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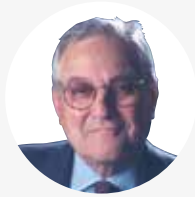


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TAWFIQ KHOURY, GENTLEMAN TITAN OF WINE COLLECTING, 1930-2020

In April of 1997 Zachys-Christie's conducted an extraordinary single owner sale of wine on behalf of legendary collector and connoisseur Tawfiq Khoury. That sale, with large formats, spans of older vintages, and provenance which together will likely not be seen again, included 10,000 bottles of a collection which had peaked at 65,000 in the early 1990s. At the time Tawfiq explained his reasons for selling to Michael Broadbent: "We travel well over half the year and in any case no longer entertain on the scale that prevailed some 10 or 15 years ago. Yet wine is to be shared, not hoarded. After allowing for the next generation, and for our own needs over a hopefully long life expectancy, it is time to part with a portion of the cellar. In truth a sad parting."

Tawfiq's decision proved to be prescient. With his wife Richel, Tawfiq traveled the world for much of the subsequent 23 years, often with their children, and eventually six grandchildren. He purchased and set aside substantial stocks of birthyear vintages for them, much of which remain in the cellar today. To continue to enjoy his cellar while traveling, Tawfiq arranged to stash a quantity of special and large format bottles on his favorite cruise ship, and would always share with the crew. Though long retired from business, Tawfiq continued to purchase current wines that he enjoyed, both European and California, for family and friends. While most of these remain in the cellar, the family have decided to sell the majority of the remaining treasures prior to the 2000 vintage, about sixteen hundred rare bottles comprising this offering.

Much of the Khoury Collection was amassed in an intense period of purchasing from auctions conducted by Christie's London and Chicago, Sotheby's and reputable retailers, in the late 1970s and 1980s. During this period Tawfiq kept meticulous records of his purchases in handwritten ledger books organized by wine. Zachys' wine auction team have been given access to these records, along with several fascinating diaries recording tastings and travel in the 1980s. Quotes from the latter have been excerpted for this catalogue.

Tawfiq Khoury was one of the last of the "great generation" of wine collectors, who gained access to a wider range of wines as the trade in fine wine expanded in the 1970s and 1980s. Among them were Ben Ichinose, Marvin Overton, Lloyd Flatt, Barney Rhodes, Robert Knudsen, Haskell Norman, and Lou Skinner, all of whom were good friends of the Khourys. This U.S. based collecting group were frequently joined by distinguished members of the European trade, including Michael Broadbent, Hugh Johnson, Harry Waugh, and Edmund Penning-Roswell. Tawfiq also loved California wines, and often enjoyed the company of Bob and Margrit Mondavi and Joe and Alice Heitz.

Yquem and Madeira fascinated Tawfiq. He collected an extraordinary quantity of both, and an amazing range will be offered in this sale. Madeira is ageless, and Yquem almost so, given its high sugar content, especially in the warmest vintages. The range of Yquem offered here is astounding—sixty one vintages dating back to 1890. How recently have you seen magnums of Yquem 1937, if ever? And drier whites such as Haut-Brion Blanc 1937 and Château Ygrec 1959 (the first vintage)? Twenty different 18th and 19th century Madeiras? Tawfiq loved Champagne and purchased it in multiple case quantities. Dozens of magnums and bottles of Dom Pérignon from 1964 through 1982, carefully stored since original purchase, still remain and are to be offered in this sale. Not to mention six of the twenty five (!) Roederer Cristal 1990 vintage millennium methusalems Tawfiq purchased directly from Roederer. One senses the towering nature of the collection at its height even in this final offering.

Collectors of great classic wines will not want to miss an opportunity to purchase magnums of Cheval Blanc 1947 and Mouton Rothschild 1945, thirteen vintages of Latour back to 1930, nine vintages of La Tâche back to 1937, rarest German sweet wines of the golden era 1920-1971, and many "onesies" and "twosies" of wines that will be highlights for tastings by collectors keen to gain an appreciation the finest wines of the last two centuries. All bottles in this sale will carry a "Khoury Collection" sticker to mark their important provenance.

Much has been written about Tawfiq Khoury: his immigration to the U.S. as a teenager, great academic success at the University of Michigan, business prowess as a home builder in Southern California, extraordinary devotion to his wife Richel and his family, his philanthropy, and his entertaining and connoisseurship of food and wine. "Wine was my passport to the world," Tawfiq explained. "Wine and food were just the medium, the reason, or the excuse to get together with friends and to share and learn from one another. Friendships were what mattered most."

CHAMPAGNE

DOM PÉRIGNON

Dom Pérignon - the name alone makes most of us break out in a delightful smile. When we think of this 17th-century monk from Hautvillers - so often pointed out as the father of Champagne - we either regard him with historical reverence, or associate his name with the proudest of all wine labels and everything else that follows in its glamorous, sparkling wake...

Back in 1936, Moët & Chandon's marketing director Robert- Jean de Vogüé could not possibly have imagined what he had done when he dreamed up the idea of the world's first prestige champagne - a champagne with a sky-high price that was supposed to be even better than the vintage wine, along with a spectacular look that won respect and prompted extravagant enjoyment...

The style itself is ultra-sophisticated, with an amazingly silky softness combined with toasted fireworks, backed up by an exotic fruitiness in a medium body. When Dom Pérignon is at its best I find notes of forest morelles, cream, peach and an overabundance of roasted coffee beans and nuttiness. Dom Pérignon Rosé is an even more exquisite and rare product that has been molded in a similar form, though its full-bodied shape leans more to strawberry or orange, where the whiter somewhat lighter variety becomes exotic and toasted. Dom Pérignon Oenothèque is the latest child in this distinguished family. At Richard Geoffroy's initiative they now release a restricted number of old, well-preserved bottles from Moët's own cellar in different stages of maturity. The wine can be newly disgorged, but it isn't a fixed thing. What is guaranteed, however, is that the wines are in the best possible condition, and that they most likely will act a little more youthfully than the bottles that have been out on the market for a while. This treasure is now decorated with a luxurious black label in unmistakable style.

And speaking of style...In an age when PR people constantly want to minimize labels and change both bottle design and packaging, Dom Pérignon stands there like a Sophia Loren of the champagne world, unchanged and as timelessly sexy. The balance conveyed in the subtly curvaceous shape of the bottle, paired with an olive green label in the shape of a coat of arms adorned with cursive writing, is still as magical as ever. Since 1970 the wine itself is made exclusively in steel tanks and the grapes are mainly Pinot Noir from Aÿ, Bouzy, Verzenay and Hautvillers, as well as Chardonnay in approximately equal amounts from Cramant and Mesnil.

LOUIS ROEDERER

Roederer did not get its present name until 1833, but was in existence as far back as 1760 under the name of Dubois Père & Fils. Louis Roederer was a hardworking man who succeeded in selling his Champagne in several important export markets. Roederer's real ace was, as with Clicquot, the Russian market. Tsar Alexander II wanted a more impressive label to show his guests, and in 1876 he made a special order for the first transparent Cristal bottles, which at that time actually were made of genuine crystal...in the 1930s...Camille Olry-Roederer took the helm. She invested the money earned from sales in some exceptional vineyards: in Aÿ, Hautvillers, Cumières, Louvois, Verzy, Verzenay, Vertus, Avize, Cramant, Chouilly, and Le Mesnil. Roederer also owns several well-respected vineyards in other locations: Roederer Estate, Ramos Pinto, Haut-Beauséjour and Château de Pez. Today the firm is the most financially successful in the region, thanks largely to these vineyards, which supply Roederer with some seventy percent of its grapes. The house is now run by Jean-Claude Rouzaud who works according to the same principles as those applied in past decades...Roederer is without doubt a brilliant Champagne house with an exceptional portfolio of wines. The non-vintage Champagne is brilliant. The Rosé and Blanc de Blancs offer an aristocratic elegance typical of the house, and the vintage wine is always among the best. Cristal is today the most sought-after cuvée de prestige, and has perhaps the most appetizing appearance of any wine in the world. Cristal Rosé is not only the most expensive rosé Champagne—it is obviously the best. In my opinion, this house is one of the four best in all of Champagne. Every vintage is stunning.

DOMAINE DE LA ROMANÉE-CONTI

The domaine is known for picking very late, sometimes, as in 1978, later than any other producers. They prune endlessly, make many passes through the vineyards at harvest and sort grapes rigorously both in the vineyard and at the winery. Average age of the vines is around thirty-five to forty-five years with yields typically around thirty hl/ha. The wines are aged in new French oak casks for approximately twenty months. There is usually only one racking and since 1985 the wines from all casks in each cru have been blended together prior to bottling to reduce bottle variation. Recently they have been moving towards biodynamic viticultural practices. Like many of the region's leading growers they have seen concrete evidence of soil and vine health improvement. It's hard to imagine that these wines could get better, but that is what separates them from the rest of the pack: an unrelenting pursuit for perfection in the Pinot Noir grape. In addition to the majestic reds, a white is also produced from a plot in Montrachet.

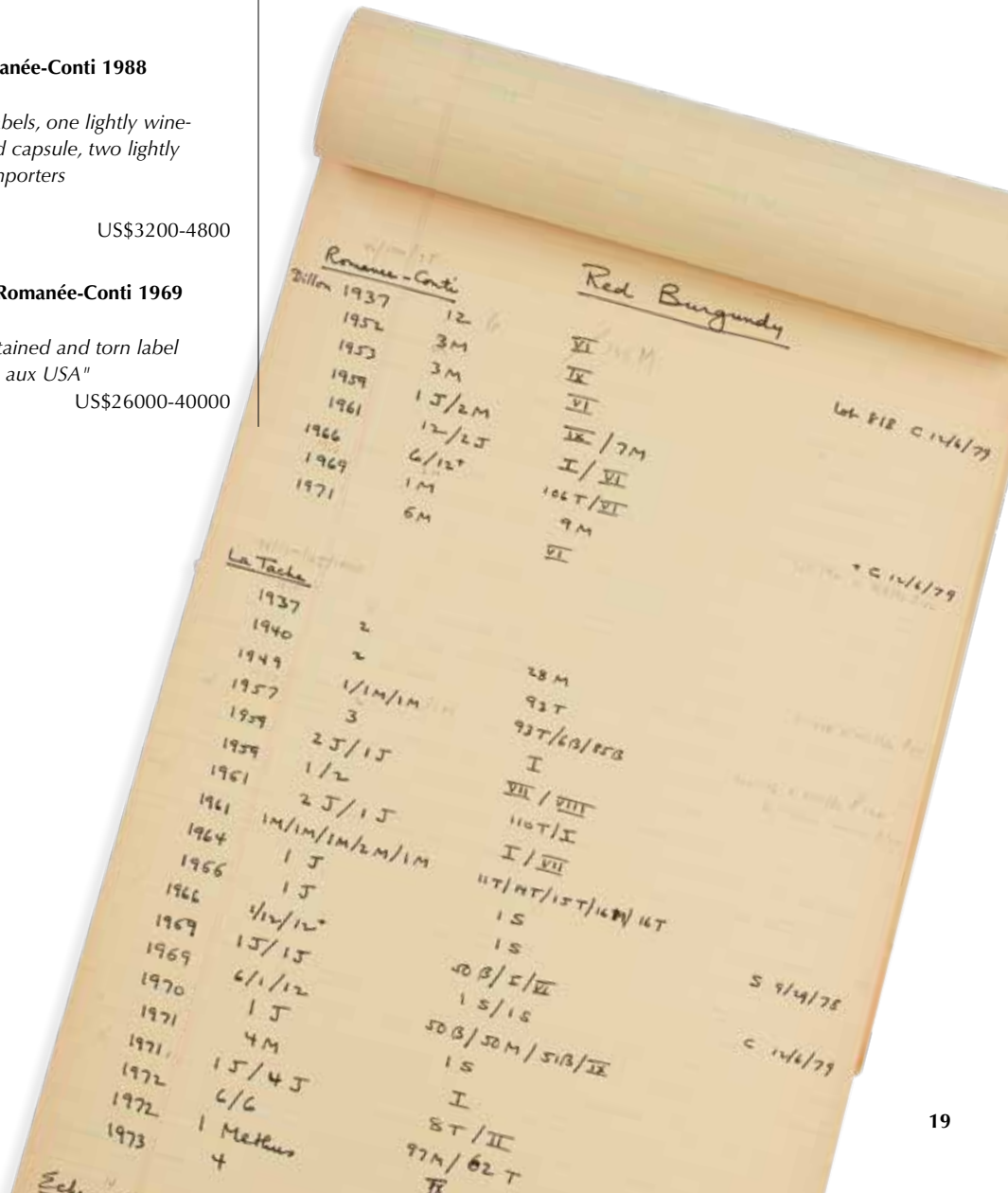

BORDEAUX

CHÂTEAU HAUT-BRION

Haut-Brion has the longest history of all the First Growths. It was even mentioned by Samuel Pepys in his diary entry of April 10, 1663, when he was dining at the Royal Oak Tavern in Lombard Street, London: "...and here drank a sort of French wine called Ho Bryan that hath a good and most particular taste I never met with."

The famous Pontac family set up the estate in the first portion of the sixteenth century. Wealthy and well connected, they had the means to promote the wine in fashionable places, and by the early 1700s it was as well known as a wine of the highest quality.

While parts were split off, the estate stayed with the family until it was passed to Joseph Fumél in 1780. He was largely responsible for creating much of what we see today, including the buildings, the gardens and the general layout of the property. He famously hosted a visit from Thomas Jefferson on May 25, 1787, and became Mayor of Bordeaux three years later.

With its popularity waning under a succession of different owners, the estate was finally put up for auction in 1836, where it was purchased by the Larreau family. Two years later, in 1838, they managed to acquire a further piece of the estate previously lost through inheritance laws.

Although it was included as a First Growth in the 1855 classification of Bordeaux, difficult times lay ahead. A further succession of owners and the depression of the early 1930s forced another sale. This time, successful American financier Clarence Dillon stepped up, and for a little under \$200,000 walked away with the estate. It remains in the Dillon family today.

Vineyards, Winemaking and the Delmas Family

No discussion of the wines of Haut-Brion can be complete without a mention of the Delmas family, who have managed the property since 1923—first George Delmas, then his son Jean-Bernard, and today Jean-Philippe. It is not only unusual but also massively fortunate for Haut-Brion to have the care and attention of such a talented family of technical directors.

Jean-Philippe Delmas is a clever, tirelessly devoted man, and the solid support and financial backing of the Dillon family has enabled him and his team to produce an extremely consistent wine. I always look forward to visiting Château Haut-Brion, not just because the wines are superb and the people great, but also because it is unique and has an important place in the history of Bordeaux.

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CHÂTEAU LAFITE ROTHSCHILD

For as long as anyone can remember, Lafite has been the most highly regarded wine in Bordeaux. From their very first book, published in 1845, Cocks & Feret have listed Lafite first, and it was ranked first in the famous 1855 classification of Bordeaux.

Fite is an old French term meaning small hill, rise or mound; it is from this humble feature in Bordeaux' somewhat bland landscape that France's most esteemed producer takes its name. The Château itself is one of the oldest in Bordeaux, with much of it dating from the mid-sixteenth century. It was purchased by the wealthy Ségur family in the seventeenth century, but like much of the region at the time, the land was used for a variety of farming.

Beginning in the 1670s, the Ségurs spent around twenty years converting a large portion of the land to vineyards. With Latour and Calon, as well as Lafite, under their ownership, the Ségurs began to find a market for their wines in London. It was first mentioned in the London Gazette in 1707 and soon became famous: by the early 1730s, it was a favorite of the Prime Minister, Robert Walpole.

Lafite remained in the Ségur family until 1784. It was sold several times, finally to Baron de Rothschild in 1868, by which time there were some seventy-four hectares of vines. It was a new era of industrial wealth and the Rothschild purchase certainly added much celebrity to the area.

CHATEAU LATOUR

Some of my fondest wine memories are of drinking wine bottles of the renowned Château Latour. It is, without a doubt, one of the greatest wine estates in the world. While its history goes well back to the fourteenth century, Latour began to be clearly defined as one of the greatest wine estates in the world in the mid-nineteenth century, and amazingly, It has kept that position for the last 150 years. Their wines, which are known for their power, richness and longevity, are sought after by collectors and wine lovers throughout the world.

As Robert M. Parker says of Château Latour in *The World's Greatest Wine Estates*, "The wine produced here has been an impeccable model of consistent excellence, in great, mediocre, and poor vintages. For that reason, many have long considered Latour to be the Médoc's finest wine... Latour remains one of the most concentrated, rich, tannic, and full-bodied wines in the world."

In 2000, I had the wonderful opportunity to taste over twenty-five vintages of Château Latour, including fourteen wines older than 1961 and four from the nineteenth century. It was an evening I will never forget. The wines were so rich, alive and fresh. What an extraordinary experience it was to be able to taste the 1900 and the 1899 side by side and discuss the differences, or to argue whether the 1955 or the 1949 is showing better right now (at my table we all thought the 1955 had the slight edge). In the end we tasted Latour from a 125 year span and although there was a lot of discussion about which were the better wines, the final conclusion of everyone in the room was that, "Latour makes some of the greatest wines that any of us have ever tasted."

The choice of a wine with the cheese course was also pre-ordained. When Hugh [Johnson] attended my surprise 50th birthday party in San Diego, Richel [Tawfiq's wife] chose a Jeroboam of 1929 Mouton Rothschild as the main red wine, justifying the selection by the fact that I missed being a '29 by a mere 4 days, having been born on January 3rd. But, for the fun of it, she also opened a bottle of the 1930 Latour, from my real birthyear, more for history than for expected drinkability. Well, the '30 Latour surprised us all, and Hugh, who had never tasted it before, actually liked it very much, as did I. There aren't many of those bottles around, and indeed I originally owned only three of the, purchased at a Christie's auction of some of Château Latour's private stock a few months ago. Having consumed one at my 50th, I had planned to reserve one for my 75th, and the third, optimistically, to start of my second century! Ben Ichinose, somehow, found another bottle, and presented it to me as a gift. Harry Waugh and Michael Broadbent next got in on the act, and through their good offices, I was presented with one more bottle by the Château. It was hand carried from Latour to London by Mr. Gibson personally, where it remained in storage with Michael. Thus the '30 Latour was the clear choice with the cheese, especially since neither Broadbent nor Penning-Roswell had ever tasted it either... It simply astonished everyone. This particular bottle was reworked in '67, was brown of color but no overly so, and proved spicy and very flavorsome, with some sweetness to the taste and fragrant violets in the nose. Hugh 'adored it,' Penning-Roswell dispelled one of my many attempts at explaining its unexpected showing: I have often theorized that the chateau had bottled some of their '29 as a '30: but he disagreed, pointing out the considerable difference in style between the '30 we had before us, and the '29s we all remember. Whatever the explanation, the bottle surprised and pleased my friends, and upheld Latour's reputation for doing a good job in hopeless years.

CHÂTEAU MOUTON ROTHSCHILD

Mouton, like much of Pauillac in the sixteenth century, was part of the sprawling Ségur estate. In the mid-eighteenth century the land that is now Mouton Rothschild was acquired by Baron de Brane, who changed the name to Brane-Mouton. Brane sold it in 1830 to an M Thuret; while it was already a notable Château, first appearing in a Christie's catalog in 1834, Thuret did not make maintenance of the Château a priority and resold it in 1853. The purchaser was Baron Nathaniel de Rothschild, at the time head of the English arm of the wealthy Rothschild family.

While Mouton was always a highly regarded wine, a big change came when in 1922, when the twenty-one-year-old Baron Philippe decided to run the Château full-time. An innovator from the start of his tenure, in 1924 he decided that in order to guarantee quality the entire production would be bottled at the Château, and from 1934 he numbered each bottle released. Also, of course, he started the tradition of works of art on Mouton labels, featuring the famous Carlu ram's head from 1924 to 1926, and since a hiatus from then until 1945, each label has either been designed by a major artist or featured a tribute to a significant event in the Château's history.

Perhaps his most significant achievement was persuading the French Minister for Agriculture, Jacques Chirac, that Mouton was and had always been a First Growth that had been wrongly classified. So, in 1973, for the first and only time, a revised edition of the 1855 classification was released with Mouton finally ranked, next to its Pauillac neighbors Lafite and Latour, as a First Growth.

PETRUS

Petrus today is a little over eleven hectares, including five hectares purchased in 1969 from neighboring Château Gazin. The vineyards have clay topsoil and gravelly subsoil, allowing good initial water retention but excellent longer term drainage. The vines are old, around forty to fifty years, planted with ninety percent Merlot and five percent Cabernet Franc. To increase concentration the vines are pruned extensively and a green harvest is performed. At harvest time, nearly two hundred workers pick the grapes at their peak of balance and ripeness. Sometimes up to four passes are needed but if pressed, as in 1982, the entire harvest can be completed in just one day.

The grapes are partially destemmed and after a fairly lengthy maceration period, sometimes almost a month, the wine spends twenty months in new oak before being fined (but not filtered) and bottled. Petrus is a classic example of careful vineyard management and winemaking yet the result leaves evidence of something even greater. These methods combine with exquisite terroir for Merlot to create something that is, in good vintages, not only earth-shatteringly tasty, but distinctive, lending the name Petrus majesty because of its quality but also its inimitability.

CHÂTEAU D'YQUEM

Château d'Yquem is the apex qualitatively and the centre geographically of the Sauternes area. Each major property occupies its own little hill. Yquem's is the highest. It is also the largest estate, the most perfectionistic, the most consistent. Unlike the rest of the region there was no cutting of corners, no lack of investment, no dip in quality in the sad days of the 1960s and 1970s.

At Yquem we have Sauternes winemaking at its most perfectionistic. The vines are pruned to yield nine hl/ha – one glass per vine (as opposed to a full bottle in a classified growth red wine château). Collection of the grapes is berry by botrytised berry, rather than by bunch or half-bunch elsewhere. The grapes are crushed in a small horizontal hydraulic press in three stages. Unlike in Champagne, for example, the first pressing does not necessarily give the best wine. There is no débourage before the wine is put into cask. Fermentation and ageing is in new oak, of course, the latter taking place in a splendid underground cellar, constructed in 1987. The assemblage is late and the wine is not bottled for three years or more. Only then is it put on the market...

There is something very special, and indeed very consistent, about Yquem. The wine is more oaky than most in its youth. It is by quite some way the richest, most concentrated, most intense wine of its kind. In great years – I have a marginal preference for 1989 over 1990 and 1988 – it is nectar: the liquid quintessence of concentrated sunbeams, to quote Thomas Love Peacock.

Back came the gracious 'thank you,' advising Alexandre how much the PM appreciated receiving the great '21s, and how, as a man born in 1920, Trudeau is most appreciative to have two great bottles from the year closest to his birth year!

Marcel Guigal - perfectionist, fanatical, pernickety – is the super-star of the appellation and probably sells more Côte-Rôtie under his own label than all the other growers combined. Despite this size, however, the quality is exemplary - as they should be at the prices he charges! He harvests late, insists on very low yields, and keeps the wines in a combination of barrel and small foudres and demi-muids, all newish wood, for up to three and a half years before bottling. Their wines are so concentrated they can withstand this wait without drying out, and remain profound, rich and individual. La Landonne is the Brune, La Mouline the Blonde, La Turque the sort of hermaphroditic mixture. Usually my favourite is the Landonne. The Château d'Ampuis bottling combines elements of both the sectors of Côte-Rôtie, from vines in the climats of La Pommier, Le Pavillon, La Garde and Le Clos.

SASSICAIA

Tenuta San Guido is named after the Saint Guido della Gherardesca who lived during the eleventh century. It is located on the Tyrrhenian coast, between Leghorn and Grosseto, in Maremma an area made famous by Italian Nobel prize winner Giosuè Carducci, and it stretches for 13 km from the sea to the hills. Three are its defining characteristics: the Sassicaia wine, the Razza Dormello-Olgiate thoroughbred studfarm and the Bird Sanctuary Oasi di Bolgheri. They divide the estate between the Oasi on the coast, the horse's training grounds on the plain, and the vineyards planted up to 350 meters on the hills. The latter have been given their own DOC, the DOC Bolgheri Sassicaia, the first, and so far only case in Italy of a DOC contained in one estate. The wedding of Mario Incisa della Rocchetta and Clarice della Gherardesca on October 18th 1930, started it all. They shared a love for thoroughbred horses that made them form a partnership with horse breeder and trainer Federico Tesio. Mario Incisa's love of good wine made him plant Cabernet vines in 1942 for what was to become Sassicaia. Seventeen years later the Oasi of Bolgheri becomes Italy's first Italian private nature preserve. In 1966 it is, with the Oasi of the lake of Burano, the first WWF Wildlife Refuge in Italy.

"I know of no wine of its class that can beat Madeira when at its best...In fact, I think Madeira and Burgundy carry combined intensity and complexity of vinous delights further than any other wine." This note was penned by George Saintsbury over a hundred years ago and is the opening line in the intensive study of the wine region of Madeira, entitled Madeira, by Alex Liddell. Though this delectable elixir fell out of favor almost altogether in the twentieth century, the wine market has turned and a wave of distinguished connoisseurs has once again fallen in love with the beauty that is Madeira wine.

The classical varieties of Madeira listed in order of driest to sweetest are Sercial, Verdelho, Boal and Malvasia (Malmsey). You may also find Terrantez and the nearly extinct Bastardo (of which D'Oliveiras has stock of the 1927). Madeira traditionally is made by arresting the fermentation by fortifying the wine with ninety-six percent alcohol spirit and (with the exception of the austere dry Sercial) leaving gradations of the fruit's sweetness. For vintage Madeira, the wine is then heated naturally in cask (large or small) in a warm area of the winery and allowed to age for an extended period of time. The gradual oxidation and evaporation achieved through the oak ageing and slow, constant heating of the wine allow the sugar, alcohol and dry extract in the wine to concentrate and maderized (burnt/oxidized) notes to evolve. After decades upon decades or even more than a century of time in barrel, the winemaker will then either move the Madeira into large glass bottles (demijohns) or bottle directly to halt the evolution and evaporation of the wine, once he feels it has reached perfection. The huge investment in time and care on the part of the winery produce a bottle that can then stand another lifetime of drinkability, truly a testament to one of the world's most brilliant wines. What is more, I doubt another type of vinous pleasure could be named that one could open tonight as an aperitif or for dessert and then come back to years later for another glass and find that same bottle completely sound! This makes vintage Madeira truly one of the most pleasurable and enduring wine investments on the market today...

We sat down to a first course of exceptional black beans soup with tortilla strips. I had insisted, upon receiving the invitation, and was allowed to take with me to Fort Worth two wines, one for the soup course, and the other for dessert. The 1905 Verdelho, Oliveira, Madeira proved an enormous hit. Alexis declared it a 'no mean little Madeira, no passing fancy'. I thought it went perfectly with the soup, and was outstanding without the usual cutting edge of Madeira. Alexis opined that Madeira is inferior: it is now fortified with rum (cane sugar) rather than Brandy (fruit sugar). Overton pronounced the Madeira fantastic, heavenly, with long life ahead.

If payment is not made within 14 calendar days of purchase for live sales and 7 calendar days of purchase for net sales, Zachys reserves the right to impose a late charge of up to 2% per month of the Purchase Price, in addition to any other rights and remedies available by law to Zachys. 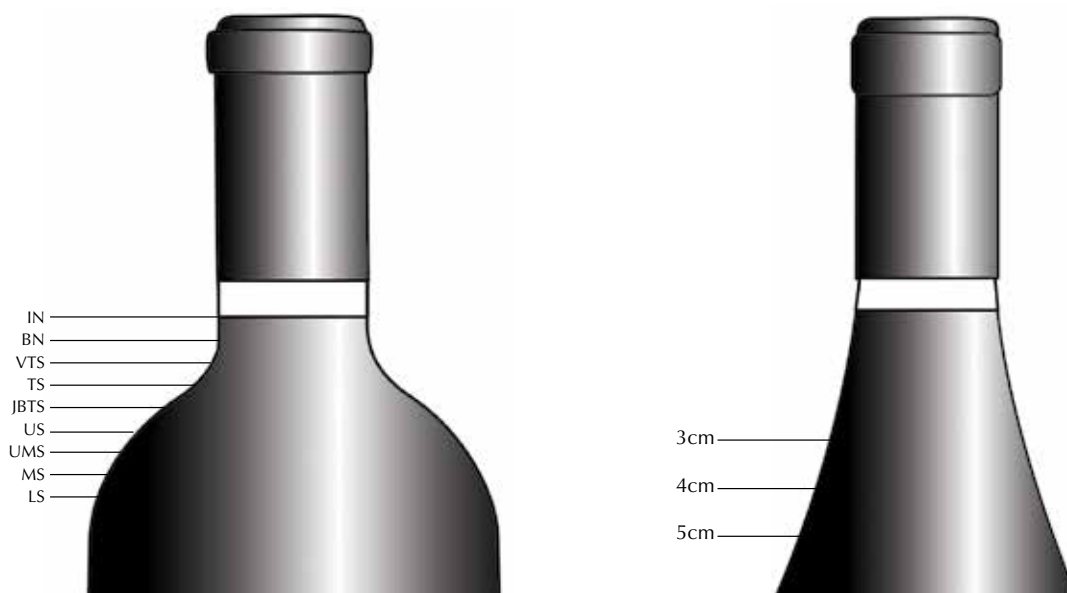

- IN **Into Neck:** Excellent for a wine of any age.
- BN **Bottom Neck:** Excellent for a wine of 10 years or older.
- VTS **Very Top Shoulder:** Normal for any wine 10 years or older.
- TS **Top Shoulder:** Normal for any wine 25 years or older.
- JBTS **Just Below Top Shoulder:** Normal for any wine 30 years or older.
- US **Upper Shoulder:** Slight natural reduction through easing of cork and evaporation through cork and capsule. Very good for any wine over 40 years old. Excellent for any wine over 50 years of age.
- UMS **Upper-Mid Shoulder:** Good for any wine 50-60 years of age.
- MS **Mid Shoulder:** Probably some weakening of the cork. Very good for wines over 50-60 years of age. Estimates usually take this into account.
- LS **Low Shoulder:** Some weakening of cork acceptable if wine or label is exceptionally rare or interesting.

Because of the slope of shoulder, it is impractical to describe levels of Burgundy-shaped bottles as into neck, etc. Wherever appropriate, the level between capsule and wine will be measured and cataloged in centimeters.

The condition and drinkability of Burgundy are less affected by ullage than its equivalent from Bordeaux. For example, a 5 to 7cm. ullage in a 50 year old Burgundy can be considered normal, indeed good for that age; and 3.5 to 4cm., excellent for that age.

Champagne bottle measurements are done from the bottom of the foil to the level of the wine.

Label & Capsule Conditions

Labels and capsules can become soiled, stained, or otherwise marked, especially with wines over 20 years of age. Unless otherwise noted, label conditions will be appropriate for age, but Buyers should note that normal staining, discoloration or other conditions may not be noted if such conditions are appropriate for the age of the label.
