. Molasses, Sugar, or Oil, one puncheon, hogshead, or load, 20 cts. Pig Iron, Lead, Copper, or Tin, one ton, 25 cents. Bar Iron or Steel, one load, 30 cents.

For each additional $\frac{1}{4}$ mile for above description of goods, 10c.

And from any of the Harbor Wharves to any place in the 2nd or 3rd Division, within $\frac{1}{4}$ a mile distance from the boundary line of the first division and *vice versa*, or from any place (exclusive of the Wharves), to any other in the city and *vice versa*, provided the distance does not exceed $1\frac{1}{4}$ mile,—instead of 15, 20, 25, and 30 cts., the rates shall be 25, 30, 35 and 40 cts.

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MONTREAL WATER WORKS.

Extracts from By-Law No. 65, Enacted April 29th, 1873.

Sec. 5. It is expressly forbidden to any occupant of a house or building, or any part thereof, supplied with water from the said Water Works, to furnish water to others, or to use it otherwise than for his own use, or to increase the supply of water agreed for, or to waste it, or to practise any fraud upon the said Corporation with regard to the water so supplied.

Sec. 6. All persons taking the water shall keep the distribution pipes within their premises in good repair, and protected from frost, at their own expense; and they shall be held liable to the Corporation for all damages that may result from their failure to do so.

Sec. 7. No person shall fraudulently connect any pipe with the pipes of the Corporation, or with any pipe, cistern or apparatus connected therewith, or to or into which the water from the said Water Works shall flow or proceed; or shall fraudulently use or otherwise misappropriate the water supplied by the city, or knowingly permit the same to be fraudulently used or otherwise misappropriated.

Sec. 8. If any person supplied with water by the Corporation do, or permit to be done, anything in contravention of this By-law, or fail to do anything prescribed by this By-law, the Superintendent or his deputy may cut off the water supply, and cease to supply such person with water so long as the cause of complaint remains, or is not remedied.

Sec. 9. No person shall wrongfully cause or suffer any pipe, valve, cock, cistern, bath, soil-pan, water closet, or other apparatus or receptacle to be out of repair, or to be so used or contrived as that the water supplied to him is or is likely to be wasted, misused or unduly consumed.

Sec. 10. No alteration shall be made in any of the pipes or fixtures inserted by the city, except by its agents or officers.

Sec. 11. No person supplied with water from the said Water Works by meter shall be allowed to connect, or cause to be connected, any pipe or other fixture between the Corporation's service pipe and the meter.

Sec. 12. No person, unless duly authorized by the Water Committee, shall open any hydrant in the said city, or lift or remove the cover of, or draw water from the same.

Sec. 13. No person shall turn on or turn off the water in any manner, or interfere with any of the water pipes or valves belonging to the city, without the license of the Water Committee or of the said Superintendent.

Sec. 14. No person shall pass the railing enclosing the Reservoirs of the said city, or shall defile or deposit any filth or offensive matter in the said Reservoirs, or on the bank or ground adjacent thereto, belonging to the said city; or shall allow any dog or other animal to jump into the said Reservoirs, or upon the said bank or ground, or shall pass or remain upon the said bank or ground after ten o'clock in the evening; or shall do or cause anything to be done tending to defile or corrupt, to disturb or agitate the waters of the said Reservoirs.

Sec. 15. No person shall draw water from the River St. Lawrence or elsewhere for the purpose of selling the same in any part of the city.

Sec. 16. No person shall draw or use water from the Water Works in the said city for private fountains, or for hand-hose for watering purposes, or for building or manufacturing purposes, unless such person shall have previously obtained from the Superintendent of the said Works a written permission to that effect, and paid the respective rates charged in the subjoined tariff for the supply of water in such cases; and in no case shall the said hose be used for sprinkling or watering the streets between 9 o'clock in the forenoon and 5 o'clock in the afternoon.

Sec. 17. No person shall use any hand-hose of a larger size or nozzle than one-fourth of an inch orifice, or use any hand-hose for the purpose of washing horses, coaches, omnibuses or other vehicles.

Sec. 18. No meter shall be used for determining the quantity of water supplied by the said Works, unless the same shall have been previously submitted to and approved by the said Superintendent.

Sec. 19. The several rates enumerated and specified in the tariff contained in the subjoined schedule, shall be, and the same are hereby imposed for water to be supplied from the Water Works of the said city.

Sec. 20. The said rates shall be due, and payable to the City Treasurer, in advance, on the fifteenth day of August every year, by the occupant or lessee, or occupants or lessees of all buildings, part of buildings or tenements in the said city, supplied with water from the said Works, as well by those who shall consent as by those who shall refuse to receive the water pipe to supply the said water, or to use the same.

Sec. 21. All charges for specific supplies, or for fractional parts of the year, shall be payable in advance and before the water is let on.

Sec. 22. In buildings occupied as offices where there are water closets in the building, each tenant of an office, or suite of offices,

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will be charged, in addition to the tariff rates, a Water-closet Tax.

Sec. 23. A discount of five per cent. shall be allowed to all water tenants who shall pay the said rates on or before the fifteenth August in each year.

Sec. 24. In all cases of non-payment of the rates imposed by the present By-law, for thirty days after the same are due, the said Council, or any duly authorized officer charged with the management of the said Works, may cut off the supply of water from any building upon which the said rates shall be due, or from any one in default to pay the said rates; which shall not prevent the said rates from running as before, and the water shall not be let on, for the use of any such defaulter, except upon payment of all arrears due.

Sec. 25. Any person offending against any of the provisions of this By-law, or of the said Tariff, shall for each and every such infraction be liable to a fine not exceeding twenty dollars and costs of prosecution, and, in default of immediate payment of the said fine and costs, to an imprisonment in the common gaol for a period not to exceed two months, the said imprisonment to cease upon payment of the said fine and costs.

Every building used as a college, academy, seminary of learning or school, all churches, poor or alms houses, nunneries, houses of industry, and generally all religious or charitable institutions, hospitals and reformatories, shall be charged at Shop Rates, to be based and determined upon the interest, at four per cent., of the actual value of the property in such case, the said value as set forth and established in and by the assessment roll last made and revised. Provided that all such institutions, with the exception of churches, may, if they see fit, use water by meter, and pay therefor at the same rate as distilleries, breweries, and other establishments hereinafter mentioned.

All rates herein imposed for Steam Engines shall be separate from and over and above any other rate for water, imposed on the premises.

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DISTILLERIES, BREWERIES, &c.

Distilleries, Breweries, Dye Houses, Railway, Printing, or Photographic establishments, and all manufacturing establishments, whenever they require water for any purpose not specially enumerated in the tariff, shall be supplied by meter, and charged, when the quantity used averages 1,000 gallons per day or less, at the rate of three cents per 100 gallons; when the quantity averages from 1,000 to 5,000 gallons per day, two cents per 100 gallons; when the quantity averages over 5,000 gallons per day, 1½ cents per 100 gallons. Charges by meter to exclude any other charge for water upon the assessed rental of such establishments, when the whole of the water supplied to the said establishments passes through such meter.

METERS.

The meters shall be furnished by the city, and an annual rent, not to exceed five dollars, charged to the consumers for the cost and care thereof. The meters shall be placed within the premises of the consumers, whose duty it shall be to see that the same are protected from frost or injury, the whole under the direction of the Water Department; such meters shall at all times be accessible to the Corporation Meter Inspector.

If the meter gets out of order and fails to register, the consumer will be charged at the average daily consumption previously registered by such meter; and for the purpose of average the year shall be deemed to be 300 days.

The provisions hereinbefore made in regard to the supply by meter shall not come into force until Public Notice is given that the Water Committee are prepared to supply meters to consumers.

When the Committee are thus prepared, they shall give two months' notice to that effect, in the newspapers in which the Corporation advertisements usually appear. Pending this notice, the Water Committee may fix special rates for unenumerated property or properties, manufactories or other establishments requiring an unusual supply; and no person shall be allowed to use water for any other purpose but for domestic purposes, without having previously obtained a permit from the Water Department to do so.

Persons desirous of supplying their own meter may do so with the previous sanction and written permit of the Superintendent of Water Works.

When water is required for purposes not specified in the foregoing Tariff, the rate shall be fixed by the Water Committee.

The Water Committee shall have power to ascertain, by meter, the quantity of water used in any of the above cases, and charge accordingly.

REGULATIONS AND RATES.

Letter Rates.—Letters posted in Canada, addressed to any place within the Dominion, pass, if pre-paid, for 3 cents per half-ounce; but if posted unpaid they are charged 5 cents per half-ounce.

On letters to Prince Edward Island, the rate is 3 cents per half-ounce, if pre-paid; 5 cents, if unpaid.

The rates on letters to the United Kingdom will be:

By Canadian Packet, 6 cents per half-ounce.

By Cunard Packet, 8 cents per half-ounce, advancing by one rate for each half-ounce.

Letters for the United Kingdom must be pre-paid, or they will be charged a fine of 3d. sterling in addition to the deficient postage on delivery in England.

The British Post Office forwards letters to Canada by the first packet sailing after the letter is posted, unless the letters bear a special direction,—“By Canadian Packet,” or “By British Packet.”—and in that case they are kept over for the packet designated. “By Canadian Mail” is not a distinctive superscription; for any mail for Canada is a “Canadian Mail,” by whatever packet forwarded.

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Letters for British Colonies and Possessions beyond sea, and for Foreign Countries, except France, *via* England, must be pre-paid.

The rate on letters to the United States is 6 cents, if pre-paid; 10 cents, if unpaid.

Registration Charges.—For the registration of a letter addressed to any place in British North America, the charge is 2 cents.

For the registration of a letter to the United Kingdom, 8 cents.

For the registration of a letter to the United States, 5 cents.

France, and other countries for which letters pass through France, special rates, according to weight.

No letter can be forwarded as registered, unless postage and registration fee are both pre-paid.

Miscellaneous Charges.—The charge on parcels, which can only be sent by post *within the Dominion*, by Parcel post, to any place in Canada, is 12½ cents per half-pound, (with 5 cents additional, if registered.) No parcel must exceed *four* pounds in weight.

One cent per ounce, payable in advance by postage stamp, is the rate on printed circulars, prices current, hand bills, and other printed matter of a like character, and on books bound or unbound, when posted at a Canadian Post Office, addressed to any place in Canada, British North America generally, or the United States.

The charges upon prices current, sent singly, when addressed to the United Kingdom, is 2 cents each, and must be pre-paid by postage stamp.

Correspondence for British Columbia and Manitoba is sent in closed mails, *via the United States*, at the same rates of postage as to other parts of the Dominion.

Postage Rates on certain Miscellaneous Matter passing within the Dominion of Canada, or to or from the United States:—

1.—Packages of seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, and scions, or grafts and botanical specimens, may be posted in Canada for delivery within the Dominion, or to an address within the United States, on pre-payment by postage stamp of a rate of one cent per ounce; and when received from the United States addressed to any place in Canada, such packages may be delivered on payment, by the person addressed, of a like rate.

2.—The limit of weight for such packages will be one pound. No letter or communication intended to serve the purpose of a letter must be enclosed in them; and they must be so put up as to be easy of examination, for the purpose of verifying the alleged contents. If put up in bags, the bags must be simply tied at the neck, so as to admit of inspection; and in the case of such packages mailed in Canada, the nature of the contents, such as "*Seeds,*" "*Roots,*" &c., as the case may be, must be marked on the package by the sender, as a statement of the claim to pass at the reduced rate above mentioned.

3.—Book and newspaper manuscript and printers' proof-sheets, (whether corrected or not), maps, prints, drawings, en-

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gravings, photographs, (when not on glass or in cases containing glass), and sheet music, (whether printed or written), to any address in Canada or the United States, may pass in covers open at the ends or sides, and provided that no letter or other communication intended to serve the purpose of a letter be enclosed therein, on pre-payment, when posted in Canada, by postage stamp of the ordinary printed matter rate of one cent per ounce; or upon payment of that rate on delivery on such matter when received in the mails from the United States.

Transmission of Patterns of Merchandise and Samples between Canada and the United Kingdom, and certain other countries:

4.—Patterns of Merchandise and samples may be forwarded between Canada and the United Kingdom and Denmark, France, Italy, Belgium, the German States, Netherlands, Portugal and Switzerland, by the Canadian packet mails, at book-post rates, and subject to the following conditions:

A—The patterns or samples must not be of any intrinsic value; and this rule excludes all articles of a saleable nature, and whatever may have a value of its own, apart from its mere use as a pattern: nor must the quantity of any material or article sent as a pattern or sample be so great that it could have on this ground an intrinsic value.

On this point an explanation in a subsequent Departmental Order, it appears as follows:

B—It has hitherto formed part of the Imperial Post Office regulations that "*samples or patterns must not be of intrinsic value,*" but in consequence of the difficulty that has been experienced in determining what is, and what is not, a pattern or sample of merchandise of intrinsic value, this prohibition has been removed.

The modification is a verbal one, and will not alter or enlarge in any way, the character of the transmissions permitted to pass by pattern post.

The special prohibition as to intrinsic value, has, it is understood, been withdrawn, not because the question of value will not still influence a decision as to whether an article offered for transmission by parcel post is a genuine commercial sample (or pattern,) or not, but because as a general proviso it could not well be enforced; inasmuch as every article, whether properly a pattern or sample or not, has necessarily more or less of an intrinsic value, and might be held to be amenable to a strict construction of this prohibitory clause in the regulation.

C—The patterns, &c., must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination. Samples, however, of seeds, drugs, and such like, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material, simply tied at the neck, or, provided that bags be transparent, they may be entirely closed, if they are for delivery within the United Kingdom. Bags, however, entirely closed, even though they be transparent, must not be used for the transmission of seeds to foreign parts.

D—The rule which prohibited the transmission through the post, as patterns of articles of cutlery, &c., has been rescinded;

and scissors, knives, razors, forks, steel pens, nails, keys, watch machinery, metal tubing, pieces of metal or ore, and such like articles, are now allowed to be forwarded by the post as samples, provided they are packed and guarded in so secure a manner as to afford complete protection to the contents of the mail bags, and to the persons of the officers of the post office. Such articles, however, must be so packed that they may be easily examined; and it is made a rule that any packets containing such articles, which may be found to be insufficiently guarded, shall not be forwarded through the post.

No packet of patterns or samples, posted for delivery within the Dominion, must exceed 24 oz. in weight.

A packet of patterns or samples sent to France or Portugal, must not exceed 18 inches in length and 12 inches in width or depth; a packet to any other place abroad must not exceed 24 inches in length, or 12 inches in breadth or depth.

The limits of weight are as follows:—

None of the articles named in the Rule D may be sent as patterns or samples to any place abroad, except Germany, Belgium, and the British Colonies, and not to these places when addressed "*via France.*"

There must be no writing or printing other than the address of the person for whom the packet is intended, the manufacturer's or trade mark and number, and the prices of the article.

Any infringements of the above regulations will render the packet liable to be treated and charged as a letter.

The rule which forbids the transmission through the Post of any article likely to injure the contents of the mail bags will apply to patterns and samples; any package transgressing this rule is to be sent to the Postmaster-General.

Transmission of Patterns and Samples within the Province of Canada.

Patterns or samples of merchandise and goods for sale may be posted in Canada to be forwarded to any place within the Dominion, on pre-payment by postage stamp of a rate of one cent per ounce, under the following regulations:

I.—Patterns or samples must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination. Samples, however, of seeds, drugs, and so forth, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material, fastened in such a manner that they may be readily opened—or in bags entirely closed, provided that they be transparent, so that the officers of the Post Office may be able to satisfy themselves as to the nature of the contents.

II.—The packet may bear on the *outside* the address of the sender in addition to the address of the person for whom it may be intended—also a trade mark and numbers, and the price of

the articles enclosed ; *inside* there must be no enclosure but the samples or patterns themselves—the particulars, however, of the trade marks, numbers and price, may be marked on the articles themselves instead of on the outside of the packet, at the option of the sender.

III.—Any sample or pattern packet containing a letter, or otherwise violating the conditions of the preceding rules, is to be rated and treated as a letter.

IV.—The rate of 1 cent per ounce is to be pre-paid by postage stamp—and if such rate be not fully pre-paid by the stamps affixed, the package is to be rated with the deficient postage and a fine of five cents in addition.

V.—Packets of samples or patterns may be registered on pre-payment by postage stamp of a registration fee of 5 cents in addition to the postage rate—and provided such packets be duly handed in the Post Office for registration.

A registration receipt or certificate should always be given for such packages when presented for registration.

VI.—No packet of samples or patterns must exceed 24 ounces in weight ; any packet exceeding that weight is to be sent to the Postmaster-General.

Book Post.—Books, bound or unbound, posted in Canada, and addressed to any office in the Dominion, British America, and the United States, are chargeable with the rate of one cent per ounce, which must be pre-paid by postage stamps.

Book packets are forwarded by post from Canada to the United Kingdom and *vice versa*, by Canadian steamer, at the following rates :—For each packet—

Not more than 1 oz.....	2 cents.
Exceeding 1 oz., and not exceeding 2 oz.....	4 “
“ 2 oz. “ 4 oz.....	6 “
“ 4 oz. “ ½ lb.....	8 “
“ ½ lb. “ 12 oz.....	18 “
“ 12 oz. “ 1 lb.....	24 “
“ 1 lb. “ 1½ lb.....	30 “

And so on, the scale progressing throughout by a single rate for every four ounces.

And by Cunard packet :—

Not more than 1 oz.....	4 cents.
Exceeding 1 oz. and not exceeding 2 oz.....	6 “
“ 2 oz. “ 4 oz.....	8 “
“ 4 oz. “ 8 oz.....	16 “
“ 8 oz. “ 12 oz.....	24 “
“ 12 oz. “ 1 lb.....	32 “

And so on, adding one rate for every four ounces.

5—No prints or printed matter will be allowed to pass by book post between the United Kingdom and Canada, unless printed on paper, parchment or vellum.

Book packets addressed to the United Kingdom can be registered on payment of the ordinary registration fee (8 cents), in addition to the postage.

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Book Post with France.—For a packet of printed matter, or single newspaper, book, &c., not over 2 ounces..... 4 cents.
Ditto, exceeding 2 ounces and not over 4 ounces..... 8 “
Ditto, “ 4 ounces “ 8 ounces.....16 “
Ditto, “ 8 ounces “ 16 ounces.....32 “

And so on, increasing 16 cents for every additional half-pound.

The Book Post Regulations between Canada and England apply to matters between Canada and France.

Newspapers and Periodicals.—Newspapers published in Canada may be sent by post from the office of publication, addressed to any place in Canada, at the following rates, *if paid quarterly in advance*, by either the publisher at the post office where the papers are posted, or by the subscriber at delivering post office :—

For a paper published 6 times a week.....	30 cents per quarter.
Do. do. 3 times a week.....	15 “ “
Do. do. 2 times a week.....	10 “ “
Do. do. 1 time a week.....	5 “ “

When the above rates are not paid in advance, by either publisher or subscribers, such papers are charged one cent each on delivery.

Transient Newspapers.—Transient newspapers, that is to say, Canadian newspapers posted otherwise than from the office of publication, and American or British papers posted or re-posted in Canada, must be pre-paid two cents each, by postage stamps, or they cannot be forwarded; except only *British newspapers* distributed to regular subscribers by Canadian booksellers and news-agents, such papers pass free, as they would do if received in the Canadian Packet Mail.

Newspapers by Mail from England.—Newspapers received from England by the Canadian and American Packets are delivered free.

United States newspapers, to regular subscribers, are charged 1 cent each on delivery. Transient papers are charged 2 cents.

Periodicals passing by Mail in Canada.—The rate on all periodicals, other than newspapers, passing by mail in Canada, save such as may be addressed to or received from the United Kingdom, will henceforth be one cent per four ounce weight of package containing periodical matter, whether the package contain one or more numbers.

Any fraction of 4 ounces to be charged as a full rate.

Periodicals weighing less than one ounce per number, posted in Canada for any place within the Dominion, when sent *singly*, pass for *one-half cent* per number, if pre-paid by stamp.


The above rate will be payable *on delivery* on all periodical matter received from the United States, except that Canadian editors may receive exchange periodicals from the United States free of Canadian postage.

Canadian Periodicals posted for United Kingdom, by Canadian Packets.—Periodicals printed and published in Canada may be posted, addressed to any place in the United Kingdom,


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b) Canadian Packet, on pre-payment by postage stamp of 2 cents each number.

This rate will be applicable to all classes of Canadian periodicals posted as above for the United Kingdom. No package of periodicals can be sent through the post if it exceed four pounds in weight.

Post Cards value one cent each, and Postage Stamps.--Postage Stamps of the respective value of $\frac{1}{2}$ cent for small periodicals; 1 cent for newspapers; 2 cents for prices current for the United Kingdom; 3 cents for ordinary Provincial letters; 6 cents for United States rate; 6 cents for Canadian Packet; and 8 cents for Cunard Packet,--are provided for sale to the public.

Penal Clause.---The Act contains the following penal clauses: To enclose a letter or letters, or any writing intended to serve the purpose of a letter, in a parcel posted for the parcel post, or to enclose a letter, or any writing, or make any written marks to serve the purpose of a letter, or to enclose any other thing in a newspaper, posted to pass as a newspaper, at the rate of postage applicable to newspapers (except in the case of accounts and receipts of newspaper publishers, which are permitted to pass folded within the newspapers sent by them to their subscribers), is an offence punishable by a penalty of not less than ten and not exceeding forty dollars.

Money Orders on Canada.---All the Money Order Post Offices in Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick, and Nova Scotia, are authorized to draw Money Orders on each other for any sum up to \$100, and for as many Orders of \$100 each as the applicant may require, upon the following terms, viz.:

On Orders up to \$10	5 cents.
On Orders over \$10 and up to \$20	10 "
On Orders over \$20 and up to \$40	20 "
On Orders over \$40 and up to \$60	30 "
On Orders over \$60 and up to \$80	40 "
On Orders over \$80 and up to \$100	50 "

Money Orders on the United Kingdom.---The Money Order Offices in the Dominion also draw upon all the Money Order Offices in England, Ireland, and Scotland, and the Channel Islands, for any sum up to £10 sterling, and grant as many Orders for £10 sterling each as may be needed to make up the amount to be remitted. The terms are as under:--

On Orders up to £2	25 cents.
On Orders over £2 and up to £5	50 "
On Orders over £5 and up to £7	75 "
On Orders over £7 and up to £10	100 "

Money Orders on the Lower Provinces.---The Money Order Offices in Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick, and Nova Scotia, draw also upon Money Order Offices in Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland. The Orders on Prince Edward Island are in Dominion Currency; those upon Newfoundland, like those of the United Kingdom, are made payable in Sterling money.

The Money Order Post Offices in the Dominion are furnished with lists of all the Money Order Offices in Canada, the United Kingdom, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland; and the Postmasters are instructed to afford every information in their power, in respect of the places upon which they draw, together with any other information relating to the issues as the intending remitters may desire.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK.

The Post Office Savings Banks commenced operations in Ontario and Quebec on the 1st April, 1868.

2. The direct security of the Dominion is given by the Statute for all deposits made.

3. At each Savings Bank Post Office, the Savings Bank regulations may be read by the public, giving full information with respect to the mode of depositing and withdrawing money, and these regulations are printed on the cover of the Pass Book supplied to each depositor.

4. Any person may have a deposit account, and deposits are received daily during the ordinary hours of Post Office business, of any number of dollars, from \$1 up to \$300, the total amount which can be received from a depositor in any one year, except in cases to be specially authorized by the Postmaster-General.

5. The Postmasters of the Savings Bank Offices will act as agents for the receipt of the money deposited for transmission to the Postmaster-General, and for the payment by the Postmaster-General of money withdrawn by depositors.

6. Each depositor is supplied with a Pass Book, and the sums paid in or withdrawn are entered therein by the Postmaster receiving or paying the same. In addition, a direct receipt for each amount paid in is sent to the depositor from the Postmaster-General, and the Postmaster-General will issue a cheque payable at any Post Office Savings Bank desired, for any sum withdrawn.

7. Every depositor's account is thus kept with the Postmaster-General, and a depositor may pay into his or her account with the Post Office Savings Bank, at any of the Savings Bank Post Offices which at the time may best suit his convenience, and exercise the same choice in drawing out money, subject only to the obligation of producing the Pass Book, in proof of identity, whenever paying in or drawing out deposits.

8. Interest at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum is allowed on deposits.

9. Postmasters are forbidden by law to disclose the name of any depositor, or the amount of any sum deposited or withdrawn.

10. No charge will be made to depositors on paying in, or drawing out money, nor for postage or communications with the Postmaster-General in relation thereto.

11. The Postmaster-General will always be ready to receive and attend to all applications, complaints, or other communications addressed to him by depositors or others, relative to Post Office Savings Bank matters.

12. Additional Post Offices are from time to time authorized to act as Savings Bank agencies.

The importation of Arms and Munitions of War, otherwise than from Great Britain or the British Possessions, is not allowed, unless by special permission from the Minister of Customs.

TARIFF.

Section 8 of 31 Vic., cap. 44, is repealed, and the following Section is substituted for it as Section 8 of said Act by 33 Vic., cap. 9.

Value for Duty.—The value for duty of goods, on which an *ad valorem* duty of customs is imposed, imported into Canada by sea, shall be the actual value of such goods at the last place at which they are purchased; and the value of such goods for duty, if imported from the United States by land or inland navigation, shall be the actual value of such goods at the last place at which they are purchased for importation into Canada, and whence they are directly conveyed without change of package to Canada; and whatever be the country from which the goods are imported or in which they are purchased, such value shall be ascertained by adding to the value of such goods at the place of growth, production or manufacture, the cost of transportation, whether by land or water, and of shipment and transshipment, with all expenses included from place of growth, production or manufacture, to the place where the goods are purchased, and if they are purchased in the United States, then to the place whence they are directly conveyed to Canada, as aforesaid; and such value shall include, also, the value of any box, case, sack, package, or covering of any kind in which such goods are contained; and all export duties on such goods, and all costs and charges incurred prior to their purchase.

Packages delivered before Examination.—All the packages mentioned in any one entry, although most of such packages may have been delivered to the importer, shall be subject to the control of the Customs authorities of the port at which they are entered, until such of the packages as have been sent for examination to the Examining Warehouse, shall have been duly examined and approved, provided such examination take place within three days after the delivery of the package or packages into the Examining Warehouse, and after twenty-four hours' notice by the importer to the collector; and a bond shall be given by the importer conditioned that the packages so delivered shall not be opened or unpacked before the package or packages sent to the Examining Warehouse shall have been examined and passed as aforesaid, provided they are examined within the delay aforesaid; and the packages so delivered, or the goods if lawfully unpacked, shall, if required by the Collector of Customs, be returned to the Custom House, within such delay as may be mentioned in the bond, under a forfeiture of the penalty of such bond; provided that the Collector shall use due diligence in causing such examination to be made, and may, if he sees no objection, permit the remaining packages to be opened and unpacked, as soon as those sent to the Warehouse have been examined and approved.

Collectors to File Invoices.—The Collector of Customs, at all the ports of Canada, shall retain and put on file, after duly stamping the same, all invoices of goods imported at such ports

respectively, of which invoices they shall give certified copies or extracts, whenever called upon so to do by the importer, and such copies or extracts so duly certified by the Collector or other proper officer, and bearing the stamp of the Custom House at which they are filed, shall be considered and received as authentic, and the Collector shall be entitled to demand for each certificate a fee of fifty cents, before delivering the same.

Materials used in Canadian Manufactures.—34 Vic., cap. 10—Sec. 3—Governor in Council may from time to time transfer to the *free list*, any or all articles (whether natural products or products of manufactures) used as materials in Canadian Manufactures.

Machinery.—Sec. 4.—Governor in Council may authorize the admission, free of duty, of any machinery to be used in any Canadian Manufactory, on satisfactory evidence that like machinery is not then manufactured in Canada. Under the authority of this Section, certain rules for the free admission of machinery have been adopted by order in Council of 7th June, 1871.

Regulations for the Inspection and Branding of Petroleum, sanctioned by Order in Council of 30th May, 1868.

1st. Refined Petroleum shall be tested by Taglibues Pyrometer or by such other similar instruments as may be approved by the Minister of Inland Revenue, and all such instruments shall be distributed under the supervision of the Department of Inland Revenue, and shall be used in accordance with instructions sanctioned by the said Department.

Fire test 105 degrees.

2nd. Refined Petroleum, which was on the 22nd of May, 1868, in possession of parties who were not Refiners, may be allowed to pass inspection, provided it bears a fire test of one hundred degrees of Fahrenheit Thermometer, without giving off vapor that will explode or ignite on the application of fire.

3rd. All Barrels, Casks or Packages containing Petroleum which have been inspected shall be branded with:—

The date of the Inspection.
Sec. 17. The name of the Inspecting Officer.
The degree of heat at which the vapor produced by it ignited.
The name of the refiner, or, if imported, the name of the importer.

4th. Refined Petroleum may be warehoused and removed in bond under the regulations made by an Order in Council on the 27th day of April, 1868.

TO CONVERT PENCE INTO CENTS.—Add a cypher to any number of pence, and divide by 6. Example: To 44 pence add a cypher, 440; which, divided by 6, gives 73 2-6ths, say 73 cents.

TO CONVERT CENTS INTO PENCE.—Multiply any number of cents by 6, and put off the last figure, which is tenths. Example: 73 cents multiplied by 6, gives 438, or 43 pence and 8-10ths, say 44 pence.

TO CONVERT STERLING INTO CURRENCY.—To the given sum add 1-5th of itself, and 1-12th of that 1-5th.

CURRENCY INTO STERLING.—Multiply by 60, and divide by 73.

GAME LAWS

OF THE

DOMINION OF CANADA.

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO.

Fishing for speckled or brook trout can only be legally done by angling by hand, with hook and line, from 1st May to 1st October. White fish, or salmon trout, are not to be taken by any means between the 19th November and 1st December; nor by means of any kind of seine between 30th May and 1st August. Gill nets for salmon, trout, or white fish, must have meshes of at least five inches extension measure, and seines for white fish of not less than four inches. Bass, pickerel, or doré and maskinongé, may be taken at any time, except from 15th April to 1st May. The Governor-General may, by order in Council, however, vary this time. Fishing by means of net or other apparatus is prohibited, except under lease or license from the Department of Marine and Fisheries. The main channel, or course of any stream, must at all times be kept open, and no

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nets shall be so used as to obstruct the passage of fish in any river, bay, or creek, to and from their breeding places. The Local Fishery Overseers are instructed to enforce these enactments.

The following is the new Game Act in the Province of Ontario, giving the season when game may be killed:

Deer, moose, elk, reindeer, or cariboo, between the 1st day of September and the 1st day of December.

Wild turkeys, grouse, pheasants or partridges, between the 1st day of September and the 1st day of January.

Quail, between the 1st day of October and the 1st day of January.

Woodcock, between the 1st day of July and the 1st of January.

Snipe, between the 15th day of August and the 1st of May.

Mallard, grey duck, black duck, wood or summer duck, and all kinds of teal, between the 15th day of August and the 1st day of January.

Hares or rabbits, between the 1st day of September and the 1st day of March.

No person shall have in his possession any of the above animals or birds, or any portion of them, during the close seasons. They may be exposed for sale, nevertheless, for one month, and no longer, after such periods, or had in possession at any time for family use; but in all cases the proof of the time of killing or taking shall be upon the party so in possession.

None of the animals or birds above mentioned shall at any time be taken by means of traps, snares, gins, baited lines, or other similar contrivances. Any person may destroy any such traps, snares, &c., which he may discover without incurring any liability for so doing.

No one shall have in possession the eggs of any of the birds mentioned at any time. No batteries, sunken punts, or night lights, allowed in the killing of swans, geese or ducks.

Beaver, muskrat, mink, martin, racoon, otter and fisher may be hunted and killed only between the 1st of November and the 1st of May.

The fine for killing deer, &c., out of season, shall be not less than ten dollars, nor more than fifty dollars, for each animal.

For having in possession the birds or eggs of any of the birds protected, at any time, not less than five dollars, nor more than twenty-five dollars, for each bird or egg.

For killing any of the fur-bearing animals out of the season, not less than five dollars, nor more than twenty-five, and a similar fine for any other breach of the Act. In all cases the whole of the fine is to be paid to the prosecutor.

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC.

Fishing for speckled or brook trout, with nets, spears, or other apparatus, is forbidden at all times. Angling by the hand for trout is permitted from 1st January to 1st October. White fish

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are not to be taken by any means between 19th November and 1st December. No lunge to be taken between the 1st October and 1st January, except in Lake Memphremagog, where the close time is only during the months of October and November. Fishing for bass, pickerel, (doré) and maskinonge, is forbidden between the 1st and 24th May. Foreigners are forbidden to fish by any means whatever, in the waters of the Counties of Terrebonne, Montcalm, Joliette, and Berthier, without written permission from the Department of Marine and Fisheries at Ottawa, or from the Local Fishery Overseer, L. J. Loranger, Esq., of St. Sauveur, County of Terrebonne. The close season for salmon is the same in both Provinces, viz.: From 1st September to 1st May for surface fly fishing, and from 1st August to 1st May for net fishing.

Game, &c., in the Province of Quebec, may be hunted as follows

1. Elk, moose, cariboo, deer, fawn and hare, in the months of September, October, November, December and January, and on 1st February.

2. Grouse, Ptarmigan, Partridge, Woodcock and Snipe, in the months of September, October, November, December, January and February, and on 1st of March.

3. Wild swan, wild goose, wild duck, Widgeon and Teal, in the months of September, October, November, December, January, February, March and April, and on the 1st May, in that part of the Province of Quebec west of Three Rivers; and from the 1st September to the 15th May, both days inclusive, to the east of Three Rivers.

East of the Brandy Pots, in the River St. Lawrence, inhabitants may take said game during the close time for food, but not for sale or barter.

4. Woodcock, snipe, wild swan, wild goose, wild duck, widgeon or teal, not to be shot or hunted between one hour after sunset, and one hour before sunrise.

5. None of the forenamed animals or birds, except hares, to be taken by ropes, snares, springs, cage, nets or traps of any kind, nor shall any such engine be set for that purpose, and any person may destroy any engine so set.

6. Any person may, and every Magistrate, Constable, Market Clerk, Peace Officer, Railroad employée, and Officer of Customs, shall seize, on view, any of said animals or birds, or any parts thereof, found in possession, or charge of any persons during prohibited seasons, or which appear to have been taken by unlawful means, and shall bring the same before a Magistrate, who shall confiscate the same to the use of some charitable institution, unless the party proves that such animals or birds were lawfully taken.

7. No person shall have in his possession any of the said animals or birds, or parts thereof, during prohibited seasons, or

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which appear to have been taken by forbidden means, but the same may be bought and sold (when lawfully taken) during fourteen days from termination of time fixed for killing thereof.

8. No eggs of any of above mentioned birds, or of any species of wild fowl, shall be at any time disturbed or taken. All vessels or boats employed in so doing to be confiscated with the egg taken.

9. Mink and wild cat, (raccoon) may be hunted from 15th October, and Marten from 1st November to 15th April, both days inclusive.

10. Otter may be taken from 1st November to 1st May.

11. Beaver, from 1st September to 30th April. Muskrat may be taken from 21st October to 1st May, in that part of the Province west of Quebec.

12. No person shall, at any time, buy, sell, or have in possession any unseasonable skin of said animals.

13. Every offence against foregoing provisions to be punished summarily by Justice of Peace, with a fine of not less than \$1, nor more than \$50 and costs, the fine to go to the informer; in default of payment, imprisonment not exceeding three months, and any magistrate may convict on view.

14. Prosecutions may be instituted without being required to be under oath, and the evidence of the informer alone, or of any one witness, to be sufficient.

15. No *certiorari* from any conviction, but an appeal to lie to Circuit Court.

16. All prosecutions to be commenced within 12 months of the committal of offence.

17. No person at any time to make use of strychnine or any other poison, either vegetable or mineral, or spring guns, with intent to take or destroy any wild animal of any kind.

18. The Commissioner of Crown Lands is empowered to appoint officers, who shall be charged with the enforcement of the above provisions respecting game, and also of the provisions of any act which may be hereafter enacted in reference thereto.

The above provisions relative to game will be found in the Statutes of the Province of Quebec, 31 Vic., c. 26, as amended by Act passed in the last session of said Legislature. (1869.)

PROVINCE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

In New Brunswick, the only game laws in force are those relating to moose and partridge. There was an act making it unlawful to kill deer on the Island of Grand Manan for a period of three years, but it expired June 8, 1868. The close season for moose only extends from 1st February to 1st May. Fine, \$40, and anyone is empowered to kill any dog found hunting within

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the prohibited time. Not more than two moose can be killed by any one person within a period of twelve months; \$12 for each offence. The killing, except for food, is prohibited, and the leaving the carcass in the woods subjects the offender to a fine of \$20. Partridges are not to be killed between 1st March and 1st September. The fishery regulations are the same as those of Ontario and Quebec, except that the close season for salmon is, for net fishing, from 15th August to 1st March, and fly surface-fishing, from 15th September to 1st March. The river Restigoucho is made an exception, the close time being from 31st July to 1st May.

PROVINCE OF NOVA SCOTIA.

In Nova Scotia, Cap. 92 of the Revised Statutes provides that no moose shall be killed between January 1st and September 1st; no cariboo between March 1st and September 1st. The close time for partridges is from January 1st to September 1st, and for woodcock and snipe from March 1st to September 1st. The export of moose and cariboo hides is prohibited. Fine from \$20 to \$50, and forfeiture of game or hides. Otter, Mink and muskrat not to be killed between 1st May and November, under a penalty of \$8. It is absolutely forbidden to kill robins, swallows, sparrows, &c., and birds of song. Penalty for each offence, \$1.

The following is a summary of the Game Laws in operation in the undermentioned Provinces. No amendment has been made to these laws since 1868:

PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA.

It is unlawful to buy or sell or exhibit for sale any deer or elk between 1st March and 1st August, or any grouse, prairie fowl or partridge, or to destroy or to collect their eggs, between 1st March and 10th August. Fine \$50 or three months' imprisonment.

PROVINCE OF NEWFOUNDLAND.

There is only one game law in this island—entitled, "An Act for the Protection and Breeding of Wild Fowl and Game." It prohibits the killing, taking, purchasing, selling or possessing of partridges from the 20th February to the 25th August, and applies a similar prohibition in the case of snipe, or any other wild or migratory birds frequenting for the purpose of incubation (except wild geese), from the 1st April to the 20th August.

PROVINCE OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

The game laws of Prince Edward Island prohibit the killing of partridges between 1st March and 1st October, and salmon in the fall.

PROVINCE OF MANITOBA.

No game law has been enacted in Manitoba.
