TORONTO ANNUAL MEETING PROGRAM TO BE SET

The 34th Annual Meeting of ASC, scheduled for November 4-6, 1982 at the Sheraton Centre, in Toronto, Canada, is nearing program completion, announced *Israel Barak-Glantz*, Program Chair.

It is anticipated that there will be well over 120 panels, workshops, plenary sessions, and roundtables. Further, almost 900 criminologists are expected to participate in the program.

Barak-Glantz also reported that the three major ASC award winners, *Gwynn Nettler*, University of Alberta (Edwin Sutherland Award); *Don Gottfredson*, Rutgers University (August Vollmer Award); and *Frederick McClintock*, University of Edinburgh, Scotland (Sellin-Glueck Award), will have featured places on the program.

Three major plenary sessions are planned, which will cover law enforcement, courts, and corrections. These are being organized by *Albert Reiss, Jr.*, *Marvin Zallman*, and *Marvin Wolfgang*, respectively. Major speakers for these sessions have not as yet been selected.

Pierre Elliott Trudeau, Prime Minister of Canada, has been invited to address the Society at the banquet, which is scheduled for Friday evening. As of the deadline for this issue of *The Criminologist*, word had not been received concerning his acceptance.

John Jay College will be hosting a reception during the three-day program. Details about this event will be announced in the next issue.

As has been the practice in recent years, participants will be limited to a maximum of two appearances on the program, only one of which may be a presentation of a paper. The second appearance may be as an organizer, moderator, or discussant at a panel or roundtable.

Only original papers will be permitted for presentation and those which have not been previously published. All papers will be considered for publication in ASC's Sage Research Series.

Serving on the Program Committee with *Barak-Glantz* and *Harry Allen*, ASC President, are *Raymond J. Michalowski, Jr.*, University of North Carolina; *Gordon Waldo*, Florida State University; and *Ronald Huff*, The Ohio State University.

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In Memoriam

MICHAEL J. HINDELANG 1945-1982

Michael J Hindelang, Professor at the School of Criminal Justice, SUNYA, and founder of the Criminal Justice Research Center, died on March 27 after an illness of several years. He is survived by his wife, Mary Lee Newell.

Michael received his bachelor's degree in psychology in 1966 and his master's degree in social psychology in 1967 from Wayne State University. He received his master's degree in criminology in 1968 and a doctorate in criminology in 1969 from the University of California at Berkeley. After teaching briefly at California State University at Los Angeles and the University of Washington at Seattle, Michael joined the faculty at Albany in 1970 and was appointed a full professor in 1976.

Michael served as associate editor of the *Journal of Research in Crime and Delinquency* and of the *American Sociological Review*, as well as on the editorial boards of the *Journal of Criminal Justice*, *Criminology*, and *Law and Human Behavior*. He served as a consultant to numerous commissions, research projects and criminal justice agencies.

Michael's contributions to criminology are prodigious. His interests lay primarily in the areas of assessment of sources of crime data, correlates of crime, and the utilization of crime data for testing theories of crime causation. In addition to many journal articles, he authored *Criminal Victimization in Eight American Cities*, and co-authored *Victims of Personal Crime* and *Measuring Delinquency*. He created and edited eight volumes of the *Sourcebook of Criminal Justice Statistics*.

Michael was a Fellow of the American Society of Criminology. His scholarship and his presence will be sorely missed. A Michael J. Hindelang Memorial Scholarship Fund has been established at the State University of New York. HIGHLIGHTS OF ASC BOARD MEETINGS

March 6, 1982

Harry E. Allen, President, presided over the meeting, which was held in Columbus, Ohio.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer *Charles H. McCaghy* reported the Society's financial position was excellent. An application for Institutional Membership was received from Jacksonville State University and approved unanimously by the Board.

Finance Committee Report: *Ronald Huff*, Finance Committee chair, submitted a 10 month budget for approval, due to the Board's recent decision to change the membership year to January through December, beginning January 1, 1983.

The Committee recommended that the services of *John Resler* be retained to conduct an audit of the Society's books and accounting procedures.

The Committee also recommended a one-year contract for *Harve Horowitz*, ASC's advertising and marketing representative, subject to the approval of ASC's legal counsel.

Archives Committee Report: The Archives Committee, consisting of *Ron Huff*, *Joseph E. Scott*, and *Dennis Longmire* met with library officials at OSU, who expressed an interest in handling the archives of the Society.

The National Historical Records Society provides funding for setting up archives and a motion was made to ask the ASC Contracts and Grants Committee to contact the NHRS to explore the possibility of a feasibility grant to establish the archives at OSU with the AD Hoc Archives Committee providing assistance.

Membership Committee Report: *Chris Eskridge* reported that as of February 28, the ASC membership totalled 1,890 members with a total of 437 new members recruited during the 1981-82 membership year—232 actives and 205 students. The Committee will continue the present Institutional orientation and yearly survey of former members.

Publications Committee Report: *Barbara Price* reported that the Publications Committee had met in Washington, D.C. at the Annual Meeting to make plans for the search for a new newsletter editor.

Two applications have been received to date, and the Committee unanimously agreed that the time period be extended with another announcement to appear in the newsletter and a direct announcement to the membership.

Fellows Committee Report: Fellow awards for 1982 will be issued to: *Lloyd Ohlin*, Harvard Law School; *Lamar Empey*, University of Southern California; *Joan McCord*, Drexel University; and *Sue Titus Reid*, University of Tulsa.

Site Selection Committee Report: *Edward Latessa* reported that the Committee is soliciting the ASC membership, through the newsletter, for sites for the 1987 Annual Meeting.

Confirmed Annual Meeting sites are: 1982, Toronto; 1983, Denver; 1984, Cincinnati; 1985, San Diego; and 1986, Baltimore.

1982 Annual Meeting Report: *Israel Barak-Glantz*, Program Chair, reported that over 100 sessions and panels have been committed for the Toronto meeting which will be held for three full days, November 4-6.

A potential for almost 900 program participants, including plenary sessions, panels, and roundtables, is projected.

Three plenary sessions are scheduled: "Law Enforcement," organized by *Albert Reiss, Jr.*; "Courts and Lawyers," organized by *Marvin Zallman*; and "Corrections," organized by *Marvin Wolfgang*.

John Jay College has offered to sponsor a cocktail party during the meeting. The banquet is planned for Friday evening, and the last session of the meeting should be concluded by 7:00 p.m. on Saturday evening.

1982-83 Elections Report: *Roland Chilton*, Executive Secretary, reported that 1982-83 election ballots had been mailed to active members in good standing the last week in February with a deadline of May 30 for their return. The results of the election will be announced at the Business Meeting in Toronto.

1983 Annual Meeting Program Chair: President-Elect *Travis Hirschi* submitted the name of *Joseph E. Scott*, Ohio State University, as 1983 Program Chair, which was unanimously approved by the Board. Recommendations for the 1983 Program Committee will be made at the November Board meeting.

Amicus Brief: *Albert Reiss, Jr.* reported that after consulting with a number of people, it seemed unwise for the Society to pursue the preparation of an Amicus Brief due to the cost and the case itself. A motion was made and approved to take no further action on the Amicus Brief.

Awards Committee Report: The Board approved the following 1982 ASC Award Winners: EDWIN SUTHERLAND AWARD: *Gwynn Nettler*, University of Alberta; AUGUST VOLLMER AWARD: *Don Gottfredson*, Rutgers University; SELLIN-GLUECK AWARD: *Frederick McClintock*, University of Edinburgh, Scotland; and HERBERT BLOCH AWARD: *James Inciardi*, University of Delaware.

Award presentations will be made at the 1982 Annual Meeting in Toronto.

ASC Local Chapters: The Board authorized *Marilyn Slivka* to convene a group of people to explore the possibility of creating a local chapter of ASC in Philadelphia and to provide an interim report at the November 1982 Board meeting of progress.

Ad Hoc Committee on Criminology and Criminal Justice Education: The Board approved the Committee's recommendation to develop special institutes, workshops, or seminars at the Annual Meeting as a continuing education service to ASC members.

A committee consisting of *Chris Eskridge*, *Alvin Cohn*, and *Travis Hirschi*, Chair, will develop the concept and report progress to the Board at the November meeting.

ASC Resource Personnel: The Board authorized the President to respond on behalf of the Society to outside requests for names of resource personnel when requests are received from colleges and universities to review departmental programs.

ASC Sage Research Progress Series: *Michael Gottfredson*, editor of the Sage Research Progress Series, announced the editors and content of the 1981 meeting volumes: *Merry Morash*, Michigan State University: **The Implementation of Criminal Justice Policy**; *John Hagan*, University of Wisconsin: **Methodological Developments in Criminological Research, Vols. I and II**; *Harold E. Pepinsky*, Indiana University: **Breaking the Criminological Mold**; and *Victoria Swigert*, Holy Cross College: **Law and the Legal Process**.

These volumes will be available for sale at the Toronto meeting.

LEGISLATION

Exclusionary Rule. The Senate Subcommittee on Criminal Law has held a series of hearings on S. 101, S. 751, and S. 1995, bills that would eliminate or modify the application of the exclusionary rule.

The Administration has suggested legislation that would provide that evidence would not be excluded even if it were subsequently ruled to have been obtained in violation of the Fourth Amendment if it were seized by an officer acting in the reasonable and good faith belief that his actions were lawful.

A draft bill setting forth the Administration's position has been transmitted to the Congress and was introduced as S. 2231 on March 18, 1982 by Chairman *Thurmond*.

Firearms. Numerous bills representing a wide variety of views on gun control are still pending before the Judiciary Committees of House and Senate. Most of the bills include a provision for a mandatory prison sentence for the use of a firearm in the commission of a federal felony.

In other respects, the bills range from proposals for stricter control of guns to those to loosen some current provisions in the Gun Control Act.

The Judiciary Committee apparently concluded hearings on S. 1030 (the Volkmer-McClure bill), and has begun hearings on S. 974 (the Kennedy-Rodino bill). As of this writing, no House hearings have been held.

Bail Reform. As of the writing of this article, the Senate had not yet voted on S. 1554, the comprehensive bail bill approved by the Judiciary Committee, which includes a provision for pretrial detention of particularly dangerous defendants.

In the House, Rep. *Kastenmeier's* Subcommittee on Courts, Civil Liberties, and the Administration of Justice held, in February, what appears to be the last of its hearings on several bail bills, including H.R. 4362, a bill which is substantially similar to S. 1554.

It is likely that the Subcommittee will soon mark-up bail reform legislation that includes some stronger measures to address the problem of bail crime.

Criminal Forfeiture. In early March, Rep. *Hughes'* Subcommittee on Crime held another hearing on legislation to enhance the use of forfeiture in narcotics and racketeering cases. Rep. *Hughes* has drawn on several earlier forfeiture bills in developing his bill, H.R. 5371.

At the hearing, the Department of Justice testified both on H.R. 5371, and on its own criminal forfeiture legislation which had just been sent to the Congress.

There is considerable interest on both sides of the Congress in forfeiture legislation, which has been generated primarily by the view that forfeiture can be utilized more fully as a law enforcement tool in combatting extremely lucrative, large scale narcotics trafficking.

LEGISLATION

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Donation of Surplus Federal Property to States for Prison Use. Although the Federal Government has already commenced a program of donating surplus property to States for use in establishing correctional facilities, legislation is being sought to facilitate such property transfers.

The Senate Governmental Affairs Committee has recently reported S. 1422, which is supported by the *Reagan* Administration. A companion House bill, H.R. 4450, was scheduled to be the subject of hearings before the House Government Operations Committee, on April 20.

GORDON NAMED PRESIDENT OF NCCD

Diana R. Gordon has been named president of the National Council on Crime and Delinquency. She succeeds *Milton G. Rector*, who was named president emeritus and who will be with the organization as a fellow for one year. *Rector* was president of NCCD for 22 years.

Gordon, a Harvard Law School graduate and member of ASC, came to NCCD in 1978 from the Citizens Inquiry on Parole and Criminal Justice where she had been director since 1973. She served NCCD as vice president from 1978 to 1980 and as executive vice president from 1980 to 1982.

Prior to 1973, *Gordon* had been a consultant for a number of organizations, among them the Fund for the City of New York, the New York State Charter Revision Commission and the Community Service Society.

IX INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS IN CRIMINOLOGY SET

"The IXTH International Congress in Criminology will be held in Autumn 1983," *Denis Szabo* announced. The Congress will deal with the relationship between criminology and public policy, and is scheduled to convene in Vienna, September 26-30.

Four separate topic sections will be addressed, Szabo noted. These include:

1. The status and roles of criminology, and its institutional relations with public policy and practice.
2. The creations of laws and their reception by society (legislation).
3. The public policies and practices proper to the criminal justice system (punishment and treatment).
4. Policies and practices of informal social control outside the criminal justice system (prevention).

The Congress will convene for six days, and there will be numerous informal meetings as well as scheduled panels and workshops. Work being presented can be of an historical or theoretical nature. ASC participation is encouraged, and papers must be received by December 31, 1982.
