Safely view the solar eclipse

Much of the state will be able to see parts of solar eclipse Monday, Aug. 21, with some areas of Western Kentucky experiencing a total solar eclipse. As you look to the skies, remember to take the proper precautions to protect your eyesight.

It is never safe to look directly at the sun unless you are in the region of a total solar eclipse. Glaring at the sun for any length of time may result in a serious eye injury in which the retina is damaged by the sun's radiation. In most cases, this condition, known as eclipse blindness, a victim's eyesight recovers, but some people have lost part or all of their vision.

Only a 70-mile-wide path roughly from Madisonville to Mayfield will be in a total solar eclipse on Aug. 21. If you are outside this area, you will need to wear eye protection when viewing the eclipse, and within the total solar eclipse area, you'll need eye protection until the moon completely covers the sun. While phases of the eclipse will last for at least two hours, the total solar eclipse will only last about two minutes and 40 seconds. You will need to put eye protection back on as the sun begins to poke out from behind the moon.


To safely look at the uneclipsed or partially eclipsed sun, you need to wear eclipse glasses that contain special purpose solar filters or handheld solar viewers that meet international standards. These glasses should be marked as meeting the international standard of ISO 12312-2 or ISO 12312-2:2015. Five manufacturers are certified to make these products. They are Rainbow Symphony, American Paper Optics, Thousand Oaks Optical, TSE 17 and Baader Planetarium. Even with these products, do not use them if they have scratches, tears or are coming loose from their frames as they will not provide adequate protection.

Sunglasses, no matter how dark, and homemade filters are not safe for viewing the sun. If you are photographing the event or viewing it through a telescope or binoculars, make sure your instrument has a solar filter attached to the lens. Otherwise, you will not get complete eye protection, even if you are wearing the appropriate eclipse glasses.


Gov. Bevin Launches 'Message of Hope' Campaign as part of Don't Let Them Die Initiative

Governor Bevin's office will begin placing painted rocks around Kentucky in order to raise awareness for Kentucky's opioid epidemic and the "Don't Let Them Die" (DLTD) initiative.

'Though this promotion is intended to be encouraging and fun, it seeks to raise awareness across the Commonwealth about a tragically serious epidemic," said Amanda Stamper, Director of Communications. "Last year, 1,404 Kentuckians died as a result of an opioid overdose. Gov. Bevin is committed to providing the policies and resources necessary to ensure we eradicate this scourge." Painted rock searches, a

form of hide-and-go-seek, is a new, wildly popular trend. The concept is simple: volunteers paint and decorate rocks, then place them for others to find. When one finds a painted rock they can photograph themselves with it and then post the photo to their social media outlet of choice. Finders are encouraged to then hide the rock for others to find. The goal is not to find and keep the rocks, but to make continue placing them for others to discover.

The DLTD painted rock campaign will be promoted on the Governor's social media pages, including his new Instagram account. In addition to decorative art, these rocks will include a



brief message of encouragement and hope, as well as the URL DontLetThemDie.com, a website providing information about opioids, treatment options, and the overdose antidote, naloxone. Rocks for this campaign will initially be hidden in the Frankfort, Lexington and Louisville areas but the Governor's office hopes to have rocks placed in all 120 Kentucky counties within two weeks. The "Don't Let Them

theme encourages Die" Kentuckians to recognize the inherent value of human life – even in the grip of addiction – and take proactive steps to support their friends, family and communities as they overcome this crisis. Kentuckians can help spread the word by painting and hiding their own rocks with DontLetThemDie.com painted on the back and sharing on social media using hashtag #DLTD.

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


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
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St. Patrick School Makes Plans to Open Preschool This Year





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

Soil Conservation Districts are governmental subdivisions of the state of Kentucky. Districts are created and authorized as a result of the 1940 Kentucky General Assembly passing enabling legislation KRS Chapter 262, which permitted local farmers to petition and establish conservation districts. In 1941, the first Kentucky conservation was organized.

AGRICULTURAL DISTRICTS

In 1982, the Kentucky General Assembly set forth the agricultural district law. It is the policy of this law "to provide a means by which agricultural land may be protected and enhanced as a viable segment of the state's economy and as an important resource." The Conservation District Board of Supervisors acts as the administrative body for the agricultural districts. If land owners submit a petition, the conservation district board reviews it, notifies the fiscal court and other planning boards, and then submit their recommendations to the state soil and water commission.

COOPERATING AGENCIES

The Bracken County Conservation District is very fortunate to have cooperating agricultural agencies and businesses as a part of their ongoing program. These also play an important part in the lives of all landowners and farmers in Bracken County. The Conservation District sincerely thanks the following for their support: Natural Resources Conservation Service, Bracken County Fiscal Court, Farm Service Agency, Rural Economic, Community Development, Cooperative Extension Service, Division of Forestry, Department of Fish and Wildlife, Division of Conservation, Division of Water, The Bracken County News, Bracken County Road Department, Bracken County Solid Waste and the local banks: First National Bank of Brooksville, US Bank of Augusta and Citizens Deposit Bank.

PURPOSE

The Bracken County SCD was organized as the 36th such district in Kentucky on September 15, 1943. The district's objective is to provide assistance and guidance in wisely managing our natural resources, soil and water, for the continued use of present and future generations. Proper land use and curbing soil and water degradation are two of the district's many ongoing objectives. Through the district program, the public is made aware of these problems, their efforts and possible solutions.

INTRODUCTION

The Bracken Soil Conservation District assists individuals, groups, organizations, city, county and state governments with solving local problems relating to soil and water resources.

The District Board of Supervisors meets the first Tuesday of each month to review the annual plan of work and the long range conservation plan. Activities and services are carried out to promote soil and water conservation throughout the year. Technical services rendered to applicants are provided by the Natural Resources Conservation Service.

By written agreement with and at the request of the Board of Supervisors, the Natural Resources Conservation Service (formerly SCS) provides professionals to help plan and carry out the district's goals.

If you have any questions about the 1985, 1990, 1996, 2002, 2008 or 2014 Farm Bills, we will be glad to assist you. The office is located on Frankfort Street in Brooksville and the phone number is 606-735-3256. ext. 3.

Make sure that you have a thorough understanding of what your conservation compliance plan calls for. Remember, sow a cover crop after harvest on all highly erodible tilled land by November 1st of each year.

The plan stays with the land. You must follow the existing plan or get a new plan if you buy or lease new land.

CONSERVATION DISTRICT ACTIVITIES

The Conservation District promotes and assists in the conservation of our natural resources by the following activities:

POSTER & ESSAY CONTESTS

WATER QUALITY/WATERSHEDS

EROSION CONTROL

The Conservation District encourages farmers to use conservation practices to control erosion on cropland, hayland and pastureland. Such practices include minimum or no-till plantings, contouring, stripcropping and adequate livestock watering systems. This is done through the Natural Resources Conservation Service Offices by the news media, articles, field days and through farm planning.

CONSERVATION FARM PLANS:

The 1985, 1990, 1996, 2002, 2008 and 2014 Farm Bills have placed much emphasis on farm planning and erosion control. The Conservation District and the Natural Resources Conservation Service continue to provide landowners' solutions in planning and establishing approved soil conservation measures for their land. A soil conservation plan for producers (tobacco, corn, etc.) is necessary to remain eligible for U.S.D.A. benefits.

STATE & AREA MEETINGS

The Area 5 Spring Meeting was held in March at Pendleton County. The State Meeting was held July 9-11 in Louisville, KY.

Prediabetes Prevention Campaign

As part of the 52 Weeks of Public Health campaign, the Kentucky Department of Public Health (DPH) within the Cabinet of Health and Family Services (CHFS) highlights a new national campaign to bring awareness about prediabetes.

New national data just re-

leased from CDC noted that 84 million American adults (more than 1 in 3) have prediabetes, which is a condition in which blood glucose (sugar) levels are high, but not high enough yet to be classified as type 2 diabetes. People with prediabetes have increased risks to their longterm health, including developing type 2 diabetes, heart attack, and stroke. According to the CDC, nearly 90 percent of people with prediabetes are not aware they have the condition. In Kentucky, it is estimated that more than 1.1 million Kentucky adults have prediabetes.

Janice Haile, a registered nurse and certified Diabetes Educator with the Kentucky Diabetes Prevention and Control Program (KDPCP) within the DPH was excited to hear that the CDC recently shared new prediabetes messages to help get the word out about what can be done to prevent or delay type 2 diabetes.

"A third of those with prediabetes will develop type 2 diabetes within 5 years unless, they, and their healthcare team, address this issue. The good news is there is something we can do once we know a person has prediabetes," said Janice Haile.

The National Diabe-Prevention Program (National DPP), a lifestyle change program recognized through the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, has been proven to cut the risk of developing type 2 diabetes by half in those who have prediabetes. Studies show that losing just 5 to 7 percent of body weight, by eating healthier and increasing physical activity, can help prevent or delay type 2 diabetes (for a person who weighs 200 pounds, that's about 10 to 15 pounds).

Ms. Haile also said, "The KDPCP has been working with the Kentucky Diabetes Network, the University of Louisville, the University of Kentucky, the Kentucky Coordinating Body of the American Association of Diabetes Educators (AADE), the American Diabetes Association (ADA) and other partners to increase awareness and testing for prediabetes. These diabetes advocates are banding together to encourage Kentuckians to take the first step by visiting DoIHavePrediabetes.org to take the 1-minute risk test. If a person finds out they are at risk for prediabetes, then they will need to speak with their healthcare pprofessional to confirm their diagnosis."

Working in a farm successor as part of a retirement plan

Are you one of the many farmers without an identified farm successor? Purdue University says that's around 75 percent, and about half expect nonfamily members to take over. A gradual shift of responsibilities and ownership, plus an extended mentoring period, can help ensure the continued success of the farm business.

After checking out a candidate's experience and references, a short trial period with paid labor can be a good step. This probationary period can help both of you assess how well you work together, how your daily priorities match up, and how you deal with setbacks.

A phased transition plan can follow, based on the goals and capabilities of you and your successor. Responsibilities for farm decisions and management can be shifted gradually or by specific enterprises. Critical elements may be held for later, while new enterprises conceived by the new farmer could be her or his full responsibility and ownership right away.

A written transition plan can ensure that timing and responsibilities are clear. A five-year plan for major progress will tell you if it's working.

A new farmer will benefit from your knowledge of your land and from your experience in the business. Remaining a minority partner or a mentor gives access to your valuable advice. However, there are no guarantees of the farm business surviving the transfer, or indeed, from any year to the next under your control. You

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
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

Epizootic Hemorrhagic Disease Reported in Kentucky Deer

Disease not transferrable to humans or pets

Epizootic Hemorrhagic Disease has been reported in white-tailed deer in several east Kentucky counties. The Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources received confirmation from the Georgia- based Southeastern Cooperative Wildlife Disease Study Wednesday morning of a Kentucky deer with a strain of the disease.

"Epizootic Hemorrhagic Disease is not transmittable to people or pets," Dr. Iga Stasiak, state wildlife veterinarian for Kentucky Fish and Wildlife. "However, we always recommend that hunters avoid eating venison from deer that were obviously sick."

Epizootic Hemorrhagic Disease (EHD) is a viral disease transmitted to deer through the bite of a midge or gnat. The disease has been present in the United States for more than 60 years. Kentucky Fish and Wildlife receives and confirms EHD deer mortalities sporadically, with a small number of mortalities each year. Larger outbreaks tend occur every 5-7 years. Outbreaks cease at the first frost, which kills the biting

Gabe Jenkins, big game coordinator for Kentucky Fish and Wildlife, said small outbreaks of EHD also have been reported in the mountainous areas of Tennessee, West Virginia, Pennsylvania, Ohio and Virginia. Kentucky Fish and Wildlife is receiving a growing number of suspected cases.

"We're monitoring this situation closely," Jenkins said. Deer can exhibit signs of illness within 24 to 72 hours after receiving a bite from an infected midge. Infected deer may appear sluggish and unresponsive to humans. EHD causes dehydration and fever in deer, which causes the animals to seek water. Infected deer are often found dead near bodies of water. Kentucky last had significant outbreaks of EHD in 2007 and 2012.

Anyone who finds a sick deer or a deer they suspect may have died from EHD is encouraged to report the finding to the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. The department staffs a toll-free number weekdays from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. (Eastern). The number is 1-800-858-1549.

Reports can also be emailed to info.center@ ky.gov. Reports should include your name, contact information, county and date the deer was found, number of deer found and whether the deer is sick or recently deceased.

The Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources is also urging hunters to report any observations of deer that appear to have died of natural causes.

EHD primarily affects white-tailed deer and is most noticeable during the late summer and early fall (August to October). For more information on this disease, visit the Kentucky Fish and Wildlife website at fw.ky.gov and search under the keyword, "EHD."


