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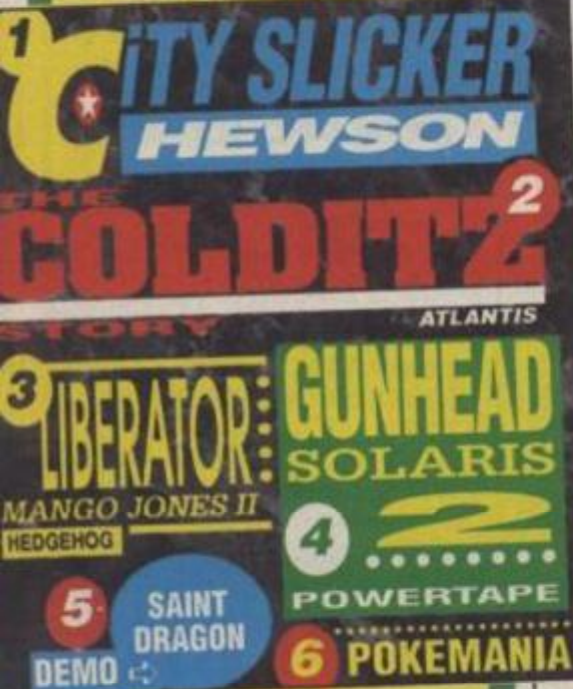

★ Continuing its 10th birthday celebrations, fab software house Hewson has lined up another great game for you — and here it is! In *City Slicker* you have to prevent Abu Cadabba, an evil terrorist, from planting a bomb in the Houses of Parliament, emulating the action of Fawkes from years ago!

The game is played against the clock, you, playing Slick, begin at eight in the morning and have to defuse Abu's bomb before it explodes at midnight! Your task is to locate parts of the **Bomb Disposal Unit** and take each bit — in turn — back to the the hide-out underneath the **Houses of Parliament**. Apart from the pieces of BDU, other useful objects litter the playing area — best collect anything you thing may come in handy!

London is packed with odd characters. There are marauding **Beefeaters**, bottle lobbing **Skin Heads** and more, and they're all there to hamper Slick in his mission! Each character has a different pattern in the game. They can open doors, throw objects, steal objects, follow Slick and generally hassle him every inch of the way.

Touching a character decreases your energy, which can lead to being unable to jump as high or as

far as before, and some characters even send you back to the start of the current screen! Falling from a great height also isn't recommended.

The energy level is kept up by scoffing food along the way. At the start of the game there are three pep pills at the bottom of the screen so if Slick's energy gets too low and there's no food in sight then one of these pills can be taken to keep him going a bit longer.

Abru makes appearances throughout the game and is always causing trouble for Slick. Thankfully, you'll know when he's approaching as an alarm sounds as he enters your current screen. But if Abru catches you then it's the graveyard for you — and the bomb automatically detonates. Get going, Slick guy!

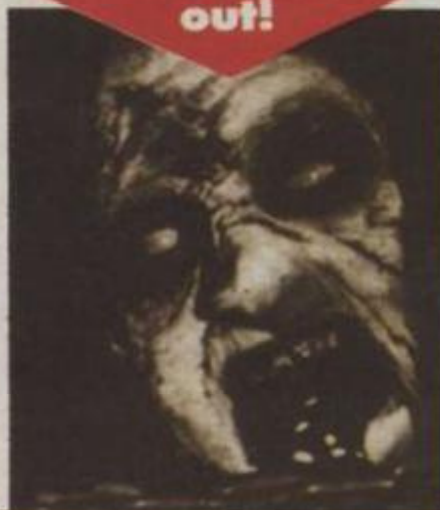

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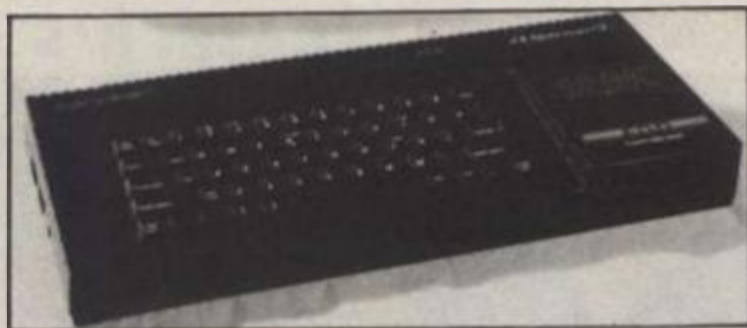

QUICKJOY III

Spectravideo £10.95

MARK: I'm not fond of Quickshot sticks. I owned a Quickshot II many moons ago and that busted within a couple of months. This looks a first glance just like it, but its trendy red body sets it out from the crowd. Again two buttons are present and each gives a solid click with each depression, though one problem is the uncomfortable hand grip. With a fairly long shaft the Quickjoy III works best on a table top, but with my shovel-sized hands I found holding the stick quite easy. A relatively cheap stick that should be given serious consideration.

NICK: This joystick has a classic design that has been copied so many times. The rectangular base with its two fire buttons on the end is comfortable to use both on a table and in the hand. The handle is quite short and has a ball at the top. The two fire buttons are not too good though as they're not microswitched and this lets the stick down. Not bad.

QUICKJOY JET FIGHTER

Spectravideo £14.95

MARK: Sadly the Jet Fighter costs too much for what it delivers. At first glance the stick is impressive with its moulded shaft and very solid looking base. But the major problem here is the length of travel: you have to move the stick so far to get a response that quick movements are near impossible! Diagonals are as elusive, though the fire buttons again answer with a responsive click when pressed. Steer well clear of this one: to quote *The Hitchhiker's Guide To The Galaxy* — it looks like a fish, it moves like a fish, but steers like a cow!

QUICKJOY V — SUPERBOARD

Spectravideo £19.95

MARK: It looks like this stick contains everything but the kitchen sink! With six fire buttons (four on the base, two on the shaft), top or base fire button selector and a digital timer (what for, I've no idea) it's a big mutha! On the table is the only practical way to use the Superboard. Travel is fairly short and thus responsive. A tough stick that should stand up to punishment pretty well, but twenty quid is serious dosh.

WICO COMMAND CONTROL

Suncom £24.99

NICK: The Command Control has a classic joystick design — a sturdy base with a long stick coming from the centre and fire buttons on both the base and the top of the stick. Unfortunately the size and shape of the base make it very uncomfortable to hold in your hand. A good feature is the inclusion of three interchangeable grips that slide onto the stick to suit all gamesplayers. There are some bad faults though. The grips do not come far enough down the stick, thus leaving a gap at the bottom. This can easily pinch a chunk out of your hand while you're playing, making the baddy who's torturing you on screen seem more realistic! The top fire button is also annoying as it needs a hard push to make it work.

SURESHOT COMMAND MODULE

Sonmax £17.95

MARK: If you want to know what big means, you should see the Command Module! With two large microswitched buttons you don't need to move your hand far to fire that laser, though I'm not overly fond of the gaudy sticker on the base. Stick travel is short making the Command Module very responsive, and so are the microswitched fire buttons. I'd advise you to wear sunglasses when using this joystick (due to the sticker), but it's a good all rounder.

TURBO PEDAL

NICK: You've got to be joking! This is so rubbish I couldn't stand using it for more than one game! You put your foot down on the pedal and all you hear is a bang — the sound of the plastic pedal against the plastic base. Eventually you do get some response from it (after a few more bangs). I found that my feet and legs began to ache soon after starting to use the Turbo Pedal, making playing a long racing game an agonising experience. A few suckers on the base wouldn't have gone amiss as the thing keeps sliding away from your foot!

NICK: With a triangular base, a fire button on the end and a short handle this joystick is very comfortable to use.

Euromax claim it's been the best selling joystick for nine years. The turbo version of the stick comes with an autofire and a Pro 9000 type handle to support a fire button. The fire buttons are not too hot though. Using a single leaf switch they need a bit of prodding to get them to work.

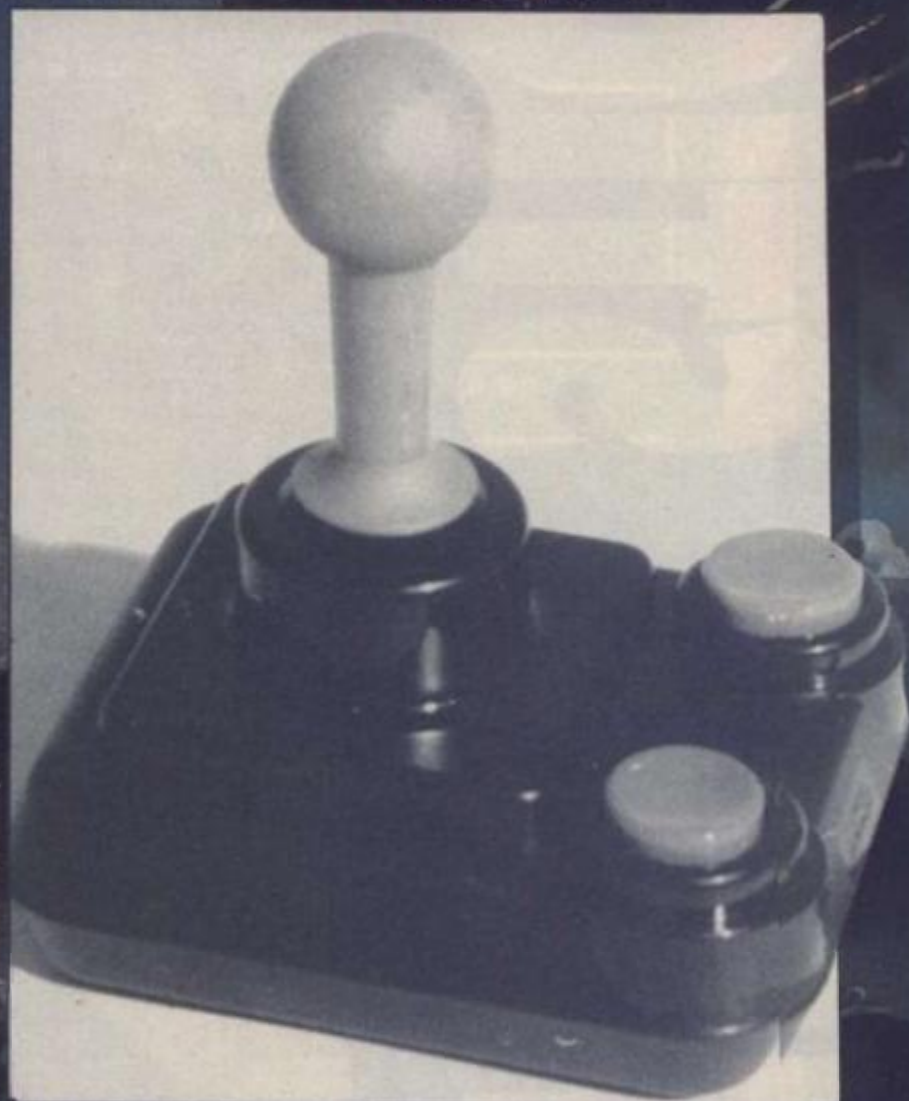

MARK: The Competition Pro is another distinctive stick with its red shaft and fire buttons. The ball shaped handle is comfortable to hold, though table top use is hampered by the lack of suckered feet. The medium travel of the stick makes it responsive, but I find the use of leaf-switches in the fire buttons very silly. Overall a rugged, comfortable stick that should be considered.

ULTIMATE RAPID FIRE

Euromax £22.95

NICK: This is one BIG joystick! The Ultimate Rapid Fire is probably the closest you're going to get to an arcade stick with its large base and two fire buttons either side the short ball handle. A dial-a-speed rapid fire button sits on the top of the base and can be turned to vary the speed of fire or to turn it off. With this stick being the size it is you can easily rest it on your lap to play a game but there are also suction cups on the base to secure it to a table top. This is definitely the best of the big sticks and a personal favourite.

MARK: Now here's my idea of a perfect stick: the comfortable rounded handle along with the sensibly placed microswitched fire button make this a definite winner. It comes in several colours: blue, black, clear and an eye warping multicoloured beast. All have the innovative 'pull and twist' collar ring that adjusts the stick tension. Like the Super Pro the Cruiser's ruggedness is legendary — we CRASH layouts have been abusing Cruiser sticks for years without complaint. Unreservedly recommended.

QUICKJOY JUNIOR

Spectravideo £5.95

MARK: This is a cheap stick, and unfortunately it shows. The fire buttons are placed sensibly enough on the base and under the index finger, but sadly a lot of bashing is needed to gain response. The stick is small so young hands will find it easy to hold, and table top players are well catered for with four strong suckers. With such a short 'stick', response is fairly good, I found diagonals easy to obtain and the **Junior** is almost silent when the stick is moved (no metal grinding on metal sounds here, matey)! At six quid the **Quickjoy Junior** is okay as a first buy, but I'd personally save my pennies.

SPEEDKING

Konix £9.99 Standard

NICK: The **Speedking** is one of the better joysticks when it comes to the left/right waggle. You can get very high speeds on sports games using it. The only problem is that it creates a great strain on the hands and arms. You can't use it vigorously for long, you have to take a break. For normal use the hand moulded stick sits comfortably in your left palm and the position of the fire button on the right is perfect. To my knowledge the **Speedking** is only available in a version for right handed players, cutting out a large segment of the joystick market. Overall a good stick but playing *Daley's Olympic Challenge* can be hell!

WICO ERGOSTICK

NICK: This is a real winner with me. It's similar in size, shape and design to the **Konix Speedking** but has one important difference: instead of being made from hard plastic, the **Ergostick** has a rubber covering which makes it much easier on your hands. The rubber also stops the stick slipping and sliding about. The only problem is a knobly bit on the end, it really begins to hurt after a long playing session! An excellent joystick I would recommend to all byte bandits out there!

NAVIGATOR

MARK: Beam me up Scotty! The **Navigator** is somewhat akin to a *Star Trek* phaser. Due to the handle, table top use is impossible (or at least very improbable), and prolonged use can lead to hand cramping. The stick is physically very short (no more than an inch or so high) so people with big hands will find holding the handle very difficult. Response is fairly good due to the short travel, but I must say this is one of my least favourite sticks.

NICK: This is one of the easiest joysticks to break! I've lost count of how many I've destroyed over the years! It responds quite well, although you feel as if you're hitting against plastic all the time instead of a nice micro switch. The main problem is the shape of the base. The rectangular box design has rounded-off corners but can still be very painful if you lean on them. Supplied with all +2, +2A and +3 computers there can't be many people who haven't seen one of these sticks. Not the best in the galaxy, but how can you complain when it's free?

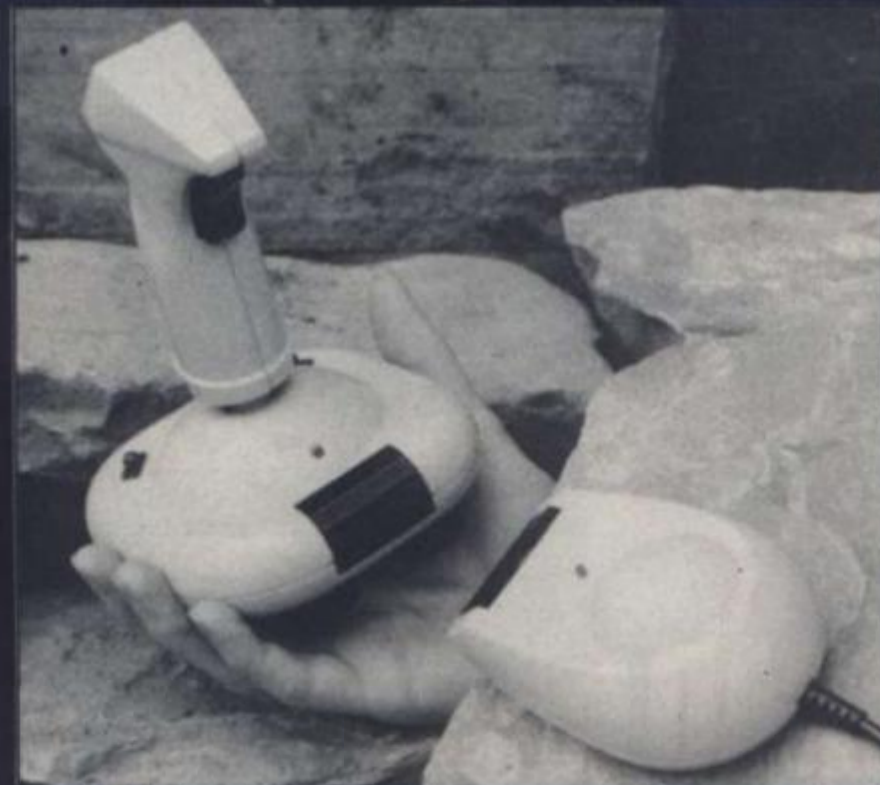

MARK: Let's face it, remote control sticks are a very expensive gimmicks that serve little purpose. Although this one works pretty well there seems to be a slight delay between you pressing the button and on-screen response. The stick is a rather natty grey colour with two fire buttons both on the shaft, though the handle isn't moulded and I found that prolonged use cramped my hand. There are plenty of cheaper 'normal' sticks on the market, and in my opinion the **Challenger** will only be bought by people interested in gimmicks.

SAM CO GET COUPE RIGHTS

Alan Miles and Bruce Gordon, ex-directors of MGT plc, who now run Sam Computers Ltd have bought the rights to produce the Coupé themselves. There are plenty of Coupés already in stock and SAM Co aim to distribute 10,000 through the Christmas period. With SAM Coupé software getting more support by the day, the computer that appeared to be condemned to an early grave is now well back on the road to recovery. Additionally, SAM Co has decided that SAM Coupés will now be sold with a disk drive as part of the package — finally an end to those tape player blues!

COUPE PRICES GET THE CHOP

SAM Co has released the new prices for the Coupé packs, and jolly competitive they are too! The now-standard SAM Coupé with one disk drive retails for **£199.95** — which is a reduction of \$50! As the Coupé can take two internal drives a SAM drive can still be bought separately — £10 has been knocked off the original price, bringing it down to **£79.95!** Should you want to buy the complete set, a Coupé with two on-board drives, the total price is now **£275**, a reduction in price of £45. Bargains a plenty, or what?!

TENGEN TITLES, AHOY!

Domark's collection of Tengen coin-op titles are currently up for conversion to the Coupé, which is good news for all you arcade addicts out there! **Enigma Variations**, publishers of most Coupé software are handling the production and distribution for the three titles, which are: *Escape from the Planet of the Robot Monsters* (the crazy isometric exploration/shoot-em-up game, Speccy review CRASH 78), *Klax* (the fiendish puzzle game, Speccy review CRASH 77) and *Xybots* (two-player 3D chase and blast game, Speccy review CRASH 65). Also up for conversion to the Coupé is Domark's biggest selling title *Trivial Pursuit*. The Speccy version was a massive hit a



few years back and is likely to be a bit of a smash on the Coupé too as it's the Coupé's big Christmas release; out December.

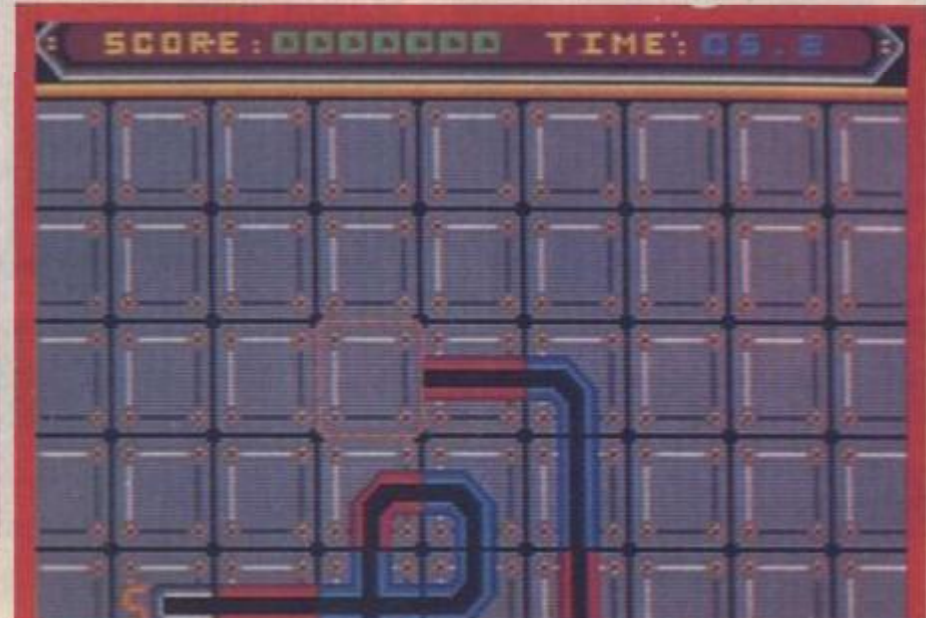
SAM'S PIPING HOT!

Pipe Mania, the most addictive puzzle game ever, originally published by **Empire** is soon for release on the Coupé. The conversion, like **Domark's** titles, is being handled by **Enigma Variations** (what a busy lot!) who are currently implementing the graphics which should makes the Coupé version look almost identical to the **Atari ST** version.

Not only is EV converting smash hits to the Coupé, but it's also continuing to publish. *Mind Games 2* is set to be the big Christmas compilation for the Coupé and contains another four games to stretch your grey matter! The pack consists of more traditional games, which are: *Poker*, *3D Noughts and Crosses*, a sliding puzzle game and a version of the

FAIR PRICE FOR SOFTWARE

Prices for SAM Coupé software look set to stay at the price initiated by **Enigma Variations** when it released *Defenders of the Earth*, that's **£11.99** on cassette and **£14.99** on disk. 'It would be easy to charge a lot more for SAM Software,' commented an Enigma spokesman, 'but we feel that people who bought the Coupé were looking for 16-bit computing power and graphics without the high cost of software at £25 a shot — we have to offer them power and performance at a fair price.' Bravo! The only known exception to the £11.99/£14.99 price rule is *Trivial Pursuit* which has always sold at £15 on cassette and £20 on disk. SAM PD

A public domain library catering specially for Sam Coupé software has been set up by **David Cowell** of **CMS PD**. As the library has just got going, CMS's shelves are not exactly bulging

with Coupé software as yet but CMS PD is willing to take a look at any games, demos or utilities Coupé owners send in. At the moment three pieces of software are available, and they are: *Soccer Challenge* — a soccer management game featuring full colour mode four graphics, sound fx and music; *Satellite '90* is a space target shoot-em-up, similar to *Operation Wolf*, again with mode four graphics, music and sound fx. The third piece of software is *Sprite Editor* which features easy editing facilities. Two demo disks are also available. The PD disks cost £1.50 each and you can get full details and a catalogue, if you enclose a stamped addressed envelope, by writing to: **CMS SAM Coupé PD, 70 Donald Drive, Chadwell Heath, Romford, Essex RM6 5DU.**

■ **Q: What exactly is a public domain library?**

A: Right ho, first of all you need to understand what public domain software is. It's software, which can be a game, a utility or simply a graphics and sonix demo, which the author has given up their copyright on. This means that anyone is free to copy and distribute it, without profiting from it. A PD library basically keeps a stock of software from which you can choose what you want. Cost is very low — you simply pay the price of a disk, post and packaging and a small handling charge. In CMS's case it's just £1.50. Often it's the best way of getting software and if you're a programmer it'll get you noticed. Check it out!

QUICKSHOT TIP

EB Evans from Mansfield, Notts dropped the SAM desk a line to pass on this tip: If you're having problems with software when using a **Quickshot II** joystick on the SAM Coupé try disconnecting the red wire in the joystick. The red wire is the autofire connection but Mr Evans found it was simply causing chaos and games continually crashed. So you'll be without autofire, but the crashing problem should be cured. The outputs on the 'stick are 0 for fire and 6789 for directional control.

Waste you try to save Earth by disposing of dangerous cannisters of waste in a giant spaceship. The objective is to launch the ship before the cannisters become volatile.

A series of conveyor belts are set up for the cannisters to travel along and all you have to do is switch on the correct lift to move them up. The game only becomes challenging on the later levels when the conveyors speed up and more cannisters arrive. The simplistic graphics definitely don't do the Coupé justice, and *Nuclear Waste* soon gets tiresome.

MARK I'd hoped one of the four games would be mildly playable, but no, they're all dull. Graphics on each are very simplistic albeit colourful. Even at a budget price I would consider them all poor value for money.

Graphics are even worse than *Nuclear Waste* in *Magic Caves*. Playing the part of a ball (!) you roll around each level using the sliding platforms and lifts to collect a potion. Keys open doors and reveal secret passages. *Magic Caves* looks very similar to a game I once wrote in Spectrum basic! It took me half an hour and I didn't bother saving it. There's nothing here to make you want to come back for more.

The best of the lot is *Blokade*. It's well programmed and simple to tackle. Played against the clock, you have to change all the blocks on screen to the target colour by sliding the panels. When a block is surrounded with the correct colour you can change it and go on to the next. Playing *Blokade* soon puts a great strain on your eyes and the monotonous gameplay will only keep you going for a few games.

Bombed Out is graphically similar to *Blokade* with its neatly drawn sliding platforms and a timer to beat. You have to collect all the bonus flags and get to a bomb before it explodes. The playing area has skulls to avoid (they're deadly) and watch out for disappearing blocks!

Futureball is a sports simulation set in the year 2090. Games have changed over the century and here, instead of handballing

Argentines you now have lasers, killer robots and deadly traps to play against. As a new recruit to the game you must pass through the training sessions before you can become a member of the first team. It's this training that forms the game.

The graphics are simple with not much evidence of the sixteen colours the inlay boasts. All four training events you have to pass through have a basic blue square background with obstacles such as sliding squares and blue spheres here and there. completed! *Futureball* has no lasting appeal. After a couple of attempts at conquering the annoying gameplay you soon give up and go onto the better game, *Sam Strikes Out!*

The game is played in a basic platforms and ladders style with the added complication of having to collect and use icons to move about. 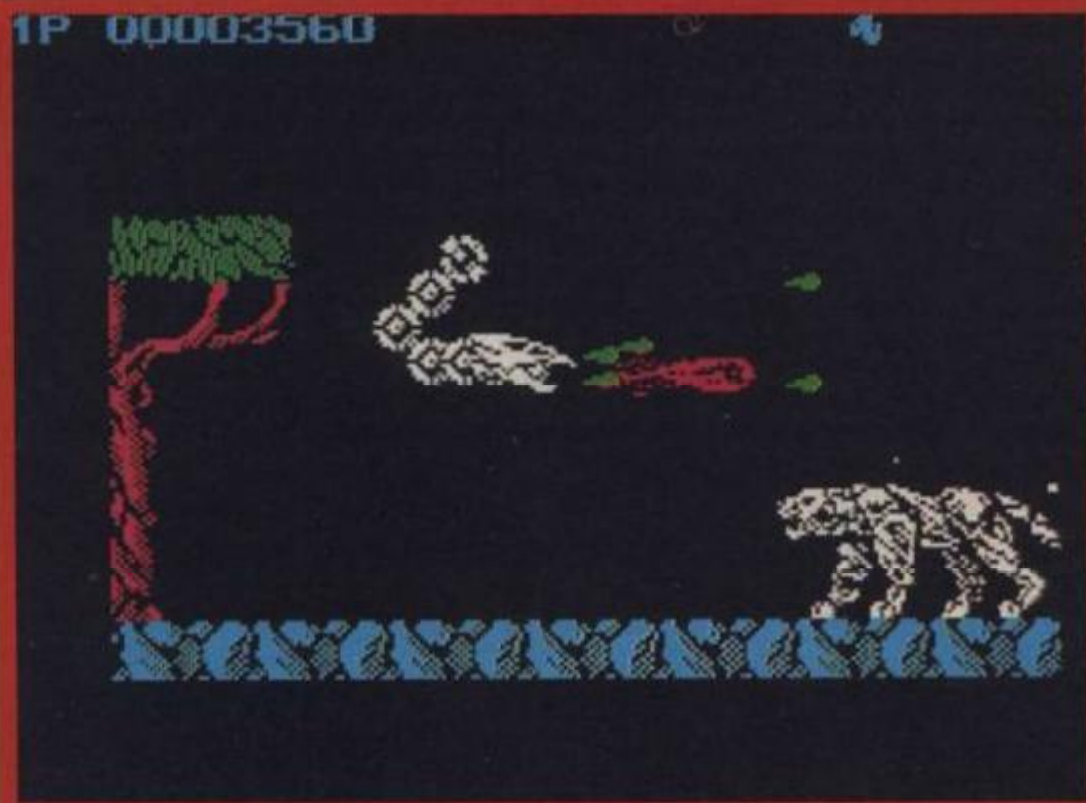

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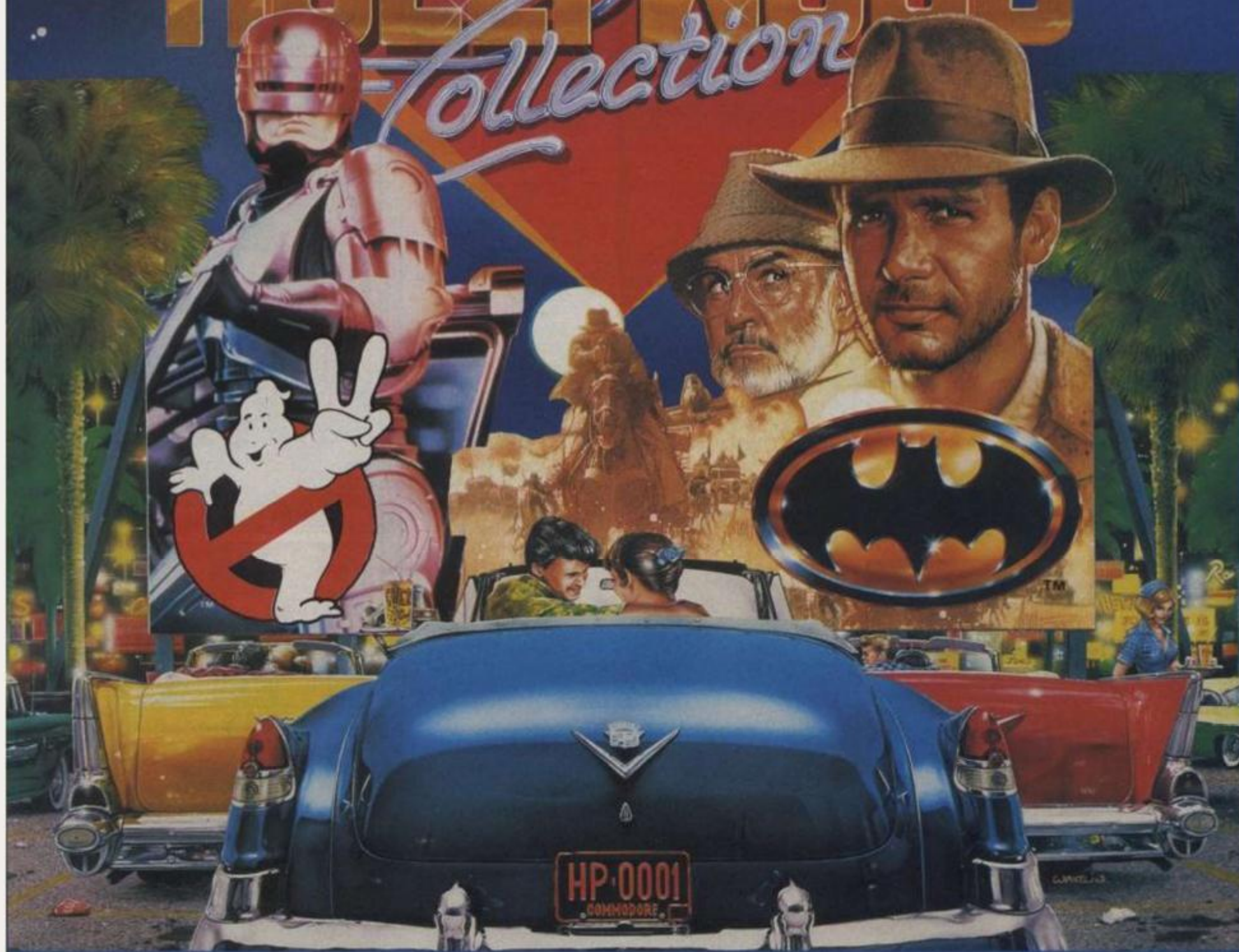

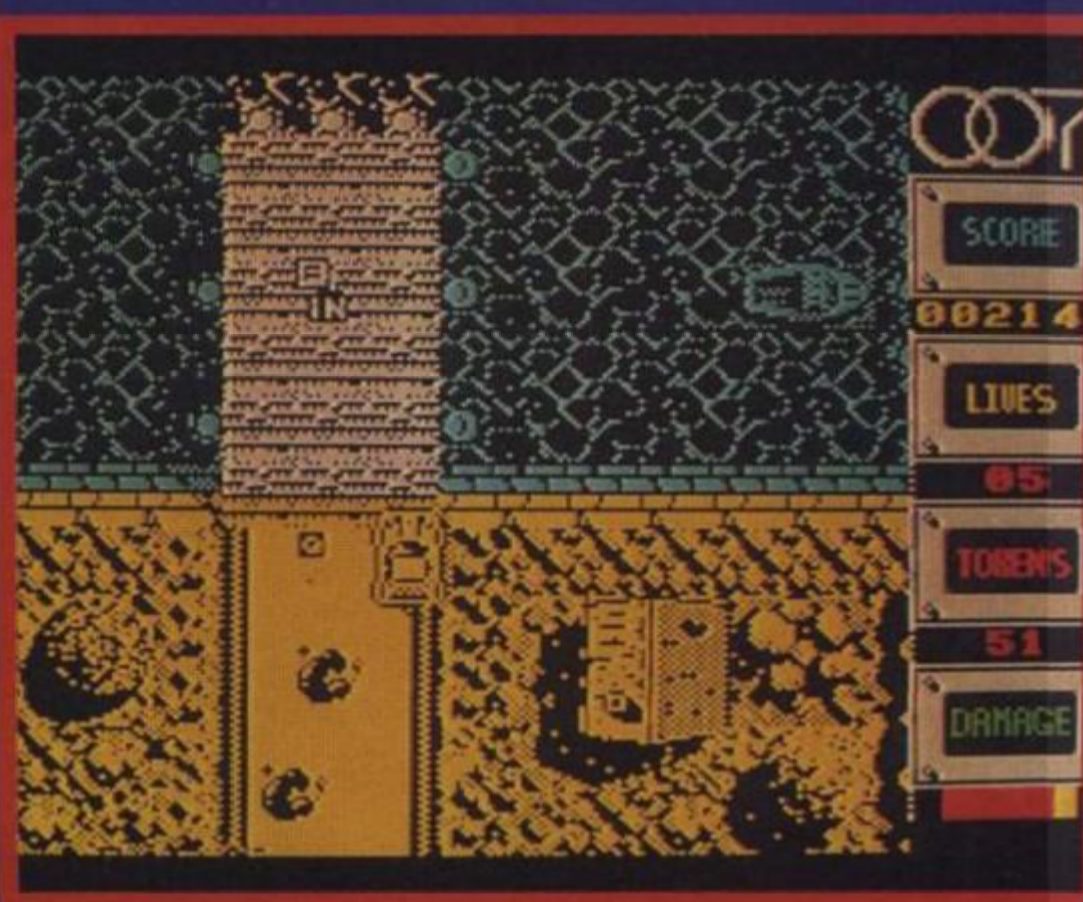

In every Bond movie there's an evil megalomaniac who attempts to take over the world — here it's Karl Stromberg, a bit of a fruit cake, who, from his underwater base Atlantis, has hatched a cunning plan! He steals two nuclear submarines, one British, the other Russian, and with them plans to destroy New York and Moscow. It's up to Bond and beautiful Russian spy Major Anya Amasova to save the world (again).

The game is split into six parts, each a scene from the movie. The first has Bond and Anya driving along the open road to meet Q. Bond's white Lotus is viewed from above (in true *Spy Hunter* style), and the idea is to collect as many of the Q tokens as you can whilst avoiding the obstacles. The Lotus is armoured but repeated knocks and crashes result in a loss of a life.

Make sure you get the jobbie to convert the Lotus into a submarine because you're underwater in level three where Bond and Anya are attacked by a variety of underwater vehicles as they head for Atlantis.

The final three levels see Bond blowing the doors to the control room where the nuclear subs are being directed. Bond is perched atop a surveillance camera whilst you, as Anya, must shoot the soldiers trying to stop Bond. Scene five sees Bond and his jetski heading

for Atlantis to save Anya who has been kidnapped by Stromberg, whilst the sixth and final scene has Bond shooting it out with Stromberg and his sinister henchman Jaws.

The movie is one of my favourite Bond romps, and so I had high hopes for the game. The verdict... well it does have its good points, the attention to detail is one. Both the moving and static sprites are nicely detailed, though scrolling is a little on the juddery side.

Ringworlds are destroyed with a photon torpedo. Then, to liberate an occupied planet you have to capture a shooting star and steer or tow it towards the planet. Release the star onto the planet and it destroys the Dargons and liberates that world. Oh, and there are loads of alien thingies all over the place to shoot too.

Gameplay is essentially an

eight-way scrolling shoot-'em-up but with a yucky 'intellectual aspect' thrown in. There are billions (quite a few — Ed) of dials to keep an eye on and to succeed must be followed correctly; the status panels (on the left and right hand sides) are continually blasting you with information which takes away most of the fun you might have in carelessly blasting everything! *Solar Empire* is a funny mix of gameplay — you want to play it fast and furiously, when you should be playing it a bit strategically. Except you can't play it at all on the +2A, because it's not compatible.

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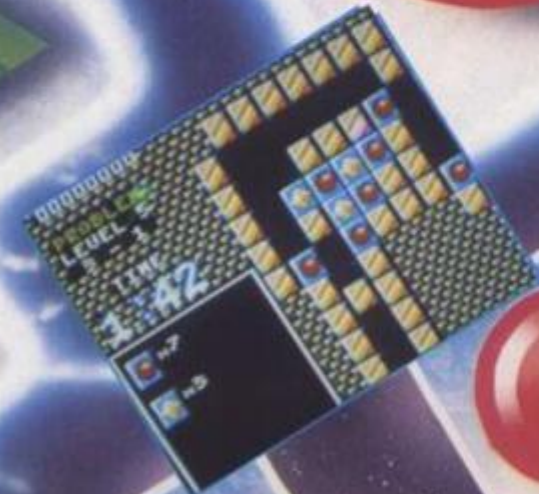
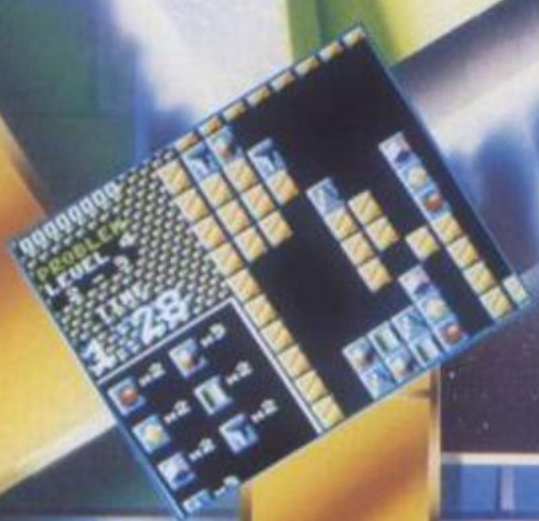
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
