Mr. Hutton was born in New York on August 8, 1843, and was educated at private schools. The degree of A. M. was conferred upon him by Yale University in 1902, and in 1897 he received the same degree from Princeton. He was, for years, literary editor of Harper's Magasine, and at the time of his death was Lecturer on English Literature at Princeton. Mr. Hutton's first literary attempt was a criticism of the play Jessie Brown, which he submitted to the Evening Mail in 1872 and which was so acceptable that he was appointed dramatic critic of that paper. His book "Plays and Players" appeared in 1875 and was the vesult of his interest in the stage. Among his other important works are "Literary Landmarks of London," Literary Landmarks of Edinburg." "Literary Landmarks of Venice," "Literary Landmarks of Venice," "Cliterary Landmarks of Oxford," "Gurlosities of the American Stage," "Portraits in Plaster," "Artists of the Ninetenth Century" anw many others, making a total of forty-eight works in all. His "Literary Landmarks" series is extensively read by students, as it is full of interesting details of the homes and haunts of celebrities, Mr. Hutton was also a compiler and editor, and was well-known in social and club life. His hobby was collecting death masks, and he had a rare collecting which he presented to the museum of Princeton University. His death is deeply regretted by all who knew him personally or through his writings, for he was a man of decided literary and dramatic talent, a genius in his field. 7

BIUPOSIDES DISTRIBUTORS & COMMERCIAL ADVERTISERS

1880-BILLBOARDS-1902

A score of years ago the use of billboards as a means of securing publicity was limited to a class of acvertiers, known as amasement caterers; the circus, the theatre and similar amusements were advertised with posters in a limited way several score of years ago, but prior to 1880, very few commercial products had been given any publicity on billboards; a few proprietary medicines were among the articles, for which half sheets and one sheet posters were first gotten out; those were posted on fences, sheds and available public places, mostly by the traveling agent who visited the drug and general stores, his duty being that of salesman and advertising man combined. Billboards in 1880 were given little thought; only in a few of the larger cities were bill-posting plants maintained by men who pursued it as a business and means of earning a living; in the medium and smaller towns the erection of a billboard meant the coming of a circus, they were contracted for by circus agents to be built and maintained only for a few weeks, used exclusively to advertise the circus, torn down or abandoned after the circus had gone; thus for years only the shrews and enterprising circus proprietors realized the publicity value of the poster. During the period from 1880 to 1890, billboard advertising seemed to interest a few more commercial advertisers, but only in a small way; the appropriations for posters were limited, as were the posters in size as well as from an artistic standpoint. In 1891, billboards, posters and the billpoating business as a commercial industry, seemed to take on new life. In July of that year a small party of pioneer billposters met and organized an association to promote billposting; Edward. A. Stahlbrodt, of Rochester, N. Y., was chosen as leader in the movement, and his wise counsel soon began to show the possibilities of a business that had so long Isin dormant; the little organization, which began life in 1891 with less than a dosen members, thrived and grew

CROP REPORT

The weather Bureau's weekly summary of crop conditions is as follows. While too cool for best results in portions of the lake region and in the Missouri valley and Northern Recky Mountain districts, with excessive moisture and lack of sunshine in the Central Mississippi and Lower Missouri valleys, the week as a whole, has been very favorable in the districts east of the Rocky Mountains. Drought in the South Atlantic and East Gulf states has been very generally relieved, although more rain is needed in portions of Florida and in the Central and West Gulf coast districts. The North Pacific coast also experienced a favorable week, but in California nearly all crops were injured by continued drying North winds. Over the western portions of the corn belt the growth of corn has been checked by lack of warmth and sunshine, and it is much in need of cutifivation, while in the central and eastern districts planting and replanting have been delayed by rains. Poor stands are reported from the lake region, Ohio valley and Middle Atlantic states. In the Southern states the general condition of corn is promising, although rain is needed in the Central Gulf coast districts.

Winter wheat has suffered somewhat from

eral condition of corn is promising, annually rain is needed in the Central Guif coast districts,
Winter wheat has suffered somewhat from heavy rains in portions of Oklahoma and Missouri: elsewhere this crop has advanced favorably, but the outlook over the eastern portion of the winter wheat belt continues unpromising, although more or less improved in the Ohlo valley and Middle Atlantic states. Wheat is now beading, as far North as the Central Mississippi valley, harvesting being general in the Southern States. On the North Pacific coast the crop has advanced favorably and is heading; in California it is maturing rapidly, the late sown having been seriously damaged by hot winds, with the exception of some weedy fields in South Dakota, spring wheat is in very promising condition in all districts.

Oats have made vigorous growth throughout the Central valleys and Middle Atlantic states, and a general improvement of this crop is indicated in nearly all districts. Seeding is now practically fulshed in the extreme Northern sections and harvesting continues in the Southern states.

As a whole there has been quite a decided 'm-

practically finished in the extreme Northern sections and harvesting continues in the Southern states.

As a whole there has been quite a decided 'mprovement in the condition of cotton over nearly the whole of the cotton helt. The crop has, however, suffered some damage in Oklahoma and Indian territories from overflows and from insufficient moisture in scattered localities in Louisiana. Rapid growth and a good state of cultivation are generally indicated. Boll we, vits are increasing rapidly and doing considerable damage in a number of southwestern and south central counties in Texas.

The week has been exceptionally favorable for transplanting tobacco, and this work has advanced satisfactorily, having been completed at Tennessee and North Carollina and about three-fourths finished in Kenthery and Vircinia. In the extreme Northern states there is an encouraging outlook for apples, but in the Central Misshelppi and Oblo valleys and Middle Atlantic states the prospects supear to be somewhat impaired by extensive dropping. In the Southern states a good crop of peaches is indicated.

The previously reported promising condition of grass continues generally throughout the country.
